

'Border patrol' finds all quiet in Park after dark

Friday, Aug. 11, 8 p.m.:

The radio in Grosse Pointe Park Officer Gerald Kolakowski's patrol car squawked with the announcement of a man firing a gun. Kolakowski listened with interest, but wasn't too concerned.

Fortunately the man with the gun was not in the Park. He was somewhere in Detroit's 5th Precinct, which surrounds Grosse Pointe Park to the west and north. The Park's southern back is against Lake St. Clair, with Grosse Pointe City to the east.

"The 5th Precinct used to be the busiest in Detroit," said Kolakowski, who has been

on the border patrol in Grosse Pointe Park for 15 years. "Now it's one of the slowest."

While freely admitting he's just a cop and not a politician, Kolakowski speculated that the police activity in the 5th Precinct, and consequently in Grosse Pointe Park, has dropped considerably because there's not too many people left in the far east side of Detroit.

As an observer riding in Kolakowski's patrol car on this warm-but-quiet Friday night, I was treated to a tour of the Park and the bordering area of Detroit through the perspective of a police officer.

"We call this the border patrol," said Ko-

lakowski, as he left the police station on Jefferson, went north on Alter to Mack, east to Cadieux and back down to Jefferson.

"I like to go around the business areas to see what it's going to be like for the night," he said. Things were pretty quiet, so he added for my benefit, "Ironically, when it looks quietest, it gets busiest."

After going around the Park perimeter, Kolakowski went a block or two into Detroit for a look at the other side. Detroit's far east side is pocked with abandoned houses and apartment buildings and empty lots where once-beautiful homes stood.

Kolakowski points out that many of the

neighborhoods west of Alter Road were once made up of the same socio-economic mix as the Park's "Cabbage Patch," but now the difference is between night and day. On one side of Alter Road, homes sell for a \$100,000. On the other side they go for perhaps \$30,000 or less.

Cabbage Patch, by the way, refers to the close-together homes on Wayburn, Maryland, Lakepointe and Beaconsfield that are plunked down one after another, row after row, block after block.

St. Ambrose rectory attic catches fire

The rectory at St. Ambrose Catholic Church caught on fire Monday, destroying about half the attic and roof.

The St. Ambrose mishap was the second major fire in Grosse Pointe Park in as many days.

Park firefighters were called at 10:07 a.m. to St. Ambrose, which is at Maryland and Hampton and a block from the fire station. The fire was quickly escalated to a three-alarm situation, with firefighters and trucks arriving from Grosse Pointe City and the Farms.

Park Public Safety Deputy Director Phillip Costa, who as fire chief directed the firefighting efforts, said the fire at the St. Ambrose rectory was restricted to the southern half of the attic of the 3-1/2 story building.

He said the irony is that the rectory built in 1926 was supposed to be fire-proof, or at least built of fire-resistant materials. About one-half of the slate roof and its charred supporting beams will have to be replaced, Costa said. The third floor received smoke damage, and all the floors under the fire probably received water damage.

The fire was accidentally started when dust in an interior wall on the third floor was ignited by a torch being used by a plumber. The fire quickly roared out of control up the inner wall and into the attic. The third floor of the rectory was being remodeled.

While the three fire departments worked to put out the fire, many concerned residents and nearby parishioners stood by. Among those watching was Sister Irene Kerich, who said her office was in the third floor. She

said she has been with St. Ambrose for 14 years, and she was quite shaken up by the fire.

Two Park public safety officers, Chris Powell and John Viviano, were taken to Bon Secours Hospital, Costa said. Powell strained himself while pulling a hose up a ladder and Viviano suffered a sprained ankle.

No one in the rectory was injured due to the fire.

There was no estimate of the damage to the rectory.

At 8:30 a.m. on Sunday morn-

ing, Park firefighters were called to an attic fire at a two-family home in the 1000 block of Wayburn. Grosse Pointe City firefighters also arrived at the two-alarm fire.

Costa said it appeared that faulty electrical wiring caused a fire in the attic of the home. He said mattresses stored in the attic may have helped get the fire going.

The fire was extinguished

Absentee ballots in Farms primary being investigated

Results from last week's Grosse Pointe Farms primary election for municipal judge remain uncertain as 315 absentee ballots are being investigated by Michigan State Police.

The day before the election last week, information that the wife of one of the candidates improperly handled some ballots was made public at a press conference called by Wayne County Clerk James Killeen, who is a neighbor and contributor to one of the candidates.

It was reported by Killeen that Irene Gracey, wife of candidate Paul Gracey, delivered absentee ballots to voters and took them back to City Hall.

Of the total 1,789 votes cast, incumbent Matthew Rumora received 1,034 and challenger Paul Gracey received 308. Candidates Eugene Casazza received 298 votes and Richard Roosen, 149.

If by chance the absentee ballots are not included in the final vote tallies, the top vote-getters are Rumora with 850 and Cas-

azza with 269 votes. The top two vote-getters in the primary go on as candidates in the November general election.

State law prohibits a candi-

date or family member from taking absentee ballots to voters, using the ballots to solicit votes or delivering them to a polling place.

Mrs. Gracey said she did not know she was breaking the law and was offered the ballots by an employee at the Farms City Hall.

State Police Inspector Gerald Johnson said interviews are being conducted to determine how Mrs. Gracey obtained the ballots. Evidence is being gathered and will be presented to the Wayne County prosecutor, he said.

"The laws governing the handling of ballots are very clear. She (Irene Gracey) should not have been able to collect the ballots.

"The law is more incumbent on the city clerk's office to properly distribute the ballots than on the person who picks them up," Johnson said.

Gracey and his wife say that one of the candidates called Wayne County Clerk Killeen and asked that a press conference be set up to discredit Gracey.

In the impromptu press conference held Monday, Aug. 7, the day before the primary, several newspapers and radio and television stations were called into Killeen's office where the allegations about Mrs. Gracey were made public. The Grosse Pointe News was not notified of the conference.

Killeen, a Grosse Pointe Farms resident, would not comment on the Graceys' charges that he called the press conference to discredit Gracey.

Killeen told an employee in the Wayne County Election Commission that he will not talk to reporters from the Grosse

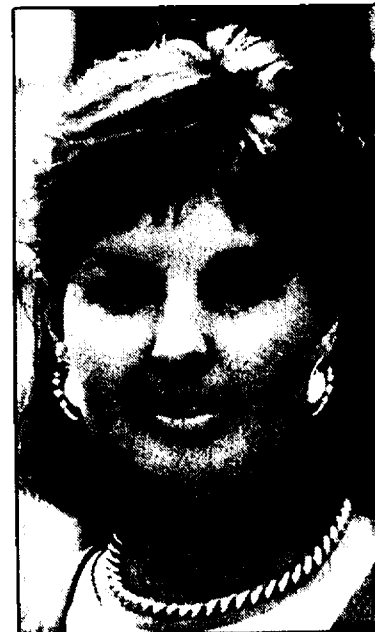
Farms resident Cathy Huth has always been pretty quiet, spending her non-working hours with her husband and two children. She had no intention of being an activist. Little did she know what one letter would do.

In March, Huth, 33, wrote a letter to the Grosse Pointe News pointing out that all the Grosse Pointes except the Woods offered the lowest level of emergency medical service. Her letter sparked a debate that is still going on and has meant the upgrading of some of the cities' emergency services and thus the saving of lives in the long run.

Huth, who is a registered nurse anesthetist at Cottage Hospital, said she was taking a continuing education course at St. John Hospital in advanced cardiac life support and she was told by the cardiologist instructor that Grosse Pointe Woods was the only city in the Pointes

to have advanced life support. A resident of the Pointes all her life, Huth was surprised that

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'Jane Doe' rescued at Farms park

An unknown 4-year-old female was rescued at Pier Park in Grosse Pointe Farms last week after she apparently swam across Lake St. Clair.

Described as brown with four legs and frightened half to death, the female can be dubbed "Jane Doe" in this report because she is, in fact, a doe — you know, a deer.

Farms police and Michigan Humane Society officials who rescued Ms. Doe did not know whether she had any children or where she came from. One Farms officer said Ms. Doe "took the Fifth" when asked where she swam from.

Mike Killian, an investigator with the Humane Society's animal cruelty division, took part in the rescue in the waters off Pier Park at the foot of Moross. When asked where he thought Ms. Doe came from, he said, "I don't know. She didn't tell me."

One thing he did know, however, is that the deer did not come from Belle Isle, because Ms. Doe is a different species than those on Belle Isle. Speculation is that Ms. Doe swam down from Harsens Island, across from Canada or from an island in Lake St. Clair, such as Peche, on which she could have been trapped during the winter.

Regardless of her nationality, she is now a U.S. citizen living in Holly, thanks to the efforts of the Michigan Humane Society, Farms police,

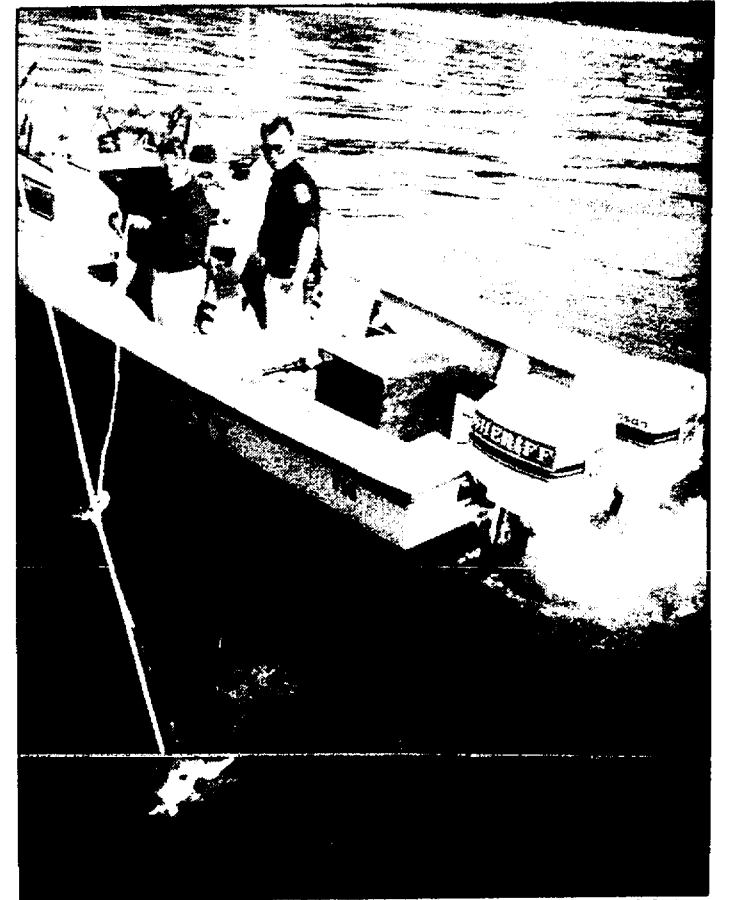

Wayne County Sheriff's deputies and helpful bystanders.

At 8:05 a.m. Aug. 9, Farms officers responded to a report of a deer trying to get ashore along Lakeshore. Each time the deer tried to get on land, it was frightened back into the water by the traffic. When police found Ms. Doe, she was exhausted after having spent a long time swimming.

The officers found Ms. Doe near the Crescent Sail Club, where sailing instructors got a boat and assisted Farms offi-

cers in herding the animal near shore at the Farms municipal park. A Sheriff's Marine Patrol boat also arrived with a couple of deputies to assist.

Grosse Pointe Animal Clinic veterinarian Lawrence Herzog, who is always ready and willing to assist local police with any animal emergency, arrived at the scene and was able to tranquilize Ms. Doe with a dart. After she

Woods park security guard found drunk

When a 23-year-old Grosse Pointe Woods Lakefront Park security guard reported at the station after the park closed Aug. 9, Woods police officers were keeping an eye out for him.

About five minutes earlier, a Woods officer received a report that the park guard had been drinking. When the guard appeared at the police front desk at 10:15 p.m. to turn in a radio and keys, officers detected a strong odor of alcohol. The guard's eyes were red and watery, according to police.

When the guard denied he'd been drinking, he was asked to submit to a breath test. He agreed, and the result of the breath test was an alcohol level of .260. Legally drunk is .10.

The guard was then told that he couldn't drive home and was asked for his keys. He said the keys were still in his car, which was running in the parking lot. When an officer went out to secure the car and get the keys, he found three partially full bottles of vodka in the vehicle.

The guard told police he is a recovering alcoholic. His employer, National Security Patrol of St. Clair Shores, was notified of the incident.

Valente resigns from Park council

Councilman Mark Valente III resigned his seat on the Grosse Pointe Park City Council Monday night.

In July, Valente was named director of congressional relations in the U.S. Office of Personnel Management in Washington, D.C. Previously he was

employed with the National Republican Committee, where he

At the regular council meeting Monday, Valente's colleagues thanked and praised him for his services to the city.

Mayor Palmer T. Heenan praised Valente for being very issue oriented and looking at all sides of an issue. He called Valente a "formidable adversary."

"We will miss you for pointing up all sides of every issue," Heenan told Valente. "You've been very sharp in this regard."

The other council members present all wished Valente their best, much to Valente's embarrassment because he felt it sounded as if he were retiring or something.

"I'm too young for this," he said with a red face, while his mother took photographs of her son's last night on the council.

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G.P. Academy gets OK to construct fieldhouse

The 100-year-old Grosse Pointe Academy is expanding again.

At Monday's meeting of the Farms City Council, final site plan approval was given to the Academy to build a fieldhouse complete with a basketball/volleyball court surrounded by a running track, locker rooms, a kitchen and a 50-foot wide stage.

Rick Adams, an architect with Malak Associates of Southfield, explained to the council that the 19,700-square-foot facility will be primarily concealed from view from Grosse Pointe Boulevard and Lakeshore. It will be located along the south property line, adjacent to the St. Paul Catholic Church property, about halfway between the two thoroughfares.

The architectural style will blend with the existing buildings on the site, Adams said.

Headmaster Sydney DuPont said that the construction of the new building will create a courtyard bordered by the new fieldhouse on the south, the existing school building on the north and the existing administration building on the east.

DuPont said the existing gymnasium at the school is outdated and insufficient because of the low ceilings and short distance between the foul line and the wall. The existing facility can only house one activity at a time, he said.

"Many of our after-school activities are curtailed since only one team can hold a practice. With the new building, we will

be able to have several activities going on at the same time," DuPont said. "It will enable our students to compete with other independent schools."

Besides physical activities, DuPont said the fieldhouse will double as a large assembly hall with about 750 seats. The current auditorium seats 350.

At the meeting, a resident voiced his concern that if the school rents out the facility to other organizations, parking could become a problem.

DuPont addressed the concern, saying that for many years the school has observed a conservative use and that school administrators will work with neighbors.

DuPont said the school stated the need for a larger physical education facility in the early 1980s as part of the school's long-range master plan.

The Academy is not considering any other expansion plans in the future.

"This will complete the entire complex at the Academy."

DuPont added that the school will continue its restoration efforts of the original buildings to ensure the Academy will be able to serve future generations of students.

Hollywood Nights Bar gets new owner, format

The Hollywood Nights Bar on Mack Avenue in Grosse Pointe Park has changed hands and will be renovated into an "up-scale sports bar," its new owner said Monday.

The change in ownership was made public when the bar's new proprietor went before the Park City Council seeking to have the Class C liquor license transferred.

The license is currently held by Kavi Corp., which operates as Hollywood Nights Bar at 15128-15130 Mack Ave., at the corner of Lakepointe.

The new owner is John Carlisle, a St. Clair Shores resident who has a law practice in Grosse Pointe Farms. The new sports bar, which will be owned under the name Mack Avenue Corp., is Carlisle's first venture in the bar business.

The bar, which has not yet been named, will be managed by Richard Strasz, as Mack Avenue Corp. president. Strasz has some 10 years in the food service business. His work experience includes Lelli's and the Lochmoor Country Club.

Prior to the council's approval of the liquor license transfer, Councilman James Robson Jr. asked Carlisle what he would do to restrict rowdiness by the bar's patrons who party in the streets after hours and urinate in public.

Carlisle said his bar would not attract such an ill-mannered crowd, and he said if such incidents did occur, police would be notified at once.

The new owner said the existing building will be completely gutted and rebuilt. The new sports bar is slated for a Dec. 1

opening. The state Liquor Control Commission has the final approval over the liquor license transfer.

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Lot reconstruction to create parking shortage on Hill

Grosse Pointe Farms officials are asking for cooperation during a predicted three- to four-week reconstruction of the Hill's largest parking area.

The municipal parking lot behind retail shops on the Hill was closed Monday, Aug. 14 for expansion and renovation for at least two weeks. During the final weeks of construction when the lighting is installed and the area is landscaped, the lot will probably be open for use, according to City Clerk Richard Solak. At a meeting last Thursday between city officials and merchants, Solak outlined the construction plan and schedule of completion.

"Our goal is to maximize the number of spaces," Solak said. "Right now we are coordinating the efforts of the contractor, city services and the merchants to make sure the project goes well."

Solak said once the lot is done, the area will be greatly improved in terms of aesthetics, convenience and safety.

At the early morning meeting, several merchants voiced con-

cerns that cars driving through the alley between the lot and stores posed a safety threat to customers exiting through the rear.

Solak said the area will be safer than before because cars will enter the lot from the McMillan side and will exit on the Muir side, thus decreasing the amount of traffic through the alley.

The lot will have an attended booth near the north end and will most likely be operated by National Garage Inc. The lot's

hours are yet to be determined by a city ad-hoc parking committee.

Solak said the construction period of late August was chosen due to the fact that sales for most merchants is slow during this period and also because school is not in session, resulting in more temporary parking spaces for employees on school properties.

Specifically, employees are being asked to park in the Richard School parking lot, the South High School parking lot, be-

tween the main school building and the Industrial Arts building off Fisher Road and in parking spaces along Fisher Road.

Employees are asked not to park along Kercheval or McMillan, in metered spaces in the Richard parking lot or on residential streets in order to save parking spaces for customers. Customers may also park in the Cottage Hospital parking deck at 75 cents for the first two hours.

For employees, Cottage Hospital has agreed to lease spaces for \$20 in the "B" lot, just west of the parking structure. The rate will be prorated from Aug. 14 if

used less than one month and there is a \$10 refundable card deposit.

The alley adjacent to the lot will be open for most of the construction period for deliveries. It will, however, be closed for two to three days so that utility wires can be run under the alley, thus eliminating most overhead wires in the area.

Solak said during the few days that the alley will be closed, deliveries will be made from Kercheval and may add to the temporary parking problem.

Solak added that while utilities are being switched from

overhead to underground wires, merchants and employees may experience a short power outage, most likely during off hours.

Once the lot is constructed and opened for use, vintage style lighting will be installed and landscaping performed to improve the overall look of the lot. During this time, the attendant booth will be installed, as recommended by the Hill Association.

Solak asked all merchants and Hill employees for patience and cooperation during construction and said that once the lot is done it will be a plus for all parties involved.

He escaped out the front door of the business with \$106 before he was caught on St. Paul.



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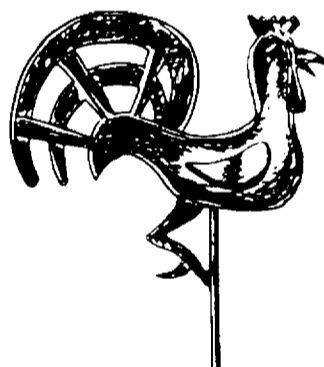

A question of life and death in the Pointes

Like many other Michigan communities, the Pointes are faced with a growing demand for improvement in the level of emergency medical service offered by the Grosse Pointe communities.

The demand is coming from concerned citizens, hospitals, representatives of the medical profession and municipal officials who are being pressured by some of their constituents.

In recent weeks, two communities have acquired automatic defibrillators which will require the upgrading of the training of the emergency medical technicians who operate the EMS in the Park and the Farms. As a result, the level of treatment provided in the critical early minutes of an emergency will be substantially improved.

The Park put the first of its two recently purchased machines into service July 1 and just last week the Farms, which had recently turned down a request for funds for purchase of a defibrillator, received one as a donation from Cottage Hospital.

But even more improvement in EMS in the Pointes is being sought. Farms resident and nurse Cathy Huth, who has been in the forefront of the campaign to improve life support, recommends that limited advanced life support service be provided at a minimum. That would require additional training of the emergency medical technicians who now staff the basic life support programs serving the Farms, the Shores, the Park and the City (from the Park).

Ms. Huth was active in organizing the Grosse Pointe Citizens for Improved Life Support, has written letters to the Grosse Pointe News supporting her views, has testified before the Farms council and presented to it petitions signed by 250 Farms residents favoring improved life support.

Farms Public Safety Director Robert K. Ferber also has made a study of the problem, recommended the addition of an automatic defibrillator to the basic life support

system and has urged the exploration of various alternatives if the Farms wishes to improve its ambulance service beyond that point.

To date, the Woods is the only Pointe community that offers the type of advanced life support service deemed essential by the American Heart Association. The basic life support programs offered in the other Pointes include sophisticated first aid provided by trained medical technicians, plus equipment and transportation.

The differences among the three levels of EMS service are basically in the amount of training of the medical technicians and the advanced services they can provide, the number of them available at any one time and the equipment they have access to.

But it is obvious even to laymen that advanced training and the more sophisticated equipment required by advanced life support systems provide a service that can

mean the difference between life and death when an EMS ambulance answers a call.

The offset is the increased cost. In the Woods, for example, costs have mounted since the city approved a one-half mill levy for upgrading its EMS service from basic to advanced back in 1981. The levy is expected to bring in \$216,000 during the 1989-90 fiscal year to operate the advanced life support service, with the city adding a bit more to balance the budget.

As a result of the higher costs for the advanced life support offered by the Woods, several people have recommended that the Pointes consider a consolidated service providing such support for all the Pointes with all five municipalities sharing in the cost.

Such an idea obviously needs more exploration but the Pointes already have learned the benefit of close cooperation in the police and fire protection provided by the five public safety departments. Expanding to the rest of the Pointes the level of EMS protection the Woods now provides to its citizens is another cooperative endeavor whose time is at hand.

We believe the proposal deserves serious study by all the councils and public safety departments of the Pointes and adoption of the joint effort if acceptable ways of financing the additional cost can be found.

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A strange judicial primary

The results of the first primary election in Grosse Pointe Farms in years remain in limbo more than a week after the vote as a result of questions that have been raised about 315 absentee ballots cast for municipal judge.

Incumbent Municipal Judge Matthew Rumora led the four-man field and apparently was nominated for the November election regardless of what happens to the contested absentee ballots.

But questions remain about the identity of the second nominee. In the balloting, Paul Gracey ran second with 308 votes, Eugene Casazza was third with 298 and Richard Roosen was fourth with 149. But if all the absentee ballots were removed from the totals, Rumora would have 850 votes, Casazza 269 votes, Gracey 215 and Roosen 140. In that event, Rumora and Casazza would face each other in November.

State police are investigating the absentee ballots because of complaints that Irene Gracey, wife of candidate Gracey, improperly handled absentee ballots by delivering them to voters and then returning them to City Hall.

Mrs. Gracey readily admits she delivered ballots to her neighbors and then returned them to City Hall, but said she did not know she was violating the law. Furthermore, she said she was offered the ballots by a Farms city employee and only then agreed to deliver them.

The role of Wayne County Clerk James Killeen in the whole matter is unusual in several respects, including his refusal to talk with the Grosse Pointe News.

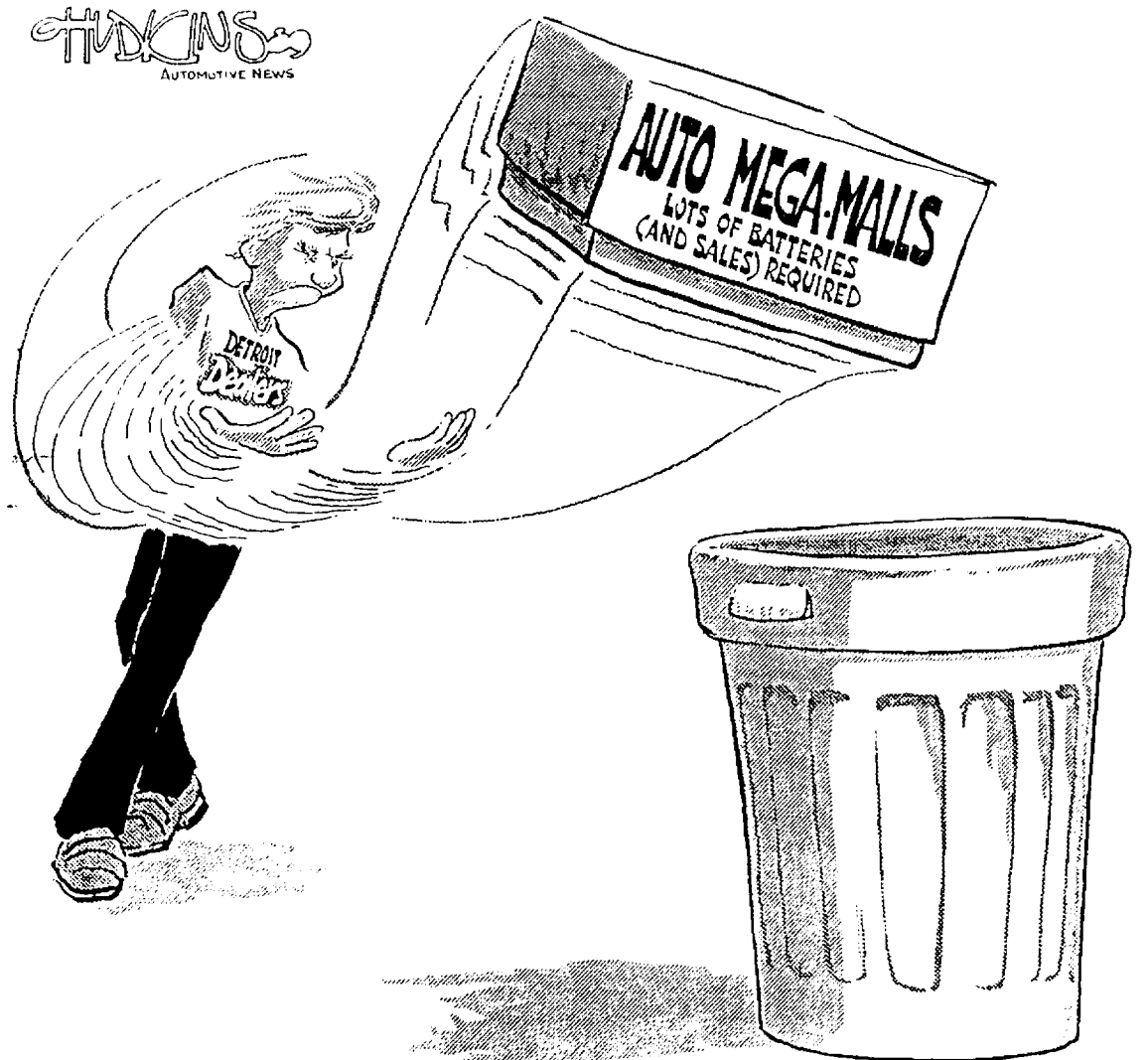
He apparently called an impromptu press conference on the day before the primary to air allegations about Mrs. Gracey's conduct but he has refused to answer calls from the Grosse Pointe News which wants to know who made the allegations, to hear his response to complaints he called the press conference to discredit Gracey and to ask him other questions.

Killeen lives next door to Casazza in the Farms and his name appears in a listing of Casazza's supporters in one of the candidate's advertisements in the Aug. 3 issue of the Grosse Pointe News. Records also show that Casazza contributed to Killeen's campaign for re-election as clerk in 1988.

State Police Inspector Gerald Johnson, investigating the case, added another interesting footnote to the story. He is gathering evidence to present to the Wayne County prosecutor and said he suspected the absentee votes were not legally obtained and thus "are in jeopardy."

And who makes the determination of whether the ballots were legally obtained or not? The same County Clerk Killeen, Johnson said.

Stranger things than this incident have happened in elections — but not in Grosse Pointe Farms.



Michigan now is 80% urban

More than four out of five Michiganders live in urban areas and about half of the state's population inhabits the Detroit metropolitan area.

Those figures from a recent Census Bureau report show the extent to which this state and others in even the once agricultural Midwest now have become urbanized.

But it is, of course, a national trend which shows that almost half of all Americans live in just 37 metropolitan areas with a population of a million or more and that nearly 86 percent of the nation's growth since 1980 has occurred in the 282

officially designated metropolitan areas.

Detroit is fighting desperately to make sure everyone is counted in the 1990 census so that it can remain in the charmed circle of cities with more than a million population. But it is also the center of a metropolitan area with a population of 4.6 million, making it the sixth largest such area in the country.

The major reason Detroit wants to be kept in the million-or-more category is that it faces the loss of substantial amounts of federal and state aid if it falls below the one million mark. In addition, a number of state laws affecting only Detroit would have to be rewritten if the population dips below the million level.

New Jersey is the only state that falls entirely within metropolitan areas, but seven other states had more than 90 percent of their population in metropolitan areas, the Census Bureau report said.

The Midwest, even though many of its states are now urbanized, is still losing population to the South and West, the Census Bureau said on the basis of an analysis of figures from 1980 through 1987. The Northeast's loss of population in the 1970s stopped in the 1980s.

Rapid population growth does have its problems, of course. Perhaps the population shifts occurring more slowly in states like Michigan do offer one advantage. They provide more time for planning and organizing growth to enable it to occur with less inconvenience to residents, developers and public officials.

Sept. 17, 1964 —

The New York Times reported that President Johnson said the country could rest assured that his administration had "taken every step to insure that neither a madman or a malfunction could trigger nuclear war." He reiterated his belief that control over nuclear weapons must remain with the president, a position formerly opposed by that of his Republican opponent, Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona.

Sen. Goldwater toured the Tennessee Valley and said he stood by what he had previously said on the desirability of selling the TVA to private enterprise.

The United States offered to contribute \$2 million and Britain \$1 million toward the cost of keeping the U.N. forces in Cyprus for three months after September.

A Belgian cardinal proposed that the pope share with the bishops of the Roman Catholic Church one of his major powers — the right to initiate canonization.

The Maharajah of Sikkim and his wife, the former Hope Cooke of New York, voiced confidence about the relations between their country and Communist China. Sikkim is a tiny country in the Himalayas between India and China.

East Germany rejected a West

German proposal to extend the scheduled pass agreement for West Berliners, to include Christmas 1965, thus creating a deadlock in the East-West talks.

Yugoslavian President Tito returned from a five-day state visit to Hungary, determined to limit his role in the Soviet-China split to "analysis" and "commentary."

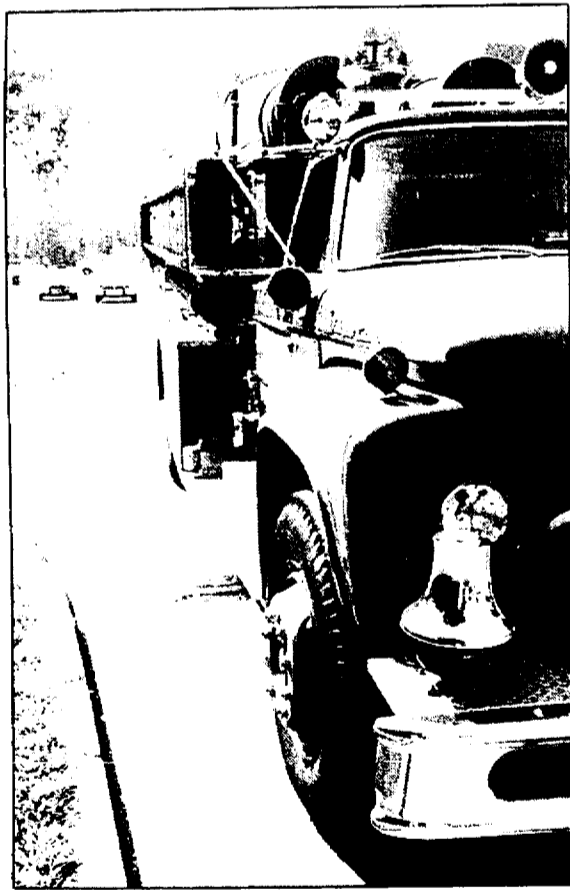
without injuries and the fire was limited to the attic. The upper flat of the home received extensive smoke and water damage.

Suspect charged

A 17-year-old Grosse Pointe Park youth has been arraigned on a felony breaking-and-entering charge and turned over to Wayne County Circuit Court.

The arrest of the suspect and the recovery of \$40,000 of stolen property closes the investigation of 10 home burglaries in the Park since August 1988, according to Park police.

At his arraignment Aug. 5 in Park Municipal Court, the youth pleaded innocent to the breaking-and-entering charge involving a March 20, 1989, incident. After a preliminary examination Aug. 9, the youth was bound over to Circuit Court, where he is scheduled for an arraignment Aug. 23.

Police said an intensive investigation by Park detectives led to a search warrant being issued for a home in the 15300 block of Windmill Pointe Drive. The search uncovered an assortment of stolen goods, including electronic equipment, silverware, jewelry, art objects and oriental rugs.

After suspected cocaine was found, officers obtained a second search warrant for narcotics. Police said the adult homeowner at the Windmill Pointe address will be charged with violated controlled substances laws if the suspected drugs are confirmed by lab tests.

The youth was released on \$20,000, 10 percent bond. He also was ordered to stay with his mother and he was forbidden to have any contact with the individual living at the Windmill Pointe home.

Health advisories in lake continue

Wayne County health officials have once again issued a health advisory for Lake St. Clair near the Milk River because of raw sewage released after last week's rainstorm.

The latest warning was at least the fourth since June 1 and is related to the recent rainfall.

When heavy rains fill sewers to capacity, raw sewage is occasionally released to avoid an over-

erflow of raw sewage in homes, according to Dean Tuomari of Wayne County's Department of Environmental Health.

The raw sewage is mixed with rain water from the sewer/storm drain and released via a large underground pipeline near the mouth of the Milk River at the Woods' Lakefront Park marina.

Last week's rain overwhelmed the sewers and the large holding tank at the Milk River Pump Station. Once the level reached

capacity, approximately 15 million gallons of rain water mixed with raw sewage, ground garbage and other waste was released into Lake St. Clair.

Officials say that swimming in the contaminated water can result in health complications, such as infections if water comes in contact with eyes, ears or cuts in the skin. The sewage-laden water is especially harmful if swallowed.

County health officials per-

form weekly testing of the area and report that the inlet surrounded by the Edsel Ford property in Grosse Pointe Shores is included in the advisory.

The advisory includes the shoreline area from Stephens Road (9 1/2 Mile) south to Vernier. Engineers studying long-range solutions to the raw sewage problem in the Milk River area report that sewage is released in the lake an average of 46 times throughout the year.

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East End Community Center

For Homeless Women with Children
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August, 1989

Dear Friend,

I would like to introduce you to the East End Community Center (EECC), a non-profit organization created by some residents of Detroit and the Pointes who are concerned about the homeless and about improving the quality of life in Jefferson-Chalmers.

The project entails converting three buildings from 14401 to 14425 East Jefferson, into a facility to house a day-care center, community service programs, wholesale farmers' market, and transitional housing for 25 homeless families (women with children). The EECC is committed to be an innovative approach to homelessness that will help develop the community at the same time.

As a model project that specializes in the long term needs of homeless women and children, the EECC will offer a comprehensive array of supportive services for the benefit of our residents and local people. We will network with existing service programs in Jefferson-Chalmers and offer many services that the area desperately needs; for example, vocational and educational training, substance abuse counseling, legal aid, employment opportunities, parenting skills education, etc. The project will also include a State-licensed day-care center for 60 children. There will be room reserved for children from local families who need low-cost quality day-care. We will staff 15 to 20 professional people, and we expect to attract many volunteers.

The EECC will also help to revitalize a business strip which is now no more than the skeleton of the prosperity and beauty which flourished years ago. In relation to the center we plan to open a bakery, catering service, furniture refinishing shop, and a wholesale farmers' market. These small businesses will give new life to the area and provide jobs where some of our residents can develop business skills and earn personal money.

The project requires financial help to get started. We plan to begin full operations by December 1st of this year. After one year — by December 1990 — we expect to be able to cover at least half of our operational expenses by rents and day-care fees (paid by the Department of Social Services), and by profit from our small businesses. The other half of our expenses we expect to meet with donations and grants.

For the first year, however, we need financial help from the private sector. At present we are seeking funds to purchase the buildings, build a kitchen, buy a van, and open the farmers' market and day-care facility. We need either donations or loans. All donations are tax deductible.

Please let me know at your earliest convenience if you can help us get started. I will be happy to offer you an in-depth presentation of the entire project, answer all your questions, and get your input. Thank you.

Pointe News and that any calls from the Grosse Pointe News should be referred to the Farms City Hall.

It is not known why Killeen did not invite the Grosse Pointe News to the press conference, or why Killeen will not now comment on the matter, even though

he did so to other members of the media at the press conference.

In a paid advertisement for municipal judge candidate Casazza in the Aug. 3 Grosse Pointe News, Killeen is listed as a financial supporter to Casazza for judge. Casazza and Killeen are next-door neighbors on Moran Road.

Likewise, Casazza has contributed to Killeen's past election campaigns for Wayne County clerk, according to campaign finance records.

In a telephone interview, Casazza said he did not want to comment.

"I will wait until the investigation is complete," he said.

"If there is a recount, it could make a big difference," he added. "I just can't ask for a re-

count. I'll have to wait and see what happens."

State Police Investigator Johnson said if the ballots are not legally obtained, they are not legal votes.

"I would suspect that the votes are in jeopardy," Johnson said. "That's for the county clerk to decide."

Killeen, as county clerk, will decide what ballots are valid.

Johnson added that the investigation could last several more days. Currently, several absentee voters are being interviewed by state police.

Farms City Clerk Richard Soklak said he has challenged the absentee ballots in the primary. Under the challenge, the city reserves the right to review the ballots at a later time.

The Grosse Pointe Farms Board of Canvassers plan to meet Tuesday, Aug. 22.

Dingeman withdraws from race

James Dingeman, a Grosse Pointe Farms businessman, has dropped out of the race to be the Republican candidate for the U.S. Senate in 1990.

Dingeman, who was the first candidate to enter the race in March, was on vacation and not available for comment as to his reasons for withdrawing.

After dropping out, Dingeman reportedly endorsed U.S. Rep. Bill Schuette, of Sanford. Schuette, however, hasn't announced his candidacy yet.

Another Grosse Pointer who is running to oust U.S. Sen. Carl Levin is W. Clark Durant III, a lawyer who served on the board of the Legal Services Corp., appointed by then-President Ronald Reagan.

Durant is now the only official Republican candidate in the senate race.

was sedated, the rescuers got a rope around the deer's neck and guided her to shore.

Once the deer was at the bank, Killian and Mark Kaltz of the Humane Society and others were able to lift Ms. Doe into a Humane Society van for transportation to a Humane Society emergency clinic in Auburn Hills. There she was examined and found to be in good shape. She had not suffered any serious injuries, according to a veterinarian at the clinic.

Ms. Doe was then transported to a YMCA camp in Holly where she was released. Killian said the deer laid still for a while and then got up, looked around, and bounded off into the Woods, where it is hoped she will set up a new home.

According to the Farms police report, Ms. Doe's employer was unknown and her occupation was survival. Thanks to the officers, the Humane Society and others, Ms. Doe did survive the ordeal and will begin a productive life in southern Michigan.

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Industry forecast: It's a buyer's market for cars

Tough times are ahead for the American auto industry, according to the University of Michigan's Transportation Research Institute. That's bad, right. Well, maybe not.

The forecast was the result of

mous change was wrought on the average automobile — the automatic transmission, aerodynamic styling, unibody construction, air conditioning, pushbutton radios, power steering, hydraulic brakes, power-assisted

gan looking at what the Japanese were doing right and, in desperation, turned to emphasizing quality. And customer satisfaction. And service.

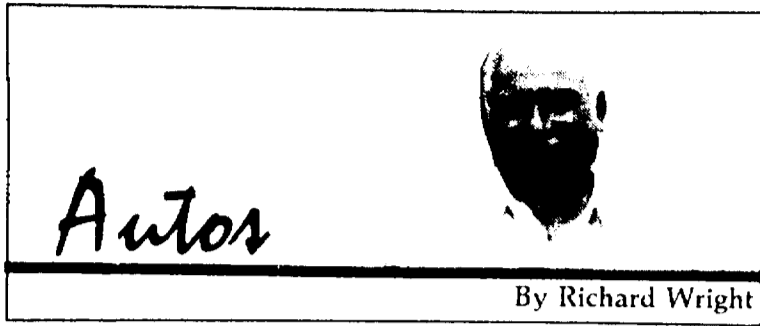
The result was that American cars have begun climbing in the esteem of buyers and also in the J.D. Power surveys. But they were climbing not at the expense of the Japanese makers, but the European. Power now says American nameplates rank second in customer satisfaction to the Japanese, a place which had been held by the Europeans.

And the Power survey also found domestic makers had scored the greatest gains in the past year, greater than the Japanese. Acura, Honda, Toyota, Nissan, Subaru and Mazda are still in the top 10 of customer satisfaction, but Cadillac and Buick are too. The only European make in the top 10 is Mercedes-Benz.

So the emphasis on quality is paying off and the trend now

a Delphi study by the institute's Office for the Study of Automotive Transportation. A Delphi study is one in which experts are asked what they think and in the "Delphi V Forecast and Analysis of the U.S. Automotive Industry Through the Year 2000," the experts were more than 250 automotive marketing and engineering executives.

The forecast sees a buyer's market for automobiles through the next decade and concluded that the industry will need to reduce costs, improve quality and provide better service to sell cars in this competitive atmosphere.

And that's good, right?

The U-M survey, headed by David E. Cole, professor of mechanical engineering and director of the institute, predicts that passenger car sales in the United States will grow less than 1 percent a year over the next decade, from 10.1 million in 1990 to 10.9 million in 2000.

Light truck sales will grow a bit faster, but the explosive sales gain of recent years are over, the experts say.

Which brings us to the Buick LeSabre, which in July was named the most trouble-free U.S.-built car by J.D. Power & Associates, a Los Angeles-based firm which does continuing research on car buyer satisfaction.

General Motors executives say the LeSabre won that recognition because of quality gains resulting from a system that fixes responsibility for defects.

Maybe. But an independent industry observer suggested only half-facetiously that Buick might have been able to improve the quality of the LeSabre because, with a low rate of sales, it didn't have to build them so fast.

Buick LeSabre sales have nearly doubled since that survey finding was released in July, so if quality begins to fade, we will know it is because as demand picks up, Buick finds it does not have time to build each LeSabre right.

In fact, history indicates that bad times may be good for the buyer and, in the long run for the industry too, because they force improvements as demand declines and the marketing people need something to sell.

Hard times first came to the auto industry in the early '20s as a combination of a post-World War I recession and the fact that most people who wanted a car already had one caused sales to stop increasing. The industry responded with annual model changeovers, "planned obsolescence" and advertising which stressed image and dreams.

But when hard times really hit after the stock market crash in 1929, these measures were not enough and the industry had to make real improvements, which it did through the vehicle of the annual model change.

We tend to think of the '30s as the era of classic cars, of elegant Duesenbergs, Packards, Cadillacs, Lincolns, Pierce-Arrows and the like, which it was. But it was also a time in which enor-

brakes, the low-priced V-8 engine, to name a few innovations. By 1940, the automobile was much different than it was in 1930.

And those were hard times for the industry. Most of the auto making firms which existed in October 1929 were gone by October 1939. And car sales did not return to their 1929 level until 20 years later, in 1949. It was a buyer's market during the Depression.

It was a seller's market after World War II and while the '50s were a golden age for the auto industry, most of the technological improvements were based on earlier developments. In that post-war era, the emphasis was on production numbers to meet the demand. Quality and real technological advances took a back seat to tailfins, three-tone paint jobs, portholes and other gimmicks.

The industry was again in hard times in the late '60s and into the '70s, under the gun from the Federal government, consumerists, OPEC and increasingly tough competition from Japan. Enormous strides were taken in making American cars cleaner, safer and more fuel efficient, but still sales of Japanese imports continued to climb.

Finally, the '80s, Detroit be-

seems to favor Detroit. The U-M study says that in the hard times ahead, domestic makers will "be forced to continue reducing costs and improving quality and offer better service to buyers."


David J. Andrea, research associate at the Transportation Research Institute, who wrote the U-M report, said car dealers will become increasingly important

players in the competition for

buyers. "Products will continue to be judged on price, styling and perceived quality," he said. "However, the dealer is the company to an individual customer and, thus, a crucial factor in the customer's perception of the prod-

uct."

This too bodes well for the American makers. The practice of some Japanese-line dealers of tacking on extra profit above the sticker price may backfire on these companies, just as it did on American makers in the buyer's market after World War II.



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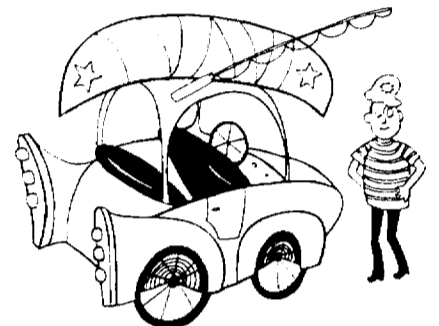
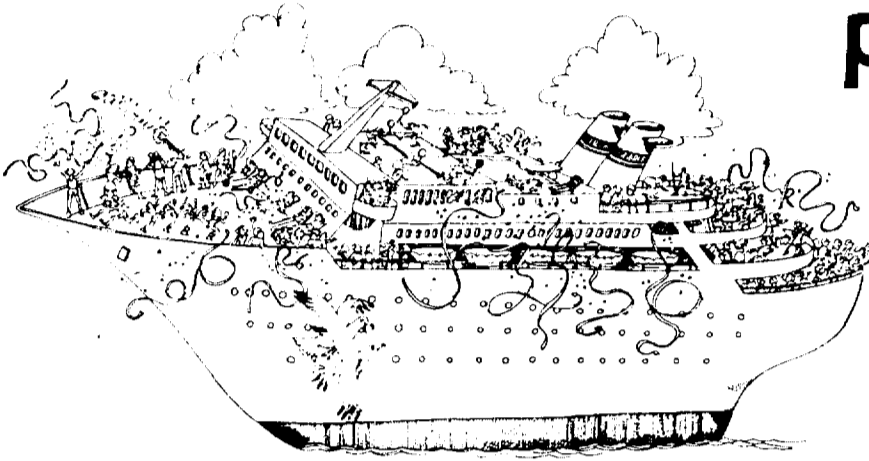

all the Pointes didn't have the best available in emergency medical service. After all, the Pointes have the best schools, parks and roads, why not the best EMS?

"If I wasn't a parent, I don't know if I would have done anything," she said. "But when you have children, you want what's safest for them. Not only for your children, but for everybody else's too."

She said she would like to think that anyone in the community who saw a way lives could be saved would do something. She did something: She and a friend, Yolanda Turner, wrote a letter.

Through the letter to the editor in the March 9 Grosse Pointe News, Huth and Turner informed their fellow citizens that the emergency medical service in four of the five Pointes was not the best available. In fact it was the least possible available.

The best EMS is advanced cardiac life support, which the

Woods has. Second best is limited advanced, and the lowest level of EMS is basic, which the Farms, Shores and Park have. The Park provides EMS for Grosse Pointe City.

Huth said she originally planned on just writing a letter to inform the residents of what she had learned about the local emergency medical service. But the EMS issue took off from there. Now there is even a 14-member committee, Grosse Pointe Citizens for Improved Life Support, to educate residents about EMS and to promote continuous upgrading of the service throughout the Pointes.

"I'm not an activist," Huth said. "I spend most of my time with my kids. I'd never been to a council meeting."

Now she's a veteran at speaking before her elected officials and standing up for what she believes is right.

"I knew more about the president than I did about our local legislators," she said. "And the president doesn't affect my day-to-day life. It's been a learning experience."

Indicating that local officials are sometimes aloof to input for residents, Huth said, "I think they forget we voted for them, and that they wanted the job."

Her efforts have paid off. The Farms Public Safety Department accepted an automatic defibrillator instrument from Cottage Hospital last Friday. And Cottage has offered to provide the Shores EMS with an automatic defibrillator. The Park recently

purchased two automatic defibrillators and has one in service.

While the Park had been looking at the defibrillators for some time, the offer from Cottage Hospital to provide the units to the Farms and Shores and the two cities' willingness to seek the necessary extra training is in large part due to the eye-opening efforts of Huth.

The daughter of Dr. T. Mascarin of Grosse Pointe Shores, Huth said she has always been interested in health care. After graduating from Grosse Pointe North in 1974, Huth attended a two-year nursing program at Mercy School of Nursing in Detroit, where she became a registered nurse.

She then worked in an intensive care unit at an Ann Arbor hospital while going to school nights for her bachelor of science degree from Siena Heights College. After that she went to the Grace School of Anesthesia for two years to become a certified anesthetist.

Six years ago she married Paul Huth, a lawyer who is a partner in the downtown firm of Huth and Farmer.

The Huths have two children:

Hunter, 4, and Holly, 1. Hunter is looking forward to attending the Grosse Pointe Academy this year. The Huths have lived in their older home in the Farms for nearly two years.

When not talking about her family, Huth likes to go back to her other favorite subject: EMS. She said she is glad the Farms got an automatic defibrillator, but she urges the city not to stop there.

She points out that the automatic defibrillator is only half the battle in improving the odds of a cardiac arrest victim's chances of survival. Advanced airway management — intubation — is the other essential element of successful cardiac emergency treatment.

Huth hopes the Farms and other Pointes will upgrade quickly to limited advanced life support so that intubation as well as defibrillation can be offered to heart attack patients. Of course, the ultimate goal should be advanced life support throughout all the Pointes, she said.

"The goal is to make the Pointes the safest community possible," she said.

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'Young Einstein' is wild, crazy — just like its star

Science can be fun and if you don't believe it, go see "Young Einstein," a riotous account of him as a young and irrepressible youth who as an adult became the greatest scientist of all time. Sure, it's a made-up story, but one that is anchored in early experiments that later became important contributions to science, among them the theory of relativity that included gravitation as a determinant of the space-time continuum.

The audience, however, is never asked to ponder anything that heavy. It is enough to know that this light-hearted embryo genius' forays into science were as exciting for him as a new toy. When we first meet the young Einstein, played by Yahoo Serious, he is lolling around under an apple tree on his folk's Tasmanian farm listening to music on the gramophone, watching apples drop to the ground. His mother and father are easy-going parents who are con-

tinuously confused by their son's crude experiments, but they never object, even when one sends him flying through the roof of their modest cottage and plump in the middle of Mom's freshly baked pie. Shortly after Dad lets him in on a family secret. He takes him out to a shed where a contraption has been rigged to brew beer. But there is a problem. There are no bubbles in the beer. Immediately the wheels in young Albert's head start spinning. He solves the problem, but in the process the shed explodes. No matter. Einstein, blackened head to toe by smoke, stands triumphantly holding a glass of beer complete with bubbles and a beautiful collar of foam.

A jubilant father sends him off to the mainland to patent his discovery. In this extraordinary film where every scene is like a first experience, nothing comes easy and that includes Albert's trip. We see him clutching his baggage and his viola rowing across the ocean, climbing mountains, trekking through jungles and deserts, braving blizzards as seasons change until he finally reaches a train stop.

On board he meets another young scientist, Marie Curie, and her obnoxious friend, Preston. Marie is impressed with his scientific knowledge, but Preston wants him put off the train. Albert is rather an odd-looking character in his backwoods buckskins and technicolor spiked hair.

When he reaches Sydney and tries to patent his beer invention, he is promptly thrown out

because the office does not patent theories. A concrete example must be presented.

With that on hold, he begins



work on another. He transforms his classical viola into civilization's first electric guitar and invents a new dance pattern—rock

and roll. Back to the patent office again where he is once more thrown out. With that he decides to look up Marie Curie. He falls in love with her and she with him.

There follows idyllic scenes where they walk and picnic, including one where the wave swells at the beach inspire Einstein to invent the surf board.

A tongue-in-cheek comedy, "Young Einstein" displays an unmistakable respect and affection for the great scientist. It pays him honor as a genius, a rebel and a man of peace.

Written, produced and directed

by Yahoo Serious, "Young Einstein" is a local sensation in Australia. Down under it had a bigger opening than "Raiders of the Lost Ark," "Rambo," "Ghostbusters" or "Star Wars." Serious is even challenging Paul Hogan for the title of comedy king of Australia.

"Young Einstein" as played by Serious is fused with energy. He never loses momentum as he enthusiastically puts into motion his many ideas.

A wild and crazy epic comedy-adventure-fantasy-romance, this slapstick intellectual film will appeal to audiences of all ages.

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'The Abyss' is good at first, then it copies other films

There's a lot to like about "The Abyss." It's the first film in recent memory to mix a healthy dose of adventure with some wonderful suspense, some great human interaction and, best of all, a hint of the fantastic.

Indeed, the first three-quarters of the picture is an edge-of-the-seat thriller that will have audiences enthralled.

Unfortunately, the last 20 minutes of the film is so unambiguously melodramatic and, even worse, derivative, viewers

will have a hard time remembering how good the first part of the movie is.

And just how good is the first part? Consider this: An American nuclear submarine off the coast of Cuba is lost, and all the crew members have died. A group of underwater oil drillers in the area are dispatched to help some military types search for survivors and retrieve the sub's nuclear arsenal.

Meanwhile, the Cubans are nervous about the American warships in their waters, and a hurricane is about to force the

ships away, meaning the people below the surface may be stranded.

Add to this the tensions between the oil workers, led by Ed Harris, and the military types. And the marital tensions between Harris and his estranged wife (Mary Elizabeth Mastrantonio). And, best of all, the presence of a life force living on the ocean floor three miles below the surface.

This is good stuff, to be sure. And it provides a host of memorable moments in thrilling scenes.

The problem is the film's climax and conclusion. Without revealing too much of the plot, it's



difficult to explain exactly why the film is so disappointing. Suffice it to say that if you've seen "Close Encounters of the Third

Kind," there is little here that is unique.

The plot, when it's not borrowing from "Close Encounters" and other films of the genre, is a good one. But viewers who remember Steven Spielberg's classic film will find neither the sophistication nor the sincere innocence that picture conveyed.

Still, "The Abyss" has a certain charm that can be appreciated on its own level. Since most people have a fear/fascination with water and the sea, it would be difficult not to be drawn in to the predicament this

picture's characters find themselves in. And the action scenes are so well filmed, we feel we're in the underwater station with the characters.

Also, the film's special effects are top-notch. And never do they overshadow the main action — a mistake repeated all too often in lesser films.

Unfortunately, even while "The Abyss" managed to steer clear of the typical problems, it fell prey to the biggest problem of all in Hollywood — the inability of filmmakers to develop completely original material.

Jacobson's youthful ambassadors learn, earn, have fun

Every year about this time, Jacobson's in the Village welcomes a new group of young employees who become part of a unique corporate program called the J Board.

They are a select group of high school juniors and seniors who are given an introduction to the world of retailing as few salespeople are.

They are introduced to all of the managers and, over a year's period, they are exposed to the store's operations, including merchandising, display, selling, sales promotion, receiving, even the switchboard.

They are given the flexibility to pick their own hours from a monthly schedule and they are involved in a number of activities sponsored by the store, including modeling in fashion shows and participating in the Santa parade held every year the day after Thanksgiving.

What a deal. It's no wonder that there are up to 60 applicants for about 20 spots.

The program has been in existence for more than 15 years and all of the Jacobson's stores in Michigan, Florida, Ohio and Indiana have a J Board. It was exclusively female until three years ago when males were added to the board.

The Grosse Pointe Jacobson's completed the year with four

male and 22 female students. The new board will have five and 20.

Joseph Binkowski, a Grosse Pointe North graduate, is completing his year on the board working in the men's shoe department. He'll begin classes at Michigan State University this fall where he plans to study business or pre-law.

Binkowski heard about the J Board through job placement at school. It's been a good experience, he said. "You get to see all kinds of people and you learn that no two people are alike."

Binkowski was a model in two fashion shows. The first, he said, was a "horrible experience" and the other one "was a lot of fun."

"Dealing with customers has helped me a lot in communications, in my speech class and communicating with others one on one," he said.

Working at Jacobson's has given him an appreciation for the store's policy of personal service, he said. "It's amazing to go to another store and you can't find a salesperson for miles. They stay at the register and wait for you to bring the merchandise."

He is the youngest of four children of Elizabeth Binkowski of Grosse Pointe Woods and the late Theodore Binkowski.

J.J. Conway, who will be a senior at the University of Detroit High School, is working in the men's department. He plans

to major in broadcast journalism at Marquette University in Wisconsin after he graduates next year.

The oldest of four children of Michael and Kathleen Conway of Grosse Pointe Farms, he's working 30 hours a week during the summer.

Conway said he enjoyed wearing a tuxedo during Christmas and assisting shoppers.

"With this job, you're always on your toes — you have the reputation of the store at stake," he said.

Conway said he was surprised at how much effort goes into promoting merchandise. "We change our displays every two weeks."

He cites the Thanksgiving parade as an example of community service. "You come to the realization that this place is more than a store that sells merchandise — it's an asset to the community."

The co-directors of the J Board are Denise Bigwood, Miss J supervisor, and Kevin Cooper, men's manager.

Former J Board members come back during Christmas or summer vacations, Bigwood said, and because of their training, they are given preference in hiring. Some of the fringe benefits of being on the board are classes in hair and skin care, telephone etiquette, fashion and modeling basics.

Barbara Denler of sales promotion, who is also involved with the J Board, says that students who are interested in modeling only should not apply for the J Board. Training is geared more to all facets of retailing, she said.

The students are the store's liaison with young people, she added. "They tell us what the kids like, about our advertising, if it's hitting that market. They are our ambassadors to the schools. They keep us up to date."

Cooper said he enjoys watching the students grow on the job.

"It's fun to watch them when they first come in. They have no selling language, and then they sometimes get better than a salesperson."

"They really come out of their shells and become more comfortable. It's good for them personally as well as professionally."

Some J Boards are not as active as the Grosse Pointe store's, but Bigwood said the company is committed to continuing the program. "It's a good tool and they

get exposed to more sales than our salespeople. They fill in anywhere. They're groomed to be flexible."

Requirements for the J Board are: the applicant must be 16 years old, have good grades, be personable, have some interest

in retailing and live in the area. There are currently students from seven schools on the board and Denler said representation ranges from seven to 11 schools.

The interview process is not easy. Applicants are screened first by J Board graduates, then

by Denler, Cooper and Bigwood and finally by the personnel manager.

For more information on the program, students are advised to check with their job placement counselor or the personnel department at Jacobson's.

The police academy, however, doesn't turn out sociologists and Kolakowski doesn't offer explanations or solutions. He's just a cop on the beat, filling the time between runs with small talk with his partner, or in this case an observer.

While making our rounds, we traveled Korte Road over the Fox Creek and into Detroit. Recently, Park residents have petitioned to have Korte closed off from Detroit due to traffic concerns, but by the looks of the type of cars using Korte to get across Fox Creek, mostly Pointers will be inconvenienced by the road if it were closed.

At the foot of Alter at Lake St. Clair in Detroit, there's the most interesting trailer park I've ever seen. Some of the more fortunate inhabitants have 1950s vintage trailers right on the Fox Creek with small boats moored along jury-rigged docks. Most of the trailers have been added on to for year-round comfort.

9:35 p.m.:
Two and a half hours after the shift began, we get our first call. It's for a lawn job. At the address, we talk to a young couple who say unknown suspects in a red Jeep turned around on Berkshire by driving across a neighbor's front lawn.

We drove around the area for a while hoping to see the suspects in the Jeep, but the search was negative. Kolakowski reported No. 14 (that was us) was back in service.

10 p.m.
A disturbance was reported at a dance at St. Paul School. Ours and several other Park patrol cars converge in the school's parking lot. We cruised through slowly while other officers talked to the kids. All looked quiet so we continued our free-lance patrol assignment, which meant we could go pretty much anywhere we wanted to.

Grosse Pointe Park Public Safety runs 12-hour shifts. The night shift runs from 7 p.m. to 7

a.m. It's a long night, but Kolakowski said he's used to it, and he likes the night shift best. "It seems if something's going to happen, it's going to happen at night," he says.

Public safety officers on the 12-hour shifts work 15 days a month and every other weekend. Kolakowski doesn't have a second job, but he spends a lot of time renovating his older home in St. Clair Shores.

When the Park police and fire departments merged into a public safety department a couple of years ago, it meant radical changes for the career police and fire officers.

Public safety means officers are cross-trained as policemen (or policewomen) and as firefighters. Sometimes they're also trained as emergency medical technicians.

Kolakowski, however, said he's still just a policeman, which means he doesn't spend some of his shift in the fire house on standby. He will patrol all night long, which is what he likes. He likes being just a police officer.

Officer Mark Sillman, a 22-year veteran with the Park, was happy being just a firefighter until public safety came around. His happiest time this Friday night was being through with police work and being able to spend time with his engines: the new pumper truck and the ladder truck.

Since the pumper truck is new, he took me on a ride around the city. He says he wants to acquaint himself with the new truck and where the many switches and levers are. I think he just wants to man the truck, to feel like a firefighter again.

11:05 p.m.:
We are called to a residence to fill out a larceny report. Once there we learn a bicycle was stolen sometime between 8 and 11 p.m. The bike was on an unlocked back porch.

We stop by the fire house and get a couple of pops out of the machine, and we then sit in the patrol car across Jefferson in the bank parking lot. Even the

traffic was intermittent. There isn't so much as a speeder. Not even a burned-out headlight.

After Kolakowski finishes his pop, he sets the can on the ground outside the car, saying "This isn't what it looks like." He explains that in the early morning hours someone comes up Jefferson picking up returnable bottles and cans. Kolakowski always leaves a can or two to help the scavenger out. I left my car, too.

1:30 a.m.:
One of the officers has a drunk driving suspect stopped near the bars on Charlevoix. We drive up there to see if any assistance is needed. As we arrive, the suspect is going through field sobriety tests and answering many questions.

The suspect is then given a field breath test. He is then being put in handcuffs. The breath test must have been over the limit. One officer takes the suspect, who appears to be in his mid-20s, to the station. Another officer drives the young man's Mercedes to the station. Once at the station, it takes a couple of officers a while to figure out how to turn off the Mercedes' lights.

They don't get behind the wheel of a Mercedes too often — not on a cop's pay.

Back at the station, four Yuppie-looking people show up to get their friend who was just picked up for drunk driving. Kolakowski tells them where they can find him. I hope they're not drinking too, Kolakowski says.

1:45 a.m.:
There's a report of a loud party and kids in the street. When we arrive we don't hear any music, but we do see some teenagers sitting in a parked car. They say they're waiting for someone. Kolakowski tells the youths there's been complaints and that they will have to move on.

After the expected teenager arrives, the teenage driver starts up the old clunker, which turns out to have a loud muffler. Kolakowski rolls his eyes back. The teen eases down the street, trying not to make too much

noise and, possibly, getting a ticket for a loud exhaust.

2:30 a.m.:
There's a report of youths fighting and creating a disturbance in a front yard. Once there we learn two youths were wrestling on the front lawn. The youths begin to break up and get into their cars. They leave the area and all is quiet.

We cruise down Kercheval a few times while crowds of young people are saying their goodbyes after the bars closed. Most seem to be OK and Kercheval clears

out before too long.

3 a.m.:
By now all the bar patrons have gone home. The streets are really dead. The 5th Precinct, however, is still lively. There's a call of a disturbance again at an address that was visited earlier because of the report of the man with the gun.

The Park monitors Detroit's 5th and 9th precincts. Park and Detroit officers assist one another from time to time. If it weren't for the continuous calls monitored out of Detroit, a Park

Since I already had put in a full day during the day shift, I asked Kolakowski to drop me back at the station. At least I can go home. Kolakowski and the other's on the Park's night shift still have four hours left — the longest hours of the shift.

So much for the Park after dark. It was quiet and uneventful — just the way residents and city officials like it.

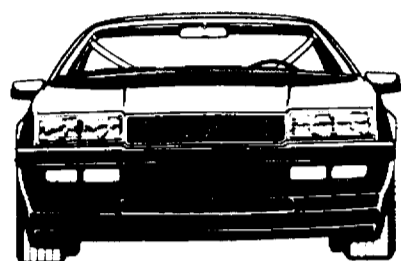

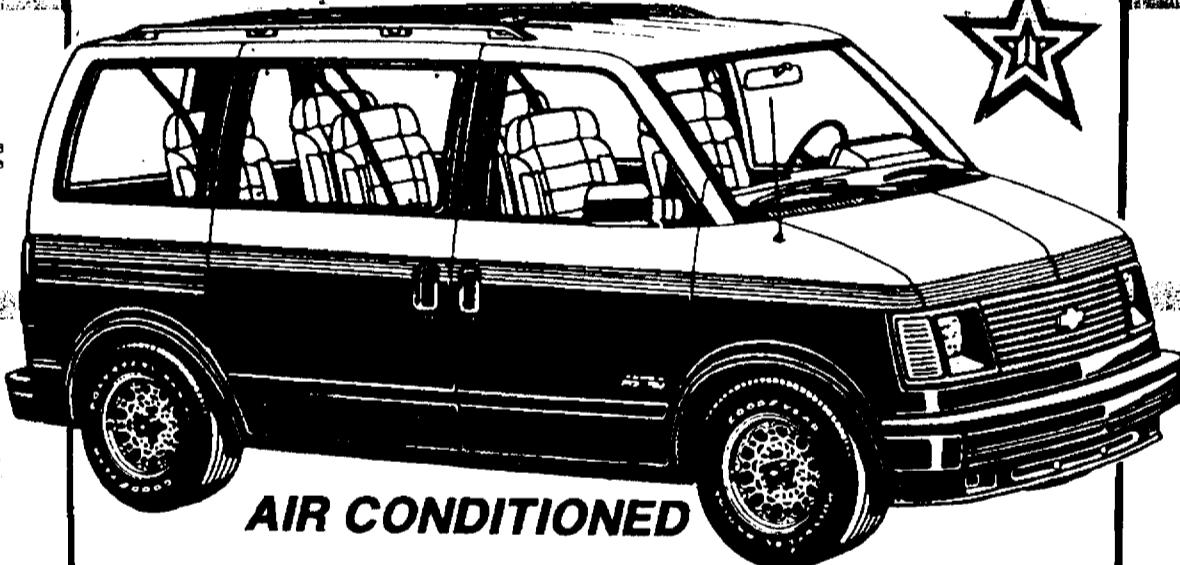

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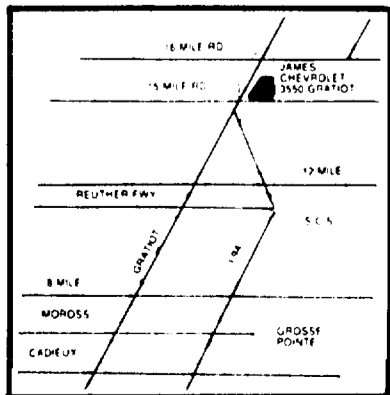
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DIO's Friends of Vision sponsors two unique support groups

Visually impaired young adults & parents of blind children meet to share information

Two one-of-a-kind support groups met each other last week at the Detroit Institute of Ophthalmology — and both benefited.

One group consisted of young adults with impaired vision. The other was made up of parents of youngsters with impaired vision.

The parents had lots of questions.

The young adults didn't have all the answers. But they had suggestions, encouragement, reassurance, and a upbeat attitude that was contagious.

Judi Dara, administrator for the DIO and a facilitator for both of the support groups,

that others with impaired vision would hear about their unique support groups and join. Facilitators Marleine Ricca, president of the Friends of Vision and Sheryl Hoffman, a volunteer, were also present.

Some of the parents' questions to the adults were direct, practical:

How do you read?
 How do you get around the city?
 What sports and extra curricular activities can you do?

How do you organize your clothes closets? Your wallets? Your kitchen cupboards?

How can I teach a visually impaired 5-year-old how to cross a street safely?

What's the best way to stop a child from exhibiting the mannerisms that are common to low-vision children, such as rocking, walking with the head down and rubbing the eyes?

Other questions were philosophical:
 Do you think it's better to have lost your sight, and therefore to know what you're missing — or is it better to have never had sight?

Are leader dogs helpful?

Is Braille helpful?

Nino Pacini, one of the facilitators for the young adult group, is a graduate of Wayne State University with a degree in computer science.

"I see nothing," he said. "Not shapes. Not light. Nothing. I lost 50 percent of my sight at age 7; the other 50 percent a few years later."

Debbie Orlovski, the mother of a 5-year-old who has been blind since birth, asked Pacini if he considered himself fortunate to have had sight, however briefly.

"There's two schools of thought," said Pacini. "I'd rather have seen, than not have seen. I remember colors, shapes. But there's a terrific adjustment (to the loss of sight.)"

Marie Perchan, a budget analyst for the city of Detroit, also a graduate of Wayne State, said she has no peripheral vision.

"I was a teenager before I understood what peripheral vision was. I was clumsy and I just thought I was a klutz," she said. "It's important to explain to children (what they're experiencing) and what to watch out

for."

Nino Pacini's sister, Micki Pacini, who has retinitis pigmentosa, said, "I have no peripheral vision — never did. I didn't realize it until I was in second grade. It's worse now. I have a very narrow field of vision."

Micki and Nino Pacini and Perchan were mainstreamed in classrooms of local schools when they were growing up. That is, they attended classes with so-called normal children and received supplemental help for their handicaps outside the classroom.

"It's best to be mainstreamed," Perchan said, in answer to the parents' questions. "Your child will eventually have to live in a sighted world. It's tough, but the regular classroom is a lot better for them."

"I didn't want to be stereotyped by being in a class for vision impaired kids," said Micki Pacini. "Kids are cruel."

Doug Paschke, an accountant for the city of Detroit with a bachelor's and master's degree in business administration, also has retinitis pigmentosa, diagnosed when he was 23.

"It's also good for the so-called regular kids to be exposed to blind kids," he said.

"It's good for other kids to see blind kids doing the same things they're doing," said Nino Pacini. "They should see that blind kids don't have to grow up and sell pencils on the street. Most people — kids especially — have never dealt with a person with a handicap."

The parents of the visually impaired children were particularly interested in how the adults got around — how they got to class, how they traveled around Detroit, whether they participated in extra curricular activities and sports.

Dan Carlsen of Grosse Pointe Woods has been legally blind since he was 16 months old. He attended Grosse Pointe schools in regular classes, with periodic help for reading.

"It really bothered me when I turned 16," he said, "because everybody else was getting a driver's license and I couldn't." Carlsen has some vision, though limited. He wears high powered glasses and gets around on a bike. He's had a Detroit News paper

route for many years.

The young adults described the variety of extra curricular activities they had tried. Most had participated in downhill skiing, cross country skiing, water skiing, softball, rock climbing, white water rafting, tubing, sailing, traveling, hiking and dancing.

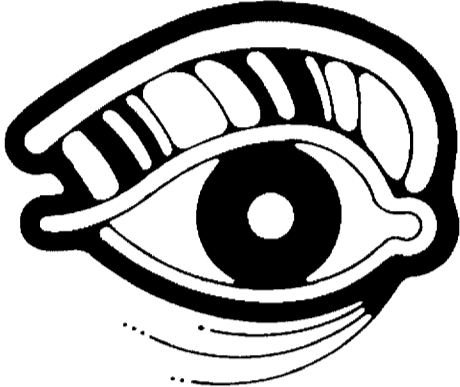
The parents were impressed.

"Hey — archery is the most fun," said Paschke, with a smile.

"And skeet shooting is a real trip," said Nino Pacini.

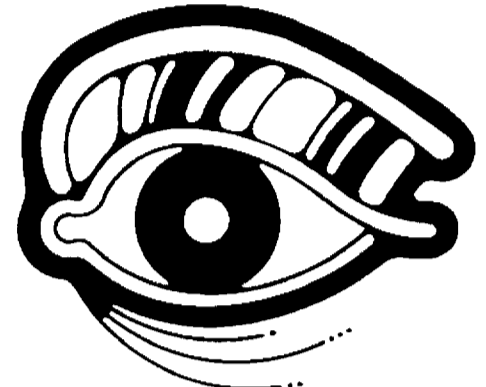
They admitted, reluctantly, that there are a few things they can't do.

"Blind people can do most anything

said that the groups' sponsor, Friends of Vision, would like to attract more participants. "We believe there are more people out there who would benefit from such support group meetings," she said, "but they don't know about us."

Participants agreed to allow a reporter to sit in on their joint meeting — in the hopes

sighted people can," Paschke said. "Sometimes slower. Sometimes in a different way."

Nino Pacini described how baseball is played with a beeper ball. He explained

that downhill skiing can be done either with a personal guide or with voice guidance. He described how he learned rock climbing skills and cross country skiing. "Water skiing is really easy," he said. "You just hang on to the rope."

In answer to parents' questions about leader dogs and Braille lessons:

"There's lots more involved in taking care of a leader dog than in taking care of a cane," Nino Pacini said. "You have to take the dog out four times a day. And you have to clean up after him."

"And when you go out on a date, it's always you and your date... and the dog."

"You have to constantly reinforce the dog's training, or else it becomes a pet," he said. "I like the reach of my cane."

"Also, you lose your sharpness when you depend on a dog."

The adults answered parents' questions about how they had solved the problems of organizing their lives, their possessions and their daily activities.

Nino Pacini demonstrated how he folds paper money in different configurations to distinguish bill denominations.

"When I go to the bank, I ask for certain bills. People are honest," he said. "I have never been shortchanged. Can you imagine — if a cashier shortchanged a blind person — what a fuss the next person in line would put up about it?"

Others in the group said they used braille to label canned

goods or to take notes or for keeping track of phone numbers.

Tapes, large print books, voice activated computers and special glasses were more helpful for most of the group's reading activities. The trouble with large print books, Carlsen said, is that you need a forklift to get them to and from school.

The two-hour meeting of the two support groups ran overtime. It was pronounced a success by members of both groups.

"I see now how (a blind person) can survive. I already knew that. But it helped to talk about it," said Bryan Kadrich, the father of an 8-year-old girl who is legally blind.

Nino Pacini and Perchan said they benefited from sharing information about their lives. "It's scary for a parent with a visually impaired child," Perchan said. "It feels good to be able to help."

The support group for parents of visually impaired children meets on the second and fourth Tuesdays of the month from 7 to 9 p.m. at the Detroit Institute of Ophthalmology, 15415 East Jefferson. Facilitators are Mary Simon and Sheryl Hoffman.

The group for visually impaired young adults meets on the first Wednesday of the month from 6 to 8 p.m. on the campus of Wayne State University. Facilitators are Nino Pacini, Judi Dara and Marleine Ricca.

In addition, two support groups are available for senior citizens. One meets the first and

third Wednesday of the month from 10 a.m. until noon at the DIO. The other, the second and fourth Tuesday of the month from 10:30 to 11:30 a.m. at the Whittier. Facilitators are Jane Stone and Dorothy Cook.

The DIO is a non-profit organization concerned with ophthalmic education, research and support for the visually impaired. It operates with a combination of public and private funding to support the visually impaired community. The DIO also has an accredited two-year ophthalmic technologist pro-

gram.

The Friends of Vision is the volunteer arm of the DIO and sponsors the three free support groups as well as the Martha F. Gorey Resource Center, a source of items that aid the visually impaired such as talking alarm clocks, video reading machines and devices for writing checks, playing cards, dialing the phone and cooking.

August is Michigan's peak for fruits, vegetables

Shoppers throughout the Midwest can look forward to a steady supply of fresh fruits and vegetables from Michigan this month.

Ample early summer rainfall and sunshine are responsible for the return of the big blues this year. Forecasts call for a Michi-

gan blueberry crop 11 percent larger than last year's. Blueberry supplies should peak during the first three weeks of this month, enabling U-Pick enthusiasts to pick them between heat waves. Those of us who just like to eat blueberries will find quantity packs as well as pints and quarts at produce markets and supermarkets.

Michigan's peach harvest is under way. The popular Red Haven variety will literally be available all month from somewhere in the state. The Red Haven is a freestone peach, meaning the flesh separates easily from the pit when the fruit is ripe. To guarantee that the fruit you select is mature and will ripen properly, look for a ground (background) color that is more yellow than green.

Almost every vegetable grown in Michigan will be available

this month. This includes snap and wax beans, beets, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, celery, sweet corn, cucumbers, lettuce, onions, green peppers, radishes, spinach, soft-shell squash and field tomatoes.

This is the season to regularly shop for fruits and vegetables at farm-site markets and from farmers at public markets. Most of them will tell you how their products are grown if you ask. Locally grown specialty items such as Japanese plums, gooseberries or apricots are sold almost exclusively at farm markets. Look for the fall-harvested Heritage raspberries at farm markets and U-Pick operations by month's end.

Other fruits we can look forward to by the end of August are Clapp's Favorite pears and Stanley plums. Remember to ripen all plums and pears away from

sunlight before eating. When they are squeezably soft and have a ripe, fruity aroma, they are ready to eat. Paula Red apples will be in markets by the end of August. For now, Quinte is an excellent variety. Ask for them at your favorite farm market.

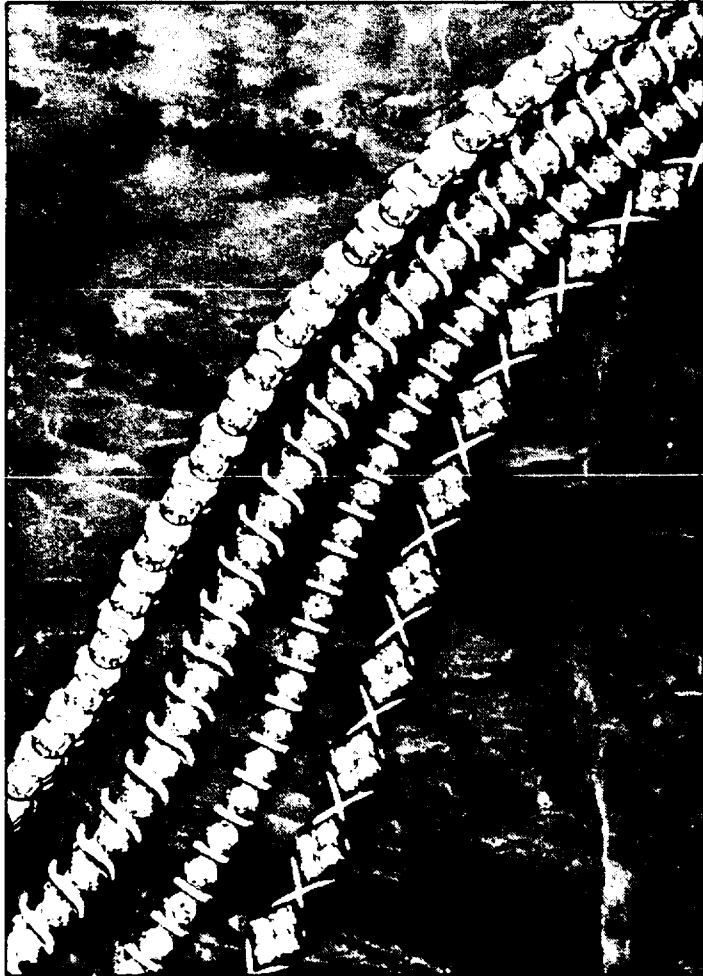

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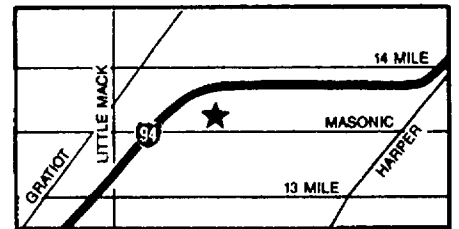
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Zoo Ball to create a taste of Africa with flora, fauna, food



Secondly, Jesus teaches us that we are to acknowledge our kinship to all others. Have you ever noticed that there is not one I, me or my in all the Lord's Prayer?

It's not "my" father but "our" father, it's not "give me my daily bread," but "give us our daily bread." It's not "forgive me my trespasses," but "forgive us our trespasses."

And we are able to receive God's forgiveness only as we are able to forgive those who sin against us. It's not "lead me"—but "lead us not into temptation." It's not "deliver me"—but "deliver us from temptation."

You are my brother, you are my sister, if we acknowledge God as our Father. And all others are our brothers and sisters. If they are hungry, or hurting or homeless, it is our kinfolk who are hungry, hurting and homeless. It is our brother who is hungry. It is our sister who is homeless.

When you pray, says Jesus, acknowledge the sovereignty of God and your kinship to all other people.

Lord, teach us to pray!

All Saints Russian Orthodox parish came into being in 1913 to serve the small Russian colony which had arrived in Detroit around the turn of the century. The Asbury Methodist Episcopal Church, designed by H. D. Butterfield and constructed in 1901, was purchased by the congregation in 1914 and the roof-top

dome, triple-barred cross and other appurtenances were added.

St. John's was the first German congregation in Detroit and was founded in 1833 in a carpenter shop where the Ford Auditorium now stands. The present church was designed by Julius Hess and the sanctuary was dedicated in 1874. At that time the spire was the tallest in the city. The congregation merged with St. Luke's in 1969 as St. John — St. Luke Evangelical United Church of Christ.

St. Joseph Parish was established in 1856 to care for parish-

ioners on farms and homes in the northeasterly direction (along Gratiot Avenue). In 1870, construction began of a new stone church at Jay and Orleans. Architect Francis X. Himpler styled it in gothic revival with a tall central tower.

The final stop will be at St. Mary's church, the third oldest Roman Catholic parish in Detroit, located in the area now known as Greektown. The first church was built in 1841 and the present edifice was dedicated in 1885. It was designed by 28-year-old Peter Dedericks in a composite of Pisan Romanesque and Venetian Renaissance. It seats 1,200.

The historic church tours are presented to acquaint metropolitan Detroiters with the history of these parishes, the arrival and movement of early Detroiters, their contribution to the cultural and religious life of the area and to focus attention on the importance of maintaining and preserving these buildings as visible history.

The program is offered by the Detroit Historical Society and the Detroit Historical Museum in cooperation with the Colonial Dames of America.

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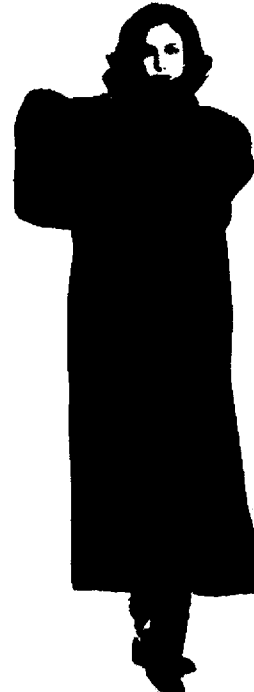
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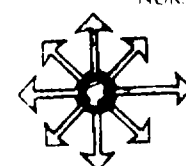

Farms resident provides personal touch to bank's services

They call her an angel, an answer to a prayer and an inspiration. Unusual descriptions for a banker. But Grosse Pointe Farms resident Mary Ghesquire is no ordinary banker.

Her title is human services representative for Manufacturer's Bank. Ghesquire assists the Bank's trust officers by visiting customers who need extra attention because they live alone or because they have health or other problems. With the majority of her clients between the ages of 75 and 90, Ghesquire continually relies on her 15 years of experience as a registered nurse and a licensed nursing home administrator.

Ghesquire's nursing background enables her to assess and evaluate her customers' medical needs and the care they are receiving. She also stays up to date on the quality of care available in area nursing homes to assist clients and their families in searching for new facilities.

For 88-year-old Florence Havalind, Ghesquire was an answer to a prayer.

"Mary came into my life at a time when I needed someone very badly," she said. Havalind had remained in her home following the death of her husband in 1982 but found managing the house by herself increasingly difficult.

Ghesquire suggested the Whittier, a senior citizen apartment complex which has nursing care available to its residents, and Havalind decided to make it her home. In addition to helping with the moving arrangements, Ghesquire was at the Whittier on moving day, assisting with the placement of Havalind's furnishings.

Havalind pointed out that she was so pleased with the results that everything is still in the same place today, one year later. That includes the important telephone numbers written in large handwriting and taped by the phone to assist Havalind, whose eyesight is failing.

During a recent visit together, the two chatted amicably about Havalind's sister and an upcoming event at the Whittier, which they plan to attend together.

Havalind produced a small package of mail, asking Ghesquire to check everything over. "When I can't see, I just don't trust myself," she said.

As they sorted through the mail together, Ghesquire suggested which items should be saved and offered to follow up on insurance-related items.

"There's nothing I wouldn't ask her," Havalind said, "and I know I'll get the best answer she has."

Most requests made of Ghesquire are quite simple: reading bank statements, setting up appointments, shopping.

Occasionally there's an unusual one — like the gentleman who asked her to take him fishing. She hopes to fulfill his wish this summer.

Ghesquire said she enjoys the variety and personal contact her work as human services representative provides. "The per-

sonal contact is very satisfying," she said. "I like being involved with seniors on a more personal level. This position allows me to be more effective in my service to them."

Ghesquire considers herself an advocate for her customers. "I am often the only one who will speak up for their rights," she said. "I want to see that they get the respect and compassion they deserve."

Manufacturers Bank is the only Detroit bank staffed with a human services representative. The bank started the service back in 1982.

The frequency of her visits varies with the customer's needs. For instance, an individual may have a doctor's appointment but no transportation, or may be looking for a new facility in which to live and would like suggestions.

Ghesquire tries to call more frequently on individuals with no families, particularly during the holiday season.

"Around the holidays, the loneliness factor increases," she said. "It's much worse for those who have no families or friends. To be there and see their faces, that someone cares enough to see them, it's a highlight. It's extremely rewarding for me to be that person who visits with them. I just wish I had more time so I could call on them more often."

Ghesquire stays in telephone contact with her clients between

visits and is always available to them. In fact, it's not unusual for customers to call her as early as 7 a.m. and as late as 11 p.m.

"Sometimes they call for reassurance, other times they invite me for lunch," she said. The fact that she can't separate her career from her home life doesn't seem to faze her. "I don't mind at all," she states. "It's very satisfying to help them, and I cherish our close relationships."

When asked what she liked most about her job, Ghesquire replied, "Being of service to these dear people...I like to see their needs fulfilled."

Prior to joining Manufacturers, Ghesquire served as a nursing home administrator for St. Anne's Mead in Southfield, the Church of Christ Care Center in Mount Clemens and the Whittier in Detroit. She also served on the board of directors of the Michigan Non-Profit Homes Association.

Ghesquire is active in the Grosse Pointe community, serving on the board of directors of Services for Older Citizens (SOC). She is involved in her church's music program, leading a folk group at St. Paul's on the Lake, and was a councilwoman for the city from November 1983 until November 1987.

Claude Pepper: Role model for seniors

Sen. Claude Pepper's death came as a numbing blow to senior citizens throughout the nation. He was 88 years old, but somehow the nation thought that he would live forever. After all, he was still fighting for the best deals possible for older Americans up until a month before he died.

It was a cause he had em-

braced years before when he was 28 years old and introduced a bill in the Florida House of Representatives to permit people 65 and older to fish without a license.

It marked the beginning of a life-long career as an advocate of government assistance for the old, the poor and the sick.

Until the end, Pepper provided a living example that age itself is no handicap. He wore trifocals and two hearing aids and a pacemaker was implanted in his chest seven years ago to regulate his heartbeat. Still, he maintained a full schedule and a heavy workload.

As a member of Congress, first as a senator and then as a representative, Pepper played a key role in a long list of major social initiatives.

During 60 years in politics, Pepper compiled a record that seldom strayed from his liberal philosophy, particularly on social issues.

Ornstein of the American Enterprise Institute. "I don't see anyone else out there with the combination of personality and drive."

Among those mentioned who might possibly take up his causes are David Pryor, D-Ark., chairman of the Senate Special Committee on Aging and Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas.

John Rother, AARP's director of legislation has this to say: "The eventual successor to Pepper may be the first one to capitalize on whatever opportunity, time and circumstance produce. What made Pepper a symbol for older Americans was Ronald Reagan's attempt to cut Social Security Benefits in 1981."

Whoever takes up the mantle will have no time to lose because the opportunity to capitalize on time and circumstance is here.

A hue and cry has gone up over last year's legislation that extended Medicare. That legislation provided one major benefit—a \$500 ceiling on patients' payments for government-approved hospital bills. Another major benefit, a \$1,370 ceiling on patients' payments for government-approved doctor bills takes effect next January. The third installment will provide for prescription drugs. It takes effect in 1991.

Customarily, Congress begins new programs by providing the benefits first; then it presents the price tag. But this time Congress sought to be fiscally responsible, presenting the price tag before providing all the benefits. Both President Reagan and Congress insisted that the program be fully financed by Medicare beneficiaries, on the grounds that they had already consumed their fair share of government resources.

Consequently, older Americans last January began paying a premium of \$4 a month, deducted from their Social Security checks, and a surtax of \$22.50 on every \$150 they paid in income taxes up to a ceiling of \$800. Those who pay the highest surtax receive the fewest benefits.

This is because the government program duplicates the health benefits they receive as retirees of private companies or government agencies. Many thought that they could purchase the same insurance less expensively, and even those who paid no surtax resented paying the \$48-a-year premium.

The complexity of the program works against it, lawmakers say. Polls indicate that many older Americans believe that the program includes only hospital benefits, and that those benefits are not a significant improvement on what they previously enjoyed.


Most Americans are unaware that the program also increases the number of days the government pays for care in nursing home or a hospice. "The beneficiaries have expressed such out-

rage, it's best to go back to square one," said Rep. Brian Donnelly, a Massachusetts Democrat who supported the bill last year and is now leading a campaign for repeal.

Despite the call for repeal, it is difficult for Congress to take back benefits once they are bestowed.

Besides, Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, a Democrat from Texas, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, which, like its House counterpart, is seeking some way to reduce both the surtax and the benefits, believes that it is basically a good program that needs some fine tuning.

It sounds like an acceptable Claude Pepper compromise.

ble—happiness, of its people is a proper concern of government. It acknowledges the value—indeed the necessity of individual work and effort. 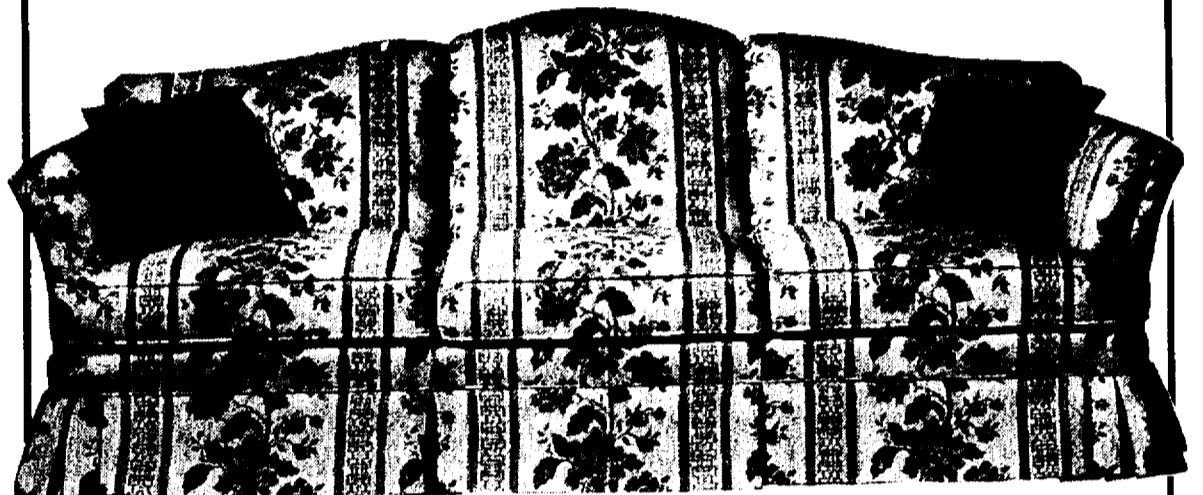

Ask almost any teen-age girl and many adult women if they weigh too much. They'll answer, "Yes!"

In our society, thin is in, and the thinner and better. But thin can be dangerous and even life-threatening when weight loss is the result of anorexia nervosa, an eating disorder.

Girls most likely to be affected by anorexia are those who are of average weight, who are good students, and who are polite, responsible children at home. They may start out dieting to lose a

few pounds because they see themselves as fat. But for reasons not completely understood, the dieting doesn't end at a few pounds.

The girls become obsessed with food but eat little or nothing. They count every calorie and exercise compulsively to reduce their weight even further. With anorexia nervosa, a girl can weigh as little as 60 or 70 pounds yet still see herself as fat.

If not treated, anorexia can lead to death. In the early stages, the disease causes missed periods, infertility, constipation, abnormally low blood pressure,

dental problems, and abdominal pain. Unfortunately, some of these problems may not go away even when the anorexic regains normal weight.

For the parents, the first indication that there is a problem aside from weight loss, may be that the teenager says she no longer has a menstrual period. Lack of periods usually occurs early in the disease, so it can be an important signal to parents and doctors to see if something is wrong with the teenager.

There is no one way to treat this disorder, but experts agree that anorexics need immediate and aggressive treatment. Eat-

ing disorder programs generally include psychotherapy for the patient and her family, nutritional counseling, and in some cases, drug therapy. Severe weight loss may require hospitalization so that the patient can gain weight. Even with therapy, some anorexics will battle their obsession with weight for the rest of their lives.

Unfortunately, most teenagers today feel that they always need to lose a few pounds to be more attractive and popular. It's important for parents and physicians to help insure that a few pounds don't take over a life.

Advertising campaigns reflect society

Did you know that before there was a Marlboro Man there was a Marlboro Woman?

It was 1927 and the ad in Vogue showed a smartly dressed young woman at a cafe table with a cup of coffee and a cigarette holder. In a delicate script that could have come from an ad for fine stationery, Marlboros were extolled as "mild as May."

The copy contained not-so-subtle messages designed to reflect the appeal of fashion and snobbery, along with purity and freshness. "Disconcerting feminine taste is now confirming the judgment of masculine connoisseurs in expressing unanimous preference for the aristocrat of cigarettes..."

There was even a red-tipped version so that a lady need not leave an unsightly lipstick ring.

"When Marlboro was trying to find a niche, it did lots of types of ads," said Allison Lee, research assistant for the Smithsonian Institution's Center for Advertising History. "The cowboy image took a long time to solidify. They used women and non-cowboy men and aristocratic-looking people. They tried everything." The Marlboro Man first rode onto the scene in 1955, but not until 1963 did the company settle on the cowboy for its dominant image.

The Center for Advertising History staff, located at the Smithsonian's National Museum

of American History, in Washington, D.C., has been busy documenting changes in society — as reflected in its ads — since 1984. And the Marlboro Woman isn't the only surprise. Who would have guessed, for instance, that Campbell's Soup thought it had a winner in, of all things, cream of tuna?

The museum had collected some advertising ephemera earlier than 1984, including the Warsaw Collection of Business Americana and the NW Ayer Advertising Agency Records. But for the most part, those materials deal with the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

Scott Ellsworth, historian at the center, said that the concept for an archival facility devoted to modern American advertising walked in the door, in a sense. It happened when Pepsi approached the museum with memorabilia in connection with the 20th anniversary of the Pepsi Generation ad campaign, launched in 1964 to attract the growing youth market.

"Halfway through, we realized we were on to something," he said. "The Pepsi project grew and created a model for future projects." Since then, the center has conducted detailed case studies of the advertising campaigns of Marlboro, Alka-Seltzer, Federal Express and Campbell's Soup, as well as Pepsi, building a collection of material for scholars interested in advertising his-

tory, marketing and the commercial use of American cultural symbols abroad.

"The Marlboro cowboys are as recognizable in the Dominican Republic as they are in Munich," Ellsworth said. "You have an image seen throughout the world. It's a tremendous advertising and marketing accomplishment. We want to try to find out how these things happen."

Advertising is a major industry, with American companies spending \$110 billion on advertising in 1987. "Additionally," said John O'Toole, president of the American Association of Advertising Agencies, "it provides a way to get a snapshot of American society."

Advertising provides a view of American history that synthesizes all sorts of historical trends," said O'Toole, who is also a member of the Smithsonian center's advisory board. "You can get a quick overview of American life by looking at an ad — what was important to people when they furnished their homes, what they ate, how they dressed, social issues, things they bought, what they thought was funny." The value of the center, says Roy Grace, chairman of the board of Grace and Rothschild and a member of the center's board, is, "It gives us a look at ourselves — as we think we should be."

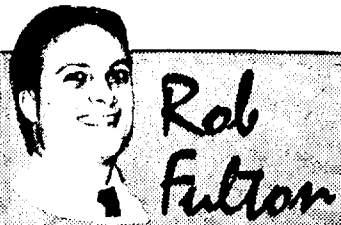

Let it fly

One full week of football practice is complete. On Aug. 9, conditioning and agility practices for local high school football teams began. On Aug. 14, teams placed the shoulder pads, buckled the chin straps and yearned for the water bottles.

This time of year is refreshing. New things are on the horizon. New faces stick earnestly out of the face mask, muscles ache endlessly, new plays are incorporated and scores of fans begin to spend more time with football than their wives — or husbands.

Young, vibrant bodies are inexhaustible. Coaches are pushing the kids to be the best. To win, to learn and to love the game.

These dog days of summer find players being inundated with pass plays, running plays, blocking assignments and defensive schemes. The repetition can seem useless and boring, but when it's third down and long, players will realize why the coach drilled them with the 66 slant, slam, dive, zip and go, wedge, hammer.

To get you through the football season, here's a little guide to football terms.

Punt: This basically means the team couldn't move the ball 10 yards, so they conceded defeat for that set of downs.

Veer: Some Red Wing players know what this means, but realistically it's when the small, 150-pound running back dashes like a bolt of lightning from the 250-pound lineman.

Rush: This happens when you drink your Slurpee too fast. Or, you get a rush when you score or recover a fumble.

Holding: This is what an offensive lineman does when he can't contain his defender.

Blitz: When you see six or so defenders rush the quarterback, you won't need an explanation.

Sack: This is when the 250-pound lineman snatches the quarterback in the backfield and tries to transplant him around the 50-yard line.

Offsides: Usually happens when an overzealous player tries for an unfair advantage.

Pitchout: Rest assured a baseball pitcher's not around.

Split end: Don't look at the cheerleaders' hair.

Wide receiver: Chubby or large kids usually don't play this position.

Reverse: This is the kind of play cameramen usually have trouble with. It's sort of a who's got it (the football).

Extra point: You only get one or two of these if you convert on the try after touchdown. No freebies or point spreads in high school football. Sorry, Pete Rose.

'89 football camps show plenty of fire

Ah, the great world of high school football has welcomed its new crop of Grosse Pointe inhabitants for the 1989 season.

With one week of practice in, it seems that the spirits are up, the attitudes are good and the players are fresh. Coaches have started watching game films, players are inspired by thoughts of undefeated seasons, and even the trainers are wrapped up in all the preseason workouts.

During the first few days of practice, many of the players didn't seem winded, or exhausted, despite working diligently. Some players have already established a position, but many others are vying for that tackle spot or linebacker position.

During the summer, the players did various things to stay in shape and prepare for the season. Ranging from bicycling to lifting crates, players at North, South and University Liggett School are physically and mentally prepared to tackle the season.

Nick Thompson, who brings 20 years of coaching from Osborne to North, spent his summer away from the game plan. He, like most interviewed, enjoyed some R and R before stepping in as an assistant coach for the Norsemen.

"I did a lot of fishing," he said. "But now that's over and I'm concentrating on football. I think this is going to be an exciting season here at North."

North quarterback Scott Bernhardt, and South QB Brian Letscher, spent most of the summer throwing the pigskin. Sure, they worked on the weights, but they focused on getting the steps down and the passes crisp.

"I worked out a lot," said Bernhardt, who returns to Coach Frank Sumner's lineup as the No. 1 passer in North history. "I threw every other day. I feel very strong and confident coming in to camp and just hope the team can come together."

For Letscher, some strolls on the 10-speed may give him the edge.

"I did a lot of lifting and bike riding," he said. "The bike riding helped me condition. Some of the guys got together for six sessions over the summer. I threw every Monday, Wednesday and Friday with the guys and we worked on some things together."

Kevin Whitfield, who will make the transition from tailback to quarterback for the Knights of University Liggett School this season, spent time on the hardwood.

"I played summer basketball with Coach Wright," he said. "After that I began working out for football by lifting in the basement."

Whitfield, who takes over for Case Western-bound Lex Smith, sees a different destiny for ULS, which is coming off its best season, 4-5, in four years.

"We've got a good team," said Whitfield. "We've got to get over the training camp injuries and get to work

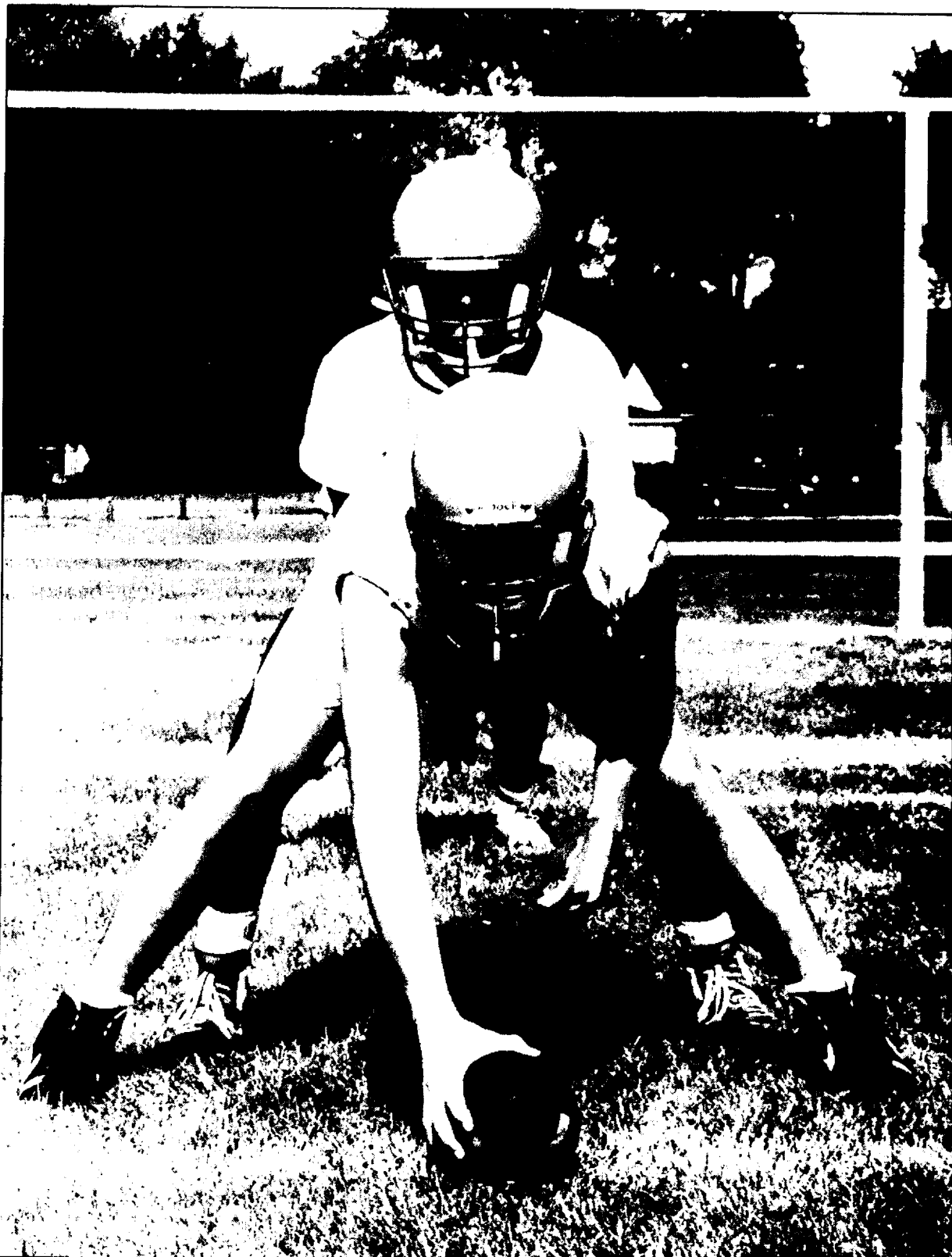

to show people what we have. This is a new, improved ULS football team."

James Dobrzecowski, who became stronger by lifting crates, agrees with Whitfield.

"We've got a senior line which averages about 185 pounds," he said. "It's not going to be another typical Knight season. It'll be a dark Knight season."

Dobrzecowski, who will anchor that senior line, took advantage of his summer job to prepare for the opener against Harper Woods on Sept. 1.

"I weight lifted every day," he said. "I work at a store and I had to lift crates every day. If I wasn't lifting weights, I knew I was still, in some way, working out."

You can take the player out of the United States, but you can't take the workout away.

"I was in Spain for four weeks and I would workout there," said ULS wide receiver Mike Barnes. "I ran a lot and played some basketball. Just because I wasn't here, didn't mean I wasn't preparing."

Charlie Stumb, North's leading receiver in a single season, tried to stay with Bernhardt as much as possible.

"I lifted and ran, and at times played basketball," said Stumb. "I also tried to get my timing down by playing a lot of catch with Scott."

Mike Montagne, who sat out four games last year with an eye injury, is ready to help South's cause.

"I did a lot of circuit training in the winter months, and ran track in the spring," said Montagne, who will play fullback for Jon Rice's Blue Devils. "This year, I am concerned with what I can do for the team. Last year, because I was injured, I had to worry about myself and I wasn't very comfortable with that. I'm just glad to be back."

Preparation was the key. South began planning for the 1989 season after getting beat by North, 27-6, in the season finale.

"As soon as we got on the bus at North, we began talking about our goals for the 1989 season," said South Z-back Jim West. "Last year we started the season with a loss (12-3 to Edsel Ford) and ended the season on a loss. We want to come in mentally prepared to go the whole way unbeaten."

West, like most running backs, had a different approach to his off-season conditioning.

"I did a lot of light workouts," he said, "not to bulk up, but to get in the best possible shape."

Tim Ryan, who will play guard and linebacker for North, lifted weights immediately following the hockey season.

"I was bench pressing and working on my leg strength a lot," said Ryan. "This year will be determined on how well our offensive line plays. Last year we knew what we had to do, but we were small and weak. This year the offensive line has got to move the ball on the ground. If we do that it should take the pressure off the passing game."

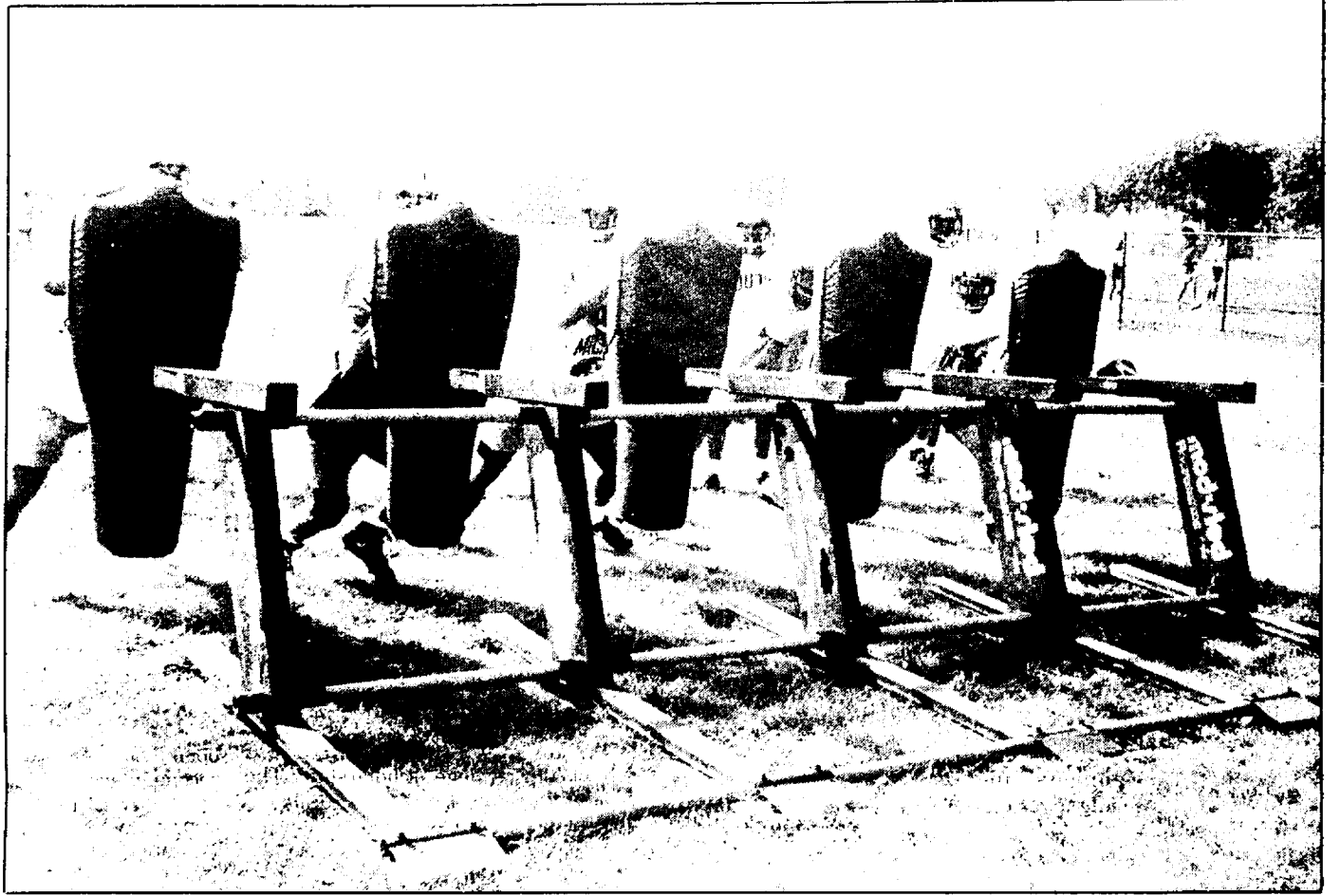
Then again, with Bernhardt and Stumb the passing game shouldn't have any pressure.

the second day of camp to perform defensive blocking drills on the blocking sled.

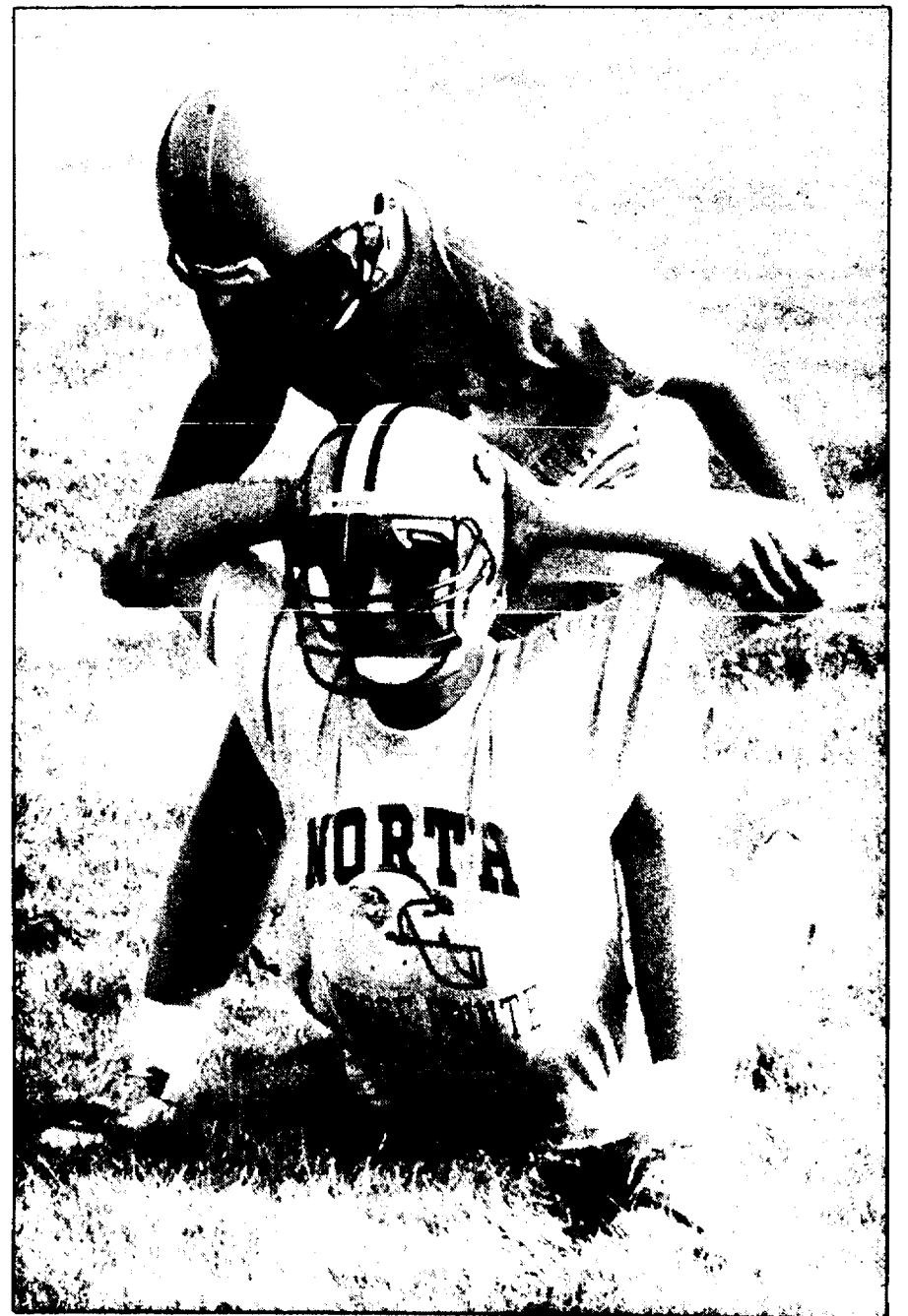

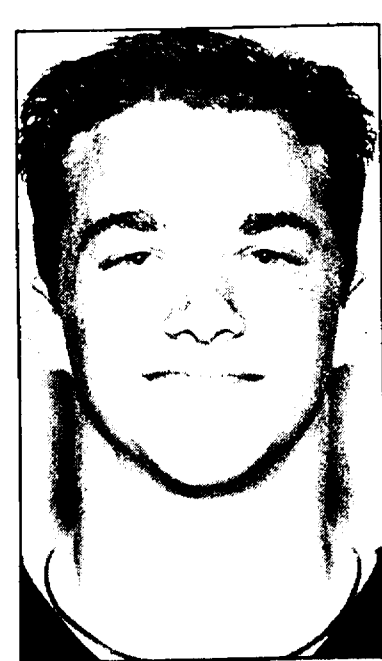
Bell. Race day went even better, as Buhl won going away, finishing eight seconds ahead of Bell.
