# Councilman sues over flyer

A bogus campaign flyer last week prompted Woods Councilman Frederick Lovelace to file an invasion of privacy lawsuit against unsuccessful mayoral candidate Timothy Mucciante and two of his campaign work-

The suit says that Lovelace and his wife have suffered damages since their address was listed as the source of a satirical political flyer that Woods police say was distributed by. Mucciante's campaigners.

-Named in the suit are Mucciante's campaign manager Edward Peabody, 20, of Harper Woods, and William Cobau, 20, of Grosse Pointe Woods. Mucciante, a 22-year-old law student, was defeated in the Tuesday, Nov. 3 election by incumbent mayor George Freeman who was elected to his second two-year term.

On Monday, Oct. 26, Grosse Pointe Woods police sought an arrest war-rant against Peabody and Cobau for allegedly breaking a state campaign law by distributing the bogus campaign flyer. A Wayne County prosecutor determined that although the flyer listed Lovelace's address as its source, no law was broken because the flyer was not advocating a specific candidate or issue.

As evidence backing their request for the warrant, Woods police submitted a sworn statement by a detective saying he observed Peabody drive into the North High parking lot on Saturday, Oct. 24, and saw his passenger, Cobau, place the bogus flyer on a car windshield.

The suit says that since the bogus flyer first appeared around Oct. 5, Lovelace and his wife have received harassing phone calls and have been "subject to great personal embarrassment and humiliation.

Mucciante said he and his campaigners had nothing to do with the flver and that the lawsuit was a form of harassment because he was gaining support before the election. Peabody said the suit is totally absurd because he had nothing to do with the bogus

At a hearing on Thursday, Oct. 29, Wayne County Circuit Court Judge William Giovan issued a temporary restraining order to prevent the defendants from distributing the flyer with Lovelace's address on it. The order also states that Mucciante and his cohorts have not been found responsible for distributing the bogus

The flyer in question is written in script form and is a satire of a Woods council meeting. At the end it urges citizens to attend council meetings and to vote in the Nov. 3 election. It is signed by a fictional group, People for Better Government, and gives Councilman Lovelace's address.

Lovelace's lawsuit says he and his wife have suffered damages in excess of \$10,000 and "have been greatly prejudiced in their social and political relationships with the commu-

"It's really a shame this happened in our community . . . I'm seeking legal recourse to prevent it from ever happening again and to show that I had nothing to do with it," Lovelace said.

Lovelace said that he plans to run for mayor or again for council in 1983 because he is interested in donating his time in service to his community "I'm running because I'm donating my time to the community. The job doesn't pay enough to have my family subjected to (harassing phone calls.)" Lovelace said.

"Winning the case is not the main thing," Lovelace added. "The point is to show if you play by those rules, you're come to get your hands

# Mayoral seats go to Graham and Freeman

Douglas Graham won a closely contested race for mayor of Grosse Pointe Park while Woods incumbent Mayor George Freeman easily won a second term in municipal elections Tuesday, Nov. 3. Farms voters also turned down three ballot proposals to increase employe retirement benefits while voters in the Woods agreed to raise their taxes by a half mill to improve Emergency Medical Service.

Turn-out averaged about 30 percent in the three Pointe communities with contested council, mayoral and judicial races. Unofficial results follow.

Graham became the Park's fourth mayor Tuesday with a 2,062 to 1,666 margin over his opponent Anthony Spada. Spada out-polled Graham in just two precincts, numbers three and five Four-year seats on the council went to Carroll Evola, top vote-getter with 1,857, Patricia Forster, with 1,758, and Mark Valente, III, with 1,664. Incumbent John Fildew, who was endorsed by most organizations and groups in the city, lost his council seat by 52 votes. Fildew received a total of 1,612, John J. P. Ryan, 1,455, and Eugene Mc-Kinney, 1,207.

In a surprisingly close race for municipal judge, incumbent Beverly Grobbel beat her opponent Alan Devine by a 2,056 to 1,403 margin.

The City

In an uncontested council race in the City about 20 percent of the voters turned out. Mayor David Robb was top vote getter, with 778, followed by incumbent William Montgomery with 708, newcomer James Curran with 682 and incumbent Robert Nugent with 672 votes.

The Woods

Incumbent Mayor Freeman in the Woods outpoiled his opponent, Timothy Mucciante, by a 3,458 to 1,360 margin. A new council member, Jean Rice, was the top vote getter in a race between seven candidates. Mrs. Rice received 2,443 votes. Also re-elected to four-year seats were incumbents Thomas Fahrner, with 2,340 votes, and John Sabol, with 1,942 votes. Unsuccessful candidates were Michael E. Slomski, 1,858, Frederick Maddock, 1,446, Douglas Munro, 1,280 and John Stoy, 845.

Two of the three Woods ballot proposals were successful. Proposal One, for boat docks, won by a slim 2,468 to 2,244 margin. Proposal Two, to improve Emergency Medical Service, was approved by a 2,760 to 2,111 margin. Proposal Three, for parks, was soundly defeated, with 1,277 voting yes and 3,725 voting no.

More than 5,000 voters, over 35 percent of the total registered in the Woods, went to the polls Nov. 3.

The Woods' Proposition One authorizes the council to begin construction of an unspecified number of new boat docks to be financed by boat dock rental fees.

Woods Proposition Two increases property taxes by one-half mill beginning next year and thereafter to upgrade Woods ambulance service to Advanced Life Support System status, including state-of-the-art monitoring equipment for heart attack victims.

Woods Proposition Three raises local property taxes by one mill for four years to fund city-wide park improvements not specified on the ballot. The Recreation Commission and council decide what projects are to be done using the Phase Two Park Improvement Plan as starting point. That plan includes new tennis courts at Ghesquiere Park, athletic facilities at Lake Front Park, a solar heater for the pool there, a band shell at Ghesquiere and other projects. One mill raises about \$302,000 a year in the Woods. The total collected by the tax would be about \$1.2 million.

The Farms

Farms voters returned four incumbent councilmen to their seats and defeated three ballot proposals dealing with city retirement and pension

Top vote getter was Joseph Fromm, with 1,952 votes. Next in line was Gail Kaess with 1,765, and Nancy Waugaman, with 1.725. Those three were elected for four-year terms. Jack Cudlip won a two-year term on the council with 1,720 votes.

Losers in the Farms council race were James Mast, a former councilman, who netted 1,517 votes, and Andrew Dahl, with 710.

Incumbent Farms Judge Robert Pytell soundly defeated his opponent Anthony Penta by a 2,210 to 411 vote

The Farms ballot Proposal One was defeated with 1,458 voting yes and 1,198 voting no. Proposal Two went down by a 1,827 to 913 margin, and Proposal Three was defeated 1,460 to

Farms Mayor Pro-Tem Lloyd Semple was reached at home on election night and said he was disappointed with the vote on the ballot proposals. He blamed the council for not educating the electorate on the ballot issues.

"It's clear to me voters didn't understand the proposals," Semple said. He said their defeat would force the council to return to the bargaining table with a different package of proposals, one that contains fewer improvements in fringe benefits.

About 34 percent, or 2,953 of the 8,600 registered voters went to the polls in the Farms.

Wayne County

Grosse Pointers apparently followed the suburban trend by strongly approving a County proposal for an Elected executive. Local voters cast 9,695 ballots in favor of Wayne County Proposal One, and 1.371 against. County Proposal Two, for an appointed council executive, was defeated in the Pointes with 5,848 voting no and 2,730 voting yes.

# Patterson Park to honor retiring mayor

Patterson Park. It has a nice ring to it and that's good, because that's what Park residents are going to call the recreational facility on the lake at the end of Three Mile Drive from now on.

The city council renamed the park to honor retiring Mayor Matthew C. Patterson at his last city council meeting, Monday, Oct. 23. It was one of many honors bestowed on the 81year-old Patterson during the last few weeks of his reign and probably the most fit. When Patterson stops to review his 22 years of city service, it is his work for the parks that he's proudest of-expansion of Three Mile in 1960 by seven acres, addition in 1970 of another six acres, construction of boat wells, olympic peols, tennis courts and prevention of a subdivision that would have blocked the view downriver.

Park residents and friends of Patterson are welcome to a complimentary reception to honor him this Saturday, Nov. 7, from 1 to 3 p.m. at the War Memorial, 32 Lakeshore Road. Refreshments will be served.

Patterson was appointed to the city council in 1959 just at a time when his career at Dodge Motor Company was coming to an end. Patterson joined the firm, for 75 cents an hour, back in 1922 when he left his native Scotland and stopped in Detroit to visit a brother. He says he was on his way to New Zealand, where he had more relatives, but his brother talked him into getting a job. When Patterson retired in 1961, he was the Dodge division's last president, with more than 100,000 employes under

His career spanned the auto industry's most expansive, powerful era. Patterson saw his firm through years of tremendous growth, the construc tion of several plants, and the U.S. war machine in Detroit. He had dealings with Presidents Truman, Johnson and Nixon and was the man who first hired Lawrence Welk, for \$5 million a year, to perform in the Dodge sponsored television show. "And I'm the guy who had to fire



him, too," Patterson says, "That was hard, he's great."

Watching the fortunes of Dodge's parent company, Chrysler, decline in recent years has been tough, Patterson was directly involved with architects on the building of Dodge Main in Poletown. When it was torn down "I couldn't even go over there, I couldn't even look. I just didn't have

the heart. That building would have worked for another 100 years," he

The toughness required to move up and stay on top in the auto industry was apparent in the way Patterson handled his years on the Park's council Patterson has a distinctive way of running a meeting, perched sev-(Continued on Page 2A)







# Wayne County suburbs face another jail crisis

An overpopulation crisis that closed the Wayne County Jail to additional prisoners from local municipalities such as the Grosse Pointes, has eased as the result of close cooperation between municipal judges, the Sheriff's Department, law enforcement administrators and intensive effort on the part of Chief Executive Judge Samuel Gardner of Recorder's Court, according to a news release from the board of commissioners.

Although a report from Sheriff William Lucas has indicated the prisoner count was reduced from 1,039 last Tuesday, Oct. 27, to 949 by Friday, Oct. 30, an order to close the jail remained in effect until Monday, Nov. 2.

In a meeting at the City-County Building Thursday, Dunn addressed nearly 80 local district and municipal judges and law enforcement administrators, including some from Grosse Pointe, informing them that a jail crisis now exists in the downtown facility and the jail annex in Westland and that the sheriff had closed both facilities to additional prisoners indefinitely.

Lucas, following the meeting, said he had turned over supervision of the county jail to Judge Dunn. This would avoid his being in contempt of court for exceeding the prisoner population limitation's set by the courts several years ago.

In answer to a number of police chief inquiries, Judge Dunn assured them that under his court order their cities would not be held responsible for violating state correctional codes. Most local jails do not meet cell standards for size, patrolling, or eating services. Dunn also assured them that the expense of holding county prisoners would be reimbursed by the county on a per diem basis.

In the meantime, Neal Bush, attorney representing county jail prisoners, has asked Perry Johnson, Director of the State Department of Corrections, to send all of his investigators to Wayne County to see that local jails meet state correction standards. "If he refuses," Bush said, "we'll take him and his department to court."

Dunn told those attending that prisoners charged with more serious crimes — such as murder — may be admitted to the county jail provided they obtain permission from his office. "I realize," he said, "that your security, in most cases, is inadequate to house the more violent prisoners."

Lucas said the downtown jail was at capacity of 739 prisoners and the

annex was currently housing 242 offenders, nearly 100 more than the cells will accommodate. Lucas echoed Dunn's estimation that the jail population would increase from this point on rather than decrease because of the economic situation, the nature of crime today, which is considered more serious, and the inability of persons to afford bail.

Some 80 municipal, district judges and police representatives attended the Thursday meeting to hear Dunn speak. "I don't plan to issue a court order requiring your communities to comply with my request," he said. "I think we can work together."

Livonia Police Chief Robert Turner pointedly told the judge he would not comply. "We're being sued by one prisoner as the result of a similar problem the county had six years ago and I'm not going to hold any county prisoners in my jail," he said, "furthermore, any prisoners we do get will be cuffed and left at the county jail's front door." "I see," retorted Dunn, "then I'll have to issue you and everyone else here a direct court order."

Chief Turner carried out his threat late Thursday when he sent three prisoners to the jail — only to have them refused. The Livonia patrolmen and their wards remained in the parking lot for hours uncertain as to their next move. Lucas said it was the first time on record that anyone insisted upon entering his lockup.

Holding cells in Grosse Pointe municipal buildings are small and in most cases do not meet state codes for retention facilities. Local police officials find themselves in the same bind faced by other area communities and, in dealing with it, often violate state laws governing how long they can hold prisoners, according to Farms Police Chief Robert Ferber.

"We don't have any choice really. We're making every effort to bond out as many, prisoners as we can, but when they're involved in violent crime we just can't do that. So we hold them in our own cells over the legal limit," Ferber said.

wednesday, Judge Dunn ordered the state to pick up 100 of its own prisoners for detention at Jackson and said he will personally interview each prisoner in the county jail to determine which can be released on quick bond, as one way to help alleviate overcrowding. Municipal and district judges were also advised to utilize a state-funded halfway house for female offenders to circumvent problems at local lock-ups that have no provision for holding convicted women. "The St. Evangeline halfway house in Detroit can accomodate nearly 30 women with minor offenses, leaving room at the county jail for those convicted of more serious crimes," Alfred N. Montgomery, Director of the County's Criminal Justice Coordinating Council, explained.

Judge Dunn said his office would also contact Macomb and Washtenaw Counties for possible housing. "Oakland," he added, "is already at capacity." He said he also plans to ask the Wayne County Board of Commissioners for additional jail staffing. Dunn has already placed a five-day limit for processing of custody cases by Probate Court

Judge Dunn is also considering reopening three barracks at the Detroit House of Corrections.

# Police warn of LSD tabs Grosse Pointe Woods Public

Grosse Pointe Woods Public Safety Youth Officer James Fowler issued a warning this week to parents and children about recent reports of sales of the drug LSD in the form of postage stamp size pictures of cartoon characters.

The small pictures may contain drops of "blotter acid" that can be placed in the mouth or absorbed through the skin, Fowler said. The paper tabs often come in sheets and could find their way to younger children from older kids or as Halloween candy. They are similar in appearance to tattoo transfers commonly sold in drug stores and collected by children.

The tabs are about the size of postage stamps and are printed with pictures of Mickey Mouse, Superman, and other cartoon characters. Police suggest calling them if such items are found.

While there have been reports of the new "blotter acid" in Michigan, Fowler said none have been spotted in Grosse Pointe by police.

# State expected to rule on Hill parking plan

Health is scheduled to rule late this month on Cottage Hospital's application for approval to build a 350-car parking structure on Kercheval Avenue. The structure is the keystone of a plan to stimulate commercial activity on the Hill in Grosse Pointe

Department spokesman Marion Vaughan said formal application for the structure by Cottage Hospital was made on Sept. 14. The department has 90 days to review the proposal and issue a "certificate of need" allowing the hospital to proceed with construction, she said.

The parking deck will be located at Kercheval and Muir, adjacent to a retail office building that has been proposed by Peter Bologna, partner in Kercheval Investment, Co. The Farms city council earlier this year granted Bologna's firm a 10-year, 50 percent tax break on the building. That project has been beld-up by a lack of parking in the area, according to Bologna.

Cottage Hospital's request to the state outlined plans for the garage, as well as an underground warehouse and office area that will be connected to the main hospital by a tunnel. The 26,000-square-foot underground space will house some non-patient services that would be moved from the main building, according to Cottage Administrator Ralph Wilgarde. Cost of the entire project is estimated at about \$3.75 million.

Wilgarde said the project could be completed by October, 1983, if the state rules on it this month.

Cottage is also seeking state approval to add 15 medical/surgical beds to replace 18 obstetrical beds that were transfered to Bon Secours under

medical/surgical capacity. In addition, Cottage is seeking state approval, to increase its psychiatric ward from 36 to 56 beds.

Bon Secours Hospital in the City also recently asked the public health department to okay its purchase of a sophisticated diagnostic device known as a CT scanner. The scanner will be jointly owned and used by Bon Secours and Cottage. The device costs about \$903,000 and will be located at Bon Secours, where radiological technologists will be responsible for its operation. Staff from both hospitals would have access to the scanner, which produces cross-sectional x-rays of the body.

#### A new life for dead trees

In the last decade, a new art form. stump carving, has revolutionized yard decor. Stump carving is the shaping or sculpting of a dead tree's

stump using chainsaws.

Many carvings have appeared in the Grosse Pointe community. The most recent addition is a 15 foot-high eagle which belongs to Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Gaspar of Whittier Avenue. ### Job-seekers find help at North

North High

Students seeking part-time jobs after school and on weekends can get assistance from job placement officer, Jayne Warner in the Grosse Pointe North High School counseling center. Mrs. Warner is at North on Tuesdays and Wednesdays between 9 a.m. and

The job placement program is funded through the State Board of Education. Most of the jobs offered are from about 3:30 to 6:30 p.m. on weekdays and full-time on weekends. Salaries are usually minimum wage.

Thirty-six new job openings are available, with 151 students already working. The biggest market for jobs in this area is by far for girls with business skills such as typing and shorthand. "It's a shame more boys don't take business skills as an elective and take advantage of this," said Mrs. Warner. "It looks very good on resumes."

Students must go through several procedures before they can be interviewed by employers. First they must fill out an application obtained at the job placement office. A student's evalauation by an adult is also required, usually done by a counselor, teacher, or someone else in the

Mrs. Warner then conducts an interview with the student. "During the interview I fill out the third page of their application, find out what type of job they would like to have, and what career goals they have," explains Mrs. Warner. "Ideally I try to find a job that correlates with the students career goals," she added.

The job placement office is not to be confused with North's Co-op program. A student doesn't receive credit and is not released from school

in order to work. Mrs. Warner also has information on conducting interviews and making resumes. "Students should start making a file of their resumes. They should include what they enjoyed about school as well as the classes they took."


Mrs. Warner also sets up summer jobs. Students who plan to apply for summer jobs should see her in April and May.





# Prime Time-

For Senior Citizens

By Marian Trainor

Oliver Wendell Holmes, an American writer of essays, poems and novels and best known for "The Autocrat of the Breakfast Table," wrote: "To be 70 years young is sometimes more hopeful than to be 40 years

The key word is hopeful. Involved in that is the concept of will, determination to remain a part of the dynamic world and the resolution never to retreat to a status quo of static living.

It is not any easy choice to make. To retreat to the comfort and security of past achieve-ments, established habits and never-yield convictions is much less strenuous than moving on to new accomplishments, changed attitudes and modified view.

MARGARET MEAD, the late anthropologist once said: "only the young are natives of the modern world - the rest of us are immigrants, strangers in a new land."

When you look at the world and how much it has changed during the lives of older citizens, this point of view seems a perceptive one.

Made foreign by scientific discoveries, complex economic theories, media-modified politics, free-to-be-me standards for living, America can become an alien land to older citizens unless time is invested in translating the complex present into terms that can be understood and accepted by the "natives' of a different era.

There are many ways of keeping abreast of changes and avoiding that alien feeling. Newspapers, magazines, study clubs and carefully chosen radio and television programs can help to chart a course through the confusing landscape of the nuclear world.

But going back to the class-room can be one of the best ways to put the "immigrant" back in touch with the "natives" of the modern world.

As one student put it: "People my age (I am 66 but can easily pass for 65-and-a-half) come from a far distance indeed, bringing with them strange customs and attitudes, even somewhat different dress and lan-

She then relates how she set out like an immigrant to find out what had been happening in the world while she was cooped up in a job for half a century and where she might find a place in it. She admits that sometimes she felt like an undesirable alien ("The natives seemed to regard a retired person as something like a retired office file to be put away with other obsolete

material.") She was persistent. She writes that if she couldn't be a native, she would at least become a naturalized citizen. After all, America is made up of immigrants. She held fast to the belief that older people can adapt to today's world and add to the American mix, like other immigrant groups.

America's older population is not deportable nor will it disappear. Those in their 60s will be around 10, 20 or even 30 years from now and as a group will comprise one-fifth of the population. That is too large a troup to be culturally, intellectually and socially illiterate.

Life, as long as it lasts, is to be lived. Unless the effort is made to enlarge our vista, our private world can narrow to the point where it becomes boring and intolerable. Communication is important. It is not easy to communicate with those whom we

don't understand and who really don't care to understand where we are coming from. The world changes. The world as we knew it is gone. It is up to us to find our way in it or be lost. Education can provide a compass.

Going back to school may seem incongruous for those who have known many successes in their careers and feel that they should be teachers rather than students. In their particular field that is probably true but there are other worlds to conquer.

LEARNING DOES not need to be arduous and forbidding. Education can be as stimulating at 60 as it was at 16. The opportunities are there. Locally there are community colleges, adult education programs, the College of Lifelong Learning and universities staffed by experts in their fields. You can learn about the why and wherefore of local government, world politics, ecoriomics, science or any other subject that will make you feel less a stranger in your own land. The fees are nominal, Wayne County Community College courses are free for senior cit-

Actually courses at any institution of learning should be free for older people. They have supported these institutions of higher learning with taxes all of their working years. They have earned the privilege of free entrance into the academic world if they choose to exercise that

Locally it would be an incentive for older people who want to take courses to have an institution such as the Fromm Institute for Lifelong Learning in California. Founders, Alfred Fromm and his wife, Hanna, came to the United States as refugees from Hitler's Germany in 1936 and established the institute on the campus of the University of San Francisco.

At Fromm retired people are taught courses on a high academic level by emerite professors. They study with their peers but are surrounded by thousands of young students who make them feel part of the student body rather than belonging to an old age club. Some of the students move on to the university to study for a degree (most of them over 65) and to prepare for a second or even third degree. Some start to work part time to supplement their income. Others simply enlarge their vista on life. All of them acquire an increased sense of self-worth and self-confidence.

Tuition is \$150 a year but if the student can't afford it, it is waived. Terms run for eight weeks and three courses can be chosen. Classes meet for an hour and a half once a week in the term. In between there are stimulating lectures, plays, concerts and field trips.

The world does not pass these students by. They are very much a part of it, as they compare interpretations of the e. e. cummings poems or whether the procession of the equinoxes nullifies astronomy.

Sounds difficult? Take heart. We are told that the only part of an older person that normally is as good as ever, and usually better, is the brain. Brain cells die but there are always trillions more. Even Aristotle used only a fraction of the human brain power available.

The brain like any other part of the body becames flabby unless it is exercised. It is necessary to give it a real workout if we want to keep it fit enough to get along with the natives in this new land.

(Continued from Page 11A) Another institution similar to the Fromm Institute is at the University of Kentucky where the Herman L. Donovan Fellowship for Senior Citizens provides educational opportunities for older students. Established by the late Dr. Herman L. Donovan (University of Kentucky president 1940-55) who believed all campuses should open their programs to retirees on a tuition free basis, it offers opportunities for study in all the academic areas to those who want to know what is new and accepted in this new world. The courses vary from English to computer science. Donovan scholars range in professions from lawyers to electricians and in age from 65 to the 90s. Their educational levels extend from being high school graduates to having doctorates

in philosophy. Are there benefits to society in keeping the older population functional and fit? The answer seems to be yes. Most of the Fromm students are active members of their communities. One student admitted to being less opinionated and also discovered that her opinions are now more acceptable since they are now based on better information and clearer thinking.

How do the instructors feel about their students? One professor confessed that he found them more impassioned than the

younger students. "Younger students are disenchanted," he said. Another was distressed by the nihilism and passivity of the young.

Education can be an endless search, for horizons of knowledge are always just beyond sight. But along the way, the older student stops being an alien and becomes a native of a new world that had become strange and incomprehensible. With that comes hope—hope for a happy fulfilled old age through knowledge regained.

# Kylian ballet is repertory special

This past July the Netherlands Dance Theatre gave its American premiere performance of Jiri Kylian's "Overgrowth Path" at the Metropoliton Opera House. The Met is New York City's summer showcase for dance companies of international stature, such as the National Ballet of Canada, the Paris Opera Ballet and The Royal Ballet of England. A premiere at the Met is something like defending a dissertation before the world's renown faculty of dance

When the dance calendars listed NDT among the Metropolitan's summer presentations, whispers wafted on the air between balletomanes. Could this 35-member ensemble ballet company possibly do justice to the grandeur and enormity of the Opera House? The last time New Yorkers had seen NDT, in 1979, they had. been left with a feeling akin to cult enthusiasm. Previously girdled by the New York City Center's stage. NDT admirers waited eagerly to see what use would be made of the Met's ample stage. Given the troupe's seemingly unbounded energy, the potential was

The result was phenomenal. The house was sold out for their entire engagement. The dancers were praised for their cohesive, expressive and technical brilliance, and Clive Barnes of the New York Post proclaimed Kylian "a master."

On Nov 9, 10 and 13 Alpha Repertory Television Service, (ARTS), presents a glimpse of the choreographic process in "The Creation of a Ballet," chronicling Jiri Kylian's creation of "Overgrown Path," from rehearsal to world premiere. It can be seen on Grosse Pointe Cable channel 24.

Thirty-four year old Kylian began his dance studies in his native Czchoslovakia and continued at Britain's Royal Ballet School. He danced with the Stuttgart Ballet before joining Netherlands Dance Theatre in 1975 as full-time resident choreographer and co-artistic director, assuming full artistic direction in 1978.

"Overgrown Path" is choreographed to Leos Janacek's "On the Overgrown Path" the composer's best known cycle of piano pieces. Kylian describes his ballet as a "dance portrait of this most inside song. Janacek wrote the suite after the death of his son, while his daughter was dying, and in the midst of parting from his wife. Both music and ballet derive their titles from a view of life as a path, overgrown with layers of experience and somber reflection.

"Girls, do it once with fury, but really with fury," directs Kylian during a rehearsal. His meaning is understood. Tentativeness is abondoned, trained muscles are trusted to repeat the sequence of movements, allowing feeling to motivate and give color to the dance. Strong, quick impulses send their feet stomping into the ground, as clenched fists rustle their skirts into a maelstrom. Outside, children press their noses to the window and giggle at what they see inside. Pigeons alight and take flight from the same sill.

Given its emotional underpinnings, the ballet is naturally serious in tone. It is not, however, a narrative, literal ballet. It is abstract, concentrating on movement quality and small group relationships, expressing a range of emotions from desire to nidifference and repulsion. Groupings form and dissolve, lives touch and veer off again. What is vital to one person is trivial, even oblivious to the next.

Kylian's relationship with his dancers is well served by his equanimity, and attested to by negligible attrition. The dancers are an international



#### **ORDINANCE NO. 92**

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CODE OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE PARK BY ADDING A NEW SECTION 9.131, CHAPTER 47C, TO TITLE IX OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE PARK.

THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE PARK ORDAINS:

Section 1.

Section 9.131 is added to Title IX, Chapter 47C of the Code of the City of Grosse Pointe Park to read in its entirety as follows:

Section 9.131 HANDICAPPED PARKING. Each shopping center parking area as defined in Section 1 of Act No. 235 of the Public Acts of 1969, as amended, being Section 257.941 of the Michigan Compiled Laws shall contain parking spaces specifically designated for handicappers in numbers to conform with the requirements of Section 2 of Act No. 1 of the Public Acts of 1966, as amended, being Section 125.1352 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.



# Nuclear protests echo era of appeasement

Viewing the recent' European anti-war and nuclear disarmament demonstrations on the TV tube or reading about them in our papers, those of us who are long in the tooth and even longer in memories are often carried back to the isolationist demonstrations of the 1930s and the anti-war protests of the 1960s. We are also reminded that what we learn from history is that men never learn from history.

On the U.S. campuses in the 1930s, it was popular to blame war on the munitions makers and. among students, to take the Oxford pledge not to bear arms for flag or country. On the campuses and elsewhere in this country in the 1960s. it was popular to blame war on our own government and to contend that if the United States would just withdraw from Vietnam, Cambodia and assorted other foreign trouble spots, peace would return and all would be well.

BUT IN NEITHER case did the demonstrators achieve the peace they sought. True, the protests of the 1930s probably delayed U.S. entry into World War II but the delay may have prolonged the struggle. And, true, the demonstrations of the 1980s did help persuade Washington to pull out of the Vietnam war but that action did not bring peace to Vietnam or its neighbors.

What the European students are protesting these days is the proposal that the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) put U.S. cruise and Pershing-2 missiles into Western Europe. Like the American protesters of the 1930s and 1960s, they assume that if nothing is done to alarm or upset the potential aggressors, nothing is likely to happen and peace will ensue.

Fortunately, many Europeans do not buy the demonstrators' line even though European governments may be influenced by it. The Economist of London, probably the best news weekly in the world, simply says the protesters are wrong. In its Oct. 17 issue, The Economist warns of the fallacies of doing nothing to improve Western Europe's defenses and then adds:

Between now and next April, when the row about NATO's new missile plan comes to a climax at the congress of West Germany's Social Democratic Party, the majority of the NATO plan's opponents who are still open to reasoned argument have to be persuaded to take a closer look at the consequences of what they advocate.

Thy have to be persuaded, first, that a unilaterialist Western Europe is dangerously likely to become a neutral Western Europe; second, that a neutral Western Europe cannot expect Russia to leave it amicably alone, and, third and vital, that restoring the nuclear balance will not only avoid the danger that life for West Europeans would become more like life in Eastern Europe but will avoid that undesirable thing without increasing the danger of nuclear war."

The Economist makes its warning because the Russians have a lead in non-nuclear forces in central Europe as well as in battlefield nuclear weapons and longer-range nuclear delivery systems than can, as the magazine puts it, "swish clean across the battlefield to the far edges of Western Europe." In short, NATO would lack any credible deterrent unless it updates and modern-

izes its nuclear weapons systems. But The Economist wasn't the only European voice to take issue with the anti-war and anti-U.S. demonstrations. In an article in the Wall Street Journel, Josef Joffe, senior editor of the German weekly Die Zeit, contended that the recent demonstration of 250,000 in Bonn did not really speak for all of West Germany. Public opinion polls show, he wrote, that 69 percent of the population reject activities such as the Bonn peace rally as a matter of principle. Although 40 percent oppose the deployment of new missiles, favor it with the Soviet Union lead nowhere, he reported.

EQUALLY ENCOURAGING is another report that shows 65 percent of the West Germans polled regard the United States as "likable," while only

17 percent opt for "dislike." But the West German editor conceded that his own government has not been as supportive of NATO and the West as it could have been. Helmut Schmidt, the German chancellor, seems tired, Joffe writes, and, "unable to make up his mind, he will coddle the peace movement today and castigate it tomorrow."

Joffe was also critical of the Reagan administration's rhetoric and belligerent pronunciamentos that provided ammunition for the administration's European enemies. But he was also hopeful of an increasing Washington sensitivity to European domestic and political needs on the issue of nuclear rearmament as well as the arms control talks with the USSR that NATO encourages.

Perhaps most encouraging of all was the editor's report that while the Bonn rally was organized to protest continued American "warmongering," recent U.S. indications of a willingness to talk arms control at a time the Soviet Union keeps adding to its arsenal resulted in some shift of opinion. "The U.S. was no longer the sole scapegoat," he wrote. "There were plenty of banners demanding: 'Disarmament in the East as well as the West.'"

Such demonstrations have some effect on allies and foes. Enemies always consider a nation's willingness to fight as well as its readiness to fight. In the days leading up to World War II Nazi Germany miscalculated on both counts. It knew the United States was not prepared to fight and it also believed Americans were unwilling to fight in view of the demonstrations against war in this country.

In his autobiography published after World War II, Eric Sevareid, the retired CBS reporter and commentator, recalled that he was one of the students taking the Oxford pledge against war at a University of Minnesota demonstration in the mid '30s. He said he voted for the pledge along with the others. Then he added: "The only thing that disturbed my peace of mind was a lasting memory of a tall young man in uniform— I believe he was the ROTC cadet colonel—rising with simple dignity, facing the hostile crowd and saying, 'If we are to enjoy the privileges of democracy, as you are in this meeting, why should we not be willing to defend it?'

In England and West Germany there are fears today that Western Europe will become the nuclear battleground in a limited war involving the USSR and the United States. Unaccountably, some Europeans think the United States might even make peace at their expense. And yet they are unwilling to make the sacrifices to improve their own capability to wage nonnuclear war or to accept U.S. missiles to improve their nuclear deterrence. Taking those positions, they sound like the American youth of the 1930s who said they were unwilling to defend democracy even though they enjoyed its privileges.

THE EUROPEAN YOUTH who protest against

armaments and shout anti-American slogans are motivated by idealism and in some cases by leftwing propaganda. Yet the United States has maintained a shield of American troops in Europe ever since the end of World War II and that shield still totals 300,000 men. That alone ought to be evidence that the United States will continue to defend Western Europe so long as the Europeans show an interest in helping defend them-

It is still popular in some circles in this country as well as in Europe to call for nuclear disarmament, even on a unilateral basis, but most people would accept the more rational argument that the best way of reducing the risk of nuclear war is to make certain that the nation that might be considering using nuclear weapons knows that if it does so it will be answered in kind. But such deterrence in Western Europe requires not only American but Western European support.

# Recovery package is essential

By William R. Bryant, Jr. Passage of Governor Milliken's economic recovery package, introduced last week, is the only course of action the legislators of this state can take if Michigan is going to recover from and survive its grave economic condition.

During a recent televised address to Michigan citizens, Milliken claimed that "Michigan is fighting for its economic life," and stated that the only economic salvation was passage of the economic recovery package introduced last week.

The Governor is certainly correct in his assessment of Michigan's economic future. The saying goes in Lansing that when the nation gets a cold, Michigan gets pneumonia. I am confident that this economic recovery package will help immunize Michigan's economy from the ups and downs of national economic trends.

The package contains a number of related bills including the centerpiece for recovery, reform measures for Michigan's muchcriticized workers' compensation system. If passed, Michigan would finally have a meaningful definition of disability in its laws, Currently, disability definitions are drawn solely from precedents established in court

To remedy problems caused by workers disabled but still able to work in other capacities, the test for disability would become far more rigid 150 weeks from the date of injury. The disabled worker would be found disabled only if the worker was unable to perform any regular, recognized, or reasonable work which the worker could perform, given the physical condition, education and experience of the disabled worker.

In addition, disability benefits would be reduced if dependents of disabled workers or disabled workers themselves receive social security benefits, old age pensions, self insurance payments or other retirement benefits. The bill also includes provisions for benefit coordination with other states. The workers' compensation reform proposal also includes changes in the Insurance Code to provide competitive rate-making by insurance Code to provide competitive rate-making by insurance com-

Another major point in the recovery package is the establishment of a \$100 million Economic Development Fund to be financed by revenue bonds. This loan fund would be aimed at research and development facilities, industrial projects, corpo-

It is a bit difficult, six weeks after the incident, to reconstruct what exactly happened at the Sept. 14 dog owners' orientation meeting referred to in last week's letter "Year of the handicapped?" Ray Gieleghem, the trainer, informs me that in no way was the handicapped person who wrote that letter rejected from participation in the class. I can only conclude that she made the decision not to enroll. Gieleghem, a coordinator and trainer of long-standing in the Southern Michigan Obedience Training Club, assures me that every assistance possible has been rendered to handicapped persons who have enrolled. In fact, among the recent success stories he recounted was one of a person in a wheel chair who completed the obedience train-

ing program. We sincerely regret these circumstances and can only assure the letter writer and other handicapped persons of the good intentions toward the handicapped both by the Southern Michigan Obedience Training Club and the Department of Continuing Education of Grosse Pointe public schools, co-sponsors of the

rate or division headquarters and high technology service companies. The Economic Development Fund would consist of three divisions: a private development loan fund, a public development loan fund and a mortgage insurance fund which would create a market for industrial development revenue bonds.

Changes in the Single Business Tax included in the package would remove payments for unemployment and workers' compensation insurance from the SBT taxable. The SBT reform would also allow up to \$500,000 to be deducted for increased export sales of Michigan-made products. Sales would be averaged over a three-year period. The small business tax base exemption would jump from \$40,000 to \$60,000 if the bill is

Foreign banks would be attracted to Michigan under another provision in the recovery plan. Banks chartered in foreign countries would be allowed to open agency offices in Michigan, with limitations on their conduct of the "business of banking."

What we finally have before us in the Legislature is the most practical, responsible approach to solving the single biggest deterrent to economic recovery in Michigan, our workers' disability compensation system.

Let me try to bring all this down to a level we all can deal

Michigan families all over this state are hurting and scared; scared they may be uprooted; scared their kids may have to move to some place of dry desert rock to find a decent job; scared their schools will close; scared they won't be able to buy or keep that house they yearned for or treasure; scared they can't afford to send their kids to college; scared they will lose their chance at a comfortable retirement. Their version of the American Dream is threatened, and it scares them and makes them' mad. Their families are being ripped apart, and it hurts to see loved ones move away from home and from our beautiful Michigan of woods and lakes and changing seasons,

Speaker Crim and other Democrats are so fond of accusing Republicans of being heartless. It won't wash now, if it ever did. We hurt for those in pain in this depressed economy. We feel the great weight of the agony far too many families are facing. We try to let people know we understand it is a good job with hope for the future that they want and need; but we really despair when we find the same tired old rhetoric of the liberal Democrats saying "we'll take care of you, just trust us and join us in beating up on that dirty, chiseling, fat employer. Together we'll take away his profits and we'll give them all away, and, yet somehow we'll get him to create more and better jobs for you and your children and your grandchildren."

If people believe such fairy tales, then there is no hope. If enough conservative and moderate Democrats are fed up with the rhetoric and ready to get this state on a course toward recovery and to give this state a framework for growth and for hope in the 1980's, then we have a good chance.

And, lastly, I hate having to recite the kinds of things I feel I am here forced to recite because of the desperate defenses of Speaker Crim.

The Legislature has done virtually nothing in the six weeks we have been in fall session. I am hopeful we can now stop the posturing, that we can be realistic, that we can act responsibly, that we can work at least five days a week through the end of the year and somehow. give the people of Michigan the chance they need and deserve to compete for jobs.

# From Another Pointe Of View

Art and fashion will come together when An Evening Under The Stars II presents Halston and his New York models in an extravaganza in the Detroit Institute of Arts Auditorium Saturday, Nov. 14.

The gala night, co-chaired by Grosse Pointe's Mrs. Henry Ford II and Mrs Donald Young, of Bloomfield Hills, will feature supper for 1,000 guests in candlelit galleries and the museum's South Court plus Big Band dancing in the DIA's Great Hall and disco in "Studio 5200," alias the Art Institute's glass-domed Kresge Court.

This will be the first time that the New York designer has brought his traveling show to Detroit, and it's some show!—an elaborate musical presentation showcasing Halston's latest evening gowns, including a special Motor City "Fireworks" creation that will be donated to the DIA's costume collection. There'll be pre-show cocktails or champagne, starting at 6:30 p.m. There'll be wine with supper, and the Halston models will dine with guests in the galleries.

The Night to Remember with Halston, presented by the museum's Founders Society, will aid the DIA's conservation and art restoration program by helping to meet a \$500,000 challenge grant from the Andrew Mellon Foundation. The J. L. Hudson Company and Halston are sponsoring the fashion extravaganza, so that most of the ticket sales proceeds will directly support the museum.

The Gala Committee hopes to collect 600 Evening Under The Stars II subscriptions at \$150 per person and 400 at \$50 per person. Ticket information may be obtained by calling the Detroit Institute of Arts, 833-7900.





# Support for Children's Home is GP tradition

Situated between two distinguished neighbors, University Liggett School and the Grosse Pointe Hunt Club, surrounded by private homes with well-groomed lawns, the Children's Home of Detroit has provided rehabilitation services for children and their families on its "new" campus on Cook Road in Grosse Pointe Woods since 1950.

Three decades ago, it was one of the few establishments located on the dirt road between Mack Avenue and Lake St. Clair. Gradually, the woods that surrounded the Home became building sites for new homes and neighborhoods, eventually leading to the incorporation of the City of Grosse Pointe Woods. After 31 years in its present location, the Children's Home continues to carry on a 145year tradition of serving children in

Strong interest and support of the Home comes from the Grosse Pointe community in a variety of ways. A majority of the members of its board of trustees are Grosse Pointe residents and have been instrumental in shaping the destiny of the institution for many years.

For the past two years a Grosse Pointer, Mrs. Thomas A. Garred, has served as president of the board. The gavel will be passed to Mrs. John O. Hastings, of Grosse Pointe Farms, at the board's annual meeting next January. Even the cottages (Kanter, Caulkins, Boyer, Bewick, Parker) and the educational facility, Barnard Center, are named after local

Service clubs in the area have expressed interest in the Home via special activities. The Kiwanis Club of Grosse Pointe has sponsored a picnic for the children for many years; it is held either at the Grosse Pointe Woods Park or on the Home's own grounds. Last spring, the Grosse Pointe Lions Club made it possible for all children, teachers and many staff members to enjoy the Shrine Circus at the State Fairgrounds.

A tradition which dates back many years continues to be carried on by the Grosse Pointe Farm and Garden Club. Every spring, the ladies of the club, with assistance from the children, plant flowers around the cottages. This year's project was led by Mrs. John Bayne.

The Grosse Pointe Senior Men's Club Orchestra has entertained the children at Christmastime.

One social event that has become a fund raising tradition is the Bridge Marathon. It began in 1967 under the leadership of Mrs. Ford Ballantyne Jr. and Mrs. Joseph Mason. Since then, as many as 120 local residents have played bridge each year, have had fun-and have raised money for the Children's Home. Over the years, the group has raised over \$15,000 for the Home.

On the average, 12 donations are received during a given month. They range from toys and athletic equipment to furniture. At times there are surprises, such as the pitching machine dropped off by an anonymous donor and the large aquarium with a variety of tropical fish donated by also have shown interest in the Children's Home; generous donations of useful merchandise have come from Jacobson's, Kinney Shoes and F. W. Woolworth.

Many residents of Grosse Pointe support the Annual Fund Drive which is the responsibility of the

Home's Development Committee. For the past two years, the drive has been headed up by Mrs. Gordon T. Ford. of Grosse Pointe Farms. Monies raised make up the difference between those provided by the state and those needed to operate a quality program.

A year ago, when the board decided to remodel the school building and build a new gymnasium, the community gave its full support. A great share of the needed funds came from Grosse Pointe.

A special education program at the Home, although funded by the Michigan Education Department, is administered by the Grosse Pointe School District. Jack MacMahon, principal of Barnes School, oversees that program on the CHD campus.

During the summer months, the availability of the Grosse Pointe Woods Park is a welcome asset to the Home's general program.

Obviously, the Children's Home appreciates the support of the community; on the other hand, the community also benefits from the Home. Many Pointe residents find employment there as social and child care workers, dietary and medical personnel. Every summer, as many as 10 Grosse Pointers, home from college, serve as recreation workers and camp counselors. Members of the Home's Girl and Cub Scout troops have taken handmade favors to area hospitals and nursing homes at holiday times.

There are times when the Home's professional staff receives inquiries from local residents who are concerned about problems of their children or themselves. In these cases, the Home's professionals provide referral services to the proper social or rehabilitation agencies: another aspect of the close relationship between the Children's Home of Detroit and the Grosse Pointe community.





A new home for Adult Service Centers

Years of work with senior citizens and the mentally ill culminated in mid-October with an open house dedicating Adult Service Centers' new headquarters at Field and Agnes in Detroit. The ribbon cutting ceremony was especially rewarding to Grosse Pointer Margheritta Allardice, who joined the agency as a volunteer teacher of arts and crafts in 1954 and became its executive director 10 years later.

ASC is the outgrowth of a senior center started by the Junior League of Detroit in a storefront location on Mack Avenue. The agency became independent in 1956, but the Junior League still maintains links with the organization and, last December, sponsored a Christmas party for ASC's senior citizens at Detroit's Butzel Center.

The Detroit Review Club will be celebrating its 90th birthday Tuesday, Nov. 17, at the Detroit Yacht Club, with over 100 club/organization presidents invited to join in the luncheon festivities. It will be one of the biggest parties in DRC history, and that's saying something . . . as MRS. JAMES MULLANEY (left), of Chalfonte Avenue, current DRC president and official hostess for the birthday lunch, MRS. AARCN E. WILCOX (center), of Loraine Road, the club's publicity chairperson and keeper of the scrapbook, and MRS. ALFRED MASSNICK,

The Detroit Review Club has printed yearbooks since 1891. DRC publicity and photographs are treasure trove of Who Was Who and What Was Going On on the Detroit club scene through the years.

DRC was born Nov. 30, 1891, the same year that Charles Dana Gibson created the Gibson Girl. Mrs. William Johnson, daughter of Mrs. Wayne Garrett, a DRC past-president, will model an antique tea gown from the Gibson Girl Era at the 90th birthday

Early on, DRC helped found the General Federation of Women's Clubs, which now has more than three million members throughout the world, and was one of a few clubs that founded the Detroit Federation of Women's Clubs. Both Federations were founded in the same year: 1894.

Only three of the Detroit Federation's founding clubs survive: DRC, with a membership that is still growing; Detroit Sorosis and Woman's Historical Club. Several DRC members have served as president of the Detroit Federation: Mrs. Pamela Patterson (1898-1900), Delphine Dodge Ashbaugh (1912-1914), Mrs. John Ida Mae Massnick and Lou Wilcox have had luncheons for various party committee members, to finalize plans and look over material and meeting minutes from the Gay Nineties to the Eightles of our own 20th Century, and both have spent hours at the Detroit Public Library's Burton Historical Collection, which houses five boxes of DRC memorabilia.

Griffin (1948:1947), Mrs. Ralph Young (1955-1957) and Mrs. Herbert E. Norris (1989-1971). Three of these, Mrs. Patterson, Mrs. Ashbaugh and Mrs. Norris, have also been DRC presidenta.

Mrs. Eugene Hunter, of Huntington Woods, the Detroit Federation's current president, will be among those seated at the speaker's table at the birthday luncheon.

Several organizations now of major importance to the community were founded by DRC presidents. The Salvation Army Auxiliary was started at a tea at the late Delphine Dodge Ashbaugh's home. Mrs. Robert Gerlsch, another DRC member, recently completed a term as the Auxiliary's president. Mrs. Gerisch has also served as president of the Women's Assoclation for the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, of which the late DRC President Mrs. G. Leon Haywood was

president emeritus. A glance at the club scrapbooks that will be on display at the birthday party shows that metropolitan Detroit papers have been writing about what DRC women were doing from 1891 on. There are many, many

photographs. DRC was instrumental in serving milk and crackers to children in public schools before the children's lunch program began, and laws were changed by early clubwomen who were upnet at the way women were treated in prisons,

In 1895, DRC and the Detroit Federation became actively involved in philanthropic projects. Among the Review Club's many awards is one from the "Wor Savings Society" for work done by DRC volunteers during World War I. General Pershing made an appearance at one of DRC's benefit parties, at the Statler Hotel, during those war years.

CARE gave the DRC an award for more than \$8,000 raised for Greece and South Vietnam under Lou Wilcox' aegis. A letter of congratulations for DRC volunteer work through the years, along with a personal letter from Michigan's First Lady, Mrs. William Milliken, honoring DRC's stability and work, is now in Ida Mae Massnick's hands.

Recently, Mrs. Massnick has been devoting just about all her spare time to planning the anniversary (Continued on Page 9B)





#### Nuts to you, from Smith . . .

If someone comes up to you in the next few weeks and says, "Nuts to you!"—don't immediately take offense. Especially if the someone seems to be a fairly nice lady: MRS. GERARD C. MCONEY (standing), of Washington Road, for instance, chairman for the past eight years of the Smith College Pecan Sale, or MRS. DEWEY NORTON (seated), of Oxford Road, president of the Smith College Club of Detroit. Each year, over 120 members of the local Smith Club sell between 750 and 1,000 one-pound bags of Georgia pecans. The project, which raises money for Smith College scholarships, has been in existence for the past 25 years.

Mrs Mooney gave her traditional 'get out and sell those nuts" pep talk to her volunteer Smithie salespersons yesterday, Wednesday, Nov. 4, at the Smith College Club's annual fall luncheon meeting at the Rathbone Place home of Mrs. E. Paul Casey.

Other items on the agenda for the meeting, chaired by President Norton, included discussion of the visit of Smith College Economics Professor Randall Bartlett, planned for February. Professor Bartlett will lecture on national economic policies.

Mrs. Albert Arbury, of Moran Road, gave an update on college activities, based on her mid-October visit to Northampton, Mass., as a participant in the Smith Alumnae Council.

Following are three of Mrs. Mooney's own most used ways to use the nuts, selected from the Smith Club cookbook: "Favorite Pecan Recipes."

PECAN PIE

- 1 cup dark Karo
- ½ cup sugar
- 4 Tbsp. butter 3 eggs

1 tsp. vanilla

1 cup pecans Add sugar to syrup and heat until sugar dissolves. Add butter. Beat eggs and add to syrup with pecans and vanilla. Pour into unbaked pie shell and bake at 450° for 10 minutes, then reduce heat to 300° for 30 minutes.

#### PECANS PIQUANT

- 2 cups pecans
- 1 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce 1 thick pat butter dash of Tabasco sauce

Melt butter with Worcestershire and Tabasco; mix well. Remove from fire and add pecans. Stir and mix for at least 5 minutes, so each nut is well coated and sauce absorbed. Line cookie sheet with paper towels and spread nuts evenly. Bake in 300° oven and crisp for 15-20 minutes; watch carefully for last 5 minutes. Pour out

#### **CHRISTMAS COOKIES**

onto clean paper towels and salt well.

Cool thoroughly and store in tight

½ lb. butter



# Baby babble is much more than small talk

A baby's first sound-making is related to how his body feels: his comfort or discomfort. Growing Child, the monthly child development newsletter, reports that this is true the world over, regardless of culture, color or nationality.

Most mothers soon recognize their child's sounds of contentment or calls of distress and can distinguish between them because of differences in pitch and tone. Later, at about six weeks old, a baby will start to babble. What's he saying?

Actually, he's just making sounds because they please him. When he babbles he is exercising his speech organs, just as he exercises his fingers and toes. You will hear a baby babble when he is content, and it will sound as if he is repeating a string of the same sounds. As a result of these babbling exercises the baby learns to repeat the noises that please him and finds pleasure in the rhythms created by regularly repeating a pattern.

With babbling experience the baby is making the first step in early speech-hearing matching. He becomes aware that the sounds he makes and the sounds he hears have a relation-

From the beginning, by playing dialogue games and babbling back,

adults play an important role in helping the child master language and speech. When baby babbles, two things happen at the same time. He "feels" something and he "hears" something. What he feels is his own activity: movements of lips, tongue, jaws, vocal cords. What he hears are the sounds which his own activity produced. Different sounds "feel" dif-

ferent; the same sound (in time)

comes to have the same kind of "feel."

In babbling the baby is beginning to develop an automatic memory for what kind of "feel" makes a particular kind of sound. When he begins to make words the memories are all there, wired in so that when he wants to make a word he knows automatically how to make the sounds. Babbling helps get this complicated process going.

Encourage a baby's verbal skills. Imitate what he says. It doesn't matter if what he says back doesn't sound like what you said; he's still listening

She's done just about every job there is to do for the annual Junior Group of League for the Handicapped-Goodwill Industries Antiques Markets and Sales including, in 1973, serving as general co-chairman of the whole shebang. This year, personnel is her thing. She organized that committee, which sees that League-Goodwill Juniors are on hand to do dealer booth duty, staff the Country Store and serve the Calico Kitchen's light lunches and dinners, coffee and desserts all during show hours, a few years ago.

This year's show brings 52 dealers, from New Hampshire to North Carolina, Quebec, Canada, to London, England, to Fairlane Manor, Dearborn, where the 34th Annual League-Goodwill Juniors' Antiques Market and Sale debuts this evening, Thursday, Nov. 5, with an invitational, 7 to 10 p.m. champagne preview.

The show is open to the public Friday and Saturday, Nov. 6 and 7, from 11 a.m. to 9 p.m., and Sunday, Nov. 8, from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Admission donation is \$3.50. General chairmen are Mrs. W. James Prowse and Mrs. Charles Randau,

TWENTY-FIVE YEARS ago, Betty Fuchs began working with the League for the Handi-capped's Jolly Cheers Group. She's been a regular volunteer at the socialization program's Monday meetings ever since. "We have to come up each week with a craft project the handicapped can do. It's important that they have something to take home.'

Crazy Bingo is the latest addition to the Jolly Cheers' program format, and the Jolly Cheers love it, and so do the Jolly Cheers volunteers. "We have more laughs—we have the hast time. I know that some people are reluctant to volunteer to work with the handicapped, afraid they won't be able to cope, but all they have to do is come once by the end of the meeting, they don't even see the handicaps: just warm, generous, appreciative people."

At the beginning, the Jolly Cheers volunteers were a group unto themselves, providing everything, from financial backing to the weekly "treats," for the socialization sessions. Then, as happens, the volunteer cadre, always a small group of women, dwindled. "And then the Junior Group of Goodwill Industries began giving us funds, and within a year League for the Handicapped and Goodwill Industries merged and League-Goodwill Juniors' support of the Jolly Cheers was a logical extension of that merger."

Betty Fuchs had joined the Goodwill Juniors before the merger. "I believe in personal volunteer commitment," she says, "but I haven't belonged to a variety of volunteer groups. League-Goodwill has always been my pet."

A TRADITION OF community service runs in the family. Betty's husband, Arnold P. Fuchs, is a past member of the Grosse Pointe School Board and the Grosse Pointe Shores Council, a past Commodore of Bayview Yacht Club. He retired last September from Chrysler Corporation, but is still doing consulting work as the engineering expert for Chrysler's Legal Department.



The first adjective that comes to mind when one tries to describe Betty Fuchs is "vibrant." "I am a color nut," she admits.

"I devour it." Once committed, she contributes. She's a natural for the League-Goodwill Juniors. proud of her Group's reputation as Professional Volunteers: "If a person takes on a job, it's done. Those who join are active." Each in her own way, of

course. The League-Goodwill Juniors also are known as a family-oriented group — and they're famous for the homemade jams, jellies, pickles and items they put up each year for the Antiques Market and Sale's Country Store.

THAT'S ONE WAY to contribute. Another way was chosen by the cadre of Juniors who've been spending their Tuesdays and Thursdays re-finishing, under expert supervision, furniture for League-Goodwill's own booth at the Antiques Show. "We don't pick up furniture

and clothing per se any more," Betty says, "but if you feel you have something of quality, with a cash value, to donate, we'll get it, and get it in shape to sell it, and give you a tax deduction slip for it. We have some furniture pieces we've refinished this year that are just beautiful. And our members are NOT permitted to do any buying before the Antiques Show opens." Fur coats are among the most popular donated items; they sell like hotcakes.

#### **ORDINANCE NO. 93**

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CODE OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE PARK CHAPTER 48, TRAFFIC, TITLE X, THROUGH ADOPTION BY REFERENCE OF THE UNIFORM TRAFFIC CODE FOR MICHIGAN CITIES, TOWNSHIPS AND VILLAGES WITH CERTAIN AMENDMENTS AND ADDITIONS THERETO.

THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE PARK ORDAINS:

Chapter 48, Title X, of the Code of the City of Grosse Pointe Park is hereby amended to read in its entirety as follows:

The Uniform Traffic Code for cities, townships and villages promulgated by the Director of State Police and published in the 1979 edition of the Michigan Administrative Code and amendments as published in the Quarterly Supplement No. 5 to the 1979 edition of the Michigan Administrative Code, in accordance with Public Act 62 of 1956, State of Michigan, is hereby adopted by reference as in this ordinance modified. References to "governmental unit" therein shall mean the City of Grosse Pointe Park.

#### Section 2.

Sections 2.5, 2.6, 2.6a, 2.7, 2.36, 2.38, 5.11a, 6.28, 6.29, 6.31, 7.17, 8.5 and 8.27 of Chapter 48, Title X of the Code of the City of Grosse Pointe Park are amended or remain in effect as follows:

#### Section 2.5 Authority to impound vehicles.

A member of the police department may remove a vehicle from a street or highway to the nearest garage or other place of safety, or to a garage designated or maintained by the police department or otherwise maintained by this governmental unit, under the circumstances hereinafter enumerated. The necessary costs for the removal shall become a lien on the vehicle and the person into whose custody the vehicle is given may hold it until the expenses involved have been paid:

- (a) When a vehicle is left unattended on a bridge, viaduct, causeway, subway, tube, or tunnel where the vehicle constitutes an obstruction to
- (b) When a vehicle on a street is so disabled as to constitute an obstruction to traffic, and the person in charge of the vehicle is, by reason of physical injury, incapacitated to such an extent as to be unable to provide for its custody or removal.
- (c) When a vehicle is left unattended on a street and is so parked as to constitute a definite hazard or obstruction to the normal movement of
- (d) When a vehicle is found being driven on the streets or highways in such an unsafe condition as to endanger persons or property.
- (e) When a vehicle is left unattended on a street continuously for more than 48 hours and may be presumed to be abandoned.
- (f) When the driver of the vehicle is taken into custody by the police department and the vehicle would thereby be left unattended upon the
- (g) When removal is necessary in the interest of public safety because of fire, flood, storm, snow, or other emergency reason.
- (h) When a vehicle is found parked in a "tow-away zone" designated by the traffic engineer and properly signposted.

#### Section 2.5a Authority to impound abandoned vehicles.

- (1) The police department shall take into custody abandoned vehicles and abandoned junk vehicles found on a street or highway or any other place, whether public or private. For purposes of this section, a vehicle is considered an abandoned vehicle when:
  - (a) It has remained on a public street or highway, or other place open to travel by the public, for a period of 48 hours or more, without notification by the registered owner to the police department of the reason for leaving the vehicle in the public place
- (b) It has remained on private property for a period of 48 hours or more without the consent of the owner or lessee of the property, or for a period if 48 hours or more after the consent has been revoked.
- (c) It has remained in a garage for more than 15 days without a contract of service, storage, or repair by the registered owner.
- (2) A police officer may issue a citation to the registered owner of a vehicle which is found abandoned within this governmental unit. The citation shall state that the registered owner is charged with abandoning a vehicle.
- (3) Abandoning a vehicle is a civil infraction.

#### Section 2.6. Notifying department of state of impounded vehicle.

. (1) If the registered owner of an abandoned vehicle taken into custody by the police department has not claimed the vehicle and paid all charges due against it within 10 days, the police department shall notify the department of state on a form prescribed by that department.

(2) Disposition of an abandoned vehicle shall be made as provided in section

Section 2.6a. Release of Impounded Vehicle.

Before the owner or person in charge of an impounded vehicle shall be permitted to remove the same from the custody of the Police Department, he shall furnish evidence of his identity and of his ownership or authority and he shall sign a receipt for the vehicle, as well as complying with the applicable procedure in Sections 2.5, 2.5a and 2.6.

Section 2.7. Vehicle deemed abandoned or junk; record and photograph; release of vehicle; definitions.

(1) When a vehicle found abandoned on a street or highway or any other place whether public or private, has a value of less than \$100.00, it shall be considered an abandoned vehicle.

(2) A vehicle is considered a junk vehicle when:

(a) It is 4 or more years old and has a fair market value of \$100.00 or less. (b) It is apparently inoperable and is extensively damaged, including a broken window or windshield, or missing wheels, tires, motor, or transmission.

(c) It does not display current registration plates.

(3) The police department, or a bonded licensed dealer, shall record the make of the vehicle and the serial number when available, shall detail the damage or missing equipment to substantiate the value of \$100.00 or less, and shall photograph the vehicle at the place where it was abandoned. The police department shall retain the photograph for at least 2 years.

(4) Within 24 hours after it is determined that the vehicle was not stolen, the police department shall release the vehicle to a garage keeper, towing service, used vehicle parts dealer, or scrap metal processing facility. The person to whom the vehicle is released shall proceed as provided in section 252 (d), (h), and (i) of the act.

(5) As used in subsection (d): (a) "Scrap metal processing facility" means a business concern engaged primarily in the acquisition, processing, and shipment of ferrous and nonferrous scrap, the end product of which is the production of material for

remelting purposes for steel mills, foundries, smelters, and refiners. (b) "Used vehicle parts dealer" means a business concern engaged primarily in the acquisition of wrecked, damaged, inoperative or abandoned vehicles, or abandoned junk vehicles, the dismantling of these vehicles for the reclamation of reusable parts, and the preparation of remaining scrap metal

Section 2.36. No Stopping, Standing or Parking Zones.

The traffic engineer may determine and designate zones where stopping, standing or parking is prohibited due to hazardous conditions which may exist or where conditions exist which would cause undue delay to traffic. Such zones shall be designated by posting proper signs at such locations and the distance between the signs shall not exceed 200 feet.

Section 2.38. Permits for Curb Loading Zones. The traffic engineer shall not hereafter designate or sign any curb loading zone upon special request of any person unless such person makes application for a permit for such zone and for a sign to indicate the location of each such zone. The traffic engineer upon granting a permit and issuing such sign shall collect from the applicant and deposit with the treasurer a service fee, in the amount specified by resolution of the ordinance making body, for year or fraction thereof. The Governmental unit may by regulations impose conditions upon the use of such sign and for reimbursement for the value thereof in the event of its loss or damage and its return in the event of misuse or upon expiration of permit. Every such permit shall expire on December 31 of the

year for which it is issued. Section 5.11a. Maximum Speed Limits - Alleys and Parks.

Section 6.29 License Issuance.

(1) No person shall drive a vehicle at a speed exceeding 15 miles per hour on

any alley or on any street in a park. (2) A person who violates this section is responsible for a civil infraction.

Section 6,28 Lincense Required. No person who resides within the City of Grosse Pointe Park shall ride or propel a bicycle on any street or upon any public property unless such bicycle has been licensed and the license plate pertaining thereto is attached. Licenses shall be issed by the Police Department.

Licenses shall be issued in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 26 of the City Code. The fee for such license shall be as prescribed by Chapter 27 of the City Code.

Section 6.31 Rental Agencies. No bicycle rental agency operated in the City of Grosse Pointe Park shall rent or offer any bicycle for rent unless the bicycle is licensed and the license plate is attached. Section 7.17 Hitching.

(1) No person shall climb unto, ride on, hitch on, or attach himself to the

exterior of any moving vehicle. No driver shall knowlingly permit any such actions. (2) A person who violates this section is responsible for a civil infraction. Section 8.5 Parking in a Manner that Obstructs Traffic; Removal of Stalled

Vehicles; Violation as Civil Infraction. (1) A person shall not park any vehicle on a street in a manner that leaves an insufficient width of the roadway available for free movement of vehicular (2) Whenever a vehicle becomes stalled or for any reason cannot be moved,

by its own power, and in consequence obstructs a street, the owner or operator shall cause the prompt removal of same by towing or otherwise. (3) A person who violates this section is responsible for a civil infraction.

Section 8.26 Large Vehicle Parking. (1) No person shall park a vehicle greater than 20 feet in length or 7 feet in height or any trailer upon any street or alley for a period of more than 30 minutes or while activity engaged in loading or unloading the same. (2) A person violating this section shall be responsible for a civil infraction.

Section 8.27 Parking Commercial Vehicles. (1) It shall be unlawful to park any commercial vehicle on any street in this City for a period longer than thirty (30) minutes between the hours of 2 a.m. and 4 a.m. of the same day. It shall be unlawful at any time to park (1) any commercial vehicle in excess of half ton rated capacity (2) any housetrailer or (3) any tractor, on any street in this City for a period longer than thirty (30) minutes. The provisions of this section shall not be deemed to prohibit the parking of commercial vehicles, housetrailers or tractors during such period of time in excess of thirty (30) minutes as may be reasonably required for actual loading or unloading, nor the parking of commercial vehicles used by workmen working in the vicinity during such period of time in excess of thirty (30) minutes as work is actually in progress. Nothing in this section shall imply any permission to park where parking is otherwise prohibited or restricted. The Chief of Police for good cause, may grant special permits permitting the parking of vehicles described in this section during a period in which parking would otherwise be prohibited but each permit shall be granted

for a definite period of time. (2) A person violating this section shall be responsible for a civil infraction.

Section 3 The City Clerk shall publish this ordinance in the manner required by law and shall be at the same time publish a supplementary notice setting forth the purpose of the said Uniform Traffic Code and of the fact that a complete copy of the Code is available at the office of the Clerk for inspection by the public at all times.

Section 4 This ordinance shall be effective November 15, 1981.





# State aid cuts to schools unfavorable

The survey, completed in September, was conducted by Nordhaus Research, Inc., of Farmington Hills, with consultation from the Institute for Social Research (ISR) of the University of Michigan. Nordhaus conducted 800 interviews of a scientifically selected cross-section of Michigan adults by telephone between Aug. 26 and Sept. 8. The survey was commissioned by the Michigan Education Association (MEA'), which released the results at

put U.S. in energy bind Imagine that it is the summer of 1983. Violent uprisings have shaken a key Persian Gulf nation. Its ruling house has fallen. Oil no longer flows from its rich fields, once one of the

The free world has lost about a fifth of its oil supply. The oil glut of 1980, which cushioned the world's losses at the outbreak of the Iraqi-Iranian war, has evaporated, according to a frighteningly plausible scenario sketched by National Geographic Science Editor Kenneth F. Weaver in the magazine's energy issue.

The United States, which at first did not feel this 1983 cutoff, is compelled to honor a 1975 international agreement to share its oil with more heavily hit Western Europe and Japan. This costs the nation more than half the oil it was importing before this critical Arab collapse.

At home, the effects are disastrous.

There is not enough fuel to go around.

Jobs, businesses, productivity are all affected. Every economic indicator is alarming And all because the United States, and most of the rest of the world, has such an unquenchable thirst for oil that it has become dependent on some of the most politically unstable parts of the world. So fragile is the balance of the oil supply that even a minor cutoff can have global reper-

cussions. How did we get ourselves into this dangerous predicament? "The answer is clear," Weaver writes. "Of all the common fuels, oil is the most portable, the most convenient for transportation, the most versatile.

"It has seemed endlessly abundant. Above all, it was - until recentlycheap. And so we became addicted to oil. We built a way of life around Last year just under half of our energy needs were provided by But since 1947, when the United States became a net importer of oil, its own production has not been able to

keep up with its oil-gulping lifestyle.

The imbalance has steadily worsened

In every year but one since 1967,

Weaver notes, "we have used more oil from our proved reserves than has been found in new reservoirs." Our national bill for guzzling imported oil has soared from a trickling \$3 billion in 1970 to a staggering \$80 billion by 1980. And the price of a barrel of crude oil -- less than \$2 a decade ago — is well on its way to the projected \$80 by 1985.

How can we get ourselves out of this energy fix? Understanding six basic truths about energy may help, Weaver suggests: 1. Energy sources are not running

out - yet. The irony of the energy bind is that the United States is one of the richest nations in energy raw materials. It has the largest single share of coal reserves, is the world's third largest producer of petroleum, is now virtually self-sufficient in natural gas, and has the largest nu-

clear power output of any country.

new deposits, the dwindling of proved reserves of oil and gas can only be slowed, but not halted. People in the 20th century alone will have used up the bulk of the irreplaceable resources. If new sources were not found, gas

reserves would be gone virtually in another 10 years. Conventional oil resources are expected to be depleted by the year 2000. Coal reserves alone are so vast that they are not in danger of running out in the near future. But the wide-

spread use of coal comes the problem: transportation and pollution. 3. There is no quick solution. All the major solutions that may have a substantial effect on the U.S. fuel supply are years away. They require development and careful testing of new technologies, mobilization of billions of dollars of new capital at high interest rates, and construction

of enormous facilities. 4. There is a price to pay. Virtually every proposal for increasing the energy supply involves hidden costs. unpleasant side effects, and uncertainties. Nuclear energy triggers concern over radioactivity. Coal contains sufur and other undesirable substances, which are only partly removed from burning emissions. Synfuels require extensive strip mining. enormous costs, and possible excessive water demand.

5. The energy problem is internationally intertwined. The U.S. energy binge, which alone devours more than a quarter of the world's energy output, puts heavy demands on the world oil supply that have an immediate impact on other nations, particularly Western Europe and Japan. The average U.S. citizen uses the energy equivalent of a barrel of oil every six days.

6. Energy efficiency and conservation are essential now. Study after study concludes that the "cleanest, least expensive, and least vulnerable energy option today is to use less by being more efficient," Weaver writes. And according to Chauncy Starr of the Electric Power Research Institute, "Only conservation can be implemented quickly enough to make a substantial difference.'
