Kennel, LoCicero win big victories at polls



It's time for the strains of alma maters to be heard throughout area high schools. Our Lady Star of the Sea graduates received their diplomas May 22, while University Liggett seniors (above) took part in graduation ceremonies Tuesday night, June 7. The 38 graduates from Grosse Pointe Academy received diplomas after day-long ceremonies last Thursday, June 9, in the school chapel. The 423 seniors at North High became 423 alumni last night during ceremonies in the school's gym. And South's graduating class of 403 will receive diplomas tonight during ceremonies on the front lawn of the school scheduled to begin at 7:30 p.m.

Local voters handed victories to Board of Education President Dorothy Kennel and Grosse Pointe Park attorney Vincent LoCicero in Monday's school board election.

Incumbent Mrs. Kennel, first elected to the board in 1979, captured the top spot with 2,462 votes, followed by LoCicero with 2,178 votes. Running behind LoCicero was Thomas Peters, a former English teacher at South High School, with 1,528 votes.

Mrs. Kennel and LoCicero will officially assume their \$400-a-year seats on July 1, and will be sworn into office on July 11 to serve out four-year terms.

Early Tuesday, unofficial election results showed 8,646 voters cast ballots in Monday's contest, about the average turnout for school board elections, according to a school spokesman.

Mrs. Kennel led the election vote in all precincts, except for Barnes, Mason and Trombly. LoCicero took the top vote in Barnes and Trombly. Fourth runner-up, Frank Stellingwerf, won in the Mason school precinct where he was president of the PTO.

Interestingly, the top three winners in Monday's election found their biggest support in the Richard school district, Mrs. Kennel

with 445 votes, LoCicero with 351 votes, and Peters with 231 votes.

Peters grabbed the third spot from Stellingwerf by 58 votes. Both candidates were endorsed by the Quality Education Coalition, a group of parents opposed to Supt. Kenneth Brummel's tentative plan to reorganize the school system and close four elementaries.

Election tallies showed Stellingwerf with 1,470 votes, and candidate David Russell with 452 votes, Anthony Skomski with 294 votes, and Sharon Vasher with 257 votes.

On his way to a victory party Monday night, LoCicero credited his election win to "a real team effort."

"Basically, it was a fair and clean campaign," LoCicero said. "It was more work than we expected it would be. We had excellent advisors telling us how it should be done."

"It was a real team effort. I'm looking forward to serving."

LoCicero said his campaigners conducted heavy phone solicitation throughout the community and went door-to-door over the election weekend.

Mrs. Kennel also said several phone calls to residents "brought out the vote" Monday and added

she trekked about 16 miles door-to-door last weekend passing out flyers and introducing herself to voters.

Supt. Brummel's proposal to close four elementary schools by fall, 1984, dominated the campaign early on. Mrs. Kennel said the school closing issue "sent a message to the board about school consolidation."

"People who are opposed (to the superintendent's plan) know we are listening to them. A lot of people have told me that," Mrs. Kennel said.

Mrs. Kennel and LoCicero will vote on Supt. Brummel's proposal this November.

Education cable channel goes to college group

The cable company's citizen advisory board informally agreed last month to allow the Channel 56-run program, College Cable, to move from channel 20 to 19, the channel set aside in the franchise agreement for "educational access." Grosse Pointe Cable general manager Steve Davis said another program will replace Col-

Graham, Heenan to face off in Park

Grosse Pointe Park has scheduled a primary election for Aug. 2 to narrow down the field of eight candidates who this week filed petitions to run for three open council positions.

The eight include three incumbent council members, Dr. Roger McNeill, of Windmill Pointe Drive, John Prost, of Pemberton Road, and Anthony Spada, of Kensington Road, who surprised many who expected him to seek the mayor's seat this year.

Also on the ballot will be John J. P. Ryan, of Lakepointe Avenue, who ran for election in the Park two years ago without success. Other candidates for council will be David Gaskin, of Bishop Road, Vernon Ausherman, of Lakepointe Avenue, Paul Lechner, of Devonshire Road and Robert Allan McCormick, of Bishop Road.

Only two candidates filed petitions to run for mayor, so their names will not appear on the ballot until the general election in November. But the contest promises to be an exciting one with incumbent Douglas Graham, of Trombley Road, facing prominent attorney Palmer T. Heenan, of Bishop Road.

All the candidates have until 4 p.m. tomorrow, June 17, to withdraw from the race, according to city officials. The deadline for filing petitions for office was Tuesday, June 14.

Seven candidates also made the Tuesday deadline for filing petitions to run for Grosse Pointe Farms council this year.

There are four council seats up for grabs in the Farms, including those held by Mayor James Dingeman, Mayor Pro Tem Lloyd Semple, and Councilmen Jack Cudlip and Harry Echlin.

Two incumbents, Semple and Cudlip, have dropped out of the race. Dingeman and Echlin will seek re-election.

New names for Farms voters to choose from in November include Bruce M. Rockwell, of Kenwood Court, Mary Anne Guesquiere, of Hillcrest Lane, Sterling E. Graham, of Radnor Circle, C. Milena Raynal, of Lewiston Road, and Charles Rutan, of Fisher Road.

Panel will study 'excess space'

A government logistics specialist, a homemaker, realtor and businessman were among the citizens appointed to a panel to study possible uses for school buildings that may be closed by the Board of Education.

Supt. Ken Brummel has proposed closing four elementary schools in the fall of 1984 in response to the school system's sharply declining enrollment. Parents organized in opposition to his plan convinced the Board of Education to postpone a vote on the proposal until November. The "excess space" committee, which was appointed last week, is scheduled to report to the board on Oct. 3.

Its members include Carl Anderson, an educator with South Lake Schools; George Baer, a local realtor; Peter Gast, a member of the Mason school PTO; Edward Haug, a member of a committee which earlier studied school closings; Peter Johnstone, realtor; Karen Knudsen, who manages property for a local non-profit organization; Sharon Masek, a trained social worker; Judy Mathews, Kerby PTO president and junior high school teacher; Frances Schonenberg, past president of the League of Women Voters; William Schultz, a logistics management specialist at the federal tank arsenal; and Ben Zenn, the school system's director of support services.

City councils in the five Grosse Pointes also were invited to appoint representatives. The Farms named Clerk Richard Solak, the Woods appointed William Wilson, a councilman. The other cities will name members at a later date.

Brummel outlined the charge to the committee in a one page memo and asked that recommendations which "suggest and prioritize alternative uses and dispositions for each of the buildings and sites" be included in the report.

Brummel asked the panel to address at least the following issues, in its report:

- Which building(s) is a suitable location for the continuing education/community services component?
- Which building(s) is a suitable location for the Instructional Materials Center?
- Which building(s) is a suitable location for the central administration building?
- Which building(s) is a suitable location for central warehousing services?
- Which building(s) is a suitable location for central maintenance services?
- If Special Education Services personnel were to be consolidated, which building(s) is a suitable location?
- Which building(s) is a suitable location for community use; e.g., historical society, FLEC, Health Education Council?
- Which building(s) is suitable for re-opening should future enrollments require new educational space?

SEMTA faces budget woes, cutbacks

The Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority is considering a sales tax increase or authority to levy property and income taxes to offset a \$15.8 million deficit in the second half of its budget year.

The first half of SEMTA's July to June fiscal year is in balance, manager of media affairs Gail Whitley said. But the transportation authority faces "drastic" cutbacks if it receives no new revenue to offset the red ink next year, she said.

The cuts would be similar to those proposed last year when SEMTA found itself up against the wall financially, Whitley said. They would include up to 70 percent of large bus service, all small bus service and trains, she said.

While SEMTA discussed the potential of seeking a state sales tax increase from 4 to 5 percent to

help bolster revenues, the authority is not committed to the increase, Whitley said.

According to SEMTA, a one-cent hike in the sales tax statewide would raise more than \$395 million. A tri-county area sales tax hike of the same amount would raise \$140 million.

A sales tax increase would require amendment of the state Constitution which requires two-thirds majority of the Legislature, the governor's signature and a majority vote in a statewide election.

State Rep. William R. Bryant, Jr., R-Grosse Pointe Farms, said SEMTA officials are "still getting their act together" on the request for some sort of tax increase.

There are alternatives to the sales tax increase, Bryant said.

One option would be for the state to allow the transportation authority to collect a portion of the mandated sales tax, he said. Presently, the sales tax is collected completely by the state. With legislation, the state could lower its portion of collection while the authority received the rest, he added.

Another possibility would be devising a use tax for the area served by SEMTA, Bryant said. The use tax involves taxes on second hand sales, flea markets and other such sales, he noted.

SEMTA approved its \$99.2 million budget in early June. Hundreds of Grosse Pointe businessmen, commuters and shoppers use routes along Kercheval, Charlevoix, Kercheval, and East Jefferson.

Northwest area plan One-way streets proposed in Woods

Residents on Holiday Road and the northwest section of the Woods will have a chance to meet with council members to discuss upcoming road changes in their areas.

For Holiday residents between Torrey and Cook, it will be a chance to discuss scheduled road work and water main replacement.

Woods changes zoning board appeal fees

The Woods council Monday, June 6, passed for second reading and adoption an ordinance which will add a mailing charge for zoning board of appeals hearings. The city will charge appellants 25 cents for every notice over 30 mailed out to notify surrounding property owners.

Under provisions of the Woods city code, property owners within a 300 foot radius are notified of the zoning appeal when a date for the hearing is set by the council. In addition, notice of the hearing must be published in a newspaper of general circulation before the hearing.

Deputy City Clerk Louise Warnke told the council the average number of notices mailed was 30, but the number varied greatly, depending on the size and location of an appellant. While an average homeowner may require 30 notices, a location like the Lochmoor Club would require many more, city officials noted.

Under the proposed ordinance, the fee of \$75 for filing for the hearing will remain the same. The fee of 25 cents for notices will be assessed after the hearing date is set and will be due before the hearing.

Failure to pay the extra fee before the time the notices must be mailed and published will result in the cancelling of the hearing, the ordinance reads. In addition, the initial \$75 fee will be forfeited to the city.

The appeal fee may be waived by the Board of Appeals at the request of the petitioner and the filing of an affidavit showing the petitioner meets the standards for a low income person or family as set by the federal government, according to the ordinance.

The council will again consider the ordinance for final adoption at its June 20 meeting. If adopted, the ordinance would take effect in 20 days.

For northwest area residents, it will be a chance to review alternatives to eliminate traffic problems from Old Eight Mile Road by possibly turning some streets into one-ways.

The city will replace the asphalt paving on Holiday Road from a point north of Cook Road to Torrey Road with concrete and replace a water main, Woods officials said. The city is still trying to set a date for meeting with residents when the council and city engineers can both attend.

The Wood requested the state Department of Transportation to grant the city an exception from recent changes in the state code for major streets. Under the new provisions, new or existing reconstructed major streets must measure 32 feet from curb to curb.

The city requested it still receive major street funds for the new section of Holiday, although the street will be repaved at its present 24-foot width. Should traffic flow become a problem, the city agreed to eliminate parallel parking on the street.

Woods City Administrator Clerk Chester Petersen said there was a difference in the amount the city is paid by the state for its major and local streets. In addition, cities must match local street funds with its own.

Northwest residents will see eight alternatives for changes in signage and traffic flow on Monday, June 27, at 7:30 p.m., in council chambers. The changes are meant to alleviate some of the traffic flow problems caused by

users of Old Eight Mile Road, which becomes Brys Drive just east of Helen.

The Department of Public Safety presented the alternatives, which propose signage additions and changes as well as one-way streets in the area to divert some traffic off of Brys.

The council decided to meet with residents of the area to allow them to form a consensus about which plan they think would be best for them. Public safety representatives said they had no recommendations for the council on which plan offered the best solution.

Councilman John Sabol said the city should take some immediate action. He proposed acceptance of an alternative traffic plan that would turn Brys into one-way eastbound, while Roslyn would become one-way westbound. "No left turn" signs would be posted at Helen and Brys and "do not enter" signs would be posted at Brys and Roslyn.

Although the city had made changes in the area in previous years, it had never tried one-way streets, Sabol said.

Should the city discover the plan didn't work, it would only have spent a minimum amount on signage for the area, he added.

The motion died for lack of support. Others on the council argued it would be better for all concerned if residents knew of the upcoming changes, rather than discovering one day their streets have become one-way.

Burn specialists speak at cottage

The National Institute for Burn Medicine, a national non-profit health care organization, in cooperation with the University of Michigan Burn Center is sponsoring a program on Emergency Burn Care at Cottage Hospital of Grosse Pointe on Friday, June 17.

Marilyn Mackovjak, R.N., Staff Nurse, Burn Unit, the University of Michigan Hospitals, will show the film, "Emergency Burn Care," lecture and answer questions.

Each year 100,000 people are burned in Michigan, 400 die, and 3,200 are hospitalized. Immediate, decisive care at the scene of the accident and in the Emergency Department not only results in saving the patient's life, but also can reduce the severity of complications.

The Education Department at Cottage Hospital is coordinating this program and an invitation is being extended to all local medi-

cal providers, physicians, nurses, emergency medical technicians and others. If interested, contact the Education Department at 884-8600 ext. 2390. No fee is required. Garden City Board of Education member Armen Barsamian also was elected to the Intermediate School District (ISD) board. Barsamian, a senior cost analyst at Ford Motor Company, was elected to a six year term.

Two ISD members retained their seats in the June 6 election, Mary E. Blackmon will serve a four-year term and Boyd W. Arthurs will serve a six year term.

One board member from each of the 36 school districts in Wayne County was eligible to vote in the election.

By law, intermediate district board members serve six-year terms. Two vacancies on the ISD board require that members be elected to fulfill the terms of the vacant seats.



Council delays pay hike vote

The Woods council took no action Monday night, June 6, on pay increases for the mayor and councilmen that were recently recommended by the Local Officials' Compensation Commission. After receiving and placing the report on file as part of the first motion of the night, the council passed over discussion on the report.

Under the provisions of the ordinance that created the commission last year, the council must reject the recommendations by a resolution with two-thirds majority support. The council has one more meeting before a 30 day deadline for action expires.

Council members contacted before the meeting expressed surprise that the matter had been placed on the councilmen agenda. John Sabol and Thomas Fahrner declined comment on the report until after the council reviews it.

Councilman Frederick Lovelace said the recommended pay increases for the council and mayor were small. The report recommended the honorariums for council members and mayor be increased from \$400 to \$600 and \$600 to \$900, respectively.

The committee also recommended the salary for municipal judge be increased from \$3,000 to \$5,000. Lovelace said he thought the amount might have been higher. "She (Municipal Judge Patricia Schneider) puts in more than

public administrator, I think the provisions of the Michigan Civil Services system went far beyond what the original intellectual reformers proposed over six decades ago. They would have been shocked to think that, beyond prohibiting cronyism selection or politicized placement, the representatives of the people cannot, through law, regulate the conditions of employment, demote unneeded supervisors, dismiss inefficient personnel, or reduce the compensation or future wages of employees during economic depression. These restrictions have led us to organizational chaos, and a class of citizens in our society who are separate from and immune to the needs of the rest of us even though they are on the public payroll only to carry out public policy needs.

The message of Orwell was clear: maintain control over yourself and your government. The task of the special subcommittee is equally clear: Reestablish public control over the bureaucracy.

In these days of computerized case files, sophisticated communications and intricate human needs, the demands of society are large and must be done by government on a mass scale. And for the most part the overwhelming number of civil servants have been diligent, hard-working and responsible individuals. As 1984 approaches, however, we need to keep one eye on the abuses of the political system and the other focused on where we ought to be.




Cities receive more cash from highway taxes

State tax revenues for maintenance and improvement of Michigan's highways, roads, streets and other transportation systems climbed during the first quarter of 1983 for the first time in three years, the Michigan Department of Transportation reported.

Income from Jan. 1 to March 31 totalled more than \$195 million, up 8.8 percent from the same period the year before. However, revenue fell short of the \$195.78 million collected in 1981's first quarter.

The first quarter increase reflects hikes in gas and weight taxes approved in December as well as a 3 percent increase in highway travel, the department said.

The Grosse Pointe share of the revenue is \$261,518, according to department figures, up from \$243,636 for the same quarter last year. The Woods should receive \$91,065; the Park, \$66,900; the Farms, \$55,961; the City, \$30,681; and the Shores, \$18,909.

The county's share of the revenue topped 18 million, up from \$7.3 million for the same quarter last year.

Fuel consumption continues to decline, the Transportation Department said. Gasoline sales fell from 849 million gallons in the first quarter of 1982 to 793 million gallons in 1983, indicating growth in the number of light-weight, fuel-efficient cars.

Sales of diesel fuel increased from the same quarter of 1982, the department said.





Cox may be forced to sell local franchise

Cox Cable, currently negotiating for the purchase of Kaiser Broadcasting Co., may be forced to sell its franchise in St. Clair Shores, Fraser and Grosse Pointe Shores if the deal goes through.

David Andersen, corporate director of public relations for Cox, said the company has not yet closed the Kaiser Broadcasting deal. The boards of directors have agreed in principle to the sale, but have not given final approval to the purchase, he said.

Under Federal Communications Commission rules, a media company can't own more than one form of mass media in a given coverage area. Should the sale be consummated, Cox Cable of St. Clair Shores may have to go up for sale, company general manager Mike Zimmer said.

"We'll have to divest ourselves of that interest," Zimmer said, adding the company had invested about \$4 million in initially setting up the three-city franchise.

Andersen said the cable company may apply to the FCC for a waiver of the cross-ownership rule and determination is up to the FCC.

Tapes help cancer patients

Some surveys have found that after the patient is first told about a cancer diagnosis that there is a mental block. Virtually all else said in the visit is not really heard or is distorted following such a diagnosis with a patient.

The Harper-Grace Hospitals Radiation Oncology Center (ROC) staff began pilot testing use of tape audio cassettes given to the patients following their interviews. The tests proved beneficial to both patients and staff and the new program inaugurating taped interviews was begun for radiation therapy patients.

The department purchased four tape recorders and a carton or two of audio cassette tapes. Patients are given use of the tape recorders and tape following the first interview only.

William E. Powers, M.D., of Detroit, chief of the ROC, notes, "The patients benefit in so many ways from this feedback."

He said "taking the recorders home allows the patient and his or her family time to digest and analyze the information. Later visits with the radiation therapist can build on that initial information. Misunderstandings between doctor and patient or fam-

ily are usually weeded out. The patient can list at home any questions that may not have been cleared up during the interview."

Nancy Dehem, of Grosse Pointe,

ROC department head, said, "We have even heard of some patients sending the tape cassettes to other parts of the country so their relatives can listen too."




"Pete isn't much help at feedings, since I'm nursing the baby myself. However, he is really good at walking her around. He's not too crazy about changing her

Thanks Dad. Have a great day.



 says Doug Bastianelli, of North High. "I want to see what's out there to do, that's really what college is all about." Bastianelli will attend MSU's honor college on scholarship this fall.

For now, Kenneth Fromm, South's Latin Club and National Honor Society president, is certain a liberal arts major is right for him. "Then I'm not sure," says Fromm. "Business, law or computer engineering are all possibilities."

Even North's valedictorian is uncertain about which career she'll land in after college, but Jenifer Kuzel wants a "good job" and she'll "do what she can" from there. For Kuzel that means helping people, traveling and working in her community.

The future is not all roses as these grads look ahead. The poor economy, nuclear war and a declining Michigan economy are some of their concerns. But as one student said about nuclear war, "It's hard to get worried about things I have no control over."

"Finding a place in the work world is my biggest worry," says Matteo diTommaso of South, for whom a career choice is particularly tough.

"Ideally I see myself in a research lab but my violin stops me." Playing the violin is diTommaso's most important extra-curricular activity. But both his "loves," science and music, would demand his full attention as a career and he's not sure he can give up one for the other. Postponing the choice for now, he says "I'll attend the University of Indiana, they're well-ranked in both science and music."

David Wu of University Liggett does not worry about his future. "I'm mainly concerned with the present." For Wu that means working in an immunology lab studying defense mechanisms this summer. Wu did his worrying earlier this year. Wu, to his surprise he admits, was accepted to a medical school program at Uni-

versity of Michigan which will allow him to study medicine as an undergraduate and will graduate him as a doctor in only seven years.

 with the channel now," Sloan said.

"We didn't want to give it up because we were afraid we might not get it back. But (cable officials) assured us the decision will be reviewed in August and some kind of plan worked out."

Grosse Pointe Farms Councilman Joseph Fromm, who recently joined the cable company's board of directors under a rotation system spelled out in the franchise agreement, said the decision to move College Cable to channel 19 was only temporary.

"I would never agree to taking (the channel) away permanently," Fromm said. "I think the schools have to have some form of representation." Fromm said he will present an alternative solution when the advisory group meets with school representatives in August.

Sloan and Carl Schoessel, who coordinates cable programming for Grosse Pointe public schools, said they increased their use of the channel substantially over the last semester, broadcasting student plays, concerts, athletic

events and speakers in the buildings. Cable officials first proposed putting College Cable on channel 19 last December, but postponed their decision on the switch until last month to give the schools time to develop programming.

John Rickel, president of Grosse Pointe Cable, Inc., said company officials are interested in seeing as much programming as possible on the system.

"It cost \$300,000 to build a cable channel," Rickel said. "Obviously we want to return as much to the community as we can through programs."

College Cable broadcasts classes from several nearby universities and colleges 24-hours a day. It is supported by the U.S. Department of Education, and Channel 56 and is aired over at least nine other cable systems. The schools involved include Eastern Michigan, Madonna College, Oakland Community College, Schoolcraft College, University of Michigan/Dearborn, Washtenaw Community College, Wayne County Community College and Wayne State University.

Elegant evening at Ford House ends current Pro Musica season

Pro Musica's 56th annual dinner meeting was a concert evening in the venerable society's finest tradition of presenting living composers and their music. A record 102 members and guests gathered at the Edsel & Eleanor Ford House on Wednesday, June 8. Special guest was composer Karl Meister, of Munich, West Germany.

Meister, formerly professor of Music at Munich's Luitpold Gymnasium, now retired, is director of

the Meisterche Kammerchor, a prominent chorus which he leads in concert and broadcast activities internationally.

He has composed dozens of works, performed widely in Europe and the United States, for voice, orchestra and solo instruments. His Christmas Oratorio, Bassoon Concerto and several cantatas have been particularly popular, taking him as far from home as the University of Califor-

nia at Berkeley for performances. His Munich Symphony, composed for the 800th anniversary of his home city, was a major concert showpiece for that city's recent anniversary celebrations. It was broadcast widely on the German Radio Network.

In his honor, his popular piano work "Berg Op Zoom," a series of variations on a Netherlands folk theme, was performed by Detroit pianist Fedora Horowitz at the Pro Musica banquet. Meister, who celebrates his 80th birthday this summer, spoke briefly about the work and other United States performances of his music.

His talk was followed by a two-piano performance of Gershwin's "Rhapsody in Blue" by Pro Musica members Ruth Burczyk and Edward Frohlich.

At the brief business meeting, the society re-elected directors Mrs. George Zeitz, of Dearborn, Mrs. Berj Haidostian, of Birmingham, Marvin Bookstein, of Detroit, and Grosse Pointers James

Diamond and Alex Sucek, whose three-year terms had expired.

The evening concluded with a review of Pro Musica's 1983-84 attractions: Van Cliburn Contest winning pianist Santiago Rodriguez on Friday, Oct. 7; the Arden Trio (violin, cello and piano) on Friday, Dec. 2; and mezzo-soprano Kathleen Segar on Friday, March 16.

Pro Musica President Sucek announced that all three concerts and social hours will take place in the Community Arts Auditorium of Wayne State University's McGregor Memorial.

The DCB performs Wednesday, June 29, at 8 p.m. at Meadow Brook Music Festival, and closes the festival with laser show and fireworks performances at 8 p.m. Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 3 and 4. With release of Volumes Five, Six, Seven and Eight in its on-going "Gems of the Concert Band" LP series, the 65-member DCB, now in its 38th year, continues to demonstrate the virtuosity, versatility and extensive repertoire for which it has achieved international acclaim.

The band may be unique in a way dear to the hearts of arts administrators. "We don't believe in deficit spending," says DCB Director Leonard B. Smith, who

has not only presided over artistic production of all albums but has been solely responsible for their successful marketing and promotion worldwide.

"When we embarked upon our very first recording session which culminated in the 10-album Sousa Collection recently picked up by Book of the Month Club, it was firmly established that continuing production would be supported entirely from income produced by sales of the albums themselves. This meant that more than a quarter of a million dollars had to be earned through sales."

"Not only did we complete the Sousa Collection according to plan, but we were able to start production of the equally popular Gems series on the same basis. It, too, is paying its own way through worldwide sales."

As proof of the band's popularity, Smith produces an order at hand from a fan in Tokyo, Japan, accompanied by a check in the appropriate amount, for all 20 presently available DCB albums. "And this," he notes, "is one of many that arrive regularly from all parts of the world."

All albums produced by the DCB have been recorded in the main auditorium of Detroit's Masonic Temple. When buying leeks, choose the freshest, medium-sized ones, with bright green tops and a crisp white base. The usual bunch weighs about one pound, and will serve two. Use only the white portion of the leek, and one to two inches of the green tops. To prepare, trim off roots plus the first layer of skin (and a second layer, if the leeks are slightly dry and quite dirty). Make a slit halfway through the stalk to within 3/4-inch of the bottom; then separate the leaves and thoroughly rinse under cold, running water, to remove any dirt or sand.

CREAM OF LEEK AND POTATO SOUP

4 leeks, prepared, thinly sliced
1 thinly sliced medium-sized onion
3 potatoes, medium-sized, peeled and thinly sliced
3 cups chicken broth
2 Tbsp. flour
3-1/2 cups skim milk
1/2 cup evaporated skimmed milk
Salt and white pepper to taste

In a Dutch oven, melt the margarine, add leeks and onion and cook until transparent and beginning to turn slightly golden. Add chicken broth and potatoes. Cover and cook about 40 minutes. Season lightly with salt and white pepper.

Pour this mixture into a blender container or food processor, and thoroughly puree.

Make a paste of the flour and 1/2 cup of the skim milk, making very sure that it is very smooth. Return puree to Dutch oven; stir in flour mixture. Add remainder of skim milk and evaporated skimmed milk, stirring constantly with a whisk. Return soup to heat; continue stirring with a whisk until it is hot and thickened (do not boil). Serve hot or icy cold, garnished with chives. Makes 6 servings.

Calories about 208 per serving. Cholesterol about 4 mgs.

NOTE: A cup of finely diced celery may be sauteed along with the leeks and onions to add a distinctive flavor.

SCALLOPED POTATOES AND LEEKS

3 cups potatoes, peeled and thinly sliced
2 Tbsp. flour
1/4 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. white pepper
4 leeks, cleaned and washed, sliced 3/4-inch thick
3 Tbsp. unsalted margarine
3 Tbsp. finely minced fresh parsley
1-1/4 cups skim milk, heated

Toss potato slices in a paper bag with the flour, salt and pepper. In a large, heavy, shallow pottery bowl, arrange a layer of potatoes, a layer of leeks; repeat, making last layer potatoes. Dot each layer generously with bits of margarine and at least 1 Tbsp. minced fresh parsley.

Pour warm milk over potato/leek mixture. Cover and bake in preheated 350° oven at least 1-1/2 hours, or until potatoes are very tender. Bake uncovered for the last few minutes, sprinkled with paprika. Makes 6 servings. Elegant with barbecued or roasted meats.

LEEK A LA GRECQUE

6 medium-sized leeks, cleaned
2 Tbsp. fresh chopped tarragon or 1 tsp. dried tarragon
2 Tbsp. lemon juice
2 Tbsp. finely minced parsley
Freshly cracked black pepper
1 medium-large tomato, skinned and seeded
Pinch of thyme
1 bay leaf
3 Tbsp. olive oil
1 cup water

Halve the leeks lengthwise. Put all ingredients into a heavy saucepan or flameproof casserole (a flat stainless steel or earthenware utensil is preferable). Cover and bring to a boil. Lower heat and simmer gently for about 10 minutes, until leeks are tender but firm. Allow to cool, then chill. May be served as an hors d'oeuvre or salad. Makes 6 servings.



Heat, wild pitch spoil North hopes

North High's varsity baseball team now knows two things for sure: 1) playing 18½ innings of baseball under a blazing sun and 88-degree temperatures is not the best way to spend a Saturday; and 2) losing one game and the regional championship is the WORST way.

Coach Frank Sumbera's Norsemen (30-7) did almost everything right in their regional competition last Saturday. It's the "almost" part which is responsible for sending Warren Cousino (19-8) instead of North to the state semi-finals this weekend.

North took 13 innings to dispatch a scrappy Southfield team, 2-1, in the first regional game. The Norsemen took a 1-0 lead in the first inning when centerfielder Dave Waldeck walked, took second on an errant pickoff throw, went to third on a wild pitch and scored when starting pitcher John Menzo singled sharply to rightfield.

But Southfield came right back in the second to tie the contest without benefit of a hit. Southfield centerfielder Robert Graham walked, moved to second after another walk, advanced on a sacrifice bunt off the bat of outfielder Michael Burwell and scored on a sacrifice fly to leftfield.

Southfield's William Mathews and North's Menzo each took over in what had become a pitchers' duel. Each team threatened, but couldn't get the winning run, forcing extra innings.

Senior righthander Dave Babcock took over for North after 10 innings and Steven Sontag assumed the pitching chores for Southfield because of a state rule which limits a starting pitcher to 10 innings. Menzo had struck out 13 and walked only four. Southfield managed just four hits against Menzo, all coming after the eighth inning.

In the meantime, North managed eight hits off Mathews and Sontag — who combined for 13 strikeouts.

All-League and all-region selection Waldeck put North into the regional final against Warren Cousino with his two-out, 12th-inning single to left. Leftfielder Dennis Cyr had lead off with a walk, Steve Walker was safe on a fielder's choice and following Shawn Dowden's strikeout and Walker's steal of second, Waldeck sent Southfield home with his base hit. Babcock got the win in relief.

Babcock came right back to start the championship game against Cousino — after a one-half hour break for infield practice and a change of uniform.

North jumped out to an early 2-0 lead, thanks to Marty Mitchell double and a pair of Warren Cousino miscues. Babcock, despite the heat, seemed to get stronger as the game went on . . . until the sixth inning.

Four singles wrapped around a walk and a strikeout enabled Cousino to tie North at 2-2. With two out, and after rightfielder Dan Kopitzke had cut down a


