Grosse Pointe's own Michael J. Connolly, the 33 year old whiz kid who was appointed general counsel for the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission by President Reagan last year, has reportedly resigned from the post under pressure from the White House. The former General Motors employe who lives on, Kensington Road in the Park has been criticized for his allegedly proemployer stance on the commission and a propensity for dropping cases against large firms. Connolly could not be reached for comment, but the Wall Street Journal reported he is headed back to our town to resume private law practice next month. Connolly held the EEOC post for nine months.

The News takes this opportunity to apologize to Farms Councilman Joe Fromm for neglecting to publicize the fact that water rates in his city have taken a recent dip, unlike the rest of the Pointes. As of July 1, Farms residents experienced a five percent drop in their water rates as a result of a corresponding drop in sewage flow rates from Detroit. The old rate was \$14.10 per 1.000 cubic feet. The new rate (ta dana!) is \$13.40 per 1.000. Farms comptroller Carrol Lock said that if the water dispute with Detroit hadn't been solved. Farms residents would have seen a 10 percent increase in their rates. He also advises enjoying the lower rates while you can. They'll probably go up in a year. Farms agrees: Ford has a better idea

It was a standing room only crowd at the Farms Council meeting Monday night, Aug. 23, that saw the city fathers vote unanimously with one abstention to allow the first cluster home development on Lakeshore Road.

The vote, which came after a two and a half hour discussion. was preceded by a rare personal appearance before the council by Henry Ford, H. owner of the

Ford explained that he had been unable to sell the land, site of his now unoccupied 76-room mansion. for the past several years. Ford said he thought this was an op-portunity to develop a "quality, innovative type project" on the property and to provide the type of development where owners could "lock up their homes and leave them, worry-free, for two months, if they wished." Ford said that before the meeting he had already received calls from two buyers interested in putting down deposits on homes.

After a brief explanation to the council, Ford turned the discussion over to William Caldwell. president of the Caldwell Equity Corp., proposed builders of the

Caldwell explained that although plans weren't yet 'fully formed. the developers hoped to build 18 "cluster" type homes on the 7.85 acre site, interspersed along a meandering road stretching from Kercheval Avenue to Lakeshore Road

Three of the homes would be constructed along the 390 foot frontage paralleling Lakeshore Road. Caldwell explained that although some of the homes would be attached at a common garden wall, or common corner, they weren't really "condominiums"

"With most condos, homeownership is limited to a 'paint to paint' basis,' said Caldwell, 'meaning the condo owner owns
only what's within his walls. He doesn't own the structure. With these homes, the buyer owns the home and the property it's built upon. Upon closing, the homeowner would join a Homeowners Association which would entitle him to 1 18th ownership of the remaining land.

With a rezoning allowing cluster type homes, we can utilize the unique qualities of the property," said Caldwell. "It's a long, narrow lot with hilly terrain and a fine view of the lake. If we just shot a road straight through and put in single, family homes we'd lose the pool, poolhouse and probably 90 percent of the trees. This way we save them.

Caldwell said the development would be based on four or five basic design floor plans, offering two and three bedroom homes with attached two car garages. Prices for the homes would begin at about \$300,000. The road running through the development would be private and would offer single entrance and exit onto Kercheval and Lakeshore.

Caldwell said that if construction were to begin in 1983 "with a normal market. his company would hope to finish by 1985.

Audience reaction to the plan was mixed, with scattered applause greeting pro and con opinions on the development. John Wayne, of McKinley Road backed the rezoning saying the liked it both as a teacher of architecture and as a citizen.

They've done well aesthetically," he said, "As a homeowner I also believe it will enhance the community.

On the negative side, one of the most vocal opponents of the com-plex was Philip Leon, of Lakeshore Road, who said the project was "reasonably" attractive but, he feared, setting a precedent.

Clyne murder: Case closed

Jeanne Clyne was in the wrong place at the wrong time. That's the opinion of Grosse Pointe Farms police who confirmed that mass murderer Coral Eugene Watts killed Mrs. Clyne nearly three years ago as she walked along Kercheval Avenue.

At a press conference held Saturday afternoon, Aug. 21. Farms police said Watts had confessed to the murder only after he was granted immunity from prosecution by the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office.

Reading first from a prepared statement. Det. Earl Field explained that immunity had been granted because "in all likelihood. outside evidence will never be developed to lawfully prosecute Watts for this homicide. We. nevertheless, feel that the ends of justice - the protection of society - will be served in this case."

Mrs. Clyne, a former reporter for the Detroit News, was killed early on the evening of Oct. 31, 1979. A resident of Merriweather Road, her body was discovered on the north side of Kercheval, laying along side the walkway between Lothrop and Merriweather Roads. She was 44.

After delivering the statement before television cameras. Det. Field answered questions from reporters. Field stated he had interviewed Watts over a seven hour period on Thursday, Aug. 19. in Houston, where Watts was sentenced to 60 years in prison for burglary with intent to commit murder.

Watts told police he walked toward Mrs. Clyne, then suddenly areas. pulled out a 14 inch screwdriver and stabbed her 11 times in the

Watts reportedly told police Mrs. Clyne kept saying okayokay okay as he stabbed her. Watts also said she threw her hands up across her chest and that he was sure he "nicked her in the hand" when she did. Police reports show Mrs. Clyne suffered defensive wounds on one hand.

Watts also reportedly told police he ran back to his car and drove off toward Mack Avenue. He said he kept the weapon and later threw it away in Detroit. Watts stated Mrs. Clyne was still standing when he fled.

During the interview. Watts also reportedly corrected the police description of him given to newspapers at the time, saying the golf hat he was wearing was "dark red and not dark blue

Det. Field said that during the entire interview. Watts never expressed any remorse and that he was very "calm and matter-offact" in his description of the murder. Reportedly, Watts never said why he killed Mrs. Clyne.

Det. Field also said Watts casually mentioned murdering two other women in the Grosse Pointe area. Watts reportedly would only make the admissions when recording equipment in the room was turned off during an interview break.

In the Traverse City case, the Michigan State Police are reportedly re-opening the investigation of the 1975 stabbing death at young mother at a highway rest stop. The woman was killed without apparent motive in a restroom while her two young sons waited for her in their car, police said.

"Every police department with unsolved murders of young women is going to be interested in said Det. Field. "He this guy. kills by stabbing, strangling or drowning - all apparently without motive and completely at random. That covers a lot of murders. He killed 12 women in 14 months while in Texas, and he also came back to Michigan twice during that period.

"Who knows what he's done in the years before he was caught? At least in our case, we can finally lay Jeanne Clyne to rest.

This summer is one some Park residents will remember with PacMan fever. As temperatures have soared, so have problems in the neighborhood surrounding the Esquire Theater on Jefferson Avenue, where a 14-game video parlor is packing kids in every even-

Neighbors say they have been physically and verbally abused by crowds of dope-smoking teens who spill out of the game room to nearby parking lots and private yards. "From 7 to 11 every evening there's no sleeping around here," said Ernest Maynard of Nottingham Road, "You can smell the pot from your front door. I worry about my 10-year-old daughter's safety.

Another resident, who handles maintenance for the nearby Detroit Institute of Ophthamology, said he was physically assaulted by youths from the video parlor.

The angry neighbors have taken their complaints to city hall and have made appearances at the city council's last two meetings. Even though police patrols have been increased and theater owners are tightening security measures and posting loitering ordinances, the problems aren't

The game room opened in the financially-strapped theater's lobby this January, just days before the Park city council passed an ordinance limiting businesses to five games each. Initial reaction from citizens was supportive

Trustees ask for Grobbel appointment





Woods buys equipment

Grosse Pointe Woods moved closer to getting an Advanced Life Support system Monday, Aug. 16, when the council approved the purchase of radio and defibrillator equipment.

The council also delayed awarding a design and construction contract for the proposed dormitory behind the municipal garage. City Administrator Clerk Chester Petersen said the bids were much higher than the amount the had budgeted.

The city appropriated \$45,000 for the dormitory in its 1982-83 budget. The lowest bid, according to city officials,

The building to located behind the municipal garage, would house paramedics on 24 hour duty. The building would provide approximately 1,400 square feet of both living and storage space according to contract specifications.

Petersen asked the council to post pone the matter until the city could meet with the low bidder and try to talk the price down

WCCC tax set at .85 mills

Trustees of the Wayne County Community College last month ap-proved a 1982 tax rate that will cost Grosse Pointe taxpayers about \$875,000 this year, or about \$48 per household A motion to continue last year's rate

of 0.85 mills for this year was made by Grosse Pointe's representative to the college board. John Grylls, at the trustees' July 7 meeting and was approved unanimously. The tax will generate a total of \$11.5 million from taxpayers in 36 Wayne County communities. The rate includes 0.25 mills for operating purposes and 0.60 mills for debt retirement. A mill equals \$1 for every \$1,000 of assessed valuation.

Earlier this summer, college administrators announced the closing of the Austin Center on East Warren Avenue, the closest WCCC branch to Grosse Pointe. New laws regulating the sale and ownership of flare guns have now gone into effect and Michigan State Police officials are urging retailers and po-tential purchasers of these devices to be aware of these changes. The new laws exempt retailers and purchasers of flare gun pistols from the handgun purchase normit and re-

the handgun purchase permit and registration requirements, but restrict sales to boaters or pilots who are 18 years or older.

The purchaser is required to present a hoat registration bill of sale or

a boat registration, bill of sale or airplane pilot license to the retailer in order to purchase a flare gun pistol. Possession and transportation of the devices is restricted for use in conjunction with boating, and aircraft emergencies.

Traveling between home and boating use, or purchase and home, etc., the device has to be unloaded, enclosed in a case and carried in a trunk of the vehicle. 

New regulations for the utilities?

The Michigan Citizens Lobby is waiting for a court ruling to certify a Nov. 2 ballot proposal that would increase regulation of Michigan public utilities. The proposal would eliminate the automatic fuel adjustment clause now in effect, and require utilities to submit all rate requests to the Public Service Commission for public hearings.

Opposing the proposal is a group called Citizens for Michigan Jobs and Energy, including representatives of the state Chamber of Commerce, utility companies and unions. They say the ballot proposal will lead to higher utility bills and massive job losses.

The News asked shoppers on the Hill if they will cote in favor of the proposition in November.

GPW denies first video game appeal

By Mike Andrzejczyk In the first request for a variance from the city's month-old video game ordinance, the Woods council Monday. Aug. 16, refused to ease the parking restriction to allow Mr. C's Deli, 20915 Mack, to install a Pac Man machine.

The council voted 4-2 to deny the request of Vito Cataflio, store president, to count one parking space from the Ridgement municipal lot to meet the additional parking space requirement. Councilman Robert Novitke was not at

the meeting.

The video ordinance requires one additional off-street parking space for each machine. An appeal to the city can be made to have that requirement

Another request by Cataflio to cut the six feet of space required on each side of the machine down to three feet

was also turned down.
City Attorney George Catlin said the space provision doesn't fall under the appeal process.

I wouldn't ask for the variance if I thought the one machine would jeopardize my business." Cataflio said, adding the store and the family had a reputation at stake" as well as an

investment in the city.

Cataflio asked the council for a temporary permit, so the store could show how the machine would be operated. The council could review the operation and revoke the license in 30 to 60 days if it wished, he added.

Councilmembers, however, said the variance would mean granting the store more public parking spaces. The store already received one variance before it opened. Councilman Thomas Fahrner said.

We gave them a variance to open their business," Fahrner said. "I really don't think we should lean on public parking for variances.

Councilman John Sabol agreed, saying, "This council would be wrong approving the variance, because he (Mr. C's) would be sapping all the public

parking." Parking is a problem for all Mack merchants, Cataflio said, adding, "If everyone on Mack Avenue had their

own parking, then why would we need those lots? I thought that's what the lots were for.

He said the game would not draw extra cars to the store, basing his contention on experience with the games at other Mr. C's locations.

The game would be a convenience for customers, Cataflio said, and would not be meant for children to come off the street to play. There would be no crowds, no lines and no interference with other customers, he

Councilman Jean Rice said the game, not the parking requirement was the problem.

"There may not be anyone here who objects (to the game)," she said, "but, I don't think the people of this community want it.

We, the council, have to view a change as to whether or not it is desirable to the residents of the com-munity," Mayor George Freeman

The city has received three requests for video game licenses. City Administrator Clerk Chester Petersen said. Cataflio's was the first to require the appeal, he added.





Cable TV fees paid to cities

The five municipal members of Grosse Pointe Cable, Inc., recently refees for the first half of 1982, according to the firm's Vice-President and General Manager Michael Reynolds.

Company president John Rickel said the fees paid to the cities in future six month periods will match or exceed the current level. Since the cable company began serving customers. more than two years ago, the cities have received a total of \$87,011 in franchise payments. The tees are based on the number of customers in each city. The cable system now serves about 10,000 households, according to the firm.

Grosse Pointe Woods received the largest payment for the first six months of 1982, \$12,387. Harper Woods received \$10,017; Grosse Pointe Park, \$7,782; Grosse Pointe Farms \$6,250; and Grosse Pointe City \$3,578. Woods plans business strip study

By Mike Andrzejczyk Grosse Pointe Woods will pick the brains of developers and residents as it begins studying the possible redevelopment of the Seven-Mack Shopping Center and the rest of its business district.

The Woods council signed contracts at its Monday, Aug. 16, meeting with Gerald Luedtke and Associates, Inc. and Nordhaus Research, Inc. to perform studies.

Luedtke and Associates will do a four-part study to test the market for possible developers at the Seven-Mack area, look at the possibility of a new supermarket at the Farmer Jack store, analyze commercial frontage on Mack south of the municipal offices to Bournemouth and to extend the city's neighborhood strategy zone to the northeast portion of the

Nordhaus Research will conduct telephone interviews with residents to find out attitudes on the development of the commercial strip, shopping, off-street parking and possible zoning changes.

Both studies will be funded with Community Development Block Grant funds from this and previous years. Administrative Aide Gerard McNamara said. The Luedtke study will cost \$14,000. while the Nordhaus study will cost \$3,700, plus or minus 10 percent, according to contracts.

Most doorwalls come equipped with what are most kindly termed "flimsy" locks.

For glass doorwalls, you should consider several precautions from the simple placement of an old broomstick or dowel rod ("Charlie" bar) in the lower track, to the more sophisticated type of auxiliary lock to prevent intrusion by this entry

Rarely does the intruder break doorwall glass to gain entry, because of the noise created. A more common form of forced entry with doorwalls is through the insertion of a crowbar or other device at the bottom, to force the doors up and out of their track

Such intrusion is easily thwarted by the installation of a series of screws mounted in the "play" area or open space above them. Mount screws in the upper track, leaving just enough clearance for easily sliding of the door, but not enough so as to allow the door to be lifted by force out of its lower track.

Another inexpensive and easy device for securing a sliding glass doorwall is that of drilling a hole or two in the frame and inserting a pin through the holes and the anchor molding. This can be a do-it-yourself project with a

Students' benefits are reduced

Several changes in the Social Sec urity law went into effect last Sept. 1 in order to save the system money, according to James T. Mostener, manager of the district Social Security office at 17420 Mack Avenue

Students' benefits will be discontinued after April, 1885 Students 18 or older who started college before May. 1982, and are entitled to a child's be-nefit for August, 1981, will keep getting benefits. But their checks will be cut 25 percent in September, 1982, another 25 percent in September, 1983, and yet another 25 percent in September, 1984 Also, they will get no cost of living adjustments and no benefits from May through August.

College students 18 to 21 who be came eligible for a child's benefits after August, 1981, only got the benefits through July, 1982. Those now 18 and attending elementary or secon dary school will keep getting benefits but those 19 to 21 received them only through July, 1982.

A mother's or father's benefits will now end when the youngest child turns 16 instead of 18, unless the child is dis abled. Children will keep getting be nefits until 18. This will take effect immediately for parents who became eligible after August 1981

For parents eligible before Sept 1 the changes will not take effect until September, 1983. The combined savings by 1986 are expected to be almost \$1.7 billion.







diminished as a skillful art even though each of us may think we are dotting our i's and crossing our t's correctly In his book, local calligrapher Wil-

liam Bostick quotes Scottish essayist Carlyle: "The art of writing is the most miraculous of all things man has devised." Well, the miraculous is happening all over again. For some unknown reason there is a resurgence of interest in writing beautifully once

Calligraphy or "beautiful writing" is appearing on everything from menus to wedding announcements, merit certificates to name tags.

"I don't know really what it is." says local calligraphy teacher Dorothy Newhouse. "I guess people have found it to be beautiful and consider it a skill. People like receiving calligraph-

Mrs. Newhouse has been teaching calligraphy in the public schools' Department of Continuing Education for two years now and considers it her "fourth career" after lifework as a museum administrator, mother of three children and French teacher at North High School for 18 years. She retired a year

She became interested in calligraphy nearly six years ago when she took a class taught by Bostick at the Grosse Pointe War Memorial, Mrs. Newhouse uses his book "A Manual on the Acquiring of a Beautiful & Legible Handwriting to guide students from their regular sober strokes to a calliguism it. That's what I love about it.

in a decidedly indecipherable fashion - raphic style of the 16th century called Chancery Cursive.

According to Bostick's book, the chancery style was officially adopted as the hand of Papal decrees because of its beauty. Bostick's theory on the popularity of calligraphy is penned to America's digust with the "ugliness and illegibility of much 20th century handwriting."

In her well-attended classes at Brownell school each week, Mrs. Newhouse focuses on beginning skills of calligraphy, teaching students to be comfortable with the tools of the trade - feltdipped pens and special ink.

Even though each student uses the Bostick workbook, Mrs. Newhouse encourages students to develop their own style. But after eight sessions Mrs. Newhouse reminds students it takes lots and lots of practice to control a beautiful

"You constantly, constantly try to improve yourself, but you enjoy the creativity of improving.

Not only does Mrs. Newhouse find it a pleasure to teach calligraphy, she also has found a dozen uses for it herself.
"My regular handwriting has improved slightly, too.

Mrs. Newhouse put her calligraphic skills to good use about six years ago when she addressed wedding invitations for each of her daughters-in-law.

I use it when I address all my envelopes. An organization has asked me to do 14 certificates of appreciation," says Mrs. Newhouse, who is busy calligraphing a recipe box and a few poems





1,500 births in '82

A baby boom at Bon Secours

Due to a recent surge in births, Bon Secours Hospital in Grosse Pointe has had the largest percentage increase in deliveries of all hospitals in the seven county area of Southeastern Michigan between 1977 and 1981, the hospital announced last week.

The statistics were gathered by the Greater Detroit Area Hospital Council from the 42 out of 80 hospitals in the area that provide obstetric services.

The statistics show deliveries at Bon Secours Hospital have increased from 751 in 1977 to 1,339 in 1981. The hospital expects 1,500 births in 1982.

The increase happened while Michigan's birth rate has been declining since July, 1980, according to Michigan Department of Public Health

One reason for the increase is the hospital's medical and nursing staffs' reputation for providing familycentered care with sensitivity, caring

and expertise, the hospital said.

We have a rule that each patient is an independent person, said Mohammad Ariani, M.D., chief of the obstetrical department at Bon Secours. "She is not like any other person at all. She should be treated like no

"Bon Secours does a good job of making birth as natural and as safe as possible," Dr. Ariani added.

Consolidation of Cottage Hospital's obstetric unit at Bon Secours Hospital in August, 1981 has also contributed to

the increase, the hospital said.

The hospital believes its birthing room, infant car seat rental program, prenatal classes, and a gourmet dinner for new parents are what brings obstetric patients to Bon Secours.



Clouds on the GOP horizon

Republican leadership is united for a fall campaign in which it hopes to retain the governor's chair, win other state elective posts and possibly even wrest control of one or more houses of the Legislature from the Democrats.

By nominating former Michigan Supreme Court Justice Thomas Brennan for lieutenant governor, Oakland County Prosecutor L. Brooks Patterson for attorney general, and Michigan Northern Railway President Elizabeth Andrus for secretary of state, the GOP convention in Grand Rapids last week put together a slate which it believes will be able to win success in November.

Even Lt. Gov. James Brickley, who was one of the losers in the gubernatorial race, appeared to join the unity campaign by nominating Brennan for his own post.

YET BEFORE THE NEW leaders under Richard Headlee, the Farmington Hills insurance executive who is the party's choice for governor, start relishing their November election victories, they still should consider a few political clouds on the horizon.

One is that Gov. William Milliken, while endorsing Headlee and the ticket, has made it clear that the extent of his support will be in doubt so long as Headlee continues to run against Coleman Young and Detroit. Milliken attended the state convention only briefly, explaining he did not want to appear to be stealing the limelight from Headlee.

Another is that neither Headlee nor Patterson critics said the governor was a poor loser by all, helped elect Milliken time after time.

Aside from a few grumblers, Michigan's new failing to spend more time at the convention. But Milliken supporters felt that Headlee and Patterson were, in effect, poor winners by their attacks on the retiring governor.

A third is that while the GOP convention nominated one woman, Ms. Andrus, for secretary of state and three other women as candidates for the boards of Michigan's three major universities, some GOP women are still upset at the fact that both the candidates for governor and lieutenant governor are opposed to free choice of abortion as well as the now-defunct equal rights amendment.

A fourth possible GOP handicap is the attack by Headlee and former Gov. George Romney against union bosses as bearing much of the blame for the state's economic troubles. It is true the AFL-CIO, the UAW and the teachers unions already have endorsed the Democratic nominee, James Blanchard, but the GOP attack on union leaders will tend to increase organized labor's opposition to the GOP and make it more difficult for Headlee to make a distinction between labor leaders and the union members he hopes to woo to the GOP. And while high labor costs have contributed to Michigan's woes, most of the blame has to be put on the national economic recession.

While the GOP show of unity was impressive, the public knows that what it saw and heard in Grand Rapids were the voices of the party leaders. Know Your Schools

A trustee's proper contribution

By Kenneth Brummel **Superintendent of Schools**

John Fisher, past president of Teacher's College, Columbia University, has noted that, "The proper contribution of the school board member is not expertise, but wisdom; not detailed knowledge, but high values and sound judgement."

In this second column about board of education functions, 1 want to examine some of the ways the trustees of the Grosse Pointe Board of Education makes their proper contribution.

As representatives of the citizens of this school district, board members are responsible to the state government for the education of all pupils in kindergarten through 12th grade and for adult and community school programs. Thus, board trustees are state officers elected in the manner proscribed by law and for the purpose of discharging a legal responsibility. As state officers, board members have to uphold state laws when exercising the authority of their office.

As an elected body, the board identifies community aspirations and needs, and develops educa-

tional programs and services for all residents and fosters public based on financial plans that are confidence in their actions. consistent with community resources. Educational policies reflecting community attitudes and aspirations are implemented by the superintendent of schools, who is appointed by the board as its executive officer.

Two of the most important duties of the board are to establish policy and determine goals for the school system. Existing policies are reviewed and changed as necessary and new policies added when appropriate. In determining goals for a new school year, the board reviews accomplishments of past school years and staff recommendations for the future, a process that is occurring now. Goals consistent with the system's philosophy statement are then developed and further expanded in individual, departmental and building objec-

The members of the board of education also recognize their crucial role in promoting education in the community. Therefore, they conduct their business in a manner that reflects a strong commitment to quality education

The board serves as the vital link between the public and the schools. It is the desire of the board to provide an avenue for citizens to express interest in and concern for the schools. Accordingly, residents are strongly urged to learn what is happening in the schools, to visit regularly with the leadership of individual schools and the school system, and to attend meetings of the board.

Through citizen participation in school activities, students, community and school staff are brought together in a partnership that improves instructional programs, defines positions of responsibility and accountability, develops a sense of appreciation for all peoples, enables the school system to meet community needs, and provides unlimited opportunities for the schools to serve all

In the final column of this series, I will explain briefly the relationship between the board and the superintendent as the board discharges its legal responsibilities in operating the school



Pointer of Interest

You're driving along a country road late one night. As you guide the car around a curve your headlights reveal a hitch-hiker. The debate with yourself begins. Should you risk picking up the hitch-hiker? Warning signals flood your thoughts: don't talk to strangers, lock your doors and never. never, never pick up a hitch-hiker.

On the other hand, this is a lonely road and it could be hours before another car comes along. Never trusting anyone is inhibit-ing your lifestyle, and the company might be pleasurable. You stop. But the hitch-hiker makes no move towards the ear. You get out and realize that the hitch-hiker is a plywood replica of a man with a series of notes written on its back telling where it's been and its destination. You've just met one of Jim Pallas' hitch-hikers.

Pallas, Grosse Pointe Park sculptor, began the hitch-hiker project when the Detroit Focus Gallery asked for entries in its mail art show. Pallas made the hitch-hiker of himself sitting in lotus position and hung a sign around its neck that said "Detroit." He set it on a blacktop road near Lake Odessa with a note thanking the driver who stopped for it and indicating that it was headed for 743 Beaubien, with no mention of the gallery. The hitch-hiker arrived the next day.

Since then Pallas has made a number of hitch-hikers, including family members, local artists and celebrities. Pallas gives the completed hitch-hiker to the subject to be sent wherever the subject chooses. Pallas then checks on the whereabouts of the hitch-hiker from time to time.

THE HITCH-HIKER project is a romantic piece about risk and the open road," Pallas says. He has no intention of making money on the project.

Pallas is best known for his electronic sculptures. He is the creator of Century of Light, the sculpture on Washington Boulevard that is a network of lights, equipped with microphone and radar that responds to the people on the boulevard. The lights will follow a pedestrian across the street or respond to a conversation spoken in normal tones.

The programming module for Century of Light is a seven and one-half-foot sculpture of white painted metal, with a micro comkes board.

sharpener and popcorn popper. This module, Progmod, can be programmed to perform a number of light responses on a smaller light screen, in the same way that Century of Light does. Progmod can be disassembled to fit in a Honda, taken downtown and plugged into Century of Light to reprogram the large sculpture. Although the two sculptures can work together, both sculptures can be worked and enjoyed independently.

Pallas has always been interested in motion and sound. Early sculptures, when he was an art student at Wayne State University, often are on wheels with sound illustrations. His first piece

Pallas' most recent sculpture, Son of Bird on a Perch, a working name subject to change, sits in the corner, feathers flipping and lights blinking in response to the sounds in the garage. He says he plans to change the sculpture because he thinks it's boring.

"Good art doesn't go stale," he says. "It must remain constantly interesting, even if you don't like it. If it's a real work of art you will always notice a new associa-tion in the sculpture." Son of Bird on a Perch has failed to meet this requirement.

Since its founding by the state legislature in 1978, the Youth Sports Institute has already provided over 250 workshops reaching more than 15,000 coaches in communities throughout the state. These workshops not only cover specific techniques on the selected sport, but emphasize first aid, safety, child development, practice and game organization. In addition, hundreds of materials and films are available for

use by community programs.
The Youth Sports Institute is housed at Michigan State University and funded by the state. The major objectives of the institute are: to provide communitybased educational programs for volunteer coaches, officials, administrators and parents; produce printed materials. films, slides, etc., for the community programs; and conduct scientific research involving children who are active in sports. Recently the Institute joined with Michigan Recreation and Parks Association in developing a youth coaches' certification program and a program for all directors of youth

Every year a growing number of youngsters participates in youth sports programs throughout the state. Thousands enjoy programs run by re-creation departments, public and pri-vate organizations. A growing controversy among parents, educators and community leaders is whether athletic competition is good for growing

youngsters. The Michigan state legislature, in response to those concerns over youth sports programs, established a committee to investigate programs throughout the state Individuals from Lake Superior State College, Michigan, Michigan State University and Wayne State University formed this committee and began the three-phase study in 1976 which culminated in the birth of the YSI
