Elemen-year-old gets an early start in volunteerism

Alas, 11-year-old Paige Phillips has been unemployed all her life. That is — until this summer.

When one of girlfriends was hospitalized last June, Paige visited her at St. John Hospital. While cheering up her friend, Paige observed the hospital routine and was particularly fascinated by the teen-age volunteers who were bustling about, helping with hospital chores and patient care.

"I called the hospital and they said that I wasn't old enough. I had to be 14," said Paige.

Her mother, Kathy Phillips, said, "They told her to try volunteering at a community center or a nursing home. Paige got out the phone book, made some calls and lined up two interviews. I didn't do anything. She interviewed at Cottage-Belmont Nursing Center the next day and they signed her up for two days a week."


Paige has been working at Cottage-Belmont on Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. ever since. "I'm her driver," Mrs. Phillips said. "She usually calls me about 3:15 and asks if she can stay until 5 or 5:30."

"I like a lot of the people," said Paige. "Most of the time they're happy and they're always glad to see me. "I play games with people. I push wheelchairs when people need to go to different activities. I bring popsicles and cookies. I read to them, brush their hair, try to cheer them up. I get to do arts and crafts with them and sometimes I'm the pin girl for bowling."

Mrs. Phillips said when her daughter interviewed for the volunteer job, she was told this would be just like a real job not like a place to play. It would

be serious business. "They told her there would be a dress code — she'd have to wear slacks or a a skirt that comes below the knee. Her shirt should be tucked in. She should wear tennis shoes. She also has to sign in and out and call if she can't come in. When she gets there, she gets a list of patients to visit.

Board sets guidelines on reporting abuse

To centralize statistics

The school board Monday adopted a policy setting clear guidelines on handling the reporting of child abuse cases. The new rules will ensure that cases where neglect or physical, mental or sexual abuse is suspected will be reported uniformly.

"We had a number of cases with evidence where the Department of Social Services was called in," said Deputy Superintendent Joseph Spagnoli, who formulated the policy. "In reviewing those cases, we found that they had been handled differently."

Under the new rules, the building principal will be informed, as well as the Department of Social Services and the Department of Special Education Services. In addition, statistics on abuse will be centralized with the Grosse Pointe Special Education Department, which will be in charge of the policy's operation.

"Until now, reporting has been done on an individual basis, with no central flow," said Special Education Director Claire Hunt. "There was nothing in our policy that outlined a procedure. We wanted to make sure we have one and everyone knows what it is and follows it." There are a few abuse or neglect cases uncovered each year in Grosse Pointe. Nobody knows for sure how many, because the reports are recorded in the individual student's records and are not compiled centrally --- which will change starting in September.

But the numbers are probably not great.

"Fewer than half a dozen," Hunt said, "which is not to say it's not going on. Those are the ones we know about."

"There aren't many," Spagnoli said. "There are a few abhorrent cases where it's hard to believe things like that could happen to any child anywhere."

Child abuse and neglect are hard to detect. Any individual signs of it are also things that happen to other children in normal life. It's the patterns of injuries or behavior that lead to suspicion, Hunt said.

"They carry guilt with them," she said. "Adults may be alerted on a subliminal level."

There are quantities of adults who see a child in an ordinary school day. Aides, cafeteria workets, castodians, office workers all have an opportunity to observe pattern of unusual behavior. "A youngster isn't just deposited through a slot into a classroom," Hunt said.

Park seeks left-turn ban on Mack

If the Wayne County Road Commission says it's OK, drivers westbound on Mack Avenue will not be able to turn left on streets from Nottingham to Wayburn between 7 and 9 a.m.

The Park council voted Monday night to prohibit the left turns on Nottingham, Beaconsfield, Lakepointe, Maryland and Wayburn to cut the volume of traffic on the residential streets.

The recommendation was part of a report submitted by Goodell-Grivas Inc., consulting engineers who studied the area bounded by Mack, Jefferson, Wayburn and Somerset. The city paid \$4,500 for the study, which incorporated findings from a 1985 study conducted by the city.

Councilman James Robson, who pushed for the study and has been a vocal supporter to ease the volume of traffic in the area, also proposed that drivers eastbound on Jefferson Avenue from Wayburn to Somerset be prohibited from making lefthand turns between 4 and 7 p.m. It would include Maryland, Lakepoint and Beaconsfield.


The matter was tabled, however, until there is a report on the Mack Avenue ban. Mayor Palmer Heenan proposed a 90day trial period "to see what kind of complaints we get. We don't want to do too much experimenting," he said. Director of Public Safety Richard Caretti said the request has to be approved by the county road commission, and he would not estimate when that would be.

Pointer of Interest James E. Brophy

Tomorrow James E. Brophy and a group of Michigan residents will walk to the center of the International Bridge that crosses over the Soo Locks where they will meet a group from Canada. They will dedicate a plaque commemorating the 25th anniversary of the bridge and then they'll release 10,000 balloons.

The historic walk should be an emotional event for Brophy who was in on the birth of the bridge.

He was appointed to the International Bridge Authority as chairman by then-Gov. G. Mennen Williams in 1959. He has been reappointed chairman every four years since then by succeeding Republican and Democratic governors, making him the longest serving member of the Authority.

Chosen for his financial acumen, Brophy has accumulated knowledge about bridges and international law. And he's traveled the road between Grosse Pointe and Sault Ste. Mariemany times in the past 28 years. The Authority, comprised of three U.S. and two Canadian representatives, meets quarterly, generally in the board room at the bridge, occasionally in Detroit and Toronto.

The two mile bridge links the twin cities of Sault Ste. Marie, Mich. and Sault Ste. Marie, On tario. It has been a boon to Canadian tourism. Before the bridge, about 5,000 people a month traveled by ferry across to the Canadian side. Recently, Brophy said, some 11,000 people crossed the bridge in one day.

The walk tomorrow will be historic since the bridge is not open to foot traffic. It will also be breathtaking the heidge See POINTER, page 13A

Contractors working for the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency at 38 Wayne County houses randomly selected by computer found that all but two have well below the four pico curie limit on radon set by the EPA. Neither of the two houses is in Grosse Pointe.

The tests were conducted in the spring and will resume in October, according to health department assistant director for environmental health Bruce Davis. Testing isn't done in the summer because the charcoal test cannisters don't give reliable results in high heat and humidity, Davis said.

Health officials didn't expect to find much radon in Wayne County because of its geology. An underlying layer of clay in

Preliminary tests for radon on much of the county prevents any a small number of houses in gas from seeping through. Only Grosse Pointe show exactly what the northwestern corner of the county has a shale substructure conducive to gas seepage.

But Michigan and its counties have volunteered to take part in the 10-state test. Larger amounts of radon have been found in locations as near as Washtenaw County and as far away as the Upper Peninsula.

Some homeowners still feel better if they have their house tested. Davis cautioned that there are some unscrupulous contractors promising more than they can deliver.

'Some contractors are charging up to \$50 for a test - but you can get your own EPAstandardized unit for about \$15," he said. Some companies are also offering a complete spec-

"It's impossible to do an air test for that little," he said. 'You can't test for everything under the sun. You have to know what you're looking for and the test for each compound costs quite a few dollars."

Davis said the health department is not recommending either that people get a test or not get a test. "That's up to them," he said. But the public can also keep in mind that radon

levels in Wayne County tend to be low.

"So far, it's about what we expected," Davis said, "which is not much."

Scouts find high adventure in the hills of New Mexico

"Those who trek Philmont either come back a man, or a broken boy.'

Boy Scout Troop 96 Eight Boy Scouts from Troop 96 recently returned from a rugged, 78-mile backpacking trek in Cimarron, N.M. Their reward for hardship and deprivation was added self-confidence, and a new respect for people's differences and the land. They learned the importance of a positive mental attitude, of working as a unit, and how to camp without leaving a trace. They also had loads of fun, and not one returned a broken boy.

Philmont, owned and operated by the Boy Scouts of America, has an elevation ranging from 6,500 to 12,441 feet. It is 215 square miles of rugged mountain wilderness in the Sangre de Cristo range of the Rockies.

The crew worked hard preparing for their journey. For two months prior to departure, they ran South High School's track regularly, under the direction of crew leader Thad Scott, a South student. They had two practice hikes carrying the 40- to 50pound packs they would be expected to carry at Philmont.

After a long train and bus ride, the crew was almost ready to start their trek. At base camp, on the dry desert floor, they still had to empty their packs once again for a final check. Who was carrying too much? Every ounce counts when carrying your food, clothing, cooking equipment (including camp stoves), bedding and house (tents) on your back in high altitude. Fastidious parents would wince to hear the ranger's tongue-in-cheek suggestion for economizing on the amount of underwear carried in:

the next; turn it inside out the film, toothpaste, and even the third; and reverse it once more the fourth!

The 10-day trek, in an area where water is scarce, was to include only three showers, with sponge baths sufficing in between. As it turned out, this crew had to skip their middle shower since the pump was broken at their site. Water from streams could only be used for drinking, after purifying it. No swimming, no soaking sore, tired feet, no washing was permitted in it – 15,000 scouts would make their way through these mountains before the summer was over.

Ranger Joe Robinson, whom the boys could only describe as cool," accompanied the crew the first three days. Their description of him was right on target. Who else but a cool guy could get a bunch of teenagers to cheerfully scrub pots and pans around the sump - the only place where washing was permitted – while singing such lyrics as these?

"Here we are with dirty pots, Camp Suds, and HTH. Don't forget to spatulate.

Have a nice day! With relentless good humor, Robinson reviewed compass skills, and how to set up camp, having them do it in silence the second day in order to foster teamwork. He taught them how to cook the dehydrated food, about courtesy on the trail, how to dispose of ashes and cinders after a fire (scatter them around the forest floor the next morning), and never, never bush wack - that is, cut across a switchback designed to keep the incline less strenuous. Cutting across them causes erosion.

He talked about how to avoid dangerous run-ins with the black bears that inhabit the wilderness there. Anything with a smell – Wear it the first day; reverse it food, soap, deodorant, unused first aid kit - had to be stored nightly in bear bags suspended from the trees. Not a morsel of food could be brought into a tent under any circumstances, and any clothes worn while cooking or eating could not be worn to bed. Also, they were warned to never take a flash photo of a bear, and to never run away from one - back away slowly.

The most important lesson he taught them was low-impact camping. Jamie Nevison's father, who as a youngster went to Philmont, said the pictures from this trek depicted the same wilderness he experienced more than 30 years earlier.

Robinson not only inspired the crew to replace the wood they used from the wood pile, but to collect enough to create an "awesome, awesome, awesome courtesy pile" for the next group coming through. He ended this three-day stay with a Philmont tradition — he made them peach cobbler, cooked in a Dutch oven over an open fire.

Many of their stops were at staffed camps where the crew could participate in skills needed more than a hundred years ago. Scoutmaster Dave Steele says, "These interpretive programs are some of the most accurate in the country. In fact, the gold mine we descended is the only one in the United States permitted to operate tours without electric lights.'

Other stops included mountain climbing and rapelling, blacksmithing, throwing tomahawks, climbing a 20-foot spar at the lumbering camp, calf-roping, branding (they branded their hiking boots), making arrowheads, fly-tying, grinding corn, simulated fur trapping, and real muzzle-loading and shooting. Their hats, used for targets, have black powder holes in them as proof of their outing. They

The purifying effects of the steam were then topped off outside the lodge, when they threw buckets of cold water over themselves.

One of their most tiring days was the third one, which began at 4:30 a.m. with a climb to the mesa to watch the sun rise. After breakfast and breaking

to the mountain climbing camp. Along the way they took a side hike to see Lover's Leap, and later ended up on a Jeep trail that adviser Jerry Partridge laughingly described as a "ladder." There wasn't a level spot on it, it had no switchbacks to ease the ascent, and it was hot and sunny. It was like the "hill" Boston marathoners encounter in their race that either makes them or breaks them. Once past that, they set up camp, made dinner, cleaned up, and then did some mountain climbing before turning in for the night.

"There's nothing like a viewyou've earned," says adviser Partridge. "After sweating, starving, hyperventilating and helping one another to the top, you bask

in the joy of the view." The boys agree.

The outstanding feeling they got from the trip was when they returned to base camp. As Scott Partridge put it, "We can now say to ourselves, 'Hey, I did this," and that translates into meaning they can travel other unknown, difficult paths in the future. . . and survive.'

Steele has now led four crews to Philmont. He says, "On average, this crew was a bit smaller and younger (ages ranged from 13 to 18), but moved along as quickly and crisply as any crew I've ever seen." 

Former judge arrested

"I have an obligation as a wife and mother to protect my familv from destructive behavior directed toward them," Grobbel said.

"I attempted to end, with reason, the devastation this person's intrusion into my home and family has caused. Instead this person chose to call police and have me removed from the front yard. Rather than leave, I was arrested.

Grobbel said the woman was not a family member, but declined to give any other details.

"There is no point to go into what happened," Grobbel said. "I did what a wife and mother would do to try and resolve this matter peacefully."



ing centers. You'll learn from the patients. It's a two-way proposition. You'll learn about people, careers, travel and more.

Paige said she likes crafts and playing games with patients. "I play board games like Sorry with them," she said. "I move the game pieces. I draw the cards for them and for myself. I read the cards for them and for me. Then the patient (sometimes) stands up and shouts, 'I win."

Besides her four or more hours of volunteer work each week, Paige also takes piano lessons and swims with the Lochmoor Country Club's swimming team - a commitment that involves practice twice a day. She's also participating in the Grosse Pointe library's summer reading club and has just completed her 31st book.

Her only previous work experience, she said, was occasionally helping friends sell lemonade at front yard lemonade stands or working at garage sales.

She plans to continue her volunteer work after school starts. She graduated from Monteith Elementary School in June and will enter sixth grade at Parcells Middle School in September.






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

New state plan: hike sales tax to help schools

new plan to shift part of the state's property tax burden to the sales tax Thas emerged from the property tax and revenue subcommittee of the state School Finance Commission and is expected to become the basis for legislative tax reform later this year.

But if the recommendation does what Sen. Dan DeGrow, R-Port Huron, claims, it is unlikely to do the job expected of it. DeGrow said, "Almost everyone would get more relief under this proposal." If that were true, who would pick up the tab? Nobody is suggesting the schools and other state services should get less money at this time.

Under the plan, the state sales tax would be boosted from 4 cents to 6 cents on the dollar with the additiional receipts being used to finance more than \$1 billion in property tax relief. So the plan entails a tax shift rather than the tax relief that DeGrow claimed.

Even so, the shift from the heavy reli-

ance on the property tax, chiefly to finance public schools, to the sales tax might arouse enough support for passage of the required constitutional amendment. To get on the ballot, however, the proposal would have to be approved by a two-thirds vote of the state Legislature.

One of the aims of the tax shift proposal is to level out the differences between rich and poor school districts. Yet a sales tax is believed to fall harder on poor people than the middle class or the well-to-do because it taxes the ability to consume, not necessarily the ability to pay. So the tax switch might benefit poor districts but at the expense of poor people. That sounds like a strange kind of reform.

Under the plan, local school taxes on residential property would drop in most districts from an average of 32.5 mills to a maximum of 18 mills unless voters ap-

proved a higher rate. But a new cap of 38 mills would be imposed on all local property taxes, including those imposed by counties and townships, as contrasted with the current 50-mill cap.

However, commercial and industrial property would be taxed at a flat 23-mill rate and this revenue would go into statewide school aid fund to be distributed around the state to even out the differences between rich and poor districts. In addition, the commission subcommittee recommended the creation of a \$200 million fund to insure quality education, and to finance it would use half of the estimated \$170 million windfall from the federal tax reform laws instead of returning it to taxpayers.

There is much to be said in favor of lower property taxes around the state but any limit on the amount of millage that

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could be imposed by a local district would work to the disadvantage of a district such as Grosse Pointe which raises most of its school revenues from the property tax and is eligible for little state and federal aid.

It makes sense to provide for better financing of the public schools, but it makes no sense to put any cap or lid on the amount that any district wishes to impose on itself for school purposes. Quality education has a high price, as Grosse Pointe taxpayers have learned, but the excellence obtained here has paid good dividends to students, their families and the entire community.

The Michigan School Finance Commission that is considering revisions in tax support for the public schools was appointed earlier this year by the state Board of Education and includes corporate heads, labor union officials, lawmakers and several prominent media people as well as representatives of business, education and professional groups.

They are at least trying to make major revisions in Michigan's tax laws rather than simply seeking more Band-Aid solutions that have been so popular in attacking immediate tax problems in the past. But whether the commission's package, if and when it is approved, will stand the legislative and public tests required in hiking the sales tax remains to be seen.

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No surprises in Park vote

There were no major surprises in the Park primary last week, with all of the favored candidates being nominated for the November election.

It had been expected that the three incumbent council members would lead the race for the council and they did. John C. Prost, seeking a third term, led the ticket with 944 votes, while David M. Gaskin and Vernon R. Ausherman were both nominated for a second term.

Daniel E. Clark led the challengers with 630 votes, only 92 behind Ausherman, with Barbara A. Cherghezan and Richard H. Case becoming the other two nominees for the general election. Mrs. Cherghezan, the only woman in the council race, staged a mild upset by coming in fifth.

In the contest for municipal judge, the two favorites, Kirsten Frank and J. Thomas McGovern, led the field of six and outdistanced the other entries.

Mayor Palmer Heenan, seeking a third

two-year term, was unopposed and will remain so in the November election.

The close races among the top candidates for both the council and municipal judge indicate that the November election campaign will be in the Park tradition. That means that it will be a hard-fought campaign with the leading candidates going all-out to influence the voters.

As we've said before, however, that also means that the voters ought to get the benefit of a good ventilation of the issues, whether the candidates are discussing the future of the flood plain in the Park, the controversy over renovating the municipal court and council chambers or some other issue that becomes a matter of concern during the campaign.

Good competition is usually the key to a good discussion of the issues and the nominees for both the council and municipal judge assure that will be true again this year in the Park.



Extending libel protection

raditionally, the news media have relied on three defenses against libel: provable truth, fair comment and criticism, and privilege. But the Michigan Supreme Court last December removed one of the media's most important shields against libel when it limited privilege to reporting of court proceedings and ruled that the press is not immune to libel suits when its information is obtained from police blotters and other public records.

Now Rep. William Bryant of Grosse Pointe has proposed that the privilege be extended to accurate reports of public and official actions, records, notices and announcements as well as court proceedings. And last week the legislation won the support of Justice James H. Brickley who wrote last year's opinion that limited the media's privilege to reports of court proceedings.

In a speech to the Michigan Association of Broadcasters, Brickley said he supports passage of legislation to shield the press from libel suits when they accurately report information obtained from public records. This, of course, is exactly the aim of Bryant's bill which would, in effect, reverse the high court's December libel ruling.

Brickley's point was that "once information is reduced to the status of a public record, that fact is public regardless of its original accuracy." It is highly unusual for a supreme court justice to publicly com-

ment on a specific case that has been before the court and to endorse legislation that apparently would head off similar cases in the future. Brickley explained, however, that "a post-opinion preference is not out of order."

In the December case, the Battle Creek Enquirer published information provided by two local police agencies, but the information was inaccurate. As a result of the court decision, the Enquirer was required to go to trial to protect itself against the libel suit brought by the man involved in the case.

It may appear to private citizens, on their first look at this situation, that this is a dispute affecting chiefly the news media and the people they cover. But it is more than that. The news media serve as surrogates for the public in keeping an eye on what public officials and institutions are doing. And so it is in the public interest to permit the media wide latitude in doing their job, assuming they do it accurately.

That does not excuse inaccuracies that libel private citizens or public officials, but the proposed legislation would relieve the media of liability when they accurately use public records that turn out to be faulty or that are libelous in content. Such legislation appears to serve the broad public interest and we hope when the Legislature returns to Lansing next month, it will enact Rep. Bryant's bill into law.





It's time for a comprehensive trade policy

Day care isn't a business

To the Editor:

I attended the July 28 meeting of the Grosse Pointe Woods Planning Commission. I was there regarding my interest in the agenda item "Interpretation of 5-4-1." I must say that I believe you were correct to suspend and make no interpretation of the item. It was clear from the discussion that you were not well acquainted with the background and nature of the issue. I believe it is best to give this matter serious consideration prior to making any interpretation.

I do, however, believe this matter will again come for your recommendation and want to express my views to you in anticipation of your inevitable consideration of the issue. I strongly support the position taken by Mrs. Temkow. I speak to you as a working mother, a member of this community, and as a professional with a background in the care and counselling of families with young children. Even the most cursory review of pertinent literature and research in the area of family dynamics will highlight the exquisite need for appropriate child care. This is especially true in the early years when children are forming relationships within a family unit.

We are all well aware of the physical and emotional abuses which have occurred in the institutional day care centers. This is why, when deciding what type of care my young children should receive while I am at work, that I chose a family day care home. The home is a smaller system in which the parents, children and caregiver can become well acquainted, and allows for greater integration of the child into a situation which most resembles a family unit.

The child receives care from one adult with whom he can form a consistent relationship. Likewise, he associates with a small number of other children. With these children he can begin to acquire the necessary "give and take" skills required in all other aspects of life as his boundaries expand. The consistency of authority, caring and peer relationships are some of the key elements and foundations necessary for normal growth and development. This is well documented by all family developmental theorists. Furthermore, in the family day care home the parents are able to screen and select a caregiver whose values and parenting style most resemble those of the parent. The child is less confused in

caring. The amount of stimulation the children receive is grossly abnormal. The noise level alone is often enough to cause sleep and behavioral disturbances in children. There is often a great turnover in employees at these centers, thereby causing the child (with limited social, analytical and emotional skills) to continually readjust to a new caregiver. The commercially zoned areas in which these centers are located are congested and often hazardous for the children. There are often 12 to 30 children in a room together, and this situation occurs from infancy! From both a developmental and infectious disease perspective this is an atrocity. It is well supported that children in large daycare situations have a greatly increased incidence of communicable diseases. Oftentimes these diseases are fatal.

You may ask; "Why does mother work outside the home?" There are many reasons: There is (I hope) the option of the family daycare home; the woman (and society) has invested a great amount of time and energy into a career; many women are single parents; many homes require dual incomes; the list of answers is almost endless. In my own case, I have spent years educating and establishing myself as a professional, and am currently a faculty member at Wayne State University. The educational preparation for such a position was a long process and it is my intent to continue to serve my community and foreign investment.

The Reagan Administration is not in favor of the Senate bill, but it deals with unfair trading practices less severely than the House bill and gives the president broad discretion to avoid retaliation.

All of the differences in these bills will need to be settled in a House-Senate conference that is expected to start in early September. Even though there are problems that must be solved between the two bills, it appears likely that there will be a new U.S. trade policy implemented before the end of the year.

Whatever path we follow we must find something that is good for the short-term and, at the same time, can be developed and implemented as part of a comprehensive long-term strategy. We must analyze this problem and make a decision based on a policy that is best for the entire country.

in my profession. However, although this society supports the continued education of its members, there are other conflicting (and antiquated?) constraints which relegate the service of (my) education and expertise back to society to an almost useless category.

Gentlemen, there are and should be better options for working parents and their children. The allowance of the family daycare home in a neighborhood, résidential environment is a viable option. Children belong in a home environment. I do not believe that the care of seven or less small children in a home by one adult is an incursion of a commercial enterprise into a neighborhood. Rather it is a natural and socially appropriate method for the care of children in their own environment. It is a rational choice from both a developmental and health standpoint. Child care is a community concern. I ask you to consider this issue carefully and then join the growing numbers of thoughtful communities in our area and across the country which are allowing the family daycare home. The Grosse Pointes have an outstanding history of commitment to a high quality of life. I believe the stand of allowing our children to be cared for in a neighborhood setting would be yet another asset and point of pride for our community. Bruce K. Benesh Susan V. 





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14 break-ins keep police busy



Drippy, itchy noses, red, scratchy, watery eyes, sore throats, itchy ears, blocked nasal passages, sneezes and sniffles, wheezes and snuffles are de rigueur for about 15 percent of the population from mid-August until the end of September.

Hay fever is a lay term, according to John Lesesne, M.D., an allergist on the staffs of Bon Secours and St. John hospitals. Hay fever refers to allergic rhinitis and has nothing whatsoever to do with hay. In late August and September, the term usually refers to the sneezy, sniffily reactions of certain people to the pollen of the ragweed plant. "Some people also react to outdoor molds and fungi that grow in New York boroughs tried to fields where dead organic matter is abundant," he said. related to the ragweed family. According to Lesesne, chrysanthemums, zinnias, asters, goldenrod and dandelions may cause trouble for hay fever sufferers.

The only people who are bothered by ragweed pollen are those who have inherited a predisposition for developing hay fever, he said. When the pollen is present, and when the wind carries a high concentration of the stuff toward allergic noses - the sneezing and itching starts.

The ragweed pollen interacts with the allergic person's antibodies, causing his body to produce and release histimines. The histimines are the immediate cause of the symptoms of hay fever.

Lesesne emphasized avoidance as the best treatment for hay fever sufferers. "Use air conditioning in your house, at work, and in your car, whenever possible. If

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Some cultivated flowers are you don't have car air conditioning, keep the windows rolled up," he said.

If the symptoms are severe, there are several remedies to alleviate the discomfort. Allergy injections must be started several months before the hay fever season, to build up antibodies prior to the onslaught of pollen. Injections are given weekly, or semi-weekly. The so-called oneshot treatment, he said, is still experimental. Lesesne said a treatment is being developed that involves fewer shots.

Medication has long been one of the weapons against hay fever symptoms. Most medications, he said, are antihistimines or decongestants, or a combination of the two. Over-the-counter drugs are available, but, like prescription treatments, often cause drowsiness. "Several years ago, a new antihistimine came out, called Seldane," he said. "It does not cause drowsiness. It may not work for everybody and some people may need a decongestant as well."


He added that there are several kinds of nasal sprays that

also bring relief. Decongestant drops should only be used three or four times a day, he said. They offer quick relief, but should only be used for a short term. For longer periods of time, he said, some prescription drugs contain a type of cortisone that only affects the mucous membranes of the nose. Another drug, Nasalcrom, prevents the release of substances which cause the allergic reaction and has virtually no side effects. Eve drops are also available.

Lesesne said that daily pollen counts issued by local weather forecasters are confusing and don't indicate the degree of suffering individuals will endure. "Several years ago, the Michigan Allergy Society came out with a statement to this effect," he said. "Pollen counts have been taken the day before they are issued, and are usually too late to be of any practical use. Plus - local variations are too wide to provide any accurate measurement." If you live next to a field full of ragweed, the pollen count will be higher than if you live near an lake with an onshore breeze.

Lesesne emphasized that avoidance of the pollen of the ragweed plant is the best defense for those who are allergic to it.

This is the '80s. But not everything is malls and chain stores. There are still a few holdouts that stress the personal touch.

"The overall trend has been away from this type of (independent) store. We're it," said Bill Seppala, president of his familyowned sporting goods store, Harper Sport Shop.

The store started as a narrow aisle crammed with athletic equipment. owned as a sideline by Seppala's father, Les, a Detroit teacher. After 10 years, it moved across Harper to its present location. Now it is wide and deep and backed up by a maze of inventory warehouse and still crammed with athletic equipment. Les and Katherine Seppala still work in the store where they started teaching their son the business when he was 12.

"I started out working on the hand engraver," Seppala said. "Now we have a computerized engraver that will do in 10 minutes what I used to spend 45 minutes doing. And if I got to the bottom and made a mistake, what could I do? That can't happen now."

The computerized engraver is a symbol of the personalized service that is the hallmark of the independent store. About 25-30 percent of Seppala's business is custom work: embroidered team shirts and jackets, silk-screened hats and T-shirts, engraved trophies, bowling balls drilled to specification.





Due to a change in federal tax law, all unemployment compensation received after 1986 is taxable.

The Tax Reform Act of 1986 repealed the former provision which allowed a limited exclusion from gross income for unemployment compensation received by individuals whose income did not exceed certain amounts.

Individuals who receive a substantial amount of unemployment compensation in 1987 may need to adjust their withholding allowances or make estimated tax payments. If they do not do this, they may not have enough income tax withheld to cover their tax for the year.



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Substance abuse in the workplace

Michigan employers who are concerned about tackling the controversial issue of drug testing in the workplace are finding the help they need in a recently published book dealing with substance abuse in the workplace.

The first book of its kind written specifically for Michigan employers, "Combating Alcohol and Drugs in the Michigan Workplace" is a 169-page guide published by the Michigan State Chamber of Commerce and written by Gary Klotz, a Michigan attorney specializing in employment law.

State Chamber President James Barrett pointed out that personnel practices and the issues surrounding alcohol and drug abuse in the Michigan workplace are changing rapidly. He said new legislative proposals and court interpretations appear each year, posing a challenge for employers who are considering establishing new drug-related policies, re-examining old ones or instituting a drug testing program.

According to Barrett, this handbook for Michigan employers is designed to guide their approach to drug testing: when to test, how to test and what to do with "positive" test results. He said the book also addresses the legal and employee relations considerations applicable to work rules about substance abuse, disciplinary measures and investigative alternatives to drug test ing.

Road work to delay motorists

The projects are among 84 construction areas under way which may slow drivers on state freeways this summer.

In Southeast Michigan, a onehalf-mile section of northbound I-75 from the Ohio line is reduced from three lanes to one and southbound traffic is reduced to one lane for a one-half-mile stretch around Luna Pier.

In August, the six-mile stretch of I-75 from the Ohio line to Luna Pier will be reduced to one lane each way until mid-November. Nearby parallel alternate routes are U.S. 24 (Telegraph Road) and M-125 (South Dixie Highway) or U.S. 23, which is 10 miles west of I-75.

Farther north, a six-mile stretch of I-75 at Flint between Flushing and Mount Morris roads is reduced from three to two lanes both ways. One alternate route is via I-475 which connects with I-75 south of Flint and reconnects north of Flint by exiting on Clio Road, heading north to M-57 and then west to the freeway

I-75 both ways over Dixie Highway in Bridgeport township in Saginaw County is reduced from three to two lanes each way

I-75 over the Zilwaukee Bridge near Saginaw is reduced intermittently from two lanes to one days. The two inside lanes are closed nights and weekends. In Oakland County, westbound I-96 from Wixom to Kent Lake roads near Wixom is reduced to one lane from 6 a.m. to 3 p.m. and to two lanes from 3 p.m. to 6 a.m. daily. Eastbound I-96 from Kent Lake to Wixom roads is reduced to one lane from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. and to two lanes from 7 p.m. to 10 a.m. daily.

Eight miles of eastbound I-96 in Ionia County carry two-way traffic from the Ionia/Kent county line to the Jordan Lake rest area due to work on westbound lanes.

Westbound I-94 is detoured for two miles from west of Rawsonville Road to the U.S. 12 interchange near Ypsilanti. Eastbound traffic is shifted to the westbound lanes.

Traffic on four bridges carrying I-94 over U.S. 131 in Kalamazoo county is reduced to one lane each way. The northbound and southbound U.S. 131 onramps to westbound I-94 are closed. A signed detour directs traffic via local streets.

I-94 from Paw Paw to east of Mattawan in Van Buren County carries one lane each way for four miles on the eastbound side.

U.S. 27 in Clare County is reduced from two lanes to one each way for six miles between Hatton and Mostetler roads.

In addition, the southbound Lodge Freeway (U.S. 10) in Detroit is closed from Seven Mile Road to I-75 through mid-November



"I wound up - with the help of a very good contractor - rebuilding the entire back of the house. You wouldn't believe the difference. And not many people would think that the back of the house would be so crucial to the appearance of the place. But I think it is important to do a total job on a home. After all, that's where you have to live.' Because of her work on both houses, Wood hasn't been able to finish the detail work on her own home. And she hasn't been able to find much time to touch base with some of her clients. "The deck of the porch isn't painted and I just got the wallpaper up in the library. I've been so busy that I just haven't been able to get the odds and ends finished," Wood said. It'll get done, she said, but she doesn't mind taking the time. "I did this house for myself, not as a portfolio piece. It's the first real home I've had since the Bloomfield Hills carriage house. I did it to see if I could do this kind of extensive work myself. It has been a learning experience. "I've been very pleased with the results. Perfect strangers stop and watch me work and neighbors stop by and give me encouragement. That's very satisfying. I like this neighborhood. There's a lot of untapped potential here and a lot of things that the city is planning to do. This is a very exciting place to be right now. Wood said she'd like to get back into design consulting. One thing she's noticed is that her renovations have spurred similar activity from many of her neighbors.

AAUW: Not for women only

The name will remain the same, but the American Association of University Women isn't just for women anymore.


At the recent AAUW national convention in Houston, Texas, AAUW members voted overwhelmingly in favor of accepting male college graduates. According to Kay Kirby, president of the Grosse Pointe Branch of the AAUW, the organization was merely following its own standards by adopting the amendment to the AAUW bylaws.

"It's about time we did it," Kirby said. "The AAUW has had a long history of action for equality. We certainly couldn't turn around and be exclusive."

By admitting men into the AAUW, the education-oriented organization also sidestepped the kind of messy legal challenges that some gender-exclusive national organizations have had in recent years. "We certainly didn't want it to go that far," Kirby said. "This decision really is in keeping with the spirit of the AAUW."

The major change brought about by the decision is that the bylaws will now read: "Membership open to graduates with baccalaureates" rather than "women with baccalaureates." There will be no change to the AAUW's name or procedures, Kirby added. "The fellowships which have been offered to women will still go to women," she said.

The AAUW has 175,000 members nationwide, about 320 in the Grosse Pointes. It began as a study group, but has shifted its emphasis in recent years to an "action" organization, Kirby said. "We're one of the oldest

One of the AAUW's major ongoing projects is that it promotes fellowships and scholarships for members who wish to continue their education. For the past 25 years, those scholarships have been funded from proceeds of the Grosse Pointe branch's popular Used Book Sale. It is likely that in the near future, scholarship and fellowship programs will be developed for male members,

Right now though, there aren't any male AAUW members. "As far as I know, there have never been any men who have wanted to join," Kirby said with a chuckle. "The League of Women Voters opened its membership to men two or three years ago and I know of three men who joined ... and they were spouses of members.



South's new A.D. Lake looks to continue South's success

The reputation that the Grosse Pointes carry has landed yet another aspiring professional administrator.

This time around, Grosse Pointe South hooked Anita Lake, known as "Jo", to its athletic program.

Lake fills the vacancy left by Chuck Hollosy who retired July 1, 1987 after a 26 year athletic directorship.

"I know very well that I have some pretty big shoes to fill," said a realistic Lake. "Chuck Hollosy has done an excellent job here and he has left the program in great shape. I just hope I can continue the program at the high standards it has been run at for years."

Lake, who has had success follow her wherever she goes, was named to the athletic director's post on June 18.

"I heard that Grosse Pointe was one of the most progressive school systems in the state," said Lake when asked why she applied for the job. "I also felt that the total philosophy I have about skills, both mental and physical, could do nothing but produce here at South. I believe in total education for the student athlete and there's no better place than South because of its tradition and history."

Speaking of history, Lake has an array of coaching backgrounds that have helped her develop her sports forte. She was named the National High School Volleyball Coach of the Year in 1979 and has had a distinguished career as a softball, basketball and volleyball coach.

"I truly feel that my background has groomed me to be an athletic director," said the former assistant principal of O.A. Carlson High School in Rockwood. "I broke into coaching when women's athletics were just starting. Since then I have devoted my time to athletics. It has been in my blood forever."

Lake is a quiet, reserved administrator, yet has made quite a noise in the world of coaching. She coached two of her teams to national volleyball records; Flint Kearsley, third place, 92 consecutive wins and Holy Rosary, fourth place, 90 consecutive wins. While coaching at Flint Kearsley, Lake became the only female recipient of the A.W. Bishop Award, awarded annually to the outstanding coach in the Flint area.

With a nickname of "Jo," many outsiders may tend to believe the new South A.D. is a male. However, when the voice on the other end of the phone has a lady-like tone, more often than not an awkward tone follows.

"A lot of people have a misconception of me being an athletic director because of my name," the former O.A. Carlson athletic director said. "I get quite a kick out of how suddenly some of the tones change. It's actually quite fun." "I love being a female, but I am an athletic director," she said boldly. "I do not like the question 'What's it like being a **female** athletic director?' All athletic directors have a job to do and the only difference is the style of a program."

A lady with initiative, Lake is determined to maintain the direction of the athletic program until it is in need of a change.

"I haven't really had a chance to talk to the kids, so until I do that and find out what they want and what their needs are, I won't make any drastic changes," she explained. "I want to continue the program the way it's going. I don't want to make any major changes. I want to be able to facilitate to the kids."

Although she's the new kid on the block, Lake has her priorities in order and believes that lending a listening ear is the key to a good rapport with her coaching staff.

"A lot of people tend to believe that athletic directors actually try to coach the coach," she said with hesitation. "I feel the A.D.'s job is a position of understanding and listening with coaches and student athletes. It goes without saying that I take care of scheduling and organization, but the mainstay with the program has got to be listening."

 \bar{L} ake is a "behind the scenes" styled person who generally lets her staff do their thing until her input is necessary.

"I have to let the coaches do their jobs and when there's a need for my interpretation, I will step in," she said confidently. "I don't coach them. They are trained professionals and I am here for a support system basically."

Lake, who has collected eight state championships over her 22-years of coaching, is hoping her success may rub off on the Blue Devils, but she doesn't think it will be needed in most cases.

"I wish I could say that I'll be able to step right in and make this a highly successful program, but it already is," she boasted. "The program here is exemplary. I just want to continue running a smooth operation."

Lake came to the Blue Devils' program from O.A. Carlson High School in Rockwood where she acted as assistant principal and athletic director. Lake was a highly successful coach who has compiled a win/loss record of 653-65 over a span of 22 years. She guided her volleyball, basketball and softball teams at Flint Kearsley and Holy Rosary to a total of nine state championships. In 1979, Lake was voted the National High School Volleyball Coach of the Year by the National High School Athletic Coaches Association and she stated that it was one of her biggest thrills as a prep coach. Included in her world travels are trips to China and Europe. She also coached at Michigan State University for a season. She is looking forward to the challenge of the program and tradition at South and stated that when it's football season, she lives on hot dogs because she's always at the games and never has time to get a decent meal.




'Sprint' takes LTYC Regatta

Don't drink and boat

The recent stories of people who mix alcohol and boating should be a reminder to us all that alcohol and operating boats do not mix.

The Wayne County Sheriff's Marine Patrol is in charge of enforcing the "drunk boating" laws in our area. Sergeant Schmoekel, from the Sheriff's Department, states that one of the most difficult areas of enforcement is that of the drunk boater.

"Often the intoxicated boater is difficult to identify. Unless we get a complaint or the Marine Patrol people have reasonable cause to stop a boater for very erratic boat opreation creating a dangerous situation, the drunk boater might go unnoticed. Hopefully passengers in the boat will keep an intoxicated person from operating the boat. Boaters, like drivers of cars, need to know when they have had enough and NOT operate their vessels."

Field and Stream Magazine's May issue carried an article on how alcohol can have an impact on one's alertness; especially when on the water. They tested two experienced boaters for the effects of alcohol. Both were put through special courses which tested boat handling and safety skills. After just one drink, the Field and Stream examiners were able to measure loss of boat handling skills, diminished reaction time, and lessened assiduity when following directions.

The second through fourth drinks brought on increasing inability to function. By the fifth round, participants were so drunk that emergency boat handling skills (such as throwing a life jacket into the water to simulate a man overboard) were so poorly executed that had it been a real-life situation, harm would have come to the victims.

The Field and Stream personnel administered six drinks over a two-hour period. Blood alcohol levels were measured at .110 to .116; well above the .10 legal limit.

All through the testing, the participants were questioned about how intoxicated they were feeling. Both stated that they were fine and not impaired up through the fourth drink. But, both participants could not stand on one leg or pass other field sobriety tests. By the sixth drink, both admitted that they were not able to function and that they were in fact, drunk.

The Field and Stream personnel further measured night vision to be adversely affected, as well as the ability to distinguish the difference between red and green. When one considers the inability to focus, reason quickly and react immediately, as well as other impairments, it does seem that operating a boat at night is equivalent to having your head in the sand.

Drunk boating laws are getting tougher. In this state, one is considered "impaired" when the blood alcohol measures .07 and above, and "under the influence" when blood alcohol is at .10.

The Sheriff's Marine Patrol is very active in our area. They can administer sobriety tests on the water with portable brethalyzers and issue tickets. More than likely, they will turn the vessel over to a sober passenger capable of handling it and returning it to shore in the event the skipper is judged to be incapable. If that is not possible then the Marine Patrol will summon a tow for the vessel, which could cost the skipper upwards of \$50.

Sergeant Schmoekel indicated the Marine Patrol generally turn "drunk skippers" over to the local law enforcement agency.

"Local police then take the inebriated into custody, give them a blood or urine test - their choice - but most people take the breath test and then issue the summons for a court date. They usually post bond and go home if someone comes to get them. If they can't post bond then they have to stay until they sober up." Schmoekel stated. "From then on it is just like a drunk driving charge in a car. The person goes through the same judicial process - before the judge and all that. Either charge, operating while under the influence or operating while impaired, carries a hefty fine and/or a jail sentence."





Some fitness answers

Some answers to your fit ness questions:

What is the ideal dress for exercise in warm weather?

Lightweight and loosefitting are the keys to permit circulation of air between the skin and the environment. Heavy sweatshirt material and rubber or plastic clothing prevents or inhibits evaporative cooling of the body by sweating. Try cottons in light colors to reflect the heat as dark colors absorb the heat.

Can cold air cause lung damage during outdoor exercise?

No. Even the coldest air warms up in the nose and throat before it enters the lungs. Lung tissue can't freeze while you exercise. Cold air, however, may produce a drying effect which could aggravate an existing respiratory or asthmatic condition. A mask to go over your nose and mouth will do the trick to add needed moisture.

I'm weight training. Should I consume extra protein?

It is generally assumed that extra protein is of no benefit. Excessive protein can be harmful because it places a strain on the liver and kidneys. Contrary to popular claims by manufacturers of powdered protein, these supplements will not build larger muscles out of smaller ones. In addition, calorie-laden protein over your needed caloric input will be transformed to FAT. Excessive calories of any type will add fat.



When there is an imbalance between the calories consumed and the body's energy expenditure, any excess is stored fat. Burning this stored fat for energy is every dieter's goal. The problem is, how do you get the body to burn fat in a safe way?

Fat metabolism (breakdown) depends on the glucose from carbohydrates. Fat cells must have an adequate supply of carbohydrates in the form of glucose in order to burn fat properly. When a person is not consuming adequate carbohydrates in the diet, the body is put in a fasting stage. During fasting, the brain's requirement for glu-

cose must still be met. Consequently, body protein tissues, such as liver and muscle cells, begin to break down to provide the necessary glucose for energy.

After glycogen stores from the liver are used up, there is no available glucose in the body for cells to continue to function properly. When this happens, fatty acids from stored fat are converted into ketone bodies which eventually results in ketosis.

In the first few days of this deprivation of glucose, the body protein (muscles) provides 90 percent of the needed glucose. If body protein loss continues at this rate, death could occur within three weeks. When ketosis occurs, the dieter often has a sweet or "fruity" odor to the breath. When a person experiences ketosis, ketones may be produced in greater quantities than the body can use and excrete. This causes them to accumulate in the blood. This condition can lead to acidosis. (an acid condition in the blood) which can harm many body functions.

The more obvious signs of severe acidosis are muscle twitching, involuntary movement, cardiac arrythmia, disoolescent.

During ketosis, the body drastically reduces its energy output in order to conserve both its fat and lean tissue. Decreased muscle results in slowed metabolism and the loss of fat falls dramatically. Even though weight loss may be fast, it is primarily water and protein loss. It is possible that fat loss would be far less than if additional food was consumed.

To avoid unwanted conditions of ketosis, the average person must have a minimum intake of at least 60 grams of carbohydrates a day. But to be not only safe and healthful, your diet should include almost twice that amount in carbohydrate foods plus a balance of protein and fat.

For those who are including a high level of exercise along with dieting, the need for increased carbohydrates is essential.

In order to evaluate a weight-loss program, make sure that you will be eating adequate amounts of fruits and vegetables along with selections from the bread list.

When following a well-balanced diet, lean tissue will not waste away and only excess body fat will be lost. It is

also very important to remember, when setting a goal weight, that you choose a weight that is healthy for you, taking into account not only your height, but also your bone structure and overall body toning. Muscle weighs more than fat, but takes up a smaller amount of space so the final "ideal" weight for you is only one indicator of whether you have reached a healthy goal weight.

Some people, when dieting, may try to cut back on the recommended amounts of food, thinking they will get a better weight loss. Actually, they are setting themselves up for an unhealthy state. The weight loss that may be seen in a decreased consumption of carbohydrate is a loss of body protein with quantities of water and important minerals, not body fat, and will easily be gained back because it is vital that the body replenish its protein stores.

The more you become aware of nutrition and your metabolism, the better you will be able to make the right choices and experience a safe and effective weight loss; a weight loss that may be maintained throughout your life!

Yes, your metabolism has changed. It is estimated that for every decade after age 20, there is a 10% reduction in resting caloric requirements. If eating habits don't change, those extra calories convert to fat. However, as people age, they also become less active and burn less calories while their food intake remains the same. What to do? It's not fair, but one should eat less and exercise more!

Will sweating help me to lose weight?

You will weigh less because of fluid loss, but not because of loss of fat tissue. It's not uncommon to lose from two to three pounds due to sweating while exercising vigorously, but that weight will return shortly after exercise by normal thirst. You should drink water prior to, during and after your vigorous exercise bout to prevent dehydration.

I would like to diet by eating one large meal a day. Is this advisable?

This may upset your body's metabolism and cause harmful changes in blood fats. Plus, eating all calories in one meal may stimulate the body to store more of the calories as fat. A one meal a day schedule will also increase appetite, which will lead to weight gain.

I've heard that you cannot change muscle into fat. Is this true?

If muscles are not used, they will weaken and become smaller, but they won't change into fat. Muscle is muscle and fat is fat. An excess of calories will become fat no matter where they come from, i.e. proteins, carbohydrates or fats.



'La Bamba'' is a sweetly nostalgic rock 'n' roll biography of Richie Valens, a California fruit picker at 15 and a rock star by 17, when he died.
