Drive begins to promote charter

Grosse Pointe Charter Commissioner Barbara Gattorn joined her colleagues Monday to launch a two-month campaign to familiarize voters with a draft of a home rule charter to reorganize Wayne County.

At a downtown press conference, charter president George Ward outlined highlights of the draft and cautioned that whoever steps into the post of county executive officer, (CEO) will have to be an effective

Ward emphasized several times that the new county leadership is more important than the charter itself.

THIS NOV. 3 voters can choose between an appointed CEO or an elected official to govern the nation's third largest county. A new charter would take effect January, 1983.

The Charter Commission's ninemonth battle to untangle the bureaucratic chaos in the county marks the first time a state county has converted to home rule, breaking away from the state constitution, Ward said.

"It puts into place in Wayne County a structure that is locally amendable,' Ward said.

Charter commissioners George Orzech (16th district), commission treasurer Lyn Bankes and the commission's executive director, William O'-Brien, were also present at the press conference.

According to the 34-page charter, the new CEO "shall supervise, direct, and control functions of all departments of the county except those headed by elected officials." Those exempt offices include the prosecuting attorney, sheriff, county treasurer, register of deeds, drain commissioner and

county clerk. Ward said the new CEO will draw up the county budget, instead of the present three-member board of auditors, and will wield some control over the road commission during his four year term in office.

For the first time, if voters approve the new charter, Wayne County will undergo an audit to "hopefully avoid more payless paydays," Commissioner Orzech said.

Grosse Pointe's Gattorn, vice-chair- county,

man of the commission's personnel committee, said a crucial element in the personnel portion of the charter is the removal of the function from the civil service commission.

"The current personnel department would be replaced by a professional management service. The current civil service department would review complaints and not be involved in the day-to-day operation of the personnel department," Gattorn said.

The new charter calls for the present 27-member county commission to be scaled down to 15 officials elected

to two year terms. Ward said if the 27 member commission wasn't reduced "it would have signaled that nothing was done in the legislative branch of the county. The grassroot feelings I have been getting are that a cut was eminently in

The new commissioners will have to confirm every CEO appointment, excapt the county's chief financial officer, Ward said. They would also have the power to override a veto of the CEO by a two-thirds vote.

Judge rules against state on group home

Citing common law doctrines guarding against public employe conflicts of interest, Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Robert Colombo this week ruled "null and void" a lease between Dr. Andrew Barrer and the state of Michigan for a group home for retarded persons on Bedford.

In a seven-page decision issued Tuesday, the judge ordered the state to stop paying rent to Dr. Barrer for the empty home and enjoined the state from issuing any license to a group home in the Park "until it is in compliance with its own rules and regulations" and informs Park residents of the "available opportunities that such residents and others would have in connection" with a group

Unless the decision is overruled, it will prevent the state from proceeding with plans to move six mentally han-dicapped residents of the Plymouth Center for Human Development into the Bedford home,

The home was leased by the Department of Mental Health in January from Dr. Barrer, a former mental health employe who still has contracts with the department. The monthly rent of \$2,100 is reportedly the highest in the state for a home of its

In his decision, Judge Colombo criticized defendents in the case for their apparent "disregard for the public taxpayer's funds and the duty to zealously protect the public interest at a time when the state's finances are severely strapped.

THE JUDGE noted that, even though the state has been restrained from moving residents into the home on Bedford, it has continued to pay Dr. Barrer \$2,100 in rent, while the facility is not in use.

This, he said, "further reflects upon the propriety of the agreement between Dr. Barrer and the Department of Mental Health" which is one of three defendants in the case, Other defendants are the Department of Social Services and Management and

, to be null and void and in viola tion of the laws of the state as well as in Molation of the March 19, 1979 Rules and Regulations of the Department of Mental Health . . . and enjoins the defendants from making any further payments under the terms of this lease to Dr. Barrer," according to the ruling.

The suit was filed and financed by 29 residents of Bedford Road and the surrounding area who were informed in February of the state's already-approved lease on the home. The residents' attorney Pieter vanHorne argued against the home on several points, including violation of local zoning ordinances; the state's failure to allow neighbors an administrative complaint hearing; the state's failure to notify the community of its search for a group home in the Park; and "unjust enrichment" to former state employe Barrer.

While the judge did not rule on points other than "unjust enrichment," he retains further jurisdiction in the matter and may consider those issues at a later date.

According to testimony at a July 16 hearing on the suit, Dr. Barrer, who was then living in Detroit, purchased the home at 1030 Bedford for \$135,000 in July 1980 and did not move into the home. In September

he contacted the department of Mental Health about leasing the home, and an agreement was signed in Jan-

The judge noted in his decision that testimony showed the state made no effort to advertise for a facility in the Park through any local papers and did not contact any local real estate agencies about the availability

The judge cites Michigan law stating "no public servant shall be a party, directly or indirectly to any contract between himself and the public entity of which he is an officer or employe . . .

Park voters narrow council race to six

Incumbent Grosse Pointe Park Councilman John Fildew took the lead as the top vote-getter in Tuesday's primary, assuring him a spot on the Nov. 3 ballot to elect three council members.

Fildew drew 529 votes in the primary race and was followed closely by political newcomer John J. P. Ryan with 501. Other unofficial election results late Tuesday showed candidate Eugene McKinney with 451 votes, Mark Valente III with 419 votes, Patricia Moran Forster with 335 votes and Carroll Evola with 330

Defeated in their first bid for political office were Anita Myers with 304 votes and Patrick Murphy with 274

The six winners will face off in November to fill three council seats - those currently held by Fildew, Ann MacDonald (who chose not to run again) and the seat being vacated by Councilman Douglas Graham,

Graham will compete against colleague Councilman Anthony Spada for the mayoral seat vacated by the resigning Matthew Patterson in No-

The primary campaigns conducted by most Park candidates were lowkeyed and low-budgeted, with a great deal of door-to-door solicitation throughout the community over the ceekend. One candidate. Vulente was forced to respond to circulated rumors just days before the election, alleging that he does not actually reside in the Park, but lives in a home on Audubon in Detroit.

Valente was reached for comment late Monday at the home he says he shares with his family on Whittler Road in the Park - his legal address He said he and his brothers share responsibility for regularly checking on an unoccupied house on Audubon that was owned by his late grandmother and is now the property of his

Old scams find new victims

For years parents have warned their children not to talk or go with strangers. Now, with con artists at work again in the Grosse Pointe area, it seems some parents could use a little of their own advice.

The most recent report of a scam involved an 82-year-old Grosse Pointe Farms woman who lost \$13,000 in a "pigeon drop" last month. That prompted interviews with local police and turned up some interesting facts about con artists, their victims and various types of con games.

For instance, it isn't always older citizens who are fooled by con artists. City Detective Robert Van Tiem remembers a case where another Farms woman, about 30 years old, lost nearly \$10,000 two or three years ago in a scam much like the most recent one Although older people are frequently victims, any unsuspecting person is a potential target, "It's still that element of human greed that makes people think they can get something for nothing." Van Tiem said,

Police agree on that point as being the key element to the con artist's success. "They appeal to the larceny within some people," Park Police Chief Henry Coonce said. He was referring to the "pigeon drop" scheme in which con artists tempt their victims with an offer to share a large sum of money supposedly found by the con artist in exchange for the victim's help with getting it into a bank account for safekeeping.

Since the two are strangers, the victim is asked to contribute an ample amount as an act of good faith. But, once the thief lays hands on the victim's money, a quick switch is made, the con artist disappears and the victim is left with nothing. "This scam has been happening all over the country," Coonce said, "and particularly in affluent suburbs."

While the "pigeon drop" is the most common, it is certainly not the only con game in town. Here are some others police say have been used around the Grosse Pointe area:

• The "C.O.D." scam involves a phony delivery person who asks a resident to accept a package for an absent next-door neighbor and pay the C.O.D. charge,

• The "utility-refund" seam, currently in vogue, involves two or more accomplices posing as gas, phone, electric or water employes. The imposters gain entry to the house with the excuse that an inspection is necessary and when inside, inform their victim that he or she is entitled to a refund which will be paid on the spot if change can be made for a slightly larger bili. The team notes where the victim goes to get the money and during the inspection, one slips back to the place where the change was gotten in search of more money or valuables.

Stats show Woods crime down for first half '81

Even though the tragic shooting of 17-year-old Todd Poole has blemished Grosse Pointe Woods crime records, statistics show a general drop in crime in that city during the first half of

The Poole killing was only the second homicide in the Woods' 30 year history and was an isolated incident in a city where violent crimes are rare and are usually domestically related, according to John Dankel, Woods Public Safety Director.

Dankel said the crime decrease is encouraging and attributed it to aggressive patrol work by his department. He also said that a drop in silver prices, a slight decline in unemployment and improvement in the economy contributed to a small downturn in crime.

Besides the Poole killing, police investigated one alleged rape this year compared to none in 1980. The incident allestedly occurred on May 24 to a Woods woman who has since moved out of the area, Dankel said police never established that a rape had actually occurred and that no suspect

Michigan's bridges are considered deficient or obsolete. This report inventories 524,866 bridges in the country. The TRIP report said it would cost an average of \$671.5 million a year over the next 10 years to resurface or reconstruct Michigan's deficient roads and re-

For fiscal year 1931, the state counties and municipalities have budgeted only \$315.9 million for road and bridge renewal, just 47 percent of what is needed, the report says.

Some 535 bridges in the state are rated "structurally deficient." These spans are inadequate for existing traffic due to deterioration in their decks, supporting mem. bers, or super-structures. They are either restricted to light vehicles, closed to traffic or must be rehabilitated immediately to stay open.

Another 1,910 bridges on Michigan's "off-system" roads Skinner noted at a news conand highways-local roads or less frequently traveled Police Freeway Post in Deroutes - are suffering from the same age and wear problems. The state's federal-aid system has 342 bridges that cannot handle today's traffic due to narrow clearances, poorly aligned approaches and inadequate height clearances. Most of these spans were built to handle loads equaling about one half the maximum allowed weight for vehicles now using connecting roads and streets.

Another 594 bridges on the state's non-federal-aid road system were designed and built before the 1940s and are unable to handle today's traffic.

Lawrence W. Martin, exection, said the Secretary of Transportation and the TRIP reports provide evidence that the condition of the state's bridges "is bad and getting worse. The state has to face up to the problem and provide necessary funds to repair these bridges."

Significant to police is a 28 percent drop in burglaries, from 74 to 53, Dankel said. "People are sensitive to residential burglaries and it's something we work on and are glad to see decrease," Dankel said.

Larcen'es are also significantly down 22 percent, from 289 to 225 as are auto thefts which dropped 63 percent from 30 to 11, Dankel said. The overall drop in homicide, rape, robbery, aggravated assaults, auto theft, and arson is 25 percent, from 404 to 301, Dankel said

He attributed the decrease partly to an aggressive traffic law enforcement program that contributes to decreases in burglaries and other crimes because potential criminals may be discouraged if they are stopped for

Another crime deterrent has been an increase in officer generated investigations of suspicious cars and persons, Dankel said.

Dankel said he sees no reason why the downturn in crime should not continue throughout the year although he admitted that experience shows burglaries tend to increase in fall and winter.

The rate of offenses cleared by arrest has increased substantially, up 62 out of 402 or 22 percent which is two points above the rate reported for this region by the FBI Uniform Crime Reports, Dankel said. He added that this increase is due to the addition of a special investigator in the detective bureau who works on department generated investigations.

In other categories, Dankel reported these statistics:

 Assistance to residence calls are up from 388 to 493, a 27 percent increase. These calls are to assist motorists or minor problems at nomes.

Task force breaks auto theft rings The nation's first privately

funded task force of undercover police officers assigned to investigate and break up auto theft rings was unveiled last month by the Michigan Anti-Car Theft Campaign

Committee.
The task force, which is made up of federal, state and local police officers, has recovered over \$110,000 in stolen vehicles and parts, according to Frank A. Skinner. Michigan ACT chairman.

The two teams of undercover police officers working out of the Michigan State Police Criminal Investigation Section also have recovered over \$82,000 in stolen construction equipment.

"Auto theft is a serious problem in this country, costing over \$104 million last year in Michigan alone," ference in the Michigan State troit's Executive Plaza.

"We feel our auto theft task force is off to a fine start, thanks to the cooperation of law enforcement agencies and the private sector." Skinner said.

He said the undercover auto theft task force is funded by contributions from insurance companies, the banking industry, national rental car companies, automakers and others from the private sector.





In most cases, the only work that is done amounts to an appearance change such as: used motor oil spread over the surface of an asphalt drive-way to "seal" it or a quick coat of paint in place of new shingles.

fuse unsuspecting cashiers. One makes a purchase with a \$20 bill bearing a distinctive mark such as: a telephone number or a happy birthday message and the second follows right behind with a purchase of less than \$4 but pays for it with a \$10 bill in order to receive change. When the cashier returns with the proper amount, the con artist claims a \$20 bill was given and cites the distinctive mark as proof.

Another advantage con artists have over their victims, besides the urge to get something for nothing, is the element of surprise. While the Pointes aren't exactly in the middle of a crime wave at present, con games have been a reoccurring problem for years.

"There is nothing new about them," said Deputy Police Director Richard Clarke, of Grosse Pointe City, "they die out and then reemerge." It seems con artists rely heavily on letting an area "cool off' and then, when people least suspect it, they come back,

The utility refund scam is current, but some other one could pop up next year," he added.

As for the severity of the problem in the Grosse Pointe area, it is a matter of opinion and varies depending on who you ask. Chief Coonce believes there have been a significant number of con games operating in the area, but Shores Police Chief Joseph Vitale said, "We've been very fortunate. To my knowledge, none of our citizens have been victims of con artists." Deputy Director Clarke of the City sees the size of the problem much like Chief Vitale, but summed up with a point anyone would agree with, "It isn't of major proportion," he said, "but when it could in-

Part of the reason for the differences of opinion stems from the fact that not all victims of con games are willing to report it. According to Chief Coonce, "We've had trouble making arrests and prosecutions because complaints are not given promptly which makes identification very difficult." And, he noted, "people just don't like to admit to being suckered." Therefore, no one is able to draw an accurate picture of the problem because parts are hidden.

In addition to the advantages handed to con artists by their victims, such as, the desire to get something for nothing, the reluctance to report the crime and carelessness, con artists are also convincing. They are practiced at the art of deception, and for that have been glorified in movies like "The Sting" and "Papermoon." Also interesting to note, is that the art of conning originated among the gypsies and one such group known as "Irish gypsies" is 1 500 strong and operating in the east and southeast from a central gathering place in North Carolina, according to one local police official.

Despite the advantages con artists may have, there is much that an average person can do to prevent being the victim of a con game and help is available when needed. Contact your local police, the Better Business Bureau or your financial institution to obtain more information about how con artists work. If you suspect you have been swindled or someone has attempted it, call the police. It's the best way to keep it from happening again, to you or some-



After achieving his B.A. in music at Wayne State University, Wagner earned a doctorate in musical arts at the University of Michigan with a major in organ under Marilyn Mason.





Known as the universal blood type, "O" positive can be transfused to patients with other blood types under certain medical circumstances, a spokesman for Red Cross explained. It is also the most common blood type However Red Cross Blood Services personnel regard Type "O" positive blood as rare because it is usually in short supply.







To know one's self is considered by mental health professionals an important touchstone of a happy life. The lack of self-knowledge can result in painful regrets over what might have been and frustration from fruitless endeavors beyond the individuals possible potential. It is regretful that there are those who come to their later years with the realization that their earlier life might have been happier had they really taken some time out for self-evaluation.

But it is never too late. Every day of the years which are left can be rewarding if that "pause that re-freshes" - a time out for inventory of what one wants from life based on one's own potential — is made and from that overview, plans to make every hour of every day self-fulfilling and enjoyable.

Barbara Gallatin Anderson (McGraw-Hill) presents some excellent strate-....uc accaing to make their later years better years. The author is an internationally know specialist on the relationships between cultural change and the aging process. She is the author of four books and many journal articles.

Her view is a militant one. She

contends that society is bent on the isolation of older men and women and that it is up to them to meet that challenge. To succeed, they must establish an identity which they do not have.

There is youth with its acceptable behavior patterns. Adulthood has clearly defined roles. But rules for the older years has yet to be per-ceived. Old age has yet to be defined as a significant life phase. Behavior cues for the person in passage are ambiguous and goals, non existent.
As a consequence, major problems arise as how to behave in old age. American society has responded to lines of middle age virtually intact. The fight Americans who are in their later years must wage is not for the renewal of middle age status but for standards and status as older people.

TO ACCOMPLISH this transition Anderson has established five guidelines. They are:

1. Accept yourself as an older per-

2. Develop a clear perspective on later life

3. Replace lost satisfactions 4. Develop resources that count 5. Develop alliances that count.



It is evident that each of these tactics involves new ways of thinking and looking at yourself after 60 and together they make specific demands for new behavior patterns as older

Men and women, the author contends, stand a better chance as older Americans from a position of strength based on inventoried assets than on the consuming burden of self-deceit. It is a mistake to direct the struggle for a happy life on a continued effort to hold on to middle life. The struggle must be waged within the status of the present. And its goal should be a new and valued image of an older person, a person who is entering a new cycle in life not giving up on life. As one older person remarked: "I made the decision to live, to enjoy life at my own pace, to look forward to life as I always have. After all, inide I'm the same me."

Age does bring changes in physical appearance but with the same attention to hygiene and grooming practiced in earlier years, each man and woman can be attractive as an older person. A little humor helps. As one woman put it, "Sure I'd be glad to get rid of the wrinkles, but you know it took a lot of living to make them."

The new image of age must take into account the physical, cognitive and personal changes that age does bring. But at the same time take into account the intergrity and agelessness of the self. Age is part change and part continuity. As one astute man said; "The doctor says I'm getting old and should increase my fluid intake. I do. I've started taking my Scotch with water instead of straight. You've got to adapt.

It would be foolhardy not to admit that years bring physical limitations as well as financial and social changes. Interests, activities and relationships that were linked with middle life often become inappropriate or non-existent in the later years. Therefore it is important to establish new activities and involvement that provides satisfaction. Work oriented individuals could find satisfaction in part time pursuits. A retired U.S. Marine took a job driving an armored car. Because of his organizational skills he worked himself up to a posi-tion of supervisor. A widow, deter-mined to do something with herself opened up her home to care for children too sick for school but not sick enough to be in bed all day. One man made a woodcarving hobby into a profitable part-time avocation. A woman pigeon fancier taught herself orthinology and opened up a small bird hospital in her home.

Establishing close relationships with friends can be another way. Even with spouses, brothers and sisters and grandchildren about, each of us needs people we can choose to be with. There is versatility and support that friends bring to one another.

Involvement in the political scene can not only be rewarding for the individual looking for an interest but could ultimately benefit older people generally by bringing about legislation to improve their lot. In a country where five percent of the vote usually decides the election, 17 percent (post-60 voting population) could have dramatic effect.

America needs the wisdom and guidance of its older population. The U.S. as a country is having aging problems of its own. Conservation, contemplation and concern for others, rather than control of them, these values which distinguish maturity, are far from being priorities in America's culture. However, these values are those in which the old have special empathy and practice.

To develop a clear perspective on later life, then, it is important to take stock of the past. Take a long solid look at the personal world you have been building through the years and then decide what adjustments should be made to accommodate and make the years ahead good ones. Those who make a success of old age do not do so haphazardly. They get ready for it by stripping their individual worlds of outmoded roles and patterns of life outgrown.

It is good to remember the past but the present ends it. "A man is really old," said John Barrymore "when regrets take the place of dreams." Successful aging depends on whether you remember the past as one part of life, or the sum of life.



Community placement

As Dr. Frank Ochberg prepares made it plain that he intends to do to leave his post as head of the so. In the Bedford home suit, howstate Department of Mental Health, the future of the state's community placement program for the housing of retarded adults, psychiatric patients and ex-convicts in residential settings remains in some question.

The issue is of special interest in the Pointes because the state leased a private home on Bedford in Grosse Pointe Park to house retarded adults. That action prompted several law suits, became an issue in the Park's election and started a general controversy. It also resulted in several long letters to the editor, one in last week's issue of the Grosse Pointe News by Dr. Andrew E. Barrer, owner of the group home leased to the state who defended the state program and his own actions, and a second in the Detroit Free Press from Dr. Emanuel Tanay, president of the Michigan Psychiatric Society, who was critical of the state's placement policies.

It is clear that much of the public's criticism of Dr. Ochberg is directed at the placement program which he strongly supported, even though he is accused of various misdeeds, such as the unauthorized use of state personnel to type a manuscript for a book. But the intensity of the attacks no doubt stems from the intensity of the feelings about the group home concept that he furthered. But unless the Legislature and the governor take action to halt the program, it does not seem likely that the placement policies will be changed.

THERE MAY BE some modification, however, and there ought to be. Certainly the state did little to really prepare the community for its leasing of the home in the Park. Dr. Barrer says the effort to obtain a home in the Pointes should have been known because the state had advertised in the Detroit News for months and news stories had reported the state's search. So no one should have been surprised, in his view, when a group home came to the Pointes. Yet not even Dr. Barrer would argue that the state's effort constituted a full-fledged educational program to explain the state's need and to inform the community about the kind of supervision and care of clients that would be provided. Certainly the state could and should have done more in this respect.

Dr. Tanay's criticism, however, is much more serious than that. He apparently speaks for the Michigan Psychiatric Society in questioning the expansion of the community placement program. He implies that some who promote relocation of mental hospital patients into communities are doing so to enable small commercial establishments to "pursue profits at the expense of people who are too sick to make a choice." Then he adds:

"Deinstitutionalization is the discharge of patients who need not be in institutions, not the wholesale relocation of sick people into the communities. Half-empty hospitals, the closing of psychiatric training programs and the renaming of patients as clients are not the answer to the needs of the mentally ill."

He said group homes are "miniinstitutions that, by their smallness, are unable to provide the necesary care a mentally ill person needs." He concedes there are patients who are suitable for community placement and points out that state hospitals have been handling such placement for years. But he contends the deterioration of patient care in state hospitals is not the result of budget cuts but of "deliberate policy to destroy the state hospital system.".

COMPLICATING THE controversy are the legal efforts by residents of a number of communities to stop the state from leasing any more group homes. In most cases, the state has won the right to go ahead and the acting director of the Mental Health Department has

ever, Judge Robert Colombo has just ruled that contract to be null and void.

While hearing the case the judge appeared to be sympathetic to the criticism of "unjust enrichment" made against Barrer by attorneys for the Bedford neighbors, even though Barrer and state officials deny that accusation. Instead, they contended that required state procedures were followed meticulously and said the issue of a possible conflict of interest had been reviewed in advance by the department and the attorney general's office. Now, however, the judge has upheld the conflict of interest contention on grounds Barrer is still in effect a public servant because he is employed by a private agency that has a contract with the state to provide services to developmentally disabled persons.

A further complication arises from the fact that the placement program has become deeply involved in politics. The state auditor general's office in a report earlier this year indicated the program wastes as much as \$30 million a year, lacks accountabilityand has permitted potential conflicts of interest by permitting state employes to operate homes leased to the state. Gov. William Milliken's Interagency Community Placement Coordinating Council, after checking into the charges, acknowledged the need for improvement but said two false perceptions had emerged about the

program. One was that the community placement program is terribly mismanaged, out of control and the worst-run program in state government. The other, based on the audit report, is that there is a 20 percent waste in the program. State Labor Director William Long, chairman of the interagency council, said his group's study "does not indicate anything close to 20 percent waste," and directly denied the program is terribly mismanaged. He did, however, say that "the cost efficiency of certain aspects of the program must be improved."

So what is the average citizen to conclude from such a controversy?

Obviously, there are no easy answers. And since the Plymouth Center for Human Development is under a federal court order to move most of its 600 residents into community facilities by 1983, some community placement program will have to be continued unless an alternative can be found to that course of action. But obviously more attention should be paid to community reaction to the pronosed location of specific group homes, more education about the rationale for such homes is obviously needed at the community level and better financial controls are required.

THE REACTION OF the Michigan Psychiatric Society is even more distressing for the layman, however. Here, in effect, are experts disagreeing with a state policy and at least implying that it is having a disastrous effect on patient care in Michigan. Certainly the state ought to consult such an organization before it selects a new mental health chief and when it considers the future of its community placement program.

Most of us feel an obligation to serve as "our brother's keeper" to the extent we can, but the experts' will have to settle their own differences before the public can enthusiastically support any state policy to house the retarded, psychiatric patients and others in residential settings in Michigan. Without public support. the communities in which the clients — or patients - are placed are unlikely to provide the kind of atmosphere that will be conductive to the mental and physical health of those under care there.

There was, of course, the pomp and circumstance and pageantry of the wedding of Prince Charles to Lady Diana, a day of joy for the economically-depressed British that was relayed to the rest of the world by the marvelous photography of the BBC in such splendor that it couldn't be spoiled even by the inane comments of U.S. television personalities.

There was the surprisingly easy passage of the President's tax program not only by an obsequious and Republican Senate but also by an obstreperous and Democratic House as both houses bowed to that mythical mandate Mr. Reagan supposedly won last November.

AND THEN, AS a fitting climax to the week, there was the an-

nouncement of the end of the long baseball strike, the rescheduling in Cleveland of the all-star game and the resumption of the remainder of the 1981 season as need finally triumphed over greed.

Readers can, of course, add their own special events to the special week. Perhaps we ought to add at least one footnote: the Wayne County Charter Commission's action in formally putting on the November ballot two versions of the charter that will, if approved, finally give Wayne County's government a chance to emerge into the 20th century.

Before we tackle the hard realities ahead, perhaps it is appropriate to savor these few pleasant morsels of good news. And so we do. As Shakespeare said, "Now is the winter of our discontent/Made glorious summer by this sun of York."

Park skipper wins both Mackinac races

The Voyageur is a 10-year-old cruising boat and her skipper, Dave Pethick, of the Park, never expected her to do what she did last month-win both the Chicago-Mackinac and Bay-

view's Port Huron-Mackinac races. Voyageur, an Islander 30 Mk II which sails out of the Grosse Pointe Sail Club, won Section 4 of the Lake Michigan Yachting Association division. Her elec time in the Chicago race was 71:48:18. The Chicago win came in Pethick's first appearance in that race. Voyageur also won Division II, Class N in last week's Port Huron-Mackinac race with an elapsed time of

Pethick said after the Chicago win that he was very thrilled, but never expected to do as well in that race, or in the next race in which he was entered—the Port Huron-Mackinac, Apparently his young crew, consisting of his son, Bob Pethick, 19, Jay Robinson, 20, son of Bayview race chairman J. W. Robinson, Matt Naldow, 20, and Jim Verbecke, 21, changed his mind.

"At first, we were just excited about the Chicago win. But as the kids say, we started to get psyched up for the Bayview,"

If Pethick ever needed to be psyched up for a race, it was this time. Although the boats crossed the starting line on July 25 under near-perfect conditions, the weather became an important factor as the race progressed.

The Coast Guard reported waves of up to 10 feet and winds gusting up to 40 m,p.h. Voyageur, unlike several other entries, stood up to the punishment. But it wasn't easy, Pethick says.

"It blew up a bit, but we didn't lose our mast or have to pull up because of seasickness like many of the other boats did. We didn't feel great, but we weren't as bad as the others."

Pethick and the crew of the Voyageur' weren't really aware of their position until they got to Cove Island, where boats must call and verify their position to the Coast Guard. Voyageur reached Cove Island at 7:43 p.m. on July 27. At this point, nearing the last leg of the race and after they had survived a rough night, the race really got started for Pethick, his crew and Voya-

When we got to the Cove, we got discouraged. We figured we were eighth or ninth in our class. Then we remembered that old saying: the race is won or lost in the Straits of Mackinac. So, we just pounded it out, we just went for it.

"After the sun came up and we picked up the debris—I must admit, it was a rough night—we didn't see many boats our size. they were all big fellows. We thought we'd made up what we'd lost.

"After we crossed the finish line and got the gun, we cruised the harbor and couldn't find any boats in our class." Not wanting to jinx themselves and predict a win, Pethick and the crew kept repeating: "Lefs not say it?

The Voyageur's crew turned in the time card and saw the listed results "Everybody in our class was our size or bigger, so we knew they would have to give us time."

Pethick then spotted race chairman Robinson, who told him: "Dave, it looks like you're the winner."

He didn't win without one final scare. "I took a shower and a nap, then walked over and saw the computer list had us in third place. Mrs. Robinson was there and must have seen the look on my face. She took me into the race area where the com-modore in charge verified that Voyageur was the winner.'

Not only was Voyageur a winner, but she and her crew had accomplished something few had before them. Pethick says that race chairman Robinson told him that only about a half-dozen boats had ever won both races-and those were hot-shot racers, not production boats like Pethick's.

"The significant thing was not winning one, but two races . . . this is a 10-year-old production boat that won its class in both races." Pethick says.

Right now, he adds, he and the crew are basking in the glow of victory. One of the crew got a T-shirt printed which proclaimed Voyageur as the winner of the Chicago (and in gigantic lettering) Port-Huron-Mackinac races. Pethick himself plans to do a little remembering. "I'm going to take all of the clippings and make a scrapbook. I'm even going to have all the charts done up in plastic."

Pethick dosen't plan to let Voyageur rest on her laurels. He will compete in this summer's remaining regattas and races. And what about a trip back to the races next






