The number of homes and residents affected by the proposed changes of the lots, which are immediately adjacent to the businesses on both sides of Mack to the city limits, was unknown. City officials refused to release the addresses of the homes involved pending their notification by mail

sometime this week.

THE ZONING change would allow the use of the lots for development as off-street parking by businesses, according to Woods Councilman Thomas Fahrner, chairman of the Joint Council-Planning Commission Zoning Committee.

The city was prompted to consider the changes, in committee for almost a year, because of studies of the area that found parking was deficient, he said. The Wayne County Road Commission also hinted it may eliminate street parking along Mack Avenue to clear up congestion, Fahrner

"If it comes out favorably, I think everyone will be happy with the changes," Fahrner said. "I don't think people realize that if we lose Mack, we lose the city.'

Parking along the north end of Mack is already sorely deficient, according to a study titled "A Blight Prevention Study for Mack Avenue," compiled by Gerald Luedtke and Associates.

Parking places along Mack vary in areas from 5 to 25 per business, but still leave some businesses, particularly those on the west side of Mack between Roslyn and Hollywood, deficient by as many as 75 spaces, according to the

The study did not count municipal lots, and calculated parking spaces for a business by requiring one space per 150 square feet of business area.

The proposed zoning changes would allow businesses to buy the lots if they were for sale, clear them and develop parking lots that meet the city's zoning ord-inance, Fahrner said, without having to come before the council for special approval to develop offstreet parking.

The city would not buy or take the property involved, Fahrner said. Under the zoning ordinance's grandfather clause," the houses would remain on the lots and could be bought and sold for residential uses until a buyer decided to develop a parking lot.

Some houses are already up for sale, and some businesses have already expressed interest in bidding on the property to make room for expansion and parking, Fahrner said

THE ZONING change means the houses become "non-conforming legal uses" if approved, according to a planning consultant. The homes could stay, be painted, remodeled, renovated or rehabilitated, he said, but additions to the structure of the home, such as dens and family rooms, would not

Residents of the affected homes may find their property values increase, however, even though they can't add on to the existing house. the planning consultant said. In the past, he said, homeowners who find themselves rezoned for different uses find their property is worth more

That land and house could be worth more as a parking lot than as a home," the consultant added. Interest in the property is assured because of the business pressure to expand parking, while the present market for homes make it difficult to find a buyer, he noted.

At the same time property value increases, however, property taxes, based on that value, will also increase.

'It has been a long, hard battle" to come up with a working plan for the rezoning because of residents' fears of being displaced for parking lots. Fahrner said. The city, he added, doesn't want (Continued on Page 2A)

Schools hold line on taxes

At a time when some school officials across the state are wringing their hands to find a way to stay in business because of declining revenues, the Grosse Pointe Board of Education has proposed a rollback of its millage rate. leaving residents paying the same amount of taxes this year as they did last year. And the school system will still be left with a \$1.5 million surplus.

The move to reduce the tax rate will offset increases in local property assessments of between 9 and

AT A PUBLIC hearing on the school millage last week, the administration proposed reducing the millage rate by 4.8 mills from leaving a total levy of 28.05 mills.

The new millage rate will allow the school system to collect the same amount of taxes it collected last year from local property owners, about \$30.7 million. (A mill equals \$1 for every \$1,000 assessed valuation which is half of market value.)

SCHOOL OFFICIALS noted that those rates will leave the system with \$1.5 million in surplus funds. but warned that amount may be whittled down by state budget cuts, a drop in interest rates and the outcome of current negotiations with three school employe

When trustees wrapped up final adoption of their \$31 million budget last June, the board postponed setting its tax rebate until negotiations with all employe groups were settled.

Since the last millage election two years ago, the board has consistently reduced its tax rate each year. The school system will conduct its next millage election this

about the leak. "I wonder if there's anything at all we can talk about in closed session that won't be made public. This puts us at a real disadvantage," he said.

"I'm all in favor of open meetings — I think people should know what we're doing," Graham said.
"But the (opening meetings) act does allow us to meet in closed session to talk about negotiations, law suits and real estate purchases. There are good reasons for that.

'I don't think it's appropriate or ethical for the information to be distributed. But I'm not sure what we can do.

The contracts between the city and manager Crawford as well as Clerk-Comptroller Nunzio Ortisi are currently being reviewed by the council, as they are every year. Crawford is the lowest paid city manager in the five Pointes, making just under \$45,000 a year. The Shores manager makes \$53,400 in addition to free living quarters; the Farms manager makes \$51,800; the Woods manager is paid \$49,000; and City manager receives just over \$48,000, according to information provided by those cities. Those salaries do not include fringe benefit packages which vary from



Common experience demands that all firearms should be kept out of the reach of children and immature or irresponsible adults. Unloaded rifles, shotguns and handguns should at all times be in a rack, cabinet, closet or drawer that is locked. Under some circumstances the method of storage should be such that the firearms cannot be seen. Likewise, cartridges and shells should be locked away and preferably out of

Treat every gun as if it is loaded. This applies to weapons Loaded guns in any household present a greater danger potential than unloaded guns. Usually, the only reason for having a loaded gun in the home is for protection against criminal intruders. However, there are two beliefs on this subject that warrant review.

Some people maintain that no gun should be kept loaded in a home. Instead, when the gun is needed, it and the ammunition can be taken from storage and united at the moment of emergency. On the other hand, people who have been confronted with an emergency that requires a firearm know that the ritual of getting gun and ammunition and bringing them together can be as

defeating as having no gun at all. No matter how certain anyone may feel about his solution, he must make ample allowance for the unexpected that haunts our every pursuit.

While it may seem that instructions and cautions to youngsters are sufficient, in cold reality the gun that is out of sight and behind proper lock is less likely to be the cause of trouble than a gun more readily available.

In short, in the matter of home gun security, it is safer to be overly careful, and to combine instruction and admonitions with a strong lock on a substantial stor-





Getting down and feeling good!

John Gromosaik is heels over head in love with his new boots. Inversion boots, that is, also known as Gravity Boots. John, 28, first saw the boots demonstrated by Richard Gere in the movie American Gigolo.

"I was pretty impressed with the movie," said John, of Neff Road. I saw an ad for the boots and gave a call. I'm a member of the chronic bad back club, and I was hoping the boots would help my condition. So far, they haven't let me down.

John liked the boots so well, he's formed a company called "Positive Flow Marketing Concepts" to make them available to persons on the east side.

The idea of the boots is to use the pull of gravity to help cure what ails you Reportedly, the boots reverse the downward pull of gravity thus relieving backaches and pressures. Blood circulates more rapidly and freely throughout the body and the spine is stretched and relaxed.

John has been using the boots. which resemble heavily padded ankle braces with ski type clamps, plus a welded U-shaped hook, for about three months now. He hangs completely upside down at least three times a day, for about five minutes at a stretch.

John, who's built like a Polish 'Rocky Balboa'' also lifts weights and does a series of exercises

The exercises include toe touches, knee bends, body twists and sitsit-ups is guaranteed stomach muscles that look like charcoal briquets.

"Basically, for me it's a way to get maximum benefit with minimum effort," said John "It strengthens me, aids my bad back and also provides a calming ef-

THE BOOTS ARE manufactured in Sterling Heights by Inversion Command Systems, owned by Paul Wittmer. They start at about \$70, with cross bar and clamps that may be installed in a doorway for an additional \$22. The company also provides a pipe metal Tripod-shaped cross bar support stand that stands about seven feet tall for \$55.

Contrary to popular belief, the boots were not invented by Mussolini near the end of World War II.

Supposedly, the modern forerunner of the gravity boot was invented by weight lifters on Muscle Beach in California in the 1950s. "The weight lifters would take Army boots, cut off the bottoms and then rivet a U-shaped hook on the tops," said Wittmer. "Then they'd hook them over a chin-up bar and do their exercises.

Hanging upside down for the first time is, well, strange. Naturally, everything is out of perspective. It's also disconcerting to talk to another person's ankles. The blood is pounding in your head and you feel very hot and sweaty. The tendency is to feel like a side of very slowly tenderizing beef. Movements are exagGradually, the experience becomes more enjoyable. There's something very calming about swaying upside down like a giant Fruit Bat from the Phillippines.

However, unless you're built like Nadia Comenici, getting back up again can be a problem. That's why Wittmer recommends working out with a partner, until a person gets used to the boots.

"THE FIRST TIME a person tries the system, they're usually a little leery," he said. "Naturally, they're afraid the boots and bar might not support them. They're both capable of handling up to 300 pounds. We also recommend not staying inverted more than a minute or two the first few times people work out. Persons with hang around to answer all calls.



Sagging enrollment

It's no news that American schools are plagued with an epidemic called declining enrollment. The Grosse Pointe school system has not been immune to the

trend, according to enrollment projections by officials.

Last fall administrators said about 8,000 students attended Grosse Pointe's public schools a far cry from the 13,700 students enrolled to years ago. School officials are projecting only 5,000 students will attend Pointe public schools by the 1986-87 school year.

Despite declining enrollment, local school officials insist the quality of education is not following the downward path — at least

'Úp until now we haven't been hurt too much, instructionally," said Robert Welch, director of the secondary curriculum for the Pointe school system. "But obviously with not as many students attending our schools we can't afford to continue offering the same kind of curriculum we have in the

Welch said declining enrollment is forcing school officials to take a close look at ways to continue offering an extensive curriculum. A current study is aimed at examining the kind of curriculum that will be offered in the future if enrollment continues to drop at the present rate, Welch

One option that is being explored is what Welch terms "consortioning," the consolidation of classes between schools in the district. "We have not had to do much of this." he said, "but we do have to think of ways to deal with declining enrollment."

For example, Welch noted a small number of classes have already here corrections to the same and the same already here corrections and to do much said.

Welch cited transportation as a main issue. The only students who can participate in consortioning are those who can drive back and forth between the two schools, Welch said. Actions speak louder...

· Wayne County Sheriff William Lucas showed commission and other county incumbents and evidence last week that he is beginning to pay some attention to the voters' demands for

The new executive, however, will have power to appoint and re-move road commissioners, with the advice and consent of the board of county commissioners, and will also have authority to supervise the road commission's budget. But the road commission is certain to try to kill the Padden bill.

And it probably was.

By and large, most people are quite well satisfied or are waiting for the final report of the citizens' committee on the Future Organization of the Grosse Pointe Public Schools which will be presented in December. Or so the situation

The rest of the wording, also required by law, was hardly a model clarity but this, in effect, is what it means: The board is proposing to increase its general fund by \$649,874 but will exactly balance that amount by cuts of \$121,254 in the library fund and \$528,620 in the debt retirement fund. So the amount of revenue to be raised would remain at the current year's lev-

However, because of a rise in the assessed valuation of property in the school district, the overall millage rate being proposed would decline. The rates would be 26.4684 for the general fund, 0.8900 for the library fund and 0.7000 for the debt retirement fund, making the total rate 28.0584 mills or 4.8985 mills less than the current year's levy.

The board indicated that its current estimate would leave the system with a surplus of approximately \$1.5 million, subject to reductions as a result of current negotiations with three employe bargaining units and further cuts in state aid. Unless new factors arise before next week, the board will approve the proposed levy

The board's legal responsibility

Know Your Schools

nstitution meets in Grosse Pointe the second Monday of every month? Answer: The Grosse Pointe Board of Educa-

In the final column of this series about the responsibilities and function of boards of education, I want to briefly explain how our board discharges its legal responsibility of operating the school system through the actions it takes on the second Monday of each month and at other special meetings.

Since the day-to-day operation of the public schools and libraries requires more attention than can be given by seven elected officials serving on a part-time basis, the board appoints a superintendent as its executive officer and delegates certain responsibilities to that person.

The superintendent implements board policy and acts as an advisor in keeping the board and public informed of the needs and progress of the schools and libraries. The superintendent is available to the board as a professional resource and the superintendent's recommendations normally precede board action on questions relating to personnel matters and business affairs, selection of textbooks and instructional materials, and development of the curriculum, as well as a wide range of other matters.

As a result, board members don't have to be as expert in all phases of school operation as they might otherwise have to be, but can utilize the educational knowledge of the superintendent and staff to make their decisions.

Official business of the board is conducted only in regular or special public meetings and public study sessions are usually held before each regular board meeting to discuss items that will be on the board agenda, as well as other current issues. Advance preparation for each board meeting is of great importance. Such preparation continues over long periods of time through communications from the superintendent to board members, study sessions, public discussions, and when appropriate, executive sessions of the

board. A quorum of four trustees is necessary to conduct any official school district business. In addition to the board, the superinten-

Members of the Grosse Pointe Artists' Association should know this little secret about their new president, George Howell: he once copied the style of great American painter Norman Rockwell. Flagrantly. And with the permission of Rockwell himself.

"My father worked for Curtis Publishing in Philadelphia," How-ell says. "Norman Rockwell came in one day and my dad told him he had a son who liked to copy Rockwell. 'Fine,' Rockwell said, 'I won't sue him.'"

'Young' Norsemen will try to spring Bi-County surprise

By Peggy O'Connor Frank Sumbera and his Norsemen fooled them all.

Sumbera started his rookie season as North's head football coach in 1981 - and most experts figured his squad didn't have a snowball's chance in Haiti of winning even a third of its nine game schedule. Sumbera had just 16 seniors -- and he had to go looking for a few of those. His starting quarterback was a mere sophomore. It looked like a long season for the Norsemen and their rookie coach ... and it started out that way

"At one time we were 24. We could have tanked (given up) but the kids pulled together and we won our last three ball-games to finish at 5-4." One of those wins was a 16-0 shutout of Bi-County runner-up Clinton-

Sumbera says he's pleased with the progress his varsity football charges have made in their weight training and conditioning programs; that, coupled with the way they came back and saved what would have been a disastrous 1981 season. gives him reason to be optimis-

Of course, starting sophomores almost always grow into starting juniors . . . and that is even more reason for optimism. Especially when the starting junior quarterback can only improve on his record-setting sophomore season.

Chris Bingaman started all nine games at quarterback in 1981, setting school records for pass attempts, completions and passing yardage. He is definitely a key to the Norsemen's 1982

"I think he was the reason we won our last three games last year. He has really come on in practice and he's developed leadership qualities. He's gonna be a good one," Sumbera says.

Bingaman will have to be a good one ... he'll be working with an entirely new offensive line. Graduation took last year's offensive linemen, with the exception of Jim Mestdaugh, a starter who has been hampered so far this summer

"That offensive line," Sumbera says of his major weak spot, "has to get there for us to open up the run. Passing-wise we'll be there with Bingaman, one of the best quarterbacks on

Sumbera sums up North's strengths in two words: Dave Bergeron. The 6 foot 5 inch, 225 pounder will play at the offensive right tackle and defensive end spots for Sumbera. He took most valuable player honors as a junior and is sharing co-captain honors with tailback Scott HeClair He's a true blue chip prospect, being heavily recruited by scouts from Michigan, Michigan State and Notre

Bergeron will lead the offensive game and on defense, he'll be helped by seven other returning starters, including 6 foot 2 inch, 225 pound junior Jeff Tischbein and linebackers Dave Babcock and Fred

Will South bounce back from disappointing '81?

The 1981 football season didn't go at all the way South football coach Russ Hepner thought it would. Hepner never dreamed his squad would go from winning the Eastern Michigan League championship in 1980 to suffering through a 4-5 season, the school's first losing record in 10 years.

He had no idea his team would forget how to hold on to the ball — and proceed to be shut out in three games.

But that was 1981 and years like that are best forgotten . . . except to serve as impetus to strive for better years. And that's just what's happened at South High this year.

"That's our first goal, to get back to .500 and on the track to a winning season," says Hep-ner. He adds that the spectre of the Blue Devils' first third place finish in nine seasons (after four championships and four second place finishes) doesn't really hang over the

players, but they are aware of what happened last season.

What happened was that South lost a number of games by one touchdown or less, and losing the close ones takes care of most championship aspira-tions. "We hope to have a stronger running game. Even though we were shut out in those three games, we also had a few games where we scored a lot of points. We had a great passing attack, but we couldn't get our running game going. That passing game can account for some big scores, but you can also get shut out when they close down the pass and you haven't got the run," Hepner

Fortunately for Hepner and the Blue Devils, South's strength lies up front in the so-called "talent" positions: quarterback, split end, fullback, safety and linebackers. Those positions can halp actablish a positions can help establish a good combination of running and passing, something Hepner is depending upon this season.
