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## Contract talks start

Negotiating teams for the teachers and school board sat down for the first time two weeks ago to lay out their positions. Neither side is currently predicting how long

bargaining will take. Last winter the administration proposed aiming for a settlement by the end of school, but teacher union by-laws frustrated early bargaining. Now talks can last until school starts in September if

necessary. All 16 districts in Local I are bargaining contracts this year. Armada has already settled what Grosse Pointe union President Doris Cook described as a "very good (contract) - one that all the Local I districts can look to as a precedent and a standard." Armada reportedly won a 24 percent increase spread over three years, as well as other improvements. It has, however, been the lowest paid district in Local I.

In Grosse Pointe, both teachers and administration are keeping their discussion plans to themselves. Both teams continue to meet to work out details of their proposals. Bargaining is expected to go on throughout June, take the traditional break in July and resume in August.

## North High air problem recurs

Staff Writer The air conditioning went off at North High School last week, but the worst casualty of the doldrums was staff good will.

Teachers remained angry several days later at the lack of communication. Administrators say they knew there was a problem, but were doing their best. The sultry atmosphere lasted only a day and a half, not long enough to call off school, they

say.

Things began to go wrong when one of the two air conditioning units stopped working. Repairmen brought in Tuesday to work on it turned off the other unit to test the first one. Students flocked to the clinic, teachers called the office, central administration was brought in. By Wednesday midday, the second unit was turned back on, cooling the building just as administrators were considering sending everybody home.

But teachers say no one told "Of them the repair work was scheduled. The classrooms just got hotter and hotter.

One hundred sixty students went to the school clinic; 120 of them had been there by 1:45 p.m.; 65 were there during one hectic hour.

What went wrong? Or, to rephrase the question, was anything handled wrong?

"If they have to make repairs, they should start in the afternoon when the students are ready to go home," said teacher union President Doris Cook. "Students and teachers have to be able to rely on having a reasonable atmosphere.'

Many teachers felt that school should have been closed. "The question is: Who calls school off?" said North union representative Janice McCloud. "Everybody keeps passing the buck."

"It's easy to look back and second-guess," said David King, director of support services."

North Principal John Kastran said the problem was really only bad one day. "We were considering calling the superintendent to dismiss school (Wednesday morning), but we didn't have to because we got one cooler going,"

There is disagreement on how serious the problem at North is.

#### Human temperatures up

McCloud keeps a strip thermometer in her classroom and monitors the temperature daily. "If it's just normally atrocious, I don't bother writing it down." she said. Two weeks ago, her room was too cold; by Wednesday morning, it was 82 degrees the first hour.

"I must have gotten calls from just about everybody in the building," McCloud said. She said other staff had called the school office and central adminis-

King says the building is actually one of the most comfortable in the system — most of the time. "When that building is operating correctly, it's comfortable," he said. "It's the only building in the system that's airconditioned — at the others, you have to open a window. That's why we have summer school

"Of course, when the air conditioning isn't working, it's not a very pleasant place to teach."

Once the unit started up again, the building was tolerable, according to Kastrán. "It was warm, but not too bad," he said. "It was comfortable enough to work in." Kastran said starting the unit up brought the temperature down to no more than 76 degrees in any room.

The disagreement may obscure strides made in improving the ventilation at the school. Kastran said the fans are now oper ating 24 hours a day - a longstanding request by the teachers. Before last week, a number of teachers said conditions were much improved.

But Dave King wasn't notified of the problem until late Tuesday afternoon, when Cook called him after receiving complaints. 'They normally get me involved only if it's of a serious nature," King said. "I guess the building administration didn't think it was that serious. People have to

feel they can make decisions.' King said that he tried to open the lines of communication after he hurried over to North on Tuesday afternoon. "I explained the situation," he said.

# Pointer of Interest Paul M. Turkal, D.V.M.

It's a hot Friday. Dr. Turkal doesn't seem to mind. He stoops and reaches under the passenger seat of the large white van. Pulling out two cards from the file there, he carefully sips a frozen Coke while nodding at the cards. He starts the van and drives down the Hill, holding the cards in one hand and a map and the wheel in the other. The frozen drink sits precariously atop the interior engine housing, melting quickly as the engine heats the compartment.

Ever since he was a boy, the tall, blond graduate of the Michigan State University School of Veterinary Medicine has wanted to make house calls on sick dogs, rabbits, "kitties" and snakes.

Paul M. Turkal, D.V.M., 27, of the Woods has had a home veter-



inary service business for a little more than two years. He has only 500 clients at the moment, but he's been busy lately.

"I worked for the Michigan Humane Society when I left State," Turkal said as he made a right turn onto Ridge Road headed to the Woods for his first home visit of the day. "I didn't want to be cooped up in a building. It is a lot more personable to meet people in their homes. When you see an animal in the home setting, you can learn a lot about them.

Turkal's business, Home Veterinary Service Corporation, is the most important thing in the young man's life. He works out of his van. His office is actually a small room in St. Clair Shores that has an answering machine and one small desk. If you leave a four-second message on the machine, his pager will automatically be signaled and he can call in to get the message.

He does it all. He can perform everything from routine heartworm bloodwork checks to emergency surgeries in the back of the van. He has anesthetizing equipment, a microscope, drugs, bottled oxygen - in fact, he has everything an office veterinarian has except an X-ray machine.

"Some animals, especially cats and birds, get a lot of stress from being taken out of the home," he said. "Sometimes they get more stress and it's worse for the animal than if you didn't treat it at

When he arrives at a home, he usually does not perform an examination in the back of the van. Aggressive animals may be


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


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
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
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
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# After 10 months first Pointe group home going strong

Sister Barbara, who manages the home on Lakepointe, said one of the residents has been institutionalized for more than 50 years. "She's made a beautiful adjustment and has been a delight in the house. The staff has been good for her.'

Of the six adults who moved into the house last year, one has gone on to the Supported Independence Program, a higher functioning program in which all of the residents work and require minimal supervision. Another mentally retarded adult has since replaced him at the Lakepointe home.

"You can see the difference from when they first came," Sister Barbara said. "They have events."



Sister Barbara, who regularly visits institutions like Plymouth Center, said group homes are necessary. It's not possible to get the nurturing one gets in a family home setting in an institution, she said.

The Supported Independence Program recently opened a home in Grosse Pointe Farms. Two male adults, who require a minimal amount of supervision, are living in the home on Moross.

"There are more than 100 people in Wayne County in S.I.P. in a variety of settings, primarily small homes and small apartments," said Denise Mogos, acting director of public affairs for Wayne Community Living Services, which is under the Department of Mental Health. "It's exciting to provide that next step and it's been pretty successful.'

## Recycling: A great idea waiting for some community support

Nobody in a position to do something about it is doing anything about the county recycling recommendations, but it isn't because they're opposed to recycling.

The Wayne County Planning Department issued a thick study last September and began to circulate a few copies among local officials around Christmas. Outside of a few council people with a special interest in trash disposal, the copies haven't circulated widely. A couple of city managers said they don't even know where the copies are.

Some city officials believe any move toward recycling would have to come from the Grosse Pointes-Clinton Refuse Disposal Authority — that's the incinerator - while the incinerator people say a program would have to start with the cities.

The reason for the foot-dragging is easy: Officials don't believe most people are willing to sacrifice convenience for environmental improvements. There is no immediate pressing need for recycling — the incinerator won't run out of space for some years, although it is generally agreed that it will definitely run out of space sooner or later - and most officials are unwilling to impose unpopular measures if they aren't absolutely necessary.

But the officials say recycling

is a good idea. "I know there's a lot of interest in it (in some quarters)," said Shores Village Manager Michael Kenyon. "(Elizabeth) Kuhlman, who was on our council, was very interested in it. But we



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




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## New machine uses shock waves to break up kidney stones

By the end of this century, surgery will become less frequent, and non-invasive medical procedures will take its place, according to one of three Grosse Pointe urologists who are trained to use Michigan's first lithotripter.

Thomas Mertz, M.D., said that in his experience with the machine he has seen patients benefit coormously from its use.

Mertz, 39, who has admitting privileges at Cottage Hospital, recently completed the credentialing process offered by Henry Ford Hospital, which acquired the state's first lithotripter in 1985.

A lithotripter is a medical machine that uses shock waves to break up kidney stones while still inside the kidney. Some 85 percent of kidney stone patients could benefit from this relatively new machine, rather than have to undergo surgery.

Kidney stones can occur in anyone. People more likely to develop them are those with gout or a family history of stones or chronic urinary tract infections. Kidney stones are a concentrated crystalline material which builds on itself the way rock candy crystalizes on a string hung in sugar water. Nine out of 10 stones will pass through the urinary tract on their own and can be excruciatingly painful.

He has been practicing urology for eight years and he trained on the lithotripter machine in January 1987 at Methodist Hospital in Indiana.

Stones too large to pass through the urinary tract can often be removed through conservative measures, however, a small percentage of stones required surgical intervention — that is until the advent of the lithotripter.

The machine has been generally available since February 1984, when the U.S. Food and Drug Administration approved the use of six machines in the country on a trial basis. Today there are about 60 machines in

"With surgical removal of a kidney stone, the average hospital stay was a week to 10 days," Mertz said. "The period of disability, no physical work, was four to six weeks. I have seen people go generally recommend one week

It is definitely a leap ahead both in the benefit to the patient and in lowering hospital stay


When it is determined a patient is a candidate for lithotripsy, a "stent" is inserted into the kidney through the ureter. This keeps the stone from entering the urinary tract and thus eliminates the pain. It also keeps the stone from blocking the flow of liquid.

The patient prepares for the lithotripter by following normal outpatient procedures. He undergoes a medical evaluation and also has an electrocardiogram in preparation for a general or a spinal anaesthetic.

The patient is secured in a specially designed chair and lowered into a shallow tub of warm water about chest high. The patient remains in the stainless steel tub for about 30 to 40 minutes while electrically generated shock waves pulverize the stones into small granules.

Twin X-ray units are used to position the patient precisely so that the maximum energy is focused on the kidney stones. With the X-ray machines, the doctors are able to monitor the stone's fracturing.

'The shock wave passes easily through water," Mertz said. "Beback to work the second day after cause the body is mostly water, having undergone lithotripsy. We the wave also passes through the body tissue, including the kidney.

and fragments only the stone."

Kidney stones are usually a recurring problem. Surgery can be performed several times to the same kidney, however, there is always the chance the kidney can become permanantly damaged and must be removed. Lithotripsy can be performed numerous times with little chance of harming the kidney, according to Mertz.

With the stones pulverized, the stent helps to keep the ureter open and this allows for the sandsized remnants of the large stone to pass easily. The patient is advised to drink two to three liters of fluid following the procedure to aid in the passing of the tiny fragments.

"This procedure is considered major surgery," Mertz said. "There is the risk of bleeding from the kidney and there is also a risk of infection. You can watch the stone on a fluoroscope, and you really have to see it to believe it. The stone twitches and then breaks apart. It is really amazing."

There \ was reluctance on the part of some urologists to accept the machine as a useful tool. Because the machine, in many cases, eliminates the need for surgery, some urologists will lose a source of income.

Mertz would not say what the cost of surgery is, but noted that many urologists perform 150 to 200 kidney stone surgeries per vear. That could translate to some

"Not all urologists will be trained on the machine," Mertz said. "For instance, I am the only one of four in our group to be trained on the machine.'

Mertz said some doctors were skeptical about using the machine, because they knew what they could do surgically, but weren't sure what they could expect with the lithotripter.

"People tend to be skeptical about anything new," Mertz said. "But I can say from experience that the results are dramatic.

Mertz said he is constantly amazed at the new non-invasive surgical techniques, and said he believes that by the end of this century, a large percentage of surgery will no longer be necessary.

"We now have balloon angioplasty (a non-surgical treatment for clogged heart arteries), for instance," he said. "Soon everything will be done with guidewires and catheters. It feel that doctors who don't learn and develop these new techniques will be missing the boat for the fu-

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

### Scouting fund-raiser planned

#### Historical society seeks donations

The Grosse Pointe Historical Society is often asked about the kinds of documents and memorabilia it collects.

According to Curator Jean Dodenhoff, the society's collections are developed primarily as a result of individual donations. The age of an item, she said, is less important than the fact that it pertains to Grosse Pointe or to Grosse Pointers.

Anyone wishing to donate the following types of items should call the society's office at Mason Elementary School on Tuesdays or Wednesdays between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.: family documents, photographs, letters, maps, books, pamphlets, small artifacts, manuscripts, postcards, newspapers, magazines, oral histories, Indian artifacts, genealogies, clippings, slides, videotapes and artworks.

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he controversy over the recent dismantling of the Kanzler house on Lakeshore Road has aroused new interest in historic preservation and in proposed legislation to help save historic sites, homes and other objects in the Grosse Pointe community.

Under the leadership of the Grosse Pointe Historical Society's historic preservation committee, legislation now is being drafted to identify and protect historic homes and buildings in the Farms that could be considered for preservation and preservation control. If successful in winning approval of the proposal from the Farms council, the committee plans to seek similar legislation from the four other municipalities in the Pointes.

This is an encouraging move for the Pointes. For some reason, this community has not played an active role in historic preservation in the past, perhaps because the auto industry's policy of planned obsolescence permeates the area. Even so, some individuals have done much in this field,

but now at long last many more Pointe residents are awakening to the cultural losses that are involved when historic homes and buildings come down.

The legislation is not expected to be unduly restrictive, but is intended to ban demolition and significant exterior alteration of homes and other buildings found to be of historic value. The purpose is at least twofold: to help keep a record of past achievements and, in the words of committee chairperson Tish Colett, to help maintain the quality of life in the Pointes.

"Unique, beautiful things should be saved for the enjoyment of future generations," Ms. Colett says. "But we can't take it for granted that this will happen. What this means for our community is that we can't take for granted our tree-lined streets, our pure lake water, our historic homes. If we want them to be part of our future and our children's future, we have to work to preserve them."

Some people have questioned the committee's purpose because so many of the great old homes that once graced this community already have fallen. But the committee's point is that there still are many first-rate homes and buildings, some large but some small, too, that should be preserved for future generations. As the committee points out, many are unique and simply cannot be replaced.

As the historic preservationists say, this generation obviously cannot be held responsible for what has happened in the past, but it can now try to take responsibility for what happens on its watch. They believe that without preservation, Grosse Pointe would lose many of the distinctive features that set it aside from other fine residential communities.

They point out that, in addition to serving cultural purposes, historic preservation in itself tends to help protect property values and in some cases can also yield federal tax benefits.

A few homes and buildings in the Pointes already are on the Federal Register because of their architectural distinction, the social significance of the people who lived in them or the historical significance of the property. Among them are the Alger home which houses the Grosse Pointe War Memorial, the Wardwell House and Grosse Pointe Academy's lakeshore building.

But listing in the registry does not always protect such homes from demolition or wholesale alteration. And that is one reason the Grosse Pointe Historical Society's preservation committee is seeking local legislation to carry out its goals.

The committee is anxious to get community reaction to its historical preservation proposals and urges interested people to get in touch with its members or write to the Grosse Pointe Historical Society which has its headquarters in Room 110 of Mason Elementary School at 1640 Vernier, Grosse Pointe Woods.

The society itself has only been re-established since 1980 and its historic preservation function was recognized only in 1985. But both the society and its committee serve important purposes and, in our opinion, deserve public support for their latest campaign on behalf of historic preservation in the Pointes.

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## Now it's the voters' turn

he role of the journalist in a democratic society was once described by the late Walter Lippmann in these words:

"If the country is to be governed with the consent of the governed, then the governed must arrive at opinions about what their governors want them to consent to. How do they do this? They do it by hearing on the radio and reading in the newspapers what the corps of correspondents tells them is going on in Washington and in the country at large and in the world.

'Here we perform an essential service . . . We do what every sovereign citizen is supposed to do but has not the time or the interest to do for himself. This is our job. It is no mean calling and we have a right to be proud of it and be glad that it

is our work.'

We have cited those words by an eminent journalist in previous discussions of the reasons the Grosse Pointe News covers the school board election campaign in its news and editorial columns. As Lippmann explained, we do it because there are people who have neither the time nor the inclination to obtain the information about the qualifications of the candidates they need to make informed judgments when they go to the polls. So the News does its best to provide that information for them.

We do not pretend that the newspaper is the only source of information. There are many other sources and we urge prospective voters in the June 8 election to get as much information as possible from all available sources. If they do that, they will be able to make informed judgments about the candidates when they go to the polls next week.

So far as we can learn, the campaign this year has been a quiet one with no major controversies or even sharp differences of opinion on the issues. The Grosse Pointe News last week endorsed two candidates, Vincent LoCicero and L. Jane Nutter, in the belief that their qualifications are superior to those of the other five. But other people have different views and prefer other candidates. We respect those views, too. Our choices reflect responsibility to provide our opinions as well as news reports on the election campaign.

But now it is up to the voters to pick two of the seven candidates to serve on the board for the next four years. The polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Monday, June 8, and we urge a large turnout of informed voters so that the choices are as representative as possible.

## Detroit's new gambling plan

ow that a proposal to legalize casino gambling in Detroit has not really caught on in the metro area, Mayor Coleman Young of Detroit has proposed the development of a jai alai fronton and a dog racing track in the city. Both are gambling operations that Young believes would benefit Detroit by attracting tourist dollars.

From this suburb's point of view, these proposals might be better than the plan to permit casino gambling on Belle Isle, assuming that neither the jai alai nor the dog track operations would locate on the beautiful little island. But both still are forms of gambling that tend to attract not only tourists but professional gamblers who do not contribute to any community's public health and morals.

The mayor justified his new proposal on the grounds that he wants some equal rights for the city of Detroit. Present law bars Detroit from opening a horse racing track to compete with facilities now operating in Hazel Park, Livonia and Northville. Permitting Detroit to operate dog racing presumably would end that discrimination.

But the proposal would appear to have difficult sledding in the Legislature. The Detroit News reported that more than a dozen bills to legalize dog racing in Detroit have been shot down in the past 20 years, chiefly because of the fears of the state's powerful horse racing industry that the dogs might compete too successfully with the horses.

Jai alai, on the other hand, is a centuryold sport that is played on a concrete court. about half the length of a football field, and is popular in Florida and in other resort


areas around the world as another way to bring in gambling dollars from tourists.

It appears that the Legislature would have to approve bills to legalize both dog racing and jai alai, but the mayor's proposal immediately ran into trouble from Council President Erma Henderson who said she "didn't want any gambling on the riverfront regardless of what it is.'

Mayor Young told reporters he hasn't given up on the idea of legalized casino gambling in Detroit and that he still intends to appoint a commission to study whether casino gambling would be a good thing for the city. But the opposition of the Friends of Belle Isle and civic leaders obviously has slowed down the efforts to develop casino gambling on the island. The mayor, who has been talking of the appointment of a commission for many months, apparently isn't yet ready to take on the opponents of the proposal and now sees jai alai and dog racing as possible substitutes.

What is the stake of the Pointes in all of these proposals about legalizing various forms of gambling in Detroit?

True, gambling might benefit some Pointers who own businesses and property in Detroit, but the crime, violence and other miseries caused by such operations, no matter how well policed, would tend to spill over into the Pointes and other nearby suburbs. And while some people claim they favor legalized gambling in Detroit as a last resort to help finance the city's operations, we are not convinced that other, less destructive ways could not be found to help the city meet its many needs.





# Prime Time for Senior Citizens Memories of downtown Detroit

The dictionary defines nostalgia as a "wistful yearning for one's home, country or city." There are only a few who have not experienced that sad, sweet feeling, even among those who still live in the city of their birth, probably because there is so little left of the city that they hold dear in memory. Not that they pine for it. Change is inevitable, and being progressive, thinking individuals we accept it and adjust to it.

But every once in a while, the ashes of memory are stirred by a meeting with an old friend, an incident or a news item and our hearts are warmed as we go back in time to people and places that were once so important in our

I'm sure it happened last week to many of our older residents who read of the closing of downtown Siegel's and the sale of the Kresge stores.

In memory, one stood once again on Woodward and State,

admiring the beautifully dressed mannequins in Siegel's windows. They were the forecasts of what the well-dressed woman would wear. Inside was style and affordable luxury. Having a charge account at Siegel's was a reward a working woman gave herself and the extra worked into the budget of the homemaker.

There were other fine stores, Himelhoch's, Healy's and the Washington Boulevard shops, but they were considered carriage trade shops. Kern's, Crowley's and the all-inclusive Hudson's were department stores. Siegel's was unique, a woman's store where the average shopper was not intimidated by prices.

Directly kitty-corner to Siegel's was another favorite store --Kresge's, more often referred to as the ten-cent store. It's probable that Kresge did have some items that sold for 10 cents, but no one ever went in there looking for items at that price. It did, however, have any number of items for less than a dollar.

Kresge store. That was known as the dollar store. It had highpriced merchandise but relatively so. The dollar store could well have been the seed from which K mart grew. The growth of an enterprise to a giant K mart chain that stocks designer clothes is an interesting phenomenon.

Kresge is no more, but the concept of the five and dime and dollar and up is not dead. It will live on under the sign of Jupiter, which bought Kresge, and more than likely be remembered years from now by some who will recall shopping there when they were young. The importance of these and other downtown stores in the lives of older Detroiters should be recognized in the context that there were no neighborhood coun-

Part of the problem of looking back at a certain place is that it refuses to be isolated and soon you are calling to mind other favorite haunts.

One was Vernor's. Farther

Down the street was another down Woodward, it was a stopping off place to have a frosty, sparking glass of ginger ale, not from a bottle or can, but straight from the fountain. It fizzed and bubbled and tickled your nose. It was sweet and tasty and never again equaled.

And there was Sanders' with a long counter of various chocolates where you could order one of this and one of that and put it in a bag, providing you didn't spend your 15 cents for a hot fudge sundae instead.

Memories hold so much that is important, happy times and sad times, important events and little happenings, traveling to other states or countries and a day 'downtown.''

But most important of all, memories bestow upon us the precious power to be once again with those who shared those memories; a mother who loved downtown Detroit and led us by the hand through all the sights and sounds of its stores and shops; a father who introduced another aspect of going downtown, the theater, the movie houses, the library, the museums; an aunt who babysat and made it possible for a young mother to revisit favorite



He turns the van into the driveway of his first patient. When he knocks on the door and is let in, the first thing the young doctor does is remove his Reeboks. A large long-haired house cat is going to get a clipping, and the owner has asked that Turkal prescribe a tranquilizer so that it can be done without too much stress to the cat.

Getting the cat to come to Turkal is a problem.

Carol Ann Brophy, Pretty's owner, says she knew where the cat was a few minutes before, but now that the doctor has arrived, Pretty is nowhere to be found. When the cat is located, Turkal checks its heart rate and respiration and writes out the prescription. He carefully explains the effects the drug will have on the animal.

"It is so terrific not to have the stress of taking a cat to the vet," Brophy said. "They (her two cats) are just scared fitless going to the vet.'

Brophy said she has been going to veterinarians for 23

years, and has nothing against her previous vets, but no one else has ever made home visits.

Turkal grew up on the east side of Detroit. After graduating from MSU, he moved in with his parents while working for the Michigan and then the Macomb County humane societies. He now lives with his attorney in a Woods home. Turkal said the arrangement is a matter of convenience for the time being as his practice grows.

Maintaining a strictly professional relationship at all times is something Turkal said he works at and it can be difficult. People are constantly inviting him to have a cup of coffee, a soft drink and, in some cases, lunch or din-

"I remember one house call where I had an emergency problem with a dog," he said. "As I was winding up around 2 a.m., the client was making breakfast. When I got ready to leave, the guy sets out a plate and tells me I am going to eat with him. Some people are really offended if you don't accept their offer, so I ate breakfast, when I really wanted to get home and go to

At his next stop, a large Irish setter needs a routine examination, a rabies shot and a distemper booster. The fees are similar to a regular veterinarian's, except he charges an extra \$10 for the house call.


"Oh, it's worth it," said Jeanette Williams, a Woods resident who owns Ginger, the fouryear-old setter. "It is a lot easier on the dog. She is OK in the car, but the minute you pull into the vet's parking lot, she starts to pull away and it's a constant fight.'

Turkal has his clients help to hold their animal. He says often the person likes to have the examination performed on the kitchen table, and he has the person hold the animal's head and help out wherever possible.

"It is a lot better for the animal to be held by someone he knows, and the client gets to know what to look for and a better understanding of the animal's problems.'

Turkal, though he doesn't like to admit it, is a soft touch. He

says he often gets calls to go to areas where the clients are poor. The house call fee usually goes out the window.

"They don't have a car and there is no way for them to get the animal to a vet, so they call me," he said. "They also don't have a lot of money. The animal means everything to them. I'll tell you one thing though. Everything I tell them to do to make that animal well, they do. It's a real shame, but in some cases the animal eats first. It's a shame, but they really love the animal.

He's paying his student loans

right now and keeping up with his bills, but that's about it as far as his income goes. He lamented that if he saw all 500 of his clients, he could probably do it in a month or so.

"Let's face it," he said. "How often does an animal get sick? I don't get a lot of the gravy work like the vaccinations. I get the emergency calls." Turkal will perform only emergency surgeries in his van. He handles elective surgeries in an operating room he has available to him.

"I have performed c-sections and surgeries after an accident of some sort," he said. "In many

Turkal said only one client in two years has not paid him, but that doesn't worry him. He said making sure the animal is OK is the bottom line.

He also barters. He trades his skills for mechanical work on the van, legal services and even rent. He said were it not for his bartering, what he is doing now may not be possible.

"As far as I know, I am the only one around here offering this service," he said. "And people love it. Sunday is my busiest day, believe it or not. The whole family gets together and has the vet come over. It's different for them, and they like to do it.'

Turkal said he hopes to have his own clinic one day, but that

he will continue to offer the 24hour mobile vet service. "I can't see me doing anything else," he said.

With clients like Brophy, perhaps Turkal has a start on big things ahead.

"I recommend him to everyone I know," she said. "He's the only vet I-have ever seen that gives the cats a kiss on the nose when he's done examining them."



## Detroit's problems are suburbs' problems, NAACP speaker says

Nearly 80 Grosse Pointers braved heat and a faulty air conditioner May 28 to hear Detroit NAACP President Arthur Johnson tell them to pitch in to help solve Detroit's problems. Johnson spoke to a gathering sponsored by the Grosse Pointe Inter-Faith Center for Racial Justice.

The legal barriers to integrated housing may be down, but areas like Grosse Pointe stay nearly all-white because of a long-standing set of social mores, Johnson said. "There is a whole array of informal practices that are still intact and prevent a significant number of blacks from moving in," he said after the meeting. "The restrictive covenants are gone, but the feelings are the same. The instruments are different.'

This kind of barrier is even tougher for minorities to crack than the legal ones were, be-

Johnson said at the beginning of his speech that he and the NAACP are not trying to stop people from living where they choose.

"I don't question in any sense the right of the individual to live where he wants to," he said. "The problem is that we tend to carry with us attitudes...about the city that are not only unbecoming, but damaging."

Johnson blames Detroit's problems on white economic disinvestment "unparalleled in the

country." It has resulted, he said, in a vast gap in income, employment and mortality statistics between black and white.

There are some things whites can do to change the deteriorating picture, he said. He recommended that people start to talk more openly about the problem, expressing disapproval of the racism around them. Speak up when neighbors or friends or coworkers use racial slurs.

"If blacks and whites knew each other better, they would operate less out of fear," he said. "Conditions have to change whether we like each other or not,' Johnson said.



## Hill businesses upset by traffic proposals

Traffic plan proposals sent to Goodell-Grivas, traffic engineers, by the Farms traffic advisory committee for cost analysis and possible consideration, has individual Hill business owners and the Hill Association upset.

At a meeting Monday, May 11. the Farms Traffic Safety Advisory Committee discussed four proposals that would directly affect traffic flow and parking in the area in and around the Hill.

These proposals were first suggested by Goodell-Grivas several years ago when the city commissioned an earlier study. However, according to Farms Police Chief Robert Ferber, that study didn't take into account the new business developments on the Hill, the Punch and Judy project and the Bologna building. Both were granted variances to the Farms parking ordinance, which would have required more available parking before the businesses could have been developed.

Ferber said that the four proposals, originally generated by the engineering firm, have been sent to the firm for cost analysis. Once the firm determines how much it will cost to restudy the proposals given the new developments, the city council will decide what expenditures for the study will be made.

The four proposals sent to Goodell-Grivas include: 1) removal of 42 metered parking spaces on the north side of Kercheval between Muir and Fisher roads; 2) making the Kercheval alley on the north side one way eastbound; 3) making the Kercheval alley on the south side one way westbound; and 4) create 15 or 16 permit parking spaces on both sides of Mc-Millan between Kercheval and Ridge beyond the alley way.

Several of these proposals have caused concern in the Hill business community.

Vice President Garry G. Carley wrote the traffic committee that though a planned Cottage Hospital parking deck, which will hold more than 400 cars, will alleviate some Hill parking problems, it will not be ready until after the Bologna and Punch and Judy projects are completed.

"In the meantime," Carley wrote the traffic committee, parking will be at a premium. In addition, as the Punch and Judy renovations are completed, additional demands will be placed on the available parking, to the point that any loss of existing parking spaces would create an intolerable situation.' The Hill Association's letter echoed those feelings. Its letter stated that it "strongly objects" to the elimination of the metered spaces on the north side of Kercheval.

At its regular meeting Thursday, May 21, Hill Association President Dutch Hendricks said that he felt that by opening up Kercheval through the removal of parking on the north side, speeds would be increased.

"Our primary concern should be to the safety and well-being of the residents of this community," Hendricks said.

Both the association and Standard Federal offered its support to the traffic committee and asked that they be kept informed of any meetings or changes in the plans.

Ferber, who did not attend the Hill Association meeting, said that the problem of traffic and parking on the Hill has been a difficult situation for a long time.

"It is a no-win situation," Ferber said. "No matter what you do, you are not going to please everyone.'

Ferber said that there are many competing interests on the Hill. Most recently, the Grosse Pointe library wants to expand and plans are being held up in part because under the Farms parking ordinance, there wouldn't be enough parking space required by the ordinance. Also there are school, church, businesses, both retail and service-oriented, and residential interests.

The chief said he feels that the proposals will accomplish one main task - keeping Hill traffic from using east and west residential streets and keep them using Kercheval.

"When we discuss residential area concerns, we get a lot of residents," Ferber said. "When we discuss the business area we get a lot of business people at the meeting. This last meeting we had had the fewest people on hand of any of the meetings."







# WSU professor's therapy helps improve stutterers' speech

By Margie Reins Smith Staff Writer

For a stutterer, life is charged with anxiety. A stutterer constantly anticipates the terror of being expected to speak - whether it's as simple as answering the phone or buying a Coke; whether it's responding to a teacher's question or asking directions; or whether it's as complicated as telling an anecdote or speaking to a roomful of people.


A stutterer is constantly planning ways to avoid speaking. He's doing mental gymnastics, scanning ahead, planning ways to minimize his misery. If he knows he has difficulty with certain initial consonants, he will take great pains to avoid using words that begin with these sounds. He may alter his speech, using words and phrases that are unusual. He may hold his breath before speaking. He may use one or several physical or vocal mannerisms to avoid a speech block. Although he knows what he wants to say, a stutterer's words never tumble forth effortlessly, in the proper order and at a normal speed, as other people's do.

William Leith, professor of Communication Disorders and Sciences at Wayne State University, helps those who stutter become less severe stutterers. "There is no cure," he said. "It's like diabetes. We can't cure it but we can control it.

"Furthermore, we don't know what causes stuttering.'

Leith has a Ph.D. in clinical psychology and speech pathology as well. He teaches at Wayne, supervises therapy, and maintains a small private practice of his own. He specializes in therapy for children - some as young as 4 or 5 years old. He's written three books which are used by speech pathologists all over the world and he recently spent three days lecturing at the University of Oulu in Finland. He's working on another book.

The best that can be done for stutterers, he said, is to make the stuttering less severe, a taskthat is not unsurmountable. "Today we can take a severe stutterer and make him a mild stutterer. And we can maintain

Leith said stuttering affects close to one percent of the population, or about two million people nationwide. For an unknown reason, male stutterers outnumber female stutters four to one.

"Stuttering is like a two-layer cake," said Leith. "The first layer is repetitions. The second layer is prolongations. The stut-.terer doesn't want to stutter and will do anything to stop. He struggles. He adopts secondary mannerisms to release the blocks in his speech" Some people blink to release the block, he said. Some jerk their heads or click their tongues. These tics work for a while, he said, but within a few months the tic ceases to release the block and the stutterer adopts another mannerism. "Stuttering is finally an aggregate of a whole bunch of behaviors — as many as 20 or 30. A well-known professor of speech pathology said once, 'stuttering is what the stutterer does to avoid stuttering."

REEF - rate, enunciation, easy onset, and flow. In the mid-'60s, a psychologist in Chicago discovered, quite by accident, a way to stop a stut-

terer from stuttering. He used a small tape recorder called a DAF (delayed auditory feedback). The DAF records the speaker's voice and provides a quick echo of his words. The delay between spoken word and feedback can be adjusted from .25 of a second to zero. "Quite by chance," Leith said, "a stutterer used this machine. It caused him to talk differently. He talked slowly. He paid careful attention to articulation. He carefully controlled his flow of speech. He stopped stuttering. The DAF began a new era in stuttering therapy."

Leith typically uses a DAF very briefly, for only a few minutes in the first stages of therapy, to show the stutterer that he can talk without stuttering.

personal correspondence with Hollywood's best-known celebrities, and early photographs, notably among them, one of the legendary Greta Garbo, made irreplaceable with her autograph.



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## What makes Stroh's flow? Computer chips 'n beer, of course!

Getting that brew from them to you just ain't what it used to

Stroh Brewery Company has grown from a small familyowned operation, which delivered wooden barrels of beer in horse-drawn wagons, to the third largest brewing company in the United States.

With six breweries, two container manufacturing plants and a huge world headquarters on the banks of the Detroit River near downtown Detroit, the need for coordinating and assimilating vast amounts of information is obvious. Not so obvious, however, is how crucial the computer has become to the many facets of running one of the nation's leading beer, cooler and soft drink manufacturing corporations.

"Just 10 years ago, Stroh's was dealing with just one product and several packaging containers," said James Avery, Stroh vice president in charge of operations, planning and control.

In 1981 the 130-year-old Detroit brewery acquired the F. & M. Schaefer Corporation and the following year purchased the multi-plant Jos. Schlitz Brewing Company. Today the third-largest beer producer fills almost 23 million barrels of brew annually, produces a large variety of beverages, both alcoholic and nonalcoholic, and uses more than 1,600 different packages.

Avery said he came to the Detroit headquarters from Schlitz in 1982. One of his first tasks was to coordinate the computer change-over between the two corporations. Stroh had a Honeywell system and Schlitz had IBM computers. Since the two were incompatible, a decision had to be made as to which computer system to choose. IBM made the

Now computers touch every facet of the corporation's brewing and manufacturing processes. The systems are used for just about everything. Sending reports from the six brewing plants to headquarters, ordering product from suppliers and even computer-aided design and manufacturing of bottling or packaging lines are all performed with

"There are many different brands now and in each brewery we are running can, bottle and keg lines," Avery said. "This is where things become more complicated.'

Stroh now has more than 5,000 employees nationwide and

Avery said that as far as the actual brewing process is concerned, there is little need for computers.

"There are seldom problems with the brewing process," Avery noted. "There is about a twoweek fermentation process, and two weeks of aging. All the while the product is in large vats, and it sort of takes care of

a number of different employee

contracts. Computers are used to keep track of employee wages and to help ensure the company is living up to various aspects of the contracts.

The IBM mainframe is located at the world headquarters at Stroh River Place. All reports are sent via the computer to the various department heads located in Detroit.

With all of the improvements in the corporate systems in the past five years, there are still some problems, according to Avery. He laments that the information coming to Detroit is "batch-type." That means that the reports from various plants around the country are fed into the computer system during the afternoon. The reports are not available to administrative personnel until the following morn-

"We still have some systems where we are using IBM punch cards, if you can believe that," Avery said.

Many facets of the Schlitz computer system are now 15 years old, and Avery said the company is examining the potential for an entirely new system which will bring the corporation up to date, and carry it into the next century.

Plant On-line Processing System, or POPS as it is called by the employees, would be an online, real-time computer system which would allow the instantaneous monitoring of all facets of operations at the corporation plants around the country.

The POPS project is being headed by Grosse Pointe resident Michael Shapiro, director of special projects.

Shapiro said one of the major tasks is to identify exactly what they want the system to do.

"We have to determine just what is feasible and what is practical," Shapiro said.

He noted that right now one processing problem the company has is no centralized way to Sparklers from Stroh Foods, Inc.

The Michigan Department of

track inventory as it is loaded into trucks. A POPS system would allow the continous monitoring of inventory. Therefore, if a truck driver were to grab a shipment of beer that was not in proper rotation, warnings would be sent out and the correct shipment of product would be deliv-

Avery was quick to note that the company is doing very well with the equipment it has, but said that a POPS system would be an invaluable asset to the corporation, especially in the years



One of the problems Shapiro is facing in designing such a system is trying to predict what the company's needs will be in the next five or 10 years. Right now, per capita consumption of beer and liquors is down a bit, said Avery. Stroh has already moved into the cooler market, with a malt-based line of beverage called White Mountain Cooler, produced by the Stroh-owned Colorado Cooler Company, and a new-to-Detroit fruit juice with 70 percent juice and no alcohol, called Sundance Natural Juice

"Whatever system we design today must be flexible to allow for whatever changes the company may go through in the future," Shapiro said.

Shapiro said a POPS system would enhance dealing with wholesalers. If, for instance, a line were to break down and it was going to remain down for 12 hours, there would be orders that would be delayed.

If the wholesalers were tied to the company by computer, instant decisions could be made as to which wholesalers may be completely out of product, which ones could get by on a few days delay and who is not in desperate need. Right now, when such a situation occurs, individual calls have to be made to the wholesalers before decisions can be made.

"In a case like this, we may have to wait 24 hours before we can make a decision," Avery said. "With POPS we would be able to make those decisions within minutes.

Shapiro sees computers with artificial intelligence capabilities aiding in the decision-making processes of the future.

"These would help people to make more and better decisions," Shapiro said. "Such a computer program would be another tool people would have with which to make decisions."

A new homeowners association, which represents about 60 homes in the area between Lakeshore and Grosse Pointe Boulevard from Winthrop to Carmel Lane. formed in late April. Its main objective is to preserve the beauty and quality of life of the Lakeshore area.

The group, called the Carmel/ Winthrop Homeowners Association, was formed April 28 at the War Memorial. J.V. Clemente, a Winthrop resident, was instrumental in its formation.

'Our object is the preservation of the Lakeshore area in the state it should be maintained," Clem-

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ente said. "There is a way that it should be like. We do not want to see Lakeshore become a Sterling Heights or Warren on the lake.'

Clemente said one of the main goals the organization has is to try and establish a consensus viewpoint on how the Farms Lakeshore area should be developed in the future on both public and private lands.

By keeping its residents abreast of current variance requests and maintaining an informed citizenry, Clemente said he hopes the association can participate in decision-making processes by working with elected of-

"We've got a lot of homes in the

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area that have been left to disrepair," Clemente said. "There has also been a lot of cluster housing going in and we feel there has been some inconsistency of the buildings." Some 26 mansions have been torn down in the last 26 years and this is of concern to groups like the Grosse Pointe Historical Society, Clemente said.

"The newly formed Farms Beautification Commission has been working with several organizations and we feel this is a great step," Clemente said. "We want our residents to get involved in governmental decision-making." The group has appointed a board of directors which will serve oneyear terms. The directors are Ju-

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dith Attie, Fred J. Somes, Anne F. Ford, Delphine Klein, David W. Allard Jr. and Clemente.

"I feel very strongly that organizations such as this are needed." Somes said. "We have to make certain that the city council is aware of how the residents feel on certain issues. The council is hammered all the time by developers, and gets very little or no voter input."

Somes said issues such as setbacks along Lakeshore, consistency in architecture along Lakeshore and the Detroit incinerator are all topics with which the association intends to grapple.

Both Somes and Clemente argue that other homeowner associations are needed. Clemente said one of the efforts the Carmel/ Winthrop organization intends to take on is establishing a council of homeowner associations. The association has already discussed the idea with the Harbor Hill See ASSOCIATION, page 18C

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

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

## Commercial food students will have muffins in the oven

Apple Court baked goods to come from South high vocational class

ini-Muffins, Lemon Bread and brownies don't seem like much of a problem, but when members of the Assistance League to the Northeast Guidance Center realized how many mini-muffins, Lemon Breads and brownies they were talking about, they knew they were going to need some help.

"Last year, the members did all the baking," said Pat Pompi. chairman of the Apple Court, the league's lunch concession at Art on the Pointe, to be held June 13 and 14 at the Edsel & Eleanor Ford House grounds. "But it was a real undertaking. It (the number of visitors eating at the Apple Court) has gotten

so much bigger every year."

The Apple Court is one of the league's main projects within the scope of Art on the Pointe. The annual art festival, has become one of the major art fairs in southeastern Michigan and the Apple Court is the league's main food concession, though there will be hot dogs, soft drinks and county fair-type concessions throughout the fair.

"This year, we expect to serve about 600 lunches," Pompi said. "There will be two luncheon plates (a Turkey Croissant or a Fruit and Cheese Plate) available at \$3, desserts for 50 cents and beverages including iced tea, coffee and hot tea for 50 cents. There will also be wine available.'

The Fruit and Cheese Plate will include fresh fruit and three types of cheese with two minimuffins on the side. Last year, members baked the muffins and some were larger and some were smaller. Many had to be baked weeks in advance and frozen until the weekend of the fair.

To bring greater consistency to



the baked products and to take pressure off the league members, Pompi decided to look for professional help with the baking chores.

"I knew John (Shafer, the South High commercial foods teacher)," Pompi said. "I've substituted in his class.'

The commercial foods program at South prepares students for jobs in the restaurant industry. Shafer has 48 students in three sections. Beginning students spend two hours a day in commercial foods class, learning kitchen techniques, sanitation rules and serving etiquette. Advanced students are in the co-op program and spend at least 20hours a week working at local restaurants.

The commercial foods students operate a staff lunchroom at the school three days at week and cater school banquets and

Our program is geared to ward the finer restaurants." Shafer said, "We are aiming to give the students a skill they can use after graduation

Shafer's students will bake some 600 muffins, 40 loaves of Lemon Bread and numerous brownies during the last week of school for Art on the Pointe. The Lemon Bread will be offered for retail sale.

"We wanted to have the Lemon Bread as a tradition," Pompi said. "It was very popular last year." It is a dessert bread with a cream cheese filling.

The Apple Court will be open from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. both days of the fair. It will be held under a tent with seating for 160 people. The food offered will be light, but satisfying.

"We wanted to go with light entrees," Pompi said. "It's June and it will be warm outside. This is more healthy.'

Pompi is somewhat of an expert in her own right on healthy food. She teaches natural cooking through Grosse Pointe Community Education under the title, "Pat Pompi's All-Natural Cuisine."

In addition to the Lemon Bread and brownies, baked by the commercial foods students, a

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variety of baked desserts from league members' kitchens will be offered, including Toffee Bars, Applesauce Squares, Shortbreads and fancy cookies.

Art on the Pointe is the Assistance League's major annual fund-raising project. Proceeds will go to benefit the Northeast Guidance Center, a comprehensive community mental health agency located on East Warren in Detroit. There is also a branch office serving the Grosse

Art on the Pointe is a juried art fair that will feature more than 150 artists and artisans displaying and selling their wares. There will be a variety of entertainment attractions, foods and the wonderful ambiance of the Ford House grounds overlooking Lake St. Clair. The hours will be 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. both days.

The Ford grounds include almost 90 acres of tall trees and well-manicured lawns surrounding the Albert Kahn-designed, Cotswold-style house, where the Gold and Silver Treasures of the

#### Life is a gift

"Then the Lord God formed man of the dust from the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living being." - Gen. 2:7

One issue of society has increasingly confronted us, and disturbingly so. It is the issue of human life. Every day we see on television, we read in the newspapers, of a disregard for it. The disregard occurs in the form of suicide and murder and drug use and abortion and child abuse and personal assault. Life itself has become more devalued -- more threatened.

Perhaps individuals have not usually noticed, but that disregard of human life has occurred most of all in respect to younger people. They suffer most from an unconcern of the word - "Thou shall not kill." As a society, we seem to be satisfied that those least able to defend themselves — to understand themselves -- are being victimized by life being treated so casually and so cruelly.

The greatest wonder of all creation however, is described like this: "Then the Lord God formed man out of the dust of the ground and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life and man became a living being." The unmistakable emphasis here is that life is a gift. In a secular time (our world is everything), in a materialistic age (our things are everything), the idea of life as a gift is no longer understood.

Life as a gift (actually the first article of Christian faith) speaks of the wondrousness and the worthiness of myself. The living God hasn't intended me to be insignificant and irrelevant. Through His creating of me, I am a wonderful person. The miracle of an eye to see, a mind to think, a heart to beat, a hand to use, a lung to breathe, a foot to walk — is to be appre-

That isn't being communicated on television or in stereo, in sports events and shopping malls. Unfortunately, it isn't even heard all that much in church either. The fact, however, is crucial — life is a gift. As a creation of God, I'm wonderful, and so



## Teleconference to place focus on evangelization

An estimated 60,000 Catholic laity, religious and clergy are expected to participate in Pentecost '87, a one-day national teleconference on evangelization, to be aired on Saturday, June 6, from 10:45 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Locally, it is hoped that 2,000 will take part from the 27 vicariate teleconferencing sites in the Archdiocese of Detroit.

The day will consist of video presentations, major talks presented via satellite, prayer and local on-site discussion. It will begin with a presentation by Archbishop Edmund C. Szoka.

Evangelization is defined as proclaiming the Gospel in order to bring others to Christ and His Church. The Rev. Edward Farrell, the archbishop's representative for evangelization, notes that over the past 20 years, it has come to be thought of as "not as a specialized ministry, but the common call of every Catholic."

Pentecost '87 will focus on five areas of evangelization: active Catholics, inactive Catholics, ecumenical relationships, non-Christian and the unchurched. According to James Murphy,

director of the Detroit Catholic Blondell of St. Ephrem Parish, Charismatic Renewal Center, the inactive Catholics group is "bigger than any active Protestant denomination," but, he notes, "evangelization must also reach out to those active in Catholicism and the unchurched, who have no connection with Christian faith."

Archbishop Szoka has written to the pastors of the Archdiocese requesting they make plans to include participation from their parishes at Pentecost '87.

"The theme of our Holy Father's visit to the United States in September is "unity in the work of service, building up the body of Christ.' Catholic evangelization in all its aspects is a means of fulfilling that theme. It is also a fitting preparation for the visit of one of the greatest evangelizers in the world today." said Szoka.

Evangelization efforts in the Archdiocese of Detroit will be highlighted in a local segment of the Pentecost '87 teleconference. Farrell will moderate a panel which will include: the Rev. John Phelps, CSSR and Gayle Koyton of Life Search, the Rev. Robert

Sterling Heights; Gloria Lewis of St. Agnes Parish, Detroit; the Rev. John Christ, OSC, of St. Dennis, Royal Oak; the Rev. Clarence Williams, CPPS of St. Anthony Parish, Detroit; Raul Feliciano of the Office for Hispanic Affairs; and Wyatt Jones, Jr. of the Office for Black Catholic Af-

And, like baseball dads tell me all the time, they've done it without the added benefit of being able to recruit, like private schools can.



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



#### That four-letter word

You've tried the high protein diet, the high carbohydrate diet, the low carbohydrate and high fat diets, fasting and every one-food diet you can find. Sure, you lost a few pounds. But you gained them back and then some.

The pounds you lost registered on the scale, but they weren't pounds of fat, they were losses of water and carbonydrate. If you are going to lose weight and pounds of fat by diet alone, you'll have to maintain that caloric deficit for extended periods of time, since shorter periods result in only a minimal decrease in body fat.

It sounds pretty bleak, but the facts are clear: you must combine exercise with diet to achieve a negative caloric balance. In fact, physical activity can be used effectively by itself or in combination with mild dietary restriction to bring about an effective loss of body fat.

The major findings of studies that evaluate the efficacy of various approaches to establishing caloric imbalance (leading to weight loss) are very interesting. Based upon a 24-day food restriction program of 1.000 calories per day, plus enforced exercise of 2.5 hours per day, during the first three days, the daily weight loss was 1.8 pounds. Seventy percent of that was water loss. During days 11 through 13, 0.5 pounds were lost daily, with a 69 percent fat loss and a 19 percent water loss. Days 21-24 brought about a 0.4 pound per day loss, with no water loss and a loss of 85 percent fat.

This proves that you must make a commitment to lose FAT and commit yourself to a two-month period of dietary restriction coupled with exercise. The figures you see here are not to suggest that one should lose 1.8 pounds per day. They are to show the increase in the actual loss of fat. based upon a long-term duration of caloric restriction and energy expenditure.

The study also pointed out that water intake should not be restricted when beginning a weight reducation program because this can precipitate dehydration but no additional fat loss. Also, weight loss by diet alone caused a significant loss of muscle mass. Exercise protects against lean tissue loss, which means more of the weight loss is fat loss.

Suppose you want to lose 20 pounds in 20 weeks. That's not unreasonable. Most experts agree that a loss of body fat of up to two pounds each week is acceptable. So let's be conservative. One pound per week equals 3,500 calories. You have to burn 3,500 calories or consume 3,500 calories less per week in order to lose that pound.

Rather than restricting your diet so drastically, if you were to perform one-half hour of moderate exercise equivalent to 350 extra calories, three days per week, then the weekly caloric output would increase by 1,050 calories and you would have to decrease your calories by 2,450 rather than 3,500.

If this same exercise were engaged in for five days per week, you would have to deprive yourself even less through diet. To burn even more calories, you can increase the intensity of your exercise by just 10 percent. Cycle at 22 miles per hour instead of 20, swim 50 yards in 54 seconds instead of 60 and you've burned an additional 10 percent of the amount

The Park's Gerry Krag likes working with kids. She's aware of how much activity teenagers are involved in and of how much energy they need to keep up. And as director of the year-old Community Nutrition Services, Inc., she's also every much aware of how little teens know about good nutrition.

"I can't say every teenager in Grosse Pointe is lacking in basic knowledge of nutrition, but the ones I've worked with . . . well, they are too influenced by their peers. They eat an awful lot of rast foods and soda pop," Krag

Krag's service offers nutrition counseling classes mainly through Grosse Pointe Community Education; it also offers weight loss programs, wellness programs for business and nutrition instruction. Community Nutrition Services had been scheduled to teach a class on nutrition for teenaged athletes this spring, but the class was cancelled because it did not fill.

Most teenagers, despite the best efforts of their parents, have diets which result in nutritional deficits, particularly in iron and calcium, Krag says. When she counsels teen athletes, she likes to make them aware of what causes those deficiencies. She also reviews the four basic food groups with them and instructs them in particular areas of athletic training as it relates to food tlike carbohydrate loading).

"Athletes burn a lot of calories just by virtue of the fact that they eat a lot, so they'll burn more in the course of their activity. But I believe that athletes especially teenagers - need a special diet," Krag said. There are basically three types of diets most commonly used by teen athletes, Krag said. They are:

> "I don't have any qualms about recommending the carbohydrate loading diet, but the athlete should be very well informed about it before he uses it. And I also wouldn't use it before every event," Krag said.

"The tough part about those diets is getting a typical teenager to eat multiple servings of vegetables. Nearly all of them will pick up an apple or banana and eat it, but it's tough to get today's teenagers to eat vegetables.

Krag and her group would like to change that, as well as a number of myths about nutrition and athletic performance. "There

are so many, I've got a nice little list of them here on my desk," she laughed. "Probably the most popular myth is that the more protein and amino acids one eats, the more muscle he'll have. That's absolutely untrue. It just turns into fat, not protein.

"Another one is that eating quick energy foods like honey or sugar provides a burst of energy. It does, but that burst is very short and is followed by a big letdown... sort of like a balloon bursting," Krag said. "The worst myth is that drinking water slows an athlete down. That's absolutely incorrect.

"If you watch athletes on TV, it may look like they're drinking Coke because they have Coke cups. But you can be pretty sure they're drinking water. It's just so essential."

Krag said that she is quite willing to work with local athletes and coaches. She holds a masters degree in nutrition and food science from Wayne State University and is also senior instructor for health promotions at William Beaumont Hospital. She may be reached at 882-3867 for more information.



#### The wet test

You've just spent all morning working in the yard. It felt good to get out in the fresh air and sunshine, but now you're hot, tired and in search of something to cool you off. The refrigerator reveals a vast assortment of sodas, fruit juices, milk and beer. You hesitate, wondering which will best quench your thirst, all the while ignoring the No. 1 liquid for the job: a tall, cool glass of water.

Most people have a tendency to place water aside when there is a selection offered. Let's face it: water is always available, but it doesn't have the pizzazz of other beverages. Let's take a few minutes and see how much we know about water and what it does for us.

1. The body regulates its temperature by:

a.) Craving cold drinks

when overheated and craving something to eat when too cold; b.) Burning up less fat during cold weather when fat is needed as insulation and using up more fat when the

weather is hot; c.) Sweating. 2. Under normal conditions, the body requires quarts of water per day. While some of the water comes from internal metabolic processes and the foods you eat, it is still recommended that you \_ eight-ounce glasses of water per day.

a.) 1 to 2, 1 to 2; b.) 2 to 2 1/2, 3 to 4; c.) 2 1/2 to 3, 6 to 8; d.) 3 1/2 to 4, 5 to 6.

Should be purchased in "100 percent pure lemon" or "natural" form to avoid adulteration with synthetic citric acid.

7. John is a heavy coffee drinker (10 cups per day). Will this influence his attempts to diet successfully?

8. After working several hours in the garden you need to quench your thirst. You should reach for:

a.) A glass of water; b.) A can of soda; c.) A glass of fruit juice; d.) A glass of Gatorade or other "athletic" thirst quencher.

**ANSWERS** 

1. (C) Sweating. The body can stay within a reasonably normal temperature range by perspiring when it is working hard or the outside temperature is high. Replacement of water loss while exercising is vital. Failure to do so can result in overheating, accompanied by heat exhaustion or

heat stroke. Heat stroke symptoms are: pronounced thirst, fatigue, muscle cramps, rapid heart rate, giddiness and frequent urination.

2. (C) 2 1/2 to 3, 6 to 8. The body requires this amount of water to efficiently function. This amount must be increased (as high as four quarts) with heavy exertion and activity or a hotter climate.

3. (A) Cereals. While cereals are the logical answer, even they are high in water (8 to 20 percent). Meats are between 40 and 75 percent, eggs 75 percent, milk 87 percent, fruits and vegetables 70 to 95 percent.

4. (D) Apple cider vinegar. Apple cider vinegar is made from crushed apples in which the juice is allowed to mature. High in potassium and other trace minerals, regular use of apple cider vinegar is reported to help attain and maintain better health. Distilled vinegar is processed to remove the dark color and residue, resulting in a clear liquid, but also leaching out vital minerals. Malt vinegar is just another refined processed form. Synthetic vinegar is simply an imitation produced from coal tar.

5. (C) Seltzer. Seltzer is simply a thrice-filtered water with added carbonation containing no added salts, flavorings, preservatives and sug-

ars. (Bottled waters with natural carbonation like Perrier, fall into this category).

6. (A,B,C,D). All of these facts about lemon juice are TRUE. At only 20 calories each and high in ascorbic acid and pulp, lemons are a favorite fruit choice.

7. Yes. The high level of caffeine in coffee can be both physically and psychologically addictive. As a stimulant, caffeine works to make the heart beat faster and harder and causes your nerves to be more "jittery." It increases your basic metabolic rate, forcing a release of insulin and subsequent lowering of the blood sugar. Thus, caffeine plays havoc with your blood sugar level and can produce feelings of hunger. "John" should slowly reduce his consumption of coffee by substituting water. Decaffeinated coffees are not a good choice as they contain added chemicals used in the process.

8. A glass of water. All the other beverages listed contain sugar, which slow the rate of gastric emptying and can actually make you more thirsty! For example, one can of soda may contain up to six teaspoons of sugar; orange juice and grapefruit juice have over four teaspoons per quart and even drinks specially formulated for athletes contain at least two teasspoons of sugar per quart.
