I lost a friend while on vacation last week. When I returned to work Monday, I discovered that Charlie Dickson had died Aug. 11, after a long illness.

Charlie was 74, and his newspaper career spanned well over half a century. Although he had been employed by other publications, and indeed, had published his own paper, I'd only known Charlie through his work here at the Grosse Pointe News.

To me, Charlie simply was the News. As much a part of the paper as the giant elm tree that guards our front door. And there were certain things we expected from Charlie. He was punctual, gentlemanly and a very hard worker. Traits he learned from the "old school."

He toiled back in the display advertising department, a fair distance from our newsroom, but you could hear his laughter above the clatter of the typewriters. He simply liked people and his work.

Let me tell you two Charlie Dickson stories. Once, I misplaced a roll of film that had to be "souped" for the next day's edition. I simply couldn't find it, then "envisioned" it on my desk at work.

I raced to the paper, then remembered I couldn't enter without setting off the alarm. So I called Charlie to borrow his alarm key — at two o'clock in the morning.

He met me at the door dressed in a blue bathrobe and a big yawn. He could have been angry, but he wasn't. I was a co-worker in trouble and the paper had to be served.

The film wasn't on my desk at all, but was discovered buried in my glove compartment. Charlie never let me forget it. To him, having something like this to kid me about was worth getting up for in the middle of the night.

But he could take a joke too. At his retirement party, we had a special edition of the Grosse Pointe News printed with the front page devoted to Charlie.

I really let him have it in my "FYI" column. I turned it in to a sort of "Dean Martin Celebrity Roast of Charlie Dickson." One of the more discreet party goers said it was "clever."

It wasn't. I was lewd, crude and highly insulting. Charlie loved it. His laughter let me know I had done a good job of saying good bye.

Just before the party ended, Charlie walked up and quietly handed me a sheet of paper. Written in longhand, it was all the information I needed for his obituary. I write the majority of them here at the paper.

## Too High? Suit Challenges Variance

A group of Park residents unhappy with the variance granted to Bon Secours Hospital and the Detroit Institute of Ophthalmology (DIO), builders of a proposed medical complex at Nottingham and Jefferson, have gone to court to block its completion.

A temporary restraining order and an order to show why the facility shouldn't be finished were filed against the city of Grosse Pointe Park last week, according to Wayne County Circuit Court records. A hearing has been set for next Friday, Aug. 31.

The restraining order restricts the city from issuing building permits for the \$5 million structure that will house the DIO, Bon Secours Ambulatory Surgery Center, physician offices for Ophthalmic Surgeons, P.C., and other private physician offices, until the courts can review the legality of the height variance council granted, said Anita McIntyre, attorney representing the Park citizens.

"It took over a year to get the zoning ordinance and the first variance gets passed," said Ms. McIntyre. "Everytime somebody with a little money comes along, are they (council) going to grant a variance?"

However, Grosse Pointe Park Mayor Palmer Heenan said the council fulfilled every obligation in order to help Bon Secours start its development and that he doesn't see any legal basis for the lawsuit.

"We encouraged input from citizens, adjourned meetings and gave consideration to all their comments like no other council has done," said Heenan. "We changed the plans at their request, recessed the parking lot a foot, changed the lighting and moved the exit from Somerset to Jefferson Avenue.

"I think we did win the support of the majority of citizens," he added.

The issue at question is a 12-foot mechanical equipment room that will perch on the top of the building and will exceed the recently passed zoning ordinance, that limits building height to 30 feet, by 12 feet.

When the project was first presented to council and the community last January by David Benfer, representing the hospital, and Philip Hessberg, M.D., representing the DIO, it was heralded as a shot in the arm for the business strip that serves as a gateway to the Pointes on Jefferson Avenue.

The new building would also replace the old DIO office, an eyesore that has been vacant since the roof mysteriously collapsed in August, 1983.

"This is a chance to change (that location) from semi-blight," said Mayor Heenan. "It would be a credit to our city and would encourage other developers to do something here."

Further into the project and before the variance was granted, city council voted unanimously to establish a Downtown Development Authority (DDA) to revitalize Jefferson Avenue from the Detroit city limits to Balfour Road.

One of the facets of the DDA is to provide methods a city can use to raise money. The ideal way, according to John Crawford, city manager, would be to capture tax increases through tax increment financing (TIFA).

However, one of the stipulations for using TIFA is that any money "captured" must come from improvements made after the DDA was formed. And along Jefferson Avenue, the only new construction planned at this time is the hospital and DIO's project. It's essential for the DDA's success.

Crawford explained that a tax gain of about \$30,000 to \$60,000 could be retrieved by the city, depending on the given tax abatement. "What we could do is use

that revenue to finance a bond issue, come out with a large enough sum of money, perhaps \$100,000 and acquire property, make street improvements or both," he said.

Throughout the proceedings, Hessberg has kept a low profile, allowing Benfer to speak for the two groups. And Benfer, in presenting the plan last January, refused to answer questions from residents about the style and height of the

proposed building. He said then that plans hadn't proceeded that far yet.



However, he assured everyone that his group wanted to work with the community and that the structure would comply with the community's zoning ordinance. Less than a month later, Mayor Palmer Heenan made the first reference to the possibility of a variance.

At that time he explained it may

come down to a choice between having a building that falls within the 30-foot height limitation and has less parking versus a three story building and more parking.

And by June the project had grown from 35,000 to 45,000 square feet of space, 45 more parking spaces, a request to close a street, and a zoning variance to accommodate the mechanical room.

## GOP ponders Steiner vacancy

He was the man who bailed Guardian Angel Curtis Sliwa out of jail back when Sliwa was arrested by Detroit police on misdemeanor charges.

He was the Wayne County commissioner for the Pointes whose last actions in 1982 as a lame-duck included filing an expense report for his years as a commissioner.

Businessman Ervin A. Steiner, Jr. was buried yesterday after morning services at Verheyden Funeral Home and St. Paul Roman Catholic Church. The colorful and sometimes controversial Farms resident whose holdings included the Esquire Theater died Saturday in St. John Hospital. He was 61.

Steiner was hospitalized two

weeks ago after suffering a heart attack in his Esquire business office, one day before the primary election in which he was unopposed for the GOP county commission slot.

Steiner was to face incumbent commissioner John Hertel in November for the county seat. It was Steiner's return to politics after a two-year hiatus. He lost the GOP primary in 1982 to Barbara Gattorn in an attempt to win a place on the revamped county commission.

The 14th District, which will choose Steiner's successor, said in a statement Tuesday it "deeply regrets the sudden and untimely death of Erv Steiner."

"He was an active Republican and community leader for many

years and made significant contributions to both his party and his community. He will be greatly missed and it will not be easy to find a replacement," said the statement read by district secretary Shirley Wohlfield.

The business of choosing a nominee for the vacancy will not begin until district officials return from the national convention in Dallas, Ms. Wohlfield added.

Park Mayor Palmer Heenan, one of those instrumental in Steiner's decision to seek the commission position, said Steiner will be missed as both a businessman and political figure.

"He had the best sense of communicating with people and public relations," Heenan said of Steiner.

"He was very good at people and business promotion, in getting the best out of them."

Steiner's acquisition of the Esquire meant an upgrading of the theater and the advent of better movies, Heenan said. The Park mayor was also a guest recently on Steiner's "People With Erv Steiner," a weekly talk show on Grosse Pointe Cable which Steiner produced and hosted.

"He was fun to be with on his programs. They were very community-minded, sometimes controversial, but very good news," Heenan added.

One of the few Republicans ever elected in the strongly Democratic county, Steiner and 14th District (Continued on Page 2A)

## Village will show off its gem

It is hard not to push over the Shores municipal building.

One recent letter writer said the building renovation was turning heads because of its faithful reproduction of the original Albert Kahn design.

Urban planner Gerald Luedtke called the end product of the \$1.3 million construction "renovation at its best."

Shores residents will get a chance to view their municipal offices at an open house from 2 to 5 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 9. The dedication ceremony will be held at 2 p.m., with a variety of local officials, visiting dignitaries and former councilmembers and pres-

idents present, village officials said.

What they will get is a chance to walk through and enjoy a modern office building that uses light and color to accentuate public areas of the building. Video monitors, and electronic surveillance have also been added to the lower floor, chiefly occupied by the larger council chambers, and the public safety department.

What residents didn't see was the "breaking in" of the building, the air conditioning that cooled the lower floor to 60 degrees, the malfunctioning intercom system or the thermostats in the wrong place.

The man chiefly responsible for drawing the plans for the building and making sure the same color

brick and copper gutters on the elevator tower staircase addition were used as are on the original building is Robert Wakely, a young Grosse Pointe Park architect.

Wakely put together a variety of plans for the trustees' consideration during October and November of 1982. He continued to report monthly to the council during the 10 months of work on the exterior and interior of the building, explaining the changes in plans and deviations from design to trustees while reporting the progress of the work.

The graduate of University of Michigan's College of Architectural Design has been a registered architect since 1979. Projects he has worked on include a \$14 million

## Park attorney guilty of fund embezzlement

Midwest International, a pollution control manufacturer in the resort community of Charlevoix, has been struggling to keep its books in the black since the recession hit the area. The firm's owner, Park resident Ron Parr, was finally forced to file for protection under Chapter 11 of the bankruptcy laws to keep his firm alive.

And then the company and its workers got more bad news. Some \$40,000 was missing from the pension fund, Parr said he didn't know where to look, until he discovered that the attorney he had hired a few years back to supervise the pension fund had recently been disbarred by the state Attorney Grievance Commission because of an alleged embezzlement.

And finally, after two years of work by Parr, following the case from local police through labor de-

partment officials, that attorney, David W. Roth, was brought to trial and on Aug. 10, pleaded guilty to two charges, retirement income security act fraud and mail fraud, stemming from a divorce case Roth had also handled.

Roth, an attorney with offices on Fisher Road until his April, 1983 disbarment, will be sentenced in three to five weeks by U.S. District Judge Robert DeMascio, according to F. William Soisson, assistant U.S. attorney. The maximum penalty is one to five years and \$1,000 for mail fraud, and two to five years and \$10,000 for the pension fraud.

In a plea agreement reached in DeMascio's court, Roth's sentence is limited to no more than three years. He is now out on \$5,000 personal bond, Soisson said.

Parr hopes to see Roth receive (Continued on Page 11A)

# Local politician Erv Steiner dead at 61

 trict party members put together seminars for GOP candidates seeking elected office in the county, Heenan said. "He communicated with politicians and people very well and was helpful to many office seekers," he added.

His political activity was what Steiner saw as the best way to help people, according to Richard Durant, a 14th District GOP official. It was through their political involvement that he got to know what kind of a man Steiner was, Durant added.

"I would say his most outstanding characteristic was his com-

plete integrity," Durant said, adding that "if he made a commitment, he kept it."

Steiner had "a heart as big as all outdoors," Durant said, noting that Steiner wasn't "a selfish, devil-take-the-hindmost type."

Named "Person of the Month" in November, 1982 by the Grosse Pointe Business and Professional Association, Steiner served on the Wayne County Board of Commissioners from 1970 to 1982. Involved in numerous civic organizations, Steiner also figured prominently in the annual Gold Cup boat races on the Detroit River.

Business and promotion were

Steiner's forte. As president of a real estate development and promotional company, Steiner put together trade and antique shows that were among the nation's largest.

Among some of his plans was an "Old World bazaar" for the downtown Detroit area including ethnic restaurants and shops. The program would have required no government assistance, but never gained the support of the Detroit City Council.

Other plans including the development of Peche Island into a tourist attraction rivaling Disneyland, renovation of the Alger Theater and the development of an east side Pine Knob never came to

full fruition.  
 A World War II veteran, Steiner was also a member of the Grosse Pointe Rotary Club and chairman of the board of trustees at Cleary College in Ypsilanti.

In 1976, Steiner organized a nine-mile, 250-foot parade down Woodward from the state fairgrounds. A graduate of the University of Oregon, Steiner was also a director of the Northeast Child Guidance Clinic.

A widower for almost 10 years, Steiner is survived by three sons, Ervin III (Chip), Mark and Eric; two grandchildren; two sisters, Mrs. Marvin Metzger and Mrs. Al Westgarth; and his father, Ervin, Sr.

Our sports editor Peggy O'Connor was encouraged to write a weekly column. It has proven to be very successful, with Peggy winning an editorial award for her efforts.

The hard work is paying off. More stories are picked up by the papers downtown, plus publications such as the New York Times, Los Angeles Times, San Francisco Chronicle and even the London Times. Circulation has gone up nicely too.

We'll be giving Sue a party tonight. My going away present will be a big, baggy green and white sweatshirt that says "Bless the Press."

Bless Sue McDonald too.

## Unlocked door is thieves' bonanza

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# School tax hearing Thursday

More conservative than expected contract settlements will allow public school administrators to trim the 1984-85 property tax increase down to 4.65 percent over last year's levy, Deputy Supt. James Hoeh said last week.

The tax rate will be announced before the school board's annual "truth in taxation" public hearing, scheduled for 8 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 30. It will be adopted by the

board in September.

The board expects to collect a total of \$34.94 million from local property owners to support the system during the 1984-85 school year. That figure is double the 17 million in taxes collected 10 years ago. Last year, the system collected \$31.4 million.

**THIS YEAR'S BUDGET** will finance several new programs, including expanded computer education at all levels, the addition of a

seventh period to the high school day and health education. Some money is also earmarked to increase the schools' use of local cable television.

The budget also reflects the first annual \$115,000 savings from the closing of Barnes Elementary School.

Per-pupil costs during 1984-85 will be \$4,949. A decade ago it cost \$1,423 to educate each pupil

The school board is authorized by voters to levy 34.93 mills. (A mill equals \$1 in taxes for every \$1,000 of equalized valuation.) Last year that rate was rolled back to 31.84 mills and a similar roll-back is expected this year. Earlier this year administrators projected an almost 5 percent increase in taxes for 1984-85. But Dr. Hoeh said last week that "new information about the budget" and salary adjustments would push down the increase to 4.65 percent.

## SOC moves to Ferry on Sept. 1

Leaders of Service for Older Citizens (SOC), the umbrella group that governs several programs for local seniors, are looking forward to a more efficient and more effective organization when they move into Ferry Elementary School next month.

SOC was granted a three-year lease for a five-room suite in the elementary school last week by the Board of Education. Frances Schonenberg, a spokesman for SOC, said programs now scattered around Grosse Pointe will be relocated to Ferry by Sept. 1.

In the meantime, Mrs. Schonenberg said SOC is looking for help from volunteer carpenters and builders who might help install shelves and cupboards and those who might have extra refrigerators, tables, chairs and desks kicking around. Call 882-9600 to make a donation.

Relocating all SOC's programs to one place will be a boon to the seven-year-old organization, Mrs. Schonenberg said.

"It's going to be much more efficient for us and it will make us more effective," she said.

All the group's programs will continue without interruption, she said, although the Food and Friendship group "will have to

camp out for a couple of weeks."

Food and Friendship provides a warm meal and recreation for several dozen elderly Pointers every weekday at Brownell Middle School. A new site director, Nancy Stewart, has recently joined that program. Another SOC program, Meals on Wheels, delivers two warm meals to shut-ins and invalids on weekdays, working through a network of volunteers.

SOC's Minor Homes Repair pro-

gram provides workers and parts to complete small home fix-up projects for area seniors. That program is subsidized in part by the federal government. In addition, SOC mans a Senior Citizen Information hotline (882-9600) to direct seniors to the proper agencies to help them with their problems.

SOC was founded in the basement of the Grosse Pointe Woods Presbyterian Church but it soon out-grew those facilities. The 1980

census estimated the number of senior citizens in the five Grosse Pointes to be more than 20 percent of the general population.

SOC's new home, Ferry Elementary School, is located at 748 Roslyn Road in Grosse Pointe Woods. SOC will pay rent of \$900 a month to the school board. Fifty percent of that may be paid with "in-kind" services, at a rate of \$3 per hour.





## GOP too far to the right?

A funny thing happened to both the Democratic and Republican platforms this year. Both moved substantially to the right, even though both parties traditionally have sought to occupy the middle of the road.

A New York Times analysis of the Democratic platform found that it "favors social policies less generous and less expensive than those espoused in the past." It also found that not all the change has been toward more conservative positions and that in recent years the Democrats have "elaborated and bolstered support for abortion and homosexual rights."

But virtually all references to "welfare" and "welfare reform" were eliminated this year, support for public housing was softened, and a commitment to a national health insurance program was weakened. The Democratic platform even included a section headed "Controlling Domestic Spending," which seeks "a balanced program for reducing Republican mega-deficits." It also asks "a tax system that encourages growth and produces adequate revenues in a fair, progressive fashion."

BUT IF THE DEMOCRATS, traditionally the more liberal of the two major parties, have moved toward more conservative positions, the Republicans, traditionally more conservative, have continued to move to the right. In fact, GOP party moderates were roundly defeated in all of their attempts to soften the conservative positions on controversial issues in the platform hearings at Dallas.

The GOP platform committee couldn't even find a second for a motion to endorse the proposed federal equal rights amendment and then defeated a statement saying the party respects the views of those who support the amendment. The GOP committee also defeated attempts to soften language in support of voluntary prayer in the public schools and in opposition to federal financing of virtually all abortions.

With respect to taxes, the GOP platform writers toughened the platform's anti-tax plank even beyond what President Reagan had

wanted. W. Clark Durant III of Grosse Pointe, a member of the economic subcommittee of the platform committee, was quoted by the Detroit News as saying the important thing is that "there be a loud and clear call from Dallas that President Reagan is not going to raise taxes." The White House had argued for more flexibility and aides quoted the President's comment that "a president should never say never."

Former Michigan Gov. William G. Milliken, a delegate to the convention, said he thought platform efforts seeking to bar President Reagan from raising taxes are "folly." And Sen. Lowell P. Weicker, Jr. of Connecticut said the platform in general might appeal to conservatives but would limit the party's ability to win moderate and centrist votes in such a state as his.

Indeed, the GOP may have moved so far to the right on a number of issues it will be unable to broaden its appeal in Michigan and other Midwest states which have a reputation for independent voting. Yet the polls still show a big lead for the Republican ticket in Michigan and the nation, which may indicate that the GOP has read the current political signs better than the Democrats have.

But Drew Lewis, chief spokesman for the Reagan administration at the platform hearings, denied that the document would cost the Republicans votes in November and predicted that the president "can be very comfortable" with it. "It is a conservative document and it should be a conservative document," he said. "We are a conservative party with a conservative candidate."

IN HIS DETROIT ACCEPTANCE speech four years ago, Ronald Reagan made some overtures to independent voters as well as to moderate and progressive Republicans. This year the GOP platform concentrated on satisfying the right wing. With his current popularity, the president appears likely to win reelection and yet in the long run the Republicans run serious risks in ignoring the moderates in the middle of the political road. Over time, that is where a majority of Americans find themselves on most issues.

## It's still not a good idea

In this newspaper's opinion, the Farms Council was wise to postpone until Oct. 1 any further consideration of a proposed new "first floor retail only" ordinance to regulate new businesses on the Hill. In fact, we think the council would be even wiser to drop this kind of an attempt to promote more retail establishments in the Hill shopping area.

Under the proposed ordinance, new offices for realtors, doctors, lawyers, stockbrokers and other services would be relegated to the rear 50 percent of the first floor establishment unless they were moving into a building now being used for the same purpose. Present establishments would not be affected but if any change in usage were contemplated the ordinance would require the property owner to try to lease or sell it to a retailer first.

WE AGREE THAT IT IS appropriate for the council to seek ways to help promote more retail businesses on the Hill. That is a legitimate concern of shoppers as well as store operators and owners of properties occupied by businesses on the Hill. What concerns these people is a legitimate concern of the council.

But we don't think any better of the proposed ordinance now that we did two and a half years ago when a similar piece of legislation was discussed by the Farms Council. The ordinance was proposed then because similar legislation had been enacted by the Grosse Pointe City Council to prohibit new non-retail businesses from occupying first floor office space in establishments in the Village.

But as we pointed out then, the Hill and the Village have been different kinds of shopping areas since they began. The Hill has had more of a mix of retail and service businesses than the Village has had. The Village has always been more oriented toward retail stores. But what has been good for the Village may not necessarily be good for the Hill.

Owners of buildings now housing service-oriented businesses have complained that the ordinance would treat them as second class citizens. Some have called the ordinance a possible unlawful restraint of trade. One businessman urged the council at its meeting last week to postpone action to see whether the opening of the parking lot at the Richard School would attract more customers to the Hill. By tabling the proposal until Oct. 1, the council in effect took his advice.

While the ordinance would permit the continuation of service enterprises now located in the first-floor front of buildings on the Hill, the future sale or change in usage of such buildings would be subject to council approval. In effect, the ordinance would require more control of private enterprises to make sure they were not violating the ordinance at the very time that regulation of business is being relaxed in both Lansing and Washington.

At the time the proposal first came up in the Farms Council in early 1982, the News concluded an editorial critical of the idea with these words:

"Planning for orderly growth is a laudable objective in any community. But the way in which growth is planned is significant, too. Planning should be fair to all those involved, and especially those whose financial interests are jeopardized, but it also should be implemented only if it appears to have a chance of achieving the desired goals. In the Farms, the proposed ordinance might even serve the opposite of its announced purpose and further depress business activity on the Hill."

EVEN THOUGH THE PROPOSAL has been somewhat modified since it was originally offered, we think the postponement of further consideration until Oct. 1 was a good move — and the dropping of the whole idea would be an even better one.

## Another county ripoff

The more we learn about the way Wayne County government has operated in the past, the more we are convinced its aim was to satisfy county employees rather than to service county citizens.


The latest disclosure to support that opinion comes from Wayne County Executive William Lucas who is demanding contract concessions from firefighters at Detroit Metropolitan Airport who earn an average of \$39,600, the highest annual pay for firefighters in the state.

FIREFIGHTERS ARE ENGAGED in a highly dangerous occupation and ought to be adequately rewarded for that kind of work. But under their old contract which expired July 1, the airport firefighters were entitled to receive more than \$540 a day for each of the 13 county holidays. That helps explain why it was that at least 24 of the 37 firefighters received more than \$40,000 last year and 32 of the 37 were paid more than the \$36,000 received by Fire Chief Robert Baers. That level of pay sounds excessive, especially

because Baers claims airport firefighters average only three runs a day with 54 percent of those calls being emergency medical runs. He contends the airport firefighters have a much lighter workload than firefighters in local communities who earn less.

In its negotiations with the labor union representing the firefighters, the county is attempting to alter the holiday pay provision which, Baers said, enables firefighters to receive two times their regular pay whether they work on the holidays or not. The county is also seeking to shift the workday to an eight-hour day to eliminate pay for firefighters while they sleep.

EXAMPLES LIKE THIS one helped convince the public to vote earlier this month for abolition of the Wayne County Road Commission which has operated the airport. They also explain why county government operated so deeply in the red for many years and why Lucas is getting so much public support for his campaign to bring order out of the chaotic county government.

## Woods teens in rescue

To the Editor:

While driving in the Vernier-Morningside area on Saturday afternoon, Aug. 4, three Grosse Pointe teens heard a small child crying and noticed a distraught woman searching her car. The woman was frantically searching for her keys which were lost or misplaced when she realized the child's foot was trapped beneath the front wheel.

Unable to push or otherwise move the vehicle, the boys, Tom Gebeck, Mike Sottrel and Alex DiMusto, lifted the left front portion of the car freeing the youngster.

After the rescue, the boys recounted their effort, recalling that they tried for several moments to lift the vehicle without result until the car suddenly

rose "as if there was another hand helping us."

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## Prime Time for senior citizens

Some months ago it was announced that an 88-year-old author had written a novel that had been chosen for the Book-of-the-Month and was sure to be a best seller. It was hailed as a remarkable accomplishment for a woman of her age who also suffers from emphysema and cataracts to have successfully completed what had taken her 50 years to finish.

Scores of newspaper reporters, columnists, TV cameramen and technicians, media stars and radio-TV news people came to the one-quiet nursing home in Ohio where she lives. Not only is she famous but she will also be rich. Book sales are estimated at 150,000, paperback rights and large royalties will guarantee her a hefty monetary return on her efforts.

This remarkable octogenarian is Helen Santmyer. The book is "... And Ladies of the Club" (Putnam), a story in the author's words is "a picture of the times and country people."

The "times" covers the post-Civil War Period and end with the election of President Franklin D. Roosevelt and the New Deal.

The title refers to a local women's literary club which in turn becomes the mirror for changes in a small town's political, cultural and social life in 1,176 pages.

The story is a meticulous profile of an American era told with compassion and insight. It makes the reader wish, on one hand, to go back to a time when life was lived at an easier pace and, on the other, to give thanks for the progress that has relieved us of the frustration of losing loved ones to diseases now under control and for social reforms that have added some measure of dignity to the poor and elderly.

The book has all the pull of a literate soap opera. Without sex, violence or depictions of psychopaths, the author holds the attention of the reader. Ms. Santmyer draws readers into the lives of her characters to a point where the book is not 1,176 pages long but 1,176 pages short.

While the book has a strong appeal for older readers who will remember those days when the world was less sophisticated, younger readers will be fascinated by the immediacy of her background material. She provides a personal view of history, particularly the aftermath of the Civil War. Political battles that were waged then and today are recalled with such verve that we have the impression that the author cared deeply about the outcome and the necessity of choosing the right people to run the country.

For those interested in the history of literature, the ladies of the club offer an excellent refresher course. Under the by-laws, each year, a particular literary movement is chosen and each member is required to present a paper on a particular literary movement is particular author of the period. Excerpts and discussions are woven into the narrative. Since the members are all literate, educated women, their comments offer some interesting views.

One cannot live as long and have been as an astute observer of life as Ms. Santmyer without working out philosophical observations on the passing scene. Some of hers, as expressed through her characters, are worth noting.

It begins in 1868 when six residents of a small Ohio town meet and form the Waynesboro Women's Club, a club where "a few chosen spirits can withdraw from the heat of public conflict or the distresses of family life, or the drudgery of the schoolroom, and in peace and quiet consider the fruits of genius."

The "Club" becomes the focal point around which the action of the story revolves. It affords an interesting and unique format for the author to develop the story and to pique the reader's interest. Each chapter is preceded by a list of members. As they die or move away, their names are placed in another list at the bottom of the page. New members' names are added to the list. This technique is of enormous value to the reader who might otherwise have difficulty sorting out the characters particularly when their children, grandchildren and great grandchildren enter the scene.

Another device Ms. Santmyer uses is a summary line at the head of each chapter that contains just enough information to whet the reader's appetite for more. It is a device somewhat like the old serial movies and the present day soap opera tag-lines.

Out of the 12 charter members of the club, there are two who make it through the book. They are Ann Gordon and Sarah (Sally) Rausch.

We meet them as young graduates from the Waynesboro Female College. Pretty and vivacious, it is not long before both of them become brides.

Ann, the daughter of a doctor and sister of a brother who was also a doctor but was killed in the Civil War, marries Dr. John Gordon, a brooding young man, scarred by all he has seen on the battlefield. On her wedding day Ann's father warns her that her prospective husband will be a good doctor but perhaps not a good husband. He tells her that John is too vulnerable and as a result there will be times when the tension will break.

"Be tolerant," he tells her. "All

men have vagaries if not vices. Don't reproach and don't whine." Ann is to learn how valuable the advice is.

She stands by during the rough times when her husband finds solace elsewhere and lives to appreciate the wisdom of her father's admonition when she sees her doctor-son's wife ruin his life and drive him to an early death because she refuses to forgive one indiscretion.

It is through Ann's eyes that we learn how hard a doctor's life was in those days as he had to stand helplessly by and watch people die of diseases which are now preventable. No matter how hard he tried, "Death was always lurking in the corner." The only relief from pain was morphine and patients who didn't die sometimes became addicts.

There were other tragedies too besides the medical ones. People lived and died in genteel poverty, like the Gardiner sisters who live in a mansion but die in filth and personal degradation or the retired teacher with no income who goes hungry and cold to pay her taxes.

Another side of the picture is seen through the life of Sally, a banker's daughter who marries a German immigrant. The town is dismayed, but over the years their dismay turns to admiration as Ludwig becomes the town's wealthiest citizen and a man influential in both local and national politics. Their lives mirror happier occasions, elaborate Christmas celebrations, Fourth of July concerts in the park, a huge gathering to show off their country home.

But here too, problems occur, problems that come from depressions, floods, wars, labor unrest.

If there is any dramatic or intriguing happening that the author has missed in her panoramic view of an era and how it affected the lives of four generations of characters, it is not evident.

They live through a world of changes and, as Ann muses change that come unbidding.

As the book began with Ann as a girl, it ends with her as an old lady. Alone with memories, she philosophizes on what it is like to have lived so long. Having experienced so much, she has much to offer on life's joys and sorrows. She talks with her great-granddaughter about the people she has known, some of whom apparently have lived unhappy lives.

But she says: "But we can't really know. Except for those people who have unhappy natures, or those whose religions demand that they think of life as a vale of tears. But I have never known one of them to say with the Greeks 'Better never to have been born.'" So say we all!

## Schools seek new librarian


The search for a new director of Grosse Pointe Public Libraries is well underway and may be complete by October, a school spokesman said last week.

The new person will replace William Peters, who retired in June after 10 years as director of the three library branches.

The spokesman said the position was advertised this summer, but so far has only attracted a dozen applicants. He said that the number should grow when the summer vacation season ends and the school board may be ready to name a new director by October.

Public libraries in Grosse Pointe are supported by their own, separate property tax which is voted upon during regular school millage elections. The library system comes under the jurisdiction of the Board of Education, however.

Since Peters retired, Central Library Branch Director Gerta Bielitz has been acting as the system's head.



## Lasers can treat skin problems

Lasers, used to zap and destroy the enemy in Hollywood productions, are now being used to destroy certain skin cancers and may virtually erase disfiguring skin conditions and tattoos.

"The laser is more intense than any other light source known to man," said Edward Krull, M.D., chairman of Henry Ford Hospital's department of dermatology. "By focusing all that energy onto one point, the laser can destroy tissue by vaporization."

Krull, who lives in the City, said his department is using the carbon dioxide laser to treat a variety of skin conditions and cancers. An acronym for "Light Amplification by Stimulated Emission of Radiation," the laser contains an active medium, such as carbon dioxide, that is used to vaporize or weld specific tissue areas. The carbon dioxide laser has a beam that can be adjusted to the size of a pinhole, allowing greater control over tissue destruction.

The laser is being tested in treating advanced skin cancers, which are now being removed by scalpel

excision. Because there's little or no bleeding with the laser, the visible part of the tumor can be removed in pieces. These tissue sections are frozen and later viewed under a microscope to determine if all of the tumor has been removed. If necessary, the process is repeated until no trace of the tumor is visible under the microscope.

"The tumors can be large, such as those involving the face or nose," Krull said. "They may be small but in critical areas where surrounding healthy tissue must be preserved. If left untreated or not treated properly, the tumors may penetrate into the eye or brain."

Another promising application of the carbon dioxide laser is in the removal of portwine stains, a red dish birthmark that may appear as a large blotch on the skin, according to Krull. Such birthmarks basically are resistant to treatment and cause a significant cosmetic problem. One method of treatment involves tattooing in new pigment, but results usually are poor. The laser offers a marked improvement over other methods

because its finely-focused beam can vaporize the reddish tissue area, leaving only minimal scarring.

The laser can also remove keloids, a stubborn overgrowth of scar tissue that usually affects blacks and people of North African or Middle Eastern descent. Previous treatments included cutting out the scar formation, which often caused new keloids to form. A special preparation injected into the area was somewhat more effective. The carbon dioxide laser offers new hope because it vaporizes keloids and seems to impede the growth of new scar formation.

Another area in which the laser outperforms conventional treatment is in tattoo removal. Standard removal techniques include sanding, salabrasion and excision. Sanding, also known as dermabrasion, involves using wire brushes or a high-speed wheel with diamond chips to remove the tattoo. In salabrasion, salt is rubbed into the skin, causing an inflammation that helps lift out the tattoo. Excision involves cutting out the tattoo and grafting the area if necessary.



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



**'Toughlove' approach to parenting**

Fran Pastoria thinks there are plenty of children and parents here in Grosse Pointe who need help.

"Children are not learning the lessons necessary for building the inner strength they need to develop a sense of self esteem," says Ms. Pastoria, program coordinator for Northeast Guidance Center.

"As a result, they are choosing dependence — dependence on their parents, peers, drugs and alcohol," she says.

Who is at fault? In many instances, Ms. Pastoria believes the problem can be traced to parents.

"Parents need to learn parenting skills," she says. "Their tolerance for misbehavior by their kids is so high, they must really be emotionally in trouble before they reach out for help."

Ms. Pastoria is ready to provide that help in the form of a free workshop sponsored next month by the Northeast Guidance Center.

The program, called "Assertiveness Training for Toughlove Parenting," is aimed to help parents learn to be effective in dealing with kids and their kids' problems.

Ms. Pastoria, who will coordinate the program, plans to draw on many of the tenants of the "Toughlove Philosophy" in the class. Toughlove, which began as a parent support group in Philadelphia, helps parents understand the need to set limits, take action, support one another and work with community agencies such as schools, police, courts and psychologists, to help their kids.

Ms. Pastoria's secondary goal this fall is to bolster the Toughlove Parent Support Group in Grosse Pointe that was started in 1982, after a visit to town by Toughlove founders David and Phyllis York, of Pennsylvania, family therapists who began the group after a traumatic experience when their own daughter faced criminal charges.

Since its founding, Ms. Pastoria said the local group's membership has fluctuated between 30 and three. Similar programs already operate in Dearborn and Farmington Hills, she said.

Toughlove is a way of drawing the line against out-of-control children and compelling them, often by contract, to live by reasonable rules, Ms. Pastoria explained in an earlier interview. Parents often feel ashamed because they can't control their children, she said. That is why the "parent support" concept is important. Parents learn they are not alone with their problems.

Among the topics to be addressed in the new program are helping children deal with their feelings; engaging cooperation; alternatives to punishment; encouraging autonomy; praise and freeing children from playing roles.

**ACT schedule is announced**

As the new school year begins, more than a million high school juniors and seniors across the nation will prepare to participate in the ACT Assessment Program.

The ACT Assessment, which consists of four academic tests that measure educational development and a detailed questionnaire that collects information relevant to educational and career planning, is recommended or required by more than 2,700 postsecondary institutions and scholarship programs.

School guidance counselors recommend that students participate in the ACT Assessment Program during the junior year or early in the senior year, so their results will be available in time for use in planning for postsecondary education and careers.

Students can obtain registration packets that contain all the information necessary to register and prepare for the Assessment from

their high school guidance offices. The basic registration fee is \$9.50. New for 1984-85, late registration will be accepted for an additional \$10 late handling fee.

For the Oct. 27 test, registration is Sept. 28 to Oct. 16.

For the Dec. 8 test, registration is Nov. 9 to Nov. 23.

Tests will also be given Feb. 9, April 20 and June 8.

It takes about three hours to complete the four ACT examinations in English, math, social studies and natural sciences. A sample copy of a full-length test is available in every high school. Students who would like to have copies of additional tests may obtain them at cost from ACT.

The ACT Assessment also includes a two-part questionnaire that students complete at home when they register. The questionnaire focuses on the student's interests.

**Woods plans streetscape improvements**

The Woods council Monday night, Aug. 6, awarded a contract to a Utica architectural company to design and build a \$24,000 streetscape project for the east and west sides of three Mack blocks.

Community Planners and Management was the low bidder of nine other companies. The project will include the Bournemouth, Newcastle, Kenmore Oxford and Fleetwood Beaufait blocks.

Involved is the public right-of-way on the two sides of the street, not necessarily including the median, according to the city's specifications. Using new concrete paving, brick pavers and irrigation, the company is to develop a design to give a "distinctive" character to each of the three blocks. The plans should take into consideration the trash receptacles, newspaper vending machines and bus stops in the area.

For its \$1,450 bid, Community Planners said it will prepare schematic plans for the city's review as well as the working drawings for construction. The company will also prepare the bid specifications, according to its bid.

Community Planners will also handle the management and supervision of the work, with the final inspection to be conducted by the city.

The streetscape is part of the city's capital improvement program for this fiscal year and will be paid for with federal Community Development Block Grant funds.

City Administrator-Clerk Chester Petersen said the final contract language was being prepared. The city hopes to begin work on the streetscape by this fall, he added.

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
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



# Local man tries for his fourth Emmy Field Day for kids Saturday

Former Pointer and Michigan State University graduate Harry Chancey, Jr., now living in New York, is the producer and executive producer, along with Harvey Marks, of a documentary on AIDS to be seen nationally on PBS and locally on Channel 56, Wednesday, Aug. 29, at 10 p.m.

The program by the 31-year-old, three-time Emmy award winner is from WNET, Channel 13 in New York. "AIDS: Profile of an Epidemic" attempts to provide an examination of the medical, historical, personal and societal facets of the mysterious and often fatal disease known as AIDS (Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome).

The documentary, narrated by Edward Asner, provides glimpses into the lives of a young homosexual, a hemophiliac, a drug user, a child born with disease and a Haitian. Included will be interviews with scientists who are seeking a cure for AIDS, physicians who treat AIDS patients and their families.

It also explores how family members live with the knowledge that a loved one has AIDS. Stella McKee, whose husband, a hemophiliac who contracted AIDS, states, "The hardest thing for me is knowing that I probably will have to face the future with my children by myself, because with no cure... it could happen tomorrow, you know.

That's the hardest thing. But again, I try not to think about tomorrow, because we have David today and we hope we have David tomorrow."

An animated sequence will illustrate how AIDS destroys the immune system, preventing the body from mounting an effective attack against viruses, microbes, chemicals and foreign particles and substances.

Medical experts will discuss the probable viral cause of AIDS and prospects for its cure. An outreach program, "AIDS: A Public Inquiry," also produced by Chancey, will follow at 11 p.m.

Grosse Pointe police, firefighters and mail carriers will host their 43rd annual Field Day this Saturday, Aug. 25, at the Brownell Middle School field, 260 Chalfonte Avenue.

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## Hertel survey

### No improvements here

The economy may be recovering, somewhere. But apparently the upswing isn't hitting the 14th Congressional District, which includes Grosse Pointe Farms, Woods and Shores.

Most of the respondents (60 percent) to U.S. Rep. Dennis Hertel's recent annual survey said they are not better off now than last year. It was the same answer Hertel received last year on that question.

A majority of the 3,000-odd respondents identified the nation's most critical economic problem as the huge federal deficit. And a majority said that cutting the defense budget was the best way to reduce that deficit.

When asked if they favored spending \$30 million to build and deploy

MX missiles, nearly 70 percent disagreed with the funding for national defense.

Unemployment still ranked as a crucial concern in the area. Twenty-three percent of the respondents said it was the most critical economic issue facing the nation. Almost 60 percent agreed there should be auto import quotas.

President Reagan's advisory council on Medicare has recommended the eligibility age be raised from 65 to 67, and 74 percent of the survey-takers disagreed with the action.

Reagan's foreign policy plan to increase aid to Central American by \$8 billion over five years was opposed by 62 percent. A majority opposed sending U.S. aid of any kind to El Salvador.

When questioned this week regarding his promise to Park citizens last January, Benfer said he had meant that the building itself was within the height limitations. "It was the mechanical penthouse, not the building, that exceeded the requirement. I think we've lived up to our commitment."

"Anyway, this (suit) is between the neighborhood and the city, not the DIO and Bon Secours. It is our opinion that the proposed building is the best of a number of plans we studied over a series of months," he added.

At a public hearing held July 9 on the variance, council listened to an overflow crowd, most of whom voiced opposition to the penthouse equipment room and its potential noise, plus the increased traffic on nearby streets. They asked if another plan could be drawn that was consistent with the ordinance or if the former DIO building could be remodeled and used instead.

But Benfer suggested backers would pull out of the deal if they weren't given what they wanted. "We can't proceed with the project at the old DIO building and it won't continue without the variance," he said.

The evening ended on a sour note for most of the spectators when council unanimously granted the hospital and DIO the variance.

Herold McDeason, city attorney, said in a prepared statement Monday, that the city believes all actions taken to date conformed to law and ordinance requirements. "The city intends to vigorously defend its position in any litigation."

The height restriction issue was by far the most controversial aspect of the comprehensive zoning ordinance revision that was approved by council in 1983. City planners originally proposed a more liberal limitation, but citizens who packed several public hearings on the law demanded a more conservative limitation in

order to maintain the single family residential nature of the community.

The council relented and put the 30-foot rule in effect.

the maximum sentence. "Any other option would be a disgrace to the judicial system, a miscarriage of justice and an insult to the U.S. Department of Labor and its investigators," Pair said.

Pair said he is attempting to gain reimbursement for the pension fund losses through another federal agency, but he's worried about his chances.

"The vested interest employees of the (company) pension fund are the real losers," Pair said.

Midwest International now has about 32 employees, half the number it hired before the recession. About 18 of them had vested interests in the pension fund, Pair said.

Roth had been hired by Pair and placed on a \$3,000 monthly retainer to handle the pension fund and taxes for Midwest, the firm's owner said.

The second charge that Roth pleaded guilty to on Aug. 10 was mail fraud involving a sum of between \$175,000 and \$200,000 that Roth admitted to taking from the accounts of a divorced woman whom he represented. It was the same charge he was disbarred for on April 25, 1983, by the Attorney Discipline Board.

Roth has practiced law in the Detroit area for several years and in the early 1970s rented the entire 23rd floor of the Fisher Building in the New Center area for a law firm he hoped to start, his associates say. **PHEASANT HUNTING REGULATIONS FOR 1984**

The Natural Resources Commission, at its meeting on June 8, 1984, under the authority of Section 11, Chapter II, of Act 286, P.A. 1929, as amended, and Sections 1 and 3 of Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, being Sections 312.11, 300.1, and 300.3 of The Michigan Compiled Laws, established the following pheasant hunting season regulations for 1984.

Seasons  
Zone 1:  
In that part of Menominee County lying south of Highway US-2 and Delta County, south and west of Escanaba River, October 10-20, inclusive.  
Zones 2 and 3:  
October 20-November 11, inclusive.

Bag Limits  
Zone 1:  
The bag limit shall be restricted to 1 male pheasant per day, 2 in possession, and 4 during the season.  
Zones 2 and 3  
Statutory bag limits shall apply -- 2 male pheasants per day, 4 in possession, and 8 during the season.  
Pheasants taken in any of the prescribed pheasant put take areas shall be included in the small game hunter's daily bag and possession limit.

This Order replaces the previous Order entitled, "Pheasant Hunting Regulations for 1983," CWI-231-83, dated June 10, 1983, and shall take effect October 10, 1984 and remain valid until November 11, 1984.

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



London pub is rendezvous for Spartans

(Ed. Note: Joseph J. Serwach, of Lochmoor Boulevard, Editor-in-Chief of Grosse Pointe North High School's student newspaper and yearbook in 1983, reporter for The Michigan State News during the past year, has been a member of Michigan State University's London Bureau this summer.)

At least one British business is saying "yes" to Michigan in a big way.

A Park Road pub near downtown London found new customers this summer by displaying a green and white flag bearing the words "Go State." The flag, hung in the front window, gains the attention of Michigan State University students who stay nearby during the summer months.

MSU's Office of Overseas Study Programs, which offered 14 courses to more than 300 students visiting London this summer, hosts more students in England than any other American college or university, according to Caroline Latham, one of the program's directors.

Dave Lowe manages the Windsor Castle pub, which seems like a typical British saloon to visiting students—except for the MSU flag in the window and a Michigan State T-shirt which covers a maize and blue pennant from the University of Michigan, hung on a wall inside.

"When a gentleman from Ann Arbor saw our MSU flag, he said 'We'll send you a good one' and sent us the Michigan pennant," Lowe says. "That (U-M pennant) didn't go down too well, so we had to cover it up—but all in good fun."

The 30 to 40 MSU students who come to the pub regularly are "more polite" than his English customers, Lowe maintains.

"We enjoy the company," he says. "We tend to get along with all nationalities."

Discipline and the 1-year-old

As soon as a baby begins to get around under her own steam, parents need to think about teaching her that some things (like electrical outlets) are off limits. This is the beginning of discipline.

In the dictionary, discipline has many meanings. From the point of view of child-rearing, some of these definitions are helpful and others are not so helpful, according to Growing Child, the monthly child development newsletter.

Instruction. The dictionary says this is an old-fashioned meaning. That's a pity because good discipline should instruct a child.

Training which corrects, molds, strengthens, or perfects. This is the best meaning of discipline.

Punishment, chastisement. Many people think of discipline as punishment. They try to decide if

In England, pubs are required to close at 11 p.m. and the early closing time often disturbs customers who want to stay longer, Lowe says. "The (MSU) students don't always understand that law, but they abide by it," he says. "They never put up a fuss or try to stay longer, like a lot of my (English) customers will."

The students, who stay in college dorms in the neighborhood, often pay their first visit to the pub after noticing the flag.

"It's kind of wild to be walking through London and to see that big 'S' in the window," explains Duncan McGuffie, an MSU graduate and resident assistant for MSU overseas students this summer. "It's kind of like a little touch of home in this traditional British pub."

Lowe's wife, Dawn, calls the summer months when students

visit her "favorite time of the year." She will take her first trip to Michigan this October, spending six to eight weeks visiting friends in Detroit, Ann Arbor and East Lansing.

"I suppose Michigan's an overgrown version of what we've got here," she says. "My image of America is pretty much what I see on television. I know Michigan's cold in the winter."

The Great Lakes, the universities "and possibly Chicago" are some of the places Dawn Lowe wants to see. But mainly, she expects to spend her time "having a look at Detroit."

"If I could take this place and plunk it down in the middle of Michigan—that's where I'd like to be," she says. "I want someone to show me what the Great Lakes are like. I expect they're pretty special—nothing like we've got here."

certain kinds of punishment are better or worse. But if discipline is something positive that helps a baby learn, grow and develop, then it is an entirely different matter.

Control gained by enforcing obedience or order. This definition of discipline does not focus on instructing or strengthening or a child's need to learn.

The heart of the matter is this: can discipline be used in a positive way?

Most children under a year old will continue to do exactly what you don't want them to do. Their curiosity is enormous and their physical drive propels them from one situation into another. Presented with fascinating new objects and places, they do not have the necessary knowledge—or experi-

ence—to determine what's "yes" and what's "no."

For example, assume you have an expensive television" et. The knobs are an endless source of fascination for your daughter who takes every opportunity to twist, turn, and pull them. Every time you see her doing this, you tell her "no" and pull her hands away. Her response: the minute you're not looking, she's back at it.

What to do? You can persist in "no-no" until she's old enough to get the message. This won't do much good for right now. Slap her hands along with the "no" until she learns what you mean. This may be months away, if your television set still works by then. Or use your ingenuity. For example, rearrange the furniture so the set is inaccessible to her, or tape a piece of cardboard over the knobs.

This is St. Paul's-on-the-Lakeshore's Sesquicentennial Year, and the Altar Society ladies are going all out to commemorate it. Special attractions at the 1984 fashion luncheon will include an exhibit of antiques, among them: a toy sewing machine (circa 1884); moveable cast lead toys; a bowl carved from a single tree branch; old-time hats and a shawl.

The Altar Society hostesses will wear dresses of past decades, which should provide an interesting counterpoint to new fall/winter fashions from the Shops of Walton-Pierce. First prize in the raffle is an exquisite linen and cut-lace tablecloth, with a French motif. (St. Paul's was founded to serve the French settlers of Grosse Pointe's original Ribbon Farms), donated anonymously by one of the present parishioners.

Sister Clement Allard, O.P., has traced the beginnings of the Altar Society. The first recorded mention of it is in 1868, when it is said to have been formed under the pastorate of The Reverend Francie T. DeBroux, the parish's first permanent pastor (1857-1882). The first mention of an Altar Society Luncheon at the Grosse Pointe Yacht Club is in the 1953-54 editions of the "St. Paul Weekly."

Since then, the GPYC has become the traditional setting for the Altar Society's annual luncheon, and the fashions have traditionally come from Walton-Pierce. Carol Lachiusa is general chairman of the Sesquicentennial fashion luncheon. It is open to the public by reservation at \$20 per person. We thought about researching the cost of the first fashion luncheons, but decided against it: inflation has become a fact of life. Better not to know than to cry.

### An Elegant Autumn Picnic

A famous British summer opera festival provides the blueprint for southeastern Michigan's Glyndebourne Picnic, selected in 1968 by the Friends of the Kresge Library as their annual fund raising event to benefit Oakland University's Kresge Library.

First presented in 1934, the Glyndebourne Festival Opera staged in England during a 12-week summer season celebrates its 50th anniversary this year. Oakland's Glyndebourne Picnic, like the original, takes place on the grounds of an historic Tudor style mansion. The British festival is presented in an 800-seat theater adjacent to 16th century Glyne Place, a 640-acre estate in East Sussex, 54 miles south of London. The picturesque lawn and gardens of Meadow Brook Hall, 100-room former home of Matilda Dodge Wilson on Oakland's Rochester campus, are the setting for Michigan's Glyndebourne Picnic.

Men and women don formal attire for England's Glyndebourne performances. During the 75-minute intermission following the first act, they "picnic" — from hampers laden with gourmet delicacies washed down with fine wines, spreading fine linens on the ground (weather permitting) and setting their "tables" with fine china, silver and candelabra.

Oakland's version of Glyndebourne bears many similarities to its forerunner. In England, many members of the Glyndebourne audience come down from London for the evening. Oakland's Glyndebourne, too, draws people from a considerable distance, many of them from The Pointe.

But the picnic itself, not classical opera, takes center stage at the Oakland site. Attire, as in England, is formal. Oakland Glyndebourne guests bring their finest table settings, and the contents of their picnic baskets rival those of the British festival. And music remains very much a part of Oakland's Glyndebourne Picnic. Dinner accompaniment this year will be provided by organist Jay Valle. After dinner, there'll be dancing to the music of Eddie Schick's Orchestra.

"A Hunting We Will Go" is the theme of Oakland's 1984 Glyndebourne Picnic. It will span six hours, running from 6 p.m. to 12:30 a.m. on Saturday, Sept. 8. Tables for six, eight or 10 can be reserved. Tickets at \$150 per couple (\$300 patrons, \$1000 benefactors) may be obtained through the Friends of Kresge Library, 377-2477, or the Louis Camps, 652-4499. Reservation deadline is Saturday, Sept. 1. Ticket prices are mostly tax deductible, with all proceeds going to the Kresge Library.

## Capitol pages Mary Hartzell this summer

Weekdays, almost all year 'round, when Mary Hartzell rolls out of bed she knows she has few decisions to make concerning her attire. From September to June she wears the light oxford gray skirt and blazer which is the school uniform at Dominican High, where she is a senior.

During the summer months, her main wardrobe consists of black pants, white blouse and black shoes; the ensemble Mary, daughter of Grosse Pointe resident James Hartzell, wears as a page on the Senate floor in Washington, D.C.

"It's a lot of work," says Mary of the page's tasks, which include placing podiums, chairs and fresh drinking water for the sometimes long-winded senators. Deliveries are made for the lawmakers and their staffs, and many errands are performed.

Because she has seniority and experience, Mary must keep track of which bill is being discussed and notify people, who might be scattered around phone booths, desks and cloak rooms, which bill is to be voted upon and when. At all times, pages need to know which senators are on the floor.

This "great opportunity," as Mary describes it, is usually offered to outstanding students. In 1980 Senator Carl Levin sponsored Mary, who was then 14 years old. This is her fourth summer on the job — making her one of the last young people who will have worked at it for four years.

After the page scandal of 1982, requirements were changed. One must now be 16 years old to be accepted into the program.

About the page scandal, Mary says she's "confused. It happened a long time ago. We sometimes get weird looks. If people have questions, we send them to our boss." Mary's boss is Patrick Griffin, secretary for minority Senator Robert Berg of West Virginia.

There are only 30 year 'round page positions, but many more open in the summer. Since there are 100 senators, it is seniority that

determines which senators will sponsor a page. A page working all year must be at least 16 years old and a junior in high school. The pages are required to attend the Page School.

Marda Robillard, Senator Levin's Michigan liaison, has worked with him in Michigan for two years and in Washington for four years and has seen many pages come and go. "It takes them about three weeks to learn their way around."

Pages usually begin their duties at 9 a.m., one hour before the Senate goes into session. Most often they work from 9 to 2, occasionally until 5 p.m. When the Senate is in recess, the pages' hours are 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. During the discussion of the MX Missile Defense Bill, the pages worked "all hours. It was tiring but exciting," Mary remembers.

A page is paid twice per month, and the check is mailed to the home. "Page dorms/apartments are available, but you are on your

own as far as the bill-paying goes. Nothing is provided." Mary is especially fortunate to be able to reside with her mother, Joan, who lives in Arlington, Va.

After all these summers as a page, Mary observes that she likes the friendliness of the people, the bond among the workers and the respect that they all show for each other. She has made some lasting friendships. She admits she is still tickled when visitors "treat you like a celebrity."

A highlight of her four summers in Washington has been the opportunity to be with the man she describes as her "Washington father," Joseph Biden. "He's my best friend," she says. "He's a senator (from Delaware). He's a nice man."

Similar plaudits come Mary's own way from her friends and teachers. Dominican High's assistant principal, Sister Joan Weitz, O.P., describes Mary as "a fine young lady. She is very mature and dependable, and always willing to serve."

### FRESH TOMATO ASPIC

7 medium tomatoes (about 2½ lbs.) cut into bite size chunks  
2 medium stalks celery, sliced  
1 medium onion, chopped  
1½ tsp. salt  
1 bay leaf  
½ cup water  
2 Tbsp. plain gelatin  
3 Tbsp. sugar  
2 Tbsp. lemon juice  
1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce  
1/8 tsp. hot pepper sauce  
Vegetable cooking spray (optional)  
1 cup skim milk plain yogurt  
2 Tbsp. fresh chopped dill or 2 tsp. dill weed  
1 tsp. grated lemon peel  
Lettuce leaves for garnish  
Cucumber slices for garnish  
In 3-quart saucepan, over medium heat, cook tomatoes, celery, onion, salt and bay leaf until vegetables are very tender, stirring frequently (about 20 minutes).  
In 1-cup measuring cup, mix water with gelatin; let stand 5 minutes to soften.

In covered blender container, at high speed, blend tomato mixture until pureed. Return to saucepan, pressing tomato mixture through a sieve or food mill; discard seeds and skin. Stir sugar, lemon juice, Worcestershire sauce, hot pepper sauce and gelatin mixture into tomato mixture. Cook over medium heat, stirring frequently, until gelatin is completely dissolved.

Lightly spray 6-cup Bundt pan or mold with vegetable spray. Pour tomato mixture into prepared pan; cover and refrigerate until set (about 3 hours).

Prepare dressing in small bowl by mixing yogurt, dill and lemon peel. Cover; refrigerate. (Finely-grated, peeled cucumber adds a piquancy to the dressing.)

To serve to 8: Unmold gelatin mixture onto salad platter, tuck lettuce leaves under mold. Top with yogurt dressing.

### MELON MOLD

3 env. unflavored gelatin  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 cup boiling water  
1 cup One-Cal gingerale

1 cup cantaloupe balls  
1 cup honeydew balls  
1 cup watermelon balls  
Lemon Yogurt Ginger dressing  
Mix gelatin with sugar, add boiling water and stir until gelatin is dissolved. Stir in cold gingerale, orange and lemon juices. Chill, stirring occasionally, until consistency of unbeaten egg whites. Fold in melon balls. Turn into 6-cup mold. Chill until firm. Unmold and serve with Lemon Yogurt Ginger Dressing, garnished with frosted grapes. Makes 8 servings.

### LEMON YOGURT GINGER DRESSING

1 Tbsp. honey  
1 tsp. grated lemon peel

### A football guide . . .

The moment I saw an aunt of mine knock over a table lamp when she got overexcited and began cheering for the opposition's interception of a Detroit Lion pass while watching a TV game a few years back, I decided that of all sports, football is the toughest for women to understand.

Before anybody gets huffy and starts writing letters calling me sexist, remember that one, I am a woman. Two, I like football. And three, I've always been one of those people who gets mad when I read statements about women like the one I just made.

I've also been on the receiving end of the scenario many men apply to women when it comes to football. You know, the one about how a bunch of monkeys randomly typing on typewriters might, in a thousand years or so, type out one of Shakespeare's plays? Except some men think that women, left to stand around listening to the random comments of men on football, might, in a thousand years or so, begin to understand the game.

Football has always been thought of as a man's game. Women's participation has, more often than not, been limited to cheerleaders knowing when to yell "block that kick!" and mothers knowing how to get the grass stains out of their sons' football pants.

It can't be denied that women are well down on the list of who gets football explained to them first. Some men will spend hours going over players, numbers, depth charts, plays, counter-plays, strategy and the debate over the USFL versus the NFL, all with the family dog before they'll talk football with a woman. They'll find a foreign student at a college game and get into a football trivia quiz . . . and keep on talking even after he finds out that the guy knows no English. But talk football with a female? No way.

And I know why. It's because women are too sensible. And once some men get into their explanations of what can be a complicated sport, they're at the mercy of someone who isn't going to nod, stare blankly or ask where the concession stand is.

Now that football season is upon us (those meaningless exhibition games have already taken over the Saturday, Sunday and Thursday TV viewing times and high school football is a mere two weeks away), I feel it my duty to serve as sort of a guide to the wonderful world of football. I don't know everything about it, but I can safely say that my grasp of football falls about midway between that of a college cheerleader and an assistant to Vince Lombardi.

• Never, never, never ask why, if they carry the ball with their hands, the game is called football? Questions like that will only make football fans hostile and if there are any Europeans within earshot, it'll start a big fight over why soccer is called football, too. You don't want to get into that.

• Memorize football chitchat. Sitting down with the crowd to watch a Notre Dame game on a Saturday afternoon is a good time to throw out little tidbits like: "Yeah, the Irish never have done much since Ara Parseghian left." Or, "I see where the Sporting News has picked Nebraska to have a great season." Never mind that you could care less whether Ara took the Irish to Nebraska in a hot air balloon or not, it sounds smart anyway.

• Be careful how you use football terms. Saying stuff like: "Uh-oh, here comes the blitz," may sound good, but if you say it when the kicking team is coming onto the field, you're gonna look D-U-M-B.

• Watch Monday Night Football with the sound off. That's what real football fans do and if you're new at the game, you'll only get confused with the tripe passed off as commentary by Howard Cosell, Frank Gifford and Don Meredith — the Kukla, Fran and Ollie of the football set.

• Read the papers every once and a while to check out what's happening in football. You won't make many football friends if you start wondering aloud whether the "Yankees played in the Super Bowl last year," or saying stuff like "when did Grosse Pointe North get a football team?"

• Don't go around whining about how long the football season is. There are two football leagues, more than 40 professional teams, 1,800 players and around 5,000 coaches. These people need work and roughly half the American population — particularly all three TV networks and most of the civilized advertising world — like the fact that somewhere in this country, they're playing football in public for 11 months out of the year. Yes, indeed, the world is full of looneys.

• Never, never, never watch Canadian football. Their fields are 110 yards long (Lord only knows how many meters that is), they get points for anything short of tying their shoes correctly and besides, who cares if the Hamilton Tiger Cats beat the Edmonton Eskimos?

• When you go to a game, just sit back and watch. Since an acute understanding of the sport is not an inherited trait for most of us, watching the game and just taking for granted that after three hours (give or take a commercial break or five) of offensive teams struggling to cross the opponents' goal line and defensive teams trying to stop them, somebody will win and everybody can go home happy. And somewhere along the way, it'll all begin to make sense.

Women with little or no knowledge of football aren't the only ones for whom I've compiled these suggestions. They're just the most obvious, since women at football games tend to stand out like sore thumbs if they aren't toiling away in the concession stands peddling hot dogs or dressed in string bikinis and doing aerobics on the sidelines. I know a lot of men who merely like football, don't completely understand it, but would like not to be conspicuous when among those who LOVE football. This is for them, and anyone else who wouldn't mind watching a game or two, but isn't ready for a job as a color analyst.

Whatever you do, though, just don't start wearing those ridiculous giant foam cowboy hats or big "Number One" foam fingers. . . I haven't come up with an explanation for that part of the game yet.

## Statistics say: don't dive

If national averages hold true, dozens of recreational swimmers may be paralyzed this Labor Day weekend in diving accidents across the country.

Many will become lifetime quadriplegics due to spinal cord injuries suffered from dives into four feet of water or less, according to the Aquatic Injury Safety Group, a Detroit-based, non-profit organization dedicated to increasing public awareness of the dangers of diving.

"From the beginning of their lives children are taught a head-first dive into water is perfectly safe," states Grosse Pointer Ronald R. Gilbert, chairman of the Safety Group. "This is simply not true. Any head-first dive into four feet of water or less can result in crippling injuries."

Gilbert points to statistics released by the National Spinal Cord Injury Data Research Center in Phoenix that show close to 1,000 spinal cord injuries resulting in paralysis or death are suffered by recreational divers every year. Diving is the fourth major cause of spinal cord injuries in the U.S., behind auto accidents, falls or jumps and gunshot wounds.

The Center reports spinal cord injuries from diving are evenly split between open bodies of water,

such as lakes, and swimming pools, including above-ground and in-ground pools. Swimmers most at risk, according to the statistics, are 15- to 29-year-old males.

A nationally respected expert on diving safety, Dr. M.A. Gabrielsen compiled a list of common findings in diving injuries, including the following:

1) The majority of diving spinal cord injuries occur in four feet of water or less.

2) In most cases, there are no adequate markers or warning signs prohibiting diving.

3) Spinal cord injury victims think they are executing "safe dives" which they have done many times before.

4) None of the victims are aware of the potential danger of diving in the areas where they perform their dives.

Gilbert notes, "None of the spinal cord injury victims that I've met ever believed they could become quadriplegics just from diving into water. Unfortunately, these people realized the truth too late."

Aquatic Injury Safety Group membership consists of approximately 100 practicing attorneys nationwide who represent clients fatally or critically injured in diving and other aquatic accidents.

## Turkey Trot plans made

Again this year, thousands of runners will race along the Michigan Thanksgiving Parade route Thanksgiving morning, Nov. 22, to the cheers of some half million spectators.

The first 10-kilometer "Turkey Trot" was last year, and it proved so successful that it is now an important part of the Parade tradition. Several new features have been added for the 1984 Turkey Trot, including a one mile walk/run prior to the 10k race, computerized finish results, twice as many awards, and an even bigger post-race party inside Cobo Hall.

Parade officials believe the 1984 race will attract even more runners than the 2,300 who ran last year. One of the most significant additions for 1984 is a third corporate sponsor. Independence Health Plan will join WJR radio and The Detroit News, sponsors of the race last year.

"We are delighted that Independence Health Plan is with us in 1984," said Parade Executive Director Carlene Bonner. "Our already strong corporate base becomes that much better. Our sponsors provide important financial backing and promotional support, and that is crucial to us, because all proceeds from the race go toward the substantial costs of putting on the Thanksgiving Day Parade."

Bonner also announced the appointment of the Park's Jeanne Bocci as race manager for the Turkey trot in 1984. Bocci has extensive race management experience, having organized the popular New Year's Eve Run in Detroit for the past 15 years. Bocci is a world class race walker, one of Michigan's top marathon runners and is nationally ranked as an ultra-marathoner.

The Turkey Trot's huge crowd remains a unique attraction to runners. With a half million people lined along Woodward Avenue in Detroit for the parade, the Turkey Trot has the largest live audience of any 10k race in the world. Highlighting the new attractions for 1984 is a one mile walk/run which

will be staged at 8 a.m., 45 minutes before the Turkey Trot itself. People who can't run the full 10 kilometers can participate, and they will receive commemorative awards, a T-shirt and refreshments. To encourage children to take part, a special Thanksgiving souvenir will be available for everyone under 12.

Another addition for the 1984 Turkey Trot will be computerized finish results, supplied by Burns Computer Service, a race results specialist. Complete listings of results will be available within a half hour of the last finisher, and the results will be published in The Detroit News the day after Thanksgiving.

Also, awards will be given to the top five finishers in five year age groups, thus doubling the number of awards from 60 to 120.

The 1984 Turkey Trot will again start in front of Cobo Hall, go through downtown and up and back on Woodward Avenue, following much of the parade route. But this year the finish line will be inside Cobo Hall, giving runners a warm ending to the race. This year's post-race party will be even bigger, with entertainment, refreshments and large television screens to watch the parade.

Portions of the 10k and one mile race will be shown during the live coverage of the parade. As has become a tradition, the parade will be broadcast live by a regional television network and will also be featured live on CBS-TV.

"We were very excited about the improvements for 1984," said Turkey Trot race manager Jeanne Bocci, "and we expect an even bigger turnout this year. Getting 2,300 people last year was excellent, but now that we've become established in the running community, we should do even better in 1984."

## Camping? Look out for bears

Nature lovers who plan to spend the remainder of their summer vacation camping in areas populated with bears should remember to expect the unexpected, because bears are unpredictable, says National Wildlife magazine.

Knowing about bears in bear country could make the difference between an outdoor adventure and a tragedy, according to the bimonthly publication of the National Wildlife Federation.

"Few back country campers have ever seen a bear. Far fewer have been injured by one," says Stephen Herrero, a wildlife biologist with the University of Calgary. However, after conferring with National Park Service officials and experienced campers, Herrero and others have made some sharp conclusions about how campers can avoid problems with the wild creatures.

As one biologist stated: "There are no absolute formulas because the characteristics of individual bears vary as much as do the characteristics of individual people."

The first step is to understand a bear's habits and actions. If given a choice, bears are usually known to be shy animals and will run away from an intruder rather than challenge him. On the other hand, if a bear is surprised or senses a threat to its cub, it will probably defend its ground. When inspecting their surroundings, bears tend to grunt, woof, and snap their jaws as they determine the threat of danger nearby.

Above all, the most valuable ingredient to a safe, accident-free outdoor experience is preparation for an encounter. Here are a few suggestions, according to National Wildlife:

- Always remain calm — running or shouting could encourage an attack.

- Retrace your path on the trail each time the bear retreats, slowly making your way toward a tree sufficiently big enough to carry your weight and tall enough to be out of reach from below.

- If an attack seems unavoidable, and there is no tree in sight, playing opossum — lying simply on the ground as if you were dead — could save your life. Others have also advised kneeling on the ground with your head between your knees and clapping your hands behind your neck to form a tight, well-protected ball while shielding your face, neck and chest areas.

- Hikers should never travel alone. Some even recommend hiking in groups of six or more.

- Familiarity with an area and selection of a proper campsite are also important. Game trails should be avoided, since bears often use them at night.

- Keep a clean campsite — no hungry bear can pass up leftover scraps. If there are fishermen in your party, make sure that they prepare their catches at least 100 yards away and store their clothes in airtight sacks in order to prevent the escape of fresh fish odors.

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## Array of alternatives sparks fashion freedom



### Experts reveal clean, new concepts of fashion for today's well-dressed men

The top men's fashion authorities advise that all those extra zippers, exaggerated pockets and other frills are now being thrown out. This fall it's the clean, uncluttered look.

The experts are the designers to whom the nation's fashion editors have voted this year's Cutty Sark Awards, the "Oscars" of menswear. They report there's a new simplicity to men's styles, with an accent on natural fabrics and generous proportions.

Perry Ellis, who captured the Outstanding U.S. Designer title for the second consecutive year, is focusing on clean lines in quality fabrics, with no distracting details.

According to the famed Giorgio Armani, who won the Cutty Sark trophy as the top international designer, "Men's fashion has become grotesque with so many 'tricks'."

"Sportswear, for example, is supposed to be easy to wear, but with all its gimmicks it was becoming impossible to enjoy," adds the designer, "Luxury has to be quiet."

The number one sportswear authority in the U.S., Andrew Fezza, said

after winning the silver Cutty for his 1984 sportswear designs, "The smart man will look for loose, comfortable clothes that he can dress up or down, according to the situation. Menswear can be sophisticated without being too serious or too extreme."

For example, this fall he likes wool trousers with a leather waistband, worn with a blanketstripe shirt. "By themselves, they create an effortless sense of style," he says. "Add a jacket and tie and you're dressed up."

Mary Jane Marcasiano, who was voted Cutty Sark's Most Promising Designer trophy for her hand-loomed knitwear, advises, "Select clothing that stresses your own personality."

"You can do this by layering patterns, textures and shapes in the colors that best complement you. That way you'll always be exclusively you."

Chip Tolbert, fashion director of the Men's Fashion Association and chairman of the prestigious Cutty Sark Awards, sums it up, "Forget the fads. Stick to quality fabrics and comfortably flattering fit, and you'll be a fashion winner this fall."



### Individual color and style options mark the 1984 fall fashion season

Fashion has always had its ups and downs, its ins and outs. Skirt lengths have risen, only to fall again, and fallen, only to creep upward, a season or two later. Sleek, narrow styles have been replaced by fuller, more fanciful fashions, which have reigned a short season before abdicating to lankier looks. And, with each change of shape, has come a related change of mood — sophisticated or playful, quintessentially modern to "retro" in the most distinctive sense of the word.

Fall '84 seems to defy this trend toward exclusiveness, this seesawing of "out" and "in," as it dispels many of the myths surrounding fashion by being essentially a season of many moods, one of almost limitless options.

Fall '84 provides a rounded picture of the contemporary American woman, and provides her with a multitude of fashion alternatives to suit the facets of her life, and her own special style, as well.

Pants are in the fashion forefront, but so are skirts. Sportswear is easy-wear; evening dress an excursion into all-out glamour.

The sheerest organzas enlivened by a metallic sheen competed with sequined and beaded extravaganzas for evening honors, full of dazzle and glitter, and designed to bring down the house.

It all adds up to fashion as it was meant to be — flattering to the women who wear it, dazzling the people who see them, and ultimately expressive to a personal style which is each individual woman's distinctive signature.


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

## Making sure the glove fits

- Never yank a glove on... harsh treatment stretches and strains the material (whether it's leather, fabric or knit) and weakens the seams.
- Fit the glove over the four fingers of your hand and gently work down on fingers until seams are straight and glove fingers are smooth. Then insert the thumb and smooth glove over your palm and wrist.
- Remove gloves by turning them half inside out, then slide off gently.
- If possible, try to avoid getting leather gloves wet in the rain — streaking and staining may occur. However, if they get wet, put the gloves on your hand and massage the spots with your fingertips. This will minimize the staining and restore the supple softness of the leather.
- Never roll gloves into a ball to put them away... instead, after wearing, stretch back to original shape, straighten fingers, and pat gloves while they are still warm to help retain shapeliness and trim fit.

- Speaking of fit, do you know your glove size? Making sure that your gloves fit properly will provide extra warmth for your hands (remember, your hands are the second most susceptible part of your body for heat loss) and enhance their look on your hand as well.
- Follow these four simple steps for making sure your gloves fit properly:
1. Place the beginning of a tape measure on the knuckle of your index finger.
  2. Bring the tape across the other knuckles.
  3. Continue moving the tape around the palm side of the hand until the tape reaches the point where you started. (Leave the thumb completely out!)
  4. The point where the tape meets is your glove size. For example, six inches is size 6 glove, seven inches is size 7 glove, etc.
- Most of all, enjoy your gloves — they are meant to be a fun fashion accessory!



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Place a few tablespoons of herbs — camomile, rosemary or thyme — in a bowl. Pour boiling water over all and hold a towel over your head making a tent. Steam for 10 minutes, blot dry and apply an astringent.

• **Drinking:** Most nutritionists recommend drinking the equivalent of nine 8-ounce glasses of water a day to ensure that

your body is adequately cleansed. But be sure of your water quality.

If tap water is not to your liking, try getting a home water filtration system to remove undesirables and to make your water fresher, more natural. Remember, juices, milk, tomatoes and soups also have a high water content.

• **Rinsing:** Rinse and rinse again using the cleanest, clearest water. Do use softened water to eliminate that soap curd film, and do rinse carefully 10 times, splashing your face as least five times with tepid water.

• **Spritzing:** In cold weather, humidity is often difficult to control, especially when rooms are overheated and the air is dry. Try keeping a pan of water on the radiator and misting your face regularly to rehydrate the skin for a fresh, glowing look.

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
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

## Eye on men's fashion: the spotlight's on tradition with a twist

### menswear with an emphasis on quality, classic good looks

There are as many definitions to the phrase "fashion excitement" as there are people, and menswear for fall, 1984, is an arena for them all.

Conservative dressers will appreciate the fine tailoring, subtle details and classic good looks of traditional clothing, while those men in the avant-garde will love suits which boast something more than a subtle difference, and which redefine the silhouette in sometimes dramatic ways.

As in seasons past, color and fabric provide much of the opportunity for designers and manufacturers to display their virtuosity, many featuring subtle interplays of a veritable rainbow of hues in the weave of the fabric.

Whether nubby for dimensional appeal or smooth, the way the traditionalists prefer, the keynote to fabric for fall '84 is richness and quality.

#### A touch of classic

This is carried through in all areas of menswear, giving classic stature to even the less traditional styles.

Sweaters, as always, are front runners in terms of styling, with designers utilizing a freer hand, unbound by restrictions of office attire, to create a multiplicity of fashion looks.

Some sweaters boast novelty patterns such as white and black terriers on a gray ground (one designer's signature sweater for fall), or hand-knitted sports sweaters which feature full views of hockey or football players in full star action (the *piece de resistance* of another designer's fall collection); others, a host of dazzling geometrics which have in distinctiveness and popularity replaced the fair isles which tended to dominate in previous years.

#### Interplay of textures

Pattern on pattern and texture on texture looks, both important aspects of women's wear for fall, make their mark on menswear as well, with their strongest impact on casual dress clothes — the English country gentleman style, for instance, with a tweedy hacking jacket worn over a nubby sweater, dimensional trousers (cuffed or not — designers are divided in their stance, allowing even the most fashion-aware men to follow their individual preference in this important issue), one or more sweaters, and a striped, plaid or solid shirt.

This country squire look is often translated into purely American terms — rather than riding to hounds, men who favor this style of dressing are likely to spend their leisure hours fishing, or perhaps rock climbing. Thus is born a certain ruggedness of style, very flattering and very masculine.

#### Getting your hair in shape

Fitness, health and beauty are "in" for the '80s, and hair care is an important part of maintaining a healthy, vibrant image. Total care involves not only a balanced diet and exercise, but proper hair care that will help you and your hair shine. So get ready, it's time to shape up your hair.

Hair condition is a mirror of an individual's health. So develop a basic hair-care routine that keeps your hair shiny clean. This consists of regular regime of shampooing and conditioning.

A quality shampoo removes dulling oil, dirt and loose flakes as well as air pollutants from both hair and scalp.

It must be strong enough to do the job yet not so harsh that it causes damage or irritation. The shampoo should provide a full rich lather that traps dirt and soil, and carries them away from hair and scalp.

It must also rinse away quickly and easily, so no trace of suds or soil remain. Incomplete rinsing can leave a dulling film on hair or cause the scalp to flake and itch.

Conditioning can help detangle hair and makes wet-combing easier. Conditioner also improves manageability and adds body, bounce, and shine.

Simple as it seems, it is important to note how to shampoo and condition. First, massage scalp with finger tips, not fingernails.

Gentle pressure aids cleaning and helps circulation — by using your nails, you could scratch your scalp or snag and tear the hair strands. Also, avoid too much water pressure when rinsing. Heavy water pressure can strain and tangle hair.

How often you shampoo and condition depends on the condition of your hair and scalp, your personal preference and, last mentioned but not least, your hair style. Choosing a style that complements you and your schedule gives you more time to do the things you really want to and more confidence in your appearance.

Before deciding on a style, consult your hair stylist. Consider your hair type, face shape and lifestyle. In keeping a healthy, active schedule, you may want to choose a no-fuss hairstyle that works for every day.

A good cut requires little time to style and still appears natural and attractive. You can eliminate the use of curlers and irons by using a hands-only method.

Simply dry the roots first and continue to "scrunch" hair with your fingers — like crumpling a piece of paper. This gives your hair volume and body in a matter of minutes.

Today, there is no need for your hair to look less than terrific. A good cut and proper hair care contribute to a more healthy you!
