Freshman representative is confident

U.S. Rep. Dennis Hertel is disappointed at the loss of Grosse Pointe Park and Grosse Pointe City from his 14th District in the 1982 reapportionment even though he did not carry either of those communities in 1980.

In an interview with the Grosse Pointe News, the congressman said he would have preferred simple additions of area and population to his district rather than the shifts ordered by a panel of federal judges. Reapportionment was required after the 1980 census to accommodate population shifts within the state and Michigan's failure to grow as rapidly as some other states, a fact that cost the state one congressman in 1982.

The Detroit Democrat, who feels very fortunate to be the first freshman congressman from this state in this century to be unopposed for reelection, covered a number of other issues in his review of his record with the News. Among them were:

• He voted against the recent federal tax increase bill because he felt "the bad outweighed the

• He supports President Reagan on "about two-thirds" of his bud-

tions in social programs.

• He favors continued buildup of conventional weapons but thinks the Pentagon "is spending unwisely because it has so much money available.

• He believés all government programs, for social purposes as well as defense, should be monitored closely for fraud, abuse and

• He thinks that overall the President's economic program "doesn't add up" because he is trying to do too many things at the same time.

WITH RESPECT TO reapportionment, Hertel knew the 14th District would have to be revamped because it had lost population. But because he had spent time and money getting acquainted with and seeking support in all five Pointes, he would have preferred to have kept them in his district even though they voted for his 1980 GOP foe. From a political point of view, he said, he would have preferred not to have lost some of his territory in Detroit, as well as in the Pointes, and didn't ask for such shifts as a new area of Warren that replaces another part of that city in his district and the expansion out to Hazel Park and Madison Heights.

Hertel admits, however, that his district now has a heavier Democratic vote than under the old reapportionment. He doesn't object to that but does point out that there are more Democratic voters, proportionately, in the Park and the City, which were cut from gressional district lines but added his district, than in the Farms, Shores and Woods, which remain

> As might be expected from a congressman who has a free ride to a second term, Hertel in general took a conciliatory and nonpartisan tone in his discussions with the News. He even expressed sympathy with the Pointers who feel that the Pointes should have remained in one district because they constitute one community.

> He pointed out he has proportionately more Pointers on his staff than other areas of his district provide, gets more volunteer workers from the Pointes and Harper Woods and receives a heavier load of mail from the Pointes than the other parts of the district, considering their relative populations.

THE HIGHER income and educational levels of the Pointe residents and their more conservative views on some issues tend to put them in somewhat different categories than voters in the rest of his predominantly Democratic

taxes, the environment and defense spending, they differ only in degree from his other constituents, Hertel believes.

When the News interviewed the congressman last year, he said he could support about two-thirds of the President's programs. Now he says he would still support twothirds of the Republican President's budget cuts he would differ with him on the extent of his reductions in sociai programs.

He agrees with Reagan that there is still fraud and abuse in many government agencies and all should be scrutinized, whether they are social programs or the defense department. And he thinks Congress itself should cut out the boondoggles, such as the Corps of Engineers projects demanded by individual congressmen and serving the needs of only a few people.

Hertel explained he "could have voted for" the recent tax increase but decided to vote no because "the bad outweighed the good." Furthermore, the bill was passed in a marathon weekend session during which it was difficult if not impossible for even members of Congress to learn all of the provisions in the compromise mea-

State trappers see moths in area

State Agriculture Department officials said they think they found gypsy moths in the Grosse Pointe-Harper Woods area this year. They won't be sure until later this month whether the numbers of moths found in the area warrant a search for a possible infestation, they added.

Traps were set last June and collected last month and yielded a number of moths that could be gypsy moths, department regional supervisor Carl Dollhopf said. The moths have been sent to entymologists for positive identification, he added.

"I'M HESITANT TO give any numbers until an entymologist has confirmed that they are gypsy moths." Dollhopf said. "There are two other similiar moths and we want to be sure.'

Dollhopf said traps in Harper Woods, Grosse Pointe Woods and the Shores yielded moths in numbers. Pending confirmation of their findings, Dollhopf said the next step for the department will be to come up with a procedural plan to discover any possible infestations.

Finding moths in a trap doesn't mean there is an infestation, he pointed out. The traps are meant to capture only male moths. A yard-by-vard search of areas where moths are found will determine the state's next step increased monitoring or pesticide spraying.

Male gypsy moths are strong flyers, he said, and can be carried by high winds to an area where there are traps. The flightless female is what the department's search will look for.

Female moths lay eggs in the same area they were hatched. Dollhopf said. A yard-by-yardsearch literally leaves no stone unturned, he added, because egg masses can be attached to lawn chairs, woodpiles, eaves and downspouts and almost anything

masses could warrant a spraying program to kill the insects. Dollhopf said. The likely pesticide used would be Sevin. he noted. which has completely wiped out moth populations in areas where it has been used. Although fought in other cities. Dollhopf said Sevin was the safest of the pesticides used to combat the gypsy moth.

Spraying in Grosse Pointe could raise problems because of its location near the water. Dollhopf said. For possible infestations near the lake, other eradication methods may have to be used.

Talk of spraying is premature. Dollhopt said, since the department hasn't even determined whether they have found moths or

THE GROSSE POINTE Shade Tree Council put together an education program earlier this year to help residents learn what kinds of problems were involved with gypsy moths. The group's hotline number has had good response. council representative Jean Rice

Rice said she handled about 30 calls, one of which warranted a follow-up investigation by the Agriculture Department. Most calls were for information about the moths, which have defoliated millions of acres of forests in the East and Northeast, or to report sightings of another pest, the Eastern Tent Caterpillar, Rice said. The larvae of the two insects are similiar, she added.

Education helped keep many of the traps in place, she said. One of the worries the Shade Tree Council had when it first discussed its program was making sure the traps stayed where they belonged. Rice said.

Posters in public and private schools, letters to residents, slide shows, lectures and a cable television program titled "Where Has The Shade Gone?" kept the public informed enough to make sure the traps stayed in place, she added.

of unemployment benefits and the aid to Michigan on its unemploy-ment benefit debt to the federal treasury, he wanted a 13-week extension rather than a 10-week extension in benefits. He also opposed provisions that apparently will bar the Michigan unemployed whose benefits had run out prior to June 6 from qualifying for the extended benefits.

"These limitations in effect watered down the strongest points being made by Michigan sup-porters for the tax bill," he con-

Hertel didn't support the withholding of taxes on dividends and interest, required under the new tax bill, which he sees as mainly an effort to collect such taxes earlier and thus benefit the federal treasury. He said 89 percent of the recipients of dividends and interest now pay their taxes on such payments and many of the 11 per-

cent who don't pay receive only small amounts of dividends and interest which are not reported to the Internal Revenue Service by those making the payments.

Overall, the Democratic congressman does not believe that the President's economic program 'adds up.'' He said, "You can't have tax cuts as massive as those approved a year ago, huge increases in defense spending and then expect to balance the budget by cutting social programs." He feels he was consistent this year in voting against the tax hikes because he had voted against the tax cuts a year ago

As a member of the Armed Services Committee, as was his predecessor, Lucien Nedzi, Hertel supports a buildup of conventional weapons but feels that the defense establishment is "spending un wisely because it has so much to

HE BELIEVES THE public has supported the Reagan administration's general buildup of U.S. defenses but thinks that because the Pentagon has gone too far, especially with proposals for some highly complex and extremely expensive weaponry, the pendulum of support is swinging against huge increases in defense spending.

Overall, Hertel appeared to be more self-confident and more sophisticated about Washington than in his interview a year ago. He obviously was in a conciliatory mood and wasn't angry at anyone. And why should he be? He was unopposed in the primary and doesn't face any opposition in November, which means he has a clear track to at least two more years in Washington.



(Continued from Page 1A) workshop or special education program. The aim of the group home approach is to simulate a family setting that fulfills the emotional as well as physical and medical needs of the patients.

The community advisory council was formed to oversee the creation of the group home and may actually operate the home, according to Carol Igoe, council and ARC member. The group is working with representatives from the Southgate Regional Center for Developmental Disabilities who are assisting the ARC on public relations and community education and advising the group on licensing procedures and financ-

Jean Krane, Southgate Center community relations representative, said she is pleased with the way the local organization is working. "Most often, we have to go out and form a group like this before we can even begin looking for a site,"Ms. Krane said. "Here. we have a community organization that has come to us for help. That is very unusual.'

Ms. Igoe said the local ARC has

a waiting list of 35 persons who are ready for group home placement. She said the council has inspected several homes in the area to determine if they would be appropriate group home sites and that decision is expected shortly after Oct. 1.

THERE ARE currently no group homes in Grosse Pointe, but the state tried to open one last year on Bedford Road in Grosse Pointe Park. That home was opposed in Wayne County Circuit Court by residents who charged the state violated its own rules requiring notification of residents about its intent to open a home. The home was stopped by Judge Robert Colombo who declared the lease signed between the homeowner, a former state mental health employe, and the state to be null and void. The lease on the home was reportedly the most expensive for a facility of its type in the state.



"We don't wait for the audience to come to us. We go out and develop the audience," Rachlevsky said. "We've introduced many new people to classical music that way. Once I get them in, they keep coming back.

The Grosse Pointe story is just part of the Renaissance success saga. The organization plans to produce more than 120 concerts this season, including the unusual Nightcap with Mozart series on



Rent-a-fish in the Park

In America, a land where anything and everything is possible, you can now rent a fish. Or fishes, as the case may be. And we're not talking about your average guppy in a goldfish bowl either.

At the Classic Aquaria shop, located in the Engineer Building at 15524 Mack Avenue, Suite 300, you can rent (and also buy) ultra modernistic aquariums stocked with exotic fresh water fish from the Philippines, Bangkok, Sri Lanka and other intriguing coun-tries with names you can't pro-

We've found that many people approach aquariums like they do houseplants," said Frank Kulesza, president of Classic Aquaria. They want them around because they love them, but they end up killing them off through neglect or over maintenance. We take care of that problem.

For a rental fee varying from \$35 to \$65 a month, homeowners (also restaurants, bars, doctor's offices, etc.) can rent an aquarium completely stocked with practically any variety of fish de-

Kulesza's company provides the aquarium, pump, filter, air tube, light, flora, extension cords and cleaning magnets. They'll come once a month and clean the tank, vacuum the gravel, replenish the food supply and replace any fish that may have gone belly up.

For a \$20 monthly fee, they'll provide the same services to customers who purchase fish and aquariums from them instead of aquariums. Purchase prices vary from \$135 to \$650.

For many persons, half the fun is selecting the fish, then the type of aquarium they'll live in. The selection is large, varying from free standing octagon or triangular shaped models standing up to 80 inches tall and coffee table models that turn a functional hobby into a unique conversation piece.

Others include "bubble" aquariums. These are fish tanks with a large "bubble" bulging from the side that magnifies the size of the fish, helping to create an illusion of extended space.

Another favorite is the "Sea

View," in which a stark contrast is created by the black back panel that frames the fish in a shadow box effect. All lights are hidden away, creating a "lit from within" effect, highlighting the fish to their best advantages.

Self-employed must file for tax

Self-employed persons and business expenses connected with people who earn extra income in self-employment should be aware that such income must be especially reported in order to count for Social Security purposes, according to James T. Moslener, district manager of the local Social Security Office.

In fact, Social Security taxes may be due even if a person does not owe any income tax, Moslener said. As long as a person has net self-employment income of \$400 or more, he or she must file a federal income tax return and pay Social Security taxes, he said.

The tax on self-employment income is reported on Schedule C (Profit or Loss from Business or Profession) and Schedule SE (Computation of Social Security Self-Employment Tax), available from any Internal Revenue Ser- It can mean higher payments for vice office. Calendar year selfemployment tax returns for 1981 must be filed by April 15, 1982.

People receive Social Security credit for self-employment income only if net earnings from self-emfigure is acquired by deducting all number at 493-1111.

the self-employment activity.

Social Security self-employment taxes for 1981 were paid on earnings up to \$29,700, at a rate of 9.30 percent. People who have both wages and self-employment income should pay first on their wages — which are usually automatically deducted by the employment and then include their ployer - and then include their self-employment earnings up to the maximum taxable earnings.

People who paid taxes on the maximum wages covered by Social Security do not pay Social Security tax on the additional income earned in self-employment. Moslener said.

Because Social Security benefits are based on the amount of earnings a person has credited to his or her Social Security record, it is important to report all earnings. retirement or for the family in case of disability or death, Moslener noted.



Firm recommends Mack-Vernier changes

By Mike Andrzejczyk

The Mack-Vernier intersection is well-designed, but could use some improvements to make it safer, according to a traffic study presented to the Woods council at its Monday, Aug. 16, meeting.

The 36-page report compiled by consulting engineers Goodell-Grivas, Inc. cited heavy use by pedestrians as reasons for making the improvements at the intersec-

We have found the design of the intersection good," the study introduction read, "and the overall accident experience is quite low compared with other signalized intersections of similiar traffic volume.

'However, due to the large number of crossing pedestrians from the two nearby schools," the study continued, "we felt that several improvements could be made to reduce the potential for accidents.

Nine recommendations from the study include changes in signage, payement parking additions, signal length changes and modification of crossing guard routines.

Crossing guards at the corner were "conscientious and energetic in performing their tasks," the study said, but were unable to stop some cars that did not yield to pedestrians while making right turns onto Vernier.

Motorists at the corner are a major problem, the study said. On-site observers recounted incidents where pedestrians were forced to jump back onto the curb or delay crossing the street because motorists failed to stop for

Applications are available by calling SEMTA at the same number. A one-inch square photo of the person applying must accompany the application.

To date, more than 6,000 seniors and handicapped citizens own and use the reduced fare passes in the tri-county area.

the study said. "The crossing guards were often able to 'hold' the right-turners, but many motorists did not respect or adhere to the crossing guards.

To combat that, the study recommended selective enforcement by police and the changing of signal timing to allow for two to three seconds of "all-red" allowing pedestrians a chance to cross

Pedestrians crossing against the signal was another problem cited by the study. The worst offenders, according to the study, were Par-cells students, although the study said 80 percent of them crossed properly

The schools and the city should continue education and enforcement programs along with installing another set of crosswalk signals in the medians, the study

Changing the placements of crossing guards could stop improper crossings and right-turners, the study recommended.

Two signs on the northeast corner of the intersection obstruct the view of pedestrians and motorists and should be either moved or replaced, the study said.

In addition, "No Turn On Red" signs located on three corners should be supplemented with other signs, the study said. Signs in the median or hanging from the signal wire were recommended.

Lane use arrows should be added to right and left turn lanes to reduce the possibility of sideswipe and rear-end collisions, the study recommended.

The corner had only 57 accidents in the last five and a half years, the study noted, and the incidents have been decreasing dur-ing the last four. The number was quite low, the study noted, considering that average daily traffic on Vernier was 28,099 vehicles, while average daily traffic on Mack was

The accident rate could be cut in half if all the recommendations are taken, the study added. Other recommendations were considered by the company, but the final nine were those considered most cost-effective.

The study was started after school officials, parents and Parent-Teacher Organization members came before the Woods council earlier this year. The group asked the city to install a flashing school crossing sign on Mack to enhance the safety of the corner. The suggestion, the group said, came from former Public Safety Director John Dankel

After machinations between the city and the Wayne County Road Commission, the Woods council decided to have the study of the corner done, looking for ways to improve the safety of the corner.

Ross Kogel, president pro-tem of the Parcells PTO and one of those who asked for the study, said he was pleased with it, adding the concern of parents had



Prime Time-

For Senior Citizens-Marian Trainer

So you forgot where you put your keys and you can't remember if your luncheon date is tomorrow or next week. You sigh and remind yourself that poor memory is one of the penalties you pay for living a long life.

Sorry but that excuse won't wash anymore. Experts have found that the difference in what older people remember and the young remember is very small. In a study done by Roger Dixon of the Max Planck Institute for Human Behavior and Education in West Berlin, the abilities of people in their 30 s to recall a short text was compared with those in their 60's. It was found that given equal ability in high verbal skills, there was little difference.

Beyond the assurance that poor memory is not part of the aging process, such studies provide evidence that older people can go on learning as long as the desire to acquire new skills and interests remains. It may be that it is possible for them to get more out of learning because they bring to the subject a background of living experience

The older person who has lived through four wars will have a effect of war on people and nations than a younger student time you meet him. whose acquaintance with American history is limited to lectures and the written word.

The Grapes of Wrath" studied as literature will have more meaning to a reader who has lived through the depression years than one who is experiencing the deprivation and hardships of that era vicariously in a novel.

IT IS THIS portfolio of living experience that could account for the differences that experts found in the process of remembering between younger and older people. They found that younger people remembered the facts of a story but older people were better at remembering the point of a story. This seems to be logical since younger people have little to go on but facts while someone that has lived many years can computerize. facts into their subconscious memory, sort them into a pattern that leads to a conclusion based on their life experience.

And what a wealth of experi-

ence the older generation of the 1980's have to draw on. If there is one word that characterizes this century, it is change -- a change so rapid that is remarkable that those who have fived through it member is an asset in learning have been able to assimilate it. Besides the personal changes that occur in everyone's life -- births. marriages, deaths, good times and bad - there were the rapid changes brought by technology.

Is it possible for someone who has not experienced it to understand the thrill of hearing music with earphones attached to an oatmeal box wound with copper wire and equipped with a cat whisker to bring in sound? This was the forerunner of the modern stereo radio with its high fidelity sound. Is it possible to imagine watching the first television set with a "bubble" attachment to enlarge the picture?

sonal neighbors. But, however meaningful these findings concerning the capacity of older people to remember -and it could be very encouraging to those who are contemplating much to help with the problem of retrieving misplaced keys or forgotten luncheon dates beyond the assurance that such memory lapses are common to all ages.

However, there are techniques which work for younger people who have trouble remembering and should work for those with added years also.

ONE OF THE MORE successful methods for remembering touted by experts is that of association. For instance, you might be introduced to a Mr. Lambey. You are impressed with his quiet, gentle manner. You want to remember him by name so you associate his broader base of understanding the name with a "lamb". Fine, just don't call him Mr. Lamb the next

Another example — Mr. My-kowski, a name that is harder to remember. Broken down his name can become, "my cow skies." Just don't start to laugh at this mental picture you have created every time you meet Mr. Mykowski.

We generally remember best what we work with most. Consider Grace Hopper, a Navy captain who is still on active duty at the age of 75 because "She's got a computer brain and the Navy can't do without her." She is on the Admiral's staff at the Naval Data Automation Command at

Washington, D.C. "My job," she said, "is to look ahead and see what's going to happen next. It's very exciting." Hopper joined the Navy 39 years

was very lucky," she went on. "I was ordered to be the first Navy computer.

It is obvious that Captain Hopper's acumen has been kept alive by continued activity in her field, time and age have not diminished her memory capacity.

Closely aligned with memory is intelligence. The capacity to renew skills and assimilating knowledge gained from exper However making sound judgements rests with intelligence.

It is good to know that memory does not decline with age but it is just as reassuring to know that age does not affect intelligence.

According to a study done by Raymond B. Cattell and John L. Horn, intelligence consists of two kinds of abilities. One is related to the functioning of the nervous system and can be measured by tests of reasoning. This is known as fluid intelligence.

The other is defined as the ability to use habits of judgement based on experience, in order to solve problems. These habits have taken definite form as a result of earlier learning. This is called crystallized intelligence and includes an awareness of concepts contained in general information and knowledge of special fields.

OLDER PERSONS did better on tests for crystallized intelligence but did not surpass young participants on fluid intelligence. This is not surprising since the test involved the nervous system. While the ability to think quickly may slow down with age, intelligence does not diminish. It just takes a little longer for older people to

solve problems. The study also found that when intelligence did decline during the postretirement years it was generally because they were made to feel left out. It was found that society sometimes encourages older people to play the "sick" role, a role that exempts them from his or her normal obligations. This low expectation attitude actually discourages perfectly capable people from engaging in activities requiring independence and com-

petence. An older person who succumbs to that role may come to view themselves as helpless and dependent. This self-image and behavior, in turn reinforces society's prejudices. A vicious circle begins. The older person, deprived of self-confidence and beset by self-doubts, reinforces an image of lowered intelligence when actually the same potential is there, needing only self-motivation.

Do memory and intelligence decline with age? The answer is no, particularly at this point in time when older people enjoy greater bealth and vigor and are better educated than their predecessors.

The old order changeth

a rezoning of his Lakeshore estate, the Grosse Pointe Farms Council sought to calm the fears of Pointe residents worried about the precedent that would be set and the increased density of dwelling units that would result from construction of cluster housing on the property.

In discussing Ford's plan with a crowd of concerned property owners that packed the council chambers, Farms officials made it clear that approval of Ford's application would not automatically mean acceptance of every future request. They insisted each application would be considered on its merits and, as Councilman Nancy Waugaman said, "Every person with a half acre of land is not going to be able to rezone it for cluster housing.

IN ADDITION, in her motion to accept the Ford proposal, Ms. Waugaman stipulated that the dwelling density on the Ford property could be no more than the 2.3 units per acre shown on the plan presented to the council. Under the cluster housing provisions of the zoning regulations currently in effect, density could have been as high as 4.5 units per acre.

Both Ford and his developer, William Caldwell, made it clear that they wanted a quality project which would have low dwelling density and would retain most of the trees as well as the swimming pool and pool house on the property. In answer to questions about future changes in the development plan, Caldwell said no plan is ever cast in stone but any major deviation would be brought back to the council for its approval.

Even with those assurances about precedent, housing density and possible plan changes, some residents of the Farms and the other Pointes were not especially happy about the proposal to replace Ford's 76-room mansion with 18 units of two-bedroom and three-bedroom dwellings in a cluster housing complex. Several people expressed concern that Lakeshore Road no longer would remain one of the finest streets in America, as it was described by one resident, if construction of the new development goes ahead.

Yet it is difficult to argue against the case that Ford and Caldwell made in their presentation to the council. Ford pointed out that after he had been unable to sell his home, he began working with Caldwell to see what could be done with the property. That is when they came up with the cluster housing development which Ford described as a "quality, innovative-type

Before approving Henry Ford II's request for project" where owners could "lock up their homes and leave them, worry-free, for two months if they wished." Nor is the project apt to lower nearby property values if it is developed as planned with units starting at about \$300,000 each.

> The question is what, if any, are the possible alternatives to the kind of development that Ford proposed. None has been offered to date.

> Realistically, it has to be conceded that the demand for mansions the size of Ford's home is limited. As Ms. Waugaman said, "It would be nice to see the big homes remain on Lakeshore. mansions sitting 300 feet back on four or five acres of land. But those days are gone. Nobody can afford to maintain that lifestyle any more. At least this way the property is utilized and the council still has control over the situation."

It is also reassuring that the council and Pointe residents have Ford's own promise that he plans to stay with the development project until it is completed. Depending on when work can get underway, Caldwell said it probably would take two and a half years to complete construction, which would mean, he said, if it were started early next year it could be completed in 1985. Ford presumably would remain involved in the project until all the units were built and sold.

As the project goes ahead, however, the Farms Council will have a continuing responsibility to make sure the development proceeds as planned. While Ford said he already had calls from two people who wanted to make down payments on the new housing units, nobody can guarantee how quickly the dwellings can be built and sold. Even in the Rose Terrace development, only 17 of 25 units have been built and the condition of the undeveloped lots leaves something to be desired. Yet measures can be taken to require completion of construction as rapidly as possible and thus reassure nearby residents.

THE FORD ESTATE is not the first on Lakeshore to be subdivided or developed. Yet it is always sad to see "the old order changeth, yielding place to new," as Tennyson observed. As more and more of the beautiful old mansions fronting on Lake St. Clair along lovely Lakeshore Road come down, the community's hope is that the new homes that replace the old ones will have a beauty, quality and charm of their own. In the case of his own property, Ford appears to have pledged to seek that goal in his cluster housing development.

From Another Pointe Of View

You all know how fast your autumn calendars fill up after Labor Day, so make a point to circle Friday, Oct. 8, RIGHT NOW because you definitely don't want to miss the first in a series of benefit events to support the John Lake Scholarship Fund: a program featuring Josephine Brummel, concert pianist — and wife of Grosse Pointe Superintendent of Schools Kenneth Brummel.

Ready for a second season of Enlightenment...

the successful Enlightenment Series that opens its second season at the Grosse Pointe War Memorial this month. And this season the ideas will cover an even broader scope as MICHAEL FARRELL, of the Detroit Institute of Arts and Windsor University, joins popular lecturer Sherwin Wine, director of the Center for New Thinking, and a panel of best selling authors in this fall's new program. Previewing Farrell's presentation recently at the DIA was KAY HEALY, a member of the Council of Sponsors established last year to help the War Memorial expand its programming to meet community needs which are not being met by other organizations. The opening set of this year's provocative Enlightenment discussions will take place at 8 p.m. on three successive Wednesday evenings, beginning Sept. 22. In these, Farrell will display his remarkable facility for relating art to the social, political, economic and psychological aspects of the culture and period in which it was created. Under the overall title "Art of the Bourgeoisie" he will explore the influence of the rising middle classes on the development of three

Ideas that stretch the mind are once again the substance of periods of art: The Renaissance in Italy, Dutch Art in the 17th Century and French Art in the 19th Century. The talks can be expected to provide startling new perspectives - not all completely reverent — on the significance of many works of art that have long been revered as masterworks. Immediately following Farrell's final program, the Enlightenment Series will continue on Thursdays with three of Rabbi Wine's popular discussions of subjects dealt with in current best selling books. Farrell is a well known art historian whose competence and charisma have made him a popular lecturer. Washington Frisbee Fest is an end-of-summer fling June wedding

It's Labor Day weekend in Washington, D.C. Thousands of people are gathered on the National Mall — pic-nicking, playing softball or just plain

relaxing.
Suddenly, a bright blue and silver saucer-shaped object whizzes by, quickly followed by a larger, orange disc, then one with a weird greenish hue. In a few seconds the sky is filled with hundreds of brightly colored spinning discs, all appearing to converge on the United States Capitol.

Don't head for cover! It's not an invasion by an alien space-age army or even a friendlier visit from a group of extra-terrestrial tourists. It's only the "big throw," the grand finale of the Smithsonian Institution's annual Frisbee Disc Festival, the world's largest non-competitive disc event.

The festival, sponsored by the National Air and Space Museum, includes much more than this massive fling. Featured during the five-hour festivities are workshops and exhibitions of disc tricks and moves by disc champions, both the human and canine kind. It's a day when young and old, novice and expert, can learn or perfect the tosses and catches that make Frisbee disc play one of America's favorite pastimes.

The festival was begun in the spring of 1977 at the suggestion of Bill Good, a member of the museum's art de-partment staff and a Frisbee disc en-

"The Smithsonian was already holding annual kite and boomerang festivals," Good recalls. "I thought the Frisbee Disc Festival would be an appropriate addition. And as for the air and space connection, a disc is really a combination of an airplane wing and

gyroscope." Explains Donald Lopez, chairman of the museum's aeronautics department: "A disc has an airfoil shape -slightly rounded on the top and flat on the bottom. The shape gives it lift when it's moving, the rotation keeps it stable and the angle at which it is thrown gives it direction.'

Sounds simple enough, but there's more to disc-flipping than meets the uninitiated eye. The faster the for-ward motion of a Frisbee disc and the greater its attitude (the angle at which it flies), the greater the lift and the longer the flight," Frisbee disc experts Mark Danna and Dan Poynter write in "Frisbee Players' Handbook'

(Parachuting Publications, 1978). "It's the same principle as an air-plane's wing. When the leading edge of a forward moving wing is tilted upward, air is compressed underneath it. When the speed of a Frisbee disc slows, the disc levels out because the air pressure above and below it becomes the same.

An entire vocabulary has grown up to describe some of the nuances of Frisbee disc aerodynamics, but even the experts admit that the precise aerodynamic basis of why a disc can fly has yet to be explained.

But Frisbee disc aficionados don't seem to worry about physics and aerodynamics as they practice perfecting their disc skills at the festival's workshops. The beginner workshops concentrate on the basic toss and catch skills which, once mastered, are used to perform more advanced disc moves. Intermediate and advanced workshops focus on "fancy tricks," in-cluding "nail delays," where the disc spins on the nail of the index finger, and "chest rolls," which involve rolling the disc from one hand across the body, down the other arm and into the

opposite hand. The object of all these maneuvers. of course, is to keep the disc spinning, and all advanced moves are guaranteed to impress any audience a disc spinner can muster.

When the workshops break, everyone's off to find a prime spot on the Mall for viewing the freestyle and canine exhibitions: the most popular events at the festival. The freestyle portion features World Class Frisbee Disc Champions who combine dance steps with disc moves to create a unique performance involving grace. style and disc play expertise.

In a typical routine, a performer reels a disc in close to the body and releases it with a quick snap of the wrist, from behind the head or under the leg. Or a disc may be released upside down when the performer is in mid-air.

The disc silently sails through the hot, humid, summer air only to be "finger-tipped," "air-brushed" and "toe-jammed" — all special tricks — before it is finally caught and quickly sent spinning away to a partner who will spontaneously perform a totally new set of moves

new set of moves.

Then there are those amazing dogs who appear to have invisible wings as they leap to heights of up to nine feet to catch spinning discs between their jaws. Most dogs have been trained since they were pups, when their first taste, literally, of Frisbee disc play was at meal time: their food was served from an upside-down disc.

Amid all this tossing, catching, leaping and continuous spinning, at least one pie tin always turns up in the act, a nostalgic link to what some people claim are the origins of the Frisbee disc: the Frisbie Pie Company of Bridgeport, Conn. Shortly after World war II, so the story goes, young men at Yale University are said to have tossed empty pie tins across the cam-

pus yelling "Frisbie" in an attempt to warn fellow students of a possible on-

Other stories link the first flying disc to Elihu Frisbee, another Yalie, who, in 1827, flung a collection plate across the campus to protest compul-

sory chapel attendance.

The first flying discs as we know them today, however, were developed in the early 1950s by inventors around the country who were experimenting with a new synthetic material: plastic. One inventor, a building inspector named Fred Morrison, designed and produced the Pipco Flyin' Saucer in his basement.

Morrison sold his discs on the county fair circuit. Actually, he sold "invisible strings" and discs were slid along the "string" to prove its existence. When someone bought a string, the

disc was thrown in as a bonus. In 1957 Morrison sold his saucer to the Wham-O Manufacturing Company, which was also beginning to market another plastic toy, the hoola-hoop. Within a few months the Pluto Platter, a flying disc complete with a cupola, portholes and the names of the planets inscribed around the rim, appeared on the toy scene. Shortly after, in 1958, the Sailing Satellite emerged; coincidentally, that was the year in which the United States launched its own man-made satellite, Explorer I.

And while man-made satellites were making their debut in space, Pluto Platters and Sailing Satellites were making their own debuts on West Coast beaches. Space was no longer an unreachable entity and these small plastic toys were a kind of tonguein-cheek reminder of what could be 'out there.

On May 29, 1959, Frisbee became a registered trademark of Wham-O Manufacturing Company, but like NA-SA's space program, Frisbee discs did not really take off until the mid-1960s. The International Frisbee Disc Association was formed in 1967 to promote appreciation for the Frisbee disc at all levels — from recreation to competition — and, in the early 1970s, organized competitions for field events

got underway.
Since then, Frisbee discs have been seen in the hands of actors, professional athletes and presidents, and they've even been tossed by former astronaut Michael Collins who, as director of the National Air and Space Museum, in 1977 flung the Frisbee disc that began the first festival.







Then, last fall, Garrett and two other National Geographic staff members were permitted to tour the Viet-namese-controlled areas of Kampuchea, including the ancient capital's magnificent ninth to 13th century temples. What they saw there formed the basis for an article, "The Temples of Angkor: Ancient Glory in Stone," that appeared in this May's National Geographic.

It was a lavishly illustrated article, of course, in keeping with National Geographic's tradition of magnificent illustration. The new variety has excellent flavor, contains some vitamin A, is a good keeper and resists greening. Shallow eyes make it less wasteful when peeled; when cut, the flesh also darkens less readily than that of other potatoes. Growers favor Yukon Gold because it matures early and yields

Saginaw and Grand Rapids shoppers will help determine if this all-purpose, European-style potato has a future in the United States. Consumers may accept yellow-fleshed potatoes for all uses or view them mainly as a cur-

If proliferation of products is any indicator, shoppers certainly have put their stamp of approval on processed potato products. A trip to one super-market revealed 27 different frozen potato packs and 15 dehydrated potato products. Planks, wedges, treats and tri-potatoes are some of the more recent product additions. Currently, all these processed products — except for some mashed potato flakes — cost more per serving than fresh potatoes.

Fresh potatoes generally offer a price advantage over processed potatoes in the late summer and fall. This year is no exception. The fall potato crop looks good nationally as

well as in Michigan. Total potato acreage to be harvested

Buttery yellow potatoes without the this fall is estimated at 1,099,700 acres er than last year's record low crop Michigan alone has 48,000 acres in fall potatoes, an increase of 8 to 10 percent over 1981. Most potatoes are still in the ground but preliminary digging reveals potatoes of superior quality and

Fresh potatoes are graded for quality and size. Standards have been tightened, allowing for fewer defects such as cuts, bruises and sprouts. The grade sold in greatest quantity (but not the top grade) is U.S. No. 1. If size is not designated, the minimum for U.S. No. 1 potatoes is 1-7/8 inches in diameter; there is no maximum size. If U.S. No. 1 potatoes are also designated size A. 40 percent of them must be 21/2 inches in diameter.

Consumers will find a wide spread in fresh potato prices now. A recent market check in just one supermarket revealed 10 pounds of Michigan potatoes at \$1.09. Although they were not so marked, these very likely were unclassified.

Unclassified potatoes are essentially upgraded potatoes. They will have more detects and be more variable in size than graded potatoes, but they must be wholesome

A 10-pound bag of U.S. No. 1 Michigan potatoes was priced at \$2.49. A 5-pound bag of the same grade put up by the same packer was just 69 cents, showing than it pays to compare



Donald D. Sfat launches into a new field

The ancient Chinese are credited with the first use of rockets in warfare, though with little success. The Russians, in World War II, fielded the dreaded "Katyusha" rockets for fire support. With the introduction of the Army's new Multiple Launch Rocket System (MLRS), this particular form of weapon has reached a new level of effectiveness and complexity.

Army Pvt. 1 Donald D. Sfat, 21, is one of the first soldiers to work with the new system. While the manufacturer has test fired hundreds of rounds from the MLRS, no soldier has so far had that opportunity.

"I like being among the first in this particular MOS (job spe-cialty)," said Sfat, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ty P. Sfat, of Balfour Road, "and having a part in determining the system's capabilities. I have a real case of anticipation. I'm looking forward to going to White Sands this month and actually getting to fire this thing. We've learned a lot about it, but putting rockets downrange is going to be the real test of that.'

Sfat, an MLRS crewman with he 3rd Battalion, 6th Artillery also said that he likes being stationed at Fort Sill, home of the Army Field Artillery School, because "of the many activities and educational opportunities av-

Construction work is a risky business

tools, overturning ladders, collapsing walls and scaffolds are some of the more obvious dangers to life and limb of the construction worker. Adding invisible but more insidious hazards, such as unacceptable levels of noise which can impair hearing and expo-sure to noxious dust or vapors which can cause illness, make working in the building industry high on the list of dangerous occupations Between 1970 and 1979, International

abor Organization statistics show that while the rate of fatal accidents in the construction industry declined slightly in the majority of reporting countries in Africa, the Americas, Asia, Europe and Oceania, it increased in several others.

For example: in the Republic of Korea one construction worker in every 2,000 was killed in an accident at his place of work in 1979. The pic-ture was grimmer in the same year in Guatemala, where four workers in every 2,000 suffered a fatal accident.

These statistics, however, do not tell the whole story. By far the most frequent are the non-fatal accidents which can result in disability and loss of employment, causing untold human suffering, and in the end are costly for both the employer and the public

Many of these mishaps are the result of poor design, human error or carelessness and could be prevented by following certain safety and health precautions, including hygiene, first aid procedures and medical care, according to a compendium of occupa-tional safety and health practices in the building industry prepared by the International Labor Office in Geneva.

This 256-page work supplements an earlier ILO Code of Practice on the subject and recommends comprehensive, practical measures to make the operators of building machines usu-

Falling beams, carelessly dropped construction industry safer and heal-

The compendium stresses the wide range of operations covered in the construction industry - such as excavations and earth moving, building in timber and brick and the use of prefabricated units - and that, with each new project, the workplace changes. This brings specific, often unforeseen, hazards which are sometimes increased by the use of unskilled labor. Falls are one of the main hazards of

the building industry . . . falls into trenches, falls from high structures. scaffolds or ladders, falls on the flat caused by litter in workplaces. The ILO compendium calls for "exceptional importance" to be given to "precautions against falls of persons. irrespective of the height of a possible fall. A considerable number of persons are killed by falling from only low

heights."
Exposure to various types of dusts or vapors can produce acute or chronic effects on the central nervous system or may result in lung diseases such as pneumoconioses which may take five to 10 years to appear and can be fatal. To counter this occupational hazard (which occurs in the building industry sectors of mining or quarry ing, blasting with quartz sand and work on furnace masonry) special care must be taken, the compendium says, to effectively exhaust the dust at its source and to make use of respiratory protective equipment. Periodical medical examinations should also be

made mandatory. Both technical and personal protective measures can be taken to reduce the harmful effects of another occupational hazard for construction workers: noise. Noise is generally considered to be harmful when it exceeds 85 decibels and noise levels for

1/2 cup to a sted slivered almonds Fresh mint sprigs (optional)

Place half the lettuce in the bottom of a large glass bowl. Lightly sprinkle with lemon juice any fruits that have a tendency to turn dark. Spread honeydew melon batts over lettuce, followed by strawberries, then sliced peaches and lastly the blueberries. Cover the fruit with the remaining cup of lettuce.
