

# Be wary: Con artists operating in the Pointes

A woman shopping is approached Sept. 24 by a man with an accent. The man said he needs to get to the airport to pick up his luggage and money, but he's afraid to take his cash with him.

A second man approaches and offers to take the foreigner to the airport. The woman is asked to hold the foreigner's money, but in a show of good faith she is told to put her money in a handkerchief with the stranger's money. She is then given the

handkerchief with her's and the foreigner's money.

The second man takes the stranger to the airport, and the woman goes home thinking she just got the upper hand of a couple of fools. When he gets home, however, she discovers the handkerchief contains cut-up newspaper.

The woman fell victim to a con known as the "Jamaican switch."

An elderly woman is at home alone Oct. 27 when a man appears at the front door. He tells her he is a new neighbor and he

noticed she had a few shingles missing on her roof.

Explaining that he wants to be a good neighbor, he offers to fix the woman's roof for free. She agrees. The man asks if his daughter and her child, who are outside in his car, can come inside and wait while he does the work. The woman lets the man's family come in.

The man goes down to the basement to look for tools while his family waits in the kitchen. The resident is unable to keep an eye on all the strangers in her home.

Finally the man says he has to leave to get some more tools. After the man and his family are gone, the woman notices that \$1,100 is missing from a strong box in a hall closet. She has been conned by what is called the "Gypsy scam."

While these scams sound like they come from Hollywood scripts, such as "The Sting," they are all too common in real life. In fact, the two cons cited here come straight from police reports in the Grosse Pointes.

On Jan. 6, an elderly Grosse Pointe Woods woman was ap-

proached by a suspected con man who offered to fix her roof for free. In this case it was not known whether he was able to steal anything. During the same day, two similar incidents were reported in Harper Woods. In one of the cases, \$700 was taken.

Police urge all residents, particularly senior citizens, to be on the alert for con men. While there is an endless variety of scams, police say residents should be skeptical and never expect to get something for free and never let strangers into their homes.

According to information, if someone offers something for nothing, you will get nothing. Likewise, if someone insists you put up your own cash for any reason, you will soon be many dollars poorer.

Con artists, who are students of human nature, are mostly on elderly people. According to police information, 60 percent of the cons reported in their 70s are victims. Only about one of five

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### Lakefront attack suspects declared guilty by judge

The four suspects in the intended rape of a Woods woman and the beating of her boyfriend behind the War Memorial July 12 were found guilty by a Wayne County Circuit judge last week.

On Jan. 12, after 2-1/2 days of testimony, Judge Charles S. Farmer declared each of the four assailants guilty of assault with intent to commit rape and felonious assault. All of the defendants had waived their rights to a jury trial.

Sentencing will be before Farmer Jan. 23 at 9 a.m. The intent to commit rape felony carries a maximum 10-year sentence, and the maximum sentence for felonious assault is four years. The sentences will be served concurrently.

Found guilty were Larry S. Golden, 17; Mark C. Calabro, 21; Jeff Calabro, 17; and Michael Zeweke, 19, all of Detroit.

Farmer ordered the four men held in Wayne County Jail without bail until sentencing. The Calabro brothers have been in jail since the incident, while Zeweke and Golden were out on bail.

Police responded to a call from a security guard at the Grosse Pointe Club at 3 a.m. July 12 of a woman screaming at the lakefront behind the War Memorial. Farms and City public safety of-

ficers arriving at the scene found four men who appeared to be fighting. When the officers approached, the assailants scattered.

The police found a hysterical 19-year-old Grosse Pointe Woods woman who said she had been raped and that her boyfriend had been beaten and thrown into the lake. Three of the suspects were arrested that day and the fourth man, Zeweke, was arrested July 18.

The woman and her boyfriend, a 22-year-old Woods man, were treated and released at St. John Hospital.

One of the assailants, Golden, was a 16-year-old juvenile at the time of the attack. He was ordered by a Juvenile Court judge in October to stand trial as an adult and charged with criminal sexual conduct in the first degree, assault with intent to commit criminal sexual conduct, assault with intent to commit armed robbery and assault with intent to do great bodily harm.

The other three assailants were charged with first degree criminal sexual conduct and assault with intent to murder.

Zeweke was the only one of the four assailants to have a prior criminal record. At the time of the attack, Zeweke was serving 10 years probation for

### Ice prevents another near tragedy in lake

Another motorist ended up in Lake St. Clair last weekend, but

this time the ice was thick enough to avert a tragedy.

A 45-year-old Grosse Pointe Park woman was traveling

northbound on Lakeshore in Farms Jan. 14 at 5:30 p.m. when she lost control of her 1981 Plymouth, went over the em-

bankment and off the road with the car ending up on roof on the ice.

In a statement to police, the woman said her driver's side window was down and she crawled out of the car and walked to shore. She was traveling alone and escaped uninjured.

The latest incident was the second car in a week to end up in the lake. On the morning of Jan. 6, a 46-year-old Grosse Pointe woman lost control of her car and ended up 20 feet out in the lake in 5-1/2 feet of water. Shores public safety officer and volunteer firefighter braved icy waters and pulled the car to safety.

In last Saturday's accident, the woman was traveling about 600 feet behind another motorist. She told police she had glanced out at the lake and looked ahead again and noticed the driver in front of her had hit the brakes to make a right-hand turn.

The Park woman put on her brakes, causing the car's wheels to lock up and sending her sliding along the icy boulevard. She told police that when she realized it was correct for the slide, the car did not respond.

The car spun around 90 degrees and headed straight toward the lake. When the front end of the car went over the breakwall, the right front wheel hit the ice first, causing the car to roll over.

Several motorists stopped to make sure everything was all right, and Farms public safety officers were at the scene immediately. Official Towing of St. Clair Shores removed the vehicle from the ice.

#### B.A. 'Bud' Bates

As a top executive of a leading direct mail company and one of Detroit's oldest businesses, B.A. "Bud" Bates Jr. of Grosse Pointe Park cringes when someone mentions "junk mail."

Bates, 63, began working for the 118-year-old R.L. Polk & Co. in 1974 as a vice president and controller. One would think there isn't much room for ad-

vancement when hired in at that lofty position, especially in a private corporation, but Bates found room in the company's stratosphere.

Today he is executive vice president of finance and administration, answering only to John M. O'Hara, chairman, president and chief executive officer, and Stephen R. Polk, executive vice president, who is the fourth generation of Polks to manage the company.

Bates, a 1950 University of Michigan graduate who earned a master's degree in business administration before MBAs had become the rage, is a certified public accountant as well as administrator.

He presides over a company with a total employment of 6,200 and with 35 operating offices throughout the United States, as well as offices in Canada, Australia, the United Kingdom and West Germany. Polk's sales in 1988 hit the \$275 million mark.

Even though Polk is still in the business of providing city directories here and abroad, the company has also become a leader in providing direct-mail

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# Woods councilman blasts proposed 'acceptable tree' list

Grosse Pointe Woods City Councilman Thomas Fahrner let it be known loud and clear last week that he doesn't think residents should be told what trees they can and cannot plant.

The issue arose at the Jan. 9 council meeting when a proposed ordinance amendment was introduced that listed the species of trees that would be permitted to be planted on the city right of way between the sidewalk and curb in residential areas.

The list was drawn up by the Community Tree Commission, of which Councilwoman Jean Rice is the council representative. The commission's intention was that the list be added to an existing ordinance that prohibits certain types of trees on city rights of way and requires the homeowner to get a permit to plant trees on the city's property, which Rice refers to as "tree lawns."

"Are we going to start ticketing people for putting up trees that are not on the list? This is ridiculous," Fahrner told his fellow council members.

"I just don't think we have to start telling people what kind of tree they can plant in front of their home," he said. "People build a \$300,000 house and they have to ask if they can plant a tree?"

When asked when the city started regulating the planting of trees, city attorney George Catlin said, "A tree ordinance has been on the books for 20 years."

Contacted last week, Rice said that while a permit is needed to plant trees on the right of way in front of a residence, the ordinance is not enforced.

"People have been so cooperative, we haven't had to do that," she said.

She said the regulations are not to discourage tree planting, but are intended to encourage the planting of the right kinds of trees. She said some species clog sewers, break up sidewalks, drop fruit and create hazards.

When questioned further about the planting of trees in the city rights of way, she said the existing ordinance prohibits general types of trees from tree lawns, such as evergreens, fruit

trees, silver maples and willows. She said the list drawn up is intended to be more specific about what is best to plant near the street.

The tree commission's list includes 42 specific trees allowed on tree lawns and 26 prohibited trees, although Rice said the list is not complete. Some of the prohibited trees and the reasons why are:

- Speckled alder, because it does not tolerate salt and is not recommended for areas exposed to salt spray from traffic or salt in water runoff.
- Buckeye, which has messy, poisonous fruit.
- Evergreens, because density causes traffic vision problems.
- Female ginkgo, because it has messy fruit and highly unpleasant odors.

Rice said silver maples and willow trees are also bad because their roots penetrate and clog sewer lines, which can cause basement drains to back up.

Other than having good reasons for what trees are planted on rights of way, she said the city should be able to decide what goes on property for which it is legally responsible.

"The city carries the liability," she said. "When you take the responsibility, I think you should have some say in what is planted."

At the council meeting, Rice asked that the list of trees be sent back to the tree commission since the list isn't yet complete.

Rice said the city spends \$20,000 a year to purchase trees to be planted on the tree lawns. She said the trees cost from \$80 to \$100 dollars apiece and are in the 3-1/2 to 4-inch diameter caliber and 10 to 15 feet tall. She said the city buys the bigger trees so that residents can enjoy their beauty and hardiness sooner.

"Of all the things I've done on the council, this is what I'm the most proud of," she said. "These trees will live a long time — long after Jean Rice is gone, these trees will still be here."

The decision of where to plant the trees is made by the tree commission. Each fall the city orders trees. The commission then decides where the trees should be planted. The city is divided into districts, with a tree commission member from each district recommending tree sites.

The commission members then contact the homeowners and ask them if they would like a tree planted in front of their homes. If the homeowner agrees, a tree is planted on the city right of way in front of his home and he is given instructions on how to care for the tree. There is no charge to the homeowner.

After the tree commission sites are filled, then the commission goes to a list of residents who have asked for a tree. Residents can get on the list by calling the Department of Public Works or by talking to a commission member.

Rice said the commission's tree locations are based on the need to fill in bare spots and are in accordance with the city's

Master Street Tree Plan. She said the plan is to replace the elm trees that once were abundant in the city but succumbed to blight.

To prevent a blight from wiping out the city's greenery in the future, the commission makes sure that not all the same species of trees are planted all in one area. Several species are alternated to ensure a future blight does not kill all the trees in a large area.

Rice said, however, that trees are only given to residents who really want one. "You don't give a tree to someone who doesn't want it," she said. "If they don't want it, they won't take care of it and it'll just die."

## Leith to receive honorary degree in Finland

Three years ago William Leith, a professor of communication disorders and sciences at Wayne State University, received an interesting letter from Professor Eila Alahuhta, director of logopedics (speech pathology) at Oulu University in Oulu, Finland.

"She wanted to translate my book, 'Clinical Methods in Communication Disorders' into Finnish," Leith said.

"She also wanted to come to Wayne State University to study with me for a week."

That initial contact led to a working relationship that took Leith, of Grosse Pointe Park, to Oulu University, which is located just 60 miles from the arctic circle, in April 1987 to conduct research, lecture and assist in the development of the uni-

versity's speech pathology program.

On May 27, 1989, Oulu University, which is the only university with a speech pathology program in Scandinavia, will honor Leith for his clinical contributions to the field of speech pathology by awarding him an honorary degree.

It was Leith's clinical approach to cognitive behavior therapy that first caught the interest of Alahuhta.

"Cognitive behavior therapy is a new clinical concept which can be applied to any clinical interaction," said Leith, who specializes in clinical theory and therapy.

The professor has developed one of only a handful of treat-

ment programs for stuttering in the United States.

According to Leith, graduation ceremonies at Oulu University, which is comprised of about 8,000 students, are held only once every five years. When they are held, it is a big event.

The first two days of ceremonial festivities include a banquet in honor of the gathered doctors, the graduation ceremonies, the formal awarding of the honorary degrees, a parade by the faculty to Oulu Cathedral for a special service and a formal dinner dance.

The dress for all occasions is white tie and tails. Leith will receive a fluted silk top hat and a ceremonial sword to signify his

honorary degree. On the last day of the ceremony, the faculty and honored guests take a daylong cruise to Sweden on the Bay of Bothnia.

In the meantime, Leith is working with Alahuhta on an international exchange program between the two universities. A student from Oulu is scheduled to arrive to study at Wayne State early in January 1989. A student from Wayne will go to Oulu University at the same time.

Leith is also busy implementing exchange programs with Trinity College in Dublin, Sorbonne University in Paris, and the University of Museo Social Argentino in Buenos Aires.

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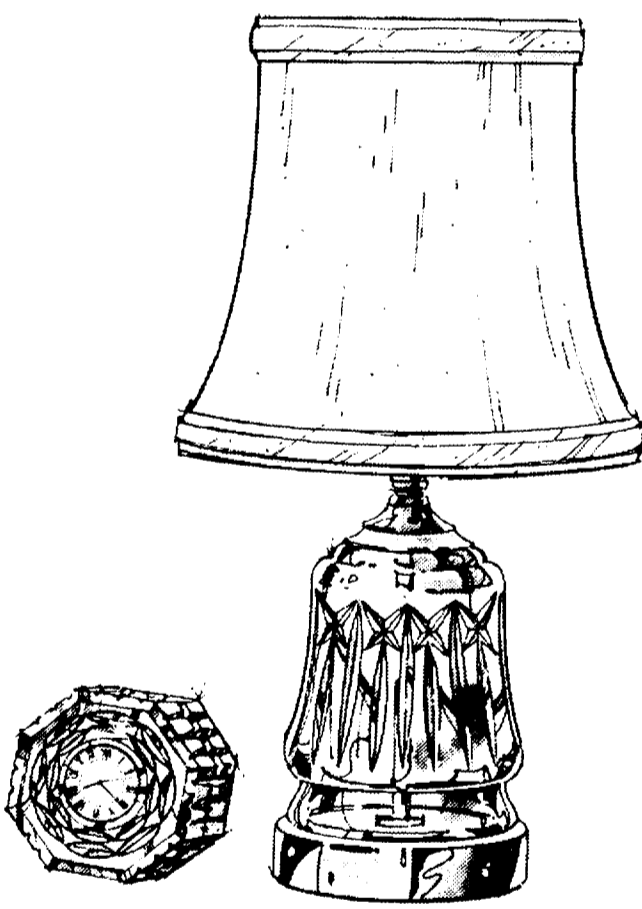
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# Business owners critical of Mack improvements

Opposition by business leaders to the already approved landscaping improvements along Mack in Grosse Pointe Woods surprised city leaders Monday night, sending the federal grant project back to the drawing board.

Business owner Antoinette DiClemente, who is a block captain of the Mack Avenue Professional and Business Association, criticized the City Council for designing and approving the \$100,000 Community Development Block Grant project without consulting business owners.

"The business owners don't want it," she said. "Put the grant where the money will do the most good: parking. We can't understand why the city won't listen to us."

Mayor George Freeman said the federal block grant funds cannot be used for parking lots. On Dec. 19 the City Council approved landscaping improvements in front of stores and in the median for five blocks along Mack Avenue. The improvements are part of the 1987-88 Facade Zone Improvement Plan and are paid for with federal grant funds filtered back to the city through state and county governments.

Freeman told the many business owners present that he was completely unaware of any oppo-

sition to the plans. He explained that the block grant Citizens' Advisory Committee had sent a representative to each of the businesses to seek input before the plans were approved. The committee's survey indicated no major opposition, he said.

According to the survey, which was presented to the council prior to its Dec. 19 approval of the project, 53 percent of the businesses contacted said the project was worthwhile, and 24 percent were concerned that the new trees would hide their businesses. About 2 percent said they didn't think the project should be done at all.

DiClemente said that the first she had heard of the project was by reading an article in the Grosse Pointe News Dec. 29, after the project was approved by the council. She said she conducted her own survey and found that 90 percent of the business owners did not know about the project.

The five blocks to be improved by the project are on the west side of Mack. They are the two blocks from Prestwick to Broadstone and the one-block stretches from Kenmore to Oxford, Lancaster to Fleetwood and Beaufort to Lennon.

The project as originally approved scheduled landscaping improvements from the business storefronts to the curb. The beautification project included 38

trees, 24 pedestrian lights, grass areas replacing concrete and walkways from the curb to the main sidewalk. The medians were to get trees and other landscaping improvements.

The business owners objected the most to the trees, which they said will hide their businesses.

"They wanted to put three trees up in front of my store," said Lou Iacobell of Iacobell Shoes. "You won't let us put things up in the windows so that police can look in, but now you put trees up so that nobody can even see the store."

Many business owners pointed out that the trees already planted on the median are blocking motorists' views and are a traffic hazard. They believe more trees will make the situation worse.

The business owners also objected to the City Council's idea of getting the business owners to pay for the pedestrian lamps, which are not to be paid for with the federal grant funds. The business people said there's enough light on Mack already, and they didn't believe they should pay for something that's unnecessary.

Freeman explained that the lights are ornamental and are being proposed to match the lights at City Hall. He said the city was considering splitting the cost of the four or five lights per block among all the businesses, but nothing has been approved concerning the lights or who is going to pay for them.

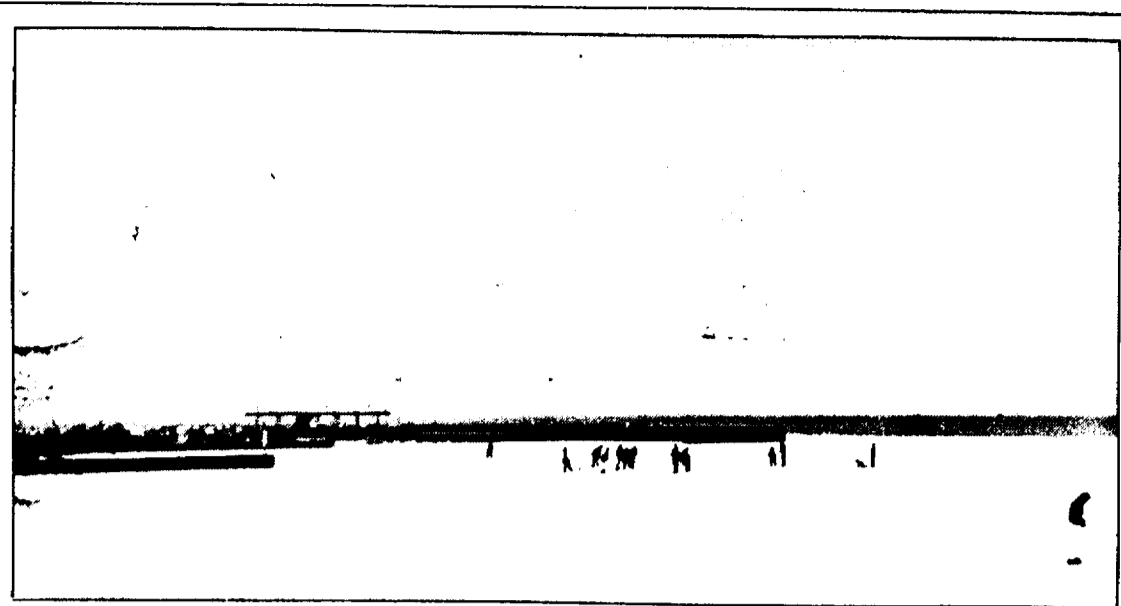
Reacting to the unexpected opposition by business owners, the City Council referred the plans back to the block grant advisory committee.

Councilman Thomas Fahrner, the council's representative on the committee, said he will discuss the matter at a meeting this week and will decide how to schedule meetings with the business owners.

Also responding to the business owners' complaints of the lack of business input in the project, the council asked that a member of the Mack Avenue Professional and Business Association be put on the block grant Citizens' Advisory Committee. The business association agreed and will nominate a committee member.

Meanwhile, the city had hoped to seek bids for the project so that it could be started when weather permits in the spring. It was not known whether the reworking of the plans to meet business owners' complaints will delay the project.

"There are very good reasons for trees and grass," said Councilwoman Jean Rice in response to a businessman's comment that they weren't needed. "We are committed to trees and grass. But plans can be changed."

# DNR rejects Woods' planned fishing pier

The planned 600-foot fishing pier at Grosse Pointe Woods Lakefront Park has been rejected by the state Department of Natural Resources.

In a letter from the DNR Jan. 10, the fishing pier application was denied because it would have an adverse impact on fish and invertebrate habitat and create a navigation hazard to boaters.

The city had hoped to begin building the \$350,000 L-shaped pier this year. The first 200 feet of the pier was designed to sit on 2,200 cubic yards of broken concrete and the remaining 400 feet would be made of wooden decking supported by steel piping.

The DNR said it would consider a new application for a shorter pier entirely supported by steel, eliminating the riprap which the city wanted because it is very attractive for holding fish.

While discussing the DNR's rejection at the regular council meeting Monday night, Mayor Pro Tem Robert Novitke said the fishing pier is a top priority with the city, and he asked if a revised design, such as shortening the pier, would meet with approval by the DNR.

City engineer Lawrence Pate said he was not sure, however, based on the wording of the DNR's letter if approval can be expected if the pier was shortened. He said he was unable to get in touch with the DNR officials for clarification.

City Administrator-Clerk Chester Petersen was surprised by the DNR's rejection of the plan, especially after he and Pate had made a trip to Lansing to get input on the design of the pier.

"The irony is that Mr. Pate

and I went to Lansing, and they recommended the things that we're getting rejected for," Petersen said. The length of the pier and the broken concrete, known as riprap, were recommended by the DNR, he said.

The Woods' pier plans also included dredging 1,000 cubic yards of material from the lake bottom near the pier to act as a fish-holding area.

The DNR said the proposed area of the pier and dredging is in a shallow water area that provides foraging, spawning and nursery habitat for a variety of fish species. The area of the lake is also a habitat for various aquatic invertebrates, which are an integral part of the food chain and contribute to fish productivity, according to the DNR's letter.

The pier and dredging would eliminate the area as a prime fish and invertebrate habitat, the DNR said.

"Thus, benefits of the proposed activity do not balance against

the detriments that will result from the project due to the impairment and destruction of the aquatic resources involved," according to the DNR.

The DNR also believes "the length and position of the pier will create navigational restrictions in an area of potentially high boat traffic."

"The department would consider a proposal involving a shorter pier designed as an open pile structure throughout the entire length," the DNR's letter concluded.

The City Council directed Pate to continue trying to contact the DNR and find out if a shortened pier is likely to get approved. The council scheduled a meeting next Monday, Jan. 23, at 7:30 p.m. in the council chambers at City Hall to consider whether to change the pier's design and reapply with the DNR.

The pier also has to be approved by the city of St. Clair Shores.

# Woods adopts dredging plan

A scaled-down dredging plan for the mouth of the Milk River at Lakefront Park was approved by the Woods City Council Monday night.

The dredging is estimated to cost \$115,000. Initially the city will pay for the dredging, but a surcharge may be added to dock fees to cover the cost.

When asked how much the surcharge would be, City Administrator-Clerk Chester Petersen said it would be determined by the total cost of the dredging minus the amount of money the city has in a fund for dredging.

The city has about \$36,000 in a dredging fund. If the work costs \$115,000, then the balance to be split among Lakefront Park's 224 boat slips would be \$79,000, or \$353 per dock renter. The surcharge would be spread out over five years, or about \$70 a year. Surcharges could be as high as \$100 per year if costs come in much higher than expected.

City officials, however, are quick to point out that the surcharge and dredging costs are all estimates. Also, the cost may be lower to Woods boaters if St. Clair Shores property owners along canals emptying into the Milk River chip in for the dredging since they will also benefit.

Petersen said the city of St. Clair Shores has refused to help pay for the dredging.

The original dredging proposal by city engineer Larry Pate had

called for a 120-foot wide channel from the tip of Lakefront Park extending 1,200 feet into the bay. The depth of the channel would be 4.2 feet below low water (chart) datum, which would be about 6 feet deep based on current water levels.

The depth of the channel is designed to be the same as the natural depth of the Milk River, Pate said.

The revised dredging plan approved by the council is to the same depth, but it is 120 feet wide for 300 feet and then narrows to 60 feet for the remaining 900 feet. The narrowed down channel covers one-third less area and, theoretically, requires a third less material to be removed, thus lowering the costs.

Pate has been directed to get core samples of the lake bottom to be dredged to determine if it is mostly sand or clay, which will determine the cost per cubic yard to dredge. The core samples will be taken as soon as the ice is thick enough to hold the required equipment.

Once the core samples are obtained, the city will be able to seek bids for the dredging based on the plan approved by the City Council.

The city is in a hurry to have everything ready to go when the weather permits so that the dredging will be done in time for the boating season.

The Department of Natural Resources and the city of St. Clair Shores have to approve the dredging before it can be started.

The Michigan Humane Society (MHS) is holding its fifth annual "Protect-A-Pet" vaccination clinic at its Central Shelter Clinic, 7401 Chrysler Drive, between East Grand Boulevard and Clay Street, in Detroit on Sunday, Jan. 29 from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Vaccines against distemper for dogs, panleukopenia for cats and rabies for both will be given at the nominal cost of \$2 per shot for pet owners on financial assistance.

The Michigan Humane Society offers the clinics to pet owners who are otherwise unable to afford necessary preventative shots for their pets. The MHS requires, therefore, that pet owners provide some proof of financial assistance. The clinic will be set up for shots only and the MHS asks that only healthy pets on leash or in carriers be brought.

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# Mother, businesswoman: She still enjoys her model life

Michelle Flaum is one of those women for whom men who don't know much about cars go to the auto show.

This month Flaum, who grew up in Grosse Pointe, will be making the grand tour of auto shows. Although she requested to work the Detroit show, she will instead have to face the winter months working in the Los Angeles, Houston, Orange County and Dallas auto shows, spending, in all, some 50 days on the road.

She worked the Detroit Auto Show in 1975 as a model who tells spectators about the powerful V-8 engine and the elegantly styled interior. At this year's shows she will be with Toyota's sophisticated new line, Lexus.

"It doesn't look like it, but it's a lot of hard work," she said. "You're standing on your feet for

hours at a time, repeating your script over and over and you have to put up with comments from the crowd, and keep smiling all the time."

At one time, modeling was Flaum's career. She took classes and modeled at Hudson's downtown at 13. "I was always interested in modeling."

She went to New York and did print work, runway modeling, commercials, industrial films and some extra work in movies.

"I loved living in New York," she said, "but the competition is so tough."

She worked as a model in Chicago, also, while she worked at Saks, but with benefits and discounts, made a better living at Saks than as a model.

"You have to have the patience and the stamina," she said, to make it as a model. "I guess I had low tolerance for what you

Now, she says she has cut back and thinks of modeling as her third job.

"First, I'm a housewife and

mother (to two children), secondly I'm a Realtor and third I'm a model," she said. "I really liked having the modeling, but I'm happiest as a mother."

advertising, of which Bates said, "We don't call it junk mail around here."

In fact, Bates and the people at Polk specialize in tailoring marketing mailings to households and individuals that are inclined to purchase a certain product. According to a company brochure, Polk maintains listings of more than 12 million businesses and more than 80 million households.

Besides city directories and direct mailings, Polk also publishes banking and motor vehicle registration listings. When a major automobile company needs to recall thousands of its vehicles, it is the Polk company that provides the mailing list.

As if being one of the top executives in a major Detroit — if not world — company isn't enough for anyone to do, Bates is also quite active in outside organizations. But again, he finds himself taking charge.

As an active alumnus of U of M, Bates has served as president of the University of Michigan Alumni Club of Greater Detroit, which may be one of the largest alumni clubs in the country, Bates said. He now serves on its advisory board.

In recognition of his unflinching support of the university through the years, he was honored with the University of Michigan's Distinguished Service award at the U of M "Football Bust" Nov. 28 at the Westin Hotel.

"I'm delighted to have won this award," he said. "It's a great honor to be recognized by my fellow Wolverines."

The U of M alumni club raises the funds to provide 20 scholarships a year for deserving students, one-third of which go to student athletes in need.

Though not as agile as he once was, Bates seems to be drawn to athletics organizations. He is also president of the Detroit Athletic Club.

Although there are now more than 100 members and it costs more than \$100 to join, Bates said the club still does what it was intended to do: provide for the wives and children of Detroit police and firefighters who died in

the line of duty.

Closer to home, Bates is a member of the Crisis Club of Grosse Pointe, which provides for emergency funds for needy families who face tragedies, such as a house burning down or a catastrophic illness.

During their 32 years in Grosse Pointe Park, Bates and his wife, Gwen, have attended Grosse Pointe Congregational Church. They have raised two children, a son and a daughter.

Bates said he enjoys living in the Park. He said the community is small but fun, with a great environment and conveniently located.

He and his wife are in the process of building a new home on Harsens Island, where they have

had a cottage for years. He's counting the days until it's completed.

"It's a great wildlife sanctuary," he said of the island. "I just like the natural quiet charm of the place."

The move to Harsens Island will not be the only move Bates will be organizing this year.

After 75 years, the Polk company is moving its Howard Street headquarters to a new building in Brewery Park. The new headquarters are expected to be completed by the end of the year. Polk will occupy the building's top two floors.

While the growing company is definitely in need of a new building, Bates is a little concerned. "When you've been at a place for 75 years, you accumulate a lot of things," he said.

# School board will ask for 2.2 mill increase for 3 years

Grosse Pointers will vote on a school millage increase this spring and if it is approved, it will be the first increase since 1974.  
For the average Grosse Pointe homeowner, whose property is worth \$147,203 (SEV \$73,602), this would mean an additional \$161.92 per year.  
The school board approved a resolution Monday to request the additional 2.2 mills for the gen-

eral fund for three years. The election will be held April 10, pending approval of the Wayne County Election Commission.  
"This is an important matter for this community," said board Treasurer Vincent LoCicero. "The board has given it a lot of thought and we hope the community will, too."  
Current authorized millage for the school's general fund, which includes the county allocation, is 33 mills, but because of the

Headlee Amendment and voluntary rollbacks, actual millage levied is 29.7809. It expires in June.  
Current authorized millage for the library fund is 1.7, but because of the Headlee Amendment and voluntary rollbacks, the actual amount levied is 1.5766. Of the 1.7 mills, four-tenths was authorized for six years last June. A renewal of 1.3 mills for three years will be a separate question on the April

10 ballot.  
Debt fund is currently .8940 mills.  
Therefore, total actual millage levied — including general fund, library and debt fund — is currently 32.2515.  
Whitner pointed out that if the board hadn't voluntarily reduced its authorized millage in 1983 from 35.2 mills to the current 33 mills, the April request would be for renewal, not increase.

"Our selling point," he said, "is that we're asking for the millage to return to what it was in 1983-84, when we voluntarily reduced it."  
Christian Fenton, director of business affairs for the Grosse Pointe schools, said expenditures are projected as rising approximately 6 to 6.5 percent each year for the next five years, while revenue is projected as increasing approximately 3.6 to 4.5 percent each year.  
"The difference — is why we

need a tax increase," Fenton said.  
Fenton said a 2-mill increase would put the school system in good condition for the next three years. If there's no millage increase, he said, cuts will be necessary.  
"If there's no renewal — we're in real trouble."  
He also pointed out that passage of the millage increase will help the Grosse Pointe school system maintain its excellent bond rating.

## Special board meeting: Example of consensus building

It was a dynamic model of a well-run classroom.  
Grosse Pointe Superintendent of Schools John Whitner, in the role of teacher, outlined his lesson plan, defined goals, set a time limit and encouraged all opinions and points of view.  
He periodically summarized the discussion, restated goals and clarified ideas.  
He used appropriate visual aids to explain and organize important concepts.  
When the discussion meandered, he gently pulled the group back into focus.

"We were trying to build a consensus," Whitner said.  
This example of classroom democracy and teaching technique wasn't the traditional teacher-classroom situation. It was a special meeting of the Grosse Pointe Board of Education held Tuesday evening, Jan. 10, at the school board office.  
The purpose: to begin planning for the spring millage election.  
If Whitner was cast as the teacher, corresponding student roles were filled by school board members Vincent LoCicero, Carol Marr, Jon Gandelot, Carl Anderson, Jane Nutter and Gloria Konsler.  
"Students" with special reports were central office administrators Ronald Tonks, director of personnel and labor relations; Alfrida Frost, director of elementary curriculum; Christian Fenton, director of business af-

airs; David King, director of support services; George Eddington, director of community education; Edward Shine, assistant superintendent; Doris Cook, GPEA president; and Kathy Roberts, public relations consultant.  
Assorted election campaign experts and volunteers rounded out the "class": Pat Gast, Pat Bertelsen, Kay Baubie, Linda Schneider and Karen McLeod.  
Whitner referred to the group as an ad hoc committee to discuss millage.  
"I was generally pleased with the turnout and the involvement," he said. "Some people came with rather set ideas. Some were able to bend when bending was necessary."  
At any rate, a democratic, orderly, informative discussion followed, and within two hours, the teacher guided students to a consensus: a proposal for a millage increase to be submitted to the board of education at its Jan. 16 meeting.

The proposal included amount of increase; number of years for increase; date of election; an alternate plan in case of a defeat; even a theme.  
For extra credit, the students kicked around some ideas for campaign strategies.  
Business Affairs Director Fenton used an overhead projector for his report. On a big screen, research on actual and projected expenditures and revenue for the next five years under various millage options was placed before the class.  
The big screen then showed ending fund equity projections for several millage options — a 3-mill increase, 2.5-mill increase, 2-mill, 1-mill and no increase.  
The group zeroed in on 2 mills. More discussion. Questions.  
The big screen showed projected staffing cuts, should the millage be merely renewed, not increased.

"On an average home, which is \$147,203 in the Grosse Pointes and Harper Woods," Fenton said, a two-mill increase means a 6.2 percent tax increase, and equals \$147.20 more per year.  
"A five-year increase will give us more time," someone pointed out. "It also ties in with strategic planning."  
Whitner listed these pros on the five-year list.  
"A three-year increase is traditional in this community," another pointed out. "It gives (voters) more confidence in the board — that we're keeping things in control. We can go for the March election date. And it's a lot less."  
Whitner added these to the three-year list.  
"The issue we're dealing with tonight," he said, "is what's the saleable number and what will fly."  
More pros. More cons.  
Whitner listed them all. Ripped the paper off the easel

and taped it to the wall.  
Some divergent discussions developed: the advisability of proceeding immediately with asbestos removal — report by David King, director of support services.  
Another diversion: "What if the millage increase fails? When can we go back to the voters again? And what do we ask for then?"  
Whitner kept summarizing. "What I'm hearing at this point ..." he said.  
Discussion of election dates. Date of the week. How close to spring vacation. Time needed for campaign preparation. Some campaign strategies. Who will do the work.  
Whitner kept pulling the group back to the task at hand. "What I hear you saying ..."  
Murmurs. Adjustments. Clarifications. Nods.  
Veteran millage campaigners were asked for advice.  
GPEA President Cook reported on contract status.  
Someone suggested: "How about 2.2 mills for three years?"  
Mumbles. Nods. Discussion. Several approving comments.

"I hear a logjam breaking here," Whitner said.  
"The 2.2 mills is a logical tie-in to bring us back to where we were before." More positive comments.  
Whitner: "April 10. Two point two. For three years ... Once, twice, three times." Hands went up. "Sold."  
Students seemed satisfied. Teacher seemed satisfied. A sense of accomplishment all around.  
Whitner later called the evening's work an example of consensus building — "taking a group with different ideas and trying to build a consensus. Eighty or ninety percent of the time it works," he said. "If it doesn't, we back off and do some more work and try again."  
Whitner's background is teaching at the elementary school level. He taught for seven years in New York State, mostly

for the White Plains Public Schools. He also was an elementary school principal and assistant superintendent in White Plains. He moved to the position of school superintendent in Connecticut for 13 years, then came to Grosse Pointe as superintendent in April 1985.

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# Children's author gets first book published

Myra J. Anderson, author and illustrator of a recently published children's book, "Gifts of Love for Children," said she's been writing ever since her children were born. She has two sons, Chris, 12, and Jeremy, 11, and a daughter, Katie, 6.

"I was wrong," she said. "A girlfriend recently reminded me that when we were growing up, I was the one who wrote and directed all our backyard plays."

Anderson, 35, said her first love is art. She has taken art classes and two writing classes at Macomb Community College. She also took a correspondence course through the Institute of Children's Literature, which she said was extremely helpful.

The slim, 31-page volume contains two stories about young rabbits named Rugby and Skeeter and is illustrated with pen-and-ink drawings.

"I never had the courage to send what I wrote until recently," she said.

Her book was published by Carlton Press, Inc., the first place she sent it. They've printed 3,500 copies, which are available anywhere in the country.

"I considered sending the first story to a children's magazine, but I decided it needs to be illustrated. I sent Carlton the first story and they liked it, but asked for another one. So I wrote the second story.

"I've been working with the publishers since May. I finally had the book in my hand the second week in December."

The first story, "Rugby's Harvest Fair," revolves around mother love. The second story,

"Skeeter's Wish," is about the Tooth Fairy.

"All children wonder about the Tooth Fairy. In this story, Skeeter wants to find out for sure if she's real. He has a plan.

"But mothers are smarter than their children give them credit for."

Anderson said a lot of children's books don't have cuddle appeal.

"Books should make children feel good. Some books are meant to teach something. I don't write to teach. I write books just to be enjoyed."

She's already working on her next book. It's for older children, still untitled. It's about a girl named Charlie who inherits extrasensory perception from her grandmother.

"Charlie finds this unusual power scary and embarrassing," Anderson said.

She said writing is not difficult. "I sit at a typewriter and it just comes out. I've learned a lot about perseverance. I never know what I'll come up with unless I give it a chance."

Anderson also works 20 hours a week as an office manager for a chiropractor. She writes at home, on her husband's computer desk.

"I have a very supportive husband. He was home the day the books arrived. He called me at work and said something had come for me in the mail. I asked him if it was an envelope or a package. When he said it was a package, I made him open it. I was so excited. I made him get in the car and bring the book to me at work.

"I finally held the book in my hand and I couldn't believe it. It was so bizarre."

Anderson will be at the Harper Woods Library at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 31, in the Heritage Room, for a "Meet the Author" session. She said books would be available for sale and for signature then.

"My children are excited. They're good critics, too. Jeremy is artistic. Chris is excited, but he's concerned with how much money I'm going to make."

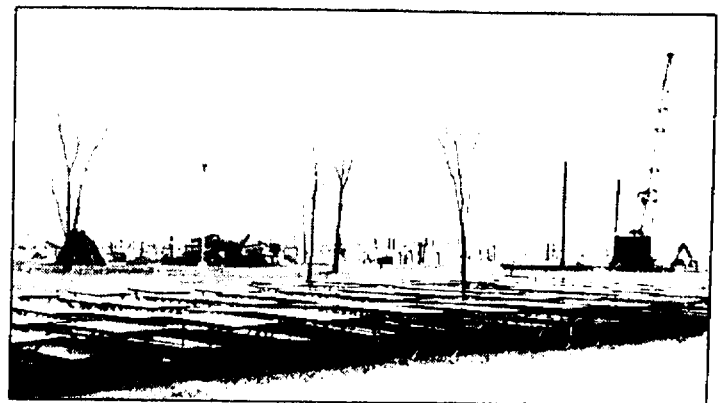
The land on which the former Hubbard house on Jefferson and Lakeside stood is now the site of eight new lots. Three are being built on, two more are purchased and three are for sale.



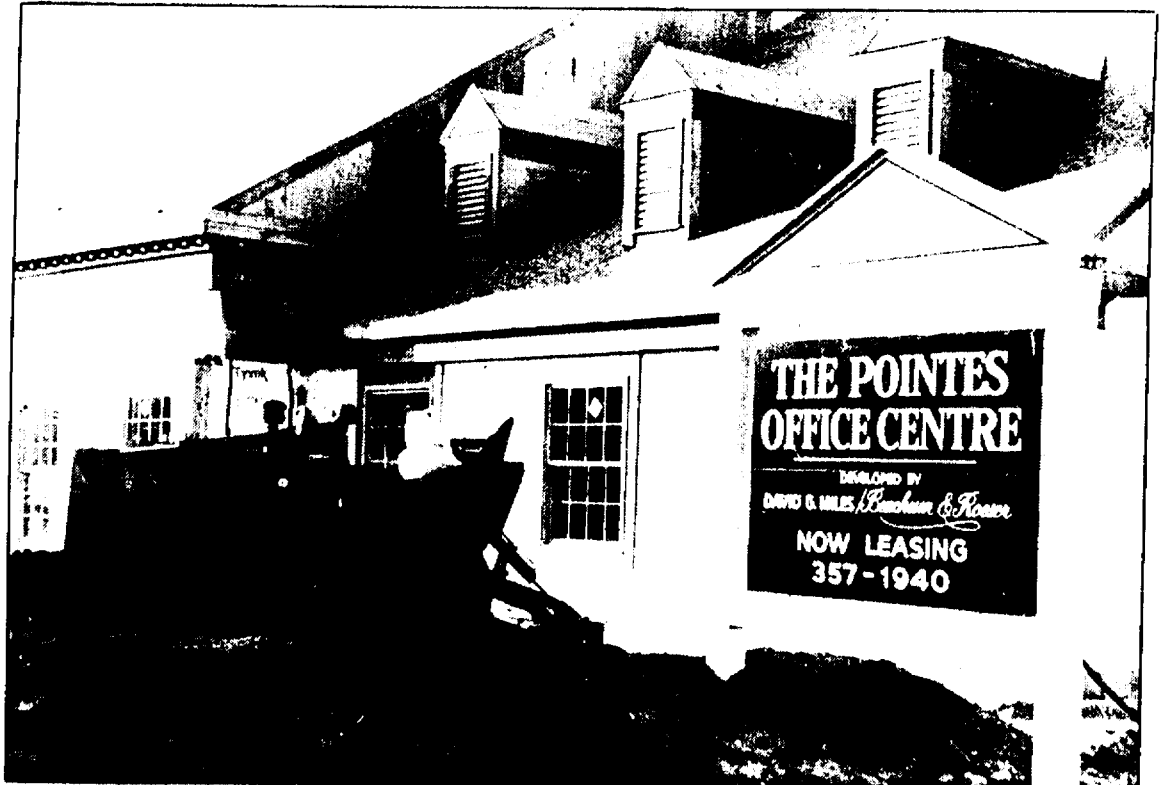
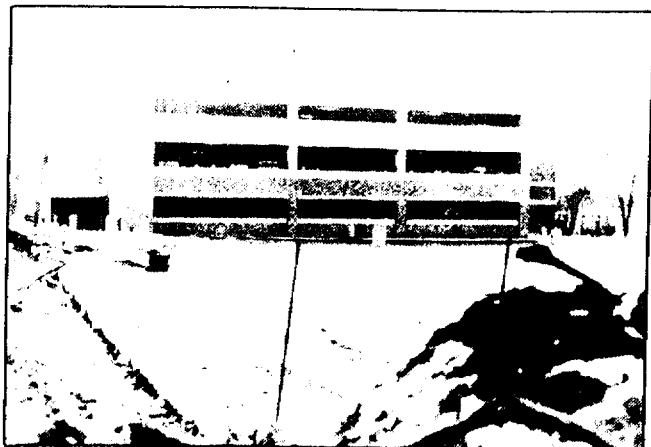
One.2.3, the Hill's newest restaurant, is shaping up. On the site of the former Bronze Door, the opening is planned for late March.

# Tax bills reflect mills for jail, intermediate schools

It's that time of year again. Homeowners are getting the chills not only from the weather but also by the increases in their winter tax bills.

The two increases affecting all property owners throughout the Pointes are the additional mills for county jails and the Wayne County Intermediate School District.

During the primaries in August, county voters approved a special one mill to be used to build a new county jail, and in the November general election a one mill increase was approved for the intermediate school district's handicapped programs, bringing the total tax rate for the intermediate school district to 8.02 mills.

The extra two mills approved by voters means the owner of a

\$200,000 home will pay \$200 more in taxes. A mill is a \$1 tax per \$1,000 of a home's assessed value, which is 50 percent of market value. A \$200,000 home would be assessed at \$100,000, which means that for every mill, the homeowner would have to pay \$100 in taxes.

In Grosse Pointe Woods the total winter tax bill is 45.71 mills (calculated by rounding off the

various millage rates to two decimal places). The owner of the home assessed at \$100,000 in the Woods received a 1988-89 winter tax of \$4,571.

Last year's winter tax bill in the Woods was a total of 42.83 mills. The Woods homeowner with the assessed value of \$100,000 paid \$288 less in winter taxes last year due to the lower millage rates -- not even taking into account higher assessed values, which are adjusted every year to keep up with rising market values.

The Woods winter tax bill also reflected a 1.23-mill increase in its drain tax. The drain levy was increased from .86 mills last year to 2.09 mills for the 1988-89 fiscal year. The drain tax was

increased to its 1987 level to pay for existing debt obligations. None of the other Pointes had a drain tax on its winter tax bill.

Not all the winter taxes went up in the Pointes. The Grosse Pointe Public School System's tax rate went down almost half a mill from 32.67 mills last year to 32.26 mills this year.

Also on the winter tax bills throughout the Pointes are .24 mills for the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority, which operates the regional parks in southeast Michigan, and one mill for Wayne County Community College. The community college tax is mandated by the state legisla-

ture. The Woods, Park, City, Farms and Grosse Pointe Township also charge 1 percent administration fee for collecting the taxes for the school district, county, park authority and intermediate school district.

Grosse Pointe Park residents pay their city taxes on the winter bill. The Park taxes on this year's bill are 17.14 mills. Shores residents also pay .86 mills in Grosse Pointe Township taxes on their winter bills. City taxes for the Woods, Farms, Grosse Pointe and Village of Grosse Pointe Shores are paid on the summer bills.

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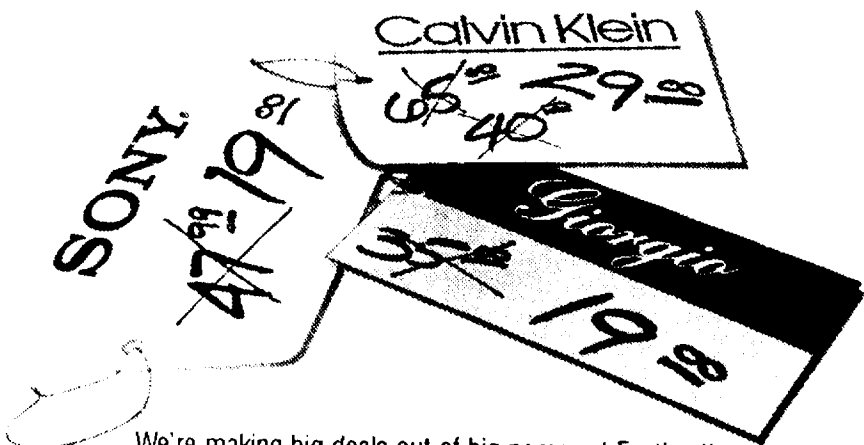
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# School board delays action on changing exam weights

The board of education heard more pros and cons Jan. 9 for changing the weight of high school final exams from one-seventh to one-fifth of the final grade.

The matter was tabled at the Jan. 16 meeting, pending more administrative input. It will be placed on the agenda in February.

A committee made up of teachers, students, counselors, administrators and parents has been considering the policy change. The committee's recommendation to the board in November was to increase the weight of the final exam to one-fifth. Current policy weights final exams at one-seventh of the final course grade.

Gordon Morlan, chairman of the committee, said the rationale for the change was to increase the importance of studying for finals. Final exams are not considered important to many students, he said, and the increased weight would foster the perception of their importance.

When the matter came before the school board at the November meeting, nearly two dozen high school students attended, asking for postponement of a

vote until they could do their own survey and present their own point of view.

At the Jan. 9 meeting, South student Brad McMillin, who served on the committee, spoke

in support of the increased exam weight.

North Student Association President Beth Stevens argued that weights should remain at one-seventh, because a two-hour

exam should not carry as much weight as the work of a full card-marking.

Roger McCaig, director of research and development for the schools, said that the one-seventh rule was adopted 13 years ago, for the 1975-76 school year.

"It's an issue that keeps coming up again and again," McCaig said, "because the cast of characters keeps changing."

Morlan said that a survey of teachers' opinions on the issue showed that, of 109 teachers surveyed, 31 said the one-seventh weight should remain while 78 said the weight should be changed. Of those 78, 68 said the final exam weight should be one-fifth or more.

David Barbour, parent of two North students, said that additional pressure on special needs students at exam time is unfair.

JoEllen Lane, representing the Michigan Association for Children with Learning Disabilities, said that the increased weighting would create an adverse effect on children who have difficulty taking exams.

"This may include children with learning disabilities," she said, "but is not exclusive to such children."

Superintendent John Whritner and board members Jon Gandelot and Carl Anderson said they supported the committee's recommendation for an increase to one-fifth.

Board members Vincent Lo Cicero, Carol Marr and Gloria Konsler had reservations about approving the change.

Konsler and Marr said that the issue has brought other problems to the foreground — such as poorly written exams, inconsistency in creating exams, and lack of review time for final exams.

Gandelot said that the board could take one of four actions: (1) not approve the increase to one-fifth, (2) approve the committee's recommendation as is, (3) approve, but delay implementation until concerns can be addressed by another committee, or (4) table the issue until all the new

questions and concerns are addressed.

If the measure is approved by

the board, it would become effective at the end of the next school year, 1989-90.

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# Detroit is regaining its star status in auto world

A lot of signs point to the same thing — Detroit is once again the center of the automotive universe.

There is the stunning success of the first North American International Auto Show, a world-class spectacle at Cobo Hall which has impressed just about everyone.

There is the continuing growth of the light truck market, dominated by U.S. makers.

The enthusiast magazines are treating Detroit iron with re-

ville SSE convinced me. A combination of excellent design, improved quality and a sagging American dollar had made upscale American cars an incredible bargain compared with the Europeans.

And this is being reflected in the marketplace. The upscale Europeans are not in a panic and Jaguar dealers are still selling everything as fast as they can bring them in. But overall, upscale European imports are declining in sales and upscale

modern but elegant and readable instrument cluster and steering-wheel-mounted controls for the sound and climate systems that I came to love as marvelous technological excess.

To Traverse City and back through some good solid Michigan winter, complete with glowing frost fog, slippery roads, snow squalls and buffeting winds, the Bonneville SSE was sure-footed, always under control and a pleasure to drive. Its antilock braking made stopping sure and straight. Never mind American Express, don't leave home without ABS.

Like all Bonnevilles, the SSE is powered by GM's 3.8-liter "3800" V-6 with multi-port sequential fuel injection, rated at 165 horsepower. The SSE also has as standard equipment variable-ratio power steering, electronic load leveling, firmer springs, heavier front anti-roll bar and 16-inch wheels.

If you think the price neighborhood of \$22,500 is kind of steep for a Pontiac, think again. Because if you compare it with its European competition (the Volvo 780 will set you back around \$40,000), the SSE is a real bargain. So is the Olds Touring Sedan at around \$25,000.

With this kind of upscale stuff coming out of Detroit, the perennial champs from Europe are definitely in for a fight. The Jap-

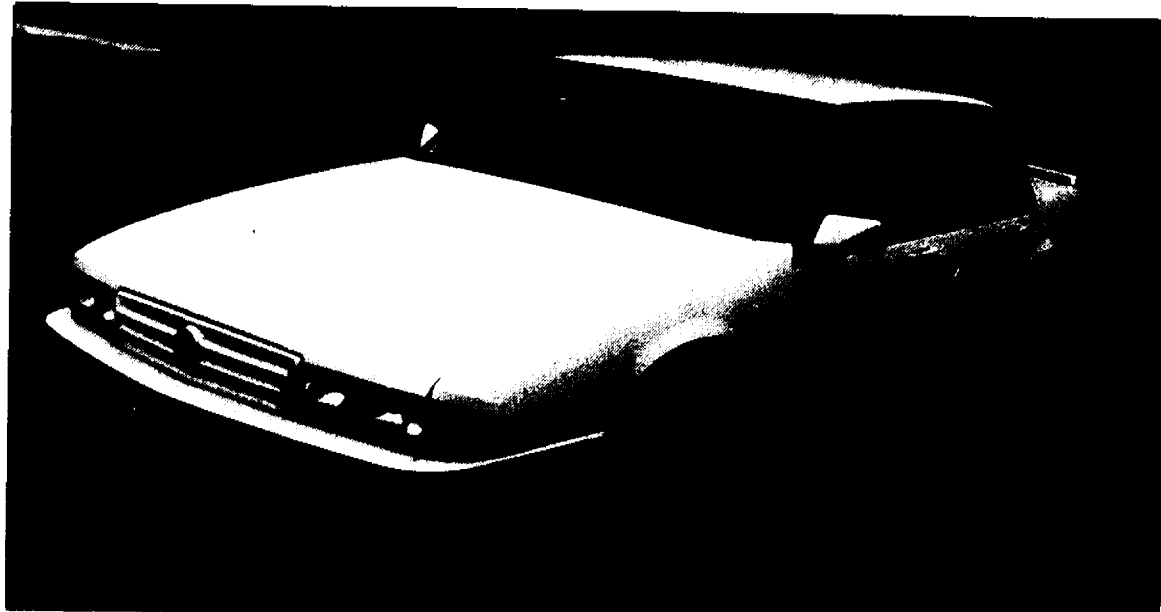

anese are just getting started in this market segment. They may find Detroit tougher than expected too.

spect formerly reserved for upscale European nameplates and Japanese quality. Car & Driver magazine recently compared the much-maligned Cadillac Allante with the revered and admittedly long-in-the-tooth Mercedes-Benz SL roadster and concluded that the Allante was the new champ.

In fact, all was topsy-turvy. The American challenger had the more sophisticated engine, drive train, suspension and steering, while the Mercedes was softer ride and had more power in straightaway pedal-stomping. But the Allante was quicker in traffic and generally more nimble and sure-footed. All this in Car & Driver was curiously disorienting as American and European roles seemed reversed.

I experienced my own automotive road to Damascus in a Pontiac Bonneville SSE (on the road to Troy and points north). A few weeks earlier, I had driven a Volvo 780 Bertone, a top-of-the-line offering which I found a surprising number of things to gripe about (surprising because I have been a Volvo fan for years, despite the fact that the Washington safety establishment and Consumers Union has long favored that indestructible Swede).

Then a few days in an Oldsmobile Touring Sedan and I discovered with some amazement that I like it better than the Volvo. A few days in a Bonne-

American nameplates are not.

A Mercedes-Benz or BMW may outrank American makes, but Cadillacs and Lincolns have always been fashionable in Birmingham/Bloomfield and the Grosse Pointes. And The Wall Street Journal recently reported an important sociological note, that Cadillacs and Lincolns are now fashionable in Beverly Hills and Pasadena.

Having been a critic of General Motors' rather dull offerings for some time, not only compared with the Europeans but also with Ford Motor Co. and Chrysler Corp., I must admit that the Old Touring Sedan and especially the Bonneville SSE have convinced me that the General is once again serious indeed about building cars.

The Bonneville SSE is certainly one of the best looking four-door sedans around, but its very sharp exterior takes a back seat to what's inside. What's inside? Just about everything your automotive heart could want. It is so well-equipped, in fact, that the only options available for the SSE are a power sunroof, leather interior and an alarm system.

Everything else is standard, including antilock braking system, seats with almost infinitely variable power adjustments, an automatic climate-control system that unobtrusively keeps the interior comfortable all the time, a

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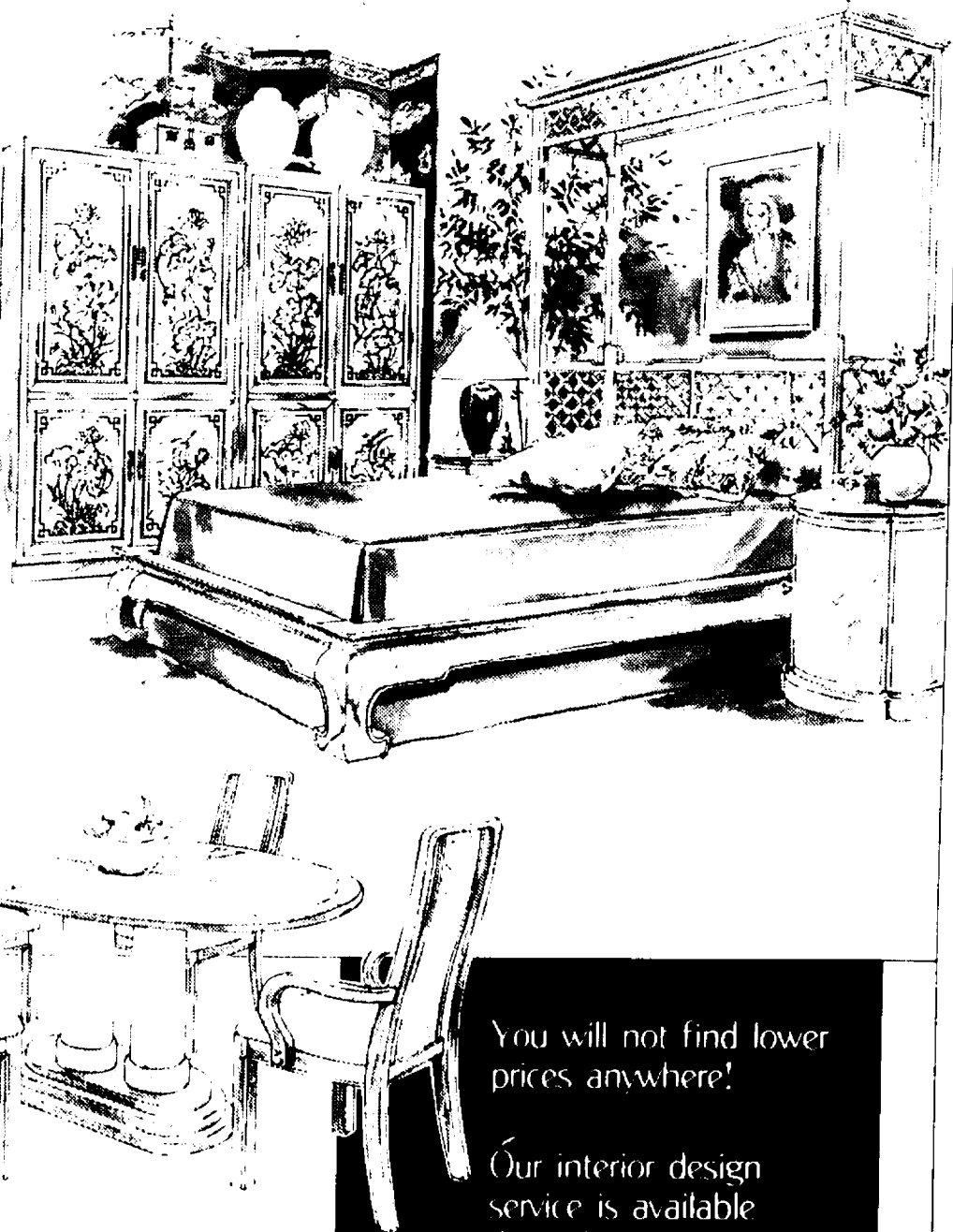
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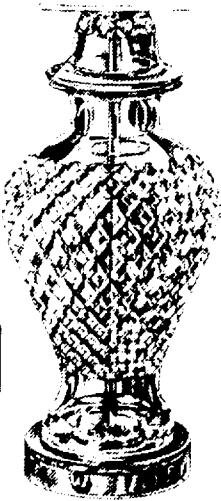


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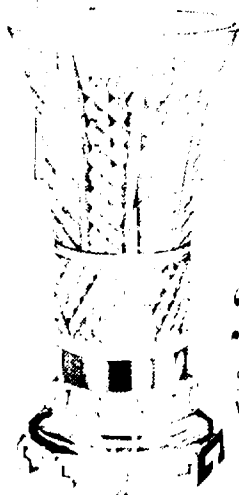
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# Resident advocates brewery pubs in Michigan

Michigan law prohibits brew pubs — small breweries that operate as part of a tavern or restaurant.

Restaurateurs are attracted to the ambiance of the idea: Customers sipping a unique beer, brewed in-house, in shining copper brewkettles and fermenting tanks, right before their eyes.

Customers would be assured a unique, fresh, one-of-a-kind product. Brewmasters could experiment with small batches and new recipes and offer a rotating selection of seasonal beers.

Tavern owners could cater to the preferences of their clientele.

Better yet, in-house brewing saves money. Packaging and distribution costs, delivery costs, wholesale and retail mark-ups are non-existent.

Thomas M. Burns Jr., of Grosse Pointe Park, president and brewmaster of Ambier Brewing Systems, a company that provides consulting services, legal and technical brewing advice for owners of brew pubs, is doing his best to change Michigan's law.

Burns is also an attorney, and he's representing the Traffic Jam, a restaurant near Wayne State University whose owner has already installed \$50,000

worth of brewing equipment in preparation for the change in Michigan law.

"Twenty-nine states now allow brew pubs," Burns said. "Of those, about one-half didn't need a legislative change."

There's a conflict of interest law in Michigan, he said. "Manufacturers can't have a concurrent interest in licensing. The purpose of the law is to promote a three-tiered division of distribution."

Burns said that when Prohibition was repealed, one of the compromises designed to appease

Prohibitionists involved keeping alcoholic beverage manufacturing separate from retail businesses.

The Beer and Wine Wholesalers Association, which has a powerful Lansing lobby, believes anything but the three-tiered division would threaten wholesalers, Burns said.

Burns has been working for two years to change Michigan's legislation. "We proposed an interpretation of the existing law to the Michigan Liquor Control Commission," he said. "The existing law prohibits manufacturers from owning retailers — but it doesn't prohibit retailers from owning manufacturers."

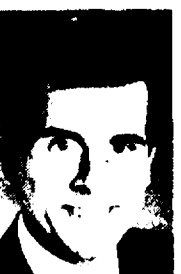

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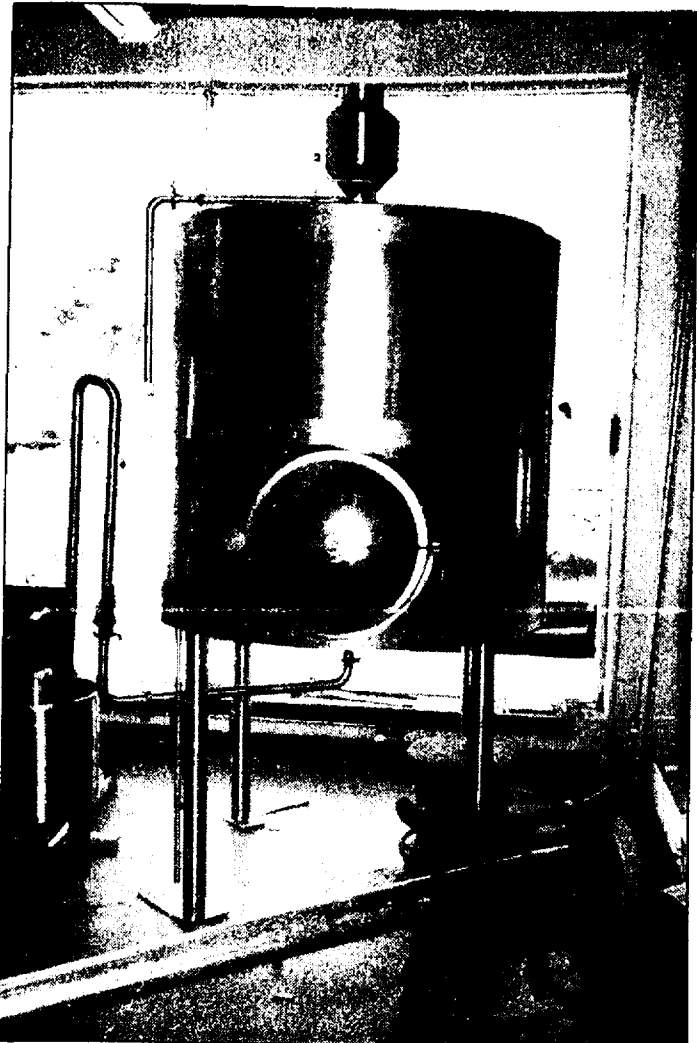
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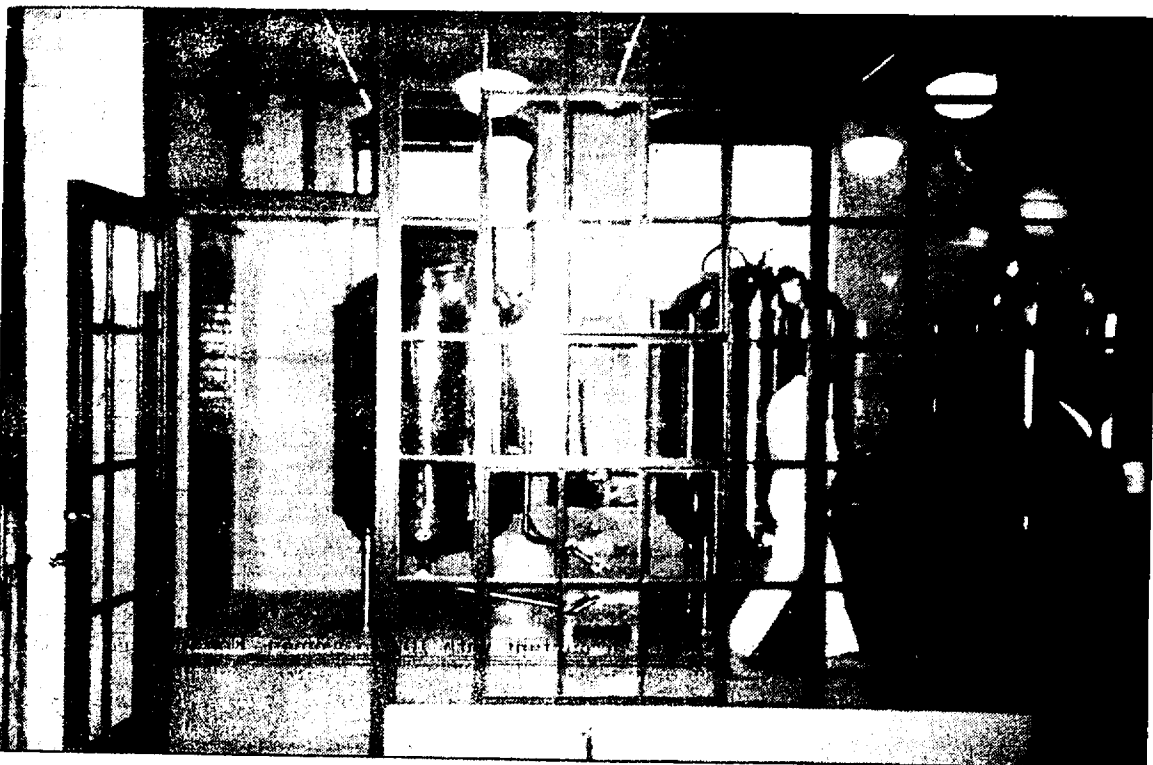

But the Liquor Control Commission ruled against this interpretation. So Michigan needs a legislative change, Burns said.

He's now approaching the problem through an antitrust loophole. "We filed a suit in U.S. District Court against Michigan and the MLCC in December and we'll prove a violation of antitrust laws," he said.

Burns said the suit will probably not go to trial. "I would guess it will be resolved within six months or so at the district level. I believe we have a good shot at it, but it could get tied up in appeal — and may end up in the U.S. Supreme Court."

Essentially, the three-tiered system is a monopoly, he said.

Burns said Ambier Brewing Systems is a service company

and is not tied to any manufacturer or product line. Ambier, he said, provides expertise and advice to potential brew pub owners — such services as concept evaluation, site review, brewery layout, licensing, equipment specification, recipes, personnel training, legal and technical advice.

He worked in a small brewery in Portland, Ore., while attending law school. Then he was brewmaster and manager of a Boulder, Colo., brewery. He was involved with the opening of the first U.S. brew pub in 1983 in Yakima, Wash. "There's now about 100 brew pubs in the U.S."

"Bottled beer is a relatively recent invention," he said, "and it only became popular about 50 years ago. "If we prevail — and

three-tiered schemes do violate antitrust laws, we'll be changing the way beer is distributed in this country.

"Brew pubs are a reaction to the consolidation of breweries," Burns said. He said in-house brewed beer would refresh the beer market — where the only difference in bottled beers seems to be the name and breed of dog in the commercials. "This trend is following the wine trend of the '60s," he said, "when people became interested in different types of wine, different tastes, imports and so on.

"In the last three or four years, we've seen the demand plateau, but we still see a 3 to 5 percent growth per year for a long time."

## Debra Grusecki: Focus is on graphic arts

Debra Grusecki spends most of her working day at a computer terminal, typesetting ads — real estate ads, display ads and legal notices. It's repetitious, she says, but it's all good experience to add to an impressive background that she has accumulated in the four years since she graduated from college.

## Lake level

Lake St. Clair's water level at the end of December was about 10 inches below what it was one year ago and about 2 inches above one month ago. At the end of December, the lake elevation was at 573.59 feet above the mean water level at Father Point, Quebec.

The December monthly mean level was about 4 inches above the long-term average. This level was about 32 inches below the all-time December monthly mean high, which was set in 1986, and about 29 inches above the all-time December monthly mean low, which was set in 1925.

For mariners, the end of December level was 23 inches above chart datum.

The six-month forecast of levels for Lake St. Clair shows that the lake is expected to be above its long-term average level during the next six months. The forecast shows that at the end of January, Lake St. Clair will be about 3 inches below what it was at the end of December. The lake is expected to continue its seasonal decline into February.

At the end of June 1989, levels are expected to be about 4 inches above what they were at the same time in 1988. The June mean would be above the long-term average level for that month but 23 inches below the all-time high mean for June, which was set in 1986.

# First English Ev. Lutheran Church: 'The local is not the total'

This is the sixteenth in an occasional series about Grosse Pointe churches.

The Rev. Paul Keppler has been pastor of the First English Evangelical Lutheran Church for all of its 32 years in Grosse Pointe — and seven years before that, at its Detroit location on the corner of Mack and Mount Elliott.

He's planning to retire next September.

The move to Grosse Pointe was in 1957, he said, because many members lived in the area.

Today the church counts 750 confirmed members and has about 100 children enrolled in Sunday School. During the peak years, he said, membership was more than 1,000 and Sunday School had 300 youngsters.

Keppler said the membership of the church cuts across social and economic lines. The mixture of old and new members blends well.

"Material needs are not primary in this congregation," he said. "We've always found people willing to give of themselves. We do what we can with the generosity available to us."

One of the problems for people of the '80s, he said, is time. "People are so busy with their lives. They're not unwilling. But there's so many options. This is a very complicated age — and church isn't the only game in town."

"My approach is to try to do the most we can. I encourage. But I recognize that it's the way we live today."

One of the unique aspects of the church, he said, is their parish education program. "This is reflected in the fact that we built the education building (in 1964) not just for children. It's for adult education, too. We have a half-hour class between early and late church," Keppler said. "We have a Monday evening class of about 20 or so each week, generally devoted to bibli-

cal study — because that's the base of a congregation. We emphasize as much adult education as possible."

Keppler said the church is heavily into benevolence programs. "We support a missionary in Japan and, in part, a missionary in New Guinea. We also give \$5,000 a year for a student trust fund to a Lutheran seminary. We probably do \$50,000 worth of benevolence per year."

"The local is not the total," he said. "We've tried to maintain this attitude."

Keppler said the church's music program sets it apart from other churches in the area. "With the help of Bob Foster, a University of Michigan graduate who is an excellent organist and

Road, in 1956, and after 14 months of construction, the church was dedicated in December 1957 at a nationwide peak in church membership.

The parish education unit was completed in 1964, with 12 classrooms, a lounge, nursery and a youth room.

The church design is modified Gothic and is made of buff sandstone, trimmed with white limestone.

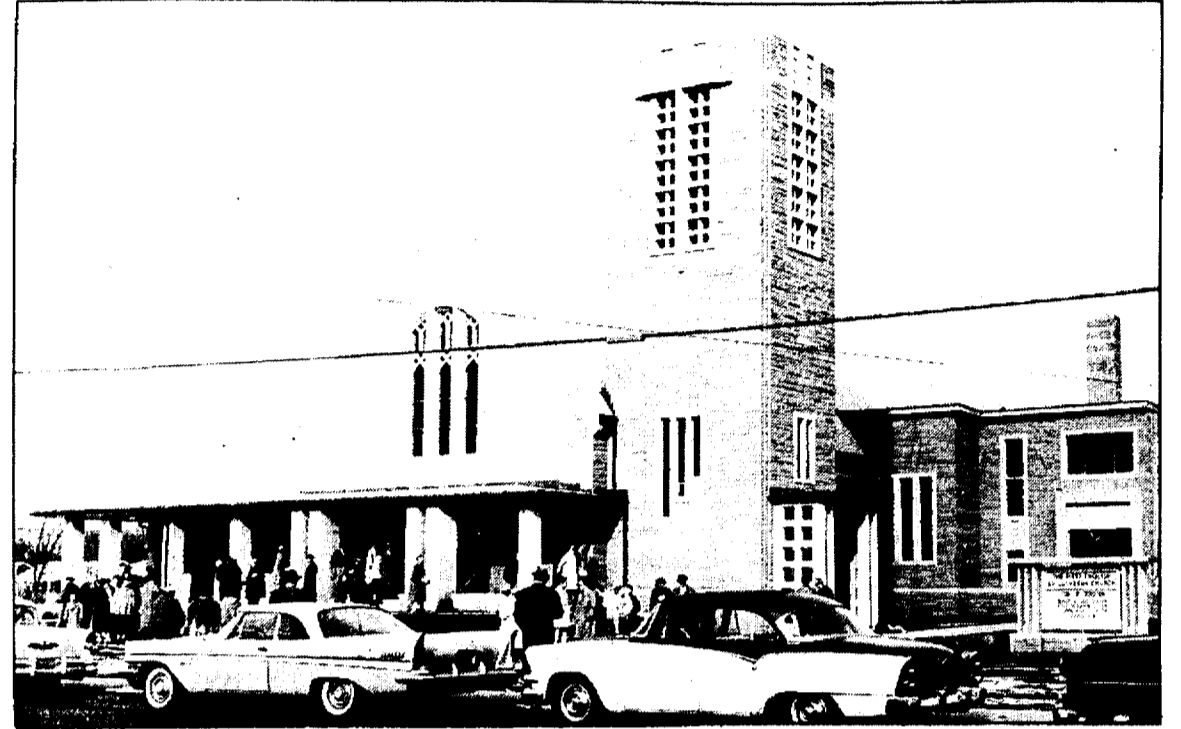
The interior seats about 500 people. The unique feature is the

elaborate stained glass windows throughout the entire church — nave, narthex, lounges, nursery, choir loft. The bright reds, purples, blues and greens in contemporary designs, figures and symbols tell the stories of the Old Testament, the life of Christ, the apostolic church, the history of the Christian church, the trinity, and various callings: art and science, government and business, home and school, labor and industry. In addition, art glass windows depict church musi-

cians, and scenes of children and family life.

Most significant, said Keppler, is the inscription on the pulpit in the front of the church: "Every man in his own language."

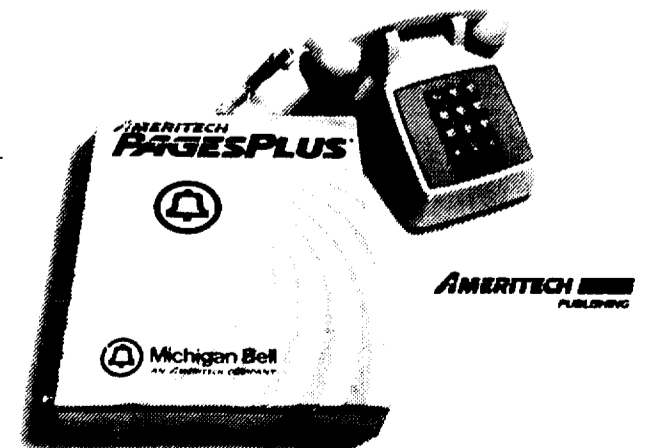
It doesn't only refer to the important role of preaching, he said, "but it also refers to the use of English in the church. First English was the first Lutheran congregation in Detroit to use English in its worship service."



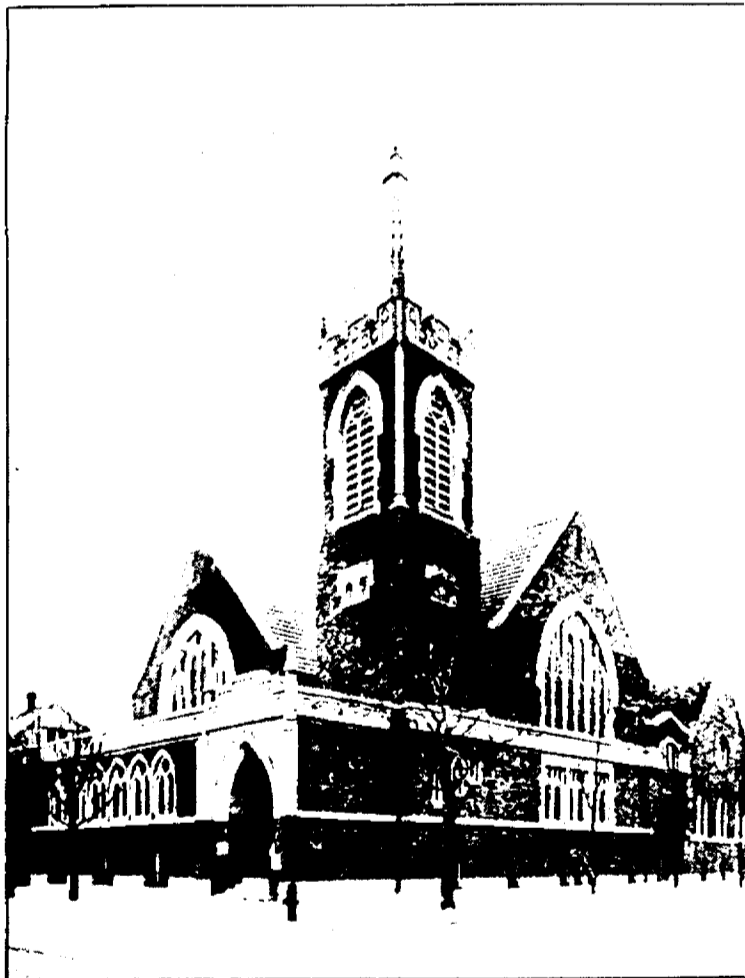
First English Evangelical Lutheran Church, as it appeared on Dec. 15, 1957, the day of its dedication after 14 months of construction.

## Solid waste management forum planned

The Annual Leadership Forum on Solid Waste Management is scheduled for March 13-15 at the Clarion Hotel in Lansing. ## Shakespeare, fakespeare

\* Or, to be(lieve) or not to be(lieve)

This is the winter of William Shakespeare's discontent.

His reputation has had to endure the slings and arrows of outrageous scholars and other literature lovers who say William Shakespeare was not the "soul of an age," but instead a petty grain dealer who died without writing anything but his epitaph and a will in which he left his "second best bed" to his wife.

The epitaph — not among the most profound of the works attributed to the Bard of Avon — reads: "Good friend for Jesus' sake forbear/To dig the dust enclosed here./Blessed be the man that spares these stones/And curse be he that moves my bones."

Well, hey, at least it rhymes.

Mark McPherson has dedicated a large portion of his adult life to disproving the myth that Shakespeare wrote Shakespeare. He spent last Thursday evening as the guest of The Friends of Grosse Pointe Public Library trying to convince an audience that the son of an illiterate glovemaking could possibly have created "Romeo and Juliet," "Hamlet," "Othello" and "A Midsummer Night's Dream."

Or, for that matter, "Venus and Adonis," "The Rape of Lucrece," or any of the sonnets.

McPHERSON HAS PLAYED prosecution counsel against William Shakespeare in a number of mock trials, including a recent one in Royal Oak, yet has always lost.

Appeals are ready to be filed and, like most litigants, McPherson will keep going to trial until he gets the verdict he wants: that there is reasonable

doubt that Shakespeare wrote what 400 and some odd years of history have said he wrote.

The facts about Shakespeare's life and the disputes with those facts are as follows, measure for measure.

He was born in Stratford in 1564. He married Anne Hathaway in 1582. Six months later their first child was born. Twins came in 1585. He left his wife and three children in 1587 for London, (legend has it he left town because he poached a deer on some lord's estate and ran away to escape prosecution) where nothing was heard of him for 10 years.

There are no school records of him ever attending the Stratford Grammar School; they have been destroyed throughout the centuries. During his 10 years in London, he was supposedly a soldier, a law clerk, a schoolmaster, an actor, a doctor and an astronomer — among other things. It is assumed he received his knowledge of these fields and used them later in writing. It is also believed that he never did any of these things and just existed for a while, free of the burden of his family.

There is mention of Shakespeare as an actor in 1593, and of him as an author also at that time, although the author reference is debated.

In 1597 he bought the most opulent house in Stratford. In 1610 he returned to Stratford where he busied himself by trading grain, and suing over shillings. He also sued to keep people from hanging around on the town's commons, a suit he lost, incidentally.

He died, leaving his will, which does not mention any literary works, plays, poems or

manuscripts. And his epitaph.

Over the years there were plays, works and parts in plays which were attributed to William Shakespeare, but never to William Shakespeare.

THE FIRST TIME the second "a" appears in his name is seven years after his death with the publication of The First Folio. There were, however, some 80 different variations on the name Shakespere at the time in that area of the country.

There are other curiosities: Why would a genius like Shakespeare allow his daughter to be illiterate (which she apparently was), and why was no mention made by his contemporaries of the man once called "the soul of his age?"

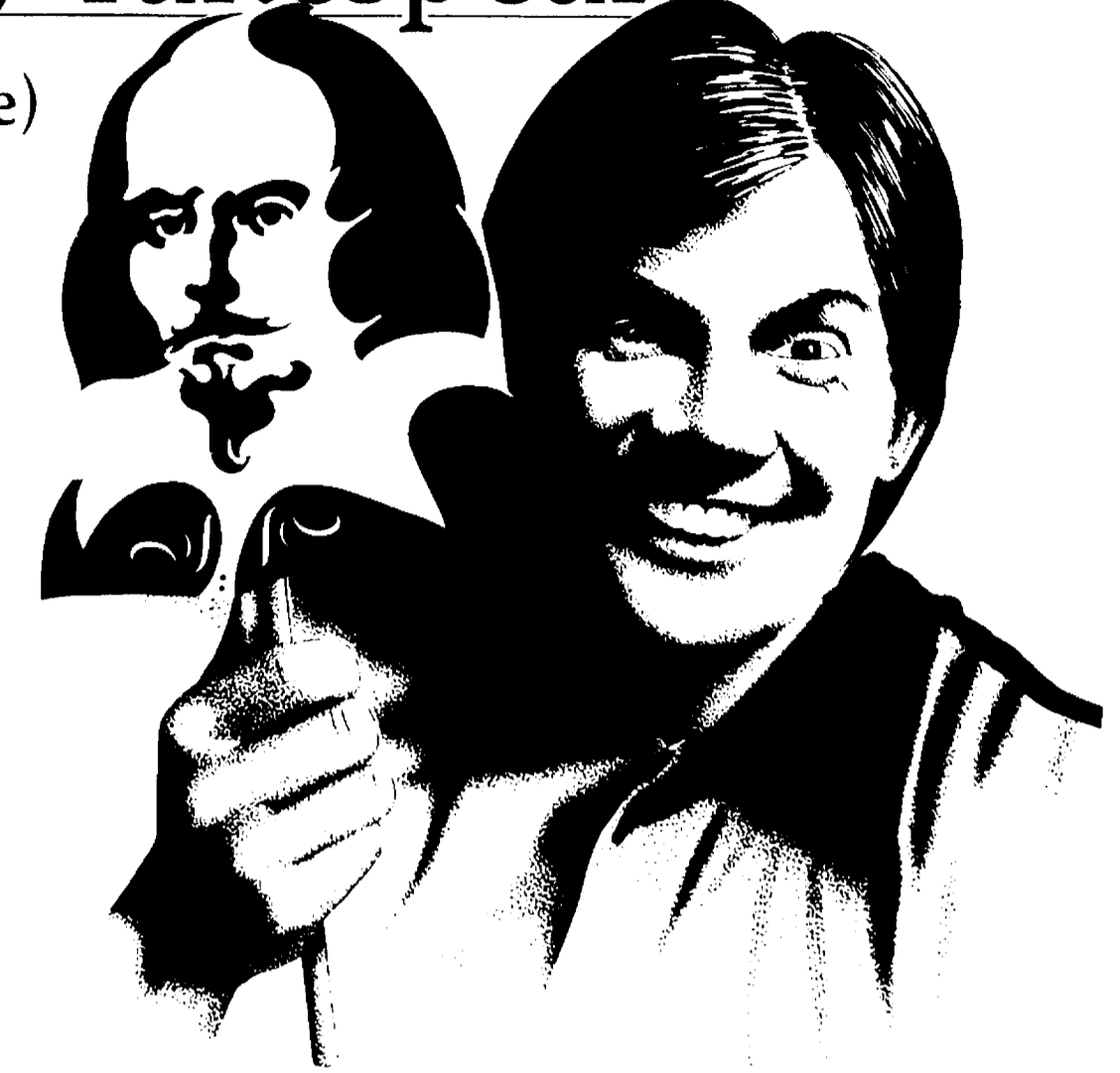
Then there is the matter of a monument to Shakespeare which was originally planned to show a small man with a bag of grain, but was changed over the years and now depicts a larger man clasping a quill pen, a manuscript in front of him.

Let's get to the meat of the matter. After 400 years, *who really cares?*

Well, McPherson says, ask any author, artist or creative type if they want credit for their work and if they tell you no, they're probably lying. That is the reason there is a byline at the top of this story.

So, assuming for the moment that Shakespeare didn't write a couplet aside from his epitaph, who would find it in their best interest to write and attribute works like these to a quiet little businessman?

One of the most known contenders is the Earl of Oxford, who recently had his day in the United States Supreme Court. That panel presided over a mock



trial and ruled there was no solid evidence that he wrote them, so it should be assumed that Shakespeare did, much to the dismay of the Oxfordians.

THE BACONIANS BELIEVE Francis Bacon wrote them and left cryptic proof in all the plays of his involvement. McPherson didn't much elaborate on this.

And then there's Ben Jonson, the Englishman who claimed to have known and partied with Shakespeare. But can the word of someone who was stripped of an Olympic gold medal for tak-

ing steroids be taken all *that* seriously?

"The Gay Elizabethian James Bond," as McPherson called Christopher Marlowe, is another possibility. Word has it he was a good friend of certain members of Elizabeth I's ministers. He was in trouble constantly for his beliefs and always just avoided prosecution. According to legend, he got in a fight and was killed and buried in an unmarked grave which has not been found to this day.

But those in the know say he never really was killed, he con-

tinued to write, but because he was "dead" he used a pen name: William Shakespeare. The proof of that comes from the front page of a 1620 tabloid entitled *Ye Olde National Enquirer*.

Then there's the perfectly plausible theory that Queen Elizabeth I — who was really a man in drag — wrote them her, er, himself.

Isn't this simply much ado about nothing because frankly, what's in a name? The classic plays by any other author would

McPHERSON HAS FORMED an agency, Daedalos, which allows him the opportunity to travel and write and give lectures about various topics, including the existence of ghosts, the Loch Ness Monster and Camelot.

"What I try to do is to get people to open up to other possibilities," he said.

And there's really no harm in making people realize that there's more in heaven and

philosophies.

A poll was taken at the end of McPherson's talk and for the first time in the decade McPherson's been conducting the trials, Shakespeare lost.

Eighteen stalwarts did not find enough evidence in McPherson's talk to throw out their "Collected Works of Shake-

# Program seeks to save seniors from fraud losses

Mary G. settles down for an evening of reading and listening to music. Just as she gets comfortable, the phone rings. At the other end of the line is a smooth-talking salesman selling precious gems and promising huge returns on her investment. After trying to brush him off, Mary begins to listen to his pitch ... and it starts sounding good.

What the fictitious Mary G. is getting interested in is one of the most common areas of investment schemes: diamonds, sapphires and other precious metals sold over the telephone. The seller makes unrealistic promises of great profits with unsubstantiated claims of gem quality and unrealistic estimates of increases in market value.

It's the sort of scheme which, unfortunately, has the most success when perpetrated on senior citizens, and which the state of Michigan, through its Corporation and Securities Bureau, wants to stop.

Since June 1987, the Corporation and Securities Bureau, in conjunction with the Office of

Services to the Aging and the Area Agencies on Aging, has had available a network of employees and volunteers in each of Michigan's 14 Area Agency on Aging regions to serve as contacts for seniors seeking information on evaluating investment offerings.

According to Carl L. Tyson, director of the Corporation and Securities Bureau, the program was developed to provide senior citizens with tools to be used in evaluating investments in order to reduce the incidence of fraud against Michigan's older population.

More than 100 volunteers and employees have been trained to work with senior citizens on evaluating investments.

The bureau has published a pamphlet called "Protecting Your Savings From Con Artists." It details some of the most common areas of investment schemes, including:

- Deferred delivery and leverage contracts involving coal, oil and other commodities: Glowing promises of profit are made in controlling large quantities of coal, oil and other commodities. Be especially wary of these opportunities when they are made by telephone.

- Advance fee loans: These involve promises to desperate borrowers only upon payment of an "up front" or "advance" fee. It is not uncommon for the fraudulent promoter to indicate that the sources of such loans are foreign investors or off-shore banks.

- Pyramid promotions: Profits are promised from bringing in other salespeople under you in a pyramid rather than from sales of the basic product.

- Gold and silver mines: Fantastic mineral reserves and profits are promised from untested

or played-out mines. Question any "secret" or "new" formula or method from extracting minerals from old mines. This is a classic fraud.

- Interests in oil wells: Promises of riches from a supposedly proven field or a surefire wildcat well are old standards replayed for profits annually by con artists.

A simple rule of thumb regarding investment possibilities is this: If it sounds too good to be true, beware. It probably is.

Michigan's Corporation and Securities Bureau advises that anyone who feels he or she has been taken by a con artist should report the matter quickly. If you believe you've been defrauded, you should contact an

attorney to determine your rights. A prompt complaint may keep others from being defrauded.

## New fellowship opens at Christ Church

Christ Church Episcopal of Grosse Pointe has created a peer support group for blind and visually impaired persons. The group, known as the Bartimaeus Fellowship, will meet on the second and fourth Monday of each month from 10 a.m. to noon in Miller Hall.

The first meeting is Jan. 23. Membership is open to all visually impaired persons; their spouses and/or companions are also welcome.

The group's goals are: to locate the visually impaired and/or their care persons who are in need of information regarding

available resources; to provide moral and spiritual support for them; to share ideas regarding coping skills. The Bartimaeus Fellowship is unique in that it will be a peer group which determines its own organization and program.

Demographics of this area indicate that there are a great many people over age 60 and that the trend will continue for decades. One of the more difficult problems of aging is loss of vision, with the resulting inability to drive, read and maintain one's previous lifestyle. The loss may also profoundly affect the

person's family.

Kay Gee, a long time member of Christ Church will serve as facilitator of the group. She has been legally blind since 1981, is a member of the Academy of Certified Social Workers and has been a consultant for the Michigan Commission for the Blind for five years.

The Rev. Bryant Dennison will serve as the group's chaplain. Both ask that those who know of visually impaired persons make them aware of the new support group.

### Cigarette smoking and heart disease

Approximately 350,000 premature deaths each year can be attributed to cigarette smoking, and diseases of the heart and blood vessels account for more of these deaths than any other cause.

Death from coronary disease is increased two to three times in smokers compared to nonsmokers, and the chances of dying from heart disease increases in direct proportion to how heavily a person smokes. The U.S. Surgeon General has referred to smoking as "the most important of the known modifiable risk factors for coronary heart disease in the United States."

The risk of cardiovascular disease in smokers is increased greatly when the other major risk factors, high blood pressure and high blood cholesterol, are present. For women who use oral contraceptives, smoking markedly enhances the risk of cardiovascular disease.

Approximately 4,000 substances have been identified in cigarette smoke. The contribution of each is difficult to determine. However, nicotine and carbon monoxide have been identified as the major harmful ingredients.

Nicotine, for instance, increases the heart rate and blood pressure while carbon monoxide reduces oxygen in the blood. Various substances in cigarette smoke are thought to injure the walls of

blood vessels, which allows more blood cholesterol to enter and be deposited in plaques (the waxy buildup of fats in the walls of arteries).

Unfortunately for the smoker, lower tar and nicotine cigarettes do not reduce the risk of cardiovascular disease. This is possibly because these smokers tend to inhale more deeply or smoke more frequently.

When cigarette smoking ceases, the likelihood of developing cardiovascular disease declines rapidly. Risk is reduced within one year, and after ten years the risk for cardiovascular disease is essentially that of a nonsmoker.

After a heart attack, stopping smoking reduces the risk of heart death by 20 to 50 percent. These data provide strong evidence supporting the benefits of discontinuing cigarette smoking.

In the 17 years between 1966 and 1983, the percentage of American adults who smoke has declined from 43% to 32%; this very likely has contributed to the decline in the cardiovascular death rate during the same time.

Patients who wish to stop smoking should ask for counseling, support, and guidance from their physician. Many health professionals have programs and/or literature available to encourage individuals, especially children and teenagers, not to start smoking.

In addition to the danger of heart disease, cigarette smoking can also lead to a variety of other diseases, including cancer, emphysema, chronic bronchitis and other lung diseases. Smoking can also interfere with the effectiveness and/or metabolism of certain drugs.

**Rockwell's legacy: Letting us remember beginnings**

One of the pleasures of added years is the opportunity it affords to look back at beginnings. "Do you remember . . . is a question that frequently comes up when members of the older set get together to talk over old times and share memories of their younger days.

The answers are often interesting. Past generations saw more beginnings and changes than those in this electronic age are likely to experience. What we now have are largely refinements and extensions of what was innovative and original back then.

Telephones and planes were first-time experiences to earlier generations. We've come a long way from those early models. We now have more choices . . . enough to make almost any purchase a confusing experience.

Those who enjoy going back in time and those who wonder how it was before the space age took over are likely to count among their favorite American artists one who immortalized the America of his time with his Saturday Evening Post covers and his illustrations in ads for new products.

From 1914 to 1987, Norman Rockwell captured the fancy of the American public with his paintings reproduced for both magazines and advertisers. He became known for his ability to bring to life an America that is remembered as a gentler time.

It was Horace Lorimer, the editor of the Saturday Evening Post, who first introduced Rockwell to the advertising world. Rockwell intended to devote himself to fine arts and magazine illustrations. But in 1914, he did a pen and ink drawing for Heinz Baked Beans which appeared in the "Boy Scout Hike Book."

In 1919, Rockwell's first full-color ad for Piso's Cough Syrup and Overland Automobile appeared. In the years that followed, countless companies sought his services.

The earlier work was done in either sepia or black and white. Most of the later ads were beautifully detailed oil paintings.

Many of those ads were treasured and placed in archives. The largest collection belongs to the Massachusetts Mutual Life Insurance Company of Springfield, Mass., which commissioned him to do sketches for its American Family Series.

the collars and, with an arrangement of strings, invented the first detachable collars. The housewives of Troy, N.Y., followed suit, which gave Ebenezer Brown the idea of mass-producing these work-savers.

They later would be known as "Arrow" collars. Shortly after, a small plant began manufacturing men's collars and soon a new fashion was sweeping the country. Following several mergers, the trademark "Arrow" became a household name.

In 1934, Anheuser-Busch commissioned "The King of Illustrators" — Rockwell — to paint an advertisement. "When Gentlemen Agree" appeared in many national and local publications. The original painting now hangs in the Missouri Historical Society in St. Louis.

In 1938, Green Giant, now a subsidiary of the Pillsbury Corp., commissioned Rockwell to prepare several paintings for its advertising campaign. They appeared in major publications and readers could order prints of the paintings.

Corn on the cob was the subject of all three paintings for Green Giant. One of them showed a boy wearing suspenders and leaning on a table with a checkered tablecloth and a mother standing by with a platter of steaming corn on the cob.

Rockwell's own zest and sense of poignancy came through in his work. So did the honesty, sincerity and truth with which he portrayed each subject. The fact that the painting was to be used commercially made no difference. He never gave less than his best and never changed his focus, always projecting an old-fashioned goodness in his choice of subjects.

**Prime Time**

Taken altogether, Rockwell's paintings for various companies provide a fabulous journey through Americana.

For those who might enjoy a look at Rockwell's world, Dr. Donald R. Stolz, Marshall Stolz and William F. Earles — all collectors, exhibitors and chroniclers of Rockwell's life and work — have compiled over 200 Rockwell illustrations in a book.

"The Advertising World of Norman Rockwell," (Harrison House, N.Y.) is a coffee table book that allows for full page reproduction in color of the paintings done for the company represented. On the page opposite the artwork is a profile of the company's beginnings and growth of its products, some of which came on the market years ago, and which are still being produced.

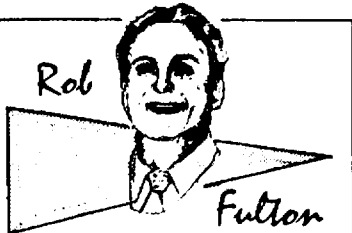

For years now the South wrestling program has been considered the Eastside's patsy. Wrestling is a sport that separates the men from the boys, and the wimps from the muscle men.

In a wrestling meet last week, the South Blue Devils were again used as mops on the mat. Despite their continued efforts to earn a win, they struggle year after year and never get out of the doghouse. Many opponents face South and go through the motions. Often times the opposition can look one or two meets down the road while wrestling the hapless Blue Devils.

Carr has been under self-imposed pressure. He doesn't enjoy losing and neither does his team. He's considered retiring from the program, but when you're dedicated to something, you can't divorce it.

On the mats, many of these kids weren't born to wrestle, but they work hard to become respected. They support teammates win, lose, or draw. Many times the embarrassment is magnified by getting pinned, but week after week the team shows up to compete and win at all costs.

Wrestling is a gutsy sport. A sport that thrives on mental toughness as well as physical demands. It becomes burdensome and often times boring. Despite all the negative connotations that go with a losing program, I believe the South kids are winners in their own right. They don't like getting twisted like a pretzel any more than the next guy, but you never see them back down from a challenge.

Carr likes to schedule more away meets, because of the lack of attendance at home meets. A poor reputation perpetuates small crowds, but the Blue Devils wrestle to salvage the pride many think they lack.

Wrestlers, just like others, enjoy bragging about accomplishments. The South wrestlers haven't been able to do that, but they can enjoy the accomplishment of true sportsmanship by striving to win.

Winning isn't everything. True, but true. It's obvious for South's wrestling team that winning is nothing, but showing up and competing says more about a struggling team than a winning record could ever show.

It's not fun to lose, but it's fun to be a part of a team that may have more heart than a championship team.

## North worthy of 5-1 win over Devils

While most superstars celebrate a big win with a trip to Disney World, North's hockey forward Bob Beltz won't be aboard that departing flight.

Instead, Beltz, who scored two goals and drew an assist in the Norsemen's 5-1 win over the South Blue Devils Jan. 12, will be counting sheep.

"I'm not going to sleep for a week," he said. "After games like this you are so wound up that it's hard to settle down."

The Norsemen were wound up from the start as they scored twice in the first two periods and once in the final period to seal their sixth win against three defeats and a tie. South's Pat Clavet was the only player to beat North netminder Matt Krieg, who turned aside 19 shots.

Beltz, who played in his first North/South game as a sophomore last year, believes the Norsemen have gained more respect.

"I think the win says a lot about us," said the 5-foot, 6-inch junior.

"South was the first school to come into Grosse Pointe and ever since (1968 when North was built) we've come in they've tried to make us look like the new kids on the block.

"We're not new anymore," Beltz continued. "We've now made our place in Grosse Pointe."

It also helps to beat the Blue Devils four consecutive times,

including two a season ago and one in 1987.

"It sure doesn't hurt," Beltz chuckled.

North scooted into the locker room at the end of the first period with a 2-0 lead on goals by Beltz and Tim Ryan. Coach Mike Manzella, however, wasn't calling it a night just yet.

"Funnier things have happened in previous South games," he said. "And nobody was going to let up. We knew South could come back at any time, we just wanted to prevent that from happening."

They did, but Clavet's goal early in the second period surely put the scare in Manzella.

"We were having trouble clearing the puck out of our own zone," he said. "When they scored that goal, it was too close. I just told the kids to get back to our game."

Penalty killing isn't the Norsemen game, but they found themselves strapped by the referee's whistle.

"We took six penalties in that period," Manzella said. "We knew we could out-man them physically, but we still feel a lot of those calls were unfair."

Despite playing short-handed most of the way, North killed the penalties. But the cause was aided by an inept South attack.

"Lack of execution," said Devils' coach Tim Zimmerman. "We didn't get time to set up the power play because we didn't do the things we've done in the past."

According to Zimmerman, his team's (5-7-1) inadequacies determined the outcome.

"Our weaknesses came to light," he said. "We are small, can't handle the puck and have no offensive punch. It's that simple. That was the game in a nut shell."

Two of the many penalties called during the second period were match penalties, forcing both teams to play four-on-four. Manzella believes the Norsemen held the advantage.

"If you give us a four-on-four situation, I think we're more talented and we're going to put the puck in the net," he said.

Thirty-six seconds apart, Beltz and John Ferguson buried the puck behind South goalie Kevin Nesler, who kicked away 26 of 31 shots.

"We knew we would need at least two shots to score (needing a rebound) because their goaltending has been solid all year," Manzella said.

Manzella, however, felt the penalties against his team almost allowed South to venture back into the game.

"We feel the referees were allowing them to get back into it," he said. "That's exactly what we felt."

As for Zimmerman, his game plan was stolen when the Norsemen's forechecking and size created some intimidation.

"Before the game I thought we would need strong goaltending and composure in order to stand a chance," Zimmerman said. "We didn't have either."

"We were intimidated. We would get the puck and then throw it away. We didn't have the people who wanted to pay the price for making a pass, especially in our zone."

At the start of third period, South trailed 4-1 and failed — again — to capitalize on some opportunities. An unofficial sixth attacker — the ice surface was loaded with excessive water — tried to assist the Devils and it almost worked.

"Thank God the ice was bad," Zimmerman said. "That's the only time we kept the puck in their zone."

The water applied from the Zamboni between periods didn't freeze in time and the puck continually stuck — literally — to the surface. Both coaches agreed, as did many fans, that "that's the funniest thing I've ever seen."

Tony Giumetti slammed the door on the Blue Devils at the 8:54 mark of the third period with

North's final goal, assisted by Beltz. Pete Mourad and Giumetti also added assists.

"The kids needed a positive game," said Manzella. "The last time we played (Dec. 22-23) we didn't play that well. I'm not happy with the lines and I'm not happy with the movement of the puck. I guess I'm looking for perfection and I think we're about a month away."

That would be just in time for the regionals on Feb. 27.

"Right now we're ranked No. 9 in Class A and I don't know if we should be or not," Manzella said. "Eventually I'd like to be No. 5, but we have to move up gradually."

Manzella, who has always downplayed games against South by contesting "it's just another game," admitted it was nice to see the seniors win at least one more time.

"The three seniors on this team have lost only once to South," he said. "That's satisfying for them, I'm sure."

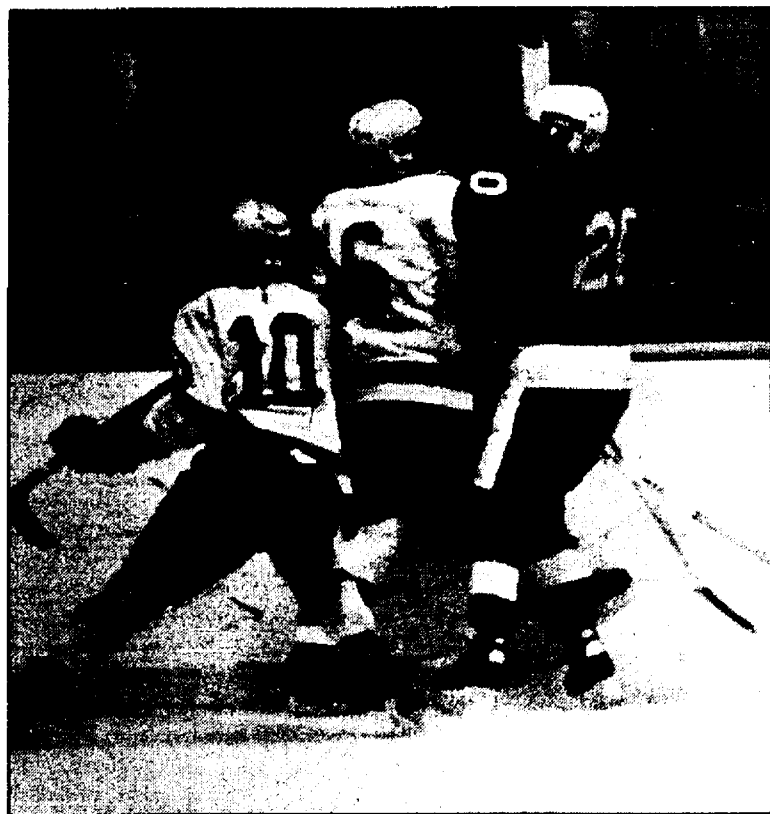

# Norsemen wrestlers manhandle struggling Devils

North's boys' wrestling team isn't as strong as it appeared to be in a 52-24 win over South last week. It is, however, much better off than the ailing Blue Devils' squad.

In the first meeting of the year between the rivals, the Norsemen led the assault with seven falls (pins) in 10 matches. South picked up 18 of its points when North failed to field a wrestler in three weight classes.

"We've been down by at least 12 points in every meet this

year," said North coach Art Roberts. "We haven't had a 171- or 189-pounder all year and when we faced South, we didn't have our heavyweight."

As it turned out, the Norsemen didn't need to fill the voids. After North's Bryan Fleming beat Lou Preston (103) to start the match, the Norsemen recorded five consecutive falls by Reid O'Brien (112), Keith Gianico (119), Ade Alli (125), Joe Ament (130) and Chris Irving (135). Dan Collins (145) and Neil Stellingwerf (160) were the other winners by fall.

Roberts admitted that his team wasn't as good as the score showed, but did compliment the ambitious grapplers.

"We're nowhere near where I'd like to be," he said. "But the reason we had so many falls is because those kids went after them."

Brion Czaiczynski (152), the only winner for the Devils, went out and earned a pin by turning back North's Brian Jendretska.

"This team has a lot of good things going for it this year," said South coach Larry Carr. "The enthusiasm is good and the kids work hard. Brion is one of them. He's a non-stop kid who goes after people."

Czaiczynski leads the Devils with six victories.

South, which has been a doormat for teams over the years, has only one win in six dual meets. Over the past three years, Carr has averaged only one win a season. This year, however, he's not too concerned about the statistics.

"We are working on getting some moves down and just enjoying the season," Carr said. "It's hard for these kids, but I really think we're having fun. We've got the numbers (kids) who want to work."

Roberts, 7-4 in his first year at North, is facing a different dilemma and co-captain John Shefferly, who was voted the "Outstanding Wrestler" at the Macomb Invitational, conveyed Roberts' feelings.

"Right now, I think we're a mediocre team," said Shefferly, who won his match at 140 pounds, said. "We don't have any depth, but we have quality. We've got some young guys we're working on and they are starting to respond."

Carr agrees.

"They're a much better team," he said in comparison to South. "His (Roberts) numbers (total kids) are down, but what he has is a lot of talent."

According to Roberts, wins haven't come easily for his team, either.

"We've been winning little by little and right now we'll try and build on that," he said. "My biggest task right now is to get the

younger kids' heads in the right direction."

Carr has conceded that his team will need several more building years in order to compete with teams of North's caliber.

"In years past we had a lot of meets in December and our kids were 0-10," he said. "That's not what it's all about."

"We haven't wrestled much this year and I think it's paying off," Carr said. "The kids are

young and are gradually getting their feet wet instead of jumping into all of it."

"It's a new approach for us."

Roberts also contends that his team is a few years away from championship recognition.

"We're one, maybe two years away," he said. "We're young, but we've got the good fortune of getting those young kids some wrestling time. We can only build on that."

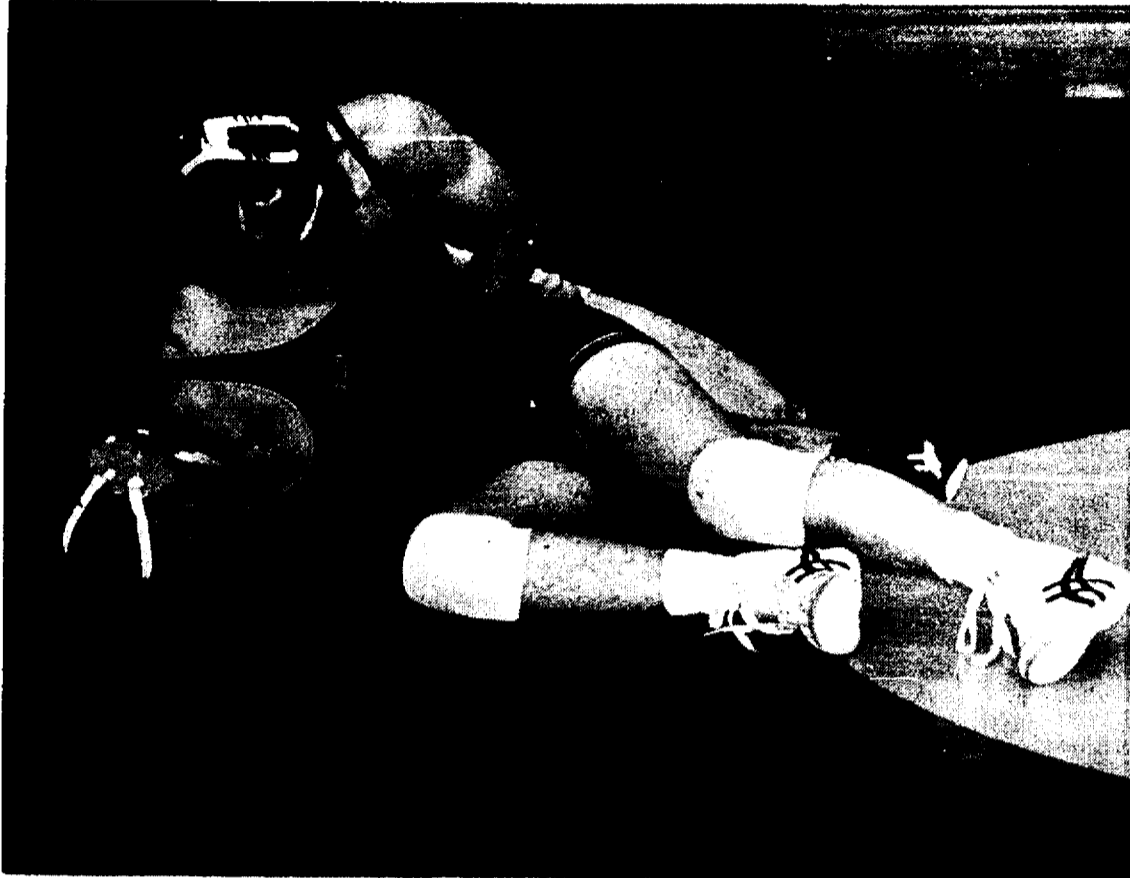

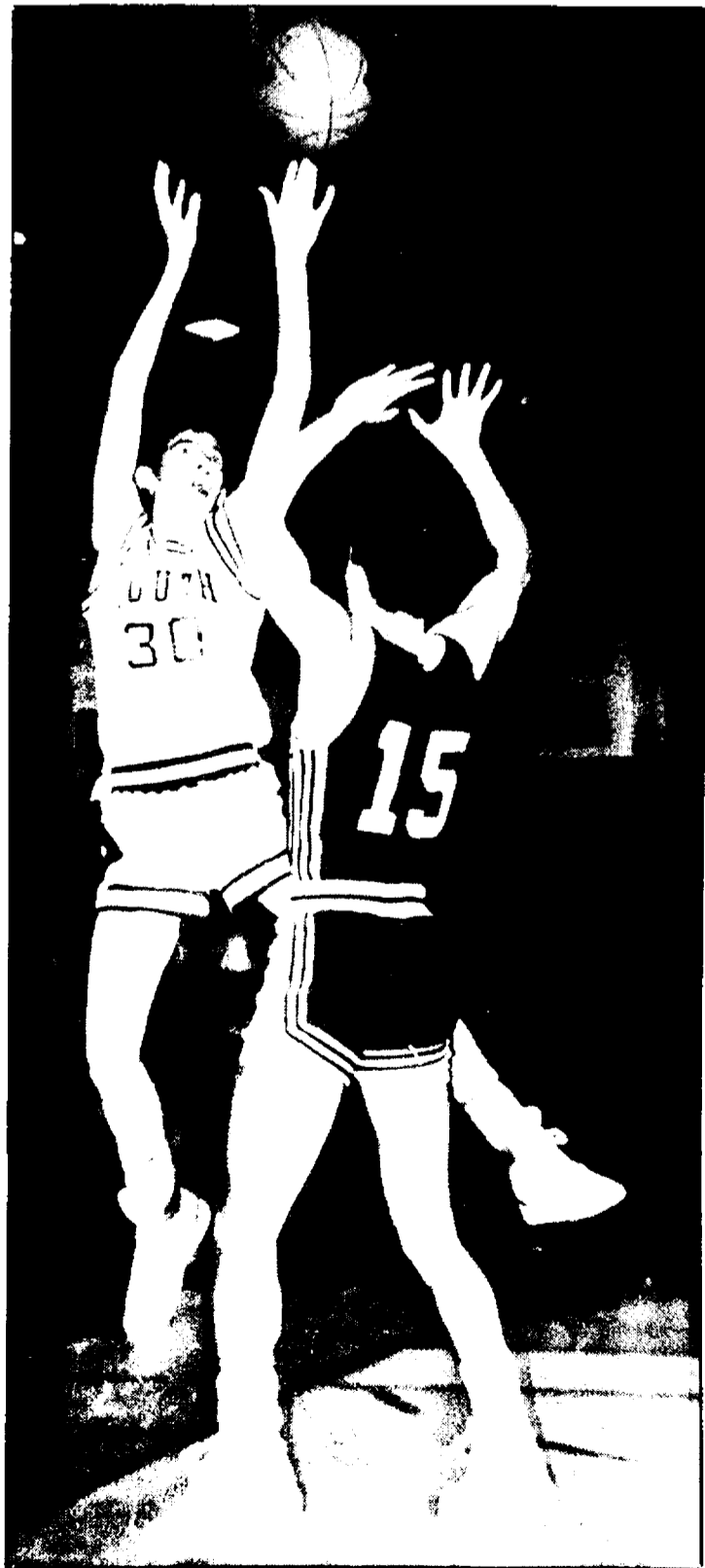

South's Chris Gramling (30) lets his shot fly.

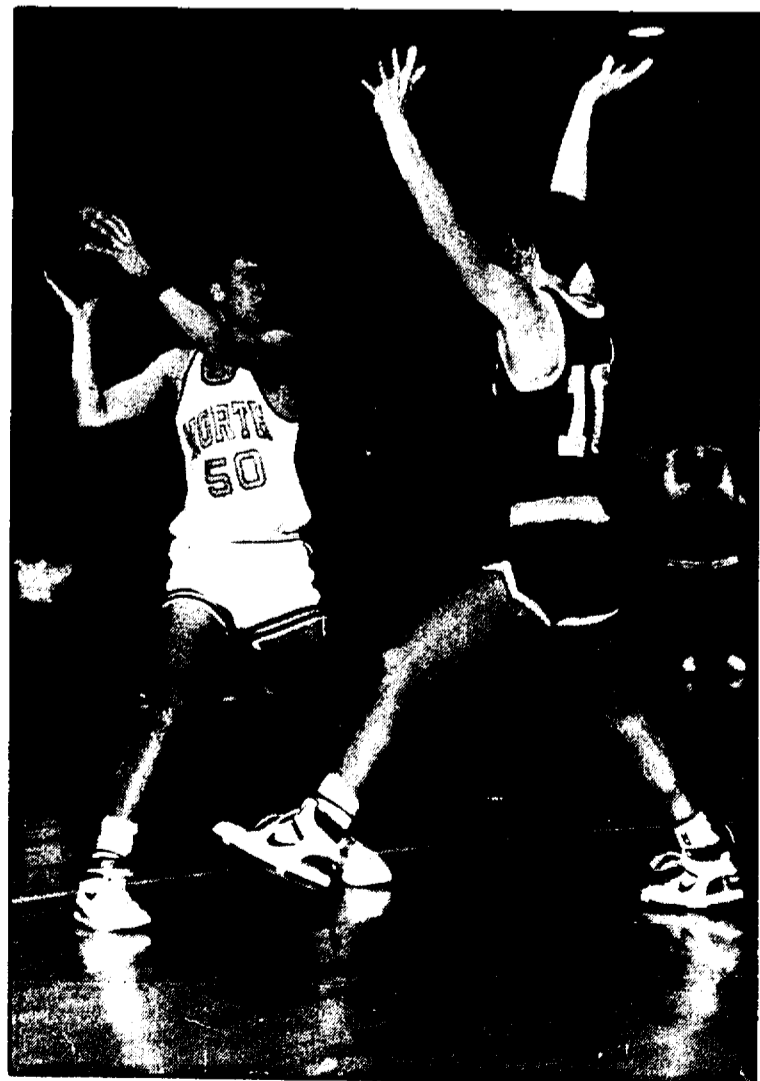

## Glenn Close shines in the wickedly funny 'Dangerous Liaisons'

The Marquise de Merteuil and the Vicomte de Valmont are nasty, nasty people.

These two vile characters, upon whom the wickedly funny film "Dangerous Liaisons" centers, are former lovers and kindred spirits. Rich beyond belief, and bored beyond all reason, they have turned their supreme intellect to games.

The gameboard, however, is the hearts and minds of innocents, and much like the childhood cardgame "War," this one has no end, and certainly no winners.

Set against the backdrop of pre-revolutionary France, "Dangerous Liaisons" chronicles the war of sexual one-upmanship between the controlled Marquise (Glenn Close) and the passionate Valmont (John Malkovich).

Like most wars, this one begins with a small, almost innocent incident. The Marquise, spurned by her latest lover, Bastide, for a virgin bride, enlists Cecile, thereby getting revenge on Bastide.

But Valmont is a man of principles. He has a reputation to uphold and seducing a virgin is beneath him. He has his eyes set upon the Madame de Tourvel

(Michelle Pfeiffer), a stunningly beautiful woman who believes firmly in the sanctity of her marriage vows and her religious doctrines.

To seduce a woman of such honor would be Valmont's finest hour. To watch as he destroys everything Tourvel has rooted her existence in would be the ultimate thrill, Valmont tells Merteuil, and that is what he must do.

But Merteuil is consumed with the thought of revenge on Bastide and sets her own plans in motion.

Really to tell more about the plot would take away from the impact of the movie, and wouldn't be fair to those who go to view the fun.

Fun? Yes, fun. How, you might ask, can a movie about people who have so much power and money that they find joy only in ruining the lives of others be fun?

First, credit goes to Choderlos de Laclos' 1782 novel "Les Liaisons Dangereuses" for the twisting and turning story of the fools who cannot differentiate love and sex.

Secondly, credit must be given to British playwright Christopher Hampton for adapting the novel first for the stage, then for the film. The language is fresh, not stilted like many period dramas tend to be. And the double

entendres are as wise and witty as anything on screen today.

Then credit must be given to director Stephen Frears, whose previous films like "My Beautiful Laundrette," have made him a star on the rise, albeit a hidden star. This film should change that.

But ultimately credit must be given to the actors, especially Close and Malkovich, who bring the characters to life, warts and all.

Close, who stunned audiences last year with her portrayal of a woman over the edge in last year's "Fatal Attraction," and Malkovich who has consistently turned in layered performances, including his Oscar-nominated role as the blind boarder in "Places in the Heart," are two of the screen's most impressive actors.

Nothing is spared in the characterizations, and even though they're evil, you find yourself rooting for them because they're having so much fun. But by the time you realize the game has changed because emotions have been introduced, and that no one is in control any longer, there is nothing to hope for but the downfall of Merteuil and Valmont.

Pfeiffer, about the only actress present who has not had classical stage training, is also notable as the purely good woman who becomes the spoils of this war between the sexes.

Like most wars, the two sides are fighting for philosophies which aren't necessarily that different. Like most wars, the end justifies all means. And like in most wars, it is the innocent who are most affected.

Like in most wars, there is no clear winner, there are no her-

oes, and there are no prisoners. Those who survive are forever changed, and those who don't are forever mourned.

It is interesting to note that Oscar-winning director Milos Forman ("One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest," "Amadeus") is busy filming a version of this story. His movie, titled "Valmont," is expected out later this year. It would be hard to top the impact of "Dangerous Liaisons," and the work of these three fine actors.

## 'Tequila Sunrise' has suspense, drama, romance

"Tequila Sunrise" is a highly stylized film featuring characters, location and dialogue integral to a high-powered absorbing story. All of these elements combine to create a harmonious whole.

It is basically a genre film that involves drug running, cops and a beautiful woman caught between two former high school buddies, one a top-level drug dealer, the other a narcotics cop. Involved in this romantic triangle is Dale McKussic (Mel Gibson), a former cocaine importer trying to get out of the racket and into a legitimate business, and Nick Frescia (Kurt Russell), a narcotics detective whose associates are convinced that McKussic is still dealing. Both of the men fall in love with Jo Ann

Valenari (Michelle Pfeiffer), the stunning, self-contained owner of an elegant restaurant.

McKussic is having a difficult time trying to go straight. There are too many people interested in his staying in the game — his ex-wife for the money, his customers, his dealers and his old

friend Carlos (Raoul Julie), a Mexican supplier who needs McKussic to help distribute a big shipment he is bringing to town. Because McKussic eats dinner every night in Jo Ann's restaurant, the police are convinced that he is dealing from there. They set up an elaborate wiretap

system that gets such innocuous messages as "I'll be late for my reservation, please hold the table."

The suspicion causes Frescia to pay a visit to check it out. The thought that McKussic goes there because of a romantic interest in Jo Ann never occurs to him; and his assignment becomes complicated by his own interest in her.

There is a relationship between McKussic and Frescia, who desperately wants to believe that McKussic is going straight, but there are too many indications that he is still involved.

"Tequila Sunrise" is a story replete with clever turns and surprises, all of them based on characters who are never what they seem. Minor characters become important because of the crucial part they play in the

story and important characters give surprise with the role they play.

With all of its complexity, however, it is the three main characters who make "Tequila Sunrise" a compelling film.

Michelle Pfeiffer exudes a sexual magnetism that is irresistible while maintaining a sophisticated poise. Russell, in his most mature role to date, and Gibson, who is right on target in his role, emerge as stars.

All of the suspense, drama and romantic interludes are highlighted with scenes featuring California sunsets and pounding surf.

"Tequila Sunrise" is not a film that can be watched casually. It has a depth and complexity that require careful attention. It is directed by Robert Towne, who directed "Chinatown."
