Anxious parents hear school closing plan

The administration is proposing by the 1984 school year to shift Mason elementary students to Parcells Middle School, transfer Defer elementary students to Pierce Middle School, and move grades three to five at Kerby ele-

"The plan provides minor disruption of schools and is not detrimental to students because of the outstanding facilities at the middle schools," Brummel said.
"(The plan) will enhance (students') education.'

The school district is predicting only 5,658 students will be in classrooms by the 1990-91 school year. Since the peak enrollment year of 1970 and 13,337 students, the district has been losing about 500 students each year. Last fall official enrollment count was 7,805 students.

The boys admitted to police they built the bomb and taped it to the inner door of a teacher's home. The explosion ripped away the storm door, blew a large hole in the wooden door and sent shrapnel flying throughout the house. No one was injured in the incident, although the house was occupied at the time, Fagan said.

That incident, and a similar bombing at North High School the Friday before with a much smaller device, led to an investigation by both police and high school administrators. Four days later, police questioned the five susagan said

"WE'RE PLEASED with the number of cases we've been able to clear," Fagan said. "We're talking about the kind of crime that doesn't leave a lot of leads. We've cleared cases we never thought would be solved."

Desilets said the department is

"99 percent sure" the incidents police have cleared were committed by the five. The pattern for the incidents was much the same, he added.

The five would drive around on weekends and non-school nights between 7 and 11 p.m. and commit the acts, the officers said. All were home before their parents' imposed curfew of 11 p.m., leaving the parents no reason to suspect the youths' activities, officers said.

"It was a kind of the spur of the moment thing in the beginning," Fagan said. "After the first few, it became a weekend thing for

"It's a younger person's type of crime, vandalism," Desilets said. Some of the victims were targets of revenge, but some were just random acts.

'As part of the investigation, we talked to a large number of people and got good cooperation from the student body at North," he added, saving cooperation was "instrumental in the arrests."

If the suspects were adults the bombing charge, a felony, could carry a maximum sentence of 25 years in prison. Because of their juvenile status, it is difficult to say what will happen, officers

THE YOUTHS had no previous contact with police and had done nothing to raise suspicion from their parents. They said they were sorry for what they had done, Fagan said. One sent a letter to the director of public safety apologizing for their acts, he added.

Seven persons have filed petitions for the June 13 Grosse Pointe school board race, school officials said this week.

Petitioners needed 29 signatures of registered voters in Grosse Pointe and had to file petitions no later than 4 p.m. Monday, April 11. According to Supt. Kenneth Brummel's office, candidates have until 4 p.m. today to withdraw from the race.

Vying for two four-term seats will be:

• Dorothy Kennel, 61, of Middlesex Boulevard, in the Park. A retired kindergarten teacher. Mrs. Kennel is president of the Board of Education. She was elected to the school board in 1979. Mrs. Kennel says her biggest contribution to the board in the last four years was her role as chairman of the search committee which selected Dr. Brummel as superintendent of Grosse Pointe's public schools.

• Vincent LoCicero, 40, of Barrington Road, in the Park. An attorney, LoCicero is the former president of the Trombly school

PTO and has served on the Grossc Pointe PTA-PTO Council. He also was appointed to the citizen committee studying enrollment de-clines in Grosse Pointe. If elected, LoCicero said he would pursue the issue of teacher accountability in the public schools. LoCicero called the superintendent's proposal to close schools "a workable plan" and added: "Obviously, the plan tries to maintain the neighborhood school concept. I think the community has been conditioned to expect some school closings.'

• Thomas Peters, 53, of Moselle Place, in the Farms. A former English teacher at South High School, Peters is currently in public relations at Blue Cross/Blue Shield. The candidate is on the board of the Friends of the Library and is the author of the novel

The diocese encompasses some of the most beautiful, inaccessible year two and three? and sometimes inhospitable land in Africa where travel by four wheel drive vehicle is measured in days instead of hours.

Because of economic cutbacks in neighboring Kenya, the mission's part-time use of a plane loaned by the Flying Doctors Service has been severely curtailed, limiting its ability to provide much needed "under the wing" medical care to the area.

Most of Father Patten's appeals were to foundations in the U.S. Most were turned down. By last February, he had raised \$70,000, less than a third of his goal. Late March saw the total raised to \$79,000, with \$1,800 contributed by Pointers who read about Father Patten's efforts in the Grosse Pointe News.

"We received \$61 from the students at Brownell Middle School from their jelly bean jar raffle," smiled Father Pat. "Plus \$186 from a Grosse Pointe Academy bake sale and a \$250 check from the Grosse Pointe Kiwanis. The rest of the \$1,800 was in the amount of small donations, one in a letter that told me 'We Grosse Pointers are slow to respond, but don't worry, you'll get your air-

The \$79,000 allowed Father Patten to proceed with plans to purchase the plane, a move he found rather scary.

"I've never worked with this much money before," he said. "I was past the point of no return. The refurnished plane, equipped with radios, some spare parts and a ferry service was \$65,000. That left \$14,000, enough for a year's supply of fuel. But I'm still \$100,-000 short. What if I can't raise the rest and the plane is grounded for

"The real motivating factor is that for every day that plane sits on the ground over here, somebody over there dies. I ordered the plane.'

Much of Father Patten's worries were relieved recently by a phone call from a Florida-based foundation tentatively agreeing to provide the project with a \$21,000 grant. Another affiliated foundation also promised to match funds. thus adding another \$42,000 to the

"However, it's not yet an absolutely sure thing," cautioned Father Patten. "The call was off the record, but they said I could expect the checks in May unless something totally unforeseen happens. That call really lifted my spirits, believe you me. I was about ready to give up hope and end the project. This will keep it

With the additional funds. Father Patten has purchased a year's supply of oil and \$25,000 in spare parts for the 1973 Cessena

"I had to buy practically everything that might break and be irreplaceable," said Father Pat. "The Tanzanian people are very resourceful and can build or repair practically anything, but in the bush they often don't have the equipment necessary to make major repairs.

"It's different here in the states," he continued. "Cessena has a fine overnight delivery service for spare parts. In Tanzania it can take months just to deliver the mail because the country is so inaccessible in places. Parts purchased here save time over

An airplane for Father Pat

Father Patten drove to St. Louis to test fly the plane and oversee modifications to the wings. He had them thickened to provide more airlift, making the plane capable of shorter take offs and landings suited to rough terrain.

The plane itself will be flown to Africa over a four day period by a volunteer pilot for Ozark Airlines. He'll follow a route from St. Louis to Newfoundland to the Ivory Coast to Nairobi, Kenya.

"The pilot is really a remarkable person," said Father Patten.
"He ferries planes free as part of his religious convictions. Ordinarily this type of service would cost \$7,000 to \$8,000.

The flight to Africa is the most dangerous part. He'll be loaded with 1,500 pounds of extra fuel. There'll even be a barrel of fuel in the seat next to him. There's just enough room for a life raft, survival suit, maps and him on the 22





Senior citizens

Those in need can get help

Behind the doors of some homes with neatly trimmed lawns and hedges, are senior citizens living in conditions which those who work with the elderly describe as 'just terrible.'

Volunteers from agencies working to improve the lives of the elderly report there are seniors living in stench and filth, sometimes in or near exclusive areas of the Pointes.

But the sad conditions that many of the area's elderly live in can be improved if they want to be helped because programs for their benefit do exist.

Social workers at Services for Older Citizens (SOC), located in Ferry Elementary School in the Woods, said that seniors will often torgo such essentials as food and the gas bill in order to keep up their property.

"THEY FEEL A sense of obligation to the rest of the community," said Virginia Downing, coordinator of SOC. Therefore, the outside of the homes are kept up while very often, the inside is "a

Volunteers at SOC have reported that the stench at the home of one elderly Pointer was so bad that they refused to continue making deliveries. Ms. Downing said that there was so much dirt on the floor of one senior's home that she personally took her vacuum cleaner to clean it.

According to 1980 census data, there are more than 7,600 people living in the Grosse Pointes who are age 65 and over. Of that fig-seniors in the area are in reason-

The census data shows that 1,775 seniors over 65 lived in the Park in 1980 and 119 of them below the poverty level. Of the five Pointes, the Park has the largest concentration of seniors below the poverty level.

Ms. Downing said that many of the older women who were once well off financially are now living in poverty because their late husbands were active in investments and business, and as a result, contributed little to social security. The income from these investments "has not kept up with the cost of living," Ms. Downing add-

"THERE ARE PEOPLE living on \$4,000 a year. But they are managing quite well," she said. Free meals and inexpensive help maintaining their homes help them make ends meet, she said. Some of the seniors who cannot

make it on their own immigrated here from other countries and never learned to speak English.

Ms. Downing said.
Food and transportation services are available to the physically impaired, but there are those who will not ask for help. They will go without assistance because they are "too proud," Ms. Downing said.

ably good health and are financially secure, SOC social workers said there is a genuine need in the Pointes to provide help for older

people.
"There are a lot of people who are eligible for these services who will go without food so they can pay the gas bill," Ms. Downing said. Although SOC is budgeted to provide only 26 home delivered meals, Ms. Downing said that no senior will starve. "If we know about that person, the food will get to

Programs for the disadvantaged elderly do exist, but the first move is up to them, Ms. Downing said. "The choices are given to them and it's up to them to make the

decision," she said.
Roman Hammes, a SOC volunteer, said that the needs of most seniors in the Pointes are social, economic and physical.

Socially the seniors wish to remain living in their own homes and to take life "at their own pace." Economically, seniors seek help with their finances and tax situations. Physically, the elderly need help with yard work and transportation.

SOC CONDUCTED a survey in November, 1980 in which it asked seniors a series of questions on what they felt their most pressing concerns and needs were. Most of those questioned said their major concerns dealt with getting help maintaining their homes and their independence.

Since most of the seniors in the area are in good health and can take care of themselves, Ms.
Downing said that one of the strongest peads is for social as strongest needs is for social activity and "to feel needed."

"For the majority of the people, this is what they need," she said.

"They don't just want to exist in their homes.

For others who cannot manage without assistance, SOC and other agencies offer a wide range of programs that includes food delivery, home repair, escort service programs and tax assistance information.

Since its founding in 1978, SOC has provided these and other services to seniors in the Pointes and in Harper Woods who are at least 60 years old. Over the last 10 years, the older population in the Pointes and Harper Woods has gone up by more than 22 percent one of the largest increases in the nation, Ms. Downing said. "You have a need just by the numbers,"

SOC is funded through block grants and by grants from the Detroit Area Agency on Aging.

Now, more people are getting their lawns mowed, their sinks unplugged and their tax information," Ms. Downing said.








The boulevard proposal is intended to "create a greenbelt effect" when you enter the city, according to City Manager John Crawford. It has won support from Detroit's Community and Economic Development de-partment, but county road commission officials are concerned it may create traffic flow problems, Crawford said. Negotiations with

the road commission are con-

tinuing, he added. The street improvements planned for Mack Avenue will supplement another federally-subsidized program to spruce up building facades in the area. A dozen businesses have completed facade work under the program, according to Crawford. Of the 28 businesses in the area, 16 are currently participating in the program he said. He added that \$7,000 remains in the fund and encouraged more businesses to

sign-up.
Under the facade program the city provides free architectural services to businesses and pays every year to give the animals a half the costs for improvements.

Appeals in the Farms dropped from more than 300 to just 50 this spring, said Carrol Lock, city assessor. In the City official Depris sessor. In the City, official Dennis Foran said only 60 taxpayers filed protests, compared to 240 in 1982. The Park's appeals totalled 1845 this year, a far cry from the 525 protestors who kept the board of review at work for 11 days to hear their cases last spring.

The reason for the decline in protests, according to the assessors, is two-fold. The most important is that the assessments declined this year, for the first time since the Depression, because of the slow real estate market. Property assessments dropped 2.8 percent in the City; 5.6 percent in the Farms; 3.6 percent in the Park; and 4 percent in the Woods. In 1982, they increased an average 10 percent.

A second reason for the absense of protesters this year is the fact the cities did not send out notices of assessments to each homeowner, as they did in 1982, the assessors said.

"We all had a much nicer spring this year," said City Assessor Dennis Foran. "There was a lot less pressure, a lot less complaining. It was nice.'

A ruling against reform

Judge Paul S. Teranes has in effect ruled against the county charter reform in ordering Loren Pittman to vacate the sheriff's office and declaring Robert Ficano to be the legal occupant of the office. But the argument may not be over. The Michigan Court of Appeals has agreed to hear Pittman's appeal and is expected to hand down its decision sometime this sum-

WHAT IS AT stake here is the appointing power of the new county executive, William Lucas, who tried to name Pittman, his former deputy, as his successor. Lucas, supported by George Ward, chairman of the charter commission, believes he has the power to fill vacancies. But Ficano was named by a threemember panel of county officials who contend that a state law gives them the power to fill the unexpired terms of elected officials.

In his brief supporting Pittman's claim to the office, Ward said, "The intent of the charter commission was to give the chief executive the power to fill vacancies in elected offices." In a charter county, he contended, "the only route to the head of an elected department is by a vote of the people or through appointment by the county executive."

If the Michigan Court of Appeals upholds Pittman's appeal, all will be well and Lucas' Lucas, then it would be appropriate for Lucas to seek an amendment to the state law to make certain the county executive is not hamstrung by laws designed for an earlier day.

Under the Michigan Constitution we must balance the state's budget annually. There are only two ways to do that under any logical bookkeeping system: either raise revenue (assets) or cut expenses (liabilities). Republicans in the legislature refused to do either.

Not that they were against taxes. They favored a 1.4 percent increase versus the 1.75 percent increase proposed by the Demo-crats. But it would have been "temporary," like the last one the Milliken team proposed, remember? Republican leadership in Lansing is famous for these ingen-ious "temporary but permanent"

solutions.
Well, I promised voters in the last election I wasn't going to play games or lie and I won't. The economic problems of Michigan are deep and structural. That's why I voted "no" on the last temporary tax — it was a sham and everyone knew it. Milliken was sure there would be full economic recovery by August of 1982, right? He was obviously wrong! I did not support the recent income tax increase as the only realistic alternative; First I presented two alternatives.

is fairer to working families than a tax on decreasing-in-value wages. It would have generated enough revenue to balance the budget and keep vital services available to those citizens devastated by our economy.

Under the Kelly proposal, when the state returned to economic health the additional revenue from the 2 cent increase would have been constitutionally mandated for replacement of the school-aid portion of your property tax bills. Unfortunately Republican obstructionists wouldn't support this alternative to the income tax and 16 Republicans brought the sales tax-property tax relief proposal to defeat on final

tion. Cowards who opposed the revenue increasing programs failed likewise to offer any package of cuts. After many hours of diligent work with our fiscal agency I came up with a written list of \$393.8 million in cuts in addition to the Governor's proposed cuts of \$225 million. House members talked about the cuts but didn't commit it to writing for fear of angering favored special interest groups. However, no consensus on these proposed cuts I believed that a 2 cent sales tax could be reached by either caucus and the revenue options were the only ones to be brought before the

Once the budget cuts were rejected and the sales tax-property tax package failed we only had the income tax proposal before us. I voted for it but not until and only after some major changes from the House version,

The Kelly amendment put a termination date of Oct. 1, 1986 on the 25 cent surcharge. The objective of the surcharge is to erase the \$900 million worth of horrendous raiding and voodoo bookkeeping during the 14 years of Republican leadership. The Senate Finance Committee substitute bill also reduced the income tax automatically for each of the next three years.

What if we had done nothing? It is too irresponsible to imagine passage. Is too irresponsible to imagine turning thousands of prisoners out alternatives? Don't blame meter maids



Any structural changes granted will be the minimum the board feels necessary to relieve the hardship, the ordinance said.

The duties of the building inspector are not defined in the current ordinance. Under the proposed change, the building inspector would have the power to issue permits and make inspections to ensure compliance with the or-

dinance. The building inspector would not be allowed to grant exceptions to the ordinance or make changes in the ordinance. No permits would be issued until the building inspector makes sure the proposed construction meets the ordinance.

Other changes include deletion of language that is no longer applicable. Also, under the proposed ordinance, it would be unlawful to park an unlicensed vehicle on private property in view without the consent of the public safety director.

Another change would make it a possible public nuisance to leave brush, grass or weeds taller than six inches growing or lying on any property. The responsible person will be under obligation to clear, remove or destroy the nuisance.

In addition, the trustees will discuss the passage of an ordinance requiring persons wanting to put up a satellite antenna "dish" to get a permit before in-

The permit must include a plot plan, a site plan of the plot on which the dish is to be installed and abutting properties, including those on the other side of the street.

'We could at least be warm,'' I said

"We were warm the last time," said my mother, "and although Cozumel was an experience, I'm not sure it's one we want to repeat. I remember Lynn floating out to sea on a coconut . . .

Chicken consumption continues to go up, up and up. From an average of 36.7 pounds per person in 1971, per capita consumption of chicken rose to 52 pounds in 1982. It is estimated that by 1990 the annual per capita consumption of chicken will be well over 60 pounds.

Turkey is another big gainer in the poultry division. Seafoods, fresh fruits and vegetables and salads are more foods with a light image that are being consumed in increasing amounts.

Consumers are cutting back (but not eliminating) convenience foods, according to Tim Hammonds, vice-president of the Food Marketing Institute. Hammonds' source is a national supermarket survey conducted for FMI by Yankelovich, Skelly and White. Hammonds notes that a condecline in per capita consumption venience food has to offer real value at real convenience if consumers are going to use it.

Consumers are using more

one out of every 20 coupons is redeemed, the Department of Agriculture reports.
According to Hammonds, shop-

pers now go into a food store with a handful of coupons rather than a shopping list. Manufacturers' coupons get consumers to buy their products — but they may also encourage shoppers to do a lot of brand switching, which leads to a decline in brand loyalty.

Recently, with the advent of generic products, brand loyalty has been challenged as never be-

Generic brands first became available in the United States seven years ago. Starting from zero, generics captured a sizeable portion of the market; for a time, the only growth of some products

was in generics.

The growth rate of generic and private labels in food stores declined in 1982, reversing a two-year trend, according to Selling Areas-Marketing, Inc. This slowdown in generic and private - label growth coincided with, and is partially attributed to, the lessening of overall shows beef consumption is trend- and more coupons. 





Michigan drivers hit with fuel tax hikes

Michigan motorists were already the highest taxed in the nation before the latest 5 cent per gallon increase went into effect the first of this month, according to the Automobile Club of Michi-

The nickle increase, which is being imposed by the federal government, will raise the taxes on an average-priced gallon (\$1.17 for self-serve no-lead) to 26 cents, or 22 percent of the total cost. The total breaks down to 9 cents federal fuel tax, 4 cents Michigan sales tax and 13 cents Michigan

The April 1 increase, combined with a series of four state fuel and weight tax hikes over a one-year period (Jan. 1, 1983 to Jan. 1, 1984), will add \$61.49 a year in taxes for the owner of a 20-mileper-gallon automobile driven 12,-000 miles annually, a 53 percent increase over 1982 taxes, the Auto Club said.

"Michigan motorists will spend \$1.5 billion in various state and federal highway taxes this year," said Robert Cullen, Auto Club's Safety and Traffic Engineering

manager.
Both state and federal tax hikes were prompted by escalating road repair costs and declining gas and

lighter, more fuel-efficient vehicles. Most of the new money will be used to repair and maintain the current highway system while a greater share of motorist dollars will be spent on public transportation projects.

One cent per gallon of the federal fuel hike, or an estimated \$1.1 billion per year nationally, is earmarked for mass transit. The Michigan Legislature recently enacted a measure which increased the diversion of fuel and weight taxes from 8.3 to 10 percent (\$66.3 million) for public

transportation. Michigan's public transportation budget, which is funded entirely by motorists, is expected to reach \$110 million this year. It includes \$4.2 million for small bus systems and \$6.7 million for rail freight projects, including the 71-year-old Straits of Mackinac car ferry, the Chief Wawatam. Last year the coal-powered ship, which carries rail cars between peninsulas, cost Michigan taxpayers \$1.6 million despite sitting inactive for six months, the Auto Club said.

As a trade-off for higher use taxes on heavy trucks, Congress mandated that states allow longer, wider and heavier trucks on the federal highway system. Michigan will not be affected by weight tax revenues because of the new weight limit of 80,000

pounds since the state already permits the heaviest trucks, 164,-000 pounds, in the nation. It will mean longer and wider trucks on Michigan highways.

"We have concerns about putting bigger trucks on our roadways," said Cullen. "Not only do they increase the wear-and-tear on the pavement, but they severely compromise the safety of motorists."

In addition to the upcoming federal fuel hike, Michigan's gas tax was increased 2 cents per gallon last January and will rise another 2 cents on Jan. 1, 1984. License plate fees, based on vehicle weight, were increased 15 percent on passenger cars Jan. 1, and will jump an estimated 9 percent beginning Oct. 1 and again on Oct. 1,

While the Michigan fuel tax increases affect truckers, they can receive a 6-cent-per-gallon rebate with the purchase of a special sticker which costs \$90 per year for state truckers, \$12 for out-ofstate truckers. In addition, plate costs for commercial vehicles increased 30 percent this year, but the rate will be frozen until at least 1985.

The traditional vehicle weight tax on passenger cars will be phased out beginning Oct. 1, 1983. All new vehicles purchased in Michigan on or after that date will be taxed according to their value. For instance, a \$10,000 vehicle will be taxed at a .4 percent rate, or \$40. That fee will decrease 10 percent for each of the next three years and then will be frozen.

According to tax rates supplied by the Highway Users Federation, Indiana is second to Michigan in highway taxes at 24.6 cents per gallon, followed by California and West Virginia, both 24.5 cents. Texas has the lowest fuel taxes in the U.S. at 14 cents.


