District court issue revived

Woods tables action on Roslyn Road purchase

The Grosse Pointe Woods City Council last week tabled the purchase of property on Roslyn Road for a 13-car municipal parking lot.

The lot, at 1864 Roslyn, is one of 42 being considered for a new parking district under a proposed ordinance up for second reading at the Monday, Oct. 18, council

City officials said the purchase of the property was handled separately from the rezoning because the city needed a decision by Tuesday, Oct. 5, to exercise its option to buy the lot.

The city will try to re-negotiate the purchase of the lot while final cost estimates and site plans are prepared, the council decided, because the council, city administration and city engineers couldn't agree on the cost.

Councilman Frederick Lovelace estimated the cost of the lot at almost \$100,000. City Assessor-Comptroller Frederick Hornfisher said the cost of purchasing the lot, razing the home and building the

lot would be about \$80,000.

The lot would have been the first half of a municipal parking lot for 27 cars that would run from Roslyn to Brys behind Michigan National Bank and Josef's Bakery, City Administrator Chester Petersen said.

The Roslyn lot carries no deed restrictions which would keep the city from putting in the lot, councilmen said. The Brys lot that would make up the other half of the proposed parking area has restrictions which could make it difficult for the city to put in the lot, they added.

The council balked at purchasing the lot until it could find a way to recover some of the money spent from the city's parking enterprise fund. The proposed lot, according to Lovelace, would take from one half to one third of the fund's balance, estimated by Hornfisher at \$220,000.

Councilman Robert Novitke questioned Hornfisher at length about the possibility of passing on an assessment increase to area

businesses based on the availability and value of the lot. Hornfisher said such an increase was possible if it could be justified by the increased sales value of the affected

Residents complained the lot would mean increased traffic on Brys and Roslyn, causing a hazard to children and possible congestion behind the stores.

Brys resident Thomas Sullivan said the entrance and exit of the lot would have to be in the alley behind the stores. That would cause a traffic hazard because delivery trucks and cars would be forced to use the alley at the same time, he said.

"I don't believe the lot can be made accessible for ingress and egress," Sullivan said. "Somebody is going to run into a definite traffic hazard."

One Brys resident complained the increased traffic along the street would be dangerous to children in the area. Overflow customers from the Mack businesses now park on the street, she said, adding she would rather have the cars parked in front of her house all day than have them driving up and down the street.

Residents also said the lot would be another "white elephant" because existing municipal lots are seldom filled.

Businessmen in the area said they could use the lot for employe parking as well as for customers, taking some of the pressure off side streets and parking areas behind the businesses

Although noting the lot was needed, the council rejected a motion by Thomas Fahrner supported by Jean Rice to purchase the property. Councilmen said they wanted to see the final cost estimates and site plans to see what protection abutting property owners would have from the lot.

'There has been legislation introduced this year that would result in the state, over five years, paying for all local courts. But that excludes municipal courts," Levitt told the council.

A bill creating a Grosse Pointe Park district court has been introduced by Sen. John Kelly (D-1st District) and is working its way through Senate committee. Judge Grobbel and Councilman Anthony Spada urged the council to support that bill and endorse an implementation date of January, 1983. The bill could not go into effect unless the council granted its support.

Similar legislation which included all five Pointes in a single district court was approved by both houses of the legislature and signed by Gov. Milliken earlier this year but expired when local councils opposed it. The city leaders based their opposition to the court on a Coopers & Lybrand accounting firm study which indicated the new court could cost the cities almost a half million dollars a year to support. That study was based on the assumption the cities would build a new court facility and a majority of the costs were due to that. The report was harshly criticized by Sen. Kelly who said it appeared to be a deliberate attempt to sabotage the legislation he had introduced.

Levitt told the Park council he thought the present court facilities would be suitable for a district

Park ends year with a surplus

Stringent budget measures and good investments have transported Grosse Pointe Park's financial position from shaky to solid ground, according to an audit report issued last week.

The city ran budget deficits for two consecutive years but ended fiscal 1981-82 with a general fund surplus of \$452,000, according to a Coopers & Lybrand audit.

Firm partner Jeff Jorissen said the surplus puts the city in a "good posture" to deal with the uncertainties of state and federal funding in the year ahead. Jorissen made his comments at a publie meeting Oct. 4 at which city council members and administrators reviewed the annual audit.

Administrators have already al-

current year's budget. The surplus is also counterbalanced by a \$178,000 deficit in the city's water fund. City Manager John Crawford said he will recommend other uses for the surplus to the council at a future meeting.

The Park's Clerk-Comptroller Nunzio Ortisi attributed the city's financial turn-around to improvements on both sides of the ledger sheet — in revenues and expenditures. The city netted \$135,000 more in earnings from investments than it expected during the year "because of good interest rates and our efforts to invest every cent we could," Ortisi said.

Arson suspected in Park fire

Fire and police officials are investigating arson as the possible cause of a blaze that severely damaged a home at 1232 Beaconsfield Road early in the morning Monday, Oct. 11.

The two-alarm fire apparently started in the basement of the home. The alarm was called in just before 7 a.m. and Park firefighters responded with two trucks. They were later assisted by two more units from Grosse Pointe City after the second alarm was sounded.


No one was injured in the blaze. When firefighters arrived at the scene the one-and-a-half story building was filled with smoke and flames were shooting from the basement windows. The fire worked through the floor into the dining room and the remainder of the house was heavily smoke damaged, according to Fire Chief Phillip Costa.

The house is a rental unit, occupied by two men, Costa said. The chief would not discuss details of the possible cause of the fire, pending his investigation.

"What's more, we had no major catastrophies for which we hadn't planned," Ortisi said. Winter and spring ice storms of the two preceding years cost the city thousands of dollars for repairs and removal of trees.

Much of the savings "reflect austerity programs that went into effect last year. We're just seeing the impact of those now," Ortisi said. "We laid off several people, bought used equipment instead of new when possible and really worked with a bone-dry budget.

The audit report did point to problems in the city's water fund. The \$178,000 deficit accumulated during 1981-82 pushed the total deficit in the fund to \$234,000. The city has consistently raised water rates to customers at its charges from the Detroit water department have increased. But Ortisi attributed the red ink to weather conditions. A wet season like last year's increases water system costs because of excessive storm water flowing through pumps, while it decreases revenues to the system because homeowners purchase less water for lawns and gardens, he said.

The current dry season should reverse that situation and may balance the fund in 1982-83 without a rate increase, Ortisi said. Auditors also noted that the water loss of 19 percent was too high. Ortisi attributed that to several major water main breaks and old meters in homes which allow some slippage. The city is replacing those meters as fast as it can. City Manager John Crawford said.

AUDITORS ALSO assessed the city's Marina Fund, which was established as a separate entity after controversy errupted over the practice of borrowing from it to pay general fund expenses three years ago. The fund is now self-supporting and includes a bond issue scheduled for final payment in 1986, the audit indicated.

Two members of the public attended the open audit review session. One, Art Moran, questioned why the audit did not include a specific breakdown of money paid to consultants on the city's 312 Housing Rehabilitation program funded by the federal government. Ortisi said that information is available to the public in other documents but is not part of the

Parking lots will destroy neighborhoods

The recent vote of the Woods City Council on the rezoning of residential housing for parking purposes is a good example of un-representative municipal government. Despite the protests of a standing room crowd of more than 100 citizens and the signed petitions of more than 400 citizens objecting to the wholesale rezoning of homes in Grosse Pointe Woods, the council voted 4-3 to continue with rezoning.

The irony in the whole affair is that unlike county, state and federal government — local government is promoted as being most responsive to citizens' desires.

It has been demonstrated that this plan has already had an adverse effect on the values of the homes involved to the detriment of the tax base of the city. A homeon Brys Drive, valued by the city assessors at slightly over \$76,000. cannot be sold for \$65,500 because the potential buyer cannot obtain a mortgage on a home zoned for parking.

Vacant homes, which are too expensive for business to raze and zoning ordinance, property owners turn into a parking lot - and on can request a variance from the

gages, can well be the "beginning of residential blight" in this whole area. The chairman of the Planning Commission has stated that this is just Phase I of a plan that will eventually include homes between Moross and Vernier.

The purpose of this proposed ordinance is to encourage businesses to buy such rezoned homes and raze them for parking lots. According to the report on which this plan is based, a majority of businesses on Mack are rented or leased. Neither the renter of the property nor the owner could afford to buy even the least expensive of these homes and destroy it for a parking lot.

The council itself tabled a motion to purchase a home on Roslyn and develop it into a parking lot because the estimated cost of such a project was in excess of \$80,000. This - for a lot with only 13 parking places.

At this rate how can they expect businessmen on Mack to purchase a home for parking? This is not planning but wishful thinking.

Even without the proposed re-

allowed to put in a parking lot. This being the case, wholesale rezoning becomes completely unnecessary.

If the need for parking is so great, a variance can be granted on an individual basis without lowering values on homes all the way down Mack Avenue. As long as these homes remain residential, the city and its citizens have some say in the type and quality of commercial development in Grosse Pointe Woods. If this ordinance passes, the city and its citizens forfeit that right.

No one questions the need for a healthy balance of residential and commercial development. However, in an essentially residential community like Grosse Pointe Woods, there is a saturation point. Unless we are careful we stand to change the character of the com-







The rule, not the exception

the Grosse Pointe public school enrollment again this year represents the rule rather than the exception in suburban districts in the Detroit metropolitan area. A compilation of preliminary enrollment figures by the Detroit News shows a 4.4 percent decrease in suburban Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties with a 4.8 percent decline in the Pointes.

Area school officials attribute the enrollment decline to some of the same reasons that caused the drop in Grosse Pointe: the declining birthrate, the increased attraction of private and parochial schools and the exodus from the Detroit area as families leave in search of jobs elsewhere. In the Pointes, another factor affecting the school enrollment is the aging population, with a declining proportion of school-age children among Pointe families.

AS IN GROSSE Pointe, declining school enrollment in the area means less state and federal aid, teacher layoffs, consideration of program cutbacks and, the most controversial issue of all, possible school closings.

In the Pointes that issue was given new attention last week when the Board of Education made it clear that the board, and not the Committee for the Future Organization of the School System, will make the final decision on

A new report indicates that the decline in citizens committee had sought clarification of its role on the school closing issue.

The board, after all, is the official body which administers the school system and thus it must assume the responsibility for decisions about school closings as well as other controversial issues. But the citizens committee should make its own recommendations on the subject for board consideration. And if, as suggested at the board meeting, the citizens committee offers a number of alternative suggestions on school closings, that might ease the

board's decision-making task.

Inflation continues to increase costs of all public services but in the Pointe school system that factor has been offset by a cutback in the number of teachers as school population declines. Since the forecasts do not indicate any early end to the decrease in school enrollment, however, the time is now at hand when strong consideration should be given to the additional savings that could be made by school closings.

WITH THE CURRENT enrollment at 7,786 on the preliminary count as contrasted with a peak of 13,700 in 1971, and with forecasts indicating a school population of only about 5,000 by the 1986-87 school year, the time has come when the school closing decision cannot be fur-ther delayed. In fact, the board will need strong supportive evidence which is not now available to the public if it rejects the popular belief that whether any schools will be closed next year and which ones will be closed if they are. The one or more schools should be closed next year.

WHEN ASKED the next day to elaborate on the identity of the manipulators, the President only said, "I did not have any Americans in mind." But that still leaves the Americans who support the nuclear freeze as dupes of these unnamed foreign manipulators.

The Detroit News, in an editorial appearing the same day the President spoke, called the nuclear freeze "a puerile proposal," contended that "some of the key organizers of these petition drives look awfully familiar to us," and charged that "they are the same people who have misread and misinterpreted Communist parently even a majority.

So the News in effect also called nuclear freeze supporters dupes, and identified them as soft on communism through the process of guilt by association that we thought had gone out of political fashion along with the late Joe Mc-Carthy.

True, the Grosse Pointe News itself has said some nuclear freeze supporters are naive, but we do not think they should be smeared and sneered at by either the President or any newspaper. The movement has achieved strong support throughout the country, in both political parties and among people in many walks of life, and it includes conservatives as well as liberals who honestly want to end the nuclear arms race.

IN WISCONSIN, a proposal somewhat similar to the one on the Michigan ballot was approved in that state's primary by a three-to-one margin. And last week, in the Detroit News' own news columns, a report on a Michigan public opinion poll showed that Proposal E is likely to carry by an equally wide margin in this state.

The House, recently renovated with the help of a Kresge Foundation grant, is a temporary home for 18 abused and neglected children, such as "Marcia" and "Marcella," eight-year-old twin daughters of a drug and alcohol-addicted mother who had the first of her seven children at age 14.

The twins, after failing to adjust in former homes, were diagnosed as "retarded, withdrawn, unable to form relationships and lacking in social and life-care skills" when they were placed at Christ Child House. During their 10-month stay there, "Marcia" progressed from first to third grade in three months, "Marcella" in eight. Both girls are now described as "outgoing — and almost too noisy!" They have happily adjusted to their new fos-

Their stay at Christ Child House reversed the potentially permanent damage caused by a neglectful family. It's stories like this that tell Christ Child Society's story, and it's a lovely one.
