Bells to ring: Local churches, schools and cities will mark the 200th anniversary of Washington's inauguration

Bells will peal at noon Sunday, April 30 in Grosse Pointe. Local churches, schools and city halls will join a nationwide tribute to George Washington on the 200th anniversary of his inauguration.

All over the United States, from Maine to Southern California, from Key West to Washington state, bells will ring at the same time.

Gov. James J. Blanchard has issued an executive declaration making April 30 George Washington Day and has urged all citizens to participate in local civic, historical and educational ceremonies commemorating this bicentennial observance of the first U.S. president's inauguration.

Grosse Pointe resident Ellanore Wiener is getting the word out locally about the bellringing tribute, which she calls the centerpiece of the many activities marking the 200th anniversary of Washington's inaugu-

Wiener is vice regent for Michigan for the Mount Vernon Ladies' Association and is chairwoman of publications. She also serves on the association's development and museum committees. The association owns, operates and maintains Washington's home. Mount Vernon, which is located in Virginia.

Bell ringing is a traditional honorary tribute that dates back to the 18th century.

When Washington died in 1799, bells were sounded across the nation. Today, naval vessels toll their ship's bells when they pass Mount Vernon.

"Many people still think of George Washington as he appears in the Gilbert Stuart portrait," Wiener said. "They see him as a stern, grim general. But he was a wonderful

One of her goals during the bicentennial celebration is to spread information about the human, personal side of Washington. She'd like to erase a few myths and substitute them with facts about Washington's personality, his family, his avocations and interests.

"He was a wonderful family man," she said. "He was a great farmer. He did some experimental farming at Mount Vernon. He loved Mount Vernon.

"He was very religious — an Episcopalian - yet his views were ecumenical. He loved to dance. He loved his glass of Madeira. He loved his wife and her children. He never had children of his own," she said.

School board approves layoff notices for 723

The Grosse Pointe school board unanimously adopted a resolution Monday night to notify 723 teachers, administrators, office personnel, classroom and library assistants, paraprofessionals, non-instructional supervisors, and plant and cafeteria personnel of layoffs at the end of the school year in June.

The measure was necessary according to Superintendent John Whritner, because of a severe shortfall in revenue for the 1989-90 school year due to the failure of a 25.35-mill renewal and a 2.2-mill increase on April

Grosse Pointe voters rejected the combined millage request for 27.55 by about 1,000 votes.

A special election has been set for June 12, splitting the millage request into two proposals: a renewal of 25.35 mills and an increase of 2.2 mills. Both requests are for three years.

A list of proposed cuts included middle school skills centers, the hockey program, one school nurse, the performing arts center technician, reading and writing consultants at the high school, a computer consultant, fifth-grade instrumental music, several clubs and athletic programs and high school remedial reading.

If both the 25.35-mill renewal and the 2.2-mill increase pass in June, he said, he'd recommend that the tax increase be held to 8 percent, which would allow restoration of all programs, some minor improvements and the holding of building and site projects to \$1 million.

If both are voted down, he said, "There's no school until the millage passes.'

Rufus McGaugh, social studies teacher at Brownell Middle School, expressed disappointment about the necessary layoff notices. "It puts a damper on the rest of the school year. I'm hoping the next millage will be passed, but it's difficult to make plans for next year."



chemicals cause adverse health

A walk through Grosse Pointe turns up lawn service companies working on every block. Concerned residents often spray their elm trees as well. Is the new controversy over chemicals a legitimate worry?

As with any complex subject, the answer is yes, no and maybe - and it depends upon whom you ask. Experts agree that not enough is known about many chemicals.

Vivienne Armentrout, an Ann Arbor plant pathologist, teaches low-pesticide gardening methods at Grosse Pointe Community Education.

"What the study says is nothing new," she said. "The chemicals used on ornamentals (that is, lawn and trees) are not used in agriculture.

"Because they don't affect human food, they're the lowest priority in re-testing. A lot of pesticides in use for a long time were not tested according to modern standards... As we became more educated as a nation, we realized we had to look at long-term effects.

"There's been some sort of complaint about this for years,' said Dr. Eugene Perrin of Children's Hospital, "Using them properly, it's probably not a problem. But the philosophy is

3 sites given historic markers

The Grosse Pointe Historical Society has awarded historic markers to three local sites for the third consecutive year. The bronze plaques were presented at the society's recent annual meeting at Lochmoor Country Club.

The three sites were selected by a special committee. The first, the original John Neff home, was built in 1910 and is stucco, with wood frame construction. Located at 459 Neff, it is now owned by Augustine Leto.

The second site, 570 Cadieux, was built in 1914 for Walter J. Hayes, a Michigan senator and president of the American State Bank. It's now owned by Dr. and Mrs. Jan Nyboer.

The third winner is the Grosse Pointe Academy, located at 171 Lakeshore. Originally founded in 1885 as the Academy of the Sacred Heart, the building was designed by William Schinkel, a New York architect, and is an example of the colonial revival style of architecture.

The bronze plaques, designed to be mounted in a visible spot, feature an interpretation of the society's logo, the windmill, which gave its name to Windmill Pointe.

The windmill was erected sometime before 1750 at the foot of Lakepointe in what is now Grosse Pointe Park. Until about 1800, both French habitants and Indians took their grain to this mill to be ground.


The Grosse Pointe Historical Society was founded in 1945, reorganized in 1979, and has more than 500 members.



In an April 20 front-page story, "Schools to ask voters for renewal, increase separately," Doris Cook, president of the Grosse Pointe Education Association, was explaining what might occur if voters did not renew Grosse Pointe's 25.35 mills on June 12:

She said, "We'd have gigantic classes — up in the 40s and 50s. We'd have to have a five-period day at the high school, with no lunch, no extracurricular activities such as

music, newspapers, athletics and clubs; no art, music and gym at the elementary level; an elimination of high school classes in declining areas like business education and life skills; not as many counselors, psychologists and social workers."

Concerning what might occur if the 2.2-mill increase is voted down on June 12, Cook said that schools would probably have to eliminate the extra-pay-for-extra-duty policy and specialists and consultant programs such as substance abuse counselors and science coordinators. Class sizes would probably go up from the low 20s to the high 20s; and most maintenance programs would have to be post-poned

Woods police disperse two teenage drinking parties

Two teenage drinking parties at homes in Grosse Pointe Woods were shut down by police last weekend.

Some 15 juveniles were identified by police at a party in the 1600 block of Roslyn at about 9 p.m. April 22. The resident at the home who was responsible for the party was a 17-year-old girl who told police that her parents were not home but were aware that she was having a

The other party was being held April 21 in the 1400 block of Hampton by a 16-year-old boy. Police broke up the party at about 10 p.m. and are planning to charge the 16-year-old for holding a house party in violation of a city ordinance. Some 30 teenagers were identified at the party.

The ages of the youths involved at the two parties ranged from two 14-year-old girls to one 19-year-old man. While most of the youths were Grosse Pointe Woods residents, teenagers in attendance also came from the not counting the empties. Shores, Farms, City, Harper Woods and East Detroit.

parting, the officers obtained their names, ages and addresses. Those under 17 years old and those without proper identification were transported to the Woods police station where their parents and guardians were called to come and get their

Police also notified the parents of the youths 17 and older who were identified at the parties. One 15-year-old Woods boy was found to be legally drunk after taking a sobriety test that showed an alcohol level of .13, according to police reports. Legally drunk is .10.

When officers responded to a call of a teenage drinking party on Hampton, they found about 10 youths standing in the front yard of the home drinking beer, according to the officers' reports. When the youths spotted the police, they threw down their beers and fled into the house.

Nine open beers were found strewn on the front lawn, in the shrubs and on the front porch. In all, 11 bottles of beer and 25 cans of beer were confiscated,

"There were empty beer cans and spilled beer throughout the When arriving at the homes, home, attic to basement, (in) the Woods officers told the teens every room," one officer wrote in

The first officer at the scene looked into the home through a side door of the home and saw some 20 to 30 youths drinking beer in the basement. He called for back-up units, but while he waited some of the teenagers were able to escape by jumping out a bedroom window.

A second officer arriving at the scene caught a 17-year-old girl jumping a fence after she had apparently jumped out the bedroom window. The first officer at the scene then entered the home to take control of the

While the officers were identifying the party-goers, officers saw a car containing five teenagers drive past the home three times and appeared to be hindering the police officers' efforts, according to the reports. When police pulled over the teenagers' car, the three occupants in the rear seat began stashing something, which later turned out to be alcohol, including a bottle of

The driver of the car, an 18year-old Woods man, was ticketed for having open liquor in the vehicle. Also in the car was another 18-year-old male and three females, ages 15, 16 and 17, all of Grosse Pointe Woods.

Police told the driver to imme-

diately take the 15- and 16-yearold girls home, and the officers followed to make sure they got home.

When Woods officers responded to the party complaint on Roslyn, the 17-year-old resident said she was just having a few friends over, and she denied they were drinking alcoholic beverages. She said there was not anyone present who was 21 or older, and she refused to give the officers permission to enter the home, according to the officers'

The officers then walked around the house and found a 12-pack of unopened beers outside and observed teenagers in the family room and a stack of beer cans on a table.

The resident was then told she was conducting an illegal party and those attending must leave at once. While they were leaving, the youths were identified. Eight party-goers were taken to the police station because they were under 17 or didn't have identification. All the parents or guardians were notified and had to come to the station.

According to one police report, the mother of a 15-year-girl argued with police, insisting that her daughter was not drinking. The officer informed the mother



Park approves purchase of

The Grosse Pointe Park council unanimously approved the purchase Monday night of two automatic external defibrillator units — items that will enable the public safety department to improve the scope of services offered to persons needing emergency medical care.

With a minimum of discussion and a presentation by Dr. Ron Laskowski, director of the emergency ward at Bon Secours, the council approved the expenditure of \$5,945 for each unit, one to be purchased immediately, and the other in July, so both ambulances will be equipped with one.

According to Laskowski, the unit works by computer chip. When the defibrillator is conlike an EKG machine - it can monitor the heart rhythm of the patient. If an abnormal pattern develops, it will administer a shock to the heart to get it back to a healthy pattern.

once it is connected, according to Laskowski, and improves the chances of heart attack victims five times.

Laskowski said Bon Secours Hospital will buy a monitoring unit to be kept at the hospital that records - both on paper and on cassette - the actions of the defibrillator unit while it is hooked to a patient. The records can be available to the patient's doctor later to aid in treatment.

The unit is best used when the response of emergency personnel is quick, Laskowski said. According to Richard Caretti, director of public safety in the Park, the response time to get an EMT on the scene is two minutes or less, and to get an ambulance on the scene is four minutes.

All EMTs will receive six nected - by electrodes, much hours of training on the new machine, and will receive two hours additional training four times a year.

The purchase of the defibrillator unit will not change the level of services, Laskowski said. The The unit will not work on Park would still have basic EMT

When questioned by Mayor Palmer T. Heenan, Laskowski said that because of the Park's size and proximity to hospitals, the city's basic ambulance service is more than adequate, but that the addition of the difibrillator unit would be desirable.

Caretti said the Park first dis-

cussed the machine some time ago when a private group tried to raise the money for it. When that fell through, it was pursued through the council.

"We've been working on this for over a year," Caretti said. "We're not reacting to publicity or letters to the editor.'



Perrin is the director of anatomic pathology at Children's Hospital and a professor of pathology, pediatrics and anthropology at Wayne State University. He is also active with the East Michigan Environmental Action Council and the Sierra Club.

Experts disagree as to whether tree spray or lawn spray is of greater concern.

"I see lawn (spraying) as frivolity," said environmental lawyer Karen Kendrick-Hands of the Park. "If you can walk down the block and smell the spray, if they post the lawn and tell you to keep pets off it, it's got to be a problem.

"If it's a herbicide or fungicide or pesticide, it's designed to be lethal to some level of life.

"I see more virtue in protecting elms than in spraying lawns. The lawn is a luxury, it's decadent and wasteful, an American

obsession.' Kendrick-Hands said she protects her elms with injection, not spray, and maintains her lawn with fertilizer and hand weed

In Grosse Pointe, the Farms has an ordinance requiring residents to spray their trees with methoxyclor. The Woods, Park and City have revoked their spraying ordinances, but the City still makes methoxyclor spraying available to residents at a savings. Shores officials could not be reached for this

But Davey Tree Service, a nationwide service that handles the Grosse Pointe City contract. doesn't recommend methoxyclor. If clients want to spray, the company recommends Sevin. But they prefer injection.

"The government agencies that want spraying are asking for methoxyclor," explained Thomas Mog, Davey director of environmental services. "The corporation is dropping chlorinated hydrocarbons (including methoxyclor) because of bad press. When a chemical has a poor public perception, we try to

Chemlawn replies

Not surprisingly, lawn care companies are unhappy with the report from Public Citizen. We checked with Chemlawn, the largest lawn care company in the United States.

"It's an irresponsible study," said Deb Strohmaier, public and environmental affairs manager. "It contains nothing new. It's old data there's little scientific documentation. It's based on innuendo and allegation.

Strohmaier said customers and newspaper reporters have flooded Chemlawn's phone lines with questions. The company has not lost "a significant amount" of business, she

The solutions are 93 percent water, she said, with pesticide accounting for only half a percentage point - if it is used.

"We know what to expect in the geographic locations,' Strohmaier said. "Fertilizer is applied on schedule. If there is crabgrass, pre-emergent herbicide is applied." When pesticides are used, they are specific to the pest, not broadspectrum, she said.

The company does use diazinon, a chemical banned on golf courses and sod farms. However, it is not used in waterfowl areas because it has been associated with waterfowl deaths.

Chemlawn applies whatever chemicals customers ask for. "We do counsel them," Strohmaier said, "but we do what the customer wants."

Low-pesticide alternatives It's important to figure out

What can you do to keep your lawn pretty without expensive contracts with lawn care companies? The integrated pest management approach starts with picking the right plants for your area.

For example, the white birch is susceptible to borers when grown this far south. They will require annual treatments with insecticides to keep them alive. When pests do appear, don't

One insect doesn't mean a tree must be sprayed. Some insects and diseases don't threaten the health of the plant, although they may look bad.

if you must spray, don't waste your money doing it at the wrong time. For example, dandelions don't absorb herbicides while they are in flower. There are also specific seasons for controlling grubs.

which disease or insect is causing the problem, then use the least toxic control. In trees, injection is a least-toxic approach. A thick, healthy lawn will

eliminate problems by itself by not giving weed seeds a chance to get started. The keys to a healthy lawn are improving the soil structure through aeration; fertilizing; watering; and overseeding. Seed should be scattered over the lawn and in bare spots in spring and fall. Last, don't cut the grass too short.

Privacy right claimed for local officials

ver the years, the courts have provided more protection against libel and invasion of privacy to private individuals than to public officials and public figures. But what about parttime public officials such as council members in the Pointes? Are they regarded as public officials or private individuals?

We frankly don't know whether that narrow issue ever has been tested in the courts, but we do know that several members of the Grosse Pointe Farms City Council protested after an advertisement published in this newspaper on April 13 carried home addresses and telephone numbers which in several cases did not appear in telephone directories.

Their contention was that there is a difference between full-time elected officials such as members of the Legislature, Congress and the judiciary whose public jobs constitute their careers and the part-time elected officials in the Pointes who usually have other full-time employment.

Further, in the Pointes, officials are not regarded as being on duty and on call to



their constituents 24 hours a day as are most full-time elected officials. And while local officials keep in touch with their constituents through their city hall offices and by attending council and other public meetings, they do not usually publicize their private lives, phone numbers or telephone numbers.

With crimes against people as well as property rising not only in big cities but in smaller communities as well, and with the threat of terrorism spreading worldwide, an individual's right to maintain his privacy is becoming more and more important as a protection for himself and his family. So it is only natural for part-time officials to seek to be regarded as private individuals entitled to have their privacy protected, too.

True, neither full-time nor part-time political officials are entitled to conceal private actions that affect the performance of their public duties. There are, of course,

different views about what constitutes private actions that affect a person's performance in a public office. But distinctions no doubt could be made between full-time and part-time public officials in this respect as well.

In making the distinction between public officials and public figures on one hand and private individuals on the other in a libel case, Gertz v. Robert Welch, former Associate Justice Lewis Powell said in part:

"States should retain substantial latitude in their efforts to enforce a legal remedy for defamatory falsehood injurious to the reputation of a private individual." His rationale for that opinion went this way:

The communications media are entitled to act on the assumption that public officials and public figures have voluntarily exposed themselves to increased risk of injury from defamatory falsehood concerning

"No such assumption is justified with respect to a private individual . . . He has relinquished no part of his interest in the protection of his own good name, and consequently he has a more compelling call on the courts for redress of injury inflicted by defamatory falsehood. Thus private individuals are not only more vulnerable to injury than public officials and public figures; they are also more deserving of recovery."

At any rate, there does appear to be legal justification for making a distinction between public officials and public figures and private individuals with respect to libel cases. Perhaps the same view could be extended to cases involving invasion of privacy. At any rate, we think the part-time officials in the Pointes make a good case for being treated as private individuals most of the time.

Consequently, the Grosse Pointe News apologizes to the Farms council members for permitting an advertisement to invade their privacy. In addition, the News will seek to respect their privacy and monitor future advertisements and news stories to make sure that we do so.

However, we will continue to cover and report actions by local officials when they make news either in their official or unofficial capacities, but we will try to show increased sensitivity to their desire for privacy in their unofficial lives.

Congrats to Detroit Newsmen

The Grosse Pointe News adds its congratulations to those that are raining down on two executives of The Detroit News, both residents of Grosse Pointe Farms, who have just won important promotions.

One is Louis A. "Chip" Weil III. 48. who has been president, publisher and chief executive officer of the News and who last week was named publisher of Time magazine and senior vice president of Time, Inc., the magazine's parent company, effective May 1.

The other is Robert H. Giles, 55, who has been vice president and executive editor of the newspaper and who has been promoted to succeed Weil with the title of editor, publisher and president.

Both men were executives of Gannett who came here after the newspaper chain. the largest in the United States, purchased The Detroit News in 1986. Weil, however, has a Michigan family and newspaper hackground.

He is a native of Grand Rapids and his grandfather owned the Port Huron Times-Herald. His mother was once society editor at The Flint Journal and his father is a former publisher of The Lansing State Journal and the former Grand Rapids Her-

ald. Weil himself went to Gannett from the Port Huron paper when it was sold to the chain in 1970.

Giles, executive editor of the paper since 1986, previously served as editor of the Democrat and Chronicle and the Times-Union newspapers in Rochester, N.Y., and executive editor of the Akron, Ohio, Beacon Journal. In his new position, he has said he will continue his close involvement with newsroom operations, but was uncertain about what public role he would pur-

Weil's appointment to head the nation's largest circulation general news magazine means that New York's gain becomes Detroit and Grosse Pointe's loss because Weil is moving to Time's headquarters city in taking his new post.

In New York, he will be spared further concern about the long delay in implementation of the request by The Detroit News and Free Press for a joint operating agreement under which the papers would merge their business, advertising and circulation operations, but maintain separate news and editorial staffs.

Among the 50 states, Connecticut stood No. 1 in per capita income at the end of 1988 with \$22,761, an increase of 7.4 percent since last year. In descending order after Connecticut were New Jersey, \$21,761; Massachusetts, \$20,701; Alaska. \$19,514; Maryland, \$19,314, and New York, \$19,299.

The Great Lakes region, which comprises Michigan and adjoining states, rated fourth among the eight regions with an average income per capita of \$16,161. New England at \$20,013 came in first, Middle Atlantic at \$18,904 second and the Far West at \$18,235 third. Below the Great Lakes were the Plains at \$15,495, Southwest at \$14,365, Southeast at \$14,331, and Rocky Mountain states at \$14,282.

Now if the state administration in Lansing could find some way to reduce unemployment so that Michigan no longer would show the highest rate among the 11 largest states, it could revive its old sales pitch that Michigan is really the comeback

But with another state political campaign coming in 1990, we can't be sure that we won't have the competing claims we've heard before that Michigan is really the master of its own destiny or that Michigan is really a puppet of Washington. Those competing claims, of course, depend on whether we're listening to Democrats or Republicans.

Grosse Pointe voters turned down a request April 10 by the Grosse Pointe Public Schools to levy 27.55 mills for three years for school operating expenses. The 27.55 figure represented a 2.2 mill increase. This is really a shame because some of the extracurricular activities at the schools, and also adult education classes, may not be allowed to be in the schools because they won't have the money.

This is a big mistake on the part of the voters, because they're going to hurt their own child's education. When the next vote happens, the voters had better wake up and vote yes to the millage. It may cost a little bit more money, but for your child's education I think you can afford it.

It is impossible to find out who voted against the millage. The people usually blamed are older people and parents that have kids in private schools. However, one of the attractions of Grosse Pointe is its schools. If the millage doesn't ever pass, the property values will go down. Knowing this,



"Pretty good," he yelled back, then kept walking.

There seems to be a perception on the part of some Grosse Pointe residents that teachers in our school system are paid too much. "Where else can a teacher go that pays as well as Grosse Pointe?" asks Mr. Trowern.

The answer is Troy, Bloomfield Hills and Farmington, for starters. All these districts pay teachers approximately what Grosse Pointe does, and all pay full medical benefits to their staff, as do most districts

average Grosse Pointe teacher's salary of \$42,481 is paid to someone who has taught for 22 years and who has 10 hours of education beyond a master's degree. Our school system is not run like a business, nor should it be. Our teachers are not line workers, our children are not products, and our mission is not to make the most amount of money for management.

If education is as important as we say it is, and if our children are the precious resources we describe them as, then we need to start treating the people who teach them as valued professionals, not as hourly workers whose livelihoods are targeted every time profits dip.

Thanks for addressing the issue

To the Editor:

On Monday, April 17, 1989, the Grosse Pointe Farms City Council voted to recommend for issuance the application of the Grosse Pointe War Memorial Association to seek licensure and operate under this license on a restricted basis. The association's board of directors and sponsored groups wish to thank the council and the Community Advisory Committee members for their time in addressing this issue.

There are four basic reasons the association is seeking licensure:

1. To better control the use of alcoholic beverages on the association's premises.

2. To establish one unified policy in the serving of alcoholic beverages rather than the many different procedures which must now be al-

3. To obtain liability insurance that will protect the assets of the association and its sponsored groups.

4. To handle the service of alcohol in a professional and economical manner.

Consumption of alcoholic beverages has been going on at certain functions for over 30 years. The intent of securing a license is not to expand the use of alcohol or to provide an open bar; but rather to better control its present

Corrently, without a li cense, user groups and individuals must bring in or "brown bag" their own alcoholic beverages. A license would allow the center to own the alcohol and distribute it only through one channel; therefore having better control over what is served, how much and to whom it is served. Also, liquor liability insurance may be secured only if the War Memorial owns the alcohol; and to own the alcohol, the War Memorial must be licensed.

There will never be an "open bar" nor will the character of the War Memorial change under licensure. The War Memorial has offered to enter into an agreement with the city of Grosse Pointe Farms as it pertains to the operation of this license and have the public safety department monitor these procedures. Further, the association has suggested that the Community Advisory Committee continue to meet and review annually the policies governing this license.

We feel it is our responsibility to control the distribution of alcohol at the War Memorial in order to protect the community we serve and the groups we sponsor.

The directors of the War Memorial are all citizens of the Grosse Pointes and will not take any action detrimental to the best interests of our community.

We appreciate your support and caring in our efforts and look forward to providing, as in the past, enriching opportunities for our community.

· The teenager who spent her life dying, who now looks forward to living, to finishing high school and her senior prom . . .

• The young physician,

unable to practice medicine due to his illness, now back at work helping others . . .

· The father who knows he will watch and help his children grow to adulthood.

Our lives have changed. Your gifts have brought us back from lives of sickness and pain, away from the edge of death. Our lives are precious to us and our families because we know how fragile life is. Many people are under the impression that a liquor license is needed to serve alcohol at events such as weddings, dinners, parties, etc. This is certainly not the case. As a matter of fact, liquor is being served and has been for many years with no problems whatsoever.

As it stands today, the War Memorial can set up a bar with all necessary equipment and material except the liquor. The alcohol must be furnished by the host or sponsor of the event. The beauty of this present policy is that it places the burden

of liability on the host instead of the Memorial.

At the council meeting both an attorney and an insurance agent stated that the host would be covered by his personal insurance, perhaps his homeowners, and that in all likelihood, no additional liability insurance would be needed.

So, under the present War Memorial guidelines and rules, liquor can continue to be served on the premises and they can continue to restrict our beautiful community center to residents of Grosse Pointe. It has always been the Founding Fathers' intent that the War Memorial serve only the people of the Pointes and not the entire Detroit metropolitan area. However, that is precisely what will happen if a liquor license is issued to the Grosse Pointe War Memorial. By law, the Memorial must then be made available to any and all regardless of residency.

Is this what we really want? Let it be clearly understood that liquor is being served and is available for functions at the War Memorial for residents of Grosse Pointe. What the director and the board of directors want, for a senseless reason, is a real Pandora's Box and, if they are successful, we will all live to rue the day!

Teaching is full-time job

To the Editor:

I take issue with my fellow Grosse Pointe residents, quoted in the April 20 issue, who are opposed to the millage increase and suggest that teachers should be prepared to "accept concessions." My husband and I settled in Grosse Pointe 19 years ago and our two sons both students at Brownell Middle School, are receiving fine educations here which we want to see continue.

After an 11-year hiatus, I returned to teaching full time in 1986 with a position in English at South High School. I traveled between the two high schools in '87-88 and now teach full time at North. Because of my low seniority and declining enrollment at the high schools. I will be laid off for '89-90 no matter what the vote in June. I suppose I could adopt the attitude that this millage really doesn't concern me, but it very much does and not just because I have two sons in school.

For years friends and neighbors have suggested that teachers really have it made with good vacations and the whole summer off. The implication always seems to be that teaching is not quite a full-time job. If hours in the school building with students are counted, I can understand this assumption. I would think, however, that most adults would remember their own educations enough to realize that their school day may have ended with the bell, but that their education, with preparation for the next day's assignments, did not. Teachers' days do not end when the students leave. Most of us spend many hours preparing and grading assignments. I have spent a minimum of five eight-hour days each of the last three Christmas vacations grading Writing

Michigan described as follows:

Workshop research papers. That is part of my job as are the evenings and weekends that I spend throughout the school year. This is a job I love and will miss next year in spite of these long hours of grading and preparation. Make no mistake, teaching is a full-time job that deserves full-time pay and fulltime benefits.

It is my strong belief that the board of education is requesting this increase in addition to a renewal for entirely valid reasons, and that they are doing so while practicing sound fiscal responsibility. Making necessary cuts and lay offs as enrollment declines at the high schools is a strong example of fiscal responsibility. Having to make cuts in such programs as aides, substance abuse programs and staff development because of the failure of the increase would become fiscally responsible but detrimental for students.

I strongly encourage all residents to vote for the millage renewal and the millage increase for the good of this community.

Back to basics

Wait just one minute! Why are Michigan schools having such financial problems? Isn't the profit from Lottery sales supposed to be used for education? If it isn't, what happened? The Lottery Commission just reported billions of dollars in sales. Certainly that adds up to millions, if not billions of dollars in profits. Did the proponents of the Lottery just dupe us into believing that the Lottery would be good for Michigan education? Has Lansing made the Lottery the sole support for education? Was the money that was used for education previous to the Lottery given to other programs?

An outcry from the recent millage defeat is that special programs will be lost, devastating property values. I fully support funding for special programs to help students with special needs, such as those with dyslexia. However, losing other types of special programs need not be a big blow to Grosse Pointe's students. If we look at this in a positive way, more emphasis on Readin', Ritin' & Rithmatic could result. Instead of spending money on teaching students how to tune up cars - something most will probably never have to do if they get a good education - spend that money on better books. I certainly would've liked better books when I went through the Grosse Pointe

school system. Instead I got books that were uninteresting, unimaginative, conservative, old and worn out.

If something is to capture and maintain interest, especially with TV as a rival, it has to be imaginative. I've seen better books. My cousins went through the Bloomfield Hills' public school system. I remember they had cool (sweet now) books, the kind I had wished I had to study. Wasn't the Bloomfield Hills school system recently rated as one of the best in the country?

Perhaps education in this country is suffering because of so much emphasis on special programs. We need to take a closer look at that possibility. Letter-writer Rosemary Kelly (Time to be blunt) argues that property values will be hurt if our schools have large class sizes and don't have special programs. Lectures at the University of Michigan have huge attendance, yet the quality of a Michigan degree is still high. Why? Because of the quality of the lectures. It would be nice for every family to have a swimming pool in the back yard, as it would give the family an escape from the rigors of life as well as make the property worth more, but would it benefit the family if it meant going without the basics? Likewise, how can we expect students to get a top rate core education if we don't spend most of the money on the three 'Rs'?

America is riding a wave of "Getting Back to Basics." People are abstaining from alcohol and cigarettes in greater numbers, healthy food is advertised on prime time, and people are spending more time with their families. It seems like traditional "American" family

values are the majority values again. Education needs to ride this wave. Right now they're behind it. The education community needs to get into sync with the rest of society. It needs to ride each wave that comes, but it also needs to bail out when the time is right. The last wave education rode, the liberal wave, is long past. It was useful. It made us aware of special needs. Haven't we had enough time to learn the lessons from that experience? Special programs are great, but only if they don't hurt the core curriculum.





"When the beach is out of reach," and although it cost a litthe more, people were willing to pay for the concept.

Cueter was 19 at the time. He made a tidy profit when he sold the concept.

And then he was off and run-

Taking the money he made from the sale of The Tanning Station, he developed the concept for Body Perfect, a body toning sidon. Although body toning - a way to exercise in which machines move different parts of the body - had been around for a few years, he improved on it by providing extra service for the customers, a one-stop shopping experience for the body.

'lt's such a fast-paced culture, that if you can give people everything in one place, they'll come to you," he said. "If you want it, I'll give it to you.'

For a time he was part-owner of the Uptown Lounge, a sports bar in Grosse Pointe Park. His most recent idea is Y-Not-Yogurt, a new frozen yogurt franchise. His first one opened in St. Clair Shores, and there are three more ready to open. Already there are lines at the door of the art deco yogurt shop. Cueter said none of his other ventures compare to the look of this new busi-

"I don't know if it's me, but all the businesses are successful," he said. "I think I got in it at the right time in the right place with the right concept.'

Cueter acknowledges that the concepts he has created are short-lived fads, but there is a market for them, and if he doesn't get in on it, someone else will. That is also the reason he egccessful businesses he built up.

"There are people out there who aren't willing to take the risk like I am," he said, "So they'll pay for my successful concept, which eliminates the risk."

Right now Cueter is looking for the next concept on which to capitalize. But there was a time when, if you asked him, he would have said he would be cutting lawns at 23, not setting up new franchises.

When he was 16, Cueter started a lawn service and through high school built up a solid customer base of more than 100 customers. Cueter's father, George, insisted he go to college upon graduation, so Cueter enrolled at Western Michigan University. He got his real estate license there and opened The Tanning Station the summer after his second year of school with money he saved from his land-

scaping company. He didn't look

Cueter, as vice president of his father's Cueter Investment Co. in Gresse Pointe Woods, said his position there has given him the financial security to be able to take the risks involved in opening new businesses.

Cueter also credits his father for his success.

"My father helped me a lot by not giving me anything," Cueter

said. "From day one, he said 'anything you want, you have to earn yourself.'

"He told me not to invest in The Tanning Station, but I didn't listen. I was so close to finishing it, but I needed more money and I asked him. He told me no." He eventually borrowed the money from a relative and opened the salon.

"He was right," Cueter said of his father's refusal to give him

money. "He wanted me to learn what it takes to be successful, and I think I did. I worked twice as hard to do it myself. If I would have lost it all, I would have learned something, too.

"I know now my dad respects me," he said with pride.

Cueter credits his mother with always being supportive of what he wanted to do.

He says hard work and success are in his family's genes, pointing to a number of Grosse Pointe businesses which bear the family name, including Cueter Investments, which has been operating in the Pointes for 20

The company does land development and scouting in the area for nationwide businesses.

Although some customers find it a little difficult to take the word of someone so young when investing hundreds of thousands of dollars, he is slowly building up his credibility.

"It's because the company is built on honesty, my dad's honesty, and I'm carrying it on. That's how I was brought up, and that's how my dad and his brothers were brought up.

"We were taught to work for what we want," he said. "That's the secret."

Woods approves grant projects

\$74,000 of community projects to be funded by the Community Development Block Grant progranı at its meeting April 17.

The funding breaks down to \$25,000 for a program for minor home repairs, \$34,600 for facade zone improvements on several commercial blocks of Mack Avenue, \$7,000 for Pointe Area Transportation and \$7,400 for administration.

Merchants along Mack were unhappy about the project when it was announced in December, fearing that proposed trees system to support them. Some

The Woods council approved would block motorists' view and obscure their businesses. City Administrator Clerk Chester Petersen said all the problems have been ironed out.

'We had a meeting with the business people to find an agreement," he said. "The trees will be spaced out, not just planted in front of a store." He said the trees would be tall enough for shoppers to read store signs underneath the branches.

The Mack project will include the planting of trees and other landscaping, plus the irrigation trees will also be planted between the sidewalk and the street. The work will be limited to five blocks of Mack on the west side.

Pedestrian lights which were in an earlier plan are not included. The city and the merchants will have to get together to decide an equitable way to pay for them, Petersen said.

The money allocated last Monday will be enough to complete the project. An earlier estimate of \$100,000 included other items. Nancy Parmenter





When a pitcher injures his elbow, he has a team doctor and a team of specialists in sports medicine at the nearest hospital to rely on.

When a cellist injures his wrist, until recently, the therapy hasn't been so easy to find. Teachers and coaches don't specialize in therapy, and while there have always been surgeons, there hasn't been a lot in the way of advice short of sur-

A new center developed by doctors at Henry Ford Hospital will deal specifically with injuries suffered by performing artists. Plans are formulated, equipment is ordered, and the first seminar was held in March.

This isn't the first such center in the United States, but it is the first in Detroit and one of a rare breed nationwide. The doctors feel they are on the cutting edge of a new era.

'Ten years from now, we'll look at performing arts medicine the way we look at sports medicine now," said Dr. Michael Benninger, an otolaryngologist who is in charge of the voice section of the new clinic. "It will be just

First the doctors have to find a hoarse. way to lift the veil of secrecy surrounding performing artists' injuries. In the cutthroat world of the arts, to reveal an injury is to show a weakness.

"People don't broadcast their the flute to their mouths. problems," said Dr. Gary Chodoroff, a specialist in physical medicine and rehabilitation who tends to the instrumentalists. 'There's a lot of stress because they could lose their position. The person next to them could challenge them on a difficult piece if they know the shoulder

"It's different from athletes. If a tight end twists his knee, you say poor guy. If a violinist hurts his shoulder, they say his technique is bad.'

The word is spreading in the artistic community, however, and eventually the doctors hope to hold monthly clinics at Henry Ford, at the Henry Ford satellite in Sterling Heights, and possibly at Grosse Pointe's Pearson Clinic as well.

Performing artists' injuries tend to be chronic and resulting from overuse, rather than sudden or acute, according to ChodoSingers and speakers go

Violinists have shoulder problems.

With cellists, it's the wrists. Flutists develop neck and shoulder tension from holding

Bass players have lower back pain and pianists' hands cramp. And we've all heard about ballerinas' feet.

Actually, dancers are more prone to the sudden injury than other performers.

Dr. Sheldon Cohn is an or-

"I've seen people who dropped a table on their toe," he said. dancer." More frequently, Cohn they're artists, not athletes. treats dancers with knee and foot injuries.

The center also has a nutritionist and psychologist to treat general health and performance anxiety, which Cohn said is more common than one would expect.

In all the artistic disciplines, treatment focuses first on medication, therapy and "relative rest," rather than surgery. "We try to keep them going by cutting back on stressful activities," Cohn said.

If you make your living with your voice, that might mean to stop talking over ambient noise on a plane or in a nightclub. Stay out of smoky rooms. Don't yell at your kids.

In other words, "take the voice abuse out of your social life,' Benninger said. "We rarely recommend total rest. That would be like telling you to take off work for six months."

"Sometimes it causes sparks." Actually, the doctors say, a number of their patients are teachers and coaches, many of whom are very interested in alternative techniques for themselves as well as their students.

The center is already getting attention from the performing arts community, which sometimes asks the doctors to stand by during performances. Nobody has offered them season tickets yet, but Cohn said Michael Jackson wanted Benninger on hand for his Detroit appearances.



Rathbun Memorial Fund to benefit from South's eighth annual Art Festival

Grosse Pointe South High School's eighth annual Art Festival, sponsored by South Mothers' Club and the art department, will feature artwork by students and alumni in Cleminson Hall from Tuesday, May 2 through Friday, May 5.

Nearly 300 pieces of award-winning student work representing about 150 student artists—drawings, paintings, ceramics, jewelry, sculpture, photography, fibers and met als—will be exhibited and many pieces will be for sale.

In addition, for the first time in the eightyear festival history, alumni artwork will be on display and for sale.

Twenty percent of the proceeds from student work and 100 percent of the proceeds from alumni work will go to the Robert R. Rathbun Memorial Fund.

Rathbun was chairman of South's art department at the time of his death in 1987. The inclusion of alumni work in this year's festival was the idea of Peter Hannert, an alumnus who is pursuing an art degree at Parson's in New York.

Grosse Pointe artist Greg Tisdale will also exhibit a print of one of his paintings, courtesy of Gallerie 454. A percentage of the proceeds from the sale of the print will be donated to the Rathbun Memorial Fund.

Chairwoman for the festival is Judy Mitchell. Barb Gruenwald, chairman of the art department, represents the faculty.

A surprise reception honoring South art instructor Jack Summers was held April 17 in conjunction with preparations for the festival Summers has been teaching at South since 1968, and is responsible for beginning the photography program at South.


According to Gruenwald, Summers' superior teaching abilities are reflected in the achievements of his students. Of 18 portfolios sent to New York for judging, Gruenwald said that seven were Summers' students.



Physical violence: A common occurrence at local schools?

By Margle Reins Smith

Staff Writer Physical violence in local high schools is not perceived as a big problem by assistant principals at Grosse Pointe North and Grosse Pointe South.

At least one parent takes the opposite point of view.

The mother of a South student wished to remain anonymous because she feared her son might suffer retaliation by his assailants

"There's lots of teen violence." she said. "The community needs fights when they hear they're

to know the frequency of vio- brewing. lence (by teenagers) in the Grosse Pointes.

She said her son was recently assaulted in school and required a trip to a hospital emergency room for treatment of a fractured nose, broken teeth and facial bruises and abrasions.

"A teacher who witnessed this referred to it as a vicious assault," she said.

Both assistant principals said they do their best to head off

"If we get wind of a fight before it happens, we call the kids down to the office and try to head it off," said South Assistant Principal Bernard LeMicux, "It almost always works.

LeMieux said fighting is the No. 2 reason for student suspensions at South. (Skipping Saturday detention is No. 1.1 During the first semester of the 1988-89 school year, he said 13 students were suspended for fighting.

The South mother said that a

enough to punish premeditated physical violence by a student.

"The student who assaulted my son had a five-day holiday and the punishment was over. We were not satisfied. We're terribly disappointed in the school. They have an obligation to keep children safe and secure while they're in school.'

She suggested that any child or adult who knowingly chooses to commit a crime on school grounds should not be allowed to participate in extracurricular activities or commencement activi-





imal and human teeth, not wood."

More facts about Washington, according to Wiener:

• George probably chopped down a cherry tree at some point during his life. But the tale about the cherry tree and George's youthful honesty is legend, purely the imagination of Mason Weems, an early biographer. The legend was included as a moral lesson in the McGuffey Reader, a textbook used by most 19th century schoolchildren, and it has persisted.

• George could never have hurled a silver dollar across the Potomac River, which was a mile and a quarter wide at the alleged location. The source of the legend was probably the memoirs of one of Martha Washington's grandsons. He wrote that Washington once threw a piece of slate about the size and shape of a dollar across the Rappahannock River near Fredericksburg, Va. The Rappahannock, at that point, is about 250 feet wide. A hefty throw, but not impossible.

 Washington was not an extraordinarily wealthy man. Although he owned a great

deal of land, he was usually short of ready cash. His duties as general and president kept him from devoting the time needed to run a profitable plantation. In fact, he had to borrow money for the journey from Mount Vernon to New York for his inaugu-

The Mount Vernon Ladies' Association is the oldest national historic preservation organization in America, Wiener said.

"It's astonishing how many people don't know who takes care of Mount Vernon. It's not the federal government, not the department of parks."

The historic estate attracts more than a million visitors a year who pay \$5 to see where George Washington lived, to stroll the grounds of his estate, and to see where he is buried.

Until about five years ago, she said, not a cent of government of public money was used for Mount Vernon's upkeep.

Wiener said that, as part of the bicen-

tennial celebration of Washington's inauguration, there will be a reinactment of his eight-day journey from Mount Vernon to New York City, the nation's first capital.

"Someone will play the part of George Washington and the journey will end on April 30, with a reinactment of the inauguration at Federal Hall on Wall Street, with President George Bush and several former presidents in attendance."

Wiener will be there and will take part in most of the festivities planned by the Mount Vernon Ladies' Association.

She recommended a book about Washington published by the association in 1942, which has recently been reprinted.

"It's a wonderful book - excerpts from Washington's letters and speeches that give a total picture of the man. It's called 'Maxims of George Washington.' Gerald Ford wrote the foreward. To order the \$7.98 softcover book, write to the Mount Vernon Ladies Association, Mount Vernon, Va. 22121.

It's difficult to review something as deeply entrenched in American literature as Eugene O'Neill's stunningly moving semi-autobiographical play, "A Moon for the Misbegotten.'

"Moon," which details a onenight unconsummated love affair, has been called the finest love story in American dramatic literature. Indeed, there isn't too much else like it either in plot or in the lyric quality of the language.

And there isn't much available like the Attic Theatre's production of the show. The acting is passionate, the directing and pacing are just right and the set is remarkable in its simplicity.

But even with all the elements in place, there is something missing - the heart. Financing the future

New, not-for-profit organization helps give kids something to remember — and learn

Remember your fifth grade
field trip? That bright May
day when you boarded the
school bus clutching your
brown-bag tuna salad sandwich and Twinkie and wondered what delights awaited
you at the Detroit Zoo or the
Institute of Arts?

It's exactly that sort of memory – the excitement and wonder of an educational field trip – that led two veterans of the Detroit communications field to form a not-for-profit organization whose goal is to provide funds for field trips for Detroit children who would not otherwise be able to experience such activities.

InSite Horizon Field Trips Inc. is a volunteer organization officially formed in January. It boasts an advisory council of educators, community leaders and representatives of Detroit area cultural institutions. InSite will raise funds for bus trips for Detroit school children in grades

three through six.

LIKE MANY people who volunteer their time to similar philanthropic causes, organizers of InSite are reluctant to take credit for the creation of the project.

"There are no new ideas," laughs Lee Murray, one of the founders of InSite and a long-time Detroit-area public relations consultant and writer. "I think this all started with Walter Green's 'School Wheels for Art and Science' program in the schools a few years back.

"Then when I did public relations for the Detroit Science Center, I initiated the bus fund, which is still going. That's where volunteers raised funds to bring kids on buses to the Science Center," Murray adds.

"I guess it just seemed like one of the world's greatest ideas to expand it to many cultural and educational venues. We got inspired and started kicking it around."

ONE OF THE people Mur-

ray discussed the notion with was Norah M. Williams of Grosse Pointe Shores. Williams recently retired from her position as manager at Michigan Bell. She serves on the boards of several organizations and is active in many civic efforts.

Williams and Murray were old Detroit Press Club friends. It seemed natural, Murray says, to get Williams in on the ground floor of InSite.

"It's something she thought I'd be interested in because of my love for the city of Detroit and for children," Williams explains. "She was right. Lee and I are kids at heart and we both thought it would be fun to do something for Detroit school children.

"Both of us, of course, vividly remembered all the wonderful places we went as kids ... and the benefit we received from taking those field trips."

The pair felt that conditions were right to build an organization which would send kids

on trips: There was no money budgeted in Detroit for school field trips. And the buses were usually idle after dropoff time in the mornings.

"The benefits to the children are obvious and enormous. But the benefits to the cultural center and the business community are also tremendous," Williams explains.

"If we can get kids in this age group—third through sixth grade—to experience what the cultural center and the business community offer, their lives would be so much more enriched. And we need to remember that we have to have that base of trained, educated and experienced people to backfill with in the future," Williams adds.

SHE TOO traces the origin of InSite to the School Wheels for Art and Science program started by Green, chairman of ElectroNetics and retired vice president of community affairs at the National Bank of Detroit, and used by the Detroit schools for two years, before funding ran out. Green is another of the founders of InSite.

The three, joined by cofounder and board of directors member Mary Duncan, supervisor of school social work services for the Detroit Public Schools, pulled the program together about a year ago, but had to wait until the first of this year for not-for-profit status to be awarded.

Mary Shapero, president of Shapero-Gordon Associates and a professional fundraiser, joined InSite's team of advisors, which includes represent-

InSite got letters of en doresement from the superintendent of Detroit Schools as well as city councilwoman Irma Henderson. The goahead came from the schools' transportation department, which told the founders that if they could get the funds, the buses would roll.

"Then we had to get around to determining the program content," Williams says. "We had to decide what the kids would see, how teachers would prepare them for the trip and how we could follow it up with an evaluation. We wanted to make sure that this program would have merit for the children . . . and for us."

Budgeting was next, with seed money coming from Michigan Bell, the Detroit Free Press Charities, New Detroit and the Lillian and Karl Scott Fund.


With that in place, Murray and Williams, et al, decided to establish a pilot program for the first year. One school, Loving Elementary, was chosen and funds pledged to send children in grades three through six to the Detroit Zoo, Belle Isle Aquarium, Fort Wayne Museum, the Children's Museum, the Detroit Library and the People Mover.

"We decided to establish a small pilot program for this year because we're getting started so late in the academic year," Williams explains.

"We want a well-managed, well-controlled program in order to accurately evaluate the strength and benefit of the program in its first year.

"That's important because if people are asked to contribute, they should know what

they are contributing to."

and for some October trips for Loving School. There is also enough money to begin to develop a directory of information on field trip sites which will be available for educa-

"This is a very important part of InSite," Williams says. "The directory will be catalogued according to sites, such as business, cultural, financial, etc., and according to activities appropriate for each grade.

"Ideally, it will build upon itself. Eventually, we can take third graders to visit a hospital to see what a custodian does and bring them back in the sixth grade to observe what a technician does.'

For both Murray and Williams, their work with InSite is a labor of love. Each is involved in professional and community work and getting this new project off the ground is time-consuming.

"We're all working people. We can't spend enough time working on what we love --InSite — because we have to work," Murray explains. "I can see where, six months from now, we'll have to get some paid professional help to do the actual day-to-day work.

"If we can get that sort of funding and help, there's no reason why we can't achieve our eventual goal: To give each child in the Detroit school system an educational field trip each year," Murray

Right now, 250 children will benefit in the May, June and October program. The 1989-90 target is to benefit three schools, 20 classes and 750 children at an average of six trips per child. InSite hopes to expand the program to 10 schools, 70 classes, 2,500 kids and six trips per child by 1990-91.

The response to InSite has been wonderful, Williams says. "The schools are unbelievably enthusiastic about it and I run into an increasing number of people who will stop me on the street and ask to contribute.

"I think they know that it's a huge return for a small investment.

WILLIAMS WON'T be able to accompany Loving School kids on their first field trip, set for next month. She'll be out of town, visiting grandchildren. "But I'll be on that

next one. It's just so important to me to do this for our children. And all children are our children. The richest inheritance we can leave them is what they become," Williams says.

There's been a lot of interest among volunteers to not only participate in InSite's fundraising, but to actually help out on field trips. "It's amazing to me that so many people what to be on that bus and watch those kids' faces," Williams adds.

Right now, though, InSite needs the kind of volunteer support of those able to devote their time and efforts to the sometimes-tedious work of fundraising, mailing and making trip arrangements by phone.

"I've seen how important this is to adults, whose faces light up at the memory of their own field trips," Murray says. "And right now, we need people who are serious about volunteering.

"And serious about making the faces — and the lives — of our children, light up, too."





Real hope for repair

This morning the faucets in my bathroom reminded me of my brother-in-law. Please don't jump to any conclusions about "drip" or "screw-loose." Don has always been more than OK by me. And he is a very talented and industrious professional counselor and teacher.

No, my mind as usual works in strange ways. It was while crouching beneath the sink to turn off the water supply prior to the repair, that I thought of Don.

You see, I have never crouched without great discomfort. My legs just aren't hinged for it. Don's are. He folds in remarkable places. I guess my children inherited that talent through their mother. They resemble more the flexibility of their uncle than their father. But even in our family there are so many variations on the theme.

We need every talent, every person doing what he/she can. We need you. We need your neighbor.



Reduce the impact of aging on memory

Throughout our lifetime, we will store about one quadrillion pieces of information in our memories. It's easy to see how one can forget where keys were left now and then.

But that doesn't mean you're losing your memory, said Donald Bignotti, M.D., a Bon Secours Hospital staff physician certified in geriatrics and specializing in dementia.

"As we get older, the reflexes that allow the recall of information get slower just like other reflexes," he said. "But a lot of what is called loss of memory is really impatience on the part of people waiting for the informa- mine if there is a conflict.

But for most people, forgetful ness is an annoyance, not a serious handicap. Along with alcohol and depression, some medications can slow down the memory, Bignotti said. If you think your medications are causing forgetfulness, you should bring all of them, both prescription and over-the-counter drugs, to your doctor so he or she can deter-

Rituals

Some people have become chronic hand washers and others will vacuum the carpet once a day, every day.

Rituals for some have become an obsession. Athletes, whether they admit it or not, are probably the biggest fanatics on routines. Some put on the left sock first, others prefer to wear a certain name brand shoe, and yet others favor eating the same meal on game

Where's the cuspidor?

Superstitions begin to surface, thoughts of blunders and mishaps enter the picture when one portion of the ritual is neglected. If the routine is fulfilled, then everything generally goes accordingly.

Something for everyone

Rituals don't just occur in neighborhood or varsity games.

The big money players also find solace in a pregame ceremony. Wade Boggs (OK when I mention his name you think of Margo Adams) eats chicken before every game. Maybe that's why he's been the batting champion several times. Either that, or his ritual was having Margo around.

It's fun to watch certain people do eccentric things. High jumpers always count steps to the bar; if by chance one step is not accounted for, the jump may be aborted or postponed.

Ball players like to take a certain amount of practice swings, dig a ditch in the batter's box, tug on a jersey or yank once or twice on the batting gloves.

A ridiculous theory that I still follow, is the unwritten rule that baseball players are not supposed to step on the foul line. I don't know what would happen if a player does, but I'm not willing to find out.

Perhaps a bit more gross than spitting, is the superstition of not washing certain clothes.

Many coaches will wear the same pair of shorts if their team continues to win. Losing is the only way the clothes get washed. Some, believe it or not, even go months without washing socks if the ritual calls for it. Undgergarments, it is hoped, are washed more frequently.

Rituals are a chronic obsession that could reflect a player's success. We may laugh at some of the things people do, we may dispute some of the things, but we accept them as part of sports.

The playoffs not only revealed the team's ability, but as an individual Ayrault became more marketable.

"After a while our team goals became higher," Ayrault said.

goals became higher because I believed that each time we advanced it would give them (college coaches) more confidence in

On April 2, Ayrault learned that he'd be one of 20 Class A players competing in the all-star

"I was very surprised when coach told me," he said. "Just to be nominated was nice. It's a weird feeling for me because I didn't think I had that good of a season."

Modestly, however, Ayrault realized that his 12.7 points per game and team-high 187 rebounds was as good a season as he expected.

"I know I had a good season," he said, "but I didn't know it was that good. I was an Honorable Mention all-state and that was a nice honor but to play in the all-star game is quite spe-

His coach for two years, Petrouleas agrees that Ayrault has been selected for all the right

"It's well deserved," he said. "It's a once in a lifetime opportunity for him and he'll always be able to reflect on it.

"Andy is aggressive and plays with a lot of intensity. I'm very pleased for him."

Ayrault, who will be playing AAU summer basketball, is content with his choice to attend Wayne. As any recruit, however, he had a tough decision to make.

Orchard Lake St. Mary's, along with four Division I colleges, campaigned hard to attract Ayrault, but Wayne's size

"Basketball's strong at Orchard Lake," Ayrault said, "and it's nice there. The people are nice, also, but I don't think I could make the adjustment going from South to a smaller school.

"South is a big school and so is Wayne," Ayrault continued. "I think I'll have an easier time adjusting to Wayne, plus I'll be close enough to home to come back for weekends and meals."


As a junior, Ayrault began receiving contact letters from colleges. In his final prep season the mail increased, but his mind was made up.

"I kind of knew halfway through the season that that's where I wanted to go," Ayrault said. "They have some great competition in the GLIAC (Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference) and Wayne has a great program. It's going to be tough to play in that league because the competition is so strong.

Going from a starter in high school to a possible substitute in college may not sit well with some, but Ayrault is prepared if that happens.

"When you're in seventh or eighth grade, you think you can do anything," he said. "I can remember dreaming about making the pros someday, but then in ninth grade I sat the bench and didn't play hardly at all. It was tough for me, but I also think I learned a lot from it. I'm just excited to be able to play basketball for Wayne.'

But not before he attempts to shine in the all-star game.


