Judges in the Pointes are sending prisoners up the river all right - but it's the AuSable River in Alcona County.

For the last six months, Grosse Pointe Woods has been lodging prisoners in the Huron County Jail in Bad Axe, and more recently, the Farms has taken its lead and has prisoners under lock and key in Alcona, St. Clair, Arenac and Huron counties.

The problem isn't new. For at least two years the Wayne County jail has not taken in misdemeanant offenders due to lack

felony offenders, such as burglars, rapists and murderers.

Since the Pointe's municipal court system doesn't hear felony cases, there is really no jail to send convicted misdemeanants to. If a local court is successful in getting an habitual thief or traffic offender in jail, chances are he could be released in a matter of days to make room for a more serious criminal.

"It's not just us," said Woods Public Safety Director Jack Patterson, "everybody has the prob-



Presidential yacht on tour; visits Grosse Pointe

The USS Sequoia

A slice of American history sailed through Lake St. Clair and the Detroit River last week. The presidential yacht, USS Sequoia, docked briefly at the Grosse Pointe Yacht Club last Friday - one port on its sevenmonth "Celebrate America!"

tour of 22 states and 100 cities. This summer's tour provided the last chance for the public to walk aboard the historic yacht and look around. The Sequoia will be returned to service as a

presidential yacht in November. The historic 104-foot yacht has served eight U.S. presidents so far, providing the setting for del-

icate diplomatic negotiations, international discussions, official ceremonies, social functions, presidential retreats and family gatherings.

President Jimmy Carter sold it in 1977. Four years later, a private, non-profit, bi-partisan organization, the Presidential Yacht Trust, repurchased the Sequoia and set about overhauling, refurbishing, restoring and redecorating it in the style of the Roosevelt era.

It was designated a National Historic Landmark in 1988.

Sequoia Capt. John Terrill said at least 500,000 people have been aboard during the last four

The public's interest is incredible, he said. "We were traveling through a deserted canal in North Carolina - the Pungo Canal. There's one little road. Lots of swamp. Wilderness. We came to a little bridge at 7:30 a.m. and there were 60 to 80 people beside the road, waving American flags and holding signs that said, Good Luck Se-

The yacht has served as a presidential retreat - as well as the setting for historic occasions for eight presidents. Herbert Hoover used it as a retreat and respite from Depression era presidential stresses; Roosevelt planned war strategy aboard; Lyndon Johnson entertained ambassadors, congressmen and foreign dignitaries; Richard Nixon was aboard the Sequoia when he told his family about his decision to resign from the

by contributions to the Presidential Yacht Trust by corporations and individuals. The rehabilitation was done by more than 240 craftsmen who worked around the clock for six months in order to complete the project in time for the Statue of Liberty centennial celebration.

It's ready for service again. All spit and polish. Gleaming brass. Flawlessly smooth varnished mahogany and teak. Shining chrome. Snappy canvas. Muted blues, cranberry reds and

creamy whites. The presidential seal is woven into the center of the carpet in the main salon and anchors are woven into the four corners. The salon is lined with brass wall sconces and short, tied-back brocade drapes, backed by the glow of mahogany and accented with gleaming silver serving dishes, white linen, silk flower arrangements in muted shades of blue, white and cramberry red. A row of side chairs covered with blue fabric with a subtle five-pointed star motif stands at attention. Reclining deck chairs -- 10 of

them - are lined up on the bridge. Scattered throughout the

vacht are framed photographs of former presidents doing historic deeds aboard the yacht: Richard Nixon with Soviet leader Leonid Brezhnev in 1973; two photos of John Kennedy celebrating his 46th birthday (his last) with family members; a black and white 1933 photo of Herbert Hoover aboard the yacht; a 1934 photo of FDR.

An major part of the restoration project involved bringing fire, safety and security systems up to state-of-the-art. Insulation was added to reduce noise from the twin 8V-71 Detroit diesel engines. Props and engine shafts were redesigned. Hull and decks were reconstructed. Power plant, wiring, plumbing and electronics were modernized. The yacht has all the latest in navigational equipment except Loran C.

Woods embroiled in day care suit homes in the Woods. By Ronald J. Bernas

Another home day care business operating in a home in the Woods is suing the city for closing it down.

The suit was filed by Mary Roose who was, until April of this year, operating a licensed day care from her home on Fleetwood, in which she said she cared for four children.

"Being licensed through the state, we figured was our goahead," Roose said.

But the Woods has a city ordinance that does not allow residents to operate businesses out of their homes.

When a suit was filed by another home day care that was shut down after neighbors complained, the city asked the state for a list of other state-licensed

The state refused and Woods city attorney George Catlin filed a freedom of information request. The state complied, showing that there were four other home day care centers in the Woods.

Catlin said he sent letters to the four telling them they had to stop operating because they were in violation of the city ordinance. Roose said she did stop after receiving that letter.

After an attorney got in touch with her, a suit was filed June 29 in circuit court. Roose said.

The suit charges that the city's ordinance is vague, not constitutional and that it is selectively enforced by the city.

"There are a lot of businesses per se which are running out of homes in the Woods," Roose day care centers operating in said. She said the city is selec-

tively enforcing the ordinance and that home day cares are being discriminated against.

"That's not true and they are not going to be able to prove it,' Catlin said.

Roose said she is opposed to the local ordinance, but also favors state controls.

The state legislature now has a bill pending that would allow the state to override local zoning ordinances for day care centers. The Woods city council has ex-

pressed its opposition to the bill. The suit also seeks an injunction from ordinance enforcement, citing financial and emotional damages. Roose is asking for financial judgment of at least \$10,000, and court costs, interest

and attorneys fees. "We've complied with the ordinance, but we're not giving up the fight," Roose said.

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




Thomas A. Malloy, president of Leisurecraft Inc., purchased it for \$286,000. In 1980, it was sold again to a business partnership headed by Norman Pulliam, of South Carolina. It was offerd for auction in 1980 and purchased again by the Ocean Learning Institute, in Florida.

In 1981, the Presidential Yacht Trust was formed and purchased the Sequoia for \$1 million. The yacht was officially designated a National Historic Landmark in 1988 and began its "Celebrate America!" Homecoming Tour in March.

Captain Terrill estimated the Sequoia will require \$300,000 a year to be properly maintained. The Presidential Yacht Trust is soliciting donations from corporations and individuals to finance this unique bit of floating American history.

After the seven-month tour of the eastern United States, the Sequoia will be returned to service as the presidential yacht.

The enclosed aft deck of the Sequoia has been furnished with casual furniture of the Roosevelt era. Framed photographs of historic happenings aboard the yacht are placed throughout the Sequoia.



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
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Educators concerned over failure of special education millage

Although there will probably be no immediate effect on the Grosse Pointe schools special education programs, many districts will soon be feeling the effect of voters turning down a one-mill increase for special education by the Wayne County Intermediate School District.

Locally voters narrowly de-2.489 margin. It lost by about 7,000 votes county-wide, 103,355 to 110,376.

Director of Special Education Claire Hunt said that the program will cost the district about \$20,000 to \$30,000 for the coming school year.

These charge-backs will rise dramatically as the years go on," Hunt said. "Some estimates suggest perhaps they will double each year.'

The intermediate school district asked voters to approve an increase of one chartered mill to fund special education programs and services for handicapped students. Some 6,000 students throughout the 34 districts within the intermediate district receive special education services funded with one exisiting chartered mill.

Budget shortfalls have required the ISD to charge-back special education costs to districts whose students are receiving services. The projected shortfall for the 1987-88 school year is about \$9 million. The new mill would have raised slightly more than \$20 million.

The reason I feel this proposal failed," Hunt said of the narrow margin of loss, "was that this was almost an invisible issue. Outside of a stand taken in favor of the issue by both daily newspapers, the ordinary citizen knew nothing about it.'

ISD officials are considering bringing the issue back on the November general election ballot since it was so close.

Kathryn Mathey, special education consultant for the ISD, said part of the reason for failure might have been that school was

parents through the students." Mathey said the WCISD will continue to operate the programs at a deficit and charge the local districts for the excess costs.

consolidating some of the programs," Mathey said. "We can't cut any further. The programs are already being operated in the most cost-effective manner."



Defeat shows casino forces poor losers

Thether the voters' rejection of ca-sino gambling in the city of Detroit finally puts an end to the controversial issue or not, the reaction of the pro-casino leaders proves they are poor

Even before all the votes were counted, Frank Stella, chairman of Mayor Coleman Young's casino gaming study commission, predicted that there would be casino gambling in Detroit at some future time. The other co-chairman, Samuel Gardner, hinted at the same thing and saw the possibility of a court challenge to the casino vote.

True, the vote was not binding on the state Legislature, which regulates gambling in Michigan, but the legislation required to legalize casino gambling in Detroit or anywhere else in Michigan does not seem to have much support in Lansing. With Detroit voters for the third time expressing their opposition in an advisory vote, it appears unlikely the Legislature could be persuaded to give its approval in the near future.

In fact, the defeat of the casino gambling

referendum, or, more accurately, the victory of the proposal to enact an ordinance to ban casino gambling, is being widely regarded as a defeat for Mayor Young and a victory for Tom Barrow, an anti-gambling organizer who ran against Young in 1985 and is expected to do so again next

The casino controversy was given credit for attracting a slightly larger than usual primary vote in Detroit although the vote elsewhere was at its usual low level for a primary lacking any major issues. Even the contest between East Lansing developer Jim Dunn and Robert Huber, Troy businessman, for the doubtful privilege of challenging U.S. Sen. Donald Riegle in the fall, did not seem to attract much interest in the GOP ranks, although Dunn's backers liked the results.

In Wayne County, there were few surprises but some disappointments. One disappointment for many Pointers was the failure of Grosse Pointe City Public Safety Director Bruce Kennedy to make a stronger race against Sheriff Robert Ficano for the Democratic nomination.

Both Kennedy and former Undersheriff Richard M. Novak had challenged the sheriff on the grounds he lacked the law enforcement experience they feel is required of a sheriff. But the Wayne County Democratic machine, loyal to one of its own, saw to it that Ficano got the support of the party faithful, regardless of his qualifications.

Even the revelation in The Detroit News, the day before the election, that five deputy sheriffs had put in so much overtime they earned more than the county executive in the first six months of this year did not damage Ficano, who presumably is in charge of managing the deputies' schedules.

Nor, apparently, was Ficano politically wounded by Wayne County Executive Ed McNamara's comment attributing the high overtime expense to poor management of the jail by the sheriff. McNamara and Ficano have been at odds over McNamara's proposal to establish a department of corrections to run the county jail, although the county executive did endorse Ficano after a countywide poll showed the sheriff with a big lead.

A second disappointment among some Pointers was the failure of Barbara-Rose Collins to upset U.S. Rep. George W. Crockett in the 13th District, although she did make a better run for the Democratic nomination than anyone else has made against Crockett. She is a Detroit city council member and former member of the state House of Representatives as well as a former Detroit school board member, who would have been, so we have been told, more responsive to constituents' needs and wishes than Crockett has been.

A Republican from Detroit, John Wright Savage II, will face Crockett in the fall. However, through gerrymandering by the Democrats, the Grosse Pointes now are divided between two congressional districts which are, outside of the Pointes, heavily Democratic. The result is that the Pointes have little influence in the congressional races nor do the Republican challengers stand much prospect of victory.

The Park and the City now fall in the 13th District, with the Farms, the Shores and the Woods in the 14th District represented by Rep. Dennis Hertel of Harper Woods, who had no primary opposition but will face a Republican foe, Kenneth C. McNeely of Madison Heights, a Detroit public school teacher, in the fall.

Millage boost hits Pointes

"t is ironic that after all the hooting and hollering in Lansing this year about Lthe necessity of reducing the state's property taxes, primary voters approved a property tax hike in the Grosse Pointes and the rest of Wayne County.

Facing two ballot proposals, voters passed a one-mill increase to finance additional county jail or detention facilities, with the revenues from at least one-tenth of that mill being earmarked for acquiring, building and operating a juvenile offender

work/training institution. However, in a close contest, voters defeated a proposal to double the current one-mill levy to help finance the education of handicapped persons in the Wayne County Intermediate School District, of which Grosse Pointe is a part.

In the Pointes, approval of the jail expansion will cost property owners about \$1 per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation or an increase of roughly \$1.3 million altogether. Unofficial totals show that the ·Pointes voted for the jail expansion by a vote of 3,003 to 1,982 and helped defeat the special education proposal by voting against it by a 2,470 to 2,489 margin.

Meanwhile, the property tax reductions that were being promoted in Lansing have gone down the drain at least for the rest of this year along with the other elements in the school reform legislation. True, there is

a possibility of a special election next year to switch some of the school financing burden from the property tax to the sales tax. But it is unlikely that early agreement can be reached to put the issue on the ballot next year.

The jail expansion is required, according to its sponsors, because crowded conditions led to the early release of approximately 2,800 persons in 1987 alone. The new millage will enable the county to build a new 840-bed jail facility, expand existing facilities by 230 beds and add another 40 beds at the 200-bed youth home.

The fact that taxpayers in Grosse Pointe and elsewhere in the county voted for the iail millage and defeated the special education proposal indicates they made a distinction between the two millages. In effect, the voters put a higher priority on battling crime by jailing offenders than on the proposed increase in special education ser-

The election results also showed that even in a period of rising antagonism to property taxes, people will vote to increase their own property taxes if they are convinced specific services need more revenue. But they won't support higher levies even to support worthy causes unless they are convinced such proposals offer the only or the best solution.

English as she's misspoke

y and large, the English have been more protective of the Queen's English than we Americans have been. And now they are getting alarmed at the quality of English being taught, not just in England but in Japan, India and other foreign lands.

The British concern recalls the furor a couple of years ago in this country about the use of "black English" in the schools. That flap died down, especially after it was explained that teachers ought to be able to recognize "black English" spoken in the classroom but not necessarily teach it.

The Economist, the British news weekly, recently offered a rebuttal to those who wanted children to be taught to express themselves in the English dialect they know rather than in standard English. It says that few teachers would argue that

there is only one correct variety of English, but even fewer would argue that anything goes in the classroom these days.

But why require standards for the English that is taught in England, the United States or anywhere else? For a very practical reason, says the Economist. It is what employers want, whether in England, the United States or India. In Japan, too, the Economist reported, employers "are increasingly miffed when British or American teachers imported to guide them in this task express doubts about whether it is worth attempting.'

So, the Economist concludes, "The English that such countries want is one that enables Indians to communicate not just with each other, but with the Englishspeaking world." Surely that conclusion is applicable in this country, too.

In the United States, one of the aims of public education should be to see that all students, including ethnic and racial minorities, are capable of expressing themselves in the English language as the great majority of Americans use it in their businesses, in their professions, on their jobs and in their everyday routines.

Otherwise, this country would risk losing its commitment to an integrated society that effers opportunities to people of all ethnic and racial backgrounds. Even worse, it would risk the fragmentation of society into groups that could only understand and serve each other, an eventuality that would be damaging to everyone.

• 1986 vs. 1985 — \$60.58





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

And he also says, "I had the luck of being born and getting in the business at the right time.'

The right time was 1924 when he got his first design job at Gotfredson Body Co. in Wayne, Mich. As an apprentice, he was paid 40 cents an hour.

He attended Bradley Polytechnic in Peoria before coming to Detroit to work as an apprentice.

"There are good schools in automotive design now, but there weren't any at that time.'

He went on to work for other body companies and in 1927, he became one of the first designers at General Motors Art and Color Section, working for Harley Earl.

The following year, he joined Stutz, where he designed three 1929 LeMans entries.

He then became the chief designer for Duesenberg, the fastest and most luxurious automobile in the country. He designed the Durham Tourster, a show car painted yellow with green fenders that was bought by actor Gary Cooper.

The price of a Duesenberg was \$14,000 compared to \$6,000 for a custom-bodied Pierce-Arrow or Lincoln. It was the most expensive car in the country.


But the one car Buehrig designed that broke precedent and is revered by classic car fans today is the 1936 Cord Model 810. It was completely different from anything done before and is con-

sidered Buehrig's masterpiece. He went on to design others, including the 1951 Ford Victoria and the 1952 Ford station wagon which boosted sales in one year from 7,000 units to 140,000.

In 1948, Buehrig invented the T-top. One is on his 1971 Corvette he drives occasionally which bears the license plate, MyTop.

One of his favorite cars is a red Honda CRX, that's often out and about on Grosse Pointe streets, with the license plate, 42

Buehrig, who turned 84 last month, said the good old days people like to talk about "weren't very good really. If you could, imagine rush hour on the San Diego freeway and replace the autos with teams of horses.'

He doesn't dwell on the past. He's working on a new design in his home studio for a contest by Automotive Quarterly. The car, he says, is designed specifically for people 19 years old or for those who wish they were.

And he doesn't sit still. He has been working with the Franklin Mint for five years on its classic car series.

He is a 15-year member of the Senior Men's Club and a member of the Society of Automotive Engineers for more than 50 years. He also goes to lunch once a month with a group of retired Ford executive engineers, from where he retired in 1965 as principal design engineer in materials application. A self-styled

plastics nut, Buehrig worked on special projects exploring the use of plastic body and chassis components.

The automotive industry today is in trouble, he says, because of inadequate highways.

"There's capacity in this country and around the world to build more cars than can be sold and the big problem is our roads are so out of step from what they should be," he said.

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

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

Photographing in the forest

I have always loved photographing in the forest. No better place exists to truly get "lost" in your photography than amid the splendor of trees and woods.

Forests have personalities of their own which can change quickly and dramatically. Fog and mist will produce a mood in your photographs quite different than that of a bright, sunny day. The same stand of trees will obviously convey different feelings whether etched by a blanket of snow or enveloped in a rainbow of fall leaves.

Trees and forests are ever-changing and you and your camera have a tremendous opportunity to record these magic

moments. Here are some tips to help you make better photographs in

Compositionally, concentrate in two areas. I have found that patterns of trees work well in a picture such as an even row of aspens contrasted against the dark interior of the forest. Or I'll concentrate on a dominant point of interest such as that unusually shaped tree, a grouping of foilage on a branch, or that predominant tree trunk in the foreground framing trees

Forest pictures can be effective often because of what is excluded. Notice in the photo shown here the severe cropping of the tops of the trees. More impact is obtained in this way.

As always, pay close attention to depth-of-field. Most likely, you'll want everything sharp from front to back so be sure to use a small aperture along with your depth-of-field scale on the lens barrel. And because it's darker in the woods, using a small aperture (necessitating a longer shutter speed for correct exposure) will most likely require a tripod.

Forests provide many other photo opportunities. Look closely and you'll see a pattern of moss on a fallen log, a patch of intimate wildflowers, or a cluster of fallen leaves. Or how about that delicate stream winding through the forest, tumbling over rocks, making miniature waterfalls?

Try looking straight up at towering trees through a wide angle lens. The trees will appear to converge producing a truly striking picture.

You've heard the expression "you can't see the forest for the trees." In your photography, you'll easily see the forest

Republicans expect Bush to carry state

Although no Grosse Pointe delegates will be attending the Republican National Convention in New Orleans later this month, local Republicans are gearing up for the political battle that will ensue once George Bush has been nominated and has selected a running mate.

Local choices for Bush's running mate range from New York Congressman Jack Kemp to California Gov. George Deukmejian to former U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations Jeane Kirkpatrick.

The local consensus is that the November election will be close and that the Republicans will have to fight hard to beat Democratic nominee Massachusetts Gov. Michael Dukakis and running mate Texas Sen. Lloyd Bentsen.

Grosse Pointe Shores resident and precinct delegate Barbara Gattorn said that in terms of his chances, the election is Bush's to

think the experience of George Bush and his association with an extraordinarily successful administration will be very beneficial."

Gattorn, who is active in 14th District Republican politics, says that the "Massachusetts Miracle," which the Democratics are touting as a Dukakis miracle, is not the result of Dukakis.

"I think the weaknesses in Massachusetts are a result of Dukakis' poor leadership," Gattorn said. "Unemployment, a poor pension program and his doubling government spending there are evidence of this."

On this issue at least, Gattorn, a Bush backer, sees eye to eye with Park Mayor Palmer Heenan who supported Kemp during the Michigan Republican caucuses this spring.

Heenan said he is not very active in this campaign, but he has offered his support for Bush monetarily.

Heenan notes that the public has heard criticism about Bush before, but noted that the shock value of hearing what he called the "truth" about the Dukakis administration in Massachusetts will have more of an effect.

"When his record there comes out. I think it will be more hardhitting," Heenan said.

He points to a recent Detroit News editorial that said Dukakis used a variety of questionable methods to make it appear as though he were balancing the state budget.

"He (Dukakis) is borrowing from an under-funded state pension fund to make up part of the state deficit," Heenan said. "He also borrowed from next year's highway funds in order to balance the budget. This is not running the government of Massachusetts efficiently.'

Joan Woodhouse, a Shores resident, was the Reagan/Bush chairman for the 14th District in 1980 and was the district's Bush chairman in the primary that

She said she is not active in this campaign, but feels Bush's chances are very good.

something he has been preparing for his whole life. (Jimmy) Carter was a kind, good person, but I think he was overwhelmed when he got to the White House. Dukakis is good as governor of a state, but he has no experience when it comes to foreign policy.'

Woodhouse would like to see Wyoming Sen. Alan Simpson get the vice presidential nod from

"He has the lightness, the ability to use his language in a very relaxed way that will appeal to voters," Woodhouse said.
"He is more off-the-cuff in a positive way which will offset Bush's somewhat stiff speaking style. He would show another side of Bush's personality.'

Bill Brucker, a Farms attorney, is a precinct delegate in the 14th District and is running again for the spot this year.

Brucker, who has been a precinct delegate for 10 years, said he feels Bush's chances are good, but that he will have to work very hard to win.

"Dukakis is an excellent opponent," Brucker said. "This will require the Republican Party to work as hard has ever to defeat him in November.'

Brucker said he will take an active role as the 14th District leadership asks of him.

"Being a worker you wait to hear when and how they want to use you," Brucker said. "In our area I'm sure I'll be making fundraising calls and handing out literature. It has worked well in the past."

Brucker said he has no idea who Bush will choose for a running mate.

"I want to see the strategy behind the decision," he said. "It should be very interesting.

Republican activist W. Clark Durant, a lawyer and Park resident, said he has been raising money for state and congressional Republican candidates and doing whatever he can for the party.

'Bush's chances are very good," he said. "He clearly offers a positive program and specific steps for further economic growth and accountability and choice in education."

Durant, too, points to what he calls the "horrendous record" of Dukakis as governor of Massachusetts.

"He has had five tax increases, never balanced a capital budget and is borrowing from an under-funded pension plan and accelerating certain tax collections to try and make it appear as though he is being fiscally responsible.

Durant offered three reasons why Bush will be sucessful in the fall. He said that Bush instinctively knows that to bring about growth one must lower taxes and cut government spending, Bush is not a protectionist

"Bush is very prepared for the when it comes to foreign trade job," Woodhouse said. "This is as is Dukakis, and he will support freedom fighters in Central America or anywhere else.

"Dukakis will renege on the American promise to the rest of the world to support and encourage other democracies around the globe," Durant said.

Durant called the Democratic National Convention in Altanta a "convention of deceit."

They were afraid to after the 'L' word." Durant said. "They were afraid to say uberalism."

He said he was not surprised that Bush is bugging behind Dukakis in the polls. He noted that Reagan was behind Carter in the polls in 1980, and that public opinion is always shifting.

"The only poll that matters is the one on Nev 8," Intrant said

Attorney Robert Novitke, a Woods city councilman and a precinct delegate, said that he feels Bush's chances in Novem-



When it comes to serving soup, Campbell's could be called an expert on the subject. It then seems only fitting that one of the world's most prestigious collections of 18th and early 19th century porcelain and silver tableware relating to the serving of soup would belong to the Campbell Museum.

For the first time this collection of decorative arts will be on exhibit at the Edsel & Eleanor Ford House Aug. 10 through Oct. 9.

Making its way around the United States and foreign countries, with previous stops in Paris, Brussels, Milan, Tokyo, and most recently in New York City, the 100-piece "Kings, Queens and Soup Tureens" exhibit consists of artistic treasures made in more than 18 countries. These objects are on loan from the permanent collection of the Campbell Museum in Camden, N.J., which receives over 30,000 visitors annually.

There will be samples of European, American and Chinese porcelain, earthenware and silver on display. Items included are soup tureens, bowls, plates and spoons from some of the world's most famous manufacturers, including Sevres, Meissen, Wedgewood, Royal Copenhagen and Worcester, as well as examples of Chinese Export.

Several of the large ceramic tureens have been produced in the shapes of various vegetables and fowl, including roosters, hens and swans.



There's a growing public concern about lead in our environment. To increase our customer's awareness on this public health issue we are reprinting in part information published by The Detroit Water and Sewerage Department in their notice on this subject.

"Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform you of the potential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done even though your water may not be in violation of the current standard.

THE PROBLEM WITH LEAD

Lead is a soft toxic metal known to be harmful to human health if inhaled or ingested. Lead accumulates in the body and its potential for harm depends upon the amount of exposure. Low levels of lead exposure can cause subtle biochemical changes.

"EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system, and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short-term exposure, is to young children and pregnant women.'

There are three potential sources for lead to accumulate in the body: food consumption, airborne pollutants and the third potential source is from your drinking water.

"The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) sets drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.050 parts per million (ppm). Based on new health information, EPA is likely to lower this standard sig-

The water provided by the City of Grosse Pointe is purchased from and supplied by Grosse Pointe Farms. The Farms has had this water supply tested for lead by the Michigan Department of Public Health and the results indicate lead was NOT detected.

YOU SHOULD KNOW

Although the water the City provides has no presence of lead - the opportunity for lead to leach into your water supply is still possible.

Typically, lead gets into your water after leaving the water treatment plant. The most likely source of lead contamination is the home or residence plumbing system.

The most common cause is corrosion (a reaction between the water and the lead pipes or solder.)

"Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest:

• If your home or water system has lead pipes, or If your home has copper pipes soldered with lead, and

• If the home is less than five years old, or

• If you have soft water, or • If the water sits in the pipes for several hours without use."

IN THE HOME

Up to the 1900's it was common practice in some areas of the United States, to use lead pipes for interior plumbing. Galvanized and then copper pipes replaced lead pipes however lead solder was used to join these copper pipes.

You can tell if lead pipes are in your home by scratching the pipe with a house key or screwdriver. Lead is a dull grey metal. Lead is soft enough to be easily scratched and will become shiny when

TO MINIMIZE EXPOSURE

You can minimize exposure to this potential problem for you and your family if you:

- Flush each cold water faucet by allowing the vater to run until the water is as cold as it will get. Do this whenever water has been setting in pipes for more than a few hours (such as overnight). This usually takes about 2 minutes. Flushing is important because the water that comes out after flushing has not been in extended contact with lead pipes or lead solder that may be in your household. (Flushing water may be used for non-consumption purposes such as washing dishes, clothes, flushing toilets, or other household tasks; it need not be wasted).
- Never cook or consume water from the hot water faucet. Hot tap water can contain higher levels of lead because lead dissolves more easily in hot water. It is especially important to avoid using hot water from the faucet when preparing baby formula. If you need hot water for consumption for cooking draw water from the cold tap and heat it on the stove or in the microwave. Use only thoroughly flushed water from the cold tap for any consumption.
- It is now a federal law that all material used for repairs or newly installed plumbing be lead-free. Make sure you check with your plumber before any work is done.

The water provided by the City is in compliance with current and proposed future U.S. EPA lead level limitations for safe drinking water.

If individuals would like their water tested to determine whether there is a problem with their internal system, reputable private laboratories are available to provide such tests.

With a name like Tom's Ovster Bar and a respectable selection of seafood, it's not surprising that the restaurant has a nautical theme.

What is surprising, however, is that there isn't a fishing net or foghorn in sight. There is a collection of New Yorker magazine covers on the walls and some posters, all nautical. And there are burgees - about 60 representing yacht clubs from all over the world. Most of them are from customers, according to owner Tom Brandel.

"I was looking for something unique and I wanted to keep it nautical," he said. A friend who had been saving New Yorker magazines for 10 years let him go through the collection and take out those he wanted.

The decor gives it the feel of an old New York saloon. Adding to the ambiance is a piano player who entertains nightly at an upright that straddles the line separating the bar from the dining room.

But ambiance is third in what customers want when they go out to eat, according to Brandel. The first two are good service and good food and they go almost hand-in-hand, he said.

Brandel, who has a degree in marketing, said that's what it's all about - identifying your market and appealing to it.

"Too often people try to make their business comfortable for themselves and it appeals to nobody."

It's obvious that Brandel knows what he's talking about. In his 20 years in the business, he's had several successful restaurants.

The first one he opened in

Street Too near the Cultural Center in 1976.

The following year, he sold the original Union Street which then went through a couple of owners before it reverted back to him in 1984. After months of renovation, he opened in March 1985 under the name of Tom's Oyster

He said it was difficult trying to run two restaurants with different concepts and different menus, so he sold Union Street Too in 1986 and concentrated on finishing the kitchen at Tom's. A raw bar up until then, the business began offering complete dinners in April 1987.

"The concept of this place is not to have complex creations," 1972 in the same spot he's in Brandel said. "Everything is now was Union Street. It was so simple. The fish is very, very

successful he opened Union fresh and it's prepared either grilled or sauteed. We recommend people just put some fresh lemon on.

There are no printed menus. only a chalkboard in the center of the dining room that is lowered and changed daily.

"This is really to the advantage of both the customer and me. I don't want to overstock on any particular item and if we run out, we erase it off the board."

Brandel did not plan to go into the restaurant business. He grew up in Saginaw and went to Ferris where he graduated in 1966.

He got a job with American Oil Co. and said he didn't like working for a large corporation. So he went into the Army and when he got out in 1968, he accepted his first management position in the restaurant business. He stayed at the Maple House in Birmingham for four years and then bought his own business.

The entrees for one day included yellow fin tuna for \$10.95, shrimp and scallop saute for \$8.95, shrimp creole for for \$10.95 and crab cakes for

Ther's also steak for \$10.95 and ground round for \$3.50... Meals come with redskin potatoes, corn on the cob and cole slaw. The raw bar had oysters from Virginia, Connecticut, Long Island and Prince Edward. They are \$1.15 to \$1.25 each, \$5.95 to \$6.95 for a half dozen and \$9.95 to \$10 for a dozen.

There's full liquor service with five beers on draft and 25 bottled beers. The wine list offers a dozen wines by the glass or bottle and another 18 by the bottle

He employs about 15 people. Tom's opens every day at 5 p.m. The dining room with 12 tables holds 48 people and another 20 \$8.95, grouper for \$9.95, marlin at the bar. The business doesn't take reservations. Visa, MasterCharge and American Express are accepted.

> Next month, Brandel hopes to open an adjoining dining room with nine tables and new restrooms. The old ones will be taken out to expand the kitchen. The restaurant will also be accessible to the handicapped.

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

be charged with a high misdemeanor or low felony.'

Often a prisoner caught in a stolen car may be charged with car theft which is a felony. He may later plead guilty to the lesser charge of receiving and concealing stolen property, which is a misdemeanor.

"Without having somewhere to put this guy, he would be out on probation and back on the street," Ferber said.



"If they don't have the money to pay a fine and you can't put them in jail," Rumora said, "you put them right back out on the

they deserve to go to jail. You have to take them off the road."

Schneider said that while outstate facilities provide a way to incarcerate a person who deserves to be behind bars, there are programs closer to home which do work. She said that the Wayne County Sheriff's Department Alternative Workforce Program allows her the opportunity to sentence someone to weekend community service work.

The program uses convicted misdemeanants to pick up trash on the expressways and to do various other jobs, such as cleaning up county parks on weekends. Those sentenced to this community service must pay for the privilege if they can afford it.

"You run into a problem when you have someone who is violent has a record of violent crimes," Schneider said. "This person would not fit in in that type of situation and needs to be behind bars."

the outstate option four times in the past four months, and has been pleased with the results.

"Shoplifters would definitely be eligible for this," Schneider said. "If you keep letting people go, your officers start to say, 'What's the use?' You send people to jail for two reasons — to protect society and as a deterrent to those who are thinking about committing that crime.'

Patterson said he is upset with Wayne County officials for not having the foresight to adequately house its own prisoners. He said that the recent passage of the one mill to build a new jail facility might help, but there will still be a problem.

"We built a new jail a few years ago and that was overcrowded when it opened," Patterson said. "I don't doubt that that will be the case when we build another new jail.'

He said it is a little like making reservations at a Holiday Inn when he tries to find lodging for prisoner's outstate.

"I called up Huron County the other day and was told they had seven beds," Patterson said, "so I reserved three beds.'

Rumora said it may take more effort to get prisoners in jail up north, but that in the end it is essential that they do.

"You just can't let them out," he said, "because then it's a joke - a mockery."

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Digging deep

Farms' Ford is new to the top job at Red Cross, but has a long history of helping the organization assist those in need

■ohn B. Ford III dug deep in his pocket and pulled out 35 cents. It was all he had and he gave it to the Detroit Community Fund and the American Red Cross.

The year was 1933 and Ford, then 9-years-old, came home proudly with a receipt for his 35cent contribution and a Red

Cross membership button.

Fifty-five years later, Ford, a resident of Grosse Pointe Farms, is now chairman of the Southeastern Michigan Chapter of the American Red Cross. He still has the receipt with a handwritten note from his mother testifying that "Johnny gave all he had in his pockets!

At the time of his 35-cent gift, fundraising for almost his entire hold the top volunteer leadership

nual meeting in June. Ford became involved with the United Foundation, the primary source of funding for the Red Cross in southeastern Michigan, in the 1950s. But it was not until the late 1970s that he began to develop an intense personal interest in the work of the Red

Ford's first wife, hospitalized in Florida for treatment of cancer in 1979, needed blood transfusions daily. The Red Cross provided the blood platelets Ford's wife needed, making him intensely aware of the needs of the Red Cross blood program.

Following his wife's death, Ford was approached by Red Cross member Florie Muir of Grosse Pointe Farms. He was asked to help raise funds for construction of an addition to the Southeastern Michigan Chapter and Regional Blood Services Headquarters in Detroit. Ford credits Muir for his Red Cross career, which has included chairmanship of the Financial Development Committee.

Ford, who has an extensive international business background and speaks five languages, begins his term of office during the celebration of the 125th anniversary of the International Red Cross movement.

"We are not just another local not-for-profit oprganization," Ford says. "We are part of the most widely known, highly respected humanitarian movement in the history of the world. We must always be guided by the principles of that international movement.

"And we must look for ways to extend our influence beyond our own local community - to play a vital role in carrying out the Red Cross mission of helping people in need, without regard to their nationality, race, religious beliefs, class or political opin-

Ford cites the current critical situation in Africa as one of the major international challenges facing the Red Cross. "Thousands of individuals, cor-

porations, foundations and religious organizations gave whatever they could to the African Famine Appeal in 1984-85," Ford says. "From the contents of piggy banks to corporate dollars. Thousands of lives were saved. But today, Africa again faces a crisis. Drought, often described as worse than in 1984-85, and civil strife threaten millions of people. The drought in this country is a severe economic crisis. In Africa, more than failed farms and higher food prices are at stake. In Africa, it's a matter of life and death."

The International Red Cross has issued a \$20 million appeal to help the victims of drought and conflict and to avert another devastating famine. The American Red Cross has been asked to raise \$3.5 million. The Southeastern Michigan Chapter's goal is to raise \$400,000, almost the entire amount from foundations and other major donors, many of whom made those generous contributions to the 1984-85 appeal.

"While the Red Cross will not conduct an active public fundraising campaign in southeastern Michigan, we will attempt to inform people about the current situation in Africa and about the role of Red Cross in the relief effort," Ford says.

Movie is an insult

Columnist Pat Buchanan recently wondered, in print, if Hollywood would dare produce a film with similar lewd and defamatory speculations about any other revered religious leader. Of course any studio would have the constitutional right to produce such a film, but it wouldn't happen because in our day we have to be "sensitive" to people's feelings about things they revere. Unless they happen to be Christians, evidently. I think that Buchanan's observation is right on the mark. I've got a couple of observations of my

If you are upset about this film, I want to ask: "What did you expect from Hollywood?" Over two centuries ago the great hymn writer Issac Watts wrote this line: "Is this vile world a friend to grace, to help me on to God?" In one way, I'm glad that MCA-Universal decided to produce this film; their action reminds Christians that the powers of this world are no friends of Christ.

Even Hollywood entertainment that is popular and well received by Christians is often full of delusion. The "Star Wars" trilogy, for example, is loaded with George Lucas' unbiblical New Age philsophy. Lucas has every right to be a disciple of Joseph Campbell and to propound his ideas on film, but I think that it is unfortunate that so many Christians have been dazzled by the special effects and not thought about the underlying religious philsophy of these films - a philosophy that finds a god within every man and makes the cross of Christ unnecessary. In the production of "The Last Temptation of Christ" Hollywood is unmasked.

I counsel those of you are are enraged about this film to be calm and confident. The psalmist wrote in Psalm 2 "Why are the nations in an uproar, and the people devising a vain thing? . . . He who sits in the heavens laughs, the Lord scoffs at them.'

Some of the literature I've received from Christians concerning this film as well as other issues make it sound like one more defeat and the cause of Christ is finished. That is ridiculous. The cause of Christ is already won, and God reigns forever as sovereign over all.

That is the hope that has sustained the church through its darkest days; it is the hope that kept the martyrs singing in victory even as they offered up their lives.

Pointe cleric remembers Dearden

The late Cardinal John Dearden was a complex man and a dedicated priest, one with a gentle wit and a total devotion to the Catholic Church, according to Monsignor Francis X. Canfield, pastor of St. Paul Catholic Church in Grosse Pointe Farms

Dearden, who died at age 80 on Aug. 1, was remembered this week by Canfield, a longtime as-

"Yes, I knew him quite well. I was in charge of transportation for the archdiocese when he arrived in Detroit from Pittsburgh, so I actually got to meet him the moment he touched Detroit soil," Canfield explained. In 1963, then Archbishop Dearden appointed Canfield rector of Sacred Heart Seminary, where the two remained in constant contact.

"He was a complex character. He also was a very gentle, very spiritual man. Because of his many duties, he often appeared to the world to be cool and aloof, but in reality, he was very warm, very genuine," Canfield

Dearden was also very person-

ally changed by Vatican II, which brought sweeping reforms to the Catholic church, Canfield added. "He was an important influence to the very essence of church government. And his involvement in various councils and commissions put him in the middle of a real swirl of response.

"Some of that response was favorable and some, of course, was very unfavorable. So he had to cope with shots from every angle. And he did it with great steadiness and poise," Canfield recalled.

Dearden was seen by many throughout the world as the American church's leading prelate. He was elected first president of the National Conference of Catholic Bishops, led the Congregation for Divine Worship and set up the Archdiocese of Detroit's Pastoral Council.

After guiding the Detroit and American church through its most trying time, Dearden retired in 1980, citing failing health.

"What emerged from the entire process was a full man. A man with a great sense of humor, and most importantly, a true man of the church. And it had not been easy for him. We, as Catholics, tend sometimes to think of the ways of the church as set in stone. When Vatican II showed us that was not so, those who were involved - including Cardinal Dearden - were the targets.

"And it did effect the cardinal. I heard him say once that 'it used to be fun to be a bishop.' That, I think, says it all."

Canfield noted that he would most remember his friend and colleague's "deep spirituality" and his "loyalty to the Catholic church."

'The church was his total life. I often wondered if the man ever had a day off. And I like to think, now that he's at rest, that it's now fun for him once more.'

What to do when the memory just isn't what it used to be

So you forgot where you put your keys and you can't remember if your luncheon date is tomorrow or next week. You sigh and remind yourself that poor memory is one of the penalties you pay for living a long life.

Sorry, but that excuse won't wash anymore. Experts have found that the difference in what older people remember and what the young remember is very small. In a study done by Roger Dixon of the Max Planck Institute for Human Behavior and Education in West Berlin, the abilities of people in their 30s t recall a short text was compared with those in their 60s. It was radio with its high fidelity high verbal skills, there was little difference.

Beyond the assurance that poor memory is not part of the aging process, such studies provide evidence that older people can go on learning as long as the desire to acquire new skills and interests remains. It may be that it is possible for them to get more out of learning because they bring to the subject a background of living experience.

The older person who has lived through four wars will have a broader base of understanding of the effect of war on people and nations than a younger student whose acquaintance with American history is limited to lectures and the writ-

"The Grapes of Wrath" studied as literature will have more meaning to a reader who has lived through the Depression years than one who is experiencing the deprivation and hardships of that era vicaciously through a novel

It is this portfolio of living experience that could account for the differences experts found in the process of remembering between younger and older people. They found that younger people remembered the facts of a story but older people were better at remembering the point of a story. This seems to be logical since younger people have little to go on but facts while someone who has lived many years can computerize facts into in- subconscious memory and sort them into a pattern that leads to a conclusion based on life experi-

And what a wealth of experience the older generation of the 1980s have to draw on! If there is one word that characterizes this century, it is change change so rapid that it is remarkable that those who have lived through it have been able to assimilate it. Besides the perbirths, mar sonal changes

Closely aligned with memory is intelligence. The capacity to remember is an asset in learning new skills and assimilating knowledge gained from experience. Making sound judgements rests with intelligence. While the ability to think quickly may slow down with age, intelligence does not diminish. Ship to shore

Boaters like being out on the water to get away from the hustle and bustle of the city.

The water relaxes and soothes tired souls, and gives respite from the hectic activity of making a living. But, once in a while, the time comes when we want to get in touch with someone onshore, or someone on shore may need to get in touch with a boater. How do we do it? How do we make a ship-to-

shore phone call? AT & T Bell's system discontinued the Special Operator Service Team in August 1987. It became too difficult to contact marine operators from land phones, and a slow and tedious process to contact the few marine operators from a ship's radio. The break up of the AT & T network had its repercussions

Today, if you want to call a boat from a land-based phone, first contact the operator by dialing O. Ask the operator to connect you to the marine operator in either Detroit or Port Huron, where the only two remaining Michigan Bell marine operators are stationed. The marine operator will attempt to place the call.

Placing the call to a boat in Canadian waters is a bit more complicated. Basically, you follow the same procedure as for Michigan, except that the Michigan Bell Marine Operator will put you in contact with an Ontario Bell special service operator, who in turn will put you in contact with the Canadian Coast Guard radio/telephone operator closest to the boat you desire to talk to.

Besides these two methods, there are numerous independent stations that operate during the summer months to serve boaters. They are listed in the Marine Radio-Telephone User's Hanbook. This book is well worth having as it gives the radio-telephone user useful and valuable information.

Boaters wishing to call a land phone from their boats call one of the Michigan Bell Marine Operators on channel 26 or 28 on the ship's VHF radio. If you should forget the channel, refer to the handbook. The marine operator will then place your call. Billing can be with a credit card, or collect as well as other billing options the regular Michigan Bell customer would receive.

Boaters also have Lorain Meritel available to them. Lorain Meritel is the largest VHF/FM radio/telephone system in the Great Lakes. It has operator stations in Chicago and Ottawa, Ill., as well as Lorain, Ohio. It also transmits from 14 remote sites in the Lakes.

A boater wishing to utilize the Lorain Meritel system would first locate the station on the ship's radio. Contact can be made by holding down the button on the microphone for 15 seconds. When you hear the ringing sound, hold the button down again for a brief moment. By doing this, the auto system knows that you are in line, so to speak. Between rings, listen for the operator to answer. Once you are in contact, the operator will place the call. Meritel offers users of its service their own credit card, and honors telephone credit cards.

The person calling from shore to ship, using the Meritel system, would first call the control station in Ottawa, Ill. The Meritel operator may tap into one of the previously mentioned methods, or make contact directly, depending on where the boat is located.

Several things to remember:

Scan the radio frequencies to locate the proper channel and then listen to make sure the channel is not already in use. Listen for a while because you may not be able to hear both sides of a conversation before you attempt to make contact.

Purhase the Marine Radio/Telephone User's Handbook. To do so, write Radio Technical Commission for Maritime Services, P.O. Box 19087, Washington, D.C., 20036.

Remember when calling a Canadian Coast Guard station, that many of the stations are remote transmitters, operated from a different location than the one designated. You should hail the operator using the name of the mast station. Remember also, that ship-to-shore and vice-versa calls are a low priority. Search and rescue, weather and safety are the primary concerns of the Canadian Coast Guard.

The Michigan Bell operators will not call back at regular intervals if contact is not made. You must reinstitute the calling procedure.

Remember, this is a gigantic party line in which everyone can listen in. Be courteous.

The Marine operators are there to assist you. Give them as much information as you can, be courteous and considerate, and you will have a successful chat with home or friends afloat.



Along with measuring your blood pressure and telling you the reading, the doctor will have you to reach as you stay on your treament.

How long? You may want to know when you can expect to reach your goal. Feel free to ask, but keep in mind that every person is different. For example, it may take several weeks or months to reduce your craving for salty foods, losing weight or finding the right dosage of medication for you.

Start small

Think big, but start small. It's unrealistic to expect success with several changes at once. Pick one and work on it until you've tor's appointment, don't waste mastered it. Then add a second, and so on.

Speak up

Ask questions. If you do not When you walk in, simply say understand exactly what you are expected to do or how to go

Proper diet is best vitamin

Vitamins for children come in more sizes, shapes and colors than all the animals in the zoo. Too often it appears that the array of brands are limited only by the work of artists at Warner Brothers and Hanna-Barbera to come up with new characters.

The exaggerated promotion of children's vitamins has made many parents wonder if giving supplements to their kids serves

any purpose. The original, best and usual vitamin packages are foods. A well-balanced diet should supply all the necessary vitamins for a growing child, but diets are easily unbalanced by food-finickiness, a run of illness or food related allergies. So how do you know whether your child needs vitamin supplements?

the importance of a well-balanced diet," Silverberg said. With a diet that includes the four basic food groups, a child should need very few vitamins supplements. If a child isn't eating a sensible diet for some reason, even large doses of multiple vitamins can't protect a child against problems.

While some may argue many of the brightly colored chewables "I try to emphasize to parents on the market are not good because they contain too much sugar as well as additives, Scott says that is hogwash. It is his feeling that the small amount of sugar in the tablets is nothing that can cause any trouble.

Silverberg says when selecting vitamins, careful label reading is what is important. "It is best to find a supplement," she said, "that has 100 percent of the RDA recommendations.

She counsels parents to look for brands that contain no added sugar, starch, or coloring.

For most people the key to getting and staying in shape is to fit exercise into their lives. For others exercise is taken to an extreme and their lives become centered around staying fit. According to a report in Health magazine, if you're a regular aerobic exerciser the odds may be as high as 75 percent that you are addicted.

Webster's Dictionary defines an addict as "someone devoted to or given up to a particular habit." Although experts are now unanimous that keeping fit can prevent heart disease and prolong life, how much exercise remains controversial. Most would praise exercise addiction, but according to Dr. Connie Chan, assistant professor of human services at the University of Massachusetts in Boston, a positive addiction can quickly turn negative.

How do you know if you're a fitaholic? Are you compulsive about your exercise routine, or irritable if you miss a workout? Do you brave your daily run through blizzards or 120- degree give up your scheduled exercise even though it may interfere with relationships, work, or your

could mean that you're possibly moving in the wrong direction with your workout and need to re-evaluate the importance of exercise in your life.

According to John Somers, athletic trainer with Cottage Hospital Athletic Medicine Program, (CHAMP), exercise becomes unhealthy when an athlete is governed by an obsessive need to achieve some desired ideal of behavior.

"The danger enters in," said Somers, "when a person's exercising goes from being a personal choice to a need." The athlete may not just desire to exercise but actually require it to face a tense situation, Sommers added.

Somers believes that for the most part an obsession with working out is nothing to get worked up about. It is his feeling that unlike an addiction to drugs or alcohol, which destroy the mind or pickle the liver, a fitness fanatic strengthens both his brain and his body.

There are some "recreational" athletes, observed Somers, who push themselves to the point of injuries such as shin splints or stress fractures then refuse to rest and recuperate, creating heat waves? One popular, but unproved theory he gave is that athletes become fixed on endorphins, the body's natural pain killers, - which flow into the brain and

the bloodstream during strenuous workouts. "Exercisers," said Somers, "get hooked on the euphoria, often referred to as "runner's high." He also believes that endorphins may contribute to exercise addiction because of the dulling effect they have on the pain of aching muscles or broken bones that would otherwise advise athletes they are overdoing it.

Another explanation offered is that exercise eventually becomes much more than a means of recreation or form of staying fit. Devotion to exercise results from stress reduction and the sense of achievement the workout awards. Exercise zealots tend to be overall compulsive people who get hooked on a sense of control and their ability to attain a particular goal.

According to a study published in Psychology Today, potential addicts develop a heady sense of control over their bodies and feel invincible when working out. These athletes tend to be intense individuals whose job may not often produce quantifiable results, and in their increasing mileage and "personal bests" they discover a new source of measurable achievement.

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According to Chan, a majority being are on the edge of addiction.

If you think you're a fitaholic, sensing that your exercise program has become an obsession of the mind and a compulsion of the body, you can take steps to manage your mania.

One important first step is to have variety. Give yourself an opportunity to take a day off your regular workout and schedule another activity instead. Try to do something that does not involve exercise like watching a movie or reading a book. If it's hard to cut exercise out of your day, at least try substituting a less intense activity like taking a leisurely walk. Adding variety will help you to get away from your rigid, compulsive routine.

Another measure to take is to

cut back slowly. By reducing exercise time or taking rest days you'll have more time to spend on other activities. If possible, take a vacation where you geographically remove yourself from your usual setting. While you're away from your normal routine you should be able to see things a little differently and your thoughts will be diverted in a way that doesn't occur at your familiar surroundings.

Finally, find another way to let off your steam. Talk to someone that you feel comfortable with. If you do not have a person you're close enough with, seek a competent counselor. Sommers assures that "compulsive athletes do not need to give up exercise, they just need to put it in perspective.

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
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
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
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
