## Pointer dies in Montana, FBI seeks hitchhiker

Police and FBI agents in all states west of the Mississippi are on the look out for a young hitchhiker who they feel may be responsible for the death of a former Grosse Pointe man earlier this month.

The body of Frederick H. Pongrace, 31, son of Mr. and Mrs. Otto Pongrace, of McMillan Road, was found at the base of a 180 foot cliff at 10:30 a.m. Thursday, July 14.

According to his parents, Mr. Pongrace, who was discharged from active duty as a lieutenant with the Coast Guard on June 30, was on his way to Seattle from Washington, D.C. to visit a friend. He was traveling in a camperequipped Volkswagen van and had planned to visit a number of national parks along the way.

"Apparently my son picked up a hitchhiker and his dog somewhere about 60 miles east of Gla-

ground, but were asked to leave tos. the next day because the dog was causing trouble. The owner of the camp said Fred could stay, but he left with the hitchhiker.

According to Bell, the hitchhiker later slept overnight in the van, getting it stuck in the mud. The hitchhiker was described as a white male, clean shaven, between 5 foot 7 and 10 inches tall, with a stocky build. He was carrying a blue back pack and traveling with a black Labrador type dog, called a tow truck and paid for the tow with Pongrace's camera. The truck operator contacted the police. A cross country trip to visit a friend in Seattle ended in death for Grosse Pointer Frederick Pongrace earlier this month. His body was found at the base of a 180 foot caff by tourists visiting Glacier National Park. Police and FBI agents tracking Pongrace's trail have established that two days before the discovery of his body the recently discharged Coast Guard Heutenant had picked up a hitchhiker about 60 miles east of the park. Police say the hitchhiker and the van belonging to Pongrace are missing.

"We feel the hitchhiker is head, ed for California," said Bell. "He crossed over into Montana from Canada. Said He'd been working there. Canadian customs checked him over real good, going through his back pack and looked at his drivers license. They noted he was from California, but didn't take his name. They had no reason to.

"We later found out he had robbed someone in Canada. Apparently he'd been in a bar, met some guys, went back to their place and drank some beer. Then he stole a wallet from a truck and locked the keys in the trunk and took off. He really treats people who befriend him real nice."

According to Bell, Pongrace and the hitchhiker met up outside of Glacier, then spent the night in a camp. "The owner said Pongrace was upset that the hitchniker was being tossed out," said Bell, "He reportedly could have stayed but told the hitchhiker, 'I brought you here. I'll see you get out.' He was so upset he called the police about the camp owner."

According to police records, Pongrace called the Havre, Mont. police at 7:30 a.m. and 3 p.m. Wednesday, July 13 to complain about the camp owner. His body was found at 10:30 the next morning. Officials believe the body could have been at the base of the cliff for 10 to 12 hours before it was discovered.

"There's a lot of legwork involved with this," said Bell. "We're doing a lot of back tracking. We feel he's in Califor-

'nia by now. Hopefully we'll pick (him) up before long, unless he dumps the van. He's either very cool or very dumb.

"Perhaps it wasn't a murder. Maybe Mr. Pongrace got too close to the edge and fell. This guy saw it and panicked. Maybe it was a homicide. The drop at that point is sheer. It wouldn't take much to push someone over.

"We've had a lot of response from the public," added Bell. "Even calls from Manitoba. Hopefully we'll catch up with him. We've come close a couple of itimes."

Funeral services for Mr. Pongrace are, at press time, incomplete. Born in Detroit, he attended Maire School and later graduated from Horace Greely High School in Chappaqua, New York.

Mr. Pongrace was a graduate of the University of Virginia and enlisted in the Coast Guard as a lieutenant junior grade. During his tour with the Coast Guard, he was involved with environmental ocean research centering around the control of oil and chemical spills. He served variously in Hawaii, Alaska and Washington, D.C. He was honorably discharged from the Coast Guard at the end of last month.

Mr. Pongrace is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Otto Pongrace; one sister. Mrs. Anne Male; and a niece.

## Stretching a sail at Hood loft on Charlevoix. Ready for the race Sailmaking — an ancient art

By David Steinkraus Technology hasn't really caught up with Hood sails.

Oh, yes, there are new fabrics and there are computers and other machines, but the art of sailmaking — and make no mistake, it is an art — hasn't changed in hundreds of years.

The Hood sail loft is located on Charlevoix in the Park. Its chief is John T. "Tim" Woodhouse, himself an experienced sailor and ice boat champion.

Woodhouse moved his business to the Park from St. Clair Shores when he wished to expand. The requirements for a building were difficult to meet because a sail loft needs an open area of several hundred square feet in order to lay out sails. The building on Charlevoix, became available and the shop moved.

Just at the moment, the shop is working on sails which will be used in the upcoming Port Huron to Mackinac race. In fact, Woodhouse said that all other orders were shut off several weeks ago in order that the shop could concentrate on producing sails for the racing boats.

Woodhouse himself will be sailing as the tactician on Michigan Crude, an entry in the Port Huron to Mackinac race as well as the Chicago to Sarnia race. Woodhouse has sailed in the Canada's Cup and Mackinac races, and in Florida and Europe. In addition, he was the world ice boat champion in 1974 and the North American champ in '72, '73 and '74.

a guide and Woodhouse still races in the South during the winter. These races serve as testing grounds for new sail design ideas.

It is true that technology has invaded sailmaking somewhat. Computers are used to design sails, but they are not a substitute for actual trial on a boat. Sometimes, Woodhouse said, sails won't be started until the sailmakers have a chance to sail the boat.

"We understand all the principles," said Woodhouse. He added that there are many other variables which prevent the application of set formulas. Wires will stretch and go slack, forces will spread unevenly over a boat's rig. All of these factors will affect the way sails are made and cannot be easily anticipated.

Another advantage of new technology is the fabrics which sailmakers can use. Sails now are mainly made of Dacron which doesn't get water logged. Racing boats may use a fabric which is a composite of Dacron, Kevlar and Mylar all bonded together to form

The advantage of the new fabries, especially Kevlar, is that they are very strong for their


shape over a wider range of wind is to have an open mind. speeds that Dacron sails. Or, the new fabrics may be used to make a sail which is very powerful for a specific task.

Weight saving in the sails, Woodhouse said, also means a weight saving in the boat. A 40foot racing boat will carry about 15 to 17 sails'. If ande of Dacron the total weight visuld be about 1,000 pounds, but Kevlar sails would only weight about 400

comparable sail made of Dacron.

Sails are still very labor inten-All of this experience serves as sive. In fact, all the labor which goes into a set of sails is hand labor. Though there are machines used in the garment industry to cut cloth to shape, they are too expensive for a shop such as Hood which makes sails on a custom basis. The maker is better off with a highly paid sail cutter because of the expense of the machines, said Woodhouse.

> Sailmakers have become fixtures on racing boats. Their job,

said Woodhouse is, "to tweak those sails all the time." Also, the sailmaker will constantly recut the sail in order to squeeze the last bit of performance from it. In the America's Cup trials, Woodhouse said, a sail will last about two weeks before it becomes too overstretched to be of further use.

Woodhouse began making sails in the 1970s as an outgrowth of his interest in sailing. There is, he said, no formal training for sailmakers to go through. Trial and error seem to be the primary training available. Budding sailmakers may work in a shop, of course, and Woodhouse did this The new sails may be set in for a time. But the best way to lighter winds and will retain their make good sails, Woodhouse said,

And what does experienced racer Woodhouse see as the outcome of the America's Cup races? Woodhouse thinks that American skipper Dennis Conner will be the ultimate victor. ## City mayor faces SEC civil charges

Grosse Pointe City Council, Mayor David Robb asked to be excused from the city's Monday council meeting because "of the media attention that has been focused on me and a personal business matter during the past week."

Councilman Lorenzo Browning, who served as mayor pro-tem at Monday's council meeting, read Robb's letter to council members. "I ask to be excused from this evening's meeting in order that I may give careful consideration to my official capacity as mayor of the City. This will afford me an opportunity to discuss my position with the members of the council and community," the letter read.

Robb said it was his "desire to avoid interfering with the official business of the City."

There had been some speculation that the mayor may resign after the Securities Exchange Commission charged in a civil suit last week that the 53-year-old Robb embezzled \$188,000 from a bankrupt Detroit brökerage firm while serving as a court-appointed trustee to pay off creditors.

In its suit filed in U.S. District Court, the SEC alleged Robb violated the Securities Investor Protection Act, in his involvement with the brokerage firm, Financial House, Inc., and its insurer, the Securities Investor Protection Corp. (SIPC), which protects investor interests when such brokerage firms declare bank-uptcy.

As trustee, Robb administered payments to creditors of Financial House from a SIPC fund.

Council reaction to Robb's letter was favorable.

"It's very simple to me," said Councilman Browning. "Dave, for the length of time he has served as councilman and mayor, I think has done a good job. No action can be taken by the council, in my belief."

Browning added the SEC In a handwritten letter to the charges are "a private matter"

## Election winners spent most

As you might expect if you're watching local school politics cleely, the two top vote-getters in last month's school board election spent the most money on their campaigns, according to the Wayne County Election Commis-

Campaign finance statements filed by the local candidates last week with the election commission showed newly-elected trustees Dorothy Kennel and Vincent LoCicero listed expenditures of more than \$1,500 each to get elected to the \$400 a year school board post. But in his first bid to elected office, LoCicero spent about \$1,600 more than Mrs. Kennel, according to those finance statements.

Mrs. Kennel grabbed the lead in the annual election with 2,462 votes while LoCicero followed second with 2,178 votes.

The Campaign Finance Act of 1976 requires candidates to disclose details of their campaign expenditures and contributions if they spend more than \$500. Deadline for filing post-election statements was Thursday, July 13.

Those candidates who spend less than \$500 may file a reporting waiver under the law and do not have to disclose what they spent

Councilman James Curran said Robb's action was proper under the circumstances. "I thought the arrangement was appropriate. It will give him time to think things over," Curran said.

The SEC has charged that since 1977 as the court-appointed trustee to oversee the liquidation of Financial House, Robb "engaged in acts, practices and a course of business which operated or would operate as a fraud or de-ceit upon the SIPC and other persons.

Robb "concealed, destroyed and falsified documents" relating to the liquidation of Financial House, the SEC charged in its suit. It also alleged he stole and misappropriated funds belonging to Financial House and SIPC for "his own use and benefit."

Robb was appointed trustee for the liquidation of Financial House in 1974 by U.S. District Judge Ralph Freeman and served until March 29 of this year when he re-

In reaction to the suit, Robb said this week he would "let the court decide" and refused further comment.

Judge Freeman has ordered Robb to provide the court with a record of all the funds he handled as a trustee within 30 days and also enjoined him from committing any further violations under the Securities Investor Protection Act. The court also ordered Robb to repay any missing funds once an accounting of Financial House monies has been made.

Robb has consented to the order without admitting or denying the SEC allegations.

In the three-count complaint the SEC specifically alleged Robb "misappropriated and converted for his own use and benefit" about \$101,900 from an account at Michigan National Bank of Detroit, which was in Robb's name as the trustee for the liquidation of Financial House, Inc. The SEC further charged that Robb wrote 20 checks against that account payable to himself or to himself as trustee, by altering endorsements to bear a countersignature of a U.S. bankruptey judge. At least nine of those checks were deposited in National Bank Detroit, according to the SEC charges.

"In order to conceal the misappropriation and conversion of moneys, defendant David Robb. among other things, made alterations on some of the checks and/or altered the endorsements on the back of some of the checks, and failed to record the payments of money to himself on the accounting records maintained to reflect cash disbursements by the estate of Fi nancial House, Inc.," the SEC complaint reads.

The SEC also charged that:

• From July, 1960 to February, 1982, Robb misappropriated \$11,-100 belonging to the estate of Financial House.

 On June 13, 1979, Robb misapproprieted \$5,000 out of a \$75,000 payment belonging to the estate of Financial House.

• On July 16, 1982, Robb misappropriated \$10,000 out of \$238,743

## Six good candidates

cosmic issues of peace or war in the Middle tributed to the defeat of a proposed millage East, Latin America or elsewhere in the globe increase to finance street repairs and reconthat demand attention in a presidential or even a congressional campaign. They do not compete in importance with the taxation, social service, education and business climate issues that capture the headlines in state elections. But they do involve matters that directly affect the individual taxpayer and the community as a whole.

That is the reason the campaign is warming up in Grosse Pointe Park for its Aug. 2 primary as the eight candidates for the city council discuss the issues that are close to the hearts and the pocketbooks -- of most residents. In the Park, those issues include the condition of the streets, possible revision of zoning regulations to permit more multiple housing, better protection against crime, a revival of the plan for a district court to serve all the Pointes and even the school closing proposals.

AFTER INTERVIEWING the candidates, the Grosse Pointe News is impressed by the fact that all eight are dedicated to the bet-terment of the community. They are running because they feel they could make a contribution, because they have experience and background that they feel qualifies them for service on the council and because they want to help solve specific problems. Their differences are more over ways of improving their community, and less over aims.

Yet it is true, as one candidate said, it has become to some extent a contest between the "ins" and the "outs" although there are no formal slates on either side. Three incumbents are running for reelection, while five other candidates seek places on the council. In the primary, six will be nominated to compete for the three positions to be filled in November. Yet even the "outs" are not all that critical of their city government. In fact, it is because they like living in the Park that they are seeking to serve and improve that community and its

So what are some of the differences among the candidates? If the council doesn't get the \$1 million bond issue from the state and the \$1 million in matching federal funds which it is seeking for road improvement, most candidates agree that the Park would have to finance the work by going back to the voters for a millage increase, issuing bonds on assessing the costs against abutting property. Several of the "outs" think the council should have already set aside a fund for road improvement, and increase as an alternative to continuing to drive on bad streets. Several "ins" think the council again will have to consult its citizens advisory committee on roads for advice if it fails to get the state and federal aid sought.

> ASKED FOR THEIR suggestions about future aims and programs, the candidates had a variety of recommendations. Lechner suggested the police department could do more crime prevention work by educating citizens on their responsibilities and also suggested a park users fee to finance more equipment and other park improvements. Prost would like to improve Patterson Park and reduce park vandalism. Ryan wants the council to announce its agenda a week in advance to inform citizens and suggests improved identification of Park residents in order to restrict use of city parks.

> Ausherman favors the proposed district court for all the Pointes, a move also backed by McNeill and Ryan. Ausherman also wants an evaluation of city employes in view of the fact the fire and police departments take half of the budget. Gaskin sees the need for more official communications to the public and favors more innovative use of the police. McCormick wants more attention paid to the expired contract with the police and firemen, and recommends a centralized dispatch system and record keeping as well as a joint jail facility for all the Pointes. McNeill wants to keep the community financially sound and also improve Jefferson Avenue as the gateway to the Pointes.



## A bad rap on the tax hike

Rep. Gary M. Owen, speaker of the House of Representatives, reports that in states with graduated income taxes, the marginal rates on middle and high income are much higher than the Michigan rate. In fact, according to Owen, 24 states have a permanent maximum marginal rate higher than Michigan's rate of 6.35 percent which will start dropping on Jan. 1, 1984. The highest rate is in New York state, where the maximum reaches 14 percent on income of more than \$24,000 a year.

> Ohio, for example, raised its income tax 90 percent and boosted other taxes for a total of \$1 billion. Indiana raised its income tax 58 percent and its sales tax 25 percent for a total of \$1.8 billion; Minnesota raised its sales tax 50 percent and imposed a 5 percent surtax on its income tax, for an overall boost of \$960 million; Illinois raised its income tax 20 percent, its sales tax 25 percent and its corporate income tax 20 percent for an overall hike of \$1.3 billion; and Wisconsin imposed a 10 percent surtax on personal and corporate income taxes, postponed indexing of its personal income tax, raised the sales tax 25 percent and adjusted other taxes for an overall boost of \$375 million.

> In effect, Owen blamed Michigan's need to hike income taxes on the national recession; the Reagan administration's "new federalism" that has drastically cut federal support for domestic programs; the necessity to pay for such basic government services as public safety, education and human services; and the constitutional requirement that Michigan must balance its budget.

> Owen's statement helps to clarify the record but we doubt that it will make it any easier for Michigan residents to pay that temporary increase of 36 percent in income taxes that the Michigan Legislature passed last spring. On the other hand, it is true that misery loves company and almost all Americans are suffering from higher state taxes regardless of where: they live. Michigan residents are not being: singled out for special attention, despite the: claims of some tax critics.

However, Owen does not deal with the broader question as to whether Michigan's overall tax picture is fair and equitable, when compared with the tax load borne by residents: of other states. He also ignored recent increases in state taxes on gasoline and cigarets as well as on some forms of business. 

As the competition grew to seven candidates for two board seats, Mrs. Kennel said she thought it was time "to get out and do some advertising.'

"To get elected in any school board election if there is any competition, you have to spend at least \$2,000," Mrs. Kennel said. "I don't think you can go lower than that." Mrs. Kennel's out-of-pocket expenses were about \$100, she

More than \$2,000 in contributions poured into Mrs. Kennel's campaign in sums of \$25, \$35 and \$100 from local residents, according to the finance statement. Much of that amount was spent on advertising, postage and cam-paign literature, Mrs. Kennel

"No, not initially, but we didn't expect to receive as much as we did either," LoCicero said.

"We wanted to do some things right along like flyers and advertising. Not until we got further into the campaign and did some other things and talked to some people involved in this before that we had an indication it was going to take that much," LoCicero

The only other school board candidate required to file a detailed campaign finance statement with the county Election Commission was Frank Stellingwerf, who was fourth runner-up in the school board race. According to his statement, Stellingwerf spent about \$1,800 between the reporting period of June 7 and June 29 and received \$1,800 in contributions over the entire campaign.

An organization that sprung up during the campaign and threw its support to Stellingwerf and candidate Thomas Peters spent about \$900 in an attempt to get the two individuals into office. The group, called the Quality Education Coalition made up of parents who urged school Supt. Kenneth Brummel to delay his school closing plan, also received about \$900 in contributions for its cause, according to the county Election Commission. The QEC spent most of its money for advertising, the financial statement showed.

Last week a county election employe said her office still has to sift through the stacks of campaign finance statements from recent school board and municipal elections to verify that listed information is accurate. If an error is found, candidates have a nineday period in which to file an amended statement, the Election Commission office said.

Memorial trees to be planted on public property, such as the municipal building ground's, Veterans' Memorial Parkway, for veterans only, or city parks may be ordered at a group rate through the Woods Tree Commission or through any tree nursery.

The city reserves the right to make the final determination as to the appropriateness of tree species donated and as to the proper placement. Checks covering both the tree and the marker should be made payable to the City of Grosse Pointe Woods and are tax-deductible donations.

## Prime Time-

For Senior Citizens-Marian Trainor

We longed for it. We prayed for it. We planned for it. Now it is here — with a vengeance — our summer of 1983. It's a little warmer than we hoped for but better than its counterpart, the cold, chilling, dark days of winter.

There are those who argue that you can always stay indoors and keep warm in the winter but there is little you can do to beat summer heat.

Okay, I've heard of air conditioning. However, if you choose to live with an artificial cooling system indoors during these glorious months, you are depriving yourself of the joys of summer; the clean coolness of morning, gentle breezes sifting through verdent shade trees, drives to your favorite park with the windows down. The momentum of the car will create enough air. Forget the noise of the other cars on the road and the din of the streets. It's time to get acquainted with the outside world. The walls of winter will close around you soon enough.

Besides, there are many ways to beat the heat. Drinking lots of liquids is one of them. Among the liquid most recommended is plain water. A noted phsylologist, Dr. I. Ian Phillips, explains that water is the body's most vital nutrient; that our bodies are largely water and that water is the body's natural system for regulating temp-

During the course of a day two and a half to three quarts of water is lost through perspiration, natural evaporation and excretion. This should be replaced by drinking water.

This precaution is particularly true for older people because they seem to be susceptible to dehydra-

Some scientists attribute this to hormone (angiotension) which stimulates thirst. They speculate that as we age that hormone does not work efficiently and that older people drink less water than they should to avoid dehydration. It is particularly important to follow this precaution if one spends time in the sun playing golf or garden-

ing.
If plain water doesn't do it for you, club soda is a good choice. It is 100 percent water and has a high sodium content. Since you lose both water and sodium when you sweat and you need to replace both, club soda makes a good

Lemondade, or just a twist of citris fruit may be more palatable. The acid in the lemon increases salivation which makes the mouth feel less dry. Go easy on the sugar if you choose lemonade hecause too much sugar tends to draw water out of your cells. Since such drinks as fruit punch and milk shakes have high sugar content, they are not preferred as thirst quenchers.

If a cold beer is your favorite summer drink, the best that can be said for it is that it is preferable to drinking a martini or a wine cocktail. All alcohol inhibits an anti-diuretic hormone (ADT) whose function is the regulation of water in the kidneys. The superiority of beer is that it has a much higher water content than the

Most people do not drink as

to get cool in a hurry, put ice in your water. However, if you need to replenish water, drink water at room temperature. You'll be able to drink more and swallow it fas-

The old rule of eight, eight ounce glasses of water a day still holds in any season but particularly in the summer when we have to guard against dehydration, heat cramps, heat exhaustion and heat stroke, each of the result of not taking in enough water to replace what the body has lost.

Another way to cool and to enjoy the lazy, hazy days of summer at the same time is to picnic. Any one of the Pointe's parks is a good place to go for a cool dip in a pool, sit in the shade and watch the boats go by and to eat a picnic lunch or dinner.

If you are planning to do this, there are some precautions that should be followed with the food you are taking. You should plan to eat it within four hours of the time you arrive. If it is to be kept longer, it should be kept hot or cold. This is particularly true of foods with a high moisture content such as salads, fried chicken and meat-

Most people think that only foods with mayonnaise pose hazards. Not so, say the expets.

Mayonnaise, which is acid, actually helps to inhibit the growth of microorganisms that cause trouble. It is the moisture and temperature that cause trouble. Keep foods well chilled or constantly hot.

Keeping foods cold in hot weather is no trick. It can be accomplished economically by freezing blocks of ice in milk cartons and then placing them in containers with the food. Another method is to freeze food the night before it is being consumed.

When setting out food on the picnic table, the temptation is to put it all out at once to make an inviting, lavish display. A better method is to bring out one course

Another good rule to follow whether eating at a picnic table in a park or on a patio, is to keep it light. Eating lightly in the summer is not only better for your health but it is also more econo-

The supermarkets, your neighborhood grocer, the local fruit market offer fresh locally grown fruits and vegetables during the summer season. This is the time to visit the Eastern Market or drive out to one of the many roadside stands. You won't have to be coaxed to eat all those sumptuous offerings that summer brings when you see the lavish display of Michigan's local pro-

It is such foods as you find there that can help you to maintain health and vigor.





Responding to another question, Krause said that a merger with the Detroit Department of Transportation is not in view. Though SEMTA was conceived with the idea of its eventually taking over all public transportation in southeast Michigan, Krause said, the funding troubles which the city is now having inhibit a merger.

The current problem of how SEMTA will fund its operations for the rest of the year is still up in the air.

Krause said that there are alternatives to the sales-tax increase for funding, but declined to elaborate on any.

The first object of increased funding for transit, Krause said, will be to restore the service which has been cut.

Referring to the outlook for funding for SEMTA Krause said, "things are going to get worse be-fore they get better." In six months, Krause said, he will have to begin making decisions on how to balance his budget. The result, if there are money troubles, will be service reductions.

Krause said that the purpose of the meetings and solicitation of public comments is to get the public to agree on a plan so that costs may be estimated. Krause said that the plan which has been proposed is not final.



## Help sought in Woods by insulation group

A group of residents concerned about the presense of urea formaldehyde foam insulation in their homes appeared before the Woods council last Monday, July 11, to ask for help in getting state and federal funds to help with the removal of the insulation.

Three homeowners complained of headaches, nausea, respiratory ailments, nose bleeds and rashes they say was caused by the formaldehyde in the insulation. About 15 affected homeowners were present for the meeting.

At the same time, the representatives of Citizens Engaged in the Removal of Toxic Substances, (CERTS) a Berkley-based group, asked the city to consider finding out how many homes are affected in the Woods and possibly even offer homeowners tax breaks for their property.

Brys resident Ethel Chaney, a 34-year-resident of the Woods, told councilmembers CERTS needs the backing of local governments to help pressure state and U.S. representatives into taking some action to help those affected by the foam insulation.

CERTS representative Nick Saputo, from Warren, put the cost of removing the insulation from a home at between \$8,000 and

The group intends to appear before the Detroit City Council later this month to make a similar presentation, Saputo said. With the help of local governments, there may be action at the state or federal level to get money for insulation removal, he said.

Although several measures dealing with formaldehyde foam insulation were introduced in the iast session of Congress, only one bill introduced by U.S. Rep. Dennis Hertel is still pending.

the University of Michigan Artist and Craftsmen Guild, comes word that if you're a "fair freak," Ann Arbor is DEFINITELY the place to be these days. Over 1,000 local and outstate artists/craftsmen are exhibiting there, in three area art fairs that opened yesterday and will run from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. today and tomorrow, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday.

The Ann Arbor Street Fair, the original juried fair, is now in its 24th year. Works by 250 exhibitors are on display in booths along East and South University Streets. The Potters Guild is represented, and there are daily demonstrations in glassblowing and blacksmithing, plus an activities booth for children ages 4 to 10.

Running simultaneously, along Main Street between Williams and Huron and on State Street, from the U. of M. Union to North University, is the Ann Arbor Summer Arts Festival. This juried fair, largest of the three, has been sponsored by the U. of M. Artist and Craftsmen Guild for the past 13 years. It features 600 local and national exhibitors. Street musicians and entertainers compliment the visual arts with live music on a stage in front of the Michigan Union.

The third show, a 15-year Ann Arbor tradition, is the State Street Art Fair. It's the smallest of the trio, offering 147 exhibitors from Michigan and adjoining states, but it's especially colorful. A giant midway tent on Maynard houses many of the artists and craftsmen, with additional booths set up along North University to display everything from watercolors to woodcarvings.

And if, familiar with Ann Arbor, you know how difficult parking can be there, and wonder if the fun of the fairs is worth the frustration of finding a place to stash your wheels, be advised that there is ample free parking at Briarwood Mall, from where a shuttle bus service will, for a small fee, take you to and from the arts' action.

The former, I believe, encompasses those books written for the under 12 male population . . . the ones like the "Babe Ruth Story" or "The Life of Lou Gehrig." Those are the books I used to read in the third grade . . . until the librarian spotted me, tore the book from my hands, mumbled something about how girls don't read books like that and shoved "The Clara Barton Story" in front of me and told me to read. It really wasn't too great a loss.

The combination of finding it hard to believe Lou Gehrig's admission that "he was the luckiest man on earth," despite the fact that he was suffering from an incurable disease, and the fact that girls (this one anyway) are too smart to read dull, biographcial books like that . . . lead me to the discovery of real sports books. I have my own thoughts on the evolution of those books.

## What next: the Tawdry Side of Tiddly Winks?

The first of these deliciously sleazy, author-come-lately sports books I encountered was Ball Four by ex-New York Yankee Jim Bouton.

In Ball Four, Bouton "blew the lid off the baseball world" as they say in the back-of-the book vernacular of the 1960's. What he really did, as far as I was concerned, was knock those tin gods who impersonate baseball players off their pedestals and get them back down here with all the rest of us poor slobs. (Although he managed, through his daily diary of life with the fact-paced, high living New York Yankees — and his afterlife with the low-life Seattle Pilots — to put a number of those tin gods even lower than the rest of us poor slobs. And best of all: the book was hilari-

Bouton went on to a few more teams and two more books, but he was never able to recapture either his fastball or the fresh, bold raunchiness of Ball Four.

Bouton did, however, touch off the birth of a whole slew of "kiss and tell" books by athletes from every sport. Homosexual football players spilled their guts, bornagain-Christian baseball players detailed their wholesome, if somewhat boring, lives and basketball players managed to find ghost writers to pen the story of how the cager was promoted through high school and college, ending up with a third-grade reading level, an NBA championship ring and a million dollar contract.

The worst of this genre (and my hands-down favorites) are The Bronx Zoo by Sparky Lyle, and Hockey is My Life by Phil Esposito.

Lyle's expose of the festering boil sometimes known as the New York Yankee clubhouse was basically a reprise of the Bouton book — minus the humor and sarcastic wit of Bouton and full of the petty anger of a recently departed one-of-the-good-old-Yankee-boys. Like Bouton's, Lyle's book found its way to the top of the best seller list. Unlike Bouton, Lyle never found his way into a baseball fan's heart.

Hockey is My Life, by former Boston Bruin and New York Ranger star Phil Esposito, has everything a hockey fan could want: except the storehouse of anecdotes a veteran of two decades of NHL wars should possess. There are pictures of Esposito and his wife, Esposito and his kids, Esposito falling down during introductions in the USSR-Team Canada series . . . you name it, Phil's got a picture of it.

Esposito starts out promisingly with a story of how he and kid brother (and future All-Star goaltender) Tony used to shoot pucks at their mother in the family basement (with her consent, of course). And he hits stride again with a tale of the Team Canada trip to Russia. Esposito tells of when hè and roommate Wayne Cashman scour their Russian hotel room for the "bug" they are sure is planted there. Finding a suspicious-looking object under the rug, they unscrew it . . . only to hear the chandelier it was attached to crash to the floor below.

Unfortunately, the book runs into the same problems most of the other sports books do: the authors want to tell all, but they don't want everybody to know they've done so - especially their teammates.

## The new look in books . . .

Things may get better in the 1980's, though, if the pair of books I've read recently are any indication.

In Home Games, by Bobbie Bouton and Nancy Marshall, two baseball wives trace their baseball lives through a 19-year diary of letters between them. The book, like the lives of Bouton and Marshall, is split in three parts: Part One, where the moods of the young baseball wives swing as wildly as a fastball-hitter facing a curve; Part Two, where Bouton and Marshall see things in a harsher light; and Part Three, which brings the sadder, wiser and nowdivorced authors up to date.

If you can get past the first part, which includes a lot of silly whining over delayed bonus money and exhilirating over one pitching win; the rest of the book is not unlike the male half of the Bouton writing pair's Ball Four.

It is that sad-funny-bitter-wistful combination of a book that sets *Home Game* apart from the others.

stress," Zeiler adds. Individuals starting a fitness program should swim 25 yards, the length of a standard pool, then pull themselves out of the pool and walk back to the starting point. That gives the body a short workout, a brief rest period, and the pulling action strengthens the arms.

The Auto Club also suggests beginners avoid unnecessary fatigue by learning proper breathing skills through swimming instruction. For variety and maintaining distance, swimmers may want to alternate strokes, such as using the crawl stroke one pool length, then swimming the backstroke. Once practical swimming skills are learned and the body is accustomed to the exercise, individuals should strive for a distance of 800 to 1,000 vards of continuous swimming for 25 to 35 minutes three to five times a week.

Heart rate is the key to how intensely an individual should exercise. Swimmers should subtract their age from 220, then multiply the resulting figure by .6 for the minimum and by 9 for the maximum rate the heart should work during the activity. For example, a 30-year-old individual should have an exercise heart rate between 114 and 171 beats.

The Hammer: Confessions of a Hockey Enforcer, by Dave Schultz, was written with one of hockey's most famous (albeit sappiest) writer, Stan Fischler. In this one, NHL goon Dave Schultz (whom I once saw spit at a Red Wing crowd which had booed him too loudly), tells all ... and blames it all on just about everybody else.

The book has everything I look for in a sports book: plenty of anecdotes, lots of tales-out-of-school about other famous players, and a heart-rending story of how the author had to change his ways or lose his wife. There's even an entire chapter on how Schultz, who scored only 79 goals and racked up 2,294 penalty minutes in his 13-year, 535-game career) thinks hockey can be made a better sport. See, there's even humor in this one.

Anyway, "The Hammer" is a perfect example of what sports books ought to be: full of juicy gossip, written for the average fifth grader and packed with pure entertain-

Try reading one this summer. They're probably all at the library . . . under sports books. (Just stay away from librarians hearing books about Clara Barton.)
