Pit bull ruling delayed sufficient, then a trial with wit-

A decision to throw out a Woods ban on pit bulls and related breeds has been delayed by the judge ruling on its constitutionality

Judge Kaye Tertzag of the Wayne County Circuit Court has set a date of Oct. 16 to rule on the merits of the ordinance, according to George Catlin, Woods city attorney. The delay is due to a backload of cases, he said.

The ordinance, adopted by the Woods City Council Oct. 3, 1988, states that pit bulls and related breeds are banned within the

city limits.

Specifically, the ordinance bans bull terriers, pit bull terriers, Staffordshire bull terriers, American Staffordshire bull terriers, American pit bull terriers or any related breed.

The ordinance also bans any dogs which have the appearance or possess any characteristics of any of the above breeds.

The ordinance is being challenged by Woods resident and pit bull owner Rosemary Mulleavy, Catlin said.

If Judge Tertzag decides that briefs filed by representatives of Mulleavy and the city are not

nesses and experts will be held.

Since the adoption of the emergency pit bull ban last October, two Woods residents have been ticketed for harboring the animals. One of the tickets was voided by the city after the dog died. The other was mistakenly given to a man in reaction to the pit bull owned by Mulleavy.

Under the ordinance, Woods officers have the power to impound suspected animals until the court has determined whether the animals are a member of one of the banned breeds.





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\$1,000 reward offered for arrest of oil spiller One official says county knows who did it

Several tips have been called in since a \$1,000 reward was offered last week for information leading to the arrest of those responsible for dumping the hundreds of gallons of asphalt in the Milk River sewer system.

Also, an unconfirmed report from a Grosse Pointe Woods official states that the county knows who dumped the asphalt into a storm sewer, but the official did not state who the suspected person or company was.

Wayne County Public Works Director James Murray, the senior county official handling the investigation of the oil spill, could not be reached to confirm whether the county does in fact know who the dumper was.

Meanwhile, officials for Citizens Crime Watch, the organization offering the reward, are urging anyone with information to call its 24-hour hotline at 1-800-8222-911. All callers remain anonymous and the reward will be paid if the caller's tip leads to an arrest. The reward is not dependent upon conviction.

"We don't want to know who they (the tipsters) are," said Sandy Howard, program coordinator for Citizens Crime Watch. "We don't even want to know their association with them (the crime suspects being reported). We don't even ask. As long as we can get them (criminal suspects) off the street. That's what counts.'

Howard said this is the first oil-spill case in which the organization has offered a reward. She said the Southfield-based organization normally offers rewards for violent-crime suspects, such as for rape, murder, major thefts and those on the FBI's and Detroit's 10 most wanted lists.

The decision to offer the reward in the oil spill was made by retired Oakland County Sheriff Johannes Spreen, who is now program director of Citizens Crime Watch.

Comparing the Milk River spill with the infamous Alaskan Exxon catastrophe, Spreen said. This is not a guy who was drunk. This was a deliberate act. I feel badly about this because I am sort of an environmentalist."

He said he read accounts of the Milk River spill in the newspapers and believed the action of dumping the asphalt into a storm sewer and the criminal action of not reporting it warranted the organization to offer an award.

On June 1, county officials began clean-up operations at the pump station at Parkview and Marter in Grosse Pointe Woods. Officials said up to 1,000 gallons of a tar-like emulsion used in into a storm drain serving the Milk River drainage area, which

includes Grosse Pointe Woods, Harper Woods and a portion of southeastern Macomb County.

About 200 gallons of the asphalt emulsion escaped over the pump stations outdoor retention basin and into the remaining Milk River channel that empties in the Woods' municipal park. The bottoms of boats in the harbor became covered and stained with oil residue.

While county officials are investigating the spill, those at Citizens Crime Watch hope the anonymous reward will convince someone to come forward.

"There are always people who know something," Spreen said, "and I'm sure somebody knows who did this.'

Howard explained that all callers' identities are protected asphalting roads was dumped by Citizens Crime Watch, which was founded in 1987. She said the organization doesn't even

Each caller is given a number. When an arrest is made, the caller notifies Citizens Crime Watch and arrangements are made for paying the \$1,000 reward. Howard would not go into details how the payment transaction is made, but she emphasized the anonymity is maintained throughout the process. Even if the caller volunteers his name, it is not used or given to police.

As soon as a tip is called in, Citizens Crime Watch notifies the appropriate authorities. Howard and Spreen said the organization has an excellent working relationship with law enforcement officials and agencies throughout the state.

One reason for the organization's good rapport with law enforcement is that Spreen has



2 tax-boost options called 2 small mice

fter months of attempts to reform Michigan's system of financing publacktrianglelic education, the Legislature appears to have produced two small mice, which surely is one way to describe the two tax-hike options that the solons have voted to put on the ballot next Nov. 7.

Proposal A would raise the state sales tax from 4 percent to 4.5 percent, use the \$400 million in new revenue to bolster the school aid fund, slightly raise the per-pupil expenditures in the state's poorer school districts but provide no property tax relief.

Proposal B would raise the sales tax from 4 percent to 6 percent, increase state aid to schools about \$468 million a year and cut homeowners property taxes 37 percent on the average and business taxes about 22 percent.

In addition, it would impose a statewide 14-mill tax on business property and 9 mills on residential and agricultural property with the revenue to be distributed among the districts. Local districts would have the option of approving 4 additional mills in the future.



Neither plan appears to do much to close the gap in per-pupil spending between the wealthier and the poorer districts, which presumably was one of the reasons the Legislature began considering revisions of the school financing plan in the first place.

The reason we describe the options as mice is that neither one appears to have enough strength to win state passage. We think it is ridiculous for the legislators to offer both proposals to the public when they themselves were unable to agree on which is the better route to go.

In fact, a third alternative still exists which might be called the Engler plan. Sen. John Engler, the Mount Pleasant Republican who is the Senate majority leader and is expected to challenge Gov. James Blanchard next year, thinks the Legislature should use most of an anticipated \$300 million surplus to beef up school financing.

Engler is not going to support either of the legislative options and instead will

urge the defeat of both. He thinks the Legislature passed the buck to the people by approving both proposals. He obviously also thinks he has a ready-made issue on which to challenge Gov. Blanchard who supports Proposal A.

News reports indicate that the Michigan State Chamber of Commerce will campaign against both proposals while the Michigan Manufacturers Association reportedly will support the plan calling for a half-cent increase in the sales tax. The Michigan Education Association is expected to support one of the two options but has not yet decided which it would be.

With the legislators as well as the special interests already divided to such an extent, it is unlikely that either of the ballot options will be enacted. If that turns out to be an accurate prediction, Engler will have been right in saying that the Legislature passed the buck on the school spending reform issue back to the people.

But if the governor's leadership on the

controversial issue can be faulted, so, too, must be Engler's leadership except, perhaps, by those, such as the members of the Chamber of Commerce, who oppose any increase in any kind of taxes for schools at

With two options on the ballot in November, voters will be able to cast their ballots for or against one or both proposals. If both win a majority, which currently appears to be unlikely, the plan with the largest number of voters would become

While the impact of the plans on the Grosse Pointe district is not yet clear, The Detroit News reported that the current Grosse Pointe District rate of 31.35 mills would be reduced to 26.72 mills under Proposal B. If the report is accurate, the district later would have the option of voting up to another four mills in taxes, which would bring the total to 30.72 mills. However, neither figure includes the 2.2 mill increase just voted on June 12.

Just what position the school board will take on the proposals is not yet known. Proposal A does not appear to affect the district much if at all, but Proposal B would cap the current property millage levy and might also cost the district some of the state aid it now receives. Under the circumstances, it is doubtful the board would support Proposal B unless it provides benefits to Grosse Pointe that are not known at the present time.

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Grosse Pointe honors Arnie

True, it had been a great week for sports in Detroit with the Pistons returning home with their National Basketball Association championship and the Detroit Grand Prix attracting huge crowds. But Pointers and other Michiganians who long have savored the role the Country Club played in starting Palmer on his notable career were delighted to see and applaud him again.

The occasion was the dedication of a plaque near the 18th hole which was memorable for two shots Palmer made in winning the 1954 championship. In the semifinals, he saved par by making a miraculous chip shot that enabled him to play extra holes to enter the final round. In the finals against Robert Sweeney, Palmer played a fabulous four-iron 14 feet

from the hole on the same 18th green. For Palmer, that victory was the key that made 1954 the turning point in his life, he told a crowd of 500 well-wishers that included old friends, fellow competitors from the 1954 tournament and golfing addicts from the Country Club. In 1954, he met and later eloped with Winnie, now his wife of almost 35 years, and turned professional after gaining his first major title

Now gray, nearing his own 60th birthday and a father himself who is playing chiefly on the Senior Tour, Palmer seemed to enjoy reliving the events of 1954 as much as his hosts did. And like most golf tournaments and exhibitions, the dedication served two worthy causes in addition to memorializing a notable event for golfers. The event was also a fundraiser for Cottage Hospital's expanded Physical Therapy department and the Evans Scholarship Fund at the Country Club.

The wave of the future?

s a result of the success it claims in a test program, Whittle Communi-Cations expects to offer a daily 12minute, advertising-sponsored TV news broadcast under the name of Channel One to public schools throughout the country starting next year.

The proposal sounds innocuous but some educators, researchers and school administrators in various states have raised questions about the idea of selling news to students through advertising just as programs aimed at the general public do.

In fact, New York state through the state Board of Regents has just voted unanimously to prohibit commercially sponsored television programs in the public schools. The regents said the Channel One program would violate the state constitution's provisions against using school property for private gain.

In California, another small roadblock to the Whittle program was erected. The superintendent of education declared that if public schools accept the Whittle broadcasts, they would lose a small amount of state aid, the equivalent of two minutes' worth a day which corresponds to the length of the commercials in the news pro-

In Michigan, Detroit's Mumford High School took part in the test and the reception appeared to be favorable but some of the approval seemed to be based on Whittle's offer to loan video recorders, television sets and other equipment to the participating schools.

Some supporters of the Whittle idea have said that they see little difference between the Channel One plan and newspapers and magazines which offer students free or cut rate subscriptions to publications used in the classroom. One critic said, however, that the Whittle contract requires that students be shown the commercials while students are not required to

The Whittle firm, which is partly owned by Time magazine, stresses the hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of satellite and video equipment it would lend to the schools. There's no doubt about that appeal in view of the fiscal difficulties that prevent many schools from acquiring such equipment on their own.

The more important questions, however, are whether the commercial sponsorship of daily TV news broadcasts in the schools will tend to increase the commercial content of other school programs, give an unfair advantage to advertisers who win spots on the Whittle program and offer advertisers a captive youth audience that is unlikely to be as well-informed or as critical as adult viewers are.

The jury is still out on those questions but one answer was provided by a New York regent, Mimi Levin Lieber, who said: "It's hard to believe that the media center of the world cannot find a way to provide kids with first-class news broadcasts that are not interrupted with commercial endorsements.'

Whittle contends that students who watched its Channel One programs scored better on current affairs tests than students who had not watched them but a Columbia Journalism Review experiment showed no gains for Channel One viewers on such tests.

More important, the Review's researcher also warned, "Rather than whetting teenagers' appetite for news, Channel One may further blunt their tolerance for complexity." And, she concluded, "Kids who are fed a diet of cotton candy are not likely to develop a taste for whole wheat.'

That's not much of a recommendation for Channel One even though it is being sold as part of the wave of the future in educa-



Defeat school amendment in fall

Our fears have been realized. The legislature placed two constitutional amendment questions on the ballot, one of which has the potential of destroying our schools

I fought the proposal as many ways as I could, trying to amend it and working, speaking and voting against it. We were not even allowed to speak on amendments or get votes on them. The skids were greased.

This latest and last proposal would submit to the voters two mutually exclusive ballot questions. The first would be a halfcent for education, pure and simple. That one is not a problem for our schools, but it also pro-

vides no property relief. The second issue on the ballot is the problem. It is a 2 cent sales tax and property tax revision proposal concocted by Reps. Oxender and Nye, only the latest version is even worse. The "old" Oxender-Nye proposal was awful for Grosse Pointe. It would have taken away our ability to raise sufficient local revenue to fund our schools at whatever level we chose, but it at least allowed us to vote 4 mills beyond state mandated mills and to vote a local income tax for our schools. But part of our property tax, a major part, would go to the state. The new proposal is even worse because it deleted the income tax option, so we would have less ability to main-

tain excellence locally. The terrible aspect, however, of the Oxender-Nye proposal. Amendment 2 in what the legislature passed, is the jeopardy it placed us in, that the legislature could deny us state aid on which we would be made dependent by the amendment, or worse, a court might order the state to see to it that no district has any more resources than any other. That would be the end of excellence and educational leadership and the beginning of a terrible universal mediocrity.



The commission sold 140 shade and ornamental trees to residents at its annual tree sale. this year. The trees are sold to the residents at cost

Another 175 street trees were planted by the city on the rights of way between the curb and sidewalk in residential areas. Also, 30 trees were planted in Patterson Park.

The Beautification Commission's tree program has been in operation for five years and has added close to 1,000 trees to Grosse Pointe Park, Abbs said.

The varieties of trees planted this year include ash, linden and maple. Some of the unusual types of trees included Hedge maple and Golden Rain trees and two new zelkova varieties: Village Green and Green Vase. In all 15 varieties were planted in the city to provide diversity and to meet varying planting sit uations.

All the trees selected are known for their hardiness in the

Pointes, where the lake moderates temperatures and allows for a greater variety of trees, Abbs said. He said the lake effect enjoyed here is similar to what makes the west side of the state a good place to grow fruit. While most of Michigan is in the Zone 4 planting area, the land along Lakes St. Clair and Erie and the west coast of Lake Michigan is classified Zone 5, which is the typical of southern Illinois, Indiana and Ohio.

At the spring tree sales, the Beautification Commission offers a couple of trees, usually a shade tree variety and an ornamental tree. This year, Winter King hawthorns, which bear a bright red miniature fruit into the winter months, and zelkovas were sold.

Abbs, who describes himself as a "tree nut," is quite proud of how zelkova trees have done in the Pointes. He said that several years ago he donated a zelkova tree to Bon Secours Hospital, which is across the street from his home on Cadieux. At the time, everyone said the zelkova wouldn't grow in the Pointes, but Abbs proved them wrong and the zelkova at Bon Secours thrived.

Zelkovas were planted as a street tree for the first time in the Park in 1988 and thrived despite last summer's drought.

Abbs said the Park administration and City Council deserve credit for allowing the Beautification Commission to experiment and plant a wide variety of trees that will add to the yearround beauty of the Park.


Abbs said another member of the commission who works to promote trees in the Park is Al Mazur. He said Mazur is the elm

expert who has helped protect and save the remaining elms which were such an important part of Grosse Pointes.

While trees are Abbs and Mazur's main interests, Abbs is quick to point out that the Beautification Commission is not a two-man show. He said all members help out with distributing trees during the annual tree sale and with the Arbor Day Awards.

Abbs sometimes gets disappointed to see trees dying in the Park for lack of care. He said most cases of dead trees are on property where the lawns receive little attention.

"It's the care a tree gets that makes a difference," Abbs said.



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Valet parking to be regulated in Farms

The Farms City Council adopted an ordinance June 12 regulating valet parking services and their attendants.

Richard Solak, city clerk, said the action was taken because there are aspects of valet parking that the city will want to control. He added that citizen concerns for the Hill area and other areas in the future were taken into account when drafting the new ordinance.

The new ordinance requires all valet services to hold a current license, which must be granted by the council.

Before a license can be granted, a public hearing must

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be publicized and held for council members to consider public

Before a license is granted, the council will consider the number of valet services in operation within the city, proposed location, traffic patterns and parking available in the area.

The valet service must provide sufficient personnel to promptly handle all requests for parking and to prevent vehicle conges tion in parking areas.

Attendants will not be allowed to park cars on a public street. parking meter area or residential street unless permission is granted by the chief of public

Also, valet services and em-

ployees will not be allowed to erect shelters or maintain chairs or benches in the public right of way, which includes streets and sidewalks.

All valet licenses must be renewed annually and renewal is subject to the same rules as the original application.

Any person violating any of the rules of the ordinance, upon conviction, may be fined up to \$500 and/or 90 days in jail.

Each day that a violation continues will be considered a separate offense by city officials.

Solak said the ordinance is not intended to regulate temporary valet services in residential areas, but instead is aimed at cape had he been able to get the controlling permanent services.

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
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
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Grosse Pointe News News Grosse Pointe Children's Theatre celebrates 35 years of magic

Grosse Pointe Park resident Sally Reynolds once dreamed of a career in radio and on Broadway. A trip to New York City helped her attain her goal of working in the theater, but on a different scale.

As a fresh-faced young talented woman, Reynolds went to New York to audition for a part any part.

While waiting for the interview, she met Raymond Massey who happened to be walking by. They talked.

"He told me that talented people are a dime a dozen in New York and that I should take my talents and put them to work at home," Reynolds remembers fondly.

Back in Grosse Pointe where she grew up, Reynolds took the talents she had developed at Michigan State University where she majored in theater and education and put them to work at Liggett School where she taught for a few years.

She directed some students in theater productions there and was bit by the bug. She then got her master's degree in children's theater, which at the time was a new science.

Then in 1954 she decided to use her talent, and with support from the War Memorial, the Neighborhood Club and other area civic groups, she started Grosse Pointe Children's Thea-

She began with 12 students and the first show they did was "The Enchanted Christmas Tree.'

"It was like one big beautiful family," she said. "It still is."

That was 140 major productions ago. Her theater is the oldest children's theater in the state, and possibly the country, she said.

Reynolds figures that not counting the special shows the group has done at libraries, senior citizen homes, churches, malls and community centers, she has presided at more than 2,100 performances.

At an average of 300 people per show, (not including the smaller shows) more than 63,000 people have seen a Sally Reynolds production. She also estimates that close to 6,000 local children have trodden the boards under her direction. She even took a group of students to Portugal in 1967 to perform.

"It started out with just kids from Grosse Pointe and now I have them from Southfield, Windsor, Detroit, the west side, everywhere," she said.

And of those 6,000 children, she sees Grosse Pointe Children's Theater alumni acting on soap operas, on Broadway and other professional theater; there are theater professors, directors, producers, opera singers and the list goes on. That doesn't include the number of doctors, lawyers, company executives and others she has met through her work.

"I love them all," she said. In 35 years, what has changed in the theater is what has changed in the world.

"Children today know too much," she said. "I really feel the world is so caught up in itself, there is no longer any time to relate to those around them. They have become little marionettes and robots where the thinking is done for them.

"Children are precious little things. There's a lot of hate in the world and sometimes that hate comes from the kids not liking themselves. Children's theater is a beautiful vehicle to get children to love themselves and each other. And to love God. I stress love of God because he's the one who gave them their talents. They should use those talents to bring happiness and joy to other people."



"There's very little pampering in children's theater," Marshall said. "She gives no one illusions. After being on stage with her, I kind of fell in love with the idea of doing theater."



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

called 'Tremont's,' which stood on part of the present Frederick M. Alger property. It resulted in the organization of a new village, Grosse Pointe Farms. which took the old boundaries of Fisher Road and Weir Lane."

Some favor the 1893 date since that is when the geographic area now known of the City of Grosse Pointe became independent of the area known as the Farms.

Jean Dodenhoff, curator of the Grosse Pointe Historical Society. said she has been unable to come up with any documentation that definitively answers the City's centennial question. She said that unless other documen tation is found, the society could probably live with either 1889 or 1893, as long as the City makes a firm decision on which it wants to use.

City attorney Richard Hanks has even been investigating the centennial question and he cannot come to any firm conclu-

"I've made a stab at it," he said, "but quite frankly I can't answer the question right now. Maybe nobody can answer it."

In an effort to find the answer. Browning planned to go to Lansing Wednesday to look through the City's incorporation records. The Village of Grosse Pointe was re-incorporated as a city in 1934, but it is apparently not known when the Village of Grosse Pointe was officially incorporated - if it ever was.

Following the meeting, one resident said he was appalled at the way the matter was handled by the council. He said politics shouldn't get in the way of some thing as important to the City as its centennial celebration.





"The Riviera is back," proclaimed the billboards heralding the '89 Buick Riviera.

It "recaptures the look and feel of our best Rivieras of the past, it also takes a step into the future," said Buick General Manager Edward H. Mertz.

"We wanted to give the car a feeling of muscular grace," said William L. Porter, chief designer, Buick Exterior Studio No. 1.

And, in fact, the '89 Buick Riviera does harken back to Detroit's golden age when each new model was longer and more luxurious than the last.



explore solutions Milk River hearing to

In an attempt to solve longrange problems in the Milk River drainage basin, representatives from state and local agencies will meet with citizens Monday, June 26, at 7 p.m. in the Woods council chambers to discuss possible solutions.

In attendance will be James E. Murray, director of Wayne County Public Works, Woods engineer Larry Pate, Roy Schramek of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and representatives from an engineering firm hired to conduct a long-range study of the drainage

On the agenda is a history of the existing system, some of the problems experienced, DNR requirements for the basin, potential for state funding and a discussion of possible solutions and respective completion schedules.

The Woods City Council passed a formal resolution April 3 asking the Michigan DNR to earmark some of the \$660 million in environmental cleanup bonds for improving the Milk River drainage system. Results will be discussed at the meeting by DNR representatives.

sewage and odor during hot weather has made living near the river basin undesirable.

The Milk River channel does not flow. It is blocked at both ends and acts as an overflow basin for sewer systems in Grosse Pointe Woods and parts of Harper Woods.

During normal conditions, all sewage in the system flows to the treatment plant in Detroit. But because Grosse Pointe Woods and Harper Woods have a combined system for storm drains and sewage, the system is frequently flooded by heavy rainwater.

Both the rainwater and raw sewage are held in a catch basin at the Milk River pumping station, at Marter Road and Parkway in the Woods. After a heavy rain the water and raw sewage must be pumped into the open communicators, they are also channel.

While in the channel, oxygenburning bacteria are supposed to decompose much of the sewage. but in oxygen-depleted water. non-oxygen-burning bacteria take over, resulting in foul odor.

The water in the Milk River basin is then pumped directly into Lake St. Clair, via the Lakefront Park marina.

Some possible solutions for the basin include a plan for aeration (adding oxygen to the water), separating the sewer and storm drain systems in certain areas and construction of larger holding tanks for the overflow.

Larger tanks would allow more time for solids to settle. The water could be chlorinated. and remain in tanks long enough for the chemical to be effective before being released into the lake.

The Woods has commissioned the engineering firm of Mc-Namee, Porter and Seeley, of Ann Arbor, to conduct a study of possible solutions. Results are expected in October.

Representatives from the firm will be present at the meeting to offer information and to note additional items to be included in the study.



find Jews. Stefan was frowned upon for hiding a Jew," Tanay said. "As the women of the village began to suspect that I was not Stefan's nephew, the rumors started throughout the village.

"You must realize that there were rewards for denouncing the Jews. The villagers would receive rations of sugar or vodka for turning people in.

One day while Tanay hid in the room waiting for Jagodzinski to return, he noticed that the cottage was surrounded by Polish police. He jumped through a window and fled.

"The police were shooting at me and I just kept running."

Tanay managed to jump a train bound for Krakow (about eight miles away) and met up with Jagodzinski there.

"These were common events," Tanay said. "Very few survived.



The third of five blocks on Mack in the Park will get a new streetscape this summer through the city's Tax Incentive Finance ing Authority.

The block scheduled for improvements this year is between Beaconsfield and Nottingham. The new streetscape, which includes shrubs, trees, flowers in raised beds and sidewalks, will cost \$129,037.

The TIFA board awarded the streetscape contract June 13 to Warren Contractors, the lowest qualified bidder, according to TIFA board President James Odell Jr.

He said the work should be started within 30 days and should take about four or five weeks to complete. He said there should be no disruption of traffic due to the construction, but pedestrian traffic may be hindered. Odell said the contractors will provide temporary walkways for the businesses' customers and the job will be completed as quickly as possible.



Committee members toured both the local libraries and libraries located in similar communities, studied professional reports, interviewed librarians and patrons, and reported monthly to members in the newsletter.

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

From the archive's huge data bank, amassed by student collectors at the University, Callow has retrieved a good variety of occult lore - including superstitions, rituals, and customs - relating to these two days.

June 24 is not only the Feast of John the Baptist but also Midsummer Day. Everybody knows that Midsummer (part of the Summer Solstice) is really the beginning, not the middle, of summer.

But once upon a time there were only two seasons, summer and winter, so the word "summer" included spring as well. This would make Midsummer the middle of the spring-summer season. Whatever they called it, ancient sun worshippers did a lot of celebrating that day.

Its eve, June 23, is downright spooky. Spirits gets loose then, according to some folklore, and are thought to wander around until dawn. So some people have been known to stay awake all night for fear of having their own spirit escape through their dreams.

According to folklore, the 23rd is also the night that the fern goes into its once-a-year bloom. But you've got to watch closely. Some people think it's also a good time to gather herbs or dew in the dark.

June 24 is fairly drenched with folklore involving water, which seems fitting, since John baptized it. Swimmers should stay out of the water until June 24, because they run the risk of drowning or, at least, suffering from bad luck - this according to folk belief collected from Poles and other informants contacted by Dr. Callow's students.

Lovers can make better use than swimmers of the day's watery folklore. Single girls can melt some metal, drop it into water, and observe the results. If the metal comes out dull, they're doomed to enter into marriage with an ugly man. If it comes out shiny, their marriage will be happy, their husband handsome.

Or a girl can make a wreath of flowers and set it afloat in a stream or pond. The boy who retrieves it will be her husband. Among some groups the future spouse is not identified. If the wreath floats, the girl will be married that very year. If it sinks, she won't.

Fire, even more than water, has been associated traditionally with St. John's Eve. (Frequently the floating wreaths have a lighted candle in the middle thus combining the fire and water motifs).

Nowadays, according to items in the Computerized Folklore Archive, these bonfires are still built, though the customs associated with them have changed somewhat. Always there seems to be a festive atmosphere, with eating, storytelling, singing and dancing.

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
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

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

'Dead Poet's Society' a film to savor

"Dead Poet's Society" has a depth and poignancy that mesmerizes. It reaches out and touches the heart of viewers with a sincerity and singleness of purpose.

There are no asides or diversion to detract or delete the message for which it was made. Like a fine piece of art, each detail, every segment contributes to the impact of the whole.

The year is 1969. The place Welton Academy, an Ivy League boy's school in Vermont dedicated to molding tomorrow's elite. Conformity is the watchword. Any infraction of the rules can result in a hefty paddling by the headmaster.

In spite of the restrictions, however, the boys manage to enjoy their time there, never realizing that in following the rigid regime, many may never realize what they want for themselves. Their lives are decided for them.

Into their rarefied, insulated atmosphere comes an impassioned English professor, John Kealing (Robin Williams), who is totally unconventional in his teaching methods. The first day he meets the class, he walks in the front door and out the back door of his classroom, then has everyone follow him to a glass case filled with photos of former

As the boys gaze at the pictures, he drones, "They're pushing up daisies now." Then he tells them to "seize the day.

Make your lives extraordinary." Keating's aim is to make poetry as exciting as a Star Wars movie and through some

unorthodox teaching methods, he brings home the necessity of looking at things from different

perspectives. He introduces MacBeth by reading the part as John Wayne or Marlon Brando. It is such instances as this that we realize that the quicksilver wit or the standup comic Williams lies close to the surface in this fine portrayal of a hip Mr.

Williams' carefully modulated performance, a tonal combination of humor and idealism makes him the most complex character in the film. He drills his students mercilessly until each one begins to perceive that only by daring to be out of step will he succeed in finding himself. He is totally believeable as the kind of teacher who changes students' lives.

While Williams is central to the film, he nevertheless serves as a catalyst as he submerges himself in an ensemble effort with his co-stars, seven impressionable boys who find the courage to follow their secret desires.

They are not heroic deeds but secret hopes they had never hoped to realize. One overcomes his shyness enough to call a girl, another auditions for a play against his martinet father's wishes and half the class gathers in a cave at night to read poetry.

Slight as these pursuits may seem, they provide much of the drama and impact of the film. Although the boys are relatively inexperienced unknowns, they carry their parts remarkably well. The exuberance of youth, the joy of discovery and the pain of tragedy are fully expressed.

Peter Weir, who directed the film, accents characters and actions with contrast.

In his films, imagery is as important as words and actions in conveying a message. We see a flock of birds soar into the air, symbolic of the boys' souls. We see an untrodden field of snow and a boy making the first tracks as he cries out in pain or

"It's a poem," Williams says of

the film, "and I am just one of the stanzas."

It is an apt comment. There is poetry in the imagery that runs through the film and poetry in the stirring way the boys' feelings are portrayed on the screen. It is poetic in its concept. There is conflict, humor and tragedy.

"Dead Poet's Society" is a film to savor. Poetry is not read lightly nor are such films as this dismissed as only entertainment.





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

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Central American ministry

Grosse Pointe teacher serves as director of Guatemalan orphanage

One year ago, Ammarie E. Monahan — a life-long Grosse Pointer, graduate of Our Lady Star of the Sea grade school and high school, teacher of English at Grosse Pointe North High School — set out on a volunteer ministry in Central America with stars in her eyes. After being laid off from her teaching job, she joined an ecumenical volunteer group to see how she could use her teaching skills to help people.

She was looking forward to a one-year ministry which would include learning Spanish, teaching English, and working with the repatriazation movement in El Salvador.

The best plans, however, often go awry.

Monahan ended up as a volunteer mother for 15 boys in Quetzaltenango, Guatemala.

And she was back in her native Grosse Pointe for a few weeks early this summer—with a story to tell.

After her six-week intensive Spanish course and a bit of traveling around Central America, Monahan returned to Guatemala

to teach English as a foreign language to first graders and grades seven through 11 in a private school. After school, she served as a volunteer in a Guatemalan orphanage, Hogar Los Ninos De Jesus.

"I lived in the orphanage and served as mom to 15 boys from ages 10 to 17," Monahan said. "I helped them with their studies and I taught them English.

"I worked on the orphanage's farm on weekends. We grew corn and had a vegetable garden and we also had four cows, two pigs and 25 chickens.

"The orphanage was run by a man from

the states.
"They are well-behaved kids. They work hard. They're like a family. The three older boys go to school at night and work during the day. One is an assistant mechanic; another is a stock boy; another does sweeping.

Soccer is a big sport for kids there. They play in the street because there's no school teams. On the weekends they play soccer or work on the farm and go to church."

After a while, however, Monahan found

out that all was not as serene as it seemed at the orphanage.

"I soon realized that the man who runs the orphanage was sexually molesting the boys," she said. "He had been doing this for 18 years and he had been fired twice from other jobs for the same reason."

Monahan felt she had to help the children. She brought charges against the director of the orphanage, and he is now in jail.

"I have to return to Guatemala and press charges," she said. "I've heard he may be out on bail because some key testimonies were retracted. I have to go back."

Monahan said that people in the village have said she was sent by God to help them — to do something for the boys.

After the director of the home was sent to jail, the orphanage was broken up. In April, she moved the boys to a rented home that had no stove, no refrigerator, and no furniture except for a few donated bunk beds.

"People in the village are the biggesthearted people you can imagine," she said. "After they heard about the problems with the orphanage, they were really concerned about the children. When we moved, people donated food, pots and pans, furniture, a stove, refrigerator, tables and chairs.

"I felt humbled because these people — even though they were poor — could give something."

Monahan wants to share these experiences of generosity with students back home when she returns. "This is something students here need to know — that being poor is not a sin; that you can be poor and still be rich inside.

"Most days we didn't have water from 10 a.m. until 10 p.m. because the sun dries it up. It's replenished at night. We stored water for drinking, washing dishes and washing clothes. These kids may be dirty — but not by choice.

"They know how to make do with the food they have. We eat a lot of rice and beans and very little meat.

"Each kid has one pair of shoes — and these are usually very poor quality. They wear out fast. All their clothing, in fact, is poor quality. Zippers don't work, for in-

Monahan would like to return to the orphanage with some donated shoes and jeans.

She said she traveled to Central America with few personal belongings; very little clothing; no make up; no curling iron; only two pairs of shoes. "I really appreciate these things while I'm home — a closet full of clothes, a nice home, a lawn, flowers, trees.

"In Guatemala the natural areas in the mountains are beautiful. The villages have

God's little corner

American sisters and brothers: I perceive we are a very religious lot. We have erected houses of worship on countless conspicuous corners from sea to shining sea. We have rigorously shaped our government so that it shall not hinder the organization of our religions and their peaceful

We have included references to a personal divine being in our national hymns and pledges. We even have a whole corner reserved for godly comments in our newspapers.

Indeed, we are a remarkably religious lot. Time and again surveys show that a heavy majority of us in every age and income bracket believe there is some personal being which can be called God.

(I am tempted to digress into the question as to whether or not we are so religious about our economic senses. Whether "In God We Trust"qualifies our use of that on which it is stamped, or is a title naming that on which it is stamped, is a question that begs for its own Pastor's Corner.) Yielding not to temptation is not my forte, but just now I

will neither yield or digress. What seems to flow more directly from our stream of religiosity is the question: "What do you know about God?"

It may be that God is, in fact, a rather benign old lady or old man who is really pleased and impressed that we take the time to build churches, sing songs and make sure our religion can continue peacefully plodding along.

Or, it may be that God is more like God. Maybe God is someone you deeply want to meet, but when you get there, God is fiercely unsettling.

Maybe God is full of mercy and love, but without dropping even a tiny speck of a pure and hearty justice.

Maybe God has the power to hold all the universe, but without losing interest in the smallest detail of our actions.

Maybe God is fully aware of our weaknesses and imperfections, but without setting aside the highest of expectations for justice, kindness and humility in each and all of

Maybe ... just maybe ... God is God.

Now, if God is just a "nice ol' guy" (dare I say, "good ol' boy?") then I guess our being very religious is just right. But, if God is more - much more - a whole lot more then we had better make some changes. At least we had better find out.

Because if God is God, then our jobs matter in a whole new way. And our spending priorities matter in a whole new way. And our prejudices, our hatreds, our violence, our environmental practices, our education, our everything matters in a whole new way.

What do you think, American sisters and brothers? Who is God anyway?

Memory expert Arthur Bornstein has called heavy stress the number one enemy of good memory and he counsels his clients to unwind, not by drinking or smoking, but by meditation, exercise or simply not trying so hard. Taking a break from the daily grind can help.

Sometimes what helps most is to accept occasional forgetfulness. British physician Robert A. Wood suggests that the medical profession should reassure older patients that forgetting an occasional name is not an early indication of senility. He refers to this common occurance as "benign forgetfulness."

Fresh fruits, vegetables available in Michigan

Fresh asparagus and strawberries are coming from Michigan fields and orchards this month a good time for each of us to reflect on the bountiful, safe supply of food we have in this coun-

Recent rains have extended the fresh asparagus season another month. Look for quantity packs at supermarkets and farmsite markets in your community.

Shelby area, take a cooler along so you can bring asparagus back home in good condition. Several asparagus growers in the Hart-Shelby area sell asparagus from roadside stands at reasonable Processors have already begun

preserving the nation's new crop of vegetables. This is earlier than normal and should enable canners and freezers to handle the increased volume. Acreage is up slightly for most vegetables.

Harvest of tart and sweet cherries will begin in June. District Extension Horticulture and Marketing Agency Lary Bradford predicts a lighter crop of tart cherries but a normal-size crop of sweet cherries. A greater proportion of the sweet cherry crop will be marketed fresh this year; look for them in supermarkets and farm markets from mid-June through the end of

If you're traveling in the Hart- gan apple crop is unclear at this point. A cold snap in early May probably reduced the crop, but no one yet knows the extent of the damage. A good supply of this fall's crop continues to come eating-crisp from controlled atmosphere storages.

> Exceptionally warm temperatures in California has hastened the ripening of cantaloupe and honeydew melons. Meanwhile, Florida - the nation's top producer of watermelon - has seen the '89 crop delayed by an early cold snap and dry weather. As a result, cantaloupe and honeydew prices are lower than normal while watermelon prices are a bit steep.

Look for meat and poultry prices to hold at or near current levels this month. Egg prices are likely to increase in July so shoppers with plenty of refrigerator space may want to lay in a supply when eggs are featured

Buhl drives, thrives in life's fast lane

18 Robbie Buhl At age cracked his piggy bank to invest in his future, but the return is still a few years away. Buhl, a 25-year-old race car

driver from Grosse Pointe, is currently making a name for himself that he eventually would like mentioned in the same sertence as Mario Andretti and other Indy 500 car drivers. He has 67 second-place points in the Barber-Saab Pro Series, and is the only American in the top

The Barber-Saab series races 12 times a year with Saab cars. Each car is stocked with a turbo charged 2.0-liter, four-cylinder, 16-valve, twin-cam engine that was in everyday use in the Saab 900 Turbo and 9000 Turbo.

The cars are known as SPEC cars, meaning each driver has no advantage based on engine performance. Each driver pays \$6.500 for each race, as well.

Buhl, who admits that his personality is dictated by the highs and lows of race car driving, is an intense individual who thrives on challenge.

"I love racing because of everything that goes into it," he said. "The biggest high I get is going wheel-to-wheel with another driver and trying to come out of a race on top. The speed is nice, but the wheel-to-wheel competition is what really gets me going.'

Buhl, who pocketed \$8,500 for his first Barber-Saab Pro Series win at Road Atlanta in April, doesn't spend his money carelessly.

"Every penny I own or win goes into racing," he said. "For the most part, I'm way over-extended, but you've got to invest in a future and I just happen to be investing my money in myself. I hope someday there's a re-

What really got Buhl going just before his graduation from Cranbrook in 1982 was his will to survive in a different world: race car driving.

A motocross buff, Buhl and his brothers took to the yards, jockeying for position. Little did he realize, however, that the backyard challenges would eventually lay the groundwork for his labor of love.

"I grew up on motorcycles and ton and Silverstone, England. bikes," explained Buhl, whose eventual goal is to race in the CART Series. "We would ride them around in the backyard, but I wasn't very serious at that time about racing.'

It wasn't until the summer after commencement ceremonies that Buhl took the art of racing seriously.

"As soon as high school was over, that's when I became more involved in motocross," he said. "I wasn't one for school, which I regret somewhat. I knew I



wanted to be in a race car after graduation, but I didn't know how to get there.

Buhl went on to attend New England College in New Hampshire and also spent some time in England. One year later, he slipped further into his dream.

'In my sophomore year of college I attended a racing school (Jim Russell) for my first formalized training in cars," Buhl said. "I just happened to win a couple of races I entered and that got me going."

Buhl raced in the Formula Ford Series, winning at Snetter-

Buhl's parents. Meanwhile, Lawrence and Fay, understood their son's aspirations, but apprehensively backed him.

"I came home at Christmas time and told my dad that I was going to race and he kind of shrugged his shoulders and laughed," Buhl said. "I told him I had to raise about \$60,000 to return to England to race.

"At first, my parents were thinking that my desire to race was a passing wind," Buhl added. "I think they kept saying.

Let him get it all over with and then he'll buy the blue suit, a house with a white picket fence and be settled into a job. They've realized now how serious I am.

Buhl didn't return to England, but went back to New England College. In 1985, he attended the auto show at Cobo Hall and within hours of touring the cars, found his "baby." "I was walking around at the

auto show and saw a Sports Renault Pro Series car," Buhl recalled. "Immediately, I said, 'That's for me."

Buhl purchased the car and that same year ne began racing in Sports Renault regional events. He set one pole position and finished first, second and third. He also attended the Skip Barber driving school in Pennsylvania to gain more experi-

"I was young and I knew that the only way to get better was to get as much training and experience as I possibly could," said Buhl, who now teaches at the Skip Barber school.

Still trying to figure himself

out, Buhl graduated with a marketing and management degree and knew it was time to gamble.

"I graduated and knew that the only way to get involved was to get up and go," he said. "So off I went. I towed my car behind my truck all around the country.

Buhl competed in 30 races and at times drove 20 hours straight to compete. His costs were ris-

ing, but so were his spirits.
"I knew it was for me," he said. "I didn't mind any of it: living out of a suit case, or not

knowing where my next dollar was coming from. Racing has always been in my blood, and at that time I was trying to live my dream.

But everybody must awaken from a dream. Buhl, who stated he's had many highlights, almost withdrew from the racing world

"Up until 1985, my career was very sketchy," he said. "After the 1988 season, in which I raced in the Formula Atlantic Series with a brand new car, I

Choosing the Spa or Hot Tub That's Right for You

You've been thinking about it for a long time. Now you've decided. You want to make it easy to relax in a soothing tub of hot water anytime you

Now you have to decide whether you'd rather relax in the warm, bubbling water of a hot tub or if you'd be happier letting the jets of a spa massage you.

Perhaps the greatest advantage of the hot tub is the natural and rustic quality of wood. Some people say this contributes to their overall sense of relaxation.

It takes a little more time to maintain a hot tub than it does to maintain a spa because wood needs to be cleaned more carefully and it has the potential for deterioration if not cared for property.

Traditional spas were built of gunite and located next to a swimming pool, with both being constructed at the same time.

Today, spas are usually a molded fiberglass structure with a surface of easily maintained plastic

Many buyers choose spas over hottubs because fiberglass construction permits a wider variety of shapes and a full range of colors.

Fiberglass can be contoured to fit your body, so most spas also have very comfortable surfaces for sitting or lying back



Parents urged to protect kids from the sun and skin cancer

Protecting a child's skin from the harmful rays of the sun may be one of the most important things parents can do for their children. Young children, especially those under age 10, can suffer dangerous effects from a lifetime of repeated exposure to the sun if

not protected properly.

"And it all starts in childhood," stated Sidney Hurwitz, M.D., Clinical Professor of Pediatrics and Dermatology at the Yale University School of Medicine. "That's when skin cancer

begins."
Dr. Hurwitz, speaking before a Skin Cancer Foundation media seminar, emphasized that sun damage in the first 10 years of life lays the ground-work for premature aging and skin can-

Dr. Hurwitz emphasized that the threat of cancer is real: Severe sun-burns in early childhood double the lifetime risk of contracting skin cancer predispose children as well as adults to malignant melanoma, the most serious and deadly form of skin

"Appropriate sun protection, like tooth brushing, should become an everyday habit for everyone, children and adults alike," states Dr. Hurwitz. "Since the damage done by excessive sun exposure is cumulative, children should be protected from overexpo-sure to the sun and its rays from the day they are brought home from the hospi-

While keeping children out of the sun during the hottest part of the day is recommended, parents know this can be difficult. Dermatologists suggest that children as well as adults be protected with a maximum sun protection factor (SPF) sunblock.




