Whritner noted the district studied the possibility of having to close a school when faced with the enrollment decline, which he pointed out was a national trend.

While one elementary school was identified for closing, the school population has leveled off and there's no longer the need, he said, adding, "We've faced up to the problem, but we never had to face up to closing a school."

Several things drew him to apply for the superintendent post in Grosse Pointe, Whritner said. "Grosse Pointe has a national reputation for education excel-lence," he added.

Detroit receives aid from Park firemen

While the Detroit Fire Department had its hands full responding to the hundreds of fires started by vandals on Devil's Night, Grosse Pointe Park firefighters lent their support.

Absentee vote not as high as '76 election

The percentage of voters exercising their franchise by absentee ballot ranged from 17 percent in the Park to 28 percent in the Shores. The figure was down considerably from the 1976 General Election when between 25 percent and 40 percent of the voters in the Pointes used absentee ballots.

In the Woods, 3,016 ballots were issued, amounting to about 20 percent of the registered voters. In the last presidential election, as many as 40 percent of Woods voters opted for the absentee ballot.

Twenty-two percent, or 1,023, of City voters requested absentee ballots this year compared to 33 percent in 1976.

In the Farms, 2,052 ballots were issued for this election. The figure, about 24 percent of the eligible voters, was down from 30 percent four years ago.

The number of Shores voters requesting absentee ballots in-creased, however, from 500 in 1976 to 650 this year. The figure represents 28 percent of the Shores' registered voters.

"It was the first time we were officially called to help Detroit since the 1967 riots," said Phillip Costa, fire chief. Walter Chapman, Detroit's chief of Fire Operations, asked for help and we said we would, as long as we could.

Three men and a pump truck were sent to Engine 52, located at Manistique near Warren, about 9 p.m., Oct. 30, according to Costa.

He said the truck was barely inside the station before his men re-sponded to a call for assistance on Manistique near Mack where they worked for almost three hours to keep fires set in three vacant homes from spreading. All were reported to be total losses.

They also put out a blaze that started after someone dosed a late model car with gas and set it on

Park firemen have assisted Detroit before. Last year on Devil's Night, Costa spotted flames rising up behind the one-story S & A Auto Glass Company at 15110 Mack Ave. at 8:49 p.m.

He said then that he knew from reports that trucks and 911 emergency lines had been ned up for hours, the result of fires started in dumpsters and vacant buildings which spread to adjacent buildings and delayed help.

Costa asked his men to help quash the 20 minute old fire which started in rubbish piled at the rear (Continued on Page 15A)

Bufalini also has one poem under consideration by Avon Books for an anthology of poetry about the Viet-

"Avon Books contacted me after they read my work in 'DEROS',' said Bufalini. "I was thrilled, of course. I'm not going to make any money with my poetry. Nobody makes money from poetry. I do it pecause it cleanses me.

Bufalini is an early riser and does most of his work before travcling to Fraser, where he teaches English. Other times, when wife Gail leaves for work, he writes after son Andy, 10, and daughter, Laura, 3, go to bed.

"I don't try to set myself a 'quota' of work," said Bufalini. Sometimes I won't write for three months, then I'll write every night for three weeks. And I never have a subject in mind. It's just bits and pieces that accumulate into a

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




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Grosse Pointe War Memorial

as John Lake remembered it

Shortly before his death in 1984, John Lake wrote of his years as executive director of the Grosse Pointe War Memorial. For those who knew him, it tells the story in a neo-Victorian style they'll well remember — a little confusing at times, but still vintage John Lake. Others will find it a nostalgic and useful contribution to the history of our community. These segments have been edited by Charles V. Hicks, but they retain Lake's original language, and they reflect the unique personality of the man who directed and developed the War Memorial Center in its first 30 years.

II. John Lake Comes to the War Memorial

(John Lake becomes executive director)

John Lake, of course, got involved in teaching. However, many times he would visit the place by the lake because of its beauty and the beauty of its gardens and also because it had plays. Some were done by the old organization, the Simians, and others by Grosse Pointe Theatre, who did things like "Mary, Queen of Scots" out on the terrace, which was very effective — especially with the wind and waves kicking up against the

In 1951 those waves and the winds became so intense that the seawall was knocked out and the steps leading down to the water were thrown all over the lawn. Later on, John Lake took his Hi Y Club over to Mack Avenue where they were tearing up the old strip of concrete; and they would load up trucks with broken concrete, haul it down to the Alger property and throw the stones into the water to build a protection.

In 1952, there was a move made to get a paid executive director for the Center. I believe first of all they went to Chet Sampson, who had a great flair with young people and had opened his travel agency and they felt it was a comer. Chet declined the opportunity. The result was that John Lake was approached and was asked to be interviewed introduced to the board and opportunity as this position. and considered taking on this position. This was a very hard decision to make by John Lake, because he thoroughly enjoyed his work at Grosse Pointe High School. He was also, of course, a little worried about how long the Center could be maintained and where he would be if the venture failed. After much consideration, he decided to say yes to the Center. As the thenschool superintendent said, "I believe you are going over there and I think I know why. You want to see what you can make of that place," and that actually was why John Lake took the job. He found himself walking down the avenue to take over.

It was rather amusing, for at the time he did this, the board apparently had not unanimously thought this was a wise move. Some felt that it was sort of superimposing someone who did not know very much on Mrs. McGinty (Ed. Note: The Center's cateress), who was a perfectly charming individual. Mrs. Ellis was house chairman at that time; and when John Loke said. "Where will my effice he?" about 19 Mrs. 19 Lake said, "Where will my office be?," she said, "Well, we'll just put up a table here in the hall. You're the director; and you direct people where to go." Well, that did not last very long; and John Lake was given a very nice office upstairs.




Cottage gets surgery laser

Cottage Hospital has become one of 10 health care facilities in the state to acquire opthalmological laser surgery technology. Now people suffering from cataracts, the effects of glaucoma or eye prob-lems resulting from diabetes can find help in their own community.

For patients requiring surgery, the laser procedure is done on an outpatient basis and takes only 15 minutes. No scalpels or anesthetics are used. Patients can walk into the hospital, remain in their street

clothes, and leave a short time later feeling only a minimal amount of discomfort, according to a release from the hospital.

Patrick Verb, M.D., an opthal-mologist on staff at Cottage, said that laser surgery eliminates the possibility of infection since no incisions are made. The laser beam allows the physician to perform surgery inside the eye without physically entering the area. The patient leaves the hospital with no visible effects or scarring.





Only students have changed at Barnes

It was in November 1983, that the Grosse Pointe Board of Education decided that John H. Barnes School would no longer house elementary school students.

When its 191 students ended their year last June, the district began the process of changing the 30year-old building that would house its community education, instructional materials and maintenance

departments. With its students went the desks and materials to the schools that the former Barnes students would attend in September. Some globes and maps are left in a storage room but they are reserved for teachers at other schools.

Moving into the near-empty building in August were the tables and office furniture from the Community Education office and classrooms at Parcells and Brownell schools. Also, the district's 1,860 films and myriad sinde presentations and video cassettes along with projectors, cameras and cassette decks were brought to Barnes.

The Community Education department has made its mark. Vending machines on the first floor cater to the building's new students and signs in classrooms remind them to keep their smoking limited to the lobby.

Reminders of Barnes' other students persist. Its knee-high drinking fountains, three-quarters scale gymnasium and the sometimes-strong smell of melted Crayolas from the heaters testify to the 30 years of grade-schoolers who came through Barnes.

The building is still used for education today. Eleven of its classrooms are used by the Com-munity Education department while five rooms house the Instructional Services Center. Also rooms like the kitchen have become classrooms under Community Educa-

The pamphlet of classes coming out next month will have more daytime courses available, according to director George Eddington. There's some ease in scheduling because there are five more classrooms available during the day, he added.

We can offer more classes during the day and not be interrupted by normal school activities," Eddington said. "You wouldn't believe the kind of interruptions

Besides easier scheduling, there's also better supervision and communication because of the move, Eddington said. Community Education classes are held in most of the district's schools, so checking on them as he does takes a good

deal of time, he added. Because the furniture left with the students, the Community Education department had to move all its equipment from its other rooms to Barnes. In addition, it's had to ask for desks from other buildings to fill some of the rooms.

On the first floor, the kindergarten rooms and an adjoining conference room are not being used at the moment, Eddington said. The conference room is storage for some extra globes and maps, while the kindergarten may become either space for a pre-school program or the maintenance department's offices when it moved from the old Kerby School, scheduled for demolition by the Farms.

The gym at Barnes is used for a variety of exercise programs, including basketball, dance exercise. racewalking, Vital Options exercise and yoga, Eddington said.

Also on the first floor are four rooms occupied by Instructional Materials. Printing and dry-mount equipment are available for teachers to use in preparing class work. Eddington said. The district's copying machine also occupies a room off the school's former library. The thousands of copies of papers, pamphlets and booklets needed by the schools, schoolsponsored groups of community organizations are prepared there.

The school's library has become the clearinghouse for books ordered by school libraries and the film and slide collection the district lends to area schools, according to Nadine Campbell.

The district has almost 1,900 films on hand, according to Angie Meldrum. The films are available to schools in the area and include some Hollywood releases among education fare. Projection and audio-visual equipment is also stored at Barnes, she added.

The women agree that although there isn't as much space as they had before, the quality of what is available at Barnes is higher. The IMC offices were in old Kerby School, they added.

Two more Barnes converts who are happy with the move are Chuck Saad and Kurt Schmidt, the audio visual technician and repairman who moved from old Kerby with their equipment.

Through their converted classroom will roll the broken, glitching pieces of machinery for the schools. Laying open on a workbench one Friday was a computer keyboard and disc drive, which Saad took a three-day program to learn to repair.

The equipment and workbenches in the room are all taken from the old Kerby facility, Saad said. The two men will spend a couple of hours each day working on equipment that comes in and also travel to other buildings to work, they said. Besides computers and projectors. Saad and Schmidt are reponsible for repairing film screens and televisions.

The second floor of the building is used for classrooms for community education. The sewing and art rooms are there, along with cardplaying and general classrooms.

Also on the second floor is the IMC storage room. Although most of the equipment that comes in can be repaired, that which is too far gone is kept to be cannibalized later. Saad said.

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Narrowing the field

It is good news that the Grosse Pointe Board of Education has narrowed from 125 to seven the field of candidates in the running for superintendent of schools and, in fact, appears to be ready to make its choice in the near future.

The search committee is now leaning toward Dr. John Whritner, superintendent of schools in East Lyme, Conn., and has asked him to meet with the full board and community leaders next Monday. And while the board will not permit private citizens to question Dr. Whritner directly, it has asked those having questions to submit them to the search committee by 4 p.m. Friday.

In effect, the committee is responding to the demands of a number of district residents that the selection process be opened to the public. In fact, the state Open Meetings Act requires open meetings whenever the entire board interviews a condidate. candidate, as it is expected to do Monday. Up to this time only the three search committee members have been interviewing candidates and doing so in private, as they apparently are permitted by law to do.

The board's decision to interview Dr. Whritner in public may also have been influenced by a letter from the Wayne County prosecutor's office asking the board to justify the closing of its interview process. The prosecutor's office apparently was responding to a complaint from a district

At any rate, the selection process now has been opened to public view, even though the board does not really think open interviews are a good thing, especially in the early stages of the selection process. Dorothy Kennel, chairwoman of the search committee, said in a statement in the school system's publication, "Emphasis," that the board opposed open interviews for three rea-

The first is that many candidates request confidentiality because they do not want people to know they are looking for another job. The second is that some candidates are better "showmen" than others and play up to an audience without giving substantive answers to questions asked. And the third is, she said, that "Open interviews can be a divisive activity because

people tend to take sides and campaign for their favorite candidate."

These arguments make sense and yet they do not tell the whole story. When the field has been narrowed to only seven candidates, for example, the board has to make inquiries into the backgrounds of the candidates. That includes asking

questions in the home districts of each of them, an action that breaches the confidentiality that some applicants seek.

As for the second reason given for secrecy, it is true that some candidates are better "showmen" than others, but surely the board can be depended on to detect the difference between showmanship and substantive answers to questions posed to candidates. And while it may be true, as Mrs. Kennel said, that open interviews can be divisive, closed meetings also can be divisive, especially in a community whose recent history has included so much controversy over school issues. Putting all the cards on the table in open meetings can help end divisiveness.

These matters deserve consideration because the selection process is still underway. Dr. Whritner is the search committee's leading candidate and one of two still regarded as strong possibilities to receive the appointment. But the committee has not yet eliminated any of the seven finalists and so there may be opportunity for further community participation in the selection process at future board meetings.

Whether the board's new procedures will satisfy those seeking open interviews is not known as this is written. But at least there is now opportunity for some community input into the selection process, even if questions cannot be put directly to applicants by interested citizens.

There is pressure, of course, to get on with the selection process because the sooner the new superintendent can be appointed, the better it will be for the entire system. Dr. Joseph Spagnoli, the interim superintendent, is well qualified and highly experienced, but the system faces a number of important decisions which need to be addressed as soon as possible, and the new administrator ought to be in place when those decisions are considered.

A life and a gift

Over the years the Grosse Pointes have received many substantial gifts that have enhanced the cultural, educational and social attributes of this community and contributed to the Pointes' reputation as a good place in which to live.

Now another substantial gift that will benefit the entire community has come from the late John W. Lake, the first executive director of the Grosse Pointe War Memorial, who left the bulk of his estate, estimated at about \$500,000, to the center. This gift surely will further enhance the center's opportunities to serve the people of the

Yet this gift was not the only one John Lake made to this community. As one of his friends, John R. Nicholson, a former president of the War Memorial Association, has said, John Lake "dedicated a lifetime to the cultural and educational well-being of many Grosse Pointers and truly added to the quality of their lives." He did so first as a history teacher at South High and then, for 30 years, as the executive director of the War Memorial.

As another past president of the War Memorial board, William D. Dahling, said at the memorial services for John Lake last summer, he was "the principal architect" of a program the "founders and succeeding trustees have approved as the most meaningful and appropriate recognition that can be accorded the deeds and valor of our servicemen." It was, he added, "to create in freedom the opportunity to fashion a civilized

Mrs. Aiger Shelden, whose husband hired Lake away from South High in 1952 to direct the center, which had been donated to the community by the Alger family, earlier this year paid tribute to the late director in these words:

"When I think of John, I think of quiet charm and old world courtesy. He had a love and a fundamental knowledge of opera, arts . . . all the lovely things. The aim of the center from the start was to add a certain cultural dignity to Grosse Pointe. John made a very great contribution.

After the death of his mother, Lake lived at the center for several years, and, as several people have told the News, he regarded the War Memorial as his home, the community as his family and his job as the host who saw to it that every detail for each major event was just right. His informal recollections being published weekly in the Grosse Pointe News reflect his fatherly feelings toward the center and its programs.

In these anecdotal reminiscences, he cites the many activities - the art exhibits, the opera dinners, the piano competition, the lectures, concerts, plays, the encouragement of civic organizations, the educational programs, the travel programs and the many other activities that have contributed so much to the Pointes and their residents. Yet he always gives credit for the center's successes to others: the Algers who contributed the land and property, the board of trustees who supported his endeavors, the other backers and contributors, the volunteers and the many participants.

Truly John W. Lake did much for Grosse Pointe and the War Memorial center. Now his generous gift, reflecting his own commitment to this community, will make it possible for the center to continue the services and programs that open the eyes and minds of Grosse Pointers to other worlds and in the long run help create a civilized society.

A non-partisan charade

Whatever the outcome of Tuesday's election. the campaign for the three Michigan Supreme Court posts proved once again that the candidates ran with avowed party support even though their names appeared on the non-partisan ballot.

In the Pointes, at least one GOP precinct delegate circulated a list of all Republican candidates for office to her precinct residents and included on her list the names of the three candidates nominated by the Republican Party for the Supreme Court And she did so without pointing out that the candidates for justice of the Supreme Court run on a non-partisan ticket.

Spencer Abraham, state GOP chairman, also sent a letter to "friends" around the state urging them to "vote for our Republican candidates for the Michigan Supreme Court." He enclosed with his letter an "Official 1984 Republican Party Candidate Guide" that listed the three candidates nominated by the GOP for the Supreme Court. The guide did add, however, "You must vote for these Republicans on the separate non-partisan part of your ballot.


The Democrats are equally guilty of playing politics with the non-partisan Supreme Court contests. The Macomb County Democratic Committee, for example, paid for political ads urging the public to vote for the three Democratic Party nominees for the high court. The advertisements did bear the line, "on the separate non-partisan

In a pre-election interview with the Grosse Pointe News, Dorothy Comstock Riley, one of the three nominees of the GOP, called the present system of nominating state Supreme Court justices

"sheer hypocrisy" and "a charade" because political parties nominate candidates who run on the non-partisan ticket. She thinks that if the candidates are nominated by the political parties, they ought to run under the political party labels. But she prefers that the system be changed and that the governor appoint Supreme Court members without regard to their party membership or support.

We agree with Mrs. Riley on this point even though we recall that James Brickley, before he was appointed to the court, sought unsuccessfully to get enough signatures to put on the ballot a constitutional revision calling for appointment of Supreme Court justices. While there are and have been in the past excellent justices on the state's high court, it is true that the present system does tend to result in the nomination and election of candidates with well-known and well-recognized political names. These people may or may not be renowned or highly experienced as either lawyers

or judges. The current method of nomination also raises questions about political partisanship on the court and, in effect, such questions are sometimes asked even when the court has shown an independence of political partisanship and pressure in arriving at some decisions. Having the candidates run on the party tickets would be more honest than the present system and eliminate the hypocrisy that is now apparent to all. But we believe an even better system would be to have members of the court appointed by the governor from a panel of people qualified by their legal and judicial experience rather than their political backgrounds.

Light at the end of the tunnel?

To the Editor:

Is it possible that there's light at the end of the tunnel in the controversy over the Grosse Pointe school system? That thought has entered my mind after reading the letter in last week's Grosse Pointe News from David Easlick and after talking with a couple of mothers from the Committee for Neighborhood Elementary Schools.

It would certainly be great if the people from the five Grosse Pointes and our educational community could get together and begin pulling together for a Grosse Pointe school system that is (1) top-notch and (2) efficient.

Many Grosse Pointers - both young and old - want such a system. Considering the fact that the school enrollment is down about 47 percent from its peak and that the number of schools is down only 6 percent, it's far from efficient.

Enlightened self-interest dictates that we have a good, efficient system. Some of the younger parents realize that before too long, their present "salad days" - the years when the children are growing up - will be passed and they'll want a solid, efficient system like every-one else. Such a system is also needed today by the parents of these young mothers and fathers in many cases.

In talking to the parents, it seems that much of the controversy is caused by conflicting information regarding the current and future trend on the numbers of children we will be enrolling in our elemenintermediate and high schools. Solid information, I believe, is available on this subject. And it should be the foundation for future planning of the school system. A major question also is "What is the real capacity of our 14

sounds quite honorable. But I question whether they had the right to make this promise since it subjects everyone in this community to the current, excessive taxes.

All those past memories we hold dear as we do those that are closer in time to the present, particularly if we still have that all important person with us who has been the mainstay of our lives; the one who joined with us in a committment of sharing, years back; one who, in spite of the roll that time takes, still remains in our view as youthful and attractive as when we first

We remember how we put our lives together again after our family had grown and left; how we settled back to enjoy uninterrupted, the companionship we had known as newlyweds; the little luxuries and trips we could afford now that obligations to family had ended; how much we enjoyed the visits of our children and what good friends we had become now that it was no longer necessary to accommodate to each others moods; and how we could live our young lives over again, enjoying and watching grandchildren grow as we had once loved and enjoyed their parents as our babies.

For some, life's autumn is not so kind. They are left alone as widow or widower. It is then that memories become even more important to brighten up the solitude of winter days.

While memories of better days can comfort and sustain and while pastimes can fill days to a point, life moves on. It is important to keep up with it even if it is only by collecting small items of interest to add to our memorandum of thoughts that cheer.

For instance, left alone, many older people worry about their health. They fret about whether or not they should change habits of eating and drinking acquired over a lifetime. They wonder about the effects of eating certain foods, smoking and drinking on their health. No need to worry anymore.

Researchers from the Harvard Medical School have found that if the eating and drinking practices haven't produced the diseases and conditions that are going to lead to premature death, and if one survives to 65 or older, then the toll of the unhealthful practices will not be seen as an increased mortality

They assumed there would be. They were surprised to find that these habits sustained a lifetime had not taken a toll.

For those who take comfort in favorite treats not enthusastically endorsed by nutritionists, this news has got to be added to the lists of items to be gratful for. That luscious chocolate dessert can be

enjoyed without guilt. On that same subject of the evils wrought by some foods and all drinking, accord to purists, comes good news and one more item for the gratitude list. One or two drinks a day is actually good for older people and according to one wine expert, there is one form of alcohol that not only has medicinal value, but seems to prolong life. It is

Brandy, the generic name for cognac, was the only form of alcohol legally imported into the United States during Prohibition as medicine. It is called "hospital brandy" in Australia. Britain's Na-tional Health Service pays for doctor-prescribed brandy. St. Bernards were sent sent out to rescue stranded travelers with brandy strapped around their necks. In France, it is called le lait de vieux, the milk of old people, and eau de vieu, water of life.

It has long been thought that there is some mysterious ingredient in brandy that prolongs life. As early as 1250, the alchemist Armaud de Villeneuve wrote: ":Eau de vieu: is good for long life." Another alchemists wrote the same thing in 1300. He contended that it gave man oxygen.

These are ideas that have come down from a time when there was no formal medicine. Cognac and orange juice is supposedly a remedy for flu-

Trivia, yet examples of collectibles that could add to our list of memories and discoveries that add to the goodness of life, make us grateful for what we have and help to banish the winter of our discon-

Thank God.



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

City officer honored for rescue efforts

Grosse Pointe City Public Safety Officer Alfred Fincham was honored recently by the Michigan Fraternal Order of Police for his rescue efforts during a Moran Road fire last February.

Fincham, 32, received an honorable mention for the Fraternal Order of Police's Police Officer of the Year award and the state lodge of the Michigan FOP Meritorious Service Award for his rescue of Heather Fitzsimons, 18, from the second floor of the burning home.

Fincham was patrolling with his partner about 6:30 a.m. Feb. 12 when the first of three alarms was broadcast for the fire. Arriving simultaneously with Farms fire units, Fincham, an 11-year veteran with the City fire department, donned an air pack and began searching the smoke-filled home for Ms. Fitzsimons.

Fincham and a Farms officer administered cardiopulmonary resuscitation to Ms. Fitzsimons while she was transported to St. John Hospital, where she later died.

Fincham and his wife Linda have three children. He has received several commendations for his work with the department, Kennedy said.

'He is certainly one of our finest officers and we are very proud of him, as we are all our public safety officers," Kennedy said.

Detroit area business and professional women got a chance to hear members of the National Women's Coalition talk about women's concerns last week. Issues, they said, were best addressed through the policies of President Reagan, his administration and the Republican

'Women's issues are economy, peace, education, freedom, family, opportunity, employment and justice," said Betty Southard Murphy, speaking to about 25 women at the Pontchartrain Hotel Oct. 31.

"This seminar, one in a series being conducted in major cities throughout the country, has been predominately attended by people who came up the hard way and are looking for a better life than that supplied by previous administrations, both Republican and Democrat," she added.

An attorney in Washington, D.C., Mrs. Murphy was the first woman appointed to the National Labor Relations Board. She said the question is to decide under which administration and which political philosophy will women better prosper and be able to pursue their own dreams and live in peace?

"Under President Jimmy Carter and Vice President Fritz Mondale's administration, inflation more than doubled with the prime interest rate increasing by 220 percent to a high of 21.5 percent," said Mrs. Murphy.

'Reagan believes people would rather work than be on welfare and he's working to provide real jobs that don't end after the government funding it took to create them disappears," she added.

'If equal pay means jobs may be eliminated, where would that leave many blacks who are usually the last hired and the first fired?" she

Dr. Richard F. Sterba, 86, one of tal health field was that he listened only four surviving psychoanalysts in the United States who trained with Sigmund Freud, will present "A Personal Glimpse" of Freud Thursday, Nov. 15, at the War Memorial. Tickets to his 8 p.m. lecture are \$4 each.

From 1924 to 1938, Sterba was a trainee, active member and finally a board member of Freud's Psychoanalytic Society. In 1932, he delivered a paper to the society in which he introduced the concepts "therapeutic alliance" and "therapeutic ego split," both of which have become standard terms in psychoanalytic litera-

Sterba, who fully adopted Freud's controversial theories decades ago in Vienna, still utilizes them today when he sees his patients in his Grosse Pointe Park

According to a recent article in the Detroit News, Freud did not permit notetaking at scientific meetings with his colleagues be-cause he wished to speak "off the cuff." Sterba, though, surreptitiously recorded the comments, jokes and anecdotes and will share many of them with his audience next Thursday.

He will also talk about Freud's philosophy to "cure our patients by love" and about the Nazis who were outraged by his teachings. The greatest technical innovation that Freud brought to the men-

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to his patients. Before Freud, men-tal health patients were taken to asylums where only the most unthinkable "cures" were adminis-

Psychoanalysis is based on Freud's theory that a significant amount of human emotion is rooted below the conscious level of the mind, normally inaccessible to one's awareness.

"Yes, analysis does take many Sterba concedes. "But the time is justified, because the result is such a fundamental improvement of the personality.

Q. I frequently have headaches What can I do?

A: Headaches are a common problem. There are basically three types. Muscle contraction or tension headaches often feel like a "hatband" of tightness around the head or tightness in the neck and back of the head. They often get worse as the day progresses or with stress. Usually they can be managed by aspirin or Tylenol, hot packs or a hotshower and relaxation techniques or.

biofeedback. Migraine headaches are common "sick" headaches often associated with stomach upset, throbbing pain, worsened by light or noise and occasionaly patients see flashing lights or have blurred vision. They may occur just on one side of the head, but more commonly behind both eyes. Often other family members have bad headaches. Migraines are vascular headaches. The blood vessel changes and headaches may be triggered by hormonal changes such as menstruation, many foods such as chocolate, aged cheeses, beer, red wines or changes in sleep

patterns. Migraines not controlled by changes in diet and habits can be treated by several types of medications that must be supervised by a

physician.

The last, the least common, headaches are caused by a variety of problems in the jaw, sinuses or brain. Usually a complete history and physical is required to rule out these causes which are treated very differently.

Another great fall . . .

Grosse Pointe, we've been spoiled.

We know that we usually have a lot to look forward to every fall sports season — even if the local teams don't win a state championship in every sport. But the experts, those wise sages who like to predict the outcome of high school games and seasons to any and all who will listen, don't quite see things our way. And, since Pointe teams have won more than their shore are the set of the seasons to their share over the past few autumns, the "experts" decided that Grosse Pointe might not have as much to cheer about

this fall, thanks to last June's graduation.

Just for the record, here's what the super athletes at North, South, ULS and even the grade schools did to show the experts just what they could do with their predictions:

Tennis: At University Liggett School, all the girls' tennis team had to contend with the loss of eight of 12 players from the 1983 championship team, a freshman playing at No. 1 singles and a new coach. If any of that bothered them, the girls from ULS hid it well, taking home the schools' fifth straight state championship.

Over at South, the girls' team endured outside pressure, some narrow-minded critics and taunts that they were 'robots' wearing Chris Evert tennis togs. Never mind that the talented, poised squad went out and won a ninth consecutive Class A state title for South. Never mind that the girls practiced and played diligently all summer in anticipa-tion of this fall. Next year, though, it might be nice for experts to remember that these robots have feelings.

And at North, the girls didn't stand a chance, the experts said. They had tough South to worry about and not enough depth. I guess that's why they only won a Bi-County League title, finished second in the regionals and ninth in the state. Nope, they didn't have a chance.

Soccer: On the soccer field, Grosse Pointe's teams were supposed to come up with a big, fat goose egg. Zilch. Oh-ferthree. So, I guess the experts don't count it when the boys' teams from North, South and ULS combined for a 32-9-7 mark and won Michigan Independent Athletic Conference (ULS, for the fifth straight time) and Macomb Area Soccer League (North, for the fifth straight time) championships. No, and the experts probably don't care that it took a three-overtime shootout to oust ULS from the state playoffs.

Football: "Uh-oh," said the experts. "South will be lucky to have a winning season after losing so many starters to graduation." Wrong again, field goal-breath. South stretched its unbeaten string to 25 games, held opponents to zero points in four straight contests, was ranked No. 3 in its region for most of the season and ended up in a tie with Mt. Clemens for the EML title ONLY after losing 25-24 in overtime and WITH-OUT one of the Devils' top starters. But that's an excuse and a 7-2 team like South doesn't need excuses. They won't be in the playoffs this year for the first time since 1981, but neither will 112 of the state's other 144 football teams.

At North some folks laughed when the Norsemen lost their first two. The laughing stopped when North won its next seven, clinched a tie for the Bi-County title and beat rival South in overtime. The Norsemen held opponents to 14 points or less seven times this year. And that's no joke.


Cross country: The harriers were lucky enough to escape predictions and forecasts from the experts this fall. That's probably because there aren't too many cross country experts around. Those who did have something to say forgot that there are two public high schools in Grosse Pointe, both of which have excellent cross country programs.

South's girls' and boys' teams each won the EML championship, finished first in the regional and South's girls' were eighth in the states. Ah, but folks forgot about North, where the girls and boys won THEIR league titles, the girls were second in the regionals and third in the states and the boys, fourth in the regionals. The experts did agree on one thing: North and South were at one time each ranked in the girls' top 10 in the state.

Escaping attention all together were ULS's undefeated middle school field hockey team, some excellent swimmers at South and North, and St. Clare's juggernaut of a volleyball team. St. Clare went 24-0, won its sixth Metro-Detroit CYO championship in eight years and ran its eight-year total to

Unfortunately for the experts, next fall it looks like those pesky Pointe teams will be winning again. Those young, inexperienced tennis players at ULS can only get older and more experienced. South can look forward to some freshmen from its 9-0 frosh football squad getting to be sophomores and moving up a team or two. And North's JV gridders were 7-2. Once you get a winning tradition started like that at North, ULS and South, it's kind of hard to stop it.

But don't tell the experts that. They're still busy trying to figure out why they finished second in the "Top Ranked Experts" contest. (Everybody else was tied for first).

North shuts out South in overtime, 3-0

The North-South game last Saturday will be remembered by many as North's first win over South in three years. But that's not what will go in the books. The record books will show that the game was North's first home win against South since 1974, and that it was the first shutout in the 16-year series.

The first half proved an exciting defensive battle. North received the opening kick-off and could only move the ball to its 35 yardline before having to punt. South could not move the ball and punted it back to the Norsemen. North took the punt and returned it to their 32 and on the first play Will Secor carried to the Norsemen's 47. But North's drive was soon foiled when South recovered a North fumble. Once again the Norsemen held the Blue Devils, forcing them to punt a second time.

In the second series of plays, Secor carried 29 yards to North's 49. South's defense stopped the Norsemen offense again by recovering the second fumble of the game. Luckily, North regained possession before South could do any damage. On the subsequent

North quarterback Joe Weidenbach connected with Steve Pochmara for a 15-yard gain, but again South's defense held and North's threat was foiled.

North's next possession came as a result of Craig Como's interception of a South pass. Como took the interception 33 yards to South's 35. Joe Weidenbach then connected on a 22-yard pass to Jon Palazzo to give the Norsemen a first down on South's 15. Again, South stopped the North attack as Craig Como failed on a 25-yard field goal at-tempt. The half ended with a 0-0 tie.

The third quarter was a copy of the first half as neither offensive team could break the other's defense. The momentum seemed to be favoring the Blue Devils however, as they kept the ball on North's end of the field. The third quarter ended with both teams still dead-locked 0-0.

The fourth quarter started out well for the Norsemen when Casey Quick intercepted a pass on North's 25 yardline. Weidenbach then threw a 23-yard strike to Secor, pushing the Norsemen to near midfield. North then tumbled

on a sweep play to give the ball back to South. With a series of short gains South then took the ball on what proved to be the last drive of the game and methodically mov-ed the ball down to North's 12 vardline.

North's chances began to look slim, but junior Palazzo saved the day when, with 15 seconds left in regulation time, he intecepted a pass sending the game into overtime.

South won the overtime toss of the coin and elected to play defense with the ball on the 10 yardline. On first down, North gained two yards on a running play. North's next two plays consisted of two unsuccessful passes. Then, on fourth down Como hit a 25-yard field goal, giving the Norsemen a 3-0 lead. South was then given the ball on the 10. The North defense held South on three successive plays and on fourth down the South field goal attempt veered off to the right and the Norsemen won their seventh straight game of the season 3-0. The loss was South's second straight in overtime.

"It was a great defensive bat-

tle," commented coach Sumbera. "I can't say enough about our entire defensive squad.

Defensively, North was led by George Kasza (11 tackles); Rob Wells (10 tackles); Rob Brumer (eight tackles); Dan Koptizke (three behind the line tackles); and Ken Werenski, Paul Mattes and Doug Calka, all with six tackles. Como, Quick and Palazzo were also cited for their outstanding defensive backfield play.

Offensively, Secor gained 78 yards for North on 15 carries. South was keying on Secor during the entire game, commented Sumbera. Will gave another excellent performance." Weidenbach and Pochmara also had excellent offensive games. Weidenbach commented on eight of 16 passes for 111 yards and Pochmara caught three passes for 56 yards.

'I'm really proud of the team, in the way they came back after our 0-2 start. For us to win our last seven games and shut out Clintondale and South makes for a very good season. It will be a great off 'season,' said Sumbers.

"I thought we could be in the top 10, realistically, so third place was a bit of a surprise.

South provided some incentive for us. We finished within four points of them at the regionals and we thought we could stay with them in the finals and maybe catch them. That incentive really helped ... we did catch them," he added.

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
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How to teach children to care
