Veterans Day — a 'necessary reminder' — for 69 years

It's not a holiday that inspires the greeting card industry, but it's one that inspires millions of Americans to stop for a moment and give thanks to those who fought for our country.

In 1919, Nov. 11 was set aside - by presidential proclamation - as a day to honor the signing of the armistice agreement in the Forest of Compiegne between the allies and Germany, one year earlier, bringing an end to the first, and what was hoped last, world war.

In 1921 the bodies of four unidentified soldiers were disinterred from cemeteries in Europe and one was chosen arbitrarily to signify all the American dead from that war. Brought to America, the body lay in state in the rotunda at the Capitol for three days as thousands came to pay trib-

In 1954, after a trip to Kansas where they called the day Veterans Day, a congressman proposed the official name of Nov. 11 be changed and expanded to honor all veterans of all wars.

Many Veterans Day celebrations throughout the country begin at 11 a.m., which coincides with the timing of the cease fire in World War I. Poppies, synibolic of the wildflowers that grew in European battlefields, are worn as a remembr-

ance. Park resident Arthur Brown is a World War II veteran who sees Veterans Day as a "necessary reminder" to those who have - and haven't - served in defense of this

He says: "History repeats itself, because we weren't listening the first time.'

He urges vets to go beyond the traditional laying of the wreath and remember their service organizations throughout the year, attend reunions, and keep in touch with those with whom they served.

Brown is the membership expansion chairman and is on the board of trustees for Post 303 of the American Legion, he says that there are some 22 million people eligible to join veterans organizations, yet only one in 20 does. Veterans Day serves as a reminder to those eligible that these organizations exist for their benefit.

"Veterans Day serves to keep that fire burning," he said.

Dick Milliman, also of Post 303 of the American Legion, says Veterans Day is a day for thanks and for remembrance.

"Originally it was a day of relief that the war was over; that the bloodshed had ceased," he said. "Now for those who made

The lottery club and one other ticket holder had all six numbers of the Wednesday drawing in January for \$4.6 million. A dispute raised by the Cottage lottery club's treasurer, Norma Brumm, prevented the club from dividing up the after-tax firstyear payment of \$94,000.

According to club member Jim Southway, whose attorney is handling the case on behalf of the club, 14 or 15 of the 20 members should soon be finally receiving their share of the \$2.3 million.

Earlier, visiting Detroit Recorder's Judge William Cahalan ordered the \$94,000 be split in 20 ths based on the number of regular members of the club. He

Pointer of Interest Al Thomas

On New Year's Day two years ago, Grosse Pointe Park resident Al Thomas saw a television program on the homeless and he wanted to do something to help. And help he did.

Thomas, 55, didn't have to look far. Through his church, Grosse Pointe Memorial, he learned that the St. John Community Center had just been forced to shut down by the city of Detroit due to building code violations and, basically, bureaucratic red tape.

"When I walked in there and found a real need for help, I didn't have to look any further," Thomas says.

As a lawyer and business manager of the Friend of the Court division of Wayne County Circuit Court, Thomas was exactly what the failing mission

He quickly learned that much of the center's problems had to do with its legal status. To qualify for funding from various agencies, Thomas had the mission's name legally changed to Eastside Emergency Center and incorporated as a non-profit insti-

He explains that many agencies will not give money to churches, so he set up the center independent of St. John Congregational Church, which is part of the center's site on Kercheval near Chalmers in Detroit.

Thomas enlisted the help of his son Jeff, who is an electrician, to help bring the old building up to code.

The church's pastor, the Rev. Ben Johnson, said he and his wife, Ann, who is also an ordained minister, knew what had to be done to save their mission, but they didn't quite know how to go about it. That's where

Gordon Morlan, chairman of about the increase of the weight the committee, said the rationale of final exams when determining for considering a change was, "Final exams are not held in

The committee to consider the high regard by many students. By increasing their importance, percentage-wise," he said, "we would foster the perception of their importance.'

In reality, Morlan said, grades wouldn't change much. "We're dealing with a perception here," he said.

Nancy Gandelot, a junior at Grosse Pointe South, said the weight of final exams should not be increased because of the emotional aspects of the testing process. "Some people just don't do well on tests," she said.

She also said that students do

take final exams seriously. She added that most teachers do not allow enough review time for final exams. She also pointed out that the two parents on the committee voted against the policy change.

Morlan countered the first point by saying that he agrees that our society depends too much on test scores, such as the ACTs and SATs, but, he said, "That's the way it is in our soci-

John Kastran, North principal, went on record as supporting the change in policy. "It's a psychological advantage that the staff is looking for," he said.

Superintendent John Whritner and board members Carl Anderson and Gloria Konsler also said they supported the committee's recommendation to weight finals 1/5 of the grade, but they were concerned about the issue of review time that was raised by the students at the meeting.

The board agreed to postpone additional discussion on the matter until December's meetings, in order to allow the students more time to present their point of view and to gather their own

The proposal was approved by the 18-member committee by an 8 to 3 vote. It must be approved by the school board.

Woods attorney confident pit bull ban constitutional

After having been skeptical of the constitutionality of a pit bull ban when it was first adopted by the Grosse Pointe Woods City Council last month, the city's attorneys are now confident the ban is justified and will stand up in court.

On Oct. 3 the council passed an emergency ordinance banning pit bulls in the city effective on or about Oct. 11. At the time the ban was adopted, attorney John DesRosiers, who was sitting in for City Attorney George Catlin expressed doubt the ban would hold up under a constitutional challenge in court.

Two suits were quickly filed against the ban seeking a restraining order blocking its enforcement. On Oct. 14 a Wayne County Circuit Court judge denied the injunction. The two suits are awaiting hearings in circuit court.

Since the October pit bull ban was an emergency action, the council had Catlin draw a permanent ordinance, which was approved for its first reading Monday night.

Catlin said the permanent ordinance is basically the same as the emergency legislation, except for some "cleaning up" of the language of the ordinance.

A court would decide if the impounded animal is among the breed banned and can order the animal destroyed. Catlin also added a provision to the permanent ordinance that would make it illegal for the city to license any dogs believed to be pit bulls.

Catlin's office put in 24 1/4 hours during October in researching the pit bull issue and in defending the city against the two lawsuits. The cost to the city at \$68.25 per hour is \$1,655.

While discussing the pit bull ban Monday night, Catlin indicated personal support of the ban, and he said he believes it is constitutional and a reasonable and justified use of police action.

He referred to an April 21, 1987, report by Dr. Randall Lockwood, director of higher education programs for the the Humane Society of the United States.

Lockwood was able to document 26 fatalities nationwide caused by dogs during a 16month period beginning January 1986. He found that 18 of the deaths involved pit bulls.

Catlin points out that Lockwood's figures show that pit bulls caused 69 percent of the deaths, while pit bulls make up only 2 percent of the dog population. He said that in his opinion the 69 percent figure justifies a ban on pit bulls.

Catlin also said that knowing a pit bull from birth is not a guarantee that the dog will not attack someone, even a family member. He referred to a letter to the editor in the Oct. 27 Grosse Pointe News by Grosse Pointe resident Denise Kennedy.

She said her 22-month-old son was attacked by an American bull terrier. The dog was 5 years old at the time and had been raised by the Kennedys since a puppy. The little boy received 86 stitches to his head and eye. She said keeping a pit bull is like trying to have a lion as a pet.

Catlin is confident the Woods' pit bull ban will be found constitutional. He said the Hartford, Mich., pit bull ordinance has stood up to one court challenge and is now being appealed.

Mayor Pro Tem Robert Novitke asked Catlin to look into making sure all breeds of pit bulls are adequately described in the ordinance to prevent similar breeds getting into the city through vague language in the ordinance.

The ordinance also bans all vicious dogs or animals from the city except for trained guard dogs. Guard dogs, however, cannot be pit bulls. Novitke suggested that the ordinance allow only "professionally trained" guard dogs.

Councilwoman Jean Rice pointed out that the city's licensing fee of \$2.25 seems awfully low considering the cost to the city of enforcing the dog ordinance and leash laws and impounding stray or banned dogs.

Councilman Thomas Fahrner responded, saying pet owners already have to pay a lot of money The approval of the permanent to get their pets all the shots necessary for licensing. 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News The complete Walter Reuther: A daughter writes

Can you imagine Walter Reuther, an intense competitive, self-disciplined patron saint of the UAW, skipping down a street in Paris with his young daughter? Or writing a love letter to his wife, May, and signing it "your dope?" Or wearing a turban and flower garland during a visit to a village in India?

This combative, incorruptible man of ascetic personal habits was also a man with a ready wit who enjoyed a good laugh, even if it was on him. This littleknown side of the legendary labor leader is illuminated in a soon-to-be-published book, by his youngest daughter, Elisabeth Reuther Dickmeyer, titled "Reuther: A Daughter Strikes."

One of the most fabled men in the auto industry was a squeaky-clean tool-and-die maker from Wheeling, W. Va., who came to Detroit and was a leader in organizing the United Auto Workers.

Before he and his wife, May, were killed in a mysterious plane crash near the UAW's Black Lake facility in 1970, Walter Reuther had become the conscience of organized labor, a political king-maker and a powerful moral leader with a worldwide following.

Mrs. Dickmeyer covers all this in her book, but also paints an engaging picture of a loving husband and father.

Reuther showed his negotiating skill early when he talked his way into a tryout for a job as a die leader at Ford Motor Co., a job which specified 25 years of the time and, to make matters cheeks made him look even younger.

He argued down the guard at to win a tryout from the foreman, who grudgingly admitted

Walter Reuther was a lifelong abstainer from alcohol and tobacco, but many of his associates were not, and when he was elected president of the CIO in 1952, some of the campaign workers reminded him that he had promised to smoke a cigar and drink a shot of whiskey if

While taking the oath of office, he was handed a stogie and a glass of whiskey. He gamely took a puff on the cigar, which set him to coughing. He raised the glass of whiskey to his lips, then exclaimed: "How can you guys drink this stuff?"

The delegates roared their delight and settled for some photos of Reuther with cigar and whiskey in hand.

Later, he addressed the Brewery Workers Union, also affiliated with the CIO and a union his own father had once headed. "It is a hell of a comedown when the son of the former head of the Brewery Workers Union is a teetotaler," he said. He was forgiven.

Mrs. Dickmeyer tells of her family's warm relationships with the Kennedys, Hubert Humphrey, Eleanor Roosevelt and Martin Luther King Jr., among many others.

Mrs. Dickmeyer made headlines herself in 1976, when as Lisa Reuther she teamed with Alfred Brush Ford, great-grand-





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

1988 election a warmup for '91 districting

mong the 1988 election returns that will be closely studied by the political experts in the months ahead are those showing the strength of the two political parties in the nation's state legislatures.

The reason?

Both political parties this year raised significant amounts of money to try to increase their legislative support preparatory to the 1991 redistricting battles that will follow the 1990 census.

Both parties know that control of state legislatures will be a crucial factor in determining the balance of power in the U.S. House of Representatives over the next decade. And while the state House members elected this year will have to run again in 1990 before the redistricting takes place, both parties sought to start a trend in their direction this year.

Michigan is one of the states that will lose representation in the U.S. House because its population has not kept pace with the increases in the South and Southwest. This state probably will lose two seats and both parties know that the outlines of the new districts may well determine whether the Republicans or the Democrats will take the loss.

Before Tuesday's election, the Republicans held seven seats, the Democrats 11. Results were not available as the Grosse



Pointe News went to press Tuesday night, but despite several close races, all incumbents were expec ed to be returned to of-

The Pointes, as we've mentioned earlier, have their own problem. It is to reunite the Republican Pointes in one district so that their candidate for Congress will not be overwhelmed by the Democrats. In the 1982 gerrymandered reapportionment following the 1980 census, the Pointes were split into two districts, in violation of the Supreme Court mandate that communities should not be divided by congressional district lines.

As we've seen ever since, that reapportionment made both the 13th and 14th districts safe for the Democrats and gave the Pointes little voice in the selection of their representatives. It is hoped that in the reapportionment in 1991, the Pointes can be reunited, with the Park and the City being moved back into the 14th District where they would feel more compatible with other voters and give the GOP a better chance at victory.

Even Rep. George W. Crockett, the 13th District Democrat who acquired the two Pointe communities in the 1982 reapportionment, feels that it was a mistake. He has said consistently that the Pointes in

his district would have more in common with people in the 14th District than they have with the majority of 13th District vot-

That, however, is only one of the reapportionment problems facing the state and the Midwest. In the 1990 census, 15 to 20 House seats are expected to shift from aging regions in the Northeast and Midwest to the South and Southwest. That will tend to lessen the influence of Michigan, the Midwest and the Northeast in Washington and strengthen the influence of the South and Southwest.

Many states in the Midwest, in addition to Michigan, also have experienced a shift in population from aging urban centers, such as Detroit, to growing suburban centers, such as Troy and Southfield. Those shifts also will require reapportionment and the new districts will give suburban communities more clout than the aging big cities.

Before Tuesday's election, Democrats controlled both legislative chambers in 28 states, Republicans ruled both houses in nine and the houses were split in 12 states, including Michigan. One state, Nebraska, has a unicameral legislature.

Democrats appear to be at greater risk in the reapportionment in 1991 than the

Republicans. Suburbs tend to vote Republican more often than central cities do. And such states as Texas, Florida and California, all slated to gain representation, have increasingly been voting Republican. In addition, the GOP controls the governors' chairs in that trio of important reapportionment battlegrounds of 1991: Texas, Florida and California.

Governors can play an important role in redistricting because they not only can influence the Legislatures but, like former Gov. William Milliken in 1982, they can also veto reapportionment legislation they dislike. Milliken's veto, unfortunately for the Republicans, was upset in the courts.

The Democrats, however, have controlled the U.S. House since the 1954 election and before Tuesday's election occupied 255 seats, as contrasted with the 177 in Republican hands. Three of the 435 seats were vacant. However, 98 percent of incumbents in both parties were re-elected in 1986.

In Michigan, the House is in the hands of the Democrats and is still expected to be Democratic when the returns from Tuesday's election are all in. The Senate is in Republican control and will remain so because Senate seats were not up for election this year. So this year the GOP concentrated on increasing its representation in the House not only to give its legislators more clout against the Democrats, but also to prepare for the showdown election in 1990 when both houses will be at stake.

So it is no wonder that in Michigan as well as the nation at large both parties will study the 1988 election results to see what they need to do in the state legislative elections in 1990 to win favorable reapportionment plans that will give them more seats in Congress under the 1991 reapportionment.

Tt was not a surprise to school officials that the fourth Friday enrollment in ures. That means that without some unexpand pected shifts, the school administration can continue to plan for continued stability for the next few years at least.

This was the second straight year that a drop had occurred after three years of small increases in enrollment. News coverage a disgrace?

ack in 1984, just before the election, John Kenneth Galbraith wrote a letter to the New York Times charging that the news media's coverage of electoral campaigns was "a national disgrace."

As it turned out, Galbraith never sent the letter to the Times but he did include it in a book, "A View from the Stands," as well as in the 1988 Information Please Almanac. His criticisms are worth considering for they apply to 1988 as well as to 1984.

Galbraith, a long-time Democrat, made two major criticisms of the media coverage. One is "the concentration on political strategy and tactics as opposed to issues in nearly, if not quite all, reporting." The second "electoral aberration" of the media, in Galbraith's opinion, is "the devotion to polling."

Without mentioning Galbraith, participants in an NBC discussion of the 1988 campaign Sunday night tended to agree with him. In early 1988, for example, the media were ready to count George Bush out of the race after he came in third in the Iowa Republican caucuses. Then he surprised the media experts by capturing the Republican primary in New Hampshire and going on to win an easy victory at the GOP national convention.

With respect to the Democrats, the NBC program recalled the media theory early in the campaign that none of the 11 Democratic "dwarfs" could win enough delegates to capture the nomination and that the nominee would come out of a brokered national convention. Wrong again, as we all

know.

The NBC program participants pointed out that TV news reports as well as commercials put a premium on snappy oneliners and 30-second visuals. James Baker, George Bush's campaign manager, said both the Bush and Dukakis campaigns were based on 30-second sound bites. But there is some justification for Bush's criticism that his position papers on solid issues were ignored by the news media.

In our view, the trouble with polling is that not enough people realize that a public opinion survey produces a snapshot that is a good predictor of the outcome only at the moment the snapshot is taken. Another problem with polls is that everybody is getting into the act, and some of the pollsters are less careful than they should be with the methods used to ascertain public opinion and with the way the questions are phrased.

Most of us in the print media tend to fault TV for the excesses of horse-race coverage and the minimizing of the issues. But the print media do not have to ape the TV reporters. Instead, we think they could make better use of the time and space they have to cover the issues in greater depth and detail.

At the center of Galbraith's argument is the complaint that more serious and greater depth reporting requires intellectual effort that most reporters are not willing to invest into it. That is a criticism that reflects on both TV and print reporters. And, unfortunately, we have to agree with it.

I have been wanting to thank this community and the public school system for letting me speak to those students taking the mandatory health course (usually ninth graders) each semester at Grosse Pointe North and South. This semester I recognized the growth this community has made. Through education our young people now verbalize some hope.

I have been speaking throughout Wayne County to high school students on teenage suicide and homicide for the past three years. My particular love is Grosse Pointe since I am a resident.

Because I know the pain caused by losing someone to suicide, I feel more qualified to educate and discuss the issue. My hour-long presentation covers the recovery, the myths, some statistics, and "What can you do if it's you or your friend who wants to die?

Three years ago students and the adults thought there were no solutions. They lived in fear it might happen to them. Teenagers believed adults didn't care or didn't take them seriously. This year in the classroom our young people responded with alternatives. They could, "Walk a dog. Tell a friend. Get another person involved. Ride a bike. Or think some happy thoughts, etc." I responded with tears! Maybe, someone won't die because I have had this opportunity. I

As usual, I have not been in the mainstream of anything that's been connected with this political happening.



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Video thief pulls knife on employee

Two girls, 16, assaulted; man, juvenile arrested

An adult and a juvenile have been arrested and charged in the Oct. 28 assault of two 16-year-old girls, who later sought safety in Windmill Pointe Park.

According to a Grosse Pointe Park police report, the girls were exiting a video store on Whittler near Kelly in Detroit Oct. 28 at about 8:20 p.m. when they were approached by two males who said they had a gun.

The girls were forced into a vehicle owned by the girls' parents and driven to an unknown address, where they were sexually assaulted, the report stated. They were then driven around for awhile and dropped off at the foot of Alter.

Park man hires helpers, who then steal his mini-van





it, it's a day of being thankful, and also a day of remembrance for those who didn't."

Milliman said people should remember those in veterans hospitals, too. "And we should give thanks that we are not in a war now."

He said it is unfortunate that there aren't as many services to remember vets as there are on Memorial Day, and wishes there was more emphasis in the schools on the import of the sacrifice of veterans.

"I think it's important to take pause to honor those who served and sacrificed for the country," said David Backhurst, a Vietnam-era vet who is a member of the Vietnam Veterans Association.


As head of the history department at University Liggett School, he teaches a class on Vietnam, and said students today need to know about that and other wars.

"The whole subject of war is one students should think about and look at to see what got us into it, and what could have been done to stop it, or to keep us out of it," he said. A yearly reminder like Veterans Day will help to provoke those thoughts, he added.


One newspaper editor once summed up Veterans Day in the following way:

perience working with government bureaucracies helped the Johnsons cut through the red tape and save their mission, which they established in 1979.

"We wouldn't have made it if it hadn't been for Mr. Thomas,' the pastor says. "(Thomas' efforts) have really been a help."

"Without Mr. Thomas' help, we couldn't have come this far,' Mrs. Johnson said of Thomas' volunteer work. "And when I say volunteer, I mean volunteer. He really works.'

On a current budget of about \$100,000 a year, Eastside Emergency Center houses the homeless, many of whom are referrals from other agencies, feeds them three meals a day, feeds the hungry off the street once a day, provides school-age children lunches in the summer, and conducts 15 to 20 workshops to teach the needy how to take care of themselves.

Since 1979, the center has served more than 75,000 hot meals, sheltered more than 8,500 homeless and served well over 4,000 lunches.

The center employs a staff of nine and has about 25 volunteers, many of whom are serving court-ordered community-service sentences. However, when the funds run out, the staff often goes unpaid so that the center can help the most people. Even with such dedication, many needy have to be turned away, Thomas said.

As an example of the need, Pastor Johnson said that last Thanksgiving he had a list of 1,500 needy families for food baskets. Because of low funds, the shelter could only provide 500 families with food.

Even shelters for the hungry

When the Thomases first moved to the Park, they joined the Newcomers Club. They made so many close friends that after their three-year membership was up, they joined the Newcomers Club.

Thomas is also on the board of directors of the Grosse Pointe Park Foundation, an organization working to make improvements at Windmill Pointe Park. He is also treasurer and a director for the Players Club, one of Detroit's oldest and most prestigious men-only social groups.

While attending law school, Thomas took some time off and

in medical school at the Univer- traveled around the world, visiting 53 countries. The trip earned him membership in the Michigan chapter of Circumnavigators, an organization for others who have traveled around the world.

Thomas hadn't always planned to be a lawyer. He earned his undergraduate degree in engineering from then Cleveland Marshall, which is now part of Cleveland State University. As an engineer for some 15 years, he worked in nuclear research and helped develop the fuel cells for the Apollo space program.

He returned to law school and in 1968 he received his juris doctorate. After being accepted into the bar, Thomas had his own law practice for awhile. In 1972

he got a job with Wayne County Circuit Court and started a new Family Support division.

He says he took the Wayne County job thinking it was temporary. He's been there ever since.

"I've always enjoyed it," he says. "It's an interesting job, and I've always enjoyed working with computers."

Now as business manager for the Friend of the Court division, Thomas is in charge of a \$30 million department that processes 5,000 checks a day, most of which are child-support payments distributed by the court.


He is currently working on a new computer system for Wayne County called the Child Support Enforcement System. Eventually the Wayne County system will be tied in with similar systems in all Michigan counties, much the same way law enforcment offices are linked for running down suspect information.

A die-hard do-it-yourselfer, Thomas is proud of the fact that he has never had to have a repairman come to his home. He said he owns just about every tool imaginable, something his neighbors seem to know when they need to borrow a tool.

He's also an avid ham radio operator and part of RACES -Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service - as well as other amateur radio groups. Thomas is also quite interested in packet communications, a system of sending computer messages via radio waves.

Between his managerial position with the county and his church and social activities, it is amazing Thomas has time to devote to the homeless, but those in need will always have a special part in his life.

"My biggest problem," he says, "is that I can't say no when someone asks me to do something."

Upper school girls at University Liggett School must wear dresses, jumpers or skirts, dressstyle blouses or sweaters, and shirts must be tucked in. Sleeveless shirts and extremely short skirts are not permitted. Dressy slacks, (no jeans, washable cords or painter pants) may be worn in winter.

Boys are required to wear dressy slacks. They're allowed to wear shirts and ties, dress shirts with sweaters, a shirt and sport coat, or a turtleneck. Socks are required.

Middle school students in the Grosse Pointe Public School System are required to be dressed neatly and appropriately. No specifics are spelled out, but extreme styles are discouraged. Shoes are required. Handbooks say that if a student's clothing disturbs normal school routine or safety, the student is in violation of the dress code. He'll be asked to call home for a change of clothes - or he'll be asked to change into his gym outfit.

Sue Klein, Pierce Middle School principal, said, "It's very unusual for a student to be inappropriately dressed. We don't have a rigid code; that's probably why it's so successful."

Two Pierce eighth graders, Laura Perry and Lee Andrus, said they could probably divide Pierce students into three clothing-style groups: the T-shirt-andjeans crowd; the punk crowd; and, what they called the "plain, normal crowd."

The largest group, they said, is the plain, normal group: girls who wear bleached jeans (tapered, low on the hips, rolled to the ankles), big baggy sweaters, big belts, black boots, and big silver earrings.

The preppier boys, they said, wear khakis, polo brand shirts. Tretorns and L.L. Bean moccasins.

flats or ankle-high boots or Tre-Boys, they said, wear L.L. torns. Long black wool coats or jackets are popular.

> Brady said that long, tight stretch pants under skirts are becoming popular. She said the favorite brand names with middle schoolers are: Levi and Guess jeans, Esprit bags and Liz Claiborne purses.

> "Your dress definitely reflects your group," she said.

Another group wears ripped jeans, T-shirts with the names of heavy metal rock groups on them, and lots of black, according to Brady and Fox.

Yet another group, they said, are the "thrashers," — or skateboarders. They wear Vision clothing, skateboard shoes and bandannas on their heads. Some boys wear one earring.

According to Emily Baker, head of University Liggett Middle School, the term "school dress" is preferable when referring to their dress code — a more representative term than "uniform."

Anyone looking in on the lunchroom crowd at ULS Middle School would probably say the school has no uniform. "We allow a bit of variety," Baker said.

Girls have a choice of three styles for skirts, four styles for blouses. Specific colors are spelled out for socks, shoes and cardigan sweaters. Girls are permitted to wear dressy navy slacks between Thanksgiving vacation and spring vacation.

Boys must wear navy, gray or khaki pants, specific styles and solid colors in shirts, sweaters and turtlenecks. No tennis shoes, gum shoes or heavy boots. Jackets (classic blazers with lapels) are optional. Ties are required with V-neck sweaters and vest sweaters, but are not necessary with other sweaters and shirts. Jewelry for boys is not considered appropriate at University Liggett Middle School.

Appearance affects behavior and attitude, according to Baker. "Pride in one's appearance carries over to pride in one's work. We instill that pride and we see that it extends to the care of things and in the looks of the building.

"We're not trying to stifle creativity. We're trying to avoid wild swings in fads. We want to avoid peer pressure. Students don't have to outdo each other with the newest and the most. Some ULS kids get financial assistance, and we don't want them to be embarrassed."

Baker said that 100 percent of the parents support the school's dress policies. "It saves money and avoids arguments."

She said it's not a problem for students either. She has to make only two or three calls home a year, on the average, concerning polyester.'

ULS eighth graders Bill Burns and Lauren Gargaro said there's not much complaining from students. "Kids won't admit it," they said, "but they like uni-

forms.' "It's good because we have so many choices," Gargaro said. "And we have free dress days and grub days a couple times a

year. Burns described student dress as "classic; conservative."

All students were asked if there was anything they "wouldn't be caught DEAD in."

The most common response: "Bell-bottoms. And anything

During his tenure as president, the number of DSO contributors rose from about 1,100 in 1962 to about 5,400 in 1977. Mr. Semple was instrumental in bringing Antal Dorati to the DSO as its musical director. According to Saturday's Detroit Free Press, Dorati said Semple will be missed. "He was a friend, and he was a really faithful president and a faithful leader of the DSO . . . I'm very sorry, and I'm sure all the friends of the DSO feel the same way.

Mr. Semple also helped bring well-respected conductors Sixten Ehrling and Aldo Ceccato to the orchestra. He helped develop the Meadow Brook Music Festival, the Cabaret Pops series, the orchestra's first international tour and its first record contract. He was honorary board chairman of the DSO at the time of his death.

Mr. Semple played the clarinet and was a member of the American Federation of Musicians. He formed his own band during his college years. He also played

with the DSO several times and played with a number of groups in the Detroit and Windsor area.

Butter Business Points Hudson's shopping service shops for busy customers taining, community wo

Betty Magee has a variety of

Some hate to shop.

Some don't mind shopping, but have little confidence in their decisions.

Some are women who are beginning new careers or changing careers, and they're unsure of their wardrobe needs.

Others have a definite sense of style and know what they want, but have no time to look for it.

Some are young, just out of hours." college, with an extremely limited budget.

Some have generous clothing budgets and are looking for clothes for traveling and enter-

Some are shopping for corporate gifts.

Some are Christmas shopping. "There's a great need for this service today," Magee said. "Over half of today's women are working from 9 to 5. Most of my appointments are after working

Magee is manager of FYI (For Your Image) at Hudson's Eastland. FYI is a shopping service for Hudson's customers. It has been around for about 10 years, Magee said, but in the past it's been a low-key personal shopping service.

Eighty percent of our work now is wardrobing," she said. And most customers are women. She emphasized that FYI can also be a gift service; it's for men as well; it's for family gifts; corporate gifts; Christmas lists; and on and on.

Now, she said, as the Christmas season approaches, about 80 percent of their work will be gift selections. "Sometimes we get calls from women who are selecting corporate gifts for their husbands' businesses. Sometimes a client's husband will ask for suggestions for a gift for his wife.'

Magee said if she knows the wife - she personally guarantees the gift won't be returned.

"Sometimes we do Christmas lists for people." We take notes on sizes, lifestyles, budgets, preferences, likes and dislikes, and then we get to work.

All at no charge. No minimum purchase.

Magee has been in the retail business for many years - at Himmelhoch's, then Jacobson's. After moving to Hudson's she was manager of the Woodward Shop for a short time.

Ten years ago she began as the only person in FYI. "Back then, FYI was more a personal shopper," she said. "It was wardrobing; not very sophisticated; not marketed toward career customers."

FYI did a major advertising campaign this fall, said Judy Ivey, FYI director for all Detroit area Hudson's stores. She said the FYI service is now in seven of the nine Hudson's stores in

did a career week seminar at the Roostertail last August and attracted 700 career women. Faith Popcorn, nationally known authority on lifestyles and trends, was the featured speaker."

Ivey said the FYI staff has tripled since May. "We have over 60 on staff now in all our stores." Eastland's FYI staff has grown from two to seven consultants in the last six months.

Typically, Magee said, a prospective client comes into the store for an interview. The initial appointment takes about two hours and the consultant takes information about sizes, budget, preferences, needs and so on.

"We have classifications according to the business of the customer. We also take information about the customer's existing wardrobe. We begin the wardrobing process during the first consultation."

The consultant brings clothing suggestions to the client - suits, sweaters, blouses, pants. "Maybe

the metropolitan area. "We also 15 pieces can be made into 30 outfits," Magee said.

The client, however, makes the final choices.

The second appointment, Magee said, is typically to choose accessories - shoes, hose, jewelry, and so on. The third appointment is usually scheduled when the season changes.

"The consultant keeps records on every purchase. She's constantly building," she said. "We also give advice on what to get rid of. One woman brought in three bags full of clothing. We ended up telling her most of it wouldn't work - it wasn't sophisticated enough for the corporate world."

Magee said FYI consultants have about 70 to 80 clients apiece and gear their work load to seeing two or three clients per day. The majority of Magee's clients are in the corporate category, she said, but another consultant gives advice for traveling and vacationing. Another specializes in wardrobes for enter-

taining, community work and activities at private clubs.

"We enjoy this," she said. "It's a great feeling when a customer leaves and we know she's pleased. It's also rewarding to follow a customer along - and up the corporate ladder as she moves into new positions, upgrading her clothing as she goes.

Magee emphasized that FYI is not just for women; not just for clients with a lot of money to spend.

She remembers a recent young client. "It was New Year's Day. She had \$119 to spend on an outfit to wear to an interview the next day.

"We found the outfit. She bought it.

"She sent me a bouquet a few days later and said she got the

She remembers another young client who was looking for a dress to wear to a party that

"I had to chuckle," Magee said, "because that's the sort of thing I do - wait until the last minute. Anyway, we found a dress that she couldn't afford. I told her, 'You have the figure for this dress now, but you don't have the money. Buy it now. If you wait until you have the money, you may not have the

"She bought the dress. She called me a week later and said she was glad she bought it. She was the best-dressed one at the party and she had a great time."

Magee said her job is satisfying when she sees a customer leave with a high level of confidence in her appearance. "My greatest reward is when a client leaves us knowing she looks

"Clients who use FYI say they spend less time shopping; they buy fewer pieces of better quality; and they do less impulse buying.'

Shirley Cheek: Experience with, concern for the handicapped

Shirley Cheek, who has been working in the Classified Department doing accounts receivable since September 1987, has lots of experience. She has been keeping the books for her husband's heating and cooling business for more than 30 years.

And she has plenty of patience, a requisite for dealing with the public, taking classified ads and working in Circulation. Her patience, however, did not come

For every day of the past 10 years, she and her husband Mitch have been involved in the rehabilitation of their son Glenn who suffered severe closed head injuries in an accident.

Glenn was 15 when he was hit by a car, a trauma that put him into a coma for six weeks and saw him shifted from one to another, and finally five hospitals.

"At that time, they didn't know what to do with closed head injuries," Cheek said. "They told us to put him in an institution."

Glenn lived in a convalescent home in Romulus for three years. The Cheeks and other parents formed Appletree, a support group for the families of closed head injury victims.

Then the Cheeks brought their son home. "He had to be taught to walk and talk all over again,' she said. "It was a real struggle. Mitch and I really worked hard with him, 24 hours a day, in shifts.

Their efforts have been rewarded.

'You wouldn't believe it's the same person," she said. "He's come so far and he does a lot for himself."

Her son, she says, is a happygo-lucky young man with a speech impediment who works cleaning offices at night.

"I still take him to the doctor's and he's still improving, but you don't see it as much now," she said. "I feel he's fortunate, because at least he's ambulatory.

"He has his mind, but it's locked in somehow."

The Cheeks have worked with the Michigan Closed Head Injury Alliance. Their goal, she said, is to make their son as independent as possible.

The Cheeks have six children and during this period, there were four at home. "It was tougher on the two younger ones, because they missed out on a lot of things," she said.

Their children range from 16 to 34 and their youngest, Christopher, will be graduating from Carl Brablec High School in Roseville in June. A member of the school band, he played for President Ronald Reagan when he appeared at Macomb Community College Saturday. Christopher plans to be a police officer, his mother said.

The reason she is working is to relieve some of the pressure

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

t 23, Grosse Pointer Tara Sendelbach has already learned one of Llife's more valuable lessons: It's more important to be happy than to be rich and famous. Of course, she hasn't totally abandoned trying for rich and famous.

"Ultimately, I'd like to be a video DJ. I'd like to take what I know about music and television and put them together, maybe at MTV or VH-1. But right now, I'm working and learning," Sendelbach says.

Tara Sendelbach is, admittedly, a ham. An energetic extrovert who recently dyed her hair red, Sendelbach remembers being involved in just about everything as a student at Grosse Pointe South High School. But life at Michigan State University was something

"I did a lot at South. I was in Pointe Players, forensics, the Tower. Then for a couple of years at State, I didn't do anything. I was nothing but a student number, which is pretty hard to take after you've been 'on top'.'

Then she volunteered to work at the campus radio station and a career was born.

The radio station provided Sendelbach with an outlet for her natural persona. And it gave her an opportunity to put together a tape to send to a Lansing top 40 station, at the suggestion of a listener.

"I just did it to take a chance," Sendelbach says. "I never thought I'd get an answer. But the guy at WVIC called me and told me that I was really raw, but with work, maybe I could make it in the business.

"They put me on a two-month trial period. And I ended up staying there for two years. It was a tough two years for

her, working weekends and what they refer to in radio as "overnights" - usually the midnight to 6 a.m. shift - and going to school at the same time. But she began to see her progress when station management moved her off overnights and gave her daytime shifts. So Sendelbach sent tapes and resumes to radio stations all over the state.

WSNX in Muskegon was the first to respond. They offered her a job which at the time she thought was great.

"At first, they had me on from 7 p.m. to midnight, then midnights to 5:30 a.m. I wouldn't get to sleep until 8 a.m., then I'd sleep until 4 or 5 p.m. and in the winter, it's dark at that time," Shedelbach says.

"I lived in the dark for six months."

She also lived with the knowledge that she was making very few friends in her new environment and that despite moving the station's ratings up by 13 points, she was going nowhere

"My best friend was Joyce, the 50-year-old cleaning woman who worked at the radio station. I used to put her on the air. She wound up being pretty popular," Sendelbach says with a laugh.

Sendelbach, on the other hand, wasn't quite the hit Joyce was. Despite her on-air success, repeated requests for better shifts were denied, she says. And she kept watching as male members of the staff were better-promoted and better-paid than she was.

"I sat down and thought about why I was staying there. I mean, I had no friends, bad pay, crummy hours. I realized that I wasn't happy. And why should you do something if you're not happy?"

Her decision didn't sit well with the radio station. "They told me I'd never work in the business again, that I'd never be

anything."

Which didn't do a lot for Sendelbach's confidence. She knew she'd made the right decision, she says, having given the Muskegon job a six-month shot. So she came back home, took a job in a clothing store and kept sending out tapes and resumes. And waiting for the right thing to come along.

In August, it did. She was among 200 young people who auditioned for a new program produced by WTVS-Channel 56. Called "Club Connect," the weekly program geared for teenagers debuted in late September. The August audition was to find seven hosts to introduce the program's segments and interact with the show's teenage performers and celebrity guests.

"I have a friend who works at the station who told me that I did pretty well in the audition, which consisted of reading from

a teleprompter, answer viewer mail and doing some off-the-cuff stuff. So I was pretty encouraged," Sendelbach says.

And pretty disappointed when she got a rejection letter from the Club Connect producers.

"I tore that letter open and got pretty upset. My family scattered away to different parts of the house that day," she says. "I was starting to believe what that jerk had said, that I'd never be anything."

But two weeks later, she got a call from Club Connect saying that they'd made a mistake and asking if I was still interested in the job. "What had happened was that my publicity photos were too severe. I really looked old and serious in them and they'd made a snap decision based on the photos.

"Then they realized that my name was on the kids' lists and on the producers' list as one of the people they wanted on the show. So they called me and I took the job."

She's got a contract and the show has a two-year minimum run. The pay isn't much - Sendelbach still works in a clothing store to make ends meet - but she's delighted with the job.

"The opportunities are endless with a show like this. It's fun, I'm learning about the business and besides, you never know who's watching.'

Sendelbach fairly glows as she talks about Club Connect.

'We're always teaching the kids something, but it's done in a quick, light way so they don't get bored. We've got a certain moral standard to stick to, and I like that. And the producers will listen to us. They take our ideas and use them in the show. And, since we're closer to the age the show is for (16), they'll let us improvise and rewrite lines so that they appeal to the kids," Sendelbach.

Most importantly, she "fits" again.

"The seven of us get along really well. It's different for me. I grew up in Grosse Pointe and I didn't deal with many minorities. But we each bring something different to the show. Among us there are two standup comedians, two Wayne State University students, a Screen Actors Guild actress, an ethnic dance and me.

"We're so different, but we get along so well. It's fun for me to work with people from such different backgrounds," Sendelbach

Although she'd like to put the Muskegon experience behind her, Sendelbach says there's one important thing it taught her that she won't soon forget: to be happy.

"I'm glad I came back. I tell my friends who are going through similar bad experiences starting out to drop it if it doesn't make them happy. I was the first one to come back because I wasn't happy. Something will come along, just like Club Connect did for me.'


For now, Sendelbach says, she'll continue to improve at her craft. She hasn't ruled out leaving home again for a job, but it isn't as important as it once was.

"I may go back into radio again, like in Lansing or someplace like that. But I don't know if I see myself going off to be a star in the big city in that sort of wear-a-suit-carry-a-briefcasedown-the-streets-of-Chicago kind of life. I'd rather be happy, even if it means turning a job down.

"Another one will come along ... I'vé learned that much."

Community . a high-protein, low-cholesterol treat Beans

Cultivated in the Americas since prehistoric times, beans were one of the first forms of money, as well as a favorite staple food among the Indians and the first settlers.

Today, thousands of families are rediscovering the virtues of dry beans as a versatile, satisfying, cholesterol-free, nutritious food that is exceptionally high in natural protein, B-vitamins such as thiamin and niacin, and in essential body-building minerals such as iron, calcium and potassium.

Dry beans, cooked or canned, provide hearty, nourishing eating at moderate cost. They rank among the top foods that provide the most cholesterol-free protein per dollar. Though beans are incomplete protein sources, a very small amount of skim milk, lean meat or low-cholesterol cheese can quickly convert them into a complete protein.

In addition to their protein source, dry beans are a very lowsodium food, and because they digest slowly, they satisfy hunger as well as keep the body's engine stocked for a longer period of time.

According to the Agricultural Handbook No. 8 of the USDA, a serving of 100 grams of cooked dry beans (approximately 3-1/2) ounces) contains 111 to 118 calories depending on the variety of the bean. Of course, that does not include seasonings and condiments.

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
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Often times we regard high school football players as more than children or young adults. We come to expect too much out of them and we lose sight of the fact that they are just

In the season's final game at Grosse Pointe North, Rice was again tagged with a 15-yarder for the same reason. North coach Frank Sumbera yelled to Rice. "Stevie, Stevie, you're a better football player than that." Rice's response: "I know, Coach Sumbera.

In his final game, Rice rushed for 59 yards. He, like the rest of the Blue Devils, was frustrated by the 27-6 thrashing North delivered, but for one moment Rice lost sight of the fact that he shouldn't have thrown the block. A mistake was made by a kid.







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Entertainment '10 November' founders at Attic

Not only is the S.S. Edmund Fitzgerald once again lost at sea in the Attic Theatre's "Ten November," but so is the attention span of the viewers, who are desperately trying keep their own heads above water in trying to understand the sequence of events and the relevance of many of the musical scores accompanying the play.

"Ten November," a play about the 1975 sinking of the Edmund Fitzgerald, opened Oct. 26 and runs through Nov. 20. It is directed by Lavinia Moyer, the theater's artistic director. "Ten November" was written by Steven Dietz, a playwright and director working out of Minneap-

The play attempts through vignettes and songs to relive the grief after the tragedy and the inadequacy of man's machines when up against nature's most powerful forces - in this case a gale on Lake Superior.

The nine-man cast, which plays all parts with no one actor with a clearly lead role, and three women who sing special

songs for the play written by Eric Peltoniemi of Duluth, Minn., are successful in relating the tragedy and the many explanations and theories as to how it happened.

You don't have to recall the details of the tragedy because the play opens with a quick rundown of the sinking and the explanations as to how it happened. But since "Ten November" lasts almost two hours (at least a half hour too long) and since the sequences lack transitions and since many of the songs fail to have any significance to the subject matter, it helps to have a curiosity about Great Lakes lore to keep your interest up.

What "Ten November" does best, however, is to relive the events as they happened Nov. 10, 1975. We hear the banter of the Edmund Fitzgerald with the other ships on the lake. We are there when the Fitzgerald first experiences trouble. We are on the bridge of the trailing ship when the Edmund Fitzgerald disappears from radar to be seen

to determine what happened to the Fitzgerald. We see how the shipping company works to get all blame removed from the Fitzgerald in order to save the company from being sued by the crew's families. We hear all the theories as to why the ship went down, including one belief that

UFOs abducted the crew.

We observe the callousness of ship owners who travel the Great Lakes in July much like Caribbean vacationers in January. Where are the owners during the ravaging northeasters of November? We learn it is the company's bottom line that forces man on a lake that means to destroy the great barges with 70-knot winds and 30-foot waves.

It is the showing of the Fitzgerald, its crew and its mysterious disappearance that makes "Ten November" worth seeing

We are at the inquiry trying by Great Lakes buffs. It is the disjointed flow of the play from scene to scene and unintelligible songs that leave one wondering what they mean that make "Ten November" a drawn out, sometimes tedious production.




