Doris Brucker, chairman of the 37-member committee, presented a six-part report at a conference meeting of the Grosse-Pointe Board of Education Tuesday, Sept. 6, recommending the

Trustees unanimously approved a resolution at the regular meeting Monday thanking the members of the Library Building Advisory Committee and asking the group to continue its work by projectmg costs, determining how existing library facilities should be maintained, recommending the configuration of Brownell's playfield, and working up a timeline leading to a public referendum and public information cam-

The existing central library is 18,000 square feet; the Park branch is 4,400; the Woods branch is 4,900; totaling 27,300 square feet. If the new building was between 30,000 and 45,000 square feet, Brucker said, the 60,000-square-foot recommendation would be accomplished.



The defeat for the Children's Home came in the form of a denial of an ordinance amendment that would have allowed an outpatient chemical dependency evaluation and after-care facility as a special land use in a community facilities district.

The community facilities zoning includes hospitals, schools, churches and non-profit institutions, such as the Children's Home of Detroit.

The special land-use amendment to allow the home's outpatient drug counseling clinic was defeated by a 4-3 vote. Voting with the majority were Mayor George Freeman, Mayor Pro Tem Robert Novitke, and council members Jean Rice and Thomas Fahrner.

The council's main reason for denying the land-use amendment and, therefore, preventing the Children's Home for developing an out patient drug counseling program for youth was due to fears that youths from outside the Pointes could not be legally health boards. The home has 64 prevented from using the clinic.

Novitke questioned city afterney George Catlin as to whether the Children's Home could legally prevent individuals from outside the Pointes from using the proposed out-patient clinic. Catlin said he did not think the home could legally restrict its clients based on where they live.

Novitke also feared that if the Children's Home received any state or federal funds what soever, the home could be forced by the higher governments to implement policies not in the best interests of the Pointes.

The Children's Home is a nonprofit private organization that receives 20 percent of its funds through its own fundraising activities, according to Unidien's Home Executive Director H.E. Tammelaid. He said the home does receive some state and county funds through per diempayments for children living at

the home The Children's Home is a residential treatment center for emotionally disturbed children from mental hospitals or referrals from county and state mental

Novitke said that since there is no guarantee that the state or federal governments would not step in with mandates for the home, and since there is no guarantee the program won't be expanded beyond the Pointes, he could not vote for the ordinance amendment.

Councilman Paul Beaupre was very much in favor of approving the special land-use amendment to allow the Children's Home to open the out-patient clinic.

He said it would be hypocritical for the council to proclaim Sept. 12-19 as "Just Say No" to drugs week and then turn around and say no to the children by refusing to allow the Unitaren's Home clinic.

Just minutes before taking up consideration of the Children's Home issue, the council unanimously proclaimed Just Say No.

Beaupre made two attempts to keep the issue alive by proposing substitute motions that would have allowed further discussion of the land-use amendment and the Children's Home proposal, but his attempts went down to the same 4-3 defeats.

The council's rejection of the proposed amendment came after the planning commission recommended approval on Aug. 23.

The proposed amendment to the general facilities zoning ordinance would have allowed nonprofit organizations on property zoned general facilities to offer out-patient drug dependency counseling by professional staff. Dispensing of drugs would not be allowed. Such clinics would be a special land-use and would require public hearings and council approval before they could

After the council's rejection of the zoning ordinance, Children's Home Board of Trustees President Nancy Nicholson thanked the council for its long hours of consideration.

"Obviously we're disappointed," she said. "Sometime (a drug counseling clinic) will happen. But not as soon as we wanted.


### 3 shots heard; police recover smoking muffler

who have lived in Michigan." Sally Brown of Grosse Pointe Park is a pioneer in child care and development. She served on the faculty of the Merrill-Palmer Institute in Detroit from 1947 to 1964, helping train students to function effectively as educators. health professionals, social workers, counselors in their work

with children and families. She developed a variety of means to support family life and reduce long-term financial dependence at the Brewster Douglass Housing Project and served as on-site administrator of that program from 1964-66.

Brown was the first director of the Detroit/Wayne County Child Care Coordinating Council; helped found the Grosse Pointe Human Relations Council; served as vice chairman of the committee to relocate families burned out of their homes during the 1967 riots.



# Farms to consider revoking Cracker Jax business license

News

A hearing on the possible revocation of a city-issued business license for Cracker Jax saloon has been postponed to Oct. 10 at 7 p.m. in the Grosse Pointe Farms City Council chambers.

The hearing was originally scheduled for Sept. 13, but the date was moved back at the request of Cracker Jax.

Reacting to complaints from residents and police reports of alleged violations at the establishment, the Farms council in June ordered city administration and prosecuting attorney Bob Ihrie to prepare a case and set a hearing regarding the possible revocation of Cracker Jax's business license.

At a June council meeting, a group of residents near the nightclub-type establishment on Mack Avenue, south of Moross, said patrons of the bar were disturbing the area, parking on their streets, and leaving debris on lawns.

Farms police followed up the residents' complaints with surthe establishment.

dents were recorded during the surveillance, including allegedly serving alcoholic beverages to

Cracker Jax management disagrees with the charges made by the residents and the police and said it has done everything local authorities and residents have

Ferber in his memo, however, said the police actions have done little to cause the management of the establishment to tighten its alleged policy of serving minors. He said the bar has not lived up to its promise of increasing security outside the building.

Cracker Jax co-owner Mark DiMaso said his establishment has complied with the request of the police, and he said that incidents of rowdy crowds outside the building and littering have decreased due to increased security outside.

DiMaso said he has gone out of his way to make sure minors veillance both inside and outside are not served alcohol. Cracker Jax patrons' hands are stamped, in overtime.

### Tentative Farms fire contract reached

Grosse Pointe Farms city and fire representatives met behind closed doors all day last Thursday and have apparently hammered out a firefighters contract that may end the year-long dispute in arbitration.

Following the negotiations, Fire Chief Sam Candela said Friday he believed the contract reached before an arbitrator will be submitted to the firefighters for a ratification vote. He would not indicate when the vote would be held, and he declined to elaborate on the terms of the

proposed contract. Farms city and fire officials were forced into arbitration after a contract reached a year ago through mediation was rejected by the firefighters. Firefighters negotiator Lt. Art Turner said last year the contract was defeated because of unsatisfactory provisions for the nine emergency medical technicians.

Farms EMTs sought lump-sum payments on top of their salaries, similar to those received by EMTs in the other Grosse Pointes, Turner said.

The Original Pancake House on Mack in Grosse Pointe Woods was robbed of \$3,200 Sunday night by two men, with one of the men possessing an Uzi-type machine gun. They avoided capture on a motorcycle.

restaurant was closed when two shoulders and weighing about shortly after 10 p.m. The door was left open while an employee was taking trash out to a dumpster. Other employees were inside cleaning up.

The two men, one wearing a red motorcycle helmet with a smoke-colored face shield and the other wearing a gray ski mask, drove up behind the restaurant on a motorcycle. One of the men reportedly told the employee outside the building, 'Don't say nothing, stay cool."

The two men entered the restaurant, with one man carrying an Uzi-type machine gun with two pistol grips, witnesses reported. After emptying the cash drawers, the men then discovered the safe was open. One of the restaurant employees told police the safe was opened just prior to the suspects entering the restaurant. The suspects stuffed the money in a maroon nylon backpack.

Some \$3,200 in \$5, \$10 and \$20 bills were taken, a restaurant employee told police.

After the two men left the restaurant, an employee called the Woods Public Safety Department. The department had all

available cars combing the area, but was unable to locate the men or the motorcycle. They were last seen heading south on Jackson below Hunt Club.

The suspect driving the motorcycle and in possession of the machine gun is described as a dark-skinned black man, about 5 According to police reports, the foot 8, of stocky build with broad men entered through a rear door 150 pounds. He was wearing the motorcycle helmet and a denim jacket.

The other man is lightskinned, black, 5 foot 10, with a narrow face and long eyelashes. He was wearing the ski mask and a denim jacket and jeans.

The case has been turned over to a Woods detective for investigation. Public Safety Director Jack Patterson was unavailable for comment.

If the firefighters approve the proposed contract, it will allow Farms administrators to complete the transition from separate police and fire departments to one public safety department. The Farms is the last of the Grosse Pointes to implement a public safety department.

Farms police accepted a contract reached through mediation and approved by the City Council Oct. 5, 1987. The contract, retroactive to January 1986, increased police officers' pay from \$29,223 to \$30,000 in the first year. The major improvement in the contract was in pensions, City Clerk Richard Solak said after the contract was approved.

He said the mediated contract that firefighters rejected last year was about 1 percent better than the contract accepted by the police officers.

The firefighters contract is the main obstacle preventing the merger of fire and police departments into one public safety deparment. The City Council approved a resolution in December 1987 calling for a public safety department. After the current firefighters contract dispute is settled, then city and public safety negotiators can meet to draw up one contract for the public safety officers.

Both the police contract approved last year and the fire contract now under consideration expire at the end of December, when city officials hope a new public safety contract will take

# Park residents injured in boat explosion; fire

Two Grosse Pointe Park residents and a Birmingham resident were in serious, but stable, condition in the burn unit of Metropolitan Hospital in Windsor, after an explosion and fire aboard a 26-foot cruiser at a Windsor marina Sunday.

Francis McCarroll, 42, and Lucy Schelleak, 24, of Grosse Pointe Park, and Jeffrey Doan, 41, of Birmingham, were admitted to the hospital after Mc-Carroll's cruiser exploded and burned about 15 minutes after it had been filled with gasoline at Lakeview Park Marina, according to Windsor police.

Another passenger, Carol Roe, 24, of Farmington Hills, was treated at another Windsor hospital and released.

Madeleine O'Brien, R.N., in the burn unit of Metropolitan Hospital, said none of the three patients sustained life-threatening injuries.

'But they'll be here for several weeks, and some will require skin grafts," she said.

According to police reports, the passengers dived into the water after the explosion, and were pulled from the river by bystand-

The exact cause of the explosion is unknown, but speculation is that it was caused by a fuel leak or by improper ventilation in the bilge of the cruiser after it was filled with gasoline.

# Canada, U.S. face common election issues

ven though Canada follows the par-liamentary system, it will face some of the same issues as the United States when it goes to the polls this fall.

A brief immersion in the Canadian news media during a weekend in Niagara-onthe Lake offers evidence of similarities on such issues as economic matters, trade, the environment, scandals and corruption, women's issues and other matters.

These and other similarities are not surprising, of course, in view of the common heritage of the two countries, their huge trade with each other, their common support of democratic ideals and their cooperation in NATO and other defense arrangements.

After Prime Minister Brian Mulroney in a recent CBC interview all but confirmed a fall date for the next federal election, Canadian news people promptly began reviewing Mulroney's four-year record in office as well as the questions he will face in the months ahead.

One Canadian raised and then answered a question similar to one posed in 1980 and 1984 in this country and, in fact, again in the 1988 campaign. It is: "Are you better off economically today than you



were in 1984?" According to Bill Fox, a former senior adviser to Mulroney, writing in Toronto's Sunday Star, "A significant majority will answer in the affirmative."

Sounding a bit like George Bush extolling the Reagan-Bush record, Fox ticked off a long list of Mulroney government accomplishments: creation of more than 1.2 million jobs, 85 percent of them of the fulltime variety and 56 percent of them held by women; a decline in unemployment; a drop in interest rates; inflation held in check; a substantial reduction in the federal debt, and so on.

But another observer, Jim Coutts, who had been principal secretary to former Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau, centered his criticism of the Mulroney regime, in the same Sunday Star, on its strong endorsement of the United States-Canada free trade agreement, still awaiting final approval in the Canadian Senate.

He sees support for the pact slipping because of criticism by the two opposition parties and the Mulroney government's failure to be specific about the expected benefits and possible damage to Canada, especially Canadian business, industry and workers, when and if the pact becomes effective.

A recent public opinion poll, taken for The Star and the Southam News, indicated that Coutts had touched on a sensitive issue. The poll showed that while 15 percent of the respondents felt that the Conservative government's best accomplishment to date had been in free trade, 17 percent regarded free trade as the biggest disappointment in the Mulroney government.

Even worse, even though the poll indicated that more than half of the respondents approved of the government's actions in stimulating the economy and reducing unemployment, it also showed that 49 percent disapproved of the free trade deal with the United States, while 38 percent approved and 13 percent were unsure about it. In fact, it was only on the economic issues that the poll showed strong support for the government.

The Canadian news media also indicate that the Mulroney government's record on

environmental issues, and especially its failure to get the United States to do more to combat acid rain, will be important. But so will be the scandals and corruption that have damaged the government in Canada, just as they have in the United States. And the Mulroney government's record on women's issues apparently will be subjected to the same kind of criticism that already has been directed at the GOP presidential nominee in this country.

Canada also will have debates among the leaders of the three parties similar to those in this country. Canada adopted the debate technique after John F. Kennedy faced Richard M. Nixon in 1960 and made the gains that enabled him to win a close victory in the November election. Canada, however, requires debates in both English and French which makes an American wonder whether the U.S. candidates will address a few words of Spanish to their audiences to show their respect for America's fastest-growing minority.

This is a simplistic overview, of course, but it is often instructive for Americans to get some idea about the way elections campaigns are run by our good neighbors in Canada, how they compare with our own and how common our two countries' problems are not only in this continent but in the world.

Whatever else we might say about Canada's election campaigns, they are mercifully short, an attribute many Americans wish the United States could copy now that we are winding down more than two years of campaigning preparatory to the Nov. 8 election.

# Suburban gambling an issue?

The gambling issue just won't die in Wayne County, even though Mayor Coleman Young of Detroit has said casino gambling is dead for now in his

The latest revival of the issue came last week when the Wayne County Board of Commissioners by a 9 to 0 vote agreed to put on the Nov. 8 ballot an ordinance that would ban gambling in suburban Wayne County if it were banned in Detroit.

The action came on a motion by Arthur Blackwell, Detroit Democrat, who supports casino gambling. He said the adoption of the ordinance would safeguard Detroit against suburban competition, adding, "We're going to protect ourselves and make sure nobody else gets it."

Blackwell's motion for a November vote on the issue may be just a ploy to keep alive Detroit's hopes for casino gambling. Ben Washburn, the county's legislative analyst who helped draft the ballot proposal, told the Free Press that the measure, even if approved, would have limited impact because any local community could pass an ordinance superseding it.

Blackwell says, however, the vote on the issue would send a message to Lansing, the suburbs and gambling interests not to slight Detroit.

In the Grosse Pointes, we've heard nothing but criticism of the casino gambling plan for Detroit and approval of the vote by which the city in an advisory referendum at the primary approved an ordinance banning casino gambling in Detroit if it

Nor have we heard any proposal to authorize casino gambling or any other form of gambling in Grosse Pointe, although there may have been some talk in other Detroit suburban areas.

Why, indeed?

were permitted by the Legislature.

As for the ordinance proposed for the ballot Nov. 8, we are inclined to agree with Commissioner William O'Neill, Allen Park Democrat, who abstained from the vote on the measure, but said: "Why put one more confusing thing on the ballot?"

# Robertson still against Bush?

rom all accounts, Michigan Republicans showed a united front in support of Vice President George Bush at their weekend convention in Detroit's Cobo Hall. But they didn't accept Bush's advice with respect to the abortion issue.

In an interview with reporters in Illinois last Saturday, Bush said that attitudes on abortion should not be used as a "litmus test" to measure a politician. But two candidates for the University of Michigan board of regents and the Michigan State University Board of Trustees failed the "litmus test" at the convention and were defeated in their attempts to obtain GOP nominations.

In addition, the convention delegates by a vote of 1,464 to 268 supported the Nov. 8 ballot proposal that would end government-paid abortions for poor women.

According to the New York Times, Bush's remark came in response to a question about the difference between his views on abortion and those of Rep. Lynn Martin. She is the national co-chairwoman of the Bush campaign but supports the right of women to choose abortion.

"Who's going to have a litmus test that everybody has to agree with everybody on every single issue?" Bush asked, adding,"I have a lot of key supporters who agree with Lynn and a lot that agree with me.'

Bush has said he favors exceptions to a ban on abortions in cases of rape, incest and to protect the life of the mother but opposes public spending on abortion. The Michigan ballot proposal, however, makes no exception for rape, incest or pregnant women infected with AIDS in its ban on abortion funding.

Bush's comments on abortion were widely regarded as part of an effort by the

presidential nominee to row back to the middle of the political road after having satisfied the party's right wing in his earlier statements about abortion and other social issues on the conservatives' agenda.

According to this reasoning, Bush has won substantial credibility among conservatives and now has the leeway to move to more moderate positions and win the support of centrists whose support could assure him victory in November.

News stories in both The Detroit News and Free Press cited Pat Robertson's Michigan Committee for Freedom as the source of the convention controversy over abortion. It circulated a questionnaire to candidates for MSU trustee and U-M regent on such issues as abortion, homosexual rights and school vouchers.

So Robertson's committee members were given the blame, or the credit, depending on which side the delegates were on, for defeating Delores Cook, a candidate for the MSU board, and Edward Liebler, who ran for the U-M board, when they sought the GOP nomination for those positions.

We recall that when Robertson's forces first entered Michigan GOP politics, they said they hoped to become active from the presidential level on down and specifically included contests for the state education and state university boards. And so they have, although one pro-choice Republican, Judith Frey of Grand Rapids, was quoted as saying that Saturday's votes were not representative of mainstream Republicans in Michigan.

Perhaps the Robertson forces are not representative of Michigan either when their earlier delegate battles with the Bush forces are recalled.

We either have to grip our purses tightly between elbow and ribcage — a posture that requires extraordinary muscle coordination and a great deal of concentration; or, if the purse has a strap, we may be able to sling it over a shoulder.

If it's slung, every time we bend forward to pick up an hors

d'oeuvre or shake a hand, the strap slips off your shoulder and slithers down your upper arm. To keep it from clattering to the floor, you have to bend your arm. If it's a heavy purse, this means it gets stopped with a jolt at approximately the elbow level. If this hand is holding a plate heaped with munchable cocktail goodies, all the hors d'heouvres will leap into the air briefly. They may - or may not - return quietly to the same positions on the plate.

If this hand is holding a drink, when the purse hits the crooked elbow, the drink will splash on your companion or on your host's carpet. And the resulting splashes run up your arm toward the elbow - to meet the purse strap.

At about this point, you'll probably meet someone who wants to shake hands.

The only sensible solution is to place your purse between your knees, balance the hors d'oeuvres dish atop the drink in your left hand (this also keeps the drink from splashing) and extend your right hand for a cool and gracious, "Pleezed ta meet-

# Rep. Bryant explains his opposition to school funding proposals

"It's a search for a better method of funding schools and relief of the burden of property taxes for some homeowners and

farmers in the state," he said.

"The latest draft (to raise state State Rep. 





# News He digs Somalia — literally and figuratively

"I've always been interested in Africa. It was the seed of it all. There are artifacts that go back two million years. It's fascinating trying to unravel those real old mysteries about how people lived.'

And that's why Woods resident Jim Ellison left Saturday to go back to Somalia, a country in the horn of Africa. He will continue work he started there last summer, and apply it toward a master's thesis for which he is working.

The work he is doing as an archaeologist is what he said he has wanted to do since he first took a class in anthropology at Olivet College.

"There was a professor there who was an incredibly charismatic guy. He could really bring the subject alive," said Ellison,

But situations caused him to switch to Michigan State, where - once bitten - he continued his study of anthropology and archaeology. A teaching assistant suggested he attend a field school in western Illinois. Basically an unpaid internship, Ellison worked along the Mississippi River, learning the more practical aspects of being on an archaeological dig, and meeting other archaeologists.

"That was when I realized, "This is a real field.' Until then, I didn't realize I could really do archaeology," he said.

After various other summer digs, he focused on his impending graduation and what he would do immediately afterward. He began writing to various schools for graduate studies and received many replies, but the most interesting one came from

Brandt told Ellison if he were accepted to his university, he could take Ellison to Somalia with him on a dig under an assistantship program which would

pay for his airfare and living expenses while working.

An offer like that was too good to pass. Ellison graduated from Michigan State in June 1987 with a degree in anthropology, an additional major in psychology and a certificate in African studies. And last year he spent four months in Somalia, returning home just before Christmas.

He has worked on other digs in Wisconsin and in Maine, and will continue his classes in Florida, where his mentor of sorts, Brandt, took a position.



colorbook for them, they were allowed to experiment and grow on their own. It was wonderful to watch them grow — that's the joy of teaching, for me."

As time went on, Lachiusa's daughter would take over her classes for very young children (3 to 12); Lachiusa took over the high school classes, then began teaching classes for adults.

That's where she found her

"I love to teach adults. I look forward to being with my students - my friends - and to the interplay between artists. And again, as a teacher I get to experience that extraordinary feeling of seeing my students grow and improve.'

Lachiusa's teaching method is simple: She gives the basic instruction, including drawing, and then stands back and lets the individual become the artist. And just about anyone has that capability, Lachiusa says.

"My husband used to say that anybody can learn. I didn't always believe him, but I've found that he was right. If someone enrolls in an art class, I believe that they must have that ability inside them. So it's my job to

draw it out," Lachiusa says.
"And I believe that a true artist is an individual. If I just teach him to mimic me, he's not being an individual. But if I help him find that artist within, I've done my job as a teacher."

Proof that Lachiusa has done her job comes in the number of students and former students she meets at art fairs and juried shows.

"It's wonderful to see them selling their work. Recently, at an art fair in Petoskey, I ran into an artist who looked familiar. She reminded me that I had taught her some 10 years ago and that until that class, she'd never painted in her life.

"And here she was, a wellknown artist in Petoskey. And she really did some marvelously beautiful work."

Currently, Lachiusa is teaching three classes at the War Memorial: beginning watercolor and drawing, advanced painting and beginning watercolor.

At the same time that Lachiusa-the-teacher begins a new season of instruction, Lachiusathe-artist has embarked upon a new style. It's her second such change of artistic gears and Lachiusa says it's exciting.

Her first major change came in 1972, when an aunt living in San Francisco turned Lachiusa on to sumi-e.

"No one here had heard of it yet. My aunt was having a lot of trouble with it and decided to give up. She sent everything books, ink block and stick, bamboo brushes and a long parchment with her teacher's corrections marked on it — to me.

"I fell in love with it. As I got more experienced in sumi-e, I began to develop my own more Westernized style. Then I began to adapt sumi-e to watercolor. What I finally ended up with was a contemporary style of the Oriental mystique," Lachiusa explains.

And she stayed with that style for a long time. She tried at one point to go back to her old style - a difficult, precise look which combined much of Lachiusa's early sculpting knowledge with her watercolor technique — because her older works were beginning to sell better, but she found she couldn't go back.

And now she's changing her style again, to a looser, washier technique which is less influenced by sumi-e. It's been about two weeks since she adopted her new form and so far, so good.

"Things are going very well. I feel good and my work is coming easier. And that's nice. The last two weeks have been very productive," says the artist who is currently featured at the Troy Gallery.

They've also been pretty busy. Lachiusa showed her work at last Saturday's Grosse Pointe Artists Association fall festival and recently conducted a painting demonstration and lecture at the McCune Arts Center in Petoskey.

And she's getting back into the teaching frame of mind, because that's what she is, she says. An artist who teaches and a teacher who paints.

'Just call me a watercolorist. You really can't put a label on me. I just interpret what I see. That's called creativity.'

### Autumn colors on schedule

Despite the summer's long drought and unprecedented heat, Michigan forests will likely unfold their annual panorama of spectacular colors on schedule, AAA Michigan reports.

Generally, peak periods to admire the autumn's artistry are the way: Michigan is endowed across the Upper Peninsula from forest and 65 species of trees, Copper Harbor to Mackinac Island; late Sept. to mid-October in Peninsula, above a line between that for superb sightseeing. Ludington and Standish; and insula, north of a line from Muskegon to Port Huron.

Nature's paintbrush usually spreads through the southern third of the Lower Peninsula from Lake Michigan toward Metropolitan Detroit during the latter half of October.

There is much to admire along mid-September to early October with almost 19 million acres of more than any other state. Add thousands of miles of scenic the northern third of the Lower roadsides and lakeshores to all

According to Melvin Koelling, early to mid-October from the Michigan State University forcentral section of the Lower Penestry professor, the brilliance of fall colors depends partly on September weather.

Tree leaves contain chlorophyll, a substance which makes them green when combined with sunlight. Many varieties of leaves also have pigments called carotene and xanthophyll, which create yellow and orange hues after the chlorphyll begins to break down. Brilliant reds result from high concentrations of

"A warm, dry summer often produces more sugar in the leaves, hence better colors," Koelling said.

"What we want to see now are sunny days averaging about 80 degrees and nights in the 50s, with rain once a week or so. But

a severe early frost or a spate of dark, rainy days in September could upset the chemical process and cause a late, lackluster dis-





# Europe done, resident takes on Asia

Tom Bartsch said his parents weren't too surprised this June when he told them he was going to take off and spend a few months traveling throughout

After all, he did the same thing the previous year, only his destination was a few thousand miles closer - Europe.

Last year the then-22-year-old Tulane University graduate backpacked throughout Europe and North Africa, staying the whole time in hotels and with friends. Now attending Detroit College of Law, Bartsch, who lives in the City, returned late in August from a similar trip through Taiwan, Singapore, Nepal, Malaysia and India.

"There's something about Asia," Bartsch said. "It's exotic and exciting and that's why I wanted to go there.'

Staying in cheap hotels and other inexpensive housing made the trip more affordable than the \$1,200 round-trip airfare makes it sound.

"Even the five-star hotels there are only \$80 a night for two people. But I didn't stay there," he said. "The ones I stayed in were \$2 a night and they weren't too nice, but I figure if you're only sleeping there, it's all right to share a bathroom with everyone else on the floor."

Another cost-cutter came in the form of friends who live in Singapore and showed him the finer parts of that city.

Singapore is a clean country. due mainly to the high fines levied on those who litter, Bartsch said. And with the death penalty mandatory for those who bring drugs into the country, there is an almost non-existent drug problem.

That country is "very serviceoriented," Bartsch said, and once he got a \$6 haircut which included a head massage and the services of six workers.

Using Singapore as a base, he took trains to the various coun-

tries he visited, traveling back to him. Singapore between countries.

India, he remembers as "a country with many problems," but problems that can be fixed.

And it's filled with people. "There's not that many people in the rural part, but there's a mass of people in the cities," he

people, many hanging out the windows, and they travel through the city at 60 miles per hour with little regard for passengers or pedestrians. He laughs at the time when a bus he was on sideswiped another bus tearing off both vehicles' rear fenders. Neither bus stopped.

You have to be really laid back traveling in India, because nothing is on time, and sometimes you end up in a different place than where you wanted to be," Bartsch said.

The people there are extremely friendly - as they are in most of the countries he visited - and many speak English, and a few opened their homes to

'You can sit down on a bench anywhere in India and be surrounded by people asking questions. They want to know so much about you. All they know about America is what they see in the movies, and it's so warped.

"Everywhere you go people try The buses are overloaded with to sell you things, and beggars are common and bold, the younger ones kicking to get your

attention." The desert state of Rajasthan was the most picturesque, Bartsch said. Camels, colorful saris and turbans were the norm set against the backdrop of ancient hilltop forts.

"It seemed like it was out of the Arabian Nights," he said.

And of course there's the Taj Mahal, built by an Indian ruler for his wife. He had plans to build another one — identical but black - for himself, but was imprisoned by his son who felt he was spending too much money. As an ultimate irony, the father's prison cell overlooked his creation.

Today, it houses the tombs of the ruler and his wife, and aside from that, it's empty, Bartsch

There was an 80-mile bus trip - which took eight hours through treacherous mountain trails - through Nepal to Katmandu, a city with nearly 200 temples of all materials from gold to wood.

It was in Katmandu where Bartsch saw the burial ritual which included burning of the body. "It was fascinating."

Bartsch was in Thailand for the anniversary of the ruler's reign which included parades, fireworks and parties through the night.

His river cruise through Bangladesh was cancelled, however, due to the intense flooding.

Now back in law school at the Detroit College of Law, Bartsch is biding his time until next summer when he expects (don't read this part, Mr. and Mrs. Bartsch) he will make the same kind of trip, only this time through South America.



Ancient druggists believed sapphire to be one of the best antidotes for poison, and if powdered it had the ability to stop bleeding. Sapphire was thought to be so powerful that it would continue to protect it's original owner even after being sold.

At one time the finest sapphires came from the country of Kashmir. The color of these stones is described as 'coinflower' blue with a "sleepy" appearance. Today, very little mining is done in Kashmir, but this quality of sapphire is being found in other areas. and is still referred to as Kashmir sapphires. Today complete are found mainly in Ceylon, Thailand, Africa, and Australia. In the United States sapphires can be found in Montana, in the area of Yogo Gulch." The stones found here are lighter in color - described as "steel" or "electric" blue, and are more transparent than other

Though sapphires are hard, care should be taken when worn. Avoid sharp blows and keep them away from high temperatures. To clean your sapphire jewelry, soak the pieces in warm soapy water and use a fine bristle brush. Have your jewelry checked by a jeweler every six months.



Staff Writer For longtime Motown fan David Bianco, writing and compiling information for a fact book on the legendary recording company was a labor of love.

"Heat Wave: The Motown Fact Book" is Bianco's second book, both of which were published by Ann Arbor's Pierian Press and are part of Pierian Press' Rock & Roll Reference Se-

His first book "Who's New Wave in Music" began as a hobby for Bianco, a former Grosse Pointe resident who now lives in Harper Woods.

"Basically it started out as a hobby. There were so many New Wave groups that kept forming and breaking up and changing members, it was hard to keep track," he said. "So I started compiling information for my own use.

He kept card files of information on groups and performers songs and copies of record reviews and articles, and he would attend concerts whenever

he could. "It was such an ephemeral movement. There were so many changes that within a year the people didn't remember the bands," he said.

When he thought he had enough information, he submitted a book proposal to Pierian Press to use as part of its Rock & Roll Reference Series, which until that time had been dedicated mostly to the Beatles, focusing on aspects like Beatles bootlegs and novelty records, complete lyrics, letters of, and the collecting of, Beatles memorabilia.

That book, the 14th in the series, was only the fourth not dedicated to the Fab Four.

Printed in 1984 and focused on the years 1976-1982, the book was eight years in the making. Much of that time went into the manual typing of the book, the discographies (lists of songs, artists, labels and years of issuance), and manually indexing (no computers were available to him them) the more than 800 bands, 5,000 songs and 5,000 names.

"That project ended as New Wave became part of the mainstream, and I wanted to do another one right away," he said.

He chose Motown, no easy task. Living in the Detroit area, he has been steeped in the music of that label, so he had a head start on the book, and also, he recognized the great story of Motown. Founded by Berry Gordy Jr. in 1959 with an \$800 loan from his family, Motown in effect changed the music industry and produced music from such incredible talents as Smokey Robinson, Diana Ross and the Supremes, Gladys Knight and the Pips, The Jackson Five, Stevie Wonder, Marvin Gaye and the list continues.

While he was working on the book, two comprehensive histories of Motown came out, but that didn't phase Bianco.

"I wasn't worried, because this is a different kind of book," he



Bianco is not sure why Motown became such a force in the music industry. It may have been founder Gordy himself or the era or the great talent it attracted, but the name of the book, he says, "symbolizes Motown's effect on people, its spirit, and its energy.

He said his next book would probably be about music too, but he hopes it is one with more

# Jacobson's display staff: yes, they do windows

Peter E. Northcott, display director for Jacobson Stores Inc. in Grosse Pointe, is responsible - ultimately - for the placement and arrangement of everything in the apparel store and the store for the home.

"The average customer looks at a display for three seconds," he said. "But many times, this customer buys everything from soup to nuts on the mannequin."

Northcott and his staff of six are in charge of designing displays for 15 windows in the apparel store and three windows in the store for the home. Windows change every two weeks and they generally carry out a theme.

"During the construction work on Kercheval (a few weeks ago)," he said, "we used a construction theme. We used road blocks and put hard hats on the mannequins. They were dressed in businesslike outfits."

Northcott said he works on window design ideas about two weeks ahead.

He's responsible for dressing more than 30 mannequins placed throughout the store. He advises department supervisors about displays. And he also serves as the project coordinator for Jacobson's store remodeling projects.

'More than a 40-hour week," he said. "I feel a strong responsibility to keep everything fresh and new."

Jacobson's philosophy, he said, is based on the fact that it is a specialty store - not a department store. "This is supposed to be a wonderful experience for

Northcott is from the Bay City area and holds an associate of arts degree from Delta College. He worked for J.L. Hudson's for 12 years doing display work, fashion shows - even modeling, he said.

"I got all my fashion background from Hudson's."

He's currently a junior at Eastern Michigan University, working in the interior design/ store planning program.

Northcott said Jacobson's doesn't rent, but buys all display props. They're stored in the basement and are often reused again and again, he said.

"We buy materials for props and displays from St. Vincent de Paul, from garage sales."

He said most of the props are durable, useable stuff that can



# The Pastor's Corner

### Movie is not gospel

The movie "The Last Temptation of Christ" has been variously termed as provocative, blasphemous and an authentic probe into the depths of Jesus' psyche. The observation I would like to make is that whatever it is, this movie is not gospel. It is not gospel in two senses.

In the first place, it is not a gospel in terms of its literary

At the very beginning of the film, there is a disclaimer that "The Last Temptation" is not a literal or factual representation of the gospel stories of the New Testament.

Rather, the movie is a surrealistic exploration into the struggle between good and evil inside a human being. It is based on Kazantzakis' imaginative fantasy about this struggle. The novelist picked Jesus as an image around which he could weave this fictional narrative.

Jesus was a representative figure of the good person in which the conflict between obedience to God's call and rejection of the call is most heightened. As a surrealistic art form, the movie has no obligation to represent the literal outlines of the four Gospels any more than surrealistic painters are obliged to represent nature in any photographic or literal way. The interest of the surrealists was to give graphic expression to hidden realities of the uncon-

As a result, the movie tells us more about Kazantzakis than it does about the historical Jesus. The author's purpose, and supposedly the movie's purpose, is to provoke the audience into thinking about the struggle between good and evil within out own unconscious experience.

For me that purpose was not achieved. I was not able to identify with the character of Jesus in such a way that the struggle between good and evil resonated within me. The character of Jesus was overdrawn. His self-mortification, his extreme guilt about the enjoyment of life and natural desires, is something that I do not share.

The movie is flawed further as an art form because the character of Jesus did not maintain the tension of the struggle between the desires of the flesh and his vocation to transcend those desires. Rather than living in the tension, Jesus wobbled back and forth between them.

At first he is a driven ascetic, the next minute he is wallowing in sensual pleasure. One minute he says God is the source of tenderness and love; the next he says God is filled with anger, wrath and judgment. Because Jesus does not maintain the tension between these polarities, he is neither an heroic figure nor a tragic one. He is a wimp (a characterization hardly consistent with the canonical Gospels).

The second way in which "The Last Temptation of Christ" is not gospel is in terms of its inspirational or faithgiving quality.

A) There is no "Good News" about Jesus.

Jesus is no saviour. As I have said, he is portrayed as a wimp. He starts off flagellating himself and repressing all his feelings of self-worth, natural affections and celebration of life. Then he succumbs to the last temptation to indulge his desires of the flesh. Finally, provoked by guilt, he gets back on the cross to propitiate a sour god. His death does nothing to help us. It gives us neither an example to follow nor any leverage to free us from the struggle between selfindulgence and a higher vocation.

B) There is no "Good News" about God. The movie's view about God is bad news. God is repressive, vindictive and violent. He is mad as hell. Just as he got Jesus, he is going to get you. God created us with libidos and urges which can be neither controlled nor celebrated. They can only torment us and push us into temptation. When we inevitably succumb, God lashes out in anger and rages for us to get back ont he cross of repression.

C) There is no "Good News" for human beings. The movie offers so solace or inspiration. Perhaps it is produced to give us a sober moral: We all face crushing temptations.

"The Last Temptation" is no gospel. It has nothing to do with the power of God for salvation which is recorded in the documents of the New Testament and which we Christians celebrate in our worship. The movie is a fanciful tale which takes liberty with the story of Jesus and plays loose with its historicity.

As surrealistic fiction, it may engage some to reflect on the forces of good and evil. At best, then, it will point to the need for the real Gospel of Jesus Christ.

# Weaving a winner

Center for Creative Studies instructor designs new vestments for church

Mollie Fletcher thought she was just getting together with a few friends for lunch. The friends had something else in mind.

Christ Church of Grosse Pointe members Betty Byrd and Jeanne McLeod asked Fletcher to meet them for lunch and to lend her expertise as a fiber artist and instructor to their project: setting up a competition among Michigan designers for the new vestments and altar clothes needed at Christ Church.

"I thought, how nice, lunch and a chance to help draft application forms and set up the competition. Then Jeanne said, 'I hope you'll enter the competi-

"I told her that I couldn't because I couldn't sew. But I thought about it and figured I could find somebody to help with the stitching. So I applied,' Fletcher explains.

Christ Church created the competition because it wanted to be supportive of Michigan fiber artists and at the same time, do something different with the new vestments.

"Our hope was that the design competition would produce something very special for Pentecost, the church season which begins in May and lasts until Advent," explains The Rev. Gregory Sammons of Christ Church.

"I can't speak for the committee, but I think we all wanted

designs which would be imaginative and at the same time, capture the themes of Pentecost.'

Fletcher's drawings did just that and she was selected as one of the three finalists in the competition.

The finalists then had to submit painted designs. They were also asked for samples of what the cloth and yarn would be like in the finished design for the project, which would include an altar frontal, three stoles and chasubles (robes), a Bible marker, chalice veil and burse (which includes several small napkin-like cloths with various purposes).

Fletcher was chosen from the finalists for the commission. Her winning design is a mixture of gray-green, blue and pink colors which address the themes inherent in the Pentcostal season: the heavens and the earth, rebirth and spiritual empowerment and growth.

Fletcher, an eastsider who has taught fiber arts for nine years at CCS (where she is head of that department), came up with a somewhat less-traditional design than some Christ Church members may have expected.

"I wanted to pick a design that I'd be compatible with. I wasn't interested in doing something that wouldn't be true to myself. Ironically, the themes of Pentecost represent themselves

in the type of work I do anyway. "I had told Jeanne (McLeod) from the very beginning not to

expect a design that would incorporate too much traditional symbolism. There is so much symbolism in the church already, I didn't think it needed to be present in the altar frontal, too," Fletcher says.

All Fletcher had to do after being awarded the commission was to come up with some time to do the work. She began the project in late May and had a target date of Sept. 4, when the

new vestments would be presented to the congregation.

"So I had three and one-half months of non-stop work. And it ended up being more work than I realized," Fletcher admits.

The chasubles are designed to represent first century street wear. "They are to remind us of the seamless robe which Christ wore and which was stripped



from him on the cross," Sammons explains.

'Through the ages, the robe became something of a teaching tool, like a sandwich board. So we wanted a vestment which would recall that ancient design.

The altar frontal, which incorporates a similar design, is comprised of three woven panels separated by a pink zig-zag design. Fletcher used a six-harness twill inlay fabric and tapestry made of 50 percent wool and 50 percent silk for the project.

The result is an intriguing mix of imaginative designs, interesting colors and traditional symbols. The reaction to the new vestments has been very postive, according to both Fletcher and Sammons.

"We used them last Sunday and got many wonderful, positive comments. I personally am delighted by the blues in the design. The vestments are different than what I had expected, but overall, very handsome," Sammons says.

And Fletcher is happy with her finished product.

"I think that the design is open enough to allow people to look at it and come up with their own ideas. And I'm always happy when a piece allows people to ruminate.

"This was a very interesting project for me in that most of the commercial work I do is two-dimensional and just hangs there on the wall. It's nice to see something fabricated and used and have meaning," Fletcher says.

Fletcher says she was further buoyed by the many positive comments she received following the debut of the vestments. She spoke at an impromptu gathering after the Sept. 4 service and enjoyed the feedback from church members, she says.

"Best of all, this work will last. It's nice to be able to think that because these pieces are in a church sanctuary they will be protected and treasured. I can come back in 20 years and still see my work.





### Pears and 'perry make autumn a most welcome sight

We almost automatically think of apples and cider when crisp early fall days arrive, but how about pears and perry for a change? Perry is pear cider, and very, very good it is.

Pears have a venerable history going back 35 or 40 centuries. Originating in western Asia and around the Caspian Sea, they have been known for many centuries in Europe, as far back as the Stone Age.

Homer, writing in Greece about 580 B.C., calls this fruit "the gift of the gods," and lists pears among the fruits growing in Alcinous's garden. Some cenof pears, and give lengthy descriptions of methods of grafting unknown in the 18th century.

Nicolas Hardenpont, a priest in Mons, Belgium, refers to pears as "Butterfruit" in the early 18th century and since that time more than 5,000 varieties have been listed. Pears contain large amounts of vitamins A, B and C and a considerable amount of iodine, necessary for the proper functioning of the thyroid gland. Beautiful skin and shiny hair have for centuries been attributed to a regular consumption of pears. What a pleasant way to acquire beauty!

A fruit which originated in this country is the blackberry, which grows wild in many states and is cultivated in many others. When settlers moved west blackberries were sparse because so much of the land was heavily forested. As the forests were cut, blackberries flourished and chance crosses between species produced many new varieties. At one time there were hundreds of varieties named, some wild, some the result of breeding.

Blackberries became very popular about 1840 when a variety named the Dorchester was exhibited by the Massachusetts Horticultural Society and widely advertised. In England, blackberries are often called brambleberries, and the nursery rhyme about the man who jumped into a bramblebush and scratched out his eyes refers to the many thorns that even the most cultivated blackberry bushes have.

As soon as you feel a nip of early fall frost in the air you might consider moving some of the impatiens that have brightened your garden all summer into pots and turning them into flowering houseplants to last well into the winter.

When you dig up the plants, dig widely enough that you have a clump of soil around the roots. Set it carefully into a clay pot which has a layer of charcoal or coarse gravel in the bottom for drainage. Set the pot in a southwest window, water it a couple of times a week, and enjoy summer color nearly all winter. A row of pots of blooming impatiens would certainly be a cheering sight in January.

Charles Darwin is best remembered for his scientific explanation of evolution which he described in his famous book "The Origin of Species." But his fascination with all aspects of nature made him especially interested in some aspects of plant life that most of us never get around to thinking about.

Every now and then we hear of experiments to determine if plants respond to music, or if they can be frightened by such

things as having a lighted match held too close to them. We say, "How silly!," but Darwin took these things seriously. After all, he once played the piano to some earthworms. He also blew whistles and shouted at them and breathed on them with tobacco smoke to study their responses.

As a scientist whose interests ranged from the possible inheritance of handwriting patterns to the question of whether plants have memories or animals have guilt feelings, he was probably the originator of the theory that you should talk to your house plants to promote their growth and health. It might be worth a try. Or you might see if they prefer rock music or opera.

The latest theory is that your houseplant should have exercise. Jiggle them a little every day, or blow on them with a strong fan.



"I wanted the kids to prove to themselves that they were better than what they showed in the first half," VanEckoute said. "They did prove that they can

play with a good team like North." While Reiter sat in foul trou-

ble and Mergos was held scoreless in the first quarter, North coach Gary Bennett was not concerned.

"We don't rely on one person," he said. "The rest of the kids did a nice job when Kim and Heather weren't much of a factor. Our offense is geared to go to anybody.'

North, playing like a seasoned-team, came fully prepared. "We were prepared," said Bennett. "It didn't surprise me that we shot well to start the game,

but it did surprise me how quickly we got out of the gate." North's uprising, led to

South's downfall. "We lost the game in the first quarter," VanEckoute said. "The kids were mentally nervous because it was the first game.'

Bennett was pleased with the quick entrance, but credits his strong defense for crossing South

doing," said VanEckoute. "I really liked the tenacity the girls showed. They didn't want to lose in the second half. As far as we are concerned, we beat North in the second half and that was our goal after halftime."

As for Bennett, he watched as his offense began to sputter as South's defense created some havoc.

"We weren't concentrating at both ends of the court," he said. South was not about to give in and they stayed in it. We just had some mental breakdowns out there.'

South's Katie Koip and Sarah Heck each had seven points to pace the offense, and Kathleen Monaghan and Megan Nelson each had six.

"The girls began to run the offense and gained some confidence," VanEckoute said. "They began to believe that they can be as good, if not better, than their competitors."

South cut into the North cushion and trailed 45-37, but they never got closer.

"Offensively we played like the ball was a hot potato," he said. "We didn't run the offense, but I think our defense helped us a great deal. 

### **USCG** refinements

High water, low water: hot summer or cold summer. It doesn't seem to matter, the Coast Guard (USCG) is always keeping busy on Lake St. Clair. This year, however, the Coast Guard was operating with refinements to its maritime search and rescue assistance policy.

If you recall, there was great controversy over the role of the Coast Guard in non-emergency situations. The Coast Guard greatly changed their policy in recent years, and no longer would assist vessels where life and limb were not threatened. The Coast Guard no longer brought gas to stranded boaters, or towed disabled boats to shore. They deferred such assistance to private operators.

Now, after reviewing the policy, conducting public hearings all over the country and going over all the written material that flowed into the Coast Guard on this issue, there have been refinements to the policy finally published. The new policy has just gone public, but it has been in the hands of the Coast Guard since June.

The USCG will continue to respond to a mariner in distress. The response may be provided by the USCG, the USCG Auxiliary or resources of the state, local, commerical firms or private entities. Much depends on the nature of the emergency. Life threatening situations will always get immediate Coast Guard response.

If neither the boater or the vessel is in immediate danger, the USCG will defer to an alternate who can be on the scene quickly, usually within the hour.

If the USCG cannot reach anyone, then the Coast Guard will offer to make a Marine Assistance Request Broadcast (MARB). This broadcast is an invitation to someone in the area to offer assistance, usually commercial firms, but perhaps a good samaritan may come for-

If the MARB gets no response within a reasonable time frame, generally considered to be about 10 minutes, then the Coast Guard can dispatch the Auxiliary. If a member of the Auxiliary is not availble, then the Coast Guard can go to the boater's side.

The boater may decline any assistance offered. (Boaters generally decline commerical assistance, usually because of cost.) The Coast Guard can make additional MARBs. but if the first response to the MARB is a commerical firm, then the USCG will only make one additional MARB. If the commercial firm is rejected by the boater the USCG may provide a list of phone numbers of alternate commerical firms. The boater would have to contact those outfits himself, with the help of the marine opera-

If the Coast Guard or the Coast Guard Auxiliary tows a boat, they will tow it to the nearest safe harbor where a telephone is available. The boater is on his own from there. They will not tow the boater to his home port.

Once the USCG takes a boat in tow there is no requirement to transfer a tow unless it is mutually agreeable.

The Coast Guard may drop the two at any time to render assistance to a higher priority emergency.

Under the non-emergency assistance policy, any boater requiring assistance will have to pay for commerical towing, or other services the commercial firm may provide.

In non-emergency situations if a commerical firm is on the scene already, then neither the Coast Guard nor the Coast Guard Auxiliary will be sent out.

The Coast Guard has now made it very clear that their job is to rescue people. They are not emergency gas stations, or marine mechanics. They do not rescue personal property. These new clarifications to their non-emergency assistance policy should help eliminate some of the confusion about just what the Coast Guard will and will not







#### Sprains and strains

The child who accidentally twists an ankle or sprains a come home bandaged or acewrapped. Hopefully, the need for x-rays has been assessed and, if requested by the school, the child should be taken to the family doctor for evaluation and treatment. An acute sprain will usually be healed within a few days if treated with rest and ice packs for the first 24 to 48 hours following the injury.

Remember that the objective of treating an acute strain or sprain with ice is to cool down the injured area to reduce swelling and slow internal bleeding. The, injured joint or the skin overlooking the join can be frozen if the

Thirty minutes on and 30 minutes off is the usual rule. Evaluation of the injured joint will also help as will rest using splints or crutches. It's important to realize that certain types of sprains do take a long time to heal. Children are often eager to get back to the sport they love and parental restraint is important to prevent serious or permanent injury from occurring.

#### Cuts

Children get cuts from a variety of causes. In general, any cut should be cleansed with normal saline if it's available. If not, plain water will do. Bleeding from a cut will almost always stop if firm pressure is applied directly over the cut. Any cut should be evaluated for closing with sutures, but many will heal without problems if

the cut is closed with a sterile-strip bandage. A cut that is deep and won't quit bleeding, a large cut or a cut that might involve underlying structures such as tendons or nerves, should be evaluated by a physician.

All cuts should be re-bandaged at least once a day. Cleansing with plain water or soap and water is permissable at any time. Signs of an infection includes increased redness, warmth around the cut, pain and a yellowish discharge from the cut itself. When that occurs, re-evaluation by a physician is necessary.

Scars will also occur from any cut. They are most prominent during the first six months after the injury but gradually fade over time.

Accidents are the main cause of injury and even death for school age children. Reinforcing all the safety

rules is important. Remember, too, that to become an adult every child has to suffer through a certain number of bumps, bruises, sprains and strains. Let's minimize these as much as possible and treat them correctly when they do

#### Locker room and shower concern

Children often develop a desire to avoid physical education classes when they reach the age to take showers after the class or team sports. A child new to the task of undressing in front of classmates or showering together may be embarrased and want to avoid classes. This happens often in adolescents and can manifest itself into strange symptoms like headaches or stomach pains that coincidentally occur at the beginning of the particular activity.

Parents should recognize that children are often embarrased by appearing nude in front of their classmates and develop the strange aches and pains as a mechanism to avoid the situation. Physical developments are delayed in some and advanced in others. These differences can lead to peer scrutiny, which may be embarrassing to the child. A frank discussion with the child will often bring out the true cause of their avoidance behavior and enable the parent to reassure the child that physical differences between people are normal.

It is time to diet again. You can't avoid the signs. You skuttle past your scale as if it had the plague. Your favorite pair of jeans just won't zip up anymore, and no amount of wishful thinking will make those pounds disappear.

When you do reach the decision to diet, it is your choice and it is up to you who you will entrust with the information. Dieting is a very personal undertaking because it is a venture which involves a change in you. Choose those you wish to know about your diet wisely, for they will either be supporters or sabateurs to your goal.

When establishing a support system, make sure you know exactly what type of support you seek. Is it just occasional compliments on your success, or do you want someone to exercise with you? Should they criticize when you pick an "illegal" food or should they leave it to your discretion? People, no matter how much they care about you, can't be intuitive to your every need. Therefore, to insure you are receiving the best possible support, be specific regarding your individual needs.

### The well-meaning friend

Friends bring so much joy into our lives. But when it comes to dieting, they will either support our goal to lose weight or they will, (many times unknowingly), sabotage our efforts. A friend who is also overweight can become jealous of your success. Your

friends may feel left behind, particularly if your friendship centered around food (e.g. going out to share calorieladen lunches, exchanging those "fattening" recipes). Your decision to diet will change those times together. Nothing will seem the same to you or your friend.

Explain to your friend that you would like to continue spending time together, but with a new and different emphasis. Think of all the different things you and your friend could enjoy together that does not focus on food or eating. It will be better for both of you, and if your friend also needs to lose weight, you may suggest dieting together.

On the flip side, is the tall, gorgeous friend who has never had to diet one day, as far as you know. Your friend may be naturally slim, but on the other hand, your friend may follow a lifestyle that includes healthy eating plus a regular amount of exercise. If the last example is the real truth, you may do well to spend time with your friend to reinforce your own commitment to shed those extra

One of the most important facts to remember is that you have a unique body; a body that will never be exactly like anyone else's, not only in looks, but in the way you will lose weight. Take satisfaction in your own personal success, and compare your progress only with your personal goals.

#### The loving spouse

Does this sound familiar? "You don't need to lose weight; I love you just the way you are." This message can be interpreted in different ways. One interpretation may be as it is stated. You are cared for and loved because of who you are, and not by what you weigh or do not weigh. On the other hand, your spouse may unconsciously need you to be overweight because he or she feels safe. When a person loses weight it means change, and many spouses fear the change that may take place. Do you still love them? This is a real concern and should never be dismissed lightly. Communication is the key to alleviate these stresses. Let your spouse know how important this goal is to you.

Be honest and straight with your spouses. Let them know what is expected of you on your particular program and ask their cooperation in helping you follow your regimen.

This does not mean that you turn your diet program over to them or make them responsible for what you have chosen to follow. It does mean though, that you have a right to object to their placing you in an impossible situation. For instance, if you and your spouse are going out to dinner, you have a right to ask that you choose a restaurant where your food needs can be accommodated. In this day and age, this is not a difficult request. Most restaurants offer a variety of choices; your spouse can eat to his or her heart's content, yet you can stay within your diet program's regulations.

#### The "Mommy" syndrome

Who cares for you and loves you more than your mother? In the past, this love may have been demonstrated by a warm batch of chocolate chip cookies, or any of a number of "your favorite" foods. And there are people other than your mother who enjoy "mothering" you.

One of the best responses to people who enjoy the "mommy" syndrome is this: "No thank you, not right now." When you tell them, "not right now," they will get the message that you are not quite ready. It does not sound as cold and uncaring as just "no." In fact, "not right now" can be used through an entire evening with no hard feelings.

#### Five plus five plus five, etc.

Recognition through realistic goal setting is the best way to build your own inner support system. Losing 30, 40 or more pounds may seem an impossible goal to attain. ### Corporations and labor unions show new concerns for happy, healthy pregnancies

Corporations and labor unions looking for ways to cut costs and improve productivity are turning to work site programs promoting proper health care during pregnancy, the March of Dimes Birth Defects Foundation reports.

The trend is a response to the continuing surge of women into the work force and a growing tendency for women to remain on the job throughout pregnancy and to return to work within months after delivery.

"Surveys show that 80 percent of the 34 million working women of childbearing age will become pregnant during their working lives," said Mary Ellen Gleeson. Community Services Director, of the Southeast Michigan Chapter of the March of Dimes. "Employers are learning that promoting healthy pregnancies can save insurance costs, reduce absenteeism and improve productivity.'

Approximately 79 percent of all pregnant women work during pregnancy. At the managerial and professional levels, 48 percent work during the ninth month of pregnancy. Almost 50 percent of all working women

will return to their jobs following delivery; double the rate of 15 years ago.

Work sites sponsoring prenatal education programs benefit from a reduction in birth defects and low birth-weight in babies born to employees and spouses. Hospital and doctor costs for initial hospitalization of a low birth-weight baby can range from \$16,136 to \$174,278 compared to \$2,923 for the birth of a open house normal-weight baby.
