



People asking for tragedy, chief says

The Grosse Pointe Farms called in. Police Department is urging Robert Bradford, officer-inand a great deal of care when venturing out on to the ice at the foot of Kerby Road or anywhere along Lakeshore.

"Yesterday was the first day of ice and we had adults and kids near open water at the foot of Kerby," Ferber said Monday afternoon. "People are asking for a tragedy."

Ferber noted that some citizens ignored commands by officers to get off the ice.

"We are asking that the citizens obey us when we ask them to get off the ice," he said. "It is a violation of state law to disobey the lawful order of a police officer."

Noting that there would be no way for an officer to attempt a rescue if someone were to go through the ice, Ferber said that the U.S. Coast Guard would have to be

citizens to use common sense charge of the U.S. Coast Guard Station at St. Shores, said that it might take as long as 20 minutes for a helicopter to come from Selfridge Air Force Base to attempt a rescue. In the frigid water, it might be too late for the victim.

Bradford said in many areas where the water is protected from the wind, the ice may thicken quickly, but immature ice may be very uneven in its thickness. Ice two inches thick in some places may be only one-half or an inch thick in others.

"Wind shifts can move ice out of an area very quickly,' he said. "If the ice stacks because of an east wind, then when the wind shifts, the ice is already broken and will move out quickly.'

Two contracts expired City, police reach impasse

Both command and public safety officers in the City have been working under the terms of a contract that expired June 1987, and while the command officers have filed for mediation/ arbitration, the other union hopes that two more meetings later this month may result in an agreement.

Detective Sgt. John Drummond, vice president of the Supervisors Association represented by the Fraternal Order of Police, said there are a number of language questions, both financial and technical, on which city officials and the union have been unable to reach agreement.

Among the more important issues, said Drummond, are hospital insurance for children in the event of the death of an officer in the line of duty, pay differential between the three ranks compared with other Grosse Pointe departments and the city's move to disallow a yearly \$1,000 cost of living allowance to the officers.

City Manager Thomas Kressbach said he didn't want to discuss in detail the various items that are currently on the table, but did say there were about 12 issues in contention between the supervisor's union and the city.

"The two sides have come reasonably close together," he said. "but there has been no complete agreement. The supervisor's group has filed for arbitration under Act 312."

One of the points in contention, Drammond said, is the union's demand that the contract under negotiation be for one year, rather than the three year contract the union has had in recent years.

"Why should it take six or seven months to negotiate a contract?" Drummond said. "I feel the city's strategy is to let the arbitrator make a decision every three years. The city offers what it wants, then the arbitrator tells them what the city must give. The city manager can't

"The agreement must be fair and equitable from the standpoint of the employee and the citizens and taxpayers," Kressbach said. "It is not uncommon for a contract to go beyond expiration. One to two years is not ancommon to reach a settlement. It is unfortunate that it must take that long. The actual negotiation process doesn't take that long, but when mediation and arbitration enter the process, there is a great deal of time

Kressbach said the city likes to have longer contracts so it can plan expenses.

"It is easier to plan when you know what your expenditures are going to be," he said. "The council can set its tax rate much easier once it knows what its budget is.

Dave Teolis, president of the Public Safety Officers Association, said he didn't want to comment on specific points of contenton, because his union has two more meetings with the city.

"Our last contract took a year and a half." Teolis said "It shouldn't take that long.

Teolis said if the city moves a little bit, the two sides "should be in the ballpark."

Kressbach said he hopes the city and the unions will reach agreement at the table rather than to have to go to arbitration. noting that is the best place to get a settlement





Park explores Caretti's proposal for public safety auxiliary

An auxiliary public safety unit is being considered in Grosse Pointe Park, Public Safety Director Richard Caretti said some Park citizens came to him with the proposal and he has been studying it for about a year.

"When public spirited individuals want to come forth to help, it's up to us to take advantage of their good will," he said.

Caretti offered a detailed proposal to the Park council at the Dec. 8 meeting which outlined the duties, training, uniforms and equipment, personnel, costs, advantages and disadvantages of an auxiliary unit.

gencies such as bad weather and downed power lines and assist in special situations, such as Devil's Night patrols, mass arrests and parades. They are paid \$50 every four months, so they'll be covered under the city's workmen's compensation insurance. They wear uniforms that carry an arm patch clearly stating their auxiliary status.

Farms Police Chief Robert Ferber said there are 25 officers in the Farms Emergency Support Unit. They are not armed. He said that they are additional eyes and ears, they use their own vehicles to patrol streets on Devil's Night, and they help with crowd control, parades and downed wires.

Ferber said he would be bardpressed to operate his department without the Emergency Support Unit. In addition, he said, some of the officers take advanced courses in weaponry,

public events, help during emer- CPR, self-defense and advanced first aid. "They are not meant to replace a police officer," Ferber said, "just to assist."

Ferber noted that last Halloween weekend, 43 men donated 258 hours over the three-day weekend. "They convert their time and energy into making the city a better place to live, he said. "I can't live without them. They are a tremendous asset."

The Shores does not have a police auxiliary, but uses eight men who work as fire auxiliary personnel.

Several years ago the City Public Safety Department tried to organize an auxiliary, but due to the limited size of the community there were not enough persons interested to form one.

Caretti proposed on-site training for auxiliary volunteers by the Park's existing personnel. He suggested monthly training meetings to maintain interest and increase knowledge and

He said the volunteers should wear police uniforms, because the general public will not defer to civilians unless their authority is clear - but he said the auxiliaries should have special shoulder patches and/or hatbands and name tags that clearly identify them as auxiliary officers.

Caretti did not recommend arming volunteers, although some communities do so. Armed auxiliairies must undergo additional training and psychological evaluations, he said, and they increase the civil liability of the department and the city.

He added that the unit should not exceed 12 members. The volunteers should be capable of the physical labor associated with fire service, be of good moral character, and live or work in Grosse Pointe Park; they should be unpaid, but equipment and uniforms should be provided by the department.

The advantages, according to Caretti, are the availability of additional manpower during emergencies, augmentation for the single patrol unit, reduction of the need for public safety offi-

cers to perform time-consuming work at the station, allowing officers to return to service more quickly at fire scenes, provision of additional "eyes and ears" for crime and fire prevention, and provision of additional trained manpower for special events such as Devil's Night, Halloween, Thanksgiving and Fourth of July parades.

The disadvantages, he said, are expenses — "Basic costs are \$1,300 to \$2,300 per member, depending on whether the volunteers are armed."

City liability would increase. "We've locking now for some legal input concerning the liability. I suspect it's not overpowering," he said, "because other communities do it."

Another disadvantage, according to Caretti, would come if personnel were improperly selected. "The wrong type of personnel can hinder the public safety operation, rather than enhance it."

If the proposal is approved by the council, Caretti said, "We will strive to put the best trained qualified candidates on the street that we can come up with. They will be fully trained and qualified to do the job they're expected to do.

"If the council approves this, I'm looking forward to seeing what response we get from citi

Jurist hears no final rites at Free Press

ow that Administrative Law Judge Morton Needelman has found no evidence of a death rattle at the Detroit Free Press, there is a strong possibility that the joint operating agreement sought by the two daily newspapers in Detroit may not be approved after all.

We never have liked the the JOA proposal, but we do think it would be preferable to a one-newspaper city. The real question all along has been whether there is evidence to back the two newspapers' contention that Detroit cannot support two metropolitan dailies except under the limited competitive conditions permitted by a joint operating agreement. The judge strongly disagreed with that claim.

The Detroit Free Press management threatened during the hearings on the JOA that if it did not win approval of the proposal it would close down or sell the paper. The top Knight-Ridder group executive, Alvah H. Chapman Jr., reiterated last week he still would recommend that action to his board if the JOA petition is rejected.

The recommendation by the administra-

tive law judge against granting the petition for the JOA leaves it up to Attorney General Edwin Meese III to make the final decision as to whether the two newspapers should be permitted to merge their business, advertising and circulation operations and to publish joint editions on Saturdays and Sundays.

Meese has given no indication of what he might do, but the Detroit petition for a JOA is the first to draw opposition from both the anti-trust division and the administrative law judges who hear evidence in such cases. However, Meese has a free hand and is not bound either by precedent or by the administrative law judge's recommendation.

So where does that leave the reading and advertising public in Michigan?

Many options are still open, if the attorney general rules against the JOA. The Free Press could still continue operating from its current strong competitive position. Or it could slash its staff and seek to

make a profit, which it contends it now is unable to do. Or it could close down the paper. Or it could sell the paper if a buyer could be found.

On the other hand, if Meese approves the JOA, the papers would publish separate editions on Mondays through Fridays and put out joint editions on Saturdays and Sundays. More important, the business, advertising and circulation functions of the two papers would be merged with only the news and editorial departments being retained as separate components.

In fact, the judge said a JOA would enable both papers to "settle back into the quiet life without any competition whatsoever." In their applications for a JOA, the newspapers made it clear they hoped to raise both their advertising and circulation prices in the event the agreement is approved and thus achieve what the judge called "handsome profits."

In his finding, Judge Needelman said the papers now charge "the lowest circulation and advertising prices in the nation" among metropolitan dailies, but claimed the owners did so in their efforts to achieve the "costly goals of dominance and future profits (or a JOA)." He said this "does not not constitute, however, proof that the losses are irreversible."

If a JOA is denied, however, the public and the employees of the two papers will lose unless both papers continue to compete at their present price and operational levels. But in view of what the Free Press and Knight-Ridder managements have said, that appears to be unlikely. What appears to be more likely are higher advertising and circulation prices, whether a JOA or a single newspaper continues in

There has been an increasing concentration of ownership of daily papers in the United States in recent years, and the two chains, Gannett and Knight-Ridder, that own the Detroit papers are the two largest in the nation. The approval of a JOA would further limit competition in Detroit which currently is the only city in Michigan with daily newspaper competition.

For the public, the best thing that could happen, in the event Meese denies the bid for a JOA, would be for both chains to rethink their ambitions in Detroit and try to prove that Judge Needelman was right in saying that the future of the two Detroit newspapers should be decided by the market place, not by the federal government.

A strange welcome to '88

Ramilies living on Provencal Road between Lakeshore and Kercheval in the Farms were given an unusual welcome to 1988 when a jack-hammer began pounding away on their street shortly after 6 a.m. Jan. 1.

Some residents no doubt thought it was just the throbbing in their heads after a festive New Year's Eve. But in reality the noise was caused by the Farms Water Department seeking to find and repair a break in the water main serving the street.

The Water Department had been notified of the problem by a Farms police officer shortly after 4 a.m. By the time the department had notified the gas and electric utilities and started its repairs, it was about 6 a.m. Fortunately, the crew quickly

located the break and had completed its repairs by about 9 a.m. Within another hour, the surface of the street had been restored to normal.

We report this incident to remind ourselves and all Pointe residents how dependent we are on our public services and how much we owe to the public employees who keep them functioning, even when the rest of us are celebrating or recovering from holidays.

Some residents of the street involved never even knew there had been any trouble or that the water service to the entire street had been turned off for several hours. They didn't know because they slept through all the commotion after celebrating New Year's Eve.

Mixed outlook for 1988

It's now time to forget the euphoria caused by the victories of three Michigan university teams in post-season football games and look at some of the harsh economic and political problems ahead.

One of them is the fact that a year-end Census Bureau report showed that Michigan, even though it remained the eighth largest state in the Union, still shows a population loss from 1980 to 1987.

Well, why should that be a problem? Won't a smaller population actually reduce overcrowding, governmental costs and perhaps even taxes?

It's a problem, for one thing, because Michigan is likely to lose both federal aid and federal representation if the population decline continues through the 1990 federal census.

Much of the state's loss in population can be attributed to the continuing decline in the number of people living in Detroit and some of its suburbs, such as the Grosse Pointes. Federal aid is no big deal in the Pointes and other suburbs that are doing well, but it is important in Detroit if that city is to maintain its services even at current levels.

Furthermore, if Michigan loses one or two congressmen because the population decline continues until the 1990 census, the state also will lose some of its political clout in Washington, regardless of which party is in power. Eighteen representatives can speak with a louder voice than 16 or

The new census report indicated that the South and the West continued to grow the fastest of the regions in the nation, with Florida supplanting Pennsylvania as the fourth most populous state. That means that any losses in Washington representation by Michigan and such midwest states as Iowa, Nebraska and North Dakota will result in gains for southern and western states in their congressional representation and in their power in Washington.

The loss of population also will be felt by businessmen who will have to seek more out-of-state markets if they are to keep pro-

duction even at current levels. It also could affect the quality of the state's work force if the brain drain resumes.

Yet Michigan still does have much to offer, as is made clear in the new report putting the state into the finals of the process of selecting a site for the government's proposed new superconducting supercollider. A Michigan site in nearby Stockbridge was announced as one of the eight apparent finalists in what has been called the atomsmasher sweepstakes.

Current reports are that the \$4.4 billion, 53-mile-round underground particle accelerator will be the largest scientific facility in the world and provide 4,000 construction jobs, 2,500 permanent jobs, a \$275 million annual budget and tens of millions in new tax revenues.

Located between two distinguished research universities, the University of Michigan and Michigan State, the Stockbridge site also has other excellent assets. But with seven other competitors, Michigan will need a united political and economic effort during the protracted battle among the political, research and other interests involved, if it is to persuade the sponsors to put the facility in this state. Too often in somewhat similar competitive situations in the past, Michigan's teamwork has broken down.

Another economic factor that may redound to Michigan's benefit is the newly signed free-trade agreement between the United States and Canada. The treaty, if approved by Congress and the Canadian Parliament, would make it easier to Canadians and American to do business in each other's markets by reducing and even phasing out current tariffs and duties over a period of time.

Yet as others have advised, the state must continue with its current campaign to improve its economic and educational climate in order to attract more businesses and jobs to Michigan. In the long run, success in that endeavor will bring many dividends, even if the state fails to attract the superconducting supercollider scientific facility.



It's against the law

Property owners piling snow high along roadways and shoulders or pushing it to the opposite side of the street can cause hazardous conditions for motorists, and the Michigan Department of Transportation warns that it's also against the law.

State law (PA 82 of 1978) prohibits businesses and citizens from dumping snow on roadways and shoulders or piling it so high at driveway enfrances that if obstructs the vision of motorists.

The department recommends residents keep the shoulder in front of their driveways clear and also clear snow for a short

Large businesses should make special arrangements ahead of time to remove snow from their driveway entrances and drive ways. In some cases it may be necessary to truck snow away from parking facilities.

Violators leave themselves open to fines and lawsuits for public liability and property damage. For a charge to be filed, a police officer must witness the violation or a citizen must file a complaint.

All property owners and per sons hired to remove snow are responsible for maintaining safe

City focuses on infrastructure

By Margle Reins Smith Staff Writer

Grosse Pointe City Manager Thomas Kressbach said 1987 was a busy year, with no major disappointments.

"Lake levels started out at an all-time high, but ended at a reduced level. This was helpful for sewers and basement foundations — a surprise for boaters, perhaps - but helpful to the rest

The largest project undertaken by the city in 1987, he said, was the installation of a new variable speed storm pump at Neff pumping station. Including the building enlargement, the cost was \$375,000.

"This is the city's first new pump in 58 years. It is a firstline operating sequence pump that now provides standby pumping capacity for the first time in the station's history."

During the year, Grosse Pointe also completed a city-wide infrastructure study at a cost of \$15,000 and authorized sanitary sewer repairs estimated at \$125,000. Workers placed a liner in a 60-year-old storm sewer on Lakeland at a cost of \$99,165, including engineering and inspection work on adjacent sanitary sewers.

"The sewer work is not glamorous, but it's necessary," said Kressbach. "The city is getting older and the infrastructure requires more attention."

He noted that the city completed installation of new electrical wiring and outlets at the marina. The cost was \$9,500.

"We installed a valve-controlled storm water/catch basin ing projects progressed at a rapid line at the foot of Lakeland and clip. It was a good year for us.

completed seawall landscaping, at a cost of \$7,000." Kressbach added that six homeowners replaced their seawalls, seven residents completed similar seawall work in 1986, and two are planning work for 1988.

"We resurfaced various streets at a cost of \$118,600," he said.

New businesses and major renovations included Walton Pierce, The Gap, Damman's, Arbor Drug and M.J. Carroll. Benches and litter receptacles were installed at Village Plaza, and some miscellaneous brick work and planters were added in the Village shopping area. Several Village merchants placed flower planters in front of their stores. Caffe Trevi Ice Cream Parlor and Cafe Le Chat placed tables outdoors during the summer.

And private development is continuing, according to Kressbach, with 11 houses under construction at the Dodge Place development.

The city replaced a public works loader, patrol cars and other equipment at a cost of \$82,500, he said.

"And we again received a Tree City USA award. The Dutch elm disease prevention program continued and 75 replacement trees

were planted in the fall." Kressbach said plans for 1988 include about \$100,000 for street resurfacing and sewer repairs, a fund-raising campaign for the City of Grosse Pointe Foundation and a variety of park renova-







Neighbors' complaints about a Farms backyard wooden skateboard ramp went to trial and ended in a hung jury. But the owner said her kids and their friends have lost interest in the ramp they built themselves.

Nine-year-old Rocky Bryant became one of the youngest people even to visit the North Pole, where he flew with his father on a series of small planes crammed with food, fuel and arctic clothing.

May

School board members decided not to break ranks with the High School Athletic Association by requiring a 2.0 grade point average for sports participation. The decision was made over repeated objections by then-Secretary Carl Anderson, who favored the stiffer requirement.

Edsel Ford auctioned off pieces of his Lakeshore house, including bricks, gates, plumbing and roof tiles, prompting howls of outrage from the Grosse Pointe Historical Society. Members wrote several letters begging Ford to save the architecturally significant old Kanzler house and vowed to push harder for a historic preservation ordinance.

School officials threatened to terminate the parking agreement at the Richard lot if the Farms council wouldn't take another look at solving the parking shortage on the Hill. And high school teachers said they were fed up with students heading out on spring vacation several days early.

Arbor Drug moved into the Village shopping area, while Damman Hardware moved across the street.

June

Parcells Middle School was named an Exemplary School by the U.S. Department of Education, winning the honor for high academic scores, participation in the state Sesquicentennial celebration and community involvement in school activities. Meanwhile, teachers at North were angry because attempts to fix the school's persistent ventilation problems led to a stifling years. Richard and Sheila day without the air conditioning.

Pointe officials said they hadn't made any commitment to recycling because residents aren't interested. The Farms beautification commission got started with plans for the Hill and the Mack-Moross intersection. And Hill business people were upset with proposals to control traffic by making the Hill alleys one-way.

July

Residents on Charlevoix and Vernor were treated to the sound of a roaring bus, the flashing blue lights of 20 police cars and a few sirens when three juveniles stole a parochial school bus and went joyriding.

The Farms and the schools got together on a parking plan for the library expansion. A Park woman became the first female member of a Lion's Club.

The Park city attorney found that City Manager John Crawford hadn't circumvented the

city charter in letting council chambers redecorating contracts. Several officials were less than happy with the legal report.

A pilot day care program at the schools was approved by the board. An electrical storm caused a transformer at the yacht club to overheat and black the club out. ULS student and athlete Ti Juan Kidd was shot and killed on a sidewalk outside a Detroit party.

Six people filed for the Park judge's seat vacated in March in a pay dispute. Grosse Pointe Memorial Church took a direct hit from the same lightning storm and it knocked out the Dial-A-Prayer.

The Woods ordered Sheila Temkow to close her home day care operation, which the city said was in conflict with the ordinance on home businesses. Farms resident Pam Allor was lost in Lake Erie when her twinengine Cessna crashed. The Farms received a proposal to subdivide the Higbie estate, causing alarm bells at the historical society.

August

Teacher contract talks resumed after a July hiatus. The Woods began a series of public hearings on home day care. Longtime school board trustee Joan Hanpeter resigned when her family moved out of the dis-

The Farms council approved a zoning ordinance that mandated larger lots in the area along Lakeshore. Cottage Hospital began a program to remove asbestos in a wing destined for remodeling as a rehabilitation unit.

Four Grosse Pointers were among the victims of the crash of Northwest Airlines Flight 255.

September

Dorothy Kennel, who had retired only the year before, was reappointed to the school board to fill the vacancy left by Joan Hanpeter. North Principal John Kastran's car windshield was shattered by a brick thrown from a freeway overpass.

Teachers and school administration reached agreement on a contract that offered teachers a 19 percent increase over three Temkow went to court and got an injunction stopping the Woods from enforcing its ordinance against them. The court allowed the Temkows to continue operating their day care home for 90 days.

A group of Grosse Pointe lawyers went to China for a conference on the legal system. Most of them said they hoped to increase the amount of business they did there. "I traded a lot of business cards," one said.

The school administration was taken over by a horde of hopping fleas. Grosse Pointers were deep in preparations for the visit by the pope. And the Woods ended its 90-day experiment with oneway traffic on Bournemouth -

many of the residents who had asked for it.

The Woods sent out notices to all home day care operators, ordering them to stop caring for children at home immediately. Committees were working feverishly to get the library expansion bond passed.

The school board considered closing the high school campuses, to the dismay of some students. The Pointes were experiencing a drop in serious crimes, according to a newly released report.

A proposal for an office complex in the Park was defeated. prompting Mayor Palmer Heenan to say that the momentum for development in the city was lost. The Woods took up the cudgels on behalf of residents annoyed by helicopter landings at St. John Hospital.

A senior citizen apartment project in the Park fell through for lack of funding. And school officials pondered the meaning of low science test scores in Grosse Pointe and statewide.

Henry Ford II died after three weeks in the hospital with pneumonia. He was 70.

October

The Farms issued two more violations to adults who allowed children to have parties and serve alcohol in their absence. Farms Municipal Judge Peter O'Rourke said the local court was overworked and understaffed and didn't have enough space. He requested more money to operate the department.

The Park and its public safety department achieved a contract after a year of negotiations. The Woods went to court to ask that the helicopter flights into St. John Hospital's parking lot be temporarily stopped. ULS opened a newspaper recycling center.

Efforts continued to promote expansion at the three libraries. The Park council considered inspecting rental property every two years to encourage better upkeep.

The Woods contracted with an urban planner to study Mack

which really hadn't satisfied Avenue again. Farms residents from the 6th precinct complained that the council and administration are not responsive to their problems. And the Farms floated bonds to upgrade the city hall and the park.

November

The Woods held another public hearing on home day care. Let ters to the editor poured in supporting the high school music program - even though the marching band was cancelled and on both sides of the home day care issue.

Grosse Pointers went to the polls, re-elected most incumbents and defeated the library expansion. Park councilman John Prost was unseated in a surprise.

Ventilation problems at North were on their way to being solved, even as the teachers' union drew attention to asbestos problems at the school. Library supporters pondered their next move in the wake of the bond

The Pointes pension funds lost money in the October stock market crash, but didn't lose their shirts, according to fund managers. They were vested more in bonds than stocks.

The Shores bought a new \$100,000 pumper truck for its public safety department. The schools kept ahead of a head louse infestation. And a statue stolen from the Henry Ford estate turned up at a U of D fraternity — no explanation.

Farms residents urged the city to adopt a blight ordinance. The Farms Foundation promised to raise funds for a \$75,000 facelift for the Pier Park entrance.

The Woods planning commission bit the bullet and refused to change the ordinance to permit home day care. The Bronze Door changed hands and two new Hill developments were almost booked full. Brooks Brothers relocated to the Farms.

December

The Farms council gave Judge O'Rourke almost everything he asked for: more space, more money, more staff. The council also passed a resolution to consolidate police and fire into one public safety department.

The Park council continued to argue about the redecorating of the council chambers. It also rezoned a parcel on Jefferson to a commercial classification, more restrictive than originally requested by a previous potential developer.

Grosse Pointer Alfred Glancy told the newspaper that racism is a problem Grosse Pointe needs to be concerned about. Mack Avenue business people applauded the possibility of a new community-owned development on Mack at the Park border.

A smoke alarm saved a family from injury when a fire caused \$200,000 of damage to their Park home. Farms police announced a crackdown on drunk drivers. Woods police announced they wouldn't penalize slow shoppers with parking tickets during the holidays.

The school board considered adding a library annex onto Richard School, then decided a cooling-off period of a year or two would be better. The schools were seeing an influx of students from private schools,

Grosse Pointe's incinerator passed the ash test, with the residue showing no traces of several toxic substances. A small amount of cadmium was considered of no consequence.

The school board looked at ways to cut \$500,000 out of the budget.





Prepaid funerals: An option offered by local funeral directors

Prepaid funerals are not a new concept. According to three Grosse Pointe funeral directors, there has been a slight trend toward pre-funding during the last few years. Depending on financial and family circumstances, the arrangement may be advantageous for the family, as well as the funeral director.

David Peters, of A.H. Peters Funeral Home in Grosse Pointe Woods, said, "Probably 10 percent of our funerals are prefunded. Another 10 percent are pre-arranged, but not pre-funded. Two types of people find this advantageous: those who have to '50s, when funeral directors offers.'

"Today, it makes good sense own mortality in terms of a funeral, estate planning and a will. I'm a firm believer in getting one's house in order," Wilhelm said. "If you don't want to pre-pay, you might want, at least, to pre-plan.

Wilhelm said he does a lot of public education concerning funeral planning. "Death and funeral services are still very mysterious entities for people. I try to be more open, to play the role of educator. Death is a natural process and it can be less of a burden if the funeral is preplanned.'

On July 1, 1987, a state law concerning funeral pre-funding went into effect, providing important consumer protection for those who purchase funeral goods or services prior to death. According to the Michigan Funeral Directors Association, the law requires all money given to a seller of funeral goods to be placed in escrow. Consumers

ent types of contracts are available. The guaranteed price contract allows the buyer to purchase, at today's prices, specific merchandise and services. The funeral director takes the risk that the escrow fund will increase sufficiently to cover costs at the time of the buyer's death.

The non-guaranteed price contract is one in which the director assumes no risk. The money is deposited and earns interest, and if the fund has grown sufficiently to cover the buyer's plans at the time of his death, the excess is returned to his family. If the fund is insufficient, the family is responsible for the difference.

Funeral directors generally write guaranteed contracts for the merchandise and service for which they set prices. Non-guaranteed contracts are written for the items provided by others cemeteries, newspaper death notices, death certificates, flowers, clergy honoraria, etc.

Wilhelm said he has written pre-needs for all kinds of people; for expensive and not-so-expensive funeral merchandise. "Most are in their 50s or older and quite a few contracts were written through the Department of Social Services. "A guaranteed contract freezes costs, so the family won't have a lot of out-ofpocket expenses.'

Wilhelm said he doesn't hardsell the concept. "Education about the option is one thing. Selling it is another. I offer a full range of services and I've never turned a family down because of lack of funding. We work out some arrangements."

Because of the new law, Peters said, some funeral directors will aggressively market prepaid funerals. He said consumers should consider this option carefully and should ask several questions before buying:

- Will 100 percent of the money be placed in escrow with an escrow agent?
- Is the funeral home registered?
- Is the seller of the prepaid arrangements also the provider?

• What happens if you cancel? Peters also noted, "Laws have iust allowed the pre-funding of funerals by insurance. In this case, no taxes are paid. The insurance may be paid by monthly installments.'





The hospital is known for its neo-natal unit, and large numbers of medically fragile children from the tri-county area are funneled through its doors. Most of the families in TLC are referred there after being treated in neonatal intensive care at St. John. Because Thayer's baby was born out of the state, she was not automatically a candidate for referral to the volunteer network program.

Premature babies have low birth weight, which can bring with it a variety of complications, especially respiratory problems. The hospital does the initial medical treatment, Home Health Care follows up with treatment after the child goes home and TLC provides a network for parents to lean on.

Forty-three parents are currently trained as TLC volunteers to help the parents with insights, advice and sometimes, just a shoulder to cry on. "TLC tries to find a mother who is compatible with your area and age range," said Thayer, whose husband Frederick is a local mechanic. "So they connected me with Linda Bartol, a mother of two also, who has already gone through many of the questions and experiences that I am now facing."

Thayer said she can understand why the TLC program is successful, because sometimes even family and friends don't know what a person is going through. Because of the sensitive nature of her baby's condition, Thayer said she has only spoken on the phone with Bartol, but she looks forward to the day when they can finally meet face to face.







Library defeat, staff development highlight school year

It was a year that got mixed reviews from school officials.

Superintendent John Whritner said officials were bitterly disappointed at the defeat of the library expansion bond issue and millage increase requests, but pointed to a number of accomplishments of which the district could be proud.

The request for an \$8.65 million expansion and renovation of its three public libraries was turned down in November along with a request for one additional mill for the library.

The board has decided to put the issue on hold, at least until 1989 or 1990, but has agreed to ask voters to raise the library millage rate by four-tenths of a mill later this year. Whritner said the millage increase is absolutely necessary to maintain current library operations

"The four-tenths millage increase coming up in June is crucial," Whritner said. "We need that just to maintain current operations. We have a major computer project under way, which is dependent on that millage. We need the millage to continue with staffing levels as they are."

Teachers in the school system were awarded a three-year contract in 1987. They will receive a 19.2 percent salary increase, with 6.2 percent increase both this school year and next, and a 6.7 percent increase in the 1989-90 school year.

The district also developed a new evaluation model for administrator salaries. The pay-forperformance model means each administrator has been given a set of criteria upon which his or her increase is based.

Whritner was pleased with the school system's curriculum development over the past year.

Teachers are now more involved in curriculum development," he said. "The program is working beautifully and we are on the way to a bottom-up approach to making curriculum decisions.'

During the 1986-87 school year, 27 proposals were submitted to the Curriculum Coordinating Council for study. Some 19 committees are or have been active and 184 individuals have served on committees.

Whritner said that the staff development committee first formed in 1985 continued to explore and develop a comprehensive Staff Development Program for all employees during 1987. Two surveys were conducted to identify the needs and priorities for future implementation.

Rosalie Bryk was hired this past year as teacher-on-specialassignment to coordinate staff development district-wide. Several staff development proposals were given to Whritner by the Staff Development Committee. Action is expected to be taken

later this year.

The district took a long look at staff recruiting in the coming years. Projections are that while more than 100 Grosse Pointe teachers will be eligible to retire in the next three years, actual retirements will range from 17 to 30 per year.

"We have hired 35 new staff members each of the last two years," Whritner said. "More and more staff are reaching retirement age.'

In response the district has developed a recruiting brochure which is currently in the printing stage. The assistance of Dorothy Combs, former school public relations specialist, was invaluable on this project, Whritner said. Officials visited a number of universities in Michigan and Wisconsin to interview future graduates. Whritner noted that at several universities, the number of students requesting interviews far exceeded the number with whom officials could meet.

·The Early Childhood Committee, which met throughout 1987, reviewed a 1983-84 early childhood study. The committee has recommended that the school board maintain its commitment to all existing early childhood and child care programs offered in the school system.

A pre-school program is ready to start this month at Barnes School. The board intends to initiate a full-day child care program this year, with 40 percent of the spaces reserved for children of employees.

This year the board will consider offering a part-time child care program only after successful implementation and expansion of a full-day program and only after reassessment of community need.

The district will be looking at its facilities during 1988. Enrollment projections were completed at the beginning of 1987, and actual fall figures were on target. There were slight increases in the number of students at the elementary and middle school levels and a slightly greaterthan-expected decline in high school enrollment.

Early in 1987 the board approved \$1.5 million in electrical, mechanical and architectural energy improvements districtwide. The board will likely expend an additional \$1 million in window projects at four elementary schools this year.

Other projects, accomplishments and developments listed by Whritner included:

- The retirement of Don Bassett as principal at Pierce and Chuck Hollosy as athletic director at South. Sue Klein replaced Bassett and Jo Lake replaced Hollosy.
- Last year the program for the severely multiply impaired was operated at Cottage Hospital, and the educational compo-







Detroit Auto Show preview will benefit special Northeast Guidance Center services

By Peggy O'Connor Andrzejczyk ver the 23 years and two weeks Pat Sims has been on staff at the Northeast Guidance Center, there's really only one thing which hasn't changed: the importance of addressing the needs of children.

Sims does that each day in her role as supervisor of Child and Adolescent Services at the Northeast Guidance Center. NEGC's Child and Adolescent Services are available, without referral, to children 18 and under who live in the NEGC intake area, bounded by Conner, Van Dyke and Eight Mile Road and including Detroit, Harper Woods and the five Grosse Pointes.

Last year, the Child and Adolescent Services received requests to assist some 600 children and adolescents. Those numbers are drastically higher than the ones which were the norm when Sims began her career at NEGC in 1964. The types of problems she's seeing these days are different, too.

"The biggest difference is in the older kids. These days, there is a consistent breakdown in the family unit. We're seeing a tremendous number of single parent families. It isn't that a single parent can't do the job, but that it's much more difficult when there's no one there to share the developmental tasks such as toiduties. And even in intact familet training.

lies, chances are that because of economic factors both parents must work," Sims explains.

"And kids are also being exposed to so much more these days. It's amazing what they hear, know about and have to deal with by the age of 10. The violence, the peer pressure. My personal feeling is that the emphasis on being part of the 'in' group puts a tremendous amount of pressure on kids today."

At one time, the family unit was able to offer more support, Sims says. That is no longer possible for many families, since most of their efforts are tied into the basic struggle to survive.

When a child or adolescent has a problem, NEGC offers individual and family therapy, as well as consultation on behalf of those clients with external systems such as schools, medical services and other agencies.

"With children, the kinds of problems they have are usually tied into their stage of development. Pre-school children, those 6 to around 11 or 12 and adolescents have whole different sets of problems," Sims says.

"Say a pre-schooler is referred to us with some management problems. He has a temper, doesn't obey or follow directions. Or he's not accomplishing basic

"One cause may be that the parent doesn't know what to expect from the child. If a child isn't talking, maybe its because he doesn't have to because everything is handed to him. Or, if a parent complains that a child can't play alone for three hours, they perhaps haven't realized that a child that age doesn't have the attention span to accomplish that."

NEGC does a careful assessment of the child and his family. 'We develop a history to be sure we're not missing some physiological or mental problems. We are fortunate in that these days, people are more sophisticated and doctors are able to better pick up indications of such problems," Sims explains.

NEGC also obtains a complete family history, including indications of substance abuse. From there, staff members are able to determine the problem and develop a treatment approach for the client and his family.

In general, the treatment program takes about six months. Many times clients reapply if the problem resurfaces. "There is often a high drop-out rate among adolescents, often because the problems have been ongoing. Also, total family involvement is necessary for the best chance of success. We try to get the family to work with us, even though things might get worse before

they get better.

"Many times that's because a child is reacting in fear to what we've opened up in attempting to help him. Substance abuse, perhaps. Or marital problems where the child is used by the parents to get back at one another. People get scared when therapy starts to open those things up," Sims says.

NEGC employs many support groups in helping clients, such as Parents Anonymous, Al-Anon, Alcoholics Anonymous, etc. "We're only here Monday through Friday for certain hours, so our clients need these outside resources they can call at any

NEGC fees are based on the ability to pay on a sliding scare. Most insurance carriers also have provisions for psychiatric care. No one is turned away beSims says.

NEGC public information liasion Donna Moshour notes that public funding and insurance coverage cannot possibly cover the extra services and programs NEGC offers for Child and Adolescent Services. "For example, we have a pilot program in the schools. a prevention project where the absenteeism problem is addressed. The focus is the K-Grade 3 group, where the seeds of chronic tardiness and absenteeism is identified, then trained volunteers go into the schools to tutor and serve as role models helping the kids to learn to like school and learning," Moshour

Family liasion specialists are also being trained to go into local homes and assist parents in becoming more effective in their parental roles and to help link

cause they cannot afford to pay, them with other community services they may need.

> It is an ambitious project which began in December in anticipation of future funding. Some of that funding, NEGC's Sims and Moshour hope, will come from proceeds of the Detroit Auto Show Benefit Preview, set for Friday, Jan. 15, from 7 to 9 p.m. at Cobo Hall.

Settle in for a winter of houseplants, seed catalogues

There is something very exciting about the prospect of a whole, new year ahead with all its questions still unasked and its answers unlearned. The holiday decorations suddenly look tawdry and cluttered. We put them away and our surroundings take on an oddly clean, austere look which is somehow

Suddenly the mail brings the first of the spring seed catalogues and we can turn from the snow sifting down outside to the prospect of fragrant flowers and super-special vegetables and verdant lawns yet to come.

Greenhouses and houseplants take on a new importance in mid-winter. In the 18th century, many large houses had orangeries, designed in a simple, classical style and located a short distance from the house. The idea was that a short walk to reach them would enhance the delight of the tropical atmosphere as one came in out of the cold.

But early in the 19th century the greenhouses and orangeries, now called conservatories, were attached to the house and became a feature from within. It was recommended that a vista

be created by attaching a conservatory to the drawing room and placing a large mirror at the end of the leafy bower to create a "flower tunnel.

A noted landscape designer in 1816 advocated a sort of lobby between the conservatory and the drawing room "to prevent the damp smell of earth." But the Victorians happily threw this advice to the winds and in many smaller houses the only

house-conservatory again and lavish hand. called it a "winter garden." Potted palms were the most popular plants found there. A fountain in the middle of the room added the musical tinkle of water and, if the winter garden was large enough, it was a popular place for entertaining, with the hostess serving afternoon tea to her friends amid the greenery while snowflakes whispered on the glass walls outside.

window in the drawing room opened directly into the subtropical atmosphere of the greenhouse, thereby ensuring a dark room in winter and an airless one in summer. But the greenhouse, or conservatory, was nevertheless a necessity.

Later in the century, the Edwardians changed the name of the erstwhile orangery-green-

In some parts of the world the holidays are not yet over. The Russian Christmas is celebrated in January and New Year's Day is a special holiday for children with troika rides in the countryside, trips to the circus, the ballet or the puppet theater and a visit from Ded Moroz, or Grandfather Frost, who distributes pre-

In Scandinavia, the Christmas season lasts until Jan. 13, St. Canute's Day, which is marked by continuous partying. This is to maintain the oft-repeated saying that the Christmas spirit must not be allowed to leave the house and the only sure way to guarantee this is to offer every visitor, even the stranger who might come to the door, something good to eat. No one dares refuse. This would break the spell and the one who refuses would carry the Christmas spirit away with him.

The Chinese celebrate the new year according to the lunar year, which is based on the waxing and waning of the moon. Because the moon cycles take about 354 days rather than 365, the Chinese New Year's Day wanders around somewhat in the month of January or early February falling somewhere between Jan. 20 and Feb. 20, at the inception of the second new moon after Dec. 22, the winter solstice. But the new year is perhaps the most important of the many festivals which punctuate the Chinese calendar.

Before you discard your sents and spiced cakes with a Christmas tree you might snip

off all the needles into an ornamental container to keep beside the fireplace and for weeks to come you can scatter a handful of pine needles over your cheery fire to fill the house with the lovely scent of pine. Another idea for recycling pine needles is to stuff a small pillow with them. There is an old belief that a pine pillow is a sure cure for insomnia, but in any case, it is a delightfully fragrant touch in any room.

It is not too early to plan what you will buy for your garden since this is when most nurseries offer the greatest variety of deci-

duous trees and shrubs, bare-root trees, vines and herbaceous perennials. But if you are planning on buying fruit trees for spring planting, be sure to check carefully to ensure that the peach tree will really bear peaches and the crabapple is not just the flowering kind that will not produce crabapples for you to make into jelly.

Is it only our imagination, or are the days really beginning to be a little longer and is there beginning to be that quality in the light that promises spring will be a reality after all?



The Pastor's Corner

From feasts to action

By The Rev. John Lambert, O.S.A. Pastor, St. Clare of Montefalco Church

Christmas and the Feasts of the Holy Family and Epiphany have come and gone and what Christian among us has not been moved by this yearly celebration of God's presence in our midst?

The parties are over, the cookies eaten, the gifts unwrapped, the wrong size sweaters returned to the stores from whence they came. An end to our excitement for another year as Christians?

We at St. Clare of Montefalco parish have embarked on an adventure that should keep us on a high the year long. After a long period of parish renewal, we have become involved in two important movements that have been encouraged by our church: Evangelization and the RCIA.

Although the Catholic church has an ancient tradition of missionary activity, Evangelization on the home front is a relatively new emphasis. It simply means that we are becoming more and more aware of our baptismal calling to carry on the mission of the Lord. Jesus was and is the bearer of the good news that God loves us. When Jesus preached, taught, healed, He proclaimed that God is indeed searching us out that we may be saved from sin and death. To evangelize is nothing more than to share the good news with others in our parishes, neighborhoods, work places and schools.

We have established an Evangelization Commission in our parish council structure. Several members of the new commission have received training and the leadership of the parish will soon be making a weekend retreat centered on the call to evangelization. Our "Welcome Home for Christmas" campaign was one of the first efforts. Special Christmas invitations were distributed and brochures on parish life were made available. Soon we will actively begin to seek out the unchurched and the inactive Catholic. We are returning as a parish to our missionary roots.

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) is modeled on the way the early church received new members. It involves an RCIA team of organizers and catechists, parish sponsors, weekly meetings, a journey together in faith. The focal point of RCIA is the Easter Vigil and the celebration of the sacraments of initiation: Baptism, Confirmation, Eucharist. The RCIA is a process that also has great potential for parish renewal.

We at St. Clare of Montefalco are excited by this renewed sense of mission in our parish. It's no longer "Ho, hum. Things as usual!" We are still a church of apostles, prophets, missionaries, disciples. We are an imperfect church made up of imperfect people, sinners all, but we are a church seeking the God who is seek-

Simple, tasty dishes make a satisfying winter supper

Here are some quick, healthy dishes to warm up empty stomachs on cold, winter days.

The following recipes come from the low-calorie, low-cholesterol, budgetwise kitchens of Thyra Grey Howard and Helena DeWitt Roth.

CURRIED CELERY SOUP

- 1-1/2 cups thinly sliced celery with leaves
- 1/2 cup onion, chopped
- 1/2 cup sliced carrots
- 1 cup diced potato
- 1/2 tsp. minced garlic
- 1 tsp. curry powder 2 cups chicken broth
- Salt and white pepper to taste 1/2 cup evaporated skimmed milk

1/2 cup skim milk

Watercress sprigs for garnish In medium saucepan place cel-

ery and leaves, onion, carrot, potato, garlic, curry powder, salt, pepper and 1 cup of the chicken broth. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer, covered, until vegetables are tender, about 15 minutes. Pour half the vegetable mixture into blender container. Blend at high speed until smooth. Remove. Repeat with remaining vegetable mixture. Return all of the pureed mixture to the soup kettle. Slowly stir in the milks and remaining chicken broth. Heat only until hot, (Do not let boil). Makes 4 cups.

SUPER TERIYAKI FLANK STEAK

- 2 Tblsp. soy sauce 2 Tblsp. honey
- 2 Tblsp. dry sherry

- Dash of garlic powder 1 flank steak (about 2 lbs.)
- 16 thin slices

- 1 cup vellow squash, thinly sliced diagonally

Chopped parsley for garnish Simmer water, lemon and sugar in large saucepan until reduced by half. Add cinnamon. steam carrots and squash about 4 minutes or until fork tender.

- 2 egg whites, stiffly beaten

Preheat oven to 375°. Have all ingredients at room temperature. Sift carob flour, cake flour, baking soda, baking powder and salt together.

Cream margarine until soft, then gradually add sugar, beating constantly until light. Beat in egg yolks and vanilla. Add the sifted flour mixture alternately with the yogurt. Stir the batter until smooth after each addition. Beat the egg whites until stiff but not dry. Gently fold them into the batter. Bake in two greased 8-inch layer pans for about 25 minutes or until cake tests done. When cool spread with filling and icing.

Reason for erratic temperatures unclear, say meteorologists

National Geographic News Service What's happened to winter? During the past dozen seasons, there has been an unprecedented spell of abnormal winters across the United States - either much colder or much warmer than usual.

"Such erratic extremes in such a short period are not expected to occur again for more than a thousand years if the climate patterns of the 20th century continue," said Thomas R. Karl, a research meteorologist at the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's National Climate Data Center in Asheville, N.C.

an analysis of the weather record since 1895 of winter temperatures in the contiguous 48 states, averaged by area. The abnormal swings, which began with the winter of 1975-76, followed a 20-year period of relatively stable seasonal temperatures, Karl said.

from 1975-76 to 1982-83, three in jet streams occur. Jet streams winters were much warmer than normal and three consecutive winters were unusually cold, he said. Since then, two winters have been slightly colder than normal and one has been slightly warmer. Last winter was the ninth warmest since

Meteorologists define winter in the northern hemisphere as the months of December, January and February. Astronomically, winter is the season between the winter solstice (Dec. 22 this year) and the vernal equinox (March 20, 1988).

This spell of abnormal winter Karl's assessment is based on temperatures has coincided nationally with a period of extremes in precipitation, Karl said. But "there is little direct correlation between the two." he pointed out. "a very cold winter is not always very dry."

Why these winters of extremes? Karl explained meteorologists do not yet have a complete During the eight-year period understanding of why anomalies

are strong, high-altitude winds that tend to steer weather patterns, such as winter storms and polar outbreaks of arctic air. across the northern hemisphere.

"Whether the recent variability is a moderately rare event in a reasonably stationary climate or represents a climate change, we don't know," he said. He is uncertain whether this erratic pattern has ended, is ending or will continue.

The winter of 1986-87, for example, was the mildest since 1895 in the five neighboring states of Minnesota, Montana, Wisconsin, North Dakota and South Dakota, noted Frank T. Quinlan, cheif of the Data Center's Climatological Analysis Division.

Across the border in Canada, he added, farmers in the southwestern prairies complained that last winter's warmth, combined with little snow cover, exposed the soil to wind-driven erosion.

thrive on cold - or at least are snow been accompanied by pro- ral Resources. "It can be a foot used to it - the winter of 1986-87 was "both one of the warmest and dryest, and it followed a five-year period of extreme wetness," said Jim Zandlo, the state climatologist.

Normally, snow covers much of Minnesota continuously from late November or early December through March, Zandlo added. But last winter, large regions of the state didn't have any snow cover and few areas had more than a foot of snow. Temperatures averaged at least 10 degrees above normal.

Although the destructive and sometimes fatal effects of excessive cold and snow are devastating, an "open winter," too, can take its toll, Zandlo said. Without the snow blanket as insulation from cold, dry air, last winter's wheat and alfalfa crops were damaged. Without the snow shield, more wildlife than usual died.

It would have been worse, Zandlo said, had the absence of longed periods of 20-below-zero temperatures.

The winter warmth resulted in a premature start to the spring growing season, including early emergence of weeds and insect pests. The dryness touched off prairie-grass fires. The lack of snow meant virtually no spring melt and no replenishment of the water supply. Without weeklong stretches of subzero temperatures, the ice on many Minnesota lakes never froze to a safe thickness last winter, Zandlo said. Thin-ice accidents took the lives of 11 people, about double the number in normal winters. Most of those who died were in cars or on snowmobiles that plunged through the ice.

"Ice is tricky. Even in normal winters, it's difficult to know when ice is safe, because it seldom freezes at a uniform rate." Minnesota department of Natuthick in one spot, and just 10 feet away, only an inch thick."

Don't fret because of the cold

Winter conditions shouldn't impede your fitness

By Rob Fulton

When the snow flies and the cold winds blow, your exercise routine does not have to hiber-

nate or be blown away - it can increase or even begin. Cold temperatures seem to dis-

tract people from their daily exercise regimen, but according to Bill Boden, M.D., director of cardiac rehabilitation at Harper Hospital, the winter months do not have to hinder people from following through with exercise.

"Just because it is cold or snowing outside doesn't mean people should quit exercising," said Boden. "The key to exercising in the cold weather is to wear several layers of clothing and cover the extremities (feet, face, hands).

"If people do that they shouldn't have a problem. When it's real cold, they've got to dress appropriately and tailor exercise habits to the weather," added

Cold weather is less of a problem for the physically fit person, but for those out of shape, the possibility of heart problems can increase. According to Boden,

the concern when working out is tioned and who has had no regular aerobic exercise.

"The sensible recommendation for the unfit individual is to be careful," said Boden. When trying to prevent a possible heart attack in the poor weather any conditions, the person should look for some warning

"If a person feels any heart discomfort, pressure or a squeezing sensation in the chest area, they should stop exercising," said Boden. "If a person is not in shape, it could cause a cardiac

burns the throat, when breathing heavily in cold weather is not a problem for the heart, according to Boden.

"That 'cold' sensation is the person hyperventilating," said Boden. "To oxygenate your lungs, you breath faster. It hurts the throat and other areas, but it's not going to make the heart cold. However, it could trigger a problem in susceptible people."

"Breathing in cold weather causes the blood vessels to constrict," said Boden. "The arteries conditions, or for that matter, and heart are able to compensate for that, but the people should be aware that it could cause a problem. For people with heart conditions, it could provoke

"The individual who exposes The chill that cools, or even himself to heavy lifting and over-working to shovel the snow is now more susceptible to heart conditions," said Boden. "Even for those people who have never had a heart problem, lifting heavy snow can cause any number of problems. Lifting heavy objects, or even shoveling snow for a half hour is a load on the

For the most part, breathing sential in providing yourself ture and interferes with the with the right tools to exercise in the cold weather, but one other hazard to avoid is putting alcohol into the body while working, or exercising in cold

> "People shouldn't drink alcohol if they are going to be exposed to cold conditions," said Boden. "The alcohol in the body further lowers the body tempera-

body's shivering reflex. When the body shivers, it's an internal way to make sure the body is maintaining its body temperature. With alcohol in the body, it throws things out of sync.'

Weather can play havoc on your exercise program, but if you are physically fit and are willing to slip on a few extra layers, this winter you could be fit as a fiddle, and healthy as well.



'Broadcast News' is thought-provoking

The entertainment world ended 1987 with a bang with "Broadcast News," a film that has been called the best picture of the year by critics.

It has already been honored by the New York Film Critics Circle as Best Picture, Best Director, Best Screenplay and Best Actress for Holly Hunter. It will be a strong contender, if not the winner of honors in March, when the Academy Awards are handed out. If that happens, it will be writer James Brooks' second sweep of the awards. His first was "Terms of Endearment.'

"Broadcast News" gives a remarkable portrayal of the inside workings of a Washington news bureau to which Brooks has brought firsthand experience. He was a copy boy for CBS' New York news bureau in the '60s and was later involved in the "Mary Tyler Moore Show" and the "Lou Grant Show."

While it is fascinating to watch television news in the making, "Broadcast News" plays best as a romantic comedy.

Jane, (Holly Hunter) is a pintsized dynamo news producer. She is a workaholic who never gives up on a story. On a deadline, when told there isn't enough time to get it on the screen, she screams, "Do it!" and the troops scurry to carry out her command. Five minutes later when the deadline has been met, she is around hugging and congratulating everyone.

She is passionately dedicated to professional ethics, but is willing to compromise. When a returning soldier hurls epithets at the interviewer, she blots them out with a voice-over and a Norman Rockwell painting in the background.

In another scene, she sits in the news control room taking information from reporter Aaron Altman (Albert Brooks) while she feeds it into anchorman Tom Grunick (William Hurt). It is a four-star broadcast and also a faked one.

Brooks is Hunter's friend and co-worker. He is a top reporter, intelligent and well-informed, but a cynic who disguises his rage behind a surliness mixed with humor.

He calls Hurt a devil because he represents all that has diluted honest news with show biz. Yet in his heart, he yearns to sit in Hurt's place as an anchor. When he gets a chance, he makes a comic spectacle of himself.

palm of the hand into a circle about 1 1/2 inches thick. Cut a cross on the top to prevent cracking during baking. Bake at 425 degrees Fahrenheit for 25 minutes, then reduce heat

to 350 degrees and bake 15 minutes longer. Cool on a wire rack, then seal tightly in a plastic bag. To serve, slice about 1/4-inch thick (slices best 24 hours after baking). Yield: 1 Round Loaf (20 slices)

1 cup white flour 2 1/2 tsp. baking powder 1 tbsp. sugar 1/2 cup wheat germ, toasted with honey

1 1/4 cups skim milk 2 tbsp. oil 1/2 cup low-fat cottage


cheese

Sift together flour, baking powder and sugar. Add wheat germ. Combine the milk and oil and stir in the dry ingredients until just moistened. Stir in cottage cheese only until mixture is slightly lumpy (if smooth batter desired, whip the cottage cheese with liquid ingredients in blender). Drop batter by spoonfuls onto a greased pan. Cook until bubbles appear on upper surface, then turn and brown on the other side. Turn only once. Continue until all batter is used. Serve with maple syrup.


