



## Mack Plan Gets Mixed Reviews From Merchants

John Dinkel used one word to sum up his feelings about the proposed re-designing of storefronts along Mack Avenue in Grosse Pointe Woods.

"Great!" said Dinkel zipping open a case of tomato sauce on the sparkling floor at Roslyn Market.

Four years ago, Dinkel and his wife Barbara bought Roslyn Market on Mack near Roslyn and have spent much of their time and money cleaning up after its former owners.

Today, their store thrives as part of an attractive commercial strip just north of Vernier. The area is the target of a unique plan for preventing the urban blight that is already creeping toward them from Alter Road.

Unlike other urban revitalization plans, the strategy for Mack avenue is to maintain the viability and stability of business and adjacent neighborhoods before blight sets in.

Part of the plan's strategy involves integrating the existing storefronts into a contemporary style "which has some guts and integrity," said Gerald Luedtke, head of the urban planning firm that is currently studying the area with a \$84,000 grant from Wayne County.

Luedtke said he hopes to have the study completed by mid-May and demonstration blocks in each of the Pointes completed by the end of the year at a cost of "several hundred thousand."

So far, about half of the 100 questionnaires Luedtke has mailed to Mack avenue merchants to determine their needs have been completed and returned for computer processing.

Merchants like the Dinkels at Roslyn Market are enthusiastic about the program which they think will effectively prevent blight.

"They're not proposing that drastic of a change, which is good," said Barbara Dinkel referring to Luedtke's preliminary sketches which propose redesigning storefronts by using many existing elements to contain costs.

"They say it looks like a circus now," she said pointing to the various colored awnings on the stores across Mack.

"It can't do anything but help," said Marty Iannace, who's owned Bob's Drugs on Mack and Roslyn since 1957.

Iannace added that he hasn't heard much about financing the project but assumed that if federal dollars and low interest loans are available, the project will be beneficial in the long run and "anyone who doesn't participate would be foolish."

He added that he hopes his fellow merchants will enthusiastically accept the project. "I can't survive by myself. I survive better with a beauty shop, a grocery store (near by)," Iannace said.

Other businessmen were not as enthused as Iannace and the Dinkels. Josef Bogosian owns Josef's Bakery on Mack and says he supports the goal of Luedtke's project but has questions about how it will involve him financially.

"I don't know what it would cost me and I don't know if I would like (Luedtke's design)," Bogosian said.

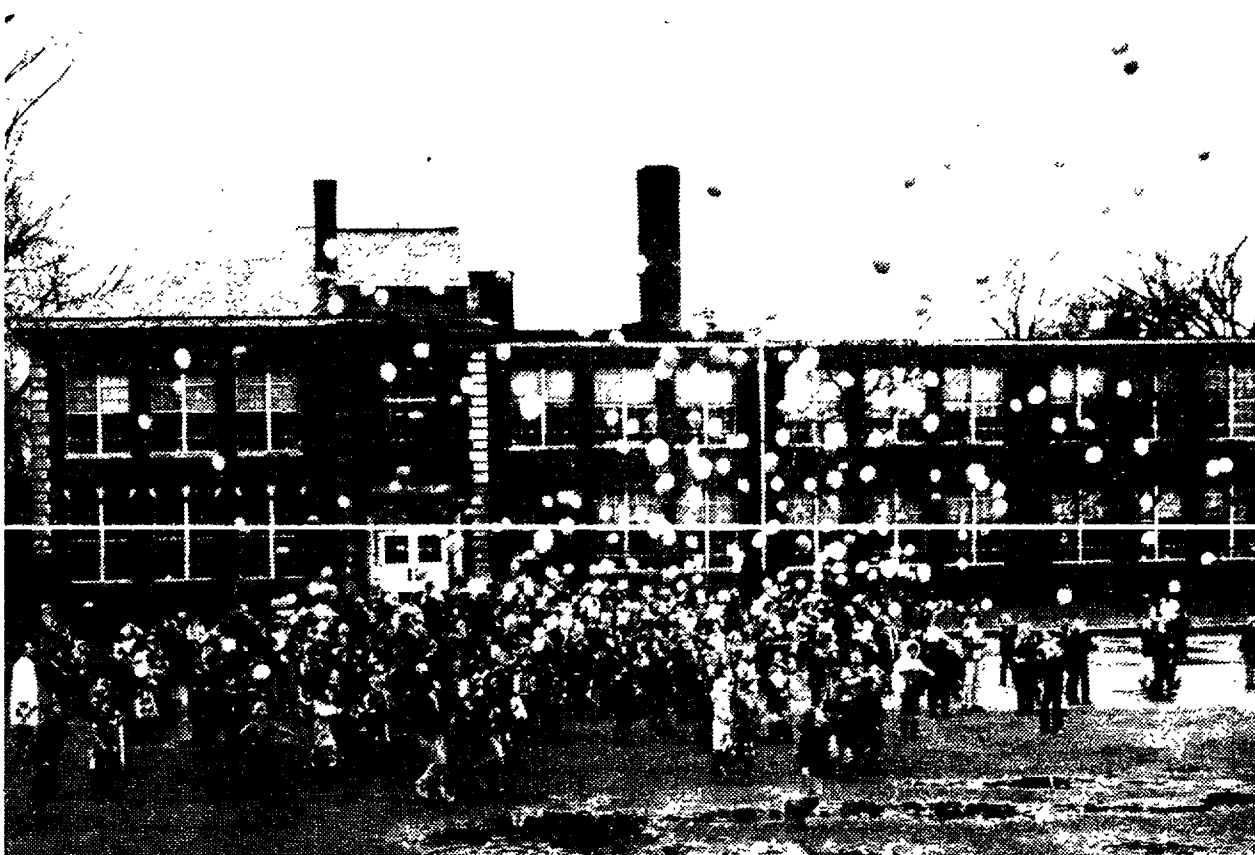
Al Adams, owner of A and A Reel Repair, a fisherman's specialty shop, echoed some of Bogosian's feelings.

"We have to do something whether it's that (Luedtke's design) or another plan... just so they get something going," Adams said.

He added that he is very aware of the impending blight that threatens Mack. "Just take a ride up 7 Mile

## Pointes Join Detroit Aging Agency

The State Commission on Aging approved a three-pronged resolution at its meeting in Lansing last Friday which will combine the cities of Detroit, Hamtramck, Highland Park, Harper Woods and the five Grosse Pointes into a single area agency on aging headed by the city of Detroit.

Detroit has applied to the State Office of Services to the Aging (OSA) requesting designation as a planning and service area to establish the De-

troit Area Agency on Aging.

The 7-6 vote in favor of Detroit's application put an end to speculation as to whether the five Grosse Pointes and Harper Woods would affiliate with the Detroit agency or with the Out-Wayne County Area Agency on Aging. That organization has also filed an application which will be determined at the next State Commission meeting April 18.

**Shores Vote**  
Both Detroit and Wayne County had forwarded invitations to the Pointes and Harper Woods urging them to join their respective agencies. Aside from the Shores, each city had adopted a "wait and see" attitude to deter-

mine which agency would be better equipped to deal with the needs of its senior citizens.

The Shores city council formally voted at its February 25 meeting to join with the Out-Wayne County agency should it be recognized as such by the state. According to trustee Elizabeth Kuhlman, the Wayne County group was offering better representation on its board of directors. However, the question of which agency to side with now becomes academic.

Detroit filed for its application after Mayor Coleman Young decided to limit the planning and service area to Detroit and the surrounding communities to allow for better coordination and im-

plementation of service programs, according to his assistant, Linda M. Bade.

The fact that Detroit has roughly 90 percent of the county's senior citizens was another factor in his decision, Bade said.

"This in itself indicates that our needs are considerably different (from the rest of the county)," she added.

Bade indicated that the agency has a board of directors with 14 members at present. The Grosse Pointes and Harper Woods will have one representative between them on the board.

There also will be an Advisory Board, as yet not formed, which will include one representative from each city. Bade said it was important that the local representatives on the board of directors and the Advisory Board members get involved as soon as possible in the long-range planning of the agency's policies and programs.

### More Funds

According to Bade, the agency has two main goals. One is to improve existing services in both Detroit and the surrounding eastern communities and the second is to try to leverage additional funding from various state agencies. She mentioned the Department of Commerce, Department of Labor and Department of Health, Education and Welfare as possible sources of further monies.

At present, the Detroit-Wayne County Area Agency on Aging is providing services to the elderly for the entire county. It is funded by state federal funds under

## School Tax Is Approved

Voters approved two tax proposals to fund local schools and libraries by nearly a three-to-one margin in the March 24 millage election.

Just about 17 percent (7,400) of Grosse Pointe's 42,000 registered voters turned out at the polls on the cold, soggy election day to decide on a renewal of 26.55 mills for schools and 1.42 mills for libraries.

The school proposal was approved by a 5,362 to 2,041 vote (72 percent) and the library question by a slightly higher margin, 5,603 to 1,756 (76 percent).

Both proposals were approved in all 10 elementary school voting districts. In the Poupard area the election marked the first time voters had approved a school tax proposal, according to principal Peter Wharton.

The strong support of the tax proposals came after an energetic campaign by a citizens committee headed by Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Semple and Mr. and Mrs. James Long.

What appeared to be missing in Monday's election was organized opposition. In past elections, even those with

light voter turn-out, the "no" voters have usually rallied at least 4,000 to their cause. Just about 2,000 voted against Monday's proposals.

"It was a reasonable proposal and a lot of good, hard workers got that across to voters. It's that simple," said Lloyd Semple. "Now it's up to the School Board to spend it wisely."

Board member Joan Hanpeter attributed the lack of strong opposition to state efforts on tax relief.

"I think the fact there has been some help for senior citizens on taxes eliminated a good deal of that opposition," she said.

## Park Man to Face Trial for Murder

A 49-year-old woman was called by the prosecution to testify at her son's preliminary exam last week on charges he shot and killed a Hamtramck man in her home more than a month ago.

The exam was held March 20 in Grosse Pointe Park Municipal Court.

Doris Eubank of Berkshire road told Visiting Judge Stan Kazul that her son, John 24, had been under psychiatric care for the last four years and described him as "unsteady" the day of the shooting.

### Cottage Safe?

The NEWS learned late Tuesday (as the paper went to press) the legislature's Joint Committee on Administrative Rules unanimously rejected guidelines directing the Comprehensive Health Planning Council and its plan to cut beds in several Detroit area hospitals.

The plan ordered Cottage Hospital to reduce 62 of its 191 beds and would have forced the hospital to close its doors, according to administrators.

In reaction to the vote, Administrator Ralph Willgarde said "We've won a major battle, but not the war."

Eubank faces a second-degree murder charge in the February 17 slaying of a close friend, 23-year-old Timothy Murphy.

Police were called to the Eubank home about 4 a.m. after receiving a report of a fatal shooting at the home. When officers arrived, they discovered Murphy's body in a third floor room. He had been shot in the neck.

The two men had known each other for about six or seven years. Both were graduates of South High School.

Judge Kazul bound Eubank over for trial in Wayne County Circuit Court on April 3 after results of a court-ordered psychiatric exam revealed he was competent to stand trial. He set bond at \$500,000.

Eubank's attorney, John Urso, had requested the court to set a \$10,000 bond with the understanding that his client be placed in a mental care institution under close watch.

Judge Kazul later said the high bond was set to make it "abundantly clear" that Eubank should be kept off the street.

In a quiet, nervous voice, Eubank's mother told the courtroom that Murphy had picked up her son about 5 p.m. the day before the shooting to play in a rock band. They returned home about 3 a.m. the next morning, she said.

Mrs. Eubank said she was worried about her son when he returned because he appeared to be unsteady, and it was evident that he had been drinking.

She also stated that her son had been under medication the previous day.

"I didn't want him to go to sleep," she said.

Mrs. Eubank said she last saw her son and Murphy together on the third floor of the house talking and laughing about 3 a.m.

"They had gone upstairs to watch television," she said.

Mrs. Eubank stated she then went to sleep and was awakened about one hour later by a "loud noise." She went upstairs and found Murphy's body on a pool table.

Police later searched the third floor.

As his mother testified, Eubank listened with his head bowed and his hands cupped to his face. He embraced her before he left the courtroom.

Eubank's father, who had been in the courtroom, said he had not seen his son since the murder.

Mrs. Eubank said she had told her son and Murphy that the murder had been a mistake and that she was trying to kill him, but she didn't believe him before.

## Matinees Make A Come Back at the Punch

They munched on hot popcorn and listened to bald men with buggy red eyes talk about how they were going to take over the world.

The 600 seats at the Punch and Judy Theater were barely filled last Saturday afternoon, but the science fiction movie "Fantastic Planet" captivated the 50 kids who came out on the sunny day to be entertained by the big screen.

"Gee, that movie is weird. But I really came for the next movie. It's supposed to be real good," said one young tike.

The Saturday afternoon matinees are in their fourth week and are one of several ideas of new Punch manager Tom Shaker to make the theater a viable part of the community again.

"I'm trying to get Grosse Pointe to take the Punch seriously," says Shaker, a professional actor.

Shaker, 27, said he has had good response so far from parents and kids alike about the matinees.

"The parents are happy that we are doing the matinees again. There's really no place around here where you can take kids to see a kid movie. Everything else is either too deep or too dirty," said Shaker.

The Saturday afternoon matinees at the Punch and Judy are nothing new. Back in the 30's and 40's you were lucky if you could get a seat in the stately theater. It was not uncommon for kids to save up their 35 cents-a-week allowances and line up around the theater not only to spend a few hours with Errol Flynn, Captain Blood and Walt Disney, but to meet with other kids in the neighborhood as well.

Pat Warren of Detroit, who brought his son to the Punch last Saturday, remembers spending some of his Saturday afternoons at the theater.

"Yea, I used to watch those movies when I was a kid, usually Walt Disney and the Three Stooges. You were lucky if you could find enough pop bottles to turn in so you could save up money to go to the Punch," said Warren.

Kids don't pack the theater now, Shaker says, but a crowd of 400 on Friday and Saturday nights is not unusual, when die-hard fans of the Rocky Horror Picture Show turn up at the doors of the Punch.

The Saturday matinees are only part of Shaker's plans to make the Punch and Judy a thriving neighborhood theater. This summer, Shaker plans to bring live children's theater, along with lectures and jazz concerts to 21 Kercheval.

In the meantime, Shaker hopes kids will continue to spend their Saturday afternoons with Godzilla and Walt Disney.

## Agency on Aging

(Continued from Page 1) the Older American's Act of 1965. These funds will also support the Detroit agency.

Services provided under the current agency include housing assistance, minor home repair, transportation, a nutrition program and telecare, a telephone service for seniors.

In the Pointes, these programs are under the administration of Seniors Onward for Change (SOC) and will not be affected by the change of agencies. The only difference will be in the area of improved coordination and implementation of existing services and, contingent upon a study by the Detroit agency of the needs of local seniors, additional programs and services in the future.

## The Resolutions

According to Irene Margaret Smith, Field Representative for Wayne County, Michigan Office on Aging, the three resolutions passed at the meeting in Lansing had been recommended by the OSA.

The first resolution divided Wayne County into two separate planning and service areas: Detroit, Hamtramck, Highland Park, Harper Woods and the Grosse Pointes comprise new planning and service area 1A. The remainder of Wayne County becomes planning and service area 1C.

Another resolution designated the city of Detroit as the Area Agency on Aging for area 1A.

The Detroit-Wayne County Area Agency on Aging will gradually be phased out and will terminate September 30. The Detroit Area Agency on Aging will officially begin its term October 1.

**Set Deadline**  
According to Smith, the Detroit and Wayne County agencies are the only two to have filed for application.

"We have received seven letters of intent, but these are the only two applications," she said.

Deadline for further applications is March 30. If the

OSA receives no further applications by that date, then the Wayne County bid will be determined at the next meeting of the State Commission on April 18. According to Smith, the Wayne County consortium's chances to be designated the Area Agency on Aging for planning and service area 1C look good at this time.

"The Wayne County consortium has acted in a responsible manner," she said. "They have complied with all of our requests. This is important because of the large amounts of money involved."

## City Reactions

Smith stated that of the \$7 million in federal funds allocated to the county for senior services, only eight percent can go towards administration. She said the OSA feels it is better to have just two area agencies on aging serving the county.

Reaction to the State Commission's decision in the Grosse Pointes was moderate. Park City Manager John P. Crawford stated that the people who have a real concern in this matter are the seniors who receive these services.

He added that the determining factor is how well Detroit's agency functions. If it provides adequate services, Crawford said he didn't foresee any problems.

He did indicate that if those services fell below the existing level, then the city council would make known their dissatisfaction with the agency and possibly align with another area agency.

## Only Better

According to Smith, however, such an action would not be practical. She said the county cannot have "checkerboard" representation. Smith stated that if Grosse Pointe felt it was not getting adequate service or felt it was being discriminated against, the city or cities in question could bring a complaint to the attention of the OSA. She felt this will not be a problem however.

"The nutrition site is the most important program in the Pointes," she said. "And the only thing that can happen to the nutrition site is expansion, which would be a positive change."

According to Bade, the Detroit agency will indeed try to improve existing services. During the first year, the agency plans to maintain or better current services while making an assessment of areas that could use improvements. Such improvements would surface in 1981.

## Wait and See

The Out-Wayne County Area Agency on Aging, which is the likely heir to planning and service area 1C, grew out of a concern that the cities of Livonia, Inkster and Allen Park shared as to what effect Detroit's application would have on their own services.

According to Diane Wellman, Program Supervisor for the Department of Community Resources of Livonia, these cities got together with others and formed their own agency.

Following a public hearing to discuss their actions, the cities applied to the OSA just as Detroit had done, armed with approximately 30 letters of support from surrounding communities.

Among the cities they invited were the Pointes and Harper Woods. Now that the decision has been made to place these cities with Detroit's agency, local city councils will have to wait and see how well that agency makes good on its goal of improving services to their senior citizens.

(Continued from Page 1) Road near Gratiot and you'll see what goes on," Adams said.

"In my opinion, you're at the start of it right now," Adams said referring to the many physicians who have moved their offices from Mack to St. John Hospital's new St. Clair Professional Building.

According to Luedtke's projections, the urban blight that has already crossed Alter Road will slither to Vernier by the year 2000. Adams says it may be sooner than that.

"People are saying you're crazy. But just wait three or four years and they won't think you're so crazy," Adams said.

Some merchants questioned how re-designing storefronts could prevent

blight. Luedtke's idea is to establish areas that act as "redevelopment anchors" to prevent the penetration of blight.

Adams seemed to agree with that concept. "Once people's attitudes toward an area change and they don't want to shop there, I don't think any amount of money will bring it back," Adams said.

Attitudes are important to making Luedtke's plan work according to Barbara Dinkel. She said some merchants may not accept the Luedtke proposal because they don't believe that blight will eventually move down Mack into the Grosse Pointes.

"I think they feel it (blight) is not going to happen here because it is Grosse Pointe," Dinkel said.

One thing all the merchants interviewed agreed on is that Mack's biggest problem is lack of parking space. Roslyn Market has space for about eight cars behind the store.

"If we had a lot next door in addition to our lot, our business would double," Dinkel said.

Parking is also a problem for A and A Reel Repair which draws about 90 percent of its customers from beyond the immediate neighborhood — some from as far as Port Huron.

Luedtke's plan proposes increasing parking as one critical element for the continued viability of Mack.

Luedtke said he expects the results of his Mack merchant survey to be ready by mid-May. The next step is to identify areas of Mack that have the most potential as candidates for the initial facelift.

The blocks with the most potential "might simply be the blocks that have the worst problems," Luedtke said.

under the bridge, which has a clearance of about five feet. The problem is felt most by the growing number of sail boat owners.

The council had approved a plan to remove the bridge earlier this spring, but then reversed that decision because of the inconvenience it would cause to other park users who would be forced to drive out of the park onto Jefferson to cross from one side to another, if the bridge were removed.

Prices for boat wells on the far side of the bridge will be \$130 this season — but access to the lake is not guaranteed.

Absentee ballots make up the remaining votes.

Approval of the three-year proposals, puts the total school-library millage rate at 38.22 mills, including debt retirement and county-authorized levies. The rate will be reduced for the 1980-81 fiscal year because of rising property values to a total of 36.12 mills, according to school figures.

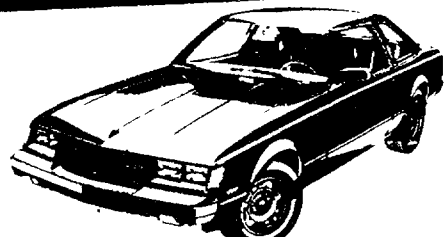

### Weaver Heads New Optimists

Pen pals from the third grades of two local schools got a chance to meet each other when 24 children from Maize joined 28 children from Mason at a party in the Mason Library on March 17.

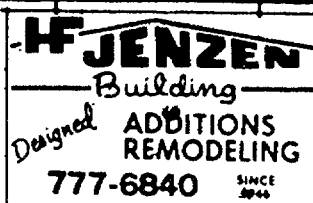

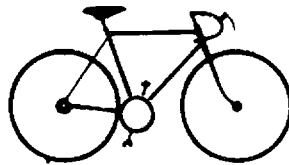

## Home Loans Hit Low Level

Tough financing conditions and escalating interest rates dealt hammer blows to housing in February to slow the turnover of homes on new mortgages to the lowest level of activity since the 1974-75 recession, long remembered as the worst since the 1930's depression.

Home-mortgage recordings assembled from county files in Wayne, Oakland, Macomb and Washtenaw counties, heart of the Detroit metro area, fell to 4,049 loans totaling \$148,595,530.

Those totals were the lowest since 1976, the first year of the recovery from the 1974-75 recession, when 3,484 home mortgages worth \$81,993,070 were recorded.

February figures in 1977 were 4,333 loans worth \$113,119,540 and those of 1978 were 5,271 for \$158,853,997. Last year, February totals were 5,435 home loans totaling \$187,254,368.

The home-buying category is \$200,000 and under in the summary compiled as a public service by Lawyers Title Insurance Corp. The dividing line between home mortgages and commercial loans was raised to that figure in January after a year at \$100,000 and a year and a half at \$75,000.

Edward A. Blaty, LTIC Michigan manager and national vice-president, said the change in each case reflected the higher levels of home loans, which are 80 to 90 percent of all mortgages in the Detroit area.

Lawyers Title's figures, covering all lenders including individuals, showed these county totals in the home group:

Wayne County, 1,777 mortgages closed for \$51,892,415; Oakland, 1,314 mortgages for \$58,906,903; Macomb 681 for \$25,691,057, and Washtenaw 277 for \$12,105,155. All four counties were down in both number and dollars.

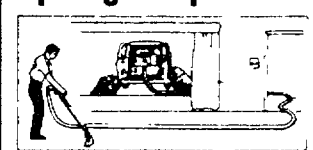

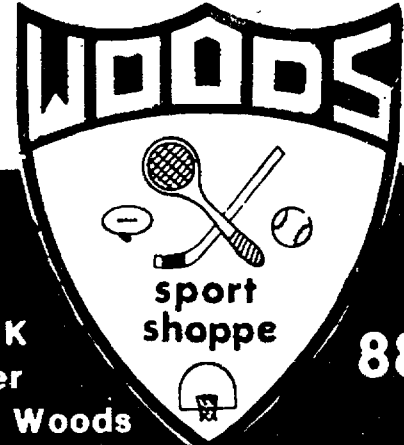

## CITY OF GROSSE POINTE FARMS MICHIGAN CODE NO. 111 MECHANICAL CODE ORDINANCE ORDINANCE NO. 243

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE DESIGN, INSTALLATION, MAINTENANCE, ALTERATION AND INSPECTION OF MECHANICAL SYSTEMS, INCLUDING HEATING SYSTEMS, VENTILATING SYSTEMS, COOLING SYSTEMS, STEAM AND HOT WATER HEATING SYSTEMS, WATER HEATERS, PROCESS PIPING, BOILERS AND PRESSURE VESSELS, APPLIANCES UTILIZING GAS, LIQUID OR SOLID FUEL, CHIMNEYS AND VENTS, MECHANICAL REFRIGERATION SYSTEMS, FIREPLACES, BARBECUES, INCINERATORS, CREMATORIES, FIRE SUPPRESSION SYSTEMS AND AIR POLLUTION SYSTEMS IN ANY BUILDING, STRUCTURE OR PREMISES IN THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE FARMS; AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF.

The City of Grosse Pointe Farms ordains:

**Section 1.** The BOCA Basic Mechanical Code, Third Edition, 1978 as promulgated and published by the Building Officials and Code Administrators International, Inc., is hereby adopted by reference as the Mechanical Code of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms (hereinafter "Mechanical Code") and is to regulate the design, installation, maintenance, alteration and inspection of mechanical systems in the City of Grosse Pointe Farms; and each and all of the provisions, conditions and terms of such BOCA Basic Mechanical Code, Third Edition, 1978, on file in the office of the City Clerk are hereby referred to, adopted and made part of this Ordinance as if fully set out herein; subject to the additions, insertions, deletions and changes prescribed in Section 2 of this Ordinance which control and supersede the specific provisions of said BOCA Mechanical Code. The intent of the City Council of Grosse Pointe Farms in adopting this amendment is to exempt itself from the provision of Act 230 of the Michigan Public Acts of 1972, as amended, by adopting and enforcing the nationally-recognized model mechanical code described above.

**Section 2.** References in the Mechanical Code to "jurisdiction" shall mean the City of Grosse Pointe Farms, Michigan. References to "Administrative Authority" shall mean the City Council of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms. Reference to the "Mechanical Official" shall mean the Director of Public Service of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms.

**Section 3.** This Ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after its enactment, or upon its publication, whichever is later.

Consumers Warned of Work-at-Home Schemes

The Better Business Bureau of Metropolitan Detroit is warning that work-at-home schemers continue to prey on those who can least afford to lose money. A recent nationwide investigation by the Council of Better Business Bureaus of 55 work-at-home promotions, each geared to attract the elderly, fixed-income individuals, students and the handicapped, disclosed that those who were investing in work-at-home opportunities were losing their money to unscrupulous promoters using misleading advertising claims.

The promotions investigated by the Council were the time-worn and widespread work-at-home schemes that advertisers use to create false expectations of high earnings and, in most instances, gainful employment.

The investigation revealed that advertisements promising hundreds of dollars for a few hours' work were simply lures by advertisers to sell information on how to set up your own business or conduct the same scheme as the advertiser's.

No actual employment existed; instead, would-be workers have had to first pay for details purporting to show how to make the claimed income, and then invest sums of money in ads, envelopes, postage and sundry other items.

In an effort to encourage advertising media to obtain all the facts before deciding on the acceptability of work-at-home advertisements, a Council "Media Bulletin" on

the subject is being distributed to local advertising media. In addition, the Council of Better Business Bureaus is referring to postal authorities those work-at-home scheme cases which appear to be frauds.

A typical advertisement for a work-at-home opportunity claimed "\$365.00 Weekly Guaranteed. Work two hours daily at home." Investigation revealed that the "guarantee" did not apply to the earnings, but only to a refund of the \$15 paid for how-to details if the worker's own efforts failed to produce the weekly income.

Council's shoppers answering such ads did not receive envelopes for stuffing as expected, but merely promotional material requiring payment of \$8 to \$25 just to buy the details on money-making plans. And to make matters worse, to pursue the plans would have required expending several hundred dollars.

The initial details the aspiring worker receives about a work-at-home plan usually turn out to be booklets telling how to go into the business of placing the same kind of ad the advertiser ran in the first place. In short, the work-at-home scheme participant begins recruiting others for the same business of offering a work-at-home plan.

Also, those who are intent on working the scheme usually are required by the original advertiser to buy such additional materials as promotional flyers or address lists.

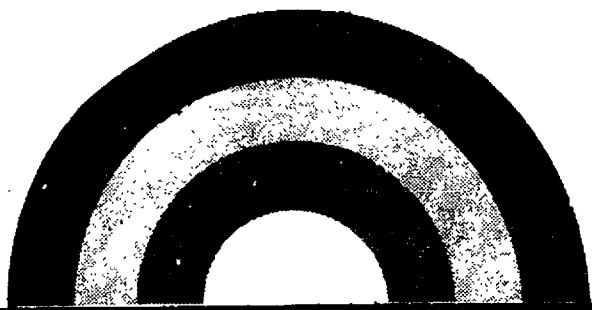

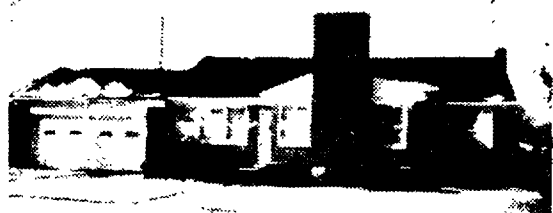

## PTA Names Best TV Shows

Is television programming actually improving? If the fall 1979 TV shows are any example — based upon the response of some 6,000 PTA members who monitored one month of prime-time programs (October 28 to November 28) — then the TV picture may be looking up.

Cautiously optimistic, the National PTA recently released the results of its massive monitoring effort in its fifth "TV Program Review Guide," citing the best, worst, and most violent shows, with critiques of specific programs.

For the first time since the monitoring began in the fall of 1977 the overall ratings for shows are higher than previously experienced.

Advertisers who regularly sponsor prime-time programs, ranging from high quality to most offensive shows, are identified and categorized in the guide, as they have been in the past two issues. In addition, the percentages of ads purchased by companies in the best shows are listed.

The top 10 shows that PTA members consider to be excellent for family viewing, in the three areas of examination — positive contribution to the quality of life in America (reinforcement of positive social values, exemplary role models, educational value); lack of offensive content (offensively portrayed sex and violence; stereotyping of sex, age, race, or ethnic background; offensively portrayed language); and high artistic and technical merit — are: "Little House on the Prairie" (NBC); "60 Minutes" (CBS); "Prime Time Saturday" (NBC); "The Waltons" (CBS); "Quincy" (NBC); "CBS Specials" (CBS); "White Shadow" (CBS); "Eight is Enough" (ABC); "20/20" (ABC); and "Salvage-1" (ABC).

Compared to the results of the spring 1979 monitoring period, NBC dropped from having five of the most commendable family programs down to three; ABC remained the same with three programs; and CBS provided the best showing in this category, moving up from two programs to four.

Programs rated poorest in overall quality, in the same three areas of examination, are the following TV series shows: "A Man Called Sloane" (NBC); "Best of Saturday Night Live" (NBC); "Soap" (ABC); "Detective School" (ABC); "The Ropers" (ABC); "Charlie's Angels" (ABC); "Misadventures of Sheriff Lobo" (NBC); "Vegas" (ABC); "Three's Company" (ABC); and "The Associates" (ABC).

In a comparison to the spring 1979 monitoring, NBC dropped from having four

of the most offensive programs down to three; ABC rose sharply from four programs up to seven; and CBS, which previously had two programs in this category, offered an unprecedented showing by having none! This is the first time that any network has been so represented.

Violence on television continues to be a major concern to PTA members, and individual, prime-time network movies continue to harbor the most violent viewing on television, during a time period when children may be negatively affected. During the October-November monitoring period, the most violent program on television (in either a series show or a film), was NBC's movie, "Last Ride of the Dalton Gang." This dubious distinction, in addition to other violent films shown by this network, earned NBC first place in the violent movie category, as well as a spot among the 10 most violent shows.

Programs considered objectionable for violent content in the three, specific areas of examination — violence to persons, property and laws — are: "A Man Called Sloane" (NBC); "The Incredible Hulk" (CBS); "Dukes of Hazzard" (CBS); "Detective School" (ABC); "Buck Rogers in the 25th Century" (NBC); "Hawaii Five-O" (CBS); "Best of Saturday-Night Live" (NBC); "Vegas" (ABC); "NBC Movie" (ABC); and "Charlie's Angels" (ABC).

Compared to the spring 1979 monitoring, all three networks retained the same number of violent shows as in the previous season, with NBC having four programs in this category; ABC having three shows; and CBS having three shows.

## Academy in Science Fair

This year's Science Fair, under the direction of Sheila Connolly, was held in the Learning Center of the Grosse Pointe Academy from March 11 to 14.

All middle school students worked countless hours to produce a display of projects which were viewed by the entire school and many visitors. In addition to the top winners, more than 70 students received special awards for their efforts.

Over half of the Academy Middle School students will take their projects to the Regional Science Fair to be held at Cobo Hall March 29, 30 and 31. The Awards Convocation for the Fair will take place on April 29 at Ford Auditorium.

You're only as good as your legs applies to golfers as well as dancers and when you're over 50 the legs can cost you lots of strokes. Gene Sarazen, that immortal of golf, wrote BETTER GOLF AFTER FIFTY, (Harper and Row, 1987).

His book is about the common problems that senior golfers have and how to deal with them.

At age 61 Gene Sarazen made the cut at the Masters tournament with rounds of 73 and 74. Even wearing a pair of knickers won't put senior golfers in Sarazen's league, but deading his book will help.

O.K. now put the books away, grab your golf clubs and head for immortality — no, I mean immortality.

## Breast Cancer Tests Detailed

Michigan Cancer Foundation tests that predict the recurrence of breast cancer will be discussed at the 13th Annual Cancer Symposium sponsored by the Comprehensive Cancer Center of Metropolitan Detroit and Wayne State University School of Medicine tomorrow, Friday, March 28, at an 11:20 o'clock session.

The symposium audience of some 250 practicing physicians will discuss results of the foundation's Breast Cancer Prognostic Study. But Tommie and Susie were lousy parents: ignoring, mutilating and even killing their babies. Susie became known as "The Killer."

Such bizarre behavior might have become a social worker's nightmare except for the fact that Tommie and Susie were golden lion marmosets, a rare and endangered South American monkey, and they were living in a zoo.

Instead, their case became the perplexing problem of Dr. Devra Kleiman, an expert in animal reproduction and behavior at the Smithsonian Institution's National Zoo in Washington, D.C.

Why, Kleiman asked herself, did these animals, taken from their parents and reared outside their families, breed prolifically but make such miserable parents? The answer had more than academic interest: The only way to save the golden marmosets from extinction was to learn how to breed them successfully.

fully in captivity and raise healthy offspring. Only 100 of them remain in the wild.

The answer was soon provided by detailed behavioral studies of the animal in captivity and the wild. Golden marmosets live in an extended family, Kleiman and others discovered. The young marmosets like Susie must be left with their parents until a second group of young are born and raised. By having role models and by babysitting with the new youngsters from time to time, the younger marmosets learned how to be good parents.

Armed with this information, the National Zoo began leaving younger marmosets with their parents until an appropriate age. The result? The number of golden marmosets in captivity has grown from 69 in 1972 to over 100 worldwide. Most of these new additions were born at the National Zoo.

The work on golden marmosets also taught researchers another invaluable lesson.

"Behavioral and social studies of animals are absolutely necessary for breeding and raising rare and endangered animals successfully in captivity," Kleiman says.

"Of course, we must also

know an animal's diet and nutritional requirements, what diseases it gets and what kind of environment it needs. But if we don't know the social and breeding customs, the chances of success are nil."

Behavioral studies of animals require painstaking, sometimes boring and always lengthy observations of their eating habits and reproductive and social activities. Ideally, these studies should take place in the animal's natural habitat, but this is not always possible.

More often, researchers combine observations of the animals in their natural habitats with studies in captivity.

In one such project on social behavior, Kleiman is studying three relatively rare South American animals: the maned wolf, the crab eating fox and the bush dog. These animals belong to the same family as the common household dog, and share another key feature. Like humans, all three species are monogamous, that is, one male mates with one female at a time.

"Monogamy is unusual in mammals," Kleiman says. "Only three percent of all the world's mammals are monogamous. Humans and these animals are among this tiny minority."

What fascinates her are both the similarities and differences in how the animals express their monogamous behavior.

The maned wolf, for example, lives mainly in savanna environments feeding on small rodents and vegetation. The males and females appear to be solitary hunters, coming together only during the mating season. The males may not stick around long enough to help raise the young.

On the other hand, the male and female crab eating fox travel in pairs in the wild and jointly hold a territory against predators and intruders. The male and female often hunt close to-

gether and reunite with an elaborate ceremony after a separation.

They may sleep in physical contact and they periodically groom each other by nibbling and licking. The male invests heavily in the survival of his offspring and helps the female raise the young by bringing food.

The short, squat bush dog shows behavior similar to the fox. Kleiman's colleagues have even observed male bush dogs assisting in the birth of young.

"These observations will help in our breeding programs," she says, "but I also want to know why these animals express monogamy in different ways and take a different amount of interest in raising their young."

"The differences may be influenced by many things—the natural habitat of the animal and the need to stick together either for food or to keep away predators. In some cases, this also means that the male takes a heavy interest in the survival of the offspring, but not always."

Kleiman tries not to draw too many analogies between animal and human behavior, although she admits that the patterns seen in animals are also seen in humans.

"Take the American suburban middle class family," she says. "Some women rear their children essentially alone. The male protects the home and indirectly provides food through wages received from a job."

"But the male frequently has little interaction with the young and weak emotional bonds with both wife and children."

"We see this pattern in animals, too, but the major difference is that monogamy in humans is culturally imposed and is not usually related to survival."

"If we can come up with some factors from our animal studies that seem to promote a particular form of mating system, we may eventually learn something about evolution of these systems and, perhaps, about ourselves."

Whatever the message may be for humans, the message for zoos is clear. Understanding the behavior and social customs of animals is a must for successful breeding programs.

In many cases, these programs are the last chance for endangered animals who, like the golden marmoset, have no other hope for survival.

## Pointer of Interest

TIMO ELO, UNIVERSITY LIGGETT SCHOOL FOREIGN EXCHANGE STUDENT

Timo Elo likes the United States, Grosse Pointe and University Liggett School just fine, thank you. And the students at ULS seem just as fond of him. "Timo is really a neat guy," says one of his classmates.

Timo is a neat guy. He's friendly, seems a little shy, and has some nice things to say about the United States... in other words, he has some qualities that are difficult to find in people these days.

Timo, the only son of Pentti and Kaarina Elo, of Joensuu, Finland, arrived in New York shortly before school began last fall. After a few days there it was on to Grosse Pointe, ULS and Timo's American family, the Kennedys. He is staying with Charles and Cornelia Kennedy, and their son Charles, of Sunningdale drive.

For many people, the transition from high school in Finland to ULS student might be a bit overwhelming. But according to Timo, the ability to adapt to different situations quickly is one of the basic requirements of a foreign exchange student.

"In Finland, all of the students want to come to America," he says, "but I've heard that only one out of 16 makes it."

**Maturity Counts**  
It's no wonder, Timo says that grades are only a portion of the requirements of a foreign exchange student must meet. First, the candidate must have an excellent command of English.

The students are then tested on their responsibility, their knowledge of current events and most important, their ability to find their way out of a difficult situation. Basically, the tests are designed to measure the level of the students' maturity.

"They give you a situation, such as, 'what if your American brother was using drugs?'" "Someone watches you and notes your reactions."

"They want to know if you are mature enough to know what to do in such a situation."

Obviously, Timo passed the test as he seems extremely mature for his age. He feels he has the real key to adapting to the different lifestyle found in the United States.

"I tried to come here with-

out too many expectations and I was successful." Timo thinks that's the best way to adapt to life in a foreign country.

Still, what's life without a few surprises? And even though Timo trained himself not to expect to experience what he'd heard other foreign exchange students have experienced in the United States, he admits that a few things have surprised him.

"School is harder here than I thought or heard it would be." That may be, he says, because of the quality of ULS as a school.

### Likes Sports

Timo's school in Finland is larger than ULS and he studies 13 subjects per year in contrast to the four subjects he is taking at ULS. This term he is studying United States History, Computer Science, Spanish and English. Foreign languages are favorite subjects for Timo, here and in Finland.

Timo feels that at ULS the teachers are much closer to the students than those at his home school. The study habits of the students are different here, too.

"People at ULS study more. Sometimes, everybody stays home and studies, and there's not much to do when no one is around."

And what does Timo do for fun when his friends are around?

For one thing, they engage in Timo's favorite hobby—sports. "I like all sports, I played soccer and basketball here and at home and I'm going out for track in the spring."

"Every time I play in school, I play to win," says Timo. "But going out with a bunch of guys to play basketball is just for fun."

Since sport is his hobby, it's no surprise that Timo considers seeing his first American football games as the best experience of his visit so far.

### Downtown Detroit

American football isn't the only thing Timo likes about the country. He has found that the European impression

of this country is not always correct.

"I've been to downtown Detroit," he says, "and it isn't as bad as some people say."

American television and radio also got praise from Timo. "Television is a lot better here — except for the commercials — they're always ruining good movies."

"In Finland, we have only two channels... we get more educational programs, you get more entertainment."

Except for the commercials. And radio? "In Finland it is nothing. The only thing I listen to is music and the stations are so much better here," he says. "You know — Detroit — the home of rock and roll."

Transportation is an aspect of life in Grosse Pointe that doesn't quite measure up to that of Finland. But Timo isn't complaining.

**Travel No Problem**  
"We have better public transportation in Finland, with buses and trains. Also, the traveling distances are not as long there, so you can walk or take a bike."

But how does he get around here in Grosse Pointe? "It really isn't a problem. My brother drives me around or somebody gives me a lift."

Timo likes Grosse Pointe. He says that it really isn't much different from his home town of Joensuu. "Both are about the same size, but people know each other a

little better at home. If somebody does something everybody knows about it right away."

Timo hasn't seen much of the United States since his arrival, but he plans to remedy that during spring vacation. "I'm going to California and Las Vegas," he says. "Maybe I'll win back my travel expenses in Las Vegas."

Add the western trip to his visits to Petoskey and New York City, and by the time Timo leaves for Finland in late June he will have seen quite a cross-section of the country.

### Very Fortunate

He isn't anxious to leave. Timo says that he isn't homesick, but misses his father because they are very close. And, when he does return home, it may not mean the last of his life in the United States.

"I've given some thought to living in America someday, but first I must finish high school in Finland."

After high school, Timo plans on college and a career in Economics: a future, he thinks, that will be enhanced by his experiences as a foreign exchange student.

"Being in the United States, you get to see the lifestyle of different people, experience other cultures and see things from another angle," Timo says.

"I think I am very fortunate to be here."
