Shine named deputy superintendent

The Grosse Pointe school board unanimously approved the appointment of Edward J. Shine, South High School principal, as the new deputy superintendent Aug. 24.

Shine, 45, has been with the school system since 1985, when he moved to Grosse Pointe from Fairfield, Conn. where he was headmaster of Roger Ludlowe High School.

"I am very honored and very pleased," Shine said. "I am excited about the potential for the school district to have a deputy superintendent again.'

At the same time, the board named Rena DeRidder as the new principal of Ferry Elementary School.

DeRidder is currently an elementary principal in Menominee, Mich., and was also a teacher and principal in Florence, Wis. She will be at Ferry's helm when school begins Sept. 7.

Shine replaces Joseph Spagnoli as deputy superintendent. Spagnoli was named special assistant to the superintendent after a controversy over administrative evaluations. Spagnoli's contract with the district was not renewed by the school board

"It's absolutely delightful Superintendent John Whritter said of Shine's appointment. "It's a wonderful addition to the department, particularly with the strengths he brings to the position and to the community. He is an exceptional human being and I am looking forward to Jan. 1 and having him here full time."


Though a national search was conducted along with looking at local candidates, the board decided on Shine.

"I'm delighted," board President Jon Gandelot said. "He has demonstrated he can do some forward thinking and has good relations with the staff. He has knowledge of the curriculum and education and I think it's just an excellent choice."

Whritner said that a search will now begin for a new South High principal.

"We will be going for a na-tional search," Whritner said. 'There are some strong people inside for the job, and it is our hope to balance those with outside candidates.

"We hope to have someone in the South position by Dec. 1 if possible," Whritner said. He added the goal would be to have some overlap between the time


Recently Shine has been the driving force behind the district's new strategic planning efforts. He went through weeks of train-

"The job of a hospice is to give people dying a little bit of dignity.'

Those are the words of Park resident Carolyn Fitzpatrick-Cassin who will, on Sept. 7, take the controls of one of the oldest hospice organizations in the United States, the Hospice of Southeastern Michigan, with offices in St. Clair Shores, Detroit and Southfield.

In her new position as chief executive officer, Fitzpatrick-Cassin will not be involved as much on a day-to-day basis with those the hospice serves. Instead, she will be overseeing the general operation and making sure the patients end their days as they want to, and with dignity.

Fitzpatrick-Cassin has been with hospice organizations since they first became an important alternative in the health care field. While in health care in Battle Creek, she was asked to be on a commission, sponsored in the late 1970s by the Kellogg Foundation, to study the hospice alternative.

At that time there were only about 40 hospices in the United States, three in Michigan.

When the foundation decided it would donate money for a hospice, Fitzpatrick-Cassin was chosen as the director, it was a study program, with a community focus.

"It was great, it allowed me to get in on the ground floor of the movement, with money to experiment and get things going," she said.

The foundation also gave grants to the Joint Commission on the Accreditation of Hospices to establish standards of hospice care, and to the National Hospice Organization to begin a program of education and training.


The Battle Creek hospice was a success, and at the end of the three-year grant, Fitzpatrick-Cassin worked for the National

Hospice Organization as president, and as chairman of the board.

For the past few years she has been hopscotching the country and the world as a consultant on hospice programming, getting funding, presenting testimony to both the Michigan and United States legislatures, and speaking to groups and hosting workshops on hospice care.

She came to the Hospice of Southeastern Michigan first as a consultant, and when the president of that organization resigned to pursue other interests. Fitzpatrick-Cassin got the job.

This hospice was developed along the lines of those in England, under the idea that a hospice is a place, but the Battle Creek introductory program, which Fitzpatrick-Cassin had

run, was created with a different philosophy.

"Hospice is not a place, but a form of care," she said. "That is why the home care program is so important. That's how the Battle Creek program developed, and the rest of the country developed along the model I worked with.

"Three or four years ago, this program was out of sync with the rest of the country, because it was focused on inpatient care," she said. "This is one of the best inpatient hospices around." But the home care program needed to be developed.

Today, there are 15 patients in the inpatient program at Mount Carmel Mercy Hospital in Detroit, and some 93 scattered around the area in the home care program.

The two programs are differ-

served, because as Fitzpatrick-Cassin stresses, hospice is a way of treating the terminally ill.

The idea behind hospice is that death should be handled with dignity," she said. "It's not something that should be hidden away, and hidden from children. The more we understand, the more we can accept death as an integral part of life.

"In this forward-thinking young culture, we don't think about death," she added. "But it's something we all need to face and deal with.'

Those who contact the hospice have a terminal illness, and a prognosis of less than six months left. "They come here only after the medical community has come to the prognosis that there isn't anything else they can do."

Fitzpatrick Cassin said studies show there are a number of fears among dying people: The first is that there will be a great amount of pain in death, and the second is that they will die alone.

"Our first goal is always to make them, comfortable," she said. The medical staff for the organization dispenses high amounts of pain killers, orally so the patients don't have to endure the pain of injections, and other drugs to control the symptoms of the particular disease.

The family is an integral part of the treatment, too.

'We get a sense from the family as to what the hospice's role is to be for both the patients and the families. It's a lot more therapeutic and helpful for them to go through (the death process) ogether," she said. "We try to take everybody's needs into account, yet we still must keep the focus on the patient."

A wide network of nurses, counselors and clerics talks with patients and their families, helping them deal with the large changes taking place.

"For many people, it's a time when they question their spirituality, and we are there to help them," Fitzpatrick-Cassin said. "But some people will say

what we really give them is simply the practical support," she said. "The support of having

ent only in where the people are someone in the home and taking care of things like laundry, cleaning or cooking a meal."

And that's where the "couple of hundred" volunteers come in. They are extensively trained during an eight-week session.

"The volunteers don't have to be medical people, but they do have to be trained, because they see everything," she said.

In addition to taking care of various chores around the house, many volunteers are just there to listen, and to care, Fitzpatrick-Cassin added.

"The volunteers really hold the program together. They are the essence of our program," she said.

The volunteers do what they do because it is a wonderful way for self-growth, and to know they made a difference. Much the same reason that Fitzpatrick-Cassin stays with hospice organizations.

"I do it because nothing I've ever thought about doing would ever be as fulfilling to me. I get a sense of accomplishment, where I can see the results, and have direct gratification knowing we're making people's lives better on a minute-by-minute basis. Where else can you do that?"

Fitzpatrick Cassin lives in the Park with her husband, Dr. Bader Cassin, and three children.

"The arbitration is binding on both sides," Caretti said. "What you have is an outsider imposing restrictions on the department and sometimes those restrictions are very difficult to live with."

Sometimes an arbitrated decision can make for ill-will within a department.

Caretti said that the command officers had settled with the city prior to the patrol officers going through arbitration. What developed was a different schedule for paid days off which gave patrol officers a slightly better deal.

'Yes, I think the command officers were a little upset at the union leadership for suggesting that they settle when they did," Caretti said. "There are no bad feelings within the department, but that is the kind of thing that happens when you go to arbitration.'

Park Lt. David Hiller has been a negotiator for the Park's Fraternal Order of Police Lodge No. 102 for 14 years. More recently he was named president

"The biggest thing here and in any department," Hiller said, "is that the men and women want

fair treatment." Hiller said that over the years police officers have gotten away from trying to negotiate a large salary increase, and have been concentrating more on the fringe benefit package and retirement.

"The unions always take a look at what is happening in the surrounding communities," Hiller said. "They look at what is happening in departments throughout Wayne and Macomb counties. The younger guys today don't just want money in their pockets. They are looking to the future. They want deferred compensation, paid hospitalization upon retirement and better working conditions."

cently ratified contracts for its police and office workers' unions. Both the police and Local 1121 ratified contracts earlier this month and the council approved them at a special meeting Aug.

Prior to contract approval, the two unions were without a contract since June 30, 1987, the longest in the city's history, according to City Manager Chester Petersen.

The police contract is a threeyear agreement which includes a 3.5 percent salary increase across the board, retroactive to July 1, 1987. The city has also decreased service requirement for pension availability, and made changes in the insurance package.

At the beginning of the second year of the contract, (July 1, 1988) the members receive a 3 percent increase across the board, and a change in age and service requirements for the pension.

The third year brings a salary

The Woods city council re- increase of 4 percent across the board with increase in life insurance, pension benefits for onduty death, longevity and cost of living bonus.

One major change is that the police union's bargaining unit will now be the Fraternal Order of Police, instead of designated officers from the city's force.

The 1121 contract calls for a 30 cent per hour increase for all current classifications within the bargaining unit, retroactive to July 1, 1987, with the same decrease in service for pension eligibility, and the same insurance package.

Further increases of 30 cents an hour at the beginning of the second year of the contract (July 1, 1988), and 40 cents on July 1, 1989, with the same decreases in service for pension eligibility.

A contract for the commanding sergeants was settled previously. The Woods now has only one contract - that for the EMTs - left to negotiate, Petersen said.

percent of that in salaries and benefits, it is essential that the city do what it can to be fair and at the same time be fiscally responsible.

Solak said that union negotiations do take time. He pointed out that with the formation of a new public safety department being negotiated, wording for the entire contract had to be discussed. Language questions in a contract, he said, are often the most time-consuming part of negotiations.

Hiller noted that while police union negotiations are time-consuming, it is essential for both sides to take their time.

"These are complex issues," Hiller said. "There are no quick solutions. Often just setting calendar dates when all the parties can meet can be a problem. With lawyers involved and the various city officials and the men all having different schedules, it is tough to find a date to meet.'

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

State pushes park upkeep, waste cleanup

Tt is good news for environmentalists and Michigan residents in general that the state Legislature finally is ready to put on the ballot an \$800 million bond issue to finance environmental cleanup and park improvements.

Final action is expected to come next week after a House-Senate conference committee reached agreement on a compromise proposal. Two-thirds of both chambers must approve the plan by Sept. 9 to put it on the Nov. 8 ballot and a majority of voters must support it to authorize the bond sale.

Gov. James Blanchard, who had proposed the bond issue in somewhat different form in his State of the State address last January, hailed the agreement. He said "the people of Michigan have a deep commitment to building a future based on environmental quality and good jobs." He



added that the proposal would "enhance our efforts to improve Michigan's future environmental health and economic strength."

In the compromise, Republicans who had objected to the state's labor policies won assurance in writing that the current policy of paying prevailing union wages for work on environmental projects would not be expanded despite the influx of additional funds.

Under the agreement, the bond sale proposal will be split into two parts: \$660 million for hazardous waste cleanup, solid waste programs and wastewater treatment; and \$140 million for improvement of state and local parks. Of the \$660 million, \$425 million would be used directly to

clean up dumps and other areas contaminated by toxic wastes. The park funds would be split with \$70 million going for improvement of state parks and \$70 million for local recreational projects.

Michigan is reported to be second only to New Jersey in its toxic waste sites. If the bond issue is approved, the money will be used to finance preliminary investigations and surface cleanups of about 600 contaminated sites as well as 60 full investigations and final cleanups, according to Andy Hogarth of the Department of Natural Resources environmental response division.


Some environmentalists were concerned that the delay in legislative approval will threaten passage of the bond issue in November. The Legislature has until Sept. 9 to

place the plan on the ballot, but the late agreement leaves backers less time than they had expected to campaign for public acceptance.

In our view, however, there is a good public perception of the necessity of cleanup of toxic waste sites and the chances are good for approval if the environmentalists can spread the word in time.

Like other states, Michigan was slow to become aware of the threats to public health and the environment caused by the almost indiscriminate disposal of waste materials in earlier days. Now, however, national and state actions brought about by the prodding of environmentalists have awakened the public to the necessity for cleaning up the waste sites and adopting new legislation to protect the land, the forests, the water and the air in the interests both of public health and economic progress.

State Treasurer Robert Bowman offered another hopeful note when he said last week that the state will be able to pay off the bonds from existing revenues, as it does with other bond obligations. That indicates that no new tax levy will be required, which ought to reassure voters on that always significant point.

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Keep gas tax as use tax

se of the federal gasoline tax to help reduce the federal deficit, a proposal supposedly under study by the National Economic Commission, is being stoutly resisted by state highway officials in Michigan and elsewhere in the United States. And for good reason.

The diversion of gasoline tax revenues to other than transportation purposes would violate the principle that the tax is primarily levied on those who use the nation's streets, roads and highways and, as a consequence, the revenues the tax produces should be used to improve those arteries and for other transportation purposes.

Indeed, anyone traveling across Michigan's highways as well as those in other nearby states knows that the major highways need attention and that if the federal gasoline tax is going to be increased, the highways themselves could use the additional revenues.

But a gasoline tax increase is one of the options reportedly being studied by the National Economic Commission which Congress created last year to find ways to reduce the mounting federal deficit. A spokesman for the commission told the Detroit News that the commission has made no recommendations regarding fuel taxes or any other revenue sources but Michigan Transportation Director James Pitz believes there is a possibility of such action and has written a letter to the commission to oppose it. "Michigan and other states around the perimeter of the nation will be hard-hit due to their reliance on transportation for

much of their commerce with the rest of the nation," Pitz wrote to the commission. "In a separate issue, we find that a fuel tax for the purposes of debt reduction would violate a long-established policy of transportation user tax revenue being used for transportation purposes."

Pitz, who is also president-elect of the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials, said the proposal would damage the Michigan economy and restrict highway and mass transit programs in all of the 50 states. Despite the federal commission's denials, state highways officials have heard estimates of a proposed increase in fuel taxes of from 50 cents to \$1 a gallon for debt reduction. The federal tax now is 9 cents a gallon while Michigan assesses an additional 15 cents a gallon, plus a 4 percent sales tax on every \$1 of fuel sold.

Highway officials have had a running battle with the Reagan administration over the allocation of current revenues from fuel taxes. An estimated \$13 billion surplus now exists in the highway trust fund and some Democratic congressmen have contended that the Reagan administration already has diverted some of the surplus to help reduce the federal deficit. It probably is true that an increase in the federal fuel tax would be an easy way to increase revenues to cut the deficit, assuming the proposal could get through Congress, but the question is whether it would be fair to tax highway users for federal spending for many other purposes. Dan Quayle of Indiana about his background and experience after he had been chosen by Vice President George Bush to be his 1988 running mate. Some of the interrogators were guilty of overkill, but it must be remembered that Quayle is not the first candidate for national office to be put on the media grill for good cause.

In fact, two Democrats who had planned to seek the presidential nomination were in effect driven from the race earlier this year by news stories that stemmed from media investigations of their backgrounds and performance. We refer, of course, to former Sen. Gary Hart of Colorado and Sen. Joseph R. Biden of Delaware.

Hart lost much of his support when the news media disclosed his extramarital adventures. And Biden withdrew after the news media reported he had been guilty of plagiarism by using the words of a British politician without attribution.

In the end, however, it was the public response to these charges that ended the hopes of the two Democrats. Whatever merit the accusations had, they did affect public attitudes toward the two aspirants for the presidency. The public found both men wanting in an extremely important presidential attribute: judgment.

It seems to us that the same quality is at issue in the controversy over Sen. Quayle. Here, however, it is the judgment of both Bush and Quayle that is at issue. But so far, it is true, the public appears to be siding with Quayle and Bush and against the media on most questions but not all.





War II, he earned the Legion of Merit as an air combat intelligence officer. While serving as governor from 1949 through 1960, Williams demonstrated his commitment to justice in many ways, not least his appointment of minorities and strong support for laws against racial discrimination in employment and housing.

As assistant secretary of state for African Affairs under President John F. Kennedy, he brought his strong sense of justice to a post that demanded great sensitivity and diplomatic skills, at a time when a number of African nations were just emerging from colonialism.

Williams later served as U.S. Ambassador to the Phillipines. He was elected to the Michigan Supreme Court in 1970, and in 1983, was elevated to chief justice by a vote of his fellow justices.

Following his retirement from the court in 1986, he remained ued to be a strong voice for a





AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 3 OF THE FENCE OR-DINANCE, CODE NO. 11-03, ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE FENCES, WALLS, HEDGES, BUSHES, SHRUBS, TREES AND PLANTING, AND TO REPEAL ORDINANCE NUM-BER 50."

THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE FARMS ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. Section 3 of the Fence Ordinance, Code No. 11-03, enacted as Ordinance No. 93 on December 1, 1952, is hereby amended by deleting said Section 3 in its entirety and inserting the following in substitution thereof:

> Section 3. No fences, walls, hedges, bushes, shrubs, trees or planting shall be erected, planted, maintained or permitted near any street intersection or at the entrance to or along any public or private driveway so as to obstruct the view of operators of vehicles and pedestrians approaching such intersection or entrance or impede safe ingress or egress of vehicles, including emergency vehicles, or their passengers, to the impairment of the safe operation of such vehicles and the safety of the general public.

SECTION 2. Except as hereby amended, Ordinance No. 93, as heretofore amended, shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 3. This Ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after its enactment, or upon its publication, whichever is later.



The red '65 Mustang coupe with black vinyl roof pulled in to the auction lane, but I didn't pay much attention to it. Nicer cars than that had not drawn much bidding. In fact, a beautiful likenew '68 Olds convertible was bid up to only \$3,800, no more than half its value and not enough to buy the car.

I hadn't paid much attention because I was thinking about a dazzlingly white chrome-fes-tooned '69 Studebaker Lark Daytona hardtop on display outside the auction tent (I favor odd stuff) and wondering what it might be worth.

While I daydreamed, the Mustang went on the block at no reserve and sold for \$1,050. It was no jewel, but it wasn't bad and that is cheap for a classic like a '65 Mustang. But it is not my style so I dismissed it from my mind which returned to the Studebaker and a muscular Plymouth Road Runner down the row from it.

My companion broke into my reverie. "Can you believe that? It sold for \$1,500!"

'What?" I looked up and saw a beautiful bronze '64 Mercedes-Benz. Again, not my style, but I had to admit someone really got a bargain, because this was super clean. A Mercedes diesel for the price of an aging Chevy Citation!

The locale was the seventh annual Collector Car. Auction and Muscle Car Show at the Ford Proving Grounds (better knows perhaps as the Packard Proving Grounds) in Utica, staged on a beautiful Saturday in August by Tom Williams Contemporary Classic Cars Auctions. Tom Williams is vice president of Promotions, Inc., Pontiac-based firm which puts on the Autorama custom car show every January in Cobo Hall and similar exhibitions around the United States and Canada. Sponsor of the Utica swap meet and auction was Tom Durocher, owner of Thomas' Street Rods and Restoration, Pontiac.

One of the purposes of the event, in addition to having fun, was to raise money for the fight against muscular dystrophy. It did raise money for that good cause, almost \$7,500. And it was fun

About 100 cars went through the auction lane and about a third of them sold, most at bargain prices. That was not bad, because Detroit is not known as a hot auction area. We are not used to auctions as they are in the South and prairie states, where auctions are a common way of selling.

The auction was run by Emmit Napier, a fast-talking, honey-voiced professional whose job is to keep the bidding moving at a fast pace, to hype the crowd, to get them excited with his auctioneer's chant.

Once in a while he would stop to admonish the crowd when he did not think the bidding was strong enough. "C'mon folks, you're here to buy some cars, not to steal 'em.'

car and it brings a bid of \$5,100, you do not have to sell it. (But the ringman will try to change your mind.) Buyers, of course, like no-reserve cars (so does the auctioneer) and some real bargains can be had, as with the Mustang and the Mercedes.

In fact, there are some major auctions in this area, but they are generally wholesale auctions open only to dealers. Whether you are aware of car auctions or not, they affect you because these auctions are an important basis of used-car price guides.

Auctions have long played an important role in the retail car business. When a new-car dealer takes your old family buggy in trade, there is a very good chance you will never see it on his lot unless it is very sharp. Most trade-ins go to auction, where dealers get rid of excess or unwanted units and buy a balcar lots.

the so-called "Blue Book" or "Black Book" or "Red Book" prices (there are a number of price services available) known to most car buyers but understood by few.

In a similar way, collector car auctions form the basis of several price guides. But when you are actually at the auction, feverishly eyeing some finned monster you owned as a kid and have to own again, you are on your own. The value of the car is what you or some other bidder is willing to part with right then on the spot. That's what makes auctions exciting.

The granddaddy of collector car auctions is coming up Labor Day weekend in Auburn, Ind., where auctioneer extraordinaire Dean Kruse bases his ITT Kruse International, which holds collector car auctions across the country, year-around. Dean Kruse auctioned off the spectacular Harrah collection, from which Tom Monaghan, owner of Domino's Pizza and the Detroit Tigers, bought a million-dollar Duesenberg and his \$8.1 million Bugatti Royale. Both are now on display at Domino's recently opened automotive collection in Ann Arbor.

Also on display are Monaghan's first acquisitions, a 1930 Hispano-Suiza and a 1930 Ford Model A woodie station wagon,

tioned over the years were a custom Duesenberg with a throne built for Father Divine (bidding did not make the reserve, but owner Ed Lucas later sold it for \$200,000), a Cadillac owned by Al Capone (\$68,000) and the bullet-riddled '34 Ford in which Bonnie and Clyde were killed (\$176,000).

Another one he did not sell was an armor-plated Mercedes-Benz 770 owned by Adolph Hitler. "The owner rejected a bid of \$50,000," he said.

Collector car auctions are now

big business, with sales estimated at around \$200 million a year. Of that, Kruse sold about three-quarters.

Auburn is on I-69, about an hour's drive south from Marshall, Mich., and is worth the drive for any car enthusiast. Or if you want to avoid the crowds (and Auburn does pack them in), plan to attend Tom Williams' auction next August in Utica. Williams puts on auctions in Louisville (Oct. 15-16), Houston (Nov. 25-27), Indianapolis (Jan. 28, 1989) and Champagne, Ill.



Lees isn't one of those auto buffs who trailers his cars to a show and removes every spec of dust and grease from the vehicle.



Lees said he likes to cruise Gratiot in his Cuda or 1979 Dodge Little Red Express truck.







The city has two foresters working on public tree matters, she said: Dr. Gerald Lanier, a forester from the State University of New York College of Forestry, and Bob Tarabula, City and Park forester. In addition, the city has heeded advice from the Elm Research Institute.

Lanier installed bark beetle traps around the city last spring, before the trees budded. The traps catch elm beetles with a scented bait.

"The thousands of beetles caught in the traps are thousands less to worry about feeding in the healthy elm trees, which then become infected with Dutch elm disease," Matthew said.

Tarabula surveys all public and private trees and recommends trim or removal of trees diagnosed with Dutch elm disease, she said. "Because of the drought, many trees appeared to contract the disease at about the same time," she said, "so removal crews are working added time to keep up.'

To ease the threat of Dutch elm disease spreading from infected to healthy trees, she said Tarabula injected the diseased trees with cacodylic acid, which causes the leaves to turn bronze, attracts beetles to the diseased tree - away from healthy trees - and causes the beetles to die.

Root transmission of the disease is also a constant threat,

With approximately 38 colors hand-screened one at a time, the fabric carries a price tag of \$150 a yard. The furniture, part of Henredon's 18th Century Rittenhouse Square, was filled he said, with plume down.

With a design background, Cameron has been in the business for 25 years. He came to the Grosse Pointe store last November, shortly after the business was bought by Art Van.





In a company where women outnumber the men 4 to 1, Kim Kozlowski is in the unique position of being the only female among four men in Display Advertising.

"Sometimes I feel like a housewife because I have to clean up after them," she said.

scholarship money they receive, and compensation for their resident assistant, graduate assistant, minority aide or teaching assistant position.

Before the 1986 Tax Reform act, all scholarship money received for tuition, room and empt. board, books, supplies and equipment was excluded from income for those studying toward a degree. Now, this tax-free status only applies to scholarship money required for tuition, course-related fees, books, supplies and equipment. Room and board and incidental expenses have now become subject to taxation.

These new provisions apply only to scholarships granted on or after Aug. 17, 1986, and they did not become taxed until Jan. 1, 1987. All amounts received on or after Jan. 1, 1987, from scholarships granted on or after Aug. 17, 1986 are subject to the new rules.

The portion of scholarship income that is subject to tax is considered "earned income," so students can use the standard deduction to help shield the income from tax. For example, in 1988, the standard deduction for single individuals was \$3,000. Mark received a scholarship for room and board and incidentals worth \$5,000. If he had no other income, the first \$3,000 of his scholarship would be shielded by the standard deduction. The other \$2,000 would be taxed at 15 percent for a total tax bill of \$300

In the case of university housing program employees, like resident assistants, minority aides and graduate advisers, compensation may or may not be taxable depending on how the university decides to pay the compensation.

If these RA's, MA's and GA's receive room and board as direct compensation for their work, this is tax-exempt.

However, if these students were to receive a check for the amount of room and board, then the check wold be considered

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

Conroy's school year begins with a preview that allows both children and parents to get comfortable with the school year ahead.





It is amazing how often the dividing lines between weeds, flowers and herbs become confused and blurred. Some of the plants that are considered the worst weeds are the most valuable of medicinal herbs and some of the prettiest of the oldfashioned flowers that our grandmothers carefully cultivated in their gardens are classified as weeds by horticulturalists. It just depends on which angle you are looking from.

Take Trumpet Vines, for example. There are 100-year-old trumpet vines which adorn old farmhouses and have reached the proportions of trees with gnarled and twisted trunks several inches thick and cascades of orange-colored, trumpet-shaped flowers. Generations of children have known about pulling the blossoms off the vines and sucking the drops of nectar from them, and hummingbirds are always to be found near the trumpet vines, almost disappearing into the trumpet-shaped blossoms in their quest for nectar.

A journey in faith

I feel something like the youngster in the elementary grades whose teacher asks him to write an essay about what he did that summer.

It's good that parents don't always have the opportunity to read the results! Out of the mouths of babes and older kids. Asking the question of myself, I'm quite free to be selective and discreet.

Some of my experiences this summer couldn't possibly be shared. Yes, there is clerical and professional confidentiality. Not that we clergy have all that much to keep in confidence. But there's always something and we'll go to our death in keeping it to ourselves and the people who trust US.

A trip to the Canadian Rockies this summer with a priest friend of many years somehow moved me more than many other journeys I've had the privilege to make.

What was so different about this trip?

People who have seen the Canadian Rockies will understand when I say that surely there are other places of equal, perhaps greater natural beauty. I've seen some of them. But somehow for me this experience opened my eyes to the infinite grandeur and power and sheer inventiveness of God.

We stood in awe before a slab of one of the mountains that geologists suggest is two billion years old. We watched water cascading from glaciers that receded from our continent only 12,000 years ago. On the earth we trod, dinosaurs plodded some one or two million years ago and then inexplicably died out, their bones only now recovered from silent graves.

God's infinite inventiveness is seen not only in these awesome mountains and mammoths but in the delicate flowers that grace the terrain and the variety of animals like elk and deer and mountain goat and marmets not much bigger than the squirrels that scurry about our neighborhood. In the forests that clothe the land in verdant garb, we see God's multi-million fingers reaching heavenward to remind us of our ultimate destination.

We could go on forever: the lakes and tarns and rivers; the Continental Divide where a stream flows from a mountain and separates, one rivulet flowing west to the Pacific, the other east to mingle with Hudson Bay and eventually into the Atlantic Ocean. And the stars! What a panoply of God's tapers!

To the credit of the Canadian government, this area of the Canadian Rockies, like all their natural wonders, has

Among the reports of gloom and doom emanating from the economic gurus is one that seniors cannot afford to retire. They claim that unless you have saved and invested substantial sums of money throughout your working years to supplement Social Security and pension, the retirement years will be somewhat lean.

But families struggling with mortgage payments, high utility bills and the costs of rearing children are not in a position to salt away a lot of cash or invest in securities. They, like their parents, will probably retire from the work force rich but not in money. Their wealth will be walking around on two legs in

daughters with whom they are well pleased.

But the fact remains that traditional sources of retirement income do fall short of providing the same standard of living enjoyed during the working years.

Many present generation retirees are finding it so. To postpone a readjustment in life style there are those who opt to remain in the work force until age 70 rather than getting out at 65. 

There are 269 employes on the payroll of Continental Illinois National Bank in Chicago who are 70-years-old. And at Honeywell in Minneapolis retirees are often called in to work on special projects. Travelers was so satisfied with its older Americans Program that it is expanding it to provide permanent part-time jobs to retirees. The firm has identified many positions which could be shared by two retirees.

A study made at the University of Pennsylvania's gerontology department showed that older workers as a group have a lower rate of absenteeism and lateness, are more reliable and as productive as younger workers, except in the case of heavy manual labor.

Accepting the older worker into the labor force as a parttime worker has proven to be a good investment for employers. They are capitalizing on what cannot be easily acquired otherwise: experience, skills and dependability.

With a depleted crew and minimal experience, the Norsemen will have to do the best they can.

Thirty-five guys are vying for the 22 spots in order to prove they are a better team than last year's 6-3 squad. Another Macomb Area Conference (MAC) championship in the White Division would be nice, but they are going to have to stay off the injury report to stand a chance.

"We can't afford to get anybody hurt," said Coach Frank Sumbera, who directs the Norsemen for the eighth year. "I know injuries are a part of the game, but we'll have to play with what we've got." What he's got is only two athletes back on offense and five on defense. "Realistically we have very little depth," said Sumbera. "Last year we had the depth to play 22 guys, but this season we only have 35 guys out so our numbers are obviously depleted.' Bill Turnbull returns to the center position this season and tips the scales at 285 pounds for his 6-foot, 3-inch frame. Tailback Kevin McCarron will ignite the offense which junior Scott Bernhardt will direct from the quarterback spot. Chuck Schultz will spring from the fullback slot. "I don't think we'll score as much as last year," Sumbera admitted. "Anytime you have to replace nine holes on your offense, you don't expect to do as well offensively in point production. But, we'll be just fine." Stacking the offensive line will be guards Tim Ryan (215 pounds) and Eric D'Hondt (200). Mark Azar will be a two-way starter. He will line up at right tackle on offense, and then switch his 6-1, 240 pound frame to defensive tackle in the 4-4 defensive alignment. Robert Hutton (6-1, 210) will start at left tackle and Scott Schorer, who will also handle all kicking duties, will start at tight end. Frank Lucido and Pete Benjin will be the wide outs. Sumbera stated he will have to nurse his offense along until the experience can be gained. "I've got to get the kids in a situation where they feel comfortable," he said. "We can get to that confidence point. To do that, we will start out going slow.

"We're going to have to be a controlled offensive team," he said. "We don't have the big kids who can really muscle a team. We will have to control the ball."

Defensively, North will be quick. They give up some bulk, but gain speed.

"Kids aren't as massive as a year ago," Sumbera said. "We know we've got quick kids so we'll try to initiate a few things."

Initiating a few things of their own will be tackles Azar and Leo Salvaggio. John Klostermeyer, Brad Bartos and Bob Thomas will step into the end slots and Chuck Schultz and Bryan Ford man the inside linebacker positions. Jason De-Yonker and Scott Schorer or Chris Meathe will play outside linebacker, while Ed Barbieri, Matt Brady and Lucido or Lawson fill the defensive backfield.

"We can't give people the opportunity to beat us," Sumbera said. "We have to cut down on the fumbles. We don't want to be playing in our goal-to-goal defense the entire time."

Although it sounds stale, Sumbera feels his kids have the ability to be a team better than 6-3.

"We've got some good kids," he said. "I know it's an old cliche, but it's true. These kids are excited and have been working hard. All that can only carry over into the season."

Sumbera's assistants are Mike Kras, Dick Grammatico and Steve Deutsch.



Crew wants to 'Aggressive'ly win

Don't tell Frank Piku he's racing against the world's finest. Don't tell him he'll have to revamp his boat in order to compete, and don't try to tell him a trophy is just a trophy.

He knows all that.

When he takes control of his 39-foot sailboat Aggressive for competition in the World One Ton Championships Sept. 7-15 in San Francisco, he will be aboard one of the finest refurbished vessels in the race.

"We will have all new sails and a new keel," said Piku, who has sailed since 1966. "We have done our research to change Aggressive to be a competitive boat in heavy air.'

Traditionally a strong boat in light air, Aggressive has accepted its transplant of a new keel, and Piku thinks that may be the ticket to a front row seat at the awards ceremony.

"Our keel has no wings, but a big bulb," he said. "It's similar to the America's Cup design. It's built to make the boat stiffer. By doing so, we took off 500 pounds."

Bill Tripp Jr., the son of Bill Tripp Sr. who designed Columbia sailboats, was instrumental in the engineering of the keel. If his track record remains consistent, the Cup could ride home on Aggressive.

"Bill has made keel changes three previous times and has made winners out of each boat," Piku said. "This is the first One Ton boat he has done and it definitely gives us an edge."

Whether or not the Joubert-Nivelt designed boat will be able to handle the thick San Francisco Bay air remains to be seen, but over the past month. Dwayne McPhail has been babysitting the boat and making sure it will be prepared.

"Dwayne has been in San Francisco supervising the installation of the keel and has made sure all the sails work," said Piku, who raced in the Canada's Cup competition in 1972. "He's there to make sure plans are going accordingly.

The plans have been on target since Aggressive was one of 10 U.S. boats to qualify for the world race during the qualifiers at Bayview in June.

"This boat has undergone some major changes to compete strictly in the One Ton's," said

"It's a boat-for-boat race with the best of the best." he added. Boats from England, Brazil.

Mexico and Italy, to name a few. will converge on the Bay a week ahead of schedule. Asymessive won't be left out. "We're going to get there a

week before so we can familiarize and adjust ourselves to the boat," said Piku. According to Piku, preparing

for the race is all over. It's the blend of experience and a quality boat that will lead to Aggressive's success or lack of it.

"Preparation is your past experience combined with the best designed boat you can have." Piku said. "We're going to urrive with the best we've got. We're going to do everything we can to have the boat prepared. The rest is up to the helmsman and crew to steer the boat and remain competitive.

Race points will be account lated in five races, one of which covers 400 miles, and one which totals 200 miles. The other three races are 30-mile Olympic Triangle races.

"If we could bring the Cup back to Grosse Pointe, that's it. Piku said. "There's nothing left

because that's the best. We're going out there with no other attitude than that of winning."

Two days after the One Ton World Championships, Piku and his crew will stay in the Bay area and compete in the St. Francis Yacht Club Big Boat Series. The series will host 15-80footers, 45-footers and the One Tons


"That series takes place right in the Bay in front of more than 200,000 people," Piku said. "That will be exciting."



Filness

Exercise; healthy prevention, or risk for health

Now that the record heat wave and drought of 1988 have seemed to fade, many of us look forward to exercising in that cool, crisp fall Michigan air. Indeed there is nothing like a bicycle ride, fast

walk or jog down a tree-lined avenue of bright yellow oranges and deep reds.

Others, nonetheless, would prefer not to take the risk at

such strenuous exertions. They claim the risks are too great, and point to the famed running author Jim Fixx, literally dying in his tracks.

We now know, of course, that he had a long history of smoking, high cholesterol and strong family history of heart disease.

Certainly, there has been excellent research in the past 10 years on exercise related sudden death. This is a medical phenomena not to be ignored. However, we need not miss the fun of recreational activities for fear that we will be that one "event" out of 100,000.

One study from Rhode Island in 1984 reviewed an eight-year period of deaths related to recreational exercise. Atherosclerotic coronary heart disease was the presumed cause of 88 percent of the deaths, primarily over age 29, with known cardiac problem history.

It is very possible that death would have occured in the near future even if these subjects had not exercised.

A sunny view

On the brighter side, current research is indicating

that there is now medical evidence that physical activity even strenuous exercise - is harmful to the healthy cardiovascular system.

Most of us are aware by now of Dr. Paffenberger's famous 14 year study of 17,000 Harvard alumni and their levels of physical activity. His conclusion was that increased exercise such as walking, sports play or regular stair climbing all were related to fewer deaths.

Alumni mortality rates were significantly lower among the physically active. This most ambitious study is conclusive in showing that adequate physical exercise is necessary to "preserve life and its desirable qualities into old age."

Beginning to exercise

How should one approach a new course of exercise? Very gradually and comfortably in the early stages.

Individuals · over 35 who have not exercised on a regular basis for one to two years should consult their physician by all means.

The physician's screening for cardiovascular risk factors

is a very important step. For those 40 years or older, an exercise treadmill stress test will most likely be required for proper evaluation. The stress test will also help the new exerciser get in touch with what his or her exertional limits actually are.

After proper evaluation, the goal, of course, is to develop the desired routine and "good habits" to avoid both injury and undesirable cardiovascular events. Allowing 10 to 15 minutes of adequate stretching and warming up is esential for the large muscle groups, and to help prepare the heart for the upcoming work load.

One should always follow an exercise prescription that in most cases is approved by your physician. Ideally this prescription is based on your treadmill stress test. The level of exertion or intensity should be approximately 60 to 80 percent of the maximal exercise performed during the test.

Ideal heart rate

Again, stress testing is not essential for everyone. If your physician rules this out, there

is a very simple formula to determine your exercise heart rate: Take the number 220 and subtract your age. That is your maximal heart rate.

Take that number and multiply by .60 and .80 to determine the target heart range per minute for your exercise prescription.

These widely accepted standards should allow for optimal and safe levels of enjoyable exercise.

Following intensity there are two other key elements of effective cardiovascular exercise. The second requirement is the frequency of exercise, for example, a minimum of three times per week and not more than five.

The third element is the duration of the exercise session, for instance, 20 minutes and 45 minutes as a maximum length of time.

By combining all three of these key factors, the progress and enjoyment of regular exercise and recreation will be most successful.

Don't just stop

A final note to complete the sensible exercise approach is with the "cool down."

The winding down and stretching period after exercise is just as important as the warm up. Your heart and cardiovascular system need to be "geared down" gradually from the demands on their function.

Plopping down on the couch immediately after a vigorous bike ride can put you and your heart in an unsafe condition. Take the time to stretch and walk around as you cool off with a towel and a glass of water.

Sure there are no guarantees in life, and with everything we do there are risks taken. The evidence becomes more clear each year that the risk of the inactive sedentary life is far greater.

So take heart and feel good about what you are doing for yourself, both physically and mentally. Regular exercise and recreation is part of being a whole person.

Just because you've never been diagnosed as having an asthmatic condition, doesn't mean you are completely immune from it.

Asthma, a condition in which the breathing passages become obstructed, can be triggered by a variety of things, including food allergy, stress, or exercise. An asthmatic condition occurs when the blowing out of air is harder and slower than usual, stated Dr. Willane Krell, Director of Pulminary Diagnostics at Harper Hospital.

"Asthma is a reversible airways obstruction," said Krell. "In other words, it's caused by various stimuli you breathe and it affects people in different

we generally swallow it," said Krell. "Asthma is a constriction of the bronchial tubes. When mucus is lodged in the tubes, it is difficult to clear it.

'In order to breathe easier, you have to clear that mucus. Otherwise it stays within the tubes," Krell added.

According to Krell, nobody really knows what the basic defect is that causes asthma. Physicians do know, however, that there are abnormalities in individuals, as well as certain stimuli in the air we breathe.

"There are plenty of things that can cause a shortness of breath," Krell said. "If someone is exercising and suddenly experasthma.

looked at by a physician to determine if there is an asthmatic condition or not," Krell said. "If someone decides they've got to be fit, that's different. However, if it's causing any discomfort or shortness of breath, then get checked.'

Exercise induced asthma is quite simple. If a person, asthmatic or not, exerts himself or herself the body can't deliver enough oxygen to the cells in need. Therefore, if the muscles and cells are not getting enough oxygen, the body reacts by being short of breath.

"When you're breathing hard and asking your body to produce a great deal of oxygen," Krell iences a shortness of breath, said, "then you're using a group they don't necessarily have of muscles not tuned to that type of work. When that happens, you can also suffer some cramps."

through the induction of exercise, those who have it can still exercise

"With proper treatment, most people should still be able to exercise when they want to," Krell said. "Anytime they feel a shortness of breath, they generally can rely on the inhaler."

An inhaler is an apparatus filled with a medicine, which with one *puff* opens up the airways.

"The broncho-dilators actually dilate the bronchial tubes and make it a bit easier to breathe,' Krell said.

If an asthmatic continues to exercise, he or she should become familiar with the times when a reaction will occur. Krell stated it is important to remain active, despite suffering from asthma. For instance, if you like to jog and you know it will cause a reaction, carry your inhaler and use it when you need it. But, remember, when the problem arises, don't stop. Build to a gradual stop. "People will suffer from intermittent reactions," she said. "You should be able to learn when you'll have a shortness of breath and deal with it."

asthma doesn't mean you have to stop exercising," Krell added.


In this summer's heat and humidity, Krell reported more cases of more difficult breathing by asthmatic patients.

"It's difficult to exercise because of all the garbage (polin and humidity) in the air," she said. "Everyone I've talked to notices they have a tougher time breathing.

Exercise is the most important thing for a person to keep in mind, whether they suffer from asthma or not, Krell said. But. knowing your body and what it can and can't do could help prevent an asthmatic reaction.

"Everyone should get a form of exercise," Krell said. "Asthma is very treatable, but you need to know your body's limitations. In some cases, asthmatic complications can set in. Just be wise and see a physician."

Krell also added that if a reaction occurs, emergency treatment should be sought in order to reverse the breathing to normal.



If a person breathes on only 80 percent of his or her breathing capacity, then that person is a diagnosed asthmatic.

Wheezing and a shortness of breath are the two most common ways to detect asthma. However, when the breathing passages are clogged with mucus, it becomes difficult to keep the airways open; disallowing oxygen to pass freely.

"In that case, it's just that the heart can't keep up with the ox-ygen being required," Krell added.

Although you may be short of breath and think nothing is wrong, Krell suggests you make an appointment to answer any questions.

'Just because a person begins a fitness regimen and suffers a bit of discomfort, isn't cause for

When this discomfort occurs, Krell recommends you don't put up the stop sign.

"Don't stop suddenly," she said. "You don't want to stop quickly because the bi-products build up. They need to be cleared up. It is important to keep breathing, possibly rhythmically, while you continue to move gently."

'Young Guns' is bold, daring; but fails on human level

"Young Guns" unites on the screen six very talented and very likable young actors.

Emilio Estevez, Kiefer Sutherland, Lou Diamond Phillips, Charlie Sheen, Dermot Mulroney and Casey Siemaszko are all here for this good-natured shootem-up about the legendary Billy the Kid.

Unfortunately, when you're dealing with that many principal characters, odds are high that most of them will be shortchanged in the personality department. That's the case here. Estevez, who plays Billy, and Sutherland are given personalities that are more than skin that suits Billy just fine. deep.

The rest of the cast is left to fend for itself.

But viewers will have to look a little deeper if they want anything more. Beyond that, none of the characters are filled out. Sheen is a ould-be leader with a bad accent, Phillips is a stereotypical Native American who yearns to get revenge at the same time he's preserving the heritage of his people, and Mulroney and Siemaszko are little more than comic relief through most of the film.

"Young Guns" definitely has a bold and daring style. And its photography is refreshing and crisp. The sad part is, because the film fails on a fundamental human level, all of the style and beauty it can conjure will not compensate. And that's very ironic in a picture that had so many chances to make its characters work well together as an ensemble.

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Grosse PoBreeder's Futurity comes to Fair

The Michigan Quarter Horse Association is holding its annual Breeder's Futurity at the Michigan State Fairgrounds Sept. 22-25. This largest breeder's futurity in the world attracts thousands of Quarter Horse breeders, exhibitors and enthusiasts from all over Michigan as well as the surrounding states and Canada.

All horses performing at the four-day show, regardless of their age, were nominated to the futurity before they were born. So for many of these exhibitors the show represents the culmination of a four-year plan. The Michigan Quarter Horse Association is the largest breed association in the state and represents all Quarter Horse owners from the one horse family to the large farms that have several hundred animals. 


