

Lauve aims for voters tired of the status quo against political newcomer and By Harriet Nolan

If you're mad, and aren't going to take it anymore, you may have helped 14th District Republican nominee John Lauve edge out his opponent Joan Rashid in last week's primary election.

"I won because of my clear opposition to politicians who feel that government spending is the way to go and my opposition to Detroit Mayor Coleman Young and the decay, waste and crime he's allowed to flourish under his administration," says Woods resident Lauve.

With a one-third margin lead from Pointe voters and an overall tally of 7,395 to 5,847 votes, he won the nomination on his second try neighbor Ms. Rashid. Lauve will face incumbent U.S. Rep. Dennis Hertel in the November election.

A similar primary bid four years ago ended in defeat to vic Caputo, a talkshow host at WJBK-TV. Caputo then lost to Democrat Hertel, an attorney and three-term legislator.


But Lauve made it to the finals this time and he credits part of his success to a growing discontent among voters who are tired of elected officials who don't seem concerned about the people they

"It's going to be a difficult job. but for the first time Hertel has opposition in his district," says Lauve, "In Sterling Heights State Senator David Scrotkin was rejected by a three-to-one margin when they recalled him, so there is a very heavy anti-tax sentiment

That was part of Governor James Blanchard's old congressional district. And, of course, Hertel and Blanchard are very good friends with similar voting records," he adds. Lauve, a 43-year-old engineer

with General Motors, has recall petitions going against both Blanchard and Young.

"I'm also going to talk about Hertel's record, particularly where he cut the Pointes into two congres-





sional districts without concern for the community," says Lauve.

His opponent, Hertel, says he stands on his past record and emphasizes his attempt to cut waste out of the defense department with a bill he introduced giving govern-

ment the same right as the private sector to nullify contracts if overcharging for materials to the point of fraud is discovered

More than 100 seek top local school post By Susan McDonald The deadline for filing applications to become Grosse Pointe public schools' next superintendent passed yesterday with more than

100 hopeful candidates on file, according to search committee head Dorothy Kennel. The school board hopes to have a

new man on board by the first of next year to replace Kenneth Brummel who took a job in California in June. They plan to conduct private interviews in October. The position was advertised extensively in education journals and

university placement offices. A consultant from the state school boards association and another from University of Connecticut have been hired to help evaluate the applicants.

"We have received applications from some outstanding individuals," Mrs. Kennel told the school board at its Monday, Aug. 13 meeting.

Insight into what kind of superintendent the community would like to see in the \$60,000 a year position was provided to the board in a report by John Brubacher, the Connecticut-based consultant. Brubacher met with hundreds of citizens in small group settings this spring.

Mrs. Kennel released only two pages of Brubacher's more than 20-page report. She said the release of more details may violate the confidentiality promised to citizens who spoke out at the meetings. The school board did review the full

Brubacher concluded that citizens want an educational leader who "could bring unity to the school system and the community by establishing personal and district credibility."

He wrote that "there has been too much change for change's sake" and "most groups agreed that it was important to recognize the strengths of the people and programs already in place and to build upon them.

While Brubacher said the school system was fortunate because citizens want to be involved and make constructive contributions, he noted there is "considerable anxiety" about the issue of closing schools.

"Even though the student population has gone from 13,000 to 7,500 and closing schools appears an obvious solution, there is a sizable number of people who want to keep the small neighborhood schools open, particularly since Grosse Pointe can afford to." This spring's school closing battle was a "crisis and many perceive it as deeply dividing the community," the consultant wrote.

"If redistricting efforts are to occur in the future, they must be carefully planned and implemented," Brubacker said.

He noted other concerns were low employe morale, Grosse Pointe's insulation from diversity and a lack of credibility of school

Farms tables Hill retail ordinance

The Farms council Monday night voted 4.3 to table until Oct. Ta proposed "first floor retail only" ordenance for new businesses on the

About 25 businessmen and property owners attended the two hour public hearing, the hon's share in opposition to the zoning change. The ordinance would require new businesses in the front half of the first floor to be retail. uses. New service and office uses would have to use the rear half of buildings

The only significant thing to come from the hearing was a petition signed by about half the property owners on the Hill that forces the council under state law, to approve the zoning change by a three quarter majority vote, of 6 or

The hearing was punctuated once by applause for Ed Pongracz. who urged the council to wait until after the opening of the Richard parking lot to see if customer traf fic improves. Two attorneys appeared on behalf of the opposition, questioning the legality of the ordinance and the purpose for its

Mayor James Dingeman characterized the rebashing of arguments as "blather" that he had heard "for a long time" since the council first proposed the ordinance to revitalize its commercial area.

The proposed ordinance would

require new retail businesses mosing onto the Hill to occupy the first floor of buildings. New office uses would be relegated to the back half. of buildings unless granted a variance by the council The ordinance would not affect

existing businesses. The retailing of provision would be tempered to a change in use smeaning a denti-c could leave his office and another dentist move in it not by a change of occupatory.

Jacobus, 20, is the son of Dr. Wayne and Mrs. June Jacobus, of Hawthorne Road. He is also a senior in electrical engineering at the University of Southern California and a midshipman with the Naval Officers Reserve Training Corps on campus.

Jacobus was one of only six midshipmen from more than 2,000 applicants from across the U.S. and the Naval Academy to be selected to serve for two months in a foreign navy in a "hands across the sea" exchange.

> The ship he served on was the HMS "Brazen," an anti-submarine frigate that's also the duty ship of His Royal Highness Prince Andrew, of Great Britain.

> "The first thing everyone wants to know is. What kind of a guy is he'," said Jacobus, lean and clean cut. "The second is, Just how did you address him?

"He's a very nice, personable guy. He introduced himself to me in the wardroom. He just came up, stuck out his hand and said 'Hi, I'm H' 'H' is the way he prefers to be addressed in very informal situations. Semi-formal it's Prince Andrew and in formal situations it's Your Highness, But most of the time on board ship it's just 'H' Which, of course, is short for His Royal Highness

"I'm working to reduce spending against our part of the country to subsidize water projects out West. That shouldn't be financed by Michigan taxpayers."

Hertel says he didn't draw up the plan for redistricting, and that he too lost part of his district in the reapportionment. He says he has worked hard in congress to deter

"They were always telling me the story of an American and British ship passing in the Atlantic. The British ship wires to the U.S. vessel, 'How do you like being part of the second largest Navy in the world? The U.S. ship wires back. Just fine. How do you like being part of the second best Navy in the world?' I was always getting gas because I was the only Yank on board, but they treated me just great. Made me feel like I was part of the family, and I'd do it again in a minute.

One day, 'H' approached Peter to ask the correct spelling of his last name. Later, he received a formal, royal invitation to the "Royal Tournament," an annual British military pageant involving paratroopers, Marine bands, marching and displays of military skill.

"Prince Andrew would often take members of the ship's company ashore on the weekend for liberty," said Jacobus. "This time it was three officers and two enlisted men. We were invited to sit in the Royal Box at the Royal Tournament and stay overnight at Buckingham Palace. We boarded his helicopter, nicknamed 'The Hussy', (Brazen Hussy) and flew to London, about 140 miles away. We flew up the Thames, made a left at Big Ben and landed in the royal gardens. Queen Elizabeth watched us from a window and Prince Edward, his younger brocher, came out to meet us. They both then took us on a tour of the gardens. They were magnificent and included a pond with flamingos in it. Also, the Queen's pet Corgis had the run of the grounds."

Peter, Prince Andrew and the others then drove by limosine to the Royal Tournament, where the 10 of them sat in the Royal box.

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"The pageant was magnificent," said Peter. "The most amazing part is where a highly trained Army team dragged a 1,600 lb. cannon behind them, would break it down on the run, flip its 900 lb. bar-rel over a five-foot-high wall, catch it and re-assemble it, all the while on the run. They did this twice, up and down a field the size of our football field, all in a matter of about two minutes.'

After the tournament, they returned to the palace for dinner. According to Peter, his room was the size of most houses. "My uniform was laid out, my shoes polished and my bath was drawn," he said. "Dinner was held in the Chinese dining room. It seats about 200, but there were only 10 of us. And 10 servants to wait on us." Dinner consisted of a fish appetizer, roast beef and a magnificent raspberry mousse served in an enormous silver bowl, filled with fresh rasp-

Afterwards, they retired to a sitting room to relax and chat. "Prince Andrew asked me about my parents, schooling and Grosse Pointe," said Peter. "He talked about his family, the new child to be born to Prince Charles and Princess Di and a few sea stories about the Falklands War with Argentina. He didn't say too much, but I believe he was proud that he served.'

Peter and the other crewmen had the run of the palace, and were allowed to go anywhere they chose. Peter was fascinated by the aisles of china, silver, paintings and weapons given to the royal family by governments around the world. "The china was just magnificent," said Peter. "The most beautiful pieces I've ever seen. And the original paintings are not to be believed.'

The next morning, they were awakened by porters who laid out their uniforms and drew their baths. Breakfast with Prince Andrew consisted by "anything you could think of."

They all then boarded the "Hussy" and returned to the "Brazen," but not before Prince Andrew had taken a photo of the men with the helicopter while it sat in back of Buckingham Palace.

Were there any last messages from the Prince when Peter returned to the U.S.? "Well, yes," said Peter, with a smile. "He wished me luck with my naval career and said I'd make a fine officer. He also asked me if I'd send him an autographed photo of the USC cheerleaders.

"After all he's done for me, it's the least I can do."

Weichli said strong retail areas force service industries out by forc-ing up rents. The corollary of that is weak retail areas can't force out service businesses because they can afford the rents of small retailers, he added.

Edward Kiska, president of the Hill Association, was only one of two speakers who favored the zoning change. Retailers "are getting out," he said. "As soon as the retailers all get out, the area collapses.

"What do you want people to do?" Kiska continued. "Do you want them to have a retail place, or do you want them to go the Seven-Mack or Eastland?"

Councilman MaryAnne Ghesquire made the tabling motion, which was supported by Councilman Bruce Rockwell. The first motion called for a 30-day tabling, but after discussion, not allowed on a tabling motion under parlimentary procedure, the date was extended to Oct. 1. Councilmen Joseph Fromm, Nancy Waugaman and Gail Kaess voted against the motion.

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
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
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St. Clair home hit by B&E


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

Businessman Steiner hospitalized

Long-time area businessman and politician Erv Steiner suffered a heart attack Monday, Aug. 6, one day before he breezed in unopposed as the Republican candidate for the District I county commission seat.

The 61-year old Farms resident was in his office, at the Esquire Theater on Jefferson Avenue in the Park, when he became ill and called for help, said Phillip Costa, Park fire chief.

"He arrested (his heart stopped) once while on the way to St. John Hospital and our men brought him to with cardiopulmonary resuscitation," said Costa. "He arrested

again at the hospital where doctors aided him."

Steiner represented the First District from 1970 to 1982 when the county board of commissioners was a 27-member legislative body. But in 1981 voters approved legislature's recommendation of the Michigan Home Rule Charter which reduced the board to 15 members and realigned the districts.

As a result, Steiner found himself challenged by another Republican for his long-held seat and eventually lost to Barbara Gattorn in the primary. She, in turn, was defeated that November by former state senator John Hertel for the

seat which Hertel hopes to retain this time around in the November election against Steiner.

Steiner recently attributed his return to politics as the result of GOP officials and civic organizations' encouragement and said his experience and expertise would definitely help the people of the district.

Chip Steiner, his son, said his father is in stable condition and recuperating. He preferred not to comment on any political plans at this time

Inquiries can be made at 823-1555, he added.



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
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
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Income tax a fall issue?

Whether the controversy over the 1983 income tax increase will be an important political issue in November remains a matter of dispute between the Republicans and the Democrats after last week's primary election.

THE TAX ISSUE apparently was not a major factor in the primary defeat of three House members who were voted out of office, since two of them had voted against the 38 percent tax increase that set off the controversy last year. House speaker Gary Owen, Ypsilanti Democrat, said the tax issue was "almost non-existent" in the primary

But House Minority Leader Michael Busch, Saginaw Republican, had a different view. He predicted the November election would be "a referendum" on Gov. James Blanchard and the Democrats, with the tax hike being a critical part of the campaign. He said the anti-tax and anti-Blanchard feeling "is still there" and said the Republicans had their best chance in 20 years to take control of the House.


The two party chairmen also disagreed on the tax issue. Rick Wiener, Democratic Party chief, said if Busch "wants to make it a referendum, I think he'll lose and lose badly." But State GOP Party Chairman Spencer Abraham said he hopes the Democrats think the tax issue is dead, adding, "We're always appreciative of people dropping their guards."

It is true, of course, that the income tax rate, which was hiked to 6.35 percent early in 1983. already has dropped to 6.1 percent and will go down to 5.35 percent on Sept. 1 under recently enacted legislation. But the 4.6 percent rate will not be reached until Oct. 1, 1987, which presumably will give the Republicans something to talk about in the coming months.

YET TWO IMPORTANT tax issues fared well in the primary elections in Wayne County. The renewal of county one-mill levy for a five-year period was approved by a big 112,473 to 72,223 margin and the new one-mill levy to bail out the financially beleaguered Detroit Public Library carried by a two-to-one vote. Those issues involved property taxes, not income taxes, of course, but the votes indicate that people will support higher taxes if they want the services such revenues provide.

If the economic recovery continues in Michigan, it is difficult to believe that the 1983 tax controversy will cut much ice with the voters in November, especially since there is already a date certain for the income tax to return to its former 4.6 level and since the rate by then will have come down a full percentage point since it reached its 6.35 peak. Yet the effectiveness of the tax issue for the GOP also will depend on just how well it is used, a factor that will become more apparent when the fall campaign really gets going after Labor Day.

DEMOCRATIC STATE SEN. John Kelly, whose district includes the Pointes, recently wrote in the Grosse Pointe News, "Hopefully, the signing of this conference report (on the income tax rollback bill) will be the final chapter on the 38 percent tax increase debate." The early evidence indicates he was wrong. 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Victories for county reform

Wayne County voters continued to show their support for reform of county government by approving two important issues in last week's primary. One authorizes the elimination of the Wayne County Road Commission and the other continues the one-mill levy for another five years. Both of these important contributions to improved county government were easily apas proved.

AS A RESULT OF the vote, County Executive William Lucas now has 60 days to reorganize the road commission and place it under general ein county government. The functions of the road commission will be consolidated into a larger county department of public service under Lucas' overall direction but the board of county commissioners will have final say about the \$170 million road commission budget.

The county executive originally had proposed a charter amendment to give himself more control over the road commission budget, but he failed to get enough signatures to petitions to put it on the hallot As a result I no ported the charter amendment submitted by County Commissioner John Hertel of Harper Woods, whose district includes the Pointes, and Commissioner Arthur Carter of Detroit. The plan was approved 116,826 to 58,778.

The one-mill county tax renewal also passed easily by a 112,473 to 72,223 vote. It assures the county about \$20 million a year for five years.

The funds are essential to balancing the county's \$196-million-a-year budget, according to Lucas, and the voters obviously agreed with his opinion.

Lucas also could claim some credit for a third victory for good government in the county primary. He campaigned against County Commissioner Joseph Jurkiewicz who lost the Democratic nomination in the 15th District to W. Curt Boller, a Brownstown Township supervisor. But in the 12th District, Lucas wasn't as successful in attacking Kay Beard, who won renomination. Lucas claimed both had opposed efforts to re-

form county government. YET LUCAS DID win one argument with Ms. Beard. A Wayne County Circuit Court ruling has reaffirmed his power to lease Wayne County General Hospital to end its drain on county resources. Ms. Beard has led the faction on the county board that has tried to keep the hospital under county control.

Nobody ever said it would be easy to reform county government. And it is proving to be as difficult as expected. Many vested interests, ranging from labor unions to companies that have done business with the county, preferred the status quo and the special status they enjoyed. But slowly and surely Lucas and his supporters on the county board are bringing order out of the chaos in county government and reducing its drain on county resources. And important steps to achieve those goals were taken in the primary

Why the light primary vote?

A primary election ought to be as important as a general election and, in some instances at least, a primary can be more important than a general election. If first-rate candidates don't win in the primary, they do not make it to the fall election and the voters are left with a Hobson's choice of picking one of two undistinguished candidates or not voting at all in November. Yet primary elections in Michigan seldom draw much of a turnout and last week's voting was among the lightest in recent history

Wayne County officials estimated that only about 18 percent of the registered voters went to the polls and statewide less than 25 percent cast their ballots. Even in Grosse Pointe, where people pride themselves on performing their civic duties, only 16.5 percent of the eligible voters went to the polls.

WHY IS THERE SUCH A small turnout in Mi-

chigan primaries?

This year a major cause was the lack of competition for many offices. In fact, there was only one statewide contest, the one between Republicans Jack Lousma and Jim Dunn for the privilege of running against Sen. Carl Levin, the Democratic incumbent, in November. Yet that contest, as bitter as it became, apparently did little to attract votes even in Republican Grosse Pointe.

A second reason is the fact that the Democrats are almost assured of winning most county-wide races. The Democrats are so strongly in control that the Republicans do not offer candidates for some offices or put up only token opposition. And incumbent Democrats seldom are seriously challenged in the primary, with the result that some county officials are reelected time and again without any opposition.

A third reason is that congressional and even some local districts have been gerrymandered in order to prevent the election of Republicans in Wayne County. As an example of gerrymandering, we have cited earlier the attaching of Grosse Pointe Park and Grosse Pointe City to Rep. George Crockett's strongly Democratic 13th District territories in Detroit. The split leaves the Farms, the Shores and the Woods in Rep. Dennis

Hertel's 14th District, makes the Pointes a smaller proportion of the total vote in each district and benefits the Democratic Party.

In addition to candidates, there were two important issues on the primary ballot for Wayne County. They were the extension of the five-year one-mill levy and the abolition of the Wayne County Road Commission. Both measures passed easily but apparently did little to attract widespread voting, probably because there was little organized resistance to either issue.

Voting will be much heavier in November, of course, because of the presidential election. With President Reagan leading the public opinion polls in this state, Michigan Republicans will be pushing for a huge vote in the hope that Senate candidate Lousma and perhaps several new GOP candidates for Congress will be able to ride to victory on Reagan's coattails. The GOP also hopes to recapture the state House.

The Democrats have other ideas and have hopes of carrying the state for former Vice President Walter Mondale, Sen. Levin and the incumbent Democratic congressmen as well as holding control of the state House. With Michigan a chief battleground in the national campaign, both parties will be spending vast amounts of time and money. That will mean more votes in both parties.

In addition to the nonpartisan nominees chosen in the primary, the November ballot also will list candidates for state Supreme Court, state board of education and the ruling bodies of the University of Michigan, Wayne State and Michigan State. These nominees will be chosen by party conventions but will run as nonpartisan candi-

THIS IS A FOOLISH method of picking nominees for these offices, and particularly for the Supreme Court. It tends to favor people whose names are well-known for political success and not necessarily those best qualified as judges. Former U.S. Sen. Robert Griffin, for example, is reportedly seeking one of the nomina-tions from the GOP. A good senator, or a fine governor, may not always be the best qualified person for the court.

From any point around the island's perimeter, there is a breathtaking view of both the Canadian and Detroit skylines. Try hitting it at a point around the Detroit Yacht Club at sundown. It's memorable and compares well to any mind picture of scenes that have impressed you.

It's reassuring to see how well the island holds its age. Old attractions still lure. People today, as others did in other years, picnic under the spreading limbs of trees grown lush and lovely with time. They still canoe on the lagoon, play ball on the diamonds, bicycle, visit the zoo and museums just as past generations did. A trip to Belle Isle is like going back in time. Happily Belle Isle is a freeze-frame of what

was, and still is. Cruising farther down Jefferson, the summer sightseer has a view of the five cylindrical imposing towers of Renaissance Center. And they are impressive jetting up against a sky that casts intriguing shadows of purple, crimson or gray, according to the time of day.

Hart Plaza is another sight worth visiting in the summer. Located at the foot of Woodward, named for the late U.S. Senator, it stretches out toward the river. This historic corner of Detroit is just yards from the point at which Cadillac came ashore in 1701.

The plaza is a perfect urban riverfront park, a dramatic and sweeping open plaza. There is an unencumbered view of the river

The Horace Dodge memorial fountain at the plaza's center sends sheets of water cascading over its sculpture, symbolizing the mighty engines the city builds.

All summer long the Plaza bustles with activity — ethnic festivals, concerts, dance recitals and other featured entertainment.

One of the best ways to view the transformation of this section of old Detroit into a vital and determined effort to refurbish the area and assume its rightful place on the river as an outstanding attraction, is to take a ride on the trolley car.

To be sure you will see some familiar sites but rocking along in this colorful, open air trolley you

will acquire a new perspective.

The trolley itself is a 16-seat import from Portugal. It offers an exciting experience as it toots along from Washington Boulevard to the RenCen. Images of a "new city"

are everywhere. Another day you might like to drive back down Jefferson and go through the only international tunnel in the world to Windsor. So closely connected are the two countries, U.S. and Canada, it is difficult to think of Canada as a foreign country. Actually in the true sense of the word, it is not. ferry will take you over to Bob-Lo. You can sit on the open upper deck and enjoy the summer sun as you cruise across the river. While the rides in the amusement park may not be of interest, the trip on the train that takes you around the island is enjoyable. What is commonly known as Bob Lo Island, the amusement park, is but a small part of the whole island.

Another rewarding trip to the land across the river is one that takes you to Pointe Pelee. This nine by four mile point is famous for good fishing and swimming. There are trails and picnic areas. Depending on which side of the island you visit, you can view a turbulent lake or move to the other side and enjoy a view of the lake at its placed best.

If you like to walk, you'll enjoy the opportunity to walk miles out into a wildlife protected marsh to observe the plants and wildlife. If you'd rather, you can rent a boat and row around the many inlets and outlets. If you go, don't miss climbing the tower at the scene that gives you a view of miles of countryside.

A bonus of this trip is driving along fields lush with melons, peaches, corn and tomatoes. The best feature is the opportunity to buy some of them to take home. There are no melons anywhere that beat Canadian honeyrocks. The tomatos are special too. Perhaps that is why one of the largest tomato processing plants in the country is located there.



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Drifter convicted of Pongrace murder

More than a year of agonized waiting for a Grosse Pointe family came to an end last week when a Montana jury found a 23-year-old drifter guilty of first degree murder in the death of their son.

The 11 woman, one man jury in Missoula, Mont. needed only two hours to find Scott David Steel, of Twin Falls, Idaho, guilty in the July 14, 1983 murder of Frederick Pongrace in Glacier National Park,

Pongrace, 31, was the son of Otto and Elizabeth Pongrace, of the City. Steel was also found guilty of theft on government property and inter-state transportation of a stolen vehicle. He faces life imprisonment on the murder convic-

Steel's trial began on Tuesday. Aug. 7, and was concluded on Thursday, Aug. 9 before Judge Russel Smith, according to Special Agent in Charge John Campbell, of the Butte, Montana office of the

Steel will be sentenced on Friday, Sept. 14, in Missoula. He had been the subject of an intense manhunt by the FBI and police in the western states since Pongrace's body was found at the bottom of a 180-foot cliff in Glacier National Park 14 months ago.

An initial autopsy had established that he was alive when he fell over the cliff, but a subsequent autopsy established that he died previously of stab wounds before being pushed over the precipice. Police officials at that time suspected he had been murdered because the keys to his Volkswagon van, money and travelers checks were missing from his fully clothed body.


The authorities quickly established that Steel was their suspect after discovering that Pongrace

had picked up him and his dog while they hitchhiked about 60 miles east of Glacier the day before. Pongrace, who had just been honorably discharged from the Coast Guard, was on his way to the Pacific Northwest to visit friends when be befriended Steel.

The day after Pongrace's murder, a tow truck operator in Pablo. Mont. told police he pulled the dead man's van out of the mud along a roadway and was paid for the job with an expensive camera that later proved to belong to Pongrace.

At that time, authorities believed Steel was driving the van south to California where he reportedly had relatives. Several possessions belonging to Pongrace were recovered from the Los Angeles home of Steel's sister. The van was also recovered in the city when police discovered two men stripping it.

Police were unable at that time-

vestigations by Healy, Fronczak, Darlington and then-clerk Ms. Renard the three arrests were made quickly, Vitale said.

According to Sgt. Mike Dawson. of the St. George Police Department. Steel was arrested without incident when he gave himself up at the urging of an uncle. According to reports, Steel was wearing the same backpack he was carrying when he was picked up by Pongrace a year earlier.

"We're awfully glad he got the penalty that he did," said Mrs. Pongrace, in a telephone interview. "It doesn't make things any easier on our end. We still miss Fred and it won't ever bring him back, but at least no one else will be hurt by this murderer. Justice is served."

"I was asked to go out the trial," said Otto Pongrace, "and I was only on the stand a few minutes, just enough to identify my son's belongings and tell of his background. I stayed outside of the courtroom, for the most part. Most of the testimony was too painful to hear. I kept looking at Steel, but he never looked at me. Of course, they had


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
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Heart of Gold winner dies

When she received the Heart of Gold Award from the United Foundation in 1982, Julie Ann Dimercurio said she had "a strong faith that my life has a purpose and that I must do what I can to help others who have cystic fibrosis.

Mrs. Dimercurio, formerly of the Pointe, lately of St. Clair Shores, lost her fight against the nation's number one genetic killer last Friday afternoon, Aug. 10, in Bon Secours Hospital. She turned 27 last month

The daughter of Alfred and Bernice Van Tiem of the Woods, Mrs. Demercurio was born and raised in Grosse Pointe. She is survived by her parents, her husband Frank, her mother-in-law Rosalia Dimercurio, and two sisters, Mrs. Nancy Rashid and Mrs. Donna Salvaggio. Four of Mrs. Dimercurio's brothers and sisters were also killed by cystic fibrosis.

Cystic fibrosis is a genetic degenerative disease with no known cure that affects the respiratory and digestive system. The disease usually strikes during infancy and kills its victims before they reach their teens.

Mrs. Dimercurio was one of nine recipients of the Heart of Gold Award in 1982 in recognition of her dedication and community service. She volunteered five to 50 hours a week to the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation of Metropolitan Detroit as secretary of the board of directors and member of the public relations, administration and resource development committees.

In 1981, she was chairman of "Kiss Your Baby Week." Excessive salt in perspiration can be a sign of cystic fibrosis and the state-wide campaign was to make parents aware of this symptom.

In addition, she was honored as Volunteer of the Month by United Community Services in 1981, appeared on radio and television and was the 1981 poster representative

"A long time ago, I decided that I love life, and I plan to help others and also enjoy every minute I can "she said in a 1982 interview. "So far, I've beaten the odds because most CF victims die before or during their teens.

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

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

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

Teacher's firing upheld by tenure panel film "Guyana Tragedy: The Jim Jones Story" to his seventh and

The state Tenure Commission, in an unusual unanimous decision. last month upheld the firing of Parcells Middle School teacher Frank Creelman on the grounds he was insubordinant and his conduct resulted "in harm to the school, staff and students."

Creelman, a shop and social studies teacher for 14 years, was fired in 1981 after a shouting match with a school administrator. There were 14 charges leveled against him at local hearings on his dismissal, including allegations that he secretly tape recorded conversations with administrators, fought with other teachers and removed school property from the building.

The five-member Tenure Commission, which has been reviewing the case since 1981, ruled unanimously that Creelman's appeal of his dismissal be denied.

Before he was fired, school administrators had sued Creelman in Wayne County Circuit Court because he had secretly recorded their conversations with a small tape machine in his shirt pocket. The court fined Creelman \$500 and ordered him to stop the practice.

The Tenure Commission found that Creelman had continued to tape conversations with the school principal in its investigation into his alleged insubordination. It also found he was insubordinate in refusing to answer administrator's questions as to why he showed the

Huron could lose its last marsh

marsh along Lake Huron in American waters is on the endangered list, writes Kenneth S. Lowe in "To Save a Marsh, A Special Report," in Michigan Outof-Doors magazine.

The Maisou Island marsh, located in Saginaw Bay, has suffered losses of more than 2,000 acres from 1949 to 1978, according to Lowe, editor of Michigan Out-of-Doors. Since that time there have been massive dieouts of cattails and the waterfowling area has been greatly reduced, thereby reducing the num-

ber of ducks. In an effort to save the marsh, a resource management team has been brought in to conduct studies aimed at determining the cause of waterfowl habitat deterioration in the island area.

rick Payne and Joel Schaeffer, of Midwest Water Resource Management, plan to investigate a number of possible causes for the marsh destruction, including the high-water theory of the Depart-ment of Natural Resources. Other theories are the intrusion of insects, rough fish activity, pesticides or other toxins or diseases, and sedimentation.

According to Lowe, the conventional explanation for the marsh destructin by the DNR has been high water conditions, but Payne and Schaeffer do not believe that would be the sole cause.

The scientists point out that in 1977 and 1978 lake levels were only about a tenth or twotenths of a foot above the 80-year average lake level and more than two feet lower than the record highs of 1973-74. More importantly, they say, marsh losses were very high in shallow, protected em-bayment areas.

Payne speculates that sedimentation may be the biggest culprit. "Because the sedimentation problem appears to be a recent development, we suspect it may figure significantly in marsh losses," he says.

To counter sediment deposition, Payne has tentatively recom-mended that at least two man-made cuts --Dynamite and Boxcar be blocked to halt sediment transport into embayment marshes, which would accom-

First, he says, it would stop the depositing of silt on the remaining cattails; second, it would protect waterfowl food plants like pond weeds and

plish several things.

The last big natural wild celery; third, it would save fish-spawning areas from becoming covered with silt; and finally, it would even help snails, a food

for diving ducks. Before the scientists can begin their marshrestoration program, however, DNR ap-proval would have to be obtained and before the DNR would offer a permit, the propsal would have to be submitted to

public hearings. Payne and Schaeffer are being retained by the Saginaw Valley Chapter of the Michigan Duck Hunters Association, who began the Maisou Island project in February 1983.

The Saginaw Valley Waterfowlers have already invested nearly \$5,000 in the project. A proposal for a \$16,975 grant under the Coastal Zone Management Act has been submitted to

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Dutch elm casualties decrease in 1984

There's some good news and bad news about Dutch Elm disease this year in the Pointes.

The good news is, fewer trees will be removed this year than last because they contracted the fungal disease.

The bad news is, there are fewer elm trees around to contract DED, which has decimated the area in the past few years.

There were 580 trees removed last year by cities because of Dutch Elm, but only 407 have been removed or tagged for removal so far this year, a substantial drop.

year, a substantial drop.
City residents lost 70 trees last year, but only 63 so far this year, while the Farms took down 88 in 1984, down from 109 last year. The Park tagged 140 trees for removal this year, down from 172 last year. The Shores removed 29 diseased trees last year, but only 10 so far this year. The Woods, which lost about 200 elms last year, removed about 100 diseased trees this year.

Losses to the disease have decreased because there are fewer trees left to contract the fungal disease that attacks the water-conducting system of all native elm species, according to Grosse Pointe Shade Tree Council chairman Al Mazur.

A pattern that has developed in other parts of the country shows that after a decade of steadily increasing losses to DED, the casualties drop off one year and slowly decrease afterward, Mazur said. The Park experienced a drop of about 50 percent in its loss from 1982 to 1983, he added. Mazur is also vice-chairman of the Park's Beautification Commission.

In 1982, the Park lost about 350 trees to DED. The next year, 172 were taken down, Mazur said.

The greater distance between existing elms works in their favor, according to Woods tree commission member Barbara Hayes. The disease can be carried by elm bark of leaf beetles or can be transmitted through the soil, she said. The farther apart the trees, the less likely an elm will contract DED from a diseased peighbor.

from a diseased neighbor.

Dutch Elm Disease literally strangles a tree. The fungus clogs the water-conducting system within a tree, blocking the passage of liquid and nutrients. The first signs of the disease can be wilting or dying leaves along one or two branches in the crown of the tree. The disease quickly spreads and can, if contracted in the spring, kill a tree by the end of summer.

To combat the disease, a spring spraying to kill the beetles is done. Affected branches are trimmed out as soon as they begin to show signs



Officials suspect this once grand tree, around which the Grosse Pointe News office was built, has Dutch Elm Disease and may condemn it later this year. "With more than 40 percent of it dead, it's an ideal site for beetle debris," says Larry Shock, of Shock Brothers Tree Service. "It's a miracle it's lasted this long, the tree has been starving to death for a number of years in that small area."

of the disease and an injection of fungicide is made to block further spreading of the disease within the tree

The Shade Tree Council has been following the ravages of DED and collecting information on the losses as well as the methods of treatment and prevention. Last year, the council sponsored a hand-on seminar for residents to show the method of injecting trees, Mazur said.

Spraying programs are done municipally by some cities while others leave it to individual homeowners. Some cities also have reforestation programs to replace lost trees at city expense.

There is no variety of tree that can match the elm in shape, size and the fullness of its crown, Mrs. Hayes and Mazur agree. An elmlined street can, even in the middle of summer, provide the cool solemnity of a Baroque church nave, Mazur added.

Some research has been done to see why certain elms are attacked while others are not, Mazur said. One hypothesis is that a stressed tree, one not in the best condition, will emit a pheromone, a hormonal attractant, that will draw bark beetles to it.

Stress for a tree, like a person, comes from a variety of sources. Injury, noise, pollution and poor care can lower a tree's resistance. To be in its best shape, an elm should be watered and periodically fertilized and trimmed, Mrs. Haves and Mazur said

Hayes and Mazur said.

To water a tree, set a hose on a

slow trickle and set it near the "drip-line" of the tree, where rain would normally fall from branches after a rain. Leave the hose running for four to five hours to thoroughly saturate the ground.

As elms have been removed, cities have tried to replace them with other varieties of trees that are more tolerant of urban conditions. Grosse Pointe City offers residents who have lost elms the opportunity to have a new tree planted at no expense to them, according to community development coordinator Chris Matthew.

"Our main objective is to plant the same number of trees that we remove," Ms. Matthew said. Six varieties are offered by the city to residents, including the Sugar maple, Crimson King maple, Marshall Seedless ash, Hybrid Skyline locust, Little Leaf linden and the Pin oak. Other varieties that residents request are investigated to determine their ability to survive

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in urban settings, she added.
The Woods has a tree-planting program, where city and federal money is used to plant a variety of trees throughout the city. Trees

money is used to plant a variety of trees throughout the city. Trees planted are not necessarily in locations where one has been removed, however, Mrs. Hayes said.

The Shores also replants trees lost to Dutch Elm when the budget allows, village officials said.

There are a variety of trees that one can plant to try to replace the elm, according to Mazur and Mrs. Hayes. Both agreed that seedless ash was a good choice, because it was fast growing and offered a large crown for shade.

Another variety is the Northern Red Oak, Mazur said. Although slower-growing than the elm, it closely matches the umbrella-like upper foliage of the elm that makes the elm popular. Another beautiful tree is the Sweet Gum, according to Mrs. Hayes.

The Park has started an arboretum at Patterson Park, where a variety of trees have been planted, Mazur said. While acting as living memorials, the trees also offer people a chance to decide what they might like in their yards, he said.

There are a variety of trees offered for sale in the spring by the Woods tree and Park beautification commissions. Buyers can choose trees for fall color, disease resistance, size, shape and almost anything else desired.

There will always be a place for the elm in the urban forest, Mazur said. About 10 varieties of elm have been developed that are disease resistant, he added, noting that resistance is the same as being immune.

The latest disease-resistant strain is the American Liberty Elm, from which the Elm Research Institute is developing seedlings. The institute said the American Liberty is the first American elm variety to be developed that is not a hybrid of Asian or Japanese species, which have neither the hardiness nor the vase-like stature of the American variety.





Alumni celebrate 30 years of Children's Theater

They came from near and far to honor their star. Well, she's not exactly a star in the "spotlight on me" tradition. But Sally Reynolds, founder and director of the Grosse Pointe Children's Theater, has had a starring role in the lives of hundreds of GPCT alumni.

So much so that many of them re-turned to the Pointe Aug. 3 from around the country and Europe to honor her when the GPCT celebrated its 30th anniversary.

Sally's living room, in her comfortable Grayton Road home, still shows the memories of that festive occasion. Congratulatory telegrams sit in bunches on tables, proclamations decorate the piano, helium filled balloons bounce against the ceiling and giant posters adorned with "Peanut" characters shout the occasion

Sitting in a circle around Sally last week were four GPCT alumnae who lingered to say goodbye to "their" director, the person who taught them how to be disciplined on the stage and at ease with themselves in real life.

They included Sally's daughter, Cindy Reynolds-Connors, who currently works for radio station WHYT-FM; Barbara Gilstorf, who works as a director in Annapolis, Md.; Gwen Humble-McShane, an actress in Los Angeles, who has appeared on such programs as "Remington Steele," "Three's Company" and "Movieola;" and Juliet Mazer-Schmidt, who lives in the Farms and is the mother of 4-yearold Kenny, who's already got three performances in the GPCT under

"Juliet is just following the example her mother set for her," said Sally, with a smile."Her mother, Mrs. John Mazer, has been the musical director of our theater for well over 20 years. We'd be lost without her."

"Kenny will be 4 next month, but he started with Mrs Reynolds when he was only five months old," said Juliet. "He's already told me one of the roles he wants to play is that of "Fagan," because Mrs. Reynolds said its a good character

"That's the way we all started,"

said Gwen. "We've all grown up in the same area and we all started with Sally. I was 13 when I began, Juliet was 5, Cindy was with the theater from ages 4 through 18 and Barbara started when she was 13, like me. People who are unfamiliar with the theater and its reputation think, 'oh, it's just a kids theater.' But Sally really gives it a polished, theatrical look. The kids realize it after they see the finished product. It's not amateurish at all.

"It's been fun, for all of us, and a lot of work, too," said Cindy, smil-ing at her mother. "It was some-times rough for me, because if I got a good role, they'd think it was because of favoritism. If mom yelled at someone, they'd later yell at me, wanting to know 'what my mother was doing?' She always went out of her way to make sure there was no favoritism. That meant I sometimes got lost in the crowd scenes. but I loved every minute of it."

"You can't always be in the spotlight," said Sally, with a wave of her hand. "I've had 30 years of stage mothers coming up and asking for their child to get the lead role, but I believe in putting children through the gamut. That way they can handle anything.'

"Every word of what she said is true," said Barbara, with a laugh. 'I remember once I had the lead in 'Annie Get Your Gun.' The next play was the 'Wizard of Oz.' I got to play the two feet of the dead witch sticking out from beneath the Remember

They all laughed. Sally reminded them that her actors and actresses over the years were involved with all aspects of theater, from acting to painting flats and helping with lighting. "It teaches them every-thing in theater, so they can handle anything that comes along," she

said.
"I enjoy working with children.
You can mold them when they're young. I believe God gave all of us a talent. We all have gifts from God and they're all worthwhile. I believe God wants us to use these talents to make the world a better place. My talent is that I was given the chance to help children do great things. They, and we, all

While Ms. Reynolds has centered most of her abilities here in the Pointe, she's always been disappointed that there aren't more children's theaters in the country.

"It's disheartening that there are so few people trained to work with young people in children's theater, anywhere," said Sally. "I'd like to see it expand to other cities, such as Kalamazoo. I'd be willing to work there as an assistant director, seamtress, lighting

director, set director or anything else to help get it established. It's such important work.'

"It's rough work, too," said Gwen, as the others nodded in agreement. "The kids today seem rougher than we were. They need more discipline and don't like being yelled at or given direction. But it pays off in the long run.

"You'd better believe we all got A's in our college speech classes." said Juliet, with a smile.

Now that the party is over, and the telegrams are put away for posterity, it's time to get back to work for Sally. She's lost track of the number of plays that she's directed, but another one looms on

the horizon. "I've had requests from the War Memorial, where we stage our plays, to produce either 'Annie' or 'Little Women.' I suppose we'll start interviewing for the play this month," said Sally, settling back in

her easy chair.
"I've even been thinking of starting to include some of our now

grown up alumnae in some of the plays, so they'll be appearing with their own children. Wouldn't that be something?

'It's true that I've been doing this for 30 years, but as far as I'm concerned it's only the 'first 30 years.' Now I'll start on my se-

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
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


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From Another Pointe Of View



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
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'Galatea' soars in California

When Philip Lewis Lewandowski's daughter, Marcie, came to visit her grandfather, Vincent P. Lewis, and step-grandmother, Ella C. Lewis, of Hillcrest Road, last week, she brought with her from California pictures and tales of her sculptor father's latest work. Galatea, shown above front and side in her pre-cast plaster state, is now the 1,000-pound bronze centerpiece of a multi-acre convalescent hospital and rest home complex in Ventura, Calif. The sea green sea nymph stands five feet tall, skimming over the surface of her "ocean" on a manta ray. She is named for a sea nymph of classical mythology. The original Galatea was sculpted by Pygmalion, who fell in love with his creation. His statue, through the power of his love, came to life. Lewandowski's Galatea was inspired by the woman in Bruce Walter Barton's story "The Tree at the Center of the World," a castaway for years on San Nicholas Island after its evacuation in 1835. Lewandowski, born and raised in The Pointe, studied at the Art Center School of Los Angeles, then worked with a major Southern California statuary casting firm. He decided to go it alone in 1970, moving to Los Osos, Calif., and beginning to create the one-of-a-kind commissioned pieces of which Galatea is his latest example.

This struggle took place throughout the turbulent 18th and 19th centuries which saw Poland, once the largest state in Europe, politically dissected by three successive partitions between Russia, Prussia and Austria.

Estates were confiscated, individuals deported. Polish universities in Warsaw and Wilno were closed. Use of the Polish language was discouraged. Great numbers of Poles went into exile in France, among them composer Frederic Chopin and poets Adam Mickiewicz and Juliusz Slowacki.
Efforts to regain independence in

1863 resulted in executions, deportations to Siberia and other measures designed to weaken the remaining Polish gentry. Only in the aftermath of World War I was Poland re-established as an indepen-

Through this long period of foreign domination, the residents of Warsaw and Cracow, as well as Poles in exile, clung to their common language, cultural traditions and dream of a reunited motherland which provide the subject of many paintings in the exhibition.

Harvest time in Michigan

Michigan food shoppers will find this August to be one of the most economical months of the year. A wide selection of seasonal stateproduced fruits and vegetables is coming to market, beef and pork prices are relatively low, poultry prices are steady and egg prices are substantially lower than they were several months ago.

August means blueberries and peaches to many shoppers. Both crops look good this year, and the carry-over of frozen blueberries is large - so look for more blueberries to be marketed fresh this season. Plan to make volume blueberry purchases during early August, when peak supplies are

Peach production for the United States is forecast at 2.50 billion

pounds, a 40 percent increase over last year's crop. Forty-five million pounds of that crop, a 10-millionpound increase over the state crop a year ago, will be from Michigan.

Peach harvest started in late July, but no real volume occurs until the Garnet Beauty ripens, about Aug. 10. A number of varieties which ripen at different times in various locations around the state lengthen the peach season to mid-September. Peak season for the state crop will occur Aug. 15 to 29, when the popular Red Haven variety is available.

Late summer apples make their debut near the end of August. Paulared (Paula Red) is a relatively new Michigan variety which has received rave reviews.

Pointer of Interest

They're men and women, 56 volunteers from 27 metropolitan area communities last school year. They've been trained in art history and classroom teaching techniques. They're the team that takes the Detroit Institute of Arts into fourth, fifth and sixth grade public, private and parochial school classrooms throughout the metropolitan area, giving 50 minute presenta-tions on such subjects as American, Ancient, African, Native American, Asian and Modern Art.

They're the DIA's Art to the Schools volunteers, and last school year they gave 1,181 art talks to 36,407 children in 61 different communities.

They're people like Ellen Kerfoot, who "saw a little notice in the Grosse Pointe News" a few years back, and decided to check it out.

Ellen, mother of five, married to an M.D. (Dr. Edward Kerfoot), is a Registered Nurse. "I'm not working right now," she says - meaning at her profession. No mother of five could be said to be not working. But she's not tied down to a this-hourto-that-hour working schedule, which means she can juggle her time: find time for some of the things she never had time for be-

Like Art to the Schools. "It appealed to me because with my background, I felt that this part of my education (art and art history) had been neglected." The notice in the News read: "A background in art is not necessary. All one needs is a desire to learn.

ELLEN LEARNED. Art to the Schools' training is thorough and challenging. It is essentially the same training as that given to volunteers working toward qualification as museum Docents, and Art to the Schools volunteers, once in the program, are also qualified as Docents.

Ellen Kerfoot has been in the Art to the Schools program three years now, and she'll be back again this fall. Her presentation focuses on Native American (Indian) Art. She is committed, like all Art to the Schools volunteers, to give her program one day per week. Sometimes, upon request she gives it more than one.

The DIA's Art to the Schools program is free of charge to the schools. This is especially important today, as many schools no longer have funds available for bus trips to the museum. Art to the Schools presentations are designed as dialogues between the students and the speaker. Slides and reproduction "touchables" of DIA art are part of each presentation, uti-



to the Schools "touchables."

lized by every Art to the Schools volunteer.

They're people like Inge Vincent, who read about Art to the Schools five years ago in the Grosse Pointe News. Inge is married to George C. Vincent; between the two of them, they have three grown children.

Inge's background includes work as a legal secretary. She still teaches German every Saturday in the German Saturday School. "It's one of the things I enjoy doing, and now I only do the things I enjoy doing." She enjoys working with young people. That, initially, is why Art to the Schools appealed to

INGE GIVES Art to the Schools' Introduction talk, and she emphasizes that it is an Introduction to Art rather than to the Detroit Institute of Arts. "I introduce the children to the basics of art, to the elements of line, texture, color, to materials and techniques.

She augments the museum "touchables" with her own pieces - a smooth tile, a textured brocade — to illustrate her points. She gave her first Art to the Schools talk at Barnes School in December of 1981. and has kept the blue folder of student "thank-yous" she received after that talk, adding to it over the

Like all Art to the Schools volunteers, Inge, after training, wrote her own program, selecting her own slides and "touchables" from the museum's collection, developing her own theme. Staying, of course, within the area in which she had been trained.

The volunteers are trained in the specific area on which they will speak. They may, after two years, request to be trained in an additional area.

"I loved the training," says Arlene (Mrs. John D.) Lewis, who has just completed it. She goes out on her first Art to the Schools assignments this fall. Her topic is American Art.

ARLENE IS a former high school teacher, mother of three small children. She's the only one of the three pictured above who did NOT discover Art to the Schools through an article in the Grosse Pointe News. (Since she IS and Art to the Schools article in the Grosse Pointe News, we lay claim to her too, however.)

Arlene discovered Art to the Schools at the Detroit Institute of Arts, at a lecture given by Michael Farrell. "Several of the women I met there were in the Art to the Schools program. I became interested in it because it offered something my education hadn't covered.

She's looking forward to her new commitment, anxious to begin, as Inge and Arlene are anxious to begin again. All over the metropolitan area, Art to the School volunteers are gearing up for a new school year. With enthusiasm.

They're men and women, young adults to senior citizens, dedicated to introducing children to the exciting world of people, places and things found in the Detroit Institute of Arts. They're people like you.

Bake in preheated 400° oven 25 minutes. Cut into squares. Sprinkle with paprika and serve very hot. Makes 16 servings.

JAPANESE SHRIMP 1 lb. (about 24) uncooked, medium-sized shrimp

1/4 cup soy sauce 2 Tbsp. tomato juice 1 Tbsp. water 1 Tbsp. cider vinegar 1/2 tsp. ginger Dash cayenne pepper

2 tsp. sugar 1 garlic clove, crushed Peel and devein shrimp. Thread 6 shrimp on each of 4 skewers; place on broiler pan. Combine remaining ingredients in small saucepan and heat to boiling. Reduce heat and simmer 3 minutes, uncovered. Brush shrimp thoroughly with sauce. Broil 4 inches from heat for 2 minutes on each side, or until tender. Baste frequently with sauce. 

COMMISSION ORDER CW. 23: 34 PHEASANT HUNTING REGULATIONS FOR 1984 The Natural Resources Commission, at its

meeting on June 8, 1984, under the authority of Section 11, Chapter II, of Act 286, P.A. 1929, as amended, and Sections 1 and 3 of Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, being Sections 312.11, 300.1, and 300.3 of The Michigan Compiled Laws, established the following pheasant hunting season regulations for 1984. Seasons

Zone 1:

In that part of Menominee County lying south of Highway US-2 and Delta County, south and west of Escanaba River, October 10-20, inclusive.

Zones 2 and 3:

October 20-November 11, inclusive.

Bag Limits Zone 1:

The bag limit shall be restricted to 1 male pheasant per day, 2 in possession, and 4 during the season. Zones 2 and 3

Statutory bag limits shall apply -2 male pheasants per day, 4 in possession, and 8

during the season Pheasants taken in any of the prescribed pheasant put-take areas shall be included in the small game hunter's daily hag and possession limit.

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
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Nutritional needs make a difference to athletes

Dr. Irving Glick, Chairman of the Sportsmedicine Committee for the United States Tennis Association has listed 10 nutrition tips in plain, simple terms to provide readers with essential dietary guidelines during the hot humid days of summer.

While Dr. Glick does recommend wearing a hat and light colored clothing, stretching prior to playing and bringing a container of cold water, he believes these aren't the only precautions one can undertake to counter the effects of the peak performance.

• Maintain a balanced diet. A healthy body is fueled by a proper balance of proteins, carbony fats, vitamins and minerals.

• Consume plenty of carbohydrates. Carbohydrates, such as fruit, vegetables and whole grain breads, are easily and quickly digested to provide the additional energy which an athlete needs for

• Maintain adequate water and mineral levels in the body. Dehydration and cramping may be effectively prevented by consuming one to two cups of water prior to play and by taking short water breaks on a hot summer's after-

• Take time to eat breakfast. Research studies have proven conclusively that both performance and concentration decline without fresh fuel in the morning. Stay

clear of caffeine, as it acts only as a stimulant.

· Avoid sugar. Refined white sugar merely raises the insulin level in the blood for a short period of time. An initial burst of energy is followed by a "rebound effect" with its accompanying fatigue and impaired coordination.

. Do not take salt tablets. A common misconception is that perspiration depletes the body of its necessary sodium. Americans consume more than enough salt in an ordinary, balanced diet.

• Have a banana. Bananas are a wonderful source of carbohydrate energy as they are 95 percent water, and provide a healthy supply of both potassium and magnes-

· Stay away from all that protein. Too much protein taxes the kidneys and while aiding in both tissue repair and muscle growth. does not fuel the body for exer-

· Enjoy the pleasure of pasta Pasta does not produce fat, as most people believe; carbohydrates are stored in the muscles as glycogen. which fuels the body much like high octane gas does a racing car engine.

· Count your calories. Learning to make use of an inexpensive cajorie counter will help you to fuel yourself with just enough energy to meet your particular needs as an active tennis player.

Michigan's top bass fishing lakes revealed

To catch a trophy bass, an angler must first choose a top lake, according to Tom Huggler, who has pinpointed Michigan's 10 top bass fishing lakes for the Michigan Unit-

ed Conservation Clubs. But trying to determine the 10 best bass lakes in the state is like trying to douse a barn fire with a garden hose. Even bringing up the subject with two anglers can provoke an argument equally as hot.

To illustrate the problem. Hugger says that 31 of the biggest large-mouths caught in Michigan

in the past five years have come from 29 different locations. The 25 heaviest smallmouths taken during the same period were caught in 22 different lakes.

Writing for Michigan Out-of-Doors, Huggler sets out his ground rules for choosing snots. They include lakes with a big population of bass 12 inches or longer, a chance to bust a real "lunker," and public access. He also considers only inland lakes generally underfished. large enough to take added pressure and vet small enough to accommodate anglers with small

Here's a short summation of his conclusions:

Heading first to the Upper Peninsula. Huggler says the U.P. is gifted with several outstanding smallmouth lakes, possibly the best one being the Sylvania Tract's Deer Island Lake in Gogebic County Test nettings by the Department of Natural Resources turned up 112 smallmouths that averaged 14.7 inches Access to Deer Island is by cance or light cartopper

For largemouth bass in the U.P. he suggests Twin Lake in Schooleraft County. Bass Lake in Marquette County

In southwestern Michigan, Huggler recommends Guil Lake for the best smallmouth bass and the best largemouth fishing is attributed to Mono in Muskegon County

Closer to home, southeastern Michigan anglers should head to Cass Lake in Oakland County for smallmouths. Huggler said. And, for largemouths, his choice is Belleville Lake in Wayne county.

Tips for bikers entering Superride

different pressure. · Stay in medium gear through

• Do not swerve left or right. That way, you won't be a hazard to persons attempting to pass you.

• Train a bit prior to the bike-athon. You'll then be in the best possible shape to go the entire distance.

· Be alert, look ahead and avoid potholes.

Superride 84 will also take place at Hines Park on Saturday, Sept. 15 and at Grosse Ile and Stoney Creek Metropark on Saturday, Sept. 22.
