A thousand young Grosse Pointers tossed off their mortarboards and stepped into the "real world" at high school graduation ceremonies last week. Where will those steps lead them?

According to the experts at area high schools, a majority of the Class of '80 will be heading off to college next fall, as usual. Just how far they go for school seems to depend on which high school they attended. For public school graduates, college usually means a Michigan school, while military, he added.

Robert Hanson, a veteran South High School counselor who will retire this summer, has been keeping an eye on local graduates for the past 34 years. Hanson says the public school system can expect to send about 70 percent of its 1,000 new graduates to two and four-year colleges next fall,

ANOTHER 25 PERCENT of the class will probably go directly to work and the remaining five percent will enter trade schools and the

Despite may people's impressions to the contrary, Hanson says those numbers haven't changed much over the last three decades.

"People seem to think that back in the old days, everyone from Grosse Pointe went to college and that fewer are going now. That isn't true," according to the counselor,

"There's never been much more than 70 percent or so going to college, except maybe in the late 1980's (during the Viet Nam war) when it got up to about 78 percent. That was the high point."

The real change in recent years is not in the number of students going on to college, but the public schools' attitude toward those who aren't, Hanson said

"We've started to do more for the kids who aren't going on to school and the public is hearing more about it. College preparation is still the core of our program, but we're proud of the fact that we have programs for all of the kids."

Of those public school students who chose to attend college next fall, the overwhelming majority (almost 90 percent) will select Michigan, rather than out-of-state schools, occording to Hanson,

Michigan State University is the most popular this year and will prob-ably get more than 100 freshmen from Grosse Pointe next fall, accord-ing to Hanson, University of Michigan is a close second, followed by Wayne State and Eastern, Western and Central Universities.

Two 14th District Republican for Bush were passed over," Brucker officers last week resigned their posts in protest of party leadership's handling of delegate selection at the County District Convention at South High last month.

The two officers, Barbara Gattorn of the Shores and Priscilla Brown of the Farms, were strong Bush supporters during the May Presidential Primary, and helped the former candidate win a better than 2-1 victory over Ronald Reagan in the Grosse Pointe vote.

Other 14th District officers, including Chairman Charles Tompkins, favored Reagan in the Primary. At the district convention, 20 of the 84 delegates chosen for the state convention were 'committed to Bush,

Other county convention delegates, including attorney Wilbur Brucker, and Warren Wilkinson, have joined Mrs. Gattorn and Mrs. Brown in criticism of the GOP leadership.

Brucker said there was a conscious effort to unseat the Bush delegates who were elected by wide margins in the Grosse Pointe primary, and to replace them, with Regan supporters who later signed affidavits to support Bush.

"The Bush people are concerned because the Grosse Pointes produced a substantial number of votes (for Bush) and got a disproportionate representation in the state convention. Some people who really worked hard

Eubank is sentenced two years

A 24-year-old Park man was sentenced Monday in Wayne County Circuit Court to three years probation in the slaying of his close friend last February. John Eubank, who was bound over for trial for second degree murder, pled guilty to manslaughter earlier this month and was sentenced by Circuit Court Judge Harold Hood to two years in prison for using a firearm in the shooting death of 23-year-old Timothy Murphy. Eubank was arrested by Park police after they arrived at his Berkshire home and discovered Murphy's body in an upstairs bedroom with a gunshot to the neck.

The county faces a \$19 million ` deficit this year after three successive years of running in the red and was ordered by Gov. William Milliken to reorganize before it would receive any state aid.

The latest obstacle is a lawsuit filed by a coalition of western Wayne communities and Grosse County Pointe City, Shores and Woods. The group wants to force a county apportionment commission to use 1980 census figures in drawing up charter districts from which charter commissioners are to be elected in the August 4 state election.

Should the concept of a new charter be approved by the voters, those commissioners would then draw up a new charter, which would eventually lead to either an elected execu-

On Monday, Wayne County Circuit Judge Susan Borman ruled that the apportionment commission must refile charter commissioner districts according to a 1972 apportionment plan, putting an end to one lawsuit but leaving the door open for another.

The legal challenge came from the Wayne County Communities for Equal Representation, which based its argument on demographic studies showing a decrease in Detroit's population coupled with an increase in many western Wayne communities.

The group claims that charter commissioners should be elected from districts which reflect that change. Although Borman did not rule in favor of the 1980 census use, the group's chances are still alive.

The figures on Grosse Pointe graduates are roughly equivalent to those from other suburban Detroit high schools, such as Birmingham's Groves High School.

According to Groves head counselor James Stone, about 80 percent of the school's 530-student graduating class will enroll in two and fouryear colleges next fall. The remaining 20 percent will head for the military, vocational schools and travel.

"A SIZEABLE NUMBER of our kids take a year out to travel," Stone said. "We probably have more students going to Israel on a one-year program with their synagogue than are going into the military.

The armed forces don't seem to be attracting many Grosse Pointe students this summer either. Only about two percent of the '80 class expect to sign up, according to Hanson but, he added, he has noticed a slight upsurge of interest in the military this year.

In an abrupt reversal of opinion, the Grosse' Pointe Woods City Council Monday granted a tavern license to the restaurant Le Cafe Francais, ending the six month standoff between the restaurant and the council.

Approval came before about 40 Le Cafe supporters who produced over 2,000 petition signatures and offered emotional testimony in favor of the specialty restaurant located in the Kimberly Korner shops on Mack. The crowd cheered when the council voted five to two in favor of Le Cafe's application.

The council also approved a revised liquor and tavern license ordinance to place on the August primary ballot which, if approved by Woods voters, will prevent the issuance of more licenses beyond the current number, which is four active liquor licenses and two taverns.

Until Monday, the council had refused to hear Le Cafe's tavern license request on the grounds that a Woods city ordinance prevented it from hearing and acting on more

Da Edoardo, was the last applicant, to be reviewed and approved by the council under the ordinance.

At that time, Le Cafe owners Charles Moraco and Ronald Serba felt they too were entitled to have their application reviewed and started legal action to have their request heard.

That legal battle culminated two weeks ago when a Circuit Court Judge ruled that the Woods ordinance did not limit the council to hear only one application and ordered it to review Le Cafe's request.

The main concern of the council at Monday's hearing and during the last six months was that hearing Le Cafe's application would encourage other businesses to seek tavern licenses. The council feared it would be confronted with up to nine additional applicants for the remaining licenses allotted to the Woods by the state's Liquor Control Commission, according to Mayor George Freeman.

"The council has been on the fence all along," said Freeman after the (Continued on Page 2)

The vote was five to two in favor of Le Cafe's request. Opposition was from Councilmen John Sabol who said "we should not have a proliferation of liquor licenses" and Thomas Fahrner who refused to explain why he voted no.

Le Cafe owner Charles Moraco said he felt "on top of the world" as he accepted congratulations from supporters after the hearing. Co-owner Ronald Serba said there is a 45-day waiting period before the state issues Le Cafe's license.

The Woods is currently appealing the Circuit Court decision that interpreted the tavern license ordinance to mean more than one application could be reviewed. However, Attorney Catlin said the outcome of that appeal will not affect Monday's council decision.

The dispute over LeCafe's application apparently will not happen again since the council can merely deny any more applications submitted to it, according to Councilman Dan Grady.

Also, the revised tavern license ordinance proposed for the August ballot was designed to clarify the ambiguous language in the original ordinance which caused the Le Cafe controversy, Catlin said.

Fewer than 100 of the 1,000 students graduating from North and South High Schools will leave Michigan for college.

That trend is dramatically reversed at Grosse Pointe's major private high school University Liggett. The majority of the 86-member class of '80 at ULS will travel for college-many to the east coast. Only about 16 recent graduates plan to attend Michigan schools, according to ULS Director of College Placements Muriel Brock.-The rest scatter to such schools as Dartmouth, Georgetown, Brown, Middlebury, Vanderbilt and Notre Dame, according to Ms. Brock.

The difference in price between Michigan and many out-of-state schools is substantial, and South's Hanson thinks that has a lot to do with most students' choice to stay close to home for college.

"Midwest public universities run about \$4,200 a year, the eastern schools-about \$8,000 to \$10,000. That's a big difference, and I don't personally believe an undergraduate education at one of the 'ivy league' schools is that much better than at University of Michigan, for example," Hanson said.

The city manager said he would like to see the alley vacated and a fence installed down the middle.

The council is expected to decide on the future of the alley at its meeting Monday night.

As for Mary and her neighbors, they don't agree right now what to do with their no-man's land, but they do agree it's irustrating, and it may mean a long hot summer before anything is resolved.

"We talked to Durant several times and told him we wanted at least fair representation of Bush delegates to the state convention. He wouldn't do it," Brown said. Bush supporters say they considered 12 out of 84 delegates to be a fair proportion at the state convention.

"The Bush forces were obliterated in the little representation we asked for," said Joan Woodnouse, former chairperson of Bush's 14th District Campaign. The result at the state convention was that moderate Republicans for Bush were outnumbered by about four to one. Woodhouse said.

"The 14th was in the minority on all issues that separated the moderates from the conservatives," said Woodhouse referring to issues voted on at the state convention.

But a possible result of the conventions' outcome could have more serious effects for the 14th district according to some Republicans.

"There will probably be some Bush people who are upset and might say to heck with it and not do any work for (Reagan,)" according to Charles . Tompkins, 14th District chairman.

"I am very reluctant to go out and work for the Republican Party in the fall election," said Mrs. Brown who resigned her party post because of the delegate issue.

"I've worked for the party for 20 years here and in New York This time I am very reluctant to do so ... By this action the leadership of the 14th has turned off a lot of people that would worked for a Republican victory in the fall," Mrs. Brown said.

The delegates dispute could have long term effects on the 14th district since many of the people involved in the convention were first-timers according to Barbara Gattorn.

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

the remaining 26 districts, may not be put on the August 5 ballot.

THAT ORDER stopped county clerk James Killeen from getting charter commission candidates on the ballot and from distributing and proofreading ballots. Last week Killeen said if his office could not get absentee ballots to local city clerks by June 17, county election officials would be in violation of state law.

However, he said this week that if his office showed it was acting in good faith, that deadline wasn't necessarily binding. Although he said there was no way he could get all the necessary work done by June 17, there is still a chance to get the question of a new charter on the August 5 ballot.

The only thing that could stop the issue from making that ballot would be a restraining order from the state court. At press time, McCauley said the western coalition would press for such an order at the same time it illes its appeal of Judge Borman's decision.

The western Wayne County communities, prior to filing their lawsuit. had approached the five Grosse Pointes in search of support. The City, Shores and Woods all supported the concept of the lawsuit, but only the City shelled out money to prove it.

City Manager Thomas Kressbach said the council decided to contribute \$331 to the lawsuit because council members felt apportionment ought to be based on current population figures since representatives from outcounty groups would be "more responsive to our needs" if they are drawn from districts based on the 1980 rather than 1970 census.

"We don't like the delaying aspect of it (the lawsuit) but I don't know how you can get around it," he said.

SHORES VILLAGE Manager Thomas K. Jeffris and Woods City Manager Chester Peterson stated their respective councils had voted to support the lawsuit although no official action was taken by either group and no money was pledged.

John Crawford, city manager of the Park, indicated his council did not go along with the request for support.

"Other than a delaying tactic, I don't see what it will accomplish," he said.

"Personally, I don't see where it makes that much difference - one more person, one more seat? I think it will affect the downriver communities, but I don't think it will affect us and I don't think we should share the costs of any lawsuit."

The Park's position is based on demographic studies which show that use of the 1980 census will not result in a great lot of change, with Detroit losing one district and the rest of Wayne county gaining one.

Andrew Bremer, Farms city manager, said the council in his city has taken no action for or against the lawsuit.

Will the Blight Stop Here?

To some people it is incongruous for the Pointes to start worrying about blight and urban decay. After all, the Pointes have a reputation for being populated by well-heeled people who take good care of their property and whose patronage contributes to the financial well-being of many business and professional people in the area.

So why worry about blight on Mack Avenue or anywhere else in the Pointes?

The facts and figures collected by Gerald Luedtke and Associates, the urban planning consultants who are looking into the problems of Mack Avenue, offer a somewhat less glam-orized view of the current stage of commercial development in the Pointes. Just the Luedtke contention that blight is creeping north on Mack at the rate of about three blocks per year and would reach Vernier biochs per year 2000 is a shocking prediction, even if it cannot be proved to be accurate.

Yet it is true, of course, that communities, like people, grow and de-cline. And it's no secret that the Pointes are growing older. As far as housing is concerned, Grosse Pointe Park already is described as a mature-stable community and the other Pointes as mature-appreciating communities. Those descriptions mean that the Pointes have passed the period of rapid development and have not yet reached the stage of mature depreciating communities, which start downhill. So blight has not yet hit the residential areas.

YET WHILE THE number of substandard housing units in the Pointes is still negligible, Luedtke's figures

started to try to reverse trends already in view. The overall implementation of any specific blight immuni-zation program would be costly, of course. And it would require private investment by owners of benefitted property. But they ought to share in the cost since they will share in the rewards.

THE EXTENT OF government funding of any such program is not yet clear. One concern of businessmen is that public financing of any project normally requires a certain amount of distasteful government control. The companion concern of taxpayers is that public spending often is wasteful. In view of the Pointe's reputation as a conservative community both in politics and public spending, officials of the local city governments no doubt will keep a watchful eye on both sides of the funding question in the months ahead.

Yet even conservative businessmen plan for the future. It is the prudent thing to do. And so communities such as the Pointes which have benefitted from both private planning and public guidance in the past should consider carefully just what kind of cooperation will be most beneficial in the future in combatting urban decay and in protecting the quality of life for those who live and work here.

A Philadelphia Story for the school board

To the Editor:

Congratulations to Viola Murtonen on her critique of the Grosse Pointe school system in her letter to the Editor of the News, Thursday, June

The issues she so correctly raises bout potential "padding" of the sysem's administrative staff, despite declining student enrollments, and the erosion of "freedoms given us by the Bill of Rights" as reflected in local School Board powers should be aken most seriously by citizens of Grosse Pointe communities who are concerned with future directions of public education and citizens prerogaives.

Some three years ago, in a Main Line Philadelphia school district, comparable to the Pointe's, a shabby progation of citizen's rights took lace. Decisions were made to close lementary schools, bus students to egional as opposed to neighborhood chools, and to use the closed schools nd their grounds for bus and other storage, maintenance services, as well as expanded administrative services.

These decisions were taken without citizen input. Community con-ferences during this period dealt solely with curriculum proposals, and as some people later reflected, served as a "blind" relative to the more disruptive school closure-administrative expansion plans afoot.

Later, the statement would be made that the community was "involved" in the changes made. Not so. The Parent-Teacher Organizations were uninformed. The long tax supporting elderly citizens were uninformed. The tax-paying individuals who use private schools were uninformed. In other words, a social, financial issue affecting, most prob-ably, a major portion of citizens in the area was addressed by a handful of administrative "chiefs" and School Board members,

It became quite clear, afterwards, that citizens were unaware they had vested powers so totally in the hands of so few. This had not been their intention at the ballot box. It would seem, however, that responsiveness of a School Board, once elected, rests almost solely on the Board's gener-osity of feeling in this regard, and not cn citizens' built-in rights.

Ms. Murtonen, you are quite cor-rect-let the citizen beware. Open dialogue and problem-solving based on "freedoms and rights" were shamefully disregarded in that supposedly enlightened, advantaged community near Philadelphia. I am quite sure that whatever the problems posed by decreased student enrollments and inflationary trends, these can be creatively addressed when a wide two alternates who never would have been selected by the real Bush delegation.

Why is the input from Republicans outside their small circle so threatening and intimidating? And what does this power mean to the district?

Richard Durant has controlled the district for over 25 years, yet in all that time there have been no Republican congressmen elected; no Republican state senators elected and only one Republican representative elect-

I can see as a result of this that only those in the district who give total allegiance to Durant may actively participate in district politics. Therefore, I have resigned my position as secretary so that I can give service to those Republican candidates and interests where personal loyalties are not the issue but good government is.

Small makes way for big

In the history of the world of business, one rule has prevailed over all others. This one rule is, "small bus-iness makes way for big business." In view of events in the Grosse Pointes during recent months, this phrase could be correctly used to describe the situation between the Save Our Shops committee and the Detroit Bank Corp.

Several small, insignificant little business establishments are being replaced by a DB&T trust office in the building now occupied by the Pointe Pedlar and other businesses. Although these businesses seem important to the Pointes for sentimental reasons, the goods sold at these businesses and the services proveded can easily be replaced by others in this area, and the loss of these establishments will be of little or no consequence. Since there are no other DB&T trust offices in the Pointes, this proposal would only help the community. While it is unfortunate that these businesses must be terminated, it must be taken into consideration that the Detroit Bank Corp. is a large and growing company and must have room to flex its muscles. Elaine Hartmann, in her June 12 letter concerning Donald Mandich, president of the Detroit Bank Corporation's advertisement of the extension of the shops' lease until June 1, 1981, calls this kind gesture on the part of Mr. Mandich "cute, perhaps too cute." Mr. Mandich was in no way cbligated to extend this lease and did so to give those persons operat-ing the shops in the Fisher Road building more time to make arrangements for the future of their business. But for his gesture to be met with such remarks as "too cute," it would serve the businesses right if, on June 1, 1981, Wayne County sheriffs arrived at the shops with eviction notices and began throwing pots and pans out the door and into the street.

While the Pointes still serve chiefly as a bedroom community for metropolitan Detroit, the changing and aging characteristics of the Pointes also affect the commercial development here-and vice versa. The residents obviously need the services provided by business and professional people. The businessmen need the patronage of the residents. Blight hurts both groups. So it is important to maintain the attractive qualities of the Pointes, both in the residential and commercial areas, and to take any steps needed to improve their appearance physically and esthetically. Even the provision of adequate parking space is essential to both groups.

Whether the Luedtke program is the only appropriate way for the Pointes to plan for the future and head off threatened blight of commercial areas, nobody really knows for certain. But this proposal and the one put forward by the Park ought to be pursued at least to the point that demonstration projects could be streets and highways.
