# High court sees county plan today

Written briefs are to be filed with the Michigan Supreme Court today, April 15, as Wayne County tries to get clarification of an Appeals Court ruling that voided its redistricting plan. Oral arguments before the Supreme Court are scheduled for next week.

The Michigan Appeals Court threw out the county's redistricting plan Thursday April 1, along with one from Macomb County, saying the plan had not been drawn up in good faith. The court said the planpit more emphasis on preserving political subdivisions than on striving for equal numbers in each district

The Supreme Court stayed the low et court; ruling, after an appeal by the county

The fight over redistricting stems from a lawsuit filed by Dearborn, Dearborr Heights and Westland in February which took issue with the splitting of the cities and townships into separate districts

The county is seeking clarification

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of just what criteria are to be used in redrawing its lines, which according to state law is to be done every 10 years, County Clerk James Killeen said Killeen is chairman of the Apportionment Committee

The Appeals Court demanded equality in all districts, Killeen said One of the clarifications sought will be whether that provision is to take precedence over the need for the districts to be contiguous or touching each other. If equality wins out, Killeen said the present districts will be meaningless.

Non-configuous cities could end up lumped in the same district to meet the equality section, Killeen said, al-

though he added that nost likely will not occur. The committees staff is now working with the population figures from the staff plan by Demoera Hubert Holley and a plan submitted by Republican Michael Lagg-() reach the exactness requested. Kildeen said

The Holley plan District One which puts the Pointes Harper Woods and northeast Detroit togeth er in a single 155,819 district, falls 424 people short of the ideal size for a distric. The variation from the largest to the smallest district is 471.1 persons or about 0.3 percent.

firemen and a general belttightening in Grosse Pointe Park will allow the city to get through the next fiscal year with a six percent increase in taxes, according to a budget presented this week to the council by City Manager John Crawford.

The manager proposes reducing the city's tax rate by almost 5.5 percent from the current 18.1 mills to 17.15 for the coming year (A mill equals \$1 for every \$1,000 of assessed valu-

Applied to an average 12 percent increase in assessed valuation of homes in the city, most taxpayers will see a six percent increase in their bills during 1982/83, according to Crawford's figures. "It's a minimal increase, based on inflation." he said.

The tax like is far below percent increase approved by the council last year while the city was struggling to get rid of a \$119,000 deficit. Five employes were laid oft from police, fire, public works and the general office staff to reduce the

THE CITY'S deficit is eliminated under Crawford's new spending plan. but the document does not restore the positions eliminated last year There are fewer workers at city hall this year than there have been for the last 25 years. Crawford said.

When you consider where we were last year, this budget is good news." Crawford said "We're in a stronger financial position because of the way the council handled some of the tough decisions it faced last year, including the layofts and the tax in

Crawford said the city has been "culting corners" every way it can to avoid a repeat of last year's unpopular 20 percent tax increase. The cry has been purchasing used equipment when possible, including trucks machinery and even second-hand park ing meters. It successfully negociated a relatively conservative contract with two major employe groups, police and fire, that provides the men with less than an 11 percent increase in wages over two and a half years and no fringe benefit improvements

for several years and nearly ruined by last winter's harsh weather. Less than \$100,000 is budgeted for resurfacing major streets which are covered by the State Motor Vehicle Highway Fund, But Crawford estimated that more than \$2.25 million worth of work is necessary on local streets in the next few years

The budget anticipates receiving \$3.4 million in property taxes from residents during the coming year; \$124,000 in fines from traffic, parking and court cases; \$120,000 in intrest on its investments and \$525,500 from state revenue sharing funds.

The city plans to spend \$693,000 on general government; \$1.4 million on police: \$783.000 on fire. \$527.000 on public works, \$584.00 on rubb,sh collection, and \$258,000 on recreation.

City councils in the Woods, Farms and City and the Board of Education also will be considering 1982-83 spending plans in the next few weeks. Millage rates must be established by June for the municipalities and by September for the school board.

The pattern was repeated Monday when school board president Jon Gandelot was the only candidate to file nominating petitions for the annual school board election June 14.

Earlier Grosse Pointe Woods restdent Robert Clark anounced his in tentions of running for the board seat, but failed to meet the April 12 petition deadline. He could not be reached for comment.

A rum n had been circulating that former schoo' superintendent Wilham Coats was considering a seat on the seven-member Board of Education. When contacted on Monday, Coa's said. "That's ridiculous.

Interest in school policies has dwind'ed considerably since 1979 when 11 candidates competed for board seats. Six candidates filed in the 1980 sch oi board electron. Last year board candidates Catherine Brierly and Ernest Buechler walked into their four-year terms unopposed.

Monday Gandelot said be was disappointed on Clark's apparent deer sion to drop out of the race.

"But I'm still looking forward to campaigning and getting out in the community. Gandelot said. I want to hear what the community has to say and I want to speak to as many people as I can

Gandelot said campaign manager S'u Dw has scheduled at least 15 coffees in the coming months. Dow managed Gandelot's campaign in 1978 when the board president made his first bid to local school politics.

(Continued from Page 1A) sary because of the lost revenue, funds for investment could be affected. With that, cities would also lose investment interest, compound-

ing their problem, Bryant said. Another problem with the gover-nor's first order was that it failed to meet Headlee amendment payback formulas, Bryant said. Under Headlee, 41.6 percent of revenues are to be returned to local programs. The revenue sharing deferrals would have put the ratio of state spending to appropriations for local governments out of balance, he said,

The removal of the deferrals from the executive order does not guarantee that payments will be on time, Michael Hamlin of the state Office of the Budget said. If some kind of tax-increase package doesn't come out of the Legislature, more than likely new cuts will be ordered, he said, adding they would probably include revenue sharing deferrals.

HAMLIN SAID the Budget Office was "keeping its fingers crossed" hoping a new package of tax increases would come through and help alleviate a chronic cash flow problem.

In its 1982-83 budget for the year, which began April I, Grosse Pointe Shores anticipated about \$76,000 in revenue sharing funds, down from \$147,500 from last fiscal year.

City officials split in their response to the issue. Some welcomed the reinstatement of the payments, while others expressed doubt the money will be forthcoming.
"We don't really believe the state,"

#### .rom state

City Treasurer-Assessor Dennis Foran said, adding the city had lowered its expectations of state revenue for its upcoming fiscal year budget.

"We have to anticipate what will happen in the next year," Foran said. The lower revenue figures are a reflection of the poor economy as well as a hedge against a future executive order which could again reinstate the deferrals of revenue sharing pay-

The City budgeted \$416,000 in its fiscal 1981-82 general fund budget for revenue sharing from the state.

Farms City Clerk Richard Solak said the city was pleased with the reinstatement of payments. He said the Farms in current budget deliberations is expecting the same amount of funds in fiscal 1982-83 as was budgeted in the previous year.

The Farms was to receive \$503,000 in state revenue sharing in its current fiscal year.

Grosse Pointe Park City Manager John Crawford said he was pleased, very much so, that the state had decided to reinstate the payments. Prompt payment by the state affects the amount of money the city earns

on investments, he said.

The Park had received a little more than the \$590,900 it had budgeted for state shared revenues during its current fiscal year, Crawford said. The 1982-83 budget will reflect "the status-quo" in terms of the funding from the state, although slightly less may be budgeted, he

Absentee ballot applications have to be prepared by May

Although fighting time, Killeen said there is not a "point of no return," when the election would have to be called off, since the Supreme Court in its decision may waive the necessary deadlines.

"We're waiting on the court," he said. "After we get the decision, we can move rather quickly on it."

A meeting of the Apportionment Committee scheduled for Monday, April 12, was cancelled pending the court's action, Killeen said. He added he will call another meeting after the decision is in.

Three people have expressed interest in the new District One seat. Republican Erv Steiner, whose Grosse Pointe seat will be merged into the larger district has said he will run for the commission seat. He did raise the possibility he may run for a state Senate seat if one were to open up.

Democrat Norbert Wisniewski is in the same position as Steiner, since Wisniewski's old Harper Woods-northeast Detroit district was also merged into the larger District One. Wisniewski called the campaign for the seat "a challenge-one I am willing to take on.

Charter Commissioner Barbara Gattorn said she is interested in running, but is not formally declaring her candidacy until some time in May. A formal announcement would lock her into the status of a candidate, which she said may color perceptions of her comments on issues such as the unionization of County Road Commission executives.



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


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

Smaller parking spaces and new signs will blossom this spring in the St. John north parking lot after the Woods council approved hospital plans to restripe the lot to allow for compact ears. The new striping will

add 114 new spaces to the lot. The approval ends four months of discussions between the hospital and city officials. St. John had asked the Planning Commission in December. 1981, for permission to increase the number of spaces in the lot from 1.157 to 1.271 by striping certain areas with smaller spaces for compact

Downsized spaces have been used in other areas, Walter Gray, hospital assistant administrator said, and were a direct response to the proliferation of compact cars. The smaller spaces would increase the number of stalls by about 11 percent, he said.

The Planning Commission forwarded its recommendation for approval to the council in December. The council set a board of appeals hearing for Feb. 1.

Gray appeared before the council that evening and submitted the plan for approval. Councilmembers expressed concern that the signage denoting the compact parking spaces had not been included in the plan. . In addition, no provision had been made for the state required number of handicapped parking spots. The request to restripe the lot was turned

In March, the hospital submitted a revised plan which included samples of the signage and the provision for 23 parking spaces for handicapped persons. The council asked for a study to be done by the Public Safety Department to see what effect the increased number of parking spots would have on traffic and the en-forcability of the compact car parking provision A Board of Appeals hearing date was set for April 5

In a letter to the council, Public Safety Director Jack Patterson said he could foresee no problems with the additional parking spaces and signage. In addition, the changing of lane usage to north-south instead of the various directions now in effect would allow for patrol cars to observe the entire lot in a single pass, he said. The traffic pattern will remain the same in the restriped lot. Patterson

# SEMTA proposes fare increases

Public hearings will begin next week in Wayne County on proposed fare increases for Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority (SEMTA) services

The hearings will be held Thursday, April 22, at 7.30 pm in the council chambers of Harper Woods City Hall, 19617 Harper, Harper Woods; on Monday, April 26, at noon in Room 614 of the Veteran's Memorial Building, 151 W. Jefferson, Detroit; and on Tuesday. April 27, at 1 pm and 7 30 pm at the Henry Ford Centennial Library Auditorium 16301 Michigan Avenue, Dearborn

If approved by the SEMTA board in May, the fare increases will take effect July 1

According to SEMTA General Manager Gary W. Krause, "While increasing fares will help offset normal operating costs increases, the revenue gained through fare increases will not eliminate the larger financial problems facing the authority. That prob lem, caused by shortfalls in federal, state and local funding leaves us with a budget shortfall - approximately \$41 million next year --- which is much too great to be made up by farebox revenues

Krause said SEMTA will be approaching the state Legislature for permission to place either an income or property tax question on the ballot in the tri-county area. "This appears to be the only possible solution for saving public transit in this region," Krause said

Under the rate like proposal. large bus fares would increase by 15 cents, from 75 cents to 90 cents. Park & Ride and Limited farces would increase from 95 cents to \$1.10 and

Commuter Rail fares would increase from \$1.50 to \$1.80 and Community Connector fares would increase from 95 cents to \$1.30,

SEMTA Connectors are those services operated directly by the authority and include the Detroit, Royal Oak, Pontiac, Macomb and Wayne Connectors Community Connectors are those systems operated for the authority by local communities and include the following Connectors: Birmingham, Ferndale, Waterford, Mt. Clemens, Harper Woods, Redford, Nankin and Trenton Riverview

SEMTA's half-fare policy for senior citizens and the handicapped will not he changed. Seniors and handicapped currently ride regular bus service for halt fare during the off-peak hours and Connector service for half fare during all hours. While the policy remains the same, the fares would be increased to reflect increases in the base fares as stated above

Other proposed increases include reducing the youth fare discount from 25 cents off to 20 cents off regular bus fare and from 50 cents off to 40 cents off Connector fares; reducing the discount on SEMTACARD monthly passes from 32 x 1-way trip to 33 x 1-way trip; a 10 cent fee for transfers between Connectors (such transfers are now free); raising the fee for weekend passes from \$1.50 to \$1.80, and increasing the flat fee for race track service from \$1.25 to \$1.50.

There are no increases proposed in prevailing rates for zone charges, transfers other than between Connectors, discounts on strip tickets, train shuttle service and free fare for children 5 years of age and under.

to new Woods compensation board

Former council member named

Five people, including a former councilman, were named Monday, April 5, to serve on the newly formed Elected Officials Compensation Commission created by ordinance last month by the Grosse Pointe Woods City Council.

The appointments, made by Mayor George Freeman and confirmed by the council at its last meeting, are for staggered terms of from one to five years. As these terms expire, new members will be appointed to five-year terms.

Richard Johnson will serve a one year term ending in September, 1983. Serving until September, 1984 will be Eugene Scherr, Patricia Schneider will serve until September, 1985. Former councilman E Daniel Grady will serve four years. His term will end in September, 1986. Thomas Sullivan will serve the full five years until September, 1987.

Under the new ordinance, the commission will meet for 15 session days in each odd-numbered year and make its determination within 45 days of its first meeting. That determination will be filed with the city clerk and will become effective 30 days afterward unless the council rejects the determination by two-thirds majority.

The elected officials covered by the commission include the mayor, who receives \$600 a year, the seven councilmembers, who receive \$400 a year, and Municipal Judge J. Patrick Denis, who receives \$3,000 a year.

Grady and Councilman Frederick Lovelace first broached the idea of creating a compensation commission in June, 1980. Grady said the idea was to evaluate and review the work of council members and other elected officials using the methods of business to determine compensation.

Under the ordinance, no member, employe or member of the immediate family of a member or employe of the judicial, legislative or executive branch of the city government

can serve on the commission Councilmembers have said the conmission will not only review the compensation of the mayor and council. which has increased about \$100 in 25

years, but will also look at methods

of streamlining city government Commission members will meet in open session and will receive compensation for expenses incurred

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

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

The "Age of Aquarius" has passed and in its place has come a new era, which might properly be termed the "Age of the Computer." The Flower Children with their songs of love and brotherhood have been displaced by robots that will take people's place in industry supposedly doing a more efficient job of manufacturing products. Who will buy the products is not yet clear. Jobless would-be consumers will not have the money for them.

Society will become polarized. Individuals will be educated, shop, bank, invest, be entertained via the computer and a video hookup.

We will have to go to great ends to maintain personal contacts. Our medical problems will be diagnosed by the computer. We will punch in our symptoms and the computer in its Hippocratic wisdom will sort out what we have fed in and decide what ails us and what the treatment should be. Hopefully it will never come to a point where a robot in a white coat with a stethoscope hanging around its neck will pat our hand, tell us everything is fine and "take two aspirin." It will never work. Sick people and well people, too, need the sound of a human voice, the touch, the smile, the look of a caring person to sur-

TECHNOLOGY has done much for us. It has extended our lives. It has also decided who shall live or die and when. It has made it possible for us to circle the world in less time than it took our predecessors to cross the country but it has also brought closer to our shores the threat of a devastating war. It has forced us to deal with ideologies of other countries which are counter to our beliefs.

This depersonalization resulting in theories that nothing is permanent and everything is worth an experiment has widened the gap between generations. Older citizens for the sake of maintaining relations with sons and daughters have been forced to accept situations which violate their notions of right and wrong. How many older people are truly comfortable with the life style of the prodigies who opt for 'live-in' arrangements and quick and easy divorces? How many grandparents miss the contact with grandchildren who are lost to them in divorce or separated from them by distance'

Technology has put us on the moon but it has removed us from that rarified romantic atmosphere where we floated in happy ignorance of the efficient but sterile life that technology was creating for us. It came so fast that we are having a difficult time finding answers to the problems which this startling new world has posed.

But accomodate we must. One of the miracles that technology has wrought is longer life for all of us and with that has come the problem of making the best of those added years.

Various organizations, national. local and private, are working on providing answers for such needs as better health care. adequate housing, easy access to transportation and recreational opportunities.

But there is another segment of society which is also affected by the longevity of relatives. They are people who are approaching old age themselves. How many times do you read of a son or daughter in their £0s trying to care for a parent in their 80s? Sometimes they have health problems themselves and, while they are willing, they are unable to do it alone. Sometimes all they need is a little time away from what is almost an around-the-clock chore. Then there are those who for one reason or other must work and have an elderly parent living with them who cannot be left alone. They, too, need

Happily, while many questions arising from our changing times go unanswered, there does seem to be a solution for this problem-a day-care center for seniors. Such centers can fill the gap between neighborhood senior centers which are generally not equipped for the infirm and the prospect of institutionalization.

For caring families it provides a welcome relief from the strain of providing full-time care for a dependent relative at home and the guilt of banishing that

person to a nursing home . . . For the elderly, day care centers are a blessing because often older people are put in nursing homes who don't need to be there because there is no other alternative. It is estimated that about 25 percent of nursing home residents do not need the special care provided by those

institutions but are there be-

cause they need day care.

DAY CARE centers, besides providing needed services to older people such as hot meals, medication at proper intervals and leisure time activities, also keep people living in the community with independence and dignity. They have a home to go to when the day is over. They have companionship of others with whom they can reminisce and they are free of worry from accidents that can happen to older persons who are relatively helpless alone, not to mention the possibility of unwanted intruders. Newspaper stories bear out the possibility of violence against an older person alone in a home.

England has had day hospitals since 1950. They are a relatively new innovation in the United States. Adult day care centers grew out of a need. Nursing homes became too expensive. Even when adequate funds were available, relatives were reticent about placing their relatives in nursing homes because they were worried they would not get good care. Those with good reputations had long waiting lists.

Day care centers got a boost in 1974 when the Department of Health, Education and Welfare provided an incentive by agreeing to channel Medicaid funds toward programs designed to take the place of nursing homes. Massachusetts, California and Georgia were the first to take advantage of the ruling. Within four years 275 adult care facilities had been established. There are now 800 such centers in 44 states.

Basically there are two types of adult centers. There are "health centers" where the focus is on providing medical services such as physical and speech therapy. The second type is called a "social" day care center which stresses social and recreational activities though it also may have nurses and therapists on staff,

There is a wide range in the costs. For instance, one inexpensive center in Nebraska charges \$11.82 a day while some others where transportation and additional services are provided may cost \$50 a day. Contrast this with nursing homes which charge anywhere from \$30 to \$70 a day.

CENTERS HAVE been set up wherever facilities are available -church basements, American Legion posts, converted warehouses. Most of them have financial problems. They are operated on a nonprofit basis and provide services on ability to pay. Most private medical insurance companies do not include day care in their coverage. Only a few patients can afford to pay the full cost of the service.

Medicaid is available for the health-oriented facilities and some federal funds are provided under Title XX of the Social Security Act. Under the Reagan administration the total has

been cut nearly 25 percent. For older people this cut in funding is a worrisome situation. Those who have grown used to going to the centers and have become dependent on them for care and contacts have to wonder if this oasis will be funded next year.

Because plans are being made for an Adult Day Care Center in northeast Detroit, pondering the problems of operating and maintaining such a facility is timely.


Bon Secours Hospital and Lutheran Social Services of Michigan are working together to open a center at the Cavalry Senior Center, 4950 Gateshead near Mack. It would be the fourth such center in metropolitan Detroit and the only one in the Northeast area.

Formal announcement of the noint venture is expected soon. The center will take adults. mostly older citizens who cannot provide care for themselves at homé or whose families cannot care for them during the day because they must work.

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

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

# New tax burdens for all

The solution to the state's fiscal crisis apparently is going to have to await the return of the state Senate later this month but Michigan residents already know they will have to pay a dime more in cigaret taxes beginning May 1 as part of the price of balancing the state government's budget.

To raise taxes or impose new ones is always difficult, in the depression that grips Michigan, it is not surprising that the Legislature is dancing around a number of alternatives, all of which appear to bear bad news to the citizens of Michigan. Eventually, it appears some combination of a further cut in state spending and some increased taxes in addition to the hike in the cigaret levy will be imposed

The biggest stumbling block is the proposed increase in the state income tax for six months. It would raise the rate by only 1 percentage point but that would amount to a 22 percent increase. And even though it would be labeled a temporary increase, a similar temporary tax hike became permanent just a few years ago. So there is resistance both in the Senate and among the citzenry to the House-passed ncome

REP. WILLIAM Bryant Jr. of Grosse Pointe supports a 4 percent tax on sports and entertainment enterprises, a proposal which, not surprisingly, is being stoutly opposed by those business interests. But the proposal would raise an estimated \$40 million from admissions to theaters and sports events as well as from operators of pinball and video games and cable television systems. And the money would go to support the state's educational system, already suffering from the cutbacks in state aid.

To the critics of the proposal, Bryant has replied that in the crisis in which the state finds itself, it makes sense not to go after things in the realm of necessity when seeking to raise more revenue. So he favors taxing discretionary income rather than the necessities of life which is what would happen under an increased sales tax, for example.

The fact that it is not a tax on a necessity also explains the popularity of the cigaret tax among people who have to raise revenues for public use. When Michigan's tax goes up to 21 cents a pack May 1, it will tie Florida, Massachusetts and Connecticut for the second highest tax in the nation. Rhode Island's 23-cent-a-pack tax is the highest. But cigaret smokers in Chicago pay the most in total taxes. Illinois levies

a 12 cent tax, Cook County adds a nickel and the city of Chicago collects a dime. Adding in the 8-cent federal tax means that Chicago cigaret smokers pay 35 cents a pack—and city revenues from the tax continue to rise.

Dire rumors have been circulating that the cigaret tax hike will spur the smuggling of cigarets into Michigan from states which levy lower taxes. Indiana, for example, levies a 10.5 cent-apack tax and is cited as a prime candidate as a base for smugglers operating into Michigan. Yet Chicago, despite its record 35-cent per pack tax, apparently has not been much affected by smugglers. So why should Michigan be picked out as a special target?

YET IT IS obviously a case of tax overkill when all four levels of government - federal, state, county and local — impose levies on the same item, cigarets, as in Chicago. Such a case emphasizes the importance of having the federal government and the states reach some kind of an accommodation with respect to the areas each

If the temporary increase in the state income tax finally is, passed, almost everyone in Michigan will share in the increased burden of taxes. State employes will have to bear the ad-(1) to 6 min on c. more layouts or pay freezes or perhaps both. And individuals on welfare as weil as institutions such as colleges and the public schools still will get less support.

Whatever decisions finally are made in Lansing on the budget-balancing proposals, Gov. Milliken and legislative leaders are going to choose from a list of bad atternatives. They have to consider not only the impact of new and or higher taxes on business and industry but also the effect of reduced appropriations for public schools and colleges on the future education and prospects of the young people of this state. At the same time, they have to consider the plight of the poor, the aged and others who are not able to fend for themselves.

SHARING THE burden among those best able to carry it is a worthy goal. The package of sacrifices being designed in Lansing seeks that aim. Nobody will be completely satisfied with the results, whatever kind of a budget-balancing program finally wins approval. Unfortunately, in an election year the voters probably will vent their frustrations not only on those who dragged their feet on any kind of sensible solution but on those who sought to fashion the best solutions for the state and the majority of its people.

# Short-sighted economy?

If the Reagan administration's proposals for financing aid to college students are accepted, it will be a severe blow to needy students all over the country, including those in Michigan. It is estimated the proposals would result in a 50 percent cut in such aid by next September.

JUST HOW the reductions would affect one Michigan university is illustrated by figures released at Wayne State. The first Reagan adninistration cutbacks in student aid, already in effect, cut 2.386 students off the rolls and they lost \$4.9 million in aid. The latest proposals would trim another 4,500 students from federal aid and further reduce WSU revenue by \$9.2 million. An estimated 16,000 students, or about half of WSU's enrollment, received some form of aid before the earlier cuts were imposed.

Several forms of federal aid to students would be eliminated outright under the administration's proposals and others would be sharply reduced. All of the reductions being proposed, of course, are part of the administration's efforts to cut the size of the budget and federal spending in general.

It is true that there has been inefficency, waste and worse in some student aid programs. Affluent families in some cases have borrowed federal funds at low interest rates, ostensibly for student loans, and then invested the money in securities paying higher rates of interest. Some ineligible alien students have bilked the government out of loan funds. And some students who borrowed federal funds have been slow to repay even after they graduated and got good jobs.

Nobody will defend abuses in these proggrams. The tightening of eligibility rules obviously is required. And the misuse of loan funds must be stopped. But in Michigan a cutback in the amount of funds available for worthy students who meet the new eligibility standards could have serious long-range implications.

THIS STATE, still reeling in a depression, is hoping to spur economic revival in part through intensification of automation and the increased manufacture of robots. To achieve those goals, it is obvious the state will require an adequate supply of highly trained personnel. Yet cutbacks in federal loan programs will make it difficult for many graduate and professional students to get financial help to complete their schooling. even though they are the people who in a few years would be counted upon to lead the way in these new technological developments.

Congress may still refuse to make all of the cuts the administration requested. Because of the need for federal aid to students, Michigan citizens could do their state a favor by supporting state educators in their campaign to prevent the most serious reductions in these programs. No less than the future of this state is at stake. But the cut in programs has broader implications. It could slow down and seriously damage the country's effort to regain its predominance in manufacturing industries requiring highly skilled and highly educated technicians.

#### A Prize for Producer LoCicero

A pair of hard hitting documentaries dealing with toxic wastes in Michigan has won this year's Ben East Prize for Thomas V. LoCicero, who lives in Oak Park now but was born and grew up in Grosse Pointe. The prize, sponsored by Michigan United Conservations Clubs, carries a stipend of \$1,000.

His two 52-minute films were aired last year by WXYZ-TV Channel 7. The first, "Time Bomb: The Menace of Toxic Waste," examined the frightening and difficult problems posed by the careless disposal of toxic wastes, taking viewers to a number of contaminated sites around the state: Hooker Chemical in Montague, the PBB disaster area in Gratiot County, poisoned groundwater in Oakland County and Curene contamination in Adrian. The show concluded with a call for support of new legislation.

Response to "Time Bomb" was impressive. Channel 7 received more than 1,500 letters and cards expressing anger and concern over the dimensions of the problem and urging government officials to take swift action to combat it. The sequel, "Time Bomb II: The Toxic Menace Continues," examined the progress of Senate Bill 37, a measure to establish new controls, through the Michigan Senate. Channel 7 offered viewers free of charge, in conjunction with "Time Bomb II," a specially prepared citizens' guide to the problems of toxic waste.

LoCicero, a graduate of the University of Michigan, has worked as a free lance writer and documentary producer for the past 13 years. His "Murder in the Synagogue," a study of the assassination of Rabbi Morris Adler, was published in 1970. His stories and articles have appeared in "Commentary," "Swank," "MS" and other publications. His short story, "A Round with J.C.," was one of 23 selected for inclusion in "The Third Coast" a collection of Coast," a collection of contemporary Michigan fiction, edited by James Tipton and Robert E. Wegner, published early this year by the Wayne State University Press; another "Third Coast" author is Farms resident T.R. Peters Sr.

"We are a multi-purpose mental health organization. We provide treatment for all ages, for all types of problems. We define our role based upon what the community defines as its needs; we're very flexible . . . " A definition of the Northeast Guidance Center's function, precise, concise — this is what we do today; this is what we'll do tomorrow - is, Dr. Jonathan L. York seems to be saying, impossible. And undesireable. Unless one defines a person,

and a society, as unchangeable. For instance, lately, the NEGC has been getting a lot of queries from and about children of divorce. They're a growing group in the new world out there. And the world out there is always new.

It does seem, though, as if today's world is getting newer faster. "We're dealing with a changing world, we always have been, says Dr. York, "but today all the rules are changing. Jobs that were secure aren't. Women who were satisfied to stay at home aren't. Marriages that stayed together because of the children

"WE'VE BEGUN TO realize that you don't have to be lying on skid row with a bottle of cheap wine to be an alcoholic. Teenage alcoholism is rampant.

So how can the NEGC help? What can it do that a private counselor can't do as well or better? "We can do a lot of prevention-oriented education in the community. We can train people to know their breaking points.

Learn the art of rose pruning

throughout our service area. A lot of our outreach has been into the homes of older people. First, of course, we have to see that their basic physical needs are being met. But beyond these physical basics — proper food, good health care — there's another need, the individual's need for meaning, for worth, for a sense of self: 'This is who and what I am. We all need

But perhaps, in an era when death within a year of mandatory retirement has become a recognized syndrome, older people need it more. Dr. York has a special interest in the aged. He was running a program for the elderly in Lansing immediately before he came here to take over as executive director of the Northeast Gui-

dance Center, in January, 1979. He's originally from Columbus. O. He has a Bachelors degree from Yale University and a Masters and Doctorate (Psychology) from Michigan State University.

HE MET ENGLISH-BORN ing time off to travel. So was she. A year later, she came over to the United States for a visit. She never went back. The Yorks live in Grosse Pointe Park and have two sons: Jacob, six, and Phillip, one-and-a-half.

The opportunity to become executive director of the NEGC came at exactly the right time in Jonathan York's life. "I was looking for new directions. I'll admit I was a bit overwhelmed by the magnitude of the job and the service area - but I was also impressed by the Center's reputation and the solid foundation Dr. Eli Rubin (the NEGC's first executive director) had built." And as the Guidance Center's executive director, young Dr. York (he's 31 now), would have a chance to carry out many of his own ideas and ambitions

"I deal a lot with the public, with funding agencies, foundations, volunteer groups. I'm involved in a lot of overall planning. We're big enough to have a staff that can handle the day-to-day and individual program details

Recent cuts in government spending have significantly affected the Center. Dr. York is particularly concerned about the loss of NEGC's Children's Day Treatment: the youngsters who "came to us every day instead of going to school." That program was cut because of lack of funds. Some of the children have had to be institutionalized.

ON THE OTHER hand, he thinks the tight money situation "has made us more creative. We have to prioritize our activities more carefully. Our staff is more cohesive." He's not worried about further budget cuts. "Now, most of our funding comes from the state, and the Governor and the State Legislature are protecting Kathleen, who eventually became us as much as possible, because Mrs. York, in Spain. He was tak- they know we've already been cut to the bone.

This cutting to the bone on mental health projects disturbs Dr. York. "One of the things that concerns me is the difficulty in getting the public to appreciate the kind of work people in my pro-fession do. One of the things that scares me is the current 'antiservice' mood among the people who distribute government con-

"We're driving off a lot of good people from the field, simply because they think no one cares about what they do, no one thinks what they do is important. THEY know they're doing an important job, but it's pretty hard to keep going when nobody ever says. Yes, we do need you ... We thank you.

"And the fact is: mental illness and its side effects are probably the greatest drain on our economy today. I'm talking about billions of dollars lost when we lose productive workers, when we have to put together shattered families. Mental Health is NOT a frill.

Cook dandelion greens in heavy saucepan with very little water, or in steamer until tender. Sprinkle lightly with salt last two minutes of cooking. Drain, Place in heated serving dish. Add margarine and pepper and slightly toss or blend. Makes 4 servings.

# Welcome to the house Edsel and Eleanor built

"Where once there were many extraordinary residences, mine is the last to remain, for the change in our manner of living and in our taxes and in our attitudes has resulted in the demolition of all others. Elsewhere in our country. and in England and other parts of Europe, ways have been found to preserve such residences for some form of public use and they remain as witnesses to the past, as part of the history of the area and as a correlement in the lives of future genera-

"Moved by these and other considerations... I have decided to leave my residence, along with suitable farnishings, in such a manner as to allow the residence to remain and the property to be used for the benefit of the public." excerpt from the will of Eleanor Clay Ford.



The house at 1100 Lakeshore by Architect Albert Kahn is faced with Briar Hill Sandstone and is wonderfully asymetrical from any angle. Its many bay windows, designed to give the rooms a full view of the lake and almost 90 acres of Jens Jensen gardens, are studded with heraldic stained glass.

The preparations have taken time, and tremendous care has gone into the process of making the "great house" at 1100 Lakeshore a true benefit for the public, as Mrs. Ford willed in 1976. Administrators of the estate have gone to great lengths to preserve the house as it was — a comfortable yet lavish home for a fascinating lady who was Detroit's most generous philanthropist and her husband, powerful as head of

one of the nation's largest manufacturing companies.

The great architectural details of Albert Kahn's 1926 creation remain: the stairway removed from the 17th century Lyveden Manor in Northants, England; the grand library fireplace brought from England's Deene Park; and the dark paneling that covers the dining room walls from Upminster's Clock House just to name a few.

Antique furnishings remain as well. The Regency, Chippendale, Jacobean, William and Mary, Elizabethan and Queen Anne eras are all represented in fine pieces collected around the world by the two art lovers.

The floors are still covered with fine rugs, including Mouchtasha Kashan. Kirman, Ispahan. Hamadan. And in every corner is a treasured piece of art, maybe pottery from early Islam or the Ming or Han Chinese Dynasties.

Those fabulous features make the house an outstanding cultural experience for any tourist. But there's even more in store for viewers. Its administrators have managed to maintain a real feeling for the personalities and individual lives of the Ford family and the history that was made in those meeting rooms and parlors and receptions in the great gallery.

They've accomplished the feat with attention to the


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
The study (above) is paneled with Elizabethan oak and includes a marble chimney piece capped with an over-mantel of carved sections centered by grotesque men's heads. The paneling is believed to be from Heronden Hall in Kent England. The room was a place for the men to relax after dinner for coffee and liqueurs and is filled with family memorabilia. In the large bay, which overlooks the meadow, is a Gerogian burl walnut pedestal desk circa 1800 and a K'ang Hsi Chinese Ox Blood porcelain vase converted to a lamp.

The Ford House drawing room (left) is the most formal of the first floor rooms. It was redecorated during 1955 and 1956 to fit Mrs. Ford's collection of eighteenth century French furniture and French Impressionist and Post-Impressionist paintings. The mantel is a Louis XV carved rouge royal marble and above it hangs a trumeau of the same period. The walls are glazed green-blue and moldings are highlighted with gilt trim. The chandeliers are Louis XV style gilt metal and rock crystal and the room has five matching sconces. Its oak herringbone parquet floor is covered with Bakshaish rugs. Among the room's other furnishings are a pair of Louis XV carved walnut armchairs signed by E. Meunier from the mid-eighteenth century covered in gold silk velvet.

Junior League of Detroit's Designers' Show House, 625 Lake Shore Road, Groose Pointe Shores, showcasing the work of 23 metropolitan Detroit decorators, will be open May 1 to May 23. The public is invited to tour recently redecorated rooms, ranging from traditional to contemporary, and stroll through the elm-shaded grounds overlooking Lake St. Clair.

Hours are Monday through Saturday, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.; Wednesday and Thursday evenings, 6:30 to 8 p.m.; and Sunday, 1 to 4 p.m. Tickets are \$4 in advance, \$5 at the door; group rates are available by calling the Junior League office at 881-0040. Proceeds from this fourth Show House benefit the Junior League's community projects.

The white clapboard Georgian house was built in 1909 by Harry M. Jonett, then president of the Paige-Detroit Motor Car Company which produced the Jewett car. In keeping with the romanticism and revival spirit of that time, the house was designed with stately Palladian windows, numerous fireplaces and decorative moldings.

Five families have lived in the house over the past six decades, and the current owner, Mrs. Robert R. Hermann, made the house available for the 1982 Show House. Although the boathouse was demolished to make way for Lake Shore Road, and the reflecting pool displaced by a newer swimming pool. the backyard gazebo and gardens remain to recall past family weddings which graced the grounds.

The only significant structural addition was a large living room, built after World War I. Often referred to as the ballroom, it is complete with crystal chandelier. The addition also provided an extra suite of bedrooms upstairs.

Since each designer is given carte blanche in decorating his or her rooms, diversity of style marks the interior. Decor varies from a glass-topped dining room table surrounded by mirrored screens to reflect the lake view, to authentic 17th and 18th Century furniture in

In addition to the decorated rooms, an indoor outdoor tea room will provide refreshments and light lunches; a boutique will be stocked with gift items, some hand-made; and The Greenery will offer blooming, creeping and hanging

plants, most ready for spring planting. A new feature this year is a doll house which echoes the style and decorative features of the Georgian Show House. It has been furnished with a collection of fine miniatures including china, sterling silver, chinoiserie screens and needlepoint rugs, the product of 20 years of collecting.

A magnificent Chinese screen acts as a focal point of the spacious central hallway decorated by DANIEL CLANCY of Perlmutter-Friewald, Inc. Surrounding the screen in the lower hallway is a variety of antique and fine reproduction furniture against a warm greige background. A contemporary painting in the upper hallway harmonizes with antique blue-and-white porcelain.

W.S. CHAPMAN has chosen a unique semi-antique Chinese rug to set the theme of the dining room. The colors evoke the Belle Epoque and the water lilies in both the rug and draperies remind us of the Art Nouveau movement so popular when this house was built. Balancing this mood are the contemporary touches of the glass-topped table and mirrored screens reflecting the lake

Moving through the dining room, the visitor will be struck by the great design unity achieved in the BATES AND CO.-designed breakfast room by the use of one pattern and its repetition throughout the room. The pattern, a plaid with an overlay of flowers, has been used as a border on the draperies, as upholstery, ruffles on the skirted table, and the flowers have been repeated on the hand-painted heap rug. Tie-back draperies are used to frame the lake view and add softness to the room.

BRIAN KILLIAN, founder of Design Consultants, has chosen American country as the theme for the pantry and kitchen. Emphasis has been placed on the natural and hand-made, highlighted by a folk-art-inspired painting by Audrey Baenziger, signed and dated Amish quilts draping the table, the pinewood pieces — all against a crisp stucco background.

Following a visit to the doll house, situated in an upstairs bedroom, visitors will see a bathroom decorated by SHARON A. CHATHAM. The designer has chosen a dramatic black-grounded paper with scattered flowers to enlarge visually and add distinction to the small bathroom. The small window was given a simple Roman shade in a white-and-black cotton print

JAMES EVAN WILLIAMS turned one of the upstairs bedrooms into a study filled with English antique furniture, paintings, procelains and oriental accents united with floral chintzes, moires and crisp cotton textures. A bright palette of yellow, white and gold have been combined with the greens and lavenders of spring.

Decorators CHRISTOPHER AMEEL, ELIZABETH BJORK and THOMAS MAKSOUT have combined their talents to design a quiet retreat in one of the two large bedrooms which overlook Lake St. Clair, the emphasis being on comfort and quality.

ROBERT ENDRES, DIANE HOWTING AND D.J. KENNEDY, JR. of KENNEDY's Interior Design, chose mauve-toned walls framed by tailored, French buttercream-colored crown moldings, setting off the Ikat-patterned fabric used throughout the room. Overstuffed, down-filled furnishings create a sitting area near the fireplace which is balanced by a king-size bed draped with silky-textured fabric and a tailored cornice. The master bathroom continues the theme with its cream carpet, flowing drapery and mauve-cream wall-

The four-person team from JACOBSON'S HOME DECORATING, JANET EVANS, PATTI KELLY, EDA PALAZZOLO and SALLY TOWNSEND, christened the suite of three rooms and bathroom above the living room as the Suite de Grandmere. Throughout the suite, traditional European design and garden flowers have been interpreted on fabrics, wallpapers and accessories. The Dhurrie rug of the morning room introduces the suite's color scheme of raspberry, mint and mocha. The raspberry-colored hallway rug leads the visitor to the bathroom, which has a dramatic pattern on ceiling, walls and drapery. In the bedchamber, a refreshing iris fabric keeps spring in the room all year, and the hand-woven rug gives a subtle country touch. In the rear living room, JACOBSON'S used white moire walls to expand visually the relatively narrow room and framed the windows with tailored lambrequins to allow the fullest view of the grounds.

Returning to the ground floor, the visitor is directed to a spacious library which has a comfortable blending of English and French furniture against a background of grey and beige. LOIS ERICKSON, WILLIAM HERMAN and SUSAN ZINGER of HUDSON'S STUDIO OF INTERIOR DESIGN have also created a floor plan which allows for a relaxing atmosphere for two as well as excellent traffic flow into the adjoining rooms for entertaining.

NORMAN N. BROWN and ARLENE LAMBERT-BROW have made the adjacent enclosed terrace a room for all seasons by drawing from a palette of oyster, opium blue, foliage green and Oriental red. The room was decorated to be enjoyed during the cool breezes of summer, followed by the white of winter.

The magnificent living room, dominated by a crystal chandelier, has been transformed by MILDRED FRIEDMAN, ANTIQUARIANS AND INTERIOR DESIGNERS, using authentic 17th and 18th Century furnishings and accessories, complemented by high-quality replicas. As a departure from the traditional 18th Century use of brocades and deep colors, the designer has chosen to employ fabrics modern in design, texture and color which give a fresh, but elegant, feeling to the room.

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
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# Country-Look Family Room has Tips for Economizers



American Country is the hottest look in decorating these days and you don't have to spend a fortune to get it. Not if you know what you're doing, anyway.

Take the American Country-style family room created by the designers at Armstrong as an exercise in remodeling on a budget. It looks expensive but if you're willing to do part of the work yourself and to shop the secondhand stores - it needn't be.

Color sets the mood and, in this family room, the walls were painted a rich. frothy cream color to serve as a neutral foil for the other furnishings, which are predominantly wheat and slate blue.

Since storage is important in a family room, an old chest, refinished a golden honey with an antiquing kit, was placed against the middle of one wall Louvered doors (obtainable from building supply stores) flank the chest, providing access to two roomy closets.

Fronting the storage wall are two high-backed wing chairs separated by a candlestick floor lamp. They've been given new wheat-colored petit point slip-covers and a new lease on life. (Slipcovers are the most cost-effective means of resurrecting old sofas and chairs.)

Also wheat-colored is the Solarian do-it-yourself no-wax floor in a very-country tile pattern. It's one of those wide-width extra-flexible floors that you

fasten down only at the edges and at seams: there's no spreading messy adhesive all over. And a special Trim and Fit kit is available that helps you avoid expensive cutting errors when trimming your new flooring to fit the

The shaker rocking chair is not a costly antique; it's assembled from a kit. So are the shaker chairs in the kitchen that adjoins the family room. (Other kitchen items of interest are the trestle table and especially a chest of drawers resembling an outsize spice box which is actually an old shoemaker's cabinet.)

The area rug (cornflower blue) is a bound carpet remnant. The sectional sofa is upholstered in a slate blue window-pane check. The one real antique in the family room is an old-fashioned sled, fitted with a glass top, which functions as a coffee table.

Perhaps the most expensive feature of the room is the cast iron wood-burning stove which nevertheless offers obvious fuel economy.

Rounding out this American Country-style family room are accessories which impart completeness to the theme: the gray salt-glaze stoneware jug,

the having fork on the wall and the farm-scene painting. All in all, it's a pleasing facsimile of authentic Americana and it didn't break

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

• To batik, paint melted wax into your fabric so that when the fabric is dyed, the waxed portions "resist" dye, remaining the original color. Wax can be removed with a medium-hot iron or through dry cleaning.

 Ombre dyeing involved dipping sections of the fabric into two to four successively darker shades in the same color family for a subtly shaded effect.

Carry the monochromatic theme through to unfinished wooden and wicker pieces in your room. Dyeing is an easy and effective way to add color to plain, wood and wicker while still allowing the natural grain to show through. And, unlike paint, dye won't chip off.

GOOD TASTE NEED NOT BE EXPENSIVE

There is a certain little house, tucked away on a side street off Lakeshore Drive, that might easily be Lesson One for those die hards who persist in measuring beauty and good taste by the acre and by the price, instead of by the precious inch and the precious dollar. I liked the house before I was asked to help the owner with the decor.

The place is a definite tribute to the owner, for she had the wisdom to create

The place is a definite tribute to the owner, for she had the wisdom to create the interior she would like to live in, where she would feel most happy and most at ease, and to work with me to achieve it. Because of this, the moment one enters the house, one is aware that the decoration and owner are in perfect harmony.

There is about this happy, diminutive place, a quality that suggests that fragile charm that has been associated with its owner. The rooms are decorated with this feeling, delicately colored, perfectly finished.

The prevailing mood is French, with a modern twist to it. The marble floored reception room, for instance, has mirror walls, and the stairway, with its curving wrought iron bannisters is dashingly carpeted in an oriental runner, of browns and beige. Here the coloring is neutral, but with a kind of glowing opulence to it.

Window treatments are kept simple with cafe-au-lait satin trimmed with beige and brown tassel (the tassel treatment cost twice as much as the fabric). I was in the house recently and I am just as excited with it now as I was two years ago when I finished it — and it looks just as good now as then.

I remember 20 years ago when a similar client wanted slip covers on all her hickory furniture and we accomplished a great look by using mattress ticking at \$2.79 a yard. They looked good — unfortunately she washed them in her laundry machine and they shrank beyond use.

Today, we have a preshrunk printed fabric that gives us the mattress ticking look without shrinkage, no longer priced at \$2.79 a yard, however.

But many fabrics, and well priced furniture of good quality, are available at reasonable prices and put together, with good taste, make a good look to any interior. Frankly, I'm not too impressed with the fellow who drops names that this is a so and so and that my furniture is such and such. If it doesn't look right, it doesn't make any difference whose name is on it. Oh, sure we tend to use more expensive lines when the client demands the best, but quality and good taste are available at a good price. I invite you to drop into our studio and discuss your decorating problem with me. Maybe if I help you, you will have enough to buy a bottle of wine, too.

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

# That's the first purpose of any flower garden

Sardening is serious business in England. It competes with beer, cricket and the Princess of Wales for the undivided attention of the country. The most famous English gardener, of course, was Lancelot "Capability" Brown, the 18th century landscape architect who laid out the formal gardens at Kew and Blenheim, the ancestral home of Winston Churchill.

But English gardening is far from stuffy, notes "All About Perennials," a new book from Ortho Famous garden designer Gertrude Jekyll, who died in 1932, said, "The first purpose of a garden is to give happiness and repose of mind. which is more often enjoyed in the contemplation of the homely border . in any of those great gardens where the flowers lose their identity . . ."

Jekyll, an artist who turned to gardening when her eyesight started to fail, was devoted to the small cottage gardens she saw in the English countryside and is credited with starting the popular form of gardening known as the perennial border.

She was influenced in great measure by William Robinson, a late 19th century gardener who contended it was wasteful to compose formal gardens of tender annuals. Such gardens, he declared, were both unnatural and unattractive.

> Another famous English gardener was Vita Sackville-West (1892-1962) who said, "Gardening is largely a question of mixing one sort of plant with another sort of plant, and seeing how they marry happily together; and if you see they don't marry

nappiny together, and it you see they don't marry nappiny, then you must hock one of them."

Sackville-West's gardens can still be seen at Sissinghurst Castle in Kent, England.

#### Garlic is essential to cooking

the most versatile cooking herbs. When used in food preparation this herb has a stimulating aroma and a sweet and pungent taste which is pure delight.

There are two types of

garlic. The standard type can be purchased in any supermarket and has a bulb containing about 10 small cloves. The other variety is called "Elephant Garlic," and grows about six times larger than the standard and may weight up to a full pound.

To grow your own garlic successfully, remember, in cold regions, plant in the spring; in warm or moderate regions, plant in the fall.

Garlic bulbs are ready to harvest when the tops fall over. Store in a cool dry place or hang in bunches by braiding the tops into strings.

#### Save money

Deciduous trees planted on the west and south sides of the house can reduce cooling bills in the summer and heating bills in the winter

Electricity-usage studies show that during the summer months shaded houses use 2 kilowatthours (kwh) per square foot, while unshaded houses use 3.3 kwh per square foot

Windbreaks also reduce fuel consumption. In south Dakota, fuel consumption in an experimental house was 25 percent less because of a tall windbreak installed on the unprotected side of the house.



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# Get big vegetable harvests from small space



'An ounce of prevention'

Weeds! Once they're entrenched in your garden. they're hard to get rid of. You can spray them or dig them out, but that takes time and effort, especially to get every last one.

You may find, as many gardeners have, that the best way to be rid of weeds is not to have them at

Today, a number of "pre-emergence" weed preventers are available. As the name suggests, these products kill weeds before they even break the sur-

face of the ground. Pre-emergence weed preventers come in easy-to-apply granules that are shaken into or onto the

In the case of a newly prepared garden, the weed preventer should be mixed right in with the fresh soil. For gardens that are just emerging, weed preventer can be shaken directly over some young plants like broccoli and cabbage.

Other plants, such as cucumbers and melons, need to be more established with four to five true leaves before weed preventer is applied. Once applied, garden weed preventers will pro-

vide control for up to four months - and that's most of the growing season

Among the weeds controlled are crabgrass, annual grasses and many broadleaved weeds including common chickweed, carpetweed, purslane, and

The most important fact to keep in mind is that climate is the greatest factor governing the ability of grass to grow. Grass that grows best in Louisiana may have very little similarity to grass that thrives in Massachusetts or South

So the first rule of the green thumb is to pick the grass that best suits the region in which you live. Then, individual characteristics, such as draining and shade sunlight variations, should be taken into consideration.

So, the first step in starting a new lawn or bringing one back to life should be to consult with a Cooperative Extension Service office or a good local nursery,

turf or lawn professional. Once your is under way, maintenance, too, will vary somewhat according to the area in which you live. But two basic rules to remember are that your lawn

needs to be fed, and your lawn needs to be protected. A very effective treatment that has virtually nationwide application is the regular application of a combined fertilizer herbicide product.

Spring treatment will get your lawn off on the right foot, strengthening the grass so that it can grow and spread while eliminating intruders such as dandel-

ions, plantain, chickweed, and clover. In the fall, application of a product can strengthen your lawn for the long

And remember, a strong lawn is a definite asset at market time.

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#### Good Lighting, **Energy Savings** Are Compatible

Pleasant, comfortable home lighting is compatible with energy conservation, according to the American Home Lighting Institute. Well-chosen lighting fixtures and light bulbs or tubes are the keys to beautiful and efficient lighting. Get the most for your lighting dollars. Buy lumens. The efficiency of a light source is indicated by the amount of light (lumens) produced for each watt of electricity consumed. It is important to read the lumen rating for a bulb. All manufacturers list them on bulb packages.

Incandescent bulbs give a warm light, flattering to faces. Higher wattage bulbs are more efficient than lower wattage ones. Long life bulbs are good where replacement is difficult, as over a stairwell, but some light output is sacrificed in favor of longer life of the bulb.

Use three-way bulbs where possible. They let you select the amount of light for decorating a room or living area, or for illuminating a work or recreation

Use dimmer controls. They provide maximum flexibility in selection of the most suitable lighting level, thus saving watts and dollars. Dimmers are available for both fluorescent and incandescent in-

Automatic timers help control energy because they allow you to select off and on times for your fixtures.

Sound and motion sensors can control switches to turn lights on when a room is occupied and off when

Make sure fixtures are clean. Dust and grease tend to settle on bulbs and tubes, especially in the kitchen and in some work areas. This reduces light output and wastes energy.

When painting or wallpapering rooms, hallways, and other parts of the home, try to use lighter colors on walls and ceilings. This reflects light and adds to the effective illumination from your fix-

For expert advice and consultation, it is best to check with the showroom distributor members of the American Home Lighting Institute. If you do not know the location of one in your community, write to the Institute, at 435 North Michigan Avenue, Suite 1717, Chicago, IL 60611.

#### Keeping Cool with Less Energy

It is Spring again and while it is that time of the year, as the poet Tennyson tells us, when "young man's fancy lightly turns to thoughts of love." others are necessarily turning to less blissful thoughts like how to keep cool this summer.

With the great national emphasis on conserving fuel as a near-term solution to the energy problem. families are beginning to find ways to stay comfortable and still keep their cooling costs down voung lovers notwithstanding

The Washington-based Alliance to Save Energy informs us that there are about 40 million single family homes in the United States that are not adequately protected from the weather - hot or

But these homes, in their present condition and with no further investment, can be kept cooler in the summer with a few carefully practiced mea-sures. During the hottest hours of the day it is wise to keep doors and windows closed and shades and draperies drawn. Outside awnings or bamboo shades are a help if you have them, particularly on the southern side of the house.

Keep the use of household appliances to a minimum during daylight hours. These, like light bulbs, not only consume energy but generate heat; so use these sparingly on hot days. Postpone the heavy household chores like clothes washing and drying and dishwashing until the cool of the even-

And remember, as one anonymous sage once said, "It's not the heat that gets you down, it's the humidity." So it is not a bad idea to cook at night

If your home has no air conditioning equipment. exhaust fans to draw and expel the heat and humidity from the house are very helpful. Window fans are more efficient than portable fans, but attic fans that pull air through the house and exhaust it through the attic are the best.

#### **Shade Lawns Need** Special Maintenance

Establishing and maintaining a beautiful lawn in shady areas can be a difficult task. Fortunately a number of steps can be taken to ensure success under these conditions, according to Lou Laroche, editor of "Famous Lawns of America," a booklet published by Wheel Horse Products, Inc.

Laroche says that grass should receive 50 percent of the sunlight passing through a tree to be properly sustained. "Light is essential to the health of the grass, which competes with its neighboring trees for water and nutrients as well. In heavily shaded areas, the daylight needs of grass are not met. The grass then becomes thin or spotty and may eventually die," he adds

According to Laroche, one of the first steps necessary for an attractive shade lawn is the planting of a shade-tolerant grass. "Grass seed boxes list shade tolerance factors. They are an effective guide when planting. If a grass is already established, reseeding with a better adapted grass will gradually improve the appearance," said Laroche.

Once the seed is planted and flourishing. Laroche suggests mowing the grass at a higher length than usual. Two to three inches would be about right particularly for blue-grasses. Greater blade length equals a greater light gathering ability. Be wary of over-watering or over-fertilization. This is because fescues

which abound in shade mixtures will decline with such over-care The simplest solution to the shade problem is to prune or thin trees, says Laroche. 'This isn't as drastic as it may sound. If you prune your trees properly as much as 40 percent of a tree's leaf surface can be removed without

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# It's been a rough year for boxing's Bedway

For a few days in March, 1981, it looked as though Tommy Bedway's amateur boxing career had gotten off to a great start. Despite having a scant one year of training behind him, the young Shores boxer beat his first opponent easily. He could boast of having several famous Kronk boxers as his instructors and he even gathered a small army of fans who proudly wore ms mckname, Motor City Meatman," emblazoned on their Tshirts.

One year later, the Motor City Meatman has yet to fight a second organized fight, and he won't be able to for some time to come

"I was sparring with Tony Tucker he's the 1979 World Cup Boxing champ.on and I got my nose broken. I had surgery at Cottage and I won't be able to box for another month," Bedway said last week,

The accident happened in Janu-

ary and it couldn't have come at a worse time as far as Bedway was concerned. After his first-fight victory last March, he's been having a hard time scheduling another match. A few times he's had fights set up, but the opponents never showed up and the fights were cancelled.

One of those times, he showed up at a Westland gym only to be disappointed by another cancellation. He ended up fighting in an exhibition with Rick Longberg, a very good heavywight who eventually beat Otis McGee, a heavyweight ranked fifth in the United States, in the local Golden Gloves open class finals. according to Bedway,

It was only an exhibition, but it gave Bedway what he needed after a long, dry spell- confidence, "I felt good about fighting him. His train ers didn't really want me to fight Longberg in a regular fight, so they proposed an exhibition and we used 10 ounce gloves instead of 14 ounce

"He came up to me and said. Till take it easy on you. I told him that was okay, he didn't have to," Bedway said.

The way the exhibition began, Longberg really didn't want to take it easy on Bedway. "I went to touch his gloves and he ducked and threw a right. In the first round, I hurt got him against the ropes and got in about five good punches. It was a very close fight."

There was no official decision to the exhibition, but in Bedway's mind, he was clearly a winner "I was very pleased . . although he was disappointed because he thought he was going to kill me." The pro-Longberg crowd gave Bedway a standing ova-

Bedway's confidence-building encounter with Longberg took place in December. It gave him encouragement to continue toward his ultimate amateur goal: the Golden Gloves. Unfortunately, the events of early Jan

uary put a hold on those hopes

"The surgery messed up the Golden Gloves I was very heartbroken and disappointed to miss it. I really think I could have won the Golden Gloves because I went too to toe with the guy who won the Golden Gloves' open class. He had had 40 fights, I'd. had one and still I did really well," Bedway said

But then I was training with Tucker and got my nose busted

The doctors have told Bedway to take it easy for three months due to the severity of the break. At first it was thought that the earthigh in Bedway's nose was too damaged to permit him to box again, but doctors now say he can resume the sport after the nose heals completely

Bedway said the broken nose didn't really bother him that much, but it did restrict his breathing and caused him to breath from the mouth. Mouth breathers don't fare too well in boxing, Bedway said, as they are more susceptible to broken Jaws

Despite the setback, Bedway said he's more determined than ever to stick with boxing on an amateur level He still works in his dad's meat market downtown, training be fore and after work. And while he still sees some of the Kronk boxers, Bedway's training site has changed in this last year. He trains at the IBA, International Boxing Association, with boxing mentor Don Thibideaux.

"I go back to the doctor in about a month and I hope to get a fight (Continued on Page 2D)



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Michigan's spring steelhead fishing season may peak later than usual be-cause of this winter's heavy snows, but the excellent runs expected should be worth the extra 7- to 10-day wait, according to the Automobile Club of Michigan.

Anglers should watch for peak runs in early to mid-April in West Michigan, mid-April to mid-May in East Michigan, late April through mid-May in Southeast Michigan and in mid-May across the Upper Peninsula.

"The snowmelt which helps trigger the steelhead's spawning urge could be later in parts of northern Lower and Upper Michigan because of the heavy snowfall," said James Drury, Auto Club Travel Operations manager. "The melting snow would keep rivers cold, meaning a longer-thanusual period of stream temperatures below the optimum 40- to 45-degree range needed for spawning activity and best fishing.'

Some 300,000 six- to 15-pound silvery fighters planted as 6 to 10inchers in 1979 and 1980 will enter the 36 streams listed on Auto Club's Spring Steelhead Guide. There also should be a good run of immature "skippers" weighing two to four

from upstream dams will delay runs. Pier fishermen should find good results at the Pigeon River's mouth at Caseville in the Thumb. In Southeast Michigan, best steelheading should be on the St. Clair River for trollers and on the Huron River for shore and wading fishermen.

Upper Peninsula anglers should find peak action at Thompson Creek's mouth and on the Big Cedar along Lake Michigan, the Ontonagon, Little Garlic and Two Hearted along Lake

Superior and the Carp on Lake Huron.

Auto Club advises steelheaders to check specific rules for individual rivers in the DNR's Michigan Fishing Guide. Some rivers are open yeararound while others open April 1 or April 24, the start of general trout season. The guide is free to anglers purchasing license passbooks.

Although contaminant levels of Great Lakes gamefish are declining. the State Department of Public Health continues its advisory that steelhead from Lakes Michigan and Huron should not be eaten by children, pregnant women, those expecting to bear children or nursing mothers. All others should consume no more than one steelhead meal per
