

Slides to detail Trowbridge House history

"Past and Present of the Trowbridge House," a slide lecture by Jon Gandelot, will open the Grosse Pointe Historical Society's 1982-83 program series this Mon-

day, Sept. 20, at 8 p.m. in the Grosse Pointe War Memorial. With other partners in his law firm, Gandelot has spent a major portion of the year overseeing the

renovation and restoration of one of Detroit's earliest homes, enabling the firm to use it as its offices.

The Pointe Historical Society, which recently moved its collections from the War Memorial to Room 105 at Monteith Elementary School, is planning activities approximately every other month. On Nov. 8, the society will sponsor a panel and tour tracing the development of the War Memorial.

The building's historical and architectural significance will be discussed as well as the procedures required to have the structure placed on Michigan's State Registry of Historic Sites.

Tapestry Guild seeks stitchers

"Very important volunteers" are needed at the Grosse Pointe War Memorial to help members of the War Memorial Tapestry Guild restore the 16th and 17th century tapestries hanging in the Russell Alger House. Many uncontrollable factors such as sunshine, humidity and heat have caused these pieces of art to deteriorate.

The Tapestry Guild has made a valuable contribution to the continued restoration of the Grosse Pointe War Memorial. Since January, 1979, 10 volunteers under the direction of Mrs. Leonard Slowin, founder of the guild, have donated 2,500 hours to the restoration of

the tapestries. Guild members, Mrs. Carl Kasza, Mrs. Harry Carson and Mrs. Howard Harrison, experts in the art of restoring tapestries, are among those who will teach volunteers the stitches.

"Every stitch is for posterity. Every stitch is a signature," said Mrs. Kasza. "We're preserving these treasures for our children and our children's children."

Work on the tapestries is done on Wednesdays from 9 a.m. until noon and on Fridays from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m.

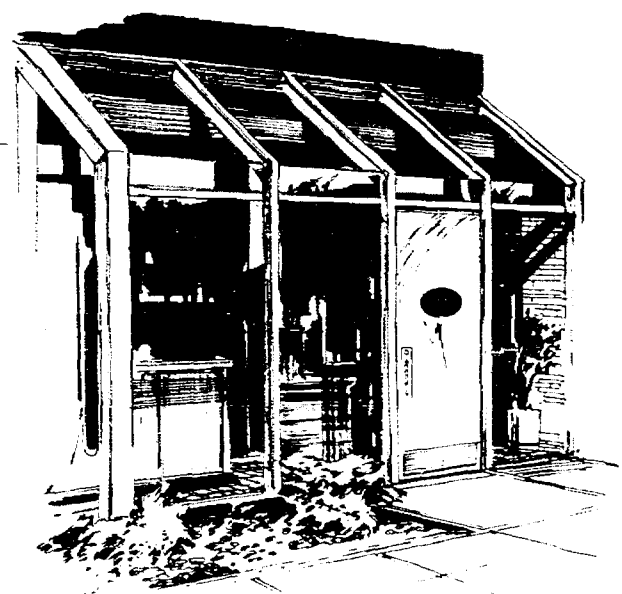

'Jaws' save life in Park mishap

Park Fire Chief Phillip Costa credits the Jaws of Life equipment recently donated to the department by the Grosse Pointe Rotary for helping his men save the life of a Detroit youth involved in a severe auto accident late last month.

The 12-year-old youth was being chased by Detroit police at 70 m.p.h. when the allegedly stolen car he was driving went out of control and crashed into a tree near Verheyden's Funeral Home at Mack and Whittier.

The youth is in stable condition at St. John Hospital. He suffered several broken bones in his arms and legs and chest, cuts over most of his body and lost a kneecap in the accident.

Park Emergency Medical Service workers were called to the scene of the accident and used the Jaws of Life to extricate the youth from the mangled car. The accident occurred at about 4 a.m. on Friday, Aug. 20.

New facility dedicated to Eleanor Ford

Pointers Carlton Higbie, Jr., and Henry Ford, II, were featured speakers last week at the dedication of the \$50 million Eleanor Clay Ford Pavilion, Henry Ford Hospital's new vital care services building.

The six-story, 210,000 square foot structure is named in honor of Mr. Ford's late mother who served 53 years on the hospital board. The building is the culmination of the hospital's 10-year planning program which has included some \$300 million in construction and renovation of the facilities in Detroit and suburbs.

The Eleanor Clay Ford Pavilion houses facilities for emergency medicine, including a helicopter pad in front of the hospital; surgery; intensive care radiology and pharmacy services. The new structure is attached to the main hospital and clinic.

The hospital was founded in 1915 by auto pioneer Henry Ford. Henry Ford II is chairman of the hospital's board of trustees.

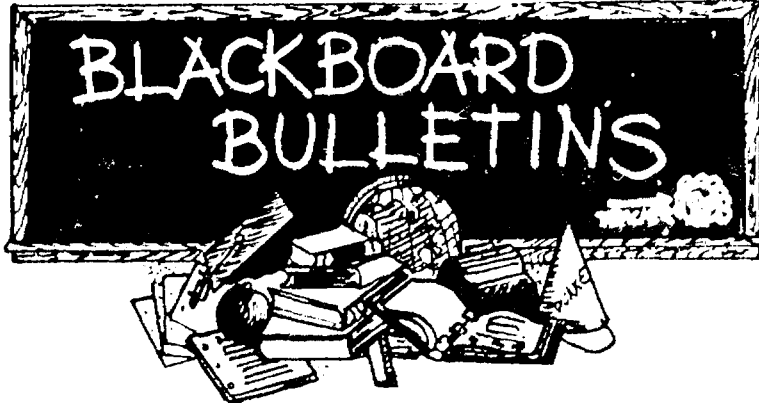
Youth arrested in Park

Students prepare for ACT tests

As the new school year begins, more than one million high school juniors and seniors across the nation are preparing to participate in the ACT Assessment Program.

The ACT Assessment, which consists of four academic tests that measure educational development and a detailed questionnaire that collects information relevant to educational and career planning, is recommended or required by more than 2,700 post-secondary institutions and scholarship programs.

School guidance counselors recommend that students participate in the ACT Assessment Program during the junior year or early in the senior year so their results will be available in time for use in planning for post-secondary education and careers.

Students can obtain registration packets that contain all the information necessary to register and prepare for the assessment from their high school guidance offices. The basic registration fee for the assessment is \$9.50. For 1982-83, ACT has established this test date schedule:

Test dates	Deadline
Oct. 30, 1982	Oct. 1
Dec. 11, 1982	Nov. 12
Feb. 12, 1983	Jan. 14
April 16, 1983	March 18
June 11, 1983	May 13

It takes about three hours to complete the four ACT examinations in English, math, social studies and natural sciences. A sample copy of a full-length test is available at each high school. Students who would like to have copies of additional tests may obtain them at cost from ACT.

The ACT Assessment also includes a two-part questionnaire that students complete at home when they register. The questionnaire focuses on the student's interests, academic and nonacademic accomplishments, and vocational and educational plans and needs.

Colleges use information from the ACT Assessment Program for academic advising, admissions counseling, course sectioning and placement, student services, and institutional research. ACT Assessment reports are sent to students, their high school counselors, and only those institutions and agencies specifically designated by the student.

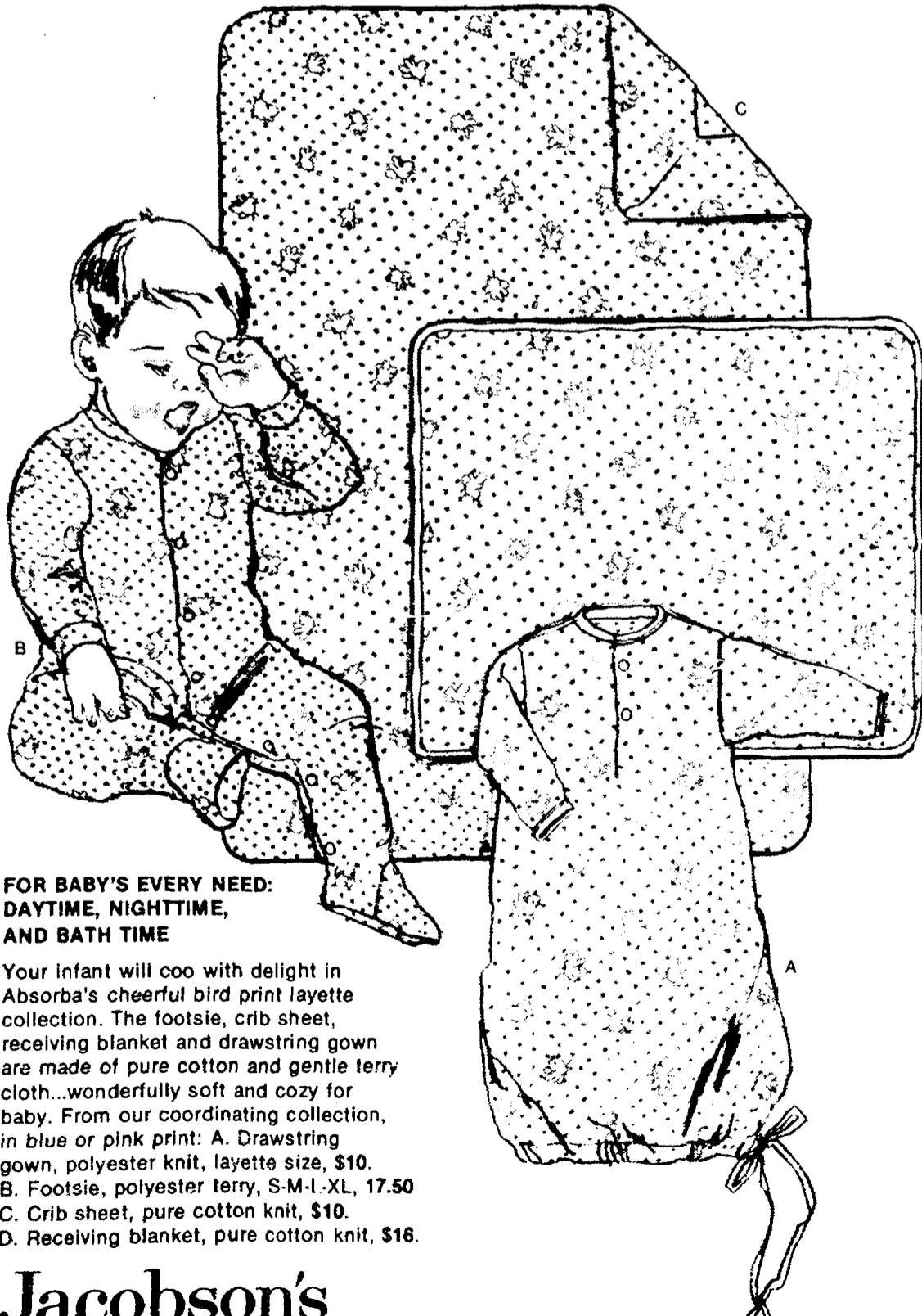

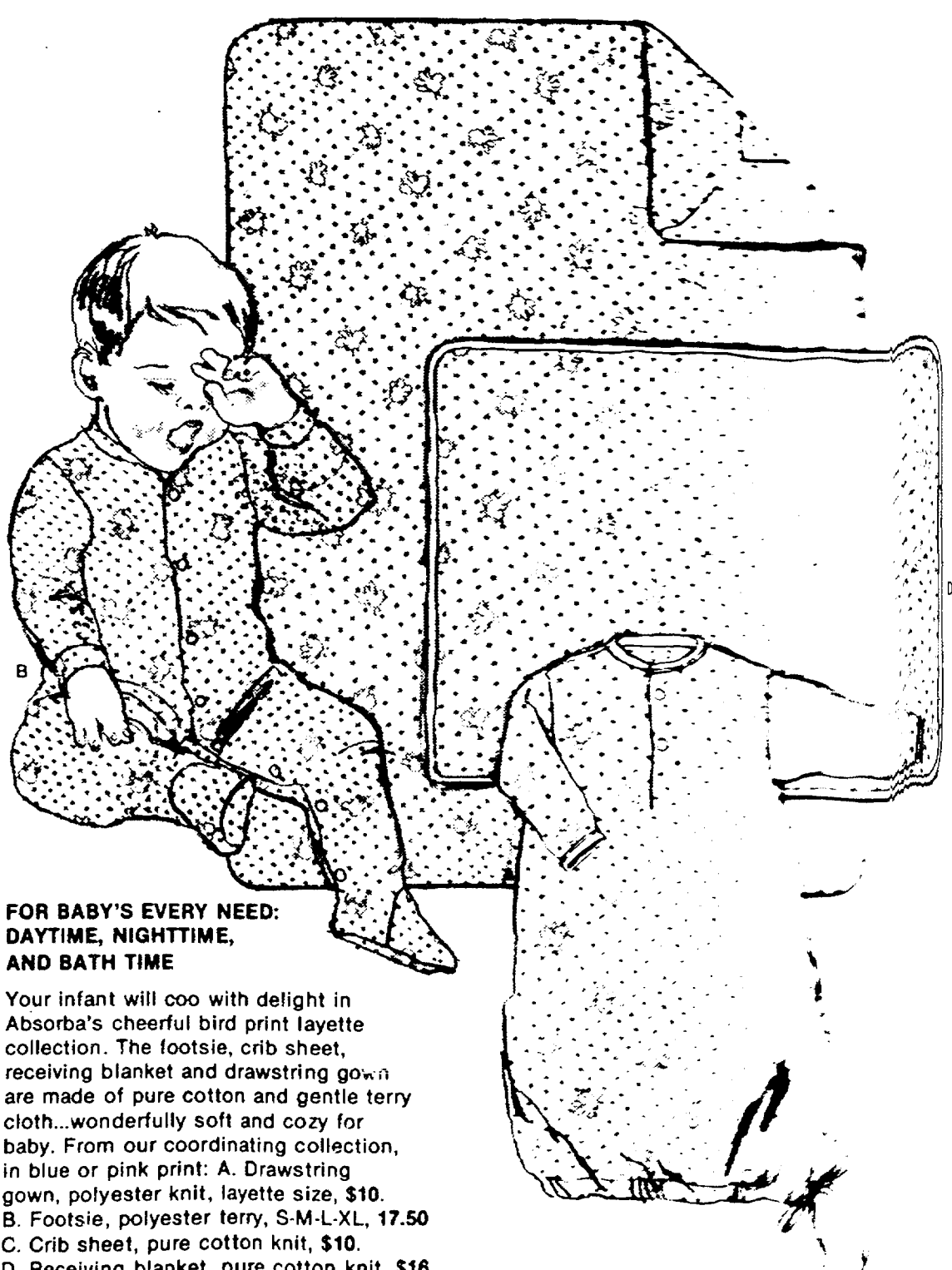



South is on the road this week, facing EML champ Mt. Clemens at 1 p.m. this Saturday, Sept. 18.

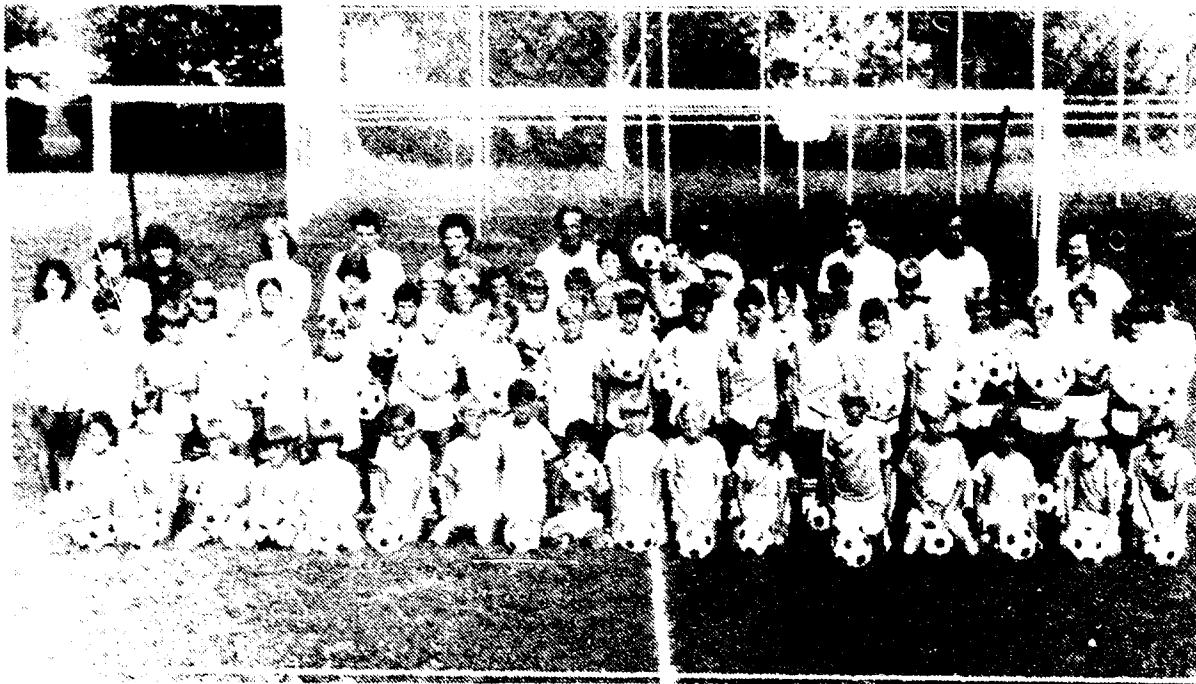
