The Constitutional, which hits the newsstands next Tuesday at \$1.50 per issue, is a very funny take off on newspapers in general and tabloids in particular. It's profane, without being pornographic, satirical without being sarcastic and funny without being mean spirited.

Among the ads are those for Ghandi lunch boxes and thermos, plus Ghandi designer sheets, the SPA's national fitness program, a \$12.95 home pregnancy test (consisting of a pregnancy test, HCG test, and a pregnancy test, not), the movie "Das Bridge" starring E.M. Kennedy plus "Raging Bull," starring Al Pacino.

Will we could go on and on, but you get the picture. If you do buy the Constitutional, be sure to check out the society page, obituaries and advertisement for "Innuence," the feminine restorative gel, on page 34. You won't believe it.

Cable TV rates are going up July 1

It's going to cost more to turn on your television and tune in to Grosse Pointe Cable next month because of rate increases for customers in the Farms, Park and City announced last week by the company. The increases range from just 7 percent (\$6 a year) for basic service to 29 percent for premium such as Home Box Office and 67 percent for new installation.

The cable company, owned by Westinghouse and the War Memorial, has almost 10,000 customers, but is not showing a profit. Higher rates are designed to provide cash to purchase new pro-

grams which, in turn, should attract more customers and increase profitability, according to the company.

General Manager Steve Davis said the company's expenses are in line with projections, but revenue and the number of subscribers to premium shows are lower than expected.

"We're several thousand subscribers behind our projections," Davis said in a telephone interview. "Our problem is that we can't get people over 65 (years old) to sign up."

Davis said the company is operating at a loss, but he would not provide specific information about

cable finances, saying Grosse Pointe Cable, Inc., is a private firm whose books are not necessarily open to public inspection. Grosse Pointe Cable issued \$7.2 million of tax exempt bonds in 1981 to help pay for construction of the system. Redemption of the bonds is scheduled to begin in September, 1985, according to their prospectus.

The rate increases were approved by the management of Grosse Pointe Cable, under president John Rickett, and a board of directors with representatives of Westinghouse, the War Memorial and one of the five cities covered by the system.

Leaders in one of the cities, Grosse Pointe Park, reacted angrily to news of the rate hike at a public meeting last week. The council voted 6-1 to send a resolution to the company asking it to reconsider.

"This is a poor time to be raising rates on anything in the middle of a recession," said Councilman Roger McNeill. When he was informed the council had no control over setting rates, McNeill complained the cities had not been careful enough when they negotiated the franchise agreement.

"We legislated a blank check to some commission or board that we have no control over. It was a

big mistake," he said.

Council member Patricia Foster voted against McNeill's resolution, saying she did not think the city was being gouged by what amounts to a 60 percent increase in the basic rate.

Councilman John Prosser, Park's representative to a franchise advisory board, said the new rates are competitive with other terms, but he agreed to McNeill's resolution.

The franchise agreement between the cities and cable company limits increases in the basic rate to 40 percent of the rate of inflation measured by the Consumer Price Index. Other charges are not controlled by the franchise. The agreement also froze rates for two years after the first date of service in the city. Because Harper Woods and Grosse Pointe Woods received cable service earlier than the other three communities, their rates were increased last year and, in some cases, will be decreased slightly to bring them into conformance with the new rates in the Farms, City and Park.

The rate increases follow:

- Basic monthly: from \$7.50 to \$7.99 (7 percent)
- Basic additional: from \$2 to \$2.25 (12 percent)
- Premium monthly: from \$6.95 to \$8.99 (29 percent)
- Premium additional: from \$2.25 to \$2.50 (11 percent)
- Installation: from \$14.95 to \$24.95 (67 percent)
- Reconnection: from \$15 to \$19.95 (33 percent)

Lakeshore prairie gets a trim



Board, teachers bargain against August deadline

Contracts talks between the Grosse Pointe Board of Education and the school system's 529 teachers have gotten underway, as one of nine open contracts within the Local 1 regional bargaining group, according to its executive director Walter Benton.

Local 1, umbrella group of the Michigan Education Association, represents teachers at the bargaining table in 17 Macomb County school districts, and includes the Wayne County school districts of Grosse Pointe and Harper Woods.

Grosse Pointe educators joined Local 1 in 1979 to strengthen their position at the bargaining table. Any tentative agreement reached by the school board and the Grosse Pointe Education Association (GPEA) during this year's round of talks will have to be approved by the Local 1 bargaining council.

Last week Local 1's Benton said contracts due to expire within the regional bargaining group include Armada, Richmond, Southlake, Fraser, Center Line, Fitzgerald, Clintondale and Warren Woods.

Benton said Harper Woods teachers have reached a settlement on a new one-year contract guaranteeing 5 percent salary improvements and 4 percent cost-of-living payments.

Grosse Pointe's teacher union president Curt Lange last week said both sides have met a few times and have submitted issues for bargaining. Lange, however, would go no further and say what issues are on the table. The

teachers' contract expires this Aug. 31.

Chief negotiator for the school board, Ronald Tonks, said both sides are in the "exploratory stages right now." Also representing the school board in negotiations are Deputy Supt. James Hoeh and Personnel Assistant David King.

Representing the GPEA at the bargaining table are Bob Graham, Pierce Middle School; Jim Garlough, Parcels Middle School; Tom Whall, Mason Elementary School; and Linda Putney and Neil Kerntzin, of Local 1.

This week, the Board of Education voted to pay \$400 for a Local 1 facilitator to act as a clearing-house during bargaining regarding negotiations and tentative agreements within other Local 1

school districts. The board used a facilitator in 1981 teacher negotiations.

Not yet named, the facilitator will be appointed by a governing board composed of superintendents of participating districts, and will serve from July to October, according to Supt. Kenneth Brummel.

Under the current contract, local teachers were to receive a 20 percent increase over two years (10 percent salary improvements and 10 percent cost-of-living pay).

Pupil decline to continue

The drop in enrollment that has forced Grosse Pointe's board of education to consider closing four schools will continue through the 1980s unless there is "massive migration" into the state, according to a Michigan State University professor.

Dr. Stanley Hecker, MSU professor of educational administration and consultant to 120 school

districts, discussed enrollment trends before the school board last Monday, June 13, and the news was not good.

"You're not special. You're as different than Livonia, Farmington, Bloomfield, Birmingham and Southfield," Hecker said. "You're graduating bigger 15th grade classes and taking in little kinders." (Continued on Page 2A)

On the radio A chance for local talent

If you liked rock and roll, the sound was great. If you didn't, the sound was merely deafening as five members of Avatar, a South High School rock band were busy warming up at University Liggett for their big audition.

It was their chance to be on the radio, that all-important free exposure in a world filled with good and bad rock bands. The musicians were cutting a tape that would hopefully be given air time on radio stations WDTR (90.0 FM) and WDET (102 FM) later this summer.

One of the persons involved in providing that air time is Grosse Pointe resident Tom Moehring. Moehring, in conjunction with Nathan Judson, and Jim Holmeyer, Music Directors at South and ULS, hopes to provide air time to a lot of high school musicians over the next few months.

"We got the idea while attending the regional and state high school band competitions," said Moehring. "Many high school kids


are as talented as college musicians, but they don't get much exposure. Many times I've gone to concerts and seen hardly anyone in the audience. The music was great but what they needed was some public relations and exposure."

Moehring, Judson and Holmeyer approached Ollie McFarland, Director of the Department of Music Education for the Detroit Public Schools, about free air time for high school musicians on WDTR, a public education station, and WDET, Wayne State University's radio station.

The first program, a half hour segment featuring Avatar and members of two Notre Dame High School Bands (Andromeda and Kontrodikshun), airs at 7 p.m. Saturday, July 2.

Moehring plans to have a two hour program aired in the future on WDET. As of now, no date has been set, but Moehring hopes the two hour segment becomes a regular program.

 garten classes.
 Last year, for example, Grosse Pointe graduated 924 seniors at North and South high schools. The entering class in the kindergartens was just 140 students strong. That's a 514 pupil loss, offset somewhat by 117 students, who joined the public school system in the ninth grade from private and parochial schools in the area. The difference between graduating and entering classes has been greater than 500 students every year since 1972, according to the schools, and was more than 700 in 1978.

Hecker, who discussed enrollment trends with the school board last March, was asked to return to Grosse Pointe to defend his projections, which have been criticized as unreliable by some parents who object to the superintendent's school closing proposal. Hecker said he agrees with the projections prepared by local school administrators who predict there will be only 6,355 students in the system by 1987-88 and the decline will continue at least through 1990, when there'll be only 5,600 students.

The school system's greatest enrollment was in 1971-72, when there were 13,376 students. Since then, it has dropped more than 40 percent, to 7,820 for the current year, a loss of 5,756 children.

Hecker said the decline in the birth rate is a state-wide phenomenon which began in 1971. He attributes it to more modern birth control methods, sterilization, rising divorce rates and women entering the work force. The only way there could be an increase in the population would be the massive migration of people into the state, something Hecker said he doubts will happen under the current economic conditions.

Turn-out low in board race

Last week's attendance at the polls for the annual school board election was slightly below the normal turnout to elect local school trustees, according to a News comparison of past elections.
 Although, 8,848 votes were cast in the election, only about 4,300 persons visited the polls because residents were asked to elect two trustees, thereby casting two votes.
 When trustee Jon Gandelot ran unopposed in last year's school board election, he received only 2,864 votes, but that uncontested race also drew a surprising turnout of about 5,600 voters to turn down a request for a community pool.
 The 1981 school board election drew 682 voters to the polls with only two candidates on the ballot to fill two seats.
 Closer to last week's election turnout, the 1980 school board election drew about 4,700 voters to the polls and about 4,770 voters in the 1979 election.
 According to an informal News poll, there are about 38,525 registered voters in the five Pointes. The last time an election drew anywhere near that figure was in the 1980 presidential race with 33,933 residents casting votes.
 In last year's state elections, 23,700 local residents went to the voting booth. In the 1981 local municipal elections, 12,400 voters visited the polls.

The 136-member GPPCPA received a 6 percent wage increase over the first year and a 3 percent hike over the second year of the contract.
 A custodian under step 1 of the pay scale would make \$6.59 an hour under the first year of the contract and \$6.79 an hour during the second year.

that would result in the closing of four elementary schools in 1984, Defer, Mason, Kerby and Barnes. Sixth grade students would be removed from all elementary schools into middle schools and Defer, Mason and Kerby K-5 grade students would attend elementary classes within nearby middle school buildings.
 The Board of Education was scheduled to vote on his plan last week, but decided to postpone its decision until November because of the public opposition to the proposal. The school board election last week was viewed by many to be a referendum on the school closing issue. Two candidates who are closely tied to the superintendent's proposal, school board president Dorothy Kennel and Vincent LoCicero, won substantial victories in the election over candidates who vowed to vote against any closing plan.

 (ments). But over the contract duration, teachers actually received 7.1 percent in COLA payments because the Consumer Price Index stopped short of 10 percent, leaving educators with a 17 percent contract package, according to union president Lange.
 A teacher with a master's degree and 11 years in the school system would make \$32,036 under the current contract. Starting salary for a teacher with a master's degree is \$18,882.
 The Board of Education also is facing negotiations with the 76-member Grosse Pointe Educational Support Personnel Association (GPESPA). That employee group and the school board have been at the bargaining table since February, 1982 attempting to hammer out a first attempt contract.
 GPESPA President Pat Potter said her membership has filed for fact-finding, even though the state no longer sets aside funds for the process. Ms. Potter said she hopes that the demand by other unions for fact-finding will put money back into the budget.
 Meetings between the GPESPA and the board will resume in August, Ms. Potter said. "We're close, but we're down to the money problems right now," she said.
 The GPESPA membership includes parking lot attendants, hall monitors and teachers' aides in the public schools. The membership's four-step hourly pay scale from 1980-81 is frozen because of negotiations with the board. Ms. Potter said the GPESPA is looking for paid sick days, medical insurance, job descriptions, grievance tactics and layoff procedures in their first working agreement with the board.
 After negotiating since January, 1982, the Board of Education and the Grosse Pointe Plant and Cafeteria Personnel Association (GPPCPA) reached tentative agreement on a new two-year contract on May 10. The school board ratified the contract last Monday night.



Woods cuts into Mack grass

Irrked by the county road commission's failure to cut Mack Avenue medians, the Woods ordered city crews to cut the grass which had grown high enough to begin obstructing motorists' views of traffic.

The city will most likely send a bill to the road commission for its costs, City Administrator-Clerk Chester Petersen said. Although the costs have not yet been calculated, Petersen said he didn't think the county would consider payment anyway.

"We will send the bill and it will be turned down and that will be the end of it," he said. The city has tried billing the county for work the Woods has done maintaining Mack in the past and has been refused, he noted.

Petersen said he received authorization from the council to purchase six lawn mowers, which will be used to keep the grass along almost two miles of Mack at a reasonable height.

Under the state's Youth Employment program, the city hopes to get 42 people from the Department of Labor, Petersen said. The six supervisors and 36 workers will probably go to work maintaining the medians, although some details still have to be worked out, he said.

"We are going to keep Mack up to our desired standards . . . and will have Mack Avenue as neat and trim as Vernier Road, he said.

The Woods council also has decided to hold off on its request that the county return jurisdiction over Mack to the city until after a study is made of costs to maintain the boulevard.

In a letter to the council last Monday, City Attorney George Catlin warned that under recently changed state statutes, the road commission could return Mack to the city without doing heavy maintenance or road repair as the city had first requested.

If the resolution is adopted by the Council, it is possible that the Wayne County Road Commission might take immediate action thereon and relinquish control of Mack Avenue in its present condition," Catlin said in his letter.

Petersen, however, recommended the council adopt the proposed turn-back resolution, saying that while the city could not force

the road commission to perform the repairs, it would at least gain complete control over the roadway.

"At least we could have complete control over Mack to further beautify and improve Mack Avenue without being hampered by the lack of effort to properly maintain such road as is the case at the present time," he said in a memo to the council.

Petersen said the city would receive about \$12,000 to \$14,000 in state money for Mack. Based on the city's past experience with Vernier Road, Petersen estimated it would cost \$20,000 over the next five years to bring Mack up to proper standards.

Petersen said the city could perform maintenance on Mack far more economically than the county, which would mean a savings to the county and a better quality roadway for the Woods.

Councilman Robert Novitke

asked that estimates be made of the cost for street repairs along Mack with a report to be made to the council. In addition, the city could wait for amendments to be made to the state statute that would force the road commission to upgrade Mack before returning it to the city, councilmen pointed out. The attempts to amend the statute are being proposed by state Sen. John Kelly, D-Detroit.

The county's ability to maintain its roads has led the Farms and Woods to complain and seek other methods of getting repairs. The Farms battled the road commission for several years over the resurfacing of Lakeshore Road. The issue received national attention after a group of Farms women donned work clothes and hockey helmets and patched potholes as Mothers Against Potholes. The road commission resurfaced Lakeshore in the summer of 1982.

Brierly vies for state board seat

The Grosse Pointe Board of Education last week supported the nomination of trustee Catherine Brierly for the position of director on the Michigan Association of School Boards (MASB) board of directors.

Mrs. Brierly is seeking one of seven vacancies on the 21-member board. Nominating ballots are sent to each school district in the state and local boards of education have from July 15 to Sept. 1 to return the sealed ballots to the MASB Nominating Committee.

Mrs. Brierly has served on the local school board since 1979.







Refuse Authority wins settlement

A negotiated settlement in a seven-year legal battle between the Grosse Pointe-Clinton Refuse Disposal Authority and its general contractor and pollution control equipment supplier has netted the authority \$1.5 million.

The settlement is already pledged to repair structural problems with the incinerator units at the waste reduction plant in Clinton Township, according to authority attorneys and the plant's superintendent.

The incinerator, built in 1972 at a cost of \$3.4 million, serves the Pointes, Harper Woods, Clinton Township and Mount Clemens, which each pay a share of the costs of the plant based on the

amount of refuse the cities send for processing.

The litigation between the authority and Barton-Malow Co. Affiliated Incinerator Corp., Peabody Process Systems and Glace & Radcliffe Engineers ended April 13, when the parties agreed to a settlement patterned after one proposed by a mediation panel appointed by the Macomb County Circuit Court.

The mediation panel recommended the contractor, engineering firm and pollution control equipment supplier determine among themselves how to divide the cost of the settlement, since each had a hand in the plant's structural problems and emission control difficulties, authority attorney Charles Towner said.

should when heated, allowing fly ash to work its way between the bricks, Towner said. The steel supports for the fire brick are also inadequate for their purpose and must be replaced, plant superintendent Edwin Hoover said.

The price tag for the repairs will most likely equal the amount of the settlement, the two said. The repairs will take place during low volume periods, when one incinerator can be left in service while the second is being repaired, Hoover added. The repairs should be done in a year and will mean no interruption of the incinerator's daily workload, he said.

The addition of electrostatic precipitators in 1981 at a cost of \$4.5 million has brought the incinerator into compliance with Clean Air Standards, Hoover said.

The precipitators replaced wet scrubbers, which were unable to meet state emission standards and threatened the shut-down of the plant in 1979. A \$4.5 million bond issue was approved by the member communities to buy the precipitators, which charge the particulate matter in the emissions and draw them to opposite charged plates as precipitate.

The authority is composed of a representative from each of the member communities. Solid waste is taken to the plant and incinerated to reduce it to 10 percent of its original volume. Metals are then recovered from the ash for further use, and the rest is shipped to landfills.

Graduation, then and now

Attending a grandson's high school graduation is like going through the exercise for a third time. A grandfather recalls his own high school commencement as well as his daughter's as he watches his grandson receive his diploma. And he finds a good many similarities between his own graduation and his grandson's even though the events were more than a half century apart.

THE CAST OF characters, for one thing, is just about the same in 1983 as it was in 1930. The graduates, of course, are all playing leading roles and the beaming parents are the minor characters. Representatives of the board of education, the school administration and the clergy offer words of wisdom which make as little impression now as a half century ago. And student speakers, who take a peek into the crystal ball of the future, find that it looks, for many graduates, no brighter now than during the Great Depression. Some things don't change that much.

Yet there are some differences, too. The 1930 graduation seemed to be more of a family affair with graduates tending to attend receptions in their own homes — until they could slip away to join their fellow students. Today's graduates join in one form or another an all-night party like the one at Grosse Pointe North

which is held in the school building and chaperoned by parents and school officials. Even an afternoon commencement, like the one in which the grandson participated, is no protector against accident. An auto crash took the life of one graduate hours after he received his diploma.

There are other differences between then and now. In the grandfather's class, there were 45 graduates, 30 girls and 15 boys. In those days, many boys never did finish high school in farming communities. They were needed at home on the farm. Today the boys and girls graduating are roughly equal in number in the grandson's school as well as in the Pointes. And the percentage heading for college today is much higher today than the 25 percent from the grandfather's class of 1930.

YET IN ONE major respect the graduates today and of a half century ago are similar. Today they are widely regarded as the nation's greatest natural resource, just as their less numerous predecessors were regarded in 1930. The hope of today's survivors of the class of 1930, however, is that when the class of 1983 reaches maturity it will do a better job of managing the state, the nation and the world than their grandparents did. That is one objective that should not be too difficult to attain.

Better late than never

Just when it appeared that grass and weeds would take over the median on Lakeshore Drive, Wayne County Road Commission crews finally went to work this week — at long last — to cut the grass.

The road commission, which does not stand very high in the esteem of most Pointers because of its long delays in the maintenance of Lakeshore's surface, apparently was short of help for its mowing crews until the CETA and state summer jobs programs became effective.

But the tall grass had created a new danger, especially for motorists driving low-slung,

smaller cars. They could not see approaching vehicles over the grass and weeds at Lakeshore intersections in the Farms and the Shores.

In the Woods, the grass on the median on Muck Avenue became such a serious danger to motorists that the city finally mowed the grass, even though it was the county's responsibility there as well.

With respect to the mowing along Lakeshore, we could solace ourselves with the thought that it's better late than never although we might remind the road commission that it is also better never late.

The rough road of reform

Anyone who has watched government operate for any period of time knows that reform does not come easily. Officials, both elected and appointed, become accustomed to the status quo. Labor unions fear any change may endanger perquisites and benefits they have won over the years. Beneficiaries of services worry that their programs may be revised. And even the general public, normally supportive of reform, begins to wonder whether it is worth all the furor.

That in general appears to be the current situation in Wayne County as it attempts to shift to a charter form of government which does represent reform. The public, fed up with a county government that was widely regarded as inefficient and wasteful, gave a reform charter strong support in a county-wide election in 1981. It followed up in 1982 by electing William Lucas, then the county sheriff, as the new county executive with the responsibility of putting the charter reforms into effect.

EVER SINCE LUCAS took office on Jan. 1, 1983, however, he has been hounded by the defenders of the status quo who have often gone to the courts to defend and protect their perquisites. The result is that the old, politically-motivated Wayne County Road Commission is still in office, despite Lucas' efforts to replace the members, and the removal of a number of officials also has been halted by court action. The labor unions, too, have been less than cooperative with Lucas' efforts to bring the county payroll into a closer approximation of reality.

True, Lucas himself has been guilty on occasion of charges that he has appointed friends and former colleagues from the sheriff's office to high posts. He sought and won a high level of pay for himself, despite the county's wretched fiscal situation, in the belief that his responsibilities deserved it and his position merited it, when compared with other county department heads. He has been accused of the same kind of cronyism and favoritism he was elected to eliminate.

Yet on an overall basis we think Lucas still is

committed to reform. He has tried to change the system but has been frustrated by the courts and the Wayne County Commission in several cases. He has appointed high caliber people to his staff and to other county posts. He has replaced a civil service commission with new members dedicated to installing a real merit system in Wayne County government.

One of Lucas' disappointments has been the foot-dragging by the Wayne County Commission which, after a brief period of cooperative effort, now appears to be joining the forces opposed to reform. As we see it, the holdover commissioners are having difficulty in adapting themselves to their new role which, under the charter, is to serve as a county legislature, not an administrative body. Some of them are even seeking to preserve their old appointive powers, despite the fact the new charter gives that authority to the county executive.

A headline in the Detroit Free Press concluded "The honeymoon is over for Lucas." The fact is, however, that Lucas never did have a honeymoon with those who stood to lose power and perquisites at the hands of reform. They now are the main source of complaints against Lucas and they obviously hope to create a groundswell of opposition which they can use to their own ends. These defenders of the status quo are not interested in reform. They seek to preserve their own benefits and their old relationships with special interest groups ranging from labor unions to county suppliers. And so they attack Lucas directly and indirectly.

LUCAS HAS not been without error himself, as we've said. But we think his commitment to reform still stands. And we think he still deserves public support as he attempts to carry out the reforms required under the county charter. It is far too early for the public to give up on the charter and on the county executive who is under fire chiefly from those whose own jobs and interests are incompatible with the reforms he seeks to carry out.

Now it's time to close schools

Now that the school board election is over, it is time for the school board members and the superintendent of schools to stop talking and start some action. I refer, of course, to the closing of schools. No clear-thinking individual can deny the necessity of school closings. In fact, had the board and superintendent been doing their jobs a few years ago as the enrollment was dropping, they could have closed one school every other year, saved the taxpayers more money, and probably be closing the fourth school now.

The issue has been blown out of proportion because they have procrastinated and now plan to close four schools at once which, by the way, still should be done.

I am disappointed that they are putting it off until at least 1984. This means that we the taxpayers will be forced to endure the cost for at least one more year for the salaries of administrators, teachers, secretarial and custodial help in four schools, not to mention the upkeep, maintenance and utility costs. It appears the board and superintendent are

To those who say that students 6 through 13 can't go to school together, I suggest they learn from the many private schools in the area. These schools have mixed ages 6 through 14 with no problems.

To those who say the quality of education will suffer if we close schools, I reply if the quality of education was good, and it was, 10 years ago with the same number of schools and twice the enrollment, then closing four schools with half the enrollment will not effect the quality of education. In fact, the consolidation may actually improve the quality.

Why don't the complainers quit sending out smoke screens and admit that they just don't want their children to walk a couple of extra blocks to and from schools.

The time for talking is over. It is time for action. If the board and superintendent can't take the necessary action, then perhaps it is time for the taxpayers to get a board and superintendent that aren't afraid to act.

One view from the Capitol

Recall or harassment?

Recall is a dirty word these days. Maybe it always is, depending on who uses it, on whom and why.

Obviously no elected official wants to be recalled. It seems a legalized, non-violent form of lynching to one facing the possibility.

Although some elected officials seem to delight in daring their constituents to get rid of them or to try, most of them, just as if they were real people, want to be liked and appreciated.

Respect is high on the list of wants. Public officials want to be respected. Perhaps it is the seeming disrespect which gives recall a dark image.

Perhaps, even, it is a seeming disrespect for the election process which is part of the seemingly unsavory aspect of recall.

People who advocate recall seem angry. They don't want to wait until the next regular election.

These things, however, are really irrelevant to any question of whether or not recall is a legi-

time process.

Two other things, though, do occur to me as being relevant.

The first relates to the basis for recall. The statute says only that it must "state clearly the reason or reasons for the recall" to give notice to the officeholder why the attempted recall is being made.

Court decisions say clarity is all that is required, sufficiency of reason being left up to the electorate. Thus it is not necessary to allege misfeasance, malfeasance or non-feasance; any clearly stated reason is supposed to be sufficient.

As a legal question, I agree, that is the way it should be. Just as a voter can vote to elect someone for any reason, so too should any reason suffice in a recall.

But I think the larger question is what reason should be actually, not just legally, sufficient. And on that question my own feeling is that, again, just like in electing someone, the question should be the whole person, the whole record, voting and service, of the officeholder.

For a new officeholder there may be little in a record to consider as offset to an unpopular

act. For a veteran officeholder there is a record, one which should be considered. And even for a recently elected person, the process by which they arrived at the questioned decision should be relevant.

Second, recall petitions, if successful is gaining the required number of signatures, cause a special election on the recall question.

This fact, in itself, should and does make recall an extraordinary measure.

Officeholders are elected at general elections. More people vote in regular, general elections than in special elections.

In my opinion, it would be an illegitimate use of the recall to attempt it solely because one felt it would be possible to get rid of an officeholder at a low turnout, special election. Just because one might be able to win a recall should not be reason enough to attempt it.

Recalls are a legitimate right of the people. The reasons for recall should be real and clear and recall should not be abused as a harassment or to try to steal a special election.

GP Theater wraps up its biggest season yet

When the final curtain came down last Saturday night on "Brigadoon," Grosse Pointe Theater's 35th season came to an end — the busiest season in GPT's history, not just for the shows that were presented but for the other events that are a part of that season.

In February, GPT presented "A Musical Celebration with Grosse Pointe Theater" which consisted of sounds from most of the musicals it has presented at Fries Auditorium over the past 20 years. The proceeds from this show are being used to continue the renovation of GPT's new rehearsal facility at 315 Fisher Road and a new heating system is being installed this summer.

In its continuing effort in the area of theatrical education in the community, GPT presented a high school drama festival in February which was open to the drama departments of the four community high schools. Three prizes were given to Rita Lynch of University Liggett School for Best Performance, Tara Sendelbach of South High for Best Director and Tamara Lapo of ULS for Best Set. The students received a trophy for their efforts and their schools received a \$200 donation for their

drama department in each category.

For many years GPT has also awarded scholarships to graduating seniors from the two public high schools in the community at the recommendation of the drama coach for each school. This year marked a change in this procedure. Eligibility for the scholarships was opened to all four community high schools and a maximum of four students from each school could compete in an audition for the two scholarships. The auditions were held in April before adjudicators Robert McKenna, Gwenn Samuel and Edie Dowling of Wayne State University. Eight very talented seniors from North, South and ULS performed. John Ward of North won the Ronald O'Bryan Scholarship and Kristin Neily of South won the Lucy Rea Scholarship. The other participants were Peggy Barrett of North, Tamara Lapo of ULS, Philip McCormick of ULS, Christine Mourad of North, Bill Oler of North and Tara Sendelbach of South.

Continuing its work in the area of educational theater, Grosse Pointe Theater, is participating in the International Theater Festival Olympiad which is being held

from June 24 through July 4, at Hart Plaza in Detroit. Grosse Pointe Theater will host a troupe from Austria. Members are providing housing and transportation for this group of 14 and will host a picnic for them on June 26.

GPT is also looking forward to its 36th season of plays which will include "On A Clear Day You Can See Forever," "The Little Foxes," "Move Over, Mrs. Markham," and "South Pacific." In addition, GPT will be hosting the CTAM spring convention in April, 1984, and will present an additional show for a brief run — "Whose Life is it Anyway?" Pointer heads cancer study

A team of five specialists from Henry Ford Hospital and a professor from Harvard University have been awarded a four-year, \$340,000 federal grant to continue studies of a rare type of detectable hereditary cancer.

It is hereditary medullary cancer of the thyroid gland. This gland, located in the neck, produces hormones which help control the body's metabolism. Previous studies have shown the cancer can be detected by a 10-minute blood test in a very early stage before the patient develops any noticeable lumps or symptoms.

According to the principal investigator for the study, Pointer Dr. Charles Jackson, chief of the Clinical Genetics Division in HFH's Department of Internal Medicine, "By studying a rare form of cancer in a small group of individuals we can learn factors important in the origin of other cancers."

Currently, if the early cancer is detected, the thyroid can be removed surgically and the patient placed on oral thyroid-replacement medication. Screening tests are performed on family members as young as age 2, with many patients from age 4 to 15 requiring thyroid surgery.

Thirteen families have been involved in the study, which has been going on at HFH since 1971. According to Dr. Jackson, "We've found that hereditary medullary thyroid cancer is not concentrated in any one ethnic group, race or sex. If a patient has the hereditary type, each child has a 50-50 chance of developing it."

The stated purposes of the continuing study, funded by the National Cancer Institute, are to improve the methods of early detection of the cancer and to determine the best method of surveillance of patients' relatives who may be affected by the disease. Clinical and laboratory follow-up of all family members will be undertaken not only to provide the diagnosis of the disorder but to establish prognostic data on both treated and untreated individuals.

Past studies in Henry Ford Hospital laboratories have demonstrated that a number of individuals from 10 families in whom the disease is present have chromosome abnormalities which are visible under the microscope.

Currently, blood specimens of family members are obtained at HFH and sent for analysis in the laboratories of Dr. Armen H. Tashjian Jr., professor of toxicology and pharmacy at Harvard.

Prime Time

For Senior Citizens

The headline read, "....we're probably going to end up alone and poor."

The story that followed warned women not to be taken in by the "Cinderella myth" and advised them to prepare to support themselves in their later years. It went on to say that the prospect of meeting a Prince Charming and being taken care of the rest of their life is a myth. It just doesn't happen.

The harsh reality is that three out of five marriages end in divorce and more women over 45 are being divorced. Another factor which determines a woman's chances of being alone is their life span. Women outlive their husbands and older widows seldom remarry.

Alice Quinlan, director of Older Women's League (OWL) supports this contention that women must learn to look out for themselves. Statistics show that there are 20 million American women over age 60 which includes 750,000 in Michigan. Sadly the figures show that the average single woman in that age group has less than \$1,000 in the bank and receives about \$4,000 a year Social Security. These women represent 85 percent of the nation's elderly. Their income is below the poverty line.

To be forewarned is to be forearmed. Younger women are supposed to benefit by hard lessons learned by those who grew up at a time when girls married soon after graduation from high school and settled down to being a good wife and mother.

But before too many tears are shed for these poor misguided girls who chose marriage as a career, some thought should be given to the pluses of that choice.

There is an undefined satisfaction that comes with being all things to all members of a family. Shopping, cooking, cleaning, doing laundry are mundane jobs that add up to making a home. These are the tangible contributions. But there are other incalculable experiences that only those who have made their family the center of their world can know, experiences that come from just being there and available.

Granted it is a different world now. We know that, accept it and make accommodations. It is true that girls no longer consider marriage a career. Men marry expecting their wives to work and help with the expense of keeping a home and raising a family in an inflated economy. On the other hand, men are willing to help with household tasks formerly considered women's work. But the fact remains the home and family can no longer be a woman's only consideration because when employers pay money they expect work in return, work that involves energy and stress and that expenditure of energy and stress must be drawn off that which would otherwise go to home and family.

Children know that because they feel it first. All children are possessive. They want to be the center of their mother's life and when mother goes off to work each day and leaves them, they feel cheated.

So, even as younger women gird themselves against a lower standard of living in their latest years, they should realize that like all trade-offs, it has a price.

Even the argument that a woman with a job is insured against displacement as she grows older is a questionable one. It is true that some men do divorce older wives and replace them with younger ones but this happens in the job market also. Many women who work are threatened by younger competition. Along with the statistics that warn the plight of women who "lived for their family" as some detractors of that choice bemoan, there are other figures that show that it was not such a bad way to go.

Michigan's older women should not be pigeonholed into any one set category. A recent survey shows that at the age of 65, many women are living on Social Security but it also shows that she more than likely owns her own home, a car and is able to take care of her daily needs. Since she was raised in an era when emphasis was placed on making do with what you have, she manages well, is optimistic about the future, active in the community, socially involved with family and friends and looking forward to leading a full life.

She, along with those who are more affluent, enjoys a new status and importance in life. On July 1, for the first time in the history of America her age group will outnumber teenagers. She is truly living in the century of old age.

No longer are older people just setting on a bench and watching the world go by. They, by their very numbers, can be an important voice in government. They are an important factor in the economy. Locally, a large advertising firm conducted a survey that indicated a buying power of older people should not be underestimated.

A 70 year old doctor who has no retirement plans, offers this advice to older people who want to make their later years better years. "Stay busy and never act your age." This is possible for anyone, no matter what their income. Being active in the Pointes is no problem. There are so many organizations that need help. The local hospitals, Bon Secours, Cottage and St. John welcome volunteers.

There are daily activities at the Neighborhood Club, something to suit every interest. The Grosse Pointe school system also offers classes where participants can pursue old interests or cultivate new ones. The War Memorial, beautifully located with scenic views of the lake from every window, is another place where a variety of classes and activities are offered. Add to this list, the senior clubs sponsored by churches of every denomination where older people can go for enjoyment.

If you do decide to attend any of these activities you can be assured that you will have lots of company. Your age group will be well represented. Wayne County has a much greater percentage of

persons over age 60 than other communities. The overall area has 17.2 percent age 60 and over.

Those over 60 in Grosse Pointe City average 23.6 percent; Grosse Pointe Farms, 23 percent, Grosse Pointe Shores, 20 percent and Grosse Pointe Woods, 20 percent.

Many of the older women who live in the Pointes, because of the era in which they were reared will have spent their adult lives raising a family. It is more than likely also, that their incomes will be well above the national poverty level because they truly will have lived the "Cinderella myth" with husbands who have provided well for them. But that should not discourage those of lesser means from engaging in activities.

When people come together in the common bond of shared experiences of having lived through depressions and wars, raising a family, adjusting to changing mores and mind boggling technology, financial status is not important. If it is a class, they are there to learn something new, if it's a game, to enjoy it, and if it is a social event, to have fun.

No woman who has spent her life caring for a family should look back with regret at what might have been if she had lived in an era when there were more choices open to women. The path not yet blazed might not have been the best one. Even rose strewn paths have thorns.

We need not envy those who come behind us, strong in their determination to have it all — husband, home, family, career, fulfillment of all their desires. They are the best and brightest. We wish them well. Just don't discount the achievements of those who were content with less.

We too have lived.

As part of the reckless abandon that comes with the end of classes, students littered the high school, surrounding streets and parts of Vernier with books and papers. Woods Public Safety Director Jack Patterson noted that while the incident was unbecoming of graduating students, the students' behavior in general was very good this year.

School officials took those who were caught littering and put them on paper crews to clean up the flotsam. Patterson said the area was back to normal last Friday.



Wheels of Freedom show is Saturday



Shores police recover boat

The boat was returned to the Ronneys. According to reports, it was uncertain whether a complaint would be filed against the two youths.

Stuck in the lake?

Coast Guard hands tow rope to private companies

If a recalcitrant engine or a broken gooseneck has turned your peaceful cruise on the lake into a disaster, the tow rope you find yourself on the end of may not be attached to a Coast Guard boat.

Though the Coast Guard has come running to help boaters in the past, it will not now be doing so in all cases because of its policy of non-interference with private business.

Coast Guard Lt. John T. Costello said that commercial salvage firms in the area are now able to provide services to boaters and have asked the Coast Guard to make room.

The commercial firms will handle those situations in which a boater may need minor assistance such as a tow, he said.

Costello said that the Coast Guard will not forsake boaters if life or property is endangered. Many people, said Costello, think that the Coast Guard is getting out of search and rescue but that isn't true.

Boaters should be aware, however, that accepting a tow from a commercial firm or another boater may be very costly.

Attorneys knowledgeable in Admiralty Law say that anyone accepting assistance from another boat is bound to repay the person rendering assistance for his time and effort. This may include a session in court if there was no agreement on fees prior to accepting assistance.

If assistance is given in navigable U.S. waters, then the matter will end up before a federal judge sitting without a jury. In this case, the boater will be required to pay

whatever the court decides is reasonable compensation. In fact this may be any sum, but in practice it rarely exceeds the value of a boat. The only hope for the boater is that the awarded sum will be so unreasonable that a higher court will reduce it on appeal.

Boaters should also remember that a salvage claim against a

boat will follow the boat no matter where it goes or who owns it.

Technically, even the federal government could sue for salvage costs, but fortunately it doesn't.

The best thing a boater could do to maintain his peace of mind and the health of his wallet is to agree on fees before accepting assistance.

Little League gets \$3,900 from Park

The Park City Council voted June 13 to give the local Little League program \$3,900 for operating expenses this year.

The league served 208 children in 1983. Participation has dropped in recent years because of the declining birth rate and two fewer teams were playing this year, according to Little League officials.

The Park Little League spent more than \$5,000 for baseballs, bats, equipment, field upkeep and maintenance. In addition, it will spend \$2,000 for umpires.

HUD gives GPs \$300,000 grant

Four Grosse Pointe cities are expecting grant requests totalling \$334,615 to be approved early next month by Community Development Block Grant administrators in Washington, D.C. The funds will be used for a variety of projects including street resurfacing, minor home repairs for the elderly and sewer improvements. The grants represent basic allocations to the cities from the federal department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), which administers the Community Development program. Other funds for special projects may be approved later in the year. Grosse Pointe Farms will use \$89,500 of its \$98,000 HUD allocation

to install more than a thousand feet of watermain in the northwest area of the city, including Moross and Chalfonte Avenue. About \$8,000 will be allocated to provide minor home repair service to 40 Farms applicants, according to HUD. The Woods' 1983-84 allocation totals more than \$90,000 and will be used for street improvements, including landscaping and new sidewalks, in the commercial area of Mack Avenue north of Vernier (\$38,515); street resurfacing on Ridgmont west of Mack Avenue, (\$38,250) and a similar minor home repair program, (\$14,250). The Park's \$89,100 grant will be used to install new street lights,

handicapped ramps and sidewalk in its Mack Avenue commercial area between Beaconsfield and Nottingham (\$79,100), and fund a minor home repair program for 50 applicants (\$10,000). The intersection of St. Clair and Mack Avenue will be widened with \$45,500 grant to Grosse Pointe City. The remaining funds of the city's \$58,500 grant will be used to replace trees around the city and minor home repairs. Applications for funds were approved by the Wayne County Community Development Block Grant program administration and will be forwarded to Washington early in July.

Schools borrow \$14.8 million

The Michigan Municipal Finance Commission has approved a request from the Grosse Pointe public school system to borrow \$14.8 million to conduct business until taxes are collected this December. The Board of Education awarded the tax anticipation note bid to First National Bank of Chicago at its June 13 meeting. State regulations stipulate that up to 50 percent of the prior year's tax levy may be borrowed by a school system until a new assessment has been levied.

Recall petition against Kelly filed again

A committee last week filed a second petition with election officials seeking the recall of state Sen. John Kelly, D-Detroit, one day after a Circuit Court judge threw out a similar petition.

Detroit attorney Gary Parker, chairman of the Committee to Recall Kelly, said the reworded petition was filed Wednesday, June 15, the day after Judge Maureen Reilly upheld a ruling by the election commissioners that the first petition was unclear and improperly worded.

The commissioners had ruled that the petition seeking Kelly's recall because of his support for the state income tax increase did not summarize properly the wording of House Bill 4092, which authorized the increase.

Parker said no date has been set for the commissioners to rule on the new, nearly 200-word petition, which he said should meet the requirements set by the election commissioners and the judge.

Any recall petition, before it can be circulated, is required by state law to be submitted to the county board of election commissioners.

The Wayne County election commission, made up of the chief probate judge, county clerk and county treasurer, must decide whether or not the language of the petition is sufficiently clear to allow all concerned to identify the reasons leading to the recall.

Parker said the reworded petition contains a summary of the tax increase bill and calls for Kelly's recall because of his vote on the bill. The petition notes that Kelly's abstention could have defeated the measure.

Under Senate voting rules, a senator present at the time a roll call vote is requested must either be excused from voting because of personal or professional conflicts, or vote on the measure. A tactic used to counter that rule is to leave before the roll call, legislative officials said.



Police salary talks stalled in Woods

Salary negotiations between the Woods and its public safety officers are headed to a state mediator as the union and city bargain on the third year base salary of the three-year contract. City Administrator-Clerk Chester Petersen said the talks between the city and the Grosse Pointe Woods Police Officers Association, which represents the city's public safety officers and corporals, had reached an impasse. The talks are limited to base salary only under the provisions of a three-year contract signed in May, 1982 and retroactive to July 1, 1981, he added. Association president Steven Petrik said the two sides were far enough apart to need the mediator. No date has been set for the hearing before the Michigan Employment Relations Commission, he added.

Under the terms of the three-year contract, which also took a mediator to settle, public safety officers received a 5 percent base salary increase in the city's 1981-82 fiscal year. The base salary for a public safety officer increased to \$25,200, while a corporal's base salary increased to \$26,964. The base salary increased 4 percent in the 82-83 fiscal year under the terms of the contract. A public safety officer's base salary is \$26,208 while a corporal receives \$28,042, according to the contract. Cost-of-living increases are capped at \$1,200 over the duration of the contract. The three-year contract signed last year settled a dispute that lasted more than a year between the city and the association. The bitter dispute included an appearance by then-association

president Thomas Hunke before the council in February, 1982. Speaking before an audience replete with public safety officers and their families, Hunke told the council the association had no other choice but to seek arbitration of the matter. In May that year, a mediator handed down findings which led to a settlement between the city and the public safety officers. The association accepted the contract, which contained none of the pension changes it had requested, because the arbitration was protracted arbitration which contained no guarantees the union would receive anything, Hunke said. 

Vintage year for asparagus

A new grading program plus ideal weather will make 1983 a vintage year for Michigan asparagus. Shoppers who want to put some away for off-season eating should be alert for 10-pound packs; many supermarkets and other marketers will be offering asparagus in the larger packs for a lower price per pound.

Michigan's fresh asparagus season will likely extend to June 20 or 25, depending on the weather. A warm spring with the right amount of moisture brings a bigger crop.

Look for the larger packs to be available throughout most of May. Fresh asparagus will continue to be available after that, but each cutting will be lower in tonnage.

The next time you go to a supermarket, look at the fresh asparagus. If it shows a white, woody stem, it isn't Michigan asparagus — and it isn't all edible. Michigan asparagus is all-green, edible from the tip to the base of the spear. This lack of waste makes Michigan asparagus far more economical than asparagus grown in other states.

Michigan asparagus offers another advantage to midwestern shoppers: it's fresher, because it travels from growers to retailers in a matter of hours rather than days. Freshness is largely responsible for the delightful, sweet flavor of fresh asparagus.

To help assure that consumers get fresh, good quality asparagus, new standards have been developed. Asparagus graded according to the new Michigan standards

should be all-green, fresh and not badly misshapen. It should also be free from spreading tips and decay or damage caused by dirt, diseases, insects or mechanical breakage.

Michigan Fancy grade asparagus should be not less than 3/8 inches in diameter and not more than 7 inches long if in an oriented spear pack (all tips going in the same direction). A maximum length of 9 1/2 inches is allowed if the asparagus is in a loose spear (sometimes called bulk) pack.

Michigan Select grade is for fresh, wholesome asparagus that does not meet one or more of the criteria for the Michigan Fancy grade.

Consumers can identify any top quality asparagus by its bright green color and tightly closed tips. Medium and thick stalks are usually the most tender. Thin, spindly stalks may be tough and stringy.

Fresh asparagus for fresh eating is best stored unwashed in the refrigerator. Arrange butt ends in one direction and wrap with a damp paper towel. Store in hydrator and use within three days — the sooner the better. Freeze or can asparagus immediately after purchase.

There are many exotic ways to prepare asparagus, but the favorites allow you to taste its delicate flavor. One simple way is to cut the stalks on a diagonal and stir-fry with seasonings and butter.

Another popular way is to stand the spears up in one inch of boiling water in an uncovered container. Cook only about 8 minutes.

About 20,000 acres in Michigan are devoted to this specialty crop. Production is concentrated in Oceana, Van Buren, Berrien and Cass Counties. Fresh asparagus often can be purchased from roadside and farmers' markets in western Michigan.



Elephant skin is very tender

When someone tells you that your skin is tough as an elephant's, you have unwittingly been paid a compliment! Although you can't tell by its dry, wrinkled appearance, an elephant's skin is actually very tender, according to a recent issue of "Ranger Rick's Nature Magazine," the National Wildlife Federation's monthly children's publication.

If you have an urge to roll in the mud and then spray yourself with dust, you'll be using two of the tricks an elephant uses to protect its tender exterior, reports Ranger Rick. When mud and dust are packed into every little fold and crevice of an elephant's skin, that means that biting insects aren't.

Elephants use other little known "survival tips." For instance, in order to keep their huge bodies from overheating (a sometimes fatal mistake), elephants depend on water. A baby elephant too small to suck water into his trunk to squirt into his mouth has to kneel at the water's edge and sip his drink.

If there's any water left in the pool after they have drunk, the elephants cool their bodies by bathing in it. Adults enjoy just lying in the water. Youngsters are playful, splashing and squirting themselves and each other.

During the dry season, when regular watering spots dry up, elephants manage to keep their cool by tapping into underground water sources. They dig wells. A female, using tusks and toenails, breaks the hard surface of a dry riverbed. After forming the sides of the well with her foot, she digs until she feels damp earth.

Then, using her trunk, she scoops out the bottom of her new well so that water can seep into it. She has provided a drink for herself — and other animals can use the water after she is gone.

Elephants can even save their own lives during emergencies, says Ranger Rick. During a drought, when even underground water has dried up, an overheated, dying elephant can stick its trunk down its throat and suck water out of its stomach to spray over itself.

This may cool it down enough to keep it alive until it can find more plentiful water.

After the signing of the 1783 Treaty which finally ended the conflict, they celebrated peace on July 4, with a festival of sacred music, the most elaborate of which was the "Psalm of Joy."

Now, exactly 200 years later, a combined choir of Detroit and Windsor voices will again perform the "Psalm of Joy," in honor of Canadian and United States independence — and in honor of this occasion, Malcolm, Christ Church, Detroit, organist and choirmaster, has decreed that all participants wear traditional Colonial dress. The Community LINC

While summer heat and dol-drumms are making most folks think of vacation, Operation LINC (Linking Individuals to Needs in the Community) is swinging into a major project.

First on the LINC summer aid list is the 4-H Growing Roots Urban Gardening-Canning Program, sponsored in cooperation with the Wayne County Cooperative Extension Service. This program is designed to informally train families, free of charge, to produce their own food supply by growing and preserving fruits and vegetables in an urban setting. 4-H provides facilities and canners for families who complete its six-hour training seminar, which teaches all methods of preserving garden produce for later use.

Each year more families enroll in this chance to become self-sufficient. And while 4-H is delighted with an increased opportunity to aid increased numbers of people, it is faced with a dilemma: not enough funds for canning jars and lids.

In an effort to aid the Growing Roots program, Operation LINC is requesting the donation of canning jars — either purchased new with lids, or used without lids. The canning jars are needed by August to take advantage of family crops that should be ripened and ready for harvest at that time.

Collection or purchase of the jars could be an excellent summer project for scout troops, church and community organizations. Call Operation LINC, 331-6700, between 9 a.m. and 2 p.m. Monday through Friday, and LINC will coordinate collection of the jars.

Meanwhile, LINC continues to help other needy Wayne County agencies. According to LINC Coordinator Fran Mumma, a major agency request was filled this month and four other agencies have special needs for the summer.

The Youth Living Center of Westland was pleased to receive a donation of three adult bicycles, and wishes to thank the community for these much-needed additions to its program. The center, a permanent home for homeless, deserted, neglected or abused children, ages 6 through 17, still needs seven more adult bicycles, and camping equipment.

Also in need of camping equipment is the Children's Center Group Home.

Detroit Metropolitan Youth for Christ, which deals with troubled

teens referred by the courts, police and schools, sponsors a yearly summer camp with special events and themes. This year the organization needs items to help present a Mexican fiesta. Requested are streamers, balloons, crepe paper, Mexican and Spanish home decorator objects, brightly colored table cloths and napkins. Also needed is velvet roping, similar to the type used by bank buildings and theaters to organize crowd flow.

And finally, the Northeast Guidance Center is in need of an electric stapler.

While LINC is busy carrying out its day-to-day functions, LINC volunteers took a brief break in late May to lunch together at the home of Sue Kvale on Middlesex Boulevard. Special features of this luncheon were the showing of the new LINC slide presentation, available for viewing by community groups, and the presentation of the new Outstanding Service to LINC Award to volunteer Sue Albright.

According to outgoing LINC President Gabrielle Pluhar, the award was given to Albright because of her long-time work and special efforts for the organization.

"Sue has dedicated 10 years to LINC," explained Pluhar. "Among her many contributions have been service as past-president, chairman of the future planning committee and chairman of the Brownell Art Fair, and she has generously hosted many LINC functions and fund raisers in her home."

"The Executive Board of LINC established this award for the first time in 1983, and we feel Sue is a most deserving first recipient." The LINC executive board will continue to choose award recipients in future years.

LINC will continue to operate this season under the direction of Summer Office Coordinator Barbara Coluni, who will provide Office Coordinator Fran Mumma with a much needed vacation.

Pointer of Interest

Here's something most dyed-in-the-wool Grosse Pointe Summer Music Festival fans probably didn't know: their festival is part of what one transplanted Southerner calls the nicest slice of Southern Hospitality she's seen north of the Mason-Dixon line.

That transplanted Southerner ought to know . . . she's Sarah Rainey, co-chairman of this year's Summer Music Festival.

And when Dallas-born Sarah Rainey and her husband Dr. John M. "Pete" Rainey decided to locate here (they'd met when she was a French major and he a medical student at Vanderbilt University) in 1974, the last thing they expected was Southern Hospitality.

"When my husband was interviewing, we looked at the good and bad points about each area. We found that Grosse Pointe was a very special community," Sarah says. "Grosse Pointe is different from Dallas . . . here it is very easy to know people. The sense of neighborhood and community is great."

Sarah found that in her neighborhood, the same love of fine music — honed for her as a child in East Texas — was great, too.

"We were so fortunate to buy a house here. We have the most wonderful neighbors . . . and having lived in the Southwest I know what hospitality is all about. When we first arrived, our across-the-street neighbors took us to Pro Musica. We've gone back every year and enjoyed it more and more."

SARAH ENJOYED it so much, she's now Pro Musica's membership secretary. And from Pro Musica, it was just a matter of time until she was introduced to the Summer Music Festival and to Alex Sucek, founder and artistic director of the festival.

"We got to know the Suceks — I've taken cooking lessons from Charity Sucek so I must be a real Grosse Pointer! — and we got involved in the festival. Actually, it's not a new involvement: just an extension of an older one."

Sarah's aunt was a piano teacher in Kilgore, Texas. This aunt was very active in musical activities with Van Cliburn's mother, who lived in the same area. "Van Cliburn even played at our house . . . before he became famous," Sarah says.

Sarah adds that despite some convincing attempts by her mother and her aunt, her own musical talent couldn't quite measure up to their expectations. "I love music. I have no great talent, but I enjoy it very much. I especially love the old warhorses: Mozart, Bach, Tchaikovsky. As a student, I loved to play Bach because I could do it without being embarrassed."

"My mother always told me to practice. I thought I'd learned enough after five years. My mother and my aunt have never thought so . . . my mother has threatened to send one of the pianos from home. I expect that one day that grand piano will be here," Sarah laughs.

With credentials like having Van Cliburn play in her two-piano, East Texas home, Alex Sucek probably knew he couldn't go wrong with a co-chairman like Sarah Rainey. But sometimes Sarah isn't too sure of herself, she says.

"There are so many brilliant people involved in the Summer Music Festival. One day a couple of cohorts and I were sitting there listening to these people, who know so much about each artist who has ever performed, every detail of every performance . . .

we just looked at each other in amazement.

"WE'D TOLD Alex that we'd thought we were going to sell this (the festival) on the basis of how much fun it was. They are, too, we found out, but on a slightly more informed basis," Sarah says.

Just how much fun is the Summer Music Festival?

"It's a lovely thing to do on a Wednesday evening. It's good entertainment and you meet interesting people . . . people who would really like to meet you."

"And there couldn't be a better setting: that beautiful lakefront. I'm very conscious of the water. I remember a Texas drought where my father said if it didn't rain in 30 days, we'd have to sell the cattle. And my father was a gentleman farmer, he needed those few cattle just to keep things going. I always think it's neat to see water."

It should follow, therefore, that if Sarah knows "hot" she also knows "sizzling." That's how she describes the first performance of the five-part Summer Music Festival. Pianist Ralph Votapek will perform on Wednesday, July 6.

"Votapek was the first winner of the Van Cliburn Competition in 1962. He's got a great local following . . . it should be a sizzling concert."

SARAH ADDS that the complete Summer Music Festival is such a "great mixture of classical and pop music that people are bound to have fun." The July 13 offering is a trio recital by William Doppman, piano; Paul Olefsky, cello; and Gordon Staples, violin. "Andiamo," a lyrical program of opera and song by soprano Carla Connors and pianist Timothy Lieberman Weisman 20-Year Volunteer Service Award to Rose Erstein, of Southfield, Claire Raynes, of Farmington Hills, and Phyllis Scofield, of Pleasant Ridge.

"And the July 27 debut concert with Leszek Bartkiewicz should be something out of the ordinary," Sarah says. Bartkiewicz was born in Poland and arrived in the United States in 1961 seeking refuge.

DIA Founders volunteer force comes of age

The 541-member Volunteer Committee of the Founders Society Detroit Institute of Arts gave 53,731 hours of museum service during 1982-83. "All of these — including the Summer Music Festival — mirror things which are of significant interest to me. There's no better way to get to know the people of the community," Sarah says.

Elegant Eating

A selection of recipes from the forthcoming low-calorie, low-cholesterol — and penny-wise — cookbook by Thyra Grey Howard and Helena DeWitt Roth featuring, this week, more TREATS with LEEKS

Though a member of the onion family, leeks are an elegant vegetable, with an unusual, subtle flavor. They are moderate sources of some minerals and contain considerable Vitamin C, plus lesser amounts of several other vitamins. They are comparatively low in calories, about 41 per average size leek. Three medium leeks weigh approximately 1 pound. Leeks are available practically the year 'round, in especially good supply from April through July and September through December.

COLD LEEKS IN DILL SAUCE

12 leeks, prepared for cooking
2 Tbsp. unsalted margarine
Salt and pepper to taste
2 eggs
2 tsp. Dijon mustard
1-2 tsp. white wine vinegar
1 cup peanut oil
½ cups minced fresh parsley
2 Tbsp. minced fresh dill or 2 tsp. dried dill
2 Tbsp. minced green onions
12 slices Virginia ham or Prosciutto
Cherry tomatoes, halved for garnish (if desired)

Place leeks in large, heavy skillet in single layer and add enough water to cover by ¾-inch. Add margarine, salt and pepper. Bring to a boil over high heat; reduce heat and simmer 8 to 10 minutes, or until leeks are tender. Remove from skillet and drain on paper towel; set aside.

Combine eggs, mustard, 1 tsp. vinegar, salt and pepper to taste in blender or food processor; blend until well combined. With motor running, add oil by drops until sauce is thick and smooth. Taste to adjust seasonings, adding more vinegar, if necessary. Add parsley, dill and green onion; whirl until combined.

Wrap each leek in a slice of ham and arrange in a single layer on serving platter. Spoon sauce over, completely covering leeks. Garnish with halved cherry tomatoes, if desired. Makes 6 servings. Calories about 238 per serving. Cholesterol about 50 mgs.

LEEK AND LAMB STEW

2-½ lbs. lean lamb stew meat
2 Tbsp. peanut oil
1 large onion, chopped
2 large tomatoes, cored, peeled, and diced
1 cup vegetable or onion broth
¼ tsp. salt
5 leeks, prepared for cooking

Trim all possible fat from lamb and cut into 1-inch cubes. Heat oil in Dutch oven, add a few pieces of lamb at a time and brown well on all sides. Add onion and cook until tender, but not browned. Add tomatoes and stir for a minute or two. Add broth and salt; cover and simmer for 30 minutes. Cut leeks in 1-inch slices; add to stew, cover and simmer 1 hour longer, or until meat is tender. Serve with a rice or bulgur pilaf, garnished with finely minced fresh mint. Makes 6 servings. Calories about 240 per serving. Cholesterol about 70 mgs.

BRAISED LEEKS PERSILLADE

8 medium leeks, prepared for cooking
¾ cup boiling chicken stock
½ tsp. salt
¼ tsp. white pepper
2 Tbsp. unsalted margarine
4 Tbsp. bread crumbs
2 Tbsp. fresh parsley, finely minced

Place leeks in a shallow, covered, baking dish with a tight-fitting cover. Add chicken stock, salt and pepper. Cover and simmer gently in a preheated 350° oven for 40 minutes, or until leeks are tender and most of the moisture is absorbed.

Melt margarine in a skillet. Add the bread crumbs and parsley; toss until crumbs are lightly toasted. Place cooked leeks in serving dish and sprinkle with topping. Serve hot to 4. Calories about 110 per serving. Cholesterol 0.

Biretta also was among three William Woods players named to All-District 16 First Team for their efforts. She is the daughter of Edward and Renate Biretta, of North Renaud Road.


Weber earns top hydroplane marks

Board approves varsity hockey

Varsity hockey is very definitely in for the 1983-84 high school sports season.

The Grosse Pointe Board of Education Monday approved the budget for 1983-84 which includes \$49,500 in start-up costs for a varsity hockey program at North and South High Schools.

The approval came as a surprise to some, since the monies which had been designated for varsity hockey had been removed from the budget at the last school board meeting. But a group of persistent parents in favor of varsity hockey had met with Supt. Kenneth Brummel, building administrators and athletic officials in an effort to reinstate the monies.

Julie Bourke, who has spearheaded the drive for varsity hockey for over one year, was elated over the board's decision.

"I'm so excited. I think this program is going to be great for everybody," Mrs. Bourke credited board member Ronald Dalby and GPHA members John Nicholson and Bill Wilson, as well as "many, many supportive parents," with the success of the group's objective.

"At the board meeting, when the superintendent told us he was taking the money out, he told us that he wanted to know how many boys would be interested in the program. They wanted to keep both a varsity and intramural program."

MRS. BOURKE and her group feel that the program will not suffer from lack of interest among the student population. "The Grosse Pointe Hockey Association had the largest Mite House program in southeastern Michigan — hockey is here to stay," she said.

"The boys all want to play hockey for their schools. And these boys are serious about studying. They know that as they near college age, they have to play hockey less and study more. Varsity hockey is a great opportunity for them to do that."

A school spokesman said Monday that the level of support garnered from parents, the central and building administrations was the convincing factor in reinstating the hockey monies to the 1983-84 budget. The school board insisted that the hockey program was "strictly a one-year commitment" and that the entire program would be carefully reviewed at the end of that year.

The high cost of the program is due partially to the costs of starting such a sport. Costs should decline if and when the program continues. The school spokesman added that the hockey program, unlike other varsity sports, is revenue-generating, which should help in decreasing the costs.

South High athletic director Chuck Hollosy said Monday that the installation of ice hockey as a varsity sport — at this late date — might cause a few problems for athletic administrators.

"But if we're going to run it, we might as well run it the best way we know how . . . at least the best way we know at this time," Hollosy said.

Hollosy and North High athletic administrator Tom Gauerke did not recommend adding ice hockey as a varsity sport. "We have been very open about that. We thought that the intramural program was the best way to go."

Hollosy added that despite that, athletic administrators would make the best attempt at providing a quality program. "At this point, it will be very difficult for me, we don't have any coaches in mind . . . and there will be some scheduling problems."

"We've talked tentatively about the other problems: ice hockey being an off-site program. But it's really not much different than other off-site sports except that the rink isn't in Grosse Pointe. That would be a problem in the area of emergency vehicle or police support needs," Hollosy said.

"But we'll work it out and do the best we can."

Park's Bocci qualifies

The Park's Jeanne Bocci and her walking partner June MacDonald, of St. Clair Shores, qualified for the USA/Track Athletics Congress Outdoor National Championships in Indianapolis, Ind., June 17 through 19.

Bocci won the 10 Km walk in 53:23, while teammate MacDonald finished second with a time of 56:07. The qualifying meet was held at North High on June 1. The

women had to have set a time of 57:00 flat between June, 1982 and June 12, 1983 to be eligible for the championships.

The USA/TAC Outdoor Track and Field Championships served as the qualifier for the World Championships scheduled for Norway this summer. The top four women from the Indianapolis championships will make the United States team.

Star and Spindler: a winning pair

Our Lady Star of the Sea High School is regarded as a real powerhouse in league as well as in state athletic competition.

Margaret Spindler, who coaches three of the teams and serves as the Athletic Director, is regarded as the backbone of the athletic department. Together, Spindler and Star have achieved positions of athletic superiority on the east side.

In 11 years, Spindler has coached J.V. and varsity basketball, as well as varsity volleyball, earning records above and beyond the achievements of a coach handling only one sport. Star athletes, in Class C-D division, have also earned their school a Class A reputation.

Volleyball, which began at Star in 1976, has produced many college-bound volleyball players. Under the guidance of Coach Spindler, the varsity team has never finished less than second place in its league. The "Tunas" have won their league championship in 1978, 1981 and 1982. They were Catholic League-City runners-up in 1981 and 1982, and 1983 state district runner-up.

The J.V. basketball team is considered the stepping stone for the varsity team. Again Coach Spindler has made this team the best it can be. The girls were league champs in 1976, 1977, 1978, 1979 and 1982. They had a perfect record of 15-0 in 1982, and set a record of averaging 52.3 points per game, the best ever at Star.

Coach Spindler's varsity basketball team is considered the

best in its seven-team league. The Tunas were league runners-up in 1976, 1977, 1978, 1981, and league champs in 1980 and 1982. In 1981 the girls made the regional playoffs and were state district champs. In 1982 they were league champs, and Catholic League runners-up. This year, Star was ranked 11th-best in the state out of all Class C-D schools.

The softball team, which began in 1978, has won either the league title or been league runner-up since the team began. The squad was Catholic League champ in 1981. The tennis team, formed in 1977, has an overall impressive record of 47-8, including league titles in 1977, 1979, 1980, 1981 and 1982, and a Catholic League championship in 1977.

In all, in the last seven years, the Tunas have attained 17 league championships, 3 Catholic League championships, 3 Catholic League runner-up spots, 1 state district championship, 1 state district runner-up, several regional playoff spots, and a state ranking.

In varsity basketball, coaches award players All-Catholic and All-League recognition. For the All-Catholic honor, out of 350 girls, 10 are selected for the All-Catholic Team. Star, in seven years, has produced at least one, and often, two All-Catholic players. In 1982, three All-Catholic players were from Star, which has never happened before in the All-Catholic selections. All-League selections are made from 350 girls — 30 are chosen. Star has been represented in All-League with again at

least one girl, many times, two girls. In 1982, four All-League selections were from Star.

Volleyball and tennis have the same awards system. In volleyball, out of 225 girls, 12 are selected for All-Catholic and 24 are selected for All-League. Star athletes again have been recognized in both of these categories with one or two girls chosen each year, since volleyball was added as a sport.

Star is proud of the recognition brought to the school by its coaches and athletes. Coach Spindler says that the excellent records, for all the teams, are due to the hard work and dedication of all the athletes. But athletes at Star say that they need a coach who helps direct them to be winners and that's Coach Spindler, coach and athletic director.
