least as long as it took to build the new vehicular bridge. During that time, users woild have to go out-side the park to get across the Milk River, and another gate and attendant would have to be installed on the opposite side of the river. "This park is for 22,000

people," said Mayor George Freeman. "For many of them, there are great con-cerns for getting from one side to the other.' "I'll never vote in favor of it until there's a way for a person to get to the other

side without having to go outside of the park," said Councilman Thomas Fahrner, powerboat owner. Mr. Hallm'an said the af fected boat owners would now be notified of the situation, and could decide for themselves whether to rent the wells this year.

Prices for the wells inside the bridge were set at \$130no change from last yearwhile the lake side wells were upped to \$260 by the council action.



Bess Bonnier Brings Her Jazz Expertise to North High School

History, Too The course runs two days each week,

On Tuesdays Bonnier speaks to four American Studies and Humanities classes about jazz history, emphasizing its position as a unique American Art.

"It's the one universal art America can lay claim to," she says. "I also try to relate jazz to other arts.

My students are urged to write poems, paint pictures or compose music dealing with their feelings and inspirations connected with the course.

"I try to show the relationship of the period of jazz to what went on in America at that particular time: historical and political developments, developments in literature and art. I want people to become aware of how jazz locks into a particular time period.'

Brings Guests

The course Bonnier has put together covers Ragtime and Dixieland as exemplified by Scott Joplin and Louis Armstrong. the Swing Era and its standouts, Benny Goodman, Count Basie, Lester Young and Duke Ellington. Be-bop from Dizzie Gil-lispie through Charlie Parker; jazz of the 50's and 60's through the music of Oscar Peterson, Dave Brubeck, John Coltraine and Miles Davis; and jazz of the 70's and today. Chick Corea, Herbie Hancock, etc.

Detroit jazz musicians such as Matt Michaels, Jack Brokenshaw, George Benson and Marcus Belgrave also have a spot in the course.

She also scheduled a program of artists who came to North to give special performances

Ms. Bonnier's prime objective with the course and program is to open up students' minds where jazz is concerned.

"I think a program like this is fantastic, don't you? It puts the student in touch with parts of our culture they probably wouldn't connect with otherwise. Nathan Judson, band director at It's a great way to broaden their musical

Letters to The Editor

In response to Elizabeth Hirt's February 14 letter to the editor of the NEWS, Cottage Hospital would like readers to know these facts.

The bed reduction plan proposed by the Comprehensive Health Planning Council of Southeastern Michi-gan, (CHPC-SEM), was not designed to promote a more efficient health care system. It was designed to ration health care, place the control of health care in the hands of a few hospitals and in effect, tell you, the consumer, where and from whom you can receive health care.

We believe this for reasons these health care planners cannot dispute:

1. American Hospital Association statistics show it costs less to be hossingle parent and being a pitalized in a community hospital than single in a world of couples. at the larger referral hospitals. Miss Hirt's statement that specialized services cost more in smaller hospitals is not logical. The costly procedures such as CAT scanning, are not even available in community hospitals.

Eighty percent of patients hospitalized today do not need the extraordinary services including open heart surgery or kidney dialysis which are available in larger hospitals and must be amortized in their bills, as well as in the bills of those 20 percent who need them. It does cost less to have routine hospital care in a smaller hospital. The three area hospitals have had service sharing arrangements in our community for many years to avoid duplication of costly and lesser used equipment.

2. Community residents should know that even with the existing number of beds in our area, emergency care services are often seriously curtailed. Like other hospitals, Cottage is frequently forced to reroute ambulances away from its emergency room because of the overload of patients. When beds are reduced in this community, it may become a grave situation, affecting With Cottage Hospital now rou-

tinely providing care for an average of over 210 patients daily with its 191 licensed beds, and Bon Secours and St. John hospitals providing care for over ninety percent occupancy, bed reduction will force you and your family to hospitals elsewhere. That is hospital care rationing.

3. Miss Hirt contends in her letter that ambulatory care will be promoted through bed reduction. You should know that there are no provisions for this in the bed reduction plan. If this is the plan, then people should know how and where it will be available. Will you be happy if care is available downtown?

Miss Hirt has attacked community hospitals for supposedly filling hospital beds with unnecessary surgeries. You should know that admission review procedures at Cottage are done on ALL patients. We face the same standards as do other hospitals.

Professor Peter Schickele will conduct and serve as master of ceremonies for the Detroit Symphony's Weekender Pops concerts Friday and Sunday, March 14 and 16, at Ford Auditorium,

The Friday performance will be at 8:30 o'clock. The Sunday concert is scheduled for 3:30.

The program consists of four works, all written by P.D.Q. Bach: The "Howdy" Symphony in D major, the Royal Firewater Musick, Fuga Meschuga and Fan-tasie Shtick for piano and orchestra.

Tickets for both concerts are sold out.

Professor Schickele was born in Ames, Iowa, and raised in Iowa, Washington, D.C. and Fargo, N.D. His principal composition studies were with Sigvald Thompson, Roy Harris and Vincent Persichetti, After earning degrees at Swarthmore College and the Juilliard School of Music he spent a year in Los Angeles as composer-in-residence on a Ford Foundation grant, following this with four years of teaching, mostly at Juilliard. Since 1965 he has been a free-lancer, involved in many different areas of composition: symphonic, film, tele. vision, theater, choral and chamber music. He is the sole discoverer of the music of P.D.Q. Bach. In Professor Schickele's own words: "WHY?" That is the question most often asked, by musicians and laypersons alike, after concerts of P.D.Q. Bach's music. One of the answers to the question is tied to the devel-opment of the long-playing record: the over-idolizing of historical figures is usually followed by a period of debunking, and during the last couple of decades, (which have seen the recording of virtually everything written by J. S. Bach), there has naturally developed an interest in the soft underbelly of 18th century music, the socalled Seamy Side of the Baroque.

This is perfectly normal and nothing to be worried about.

The author has actually found that P.D.Q. Bach's music is capable of having a therapeutic effect on audiences; the works of J. S. Bach and Mozart are so serenely perfect that many people come away from hearing them with an aggravated inferiority complex caused by the knowledge that no matter how hard they try they can never hope to achieve such beauty, whereas hearing the works of P.D.Q. Bach comforts the listener with the ego building and not unrealistic feeling that, even if he has had no music lessons, he could easily do as well with one ear, as it were, tied behind his back.

Professor Schickele has appeared with the DSO four times before: three times at Ford Auditorium and once at Meadowbrook.
