

# Community leaders tackle teen alcohol issue

Teenage drinking parties have a long tradition in the Grosse Pointe community. As traditional, perhaps, as homecoming? Signing yearbooks? Prom corsages? Detention for tardiness? Passing notes in class? "Drinking parties are the center of teenage social activities," said Tom Gauerke, Grosse Pointe North High School's administrative assistant for athletics. "Often these parties are to the exclusion of school-sponsored dances and sporting events."

More than three dozen community leaders gathered at 7:30 a.m., Wednesday, March 22, in Grosse Pointe South's Cleminson Hall, to brainstorm about how solve Grosse Pointe's increasing problem of teenage alcohol use.

Included in the group were a majority of the key people in the community who deal with young people: municipal judges, public safety directors, youth officers, counselors, SAC<sup>2</sup> representatives, school team representatives, Mothers' and Dads' club presidents, directors of the Neighborhood Club and the Grosse Pointe War Memorial, the superintendent of schools, the president of the school board, assistant principals of South and North, and South's student class leaders.

A similar meeting took place at North on March 8.

Middle schools will get a chance to voice their concerns and brainstorm about solution on Tuesday, April 4, at 7:30 a.m. at

Parcells Middle School.

"After these brainstorming sessions, we hope to form a task force with subcommittees to study different aspects of the problem," said Grosse Pointe Woods Youth Officer Daniel Koerber, who served as a moderator at the March 22 meeting.

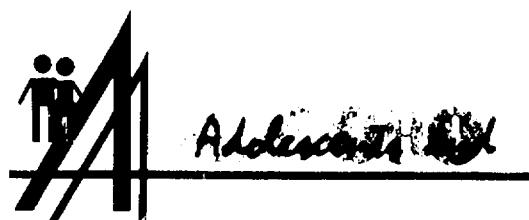
"We need to unify," he said. "We need to send one consistent message. We need to get together and become a proactive community, instead of a reactive community on this issue."

Many of the comments by individuals at Wednesday's meeting reiterated the idea that alcohol use — and abuse — is not an isolated Grosse Pointe teen phenomenon.

"We can't solve society's problems," Koerber said. "But we can focus on teenagers by unifying and sending a message that there consequences for this behavior."

"We've got to change attitudes," said Keith Wolter, president of South's senior class. If police crack down on house parties — kids will go to hotels. If they crack down on hotel parties — they'll find another place. "Kids can meet anywhere to drink. It's impossible."

## Expansion Pointes safe from east-west runway at City Airport

Expansion of Detroit City Airport, which has been steeped in controversy, will not include an east-west runway, according to plans released at a meeting last week.

Expansion plans would include an 8,600-foot runway to be chosen from among five possibilities none of which would increase air traffic — and the noise that accompanies it — over the Pointes and other east side cities.

An east-west runway was eliminated from the pool of possibilities primarily because it would have interfered with traffic from Detroit Metropolitan Airport, and because of site constraints at the ends, according to the plans.

"That's the good news," said Art Williams, co-chair of the Grosse Pointe-Harper Woods Detroit Airport Study Committee. "The thing we were most concerned about — an east-west runway — has been eliminated."

"But the bad news is that they want to operate the airport unconstrained, and we don't feel it's safe enough for that."

Operating the airport unconstrained would mean larger airplanes and more of them would be able to utilize City Airport. A constrained airport limits size and types of planes and load weights, according to Williams.

Now that part of the airport study group's fears have

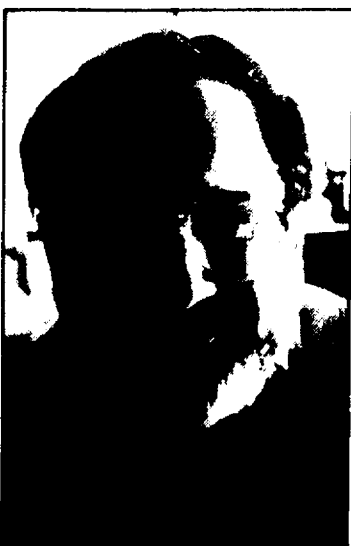
## Pointer of Interest Harvey Ovshinsky

Even though Harvey Ovshinsky is happy to have moved to Grosse Pointe a few months ago, it still took him a trilogy of articles and hundreds of words to discover how he felt about it.

Ovshinsky, 40, moved to Grosse Pointe City about 13 weeks ago after living all of his life in Detroit and the past 25 years in Lafayette Park. He said he had no doubt about moving to the "suburbs," he just didn't know how he felt about leaving his lifelong home — downtown.

"I wrote to discover how I felt about it," said Ovshinsky, who wrote three articles in a local Sunday magazine describing his brave new adventure to suburbia. Ovshinsky is an independent

writer/producer of films for the screen and television. His works have regularly appeared on public broadcasting and network programming.

He said he has been familiar with the Grosse Pointes all his life. His two children — Noah, a fourth-grader, and Natasha, an eighth-grader — have been attending Grosse Pointe Academy. His wife, Catherine Kurek-Ovshinsky, is a nurse at Detroit Receiving Hospital.

While he says Lafayette Park was and still is a "jewel," he is nonetheless glad he made the move to Grosse Pointe.

"I'm as happy here in Grosse Pointe as I was in Detroit," he said. "I'm looking forward to the adventure."

Ovshinsky said he just got

tired of the worries associated with living downtown. He said one is constantly aware of one's environment in Detroit. For example, he said he always worried about his children when they were out playing.

"I love the parks, the school, the people, the water," he said of the Pointes. "You don't have to worry so much about your environment here."

While discussing the differences between Detroit and the Pointes, Ovshinsky said, too many people tend to make generalizations concerning both communities.

"I don't believe in stereotypes," he said. "I believe that if you scratch the surface of any-

## Woods house raided in drug investigation

Two Grosse Pointe Woods men may be charged with narcotics violations resulting from a Macomb County drug investigation which led to a raid of a home in Grosse Pointe Woods last week.

The raid of the Woods home in the 1500 block of Blairmoor March 23 at 9:18 p.m. resulted from an earlier arrest in the Eight Mile-Harper area in St. Clair Shores by St. Clair Shores police and members of the County of Macomb Enforcement Team, known as COMET.

Sgt. Bill Nowicki of COMET said the St. Clair Shores arrest resulted from a month-long investigation by the multi-jurisdiction task force. He said the arrest in St. Clair Shores provided information leading to the raid of the Grosse Pointe Woods

home, which was conducted with the assistance of Grosse Pointe Woods and Harper Woods police.

The investigation and raid resulted in the arrest of two Woods men, ages 21 and 31. Nowicki said the men were arrested and released following the raids. He said warrants for their arrests would most likely be issued this week and the men will be charged with narcotics law violations.

Nowicki said he could not release the names of the suspects until they have been charged and arraigned.

During the raid on the Woods home, police found 4 ounces of suspected cocaine, a scale, an AR-15 semi-automatic weapon, brass knuckles and a shotgun.

If charged, the Grosse Pointe men will be tried in Macomb County Circuit Court.

body or any community, you find something different. Finding it, that's the trick."

Ovshinsky has been an independent writer/producer for about three years. Before striking out on his own, he worked for the local PBS station, WTVS. He has also done some work for the three local network stations, and he currently has some ideas being negotiated with Hollywood filmmakers.

Some of his film work includes "Santa Claus is Alive and Well and Living in Detroit," a feature about the official Santa in the Thanksgiving Day Parade; and "First Hurrah," a story about two lifelong friends who run for class president against each other at the University of Detroit.

When asked which of his films he liked the best, he said the choice would be impossible. He said they are all a part of himself — like his children.

Another reason for not being able to make a choice might be because most of them have similar themes, he said.

All his stories have to do with people and what they must do to get along.

They're about communicating, about people rising above their differences and their attitudes in order to get along. After all, drama is conflict and tension, he said.

"You can't be a member of a family, community, or this planet without conflict," Ovshinsky said. "We generally all have the same story, the same feelings and struggles, but the plot is different."

He said writing doesn't come easily for him. In fact, he calls his third-floor home office "the dungeon."

"They're all really tough to do," he said of his work. "I'm not one of those writers who bleed easily."

Even after all his years of successful writing and producing, Ovshinsky said he still has to put in the hours. He constantly writes, rewrites and rewrites again. "I'd be embarrassed to have anybody read my first draft," he said. He said his

scripts usually take three or four drafts, at least.

Ovshinsky teaches screenplay writing at Cranbrook. In fact, he has a seminar planned at Cranbrook for April 15-16, and for anyone who ever thought he had a script inside them just aching to be told to attend. (The cost is \$150, and information can be obtained by calling 645-3635.)

He said homemakers, lawyers and people from all callings in between, attend his writing seminars. Most people believe they have a story to tell and they just want help in getting started, but that's the easy part.

"They don't know where to begin, where to start," he said. "Anyone can start; it's the finishing (that's tough)."

Ovshinsky is capable in all the media and is respected throughout Detroit. He said he has been interested in all forms of communications all his life. Once he started a club just so that he could put out a newsletter, and he published a literary journal while in high school.

While taking journalism

classes at Wayne State University in the 1960s he worked on one of the many underground newspapers popular at the time.

"I'm a child of the '60s," he said. "It was a wonderful experience while it lasted."

While the radical '60s have long since been replaced by the "me" '70s and the conservative '80s, Ovshinsky still has a penchant for telling things the way they are. His medium is no longer an underground tabloid but rather the form of a documentary on film.

"I like telling the truth whenever possible," he said. "I don't pull any punches. I aim for the heart, but I also aim for the gut."

While you can take the writer out of the city, you can't take the city out of the writer. Ovshinsky said he considers himself a dual citizen of Detroit and the Pointes.

While many writers suffer for a lack of ideas, Ovshinsky said he is bombarded by them and doesn't have enough time in the day to work on them all.

"Basically I'm a storyteller," he said. "There's a lot of stories in this city."

While the product of the '60s has found success in the '80s, he doesn't let it go to his head.

"It's a good life," Ovshinsky said. "I'm really happy to be a part of it. Everyday I consider myself very lucky. I don't take it for granted at all."

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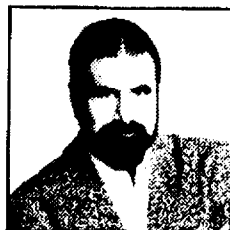
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# Park looks at recycling

It hasn't actually voted on it yet, but the Park council looks ready to get on the recycling bandwagon.

Discussion of a city recycling program at Monday's council meeting revolved more around details of a program than whether to implement one.

"There's a broad consensus for recycling," said Councilman Daniel Clark after the meeting. He spoke not only of the Park council, but of a general feeling that the time for recycling is now.

"We're delighted that the Park administration is working on such a plan, moving with deliberate speed — which is what one wants to do," said Fran Schonenberg, president of Grosse Pointe Citizens for Recycling. The group has been working with the city.

Monday was the second time the council had discussed the proposal. Still to be decided are what materials to recycle and whether to offer curbside pickup or a central collection bin.

A recycling outline has been prepared for council use. It calls for establishing some form of community education about recycling, through the schools or local newspapers; and for establishing incentives through use of funds — received from the sale of recyclable materials — for public projects like playground equip-

ment.

The outline also stresses the importance of coordinating any recycling project through the Grosse Pointes-Clinton Refuse Disposal Authority.

"This issue of coordination should be front and center," said Clark. "We should be looking to the refuse authority to provide the initial coordination. We want leadership from them and we should ask (our representative on the authority, John) Fildew to pursue that aggressively."

Councilman Vernon Ausherman also expressed interest in a coordinated approach, but he stressed cooperation from the other Grosse Pointes and Harper Woods.

"This is an opportunity for a (joint) committee so we can move forward in concert," he said.

"All the communities are tied together in the disposal authority — it's something all the Grosse Pointes should move forward together on."

Mayor Palmer Heenan focused on the issue of voluntary vs. mandatory citizen participation.

"I think we'll receive voluntary participation," he said. "It's better than forcing people to use certain receptacles."

Schonenberg agreed. "The voluntary approach is the best way to begin," she said. "By the time you're ready to make the next step, the community will be right there with you."

A number of council members said they have recently attended seminars on recycling and are following recycling efforts in other communities.

"The Ann Arbor people are pretty well along the road on this," Ausherman said. "They've found a higher participation with curbside pickup than by having people haul things to a center."

No one on the council expressed any opposition to the concept of recycling. City Manager Dale Krajniak was directed to continue his groundwork on city-operated recycling programs and to ask authority representative John Fildew to meet with the council.

"Ask Fildew if we can at least collect paper and batteries and maybe colored plastics," Heenan said.

Coordination with the incinerator authority is considered important not only because all of the communities funnel their trash there, but because the contract with the authority requires certain tonnage from the communities in order to make the incinerator cost-effective.

It is believed, however, that diverting some materials from the waste stream would result in a cleaner burn with less-toxic emissions and ash.

"I think the incinerator (people) would encourage recycling," Krajniak said.

the allocation of \$40,000 to the Downtown Development Authority so that detailed drawings and specifications may be prepared.

The architectural firm of Schervish, Vogel, Merz has been working on preliminary plans and negotiating details with Wayne County, which must approve the final plan.

"We had to work with Wayne County," said Schervish representative Kent Anderson. "It took a year and 15 or 20 drawings of curbing and turn lanes to reach a mutual agreement with their traffic engineer."

"The county has the say-so on traffic lights and turn lanes. We can't just say we want it this way."

The DDA and the planning commission have been keeping tabs on the project, but requested council approval at this point just to be sure everyone was heading in the same direction, according to City Manager Dale Krajniak. "We don't want to get it done and find that council has severe reservations," he said.

Both the architect and city officials indicated that the county is difficult to satisfy.

"The county is more amenable to the plan now," said Mayor Palmer Heenan. "They're in a mood to speak favorably, so we should move expeditiously." Once approval is granted, construction can proceed at the city's preferred pace.

At issue in the street changes was traffic flow and parking. The current plan satisfies both concerns, council members said.

"It's important because it retains Jefferson Avenue parking," Councilman Vernon Ausherman said. "Some of these little businesses couldn't survive without it."

The purpose of the project is to create a visual entrance to the city with a landscaped island and an entrance sign. "It will bring back some things that downtown has lost — like trees — and make it a town center again," said Anderson.

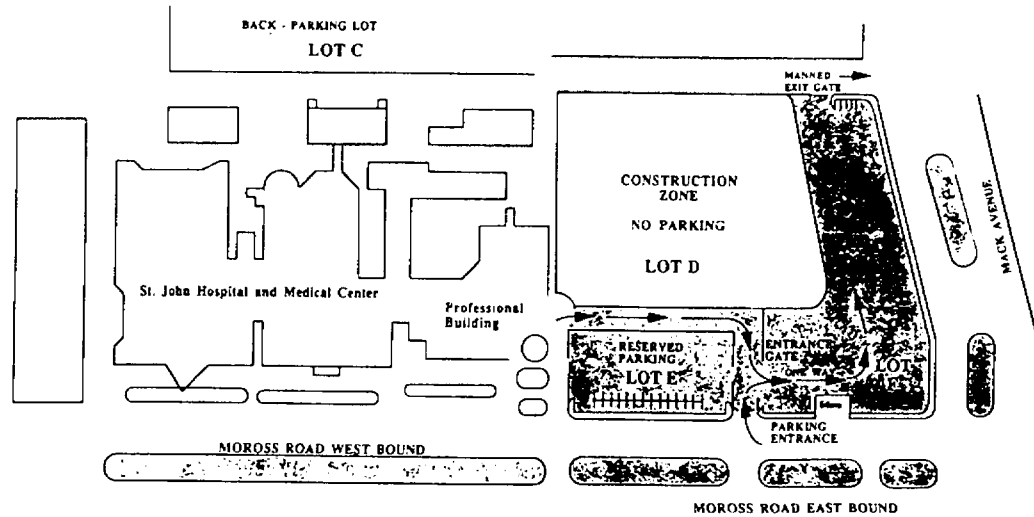
Council approval was unanimous. Specifications will now be drawn, but a construction timetable is still unclear. The island will be built from Alter to Westchester all at once — probably next year — with the streetscape (sidewalks and trees) to follow one block at a time.

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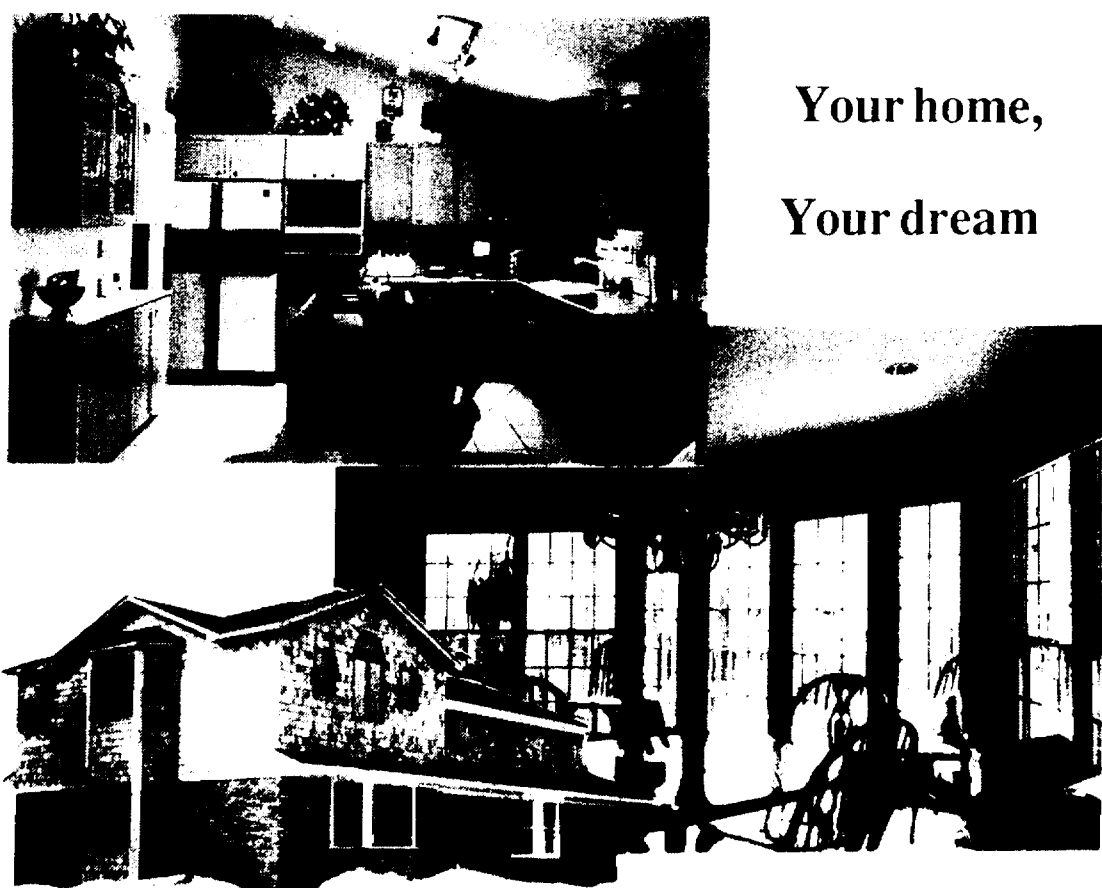

been allayed, the group will switch gears and fight for a safer airport.

"Our objective is to get them to put in a larger runway, for safety and environmental reasons, but to operate it constrained," Williams said.

With a larger runway, pilots have more leeway before being committed to a takeoff.

The report, however, states that with constraints placed upon it, the airport would be of no commercial value to air carriers other than Southwest, which currently operates out of it, a fact which Williams and the study committee dispute.

According to Federal Aviation Administration rules all planes excepting 747s would be able to use the airport with the proposed 8,600-foot runway, but Williams said he questions the safety of larger planes using the runway.

Any construction or expansion will not begin for at least a year, according to the study, because of the number of public hearings which would have to be held, and the other steps involved in the process.

Williams said the committee would like the City of Detroit to hold off any renovations until a seven-county airport study to be done by the Southeastern Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG) which would determine the air-traffic needs of a seven-county area.

The committee, with the help of co-chair Jack King and member Tom Sullivan, have presented resolutions to the five Pointes councils asking Detroit to wait. All passed the proposals unanimously.

## 3 Pointes youths detained for attempted armed robbery

Three youths from the Pointes were detained after a reported armed robbery attempt in St. Clair Shores last week when they allegedly pulled a cap gun on a paper carrier.

St. Clair Shores police said the incident is still under investigation and the youths have not been charged.

According to Woods police reports, Grosse Pointe Woods Public Safety Officer Kirk Risk was operating a radar on Marter March 23 at about 5:30 p.m. when he monitored a broadcast from St. Clair Shores police stating that three youths in a white Oldsmobile had pointed a gun out of a car at an individual at Marter and Carolina.

The license plate on the Oldsmobile was registered to a resident in the 1100 block of Hampton in Grosse Pointe Woods.

Risk then positioned his car on Marter between Roslyn and Hampton and shortly spotted the Oldsmobile traveling east on Roslyn from Marter with two of the youths inside.

Risk stopped the car and identified the passengers as two males, ages 18 and 17, both of Grosse Pointe Woods. The youths denied any knowledge of a gun-pointing incident in St.

Clair Shores. They said they did not have a gun in the car.

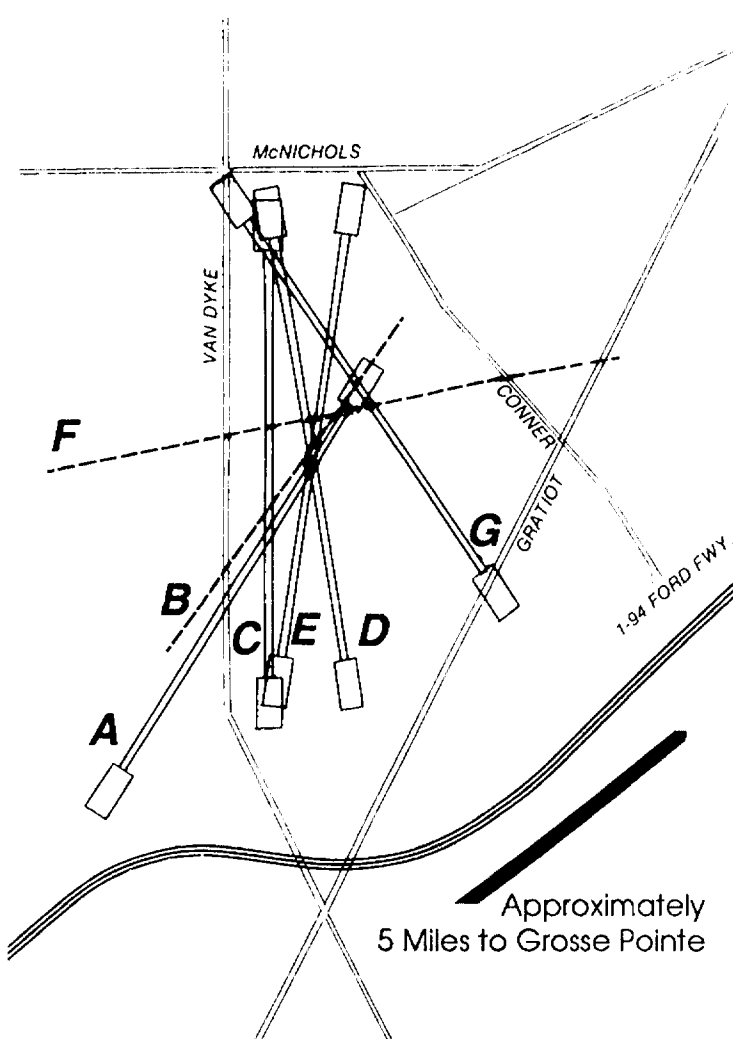
When Risk told the youths to get out of the car, he saw a cap gun in plain view in the car. He confiscated the gun and later turned it over to St. Clair Shores police.

While detaining the youths, the third boy drove by in a silver mini-van. According to St. Clair Shores instructions, Risk was to identify the youths and confiscate the gun. When the third suspect drove by, Risk released the two youths and pursued the third boy and stopped him on Marter.

The third suspect turned out to be a 16-year-old from Grosse Pointe Shores. While identifying the third youth, St. Clair Shores police advised that the incident had been upgraded to an attempted armed robbery of a paperboy and wanted the three youths brought to the St. Clair Shores station.

While detaining the Grosse Pointe Shores youth, the other two boys came by to see what was going on and Risk arrested all three of the youths.

At the Grosse Pointe Woods police station, the youths were held in separate cells. They were then transported to the St. Clair Shores police station.



This is the map of potential runways when Detroit City Airport undergoes its much-talked about expansion. Runway A runs southwest to northeast and would cross Van Dyke, causing height limitations for future buildings in the Downtown Detroit Central Business District. Alternative B was eliminated because it would require major land acquisition north and east of Connor. Alternative C lies fully within reasonable expansion boundaries of the airport, but the newly-expanded Kettering High School would lie directly under the approach path and would likely have to be relocated, as would another school in the area. Runway D goes north and south, would not cause any road re-routing, however all industry along Grinnel would have to be relocated, as would a school. Alternative E stays within the workable boundary of the airport and would not cause re-routing of any roads, but Kettering school is under the approach path to the runway. Alternative F, an east west runway which would mean air traffic over the Pointes was eliminated because it would interfere with traffic from Detroit Metro Airport. Alternative G requires the least amount of land acquisition for initial development and would not increase noise to areas not affected by it already, but would mean Gratiot Avenue would have to be re-routed and the industrial area bounded by Harper, Gratiot and the railroad would be impacted.

## Farms grants liquor license

ONE23, a restaurant scheduled to open April 8 on the Hill, was granted a Specially Designated Merchant liquor license by the Farms Council March 20. The license will enable the restaurant to sell wine and beer by the bottle for carryout, primarily in picnic baskets.

ONE23 already has a Class C liquor license for serving liquor on the premises. Owner Stanley Day purchased the license belonging to the defunct Bronze Door at the same time that he bought the Bronze Door property where the new restaurant will stand.

Only one resident complained to the council about the license because there are already three SDM licenses on the Hill: Hamlin's, Perry Drugs and Trail Apothecary.

Police Chief Robert Ferber told the council that there was no way to deny the license, as there is no ordinance regulating the number of licenses in a given area.

Councilman Emil Berg moved that the license be granted "with the suggestion and hope" that spirits would be served only in the gift and picnic baskets.

Mayor Joseph Fromm, who voted in favor, said his vote was swayed by the idea of the picnic baskets, "which will add a touch of class to the community."

Hamlin's also sells picnic baskets.

The restaurant has been under construction for seven months, following demolition of the old Bronze Door building. It will serve lunch and dinner Monday through Saturday.

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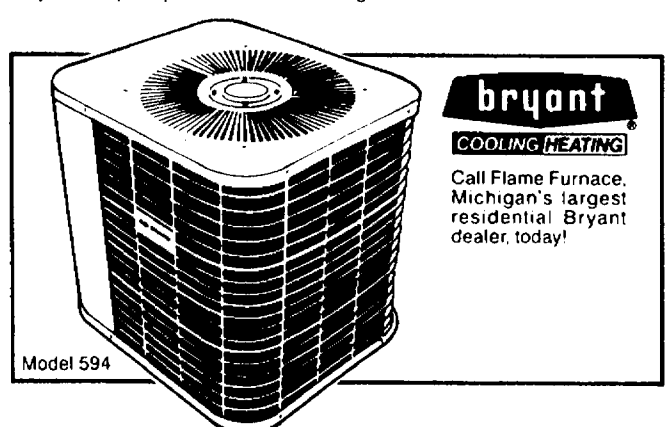
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
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
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
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# State school plan dormant but not dead

Reform of the present system of financing public education in Michigan appears to be still breathing after a meeting of legislative leaders last week but the prospects for approval this year are not very bright.

One major problem is that the issue of school financing reform lacks a leader. Gov. James Blanchard and Senate Majority Leader John Engler are dancing around the issue and around each other without taking a strong stand. Each apparently is fearful that the other will oppose whatever he endorses and make school financing a major campaign issue in 1990 when the two are expected to compete for the governorship.

Even after saying last week that he would push for an election on the school financing issue by next fall, the governor said any plan to boost the sales tax would have to be backed by business, education and labor before he would campaign for it. He repeated his preference for a one-cent sales tax increase but wouldn't rule out a two-cent hike if all major interest groups believe it would improve educational quality.

That is an example of what we would call a lack of leadership from the gover-

nor's office. But Sen. Engler isn't doing much better. He voted for the compromise plan that was defeated in the Senate but apparently didn't try very hard to get the additional GOP vote needed for approval of the plan.

Even the appointment of Edgar Harden, former Michigan State University president, as a mediator authorized to draft yet another compromise on school financing seems unlikely to bring the competing parties together.

Representatives of education, business and labor groups attended last week's legislative meeting but didn't accomplish much beyond naming Harden as a mediator. The governor was represented but did not attend personally. The state Chamber of Commerce was invited but didn't participate either. Afterward, a chamber spokesman blasted the appointment of a mediator as "a stupid idea that will only rehash months of debate."

And a Michigan Manufacturers Association officer suggested that voters be given two proposals: one to reduce property taxes by \$800 million, the other to raise \$800 million more for education. But both would

be tied to a penny increase in the sales tax rather than the two-cent boost education leaders have sought to provide the additional dollars they believe are needed.

The controversy appears to reflect the desire of educators to pump more funds into the schools through larger amounts of state aid raised by a two-cent sales tax hike and, on the other side, the demands of business groups for lower property taxes but an increase of no more than one cent in the sales tax.

A new factor was introduced into the controversy last week when a group of 107 Michigan school districts announced plans to file suit against the state, charging that the way education is currently funded is inequitable and unfair.

Their suit will be based on the disparities between rich and poor districts which have become so great in recent years that total support per pupil varies from about \$2,500 to almost \$8,000. Earlier legislative plans would have slightly narrowed that gap but were generally regarded as lacking sufficient backing to win approval in a state referendum.

For some districts, however, the problem

has become acute. Efforts to increase property taxes to support the schools have been voted down, leaving them with the necessity of cutting back student programs and services. Those reductions in turn have increased the inequality of educational opportunities being offered to students in many school districts.

Both Rep. William R. Bryant and state Sen. John Kelly, who represent the Grosse Pointes in the Legislature, voted against the most recent compromise bill. Bryant opposes any sales tax increase to help finance the schools on the grounds that such a move would also be likely to include a provision to limit the local district's ability to raise and spend its own tax dollars.

Somewhere down the road, however, either through legislation or under court order, Michigan will have to revise its present system of funding in order to increase the amount of per pupil funding in poor districts.

If we understand their aims correctly, Grosse Pointe education leaders would accept a compromise to enable the state to provide more aid to poorly financed districts but permit districts such as Grosse Pointe to continue to raise the dollars they need to maintain their excellent educational programs. Such a plan makes sense to us.

However, if those who would aid poor districts at the expense of wealthier districts get their way, they would in effect put a cap on excellence, tend to reward mediocrity and limit rather than broaden educational opportunities in districts such as ours in Grosse Pointe.

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## For Pete's sake, Waldmeir!

Woods resident Pete Waldmeir, who has won a reputation as a crusading columnist for The Detroit News, has found a new subject to attack. It's the lack of guardrails along the two-mile stretch of Lakeshore Road that runs along the edge of Lake St. Clair in Grosse Pointe Farms and Grosse Pointe Shores.

In two recent columns, Waldmeir presumed to write on behalf of the estimated 16,000 motorists who travel daily along what he regards as "that scenic but dangerous section of unprotected boulevard."

He also reported details of a suit filed against Wayne County as a result of the death of a St. Clair Shores woman who was drowned when her car apparently bounced off a small section of protective barrier into the lake back in 1985.

Working up his indignation, Waldmeir in effect accuses county, Farms and Shores officials of taking a "so what" attitude about the lack of protective railing even though he claims more than 20 motorists have ended up in Lake St. Clair in the past dozen years.

He wrote that nothing is being done because "there are too many political, social and economic heavy hitters living along that two-mile stretch from Warner to Vernier Road, folks who pay high taxes and figure the road and lake front belong to them."

Instead of a "so what" attitude, we think most Pointe residents feel sympathy for the families whose loved ones have lost their lives in lake accidents as well as those who were rescued after experiencing similar ordeals.

Yet even if we accept Waldmeir's estimate of 20 motorists going into the lake over a dozen years, that averages out to fewer than two per year. Such a total, we suggest, is not higher than the number of serious accidents occurring on other county roads, on nearby freeways, or, in fact, in boating accidents on Lake St. Clair in a comparable period.

However, we have suggested several times that a study ought to be made to find out just how many cars have gone into the lake in recent years, to learn, if possible, the causes of such accidents and to see whether installation of protective guardrails or other deterrents would materially reduce the number of cars reaching the water.

In short, we suggest it would be better to review the facts before reaching a decision about whether installation of several miles of guardrails or other protective device would improve safety on Lakeshore. However, such a study obviously will not be implemented until the pending lawsuit against the county has been settled, despite Waldmeir's flailing at the issue.

## JOA on hold once again

Once again the proposed joint operating agreement between The Detroit News and the Detroit Free Press has been put on hold. This time, however, the action was taken by The Detroit News, not the courts.

If the executives of the two papers appear to be getting slightly annoyed with each other, we suppose the reason can be found in the frustrations resulting from the many delays in the implementation of the JOA. They include the long wait for the attorney general's approval of the JOA, the flurry of court actions and the continuing appeals by the opponents, Michigan Citizens for an Independent Press.

When I want to get a teenager's attention, I do the same — but I have to remove the Walkman first.

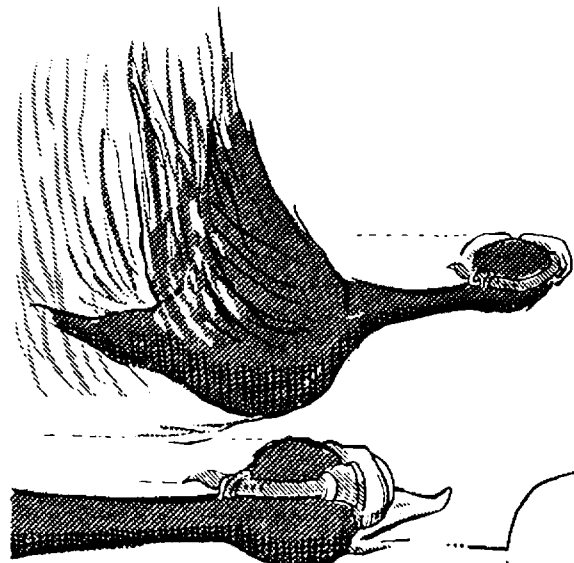
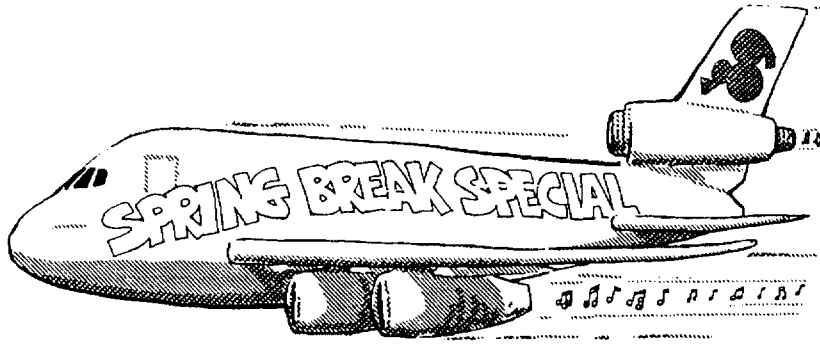

### March 31, 1966 —

The New York Times reported that President Johnson sought congressional endorsement for a \$1 billion emergency famine relief program for India and asked all other nations, no matter what their "political faiths" to match U.S. efforts.

Eight fathers were charged with trying to buy immunity from military service for their sons. It brought to 38 the num-

ber of men arrested in just more than a month in a draft evasion conspiracy. They paid from \$1,500 to \$5,000 to have a forged DD-44 form sent to the local draft boards, indicating the young men were serving satisfactorily in the armed forces reserves. Some of the young men were unaware their fathers had attempted to keep them out of Vietnam.

An airline union official said the airlines were negligent in preparing passengers and flight attendants for crash emergencies and charged that those in power sacrificed safety for profits.

Los Angeles Dodgers Sandy Kofax and Don Drysdale ended their contract holdout and accepted a contract offer making them two of the highest paid players in baseball's history. Kofax's salary, though secret, was believed to be \$120,000 a year.

Newspaper unions in New York were questioning the basis for and legality of a proposed merger of the New York Herald Tribune, the Journal American, the New York World and The Sun. They were asking U.S. courts to stop the merger.

### Concessions are needed

To the Editor:

Your newspaper gave front page space to a tax increase proponent (3/16/89). I would like to present an opposing viewpoint.

Most property owners in the Pointes have had a more than generous helping of tax increases in the past month or two when assessments suddenly went up by double-digit numbers. And this increase will only be exacerbated by more millage.

In the March 16 article, Mrs. Nutter stated that "we need an additional 2.2 mills because of contractual obligations and health care costs are up 80 percent." I assume the contractual obligations and health care costs refer to staff and teacher salaries and medical benefits. If this is the problem, why not first try to solve it before resorting to millage increase?

By any standard, employees of the Grosse Pointe school system are not underpaid. Based on days worked per school year (one of the shortest in the world, incidentally) our teachers are making between \$25 and \$30 per hour, not counting benefits.

And speaking of benefits (see "health care costs," above), how much do Grosse Pointe school system employees contribute to their medical plans? Maybe not nearly enough — if any. Now we come to the "Big C" word:

concessions.

It's being done in the best of unions these days. When was the last time our teachers' unions asked to share more benefit costs or reduce wages? Horrors, unthinkable, a pox on your house, unrealistic! But is it?

In the real world where tenure is a utopian dream and performance reviews a condition of employment, many organizations have asked for (and received) concessions from their employees so that they could continue to operate and increase efficiency. It required strong leadership and cooperative unions, but it can be done.

Academics who have never had to meet a payroll (I am allowed one cliché) do not look at cost savings in the same way that business administrators do. They don't have to. They just try to justify the need for more taxes. Throw money at it and the problem will go away.

Anyone can spend money. It is, after all, a simplistic art. Before we taxpayers are asked to dig in a little deeper, why can't the school administration sit down with their unions and ask for a little more give and a lot less take?

### Sticker shock

To the Editor:

I believe that of ongoing interest to all residents in Grosse Pointe are real estate

values in the Pointes and in their own neighborhoods.

Our current four-to-five bedroom home in the Park has served us well for the past 10 years, but we find that we need more living space to accommodate our growing family needs.

Our search began in the fall when there appeared to be "affordable," "reasonable" prices for larger homes. This looked promising.

With our eye on the interest rates and a professional market value assessment of our current house, we determined from our financial picture how much of a new mortgage we could afford. It still looked promising.

In comes spring with higher sticker prices. Sticker shock abounds! Where are these high prices coming from? Who is responsible for setting the values so high? Why are some houses on the same street, but one to three blocks apart, separated by such huge price differentials when the condition, amenities and square footage of these houses are comparable?

Ten years ago when we moved to the Pointes, the price differential between blocks was 10-25 percent, and for larger houses 30-50 percent. Now that price differential is 50-300 percent. What has happened to make the gap widen?

We got down to business and started looking at houses. We added to our cost equation: property tax, utility cost and house insurance. This is when we discovered

one of the primary hidden costs associated with financing a home — property taxes. Apparently banks don't even weigh this component heavily in qualifying home buyers for mortgages.

Two weeks ago in the Park, we received notification of an increased market assessment of 15 percent. This is in addition to the across-the-board 10 percent increase last year. That is a 25 percent increase in the past two years. This would be good if it did not have a corresponding linear effect on property taxes.

The property tax millage for the Park is \$60.77 for every \$1,000 (6.1 percent) of the State Equalized Valuation, which is about 50 percent of the market value.

In tax dollars for a home valued at \$100,000, the SEV at 50 percent is \$50,000. At a property tax rate of 6 percent, the homeowner would owe \$3,000 on this home.

Families like ours, whose taxes are relatively low because they are based on a lower market value than the current inflated one (as a result of their houses not being sold in the last 10 years), could easily face an increased tax bill of \$2,000-\$5,000 per year if they choose to buy in the Pointes today. However, these increased market assessments will eventually catch up with all homes in the Pointes and be reflected in higher tax bills.

Many families will find

that even with the current high interest rates, they can afford the mortgage, but not the taxes. Indeed, interest rates are variable and fluctuate with the economy; property taxes are locked in for eternity even when the house is paid off. In some cases, the tax bill is closing in on the mortgage payment.

Don't Pointers realize with home evaluations continually going up, property taxes are being forced up on all homes. Eventually, these tax increases and rising real estate values will price most homes beyond even upper-income families' means.

Unless one of the primary cost factors (market value, SEV multiplier, or millage) is reduced, property taxes, not interest rates, will be responsible for reducing real estate values in the Pointes.

Is it caveat emptor, or should we copy our California neighbors and revolt against these millage increases?

On April 10, vote 'no' on the millage increase.

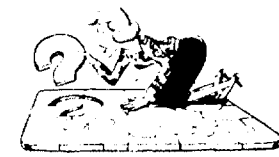
It should again be rejected out of hand by our (Grosse Pointe Farms) council at its meeting on April 17.

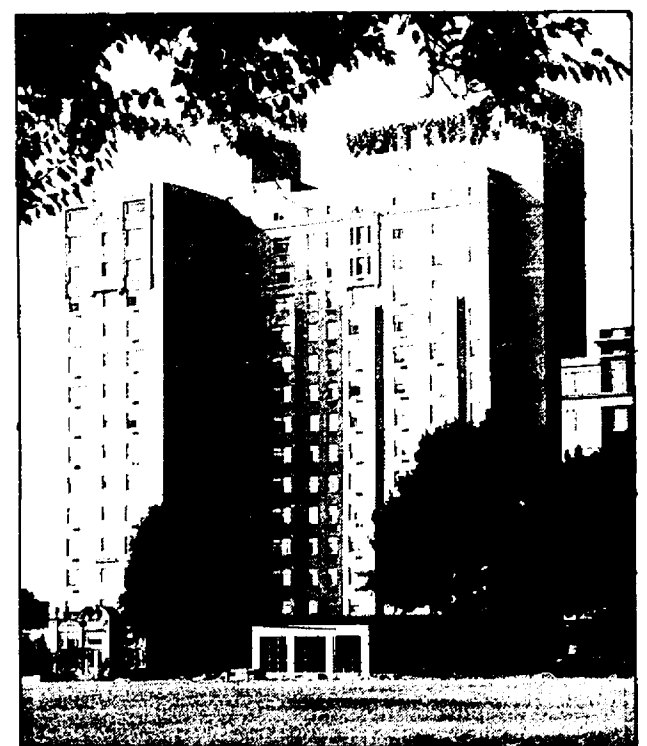

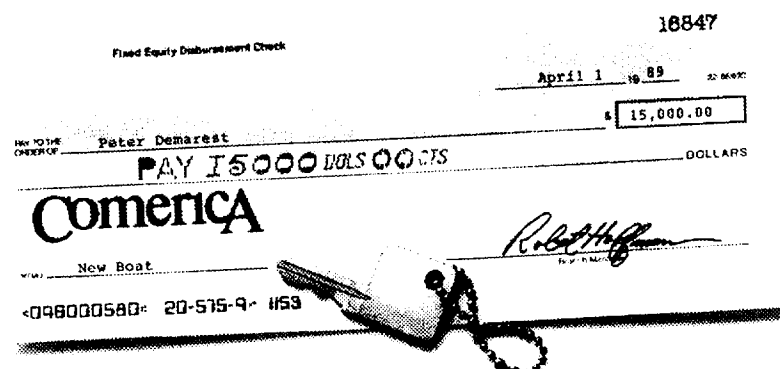

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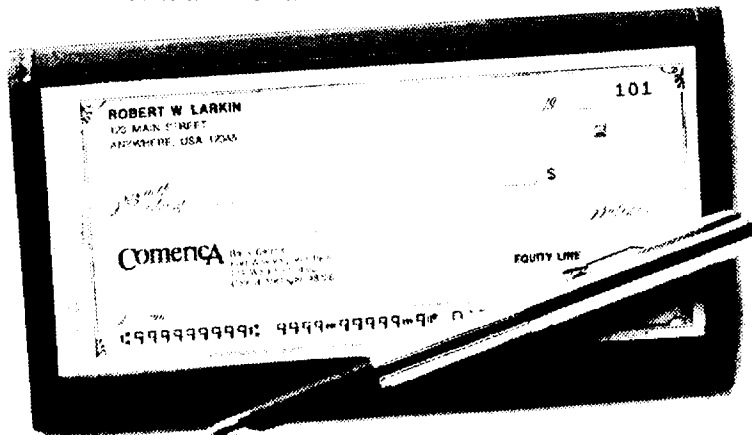
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## Four rifles stolen from Woods home

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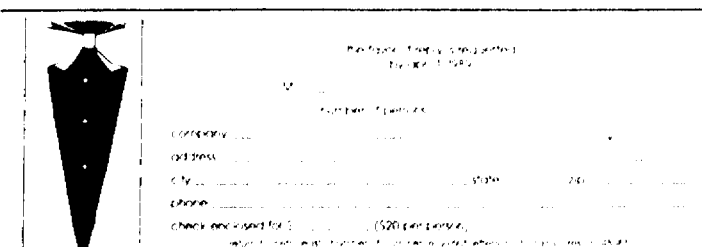

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## Woods mayor named to national committee

Grosse Pointe Woods Mayor George S. Freeman was recently appointed to a steering committee of the National League of Cities.

Freeman attended the NLC's 1989 legislative conference in Washington, D.C., where he was appointed to the Finance, Administration and Intergovernmental Relations Police Steering Committee. Freeman's appointment was announced by NLC President Terry Goddard, mayor of Phoenix, Ariz.

The FAIR Committee, chaired by Mayor Thomas V. Barnes of Gary, Ind., is one of the NLC's five standing committees that draw up policy positions on national issues affecting, or of concern to, municipal governments.

"We are very happy that Mayor Freeman will be able to take on this important NLC assignment," Goddard said. "This year will see a major effort to begin shaping a new national policy agenda under the Bush administration. Issues involving the status of tax-exempt munici-

pal bonds, local taxing authority, local fire protection, municipal personnel policy, and a number of postal service issues will be among the important matters brought before the FAIR Committee for action."

The steering committee held its first meeting March 11 during NLC's annual Congressional-

City Conference, which also produced a statement of municipal priorities on the federal budget and legislation that will affect local government.

Made up of some 35 members from cities and towns throughout the country, the steering committee will hold several more meetings over the course of the year to review major policy issues and develop recommendations for the full NLC membership to act on at NLC's annual meeting in November, the Congress of Cities, when the league adopts policy for the ensuing year.

The league, with headquarters in Washington, D.C., is the nation's oldest and largest municipal organization and has a membership of more than 1,400 cities and towns of all sizes. All of the nation's 49 state municipal associations are also members of the NLC, making the league a national representative of more than 15,000 municipal governments throughout the United States.

## Here are some spring flood protection tips:

April showers may bring more than May flowers — if you live in a community with a history of flooding.

Detroit Edison offers seven safety tips to help protect your family, your home and your electrical appliances, before, during, and after a flood.

Before flood conditions threaten your area:

- Have your electrical outlets in the basement or other areas rewired so that all outlets are placed above what you think the flood level might be. Make sure your wiring complies with local codes and the National Electric Code.

- Disconnect electric power to all basement outlets, appliances, extension cords and equipment including the furnace.

- If possible, raise all appliances above the anticipated water level.

During the time your basement is flooded:

- Never step into a flooded basement or other area if water is in contact with outlets or any electrically operated appliance that is energized, such as a washer, dryer, freezer, furnace blower motor, dehumidifier, lamps and cords. You may receive a severe shock. Not even rubber boots can guarantee your protection in this situation.

- Do not attempt to remove a fuse or turn off a circuit breaker while standing in water or on a damp floor. This should have been done before the basement was flooded. If you must have the electricity to your basement disconnected, call an electrician or Detroit Edison. Call the phone number on your monthly statement.

After the flood:

- When the water in your

basement has receded, do not attempt to operate or determine the condition of appliances or other equipment that have been submerged unless you are qualified to do so. You could be in danger of electrical shock.

- Your best safeguard is to call a qualified electrician to determine the condition of your basement's electrical wiring, an appliance repair agency to service your appliances and a furnace repairman to check and restart your furnace. These agencies are listed in the telephone directory.

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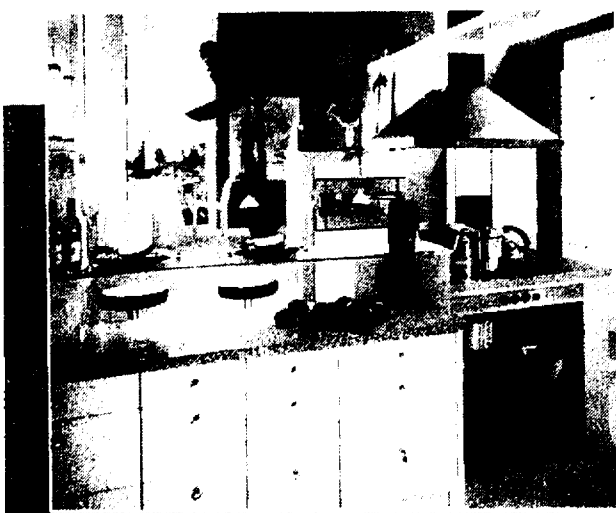

# Medical students teach children to resist lure of drugs and alcohol

Kids today are bombarded with anti-drug messages. The challenge is to find something they'll pay attention to.

Medical students at Wayne State University hope their visits to Detroit elementary schools will prove that role models can encourage children to reach for their goals.

The American Medical Student Association has been awarded a one-year contract to conduct a demonstration substance abuse project with funding from the Department of Health and Human Services. Students from eight American medical schools are participating.

*'First you love, then you hate with drugs.'*

"I had a phenomenal experience," said Janice Day of Grosse Pointe, a second-year medical student. She and nearly 80

others did a five-session visit to Cooper Renaissance Elementary School in Detroit.

"We covered the whole school with an army of medical students," said project coordinator Bessie Sandas of Roseville, also in her second year of medical school. "All of us were there at once. The teachers were happy about it."

The goal of the program is to educate children not to abuse drugs (including alcohol and medical prescriptions), but it reaches beyond that to show them why.

The children were asked to consider important aspects of American life. Love, education, power, money are issues we all have to sort out; the children wrote about them as a homework assignment.

The medical students asked the third-, fourth- and fifth-graders what they want to do when they grow up. Hands shot up, kids called out their desire to be a doctor, a nurse, a lawyer. One boy said he wants to be a stockbroker. The list went up on the blackboard, faces beaming as

their dreams were validated by being recorded.

Then, Sandas explained, the medical students tried to show how those dreams could be thwarted by drug use. One student juggled for the class to dem-

onstrate the importance of a clear head and coordinated hands.

"We wondered at first if the third-graders were too young for it," Day said, "but we soon realized they weren't."

That's because it quickly became apparent that the kids have already seen some of the ravages of drugs.

"There were quite a few kids who talked to us one-on-one," Day said. "Some of them passed notes to their team leader asking for help. They trusted us."

It's easy to tell children to just say no to alcohol and other drugs, but it's another matter to teach how to say no.

In an effort to help kids refuse to drink and take drugs, the

Grosse Pointe Woods Public Safety Department is embarking on a program that provides students with the knowledge and tools needed to say no when presented with decisions concerning controlled substances.

Public Safety Officer Sally Beghin, who is the police liaison with all the elementary schools in the Woods, recently completed more than 80 hours of specialized training in a program called Drug Abuse Resistance Education, or DARE.

DARE was developed in 1983 for the Los Angeles Police Department by the Los Angeles Unified School District. Beghin said the program "swept the country" and is now being taught in 47 states and six foreign countries.

DARE was researched and developed by educators in the Los Angeles school system, but is only taught by uniformed and trained police officers.

"The uniformed police officer automatically has credibility," said Beghin, who is known as

"Officer Sally" by the many elementary students she meets during her visits to public and private elementary school classes throughout Grosse Pointe Woods.

She said police officers teaching DARE classes must wear their uniforms, but they don't wear guns because the elementary students are too curious and distracted by the firearms.

possible to stop."

"We can't expect to change society," said Susan Pearce, South's student assistance coordinator. She noted that during recent TV coverage of the Super Bowl, for instance, the camera panned the stands to show people who were obviously under the influence of alcohol — then cut away to a bar where people were drinking and celebrating their team's successes.

"Young people have to be convinced there are alternative activities," said John Bruce, director of the Neighborhood Club. "Frankly, if alcohol is available, they'll choose it."

Pearce said that about 90 percent of high school kids drink. "The scariest thing to me is that alcohol use begins earlier and earlier. It used to begin in college; then with high school seniors; then at the junior prom; then freshmen were using alcohol. Now the majority of eighth graders have already tried alcohol."

"Parent awareness (of teen alcohol use) is low at the middle school level," said Dee Szumreany, Brownell school team representative. "Parents won't come to meetings. They say the problem doesn't apply to them."

Bill Huntington, president of South's Dads' Club, pointed out that Grosse Pointe is obviously

an affluent community and most of the successful adults drink. "We are role models. It will take five or six years to break a 20-year tradition," he said.

Some suggestions from those at the meeting:

- More parent networking.
- A school code that requires student leaders and participants in school-sponsored extra-curricular activities to sign a pledge, like the athletes' pledge, that says they will not use alcohol and drugs. Students would be subjected to the same consequences as athletes if they break the pledge. For a first offense, athletes are suspended from competition for two weeks and must meet with the substance abuse counselor. For a second offense, they miss four weeks of competition and complete a substance abuse program. Three-time offenders are suspended from competition for a year and must enroll in a substance abuse program.
- Identify places that sell alcohol to minors.
- Get parents more involved.
- Get elementary and middle school kids and parents more involved in prevention and education programs.
- Provide alternative activities for teenagers that don't involve alcohol use. "Often the term 'alternative activity' is the death phrase for kids," said Debbie

Smith, chairwoman of the South school team. "Alternative to what? Fun? We already have a zillion alternative activities."

"This has to be a coordinated effort among a lot of people," said John Bruce, of the Neighborhood Club, "not just police, parents and schools."

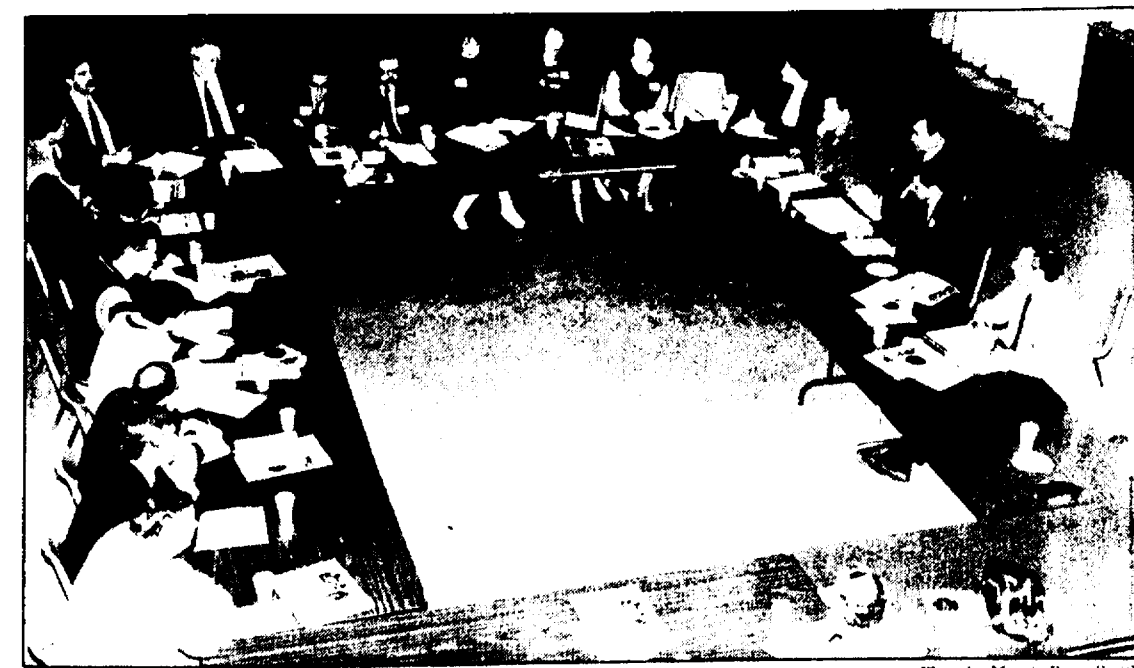
"Every child who's ever been in my office," said Gaukerke, "is aware of the negative effects of alcohol. What's missing is the

consequences for those who use it."

Gaukerke said that house parties have increased lately. "Drinking parties on weekends have been a tradition for a long time. Hotel parties. Hall parties. Parties that charge admission."

"We're frightened that something will happen to one of our students if we don't do something soon."

## Profile: North student group plans to drive message home

Grosse Pointe North High School's Myself and Students Against Drugs and Alcohol, MASADA for short, is one of the newest student organizations dedicated to fighting the drug war with positive peer pressure. But it has an image problem.

"There is a feeling that MASADA is a nerd group because people don't really know what we're about," said Kevin Boehm, a sophomore at North who is also the group's vice president.

He added that one of his mother's friends once asked him why he was involved with that "group of losers."

"They have the feeling that we're a group of reformed drug users, but that's not the case," Boehm said. While possibly one or two of the 40 or so members of the group are recovered users, the group is quite the opposite.

"We just want to show everyone that there is an alternative to drinking and drugs," he said. "We want people to know that even though we're a minority, there are people who don't drink."

MASADA members go into elementary schools to teach students — through skits — how to, and that it is right to, say no to pressure to use drugs and alcohol.

To counteract the image problem, Boehm said the group has merged with North's Students Against Drunk Driving chapter, and has launched a campaign to raise money and to get their

name known.

The fundraising effort begins April 1. The group will sell, for \$2, a plastic credit-type card, which certain businesses will honor with discounts. The cards are good for a year, Boehm said.

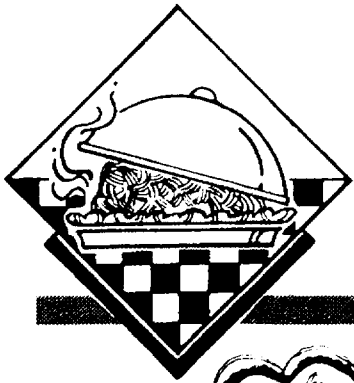
But the major project for the year will be the Drinking and Driving Awareness week, April 17-21.

In a letter to Dr. John Kasman, North's principal, Boehm said "The message we are hoping to present to all of Grosse Pointe North (with this awareness week) is simple. . . Weigh The Facts. We feel that if a group of students presents (the facts) the students are more likely to listen."

The presentation of the facts will be shocking and graphic, See MESSAGE, page 15A

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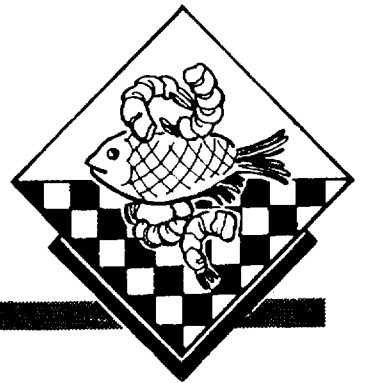
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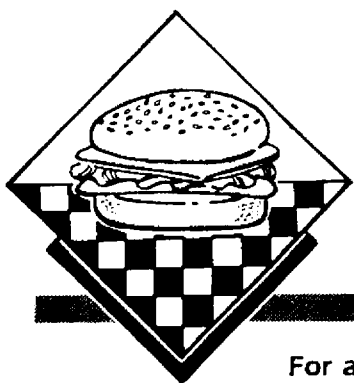
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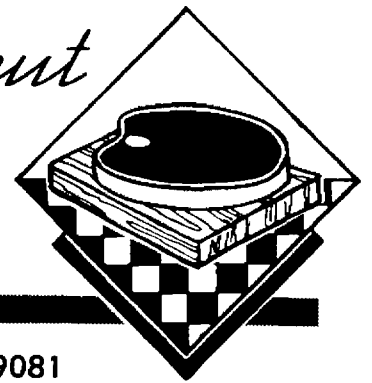
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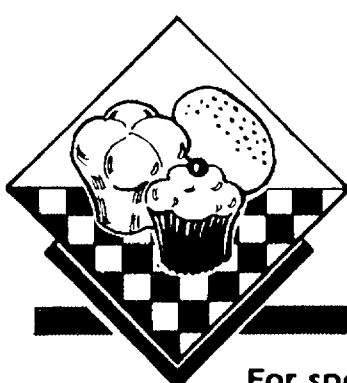
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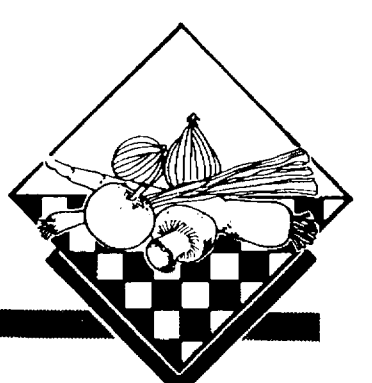

in an effort to become accepted by older students, the new students may make bad decisions concerning alcohol and other drugs.

"Just telling kids to say no is easy," she said. "DARE gives eight ways to say no. . . We're giving the kids tools they will be able to use, skills they might not normally learn."

Using a workbook designed by educators, trained DARE officers teach the students about drugs and their harmful effects if abused. The students are taught to anticipate the consequences of their actions.

Beghin said the students learn to list the good and bad consequences that will result from what they do. The good consequences of not taking drugs, for example, would include good grades, good health and good relationships with family, friends and school officials. Bad conse-

quences of taking drugs would include threat to health, poor grades and deteriorating interpersonal relationships.

Students also learn resistance techniques and how to say no, and they learn how to say no with assertiveness, but without being abrasive or uncertain.

Part of the ability to say no is linked to the student's own self-esteem, and the students are taught how to build their self-esteem.

Part of the DARE program includes teaching students to recognize stress and how to deal with it without using drugs. The future middle-schoolers learn how to make decisions and how to take risks. Not all risks are bad, and the students are taught how to determine whether an action is a good or a bad risk.

Students also outline activities that are fun and rewarding that do not include drug use.

"We make them realize it does not take drugs and alcohol to feel good and have fun."

Older students are incorporated into the program as positive role models. These are successful student leaders who the younger students can look up to and see that not everyone takes drugs. Beghin said DARE does not allow reformed drug abusers to talk to the young students.

"The idea behind DARE is you don't even try it," she said. "We don't want to expose them to anything negative. This is a very positive program. We want them to feel good about themselves."

At the end of the course, the students take a stand on drug

use. The students use skits to show how they will say no to drugs when they are inevitably faced with the decision.

The culmination of the class is the most exciting part of the program and often gets emotional. Parents are invited to attend and the students get certificates. Beghin said she is hoping that civic or business groups will donate money to the DARE program so that the graduating students can get DARE T-shirts to wear.

DARE began in Michigan in Lansing last year, and locally it is being taught in Harper Woods and Detroit public schools.

In Grosse Pointe Woods, Beghin has been invited to teach

the program to students at Our Lady Star of the Sea School. She hopes that the success of the program at the private school will convince the public school system to include the program in its drug prevention programs.

"I think it's going to be great," she said of DARE. "I have no doubt about it."

Beghin said the program works because it was carefully developed by top educators and is taught by uniformed officers. Many times students will pay better attention to the officer than to a teacher.

"We're not replacing the teacher," Beghin said, adding that the teacher must remain in the class with the DARE officer.

All DARE instructors are trained police officers and are specially selected by DARE coordinators. Only 30 percent of the

officers applying to teach DARE are selected.

Beghin has been employed nine years with the city of Grosse Pointe Woods and has been a public safety officer for six years. She is the department's crime prevention/traffic safety officer.

DARE instructors must take a two-week, 80-hour training program, which teaches the DARE curriculum as well as a crash course in teaching techniques.

The DARE program must be taught as it was originally developed. Instructors and school officials cannot "customize" the program. Beghin said it cannot be altered because then every officer would be giving the kids different messages.

"The reason we're doing this is we care about kids," Beghin said.

but that is done to get the student's attention, Boehm said.

For example: On the bench in front of the main office there will be a casket with a mirror placed in it so people can see what will happen to themselves if they drink and drive. There will be a sign above the casket — "Weigh the facts. . . Bury the bottle not your friend. Friends are for life."

The police will bring a car — made available by AAA — that was involved in a drunk driving accident. The car will be placed on the island in front of the school by the flagpole.

Facts about drinking and driving will be broadcast each morning and plans are being made to show drunk driving movies prior to school starting. SADD contracts — those which students sign with their parents, both pledging they will not drink and drive — and MASADA membership forms will be passed out during the week, he added.

The week will culminate with assemblies featuring speaker Pete Collins, a Mississippi state trooper who travels the country to speak on the subject of drunk driving.

Other SADD chapters throughout the country have used more macabre ways of getting the message across, including Grim Reaper Day, and a day in which every student received a button with the name and time of death of a drunk driving victim. After the time of death on each student's button, they could no longer speak, in effect they were dead. But Boehm said there is a reason for the harsh methods.

"In the middle school you can tell the students to just say no, but in high school, they've heard it through health classes and teachers, but we need to grab their attention," he said.

The Drinking and Driving Awareness Week was not arbitrarily chosen, the weekend following is the junior prom, a time when students typically drink. With the message fresh in their minds, Boehm hopes the students will think twice before drinking and driving.

The image problem is abating because of programs such as the awareness week, Boehm said, and the group is getting positive feedback. It's just a matter of time before the message sinks in.

DARE lessons

1. Practices for personal safety — Used to acquaint students with role of police and review practices for safety of students.
2. Drug use and misuse — Helps students understand harmful effects of drugs if they are misused.
3. Consequences — Helps students understand that there are many consequences, both positive and negative, that result from using and choosing not to use drugs.
4. Resisting pressures to use drugs — To make students aware of kinds of peer pressure they may face and help them learn to say no to offers to use drugs.
5. Resistance techniques: Ways to say no — Teaches students ways to say no in resisting various types of pressure.
6. Building self-esteem — Helps students understand that self-image results from positive and negative feelings and experiences.
7. Assertiveness: A response style — Teaches that assertiveness is a response style that enables a person to state his or her own rights without loss of self-esteem.
8. Managing stress without taking drugs — Helps students recognize stress and suggests ways to deal with it other than taking drugs.
9. Media influences on drug use — Helps students develop the understanding and skills needed to analyze and resist media presentations about alcohol and other drugs.
10. Decision making and risk taking — Helps students apply the decision-making process in evaluating the results of various kinds of risk-taking behavior, including that of drug abuse.
11. Alternatives to drug use — Helps students find out about activities that are interesting and rewarding and that are better than taking drugs.
12. Role modeling — Older student leaders and other positive role models who do not use drugs talk to younger students to clarify the misconception that drug users are in the majority.
13. Forming a support system — Students will be able to develop positive relationships with many different people in order to form a support system.
14. Resisting gang pressures — Students will be able to identify situations in which they may be pressured by gangs and to evaluate the consequences of the choices available to them.
15. DARE summary — Helps students summarize and assess what they learned from the program.
16. Taking a stand — Students complete their own commitments and present them to the class. This helps them respond effectively when pressured to use drugs.
17. Culmination — Special graduation exercise for all students.

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# Ornithologists find something to sing about

Amid the bad news about declining numbers of songbirds in North America, ornithologists are finding a bright spot.

According to National Wildlife magazine, perhaps 20 varieties of songbirds seem to be expanding their ranges in this country, some at rates that ornithologists describe as "dramatic," even "explosive."

As reported in the latest Canadian and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's Breeding Bird Survey, this expansion of songbirds — including northern cardinals, house finches, and American robins — is a pleasant contrast to ongoing declines in range and numbers of many other songbird species. (The range of a bird species refers to the geographic territory it occupies; an increase in range may or may not reflect an increase in the overall population of that species.)

Despite some wide-ranging scientific studies and hard statistics, the experts remain all but mystified. Some see the dramatic increase in the number of Americans who put out bird feeders during the winter months as a critical factor.

Others cite a gradual warming trend in some regions. Still, even among the most pessimistic of ornithologists, there is consensus that range expansion is a reality. Among the species expanding their ranges are:

**Northern mockingbird:** Once an almost exclusively southern U.S. and Mexican bird, the mockingbird's insistently repetitive tchack-tchack-tchack call — as well as its remarkably accurate impressions of other birds' calls — can now be heard as far north as Newfoundland.

Roger Tory Peterson, long considered the guru of birdwatchers, attributes much of the mockingbird's expansion to a mid-20th century trend in many areas of planting multiflora rose, a flowering bush often used as a yard ornament in suburban homes and as a divider decoration along highways. To the mockingbird, the rose represents both a reliable

source of winter food (for the rose hips) and a secure nesting site.

**Northern cardinal:** Increasingly, the wintry snowscapes of many northern regions are being brightened by the appearance of brilliant red cardinals. Thirty years ago, the northern edge of the cardinals' range was bounded by the Ohio River Valley, but the bird can now be found as far north as southern Quebec and Nova Scotia.

Ornithologist Kenneth Crowell of St. Lawrence University in upstate New York thinks that human help in the form of winter bird feeding accounts for much of the cardinals' expansion. Crowell also cites the growth of suburbs, which tend to create a garden or bushland thicket environment that the birds prefer, and a general warming trend in northern climates over the past four decades.

Roger Tory Peterson offers an intriguing theory to explain the cardinals' expansion. Their range, he explains, was once bounded on the east by the Hudson River. "I have the idea," he says, "that it was the building of the George Washington Bridge (in 1931) that enabled the cardinals to cross the Hudson. They're not highly migratory birds, but they can cross the river slowly by roosting in the struts of the bridge on the way."

**American robin:** Unlike the cardinal and the mockingbird, which are extending northward, the familiar American robin seems to be taking its caroling tyeep, tut-tut-tut call further south into the Sun Belt. What makes the robin's expansion especially heartening is that it is partially the result of the anti-DDT legislation.

And as with cardinals, the relentless growth of suburbs, which create the parklike, lawn-dominated habitat that the birds love, is contributing to their comeback and expansion. According to Texas A&M University ornithologist Keith Arnold, robins were uncommon in Texas in

the 1970s. Now, he says, "the darned things are all over the place."

**House finch:** Originally western U.S. and Mexican birds, house finches were transported illegally to New York in the 1940s, and later turned loose. Today, the descendants of those birds are spreading their range as far south as Mississippi and in such midwestern states as Iowa and Nebraska. In fact, said U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service ornithologist Sam Droege, "In a few years they should meet the native populations of the birds in the West. It's sort of like the trans-continental railroad."

## Cable company alerts residents to prewiring

Comcast Cablevision has received inquiries about companies and individuals representing themselves as cable television installation companies who will do cable television prewiring in new homes under construction. These companies are also advertising that all their equipment is "cable company approved."

Michael Singpiel, vice president and area manager for Comcast Cablevision in Southeast Michigan said they do not endorse any third party installation company unless they are under contract directly with Comcast Cablevision.

"We have run into situations where a homeowner has paid \$100 to \$150 for a new home prewire and we have found the wiring system faulty and unusable," Singpiel said.

Comcast, as a matter of policy, will prewire a home for a deposit of \$50. When the homeowner subscribes to cable television service, that \$50 deposit will be credited toward the monthly cable television bill.

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The reasons for the species' exponential expansion remain unclear. Theoretically, the relatively dry, nearly treeless expanses of the Great Plains should serve as a natural ecological barrier to a bird that prefers a more humid climate and a habitat of deciduous forests broken by clearings.

University of Washington ecologist Tim Wootton believes that the increase in irrigated cropland in the southern Plains States may be providing the ambient humidity the finches need; he also speculates that the species may be evolving in the direction of a more heat-tolerant bird.

Some other songbirds have also been expanding their range. The golden-crowned kinglet is moving south into the Piedmont areas of Maryland and Virginia, following, according to some observations, newly maturing plantations of Norway spruce trees that have been planted in large tracts around man-made reservoirs. Evening grosbeaks have moved east as far as Nova Scotia

and New Brunswick, apparently pulled in part by the explosion in bird feeders.

Barn, cave and cliff swallows are expanding in the South, thanks to a trend toward replacing round highway culverts with square ones, the corners of which provide ideal nesting sites.

Still, the songbird picture is by no means entirely rosy. According to Wilderness Society biologist David Wilcove, "Range expansion involves a relatively small number of successful species, as opposed to a number of species that are doing quite poorly."

Wilcove is particularly con-

cerned about what he calls "serious declines" in a number of forest-loving songbird species: yellow-throated vireos, worm-eating warblers and scarlet tanagers near urban areas of the East; golden-cheeked warblers and black-capped vireos in the West. "All these," he said, "have shown quite alarming declines. In fact, I'm concerned about the whole suite of forest-dwelling songbirds."

For the present, however, it appears that at least some species are doing quite well with or without human concern.

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# The Dynasty should please ram-tough customers

The Dodge Dynasty is one of the more surprising cars on the market, particularly if you have been familiar with Dodges over the years. It is surprising not because it is so nice — there have been many outstanding Dodge models — but because of its personality.

by advertising writers to describe the Dodge back in its youth. The Dodge never put on airs, it was Everyman's car, whether in its usual form of family sedan or as Super Bee muscle car.

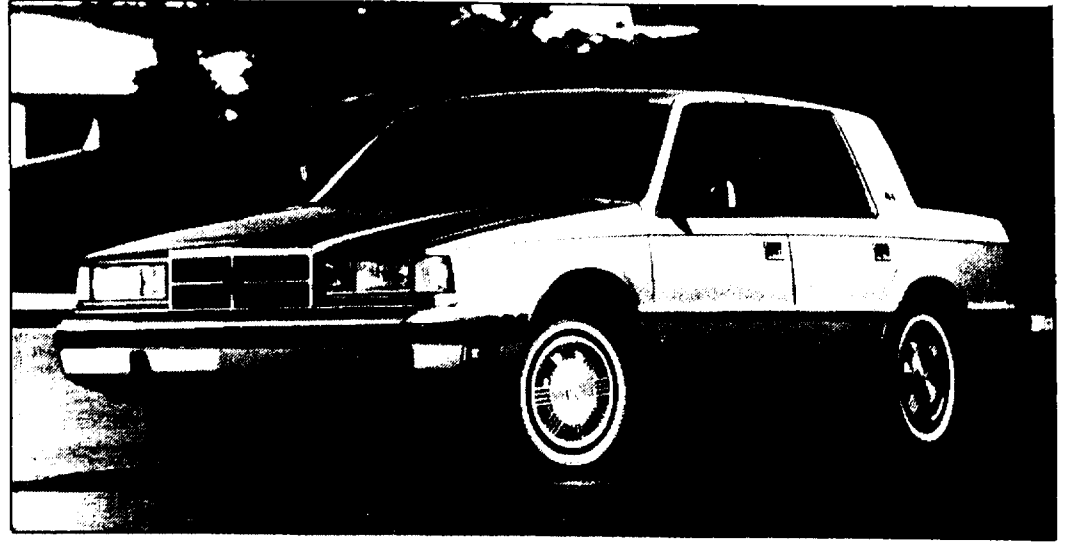
The Dynasty is a very classy, understated luxury car that re-

wanted a car a man could sit in with his hat on, a solid, practical automobile. Stodgy even. He got it and Chrysler dropped from second place in sales, which it had held since 1933, to a distant and permanent third.

But dad, a Dodge man, liked it and I learned to drive in his dark green '49 Dodge with Fluid Drive. There followed an odd-looking blue-and-cream '53 (which I bought and owned briefly before acquiring a piece of flashier and less dependable junk), a wonderful big-finned three-tone '57, and incredibly ugly '60 with lumpy front fenders and reverse elephant-ear fins in the rear, then a series of conservatively fashionable but always solid Dodges.

As sons often do, I eschewed the ways of my father and dabbled in Ford V-8's, hot-rod Pontiacs, Corvairs, Ramblers, even a Volkswagen and a Volvo. As sons often do, I returned to the ways of my father as I got older. I had a marvelous half-block-long Dodge Coronet wagon with an eight-mile-per-gallon 400-inch V-8 when the second oil crisis hit and gasoline rose to \$1.40 (and those were pre-Carter dollars) a gallon. Expensive, but always dependable.

The Dynasty is a new kind of Dodge. The premium LE's 3.0 liter V-6 does not have the brute power of the old muscle cars, but performs admirably and does not gulp fuel. (A leadfoot, I averaged about 24 miles per gallon.) A much more sophisticated machine than its predecessors, its

The Dynasty is probably the best Dodge ever made, but that is not such a big deal because that could be said of most of the current cars, particularly domestics. Today, even the low-line cars have features which make them superior to upscale offerings of just a few years ago. And the Japanese convinced Detroit it must put quality ahead of numbers. Even keeping all that in mind, the Dynasty is a surprising Dodge.

Anyone who has had an intimate relationship with Dodge over the years knows that the Dodge's strong suit has always been attention to basics. "Dependability" was a word coined

minds one more of a Cadillac than a Dodge.

## Truck safety laws effective April 1 in state

A three-year campaign to reduce truck accidents on Michigan roads culminates April 1 when the last of 12 new safety laws takes effect.

The multi-bill truck package followed AAA Michigan's Legislative Communication Campaign, resulting in 165,000 postcards being sorted and delivered to each sender's legislator. The cards asked legislators for laws to cover all trucks hauling loose loads, impose lane-use restrictions and increase enforcement and inspections.

Three statutes taking effect April 1 require covers on trucks hauling loose loads, increase fines for trucks operating with unsafe equipment and strengthen brake requirements.

Truck covers are expected to sharply reduce an estimated \$18 million annual cost for shattered windshields on passenger cars.

In its 1986 report, "Cars and Trucks — Sharing the Road Safely," AAA Michigan found many trucks to have brakes on all wheels to ensure safe stops.

Operating an unsafe truck can

now result in fines up to \$300, formerly \$100. Penalties can be levied for violating state-mandated standards on brakes, tires, steering, lights and turn signals, if these result in a truck being taken out of service for repairs.

Several truck safety measures became effective earlier this year, including:

- A law imposing lane restrictions on heavy trucks. On freeways of three lanes or more, heavy trucks are restricted to the two lanes farthest to the right, except when avoiding a

electronically controlled Ultra-drive four-speed automatic drives the front wheels smoothly and quietly and its anti-lock brake system stops the car surely on any surface.

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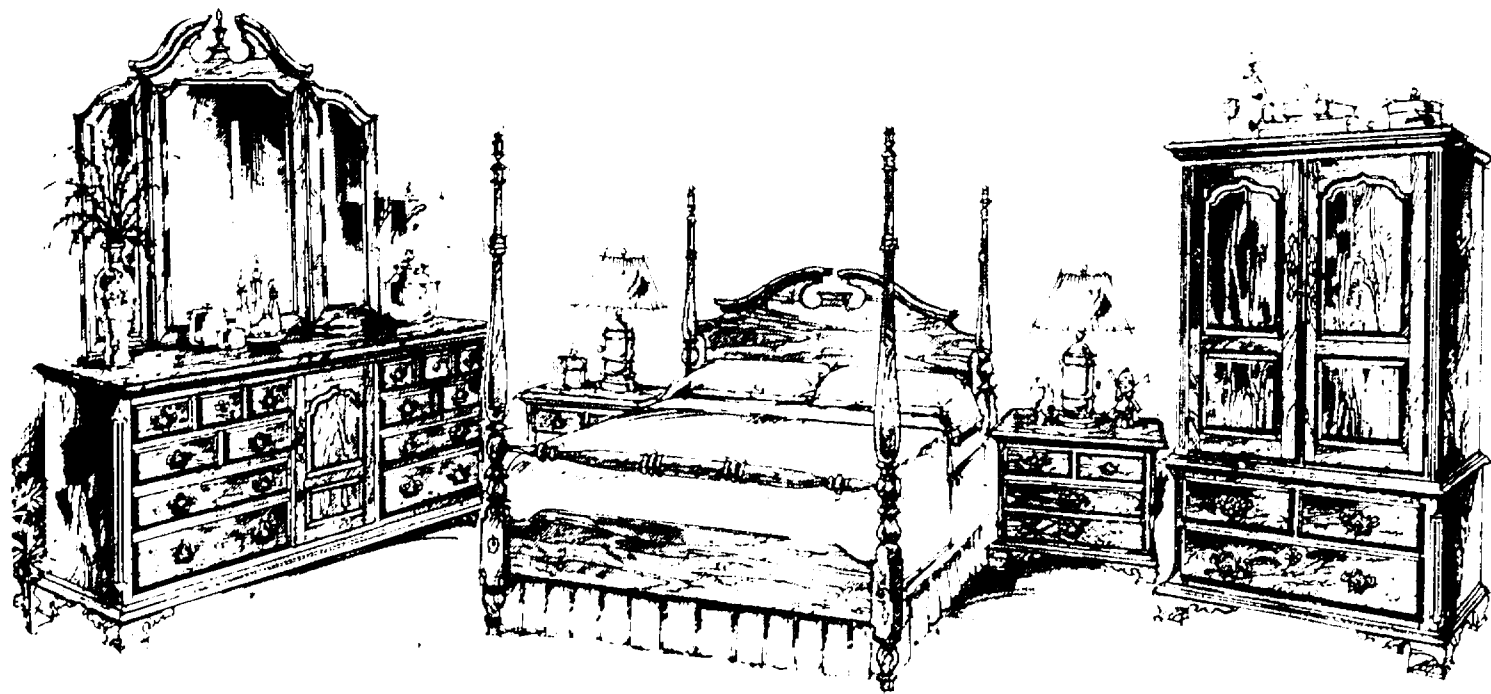
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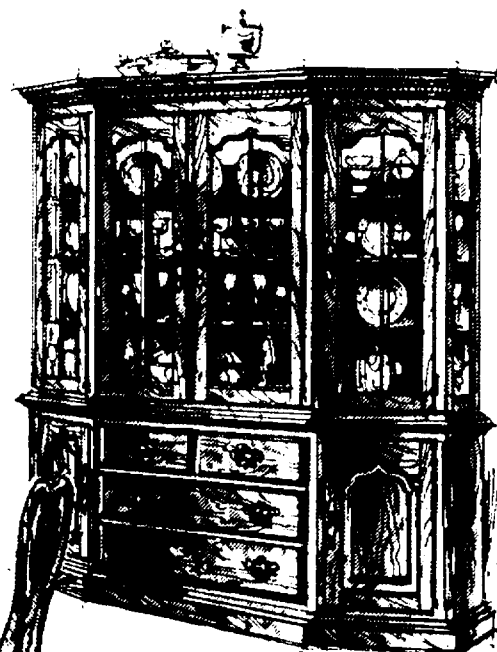
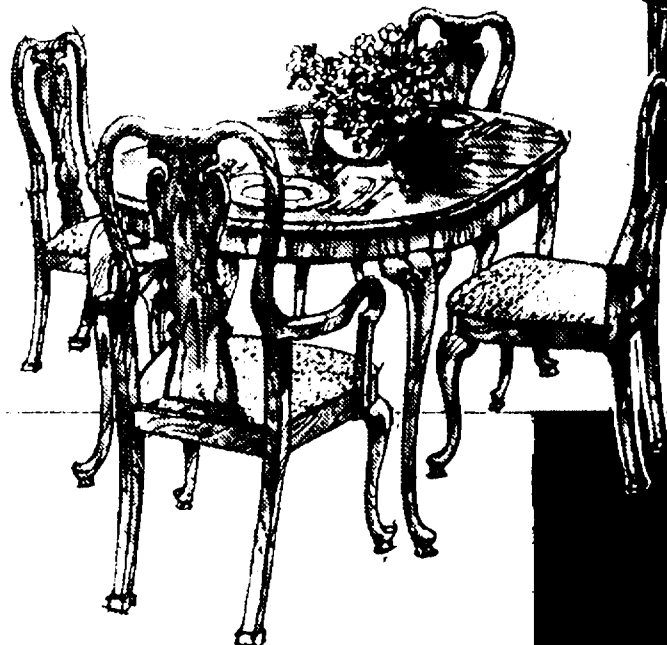

## Grosse Pointe Cinema League

The Grosse Pointe Cinema League will meet Monday, April 3 at 2 p.m. in the Fries Auditorium of the Grosse Pointe War Memorial.

"Detroit's Pattern of Growth" is the title of a film and slide show by Dr. Robert J. Goodman, depicting Detroit's growth from the establishment of Fort Pontchartrain in 1701 to the city's first two expressways in 1963.

Goodman uses "animated maps" and pictures to show the changes over the years and with slides to show a face of Detroit that is largely unknown or unseen by the suburban resident. Animated maps are also used to locate and explain the four distinct periods of the city's settlement and urban sprawl. Each map pattern is followed by "live" footage of traffic flow; street off-sets and map changes, parks, and buildings to illustrate the boundaries of subsequent areas of occupation. The street pattern of Detroit clearly shows where the city began and how it developed.

Goodman, professor emeritus of geography, taught at Wayne State University over a period of 36 years. He received an award for "Excellence in Teaching" from the university, and he was also honored by the National Council for Geographic Education with an award for "Distinguished Teaching" in his discipline. His classes brought the landscape indoors through his slides and motion picture film that he shot on his world travels. Students who worked with him helped to develop and produce animated maps and/or sets of annotated slides to illustrate historical geography.

## Men's wristwatch collecting means big business

Not every watch is worth buying or selling. In fact, once you start to look over the collection of wristwatches at Charterhouse & Co., you realize that most of the wristwatches you have ever seen are not worth collecting.

But there are still millions of watches out there somewhere that command hefty prices and Charterhouse is in the business of buying and selling them.

Charterhouse, on Kercheval in the Village, is of course known as a dealer in estate jewelry, paintings, autographs, crystal and other rare and old objects. The wristwatch business is relatively recent.

And we do mean wristwatches. Men's wristwatches. Not women's wristwatches and not pocketwatches. Pocketwatches are passe.

"There are too many of them," said Charterhouse President Bill Williams. "The Elgin Company alone made 55 million pocketwatches."

"People's judgment of the value of their pocketwatches is clouded by sentiment. Everybody has a grandfather, and if he wanted to tell time, he had a pocketwatch. Only a few unique ones are valuable."

"But old wristwatches are valuable because they essentially stopped making mechanical movements. The minute you stop making something, everybody wants to collect it."

Women's wristwatches are another story. In general, women are more interested in current fashion and less likely to wear something they see as out of date, so there's no market for ladies' watches.

Watches of any description are like the rest of the items Charterhouse deals in: they tend to be

on the expensive side and appeal to a small segment of the total population. Williams said he wanted to find a way to reach out beyond his immediate geographic area.

"I began to realize that a statewide or national market was critical," he said. "A small slice of that bigger pie was worth something."

To reach that national market, he took a step few Grosse Pointe businesses have taken — he began to do national advertising. In less than two years he has expanded from his original \$1,300 advertisement in the Christian Science Monitor, to Modern Maturity, Readers Digest and the Wall Street Journal, all publications appealing to the older, affluent market he wants to reach.

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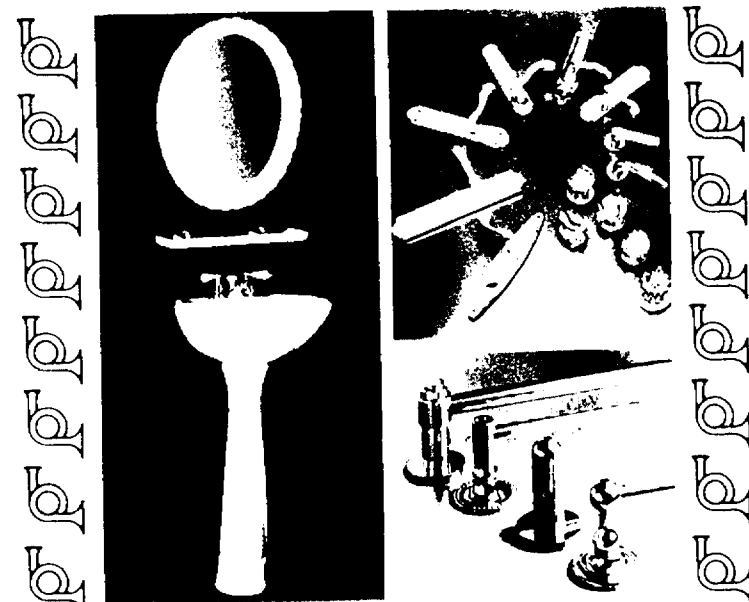

## Census Bureau to survey area households

Local representatives of the U.S. Census Bureau will revisit selected area households beginning April 3 to conduct its Survey of Income and Program Participation (SIPP), Dwight P. Dean, director of the bureau's Detroit Regional Office, announced last week.

SIPP is a major nationwide continuing survey introduced in the fall of 1983. It is one of the nation's largest surveys, with about 36,000 households participating.

The Census Bureau publishes periodic reports providing information from the survey. Subjects covered include the following:

- Jobs and earnings;
- The economic effects of unemployment, disability, and retirement
- How taxes affect personal spending;
- Participation in programs such as Social Security, Medicare, Medicaid, and food stamps.

Information from SIPP helps policy-makers and administra-

tors determine how well government programs are serving the public and how changes in programs and policies will affect the public.

Here are some facts based on SIPP interviews during 1985 on support networks among American families (the sample size limits accurate reporting to national figures only):

- Nearly 10 million U.S. residents received regular cash support payments totaling \$19.9 billion from people not living with them. Some \$11.3 billion was directed to 7.1 million persons under age 21. Another \$7.6 billion went to 2.9 million adults,

mostly to separated and former spouses, children over 21, and parents of the providers.

- Sixty-three percent of the people providing support to someone outside their household were 25 to 44 years old; 28 percent were 45 to 64 years old; only 3 percent were under age 25; and 7 percent were over age 65.

- The average support paid was \$3,006 a year, or 8 percent of the provider's family income.

Information collected in SIPP is confidential by law. Field Representatives have credentials identifying them as U.S. Census Bureau employees.

## McNamara announces 450 summer youth jobs

Wayne County Executive Edward H. McNamara announced that the county will offer summer maintenance and clerical jobs to approximately 450 young adults through the 1989 Michigan Youth Corps and the Wayne County Department of Public Services.

"These programs provide meaningful employment to a great number of young people who otherwise would not have that opportunity," said McNamara. "Their involvement in community service not only helps them personally, but also produces a higher quality environment for everyone in Wayne County."

The 225 jobs under the Michigan Youth Corps are offered to young people of Wayne County, between the ages of 18 and 21 (excluding Detroit and Downriver communities which operate their own program). Youth Corps jobs will start the first of June, last about two months, and pay from \$3.35 to \$5.50 per hour.

The 220 Seasonal Service

Worker jobs offered by the Department of Public Services require that applicants live in Wayne County (including Detroit and Downriver communities) and be 18 years or older. The jobs will begin in mid-April, last through October, and pay \$4.50 per hour. The Department of Public Services maintains roads, parks, airports and public works divisions in Wayne County.

"Both of our summer employment programs — the Youth Corps and Seasonal Service Worker program — give young adults an opportunity to gain valuable work experience and also learn the importance of a personal commitment to work ethic and career planning," said McNamara.

Participants will become involved in such activities as park groundskeeping, landscaping, roadway maintenance, clerical activities, and custodial jobs.

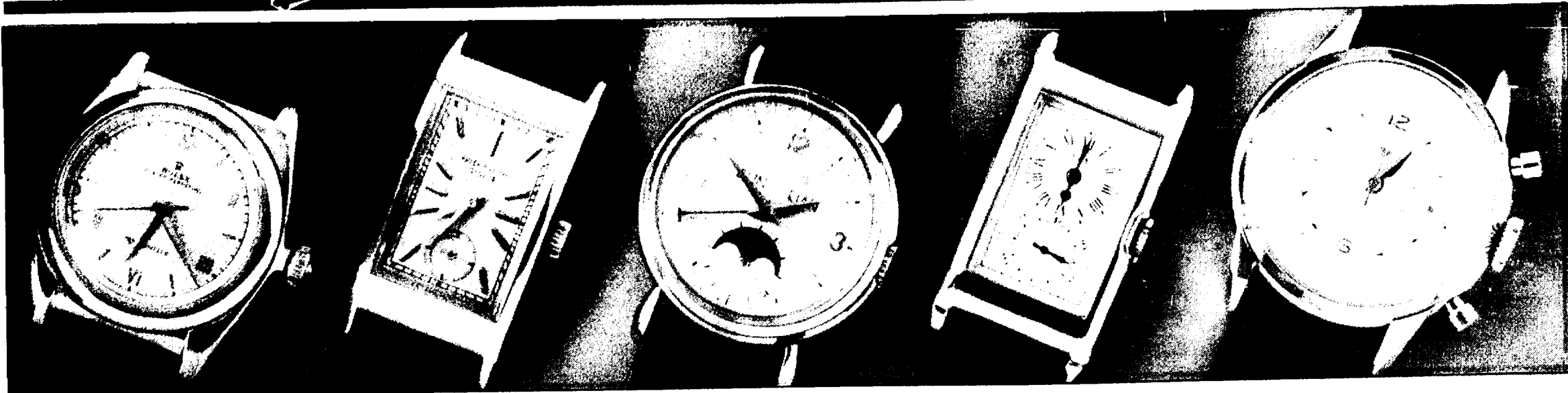

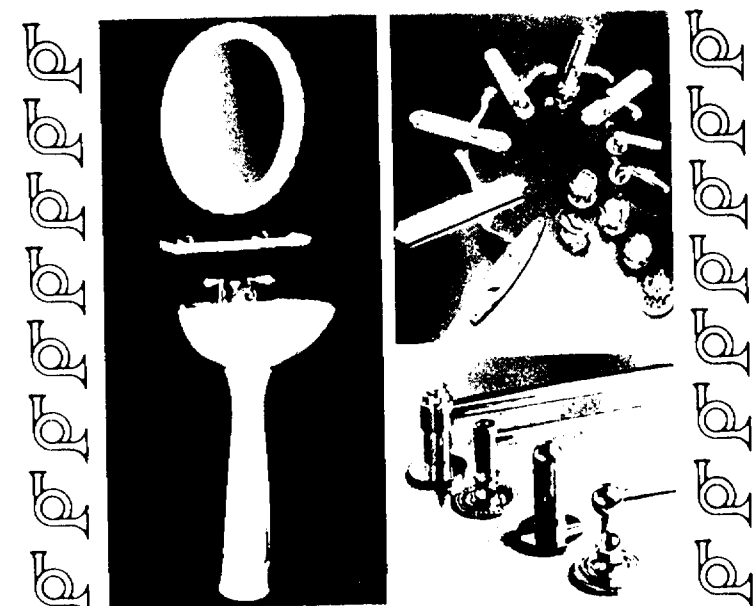

SIPP is a major nationwide continuing survey introduced in the fall of 1983. It is one of the nation's largest surveys, with about 36,000 households participating.

## McNamara announces 450 summer youth jobs

Wayne County Executive Edward H. McNamara announced that the county will offer summer maintenance and clerical jobs to approximately 450 young adults through the 1989 Michigan Youth Corps and the Wayne County Department of Public Services.

"These programs provide meaningful employment to a great number of young people who otherwise would not have that opportunity," said McNamara. "Their involvement in community service not only helps them personally, but also produces a higher quality environment for everyone in Wayne County."

The 225 jobs under the Michigan Youth Corps are offered to young people of Wayne County, between the ages of 18 and 21 (excluding Detroit and Downriver communities which operate their own program). Youth Corps jobs will start the first of June, last about two months, and pay from \$3.35 to \$5.50 per hour.

The 220 Seasonal Service

The Census Bureau publishes periodic reports providing information from the survey. Subjects covered include the following:

- Jobs and earnings;
- The economic effects of unemployment, disability, and retirement
- How taxes affect personal spending;
- Participation in programs such as Social Security, Medicare, Medicaid, and food stamps.

Information from SIPP helps policy-makers and administra-

tors determine how well government programs are serving the public and how changes in programs and policies will affect the public.

Here are some facts based on SIPP interviews during 1985 on support networks among American families (the sample size limits accurate reporting to national figures only):

- Nearly 10 million U.S. residents received regular cash support payments totaling \$19.9 billion from people not living with them. Some \$11.3 billion was directed to 7.1 million persons under age 21. Another \$7.6 billion went to 2.9 million adults,

mostly to separated and former spouses, children over 21, and parents of the providers.

- Sixty-three percent of the people providing support to someone outside their household were 25 to 44 years old; 28 percent were 45 to 64 years old; only 3 percent were under age 25; and 7 percent were over age 65.

• The average support paid was \$3,006 a year, or 8 percent of the provider's family income.

Information collected in SIPP is confidential by law. Field Representatives have credentials identifying them as U.S. Census Bureau employees.

## Scholarships available for future teachers

High school and college students committed to a career in teaching may be eligible for up to \$5,000 per year to pay for their studies.

Macomb Community College's financial aid office has information available on the Paul Douglas Teacher Scholarship Program.

Approximately 75 of these federally funded scholarships will be awarded this year through the state Department of Education. They may be used at Macomb or any other Michigan college or university.

Students are eligible for the program if they have graduated or will graduate this year in the top 10 percent of their high school class. Priority is given to students who choose math, science, computer science, or a foreign language as their major. Students applying for the scholarship must also pledge to attend college on a full-time basis.

Students receiving a scholarship are obligated to complete their education, obtain a teaching certificate, and work in the classroom for no less than two years for each year of scholarship assistance. Students not ful-

filling the teaching commitment will be expected to pay back the scholarship as they would a student loan.

The purpose of the scholarship program, explained Dorothy Savage, associate dean of student and development services at Macomb, is to encourage students to pursue careers in teaching. Acknowledging the scholarship committee's preference for math, science, computer science and foreign language majors, she said, "It is an inducement (for teachers) in those areas."

Savage noted that any Macomb student intent on a teaching career may apply for the scholarship. Adrienne Watts, of Memphis, a current student at Macomb is a 1988/89 recipient of a \$2,844 Paul Douglas Teacher Scholarship.

"It is a great honor to receive one of these scholarships," said Savage. "It is my hope that Macomb has several students who obtain one."

## Nursing scholarships available

The Veterans Administration has announced that \$8 million is available in scholarships to nursing and physical therapy students for the 1989-90 school year.

Awards are for third- and fourth-year students in baccalaureate nursing and physical therapy degree programs, as well as master's degree programs in certain specialties.

VA officials said recipients receive tuition, educational expenses and a monthly stipend of \$621. In exchange, participants agree to serve as a full-time registered nurse or physical therapist in a VA medical center for a period of one year for each year of scholarship support. The maximum length of a scholarship award is two years.

Requests for applications may be made to the Chief of Nursing Service or the Chief of Rehabilitation Medicine at any VA medical center. 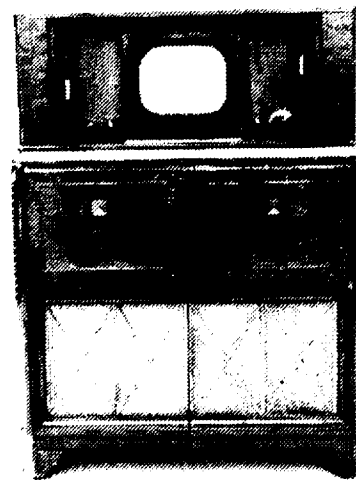

# Masterpieces in glass Author will lecture on stained glass in Detroit; fundraiser to support repair of DIA windows

Imagine three brilliantly colored, intricately designed, stained glass windows installed and lighted in such a way that their true radiance may be enjoyed by art-lovers day and night.

The Associates of the American Art Wing have their hearts set on making that image a reality . . . there's just one stumbling block: \$30,000.

John La Farge, an American artist who helped revive American interest in stained glass art at the turn of the century, created four windows which were installed in 1889 in what was once the First Unitarian Church on Woodward Avenue. In 1936, when the street was widened, three of the windows — works titled "The Helping Angel," "Faith and Hopes," and "Write Me As One Who Loves His Fellow Man" — were removed from the church, which is now called Church in the City.

In 1959, the windows were donated by the Unitarian Trust to the Detroit Institute of Arts. They have remained in storage crates

glass in his work, creating an illusion of depth and bringing out various tonal qualities in the work's voids and shadows.

"Neither La Farge nor Tiffany invented opalescent glass," Tutag says. "That came from the 17th century. But . . . each saw the possibilities of what the various colors could have in stained glass.

Both Tiffany and La Farge were impressionists who studied watercolor painting in France. They began their careers as friends, both took America by storm and both saw their friendship and their popularity disappear as time went on.

"In 1930, the market for stained glass in America just disappeared. You couldn't give a Tiffany piece away. But the works of Tiffany and La Farge are so important now, because they are such a vital part of American art history."

La Farge's works are particularly valuable as a learning tool, Tutag explains. "That's why it's so important to raise funds to get these windows installed, because it's important to make use of these wonderful teaching tools."

The DIA has the second-largest stained glass collection in the country, Tutag says. She'll discuss the DIA's pieces, and also talk about the collection found in Detroit-area churches, then detail the works found in such places as the Edsel & Eleanor Ford House and Cranbrook.

"These three La Farge windows," Tutag says in her lilting New Zealand accent, "have been crated for 30 years, yet they are in excellent condition. I can see just from looking at them now, in the trays, how lovely they'll be."

It is important, she adds, to raise enough funds to properly display the windows. La Farge's windows were done in opaque glass, which is no longer in use, and which has a milky look with streaky colors.

When they are finished, the La Farge windows will be installed on the balcony of the DIA's North Wing, adjacent to the American galleries. Lighting for the windows will be by both natural and artificial sources, in order to get the fullest enjoyment from the opaque glass.

"That's why I was disappointed when I was researching my book and I'd go into these churches. If the light wasn't right, that opalescent glass just wasn't conducive to displaying the art to its fullest," Tutag says. "That's why I'm excited about participating in this fundraising effort. When we get the windows cleaned and properly displayed, they'll be wonderful.

"Colored glass and light has many moods. That's not necessarily true with opalescent glass. But they can be beautiful, as we see in the La Farge pieces," Tutag continues. "Because of the revival of interest in glass, we are now able to plan to restore and install these windows. And since opalescent glass will no longer be used in this art, these windows will indeed be an important part of history."

in the intervening three decades.

According to James Tottis of the DIA's Department of American Art, the museum stored the windows while waiting to line up a contractor to do the restoration work the pieces so badly needed.

Each one has to be disassembled, cleaned, reloaded and any cracked glass must be repaired. A New York-based restorer will soon begin what may be a year-long effort at getting the windows in shape to display.

And that will take money.

The Associates of the American Art Wing, with help from the DIA's Founders Junior Council, have raised \$55,000, \$30,000 short of the goal of \$85,000. That's where the Associates of the American Art Wing, Lucy Hamilton and Nola Huse Tutag come in.

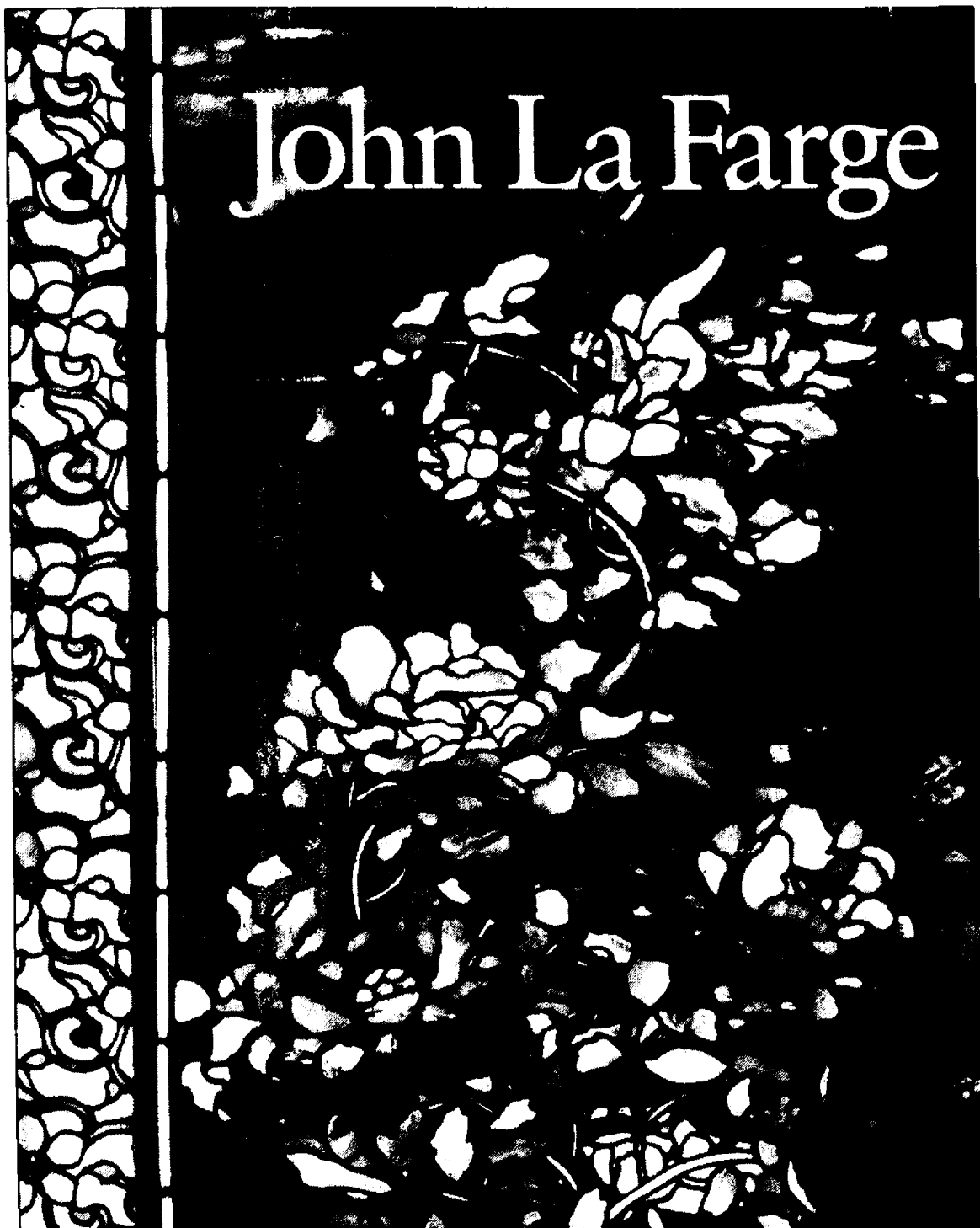
The AAW and Hamilton, of Grosse Pointe Farms, will present a fundraising lecture and reception at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, April 5, in the DIA's Crystal Gallery. Tutag, author of "Discovering Stained Glass in Detroit," will discuss Detroit's rich heritage in stained glass.

Hamilton was an originator of the famed church tours of Detroit and has long been associated with the Detroit Historical Society. Tutag, also of the Farms, holds a Ph.D. in humanities and was an associate professor at Wayne State University and a teacher of art history for 30 years.

"When Lucy Hamilton organized the church tours, I went on the tours and always asked about the windows," Tutag explains. "I always had an interest in 19th century art — the era where our city's many churches and their beautiful windows came from — and that started me on two sabbaticals on churches and windows."

It took Tutag seven years and a little help from her friends, but she finally put together the beautiful book, "Discovering Stained Glass in Detroit." Her research taught her much about the influence both LaFarge and Louis Comfort Tiffany had on stained glass in America.

La Farge was responsible for introducing the medieval art of stained glass to 19th century America. He used multiple layers of

The fee is \$35 per person. This test is not recommended for those with known cardiovascular disease or those taking medication for hypertension (high blood pressure). Wear loose-fitting clothes.

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## WHAT IS A FIXTURE?

Every real estate agent sooner or later becomes involved in a dispute about what fixtures are included in the home sale. Problems regarding the inclusion or exclusion of these items from the home sale can be solved in two ways. One is to understand what a fixture is. The easier method is to specify in the written sales contract which fixtures are included in the sale price.

A fixture is personal property which is permanently attached to real property. An example is a bathroom sink, which becomes a fixture when it is bolted to the wall. A sale of real property includes any fixtures, unless they are explicitly excluded.

As most Realtors can testify, it's not always easy to tell what is a fixture and what is personal property. Rather than going to court or losing a sale, it's best to provide in the purchase and sale contract for disposition of troublesome items such as window coverings, appliances, carpets, outdoor plants, chandeliers, mirrors and TV antennas.

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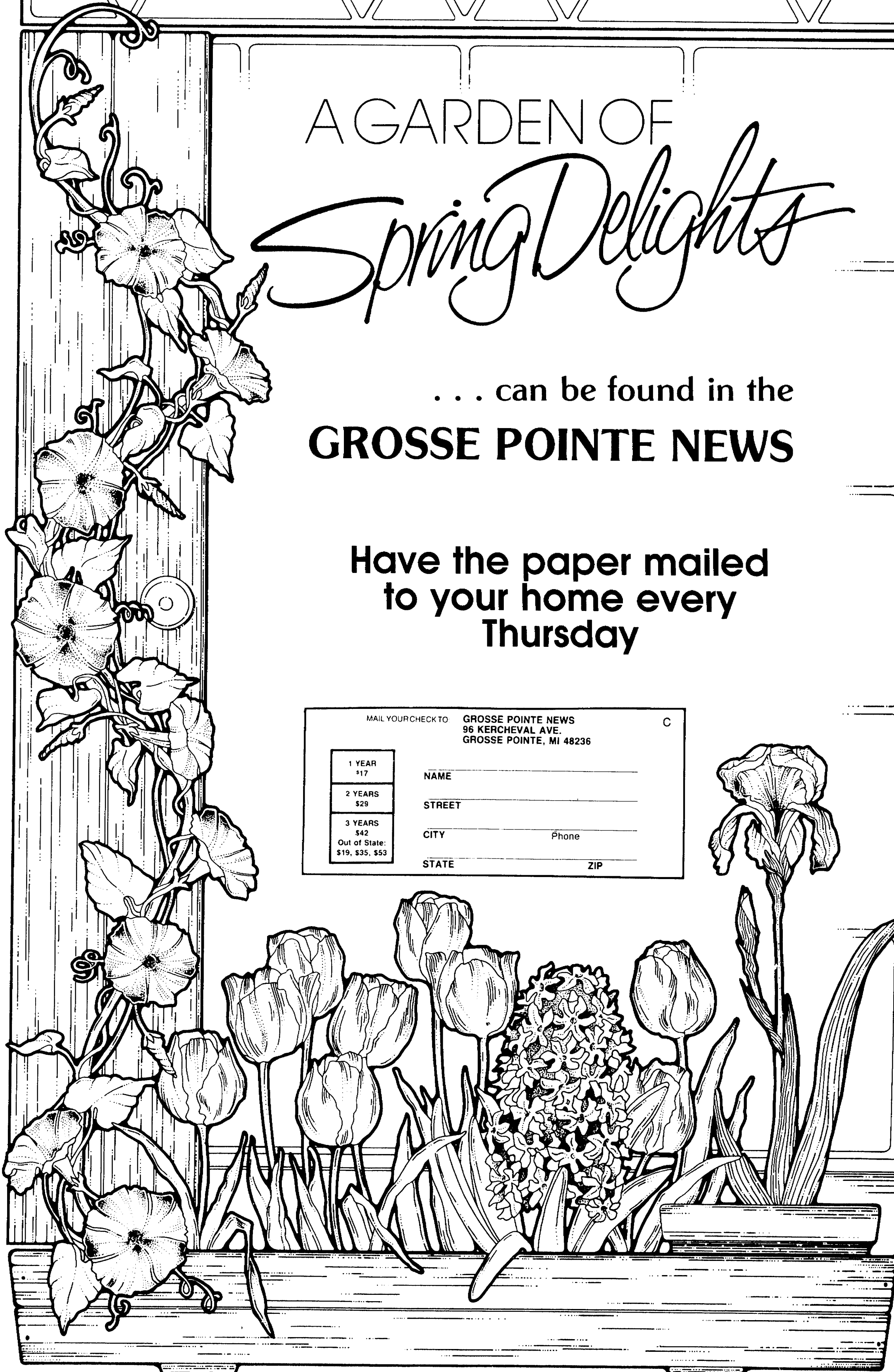


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# Burning question of the '90s: Can we trust the trust fund?

There are more ways than one to skin a cat and in the world of economics there are many ways to make a budget look better than it is.

Here's another maxim: one group's rights end where another's begins.

Both of these sayings came to mind after reading two news items. One dealt with the Social Security fund which is building up to finance the retirement of baby boomers beginning early in the next century.

The other had to do with a new federal law that would make it difficult for retirement communities to exclude children.

Regarding balancing the federal budget, the question is: Is the size of the deficit masked by applying it against the Social Security trust fund surplus, now \$104 billion and growing?

Sen. John Heinz of Pennsylvania goes on record as saying, "It is irresponsible and fiscally the opposite of truth in budgeting."

He believes that the surplus should be allowed to build up for future dispersal to Social Security recipients and the budget should be brought into balance without reliance on the trust fund surplus.

Unless that is done, the actual

deficit will rise, hidden by the rising trust fund surplus. When that surplus is needed to pay Social Security to baby boomers in the third and fourth decades of the next century, it won't be there and taxes will have to be raised or benefits cut.

Heinz and other members of Congress have introduced bills to prevent the government from counting the trustfund when reducing the budget, according to the Gramm-Rudman law.

If the Social Security surplus is allowed to accumulate, it is projected to be nearly \$12 trillion by the year 2030. As large as it is that amount would be needed to finance the benefits of baby boomers.

Another school of thought is expressed by Robert Myers, former chief actuary of the Social Security Administration.

He would let a trust fund grow, then he would cut the Social Security tax rate and put Social Security on a pay-as-you-go basis which would provide sufficient funding for the baby boomers.

Social Security is such a sensitive issue. Both present and future retirees count on it to support their lifestyles. For some it is their sole income. For others, it supplements pensions or in-

come from investments. In either case, the thought of tampering with it is disturbing. It is hoped that those who are pondering the issue will consider more than economic issues. More important is the reassurance that when it is needed those who have paid into it and count on it will receive the benefits needed to make their later years secure and comfortable.

And speaking of comfort, that brings us to the second issue: the movement afoot to prevent re-

tirement communities from barring children as residents.

At first glance any opposition to such a measure appears to be monstrous. People who love children and don't mind them around should have that freedom. But that same freedom should also govern whether or not they want them around all the time.

Many older people are tired from long years of hard work. They want to spend the years left in peace and serenity. More-

over, many who choose to go into retirement communities are dependent on walkers and wheelchairs to get around. Big wheels, skateboards and bikes could be hazardous for them, not to mention teenagers with new driving licenses tooling around in their parents' cars.

Next month an amendment to the Fair-Housing Act becomes effective, making it almost as difficult to discriminate against children as it is to discriminate against anyone on the basis of race or sex.

There is a plus to this act. Parents who have tried to rent houses, flats or apartments will applaud it. Families seeking housing know how difficult it is to find landlords who will accept children.

But lines should be drawn. Originally, Congress planned to protect the rights of senior citizens to live in quiet communities

undisturbed by the normal, noisy play that children need for healthy development. Somewhere along the line, that provision became murky enough to make it possible that courts will have to decide each case.

Another thought: Will the communities built now have to modify the environment to make the surroundings childproof? Such amenities as swimming pools and golf greens would have to be fenced off.

Those hurt most will be those older owners who bought into a community with the understanding that they wanted to live quietly. A grandfather clause could be inserted to protect that privilege.

Sensitive issues, both the Social Security trust fund and the rights of older people to choose to live in an environment best suited to their needs.

Each need to be pondered long and hard.

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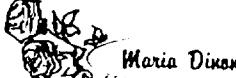

## No fooling

Having been wrapped up in athletic playoffs the past few weeks, I neglected to inform you about some closed-session meetings that have taken place.

Dealing with limited space and numerous articles, I was unable to go public with this information. Please understand, also, that none of this could be exposed until some wrinkles were ironed out.

Many people have been arguing about some proposals that will greatly influence the local athletic systems.

1) A group of athletic proponents has mounted a campaign to ban all girls from playing in high school athletics.

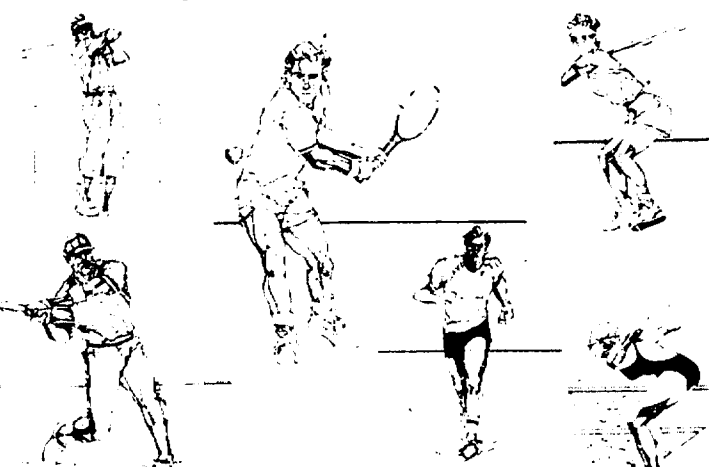

"It's hard to say what kind of season we'll have because we are

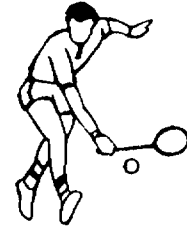

Many designers give some old classics a new look. One such classic is the nautical motif for spring. It is transformed by softness, sparkle and bareness.

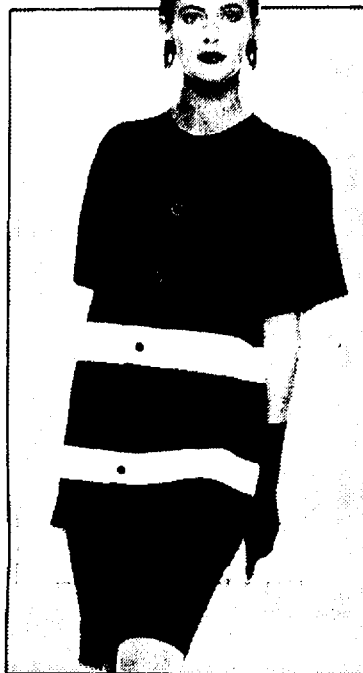

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## Pearls are a bride's best friend

Ever since history's first bride said the first "I do," pearls have been a bride's best friend. Once considered mystical gems with the power to ensure long life and prosperity, today pearls are perhaps the perfect jewel to accompany a blushing bride down the aisle.

"A fine strand of pearls is probably the best single jewelry item a bride can wear," states Linda Weichenrieder of *Modern Bride* magazine.

"Not only are pearls elegant, traditional and always in fashion, but they complement almost any bridal design as well. They seem to have the unique ability to pick up and enhance the glow of a woman on her wedding day."

Indeed pearls, which come in a variety of shapes from round to baroque, in colors from white to black, and in lengths from choker to opera, will surely flatter any woman and the gown she chooses to wear.

With the wide array of different bridal designs on the market today, all it takes is a little fashion savvy and good taste to select the perfect strand of pearls to suit a particular look.

For off-the-shoulder, scoop and boat necklines, shorter strands of pearls in single or multiple layers are the key. For high and "V" neck styles, long strands of pearls create a regal, yet demure feeling.

Just as a woman will consider the style of gown when selecting the right length of pearls for her, she should also take into account what color pearls go best with her skin and hair tones.

Experts say that creamy pearls with a golden overtone look best on women with dark skin and dark hair. Off white, cream colored pearls are perfect on women with olive and fair complexions and dark hair. And rose or slightly pink-hued pearls are smashing for those with fair complexions and blonde or red hair.

When shopping for pearls, keep in mind that luster (the clarity of the reflecting surface of the pearl) and orient (the deep seated glow that seems to come from within the heart of the pearl) are two important factors that influence price.

While natural pearls are the most expensive, they are also very rare. Cultured pearls, which are also fine jewelry, are considerably less expensive.

The only difference between cultured and natural pearls is that man has given the oyster a helping hand by surgically inserting an irritant into the oyster rather than leaving it to nature. Imitations are by far cheaper than cultured or natural pearls, in more ways than price alone, and are completely manmade.

According to Freddy Kohn, president of the Cultured Pearl Association of America, a marked increase in cultured pearl sales across the country over the past three years has been directly related to a growing appreciation for formal weddings in the U.S.

"I think that in this day and age when things seem to be moving faster, growing larger, and selling 'harder' than most people care to admit, traditional concepts such as marriage and family life are looked upon as a basis for stability," he said.

"American brides are wearing cultured

pearls as opposed to imitation pearls, not simply because of tradition, but because cultured pearls are gems that will hold their value over time. Cultured pearls are as real and warm as brides hope their wedding day will be."
