Crime suits her

Ever have one of those days? Dennis Egan, of D.M. Egan Clothiers, in the Village, did recently when he discovered a woman on her hands and knees in his store.

He approached and said "Hi! What are you doing?" The shopper was busy stuffing three suits (valued at \$1,000) into a bag. When he called the police, she dashed across Kercheval into another store, out the back and into a car.

City police arrived there and brought her to the station where she gave them a feminine name equivalent to "John Doe." Somehow doubting her word, police i.d. her through fingerprints.

Officers fed her real name into the LEIN (Law Enforcement Information Network) machine, then jumped back when the teletype went into overdrive and began spitting out a rap sheet that eventually measured about 20 feet long.

"That was the longest sheet I've ever seen," said Det. Sgt. John Drummond, in awe. "I thought the machine was going to overheat!"

The woman's crime career began in 1970 with prostitution, progressing to larceny and assault and battery in Highland Park, Detroit, Plymouth, Southfield, Harper Woods and Redford Township.

The woman (a resident of Detroit) was arraigned before Park Municipal Judge Beverly Grobbel on Wednesday, March 9, on larceny charges. She's currently in the Wayne County Jail on a \$5,000 cash bond awaiting preliminary exam this week.

Don't be surprised if crime drops about 10 percent while she's there.

Spotlight on Cox Cable forces HBO's return

Apparently you can fight city hall. Plaintiffs in a class action lawsuit brought recently against Cox Cable are rejoicing over the company's decision to reinstate the popular HBO programming.

The lawsuit, headed by Grosse Pointe Shores resident Leon Sehoyan, accused the company of breach of contract when it dropped HBO last summer in favor of the Cox Cable owned program called Spotlight.

At that time the company said it was only doing what subscribers wanted, saying a survey showed viewers preferred Spotlight to HBO because it offered more movies and less sports.

In their lawsuit, the plaintiffs (all residents of Grosse Pointe Shores and St. Clair Shores) asked for \$1 million in damages and the reinstatement of HBO. Representing the plaintiffs was St. Clair Shores Attorney James Tanielian.

The program will once again be

available to viewers in the Shores, St. Clair Shores and Fraser on May 1, according to Cox Cable general manager Mike Zimmer.

Zimmer said the company reinstated the program because it was interested in giving subscribers what they want. He said the class action lawsuit filed against Cox Cable did not play a part in the decision to bring back HBO.

Zimmer declined to reveal exactly how many protests the company had received about the Spotlight substitution, but did say it appeared to be a "significant number."

Tanielian said he wasn't surprised that Cox Cable received cries of protest over the TV switch. "Everyone we talked to was really upset about the substitution," he said. "Anytime we mentioned we were taking them to court, people would slap us on the back and tell us to 'go get em'."

Tanielian added he was going to call a meeting of the plaintiffs and urge them to forego the damages

portion of the lawsuit. "At this point, the idea of pursuing \$1 million in damages is moot," he said.

"The major portion of the suit was to re-instate HBO to the viewers and that's exactly what we did. I think we've made our point. We don't want Cox Cable to get the idea they can make wholesale changes like this and expect viewers to go along like a bunch of lemmings."

Sehoyan said he received the news on Monday, March 14. "I was informed that Shores Village Superintendent Michael Kenyon had received a letter from Cox stating that HBO would again be available to residents," he said.

"I think it is absolutely great," added Sehoyan. "It gives you a good feeling when the little guy can take on a major power and win. Another thing to remember is that it also helps to have a sharp Armenian lawyer on your side."

Sehoyan added that there were still some details to be worked out concerning attorney fees.

Woods won't spray city-owned elms

Citing studies in the Woods and Illinois that question the effectiveness of spraying to prevent dutch elm disease, the Woods said this week it plans to stop spraying elms on city-owned property.

Instead, the city will speed up its program of trimming away diseased limbs and removing trees infected with the disease, Administrator-Clerk Chester Petersen said.

Other Grosse Pointe cities, including the Farms, Park and City, plan to continue their regular elm spraying programs this spring.

The recommendation to stop the spraying in the Woods came from the city's Tree Advisory Commission at its Jan. 12 meeting. The decision was based on studies provided by Illinois state officials which showed no significant difference in losses in cities that sprayed and cities that didn't, according to Barbara Hayes, a tree commission member.

Another consideration for the change is economics, another tree commission member said. Spraying is more expensive than trimming and removal, and in times when cities have to tighten the budget belt, the more effective method for disease prevention has to be chosen. They noted there are no "dramatic differences" in tree losses in sprayed and non-sprayed areas.

DUTCH ELM disease is a fungus that is carried by two types of beetles, the American and European elm bark beetle. The insects bore into the bark of the tree to lay their eggs, which are contaminated with the fungus. Thousands of elms have been lost to the disease in Grosse Pointe.

When the tree fights the fungus, it forms a thick, sappy material that clogs its water transmission system, slowly strangling it.

One of the first signs of the disease is green wilt, the wilting of leaves at the upper branches during summer.

Spraying is done in the spring before the beetles hatch. The insects are poisoned when they cross through the pesticide or in-

gest treated portions of the tree.

According to the city's Department of Public Works, the Woods has lost 250 trees since it began spraying in 1980. The three years before that, when the city was not spraying, the city lost only 138.

THERE ARE a number of other factors involved in the spread of the disease, tree commission members said. Studies in Illinois cities, however, showed little difference between losses of sprayed and untreated trees. In Elmhurst, Ill., a study over 25 years in a 25-acre area showed trees that were not sprayed died at about the same rate as other areas of the city that were sprayed yearly, according to Mrs. Hayes.

Trimming away the diseased portions of the tree can prevent further spread of the fungus. Once the disease reaches the trunk of the tree, the elm is considered lost and should be removed, Mrs. Hayes said.

THE DISEASE can be transmitted through roots in the ground, if the trees are close together, or by the beetles. Recent studies show, however, that only 2 percent of the elm bark beetles carry the fungus, the commission said. The greater distances between the elm trees slows transmission of the disease through the roots.

The city's decision to discontinue spraying on city property does not effect the tree commission's program of setting up discount rates for the spraying of trees on private property, tree commission officials said. That spring spraying will still be offered.

In addition, the commission will sponsor a program on the injection of elms with the chemical Arbotect at 7:30 p.m. in the Woods council chambers on Wednesday and Thursday, April 27 and 28. Biologists and horticulturists will take part in the program.

Arbotect is injected into the tree near the roots to help strengthen the tree's defenses against dutch elm disease. The chemical is able to incorporate itself into the wood of the tree to slow the disease, tree commission officials said.

Top school aide accepts supt. post in Hastings

School Supt. Dr. Kenneth Brummel's top assistant, Carl Schoessel, will leave his post this June to become the superintendent of schools in Hastings, Mich.

Confirming what the school community has known for weeks, Schoessel, 39, announced this week he has accepted the top school job in the 3,800-student school district of Hastings, near Battle Creek.

Although Schoessel has not yet formally submitted his letter of resignation, he said he took the Hastings position in part to get away from the Detroit metropolitan area and into a smaller town.

"IT WASN'T A question of wanting to leave Grosse Pointe," Schoessel said. "An opportunity came up and it presented some challenges that I was interested in pursuing."

Schoessel, who joined the Grosse Pointe public school system in 1965 as a biology teacher and swimming coach at South High School, said it really wasn't his intention to stay in the community for so many years.

"When I first moved here, my intentions were to teach for a while," Schoessel said. "As it turned out, I moved gradually into different positions within the school system."

While serving as swimming coach at South, Schoessel's team carried home a state championship in 1968. Later, Schoessel was named swimming coach of the year by the Detroit News.

In 1972 Schoessel was appointed a part-time administrator in the Department of Community Services and that job led to a full-time position in 1975. Three years later, then Supt. Dr. William

7-year-old rouses family

Fire destroys Elmsleigh home

More than 30 Grosse Pointe firemen battled a three-hour blaze in freezing weather early Saturday which caused at least \$300,000 damage to a home on Elmsleigh Lane in Grosse Pointe City.

Fire officials still don't know what triggered the two-alarm blaze which started in the attic of the 16-room home. The home, appraised at about \$480,000 on city tax rolls, was the first house constructed in the Elmsleigh subdivision, built in 1963.

Many of the home's architectural details, including stairwells, panelling and entire rooms, were taken from the Standish Backus residence, one of the great Lakeshore mansions located on what is now Statton Place in Grosse Pointe Shores. It was demolished in the early 1960s.

According to fire officials, the City was called at about 4 a.m. Saturday, March 12, to the home where firemen found the west end of the roof engulfed in flames. Occupants of the home said their 7-year-old grandson awoke them only minutes before when he smelled smoke. Owners of the home were vacationing in California.

Robert Marshall said the attic area and roof were completely destroyed by the fire and the home suffered extensive water damage. The fire may have spread rapidly because of the wood-shingled roof, reports said. Marshall estimated damage to the home between \$300,000 and \$500,000.

Although no one was hurt in the blaze, City officer Virgil Beaupre suffered from smoke inhalation. He was treated and later released at Bon Secours Hospital.

Along with off-duty fire officers

in the City, firemen from the Farms, Park and Woods also helped douse the blaze.

John Stevens, who lives next door, said his family was rousted out of their beds by City firemen pounding on their door. They were told to evacuate their home.

"It was close, really frightening," Stevens said. He added he was impressed with the firemen: "It was a great demonstration of cooperation and professionalism. They did everything possible to save whatever could be saved."

Slain officer's gun dumped on Lakepointe

The .357 magnum taken from a slain Detroit police officer was found in the shallow water a foot and a half off the Lakeland break-wall Monday by a Grosse Pointe City officer.

The gun was dropped, not thrown into St. Clair from Lakeland, City Deputy Public Safety Director Richard Clarke said. It is unlikely that the current moved the three pound stainless steel gun, he added.

Public Safety Officer Donald Prystup found the gun at about 1:25 p.m. Monday when he was standing on the breakwall at the foot of Lakeland on routine patrol. One bullet was missing from the gun, which police said was registered to Detroit Sgt. Michael Bossuyt.

Bossuyt was killed by a single shot through the back of his head on March 8 after he stopped two men who appeared to be taking a video game from an arcade at East Forest and Gratiot.

Bossuyt, 34 and a father of two, was buried Friday after services at A.H. Peters Funeral Home in Grosse Pointe Woods. Later that day, veteran Grosse Pointe Park Det. Sgt. James LaPratt also played a role in the investigation into Bossuyt's murder when he arrested two persons wanted for questioning in connection with the case.

LaPratt was in the Ashland and Jefferson area when he spotted a 1969 burgundy Lincoln matching the license plate number broadcast by Detroit police late Friday, March 11.

LaPratt, who's been on the force for 26 years, was driving behind the car when he issued a call for assistance at about 4:45 p.m. Friday. Ptl. Norman Gargola said Andrew Meeker and Sgts. Bobby McAlister and Walter Paton answered the call and assisted in the arrest. The couple was turned over to Detroit police at the scene.

The woman was released Friday and the man on Saturday, Detroit police said.





Cable shut-offs irk customers

Grosse Pointe Cable, Inc. was periodically shutting down its cable system last week for what company officials called preventive maintenance causing subscribers to complain of outages and gaps in service.

Company general manager Steve Davis said service was to return to normal last Friday after three days of work. He said the shut-offs were inconvenient but necessary to maintain the system.

Shut-offs occurred in different areas throughout the Farms and the Woods Davis said. Down-time was usually three to five minutes but depended on where the customer was located along the system. The farther down the system, the longer the shut-off, he said.

One north area Woods resident-reported service out for 13 hours last Thursday and three hours the next day.

The purpose of the shut-offs is to check and replace if necessary electrical equipment to prevent

failures later on, Davis said.

The company has a tough decision when it comes to shutting down sections of the system for maintenance. Shutting down during prime time brings scores of angry phone calls, while early morning shut-offs bring police out to answer resident's calls who mistake cable workers for prowlers, Davis said.

The company tries to pick the most convenient times to shut down the cable for maintenance which has to be done twice a year, Davis said. "Sweep" equipment can monitor the strength and quality of a signal in a given area and is used daily but only alerts the company to a problem. The sweep doesn't tell maintenance workers what the problem is, he added.

Because the shut-offs are usually short the down-time won't be pro-rated on the monthly bill, Davis said. Shut-offs of more than 24 hours are deducted from the monthly service charge.

"We are trying to make sure the cable system is as good as it can be," Davis said, adding outages are "not nearly as frequent" as in earlier years. Part of the furor over the shut-offs was because the system had not undergone the maintenance for a "long, long time," he added.

Grosse Pointe Cable, Inc., a subsidiary of Westinghouse Broadcasting and Cable, Inc., has served Harper Woods, Grosse Pointe Woods the Farms City and Park for about three years. Grosse Pointe Shores is wired by Cox Cable.

The heartsaver class offers basic instruction to CPR training. Participants learn some basic anatomy, the most common heart attack signals, and how to respond when heart attack occurs. Certified instructors teach rescue

breathing, one-man CPR, and the obstructed airway maneuver. Those who successfully complete the class receive a card for one year certification in Michigan.

The CPR class is conducted by the Cottage Hospital education department in cooperation with the Committee on Emergency Cardiac Care of the American Heart Association.

Murchison Falls, the headwater of the Nile, is visited, along with Leopoldville in the former Belgian Congo. The film ends in Luanda, Uganda.



Poetry, says Frederic Sibley, makes a writer reduce such complex ideas as a man's life into a form that is readable, and understandable and enjoyable for everyone.

Sibley recently wrote a book of poetry that attempts to portray his life history. The book, "An Iambic Odyssey," is a collection of poems that span a lifetime, Sibley said.

Sibley, 71, was the owner of the F.M. Sibley Lumber Co., from 1937 to 1964. He also owned the Sawtooth Lumber Co. in Idaho until 1980. He is now retired and lives in Grosse Pointe Farms.

Because of his involvement in the lumber business, Sibley said that nature has had a large impact on his writing. Many of the poems in his book are about the outdoors and about trees, which he calls "a kind of sacred thing. I was dismayed with what I use to see the lumber men do with the trees."

HIS DAYS AS a student in Europe and in the Pacific theater during World War II also affected his writing, he said. After his graduation from Princeton University in 1934, Sibley studied in Nazi Germany where he lived with a German family while completing a teaching degree. Shortly after, he joined the U.S. Navy as a lieutenant commander.

"It all reflects a life's odyssey," Sibley said. "There's a lot of emotion in the book. It has the feelings that everyone has had."

The 96 poems are all of the poems he has written over the years "except for about a dozen," Sibley said. Some of these were too personal for publication, he said.

Sibley said that most of the poems were written in the last 10 years as he reflected back on his life. Most were written from memory of things he said "really impressed me."

Although he said that poetry is a hobby for him, he is familiar with many different styles of poetry and said that he based his own style on the Japanese Haikus and tankas. These styles, he said, require brevity and make the poet represent a physical and an inner form in his poetry.

SHORT POEMS, keep the reader interested, he said. He sees this to be a strength in his own poetry because it is written for anybody to understand. "I think a lot of English poetry is too long. It's long but not very intense. That's why I like the Japanese style."

The poems in the book are intense and very emotional. One poem, "An Old Homestead Revisited," describes a home in northern Michigan that has been in Sib-

ley's family for years. "It's very nostalgic," he said. "I can study the house right in the poem without having to go there."

Poetry as a form of writing is appealing to Sibley because he says it reduces complex ideas into a readable form. "It requires you to reduce things to the quintessence."

"Poetry is the essence of writing," he said. "It expresses truth in a few words. That's why I like poetry. You can say a lot in a few words."

Most of the poems in the book are less than a page long and often span only a few short lines. The endings of almost all of the poems are epigrammatic, he said. This summarizes the basic idea in the poem and tries to give the reader a surprise ending, "an unexpected twist" that makes it more interesting to read, Sibley said.

"These things from the past made a picture in my mind. I try to give the reader the same thing I saw in a few words," Sibley said. "It is easily understandable by everyone."

"It's a very subjective book, he added. "All of the poems in it I've actually lived. It's a living account of my life journey."

Sibley said that he does not know how the book is doing at the book stores and will not know for about another 60 days. He said that he should get a report on sales from Carlton Press in New York at that time.

ALTHOUGH HE concedes that the book has not received much national attention, he said that many of his friends have sent him letters praising the book as a fine literary piece.

Although he is now retired, Sibley still maintains an office on Mack and Nottingham where he handles various investments and is now working out the final details of the sale of his lumber business.

He has been unable to pursue his interests in writing for about a year now because of an operation he had on his right arm, but said that the pain is not as bad and hopes to begin writing again.

Sibley is a former president and poet laureate of Witenagemote Society, a literary organization. He is active in church and community affairs. He is married and has four children.

Dedication wins the day

If Dr. Regine Aronow had her way, she'd be cruising down to the Bahamas for a few hours of snorkeling.

Instead, she's lodged in a book filled office in Detroit's Medical Center, having enough problems keeping her head above water as it is.

Dr. Aronow, of Grosse Pointe City, is director of the Poison Control Center at Children's Hospital in Detroit. The center is suffering from a cut in state funding, resulting in a loss of almost 10 percent of its budget.

"Luckily we still can rely on philanthropic organizations to help us," he said. "Hopefully they

won't turn us down."

And if these organizations have to deal with Dr. Aronow personally, they'll have a tough time turning her away. Her professional abilities have kept the Poison Control Center open since she became director in 1965.

"There are terrific people backing me up," Dr. Aronow said. "I'm backed by the (hospital's) board of trustees and I have a great staff to work with. "I also have a tremendous amount of dedication to this institution."

Dr. Aronow came to Children's as a pediatrician after receiving a medical degree from the University of Minnesota. She accepted a residency at Children's and headed a number of pediatric services and clinics before joining the Poison Control staff.

Dr. Aronow, a Montana native, admits that the job creates a lot of stress. But on the other hand, it has given her tremendous opportunities to meet people and serve on various governmental and medical boards.

The doctor, who also is a wife and mother of four grown children, is a member of the Toxicology Advisory Board of the Consumer Product Safety Commission, the Toxic Substance Control Commission of the State of Michigan and is chairperson on the Michigan Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics Committee on Accident and Poison Prevention and president-elect of the American Association of Poison Control Centers.

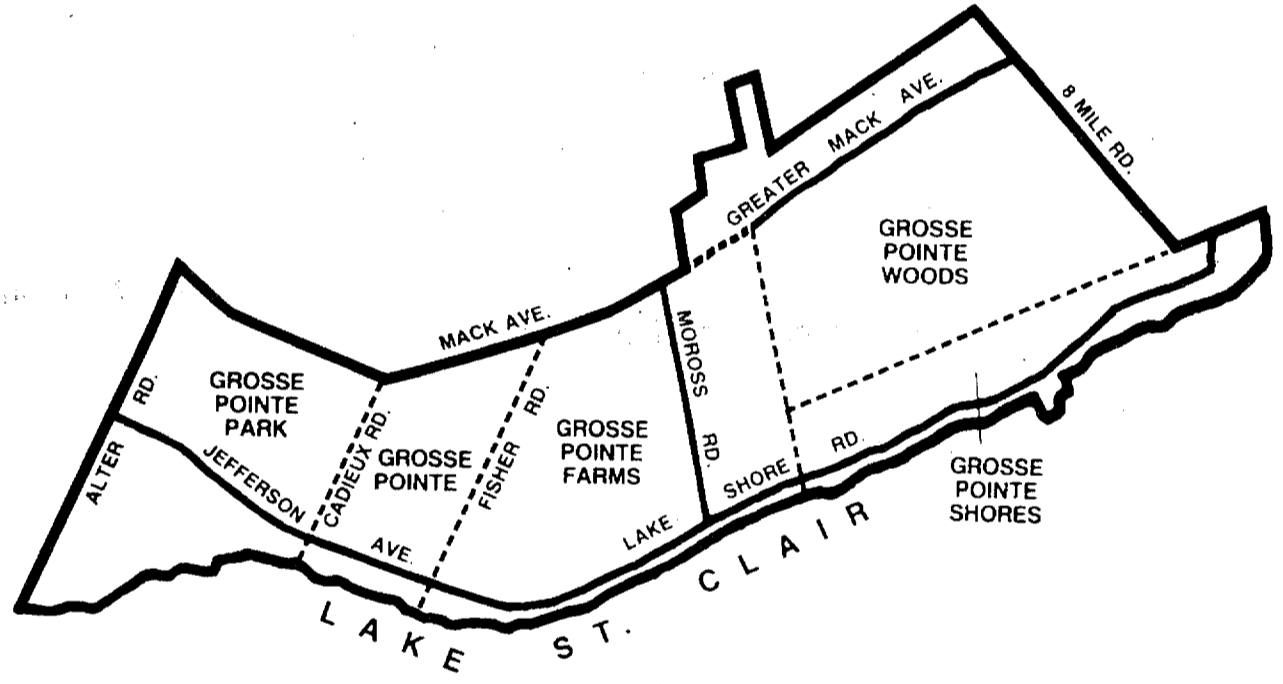

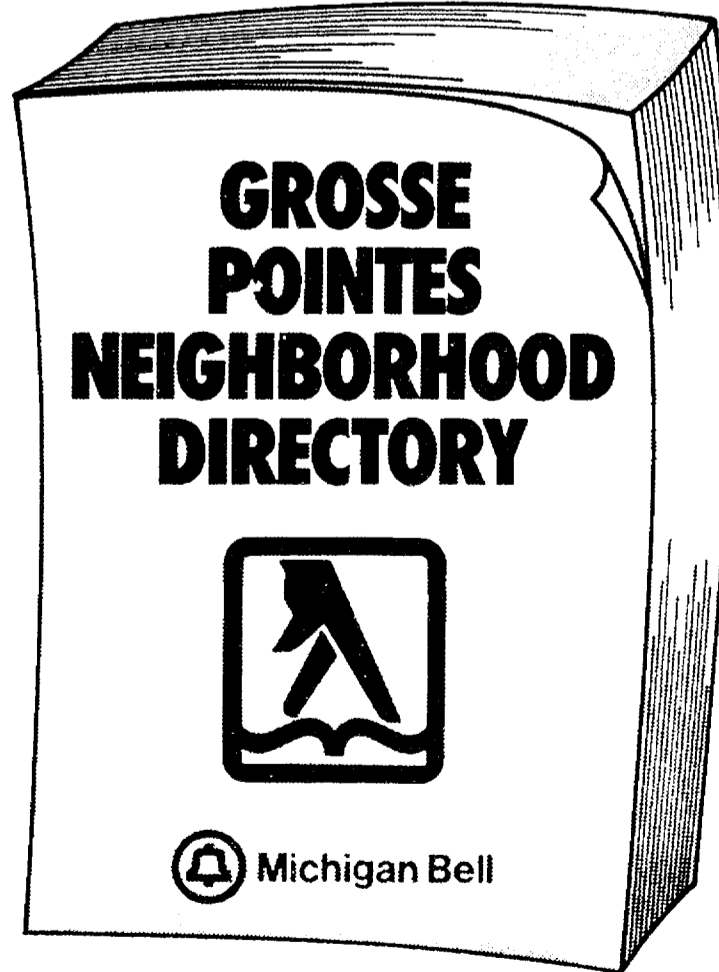

The conference, which is being co-sponsored by the Warren, Center Line, Sterling Heights Business Assistance Center and Macomb Community College, will focus on the technical details of submitting a contract bid to the federal government. Congressman Hertel explained: "Specifically, we will have experts on hand who will detail the process of preparing federal bid packages; outline the identification of government buyers and discuss the issues of quality control and contract administration as they relate to the federal procurement process."

The congressman said the seminar will differ considerably from previous procurement conferences he has helped sponsor.

"This seminar is intended to provide the particular elements involved in submitting an actual bid rather than simply offering an overview of the opportunities to do business with the federal government," Hertel said. "At the same time, it will help participants get better acquainted with the resources available to them through agencies like the Business Assistance Center."

The congressman explained that there is a wide range of opportunities for supplying the federal government with contract materials.

As a member of the House Armed Services Committee, Hertel has been instrumental in efforts to secure a greater portion of Defense Department business for Michigan under the provisions of a new procedure which prescribes that a set portion of non-combat defense contracts be awarded to states with high unemployment.

Hertel said the seminar would be aimed at people in the 14th Congressional District, especially those who have small and medium-sized companies. For more information, call 574-9420.

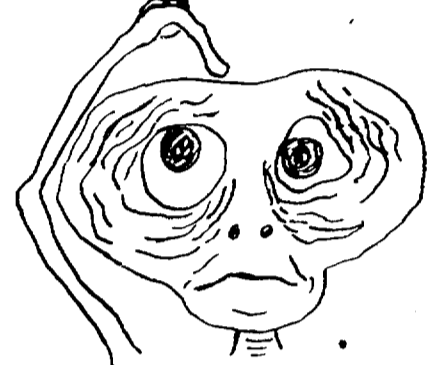

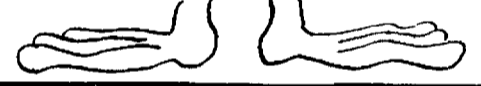

Teens credit their parents for successes

A recently developed profile of high achieving teen-agers reveals that they are products of happy homes and credit their parents with motivating them to succeed. These are among the findings in the 13th Annual Survey of High Achievers conducted by "Who's Who Among American High School Students."

Eighty-five percent of the survey respondents grew up with both of their natural parents at home. Only 11 percent are from

divorced families. This may account for the fact that 69 percent think their lives at home are happy and close most of the time. In addition, more than half note that their parents openly display affection toward them and each other.

It comes as no surprise then that most of the top teens (41 percent) attribute their achievement to receiving a lot of love from their families and wanting to do their very best to merit that love.

However, another 39 percent said that their parents are very motivated and push them to get good grades. Their parents' encouragement may come from their desire to give their children something they never had. More than half of the top students indicated that neither of their parents are college graduates.

The lack of college diplomas apparently hasn't had an adverse affect on their parents' success. Most of the teens' families (28 percent) earn between \$25,000 and \$40,000. Only 3 percent of their fathers are unemployed, while 2 percent of their mothers are in the same situation.

Nearly half of the achievers said their mothers have the greatest influence on their lives, while 16 percent credit their fathers. This may reflect the fact that most (47 percent) of their mothers are homemakers. Their fathers work in a variety of occupations, ranging from business (28 percent) to farming (10 percent).

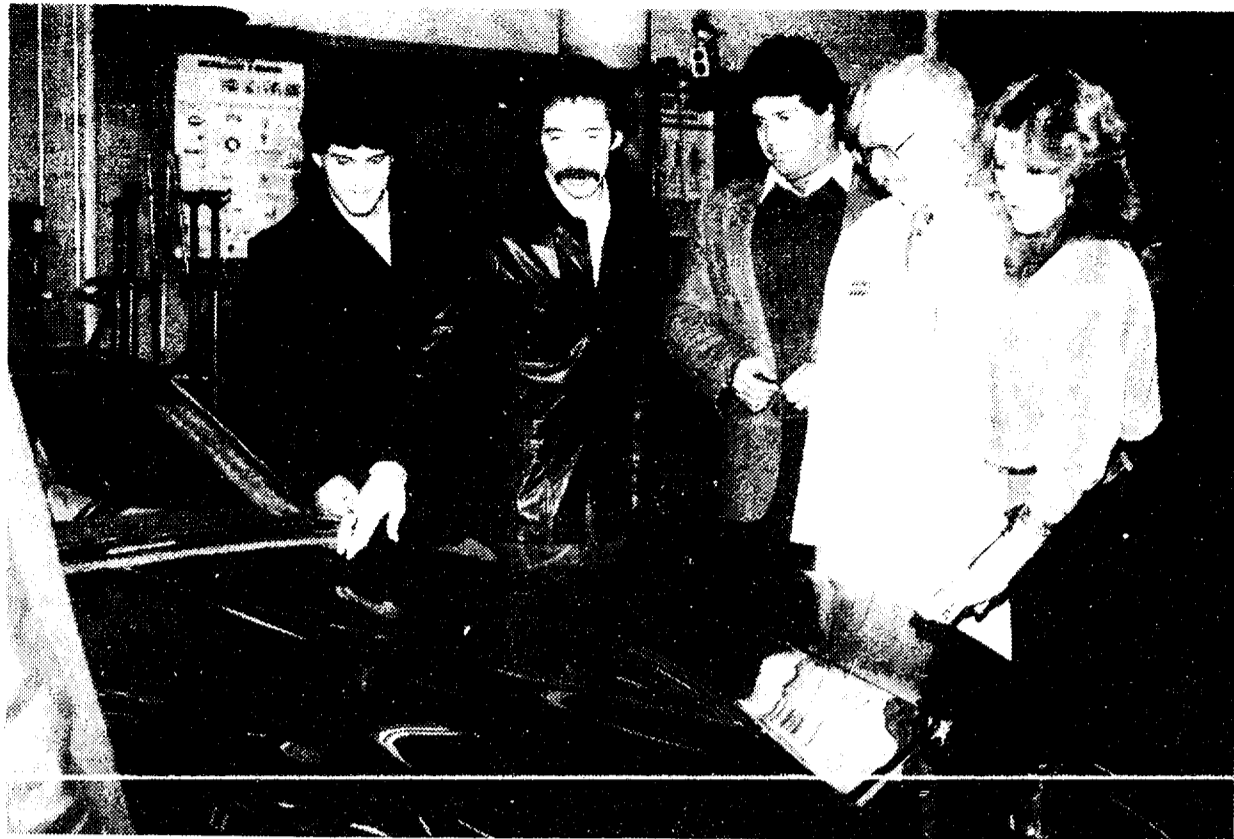

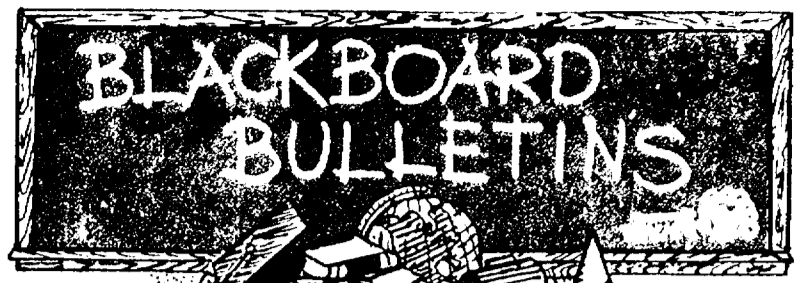

Prime Time

For Senior Citizens

One of the more popular activities among older citizens these days is going back to school.

Adult education class supervisors in public schools and junior colleges know this well. Classes are filled with eager and lively older students who come to learn about everything from China's cultural revolution to furniture refinishing, not to mention such social graces as square dancing, contract bridge and 1982 senior lifestyles.

Because older students have the time and interest to increase their knowledge, a relatively new movement in education developed a few years ago. It was called Elderhostel and the motto became "Studying There Is Half the Fun."

The first catalog of courses was relatively small but with each publication, the offerings increased. The 1983 summer catalog runs 108 pages and contains courses that may be taken in any state of the union. Such growth can only be attributed to the successful combination of study, recreation and opportunities to visit new and interesting places.

THE ELDERHOSTEL concept was inspired by youth hostels and folk schools of Europe, but was guided by the needs of older citizens for intellectual stimulation and adventure. It is based on the belief that retirement is not an end of life activity but rather an opportunity to enjoy new experiences.

More than 600 colleges, universities, independent schools and other educational institutions in the U.S., Canada, Bermuda, Mexico, Great Britain, Scandinavia, Holland, France, Germany and Italy offer low cost, short term residential academic programs for older adults.

Most programs begin Sunday evening and end the following Saturday morning. Call size is limited to 35 to 45 students.

In 1982, almost 55,000 people attended Elderhostel programs. The 1983 catalog offers courses at 634 institutions.

The Elderhostel staff is looking forward to accommodating 78,000 hostellers, and increase of 42 percent over 1982. Word does get around!

To participate students must be 60 years of age. The tuition is \$180 and includes room and board, all classes and a variety of extra-curricular activities.

Location is up to the student. Some will feel more comfortable in a small, rural private liberal arts college while others will prefer a nationally known university.

The courses elected may determine which college the student chooses. The courses are non-credit and taught by the faculty of the host institution. There are no exams, no grades, no homework. LACK OF FORMAL education

is not a barrier. The professors have found that 60 or 70 years of life experience creates open, understanding, teachable people.

While students attend Elderhostels to learn, each school offers a variety of extra-curricular activities. There is time also for Elderhostellers to explore the area and to become acquainted with each other.

There is one consideration to ponder. College dormitories are not luxury resort hotels. Bathroom facilities are shared. Meals are served in the college cafeteria. The food is wholesome and nutritious but not gourmet standard. In other words, Elderhostel offers typical college accommodations which many will remember from their college years. However, the purpose is to stimulate the mind not to pamper the body.

Although some students will choose to spend one week at an Elderhostel, it has been known that others will travel from campus to campus, integrating weeks to Elderhostel into a longer trip to visit family or to see a new part of the country.

Others might choose to go to another country. For instance if you are of Scottish descent you might want to elect a course titled "Scottish Heritage" which covers the literature, history, culture, geography and wild life of Scotland. It is offered at Strathclyde, one of the ancient kingdoms of Scotland. Its center is Glasgow. Less than 20 miles away by either the "high road" or the "low road" is Loch Loman whose bonnie banks and hills proclaim that the Highlands start here. The Southern Uplands roll down to Burns country. Chesters House, an old mansion where students stay, makes an excellent point from which to explore the city and countryside of western and central Scotland.

CLOSER TO home, those who enjoy the great outdoors might choose to attend Yosemite Institute where a course in Human and Natural History of the park is offered. Come prepared to hike through the Tuolumne Grove of Giant Sequoias and other points of interest as you learn from nature under the guidance of a professor.

Those who prefer a less strenuous stay-away might prefer Cornell University and a course "How to Get Political Clout."

A plus here is the scenic location. Cornell is located high on the hills of Ithaca, about Cayuga Lake. It is said to be one of the most beautiful campuses in the world.

Interested prospective Elderhostel students may want to stay closer to home for their first try. There is a long list of Michigan colleges and universities together with descriptions of courses offered and recreational attractions for those who prefer not to go too far away.

If you really want to be close to home, you can elect to study at Cranbrook where you can explore its 300 acres on bike trails or enjoy swimming and tennis when you are not attending lectures on Cranbrook and the "World of Art" which explores contemporary art in America focusing on original works by Carl Milles and Eiel Saariner.

The more practical may want to learn "All About Computers" and discover its capabilities and processes.

SNAPSHOTS and recollections of a vacation are fine mementos but a vacation which instructs, provides relaxation and recreation has an added dimension.

You could return refreshed in mind and spirit as well as body with new interests that would see you through the long winter months until the next year.

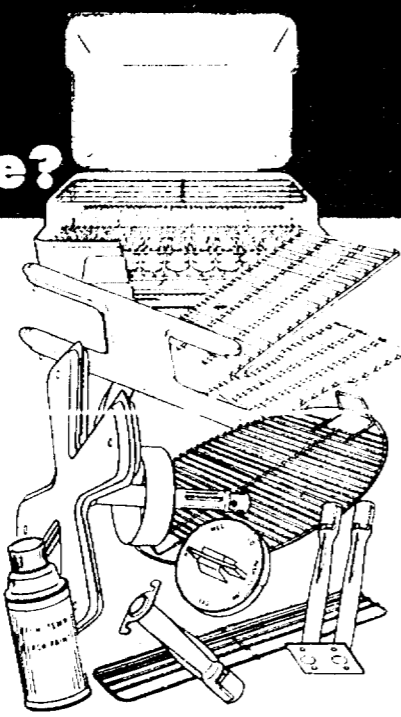

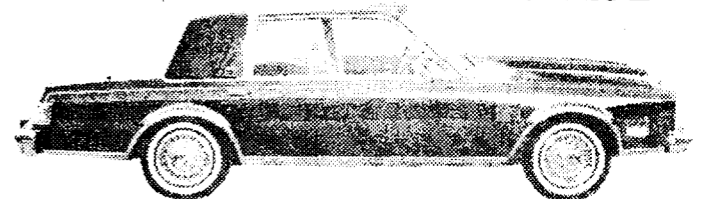

One View From the Capitol

Leadership styles differ and the style of our new governor, Jim Blanchard, is considerably different from that of Gov. Milliken. Milliken perhaps felt too great an inclination toward a style which invariably saw compromise as essentially good. Perhaps that, more than anything else, was a function of the fact that the Democrats controlled the Legislature and Milliken had to negotiate with them. Milliken also may have been a bit too imperial a governor, but it was always clear he was the leader and not one of the troops.

There was a gradual increase by Gov. Milliken of the use of a mechanism some felt was inappropriate. Rather than allow the normal legislative procedure to occur he would call, on critical issues, a meeting of the leadership and would try to negotiate a decision in that setting. That decision would be imposed, in a sense, by persuasion of their own caucus leaders, on enough members to gain passage.

Jim Blanchard is a very bright, experienced politician, not intending any pejorative connotation of the word "politician." And his style is different, and will develop or even change based on experience. He has hired people around him who seem competent. He has taken considerable care in not rushing to fill positions.

Gov. Blanchard has been hold-

ing budget hearings for the 1984 budget in his office with each department to better acquaint himself with what it is this government is doing and why.

That he has no experience as governor is simply fact. That Milliken had been a state senator and lieutenant governor meant he had a good knowledge of state government and the job of governor. One of the best recent governors, however, George Romney, had no experience in government at all. And many argue that is the best of all.

Gov. Blanchard however not only had no experience in state government, except as an assistant attorney general, but he comes from eight years in Congress. There, most would agree, he was a good and quite moderate congressman, working hard and effectively for the Chrysler loan.

The new governor does need to determine whether his will be an imperial governorship, like Milliken, or a one-of-the-boys governorship, like John Swainson, or somewhere in between. Thus far he is somewhere in between but leaning heavily away from the imperial approach. That can be good but he may need to remind himself that leaders really cannot be one of the troops and that respect for the man and the office are inseparable.

The governor is working hard to balance the budget and gain a long-term tax increase. While he has no absolute right to never have a tight budget, one easily might respect his trying for that goal unless one pays taxes.

Gov. Blanchard began work on the issue by appointing a Crisis Council. That was good. He then partially ignored their recommendations. That was not so good. He then stopped payments to local units, schools and colleges. He had to and, anyway, it helped him generate pressure for a tax increase.

In the Milliken administration the basic economic assumptions or estimates were generated by the budget director and accepted by the governor, good, bad or in-between. Some were bad, but all were based on expert opinion. Gov. Blanchard has seen fit to determine at least one basic economic assumption himself, that of the estimate of car sales. He says \$8 million. Everyone else in state government says consistently more than \$8 million. This is relevant because car sales are one key indicator of the degree of economic recovery. Those advising

the governor on the issue are his budget director and the state treasurer. His top tax-policy advisor appears to be the state treasurer.

Inherited from the prior administration in the budget office are some very good technical and very good policy people. The governor, incorrectly, is overly cautious and wary in giving authority to this staff. He is not certain they are team players, but they are.

By keeping a close rein on those policy people, his is denied any effective liaison with Republican legislators on technical and policy issues on the budget and tax issue. Republicans are comfortable with and have respect for that staff. We dealt with them for years.

One of the pieces of the puzzle, in the present issue is how much should be cut and in what specifics. Milliken, when he had to cut, made public a proposed order, it was officially submitted, severely criticized by the Democrats as unfair, turned down by them and the matter was negotiated.

Granted the governor and legislative majority are now both held by the Democrats, but now some Republicans complain that the governor says he won't formally submit a proposed cut order at this time. I don't think that is unreasonable on the part of the governor.

What is unreasonable and unacceptable is that he says a cut order will only be submitted after a tax increase is passed. That is reverse thinking. Cuts come first, or at least must be made certain no later than the same instant a vote occurs on taxes. It is not tenable to ask Republicans, or any legislator, to vote for a tax increase with any possibility, even theoretical, no cuts would be made.

The procedure used in the House to pass the tax bill to the Senate was to do it with all Democrat votes. That was unfortunate, but perhaps necessary to give them lots of room to negotiate in the Senate. What is not necessary and is highly dangerous is a growing number of incidents of retribution against Republicans who voted against the bill. It was their choice to proceed as they did. They know many of us are trying to be constructive and, perhaps more importantly, the governor should consider and adopt a strict Milliken policy never to mix two or more issues.

Mr. Blanchard started by calling for a permanent tax increase. He said that was not negotiable. He backed down to calling for a permanent solution. The governor said the deficit is \$900 million and the figure was not negotiable. It later became negotiable.

Finally, after six weeks, all components became negotiable. The governor might question whether it was worth the time and effort trying to keep complex estimates, pieces of any major issue, not negotiable.

There are those in the Legislature who are accustomed to being part of the group which solves problems. That is a valuable thing to any governor. To not be part of the group which solves tough issues creates for some an empty feeling. The governor needs to learn how to nurture, not waste or throw away, such desire to be constructive.

Jim Blanchard is our governor. He can be a good governor.

That resistance to reform

As a result, Loren Pittman seems to be on his way out as sheriff and Robert Ficano is on the way in — unless Lucas' position is upheld in the Court of Appeals.

PITTMAN WAS appointed by Lucas and is holding the job while the appeal is pending but Ficano was appointed by a three-member committee that traditionally has filled vacancies in county offices. That committee consists of County Clerk James Killeen, Prosecutor William Cahalan and Presiding Probate Judge Joseph Pernick.

The contest over the sheriff's post is just one of the several fronts on which a power struggle is being waged in Wayne County government. On the one side is Lucas, the county executive just elected last November under the new county charter. On the other side are the entrenched county officers who are not about to give up any of their power without a struggle.

Adding personal interest to the contest over the sheriff's job is the fact that Pittman is Lucas' former deputy in the sheriff's office and Ficano has been Killeen's deputy in the clerk's office. Pittman clearly has more experience in law enforcement than Ficano, who is a lawyer, but Ficano claims the sheriff's job is primarily an administrative one. The fact that Ficano is also chairman of the Second District Democratic organization is not unimportant in the dispute.

Lucas is involved in several other lawsuits stemming from his attempts to impose what he regards as his charter mandate on county government. A major one still in the courts involves his attempt to fire the Wayne County Road Commission and appoint a three-member commission of his own. Some observers think Lucas has a better chance of winning this dispute than the one over the sheriff's appointment.

The reasoning is that the road commission is an appointive body, not an elected one, and Lucas' new powers of appointment seem clearer for such bodies. In the dispute over the sheriff's office for example, Judge Teranes said

that the charter "does not permit the chief executive officer to fill by appointment vacancies which may arise in the office of an elected county official."

Some members of the charter commission are known to feel that the county executive has the power of appointment in both instances, and that even filling the vacancy in an elected office is the responsibility of the chief executive because the person named in any case obviously would not be an elected official.

LUCAS IS ALSO having his troubles with the new board of commissioners which, however, seems to be trying to be more cooperative than are the elected department heads. The commissioners are resisting their loss of power — they are now principally a legislative body with few administrative duties — and some of them still pretend the job is a full-time one. But the new commissioners, even though a majority come from the old board, appear to be trying to work out a satisfactory relationship with Lucas although they also appear to be slow to make decisions that would cost them power.

In view of the court tests and other roadblocks in Lucas' path, county voters still do not have a clear picture of how well the county is going to operate. While the public jury is still out, most county residents are willing to give Lucas the benefit of the doubt to date and hope that he can win enough power in the courts to carry out the kind of county reorganization the people clearly demanded when they so resoundingly backed the county charter.

Even at best, Lucas is faced with a monumental task in trying to bring order out of the chaos in county government. He is faced with department heads who run to the courts to oppose any proposed changes; employees and unions that drag their feet on any further concessions in pay or perks; and private insiders who prefer to keep the status quo that has helped enrich them and their friends.

REFORM ALWAYS travels a troubled road in this country. Too many people benefit from the ways things traditionally have been done and they provide self-serving excuses for not going along with change. The fact that resistance to reform is an old story, however, does not make it any more palatable in Wayne County.

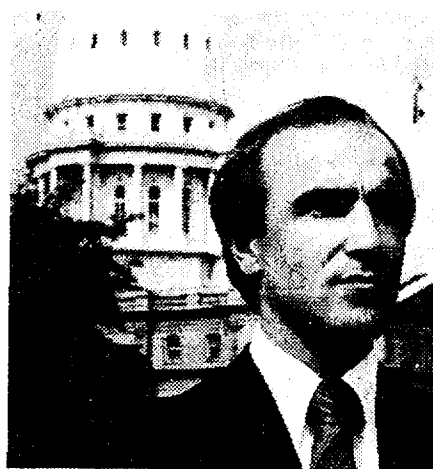

To rescue 'Social Security

By voting against the compromise plan to rescue the ailing Social Security program, Congressman Dennis Hertel of the 14th District disregarded the recommendations of the National Commission on Social Reform which had the blessing of the Democratic speaker of the House, Thomas O'Neill.

Hertel's opposition centered on the six-month deferment of the cost-of-living increase in Social Security payments scheduled for next July, the fact that low-income and middle-income citizens will continue to pay a greater proportion of their earnings in Social Security taxes than those in the higher income brackets, and the fact that younger workers will pay higher Social Security taxes but receive smaller benefits in the future.

THOSE ARE legitimate arguments but they ignore the current plight of the Social Security system. Drastic measures are called for to make sure that recipients of Social Security will continue to receive their benefits on a regular basis now and in the future. Many of the proposals in the Social Security bail-out package were criticized by people in Congress and elsewhere but a majority of the House went along in the belief the overall rescue package could be justified.

Hertel also voted against a House provision,

not included in the national commission's recommendations, that would raise the retirement age gradually from 65 to 67 by the year 2027. Speaker O'Neill also opposed this provision but the Senate Finance Committee came up with its own version of a similar plan to lift the retirement age to 66 between the year 2000 and 2015. Both plans reflect the increase in longevity since adoption of Social Security in 1935.

BOTH THE House and the Senate committee also approved a provision that calls for a tax on half the Social Security benefits received by more affluent citizens. While that also introduces a form of "means" test into the Social Security program for the first time, it also can be justified as part of the rescue package.

Over the years the Social Security program has been loaded with many benefits that never were intended when it was begun. And while Social Security taxes have continued to rise, they now fail to produce the revenue to meet increasing demands of an aging population. The compromise program recommended by the National Commission on Social Reform is not perfect but it does provide a firm basis for continuing payments to recipients. That is why we support the rescue plan and are disappointed in Congressman Hertel's opposition.

A threat to 'high tech' hopes

The U.S. Census Bureau's estimate that Michigan's population had declined another 1.7 percent between 1980 and 1982 is disturbing for several reasons.

From the standpoint of government officials, state and local, the continuing decline means that Michigan will lose federal aid which is dependent on population figures. From perhaps a more important perspective, the decline also means that the "brain drain" is continuing with Michigan losing talented people that it can ill afford to have move out at the very time the state is talking about becoming a new center for "high tech" industries.

True, loss may not be as great as the census bureau estimates. The figures already have been challenged by state officials who contend that it does not seem reasonable that one out of

every 33 people had moved out of Michigan between April 1, 1980, and July 1, 1982. But, if accurate, the federal figures would indicate Michigan's population had dropped four times more than that of any other state.

Even the state's own estimates indicate, however, that Michigan's population has declined, although not as much as the Census Bureau figures state. Whatever the decline, however, it means that efforts to revive Michigan's economy should be immediately spurred so that new employment opportunities can be provided within the state and the "brain drain" can be reversed.

Otherwise, the hope of making Michigan a magnet for new and expanding "high tech" industries is unlikely to be realized.

Tax increase finds support

To the Editor:

Michigan is faced with some tough economic decisions. A few of us realize the far-reaching implications of the proposed tax increase. All too many of us are busy attempting to maintain our businesses and keep our standard of living. To consider a tax increase at this time is indeed perplexing for many of our representatives. This difficult decision now lies on Sen. John Kelly, who had a long, difficult and expensive race for the Senate.

It is easy for many people to take time to write letters when an issue angers them; however, it is most difficult to honestly realize that we need a tax increase and to take the time to send a letter, particularly Grosse Pointers. I would urge those neighbors, who truly understand the complexity involved in shutting down many of the needed human services, to contact Senator Kelly and voice their support for his difficult decision. I would not want to be in his shoes at this moment; however, I will stand behind him for an affirmative action on cleaning up Michigan's economic woes.

From Another Pointe Of View

The Lutheran Ladies' Auxiliary for the Deaf will celebrate its 105th birthday Tuesday, April 5, with a special luncheon at the Grosse Pointe War Memorial. It's open to all, and all are welcome to join the happy celebration. Pastor Joseph P. Fabry, of Christ the King Lutheran Church, Mack Avenue in The Woods, will be the main speaker.

Four years before J.L. Hudson opened his first retail store in downtown Detroit, a group of women organized what is now known as the Lutheran Ladies' Auxiliary for the Deaf. Their purpose was to assist in providing for the physical, mental and spiritual well-being of children enrolled in the Lutheran School for the Deaf, still located at its original East Side Detroit site on East Nevada.

The organizers were undoubtedly mostly members of Trinity Lutheran Church, Rivard and Gratiot, the Auxiliary's meeting place for many years, or the newly-organized St. Peter's Lutheran Church, Chene and Pierce. They probably made their way to meetings on foot, over wooden sidewalks and across unpaved streets.

A few may have come via horse-drawn car from Immanuel Lutheran Church, another newly-organized congregation, on 17th Street near Michigan Avenue. Trinity, St. Peter's and Immanuel were all members of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Missouri, Ohio and Other States — now the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod.

German was the language of the first Auxiliary meetings, for then to be a Lutheran meant also to be a German. The women met once a month, in the early afternoon, and each meeting was followed by a coffee hour featuring homemade kaffekuchen baked by members at home that morning or the day before, in their woodburning stoves.

The year was 1878. The country was rebuilding and recovering from the Civil War. Rutherford B. Hayes had succeeded Ulysses S. Grant as President of the United States. Herbert Hoover and Winston Churchill were four-year-old youngsters.

The Lutheran School for the Deaf was a residential facility. Since students remained there for the full school term, with the possible exception of a visit home at Christmas and Easter, the early members of the Auxiliary dedicated themselves to making the school a home away from home for children enrolled there.

With little money, but much determination, the women obtained bedding, curtains, draperies, cooking utensils, furniture and rugs. They scrubbed floors, polished stoves, washed windows, darned stockings and mended clothes. They canned fruits and vegetables. They did what was necessary. One hundred and five years later, they're still doing what is necessary.





Into The Present Day

The seats the Auxiliary purchased for the School's basement auditorium in 1940 are still in use today. Tables for the picnic grove at the rear of the School, outdoor play equipment, indoor toys and books for the library have also come to the School courtesy of the Auxiliary.

The Lutheran Ladies began contributing toward the tuition of students in the early '60s. This project, which first amounted to a modest \$400 per year, has increased gradually over the years until, today, \$6,000 is donated annually for scholarships.

The Auxiliary purchased a station wagon for the school in 1963 and a new van in 1973 and is setting aside a specific sum every month to be used if and when a new van or bus should be needed. Each year, the Auxiliary presents a Bible to confirmands of the School and provides a Christmas treat for all the students.

When the School's new gymnasium was built, it included a kitchen for which the Auxiliary furnished the necessary equipment. This kitchen is used not only for the Auxiliary's own functions but for cooking and serving the dinners at the School's popular June and October Festivals.

While the first members of the Lutheran Ladies' Auxiliary for the Deaf lived mostly in the vicinity of "Old Trinity" in Detroit, today's membership list includes addresses in more than 50 zip codes throughout the metropolitan area. Many women who have moved out-of-town and out-of-state maintain their memberships, continuing to support the Auxiliary with their concern and their contributions.

¼ cup finely minced parsley

¼ tsp. salt
1 Tbsp. anisette liqueur
½ tsp. white pepper
½ cup fresh bread crumbs

Place shrimp in single layer in bottom of shallow, broiler-proof casserole; sprinkle with lemon juice. Stir together margarine, parsley, chives, wine, garlic, salt, anisette and white pepper. Spread mixture evenly over shrimp. Sprinkle with bread crumbs. Broil four inches from source of heat about 3 minutes or until crumbs are golden and shrimp are opaque. Makes 6 servings.

SHRIMP SUPPER LOAF

2 Tbsp. gelatin
¼ cup cold water
3 cups tomato juice
2 tsp. onion juice
¼ tsp. salt
¼ cup red wine vinegar
¼ cup low-cal mayonnaise
½ cups shrimp (or any other fish)
½ cup green peppers, chopped
½ cup chopped celery
½ tsp. Worcestershire sauce

Soften the gelatin in cold water. Place tomato juice, onion juice, salt and vinegar in saucepan and bring to a boil. Remove from stove. Add softened gelatin, stir until dissolved. Place ¾ cup of tomato mixture in a loaf pan. Chill thoroughly. Blend remaining mixture with mayonnaise in rotary mixer, add other ingredients and pour over the tomato mold. Chill. Serve on lettuce; garnish with watercress. Makes 8 servings.

FILLETS WITH CUCUMBER SAUCE

2 16-oz. packages frozen flounder or ocean perch fillets
¼ tsp. salt
1 oz. dry Vermouth
3 Tbsp. margarine
2 medium cucumbers, scored and thinly sliced
1 medium onion, thinly sliced
2 Tbsp. white wine vinegar
¼ tsp. white pepper

Spray 13"x9" baking dish with oil. With serrated knife, cut each package of frozen fillets crosswise into 4 pieces; place fillets in baking dish; sprinkle with salt. Add Vermouth. Bake in 450° oven 20 to 25 minutes, until fish flakes easily when tested with a fork.

About 10 minutes before fish is done, in hot margarine, in 2-quart saucepan over medium heat, cook cucumbers, onion, vinegar and pepper 5 minutes, stirring occasionally.

To serve, spoon sauce over and around fish. Makes 8 servings. Calories per serving about 128. Cholesterol about 68 mgs.

People have the wrong idea about athletes. They are, for the most part, completely opposite from the dumb jock stereotype which has been applied to them for so long. And because athletes can be funny, they have, for many years, been the source of a number of amusing anecdotes. And so, for your edification (I hope), here are a few of my favorite sports stories.

The fledgling Buccaneers didn't say or do much (except lose, they lost a lot in those days) — but they remembered.

When the Packers visited Tampa Bay for a return engagement, they were greeted by a scoreboard which read: Tampa Bay—Green. If they weren't green before that, they sure got that way in a hurry.

Locally, I have been a witness to some pretty funny stuff. Once, outside the old Olympia Stadium after a Red Wings game, I saw a familiar figure come out a side door and head for a phone booth on Grand River Avenue. The figure was Montreal Canadiens' hockey player Pete Mahovich — although he'd changed out of his uniform and into a full length leather coat, corduroy suit and a pair of — if you can believe it — muk-luks.

Now most professional athletes try to maintain anonymity "off the field," but not Mahovich. A 6 foot, 5 inch, 220-pound man wearing a leather coat and fuzzy muk-luks and carrying a hockey stick is not anonymous. And he is even less so when he lets out a war whoop and stick-handles his way across a street full of homeward-bound hockey fans. But that sort of behavior is nothing out of the ordinary for Mahovich, who, legend has it, once went barefoot to a hockey awards luncheon and insists to anyone who will listen that he was so ugly as a child, his parents had to tie a porkchop around his neck to get the family dog to play with him.

Boys will be boys . . .

We all know that professional athletes are just overgrown boys in funny suits playing games — for lots of money. But boys will be boys, megabucks and funny outfits notwithstanding, and there are plenty of good old boy stories to choose from.

In baseball a few years back, the whole world went nuts over the wedding of Cincinnati Reds' star catcher Johnny Bench. Headlines screamed about the world's most eligible bachelor — and how he wasn't anymore. But my favorite story was the one that had Bench's teammate and lifelong buddy Pete Rose accompanying Bench and his bride on their honeymoon. Bench and Rose even managed to sneak off to shoot pool once and a while, dooming the poor bride to a day of shopping or whatever. Bench and his bride are not longer attached, but Bench and Rose are still the best of buddies.

Around the time Bench was supposedly forsaking all others for his pal and a game of pool, the NFL's Miami Dolphins were winning a lot of Super Bowls — mainly on the strength of their star backfield of Mercury Morris, Larry Czonka and Jim Kiick. The trio was asked to pose for the cover of Sports Illustrated — an honor if ever there was one.

The issue those cover boys appeared on sold rather well, the stories say. It may even be considered a collector's item one day, because upon close inspection of the photo, one of the three Dolphins is seen flashing a universally recognizable, yet completely obscene hand gesture. Who says football players are dumb? They may be dirty, but they sure aren't dumb.

Dumb was one word (printable in a family newspaper) used to describe former National Hockey League nuisance Eddie Shack. Shack was like a case of hiccups — always showing up when you need him least and pretty hard to get rid of. He'd take sweeping bows and make leaping pirouettes when his name was announced at the start of a game, and he'd spend most of the game hounding opposing forwards to the point of frustration.

One evening, after a particularly frenetic Shack had done a two-step to the organ music during a stoppage in play, goaded an opponent into a stupid penalty and skated on and off the ice a few dozen times with a silly grin plastered on his face, an opponent could stand it no more. "Shack, you're so stupid you probably can't even spell."

On the ensuing rush up the ice, Shack skated in, deked the goaltender a few times and put the puck into the net to give his team the lead. He skated past his opponents on the way back to his own bench. "Goal," Shack said. "G-O-A-L. Goal."

Just like I said. Funny. F-U-N-N-Y.

Seniors play top tennis

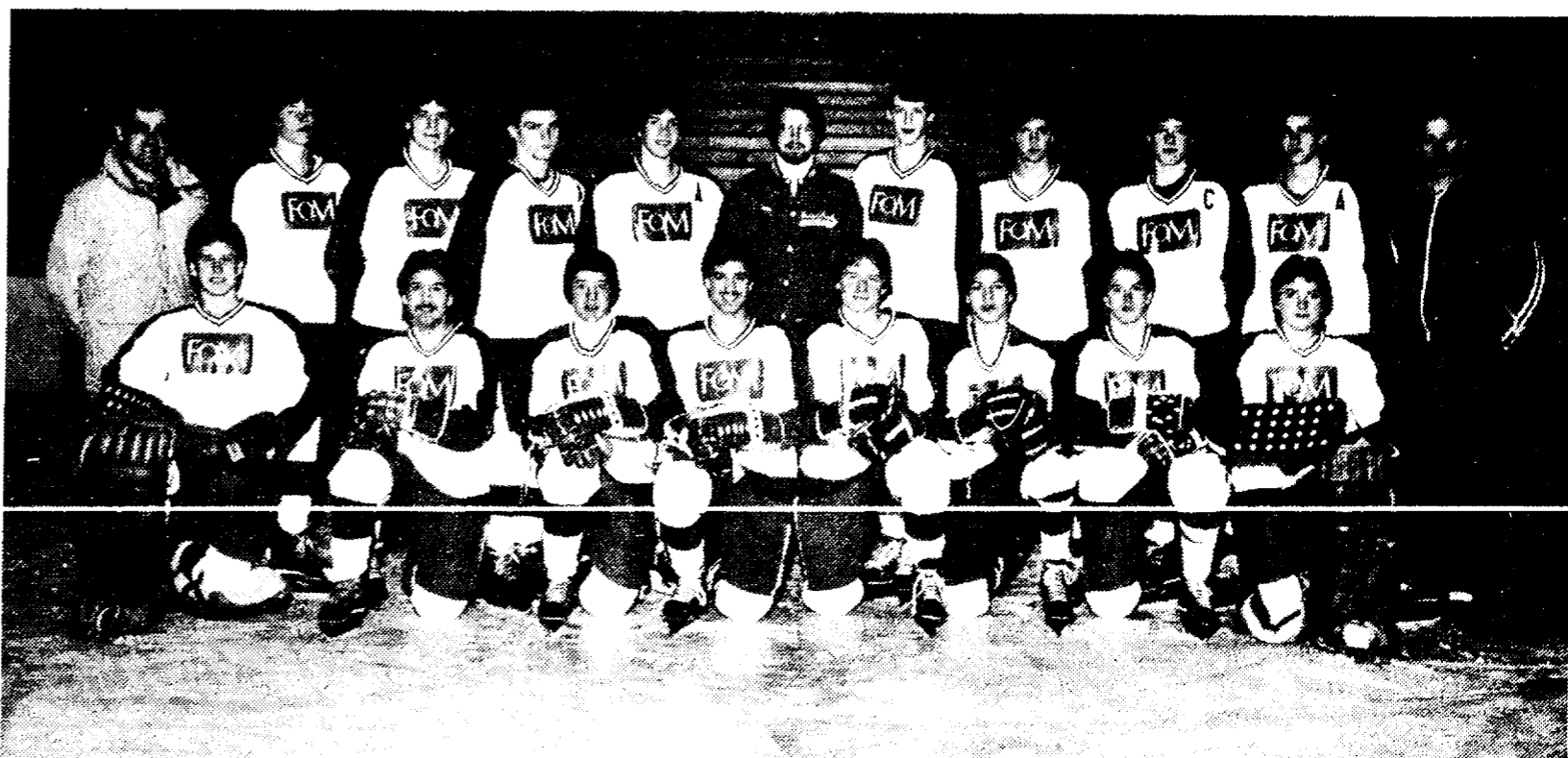

'The champ'

Fleming first to win wrestling crown

Greg Fleming holds every North High wrestling record imaginable, so it came as no surprise that he should set yet another record in winning the state wrestling championship March 5 — the one for most overwhelmed wrestler.

For the 17 year-old North senior, it was probably the first time he'd been overwhelmed in, or by, a wrestling match this season. And it took a state championship in the 105-pound class, earned by beating a previously undefeated wrestler, to do it.

"I was feeling many different things at one time... mostly happy," Fleming says.

He should also have felt pretty special — Fleming is the first Pointe wrestler to earn a state championship. That championship was a goal Fleming and his coach, Larry Aceto, had in mind for quite some time. "It's been our dream, we'd believed so hard that it could happen. And Greg made it happen," Aceto says.

The way Fleming made it happen was to win 82 percent of his career matches, or 133 of the 163 matches he participated in at North, including 90 by pins. He was the victor in 21 invitational tournaments and racked up league and district championships in his class for three consecutive years. Fleming also earned regional and state qualifications in three successive seasons.

"HE'S AN aggressive and knowledgeable wrestler," coach Aceto says. "His repertoire of wrestling skills is almost unbelievable. He's covered all the main series of wrestling moves."

Fleming's wrestling career, which began when he was a student at Parcels, did not end with his state title match. Fleming has been the object of much attention from the wrestling programs at universities like the University of Michigan, Central Michigan, Michigan State and Notre Dame. All are good wrestling schools, Fleming says.

"I'm allowed to take six visits to universities and I want to take advantage of all of them," Fleming adds.

WHEN HE does get to college, he should survive the initial difficulty of blending into a collegiate wrestling program, his high school coach says. "He's going to have to start all over again, he'll be in the position of a freshman versus a senior. And that experience he'll be giving up at first will be detrimental... but he has enough skills at this point that whatever university he goes to, he'll be a four-year investment. And that's what colleges are looking for," Aceto says.

If the colleges are looking for an aggressive, knowledgeable wrestler who only gets overwhelmed by little things like state championships, they may have found their man in Greg Fleming. The only problem belongs to North's wrestling program, which is going to be one aggressive, knowledgeable wrestler short come next season.

Aceto has already thought of that. He's hoping another Fleming, 15 year-old, 98-pound class entry David Fleming (Greg's brother who has won 72 of his 87 matches, including 50 by pins and 11 invitational) might have his own chance to be overwhelmed by a state championship or two.
