School closing report delayed one month

The much-publicized and longawaited report from the citizen committee studying the future organization of Grosse Pointe public schools, naming possible school closings, was removed from the Board of Education's Monday night agenda.

Committee chairman Ed Deeb said Monday, however, the report will be in the hands of school trustees at their January meeting. Deeb blamed the report delay on a "five-week late start" of the committee.

"We will not submit a report tonight (Monday), but we are very close," Deeb said. "We will definitely have a report at the January board meeting."

The committee was expected to file its controversial report on enrollment declines in the public schools at the Board of Education's Dec. 13 meeting.

"It's just a process of putting the report together right now. It's virtually all done," said Deeb, who would not comment on what may be contained in the report.

The Board of Education appointed the 12-member citizens advisory committee in January. but the committee did not have its first meeting until March, Deeb

Advisory board member Joy Williams said the committee met last weekend to wrap up its work, but then realized more time would be needed to review the final re-

Last month the committee made public to parents at Parcells school some preliminary findings of its nine-month study of enrollment projections, school facilities and curriculum.

Dr. Charles Weidig, chairman of the committee's staff/programs/instruction study group, revealed average elementary class size in Pointe public schools has slipped to 22.4 students. In

and 9-12 grade levels enhance real estate in Grosse Pointe, but leave school administrators and students with an inadequate program continuity in the two-year middle schools.

By the 1986-87 school year, only 6,151 students are expected to attend Pointe public schools. A classroom count this school year showed 7,805 students in the public schools. Not since 1971 have administrators recorded a peak of 13,700 students in Grosse Pointe.

Shores voters kill renovation bond issue

Shores voters turned down a \$1.3 million bond issue request Tuesday, Dec. 14, by "four or five votes," village officials said. The money would have been used to renovate the Shores' 67-year-old municipal building.

Results in the single issue special election were 148 voting for approval while 106 opposed the Shores' request for state Municipal Principles of the Shores' request for state Municipal Principles of the Shores' request for state o pal Finance Commission approval to issue the general obligation

Although the question won a majority, Village Superintendent Thomas Jefferis said that under Shores charter provisions, the bond question would have needed 60 percent of the 254 votes cast for approval.

Village president Gerald Schroeder said he was "disappointed" by the results, but pointed out the narrowness of the question's defeat meant there was the circa 1915 building necessary. community support for the reno-

"It received a favorable vote, but just fell short by a couple of votes," Schroeder said. "There was voter approval of it."

Village trustees will discuss the bond question at their Tuesday,

Dec. 21, meeting, Schroeder said, adding that another election may be called on the question. He said input would be sought from those who voted against the issue to see if possible changes

In June, the commission officials, the Shores could go ahead, despite the defeat, and request a bond issue based on limited liability. The village could then issue bonds whose principal and interest would be covered by property taxes. Unlike voterapproved bond issues, where officials would be able to raise taxes to cover the bonds without limit, a limited liability issue would only allow the Shores to raise taxes in accordance with state statutes while using general fund revenues to pay the principal and interest on the bonds.

Schroeder said the village would not consider going ahead with any type of alternate arrangement without voter approval and com-munity support for the renovation.

Shores officials said they had been discussing the renovation of the Albert Kahn designed building for several years, but recent events made the refurbishment of

Last August, a wet-plaster ceiling in the office of the village superintendent collapsed, destroying office equipment and memo-rabilia. After investigation by architect Robert Wakely, village officials were told all ceilings on the first floor of the building could be considered unsafe.

Grosse Pointe Park went to the voters on the August primary ballot, asking for an extra 2 mills on residents' tax levies to resurface the city's streets. Though Park officials said the roads needed \$2 million in repairs while the budget only contained \$100,900 for such work, voters turned down the measure by a 3-to-2 margin.

Police send hundreds home, file charges

Parents take the rap for kegger

have charged a local family with boisterous conduct resulting from a huge "kegger" party attended by an estimated 200 to 300 youths late last month.

Five Farms officers, including Chief of Police Robert Ferber, broke up the party at the Andrew Cleland residence, 28 Beverly Road, after receiving complaints from neighbors.

According to police reports, the officers converged on the home at 11:30 p.m. on Nov. 26, and informed Cleland of the complaints. Cleland reportedly told police the party was out of control, and asked for help in breaking it up.

The officers later stated they observed many minors in possession of alcohol, and found a number of young people in "various states of undress in bedrooms, closets and bathrooms

The police also reported they found one young girl either asleep or unconscious in a bedroom. When asked about her condition, one of the occupants of the home allegedly assured police that she was okay-just passed out.

After everyone was forced to leave, with the exception of a dozen youths who stayed behind to clean up the home, grounds and neighborhood, Cleland was reportedly told he was in violation of

General Alger, great grandfather of Frederick Alger and Mrs. Mead, served in the Civil War, became Governor of Michigan in 1884, was a presidential candidate in 1888 and was founder of the family that donated the Alger House to become the Grosse Pointe War Memorial in

Agencies can offer holiday help

Grosse Pointe residents are not immune to the hard times brought

immune to the hard times brought on by recent unemployment, divorce or layoffs. And a big part of the difficulty lies in not knowing where to turn for help.

It may be the first time that asking or looking for assistance may have crossed your mind. But it is not the topic of conversation at holiday parties and while you may be embarrassed or frightened, it is something that must be dealt with — the sooner the better. the better.

If your financial circumstances have only recently changed for the worse, your biggest problem right now may be adjusting to the fact they you are no longer employed or that your future is at best uncertain. There may be ad-dilional stress in the household and you may find yourself fighting

with your spouse or children.

The Family Life Education
Council, 18412 Mack in the Farms, provides short-term counseling

based on an ability to pay.

On Wednesday evenings from 8 to 9:30 p.m. FLEC runs a legal center, staffed by volunteers who will counsel individuals by telephone and suggest where they can phone and suggest where they can go for help in areas such as credit counseling or landlord-tenant relations.

There also is a medical clinic that does pregnancy testing, pro-vides birth control information and treats those with sexuallytransmitted diseases.

ANOTHER PLACE to turn for ANOTHER PLACE to turn for counseling is the Catholic Social Services of Wayne County, 19653 Mack Avenue in the Woods. It is primarily a counseling agency that deals with problems stemming from unemployment, alcoholism and marital conflict. For those not covered by insurance, a sliding scale fee is arranged.

Many area churches offer assistance or at least have information and referral services. If you are affiliated with a church, do not hésitate to call and ask for help. The St. Vincent de Paul Society, with 10 parishes in the Grosse Pointe area participating, can provide temporary help during a provide temporary help during a crisis. The parishes can help with food, clothing and other necessities. Equally as important, the church provides planning and follow-up to prevent the individual or family from feeling stranded. In Grosse Pointe, St. Paul-on-the-Lake, St. Ambrose and St. Clare all belong to the Society.

If you think you qualify for some type of county assistance, call the Wayne County Department of Social Services. Aside from programs such as Food Stamps, Aid to Families with De-

Stamps, Aid to Families with Dependent Children and General Assistance, there is an Emergency Needs Program that provides assistance "to meet basic health and safety needs."

ENP provides food, clothing,







A long strike at DSO?

By Barbara Greenough Acker

What have the six members of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra who live in the Pointes been doing since they played the final notes of Haydn's "Farewell Concert" and walked out on strike?

Following the strike announced by DSO members at a press conference last Thursday, Dec. 9, several Grosse Pointe musicians were asked to comment on the situation. Significantly, not one member mentioned the salary or pension issues as being a factor in his decision to strike.

Most of the musicians contacted expressed regrets that they had to strike, but felt it was something they were virtually forced into.

WE EITHER had to accept the whole package or reject it," said Ann Ourada, a violinist with the DSO, who lives in the Farms.

The controversial conductor search clause, wherein management would only be able to hire a conductor approved by the musicians, was approved in the 1981 one year contract. Members who voted to accept that contract, as opposed to a three year agreement, also took a pay cut, according to Ms. Ourada. In return for those concessions, the conductor

search clause was included. "To go back on this important issue now would be a big step backward," the violinist said. Ms. Ourada, who feels the con-

ductor search clause to be one of the primary issues in deciding to strike, questioned whether it should have been so important as to cause the cancellation of the Christmas season concerts. But, she reasoned, it is indeed crucial if the DSO wants to remain a first class orchestra in terms of recordings, tours and status.

Acknowledging that this privilege is not common practice in the United States (in fact, it would be unique), Ms. Ourada said that it is quite customary in Europe and results in the careful selection

Porbe, who was shocked at the inclusion of the cancellation clause (a clause that would allow management to cancel any season on four weeks' notice), said he felt he was being treated like a factory worker that could be laid off at any time. He did not understand what was motivating management to ask for the cancellation clause, but added that the musicians will no longer tolerate being treated like unskilled workers with an industrial mentality. "We are members of a highly skilled oc-cupation that is supervised by amateurs," he continued.

The musicians met last Saturday, Dec. II to plan the details of what they will do during the strike. The members are making every effort not to deprive the manufacture of music, said people of Detroit of music, said Porbe

Porbe who plays the viola, has been with the DSO for 19 years.

The musicians spoken to were all concerned that management not be offended by any of their comments. One musician refused to speak at all for fear of jeopardizing negotiations.

Time on their hands just before the holidays was not a plus in most cases. Ms. Ourada, who said she was "very depressed" about the whole situation, also added that suddenly having free time to shop did not mean much in the absence of a paycheck. The musicians are receiving about \$100 per

week from their strike fund. Others said they would be able to get some things done around the house and, of course, continue to practice, which they will do in a

Grosse Pointe Woods and its public safety lieutenants signed a three-year contract Monday, Dec. 6, that will raise the three lieutenants' salaries 9 percent over two years, add an extra paid holiday and leave the third year open for

wage negotiations.
The contract will be retroactive to July, 1982, and continue through June 30, 1984. The city and the public safety sergeants have yet to reach agreement on a contract.

According to the lieutenants, the contract is similar to one signed last year with the Grosse Pointe Woods Police Officers Association.

Under the contract terms, lieutenants will receive a base salary of \$31,983 effective July 1, 1981, an increase of 5 percent. Effective July, 1982, base salary will be increased 4 percent to \$33,262. The third year beginning July, 1983 is open to negotiations on base salary only, according to the con-

Woods lieutenants sign two-year pact

The lieutenants will receive an extra paid holiday in July, 1983, according to the contract. Christmas Eve will be considered the 11th such holiday.

The three lieutenants can accumulate up to 30 days of vacation leave. Det. Lt. Peter Thomas, and lieutenants Bernard Kelly and Allen Selby are each eligible for 27 vacation days a year.

Any days over the accumulated 30 are considered lost under the contract. However, lieutenants can get cash payments for onequarter of the accumulated time during each fiscal year

Lieutenants also will receive a cost-of-living bonus that is capped at 5 percent of base salary.

In addition to their pensions, lieutenants also will receive a supplemental annuity of \$280. The annuity will be increased \$1.20 for every complete month the lieu-

tenant works past age 55, but will be capped at \$350.

For future negotiations, the lieutenants will submit new salary, fringe benefit or agreement amendments to the city by Feb. 1, 1984. The city will then have 30 days to respond.

The contract can be extended beyond the expiration dates unless either party gives 90 day notice of termination.

With the signing of the contract, the lieutenants will withdraw their complaint to the Michigan Employe Relations Committee which charged the city with unfair bargaining and a grievance about a pension deduction from a sick day



Too early to decide lower water/sewer rates, cities say

Officials in Grosse Pointe are cautious about the affect on residents' bills of new water and sewer rates proposed by the Detroit Water and Sewage Department. Although Detroit's considering decreases in the rates to the Shores, Woods and Park, administrators would not yet say if they will translate into lower bills for

Under the schedule proposed by the Detroit department last week,

from \$3 to \$2.69 per 1,000 cubic feet. The Shores rate would drop from \$4.69 to \$4.40 and the Park's from \$4.01 to \$3.60.

The Farms pumps water to its residents and sells it to Grosse Pointe City as well. It increased its rate about 10 percent for 1982.

Sewage from all five cities is treated by the Detroit wastewater plant and rates for that have jumped steadily since a 1977 U.S.

reached between the city and Environmental Protection Agency. The city was forced to clean up its treatment plant to meet both air and water quality standards.

According to water department officials, the plant now meets both standards at a cost of more than \$500 million.

Now that the sewage plant meets EPA standards, yearly increases in rates should be limited to utility and labor increases, officials said.

Under the proposed sewage rates, the City and Farms would pay \$6.39 per 1,000 cubic feet of sewage, and increase from \$5.99. The Park's rate would increase from \$1.34 to \$4.58 Woods and Shores rates would increase from \$4.34 to \$4.55.

If enacted, higher sewage rates would partially offset the lower water rates, giving the Woods, Park and Shores net decreases for their water/sewage bills. The Woods would pay 10 cents less for its usage, the Shores would see an 8 cent decrease, and the Park 17 cent decrease.

Woods, Park and Shores officials said it is too early to begin considering a change in residents'

Shores officials said they will wait to see what comes out of a public hearing to be held on the rates Wednesday, Jan. 6, in the Water Board Building, 735 Ran-dolph, before making a decision.

Rates could increase or decrease after the hearing before they are put into effect by the Water Department next July.

Shores officials tried to inform

the Woods water rate would fall District Court settlement was its residents about the high rates to see if some conserving could lower them, officials said. In addition, the decision by the Edsel & Eleanor Ford House to use lake water to water its lawns helped decrease the amount of water the village used.

> Woods officials said no rate changes are being contemplated yet, adding the Woods water rate fell without conscious efforts by the city.

"It's just an economic sign of the times," Woods City Adminis-trator Chester Petersen said. Because of the high rates sewer rates are now higher than water rates - people aren't watering their lawns as much, at least not in our city.'

Park officials said no decision would be made about residential water and sewer rates until after final notice is received from the Water and Sewage Department. The city council will set a new rate sometime next May, to take effect that July, they added.

Rates may not fall in the Park, City Clerk-Comptroller Nunzio Ortisi said, because the city's water department is running in the red.

"We do have a substantial deficit there in the water department," Ortisi said. "It would not be possible to cut the bill when you have a deficit."

The proposed net decrease of 17 cents to the Park in combined water and sewage rates charged by Detroit won't be enough, if enacted, to lower residents' rates, Ortisi said. The uncertainity of storm drainage charges to the Park coupled with the rainy days in December have cost the city

everything that goes down the drain," he said. "The wet season has meant increased costs to the

Farms officials said the city's water rate was increased from \$4 to \$4.40 last July, but the sewer rate was lowered from \$10.10 to \$9 per 1,000 cubic feet, lowering the overall water/sewer rate to residents from \$14.10 per 1,000 cubic feet of usage to \$13.40. They were unsure about what the sewer increase proposed by Detroit would do to residents' bills.

City officials said a 10 percent increase in water rates charged by the Farms could mean higher bills in that city. The proposed sewer rates could also have an effect, they added.

The Water and Sewerage Department's income for water will increase from \$102.6 million to Redford Township.

The department works on a break-even basis, Director Charles Beckham said. Water and sewer rate revenue is first spent on operating costs and on debt service on the system. Anything left over goes into capital improvements, department officials

Cities add on costs they incur giving residents water and sewer service to residents' bills. Maintenance, labor costs, billing and administrative costs add to the rates residents pay.

Barring a change in the law, the next tax rate reductions are scheduled to take effect in 1983. Thus, the old maxim "accelerate deductions into this year and defer income into the next" is especially true for 1982 since you will most likely be in a lower tax bracket next year. This effectively makes deductions this year more valuable than next year and income a bit less heavily taxed in

Before deciding whether to accelerate deductions, first determine if you have incurred a larger amount of deductions than automatically provided to you by the IRS. This is known as the Zero Bracket Amount — \$2,300 for a single person and \$3,400 for a married couple filing in the state of the s you have, you are allowed to itemize your deductions.

Keep a look out for any medical and dental deductions. You'll have trouble utilizing them next year since the Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act of 1982 (TEFRA) changed the rules Beginning in January, medical expenses will not be deductible until they exceed 5 percent of adjusted gross income, up from 3 percent now. This means someone whose adjusted gross income is \$25,000 will be able to deduct medical costs only after they top \$1,250 in 1983, while this year, anything in

excess of \$750 could be deducted. If your medical expenses will be just shy of 3 percent of adjusted gross income this year, consider the following:

Municipal bond tax swapping

With a little less than one month remaining in 1982 it is not too late 4/1/95 rated Aa to begin addressing the taxable consequences of any gains or loss-es in your portfolio. To offset capital gains you have achieved (or will achieve) this taxable year, you may be able to establish losses in your municipal bond portfolio. You can maintain your annual tax free income, as well as the quality of bonds, and in some cases you may be able to increase your annual tax free income. This is particularly possible if you are willing to swap for bonds of slightly lower quality or with slightly longer maturities or both. The significant point to remem-

ping (or Corporate Bond Swap-ping) is that the investor can change the names in a portfolio and thereby establish gains or losses, with minimal change in market risk. This is simply be-cause two different 20 year bonds of AAA quality (say Michigan and Ohio), with the same coupon, will trace virtually the same price movements throughout their 20 year lives in both up and down markets. The only factor which could cause any relative price change between the two would be a change in rating. The same would apply for the bonds of two cities within a state.

The IRS allows capital losses to be taken against capital gains. If

be taken against capital gains. If a loss is applied against gains and is not entirely used in one year, the balance may be carried forward and applied against gains each year indefinitely until the loss is entirely used or until death. If a loss is not entirely used at death, the loss cannot be carried to the estate. The investor can apply up to \$6,000 of the net long term loss against ordinary income. This will offset \$3,000 of ordinary income, since only 50 percent of net long term losses may be applied against ordinary income. Net short term loss (less than one year holding period) can be offset, on a dollar for dollar basis, against ordinary income up to \$3,000.

lish a tax loss without actually losing any money (i.e. you still receive the full principal value at maturity), but you may find that swapping will upgrade your port-

folio as well. There are many different methods of swapping to achieve your





Red Cross plans Save-a-Life days

The American Red Cross will sponsor the annual Save-A-Life Sundays on Dec. 26 and Sunday, Jan. 2, in an effort to avert a shortage of blood. The Save-A-Life program was initiated in 1974 as a one-day program and expanded to two days in 1979 to help meet increased blood needs.

All Red Cross regional blood centers, including centers in Ann Arbor and Port Huron, will be open from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on both days.

'Blood donations decrease during the holiday season because many businesses and industries which supply much of the blood collected for patient needs are closed during the week between Christmas and New Year's Day, explained A. William Shafer, M.D., director of the local regional Blood Services.

According to Dr. Shafer, there is generally a dramatic increase in elective surgery after the holiday season. This, combined with the reductions in donations, could create a major shortage in the supply of blood.

Blood can be donated by anyone in good general health between the ages of 17 and 66 years old.

To make an appointment to donate blood during one of the Save-A-Life Sundays, call the nearest Red Cross regional donor center listed in the phone book under American Red Cross or call 833-4440 and ask for the Save-A-Life Sundays supervisor.



pondering over just the right book that will please and be treasured. But once you have the titles and categories in mind finding the book of your choice should not be too difficult. Bookstores and book sections of department stores have many selections in attractive formats to choose from.

For the young child, there are many editions of Mother Goose. Brightly-bound and richly illustrated they are a delight to look at. One of these is "The Real Mother Goose" illustrated by Blanche Wright (Rand McNally). There are colored pictures on every page which are clear and simple. The characters are dressed in charming period costumes. The colors are clear washes, sometimes soft and pale but more often bright and lively. Best of all, the pictures really illustrate the verses, a very important item to young children who often use pictures as clues to the meaning of

Another lovely edition is Mar-

garet de Angelis' "Book of Nursery and Mother Goose Rhymes" (Doubleday). The pictures are enchanting and there are innumerable decorations such as little flowery houquets and birds in the corners and pretty, plump babies who tumble here and there. Feodor Rojankovsky's "The Tall Book of Mother Goose" (Harper & Row) is an elongated book whose deep pages lend themselves either to delightful double-page spreads

or to sequences of small pictures. Variants that have grown from Mother Goose's "A Apple Pie" are picture ABC books. Some of these include Wanda Gag's "ABC Bunny" (Coward McCann) with large dark woodcuts relieved on each page by a single capital letter which suggest the small child's ABC blocks; Fritz Eichenberg's "Ape in a Cape" (Harcourt), and Clare Newberry's "Kittens ABC" (Harper) with its appeal of cuddly cats.

AN IMPORTANT step in a child's reading experience is the fairy tale. The aggressions and frustrations of childhood can be vented as children experience such turn-about situations as when Hansel and Gretel push the witch into her own fire or the lift that comes from reading about the Ugly Duckling who turns into a swan. There are some beautifully illustrated editions of single fairy tales such as Marcia Brown's "Steadfast Tin Soldier" (Scribner), Eva Le Galliennes' "Nightingale" (Harper), Adrienne Adams "Thumbelina" (Scribner) and "Hans Christian Anderson's Fairy Tales" illustrated by Wilhelm Pederson (Scribner).

These are but a few of the traditional books you could choose. If you prefer more recent offerings you might like to consider Wanda Gag's delightful "Millions of Cats" (Doubleday), the story of an old man and an old woman who want only one cat but end up with a million cats; Marjorie Flacks, "Angus and the Ducks" (Doubleday), a delightful story describing the experiences of a curious Scotch Terrier; Don and Lydia Freeman's "Pet of the Mat" (Viking), a tele of a purious for the Mat." Met" (Viking), a tale of a musicloving mouse and an opera-hating cat who meet on the stage of the Metropolitan Opera House.

Children love stories about funny and mischievous animals. So it is no surprise that H.A. Rey's Curious George books (Houghton), which relate the artics of a monkey who is always getting into trouble, Gene Zion's "Harry the Dirty Dog" (Harper) and any of the Dr. Seuss books (Random), are always on the pre-

framonn, are always on the pre-ferred list.

If you are choosing animal stories for the 8 to 12 year old group, you can't go wrong with the Marguerite Henry books about the Marguerite Henry books about horses which include the popular "King of the Wind" (Rand McNally), Sheila Burford's "The Incredible Journey" (Little Brown), a story of how two dogs and a cat through the Contact of the statement of the stateme struggle through the Canadian wilderness to reach the master they and deaf, learned to speak and love, or E.B. White's "Charlottes Web'' (Harper), with its unforgettable Charlotte and Wilbur.

Other favorites include Mary Norton's "The Borrowers" (Harcourt), a fantasy about tiny people who live in England and De Jong's "The Wheel on the School" (Harper), which tells how children try to lure storks, the symbols of good luck, back to their village in Netherlands.

SUGGESTED humorous stories are "Homer Price" by Robert McCloskey (Viking) which in-cludes six rollicking tales about Homer, and his life in Centerburg, particularly his experience with the doughnut machine and Beverly Cleary's "Ramona" books and "Henry Huggins" stories

(Morrow). No discussion of wanted books would be complete without includ-

ing the Judy Blume books. This writer's empathy with young people and their secret worries people and their secret worries has made her one of the most popular authors writing today. It all began with "Are you There God? It's Me Margaret" (Bradbury), a realistic novel about a 11-year-old girl, her religious doubts, social problems and her reactions to her maturing body. reactions to her maturing body and has progressed into other novels about problems with which children of today must contend.

No matter how intriguing the story is, there are readers who will shy away from fiction but will devour any book that coincides with their interest, whether it be science, sports, hobbies, jokes and

riddles, magic or biography.

No problem. There are many books to suit their interests. In the jokes and riddles department there is "The Great Big Joke and Riddle Book" (compiled by Uscar Weigle (Grosset & Duniap), a large book with big print illustrated with cartoon-like pen and ink drawings. It contains more than one thousand jests for fun which should be enough. In the area of magic the same publisher offers "Make Your Own Magic Show" by Aldo Bonura. It contains complete directions for a variety of magic tricks using such simple props as cups and balls, short pieces of rope and a deck of cards.

If baseball is the favorite game "The Game of Baseball" by Sam & Beryl Epstein (Garrard) gives a history of baseball, how it developed and changed, something about the great players and an excellent description with illustrations of plays.
"Football For Young Champ-


ions" by Robert Antonaccie and Jene Barr (McGraw Hill) defines the tactics and maneuverings, explains the scoring, gives a history of the game, and the qualifications to play. This book is a good one for both the participant and onlooker.

Budding scientists will welcome George Barr's "Research Ideas for Young Scientists (McGraw), a book of fresh easy-to-do experiments in various fields of science that provide simple research projects for young scientist and may suggest ideas for original research. Drawings and diagrams make the suggestions easy to follow. Another is Dan Noonan's "Mr. Wizard's Experiments for Young Scientists" (Doubleday) which covers 13 experiments all diagrammed and explained and making use of household equipment. Included also is information on the work of adult scientists and astronomers, botanists, geologists

and others.
MANY YOUNG readers are captivated by biography. Girl readers will enjoy Helen Adam Keller's "The Story of My Life" (Doubleday), an inspiring story of a girl who, although she was blind give service to others. Boys will be taken with Edgar Wyatt's story of "Geronimo" (Whittlesy), the first great war chief of the Apache Indians because of the excitement and adventure or "Benjamin Autobiography' Franklin's (Houghton) a straight forward story of a typically American character endowed with great powers developed by self-education who exerted vast influence as a citizen and statesman for his own day and the future of

the country.
These suggestions are books that have been popular with young people who come to the library to borrow books. It is more than likely that your young readers would enjoy owning one of them.



Whither John Hertel?

member of the new Wayne County Board of Commissioners in the November election, apparently is one of the most popular Democrats in the state among the party's hierarchy. That opinion is based on the number of jobs Hertel has been mentioned for both prior to and since November

Even before the election, Hertel was being touted as a possible successor to Sheriff William Lucas in the event the sheriff won his race for Wayne County executive. That election went as expected and the rumors continued that Hertel might be appointed after Lucas resigns to accept his new post.

Lucas has his own favorite as his successor. He favors his undersheriff, Loren Pittman, but Wayne County Clerk James Killeen, who serves on a committee that he says will pick Lucas' successor, reportedly backs Hertel. Ultimately, the courts may have to decide whether Lucas or a three-member committee including Killeen would make the appointment.

Meanwhile, Hertel's name also has surfaced as a possible appointee by Gov.-elect James Blanchard to a high state position. One post mentioned is that of racing commissioner. Another is director of the Department of Agriculture. Still another is an unnamed post in the new governor's office.

EARLIER THIS year, before he filed for county commissioner from the 1st District, which includes the Pointes, Hertel was reported to have been interested in running for county executive. He supposedly bowed out of that race after he learned that Lucas was seeking the post and campaign funds for other possible Democratic candidates began to dry up.

Hertel ran a strong campaign for county commissioner. In the Democratic primary, he easily defeated an incumbent commissioner, Norbert Wisniewski, who had been reapportioned out of his old district. In November, he downed Barbara Gattron, the Republican nominee who had sidelined the incumbent 1st District commissioner, Erv Steiner, in the GOP

State Sen. John Hertel, who was elected a sheriff's job had become a campaign issue. He contended that he was still serving as a state senator and running for county commissioner but did not rule out the possibility of accepting the appointment to sheriff if it were offered to

Since the rumors about the other political jobs have started swirling around in political circles, Hertel has kept a surprisingly low profile. He is, of course, busy winding up his term as state senator but neither the daily papers nor the Grosse Pointe News has had any success in recent weeks in reaching him to learn exactly what his plans are.

Perhaps, in fact, Hertel doesn't know himself or hasn't decided which of a number of alternative appointments he will accept. However, the situation ought to be resolved soon since he will become the county commissioner for the 1st District on Jan. 1 — unless he resigns to take a better job before that date. If he is going to take another position, however, he does owe an explanation to the voters of the district, and, preferably, as early as possible.

IF HERTEL should resign, the charter gives told there was no charge for the county commissioners the power to appoint his successor by majority vote within 30 days. The charter also requires that the successor be a registered voter in the district belonging to the same political party as the previous commissioner. Children's toys remain stable through the ages

Children greeted by the bleeps and bloops of electronic games on Christmas morning might find equally intriguing an exhibit in Israel that reminds us of the kinds of toys that amused youngsters centuries ago — among them a clay rooster on wheels from

Jesus' time. Modern marvels notwithstanding, kids' basic ideas of fun haven't really changed much judging from the ancient board games, dolls and pull-toys on dis-play at the Rockefeller Museum of Archaeology in Jerusalem. One main difference, though, is evidenced by the millennia-old, ivory-headed rag dolls and carved stone race games: in "the good old days," playthings were made

Rockefeller Museum curator Michal Dayagi-Mendels decided to organize the exhibition a yearand-a-half ago when she learned that no serious research had been done on the subject of ancient games. Her compilation of items gathered from various Israeli museums and private collections in Israel and abroad is believed to be the first of its kind anywhere in the world. Many of the 40 items on display were uncovered in archaeological digs in Israel during the past half-century.

Many millenia ago, girls dressed, fed and loved their dolls much as they do today, and they could choose from a variety of little companions. Tiny dolls from Greek and Roman times are a highlight of the Rockefeller Museum show. Made of bone, alabaster, wood, clay, ivory or marble, the dolls range from 3 to 17 centimeters (1 to 6 inches) high. Most seem to have once had moveable limbs, some of which have been found in excavations.

So-called Coptic dolls from the 6th and 7th centuries CE are made of bone, with moveable arms. Many times the head is intricately carved while the lower part has an unfinished look. Archaeologists assume that is because the doll was later covered with rags and mud.

Most of the games excavated by archaeologists in this region have been "board" games, incised on floors of houses or carved on stones in fields. They fall into three categories: race games (the winner must finish shead of his

opponent), war games (the winner must remove his opponent's pieces from the board) and hunt games (the opponent must be eluded). The use of dice added an element of chance to the games, but skill was an important factor.

One pastime which apparently kept the kids occupied while their parents were busy praying was found scratched out on the floor of the courtyard of the second century synagogue at Capernaum in the Galilee. Called The Mill Game by curator Dayagi-Mendels, it resembles an ancient English game called Nine Men's Morris.

The Mill Game is comprised of a grid of concentric squares with diagonals. Players take turns occupying the cross points. The idea is to line up three counters which form a mill, thus securing against attack.

Two other board games in the show, 5000-year-old Senet and 4000-year-old Tau, were played in both Babylonia and Egypt before they reached Canaan and Judea, the Holy Land. Both were race games, with hazards and penalties for landing on certain squares, just as in Snakes and Ladders or Monopoly.

"Go back to square one" is a phrase that can be traced all the way back to the game of Senet, for that's what happened in this game if you landed on square number 27. The complicated rules of these games point to the probability that they were played by educated adults who could not only count but total up and record results; most likely, they were games for aristocrats and cour-

The oldest game discovered by an Israeli archaeologist was found near the Santa Katerina Monastery in the Sinai Desert. A form of Stone-Age Checkers, it is one of the original hunt games, played 10,000 years ago. It consists of a stone slab with 14 cups cut in two rows and is very similar to a game played by Beduin children in the Sinai sand today.

The clay pull-toys on display are reproductions of sheep, horses, otters and cows. They have holes pierced in their noses, probably for attaching a string, and holes in the feet for a small axle and wheels which could have been made of clay or wood. Very few still had wheels when they were found, but the museum experts have fitted most of the pull-toys with modern wooden wheels.

Also included in the exhibition are clay bird whistles and baby's rattles filled with seeds and pebbles. These items were found in children's graves of the Israelite period, buried alongside those who died young in order to provide the children with playthings in the next world.





Another Major Art Project for Malcolm

Speaking of art projects . . . Sculptor Malcolm Alexander, born in Crosse Pointe in 1925, the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Alexander, has been commissioned by the Fairbanks, Alaska, Women in Construction to create a monument capturing the Spirit of Fairbanks, to be the centerpiece of a riverfront park there, for the City of Fairbanks' 1984 festival celebrating 25 years of Alaskan statehood.

Alexander, who works out of a studio near Santa Barbara, Calif., is no stranger in or to Alaska. He spent several months there preparing and making sketches for the largest (he has made more than 200) sculpture he has ever undertaken: the trans-Alaska pipeline monument at the foot of the pipeline in Valdez. "We didn't know it couldn't be done" is a tribute to the 72,000 workers who built the pipeline.

His "Heroes in Bronze" series, begun in the late 60s, features about 50 athletes. Last year, invited to display his works at the National Portrait Gallery in Washington, D.C., he submitted a bronze of Joe DiMaggio and one of Roberto Clemente; in conjunction with this showing he was received at the White House in recognition of his contribution to American sports through art.

The American Working Man, the laborer whose hands and back built this country, is his personal hero and the subject of his "Backbone of America" series.

Alexander feels strongly about the dignity of personal labor — and worries about what may happen to the individual spirit when hard, physical work is no longer required or respected in tomorrow's technological world.

Among the completed projects Alexander takes special pride in is a full figure of Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas.

Among his current projects is a nine-foot monument of actor Jimmy Stewart. The sculpture will be unveiled next May, on Stewart's 75th birthday, in his hometown of Indiana, Pa.

Speaking of Jimmy Stewart . . . he's one of the Distinguished Alumni, along with F. Scott Fitzgerald, Josh Logan and Jose Ferrer (to name a few) of the Princeton Triangle Shows, now in their 83rd year, and this year's Princeton Triangle Show, "Stocks and Bondage," is coming to The Pointe, to play next Tuesday, Dec. 21, at the Center for Performing Arts at Grosse Pointe North High School.

Curtain time is 8:30 p.m. Tickets are \$12.50 and may be purchased at the door. There is no reserved seating. Additional ticket information may be obtained by contacting Ron Fredrick at 827-9385. Local alumni will host the student players, and there'll be a post-performance afterglow at the Grosse Pointe Hunt Club.

The Triangle Club, now a male/female operation, was founded by Booth Tarkington at Princeton University in 1899. This year, for the first time, the director is a woman: Miriam Ford. 4. Beat eggs. Stir in yogurt, melted butter, sugar and almond extract. Stir in chopped fruit. Stir in dry ingredients until just blended. Pour into prepared loaf pan. Bake 55 to 60 minutes or until bread tests clean in the center with a toothpick.

5. Cool in pan on wire rack 30 minutes. Top with another wire rack and invert to remove from pan. Allow to cool completely. Makes one loaf.

TIPS: *When using glass pan, reduce oven temperature 25° and bake bread an extra 5 or 10 minutes.

Refrigerate (up to 1 week) or freeze (up to 2 months). Best if made at least 12 hours before serving. Wrap in plastic wrap or bag and refrigerate to enable flavors to blend and for easier slic-

VARIATION: Replace apricots with an equal quantity of dried peaches: prunes with an equal amount of golden or dark (prettier) raisins. No need to chop rai-

Holiday hazards for asthmatics

Can Christmas trees produce a wheeze? Yes, says Paul J. Munzenberger, Pharm. D., chairman of the Child Lung Health Committee of the American Lung Association of Southeastern Michigan. For the two million children under the age of 17 who have asthma, the Christmas season harbors a number of allergens that can bring on an attack.

First is the seemingly harmless tree. Mold often begins to accumulate on its branches, especially if the tree has been cut several weeks before. When the tree begins to dry out the mold spread are released. are released. These spores are an allergen for many people, says Dr. Munzenberger.

"Be sure to pick your gifts for the asthma sufferer carefully," he adds. "Pets often are poor gifts, since their skin flakes and fur are highly allergenic. Stuffed toy animals, too, can produce an epi-sode. They retain dust and can become a home for the house dust



1/4 cup Egg Beaters 2 cups whole wheat pastry flour 2 tsp. baking powder

1 tsp. soda 1/4 tsp. salt

1/3 cup carob powder

The editorial department of the Grosse Pointe News went bowling one recent Sunday. At least that's what we called what we were doing that day. Actually, the only part of our activity that afternoon which came even close to the sport was our use of balls and pins . . . any other resemblance to the popular American pastime was purely coincidental.

(In other words, if a member of the Pro Bowlers Tour had been asked to observe us in action that day, he'd have asked for a cigarette and a blindfold.)

On paper, we looked like we could have been league regulars. In action, we were more like irregulars. Still, in the beginning, we looked promising.

Our group included News editor Susan McDonald (replete in her custom designed bowling shirt); Feature/Society editor Janet Mueller (it was through her impressive contacts that we obtained use of the bowling lanes — there are no "alleys" in Grosse Pointe — at the Grosse Pointe Yacht Club); business/school news editor Joanne Gouleche and her husband Bill; reporter Mike Andrzejczyk (who impressed us all when he announced that he'd be bringing his 'old" bowling ball for the event, instead of the one he uses regularly in maintaining his 154 average); and me, the sports editor, of who so much was expected (and so little delivered) in terms of athletic ability.



Crossroads East helps the needy

While some businesses and institutions suffer during a recession, outreach programs do a land-office business, according to Crossroads East, the satellite service center of the social outreach arm of the Cathedral Church of

St. Paul, Episcopal.
The second Crossroads center,
Crossroads East opened its loca-. tion at Jefferson and Martenique last summer with a staff of 50 counselors. The east side location was opened because 20 percent of its clients came from the lower east side.

Services at the east side location are similar to those offered at the main Crossroads, located at Woodward and Forest in downtown Detroit. The downtown location has served more than 16,000 people since it opened in Novem-

ber, 1971. The goals of Crossroads staff, according to the group, are fourfold. Trained counselors offer short-and-long term counseling to anyone, "regardless of race or creed or any other classification that divides our society," the group said. Counselors try to help clients find solutions to problems at the most basic level, the group

In some instances, counselors can make referrals to other service organizations that are geared

to specific client problems. Crossroads can act as an advocacy agency as well as provide food, loans and grants, transportation, clothing, meals and shelter. Medical and legal assistance is also available, and a Sunday soup kitchen is offered at the downtown location, we soup kitchen is planned for Crossroads

With the exception of director sistant director Martha McRoberts. the counseling staff works on a volunteer basis. For more information, call Mr. McLaren at 831-2002.

Crossroads is the social service arm of the Episcopal Church, but all denominations help support the program. The group receives no aid other than from the Combined Episcopal Services Appeal. Anyone interested in donating money and other needed items can call Crossroads at 831-2000. Contribu-

tions are tax-deductible. Crossroads is an associate member of People in Faith United, a coalition of lower eastside churches in Detroit and Grosse Pointe. The two groups got together to open the facility




