# Clergy address moral side of politics

Most area clergy agree that the church does indeed play a role in the political arena and it's not a new one.

"The church is very influential in the whole mix," says Rev. David Antonson, associate pastor of Grosse Pointe Memorial Presbyterian Church.

While ministers can speak their mind, it's up to individuals to decide with their own free conscience their beliefs, he adds.

"I think ministers need to be very careful in using the pulpit as a platform to air personal political beliefs," says Rev. William Cummins of the Ebenezer Baptist Church on Moross Road. "As a minister, my task should be to tell what the Bible says, not my political persuasions.

Monsignor Francis Canfield of St. Paul Catholic Church says the Catholic church has "a prophetic role, as spokesman for moral values." Social issues have a moral dimension as well as personal and family issues, making it his duty to speak out on abortion and nuclear

The Rev. Philip Wahl, senior pastor of St. Paul Lutheran Church, says clergy should also take an active role in other political matters such as welfare legislation

and concerns for the mentally retarded and handicapped.

"I've been active in politics before," says Wahl. "No one is for nuclear war, so then the question is what do we need to do as a society now given that horrendous power? How do we influence the use of that

"The church as a spokesman can point out its belief in human values." he adds.

Several clergy favored discussing moral and political issues in a open forum where a relaxed atmosphere fosters the exchange of several ideas and opinions.

"Nobody is for abortion, it's pro-

choice basically," says Rev. Jack Mannschreek of Grosse Pointe United Methodist Church. "We realize human life isn't to be taken lightly, but what is the church doing in its mission to appease the suffering of unwanted children, unwed mothers and teenage pregnancies?

"It's a sin to take a human life. However, there are issues that involve more than taking of that life and that can't be entered into lightly," he adds.

The Rev. Edward Cobden, rector of Christ Episcopal Church, says it's not appropriate for the church as an institution to pressure legislators or the electorate.

to articulate its ethical view and educate people about values." he

"Clearly my role isn't to endorse party candidates. Yet on the other hand, I do want our people concerned about poverty, war, peace, abortion and planned parenthood; ethical implications as informed by our Christian faith.

while there is agreement that church and state will always 'come up against one another." religion shouldn't be used as a political football. That should be saved for cases of extreme necessity, such as another holocaust, says

# 21-year-old dies in auto accident Second man injured

Farms police are investigating an auto accident that occurred early Thursday morning, Sept. 6, that killed 21-year-old Joseph Gregory Siero, of Devonshire Road, and injured Lawrence Stephen Diener, 21, of Ridgemont Road.

According to reports, the crash occurred at about 2:15 a.m. Thursday morning when a leased 1984 maroon-over-silver Dodge Daytona left Kercheval Avenue, traveled 89 feet over a lawn and smashed into a large tree near the intersection of Moran Road. The path the car traveled left a single rut, four inches wide and two inches deep, in the lawn leading to the tree. Glass from the impact was found more than six feet up the tree, which measured 91 inches in circumference.

According to reports, Diener told police that he was driving the car. Responding officers found the vehicle 22 feet beyond the tree with its passenger side completely caved in. Mr. Siero was found laying on the sidewalk near some hedges, after he was thrown free of the car.

Mr. Siero was taken by the Farms Fire Department to Cottage Hospital, where he was pronounced dead on arrival. Diener was transported to Cottage by police, where he was treated for lacerations to his forehead.

Because drinking was suspected in the accident, Diener was asked by Farms police to allow a blood sample to be taken, after his rights were read to him. Diener gave his permission and the sample was

After being informed that Mr. Siero was dead, Diener was again read the Miranda rights, at his request, and then refused to take a breathalyzer test.

He was taken back to the Farms police station and remained there until he was released later that afternoon. No charges were pressed.

After Mr. Siero's parents were informed of their son's death, the body was taken to the Wayne County Medical Examiners office, where a blood sample was obtained for analysis.

According to a statement given—Cemetery

to the police, Mr. Siero's father, Dr. Jose Siero, said he last saw his son Wednesday afternoon when he drove off saying he was going to visit his girlfriend on Wayburn Road.


The girlfriend told police Mr. Siero stayed a short while, then drove off to meet Diener.

According to police reports, Diener stated that he and Mr. Siero had been at the Rustic Cabin Inn. 15209 Kercheval, had become involved in an altercation with another patron, and had left.

Diener allegedly said that they had been driving back at a high rate of speed, discussing the altercation when their car ran over the curb and into the tree.

The matter is under investigation at this time as to possible criminal charges and we are seeking possible witnesses to the altercation that took place at or in the bar," said Farms Det. Sgt. George VanTiem. "Also any witnesses who may have seen the car traveling down Kercheval. The bar isn't that far from the site of the accident ncone may nave seen some thing. We'd appreciate a call."

If it can be proved that alcohol was involved, the accident would be the third drinking/driving fatality in the Pointes during 1983-84. according to records at the Grosse Pointe News





# Court throws out Park lawsuit

Grosse Pointe Park residents wanting to stop the Bon Secours Hospital and Detroit Institute of Opthalmology (DIO) project got their day in court Aug. 31, only to learn it was all in vain.

"Filing under the wrong procedure constituted a legal technicality and Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Susan D. Borman threw the case out completely, said James Walsh, assistant Park city attorney. "Mrs. McIntyre (the attorney representing the group) should have brought the appeal under the zoning enabling act. Now we're waiting for the judge to sign the order terminating the lawsuit."

If the citizens decide to file the appropriate lawsuit, they would have to give the city advance

notice next time, "something they didn't do the first time around. said Walsh.

"The city is now free to go ahead with its plans. But we did tell the judge we would let Mrs. McIntyre know if there are any plans to start substantial work on the project to give her opportunity to seek another injunction," he added.

On Friday, Sept. 7, Mrs. McIntyre said she hadn't decided what further legal action to take, since council's recent decision to block Somerset at Jefferson Avenue and cul-de-sac the street may have calmed some neighborhood fears.

"We'll take a repoll of the area," she said. "This hasn't lost its wind

Her group originally filed a tem-

porary restraining order against the city of Grosse Pointe Park to show why the \$5 million outpatient building should be finished.

The temporary restraining order put all systems on hold until the court could review the legality of the height variance which council granted to the backers of the project last month over the objections of many residents.

The issue involved a mechanical equipment room that will perch on the top of the complex and will exceed the recently passed zoning or-dinance, that limits building height to 30 feet, by 12 feet.

judges, he was adjunct professor of law at Wayne State University. He has published more than a dozen articles, most of which deal with some aspect of ethics in the court-



# Grosse Pointe school district and cities lose population

The number of school-age children in the Grosse Pointe school district decreased by 951 from May 1982 to May 1984, according to the system's biennial census.

According to data collected last May, the school-age population, those between ages 5 and 19, was 11,791 in the 57,551-person school district. In May 1982, the census recorded 12,742 people of school age in a district containing 57,722 people.

Enrollment in the public school system is expected to drop from last year's 7,517 to 7,185 students this year, according to the school administration.

Although the population continues to decline, there is a leveling off, according to David King, assistant director of support services and personnel. The elementary population should not get much smaller than it is during the next few years, but the decline will be most felt at the secondary school

Among the good news in the census is the number 3- and 4-year olds who are in the district, King said. The May 1984 census recorded 1,117 3-and-4-year-olds, up almost 13 percent from the 988 recorded in 1982.

The district's population of 0-to-4-year-olds increased 5.9 percent, with 2,445 recorded last May compared to the 2,309 in May 1982.

The increase will help offset the loss of students at the high school level, a stabilization that will continue in coming years, King added.

The continued declining enrollment at the secondary level is going to continue for the next few years, King said. Some students come to the high school from private and parochial schools to help boost enrollment, he added.

"We have to continue doing what we're doing by offering quality programs at the secondary level,' King said. The census confirms the administration's planning for a

declining population at the secondary level, he added.

The census shows public school enrollment remains at about 76 percent of the school age popula-tion attending school. The Park shows the highest percentage of school age children attending public school with 82 percent. Twelve percent of the school age population in the Park attend parochial school while 6 percent attends private school, according to the census.

In the Woods, 78 percent of school-age children attend public school, with 18 percent attending public school and 4 percent attending private school, according to the census.

Grosse Pointe City sends 77 percent of its school-age population to public schools, with 13 percent attending parochial and 10 percent attending private schools. The Farms has 66 percent of its schoolage population in public school, with 15 percent in parochial and 19 percent in private schools.

school-age population to public school, with about 22 percent attending parochial and 26 percent attending private schools.

The part of Harper Woods in the Grosse Pointe school district sends 87 percent of its school-age population to public school, with 12 percent attending parochial schools. Less than 1 percent of the students attending private school, according to the census.

By school district, Defer recorded 1,691 people between ages 0 and 19, down 81 from 1982. Ferry recorded 2,202 in that age group, up 128 from two years ago. Kerby counted 1,643 0-to-19 year-olds, down 59 from 1982. Maire reported 1,431 people in that age group, down 87 from two years ago.

The Mason school district reported 1,087 people between 0 and 19 years old. 42 less than two years ago. Monteith reported an increase in 1984 with 2,423 students, up 1,099 from two years ago. Poupard recorded 1,045 0- to 19-year

There are 2,209 school-age residents of the Farms and 2,054 residents age 60 or older, 21 and 19 percent respectively of the city's 10,570 population. The Wood's 18,942 people include 3,879, or 20 percent, between 5 and 19 and 3,422, or 18 percent, 60 years of age

In the Shores, 685 people fell between ages 5 and 19 while 595 were aged 60 or older. The two groups comprise 22 percent and 19 percent of the village's 3,176 population.

The 5,703 people who live in Harper Woods and are included in the Grosse Pointe school system include 870 people between age 5 and



# An overplayed issue?

MICHIGAN'S INCOME TAX dropped to 5.35 percent on Sept. 1 as a result of the recent action by the Legislature, but the issue still is apparently a major factor in the fall political campaign.

A poll by a Republican-oriented Lansing polling firm found that 52 percent of the respondents said they would be "less likely" to cast their ballots for an incumbent state representative who had voted for the 1983 income tax boost. Another 33 percent of the respondents said it would make no difference to them, 10 percent said they would be more likely to vote such a legislator, and the remaining 5 percent said they didn't know whether it would make a difference or not.

As indicated by the nature of the poll, the Republicans are hoping to use the controversy over the 38 percent increase in the tax rate last year to defeat House Democrats who voted for the measure. Neither the governor nor the Senate is up for election this year and so the legislative contests are limited to the House. The Republicans, who won control of the Senate last year by upsetting two incumbent Democrats in recall campaigns based on the income tax increase, would like to use the same issue to win the House in November.

THE GOP CONTENDS that the income tax ought to be restored to the pre-1983 level of 4.6 percent earlier than Oct. 1, 1987. They got some ammunition for their argument when the Department of Management and Budget last week estimated that the state would have a \$271 million surplus at the end of the current fiscal year Sept. 30. That is about \$50 million above the estimated surplus only a month earlier.

The Republicans argue that with a surplus that size the income tax rate ought to be cut because administrations have ways of spending funds that are piling up. The Democrats, on the other hand, contend that it would be irresponsible to cut the income tax back to 4.6 percent now because of the precarious state of the economic recovery in Michigan.

There is something to each side of this argument and the public can expect to hear a good deal more about it from House candidates as the November election approaches. Since the income tax rate already has dropped twice this year — from 6.35 to 6.1 percent on Jan. 1 and then to 5.35 percent Sept. 1 — we tend to think the issue is being overplayed. But there is no doubt the tax issue is an attractive one for the Republicans in a campaign year.

# The Ferraro factor

IN BOTH NATIONAL and state public opinion polls, the Reagan-Bush ticket is still substantially ahead of the Mondale-Ferraro slate, but Geraldine Ferraro's nomination apparently did strengthen the appeal of the Democrats just as they had hoped when they nominated her at San Francisco.

In Michigan, the Detroit News poll showed that the Republican ticket still leads by a comfortable 48 to 41 percent margin, but that is well below the 55-39 percent margin by which President Reagan led before Ms. Ferraro was chosen. A Los Angeles Times survey found that Ms. Ferraro's presence on the ticket also increases the national appeal of the Democrats — but not enough to threaten the 59 to 36 percent GOP lead.

THE NEWS REPORTED that Ms. Ferraro scored well when matched against Vice President George Bush even though Bush carried Michigan in the 1980 Republican presidential primary when he defeated Ronald Reagan. In the News poll, respondents rated Ms. Ferraro superior to Bush in intelligence, leadership and understanding citizens' problems. And on per-sonal appeal as a whole, the News poll found that Ms. Ferraro scored higher than Bush or Walter Mondale, but lower than President Reagan.

The News poll reported that 23 percent of those surveyed said Mondale's selection of Ms. Ferraro made them more likely to support the Democratic ticket while only 14 percent said it made them less likely to do so. Three months earlier, before Ms. Ferraro's nomination, the News Poll had found 12 percent of the voters would be more likely to support a ticket with a woman on it, but 10 percent said they would be less likely to do so.

WHATEVER THE RESULT in November, the nomination of the first woman candidate for vice president has had the effect of concentrating more attention on the candidates for that office this year. Yet even disregarding the new factor, the nation ought to pay more attention to the vice presidents because almost one-third of our 40 presidents — 13 to be exact — had served as vice president before moving to the higher office.

It is said that vice presidents are only a heart beat away from the presidency. That is true. Eight vice presidents have succeeded to the top office at the assassination or death from natural causes of the presidents under whom they served. Four others found the vice-presidency to be win election as president and one, Michigan's Gerald Ford became president upon the resignation of President Nixon.

THIS YEAR WALTER Mondale is seeking to become the 14th vice president to make it to the White House, even though at the moment he appears more likely to join his late Minnesota colleague, Hubert Humphrey, as among those who did not succeed in the attempt.

# A bad choice for Michigan

what we pay for civilized society." Most people probably would agree with that comment, but where differences occur is over the question of how much taxes we should be required to pay. Those differences of opinion over how much is enough explain the controversy in Michigan over the so-called tax revolt and such proposals as the Voter's Choice amendment which has just been put on the November ballot.

Under the Voter's Choice, which will appear as Proposal C on the ballot, the Michigan Constitution would be amended to roll back state and non-voted local property taxes to their December 1981 level within 90 days of passage, unless voters agreed in special elections to keep the higher taxes. Any new or increased taxes would require voter approval or a four-fifths vote of the state Legislature.

What would this mean to the state and its local units?

It would require the rollback of major increases in gasoline, tobacco and income taxes enacted since 1981 unless the voters approved of them in a special election. The state of Michigan, according to the nonpartisan Citizens Research Council, would face the possible loss of more than \$1 billion a year from its general revenue fund which totals about \$5.43 billion. That would be a cut of about 20 percent in such revenues. The proposal also would limit nonresident municipal income taxes to one-half of one percent, which would cost Detroit and Highland Park an estimated \$40 million a year in local income tax

The trouble with an initiative of this kind is that it attempts to deal with a complex problem

Nobody likes to pay taxes. Yet, as Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes Jr., once wrote, "Taxes are backs in state and local taxes offers no advice on cutting any public service. Is it to be public education at the K-12 level which in many communities already is underfunded? Is it to be higher education which, until the budget increases for the current fiscal year, had been pruned so much that Michigan public university tuition rates had to be raised to among the highest in the country? Is it to be welfare spending which increased because of the recession, high unemployment and inflation? Or is it to be some other public services?

It is because Voter's Choice offers only a meatax solution to the problem or high taxes that the Promote Michigan Committee, a coalition of business, labor, education and religious organizations, was formed to oppose the proposed amendment. It is a bipartisan group whose leaders are both Republicans and Democrats and who are concerned about the impact of such a proposal on the state's essential services and its long-run future.

It is important that Michigan's tax load be competitive with other states, especially as it impacts business. As business expands and the economy improves, revenues rise and the state can afford more and better services. But the Voter's Choice amendment really does not address this complex problem. Instead, it seeks to chop public spending and let the legislators, the administrators and even the school boards of the state worry about how they are to live with the sharp cuts in revenues. There is no advice about now to keep schools running, maintain the high ways, finance social services and perform other essential services required of a "civilized society," if the Voter's Choice should pass.



To the Editor: During the recent debate over school closings, the most frequently-made claim was that, although Grosse Pointe Schools did contain some 13, 282 children at one time, these schools were actually designed

A small amount of research reveals this allegation to be a complete falsehood. The 1982-83 Statistical Annual Report of the public school system reports data that clearly shows the 15 schools were designed for 13,975 students. And in 1970, when the system did have 13,282 students, it was only occupied 95 percent.

for about 11,000 students.

Last year, these 13,975 seats were only occupied by 7,517 students, an occupancy rate of 53.7 percent. This year, according to the proposed 1984-85 operating budget, the occupancy rate of the school system will decline slightly to 53.3 percent, even though the 500-seat

Barnes School is being closed.
This is because Barnes School only has an enrollment of 191 students last year — 38 percent usage — but the entire school system is experiencing a decline this year of 332 students.

Surprisingly, the teaching staff only declined by two, from 469.7 last year to 467.7 teachers this year. However, the adadministrative staff did decline from 36.5 last year to 32 this vear.

The 800-seat Ferry School only has 267 students this year an occupancy rate of 33 percent. What's happening in our high schools is also significant. South, designed for 2,400 students, only has 1,631 this year. Even more shocking is that North, designed for 2,700 students, only has 1,431 students and 1,269 vacant chairs. Thus, the two high schools will have 2,038 empty seats this year.

Clearly, building North was a mistake, although this probably couldn't have been perceived when it was done. Nevertheless, this mistake will have to be rectified some time in the future if the cost of education is not to continue soaring in Grosse Pointe.

All of this makes clear why the cost or educating a child in Grosse Pointe has climbed in the past dozen years or so from about \$1,100 per child a year to an astounding \$4,949 per child this year. Grosse Pointe will spend more than \$15 million this year for "support services" - excluding instruction service - and this huge cost largely continues, regardless of the enrollment decline or even the closing of a school,

Incidentally, the average cost of educating one child for one class in Grosse Pointe for one year is now \$824.83. This assumes each child takes six classes, which isn't always

So the plan to charge Harper Woods students \$300 a year to educate a child in one class results in a loss of \$524.83 per year. Nevertheless, this is probably a worthwhile program.

That the Harper Woods school system was designed for 3,000 students and now only has 888 students strongly suggests the old concept of neighborhood schools may be becoming extinct in many areas.

In conclusion, the question for the residents of Grosse

Pointe is "Do we wish to continue this extravagant, toolarge school system as it is, or are we going to tackle the distasteful but necessary job of closing more schools?"

# City can just raise bridge

To the Editor:

I have been following with interest the exchanges between Grosse Pointe Woods Boat Club past-commodore Larry Sullivan and member Marie Sabol. The issue is the accommodation of more boats in the Woods park.

The Woods has the largest population, but the smallest marina facility of any of the Pointes. More boats could be accommodated if there weren't a bridge in the middle of the park. The distance between the water and the bottom of the bridge is four to five feet. If there were eight to 10 feet, the marina would be full and the city would realize more revenue

I have stood before the council as early as five years ago and proposed the bridge be raised. It's a simple matter. Cut the bridge away from the land and raise it with a crane. Then insert five-foot concrete blocks under it, lower it back into place and terrace the approaches back about 200 feet.

The idea of blowing up the bridge and then building a new one some distance away was discarded years ago. There have been many suggestions and many architects' drawings over the years, but the council has not acted on one of them.

Councilman John Sabol even said the state could sell water to neighboring states and that would lower the lake level by four or five feet. Come on, John, if that happened, there wouldn't be any water left in the river. How about all the yacht clubs

and people living on canal lots. Their boats would be aground.

The Woods boat club has been trying to work with the council for years on the dockage problem with hardly any success. All we're trying to do is to provide dockage for more of our residents and put more money in the city treasury.

On the subject of the Woods park, I sometimes wonder why anyone would want to keep a boat there anyway. The Milk River is an open sewer. Every time it rains, the dam is opened and all kinds of things the people of St. Clair Shores put into their toilets come floating into the marina (?). After a rain, you can see hundreds of fish surface, belly up. The councilmen don't believe that because they don't go to the park.

When my boat is hauled out of the water at a commercial marina and the bottom is cleaned, I have to pay much more than people who keep their boats elsewhere because the bottom is so filthy. But that's another issue. Let's get the bridge issue resolved as was mandated by a vote of the residents three years

# Prime Time for senior citizens

"Summertime and the livin' is easy" is a memorable song from a favorite classic, "Porgy And Bess." Obviously Porgy was not singing of the favorite American pastime - tourism. From time immemorial, the closing of schools in June has been a signal for vacationers to plan an itinerary and take to the roads, air and sea. Besides a change of scenery, they seek to refresh and refuel their minds and bodies. It helps to see them through the stresses and strains of earning the wherewithal to take care of all obligations and still have enough left to explore new sights and sounds.

However, sometimes vacations can be taxing, not to mention downright frustrating. Roads are crowded, planes are booked and cruises sold out. These are the problems of those who still toil in the work-aday world.

While there are some disadvantages to being retired (curtailed income for one), the opportunity to travel by car over uncongested roads, maneuvering for airplane reservations or getting a choice stateroom on a cruise is not among them. In September, when school is in session, roads are comparatively free of travel, airlines are advertising reduced rates to everywhere and there are bargain cruises. Now is the prime time for retirees to see the world, other states or tour their own state of Michigan.

Actually touring Michigan in the fall when the leaves of the trees are changing from the faded green of late summer into the glowing vibrant colors of fall can be a memorable vacation.

From north to south and west to east, there are roads that provide a sweeping panorama of glorious color. The brilliant yellow of poplars, the gold of sugar maples and the bright crimson red maples combine to make travelling Michigan roads in fall an experience.

In the Upper Peninsula near the tip of the Keweenaw Peninsula on a ridge high above Lake Superior near Copper Harbor, a tourist can view all the colors of the forest set against the panorama of the blue waters of Superior.

Procupine Mountains State Park above Lake of the Clouds offers a panoply of colors and a visit to Tahquamenon Falls is not to be missed. Walk to the platform at the brink of the falls. The trees above the walls of the river are gorgeous.

These are but two of the many scenic color tours possible to enjoy in upper Michigan. If you don't care to travel that far, plan a short trip to the Irish Hills. There are many possible routes. One of the most rewarding is M-50 which will take you to Hidden Lake Gardens, a complex owned by Michigan State University and comprised of natural upland and lowland forests interspersed with exotic plantings.

While nature in its various guises is never more attractive than when it puts on its radiant autumn dress, there are those who admit the beauty of the presentation and appreciate the pageant, but are more interested in visiting historical

For them a tour of the elegant historical homes in Marshall is more appealing. The city of Marshall is proud of its architectural past and has made historic preservation a number-one priority. Unlike small towns where structures were torn down to make way for progress, the town has emphasized the restoration of the old homes built in the 1800s. As a result the town basks in an aura of elegance, charm and grace.

Probably the best known is the Honolulu House. Abner Pratt, a lawyer, judge and state senator, chief justice and U.S. consul in the Sandwich Islands, built the house in 1860. It is regarded by many authorities as the most important historic house in Michigan.

Niles is one of the few Midwest communities that have been successively under the flags of England, France, Spain and the United States. One of Niles' best known citizens was Ring Lardner, sportswriter and sardonic humorist. The Lardner House is still a showplace. Lardner was born there in 1885 and the house had been in existence for many

If castles interest you, there is a miniature Norman-style in Owosso complete with turrets and towers. James Oliver Curwood, novelist and environmentalist, has his studio there.

For a modest history adventure in central east Michigan, try the Frank Murphy birthplace in Harbor Beach. It's a four room cottage with a small wing that was the law office of Murphy's father. Frank Murphy was mayor of Detroit, governor general of the Philippines and later, high commissioner, and on his return, governor of Michigan. He served as attorney general of the United States and later as a United States Supreme Court associate justice.

Mention Grand Rapids and immediately one thinks of the furniture industry. But the stately homes on Heritage Hill built by the tycoons are major attractions.

There are 591 buildings in the area rated significant by architects and 20 judged outstanding.

One of the most touching and personal recollections of growing up in Michigan is Bruce Catton's "Waiting for the Morning Train." He was born in Benzonia in the Leelanau Peninsula near the Sleeping Bear Sand Dunes.

One of America's most famous authors spent 20 of his first 21 summers at a cottage near Petoskey on Walloon Lake. He was Ernest Hemingway and the cottage, called Windemere, is still there.

Close to home one can experience history in our area, Parent's Creek in Elmwood Cemetery in Detroit where Chief Pontiac ambushed the British. It now runs clear, but it is still called Bloody Run. Fort Wayne is another historical site. It was constructed shortly after the War of 1812 to shield Detroit from the invasion of Canada. Another is one of the most elegant railroad stations in the nation, the old Michigan Central depot at Ann Arbor, now a restaurant.

In view of the golden jubilee of growth, and particularly since the question of religions has become such a burning issue in campaign rhetoric, a tour that would encompass a visit to some of the churches that were built in 1884 might be of interest.

1884 was a time of growth and fervor of 19th century churches. The 1884 state census listed 2,856 church organizations from 30 different denominations. Just 50 years before in 1834, the territory had only a few churches. In 1837 after a two-year battle, Michigan won statehood. There was unbounded strength in mining, lumbering and farming. In the flush of prosperity, it might be thought that religions would become a minor consideration.

That was not the case. Every denomination built church buildings and schools. It is interesting to note, again in view of present day banterings over religion, few Michigan villages were theocracies controlled by one religious group. Buildings were shared.

Although many Michigan pioneers were not associated with a church either by choice or because there was no church in the vicinity. there was a universal acceptance of the church as a cornerstone of society.

Michigan's earliest remaining churches are simple structures. Among these crossroad cathedrals are the austere log structures built by isolated congregations. The best preserved survivor of the small number of documented early Michigan log churches is the Greensky Hill Mission Church. It is located just east or unarievoix.

Mostly early churches, however, were timber-frame structures patterned after the church buildings of New England. The best preserved Michigan example of these unpretentious churches is the 1829 Mission Church on Mackinac Island.

Among the old churches, James Garfield spoke at the Muir Church of Christ in northeast Ionia County in 1854. The Rev. Issa Ervelt, the church's first pastor, delivered the principal oration at the funeral of assassinated President Garfield.

St. Paul's Episcopal Mission located on a bluff above the Flint River is a beautifully located church and has an interesting history

Built in 1874 by immigrants from Ireland, England and Scotland, it is a perfect showcase for the local labor and materials that went into its construction.



# Student-teacher ratio disputed

According to the Grosse Pointe Public School System Proposed Operating Budget — July 1, 1984-June 30, 1985 submitted by Dr. Kenneth Brummel prior to his departure: "The high school student-teacher ratio projected and budgeted for 1984-85 is 18.7 which is . down from 1983-84." (pg. 8)

The writer confesses to ignorance of the components that contributed to arriving at this 18.7 figure.

In two letters to the Grosse Pointe News demanding further economy in the public schools, Joe Callahan cited "empty classrooms and idle staffs." The schools were not identified; again the writer is in the dark.

Nor can the writer explain what happened during the summer to the 18.7 "ratio" and the 'idle staffs.

For example, the teacher who starts this September with

147 students per day — that's 735 students a week, 26,460 a school year - will hardly be idle. For another example, the teacher who ha 147 students a day enrolled in the five classes that he is by contract assigned will have a studentteacher ratio of 29.4 per class,

However, in the case cited, 147 students is the minimum. In addition, each teacher will meet with a indeterminate number of students during the

# 20 make National Merit Scholarship list

Three Grosse Pointe high schools placed 20 students in the semifinals of the 1985 National Merit Scholarship Corporation's competition, according to the program public information office.

North High School students who were named semifinalists are John Cobau, Julie Johnson, Randy Kuntzman, Patrick McDonald and James Thompson.

Students named as semifinalists from South are Christopher Bardeen, William B. Colwell, David R. Conrad, Mary E. Dietz, Karen M. Emery, Caroline E. Todd, Renuka N. Uthappa and James C. West.

University Liggett students include semifinalists Eric Christian, Gillian Darlow, Norman Issa, Lubna Jafri, Jeffrey Sweet, Michael

Wilkie and Monique Wise.

These high school seniors are among the 15,000 semifinalists who will have an opportunity to advance in the competition for about 5,500 merit scholarships, valued at more than \$20 million, to be awarded in the spring of 1985.

More than one million students from 18,000 secondary schools entered the competition last fall by taking the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) in their junior

Those who qualified as semifinalists include the highest scorers in every state and represent the top 5 percent of this year's senior class.

To become one of approximately 13,500 finalists who will be considered for awards, semifinalists must document their high academic performance throughout high school, receive the recommendation and endorsement of their principal, confirm their earlier qualifying test scores on a second examination and provide information about their interests, accomplishments and goals.

Three distinctly different types of awards will be offered. Every finalist will be considered for one of single-payment national awards that are allocated by state, in numbers proportional to each state's percentage of the total U.S. high school graduating class.

Winners in each state will be the finalists judged to have the strongest combination of academic and extracurricular accomplishments. In 1985, these nonrenewable awards will be increased in value from \$1,000 to \$2,000 and 1,800 National Merit \$2000 Scholarships will be offered.

More than one-third of them will be sponsored by corporate organizations that also finance four-year scholarships. The remainder will be underwritten with NMSC's own

Only finalists who meet preferential criteria of award grantors will compete for about 3,700 four-year merit scholarships of two types. About 1,400 will be corporate-sponsored awards which provide between \$500 and \$2,000 or more per

Corporate sponsors may specify

their four-year scholarships for finalists who are children of their employees, residents of an area served by the sponsor, or students with career goals the company or business organization wishes to

The remaining 2,300 four-year merit scholarships will be financed by colleges and universities for finalists who will attend their institutions. Winners of these awards receive stipends ranging from \$250 to \$2,000 for each undergraduate year of study at the sponsor college.

NMSC is a not-for-profit organization whose activities are financed by more than 600 independent sponsors, without federal or state funds. The 1985 class of merit scholars to be announced next spring will join some 84,000 other academic champions who have received merit scholarships worth \$247 million since the first merit program was completed in 1956.





"It finally dawned on us, late to our shame, that segregation was a horrendous situation that had to be changed. Our church spoke out, marched and protested, and worked to get laws changed so children could go to the same schools," he

"I think it's an error for the government or any political system to affirm any one right way of religious belief," says Wahl. "Yet, at the same time, it's the responsibility of the religious community to be informed enough so that it can speak to the political reality of the

# North teacher receives grant

Gordon Morlan, North High School chemistry teacher, received a grant from the U.S. Army for participation in the Summer Associateship Program for High School Science and Mathematics Faculty.

The purpose of this program is to give the high school faculty member hands on experience with current research, allowing them to better counsel and encourage students to both undertake and continue the study of science.

Such exposure to research and development activities in a

laboratory strengthens teaching abilities of the instructors involved, according to school officials.

The host laboratory to which Mr. Morlan was assigned is the U.S. Army Tank-Automotive Command in Warren, Michigan. His work was with Dr. Douglas Rose in the Applied Research Function. Dr. Rose is involved in the development of a new method of non-destructive testing, called Scanning Photo-

his nomination. Steiner said he talked the matter over with his two brothers and girlfriend before deciding to enter the race. He added he had planned to run for office two years from now and saw this as a chance to get into politics

Steiner said he is "very much pro-Lucas," adding he thought the work done by county executive William Lucas to reorganize and streamline county government were steps in the right direction.

"I think the county is better off now with Lucas in office than we were before," Steiner said. "He has worked for the people while he's been in office . . . and I want to be a part of that to help him."

He would like to study his opponent's voting record before making any statements about it. Steiner said, but added the incumbent rates among the top five commissioners in absenteeism.

One thing he would hope to accomplish as a commissioner would be greater representation for the Grosse Pointes, which he said aren't getting the attention they should as part of the 156,000-person 1st Dis-

Expressions of support for his candidacy have come from councilmen and other members of the community, Steiner said. He plans to campaign door to door and with direct mailings, and in general will be out meeting people in the district during the coming two months.

A delegate alternate to the state GOP convention, Steiner said he thinks the next two months will give him ample time to get his message

'My opponent and I are both starting out fresh," he added.

In its first season, Johanna Gilbert's Grosse Pointe Cable TV show, "Johanna Gilbert Inter-views," had its share of ups and

Like the time Johanna decided to experiment and have her guest, Detroit News artist Bill Amenda, sit with the camera looking over his shoulder while he sketched and Johanna interviewed. The problem was, Amenda discovered that he couldn't sketch and talk at the same time. "He told me after the show that he hadn't realized it would be so tough. You have to visualize him, sketching away and talking . . . like . . . this," Johanna recalls. "I guess it worked out though, there was a wonderful artistic tension to that show . . . at least I hope our viewers saw it that

Then there was the time Johanna interviewed the late John Lake. "I felt so comfortable with him." And the time when panel members from the long running radio shows "Ask the Professor," just about took over Johanna's show. "That was terrific . what marvelous humor," she

To listen to Johanna, even the downs begin to sound like the ups. That sort of attitude is consistent with her outlook on life in general.

"I hate to sound like, an 'oh, gloryoski, I just LOVE it,' kind of person, but I really have enjoyed doing each of the programs. I think I gain so much from it. And it helps to be working with such a talented young crew, willing to listen to my ideas. For me, the whole experience has been an extension of my music and my other interests. she says.

Music IS the center of Johanna Gilbert's interest. She's a native Detroiter and a Wayne State University alumna who has performed with Valter Poole and the Detroit Symphony, sung at countless area churches, appeared with the Grosse Ile Musicale, and soloed with the Grosse Pointe Symphony and the Grosse Pointe Community Chorus.

"Music is such an important part of my life," Johanna says. "I love singing. When I'm on stage, I feel a rapport with the audience. I don't go around after the performance asking people 'did you feel the rapport?', but I feel it.''

WHAT EXCITES JOHANNA about her music is that it has opened up countless other opportunities for her. Like her cable television show. And her work with groups like the Grosse Pointe Chamber Players, Tuesday Musicale, the Grosse Pointe Symphony Society and the Women's Association for the Detroit Symphony.

"I'd hate my obituary to read: she was a club woman. I don't think of my involvement in those terms.

"Ruth Burczyk introduced me to Tuesday Musicale. I had three babies and we only had one car, so Ruth picked me up for the musicales. You really have to work to present songs in front of your peer group like you do at Tuesday Musicale and the whole experience kept me performance-ready.

"Then I joined Theatre Arts and that helped me with my movements. You don't move around much as a church singer. At least then I learned what to do with my hands. Then there was Dee Shaheen . . . she told me I'd be 'Mame' in one of our productions. I was

"I think we have a wonderful family. Each child is a super individual with a sharp sense of humor and a caring nature. They've all been very supportive of my singing. And through my singing, I've come in contact with the most marvelous people. I feel I'm sharing my gift, but also coming into contact with people who enrich

The gritty defensive stand was just about all North fans had to cheer about as Brother Rice closed the Norsemen down oftensively in the first half, forcing them to punt







# Devils silence critics with 22-7 win

The flag pole was vandalized and there was no flag for the playing of the National Anthem. Utica Eisenhower had bus trouble and showed up 30 minutes late. The football team forgot to run through the paper hoop made by the cheerleaders. And the referee was leveled on South's first play of the game.

But when all said and done, the inexperienced and highly criticized South High varsity football team was 1-0, beating a highly ranked Eisenhower team, 22-7.

The Blue Devils were sparked in the opener by all three of last year's returning starters. Senior Rick Waugaman, who ran behind Paul Hawk last year, led the Blue Devils with 123 yards on 21 carries, including a five-yard touchdown run. The other two returning starters.

senior Jerry Holley at right tackle, and senior Tim Keller at left defen-sive end, led the defense. The front four were complimented by junior Jeff VanTassle at left tackle, and senior Rich Lochbiler at right end.

The real leadership came from senior quarterback Terry Ayrault, making his first start. Ayrault spent most of his junior year on the bench, but was ready when the time came.

'Anybody who starts a game has a lot of pressure, but once I took a couple of snaps, I was relieved," Ayrault said. "The offensive line made me look good by providing excellent protection, and opening holes for running backs Waugaman, Joe Samborski, Steve Butala, and Tony Wisniewski.

"Terry is one of the best practice quarterbacks we've ever had," said head coach Russ Hepner. 1 He takes well and always sprints, even in

practice. I wasn't surprised to see his poise during the game, but I was pleased at his ability to pick secondary receivers down field. That isn't something we stress in practice."

On the day, Agrault was three of eight for 76 yards, including a 24-yard touchdown pass to sophomore Tim Hudson with 11:01 left in the first half.

"It was a broken play," Ayrault commented. "I bumped into two guys in the backfield, and the pass really wasn't that well thrown, Tim just made a spectacular catch."

After the touchdown pass, George Ghazal hit the extra point and South led, 7-0. Then, with five minutes left in the half, South "blocked" an Eisenhower punt, and recovered on the Eagle 10-yard line. The punt block was a forced error, caused by defensive right end Lochbiler.

"When the ball was snapped, Rich rushed in and an Eisenhower player backed up to block him. As he moved in front of the punter, he blocked the ball with his backside," said coach Al Moebus.

Even with the break, the Blue Devils failed to score. The offense couldn't move the ball, and kicker George Ghazal shot his 26-yard field goal attempt wide.

After the missed opportunity, the Eagles struck back. The Eisenhower offense moved the ball steadilv down the field before scoring on a 14-yard touchdown pass from Scott Kerner to Todd Collins, as the half ended with a7-7 tie. The pass was one of the few highlights for Kerner, as he was five for 16 with 56 yards passing.

In the second half, South simply wore down the Eisenhower defense, scoring on two long drives. In the third quarter, Waugaman pulled three defenders into the end zone on a five yard run, and the extra point put South up, 14-7.

But it was the fourth quarter drive that sealed the victory. The time-consuming drive ended on a 16-yard touchdown run by Butala, who had 71 yards on seven carries on the day. After an Eagle penalty, Waugaman added the two point conversion, and the game ended, 22-7.

During the last two drives, sophomore sensation Dave Arnold took over where his brother Jim had left off. (Jim led South for two years in receptions.) Arnold had two receptions in those drives for 52 yards, showing definite promise for the

"I was extremely proud of our team out there on the field," continued Hepner. "They have really come together. Our tri-captains, Waugaman, Ayrault, and Larry Calcaterra, joined by Mike Keane, really took control and provided strong leadership.

In the stands, nine members from last year's squad watched as their impressive streaks were continued. The win was South's 19th straight in regular season play, and the 10th regular season game in which South held its opponent to seven points or

"Defensively, we were outstanding," said Hepner. "The improve-ment from our scrimmage was tremendous, and they did a great job.'

The "rookie" offense didn't have such an easy time. There were numerous broken plays with people running the wrong way. "Most of the problems were caused by first game jitters," Hepner concluded. "There were no turnovers, and all of our mistakes were correctible, so I think we'll be more finely tuned next week.

The Blue Devil varsity football team will open its Eastern Michigan League play this Saturday, Sept. 15, at home against Anchor Bay. Kick off is at 1 p.m.





# Deduct those tuition costs

A snake charmer who pays \$400 for a course that teaches her how to play the flute better can deduct the cost of the course from her federal income tax. A construction worker who takes a \$2,500 loan to pay for a course in heavy equipment opera-tion can deduct the interest he pays on the loan as well as the cost of the course

Millions of people each year are eligible for tax breaks because they are in school. If you're passing up on these deductions, you are throwing away money, according to the Michigan Association of CPAs.

Tax laws make allowances for self-improvement. For instance, a personnel representative who earns a Master's Degree in business administration may be able to deduct the cost of a two-year degree program. If the course work does not qualify you for another job, you may be able to save on your taxes. Similarly, a businessperson who hires a management consultant to tutor him or her in management practices can deduct

But the law is firm on which education costs are not deductible. A corporate officer who goes to law school to learn how to protect his business interests will not be allowed the deduction. That is because a legal education would probably equip a corporate officer for a different vocation. In many instances, only a fine line separates the deductible courses from those that are not.

those costs.

Expenses for education are deductible on federal income tax returns if the study improves skills needed for your current job and does not qualify you for a job in a new field. The course work, however, can help you get a promotion in your current job or shift your present responsibilities.

In addition to the cost of courses, you may also deduct the costs of books, supplies and traveling to and from the course. To take these deductions, use Schedule A on form 1040. Expenses for tuition, books and supplies must be itemized. You must file Form 2106, which requires some explanation about deductions previously these mentioned.

Traveling from job to school may be deductible. If you drive from work to school and then from school to your home, you can calculate the size of your travel deduction by using the actual expense method or the less rigorous standard mileage allowance.

If you travel and stay overnight to take a seminar, you may be entitled to a tax deduction. For instance, an art professor who travels out of state for a seminar may be able to deduct the costs associated with the trip. If part of the trip is for personal pleasure, expenses for that portion may not be deducted, the key to satisfying the IRS is to provide evidence of the educational nature of the travel, such as a course curriculum. You can take this deduction as an adjustment to income on Form 1040 even if you do not itemize deductions.

Adult students should keep in mind the tax savings they can get for student loans. If you borrow money to attend classes, the interest on the loan can be subtracted from your income if you itemize deductions. Lenders send statements at the end of each year telling you how much interest has been paid on your loan.

# New tax law affects nearly everyone

In an effort to reduce the federal deficit, close up some tax loopholes and make the rules more equitable, Congress enacted the most complex and cumbersome tax act in history. The 1984 Deficit Reduction Act (or Tax Reform Act) is the third major tax act in five years and probably not the last one. Its 1,450 pages add tremendous complexity to an already complex system and affects everyone in some

Here are just a few of the changes that may affect you, according to the Michigan Associa-

If you are investor, you only have to hold an investment for six months (and a day) to qualify for long-term capital gains tax treatment. Only 40 percent of a longterm capital gain is added to your income. For investors in the 50 percent tax bracket, the maximum tax paid is 20 percent of the gain. These new capital gains rules apply to all assets acquired after June 22, 1984.

If you purchased a luxury car for business use after June 18, 1984, you can no longer write off its full cost using a three-year depreciation formula. Now, the depreciation of all cars will be limited to a \$4,000 deduction in the first year the car is in service and a \$6,000 deduction in all subsequent years.

Divorced people will find that the law tightens a patchwork of rules on property settlements and alimony payments. The new language also dispels some confusion surrounding employe fringe benefits.

Real estate investors must now depreciate property over 18 years instead of 15, which allows smaller deductions over longer periods.

The tax on a gallon of diesel fuel went from nine to 15 cents a gallon as of Aug. 1. The tax on distilled spirits goes up \$2, to \$12.50 a gallon, on Oct. 1. And the act puts a bite on sport fishermen who must pay a 10 percent excise tax on an expanded list of fishing gear beginning Oct. 1.

Computer buyers must also contend with changes in amounts they may deduct for the business use of their computers. For computers placed in service after June 18, 1984, to qualify for an investment lax credit, more than half of its use must be for business. Additionally, to write off up to

\$5,000 for a computer in a single year or to depreciate it over five years, more than half its use must be for business and not personal reasons. A computer used 50 percent of the time or less for business must be written off under a 12-year depreciation formula, and will not qualify for an investment tax Not all the changes in the tax law

hurt: some breaks are offered. For instance, if you drive a car for charitable reasons, such as picking up clothing for a local charity, you can deduct 12 cents a mile beginrong in 1985 instead of nine cents a mile So, if you drive 5,000 miles for your local charity, you will be eligible for an additional \$150 deduc

Another change in the tax law, brought about by changing patterns in the way Americans receive medical treatment, affects medical deductions. Specifically, the new law allows you to travel to an outpatient clinic, such as the Mayo-

Clinic, and deduct as much as \$50 a night for lodging at a hotel for the period of treatment. If a friend or relative accompanies you, another \$50 deduction is allowable.

You risk losing this deduction if a significant amount of recreation or vacation is connected with the medical trip. The medical expenses qualify for deductions only if — together with your other qualifying medical expenses — they exceed five percent of your adjusted gross income. This higher floor for medical expense deductions was part of the last tax law.
