The El Nino is large area of the southern Pacific Ocean which is usually warmer than the surrounding water. This warm water causes significant changes in air patterns. If the El Nino moves north or south, it

## Children's Home proposal down, but not out

After much discussion by the Woods Planning Commission, an amendment to the zoning ordinance that would have allowed Children's Home to operate an aftercare counseling program for chemically dependent children was defeated.

For nearly two hours, the commission heard from board members of the Children's Home, a representative of the school board, and residents and neighbors of the Children's Home before coming to the decision that the amendment was too broad and would change the complexion of all properties in the Woods zoned as Community Facility.

The home did, however, receive approval from the commission on the proposed on-site expansion, which includes a new building and an addition to the administration building.

The proposed amendment would have allowed as a permitted use an "out-patient chemical dependency assessment and aftercare treatment facility" in the community facilities district. The

amendment was specifically designed for the proposed program at the Children's Home, but after discussion, the commission realized that if it recommended approval to the council, then all properties zoned as such would be able to operate the same type

Ray Lynch, a commissioner, said that while he sees the need for the program, the amendment "is a general application that goes farther than any of us is prepared to go.'

Another commissioner, Peter Gilezan, also agreed the program is a good one, but that was not the issue.

"The real issue here is what do we want in this community," he said.

While Children's Home may have the proper facilities for such a program, while traffic problems and time constraints have been worked out and there was some neighborhood support, it would allow similar programs in other community facilities zones that might not have neigh-

"We never actively pursued the matter," she said. "I guess I should have worried more. We should be monitoring demolition permits - even though it's too late by then. We're going to get a list of potentially subdividable property and monitor this."

John Uznis, one of the partners of Uznis Development Co., which now owns the estate, said the property will be developed into eight lots. "There's been interest in the lots," he said, "and we have a deposit on the lake lot." Construction will begin this

Langdon Hubbard, Frank Hubbard's father, owned a successful lumber business in Huron City, near the tip of Michigan's Thumb. His wife, Amanda, died at the age of 26, and Langdon was forced to send his three young children, Annabel, Richard and Frank, back to Hartford, Conn. to be raised by his sisters.

After finishing school in the East, Frank returned to Huron City to help his father. Severe forest fires and heavy logging activities in the Thumb area in the 1870s ended the timber business, so Frank went into bank-






LaPratt said formal charges have not been determined on the trio, but that a number of burglaries in the area may be solved with this arrest.

Upon being served, they left the establishment, and detectives handled enforcement, Furtaw said.


"We figured that we would get a couple of violations," Furtaw said, "but we didn't anticipate the number we got.'

## Boater tells of problems at Neff marina

By Margie Reins Smith Staff Writer

City resident Brad Birch raised four issues concerning the Neff Park marina at the council's June 20 meeting. He offered proposals for solving difficulties concerning well assignments and

water depth. City Manager Thomas Kressbach, who is responsible for managing the 166-well marina, said the city is working on the prob-

"We're probably talking significant dollars here and we have to look at this carefully," Kressbach said.

Birch recommended that the city establish a plan to increase the depth of water in the harbor. He pointed out that some boat owners with deep draft boats were running aground because of the low water level in the marina. The plan should include areas to be dredged, timing and financial responsibility, he said.

"We need a plan. It would make sense to dredge one harbor and clean out the entrances to the wells," Birch said. "There's only a limited number of dredge operators and when the water is low, they're busy.'

Birch owns a 27-foot sailboat with a 5-foot draft. He said he was unable to get into his well and is using the well of another resident who has not yet launched his boat.

'I'll move when he puts his boat in the water," Birch said.

He said the only way he can get to his well when the wind is offshore is by extending the boom and asking people to move to one side of the boat.

"I'm trying to get prices from engineers for dredging," he said. "There are two or three boats with drafts a few inches less than the depth and probably a half-dozen more with drafts six inches less. Up until 60 days ago, only two boats had any diffi-

What the city does, he said, depends on need, cost and a financing plan.

Birch recommended that the city let people know about the the existence of a second waiting list - for people who already have wells, but want to move to a larger well. He said that currently, few boaters are aware of the second list and are placing their names at the bottom of the list of 350 residents who are waiting to get a well. He said he waited two years for his well.

Kressbach said there is only one waiting list. "We do have some well relocation requests, but a person can't get a bigger well just by requesting it. There's only one list. (The relocation requests) probably should be published."

Kressbach said currently 353 people are on the waiting list for a well, but he guessed that 50

well if it was offered.

"We probably could charge \$15 to be on the list," he said. "That might cull out those who aren't serious."

Birch proposed that officials specify the number of days allowed for removing a boat from the harbor after the owner moves out of the city.

Kressbach said, "The policy has been, if the boat owner is living in the city on May 1 and has a boat in his well, he's been allowed to remain there for the season. There are no plans to change this. There have been no serious difficulties yet."

Birch said that some people have been on the waiting list for a well for nine years. He suggested that 30 days is plenty of time to move a boat out, once a resident moves away from the

Birch asked that the city be allowed the "right of management" to reassign boat wells in extreme situations - when boaters are assigned to wells with insufficient depth while shallow draft boats of equal size occupy deep water wells they don't need. "It's an issue of common sense," he said.

Kressbach pointed out that sometimes boat wells can't be

Kressbach said the last dredg- percent of those wouldn't take a traded one-for-one because power boats with two engine can maneuver into some wells that sailboats or smaller power boats would have trouble negotiating.

Birch said the city should manage the harbor, and not depend on residents negotiating agreements to trade wells. "It would make sense to hire someone to manage this," he said.

Kressbach said that he and two assistants have managed the harbor and have exercised the right of management several times in special situations.

"There is a greater demand on our marina for larger boats and deeper water." said Kressbach. "In the past, when marina costs remained within reason, costs were shared by all residents. The question is, does the marina ben efit all citizens?"

Birch said he thought sailors would be willing to share an assessment so that an area of the harbor would be dredged for sailboats

Kressbach expressed doubt that a significant number of boaters would agree to such an assessment.

Councilman John Youngblood said, "Well costs are ridiculously low. We should raise the rates, build up a fund and dredge.

## Quality is key at South High

our years ago last fall, I entered Grosse Pointe South High School as a nervous, timid freshman. Four years later, this spring, I walked out of the same building and graduated as a more mature, more confident teenager.

Something happened to me (and I am sure my classmates) during those four years in that building. Something similar to what happens at other high schools, but something better.

I think the word quality best describes my experience at South. Grosse Pointe is fortunate to have a very strong school system. Most colleges and universities look favorably upon Grosse Pointe students, because they know the students most likely have a strong academic background.

It's little things like what these people do which make our school, and thus our students, stand out.

The counselors deserve a lot of credit, too. Counselors are often blamed when schedules aren't right, when recommendations don't get processed, or when other things go wrong. Without their help and support, however, many of the students would not be where they are today. After writing essays for each counselee in addition to keeping track of other students. Their support, although not always recognized, is definitely needed and is also another example of the quality at South.

The number and diversity of activities is yet another strength of South. South was ridiculed earlier in the year because we lacked a marching band. However, this is nothing to be ashamed of. There are so many students involved in other clubs and sports. School spirit is not a question at South - there is plenty of spirit to go around.

This spirit is evident in the quantity and quality of the clubs and sports at South. This past year, one of the Pointe Players' productions placed third in regional competition; South won its ninth consecutive All-EML (Eastern Michigan League) sports banner for earning the most points in the

EML; the Tower (newspaper) was placed in the Hall of Fame; the band and orchestra again did well in competition and concert. The list goes on.

Many of these activities have done well not just this year, but in years past. Again, the reason for the continuing success of these organizations is due not only to the students, but the coaches and advisers who are willing to put countless hours into developing these activities for little pay and recognition.

People who are often forgotten in the hustle and bustle of high school, but who are definitely an integral part of South are the parents. The parent support at South is phenomenal. There is a Mother's Club and Dad's Club at South. Both support student activities (such as clubs and sports) financially.

Parents also support the students in person at athletic events and other extracurricular activities. In fact, sometimes there are more parents than students at sporting events.

South has always been known as a strong school - academically and extracurricularly. I am afraid that this quality is often taken for granted. I will miss South and the people who make it what it is. I just want to thank everyone who has made my four years at South a quality experience, and remind Grosse Pointers how fortunate we are to have such a strong school system.

My brother Jonathan is 10 years old. Due to my mother's illness during pregnancy, he now has a severe language impairment call aphasia. Jonathan is a bright kid. He could read at the age of three, and he solves math problems in his head faster than I can. But he still has plenty of problems. Jonathan has trouble with auditory processing, which is understanding what he hears. He also has difficulty putting ideas floating around in his head into understandable language. His poor social perception is a result of his disability. Jonathan is sometimes apt to do or say some of the most bizarre things!

Believe me, it's not very easy having a handicapped person in the family, but it does have its advantages. Jonathan may not be able to do things with me like a normal 10-year-old would, but we're different enough that we don't have any compe-

tition between us. Sometimes Jonathan's lack of social comprehension puts me in embarrassing situations, like when my friends who don't know about him look at him like he's from outer space. However, knowing Jonathan has made me more sensitive about other learning disabled kids. I've also found that when I explain Jonathan's disability to my friends, they're very understanding. Heck,

we can't all be the same. Jonathan's dependency on me has given me an overwhelming responsibility, and is sometimes a pain in the neck! But you have to admit, it's nice having someone look up to you. Not everyone has a brother who thinks they can do anything and

everything. When you think about it, the things that make Jonathan seem strange to some people are the things that make him likeable to others. He's a funny, innocent kid without a mean bone in his body. Not everyone was created with equal abilities, but we all have a right to be treated equally.



You may not agree with the politics of Malcolm X, but with the recent rash of governmental scandals, this statement holds more than a little true. Instead, it seems that every other week finds a major public official has violated the accepted political ethics code.

The Watergate affair touched off this socalled trend and it has continued through Senator Gary Hart's troubles. 

The birthstone for the month of July is the ruby. Ruby is the red variety of corundum and is one of the hardest gemstones known to man, rated just below the diamond on the hardness scale. The term "ruby" originates from the Latin word "ruber" meaning red.

At one time the finest rubies came from Burma. In turn the top grade of rubies are Burmese rubies, the finest color termed "pigeons blood." Today very little ruby mining is done in Burma due to the government. A few stones are smuggled out but are sold very quickly. The majority of rubies mined today come from Africa, Thailand, or Sri Lanka.

Early civilization thought of rubies as the King of Gemstones and many legends were associated with them. It was believed that a pale ruby would ripen if it was buried and that a flawed ruby was caused by over-ripening. It was also believed that the wearer of the ruby was blessed with health, wealth, and

Rubies are formed by a process called contact metamorphism. The chemicals needed for rubies to form are mixed with limestone, under heat and pressure these chemicals come together and crystalize as rubies. Large, fine quality rubies over five carats are scarce. In fact, carat for carat, a fine ruby is worth two to three times more than a diamond of equal quality. A ruby's color is the most important factor in grading, since nearly all rubies have some type of

Even though rubies are very hard, care should be taken when they are worn. To clean your ruby jewelry, soak the pieces in warm water with a mild soap then brush with a fine bristle brush. Have your jewelry professionally cleaned and checked by your jeweler every six months.

neighbor's and city's concerns. The program proposed by Children's Home is a chemical dependency program for children in the Grosse Pointe school system. It is designed to be an aftercare counseling program used after a child has been in an inpatient treatment center for a chemical dependency.

People who do not get aftercare do not make it," said Susan Pierce of the Grosse Pointe Public School System, who spoke as a representative of school Superintendent John Whritner.

Because the schools cannot provide this type of aftercare treatment, the school system sees the Children's Home program as a way to fill the void and gave full support to the pro-

One mother spoke, describing her story of aftercare when her daughter was discharged from an inpatient treatment center. The nearest aftercare treatment center was in West Bloomfield (others are in Ann Arbor and Toledo), which meant the student missed more school getting to the treatment center, and put a greater strain on the family. She said her daughter (who is now in an aftercare center out of state) felt if there had been closer aftercare, she could be at home

While there are many professional counselors in the area, there may not be many with the expertise and extensive training required, and the linkages with the various inpatient centers, according to H.E. Tammelaid, executive director of the home.

Nancy Nicholson, president of the Children's Home board, said the program, which has been studied for more than a year, is the culmination of a tremendous amount of effort of the board. The neighbors had been notified and their concerns were taken into consideration in programming hours and when the expansion plans were made.

"It is not a drying-out place," Nicholson said.

She stressed that the program would be professionally run and would be accessible for all who are in the Grosse Pointe school district. The program would work with the schools, and although it would not be able to address all the needs, it would be able to help some.

The commission and some neighbors questioned the need for the program to be located at Children's Home and asked whether it could be located elsewhere, at a hospital perhaps. Board members said the program would be professionally supervised and run, however, in

The new building, to be 8,600 square feet, will house health services and transfer of current services.

A portion of the building was to have housed a proposed outpatient chemical dependency assessment and aftercare treatment facility, but because that would have been a non-complying use, the planning commission had to rule against it in the

Children's Home board members said the space was still needed, even if the program was not approved.

Children's Home gets expansion OK There will also be an addition to the administration building.

Other on-site expansion includes a new roadway which will be hidden from the road by a berm, and the removal of a trailer/mobile home to make room for the road. There will also be new front parking spaces.

Children's Home board members said they discussed the improvements with neighbors, and that their concerns were built into the project.





can have dramatic changes on the weather.

Hodak said a recent theory for this drought is that the El Nino has cooled a bit, prompting the dry weather.

Rains did come to many states over the last week. In some areas as much as eight inches fell in two days, while Michigan remained dry.

So far Michigan is about seven to eight inches below its normal rainfall for the year. This kind of drought has all but destroyed a number of crops in the state, and even if it does rain, it may be too late to save others.


Hodak recalled, however, that just last year Michigan's crops throughout the central portion of the state were destroyed by torrential rains when 6.8 inches made for the wettest August on record in state history.

Weather is a fickle thing. To predict weather on a short-term basis is getting easier, but longrange climatological predictions are much more difficult.

"That science is still in its infancy," Hodak said. "We can look back over the eons and determine what the climate was like, but no one can tell you why the climate was like it was."

Lately, there has also been an increase in solar activity. Hodak said that drought is often associated with some dry spells and that could have something to do with it. He emphasized that until the drought is over, and scientists have had a chance to analyze the data over a period of time, no one is going to know for sure why we are having this drought.

Gaidica said that there has been a huge high pressure cen-

"It looks something like a huge, elongated salami," he said. 'We don't know for sure, but we suspect that this is having a direct effect on our weather.'

He said it could be preventing the warm, moist air from the Gulf from coming north. Last week when the temperature went from 104 to 75 degrees in just a couple of hours, Michigan should have seen some of the most torrential rains and serious storms of the year. Because it was so dry, however, the storms never developed. The cold front moved across the state with high winds both before and during the event, but the moisture never materialized.

Gaidica said most people don't like to think about such things as the greenhouse effect because of the enormous implications.

"I've read some theories where the prediction is that the climate bands associated with Tampa/St. Pete would be around New York," Gaidica said. "People would be vacationing on the sunny beaches of New Jersey,



ing. He was the founder of several banks in the Thumb area.

Frank came to Grosse Pointe around 1909, according to Parcells. "He had heard that Grosse Pointe was a good place to live if you worked in Detroit," Parcells said. Hubbard was the founder of the Industrial National Bank of Detroit and Grosse Pointe Savings Bank. Both later merged with larger banks.

"It was always a treat to go to the Hubbard House," Parcells said, remembering visits to his grandparents' estate. "It was an elegant household. Meals were done old-world style, with great care. On Sundays we would walk down to the lake after Sunday dinner.

"It had a great attic. The whole third floor was a play-room. There was a billiard table and lots of books."

Parcells remembers Grosse Pointe in the '20s. "Across Jefferson (from the Hubbard House) there were a couple of stores," he said. "A hardware store and a fix-it store, a repair shop. I think it was called Wright's. Grandfather Hubbard had a meadow, and a barn, and he kept a cow. They had fresh milk from the cow for years."

Parcells' father, Charles A. Parcells, was president of the Grosse Pointe Board of Education in the '40s, and Parcells Middle School is named for him. He died in 1948.

Parcells' mother, Carolyn, moved back into her girlhood home after her mother died in 1953. Carolyn later married Russell Healy Lucas, a financial analyst. She remained in what was to be known as the Hubbard/Lucas House until her death last year, at the age of 92.

Parcells said he would not call the Hubbard House a mansion. "It was a large house. A big, comfortable house," he said. "But not a Rose Terrace. Not a Henry Joy House. When you get into 10 or 15 bedrooms, and lots of service areas, then you call it a mansion."

Besides being the author of several children's books and books of poetry, Carolyn Lucas was interested in historic preservation. She spent much of her later years developing Pioneer Huron City museums in the Huron City area where she spent her early childhood. 

he joined the U.S. Army seven years earlier.

"My brother was the target of Japanese secret police and I was at the ripe age for paramilitary duty. So we walked for 30 days far into the interior. As you recall, though, the Japanese had a major offensive going in China. As we moved west, the Japanese were right behind us. So we were forced to the north ... right into a pocket of Chinese guerillas.

"That didn't prove to be too safe, either. In Chunking, my brother was picked up by U.S. Intelligence and debriefed. I settled in Chun Ming and got a job in a post office. I stayed there

"My brother was allowed to go to camp to secure the release of his own people, friends and possibly family. He, of course, didn't know what he'd find there. And although I was not there, I can just imagine the joy he felt when he opened those gates and found smiling at the memory.

In 1946, Kim earned his separation from the Army in California. He attended the Mount Herman School in Massachusetts and Dickinson College in Carlisle, Pa. He was studying a premed curriculum when the Korean War broke out.

"The college president told me I was exempt from service because of my World War II duty. In school, I had joined the 28th Division of the National Guard at the suggestion of the Episcopal priest on campus. Lo and behold, guess which division is one of the only two National Guard divisions federalized by President Truman? The 28th," Kim

Master Sgt. Kim was shipped to Germany, but later given a commission and assigned to military intelligence at Fort Bragg. Soon after, he was sent to Washington to serve with the Central Intelligence Agency in Japan. When his tour was up, Kim had to make a choice: re-enlist or join the CIA. When the Army told him that it would regularize him (as opposed to his standing in the reserve) Kim chose the

"I volunteered for special forces. I did that because I be-

lieved in underground warfare. It is the most effective type of warfare in that it is the least costly and most destructive of the enemy. For a career man, however, that was not at that time a choice assignment. But those who had volunteered had a

deep conviction in that type of unit. We worked to make it the best."

Kim served through the Berlin Crisis and rose to command the 10th Special Forces. During the Kennedy administration, the See POINTER, page 19A



special forces unit suddenly became one of the elite because President Kennedy embraced the special forces concept.

"Suddenly the unit was increased by 5,000, which jeopardized quality. But we in the forces were steadfastly selective in preparing the forces. We had to be. We were aware that Vietnam was looming on the horizon and that special forces would be a part of that," Kim says.

He volunteered for Vietnam duty in 1963, when there were only about 100 special forces present in that country, "When I arrived there, we were training the Vietnamese to fight their own war. We provided leadership and equipment and were told that involvement in a skirmish would result in being shipped out.

"Well, I was shipped out . . . and nearly in a box. I was wounded near the end of my tour and sent home to Washington.

In 1968, he was promoted to lieutenant colonel and given command of the 1st Special Forces Group (Airborne) and Special Action Forces Asia at Oki nawa. His mission was to dispatch American soldiers to Vietnam.

"But the war began to cause me problems. I went there to do a job and get it done. But my own thinking as the war progressed was that Vietnam became a place for personal aggrandizement, a place to get one's 'ticket punched.' And at what price -58,000 dead and most of them kids? For my sake? No way."

Kim was put in charge of the Modern Volunteer Army (MVA) program, where his job was to motivate soldiers to re-enlist.

"By then, I had decided that the pursuance of a military career was not for me."

At the time, Bishop Edmond Browning was the presiding Episcopalian bishop of Okinawa. "He charted the course for me, told me he wanted me to go to the seminary. I was interviewed by the bishop of Alabama," who accepted me and declared me a postulant for Holy Orders.

"I'll never forget what the sergeant major of my unit said as I was about to ship out. He said, 'Sir, are you OK?' They thought I was crazy," Kim recalls, laugh-

"But I've never had such reace as at that moment. To decide, at the peak of my career, to go to the seminary.'

It was a tough road, even for a battle-hardened soldier. Kim's involvement in a very unpopular war was constantly questioned by seminarians who, despite their surroundings, made life difficult for Richard Kim the postulant.

"One guy even asked me if I was there to atone for my military sins. It was the first time in my life I ever wanted to knock a guy on his carcass. I was proud of my military record. I'm proud of it today.

But my seminary experience was the toughest test of my life. I call it my 'wilderness experience'. And it was, until I went to my hospital pastoral training. I realized then that I'd found my niche.

Kim passed the General Ordination Examination and was ordained to the Diaconate in 1973. He held the position of assistant chaplain, Canterbury Chapel and Student Center, at the University of Alabama at Tuscaloosa. He was ordained to the priesthood on May 6, 1974, in Grace Episcopal Church in Sheffield. Ala., where he began a term as the church rector.

In 1977, Kim was called to be rector of the Church of the Good Shepherd in the Diocese of Hawant. He served there for three years, piloting a number of projects and assisting in a merger of two congregations of widely diverse cultures: Filipino and American, Under Rim's leadership, the church began a preschool program, became wholly self supporting, and implemented a prison ministry program.

## DIO benefit is a new concept . . . in more ways than one

t took the eye of a designer to spot just what the Detroit Institute of Ophthalmology needed to insure that its first-ever car show fundraiser would be a success. It so happens that eye belongs to Park resident Dick Ruzzin.

Ruzzin's wife Merrie Lynn is a reader for the DIO - she records the Grosse Pointe News and other papers on tape for the vision-impaired - and one day, brought home a newsletter detailing the DIO's planned car show.

Ruzzin, who shows his "Mangusta," a mid-engine Italian design car at the popular Meadow Brook classic car show, came up with an idea for the DIO program.

"I had some experience with car shows. I started the design group show at the General Motors Tech Center. So I went to a

planning meeting for the DIO show and found folks who were enthusiastic about finding someone who knew how to get people to bring their cars to a show like this," Ruzzin explains.

At the time, Ruzzin was on his way to the fabled Turin auto show and ideas to spice up the DIO show - with some of that international car show's features - were dancing in his head.

He thought about a different kind of car show with different cars: Concept cars. Those eyecatching designer models from past and present.

"I told the DIO that we should have a special theme, because there are a lot of these shows. The Meadow Brook show is the second best in the country, so people around here know their car shows," he adds.

"There are more auto designers in the Detroit area than anywhere else. And in auto design. the eye is the key. The connec-

So a theme was born, to the delight of the DIO and those planning the fundraiser. Ruzzin discussed the plans with his boss at General Motors, vice president of design Charles Jordan. Jordan loved the idea and so did the design chiefs at the three other auto competitors Ruzzin contacted.

Ruzzin managed to get the other two-thirds of the Big Three, Ford and Chrysler, to make a commitment to show design cars. Heinz Prechter of ASC also promised one of his concept cars for the show.

"It was weird calling everybody at the other companies to ask for their help. But they've all been wonderfully cooperative in helping us put together what we think will be a fine show."





Safety Department) and asked him if it was illegal to skate in the street. He told me that it was and advised me to call Dale Krajniak (acting city manager). He confirmed that I couldn't skate in the street, but told me that I could hold club meetings and skate in the Windmill Pointe Park auxiliary parking

"I checked the lot out. It's pretty smooth and there's lots of room to skate and set up cones and stuff. That's where we'll meet."

The meetings will be on Monday. The first is at Eatherly's house on July 18. Fee is \$15, or \$10 if submitted by July 15. The dues entitle members to refreshments, first aid and to a membership card which gives them a 10 percent discount on equipment at Metro Ski and Sports.

Eatherly says that rollerblades are kind of a cross between ice skates and roller skates, although they're a bit more like ice skates. The basic construction is a firm, plastic-like ski boot which holds three or four polyurethane wheels in a row. And there is a heel brake on one boot, rather than the toe pick or ball found on ice and roller skates.

Since their invention by a pair of Minnesota brothers nine years ago, rollerblades have been used for everything from downhill and cross country ski training to National Hockey League off-season practice and conditioning.

They cost around \$130, but

can range higher or lower according to the style and brand. They are comfortable, Eatherly says, in that even beginners can remain on their feet in the boots for long periods of time without

Eatherly says that anyone even self-proclaimed oafs - can skate on rollerblades. However, knee and elbow pads and protective gloves are necessities, at least for novices.

"The first time I put them on and skated, it was like gliding on air . . . except when you fall on your butt. Really, though, it was easy. And if I can do it, anybody can," Eatherly says.

Ideally, she'd like to have at least 20 people join her club. Cone skating (around traffic cones) and instruction will be available at each gathering. And the group will follow the calorieburning skating sessions with a meeting at a local restaurant for some food and conversation.

"We're looking for people over 18 who want to meet people and have fun. This is a recreational club, so people don't have to worry about competition or skills. Just about enjoying themselves.







Carnivorous plants are not really as dangerous as they sound and do, as a matter of fact, make very interesting houseplants which are easy to care for and are certainly unfailing conversation pieces. (One local lady, wishing to send a plant to her small nephew who was recovering from chicken pox, ordered a Venus Flytrap. 

# Archery: A not-quite-lost sport

Life sport.

There are plenty of activities to choose from: golf, aerobics, walking, swimming, shooting, fishing, skating. The only requirement is that they can be done alone, without scads of equipment or space needs. They're sports that aren't too strenuous for the 75 percent of the population that is older than said. 17. These are sports, unlike many school team sports, that will last you a lifetime.

Kids at the day camp at the Country Club of Detroit are learning a different life sport: archery. Archery classes aren't easy to find, but that isn't because kids dislike archery.

On the contrary.

"This is their favorite class," aid instructor Elizabeth Rennick. "They love it."

That becomes immediately obvious when the next class, six- between girls and boys on the year-old girls, shows up. "Hey, archery field, but Rennick said guys, are you ready?" calls Renit's easy to tell what kind of per-

nick. In answer, the girls break into a run and surround her in a gang hug.

'You'd think of this as kind of a 'guy' sport, but the girls are as good at it as the boys," Rennick

The reason is the independence of it, according to the camp's assistant director, Nancy Rennick. "They just feel good about doing it themselves," she

Daughter Elizabeth agreed. She started attending the day camp when she was three, and although her sport now is lacrosse (she's on the team at Boston College), she has always liked archery.

"This is something the kids can do for themselves," she said. "I can't shoot for them. In swimming, for instance, you can hold someone up, but this is all on their own.'

There isn't much difference

sonality the children have.

"You can tell the perfectionists," she said. They're the ones who are willing to take the time to aim, to learn the techniques, to "go for the points" and earn bullseye pins. The more impatient go for distance shots.

The class quickly goes through an exercise in naming the parts of the bow and the arrows. This is only their second meeting and most of the names haven't sunk in yet.

"Knocker," calls out one girl, describing the nock. "Stomach, someone says for the belly.

They are anxious for the main event. Four at a time, they line up to take five shots at the targets. The first shots fall short, but with practice comes improvement. By the third round, Kristin put four of her five arrows squarely in the target, earning 18 points and rounds of ap-

"She was afraid of the bow last week," Rennick said. "Look how much confidence she's

gained."

Newcomers to the sport are often nervous, she said. The bowstring can skin or burn the forearm; serious archers usually wear a protective guard. The small bows and blunt arrows at the camp are not likely to wound, but the children are taught safety precautions as if they were using hunting arrows.

One of the attractions of archery is that you don't have to be a hunter to enjoy it. A devotee can shoot practice arrows any time and any place. A couple of bales of straw in the back yard provides enough of a barrier to back up a target. Even young children are strong enough to shoot an arrow through a target, so it's important to have something behind it.



Every now and then we have a sailing year that is memorable; 1988 seems to be that year, especially for the

Great Lakes Singlehanded Society's 10th anniversary race from Port Huron to Mackinac.

Saturday, June 25, started out pleasantly enough with a stiff breeze from the south and record-setting 104-degree temperatures. The 31 solo sailors were proceeding toward the first mark of the 300-plus mile course that would end at Mackinac Island, the turning mark at Goderich, Ontario. The predicted wind shift came a bit earlier than expected, shifting the wind around to the north causing the pleasant day to deteriorate into an uncomfortably difficult sail: one that will go down in the Society's record books.

The turning mark at Goderich became nightmarishly difficult to round. The seas and wind built until there were 40 mph winds with 12 foot seas running, causing even the most seasoned veteran to question his sanity. Equipment and sailors were stressed to the limits of their endurance. The lone sailors were being tumbled about their boats like sacks of potatoes. Sleep was difficult, if not impossible, in the howling conditions that prevailed.

The extraordinary conditions continued well into Monday, finally moderating as evening came. The race committee began to hear from competitors as each made the difficult personal decision to drop out.

"Award my (participation) plaque to the lake," said Phil Rubright. "Lake Huron won this year. She deserves

Their reasons for not continuing varied. Some got seasick. Some broke equipment or tore sails. Two boats were dismasted, one in a collision with a freighter. Some decided that the reward was not worth the effort and expense. One competitor who did persevere was overheard to say that "... he could have had someone tie him up, beat him, throw cold water on him, and starve him for three days, at a lot less than it cost to sail this (race).'

Ten of the 31 entrants sailed into the harbor at Mackinac Island. The 21 who discontinued sailing were scattered in various ports along the Canadian and Michigan coastline: none further north than Goderich.

Society President Dick Lappin, who sailed his C&C 27 through the nasty weather, noted at the award luncheon, that if he ever encountered such conditions again, he would join those who holed up in a safe port, rather than brave it out against the elements again. He said he had nothing but respect for those who made the decision not to continue. He also recognized Joe Vallee, for his valiant effort in responding to a mayday distress call. Joe stood by a sinking vessel giving what assistance he could, before help arrived from shore.

# Windsurfing

Every time it's a new challenge - making the freedom experienced even more exciting.

That's a thumbnail sketch of the cacophony of superlatives from several Grosse Pointe windsurfers about the sport they have grown to love.

As anyone who has ever sailed knows, there is a mystique about using the power of the wind to take you across the water that is unsurpassed by any land sport.

Windsurfing (or sailboarding) is the use of a modified surf board equipped with a sail which allows one person to glide over a body of water. Any of those feelings one normally associates with sailing a vessel are amplified since it's the windsurfer along who must challenge the waves, wind, current and himself.

Richard Matzka, owner of Metro Ski and Sports in the Woods, said the popularity of the sport locally has grown enormously over the past five years. He has been selling sailboards for the last 10 years, and said that in the U.S. the sport has been popular for the last eight.

Local interest in the sport is exemplified by the Pointe parks putting in facilities and storage areas for the enthusi-

Choosing a board will depend on the level of skill one has acquired. Newcomers to the sport will want a light-weight, stable board. Matzka said that over the years, the board and masts have been made with light materials, which has opened up the sport for more people.

"People who bought a board six years ago may have tried sailboarding and put the thing in the garage," Matzka said. "They were very heavy and are not as stable as they are

today." Gwendy Lambrecht said she tries to get out on the water every day.

"I love to be out there," she said. "There's no competition, but myself and nature."

She said she taught herself to windsurf last July and she sailed, with wetsuit, until November.

know a little about sailing and the wind, but I've seen some seasoned sailors who try to go against the wind on a Lambrecht said no two days are the same on Lake St.



# Learn to prevent tennis elbow

Tennis elbow.

If you haven't had it, you don't want it.

Actually, it is inflammation of the muscle/tendon unit of the elbow extensors where they attach on the outer aspect of the elbow. Mine came not from tennis, but from overuse when doing pushups.

You can, however, take measures to prevent this painful inflammatory reaction when playing tennis. Test your backhand mechanics. Faults may include leading with the elbow, using an improper grip, dropping the racquet head, or using a topspin backhand with a whipping motion.

Or, your grip size may be wrong. Usually, too small. Your racquet be strung too tightly, or you may be hitting off center, particularly if you are using wet, heavy balls.

To correct the problems you will want to use proper techniques. Check with a good tennis pro.

Check your grip size. When the racquet is gripped, there should be room for one finger to fit in the gap between the thumb and fingers. Your racquet should be strung at the proper tension, usually between 50 and 55 pounds. And avoid stiff racquets that vibrate easily.

You'll know you have tennis elbow if the pain (not discomfort) is centered over the outer aspect of the elbow. There may also be swelling and increased skin temperature, and pain on racquet gripping and extension of your wrist. Ouch!

In addition to rest and ice initially, you may need to use a brace, which is a circular band placed just below the elbow. If symptoms don't improve, see your physician of course, but make certain you do strengthening and stretching exercise for the wrist.

During the Wimbledon games, tennis elbow was discussed. It was interesting to learn that this is not the most common tennis injury with the professionals. Low back pain is!

Low back pain usually results from poor body mechanics, muscular weakness or inflexibility of certain muscle groups, such as tight lowerback muscles or tight hamstrings (back of the leg). This can also be heightened by poor posture, differences in leg length or weak abdominal muscles. Surely these prime athletes aren't neglecting to do their curl-ups. Those back muscles have to be counterbalanced with strong abdominal muscles for optimum performance.

To correct the causes of lowback pain you need to stretch tight muscles and strengthen weak muscles. Always include a proper warm-up prior to the game or practice and follow with a proper cool-down following the activity. Don't forget correct posture. It's the basis for any fitness activity.

When is it time to stop the activity and see your physician? If pain is experienced before, during and after the activity and performance is definitely affected. Also, normal daily functions may be affected or movement limited because of pain. Local swelling, discoloration or tenderness upon touch may also be present. Listen to your body, rest the area and call your doctor.

You can't be a week-end athlete and expect to be injury free. Fitness is a lifetime pursuit.


• Buy small quantities and refrigerate. Don't buy more than you can eat within a few days.

· Don't throw away the outer leaves of lettuce. They may be coarse, but they contain more calcium, iron and vitamin A than the more tender leaves. They blend very nicely in a

· Kale, collard greens and turnip greens store more of their vitamin A in the leafy parts; so if you trim stems or ribs of these vegetables, few nutrients will be lost. The cabbage core, on the other hand, contains as much vitamin C as the leaves. If you discard the core, you lose nutrients.

• Don't peel any vegetable unless it is absolutely necessary. The peel is loaded with nutrients. If you must peel, don't overdo it. Use a vegetable peeler instead of a knife.

For a "jogging" workout on stairs, Spring Magazine suggests the following:

Using just the lower two steps as "bench" steps, walk up and down at a comfortable but brisk pace. Stand on the first step; move left foot to second step; bring right foot up to meet it; move left foot down, then right foot down.


If your body is bent out of shape, take the first week easy. Begin your program with a twominute stepping routine, then take a leisurely walk around the house for another two minutes to cool down.

At every new workout, increase your time by a half-minute each to stepping and walking. Gradually work your way up to a 20-minute workout. If this is your only exercise, do the program at least three times weekly.






