



#### We're tickled pink!


The "pink clink" has made the big time. After the GP News broke the story two weeks ago about the Farms' preppy jail, everybody else suddenly wanted to get into the act.

Herbert Reeves, of Grosse Pointe Woods, a purchasing agent with the Detroit public schools, said he's in the running for the June 13 school board election because he doesn't want to see Mason elementary school shut down.

ENCOURAGED, BY Mason parents to enter the board race, Reeves said: "I'm more or less running to convince the board that we don't want Mason school to close. The school board is using Mason as an excuse for closing schools.

Reeves, 41, said he has heard rumors that Mason will close and pointed to the fact that the citizen committee studying enrollment declines in the public schools mentioned the school when it addressed school consolidation in its recent report. (The committee stressed, however, that the school was used only as an example). At the school board's Feb. 14 meeting, at Mason school, trustee Jon Gandelot told parents Mason was not a target of a school closing. But Reeves said he is still hearing the rumors and (Gandelot's) statement "doesn't mean anything to me." Reeves, a purchasing agent with the Detroit schools for 20 years, said one of the ways to handle school closings is to look at how much it will cost to re-build another school building. "It's not so much closing schools as it is looking at the school building to see if it's worth saving," Reeves said. ON OTHER school issues, Reeves said the current sevenmember board does not represent all of Grosse Pointe and should include members of the medical, legal and educational professions. ## Close schools? Public hearing is Wednesday

#### By Joanne Gouleche

Grosse Pointe school officials last week announced plans for a series of public meetings on the future organization of the school system as they gear up for a solution to the district's declining enrollment problem this June.

The first meeting has been scheduled for next Wednesday, March 2, in the South High School auditorium at 8 p.m.

Next week's meeting is one of several "target dates" the Board of Education approved at its Feb. 14 meeting, designed to give trus-tees, school staff and parents "ample opportunity to participate" before a final board vote on the declining enrollment problem, including possible school closings, according to Supt. Dr. Kenneth Brummel

"WE ARE MOST concerned that the community has ample opportunity to participate. The calendar provides that," he said.

Other public hearings have been scheduled in April and May, according to the board-approved calendar. At the March 2 meeting, Dr. Brummel will act as moderator, and "the session will provide residents with an opportunity to express their opinions on what the organizational pattern of the public schools should be in future years." according to a memo from the superintendent's office.

A public hearing on a citizen's committee report studying declining enrollment in Grosse Pointe's public schools was well-attended by parents in November.

At last week's school board meeting, trustee Jon Gandelot dispelled rumors that some schools are already targeted to shut down, and emphasized the final decision to do so rests with the board at its June 13 meeting.

'You certainly are going to get a chance for some input," he told parents at that meeting.

IN JANUARY the citizen's committee, in its final report to the board, recommended that:

• One of the district's three middle schools should be closed by 1986 if enrollment trends per- The current grade structure in the public schools should be reorganized to K-5 in the elementary schools; 6-8 in the middle schools; 9-12 in the high schools

year for the district was in 1971 with 5,900 students in classrooms.

Parker said Southlake schools prepared for the school closings two years in advance.

"We had virtually no trouble at all. Everybody understood the reasons. We provide transportation to other schools now.

The school system sold two of its elementary schools to nearby churches and a third, Colony Elementary School, was bought and converted into a 15-unit condominium complex. Southlake currently maintains five buildings — three elementary schools, middle school and a high school.

Put two people together, a wag once said, and they'll form three political parties.

None of the six panelists discus-sing "Everyday Life in the 21st Century" at University Liggett School's "Tomorrow and Tomorrow and Tomorrow Speculations on the Shape of the Future'' forum held Friday, Feb. 18, said what you or I are going to eat, wear, or brush our teeth with in the next century, but they did give a taste of what to look forward to and watch out for in the future.

School officials are predicting there will be only 6,287 students in the public schools by the 1986-87 school year, a far cry from the 13.337 attending schools in 1971, the district's peak year. This fall, 7,805 students were counted in classrooms.

Grosse Pointe is not the only school district looking at those gloomy figures.

In neighboring St. Clair Shores, Southlake schools have closed three elementary schools and demolished a 50-year-old junior high school within the last few years as the system saw its pupil population dip to 2,300 last fall.

Southlake business manager Jerry Parker said peak enrollment

#### **Realtors have good news** 120-

Dramatic upswing

All you have to do is take one fices line the Farms shopping disstrict, are smiling again.


Figures released last week by the Grosse Pointe Real Estate Exchange show they have plenty to smile about these days. Sales people are listing more houses, selling more houses and getting higher prices than they have in the last two or three years. There's been a dramatic turnaround in real estate activity.

THE REASON is simple, according to Exchange President Thomas Youngblood. Mortgage rates are lower than they have been in several years and buyers are taking advantage. The rates have dropped from 17 percent in the Detroit area a year ago to about 1234 percent. Standard Federal Savings of Troy last weekend announced rates of 111/4 percent for new home construction.

"Interest rates are at about the 110stroll up and down the Hill and level we experienced in 1979 and you know it. Realtors, whose of 1980," said Youngblood. The number of homes on the market is also high (401 this January, compared to just 80 in January of 1979). The good news for the buyer is that our selection of homes for sale is three times what it was in 1979 and '80," Youngblood said. The Exchange president says the increased activity is fueled by a great amount of "pent-up demand for housing in the area.

> "THINGS BEGAN to pick up in November. I don't want to go overboard with optimism, but I do believe this is a trend. If these interest rates hold, this will be the best spring and summer we've seen in three or four years."

> Figures released by the Exchange show the number of sales closed last month up 60 percent from 1982 when only 30 deals were closed. The number of sales pending closing (see chart at right)



was up even more dramatically to 109 for last month from just 53 in January, 1982. The 1983 figure for pending closings was highest in five years. Sixty five closed in the first month of 1981, 84 in 1980, 83 in 1979, 93 in 1978 and 83 in 1977.

### Cox Cable drops HBO, picks up a lawsuit

Five irate cable television viewers in Grosse Pointe Shores and St. Clair Shores slapped Cox Cable with a \$1 million class action lawsuit after the company cancelled their Home Box Office programming and replaced it with Spot Light, a program partially owned by Cox.

The suit was initiated by Grosse Pointe Shores resident Leon Sehoyan, "One of their strongest selling points when they were bidding for the franchise was that they offered HBO," said Schoyan. "Then they up and dropped it. No subscribers that I know of received any notification about the switch.

"Cox said they took a survey and people wanted HBO dropped because they wanted all movies and no sports. That's BS. This is

the most sports minded town around

"I FEEL THEY sold us a Lincoln Continental package and we wound up with a Pinto instead." said Sehoyan. "I think Cox was counting on people being apathetic. They've done this sort of thing before

The suit, filed by attorney James Tanielian, asks for a complete refund of all fees paid to Cox since the company made the switch in June, 1982; the reinstatement of HBO: \$1 million in punitive damages and all attorneys fees.

"I'm surprised Cox is doing this," said Tanielian. "HBO is the biggest and best programming around for cable television. We'd like to see some documentation of their survey.



Mike Andersen, corporate director of public relations for Atlanta Based Cox said the company was 'surprised" by the lawsuit.

"We've never experienced this sort of thing before," he said. "This particular switch was made in the Shores, St. Clair Shores, Fraser and two other Michigan cities several months ago. This is the only place we've had this sort of reaction."

Andersen added that Cox owns 62 franchises in 23 states, but that the company never makes prog-ram changes "across the board" affecting all the franchises.

"We only make switches that are in the best interests of the consumer," said Andersen, "Spot Light is comparable with HBO in every aspect. Also, because Spot Light is partially owned by Cox we can be more responsive to consumer issues. If they have legitimate concerns, we can listen to them. We have no real control over HBO. We're merely brokers for their services.'

### Cox Cable drops HBO and picks up a lawsuit to subscribers and city councils before the switch went into effect.

"THE FIRST thing we did was notify the city councils," he said. Then the customers, either by direct mail, advertisements in local newspapers or possibly by some type of promotion on the cable system itself. Word did go out in advance.'

Fraser Councilman Walter Lange confirmed that the council was aware of the upcoming switch in programming.

'We received some kind of an invitation to an open house to be introduced to the Spot Light prog-ram," he said. "Mayor Roberts of St. Clair Shores was also there when they told us of the switch. They said it was a better program for the viewers and that they wouldn't be raising the rates on

"We called them on the switch." continued Lange. "Mayor Roberts was so angry that he left in a huff. Cox has not been responsive to our objections here in Fraser. We've had a very poor relation-ship with them and have been sorry ever since we signed up.

"It's a bad business. We've been sold a bill of goods." Lange added that some Fraser residents were getting up petitions to ask Cox to reinstate the HBO programming.

St. Clair Shores City Manager Roy Stype also confirmed that his city received advance notice of the switch, but that it was pre-sented "as a matter of fact."

WE HAD NO choice in the matter," he said. "There was no notice given to subscribers that I know of. Mayor Roberts was upset about the change and the problems we had about the addition earlier of the Escapade (adult entertainment) channel.


'We've received lots of angry calls and letters about the switch," Stype continued. "Some viewers feel they aren't getting what they contracted for. They feel they've been 'shilled'.

"However, cities are restricted by what they can require of cable television companies," said Stype. "According to the Federal Communications Commission, all we can require is the basic packages. We can't specify HBO or Spot Light.

Grosse Pointe Shores is the only Pointe community franchised by Cox Cable. The rest of the Pointes are signed with Group W Cable, Inc., a subsidiary of the Westinghouse Broadcasting and Cable, Inc.

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### Parents sue over cornea removal

last week against St. John Hospital and the Wayne County Medical Examiner hope the action will strengthen notification procedures required by law before the removal of corneas, their attorney said

Frank and Mary Wolschon filed suit last week in Wayne County Circuit court, alleging the corneas of their son, Thomas, had been removed without their permission. Thomas, 18, had been severly injured in an auto accident in Detroit last Nov. 4. He died two days later in St. John Hospital.

Howard Wallach, representing Members of a Grosse Pointe the Wolschons, said the family Woods family who filed a lawsuit learned the corneas had been removed after reading the autopsy report more than two months after the accident. Wallach said the Wolschons read the report hoping to determine that trauma to the head had been a direct cause of their son's death.

> Since filing the suit on Monday, Feb. 14, Wallach said he learned the corneas were removed at the Wayne County Medical Examiner's Office. Corneas are not usually removed by morgue personnel, according to Dr. Haresh Merchandani, assistant to chief medical examiner Dr. Werner

Spitz, but by the staff of such donor organizations as the Michigan Eye Bank.

Under state law, according to Wallach, corneas can't be removed without the consent of the next of kin. The hope of the family is that through the suit, the notification procedures between hospitals and medical examiner's offices will be improved to eliminate such problems, he said.

St. John officials said they could not comment on the case because it is pending.

Richard Fuller, managing director of the Michigan Eye Bank. said state law allows the removal of corneas after the performance of an autopsy if they are not needed in criminal investigation and will not damage the face of the deceased.

The cornea of the eye is a clear membrane one millimeter thick and about 10 millimeters in diameter that covers the pupil and retina of the eye. A scratched, clouded or diseased cornea blocks the light traveling to the sense organs in the back of the eyeball and impairs vision.

The medical examiner or anyone who serves as an agent with the medical examiner to remove the corneas can do so if they know of no objections by the family, Fuller said.

Corneas must be removed within six hours of death, Fuller said. They are then prepared by the Michigan Eye Bank for transplant or research purposes, he said.

Nationally, about 15,000 cornea transplants were done last year with a success rate of near 90 percent, Fuller said. The procedure of removing the diseased cornea and replacing it with a healthy one sounds simple, he pointed out. but it is extremely delicate work.

The Michigan Eye Bank is the only processing facility for corneas in the Lower Pennisula, Fuller said. Another eye bank serves the Upper Pennisula.

The Wolschons are asking dam-ages in excess of \$10,000, Wallach said. The amount is the minimum jurisdictional limit for civil cases filed in circuit courts, he pointed out, adding awards may be higher than that.

tion to the declining enrollment problem." Over the last 10 years, the district has seen enrollment drop from 1,853 to 914.

When the East Detroit Board of Education voted to close some of its schools three years ago, it was a traumatic experience for the community, according to Supt. Dr. Emil Siccoretti.

The school system shut down three elementary schools in 1979 and in 1976. During the 1981-82

was a recall attempt of five board of education members. It was unsuccessful.

"Those are the kinds of things we would just as soon forget. They are wounds that have healed," Dr. Siccoretti said.

The East Detroit school system counted 7,490 students in classrooms last fall, compared to the 12,790 10 years ago.

Unsuccessful recall attempts of school members were also made in Birmingham, where the school system has closed six buildings since 1971.

"There were recall altempts and one time, after the board slated three schools for closing, it reversed its decision and went back to the drawing board because Lansing, communications spe- to special interest groups, the City

BUT WE GOT parents on our side, eventually, by committing to use the costs we avoided by closing schools to reduce class size. Parents seemed better able to accept their school closing if they were guaranteed their child would be in a class of no more than 19 children," Ms Lansing said.

Birmingham school enrollment dropped drasticly from 18,000 students in 1967 to 8,129 this year.

The school system maintains 16 buildings, including two high schools, four middle schools and 10 elementary schools.

Since 1973, the Livonia schools have closed 21 buildings - 15 elementary schools and six junior high schools. According to Supt. Dr. George Graver, school board members will have to face the issue of closing a high school this June.

LIVONIA'S school population dwindled to 19,000 last fall. a 50 percent decline from the 38,500 students in classrooms in 1970. Supt. Garver said administrators are predicting only 12,500 students by 1992, adding experts believe there is no evidence the birth rate will reverse itself by the end of the century.



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

Kaufmann said. We can survive "assuming nobody goes quite crazy by trying to poison the world," he said. "You can always assume people will never act completely rationally and com-pletely irrationally." That, he ad-ded, would be the saving grace to limit nuclear exchanges.

• Heavy industries such as automobile and steel won't be the industrial leaders they were, Kaufmann said. While they will continue to exist, they will be smaller and less important to the economy of the 21st century.

• Gene-splicing may open the way to the cure of all congenital, or inherited diseases, along with doing away with the nation's leading killers, cancer and heart disease, according to Dr. Eberhard Mammen, professor in the physiology and pathology depart-ments at Wayne State University. Splicing genes could lead to the possible eradication of all infections and infectious diseases by the second millennium, he said.

At the same time, society must decide what it will allow ethically to extend the life, Mammen said. The questions of cloning, artificial organs, and organ removal and transplant are questions the next generation is going to have to answer, he added.

• The key to success in the next century may be the ability to get access to information from reference sources rather than rote memorization, according to Edwin Frederickson, vice-president for finance for the Evening News Association, a media conglomerate. Because the amount of informa-

tion will become staggering, students may find the road to success lies in the ability to speak with computers to get the information they need, Frederickson said. Teaching machines and teaching programs play a greater part in education, he said.

By the way, Frederickson pre-dicts you will still be able to go out on the front porch in 2001 and pick up the newspaper. Printed publications "will be with us for a while at least" while, at least.'

# ngry party members lose appeal to state panel

A small group of Grosse Pointe Republicans failed last weekend in their effort to appeal the 14th District's list of delegates to the Republican State Convention Credentials Committee.

The original delegates, chosen at the 14th District convention on Jan. 19, were allowed to participate in the state convention despite the petition to appeal presented by district delegates whom were not appointed as state delegates.

Barbara Gattorn, state delegate from Grosse Pointe, presented her case to the Credentials Committee on Friday, Feb. 18 at the Westin Hotel in Detroit. She asked that the committee void the Wayne County portion of the 14th District election, claiming there were many violations of the Michigan

Election Law, Robert's Rules of Order, and the Open Meetings Act of 1976.

Her report stated that:

• There was no apportionment stated in the call to convention.

• No roll call vote was taken at the time of selection of the permanent chairman.

• The Delegate Selection Committee met in private. Elected precinct delegates and the public were barred from observing.

• Division of the House was called several times after a close voice voted on adoption of Delegate Selection Committee report and ignored by the chairman.

• With a previous motion to divide on the floor, the chairman accepted a motion to adjorn.

• Delegates to the state convention were selected contrary to apportionment by city.

Mrs. Gattorn said she had a meeting to prove her allegations. A motion was made to hear the tapes, but failed on a hand vote. George Heitmanis, a state dele-gate and Credential Committee

member, countered Ms. Gattorn. and stated that she merely wanted to eliminate the delegates that were chosen and elect a list of delegates that were chosen by herself.

"The point is that the majority rules," Heitmanis said. "She wants to oust the elected delegates and hand-pick her own list. This is a democracy and a democracy doesn't operate like that."

David Haugan, attorney and precinct delegate from Harper Woods argued, "the issue is that the rules were not followed." John Getz, state delegate and member of the district's Rule and Order of Business Committee, stated that Robert's Rules (popular set of parliamentary procedures) were read and accepted as the rules of the convention.

Bottcher, however, chose to withdraw his name from the nomination and made a motion to close all further nominations. The motion carried

Gilsenan was elected chairman of the 14 District's State Convention by a roll call of votes.

Once elems are in leaf, residents should periodically look for wilting in the uppermost branches, the first indication of the disease, and have those branches removed by a cityapproved contractor. A list of registered companies is available at City Hall.

# Farms serious crime rate rose in 1982

#### **By Michael Raveane**

The number of major crimes in Grosse Pointe Farms during 1982 increased more than five percent over the 1981 figure, according to the police department's annual crime report submitted to the city council on Feb. 14.

While the state and national crime trends have declined recently, crime figures in the Farms are likely to continue "above the norm" in 1983, according to Police Chief Robert Ferber.

Although the report showed an overall rise in major crimes,

there was a decrease in the number of robberies, burglaries and auto thefts for the year. Larceny and aggravated assault were the crimes that increased most.

According to the report, there were 576 reported crimes for the year listed as Part I, or serious offenses, up 31 since 1981. The change represents an increase of 5.6 percent. The report showed that burglary

was the crime with the greatest numerical decrease for the year, down 11 percent from 1981. The total number of burglaries for 1982

The reason for the reduction in the number of burglaries was 'several good arrests," according to the report. Because burglars and groups of burglars generally work in the same general areas, the apprehension of suspects in the area will usually cause the number of incidents to decrease, the report said.

When those folks are apprehended, you see a decrease in the immediate three-city area," Ferber said, referring to Grosse Pointe City and Park.

Robbery was the crime with the largest percentage drop for 1982, down 40 percent from the previous year. Twelve incidents were reported, which was down from 20 in 1981.

1982, down from the 41 incidents that were reported in 1981.

The crime of greatest increase was larceny, up by 11 percent. with 425 cases reported in 1982 compared to 383 in 1981.

The overall increase in crime and the report's prediction that the trend will continue, is due to the demographic and economic circumstances of the metropolitan Detroit area, the report said.

"This phenomenon . . . mainly stems from our geographic loca-tion, reputation for wealth, the particular plight of the area's economy . ...' the report said.

The report noted that for the first time, the majority of suspects apprehended said they lived in Detroit, rather than Grosse Pointe. The police chief said that this development is also directly related to the bad economic conditions of the area. Also blamed for the crime in-

crease are certain "weaknesses inherent in our state's criminal justice system." The report said plea bargaining, probation and "ridiculously early release" are contributing factors

contributing factors. "Unfortunately, in our criminal justice system, because of its inability to absorb offenders, crime pays and 'good arrests' of the same individuals working the same area, must be made again and again by police," the report said.

"This is kind of frustrating to There were 38 auto thefts in the guy in the street," Ferber said. "It's kind of a revolving door and I think the citizen suffers."

Grosse Pointe Woods' annual crime report, submitted to council in January, indicated a 6.7 percent decrease in Part I offenses in 1982 compared to 1981. The number of rapes, assaults, burglaries, larcenies and arson declined in the Woods, while the number of robberies and auto thefts increased. Serious crime also declined in the Shores, according to a January report to the council. Other Grosse Pointe police departments have not yet issued their year-end summaries.

### Panel supports pay hike for disabled GPW worker

The city of Grosse Pointe Woods may pay a disabled public safety officer an extra \$388 a month while he appeals the loss of his workmen's compensation monthly payment of \$588.

The council, meeting as a committee-of-the-whole Monday, Feb. 14, voted unanimously to recommend to the council an increase in Stuart Gerow's monthly supplementary payments from \$200 to \$588 pending the disposition of Gerow's appeal.

Gerow, 37, began working for the city in July, 1969. He retired in 1980 after he injured his back on the job. The injury grew progres-sively worse and forced him to retire, fellow officers said.

Under the provisions of the Woods' disability pension, Gerow was to receive 22 percent of his salary and a monthly payment, from workmen's compensation totalling \$908 a month.

A state law, passed about two years ago, however, made it il-legal for police and fire officers to collect both workmen's compensation and a disability pension. The law, according to Woods officials. was to correct a problem where workers in some cities were collecting a total from a disability pension and workmen's compensation that was greater than the salary they received before they retired.

no hearing date has been set. Last December, the council

granted Gerow a \$200 supplement to be repaid when the case was settled. The Feb. 14 motion, if adopted by the full council, would increase that amount to \$588 with the same pay-back provisions. Gerow would repay the city the amount he received in supplements from the workmen's compensation settlement minus the attorney costs he incurred, officials

said. Councilmembers agreed to the recommendation for the increased payments and asked for a quarterly review of the case.

They said the supplement would be paid from the general fund, adding they felt it was best for the city to stand behind its employes.



• An unemployment rate higher than the statewide average for three of the preceding five years. • A poverty rate greater than the statewide average.

• A decline in population since 1960.

• An overall increase in the state equalized valuation of real and personal property of less than the statewide average increase since 1972.

Economic growth areas would offer incentives for businesses and industries to locate or continue business there, and be governed by an 11-member citizens council, the senator said. The incentives would include property tax exemptions, improved local services such as police protection and transportation, and the availability of the city's economic development and land use planning resources. A council would be reimbursed by the state for 50 percent of any property tax abate-ment granted, under the legislation.

Of each 11-member council, three members would be persons elected by the community within the economic growth area. The other eight would be appointed by the city's chief executive officer: three from labor organizations representing workers in the area, three from businesses with interests in the area, and two from the city's planning and economic de-

The council would also administer an economic development fund to make and guarantee loans to qualified businesses in the economic growth area, for public improvements, for the funding of common services used by residents and qualified businesses. and for neighborhood associations, the senator said.

Funds for the program would come from the state for the property tax abatements, from community development block grants, gifts and loans, Kelly said.


Under the bills businesses wishing to take advantage of incentives offered by an economic growth area would have to meet a number of conditions, including:

• If the business presently is located within the economic growth area, at least 50 percent of its current employes must live in the city, and at least 75 percent of the newly-hired employes must be city residents.

 If the business presently is not located within the economic growth area, at least 75 percent of the employes hired must be city residents.

• Regardless of whether the business presently is or is not located within the economic growth area, at least 20 percent of the newly-hired employes must have been either unemployed for the previous six months, or receiving general assistance or aid to dependent children payments, or head families within income levels at or below the statewide level of poverty.




"Health Directions is a unique program which will serve an ever-growing community need and will help control rising health care costs by minimizing the community's utilization of the health care system," he said.

#### **Know Your Schools**

### What if millage fails?

#### By Dr. Kenneth Brummel Supt. of Schools

The schools' and libraries' millage election is scheduled for Monday, March 7, and in preparation for that election, voters may be interested in some of the questions about the millage which are being asked and the answers to those questions.

The most frequent asked question is, "Why does the ballot wording use the word 'increase' when each proposition is being pre-sented as a reduction?" The word "increase" is contained in the ballot language because of legal re-quirements. Use of the word does not grant the Board of Education the authority to increase the millage, but refers to that portion of the total millage amount over the amount allocated to the schools by the county without a vote of the people. So even if the school system asked for a levy of only one mill more than the county allo-cated millage, the word "increase" would have to be contained in the ballot language. This language is archaic and confusing terminology, especially when it is

used in connection with reduction of millage levies that have expired, as it is the situation in this election.

The important point to remember is that the board is asking for a reduction in the authority to levy the same millage approved in the 1980 millage election, and the word "increase" is used because those rates, as any voted rate would be, will be added to the county allocated millage (less than 8 mills).

Another question being asked is "What will happen if the millage fails?" Because the millage which has expired covers the total operating costs of the public schools and libraries, the only revenue that would be available to the district in the event of a "no" vote on March 7 would be money generated by the county allocated millage. That amount (less than 8 mills) would allow the schools and libraries to operate for only a short time, so another election would have to be scheduled. At that time, the propositions could be presented to the voters again... but this would be very disruptive to the school system and the

community and would negatively affect plans for next year because of the uncertainty surrounding the outcome of a future election.

A final question I wish to ad-dress is, "Where can residents obtain information on tax credits available to them?" This year alone, the state will provide more than a million Michigan homeowners and renters, with senior citizens, disabled persons, and some veterans being the largest benefactors of tax relief pro-grams. Because the credits depends so much on individual circumstances, the best place to ob-tain specific information is to contact an office of the Michigan Department of Treasury. Senior citizens also can contact the Area Agency on Aging.

In addition, depending upon individual circumstances, many residents also can qualify for fed-eral tax credits on the property taxes they pay.

Hopefully, these answers to the questions most frequently asked will help voters to have a better understanding of the millage propositions.









## High court plays politics

Michigan's state Supreme Court, already re- as well as the court's membership will be degarded as one of the most political and least judicial of any high court in the country, caused the state additional embarrassment last week with its highly publicized flip-flop on the ouster of Dorothy Comstock Riley from the court.

It was Justice Charles Levin who proved to be the swing man whose vote in the end was responsible for Mrs. Riley's removal. He at first voted with the two Republican and against the three Democrats to permit Mrs. Riley to remain on the court and then, for reasons that are still obscure, changed his mind to vote with the three Democrats to force Mrs. Riley off the court.

LEVIN HIMSELF is a former Democrat who formed his own party to win nomination and election to the court after being rejected by the Democrats. In the end the vote on Mrs.Riley was a strictly partisan one with the Republicans favoring her retention and the Democrats voting to get rid of her.

One reason the Michigan court stands in such ill repute is the method of its election. Candidates now are nominated by the two political parties and the nominees then run on a supposedly nonpartisan ticket. What a travesty on justice! Over the years both parties have tended to nominate people with big political names rather than those with the best judicial qualifi-cations. And thus we have seen people who are more renowned as politicians than as judges or even lawyers winning post on the highest court in the state.

In recent years, we have seen a continuing decline in the public's respect for and confidence in many institutions in society. The judiciary has suffered a loss in public esteem along with many other institutions. Now in Michigan the decision of the supreme court raises the question as to whether other issues own private totem pole.

cided on a politically partisan basis. Just the raising of such a question contributes to the further loss of public respect for the court system.

After his switch, Justice Levin said "we should apologize to the people of Michigan." He's right although his own reasons for switching his vote appear to be somewhat suspect. After saying the two-month long dispute had "totally preoccupied" the court since the first of the year, Levin came up with the remarkable suggestion that Gov. James Blanchard appoint an eighth member of the court, which would be in clear violation of the Constitution that specifically limits the membership to seven. Levin reversed himself a couple of days later on the grounds he felt four justices should have made the decision. Why he couldn't have figured that out several days earlier wasn't explained.

TO HER CREDIT, Mrs. Riley behaved with judicial decorum and good sense throughout the embarrassing battle. After the decision that forced her off the court, she said she had concluded that "no constructive service can be served by my pursuing these matters further at this time," and announced she was giving up her fight to keep her seat. Mrs. Riley, a Grosse Pointe Farms resident, was a Wayne County circuit judge and the first woman on the Michigan Court of Appeals before being appointed to the supreme court. She now will return to the private practice of law.

If he wanted to take political partisanship out of the court, Gov. Blanchard, of course, could reappoint Mrs. Riley. But he won't do that because he wants to make sure the court retains its dominant Democratic tinge. And so the state will continue to suffer with a supreme court that makes politics its highest priority and gives justice a somewhat lower rating on its

### Planning for survival



But at the pre-sent time there is little coordination among the various universities and the action of one hard-pressed university in curtailing programs seldom is related to the action of another state educational institution.

JAMRICH HAS put to Gov. James Blanchard his proposal for the creation of a Michigan

The plan would be to seek maximum coordination among existing agencies concerned with the needs of higher education in Michigan. Jamrich recommended that the commission be authorized for a three-year period to prevent it from becoming a permanent state planning agency for higher education.

The idea makes good sense. It is true that this is not the first time such a proposal has been made and it is also true that colleges and universities in the past have protested against such an idea on the grounds that it would threaten their independence. From reading the news stories and letters to the editor, we conclude that one of the most frequent arguments made against proposed legislation to compel passenger car riders to wear safety belts, is that such a requirement would be an intrusion on people's rights.

As Michigan along with eight other states prepares to consider safety belt legislation this year, we think it is important to call on some expert testimony to answer this so-called "rights" argument in view of the fact that it is estimated 11,500 lives would be saved annually and 600,000 injuries prevented if seven out of 10 persons wore such belts.

**ONE REBUTTAL** witness is Charles L. Spilman, director of state relations for the Motor Vehicle Manufacturers Association. He contends that a law requiring belt wear is "no more an intrusion (on a person's rights) than a posted speed limit or any other law enacted to ensure safe traffic.'

A second answer comes from Philip W. Haseltine, executive director of Michigan's Highway Safety Planning Department. He points out that our forefathers, in drafting the Constitution and the Bill of Rights, had in mind "a participatory democracy in which each of us has an obligation to contribute to our individual and collective well-being."

That being so, he continues, "If we are serious about reducing the size and cost of government, then each of us has a responsibility to contribute to that objective. Establishing a public policy requiring safety belt use falls in that category.

Haseltine points out that there is nothing in rights.

the Bill of Rights that says anything about the right to operate a motor vehicle or that requires the state to give you a driver's license. Instead, he says, driving is a privilege granted by state government, and then adds:

"This is the same government that says your kids must be immunized before attending schools (you don't fight that one), that says you must drive no faster than 25 m.p.h. in your neighborhood (you don't fight that one) or that says you must turn your headlights on after dark (you don't fight that one).

"Government bails you out when you need medical assistance after an accident," he went on. "Government picks you up, takes you to the hospital and pays the tab when you're unable to pay yourself. And when you're talking about government' picking up the tab, you're talking about you, me and every other taxpayer in this state. What right do you have to rip off my tax dollars, as you refuse to take the reasonable precaution of buckling up?"

What right, indeed, since the government already compels the manufacturers to install seat belts or some passive restraint in every new car? And, after all, buckling up is not the only reasonable precaution we're required to take in the public interest.

IN OUR VIEW, these are effective arguments, especially in view of the fact that only about 11 percent of automobile riders now voluntarily buckle up. The proposal to require the use of safety belts for a three-year period in Michigan certainly is worth a trial despite objections that it would intrude on individual

### Second chance for Kelly Leon to win major music award

Kelly Leon, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold B. Leon, of Ridgemont Road, and a senior at Grosse Pointe South High School, is one of 12 outstanding young vio-linists selected nationally to compete in the finals of the Seven-teen Magazine & General Motors National Concerto Competition.

She has won an all-expense-paid trip to the finals which will take place tomorrow, Friday, Feb. 25, through Monday, Feb. 28, at the University of Southern California in Los Angeles.

Several hundred young musicians from across the country had entered the competition. Kelly, who will be competing for the second year in a row, is the only one selected from the state of Michigan to participate in the finals of the only national music competition specifically for high schoolage artists.

The Seventeen Magazine & General Motors National Concerto Competition is open to young men and women who are United States citizens currently studying with a music instructor and in grades 9, 10, 11 or 12 at the time of the finals.

Selection of the finalists was made on the basis of audition tapes, submitted by entrants in November of 1982 and judged in blind tape auditions by profes-sional musicians affiliated with the University of Southern California

The competition, for young musicians in three instrumental categories — piano, violin and clarinet — is an annual event, now in its second year. The host school of the finals rotates each year; last year's finals were conducted at the University of Rochester's Eastman School of Music in Rochester, N.Y.

IN LOS ANGELES, one first place winner will be selected in each of the three instrumental categories and awarded a \$5,000 music scholarship, donated by General Motors. One grand prize winner may also be selected from among the three categorical first prize winners. The grand prize winner will have the opportunity to perform as a guest artist with The Philadelphia Orchestra.

Kelly first started taking lessons when she was two-and-a-half. "My mother enrolled me in Suzuki classes," she explains. "This is a pecial system of teaching violin, designed for very young children.'
