Teachers to vote on strike

Union calls board demands 'unrealistic'

Calling the school board's position at this year's bargaining table "troublesome and regressive," Grosse Pointe teacher union president Curt Lange said Monday if an agreement is not reached by an Aug. 31 deadline, the system's 500 teachers would strike before school resumes this fall.

"If there is no marked change (in negotiations) we will recommend to our membership on Aug. 31 that they authorize a job action (strike) which would take effect Sept. 6," Lange said.

The teachers' contract expires Aug. 31. Students are scheduled to return to classes on Wednesday, Sept. 7.

Both bargaining teams were scheduled to meet early Tuesday, but Lange said he doubted "anything will change."

At issue are non-economic disputes of class size and displacement of teachers as the result of proposed school closings, Lange said.

The union president outlined four other trouble spots at the bargaining table, calling the board's stand "unrealistic." They are a proposal to increase the workday for teachers by 45 minutes; a recommendation to increase the school calendar year by two days; a proposal to in-

crease the secondary class day from five to six periods; and the issue of protecting individuals participating in extra-curricular activities from transfers.

School spokesman Bruce Kefgen Monday said the school board "does not share" Lange's dim view of the talks between the union and the board.

"I guess it's safe to say the management of the school system does not share Mr. Lange's pessimism in regard to the progress of negotiations," Kefgen said.

"Presently I can say that the board's team has responded to the union's proposals in a timely

manner, as well as presenting its own proposals and is optimistic an agreement will be reached in the near future," Kefgen added.

Lange said his bargaining team submitted a salary proposal to the board on June 29, but he hadn't heard a response to the offer until Tuesday, Aug. 23. Late Tuesday Lange said board negotiators put their first financial offer on the table.

The union president would not say what the union's salary request included, but described it as "very reasonable." He also declined comment on the board's offer.

On the school closing issue, Lange said there is no language in the membership's current con-

tract regarding what happens to teachers if a school building is closed. "Without such language, a transfer can occur at the whim of the administration," Lange said.

He added his bargaining team has not received a specific proposal on a plan to modify the high school day.

"In essence they are asking us to sign a blank check and are asking teachers to teach a sixth period which is supposed to take effect sometime in the 1985 school year," Lange said.

He added: "We are not opposed to change, but we haven't been presented with anything either. The school day is of great concern to members. The structure of the school day has great affect upon the working conditions of members. We can't in good conscience recommend to our membership that they go back to work without a contract."

Lange said he found the proposal to increase the workday for teachers "offensive" and criticized the board for not providing any specifics on the plan.

"Again, they are asking us to sign on the dotted line," Lange said. "Many of our members go in a half hour early or stay late. Many of them put in more hours than are (required) in the contract now. That's the nature of the job."

Recalling the board's recent year-long negotiations with the school system's plant and cafeteria employees, Lange said he feared if teachers returned to work without a contract, there would be the "strong likelihood we will be without a contract for a year also."

Woods vs. St. Clair Shores

Cities fire sign salvos in street fight

If you value your life and your driving record, stay off of Old Eight Mile Road east of Harper. And if you get on it, expect a trip to Vernier Road.

St. Clair Shores took steps last week to limit traffic from Old Eight Mile into their residential streets by turning Helen into a one-way southbound from Woodbridge and cutting off right turns on Edmunton to Mack between 3 and 7 p.m. The Woods council also heard from residents about the continuing traffic problems in the area.

Two groups of northwest area

residents faced off before the Woods city council Monday night, Aug. 15, over the new one-way street plan recently put into effect on Brys, Roslyn, Hampton and Ridgmont Roads.

On one side were residents of those streets who told the council the traffic changes had significantly cut traffic on their streets. On the other side were residents from Anita, Hawthorne and Hollywood, who complained the traffic that once used the streets north of their homes now used their streets.

Brys residents, who in some cases made three trips to the mic-

rophone to defend the changes, said the one-ways were "the best thing that's ever happened to us on Brys." They urged the council to give the experiment a full 90 days before reviewing the program.

Traffic on the one-way streets, which were formerly used by drivers as short-cuts to Mack, has decreased by about two-thirds according to one area resident. With all streets one-way west, traffic is forced away from them, residents said. Alternating east-and-west-bound one-ways would not have solved the problem, they added.

Hollywood, Hawthorne and

Anita residents agreed that traffic was being forced off the four streets north of theirs, but said it was just moving down in front of their homes. One Hollywood resident said traffic along his street had increased by three and four times since the one-ways were instituted.

Hawthorne residents noted the plan had effectively cut the use of the four northern streets for use as short-cuts to Mack Avenue. One resident recounted a trip to St. Joan of Arc Church, usually three minutes from his home. He now has to drive about a mile and a half to get to the church, he

City's new mayor says he will run in November

Lorenzo D. Browning, executive of the computer firm Datavision, was sworn in last week as Grosse Pointe City's new mayor after the Aug. 17 resignation of mayor David Robb.

Robb, 53, is target of a civil suit filed by the Securities and Exchange Commission accusing him of embezzling money from a bankrupt brokerage firm. Robb has denied any wrongdoing and claims the \$188,000 in dispute is owed to him for his services in the liquidation of the Detroit firm, Financial House, Inc.

In a letter to council members Wednesday, Robb said "in order that you may continue to serve the best interests of the citizens of this community, I believe that it is incumbent upon me as your mayor to resign from that position effective immediately."

The council held a special meeting early Thursday, Aug. 18, and appointed "Red" Browning to serve out Robb's term until November. Browning, the council's former mayor pro-tem, said

he would seek election to the mayor's post in municipal elections this November.

Robb's letter of resignation was accepted by the council "with regrets" and "with our appreciation for his services, for his quality and quantity (of service)," said Councilman James Curran.

Council member Jeanette Duffield said she was "totally heartbroken" because Robb was leaving his post. "He was one of the finest mayors we ever had. He was top-notch," she said. But Mrs. Duffield acknowledged that she had expected Robb to resign, saying it was simply a matter of credibility.

The new mayor, Browning, said no one on the council pressured Robb to step down.

"I haven't changed my position (about Robb)," Browning said. "They have alleged a lot of things, but haven't proved anything. I have worked with Dave a long time. I'm not going to condemn him until (this is over). He has done a hell of a job as mayor."

Browning, 69, was nominated for the city's top post by councilman Arthur Fettes, who said, "I don't have to recite Red's contributions to this city. We all don't have the time. He would make an excellent mayor."

No other names were placed in nomination.

Browning has been a City resident since 1960 and was appointed to the council in 1971 to fill a vacancy created by Councilman John King's nomination for mayor. A

Something funny is going on here

As an adult, the only magic trick I've mastered on a regular basis is making my pay check disappear. Not so with Gary Thison, who can make anything disappear, make it return and have you laughing all the while.

Thison, 30, of Harper Woods, is the magician, comedian, juggler, sleight-of-hand artist currently starring at the Sierra Station, 15110 Mack Avenue.

Tall, lean and blond, Thison started doing magic in 1971, then decided to expand into comedy and writing because he had so much money invested into the magic alone.

"I did my first show, which was an adult Halloween party, for \$10," said Thison, with a grin. "Hell, I didn't know what to charge. Actually, I did it in reverse. I packaged and promoted myself before I had an act. Then someone called my bluff and hired me and I had to get an act together."

From there, he promoted himself into shows for Cub Scouts, private parties, banquets then as an opening act in night clubs.

"Usually it was for some group I'd never go see in the first place," said Gary. "People no one had ever really heard of, like 'Vito and the Oblivions.'" Later, he worked for two years as a regular at the Comedy Castle in Royal Oak.

"I finally had to leave because, while the work was steady, I just didn't make very much money," said Gary, with a shrug. "It was the sort of thing where I'd come home and my wife would say, 'can we buy milk for the kids?' And I'd tell her to stretch the powdered stuff."

Thison has diversified by writing comedy material for disc jockeys, cartoonists, magazines, newspapers and anyone else who can use a quick quip. He also books other comedienne, magicians, jugglers and musicians whenever possible.

School tax hearing set

The Grosse Pointe Board of Education has scheduled a public hearing on its tax rate for the coming year on Thursday, Sept. 1, at 8 p.m. in board offices, 389 St. Clair.

Trustees will vote on a new tax rate at their regular meeting on Monday, Sept. 12, 8 p.m. in board offices.

With the adoption of the school system's \$36.4 million budget in July, homeowners can expect taxes to increase by at least 8 percent during the school year, according to school officials. The increase is necessary, administrators say, because the board held the line on taxes last year. The school board depleted its reserve funds to subsidize last year's budget while keeping the tax rate low.

The budget did not include funds for increases in teachers' pay. Business Director Christian Fenton said for every percentage increase awarded to local teachers at the bargaining table, taxpayers can also expect an additional six-tenths of a percent increase in their tax bills.

Representatives from Josef's Bakery and Mr. C's Delicatessen complained the new traffic patterns were costing them money because of lost customers. Both asked for a return to the old street pattern because the one-ways were bad for business, inconvenient and unsafe, they said.

A Mr. C's spokesman presented a petition signed by 350 people opposing the one-ways. The petition was circulated at the store for three days, the spokesman said. One-way street residents charged employees at the store coerced customers into signing the petition, a charge vehemently denied by store spokesmen and petition signers.

After the discussion, the council decided to reconsider the program at its Sept. 19 meeting. Traffic counts for the area will be done as soon as construction workers finish on Hollywood, Public Safety Director Jack Patterson said.

Looking for a "permanent solution" to the traffic problems in the area, the city said it will ask the state, Macomb and Wayne County road commissions and surrounding cities to consider "dead-heading" Old Eight Mile Road at Harper to eliminate the traffic into the area.

The council held little hope the proposal would be seriously considered, but decided it was best to see if the state may consider some type of signage to cut down on the traffic flow along the road.

According to Woods police, the limiting of traffic onto Old Eight Mile exiting from I-94 could cut down the number of cars moving into the area and force traffic onto major streets like Vernier or Harper, which are better suited to handle it.

The signage along Helen in the Woods does force traffic during the afternoon rush to go all the way to Vernier and back to Mack to get onto a residential street in the area.

During the rest of the day, however, traffic is kept off the four northerly streets but funnels down onto the next three. In any case, the problem hasn't been solved, just relocated, both Woods and St. Clair Shores police agree.

"I don't think you can really alleviate the problem," Lt. John Diefenbach, traffic officer for St. Clair Shores said. "You're only going to move it."

The problem in the area is basic, he noted. Drivers look for the easiest route home from work, to shopping or wherever. If that means using a side-street to avoid the main streets, that's the way drivers will go, Diefenbach said.

New students may register

Students who will be attending North High School this fall are urged to report to school previous to the official first day in order to obtain their new class schedules.

On Tuesday, Aug. 30, freshmen should report to the school library from 9 a.m. until noon and sophomores from 12:30 to 3:30 p.m. On Wednesday, Aug. 31, juniors should report from 9 a.m. to noon and seniors from 12:30 to 3:30 p.m.

School counselors will be on duty those two days to take care of any errors in scheduling that may have occurred.

New students who have not yet registered many still do so by calling for an appointment for the last two enrollment days, Sept. 1 and 2. A parent should call the office of Florence Miller, assistant principal for student services, at 343-2201.

Limiting traffic onto Old Eight Mile at Harper would probably force traffic to the main thoroughfares, which have undergone major improvements in lighting and signage since 1979, when the problem first surfaced, Diefenbach said. But, as people found they had to wait to get through the intersection, they would choose alternative routes along side streets, he noted.

In 1979, the problem was finally brought before a meeting of the elected officials from the two cities and Harper Woods, the Macomb and Wayne County road commissions and state transportation officials. No solution came out of that meeting, Diefenbach said.

The meeting did get a traffic study done for the area which pointed out nine or 10 alternatives. But the company that performed the study, Goodell Grivas Inc., came up with no firm recommendations.

"I don't really know how you are going to solve the problem," Diefenbach said. "I would think the best way would be to take those stupid signs out of there and let the traffic seek its own level and stop counting cars coming down your street."

Before the recent changes, statistics showed that Brys, the major short-cut to Mack, was a relatively safe street based on the department's accident reports.

Two words that usually come up in conversations with police and residents about the traffic situation are "election year." Four Woods councilmen are up for re-election this year, while three St. Clair Shores councilmen have terms expiring this year.

While the cities continue the traffic signage, "it's the poor guy who's going to work, home and so forth that's really hurt by all of this," Diefenbach said.

While the action-reaction signage continues, the most likely solution would be the same one used four years ago, Shores officials said; a meeting between the two cities and other agencies to look for a solution.

"There's a chance" the two groups could meet to settle the problem, Woods City-Administrator Clerk Chester Petersen said, "but we're not going to initiate it. The St. Clair Shores city manager seems to know what's best for Grosse Pointe Woods anyway."

St. Clair Shores Public Works Director Marlin Sumner, who briefed City Manager Roy Stype on the continuing problem, said that to his knowledge, Stype had made no contacts with the Woods about a meeting concerning the problem. Stype was on vacation and unavailable for comment, his office said.

"It's unfortunate that two grown groups of people can't sit down and say, 'Okay, what's the problem and what can we do about it,'" Sumner said.

Also last week, St. Clair Shores and the state Department of Transportation jointly announced a \$600,000 project to widen a two-lane bridge on Old Eight Mile at I-94 to four lanes.

The construction, to begin in the spring of next year, will double the traffic capacity of the bridge, according to state officials. The state undertook the project, which should be complete next fall, at the urging of State Sen. Gilbert DiNello.

The council also authorized the hiring of a new public safety officer three weeks early to bring the department back up to 1982 strength. The department's budget allowed the hiring of an officer in October.

Discussion before the 6-1 vote approving the hiring centered on where the officer would be assigned and where the money would come from to pay the three weeks of salary and fringe benefit costs for the officer.

Park man gets probation in arson case

A Grosse Pointe Park man was sentenced to five years probation by Wayne County Circuit Judge William Cahalan last month after he pled guilty to arson.

The man, William Yott, 22, of Barrington Road, originally faced two separate charges of arson in connection with fires in the Park last April. One charge was dropped after Yott pled guilty to the other charge, Park police said.

Two fires were reported just minutes apart at about 2:30 a.m. on April 28 on Whittier Road. Damage was limited to charring on the inside of both garages, according to fire reports.

Yott was arrested by police just 10 minutes after the first alarm when he was seen driving a motorcycle on Westchester Road. Police said he matched a description of a man seen leaving the scene by neighbors.

a laughing clapping audience around Gary as he performed.

"If the couple are receptive, I'll put on a five to seven minute show at their table," said Gary, with a smile. "If they're really a lot of fun I'll stretch it to maybe 15 to 20 minutes. Sleight-of-hand is my strongest performance. The secret is entertaining the people, not just mystifying them."

"The trouble with a lot of magicians is they approach people with a 'I-know-something-you-don't know' attitude," continued Thison, in a sing-song voice.

"People want to be mystified, but they also want to be entertained. I do my best to make them laugh as well. The most skeptical are the most fun. Of course, you've got to know your audience. The couple I approach might want to talk quietly about their divorce. Then I'm the last guy they want to see. I just quietly disappear."

As a magician, Gary thinks David Copperfield is absolute tops in the field. "He can do it all. Great magic. Comedy. Drama. Anything at all," said Thison. "I usually tell people I can do that stuff too. Then I ask them if they've got a Statue of Liberty handy I can make disappear."

Gary also thinks the absolute tops in the realm of sleight-of-hand is an old performer called Slydini. On a trip to New York, Gary gathered his courage and showed up unannounced on Slydini's doorstep.

"The door opened about two inches, on a chain of course, and Slydini asked what I wanted," recalled Thison. "When I said I was a magician from Detroit, he tossed a card out to me, said to make an appointment and told me to call the next day. I was crushed."

"The next day I called and out of the blue he invited me to a luncheon with 25 of the top magi-

cians in New York. I was flabbergasted," said Gary. "Can you imagine it? One guy would ask for the salt and 25 magicians would do something with the shaker. It's on one side of the table, then it's suddenly, on a guy's head. It's empty, then a bird flies out of it. Finally Slydini would turn his head sideways and salt would pour out."

"Then someone would ask for the butter and it would start all over. It was a riot. This went on for hours while my jaw was on the table."

"Then to top it all off, he paid for lunch, then took me back to the magic parlor in his apartment and showed me tricks by the hour. What an experience."

Unlike many comedians, Gary never was the class "cut up," the class clown making everyone laugh while gathering demerits. "It was pretty much a standard upbringing," he said. "I attended Catholic school and was only thought of as being funny among my friends. However, I do remember as a little kid playing with my cousin always wanting to play 'Red Skelton.'"

"He wanted to play 'War' or 'Cowboys and Indians' and I wanted to be 'Clem Kadiddlehopper.' I knew then I wanted to be a clown when I grew up. I'm a lucky guy. I'm one of the few people who's gotten to do what he wants for a living."

Gary has also worked on both coasts, playing a lot of the clubs on the circuit in Los Angeles, but prefers Detroit.

"I was on a radio program with Mort Sahl, a guy I absolutely adore," said Thison. "He liked my stuff and urged me to stay in L.A. where the most work is. I know I could have made it there, I've been doing this for 12 years. But I like it back in Detroit. It's home. I love my house, my kids, my dog

Park woman dies in auto accident

A Grosse Pointe Park woman died last Sunday morning of injuries she received when the car she was riding in ran off the road in Canton Township and struck a tree.

Cheryl Baker, 24, who Canton police said lived on Windmill Pointe Drive, was pronounced dead at 7:43 a.m. Sunday, Aug. 21, in Wayne County General Hospital, four hours after the car she and two other people were in was involved in an accident.

Also killed was Jeffrey Primeau, 21, of Plymouth, the driver. Another Plymouth man was injured but survived the accident, police said.

According to Canton police, two men were helping Primeau move out of a Ypsilanti apartment. When they finished, the three went to a bar where they had a few drinks and then to a Ypsilanti party, where they met Ms. Baker and offered her a ride home, police said.

Primeau had dropped off one of the passengers and continued on his way, police said. His Buick ran off the road and struck a tree at 3:35 a.m. Primeau was pronounced dead at the scene.

Although Canton police said the accident may be alcohol related, they were not sure how much the driver and passengers had been drinking, they said.

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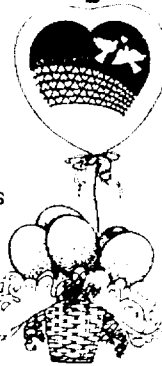

Knoxville, Tenn., native, Browning is married and the father of seven children.

Datavision, of which Browning is executive vice-president, is based in Roseville and markets a computer system that can work over cable television lines to transmit information from homes. The company has conducted tests of its product, with council permission, in Grosse Pointe City for the last three years. The tests involve the remote reading of city water meters in 200 homes through Grosse Pointe Cable Lines. The technology is also believed to have applications for security, fire and medical alert systems.

Before joining Datavision, Browning had a long career in various shipping concerns. He was an executive with the T.H. Browning Steamship Company, was assistant manager of the Lake Division of Republic Steel Corp. from 1950 to 1957, and was president of the Bob-Lo Company.

He has been a member of the board of directors of the Macabees Mutual Life Insurance Company and a member of its executive committee. He also belongs to the Detroit Athletic Club and Country Club of Detroit as well as Propeller Club of Detroit and International Association of Amusement Parks.

During his term as city councilman, Browning has served on the Southeast Michigan Transportation Authority board and as vice-chairman of the advisory council to the Wayne County Community Development Block Grant program.

The council is expected to name a successor to Browning's seat on the council at a special meeting on Thursday, Sept. 8.

Along with last week's resignation letter, former Mayor David Robb also provided U.S. District Court with about a 100-page documentation of the funds he handled while acting as a trustee for Financial House, Inc.

District Court Judge Ralph Freeman ordered Robb to provide the court with the accounting. It was Judge Freeman who appointed Robb to oversee the liquidation of Financial House, Inc. in 1974. Robb administered payments to Financial House, Inc.

South seniors register Aug. 29

creditors through its insurer, the Securities Investor Protection Corp. (SIPC).

The three-count SEC suit claims Robb "concealed, destroyed and falsified" documents relating to the liquidation of Financial House, Inc. It also alleged he stole and misappropriated funds belonging to Financial House and SIPC for "his own use and benefit."

Robb contends in his documentation to the court that he is still owed an additional \$18,000 for his services as a trustee.

Ted Focht, an attorney with SIPC's offices in Washington D.C., said last week Robb is not entitled to the extra compensation.

"Compensation in a procedure like this must be awarded by the court upon application of the person making the request," Focht said, adding Robb has been paid what is owed him.

"His (Robb's) papers now assert he is owed more, Focht said. 'None of that has been awarded by the court. As of this moment, he is not entitled to the \$18,000 he speaks of.'

"Until the court awards the compensation, he is not entitled (to the money)," Focht added.

The federal court will schedule a hearing to determine whether Robb's accounting is accurate. John Kuhn, of the SEC said last week he didn't know how long the investigation would take to see if Robb's papers were in order.

No criminal charges have been brought against Robb, according to U.S. Attorney Leonard Gilman.

Robb, an attorney, served as mayor of the City for four years and also served as councilman for six years. He also resigned recently from the Renaissance law firm of Rickel and Earle.

Village Food hit by thieves

A young black couple conned a cashier at Village Food Market, 18330 Mack, and left the store with 15 cartons of cigarettes they didn't pay for, Farms police reported.

The couple, described as neatly dressed in their mid-20's, came into the store about 1 p.m. Tuesday, Aug. 9, and asked to return a Colt 45 malt liquor beer can. The cashier told the man the store couldn't take the can because they didn't carry that brand.

While the man was talking to the clerk, the woman moved over to the cookie display near the cigarettes. When the man had finished talking to the clerk, the woman paid for the cookies and the pair left.

About 40 minutes later, store employees said they discovered 15 cartons of Lucky Strike and Carlton cigarettes missing from the display. They told police the woman had been carrying a large shoulder bag when she entered the store, reports said.

City \$80,000 CDBG approved

Community Development Coordinator for Grosse Pointe City, Christine A. Matthew, told city council members at a recent meeting that Wayne County had approved a Community Development Block Grant request of \$80,000 for city projects, including street improvements.

Wayne County administers the block grant program through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. Ms. Matthew said the city applied for the funds in March.

The \$80,000 grant will be allocated with \$49,500 for street improvements; \$7,000 for minor home repairs; \$15,500 for planning; and \$8,000 for administrative costs. Ms. Matthew said. She added that a separate \$20,000 housing rehabilitation grant had been also been approved for the city.

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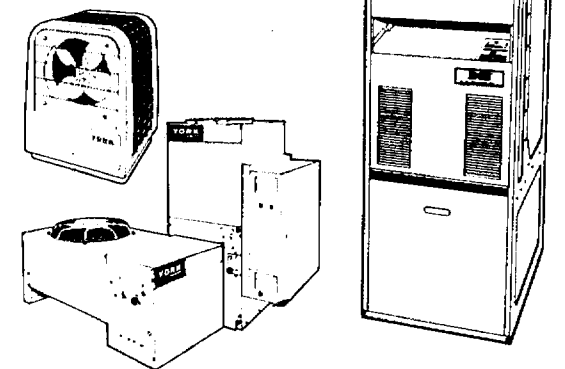
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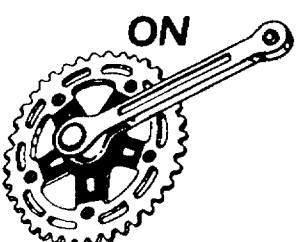
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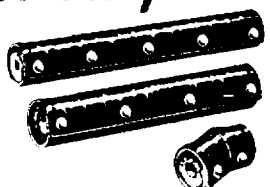
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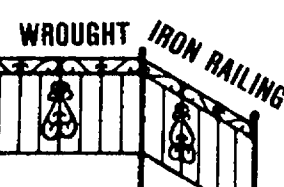
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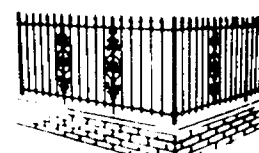
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Play honors Nancy Williams in her home town

A featured highlight of this year's Heritage Festival in historic Ypsilanti, will be memories of the life and times of a well-known Grosse Pointe who grew up in Ypsilanti. Nancy Quirk Williams, wife of former Michigan Governor and present Chief Justice G. Mennen Williams, is a key source of plot and story for a play "The Cross Street Bridge is Falling Down" written expressly to be performed as part of the festival's high jinks this Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 26, 27, and 28, in Riverside Park. Admission is free.

Flashing back from the news that the old Cross Street Bridge leading across the Huron River into picturesque 19th century Depot Town has to be torn down and rebuilt, the play interweaves the life stories of the bridge, the town and Nancy Quirk Williams who grew up in a historic Victorian mansion that is just a stone's throw from the bridge. The mansion, incidentally, is fully restored and open for tours.

Interviewed for her memories and historic background by playwright Tom Dodd, Mrs. Williams eagerly accepted his invitation to

attend the premiere and reception afterward in that home where she grew up. She will be accompanied by the Chief Justice and their daughter and son-in-law.

Dodd, a painter and art teacher at Community High School, which he affectionately refers to as the Midwest version of "Fame," is a member of the Heritage Festival planning committee. He is also one of the prime movers in a dramatic historic restoration and revival of the area called Depot Town — site of the railroad station and the center of Ypsilanti a century and a half ago.

"Depot Town's Federal era buildings literally reek with ghosts of the past," Dodd says.

His play, which will be produced by the venerable and nationally famous Ypsilanti Players is embellished by music representative of the town's old times — such songs as "Wait 'till The Sun Shines Nelly," "I Don't Want to Play in Your Yard," "Rings on My Fingers" and "Love's Old Sweet Song."

Dodd pledges that "all the music is being done absolutely straight" and predicts that "Come

Down My Evening Star" will be the hit of the show.

Another unusual feature is the role of Narrator which, Dodd states, "demands the oratorical virtuosity of a William Jennings Bryan."

"There is only one man around who can do it," says Dodd. "That is former Mayor George Goodman, now executive director of the Michigan Municipal League." And, in fact, his honor has the part.

The play is only one of many attractions at this fifth annual Heritage Festival. In between the free performances at 3 and 5 p.m. on Friday and Saturday, and at 3 p.m. on Sunday, there are hundreds more amusements. These range from historic building tours and antique sales to jazz concerts, a circus, a road race, a marathon

(called the Great Train Race because it starts and finishes at the railroad crossing), as well as the Saturday morning Farmer's Market and the many fascinating shops and restaurants of Depot Town. In addition, Cross Street on both sides of the bridge will be filled with arts and crafts for sale.

There are even ethnic dancers, a mock colonial battle in historic costume and a frog jumping contest scheduled in the riverside park.

Pointers who would like to see the play that immortalizes our own Nancy Quirk Williams should make the 50 minute drive out I-94. Exit at Huron street and follow it to the right, straight through town. It's about 1½ miles to the Cross Street Bridge which is not really falling down — not yet anyhow.

Fisher Road to be repaved

Grosse Pointe City and Grosse Pointe Farms have agreed to share costs in resurfacing Fisher Road from Maumee to Kercheval.

The Grosse Pointe City Council approved the joint project at its Aug. 15 meeting. Cost to each city will be about \$16,000, according to city officials.

According to a council memo, the Farms received bids for the Fisher Road project as part of its 1983 resurfacing program. Bid awards were made at the Farms Council July 25 meeting to

Thompson-McCully for resurfacing Fisher Road and to VanOpdenbosch Construction for curb repair.

City Manager Thomas Kressbach said his office is also working with Grosse Pointe Park officials to resurface Cadieux Road. The Park received word from Lansing earlier this month that its application for a \$1 million loan from the state for street repairs had been approved. Cadieux Road is one of 13 streets in that city designated for repair, according to officials.

Taxpayers Union head discusses need for balanced U.S. budget

James Dale Davidson, chair-brought his campaign to amend the U.S. Constitution to require a balanced federal budget to Grosse Pointe last week.

Davidson spoke Tuesday, Aug. 16, at a meeting of Grosse Pointe Optimists at the Yacht Club. His topic was "Why A Balanced Federal Budget?" Davidson was introduced by Bill O'Keefe, a Grosse Pointe insurance consultant and president of Professional Economic Services.

The National Taxpayers Union was founded 13 years ago and claims more than 100,000 members. The group successfully lobbied in 31 states last year to call for a convention to consider a balanced-budget amendment. The Union also campaigned for passage of California's tax-cutting Proposition 13 in 1978. It publishes an annual Congressional Spending Study and a membership newsletter called Dollars & Sense.

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College only for the wealthy?

Two new reports depicting the high cost of higher education in Michigan offer additional incentives to Gov. Blanchard's new commission to come up with recommendations for improving coordination among the state's colleges and universities, eliminating duplication of programs and streamlining the state's system.

One report by the state Department of Education, published in the Detroit Free Press, shows that tuition at Michigan's public four-year colleges and universities has increased 82 percent in the last five years, far more than the growth in personal income and the rise in the cost of living.

A SECOND REPORT by the President's Council of State Colleges and Universities, representing the 15 public four-year colleges and universities, emphasizes that Michigan wound up with only a 3 percent increase in state appropriations for higher education for the fiscal year 1981-82 which put the state dead last among the 50 states.

The two reports cited above are closely related, of course. As state appropriations for higher education have declined as a proportion of college support, the burden has shifted from the state to the students and their families. The result was to push average tuition rates at Michigan's four-year public colleges and universities to \$561 over the national average in 1982.

It is true that state aid to higher education will increase 8.7 percent in the fiscal year starting Oct. 1 but that rise in state support has not halted the climb in tuition. The University of Michigan has boosted tuition by 9.6 percent for the fall term with the average increase for the four-year schools amounting to 9 percent, excluding Wayne State, which is holding the line.

What all these statistics mean is that higher education is threatening to price itself out of the market. Limitations on state aid at both the state and federal level compound the problem for low-income and middle-income families. And so does the job situation which makes it difficult for students to get even part-time work to help finance their college education.

THE STATE CANNOT afford to permit wealth to be the determining factor in who goes to college. Some way must be found to make sure that capable students from all kinds of backgrounds, including those from poverty-

stricken families, get an opportunity to attend college.

Yet even before it was appointed last week the special commission on higher education was faced with threats to its efforts to seek ways to coordinate educational programs and save money in higher education in the state. The State Board of Education reminded the governor that the state Constitution designates the board as the "general planning and coordinating agency for all public education, including higher education." The President's Council, representing all the public four-year institutions, also opposes creation of a central governing board for the system.

But there are not many alternatives available for the improvement of the funding of higher education. Nobody is suggesting any further tax increase, in view of the furor over the hike in the state income tax earlier this year. So that leaves further increases in tuition, which already is so high that it is curtailing the number of students who can afford to attend college in this state, and better use of funds appropriated for higher education.

It is in this latter area that the Blanchard commission could make important recommendations. As one state education official told the Free Press, "The state isn't going to be able to afford having all the programs at all the institutions. All schools can't be all things." Those truths may be difficult to accept by some administrators in the four-year colleges and universities but the alternative may be worse. That would be a further decline in the number of students attending college, a trend that in the long run could force such institutions to close out programs duplicated elsewhere without regard for the wishes of college administrators.

MICHIGAN HAS shown welcome signs of the beginning of economic recovery in recent months. If it continues, it automatically will increase state tax collections but it is doubtful that such help will benefit higher education in the immediate future. That is why the governor and many other Michigan citizens are hopeful the new commission can make recommendations that will keep open for as many students as possible the opportunities for higher education in this state. The future of the state in the long run depends on the achievement of that goal.

Closing the gender gap

Michigan in 1984 may become one test of the Reagan administration's new efforts to win more support from American women by encouraging more women to run for high public office.

Loret Ruppe, director of the Peace Corps, has been asked by Sen. Richard Lugar, chairman of the Republican Senate Campaign Committee, to run for the U.S. Senate seat now held by Sen. Carl Levin, a Democratic liberal from Detroit. It is understood the administration is supporting the request as part of its campaign to use women candidates to attack the "gender gap."

There is the tendency of American women, more so than men, to disapprove of President Reagan's policies and performance and to identify with the Democratic Party, its issues and candidates more than men do. One recent Gallup Poll, for example, put the "gender gap" at 17 points — the difference in the proportions of men and women who approve of the President's job performance. That was the largest "gender gap" in 50 Gallup polls conducted since Mr. Reagan took office.

Mrs. Ruppe, wife of former U.S. Rep. Philip Ruppe, who himself ran for the Senate last year against Sen. Don Riegle, another Democratic liberal, would become the third well-known Republican woman to seek a Senate seat in Michigan in recent years. Earlier efforts by

Elly Peterson and Lenore Romney were unsuccessful but this time the effort is being spurred by the Reagan administration's campaign to close the "gender gap."

The encouragement of more women to run for high office reflects the administration's belief that the President's problem is more one of public relations than of substance. However, some Republican leaders believe the administration also must correct "policy deficiencies" and have taken steps to support legislation of special concern to women.

THEY INCLUDE BILLS to strengthen enforcement for the collection of child support payments, to change pension laws that hurt female spouses, to eliminate sex discrimination in insurance plans, to increase the income tax credit for child care and to make other moves. But there is little likelihood of changes in the President's opposition to the equal rights amendment and abortion, two issues of concern to many women.

If Mrs. Ruppe takes on the assignment, she will be a distinct underdog but she still might help close the "gender gap" for the president, assuming he'll run again. If Mr. Reagan does run for reelection, he could do more than anyone else to close the "gender gap" by showing more concern about women's rights and opportunities.

New victories for reform

The reforms that Wayne County voters endorsed when they adopted the county charter by an overwhelming margin are at long last going into effect despite the obstacles raised by former county officials, employee unions and the new board of county commissioners.

One of the most significant of those reforms gave the new county executive authority to hire and fire department heads. That authority was challenged by John Barr, the former county personnel director, as well as by several other officers. Now Wayne Circuit Judge Patrick J. Duggan has ruled that County Executive William Lucas has the power to fire Barr and appoint someone else "who shall serve at the pleasure of the chief executive officer."

That move apparently clears the way for the dismissal of many of the 15 other department heads, although at least one other case is to come up at a court hearing Sept. 6. But Judge Duggan's ruling seems clear enough. He said he could not force Lucas to accept "as a department head an individual who doesn't agree with his philosophy and a person with whom he may not be able to work effectively."

THAT IS THE KEY, of course. If the county executive is to be effective, he must have the power to pick his own department heads. That is especially true in Wayne County where so many officials have been political cronies of the appointing authorities. Barr, for example, was the former chairman of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners. Wedded to the political practices of the past, he obviously was not in step with the reform-minded county executive.

Lucas also is regaining a measure of financial control of the county by ordering a four-day work week for county employees and by efforts to control hospital costs. These measures, to be sure, work hardships on county officials and employees but the county exists to provide service to the public, not to pay exorbitant salaries to county employees. Barr, for example, told the court he would be irreparably harmed by his loss of income. True, perhaps, but still not a valid reason to keep him on the payroll.

The county board, however, is still being uncooperative. It is not ordering a four-day work week for its employees even though they are paid out of the same depleted county treasury as the departments required to observe a four-day work week. Too many of the commissioners are like Barr, wedded to the political practices of the past and unwilling to accept the reforms required under the county charter.

IT IS TRUE that Lucas has made some mistakes himself but when criticisms of the new county executive are aired, the public would be well advised to regard them with caution. Most of the criticisms stem from the reforms that Lucas is trying to put into effect, reforms that interfere with the cozy political relationships that existed in the past. Fortunately, the courts are beginning to recognize the power granted to Lucas by the new charter and the long-awaited shifts in personnel and improvements in procedures are beginning to occur.

At long last perhaps a new day is dawning for Wayne County government.

For Senior Citizens

Of all of our five senses, sight and hearing have got to be the most precious. Our fondest memories are fashioned of sights and sounds experienced through our eyes and ears.

A loved one's face, a baby's smile, the glory of a sunset spilling its golden glow over a deepening sky, a cool white moon floating in a field of sparkling stars, faraway places we have visited and best loved places where we have lived, all are etched forever in our minds and hearts through the miracle of sight.

Close behind is the blessing of hearing. We have all experienced moments of absolute silence. There is a strangeness and something ominous about a world without sound. We wish urgently for the sound of movement, the vibrancy of a voice, the trill of a bird to make our world real. In tune again, we search our past for memories of sounds we can never forget; the voice of someone dear, a lilting laugh, the majestic swell of a symphony.

All of our lives, we look and listen and record as we enrich ourselves with nature's beauties, man's achievements in art, music and literature and most precious of all, close ties with neighbors, friends and those whom we hold most dear, our family.

These precious possessions of sight and sound are bestowed on us with the gift of life. For most of our lives, we take them for granted but as the years go on, along with the rest of our bodily changes, the acuity of sight and hearing dims. However if we immediately seek professional help at the first sign of impending impairment, we can live our lives enjoying the pleasures that come to us through our eyes and ears.

For instance, in reference to hearing, there are few more frustrating experiences than the affliction of tinnitus. But help can be found, if one is persistent.

Tinnitus is a clinical name for "noise in the ear." For some it can be relatively mild. For others it may be a buzzing, hissing, crackling, ringing noise, severe enough to disrupt their everyday routine.

Sometimes only one ear is affected; other times both ears are affected. Not only that, a person could hear different sounds in each ear. Sounds may appear to come from different locations inside the head or outside the head. They may even come and go.

One of the causes of tinnitus could be continual exposure to loud noises. Another might be a viral infection or a head injury. Emotional stress, excessive use of alcohol, tobacco or aspirin could be factors.

Sometimes it can be alleviated by removal of ear wax, or treatment of ear infection or high blood pressure if these are the causes.

But for some 36 million Americans affected to some degree by tinnitus, there has been little relief.

However, a ray of hope for those who suffer from this annoying ailment is projected by Dr. George E. Shambaugh of Northwestern University Medical School, Chicago. Dr. Shambaugh conducted a study in which 72 percent of 195 patients were helped by treatment measures of a low salt diet, diuretic drug and, in some cases, allergic management.

A clinical and research audiologist working with a physician found in a study involving 90 patients that 30 had high blood fat levels. These patients were helped by weight reduction.

Among the other 60 patients some were found to have hypoglycemia. They found relief by going on a high protein, low carbohydrate, low fat diet. Biofeedback techniques were found to be helpful for those suffering from stress.

Another doctor working in the Ear Research Institute in Los Angeles reported success with 132 patients with severe tinnitus by teaching them to relax muscle groups of the forehead.

Another form of relief is a tinnitus masker developed at the Tinnitus Clinic at the University of Oregon in Portland. It is about the size of a hearing aid. Unlike a hearing aid, it does not magnify sound but rather it produces its own sound like the hum of an air conditioner, a sound supposedly more acceptable than the tinnitus.

One of the aspects of tinnitus is that patients aware of the noises in their ear are unaware of diminished hearing acuity. When this is true, a carefully selected hearing aid affording better reception of external sounds blocks out the tinnitus.

There are roughly 4.5 million people in the U.S. who have a serious hearing impairment. More people are handicapped by hearing loss than the combined total of those with heart disease, cancer, tuberculosis, diabetes, multiple sclerosis and blindness.

Hearing losses usually occur gradually and much of the hearing acuity can be lost before the person acknowledges any loss.

Hearing disorders can be the result of one or more localized symptoms of a disease that affects the person's general health.

The ability to hear high-frequency sounds sometimes diminishes with age. As a result, some words begin to resemble others, or parts of words or sentences are missed entirely. Other noises such as traffic sounds, television, others talking, blur conversation. Unable to communicate, those afflicted will sometimes lapse into depression and withdrawal. Such a condition is unwarranted since a hearing aid might correct any of the problems that caused it.

Equally distressful as hearing loss, is diminished vision. Hearing problems can be, but are not always the result of aging. But as we grow older there is a gradual weakening of the ability to focus on near-by objects. Usually this condition occurs around age 45 and can be overcome with the aid of corrective lenses.

The best-known problem that increases with age is that of cataracts. A cataract is a cloudy condition in the lens which decreases vision as it progresses.

While there is no way to prevent cataract formation, not all people require correction of the condition. Only about five percent of those over 65 require surgery. Removal of cataracts is only advised when vision problems interfere with daily activities or when the cataract becomes opaque. When surgery is called for, 90 percent of those who undergo it have improved vision. Cataract surgery is one of the most successful operations done today. It is done with either a local or general anesthetic. Most patients go home from the hospital in one to three days. Some eye surgeons operate on an outpatient basis.

Those who undergo cataract surgery today can look forward to more success wearing contacts than previously. Formerly contacts had to be removed at night. There were those who could not adjust to them. For these patients soft contact lenses that can be worn for a period of four to six months have proven successful. Intraocular lenses (IOLs) are permanent lenses which have also proven successful with some patients following cataract surgery.

A more serious eye condition that progresses slowly without warning is glaucoma. Glaucoma causes higher than normal pressure in the eyeball with the result that fluids within the eye do not drain properly causing damage to the optic nerve and loss of vision.

Symptoms include an unexplained blurring of the vision of one or both eyes, occasional headaches on one side or the other and the seeming presence of rainbow halos around electric lights.

Persons over 35 should be checked periodically for glaucoma.

Treatment consists of the use of eyedrops and drugs or, rarely surgery. In some cases laser surgery has proven to be an effective treatment. However medical researchers believe that more conventional treatment should be tried since those treated with lasers experience increased eye pressure and temporary inflammation.

Because most glaucomas develop in people over 40, experts recommend a medical check every two years after 40. For those with a family history of glaucoma, an annual eye examination is a good precautionary measure.

Another group of eye diseases which affect older people are those which affect central vision. Central vision makes it possible to see great distances and to read small print. The causes are varied and include diabetes, high blood pressure, kidney disease and heredity. The loss of this vision impairs the ability to do close work, to see vivid colors, identify faces, watch television or movies without special help.

Most problems can be relieved if, after the first symptoms, the afflicted immediately gets professional help.

Officials call Youth Corps success

The state-funded Youth Corps program that brought almost 100 young workers to the Pointes this summer is done for the most part. And local city officials are praising the program and the many young people it hired.

Chester Petersen, Woods city administrator-clerk, supervised the largest Youth Corps in the Pointe with more than 40 workers. He said the teens "did a superb job" and absenteeism was low.

"We got a lot accomplished over the summer and I have to say, the girls worked harder than the boys," Petersen said.

Among the tasks assigned to Youth Corps workers were landscaping of the Mack Avenue boulevard, digging ditches and installing drains, and trimming trees throughout the Woods.

"We were fortunate to see down the line early and hired four Michigan State University forestry students to supervise the Youth Corps workers," Petersen said. "That made the program run very smoothly. We had nothing but compliments from citizens."

Grosse Pointe Park hired more than 20 teens and, according to City Manager John Crawford, they did a good job.

"The corps got the jobs nobody else wanted to do, the things we

back-ordered," Crawford said. "They worked hard for the most part and did well."

The workers were assigned to trim trees, paint the Department of Public Works garage inside and out, paint fire hydrants, weed alleys and type in the city office.

Crawford said he learned something from the program in its first year. "We have to have more time to put together a program," he said. "I'm afraid some of the jobs weren't too challenging. I think we could do better in that direction with more lead time."

The Farms also employed more than a dozen Youth Corps workers and City Clerk Rich Solak said this week it turned out to be a terrific program.

"The paper work on the program was minimal for us and that was great," Solak said. "We had a few problems here and there with workers, but for the most part they did a good job."

"Some were excellent," he said. "One worked down in the court room to replace our court clerk who's on extended sick leave and really did a great job pulling the whole thing together."

Other jobs assigned to the workers in the Farms were painting parking and crossing lines on streets, reconditioning used parking meters, painting and land-

scaping. Solak said the corps saved the city significant amounts of money over the summer.

Some cities have received extensions on benefits for a few workers because not all the corps' funds were used up in the initial program. But for most workers, the Youth Corps program ended Friday, Aug. 19.

The state-funded program created about 25,000 jobs to ease unemployment throughout the state.

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Decision on restaurant law expected Monday

The battle between the big restaurant chain and small group of neighbors on Westchester Road in the Park over late night business will resume next Monday, Aug. 29, at a 7 p.m. council meeting.

A city ordinance forcing restaurants in the Park to close down between 2 and 5 a.m. will take effect on Sept. 1, unless the council takes action to rescind it next

week. Residents who live near the Steak 'N Egg Kitchen on East Jefferson Avenue hope to pressure the council to let the police power ordinance stand in order to restore some peace and quiet to their neighborhood at night.

On the other side are attorneys representing Dobbs House, the corporation that owns some 200, 24-hour Steak 'N Egg Kitchens across the country. They

have vowed to fight the rule if it is enacted and claim they'll win.

"It's summary judgment material," one said at an earlier council meeting. "It's a discriminatory law."

Steak 'N Egg is not the only eatery that would be closed down. The Tower on East Jefferson near the bus stop now operates 24 hours a day and Mama Rosa's on Mack Avenue sells pizza on weekends until 3 a.m. Representatives of both restaurants have criticized the law.

But the neighbors are adamant. They say the Steak 'N Egg attracts unsavory characters after the bars close and there are many fights and loud noises coming from its parking lot. The neighborhood is residential, and homeowners claim the presence of the restaurant depresses property values there.

Steak 'N Egg managers have spent \$2,500 to renovate the outside of their building, adding lights and enlarging windows, and have said they'll spend another \$50,000 if the law is dropped.

The ordinance was originally adopted by the council last fall, but its effective date was postponed twice by the council. The city's attorney, Herold "Mac" Deason, said when he originally drew up the law he was not aware that other restaurants would be affected and that fact "changes the nature of the law."

The ordinance was enacted under the city's "police powers" and in order to defend it the city will probably have to demonstrate that 24-hour restaurants threaten neighborhood security.

The residents mobilized against the Steak 'N Egg after three women were kidnapped from its parking lot, taken to a vacant house and raped in August, 1982.

The city council was scheduled to reconsider the law at its Aug. 22 meeting but agreed to postpone until Aug. 29 because representatives of Mama Rosa's and the Tower were not notified it was on the agenda. Councilmen John Prost and Patricia Forster voted against tabling, but the motion was approved 5-2.

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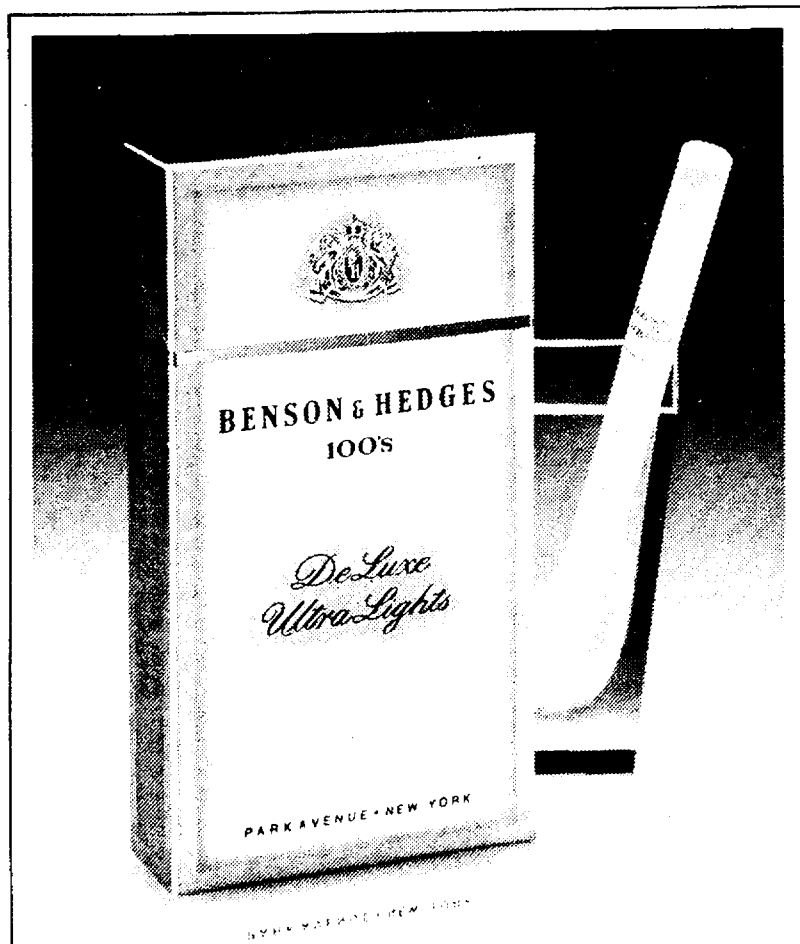

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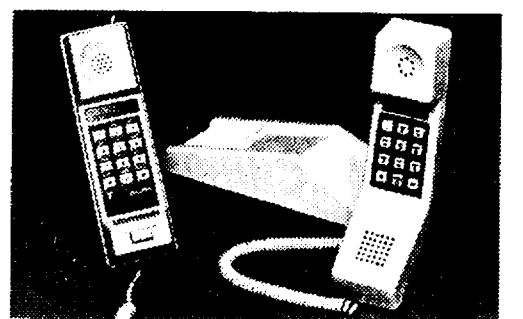

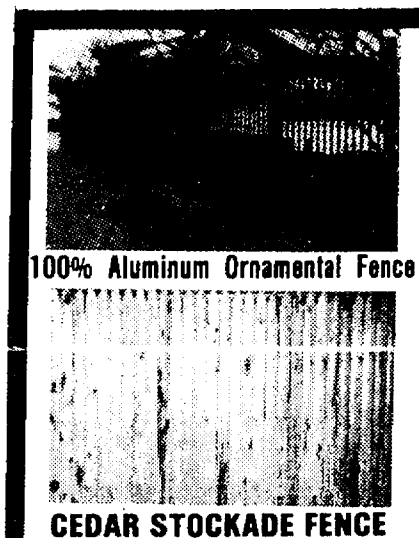

The present voted millage of the school district of 34.3000 mills has been reduced by the "Headlee Amendment" to 33.7553. The Board of Education has complete authority to establish that 30.8813 mills be levied in 1983 for the General and Library Funds from the present authorized millage rate.

The maximum additional proposed millage rate for the General and Library Funds would increase revenues for operating purposes from ad valorem property tax levies in 1983 otherwise permitted by Act 5, Public Acts of Michigan in 1983 in the amount of \$2,785,506, or an increase of 9.3%. (The increase will be \$3,035,197, or 9.9% for General, Library and Debt Funds).

The figure for increase in revenue for operating purposes is based on the latest estimate of state equalized valuation of property located within the school district.

Advertising giant Ross Roy, dead at 85

Hundreds of persons gathered at Grosse Pointe Memorial Church last Friday to pay their last respects to Grosse Pointer Ross Roy, a pioneer in the automobile business and founder of one of the largest advertising agencies in the world.

Mr. Roy, 85, died in his Shores home on Tuesday, Aug. 16, after a brief illness. Originally from Ontario, Mr. Roy inadvertently began his advertising career as a salesman for Dodge cars in Janesville, Wis. during the mid-1920s. He began compiling and comparing the merits of Dodge automobiles to other cars of the era, giving the customer the first "product knowledge" of motor vehicles of that time. Until then, most auto purchases were made according to the purchase price.

The tactic was so successful that Dodge asked Mr. Roy to teach the technique to other dealers. Thus, the Ross Roy advertising agency was born in 1926. Mr. Roy moved his base of operations to Detroit in 1927 to be closer to the automaker.

When Chrysler bought out the Dodge brothers the following year, he was retained by the corporation, which remains a key client to this day.

Other clients include the K-Mart Corp., Bacardi, La-Z-Boy Chair Co., Florists Transworld Delivery Assoc., Detroit Edison and the National Yellow Pages. The company is listed as one of the 25 largest advertising agencies in the world, with annual billings of about \$105 million a year.

Over the years, Ross Roy Inc., refined and expanded the basic communications premise that Mr. Roy enunciated into a widely diverse number of disciplines, including motion pictures, radio and TV commercials, newspaper and magazine advertisements, data books, sales and service training programs.

"We don't feel our membership should be subjected to that kind of situation," Lange said.

Lange said his membership has already formed a "crisis committee," which is making preparations for the strike. In order for the strike to take effect, two-thirds of the membership must authorize the job action in secret ballot, Lange said. The last time local teachers walked the picket line was in 1969 for one and a half days.

"We will be making every attempt to settle, but I would characterize the mood of the team as not optimistic," Lange said. "We would regret if we would have to take the job action, however, we will if necessary. We don't see any viable alternative."

According to a Local 1 spokesman, umbrella group of the Michigan Education Association representing teachers at the bargaining table in 17 Macomb County school districts and in Grosse Pointe, contracts in nine school districts are still in negotiations.

During World War II, the agency used its expertise to design instruction manuals for tanks and others weapon.

Mr. Roy stepped down as an active employee of the agency in May of this year and sold his stock in the company. He was an honorary board member and past president of the Mental Health Association of Michigan and was also past president of the Greater Detroit Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Roy was also vice-president of the United Foundation of Metropolitan Detroit and directed the collection of millions of dollars for civic, educational and political projects. He also actively supported youth activities and won the plaudits of the Junior Achievement and the Boy Scouts of America, receiving the latter's highest award, the "Silver Beaver" in 1956.

He was also a member of the Board of Directors of the Boys' Clubs of Metropolitan Detroit and in 1975 was presented with the Boys' Clubs "Man and Boy Award" for exceptional service. Mr. Roy was also an Honorary Trustee of the University of Detroit and an Honorary Trustee of the Michigan College Foundation. Because of his interest in motor vehicles and in traffic safety, he was elected chairman of the board of trustees of the Traffic Safety Association of Metropolitan Detroit in 1974 and served until the time of his death.

"Ross Roy was truly one of the great people in our industry," said Glen W. Fortinberry, president and chief executive officer of Ross Roy, Inc. "He was imaginative and boldly innovative with a service philosophy that set a standard of professionalism for all of us to follow. He will be greatly missed."

"With Ross, passes a great pioneer in the advertising and automotive field," echoed John S. Pingel, vice-president of the board. "The community will miss his tremendous contributions over the years, and I shall miss a dear friend and long time business associate."

Mr. Roy is survived by his wife, Celia; two sons, Rex Regis and Ross Regis; a daughter, Arlene Roy Hendrie; 10 grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

Interment was Saturday, Aug. 20, in Forest Lawn Cemetery. Arrangements were handled by the Verheyden Funeral Home.

Curran, a member of the Grosse Pointe City council, said the study will result in improved quality of life for the elderly through "development of new services to better meet (their) health needs."

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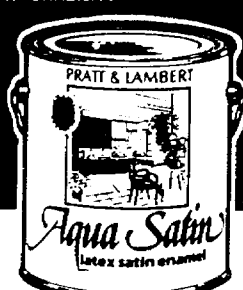
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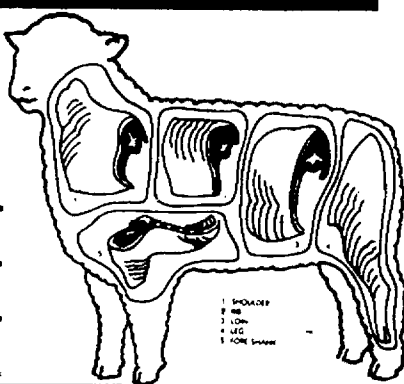

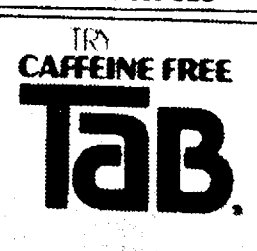
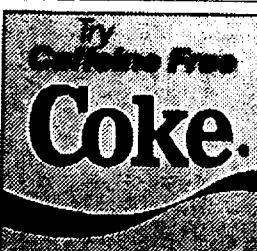
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Oil spill

Residents ask for help

Several Newcastle Road residents want the Woods' help in collecting damages from a Mack Avenue business whose abandoned waste oil storage tank leaked into flood waters in the area last month.

At the petition of the Woods Country Club Progressive Association, a homeowners association in the area, the council directed Building Inspector Earl Wakely to begin investigating the area around the Curto-Knight Goodyear tire dealership at 18391 Mack to determine if any building and fire code violations exist.

Association president Paul Guaresimo said the flood waters on the street, which in some cases reached to a point between the sidewalk and homes, were covered with oil from the tank in the parking lot at the Curto-Knight property.

About 25 homes suffered lawn damage when the oil was left behind by receding waters, Guaresimo said. In addition, the waste oil left a bad odor and film that made travel along the street hazardous, he said.

The council also asked that damages to resident and city easements be assessed and totaled. A report will be made to the council, which will decide the city's course of action in seeking redress.

The leakage occurred during the heavy rains late last month. According to police reports, the storage tank in the parking lot of the tire dealership began oozing oil, leaving an oil slick on the waters that covered Newcastle.

Anton's sued for copy right infringement

The American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers filed suit recently in federal court against Anton's Lounge and Restaurant, Inc., claiming copyright infringements.

According to ASCAP attorneys, the plaintiffs, who own the copyrights to the supposedly infringed material, claim a number of their works were performed at Anton's Lounge and Restaurant by a performer playing the piano on Jan. 8 and 9.

The songs in question in the suit, filed Monday, July 25, are: "Make Someone Happy" by Betty Comden, Adolph Green and Jule Styne; "You're Nobody 'Til Somebody Loves You" by Russ Morgan, Larry Stock and James Cavanaugh; "You've Got a Friend" by Carole King; "Since I Fell For You" by Buddy Johnson; and "When I Fall in Love" by Victor Young and Edward Heyman.

Under the Copyright Law of 1976, the owner of an establishment that uses music performed publicly for an audience must obtain a license to perform the works from either those holding the copyright or a clearinghouse which grants licenses on behalf of the copyright holders, according to ASCAP.

Without the license, performance of the copyrighted works constitutes copyright infringement, punishable by injunction prohibiting further infringement, damages of not less than \$250 and not more than \$50,000 for each song infringed plus court costs and attorney fees at the court's discretion.

The high water mark is delineated by a foot-wide swath of dead grass. In some cases, the line cuts across resident's lawns while in other spots across the city easement between the sidewalk and street.

In addition to the dead grass and scattered patches of brown along other lawns, Guaresimo said the oil left a film on the street and sidewalk that made vehicular and pedestrian traffic dangerous. Also, the oil left behind a foul smell, he said.

Guaresimo presented the council with a petition signed by 33 affected Newcastle residents and asked for the city's help in correcting the damage. "We are asking the city, on our behalf, to get the violations corrected and to put sufficient pressure on the property owner and operator to bring about the repair of the grass of residents at (the company's) expense," he said.

Both Guaresimo and Gregory DeMars, a Newcastle resident and officer of the association, hinted the city may find itself a defendant in a civil action because of the damage.

A similar incident occurred a number of years back, Guaresimo said, so the city knew the tank existed. In addition, because of the city's storm drainage policies or its inability to keep the catch basins clear, the water backed up on the street, he said.

The association is "ready to go to court" should a solution to the problem not be reached in another way, Guaresimo added.

In its petition, the association asked the city to "take action towards the purchase of this property from the possessor and/or owner of the Goodyear property." Guaresimo said he would like to see the city join as plaintiff in any upcoming civil action, because the Woods "has equity as well as liability in the matter." The city can recoup any damages to its easements through civil action and has an interest in getting code violations corrected, he added.

If the city doesn't join as plaintiff, the association may consider suing the city, he added.

Wakely said the property originally housed the Pointe Dodge dealership, and was sold a number of years back. The property recently changed hands again, but because the occupant didn't change, no certificate of occupancy inspection was necessary, he said. The new owner was given 30 days to remove the tank after being cited for a violation of the Fire Prevention Code in the second week of August, Wakely said.

Residents expressed other concerns about waste oil supposedly pooling in a back alley and oozing from a wall of a building. Wakely was instructed to investigate.

Waste oil at the building is now kept in above ground tanks which are emptied regularly by a licensed dealer, Wakely said.

It is unknown whether there is still oil in the underground tank, because the store employees capped it with concrete when it began to leak, Wakely said, adding he was reluctant to break the cap in case of another heavy rain.

Councilman Frederick Lovelace pointed out that if easements were damaged, it would be in the city's interest to consider taking action against the company.

The council will consider what action it will take at a special meeting yet to be scheduled.



Hagar the wonderful

Artist Ken Boshell went to work on another old tree stump in Grosse Pointe last week and "Hagar the Horrible," the popular comic strip character carried in the Detroit Free Press, was the result. Hagar sits on Jefferson Avenue, next to another comic favorite, Garfield, both commissioned by a near-by resident.

But, not everyone's happy to see Hagar on the road. Both tree stump sculptures happen to sit on ground governed by the Wayne County Road Commission as right-of-way for Jefferson Avenue. Some local administrators are worried that the comic attractions may be distractions for drivers coming around the Jefferson curve. The matter has been placed in the road commission's hands for a decision. The statues may be relocated after a ruling.

Career mother likes her life

The woman of the 1980s is faced with decisions her grandmother never dreamed of making.

One major decision she must contend with is which field to conquer first: the professional or the parental. Years ago, the two were interchangeable. A woman's family was her career and visa versa. Now, however, it's not that simple.

Betty Barber, assistant professor in Eastern Michigan University's Department of Home Economics, recently delved into this dilemma with a fascinating investigation of role transitions and conflicts experienced by married women who postponed motherhood until they were well established in their careers.

Barber delivered the results of her investigation in a paper titled "Motherhood After 28: Career Women Who Waited" to the National Council on Family Relations in Washington, D.C.

The investigation, conducted in questionnaire form, surveyed 35 married career women who were at least 28 years old at the time of the birth of their first child. Most of these women were employed in education or social services. Thirty-one had one child while four had two children. The children ranged in age from two

weeks to five years at the time of the study.

In addition to the written survey Barber conducted a 60-minute personal interview with each woman to validate written responses and identify personal needs and perceptions regarding work and family life.

Husbands also answered a questionnaire, the results of which indicated their attitudes toward role, performance and desired family size.

Barber's investigation concentrated on four areas: maternal attitudes; feminine interest; role stress and coping strategies; and marital satisfaction.

Among other things, Barber found there was little acceptance by the women of the "traditional maternal attitude." Statements such as "a woman's most important role is being a mother," "a child is necessary to feel like a woman" and "a child is necessary for fulfillment of a marriage," which reflect traditional values, were rejected by most of the women.

Accepted instead was a "modern maternal attitude" which embraces the notion that pursuing careers and raising children are of equal importance and that husbands and wives should share equally in the fun and work of childrearing and household chores.

Interestingly, despite these beliefs, Barber found that the women spent a significantly greater amount of time in food preparation, shopping, child care arrangements, child care, laundry and planning for social activities for the family than did the men. This represents a marked gap between perception and reality in the division of work and, Barber hypothesized, may be due to the need for women to hold on to the core home and family responsibilities which may be seen as being closely related to a sense of self-worth.

Surprisingly, the women did not express feelings of guilt or anxiety over leaving their children to return to the work force. Barber attributes this to the fact that the women who participated in the study were well educated (94 percent had at least one college degree) and adjusted to the fact that their children could be content and function normally without them for periods of time.

The women were, however, highly selective about child care (babysitters, day care centers).

"These women are well organized, careful planners who have definite goals in life and want to be sure their children are getting the best possible care," Barber says.

Most of the stress reported by the women resulted from strain due to lack of time. "Most of them cited flexible work schedules and supportive husbands as being of the greatest help whenever stress became a problem," Barber noted.

All of the 35 women surveyed expressed positive attitudes toward their roles as mother. Particularly happy were the women with children between the ages of four months and one year. Barber attributes this to the fact that at this stage children constantly are changing and developing new skills, including smiling, recognizing familiar faces and vocalizing. "The mothers are on an emotional high from these new, wonderful experiences," she said.

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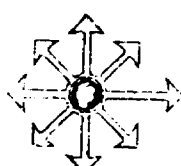


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Resume Sunday Afternoon DIA musical dates

Bess Bonnier performs light classics and jazz as well as current popular music and the Best of Broadway on the antique grand piano especially selected for the Crystal Gallery.

The Crystal Gallery, closed for six months, has been completely restored to the neo-classic style of its original opening in 1928. 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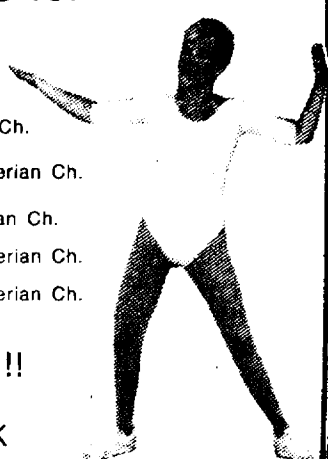

Cesarean Birth course offered

Elegant Eating

A selection of recipes from the forthcoming low-calorie, low-cholesterol — and penny-wise — cookbook by Thyra Grey Howard and Helena DeWitt Roth featuring, this week, CHILLED FRUIT SOUPS, so refreshing on a hot summer evening.

Fruit soups, highly favored in Hungary and other northern European countries, definitely merit more recognition in American cuisine. An easy and delicious topping for these soups can be made by folding 1 cup whipped topping, made from a package mix, into 1 cup fresh, plain low-calorie yogurt. Float a "dollop" (1 Tbsp., about 18 calories, with a very small trace of cholesterol) of this mixture in each bowl of soup.

CHILLED FRUIT WINE SOUP

1 cup fresh strawberries, hulled and washed
1 cup fresh or frozen raspberries
1/2 fresh pineapple, cored and cut into chunks
4 peaches, pitted
2 cups rose or burgundy wine
1/2 cup orange juice
Juice of 1 lemon
2 cinnamon sticks
4 whole cloves
Sliced fruit of your choice

Puree strawberries, raspberries, pineapple and peaches in food mill or blender. Pour in wine, orange and lemon juices; mix well. Pour into medium saucepan and add cinnamon and cloves. Simmer for 30 minutes. Remove cinnamon and cloves. Add fresh, sliced fruit. Simmer 10 minutes. Cool and chill well. Serve in glasses. Garnish with yogurt or soup topping. Makes 8 servings. Calories per serving about 62. Cholesterol 0.

CHILLED CHERRY SOUP

1 lb. sweet cherries
1 stick cinnamon, 2 inches long
4 whole cloves (optional)
2 very thin lemon slices
2 thin orange slices
2 cups water
1/4 cup sugar, or to taste
1 Tbsp. cornstarch
2 Tbsp. water

In a saucepan, combine cherries, cinnamon, cloves, lemon slices, orange slices and 2 cups water. Bring to a boil over moderate heat. Reduce heat and simmer about 10 minutes, or until cherries are soft. Remove from heat; take out cinnamon, cloves and fruit slices. Stir in sugar. Mix cornstarch with 2 Tbsp. water. Return soup to heat and, stirring slowly, add the cornstarch mixture. Continue stirring until clear and slightly thickened. Ladle out 1 cup cherries with juice. Pour remainder into blender and puree until smooth. Stir in reserved cherries and juice and, if desired, 1/4 cup Cherry Heering or dry red wine. Chill. Garnish with chilled soup topping centered with 1 ripe cherry. Makes 4 servings. Calories per serving about 92. Cholesterol - a trace.

ICY STRAWBERRY SOUP

1 qt. fresh, ripe strawberries
1 cup orange juice
1-1/4 tsp. instant tapioca
1/8 tsp. ground allspice
1/8 tsp. ground cinnamon
1/4 cup sugar
1 tsp. grated lemon peel
1 Tbsp. lemon juice
1 cup low-calorie buttermilk

Wash and hull strawberries. Reserve 4 small perfect ones for garnish. Slice 8 berries and set aside. Puree remaining berries in blender; strain into saucepan. Add orange juice. In small bowl, mix tapioca with 4 Tbsp. strawberry mixture. Add to saucepan with allspice and cinnamon. Heat, stirring constantly until mixture comes to a boil. Cook 1 minute or until thickened. Remove from heat. Pour soup into large bowl; add sugar, lemon peel and lemon juice. Gently fold in buttermilk and blend well. Fold in sliced strawberries; cover and chill at least 8 hours or overnight. Garnish each of 4 bowls of soup with 1 perfect strawberry. Calories per serving about 156. Cholesterol about 2 mgs.

New sports medicine program

Grosse Pointe has new 'CHAMP'

With three minutes to go in the fourth quarter of an important game between the South High Blue Devils and the North High Norsemen, a player grabs his knee, winces in pain and crumples to the turf.

Until this season, all the coaching staff could do was to take the proper emergency procedures, escort the injured athlete from the field, turn him over to his parents and his personal physician or the local hospital emergency room . . . and go on with the game.

Coaches might not have been able to follow the improvement of the injured player. And parents, more often than not, might not have known where to turn after the emergency room staff completed its treatment.

This year, however, the coaching staffs of all sports at North and South will benefit from the expertise of professional athletic trainers and hospital physicians in dealing with — and preventing — injuries to their athletes.

Under CHAMP, the Cottage Hospital Athletic Medicine Program, high school sports programs in Grosse Pointe will, for the first time, make use of a formal athletic training system. CHAMP is a joint effort by Cottage Hospital, the Henry Ford Hospital Center for Athletic Medicine and the Grosse Pointe School System.

It is also the realization of a long-time goal held by South High Athletic Director Chuck Hollosy, who says he's excited about the new program and its potential.

"It has to be a tremendous help to us," Hollosy said. "We've had a situation where there are so many athletes, there just isn't enough time to give them the type of attention they need. Now, we feel — we hope — that with this program, we can change that."

gram, we can change that."

CHAMP CONSISTS of part-time athletic trainers from Henry Ford Hospital as well as staff physicians at Cottage Hospital who will work with athletes in pre-season physicals and throughout the various sports seasons. The trainers are scheduled to visit the schools for about two hours daily to examine athletes, follow them through the recuperative process in the event of injury and teach a basic first aid course to student trainers.

Trainer Rose Snyder and her assistants at the Center for Athletic Medicine have already begun their work in the schools during the current practice sessions for fall sports. Funds for the trainers were approved by the Board of Education in June as part of the 1983-84 school budget.

Dr. Michael G. Sperl, physician at Cottage and the "intake physician" for CHAMP, explains the staff physicians' role in the clinic.

"It is a comprehensive sports medicine program, not just for injuries. One part of the program will be pre-season physicals for the junior high and high schools; another will be the trainer, Rose Snyder, working with the athletes in the schools. The third part of the program will be the physicians," Sperl said.

"Basically, I'm the primary physician involved in the clinic. I deal with pain and motion-type problems, mainly soft tissue injuries, so I'll be the intake person in the program."

According to Dr. Sperl, soft tissue-type injuries account for 85 percent of all sports related injuries and therefore are the most prevalent of the injuries the CHAMP clinic will handle. The other 15 percent are injuries or problems which will require the services of an orthopedist or an

internist, both of which will be available through the CHAMP program.

"The best feature of the CHAMP program is that if there is an injury or a problem, we can look at it today, not have the patient sitting around for days getting worse," Sperl said.

DR. SPERL pointed out that in the event of an injury, the athlete's family naturally has the right to pursue any method of treatment they wish. "But they have the option to see us. We're working with the emergency room at Cottage so they can work with us. The emergency room is the intake place, so in essence, the clinic will be operating 24 hours per day."

"If the parents decide to work with us, they can make an appointment to see me or the other physicians after the emergency room treatment," Sperl added.

Following an injury, treatment will consist of physical therapy. Sperl said CHAMP will make use of isokinetic machines as part of the full rehabilitative physical therapy facilities at the program's disposal.

"Ultimately, what we're aiming for is a full sports medicine program," Hollosy said.

gram to be made available to the community, the weekend jogger or part-time athlete," Sperl said. Although he doesn't expect the program to be "full-blown" for two or three more months, Sperl added that CHAMP was taking referrals at the present.

"We want to offer a comprehensive program aimed at sports medicine . . . which has grown into a science," Sperl said.

The Grosse Pointe School System is more than glad to take advantage of such a comprehensive program, officials say. North High Athletic Director Tom Gauerke has said he was very enthusiastic about the program. And Hollosy thinks it will help alleviate many of the difficulties faced by busy coaches.

"A program like this will help provide coaches with the latest techniques . . . and help in forming an extra-curricular student training program. It's been up to each individual coach to try to recruit student trainers and that's difficult. Although the coaches will still be responsible for things like taping, etc., it should be a help to have student trainers."

"We're excited about the program," Hollosy said.

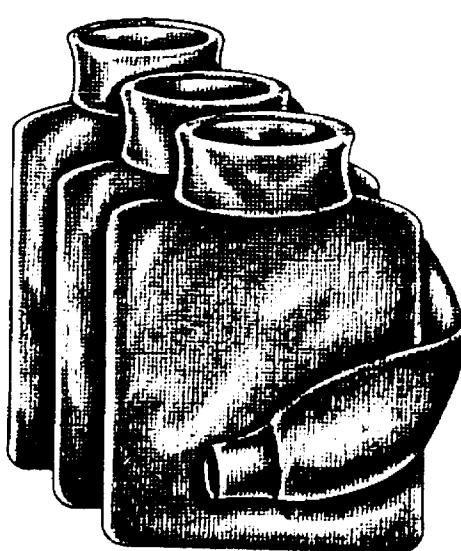
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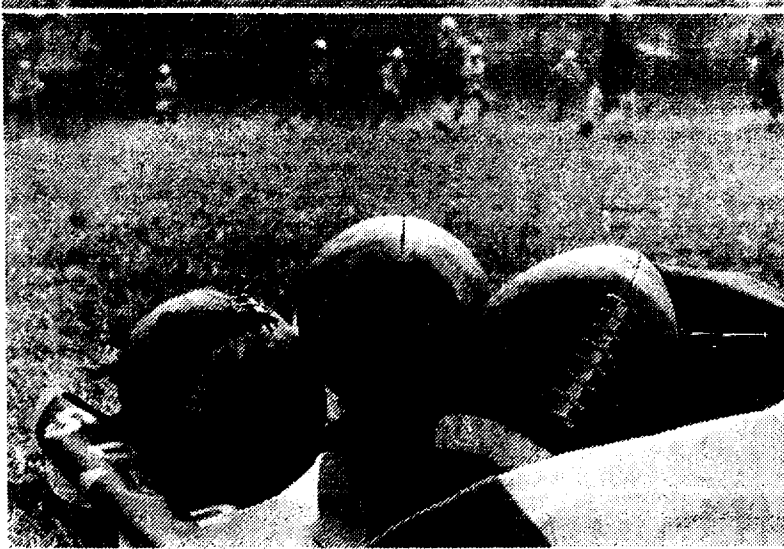
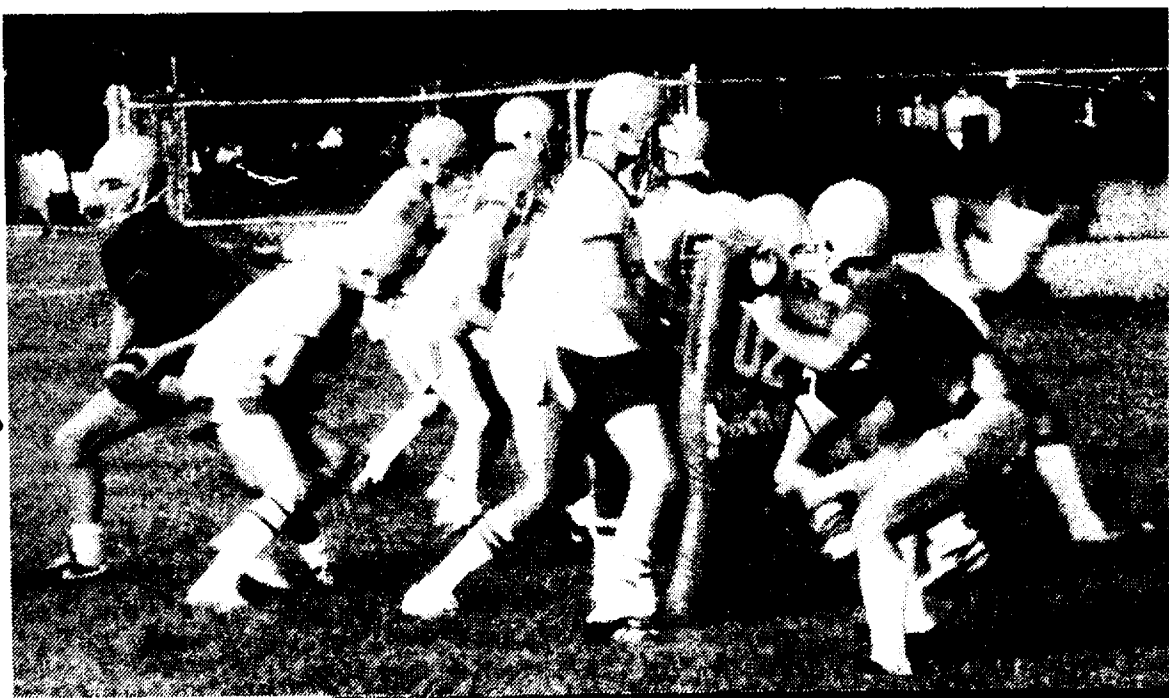

GPSC fifth in states

The U.S. Swimming (formerly A.A.U.) year is divided into a largely indoor "short course" season of competition in 25-yard pools and a summer "long course" season in outdoor 50-meter pools. The Grosse Pointe Swim Club followed-up its strong showing in the short-course season (sixth and second place, respectively, at the girls' and boys' state championship meets last March) with a fifth place finish at the 1983 Michigan Long Course Championships held Aug. 5 through 7, at the Southfield Civic Center.

Grosse Pointe swimmers, led by GPSC's head coach Scott Teeters, who was assisted by Wayne State University Assistant Swim Coach John Maguire, were a little thin in the older age groups, but this was more than offset by a very strong performance from the younger swimmers to give GPSC 395 points.

(1:23.07, 1:03.42 and 2:37.32); fourth in the 50 free, back and breast (29.40, 34.38 and 37.10); and seventh in the 100 back (1:19.80). His twin brother Billy was close behind with first in the 50 back (32.80); second in the 50 butterfly, 100 butterfly and 100 back (30.85, 1:11.35 and 1:13.50); fifth in the 200 I.M. (2:39.94), and sixth in the 100 free (1:04.89).

Greg Cooksey was fifth in the 50 and 100 back (35.42 and 1:17.88) and second alternate in the 50 butterfly (34.00). Chris Nevison was seventh in the 100 breast and first alternate in the 50 breast (1:26.53 and 38.72). Cameron Maynard took second alternate in the 100 breast (1:25.59).

The Thompsons, Cooksey and Chris Nevison teamed up to place first and establish a new state record time (2:13.61) in the 200 medley relay. Cece Rettig won eighth place in the 50 free (31.40) and teamed up with Young, Kish and Megan Connolly to take first place in the 200 free relay (2:02.57).

In the 9-10 age group, Ted Stedem took second in the 50 and 100 breast (41.52 and 1:34.78); seventh in the 50 back (41.50); and first alternate in the 50 free (34.21).
