## Developer proposes project to save Cadieux farmhouse

The Blake Co. of Grosse Pointe has developed an "adaptive" approach to save the old Cadieux farmhouse that even has the historical society's blessing.

Company President Christopher Blake presented his plans for the farmhouse at the Grosse Pointe City Planning Commission meeting Nov. 20. His plans call for renovating the existing

farmhouse at Jefferson and Notre Dame, tearing off the kitchen and adding a garage and a second, attached home — or, more accurately, a second condominium.

Normally, historical associations may be opposed to converting an old home into a condo, but the Grosse Pointe Historical Society, which has been working with Blake on the plans, believes the local builder's adaptive approach is the best way business-

wise to save the home.

Lisa Gandelot, historical society president, told the City Council sitting as a Planning Commission that the Cadieux farmhouse was built in the 1830s and is probably the oldest wooden structure in Grosse Pointe.

"We would have liked the house to remain by itself," Gandelot said on behalf of the society, "but this is a wonderful way to show that adaptive reuse can

be good."

She urged the Planning Commission to approve rezoning the property. The alternative to Blake's plan would most likely be to lose the historical house altogether.

Blake said he has a purchase agreement to buy the house and property, but the purchase is subject to approval by the council of the necessary rezoning and variances.

Before Blake can proceed with

the conversion of the farmhouse into two condominiums, the property must be rezoned from single-family residential to two-family residential.

Mayor Lorenzo D. Browning voiced concern that changing the zoning for Blake may be considered spot zoning.

City planning consultant Brandon Rogers, who was enthusiastic over Blake's proposal, and City Manager Thomas Kressbach concurred that the rezoning would not be considered spot zoning because nearby properties on Notre Dame and Jefferson are existing two- or multi-family dwellings. Also, Bon Secours Hospital is in the same block.

"I think this is a great plan for adaptive reuse," Rogers told the Planning Commission. "My suggestion is if you like it (Blake's plan) you ought to rezone it (the property). This is a chance to save a historical house."

He said that the only other way to deal with the Cadieux farmhouse and its property is to split the lot and build two single-family homes. Each home, however, would have less square footage than the individual condos proposed, and the historical farmhouse would most likely be torn down and replaced by a new home.

Blake said the economics for the \$500,000 to \$750,000 project mean he can sell the condos for more than he could sell individual, but smaller, homes.

"I've spent countless hours on this plan, and I've done it front-

ward and backward," Blake said, "and it won't work as separate units."

At the back of the existing farmhouse, Blake plans to add a kitchen and two garages, one for each of the condos. The living space of the second condominium will be set back from Notre Dame and wrapped partially behind the garage. The set-back will make the building appear less obtrusive than a straight-line approach, and the overlap of the two condos at the garages will make more efficient use of the property.

Peter Kauffman, owner of the home, said he bought the property 2-1/2 years ago in order to save the Cadieux farmhouse from demolition. He said he put money into renovation and had it rented until the tenant moved out because the kitchen began sinking.

Kauffman, who is a member of the historical society, said he had three parties interested in his properties. Two of the parties wanted to build whatever would make the most money, he said,

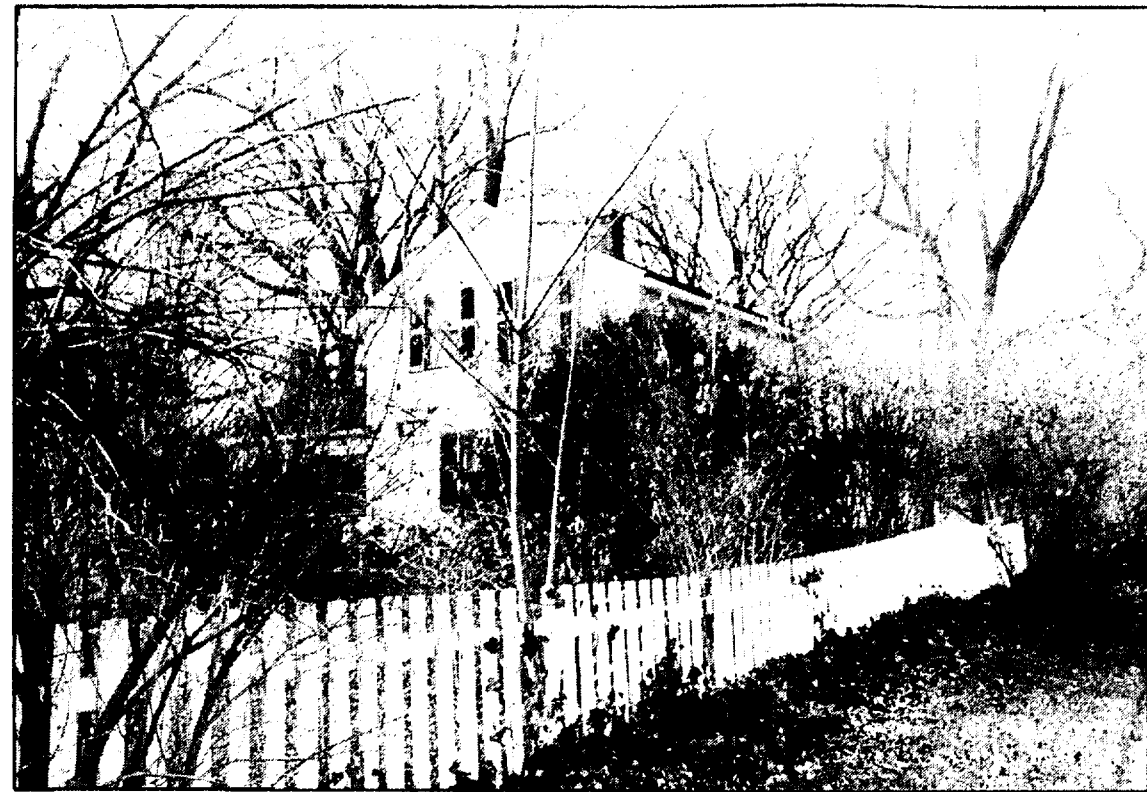

## City grapples issue of rebuilding on tiny lots

If a house were built on a tiny lot years ago before building codes were established, does that mean future builders have an inherent right to build a new home on the site?

That's a question facing Grosse Pointe City and which was debated at length by the City Council sitting as a Board of Zoning Appeals Nov. 20. No decision was made concerning the Neff property in question,

but the council agreed that whatever it decides, it may set a precedent for future builders.

Gary Haberkorn is asking the city to grant variances to allow him to build a 1-1/2 story, three bedroom home at 547 Neff. Currently there is a single-family cottage on the small lot.

The lot is zoned for a two-family home, but at only 36 feet wide, it is too small for a single-family home, let alone a two-family dwelling.

The house currently at 547 Neff has been vacant for some seven years. The dwelling is described as a 1-1/2 story Belgian cottage that was built about 1910, long before minimum lot sizes were enforced.

Because the cost of repairing the existing house would come to more than half the assessed value of the structure, it must be torn down. And even though the house Haberkorn is proposing is

roughly the same size as the existing dwelling, the neighbors are opposed to building anything on the small lot.

Haberkorn bought the lot in April. He said at the time he was advised that he would have to seek variances to build a new home on the site, but he said if he didn't buy the lot to build on, then somebody else would.

Haberkorn plans to tear down the existing house and put up a 1,607-square-foot home. The house's footprint on the lot will be about the same size of the existing house, but the new house will be about a foot wider on each side.

To diminish the feeling of closeness, Haberkorn plans to set the house back 45 feet from the street. The large set-back will allow neighbors to look at a front yard instead of at the side of a house.

Haberkorn's revised plans

show a lowered roof line and dormers, which are designed to keep the structure from looking too imposing.

Because of the small lot, four variances will be required to build the proposed house. The lot is deficient in width and area and the south side-yard and combined side-yard set-backs are insufficient. A set-back is the distance from a lot line to the house or structure.

"We believe, overall, the variances we're asking for are very minimal," said William Gilbride Jr., Haberkorn's attorney.

The lot is too narrow by about 4 feet, and the lot's area is deficient by about 335 square feet. The side-yard set-back to the south is insufficient by 3 feet, and the combined side-yard set-back is short by a little less than 4 feet.

The city's planning consultant, Brandon Rogers, said that he

still prefers that no new structure be built on the lot, but he added that if a house is built, Haberkorn's proposal is about the best for the lot.

Gilbride said his client's case is a classic example of the practical difficulties encountered in a built-up city where substandard lots exist.

"It's a single-family lot you can't live on," he said. "We're left with undue hardship."

"Undue hardship" is a recognized reason for seeking building variances, and if Haberkorn can prove the hardship exists, he may be able to build on the lot no matter what the city thinks.

James Alle, an attorney representing one of the neighbors, said that if the city turns down the variance request, Haberkorn will plead his hardship case in Wayne County Circuit Court, which could rule that the city has to allow the new house to be built.

Councilwoman Myrna Smith pointed out that whatever happens to the Neff property would be a precedent for other substandard lots in the city.

## Pointer of Interest

### Helen A. Hart

Helen A. Hart serves as a role model for women who grew up in an era when their lives were narrowly defined and who now find their opportunities are limited only by their imaginations.

When she retired from teaching and public school administration a few years ago, she promptly went back to school and, in one year, earned enough credits to begin a new career.

And her plans for the future spill out and tumble over each other until it's clear that when

Hart admits she's an over-achiever, it's almost an understatement.

But the longtime Grosse Pointe Woods resident does more than talk — she's actively involved in civic, business and religious organizations besides.

Hart was born in Hollywood where both her father and grandfather were involved in the motion picture business. Her father worked for Mack Sennett and her grandfather had his own studio.

The Depression hit and the family moved back to Detroit where her parents had been born. "Mother's family traced back to the German immigration, settling down on the east side of Woodward, and Dad's family, being Irish, settled on the west side."

Hart attended public schools, graduating from Southeastern High School, where she said she had a wonderful education.

"I came through high school during World War II and you had to take four years of math, because that's what was going to win the war. Then when I went to Wayne State, the classes were filled with returning vets and that was a terrific experience."

Hart earned three degrees at Wayne: bachelor of arts, master of education and a doctor of education administration.

## Marina rates up 10 percent in the Park

Boat well rates at Grosse Pointe Park's Windmill Pointe Park marina will cost an average of 10 percent more the 1990 boating year.

The City Council unanimously approved the increase at its Nov. 27 meeting.

City Manager Dale Krajniak said the new rates are comparable with neighboring municipal marinas, and the increases are needed to replenish the marina's cash reserves and to provide future capital improvement funds, which were depleted by dock leveling and dredging projects.

## Sign lettering growing in Grosse Pointe Park

The lettering on signs in front of businesses in Grosse Pointe Park is getting larger.

Sitting as the Zoning Board of Appeals, the City Council Monday night approved variances for two businesses to allow them to use 12-inch lettering on the awnings in front of their businesses instead of the 9-inch maximum mandated by city ordinances.

Lee Shin, of Crown Cleaners on Jefferson, recently tore down the huge, lighted sign that had been a landmark for years, and he is replacing it with a light-gray canvas awning that will be back-lighted with rows of fluorescent lights.

He asked that he be allowed to use 12-inch letters for the word "Crown." He also requested he be allowed to put the word "alterations" on the front of the awning. City ordinance allows only the business's name on the front of an awning and only on the awning's skirt.

Shin also sought permission to be able to use 12-inch letters to put "Crown Cleaners" vertically

on the side of the building, along with the telephone number in 6-inch letters.

He pointed out that he removed a painted sign that covered a third of the side of the building. He believed the vertical lettering with his business's name and phone number were an improvement over what had been on the building before.

Mayor Palmer Heenan said Shin is spending more than \$20,000 to improve the facade of the building and that the city is contributing some \$3,000 to the improvements through the Downtown Development Authority. He urged approval of the variances for Crown Cleaners.

While Councilman Daniel Clark moved to approve the variance requests, he said the 9-inch lettering ordinance ought to be looked at because the council as the Zoning Board of Appeals is routinely approving larger lettering. Clark said he would like to see consistency concerning business signs in the city.

The council approved the Crown Cleaners variances by a 6-to-1 vote, with Councilman

David Gaskin casting the no vote.

He said he didn't think 9 inches or 12 inches made a difference as far as how well motorists spotted a business along Jefferson.

"It's either right or it's wrong," Gaskin said of the ordinance. "I for one don't think I'll vote for it. Not to be a hardnose, but I believe the ordinance means what it says."

In order to present just cause for an ordinance variance, Shin had to show that adhering to the ordinance would provide him a hardship. His architect, Jeffrey Graham, said the hardship would be that motorists would not see the business.

"They (customers) won't look dry cleaners up in the Yellow Pages," he said. "They need to see us." He believed that the 9-inch lettering was too small to be noticed by hurrying motorists traveling up and down Jefferson.

Councilman Vern Ausherman, who is chairman of the council's Ordinance Review Committee, said the 9-inch lettering provision in the city ordinance will be

looked at for possible revision.

The other businessman seeking larger letters was John Carlisle, a lawyer with offices in Grosse Pointe Farms. Carlisle is a co-owner of "Jimmy Mack's Old Pointe Tavern," which is moving in where the Hollywood Nights bar used to be at Mack and Lakepointe.

Carlisle is putting up a canvas awning along the front of the building. Above the entrance the awning will protrude and will carry the words "Jimmy Mack's." The word "Mack's" will be in 12-inch letters.

Heenan pointed out that Carlisle's awning will be an improvement over what's there.

"It'll be a substantial improvement," Carlisle agreed. "Anything less than fire would be an improvement."

The Zoning Board of Appeals agreed and approved Carlisle's sign and 12-inch lettering by a 6-to-1 vote. Gaskin cast the no vote.

Carlisle plans to open Jimmy Mack's, an upscale sports bar, next month.

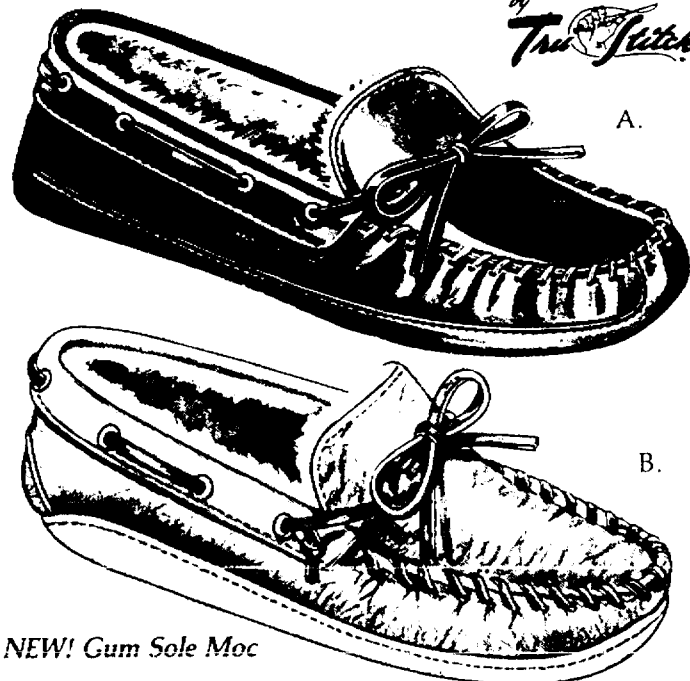

# Woods council shies away from raising parking rates

It was the parking meter rate hike that was not meant to be.

That's the way that one Grosse Pointe Woods merchant described the action, or inaction, taken by the Woods City Council at the Nov. 20 meeting.

At issue was a proposed hike in parking meter rates which the city's own parking commission strongly urged council members to reject.

William Rogers, parking commission chairman, told the council that raising meter rates will not solve any problems.

"There is no justifiable reason to do it," Rogers said.

But prior to Roger's comments Councilman Thomas Fahrner, who supported a hike in parking rates, told Rogers that the parking commission should not be telling the council what to do.

The council earlier in the year delayed action on raising meter rates and sent the item to the parking commission for study.

The council was told by City Administrator Chester Petersen that the largest increase in the proposed rate hike would be in long-term parking — from four to 10 hours — while eliminating all 12-hour parking in the Woods. Also proposed was the elimination of all one-hour parking along Mack Avenue.

Petersen told the council that

a hike in meter rates is needed to combat higher operating costs since the city has not raised parking rates in nine years.

The answer he said was to increase the cost of long-term parking (between four and 10 hours) from 15 to 25 cents per hour.

Though rejected, the price hike would have increased all day parking from \$1 to \$2.50.

"Why do we have to rip people off?" Rogers asked. "Raising the meter rates does not make any sense at all."

Fahrner, in support of the proposed higher rate, said, "In downtown Detroit you can't even walk into a parking lot for \$3."

Judy Orhan, owner of Pointe Travel, said comments like Fahrner's demonstrate that some Woods officials have a distorted view of parking in the area and throughout southeast Michigan.

"The impression we (merchants) had was that the council was ready to raise the parking rates," Orhan said. "The merchants have been reasonably vocal on parking issues. I don't think anyone on the parking commission wants to raise meter

rates."

Orhan, a former member of the parking commission, said the panel in the past was responsible for convincing the council to reduce the number of meter maids from two to one on any particular shift.

"The parking situation is not supposed to be a money-maker for the city," Orhan said. "Right now we have a good balance between the city and the merchants and things are working fairly well. What we don't need is a rate hike."

Councilwoman Jean Rice, also opposing a rate hike, said crowded parking along Mack Avenue will not end if rates are increased.

"It will not be solved by dinking around with meter rates. It will take the efforts of residents, the council, the merchants, and the parking commission. Everyone must understand that solving the problem is vital to the business in the community."

Rice added that the city will have to work with residents to create additional space and that may involve razing residential dwellings adjacent to commercial

property along Mack Avenue. Rice stressed that any long-term plan would have to be favorable to residents in the area.

Also under consideration was the purchase of electronic parking meter modules, similar to those on Kercheval in the Village.

Parking Commission Chairman Rogers also urged the council to reject a proposal by the department of public works to replace 600 mechanical parking meter modules with new electronic modules at a cost of \$111,880 or \$186.48 each.

Under the plan, the modules would have been replaced while retaining the meter housings, which would have been reconditioned for an additional \$8,400.

The total price tag for the now defunct plan: \$120,280.

"We can do a lot better," Rogers said, referring to the electronic modules. "The digital meters we have seen are hard to read and you can't see them from a car."

Councilman Paul Beaupre said the purchase of a particular style parking meter does not fall under parking commission re-

view.

Petersen said the current meters have been in operation for more than 23 years and they do not work properly.

"They're the oldest in the area. The mechanisms are beyond repair."

Petersen added that the city could order new mechanical modules at a lower price.

"We feel it is in the best interest of the city to purchase new mechanisms and install them in our housings," he said. "We are changing our recommendation to mechanical instead of electronic modules at a cost of \$100 each."

The total cost for the mechanical module replacement and reconditioning for 600 meters will be about \$60,000, nearly half the price of going the electronic route."

In the end, the council voted to approve the lower-priced mechanical modules and let the parking rates remain the same. The only change in meter times was that all 12-hour meters will now be set for 10 hours.

And when the gavel came down, Orhan, other merchants and members of the parking commission applauded the council.

## City, Park buy new police cars

The purchase of three new Grosse Pointe City police cars was approved by the City Council Nov. 20.

The cars will be bought through Oakland County's purchasing program at a cost of \$13,126 per car. The total \$39,380 purchase had been accounted for in the budget.

The Grosse Pointe Park City Council also approved the purchase of three police cars through the Oakland County purchasing program. The Park, however, got a slightly better deal.

The three vehicles will cost the Park a total of \$37,658, or \$12,552 per car.

Grosse Pointe Park Public Safety Director Richard Caretti said the Park replaces its patrol cars after 2-1/2 years. He said the other Pointes replace their cars sooner.

## Group to circulate petitions at last planned recycling day

Grosse Pointe Citizens for Recycling will circulate petitions at its last once-a-month recycling drop-off Saturday, Dec. 2 at Grosse Pointe South High School.

The petitions will request that the cities represented by the groups (the five Pointes and Harper Woods) establish an interim fixed drop-off site until curbside recycling can be provided. The group is recommending a goal of January 1991.

The petition drive is a result of stalemated negotiations with the cities. The cities were asked to accept responsibility for recycling.

Grosse Pointe Farms, at its Nov. 13 council meeting, declined to move on establishing a drop-off site on city property.

University Liggett School will continue to provide its newspaper drop-off at Cook Road and Chalfonte in Grosse Pointe Woods. The drop-off is open six days a week.

Four councils have passed a resolution requesting the Grosse Pointes-Clinton Refuse Disposal Authority to study and make recommendations to implement drop site recycling and/or curbside recycling and battery recycling at the earliest practical date.

"Although we are encouraged

by these actions, the immediate problem of where residents can take their recyclable materials this winter has not been solved," said Frances Schonenberg, president of Grosse Pointe Citizens for Recycling.

## Businesses are recycling, too

The surge in interest to recycle has spread to some local businesses which are also heeding the call to pitch in to save the environment.

At least three local businesses are helping and hoping their efforts might make a difference.

Kim Carter is a member of Grosse Pointe Citizens for Recycling and has talked two businesses — Park Pharmacy and Jess's Servicer — into recycling.

Carter, who works at Park Pharmacy on Jefferson in Grosse Pointe Park, said she talked her bosses into saving the plastic containers in which medication comes. Each month she collects approximately 20 brown paper bags full of the plastic containers which can be recycled.

Carter was also instrumental in getting Jess's Servicer, also on Jefferson in Grosse Pointe Park, to save the plastic quart oil containers.

"We go through about 200 to

Schonenberg also said that the group has studied waste management and recycling in depth in the Grosse Pointes and Harper Woods and has researched recycling efforts in other cities throughout the United States.

300 (oil containers) a week," said Jesse Rose, who has run the service station for 30 years. "It's an extra step, throwing them in a different container when we could just throw them in the trash, but we don't mind doing it if it'll help the environment. We'll do anything we can if it will help."

ONE23, the new restaurant on Kercheval on the Hill, recycles old menus and grease (as most restaurants do), according to Dan Coe, general manager.

"We started out saving glass for recycling, but it got impractical," he said, since getting someone to pick it up and take it to a recycling dropoff center was difficult.

He said that if the city would collect recyclables, the restaurant would start saving them again.

The restaurant looks for paper products made of recycled material, but they aren't easy to find, Coe said.

"I've been involved in recy-

cling right from the time Grosse Pointe Citizens for Recycling started," Carter said. "The environment is going to heck and I think recycling helps. Well, I'd like to think it helps."

She urges other businesses in the Pointes to recycle, too.

"I think a lot of places might recycle," she said. "All they need is one person to take charge and get it going. It's so easy to get used to throwing something into a different bin instead of the garbage."

"We all have to work together for this."

With the last Grosse Pointe Citizens for Recycling collection days scheduled for Saturday, Dec. 2 at Grosse Pointe South High School, the group is urging residents to continue to save recyclables, and to take them on the last Saturday of the month from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. to the Detroit East Area Residents' collection project at the Cannon Community Center on the corner of Bluehill and East Warren.

## Goodfellows to sell papers Monday

Detroit's Old Newsboys, Goodfellows, will be out in full force Monday, Dec. 4, to make sure as they have for the past 75 years that there will be no child in Detroit without a Christmas.

Plans for the 76th Goodfellow sale, with a goal of \$825,000, were finalized by attorney Alan Ackerman, who is president of the organization for 1989. The Old Newsboys, assisted by Detroit policemen, will take over downtown and uptown street corners for a few hours on Monday, hawking the papers they sold as kids.

The annual sale of Goodfellow editions of the two top metropolitan Detroit newspapers ensures a merry Christmas for 40,000 underprivileged children.

"There are absolutely no administrative expenses," Ackerman said. "The men and women running it are personally involved, many of them contributing their time, money and effort all year long. And most important, every single dollar raised goes to the kids for whom it's collected."

Goodfellow packages include T-shirts, briefs, socks, caps, scarves and knit gloves as well as jeans, books and candy.

## Rent a car seat

Car accidents are the leading cause of death for children from birth to 6 years old, and for every child killed in a car accident, about 1,000 more are injured.

Mount Clemens General Hospital is helping to reduce these statistics by offering infant and toddler car seats to the public for a yearly rental fee.

Infant car seats are designed for babies up to 17 pounds and may be rented for a \$45 fee, with a \$15 refundable deposit. Toddler car seats are for children between 17 and 40 pounds and may be rented for a yearly fee of \$10, with a refundable deposit of \$20.

Car seats must be used in the manner prescribed by the manufacturer or they will not protect a child. For parents who are unsure how to secure their child in a car seat, volunteers from the hospital review the proper use of car seats with a 30-minute presentation which includes a short film.

For more information about the car seat program, or to make an appointment to rent a seat, call 466-8289 Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

The state of Michigan requires that all children up to the fourth birthday be secured in approved restraint devices when traveling by auto. Children under the age of 1 must be secured in federally approved safety seats whether riding in the front or rear seat. Children 1 to 4 years old must be secured in a safety seat while riding in the front seat.

# Does glasnost call for U.S. spending cut?

If the Soviet Union really intends to lift the Iron Curtain that separates the East from the West, the action could yield a substantial dividend for the United States.

The dividend would be in the form of a major reduction in U.S. defense spending with the U.S. armed services already having been asked by Defense Secretary Richard Cheney to draw up plans for cutting as much as \$180 billion from projected spending over the 1992-94 fiscal years.

After reporting this story, the New York Times followed it up with a report that the Air Force has responded to Cheney's request by proposing the closing of 15 bases, stretching out purchase of the Stealth bomber and eliminating five fighter wings.

A second followup reported that U.S. military planners have proposed eliminating three Army divisions, which would cut about 200,000 uniformed and civilian jobs.

and abandoning plans to modernize the main battle tank, the M-1.

In addition, the Times reported that planners have proposed new reductions in the more than 300,000 U.S. military personnel now stationed in Germany beyond the cuts already being negotiated in U.S. conventional forces in Europe by NATO and the Warsaw Pact.

The stories warned, however, that the Pentagon had not yet made any decisions about whether to accept all of the \$180 billion in reductions and that Cheney's request was intended to force the services to identify their priorities and set an outer limit for negotiating somewhat less drastic trims.

In a later TV interview, Cheney confirmed that he had requested the study because he thinks the likelihood of a conflict

between the Soviet Union and the United States is at its "lowest level since World War II." That view obviously stems from the developments in Eastern Europe in recent months that resulted from Gorbachev's twin policies of perestroika and glasnost (restructuring and openness).

At the same time, however, Cheney emphasized that President Bush would make the final decision about any reduced defense spending in 1992-94 and that his decision probably wouldn't be made until 1990 after the final decision is made on smaller proposed cutbacks in the 1991 Pentagon budget.

The Bush administration is being chided for being too cautious at the same time it is being criticized for paying too much attention to the torrent of words coming from the Soviet Union and its satellites.

With respect to Hungary and Poland, in particular, critics are complaining that the president has failed to express with sufficient eloquence the new opportunities for a more peaceful world that lie ahead.

Bush tends to refer to his policy as one of prudence. So far that means he welcomes the movements toward democracy and capitalism occurring in Eastern Europe, is reassuring the Soviet Union that the United States does not intend to make political capital from these new developments and at the same time makes it clear the United States is keeping its powder dry.

Such sentiments appear to make sense to most Americans. Even some experts are now saying it's not too bad for the United States to have a skeptical foreign policy team in place at this time. And surely prudence is better than any precipitous retreat into isolationism.

However popular they may be, any savings from a military cutback are unlikely to be passed along to the people in lower taxes. Instead, reductions in military spending would make funds available to cut the federal deficit, finance underfunded domestic programs and meet some of the new demands for aid from Eastern Europe. Those are worthwhile goals, too.

## Little hope for school reform

The early reaction to the lop-sided defeats suffered Nov. 7 by both of the proposed state constitutional amendments to bring about school financing reform offers little hope for any new plans in the immediate future.

Senate Majority Leader John Engler, R-Mount Pleasant, who had opposed both proposals, said the vote showed simply that the people supported his position and opposed that of Gov. James Blanchard, who had supported Proposal A calling for a one-half cent increase in the sales tax to benefit K-12 education.

After meeting with leaders in the coalition that had backed Proposal A, Blanchard said he was "disappointed but not discouraged." The coalition itself vowed to seek state funding for new education programs such as pre-school, dropout prevention and more math, science and computer courses.

Engler contended the public had clearly said no to higher taxes but reiterated that he would seek more funding for education with a greater percentage of the state budget devoted to it. But since he is planning a run for the governorship in 1990, he declined to say at this time which other state programs he would cut to provide additional money for schools.

In state as well as national politics, the public appears to be cool to more taxes but at the same time says it favors greater support for some old programs and adequate financing for new ones such as child care and protection of the environment.

Two reports by non-public agencies about education problems in Michigan have done

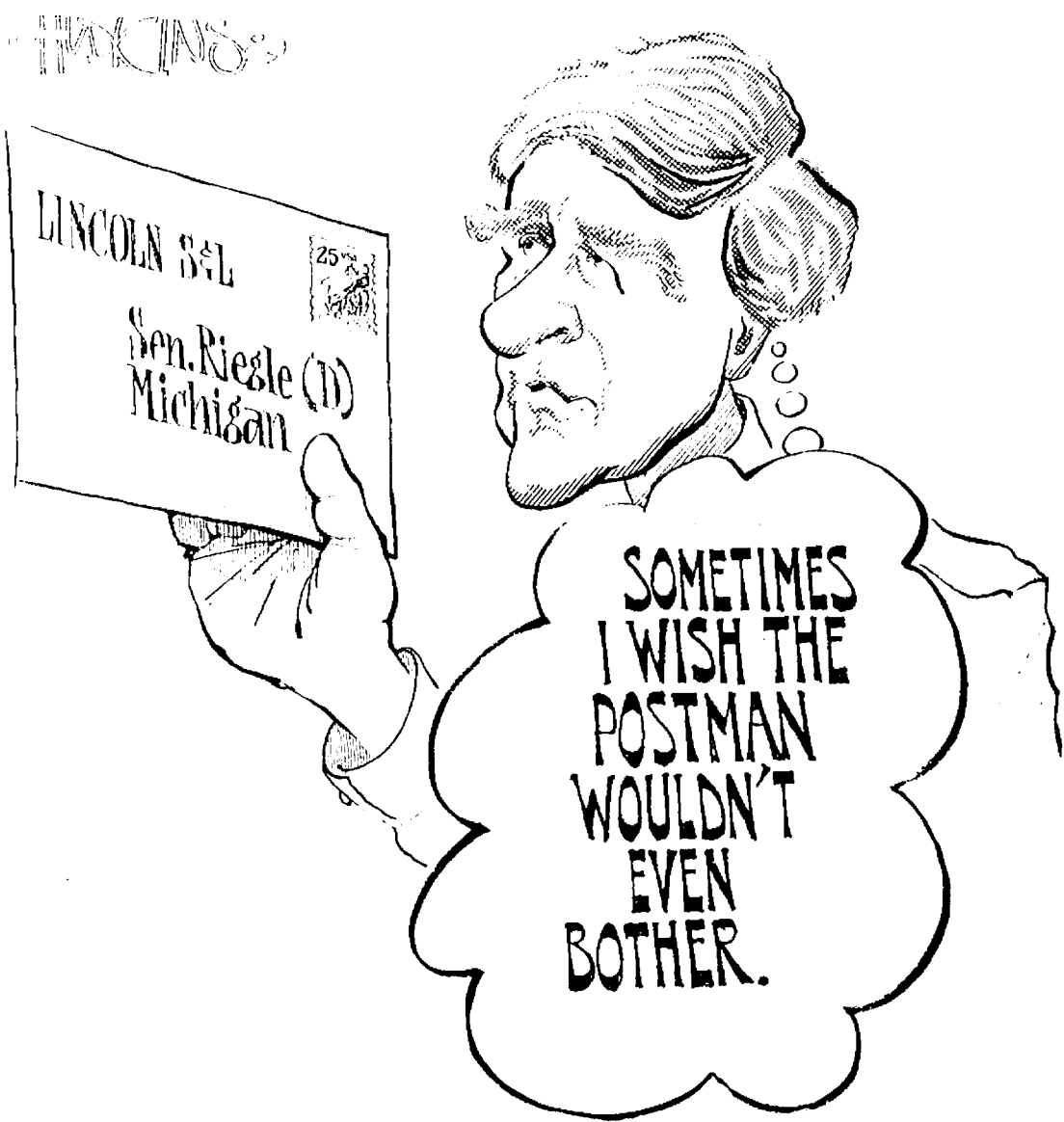
little to improve the outlook for state reform of education either in funding or other areas.

A report by the Center for Demographic Policy at the Institute for Educational Leadership in Washington recommended magnet schools in Detroit in which suburban children also would be enrolled. While integrated schools presumably would benefit both black and white children, such a plan also would require cross-district busing which already has been rejected by Detroit and suburban school people.

The second report, by Public Sector Consultants Inc. of Lansing, provided a series of school district rankings based on per-pupil spending, scores on state standardized tests and the amount residents pay in school taxes based on their ability to pay. Grosse Pointe received a low ranking based on what residents pay compared with the tax base but the whole report was appropriately called "garbage" by a Grosse Pointe school official.

Despite the resistance to taxes, we think higher taxes to finance improved schools throughout the state would be approved if the people were confident the new money would go for better programs and not be diverted to other uses such as higher staff and teachers' salaries.

In the Pointes, residents probably would agree but only if no cap on local school spending were imposed, as had been proposed in the recently defeated Proposal B. Such a cap is the route to greater state control and mediocrity, not further improvement and achievement.



## A shaky start for the JOA

Detroit's joint operating agreement between the News and the Free Press went into official effect Monday, but it was a shaky start until a tentative contract settlement on Tuesday apparently averted a strike threat.

That means that after 43 months of waiting for a JOA decision, readers, advertisers and employees of the two papers can be assured that the first joint editions will be published Saturday and Sunday.

However, when the joint editions appear, they won't be the first ones ever published by the Detroit papers under joint nameplates.

In fact, the papers published joint editions for 10 days in July 1980 during and after the 1980 Republican National Convention in Detroit because a Teamsters Union strike had closed the Free Press. The joint paper was published on the presses of The Detroit News until the

strike was settled.

By coincidence, the Teamsters was one of five newspaper unions threatening to strike at 12:01 a.m. Thursday and thus further delay the full implementation of the joint operating agreement.

As they appeared Monday, both newspapers provided new features and new organization of news material in their efforts to retain their individual readerships five days a week, Monday through Friday. Both stressed "improvements" but the changes cannot offset the loss of separate papers on Saturdays and Sundays.

It now appears that the joint editions under the JOA will be published this weekend, despite the efforts of the unions and the critics who had forced the papers through a series of court actions that lasted more than 3-1/2 years.

Although public opinion is divided on the value of the JOA to the Detroit metro area and to Michigan, Gov. James Blanchard took a positive view. He said in part that the decision "means we'll continue to have two major statewide newspapers and guarantees the diversity of ideas and opinions provided by The Detroit News and the Detroit Free Press will continue."

We have the same opinion, governor, because we think the Free Press had fully intended to carry out its threat to close the paper if it didn't win approval for the JOA. We still believe limited competition five days a week provides a better public service than a monopoly daily would offer

A little vigilance, by a large number of citizens, is the best way to ensure that our community will remain one of the best in which to live and for raising a young growing family.

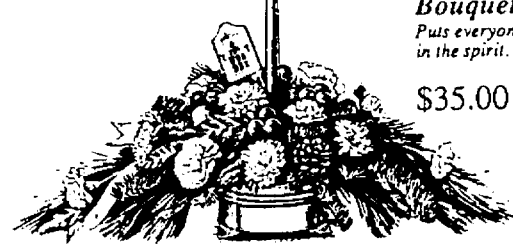

## Abortion

## To the Editor:

Along with a lot of others, I hope, I deplore the expanding politicization of the most challenging moral issue of my lifetime: legalized abortion.

First Helen Milliken, wife of Michigan's longest-serving governor and lifelong republican, says she will endorse (without mentioning his name) Governor Blanchard.

Why? Because he is doing a good job in governing our state? No, because he is in favor of abortion. Never mind educational deficiencies, massive budgetary problems, health problems, child care, poverty, homelessness, taxes — the whole, sorry long list of state and national crises.

No, hard-rock Republican Helen would prefer to push her favorite project: killing unwanted babies. Read her lips.

It's not just Helen: Democrats won the mayor's job in New York and the governorship in Virginia. Both endorse abortion on demand. Since both candidates are black, except for the abortion factor I would regard this as a most welcome, wholesome triumph over racism.

Recently, Catholic Archbishop Theodore E. McCarrick of the Newark Archdiocese wrote: "In the aftermath of the significant recent Supreme Court decisions relating to the abortion question, you and I, together with many people of goodwill from the Protestant and Jewish communities as well as those who profess no formal religious ties, are going to be entering a period of unusual stress and strain..."

Well, that period is here — right now.

First off, abortion is baby-killing. Okay — tell me it's not killing, because it's "just a bunch of cells," or, "it's just a blob of protoplasm." Sorry, but that answer could be accepted only by those

who know nothing of philosophy — specifically metaphysics, the science of "being" — and little or nothing of theology.

At conception, those cells begin dividing and redividing according to a definite genetic architectural plan. They possess what in metaphysics is commonly referred to as "potential" being, as distinguished from "real" being. The potential baby will proceed to real baby unless interrupted by the abortionists' hot saline solution, or surgical scalpel or some other means. Despite all the euphemisms, the equivocations and meretricious garb, after the abortionist washes his hands, there is one less person to be born into the world.

Don't buy "pro choice" talk either. This sounds like such an eminently fair position. Actually it's meaningless. "Pro choice" is the law of the land today. Nationally, abortion on demand is legal. "Pro choice" at present is a tawdry device to permit ambitious pussyfooting politicians to run in opposite directions at the same time. You've heard it: "Personally, I'm against abortion, but I think every woman has a right to control her own body, etc. etc..."

Back to philosophy. Ethics teaches us that "every right has a corresponding responsibility." Thus, the right to sex obliges its proper use. Thus, if a woman has a "right to control her own body," and she's pregnant and doesn't want to be, somebody lost control.

Let's understand another thing. The woman's right to control her own body does not confer the right to kill a third party to her act of creation.

Many of the people I've talked to admit to being "pro choice," or out-and-out pro-abortion. When we get around to reasons — why, I find a discouragingly great number of them aren't really

so high-minded and concerned about the woman's rights — or the fall-back positions of rape, incest and so on. What they're really favoring abortion for is to get rid of babies of the poor who would, of course, become welfare clients, and probably cost them some tax money. Not really very high-minded after all.

Helen Milliken's fellow Republican politicians have milked this abortion issue dry. Reagan campaigned against abortion twice and won by landslides both times. But in eight years in office, he never made one public speech, never confronted one abortion issue head on. And his stage director Nancy is on record as saying, "I don't give a damn about the Right to Lifers."

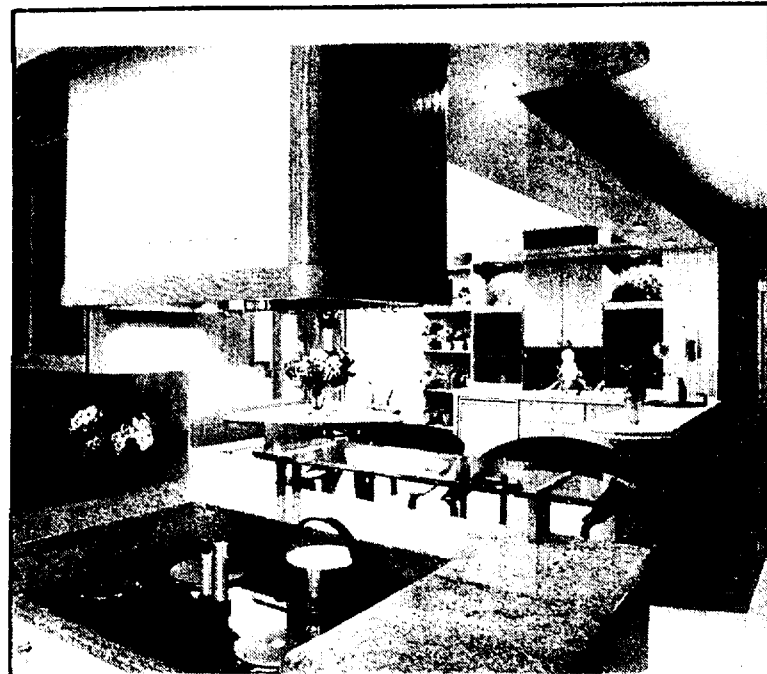
George Bush was pro-abortion in the 1980 primaries, but anti-abortion in 1984 and 1988. Now I don't know where he really stands. All I know is where his rhetoric stands.

So the archbishop was certainly right. We sure are entering a period of "stress and strain."

The saddest thing to me is taking, as I said, the most important moral issue of our time, and making it just one more political stance, based on how many votes it will pull.

If any of you really feel the "stress and strain," may I suggest you take a look at what "Pregnancy Aid, Inc." has to offer.

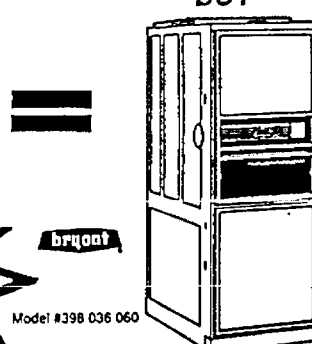

As some of his friends got older and outgrew their Legos, they gave them to John who built even bigger towns out of bigger houses and huge space stations from which spaceships were launched.

He moved up to building models which are proudly displayed in his bedroom and basement of the Grosse Pointe Farms home he shares with his parents, Peggy and Vic, and his older brother, David.

"But the models drove my eyes buggy with all those little pieces," he said.

Then he read a classified ad which offered a partially built doll house. He bought it and went to work.

"It was built by a pre-school class," his mother said. "It was completed, but it looked like it had been through the San Francisco earthquake."

The walls were crooked, the floors sagged — it looked as though it were built by, well, a pre-school class.

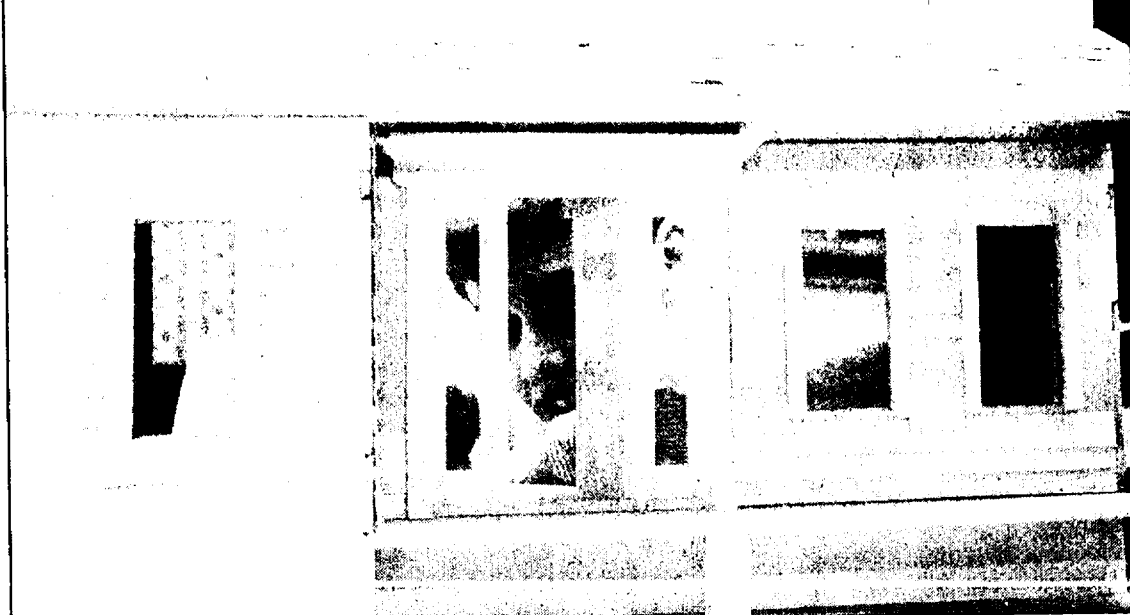
He took the Victorian-style farmhouse apart and redesigned and rebuilt it. At more than 3 feet wide, 2 feet deep and just under 3 feet high, it was one of the biggest projects John had done. With this house barely finished, he set off on another large project. It's another doll house, but this time, he designed it.

"I want to be an architect and this will give me practice," he said.

Because he likes older styles of houses, especially those with porches, he modeled his current project after some of the older houses in the area.

When completed, it will have 11 or 12 rooms, fully furnished — with mini-furniture designed and built by John because pre-built furniture is too expensive — and it will be wired for elec-

"It's a real expensive hobby," John said, but he paid for it by dog sitting and doing other odd jobs around the house.

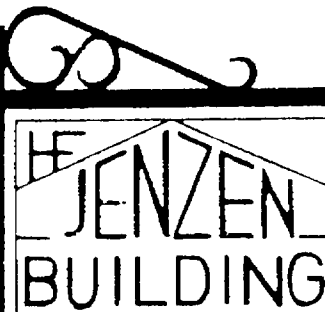
"We're real proud of him because he did this all by himself," his mother said. "We supplied the Legos for a long time. He does this by himself."

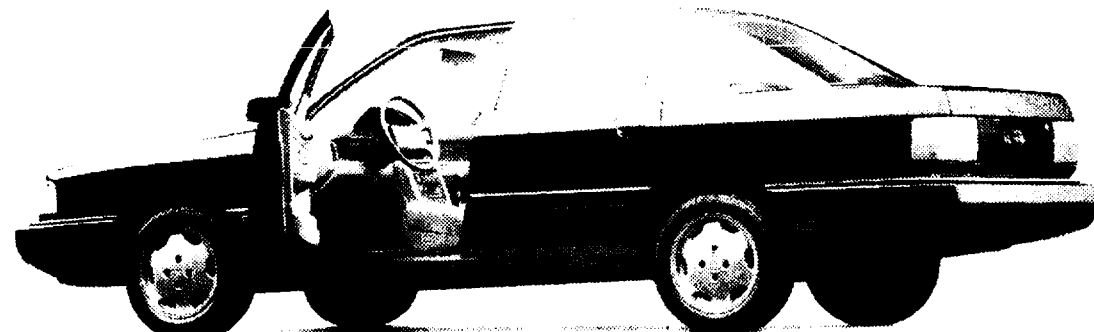

# Counselor: Police deserve our support, not derision

As the student assistance program coordinator for the Grosse Pointe School System, my responsibilities include working directly with students who have substance abuse problems, as well as working with those adults inside and outside the school community who are trying to reduce the drug menace that our children and our society as a whole face.

Now the Grosse Pointe News has given me the opportunity to talk directly with its readers about what I see as some of the crucial questions we must ask and answer as we fight this latest "war on drugs."

I decided that my first column would be a copy of the letter I just wrote to the Grosse Pointe South school newspaper, The Tower. The letter is in reference to an incident that took place on Friday, Nov. 10, on Fisher Road across from Grosse Pointe South High School. Officers from Grosse Pointe Park, City and Farms police departments arrived during the lunch hour after receiving reports that certain people were buying and selling drugs at that location. They questioned, searched, and in the view of many students, intimidated a number of young people who were gathered across the street from the school. No drugs were found.

## To the Editor:

I was not in the building on Friday when "the big drug bust" occurred, so I'm sure I do not know all the facts. Perhaps, as I have heard, some police officers were over-zealous in searching students. But I am concerned that so far the only criticism I have heard is aimed at police. I've heard nothing said about the fact that it is the people who buy, sell and use drugs on or near South's campus who are the true "bad guys." It is they who put innocent South students' rights in jeopardy — not the police.

I've heard a lot of outrage expressed over the number of students who were searched who were not in possession of drugs. However, many students who regularly frequent Caffè Trevi and Farms Market also acknowledge privately that they were surprised that none were found — especially on a Friday afternoon. If students were surprised that no drugs were found, doesn't that indicate that the police were probably right in assuming that they might reasonably expect to find some?

I'm glad they didn't find any drugs, but I'm not naive enough to believe that that means that there is no sale or use of drugs taking place around South's campus, and quite honestly I'm

glad the police are trying to do something about it. Because you only have to read the papers or watch TV to know that the more drugs there are in a neighborhood, the more dangerous that neighborhood is.

My job is to try to reduce the demand for drugs, not the supply, but I know how much harder my job is when alcohol, marijuana, LSD, cocaine or any other drug is easily available. What most students don't think about is that when they buy their little bit of pot or coke for the weekend, they are not only risking addiction, they are supporting a business that depends upon addiction and violence to exist. Perhaps they're buying from a South student, a "regular person," but where is that person getting the drugs he or she sells?

Within a mile or two of South, people are being killed to protect this "business" — one that these South "student sellers" are indirectly working for and that South "student buyers" are supporting. Therefore, whenever a student buys pot, acid or coke — even from another student — he or she is bringing the crime and violence of the drug trade closer to the innocent students and people of Grosse Pointe.

Why don't the students who don't use object to this danger and the potential loss of free-

doms they are subjected to by those who use? Perhaps illegal drug use has become so commonplace that even students who don't use aren't sure that it is any of their business if others do. But just as importantly, many of them are afraid to say anything. And this is perhaps the saddest fact of all, because in my judgment they are right to be afraid. And this fear is proof that all of us — innocent and guilty alike — are suffering because of drugs.

So I applaud the Grosse Pointe Park, City, and Farms police for sending the message to those who use or sell drugs that they may not do so with impunity. They are attempting to protect us from the pain, crime, and violence that drugs inevitably cause, and they deserve our support, not our derision.

And to those South students who are now buying or selling drugs: quit. Quit on your own if you can, but if you can't, ask for help. It is available and you deserve it.

If the frankness of this letter and the matter-of-factness with which I speak of drug use and sales among Grosse Pointe students shocks some readers, please understand that such a letter could be written about virtually every school population in every community in this nation. That is how pervasive the problem is.

Please don't misunderstand me: We don't have the problems that Detroit and many other big city school systems have. We don't have students brazenly using and selling drugs in our schools. But neither are we "drug-free."

For those of you whose first reaction is still outrage, as if Grosse Pointe should somehow be immune, or the school or the police should somehow be able to stop this from happening in a community like ours, please understand this: We are trying. We have school programs that attempt to prevent first use, intervene when use is discovered, and enforce reasonable consequences when rules are broken. We cooperate with the police in all five Pointes when we hear of illegal activities. At this time we feel

we are holding our own: Drug use and sales are not rampant among our young people.

But the schools cannot fight this battle alone. We need the help of the entire community, and that will only occur when the entire community becomes aware of how serious this threat is, right here in Grosse Pointe.

In coming weeks I hope to use this column to share some of the strategies that this and other communities are using to combat this problem. I welcome your ideas as well. Individually, perhaps even as a community working together, we cannot do everything to stop the abuse of drugs in our society, but we can do many things, and we have to try.

## Trees: Always fascinating

Don't think for a moment because fall leaves and colors are gone that trees become boring photographic subjects. On the contrary, trees are always fascinating and are a favorite subject for my camera no matter what the season.

As winter approaches, trees offer a whole new appearance — one of starkness and boldness as bare branches reach outward and upward in dramatic, geometric and sometimes romantic patterns.

Many scenes that perhaps were blocked by summer foliage will now be visible and you can use curving twigs and branches to "frame" your subject just as you might have used foreground foliage in the summer.

Use a small enough aperture to get the depth-of-field you need to render both the foreground and background in sharp focus. The depth-of-field scale on the lens barrel or your camera's depth preview button will assure that everything will be sharp. Out-of-focus branches will spoil what may have been an exceptional shot.

Bare trees and branches can also be shot against the sky to

obtain stark, graphic designs that often will display the beautiful, flowing patterns of nature.

Begin by carefully studying the composition in the viewfinder to make sure there's a balance and flow to the elements in your picture. Try to get a certain "rhythm" in your shot. Take your exposure reading off the sky and the branches will appear as a design of black silhouettes.

Tree silhouettes work especially well against a dramatic sunset or cloud pattern, too. Even try including the sun in the picture for a "starburst" of excitement.

Be sure to take some bare tree photographs after a snowfall. The contrast between fallen snow and dark branches is dramatic and will give you many rewarding pictures.

Whether it's an overall scene of bare trees in a field of fallen snow or an intimate shot of a single branch laced delicately with a few frosty flakes, you'll be glad you braved the chill.

So let your photographic knowledge branch out by letting bare trees and branches add a new and challenging dimension to your photography.

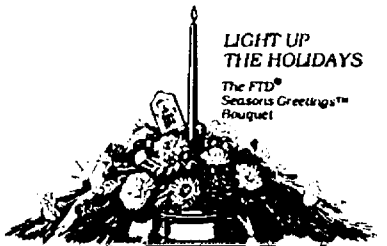

The Tower, Grosse Pointe South student newspaper, set a national record as it received the coveted Pacemaker Award at the National Scholastic Press Association convention in St. Louis last week.

South's student newspaper has won Pacemaker recognition more often than any other paper in the country.

The Pacemaker Award was given to the eight best student newspapers in the country by the press association in cooperation with the American Newspaper Publishers Association. A team of editors from the St. Louis Post Dispatch made the selections.

This marks the Tower's sixth Pacemaker Award, having won previously in 1967, 1970, 1977, 1978 and 1986. It was named Pacemaker runner-up in 1979 and won regional awards in 1984 and 1987. Only one other school in the nation has won six times.

Jonathan Nevison, the newspaper's business manager, was in St. Louis to receive the award, and he made the presentation to this year's staff upon his return.

Selection for the award was based on a three-step process. To qualify, a paper must earn All-American honors in an evaluation service sponsored by NSPA and receive marks of distinction in all five aspects of the evaluation. The Tower has been All-American every year since 1957.

From those papers, the St. Louis Post Dispatch editors chose 30 regional Pacemakers. The Tower was one of five papers honored in the East regional. The national winners were then selected from the regional winners.

In addition to the All-American and regional and national Pacemaker recognition, the Tower has been honored by two other organizations this fall. The American Newspaper Publishers Association and the Association for Educators in Journalism and Mass Communication selected the Tower to represent Michigan

among the country's Nifty Fifty outstanding student newspapers and scholastic journalism programs.

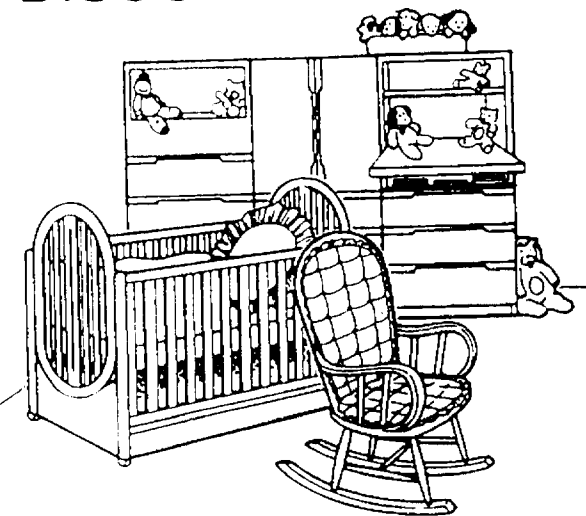
The Tower also received the Medalist Award, with All-Columbian honors in all five aspects of an evaluation sponsored by the Columbia Scholastic Press Association at Columbia University. The Tower earned 982 of a possible 1,000 points. The judge commented, "The professionalism that this publication shows 'Towers' over and above the majority of student (and professional) publications in the country."

All of the honors were based on evaluations of last year's newspaper, edited by Julie Wheeler.

Women then had several choices open to them: "You were either a teacher, nurse or secretary." Teaching was a natural, because her mother was a teacher.

Hart began her career at the old Monteith School in Detroit near Indian Village. After five years, she was promoted to teaching assistant principal, then free assistant principal and then principal at Clippert School.

She spent the rest of her career in central administration as director of staff development and teacher training. The job involved working with colleges and universities in placing student teachers, and training teachers, administrators and non-teaching personnel including bus drivers.

"During those days, we had a

lot of federal money and we were able to do a lot of training," she said.

While she was with the school system, Hart and several other women began the Michigan Professional Women's Network, the first such support group. It continues to meet regularly.

She was also one of the first teachers to do an educational program on Channel 56 that covered all aspects of social studies. "We were live and it was a lot of fun."

Hart retired in 1984. "Several opportunities presented themselves to me and I thought I would try my hand at financial planning," she said.

She took the six classes necessary to become a certified financial planner. To become certified, a person must pass six three-hour exams on the following: 1)

personal financial planning; 2) risk management; 3) investment planning; 4) personal income tax planning; 5) retirement planning; and 6) estate planning.

The course normally takes two years to complete, but Hart was finished in one year. She affiliated with the America Group in Farmington Hills, which is part of a national organization of state mutual companies.

"I particularly enjoy working with people, pre-retirement or retirement, and helping them feel they are secure."

While beginning a new career is a full-time challenge, Hart belongs to a number of organizations: American Business Women's Association, Grosse Pointe chapter, and the Women's Connection of Grosse Pointe, both of which she sponsors for monthly meetings at the Yacht

Club; chairperson of the parish council at Our Lady Star of the Sea; member of the board of directors of the League of Catholic Women and a member of Michigan Women Studies Association, the group that worked to develop the Michigan Women's Hall of Fame in Lansing.

She has served with the United Foundation, the Black United Fund and the Children's Museum of Detroit.

Hart says she enjoys serving as a mentor. "During the '70s we talked a lot about networking and mentoring and it's still very important for women to be supportive of other women."

She advises women in college to affiliate themselves with groups on campus, besides sororities, such as campus ministry groups and pre-professional groups.

Hart's future plans include going back to her birthplace — California — and living there part of the year and here the rest of the time. She said she'd live there "earthquakes and all," probably settling in the San Diego area.

"I probably will keep on going and I do feel personally that you have to constantly be challenged. I could not just retire period," she said.

In her spare time, Hart enjoys traveling, reading, going to the theater, Detroit Institute of Arts and Grosse Pointe Symphony concerts.

She has an interest in history. Besides being the keeper of "loads of old movie stills," Hart said she would like to trace her roots someday when she is able to devote herself full time to the project. And she recalls her move to Grosse Pointe Woods in 1953:

"The Milk River was still running along Chalfonte, and Cook and was a one-lane dirt road. There was a farmhouse on the corner of Cook and Moross and at the end of Hidden Lane was a cow. There were a lot of little farms. I just saw that whole area east of Moross develop like nobody's business."

## Successful money-managing, according to Helen A. Hart, CFP

Q: I read that I could buy Treasury Bills from the government. In the past I bought them through my broker and paid to make the purchase. How can I buy these myself?

A: Find your nearest Federal Reserve Bank and ask for a tender form. Complete the one page and mail it in with your check (at least \$10,000). You will receive the difference between the auction price and the amount you sent in. At the end of three months you will receive the combined interest and principal, \$10,000. You also can purchase them in person at the Federal Reserve Bank. Three-and six-month bills usually are auctioned on Mondays.

Q: I received a phone call yesterday from a person who said she had a super investment in a strategic metal used for defense industries. She said I could earn a "fast dollar" if I sent my money in and got in on the ground floor because of new defense contracts being let out by the government. How do I know this is on the level?

A: If the caller thinks this is a sure thing investment, why is she on the phone telling you? Caveat emptor. Let the buyer beware.

Q: I don't understand mutual funds. How do they operate?

A: When you invest in a mutual fund, you are buying shares of the fund. The fund pools the money of many investors to buy stocks, bonds on many markets that will help the fund and its investors achieve their objectives. When the fund earns money, it distributes earnings to the shareholders. Investors who do not need income choose to re-invest and participate in dollar cost averaging.

Q: OK. What is dollar cost averaging?

A: By systematically reinvesting dividends, interest and/or capital gains, you purchase additional shares or fractions of shares at the current net asset value. These usually vary on a day-to-day basis. By systematically purchasing on a monthly or quarterly basis, you average out your overall investment between the high and low sale prices.

Q: I overdid it during the holidays. My credit card balances are more than I can handle. What can I do?

A: There are several steps you need to take immediately. First, list all of your monthly expenses. See if you can begin to trim some of these to free up money to help with the debts. Be honest with yourself. Can you identify things nice to have, but not neces-

sary? Can you cut out frills? Cut to the bare bones. If freeing up some funds to pay your creditors doesn't clear up all the debts, next contact your creditors and try to negotiate a payment schedule. If you have a good credit record, creditors will usually work with you. You might want to consider a home equity loan if you are a homeowner. You may be eligible for a tax reduction on your interest rates. Check this with your tax adviser.

Q: My father had a \$5,000 life insurance policy and told us that was all that was needed to bury him. Today I hear my friends talk about life insurance policies at \$50,000 or more. How much does a person need?

A: Most life insurers will tell you that the rule of thumb is an amount from five to eight times your annual salary. If you earn \$50,000 per year, your life coverage might range from \$250,000 to \$400,000. While this seems like a lot, several considerations are taken into account: Is your spouse able to work? Age of children? Cost of college education? Number of years until the spouse is eligible to receive Social Security when it ceases for children? Life insurance means just that — for the living.

By a 4-3 vote, the Grosse Pointe Farms City Council denied a business license application for a car rental agency at the Sears factory outlet at Moross and Mack.

Solak said even under the special conditions section, which is very broad and sweeping in its interpretation, the car rental agency was deemed unacceptable by a majority on the council.

Voting against the application were Mayor Joseph Fromm and councilmen Emil Berg, Gregg

Berendt and John Danaher. Voting for approval were Gail Kaess, John Crowley and Harry Echlin.

## Woods council divided on mayor pro-tem choice

The recent election in Grosse Pointe Woods came off without a hitch — almost.

As a matter of procedure, the council elects a mayor pro-tem from within the ranks at a council meeting following the elec-

tion.

The position of mayor pro-tem was held by Councilman Robert Novitke, whose term as mayor pro tem expired recently. His term as councilman runs until November 1991.

At the Nov. 20 meeting, Councilwoman Jean Rice nominated

Novitke for another term as mayor pro-tem.

Councilman Thomas J. Fahrner then nominated Paul Beaupre. The move was supported by William W. Wilson.

But when the time came for an open-voice vote, Wilson said he did not want to make his

choice public. Instead, he asked for a secret written ballot.

The idea was acceptable to Chester Petersen, city administrator, but did not sit well with Rice, the top vote-getter in the recent general election.

"We have to be careful," Rice said, "Anything we do must be out in the open."

Mayor George Freeman agreed and advocated the traditional open-voice vote.

But Wilson asked if the vote could be postponed until the council could confer with city attorney George Catlin, who could not attend the meeting.

Rice said the item is on hold until the next meeting. "It would be nice to preserve everyone's feelings," Rice said, "But that's not the name of the game."

Mayor Freeman, presiding over the meeting, granted the postponement until the next meeting of the council Dec. 4.

The position of mayor pro-tem pays \$1,000, the same as a regular council seat. The mayor pro tem presides over council meetings if the mayor cannot be present and serves as interim mayor if the mayor resigns before his or her term is completed.

# Residents invited to take a historical walk in Woods' 4 parks

The Grosse Pointe Woods Historical Commission wants to take residents on a walk through the city's four main parks.

The emphasis of the walk is on the historical development of the parks.

But, according to D.J. Hallman, director of the Parks and Recreation Department, the future of the parks is just as important as the past.

The historical commission has outlined the past development of the city's parks in a brochure titled "Take a Walk in the Woods." The brochure was made possible with funds earned by Mayor George S. Freeman at the recent 1988 Mayor's Work Day at Disney World in Orlando, Fla.

Included in the brochure are descriptions and locations of the parks. And thanks to Hallman, the historic development of the parks is coupled with current descriptions and even some plans for the future.

So put on your walkin' shoes and join us for a walk in the Woods.

In 1945, the city's second largest park facility and the site of the current Woods city offices,

Ghesquiere Park, was purchased for \$42,000. The plot, known as Mack Park, originally consisted of more than 44 acres and was located in Gratiot Township. Three years later a 12-acre portion was sold, leaving the current Ghesquiere Park and municipal complex at about 32 acres.

Ghesquiere Park was named after Alois A. Ghesquiere, president of the village of Grosse Pointe Woods from 1939, when the municipality was changed from the village of Lochmoor until it became the city of Grosse Pointe Woods in 1950.

Hallman said Ghesquiere Park has been improved in recent years with the installation of the "magic square" game and skating area, the gazebo, the new playground area and the improved baseball diamonds for the Little League and Babe Ruth baseball leagues.

The city's largest municipal park, Lake Front Park, is approximately 53 acres and is not located in Grosse Pointe Woods, but in neighboring St. Clair Shores.

Located on East Jefferson at the foot of Marter Road and adjacent to the Edsel & Eleanor Ford property, Lake Front Park sits on land owned by the Woods. The plot was owned by the Fords.

In 1946, when the Woods had a population of about 6,600 people, a master plan was created. The plan, outlining the need for a municipal park, included growing population projections and estimates that the city's population would triple in just two decades.

Recognizing the need for a municipal park, a generous offer was made to the municipality by Eleanor Clay Ford, who offered an option for purchase of a portion of her estate for the proposed park site.

Soon after, a special election was held on March 10, 1947, which allowed taxpayers to decide on the land purchase. The acquisition was approved in a 962-460 vote. In February of the following year, the village took title of the land at a cost of \$60,000.

## Drinking teens face parents

Five Grosse Pointe City teenagers who were found with beer in their vehicle were released to their parents by City police Nov. 24.

Police stopped the teens' vehicle, a 1990 Jeep, at 10:30 p.m. for speeding at Fisher and Maumee. The officer saw beer in the vehicle.

The driver of the vehicle was a 17-year-old boy. His passengers included a 16-year-old boy and three girls, ages 14, 15 and 16. The 15-year-old girl had just celebrated her 15th birthday Nov. 23.

The officer who made the traffic stop took the youths to the City police station where they were detained until their parents picked them up.

The driver of the Jeep was cited for speeding.

The park now offers swimming, boating, racquet games, playgrounds for tots and picnic areas.

Hallman said recent park improvements by the city include new playground equipment, a sun shelter serving both the swimming area and adjacent park area, a new concession stand and comfort station.

The city is continuing dredg-

ing at the mouth of the Milk River so that sailboats can easily exit and enter the Lake Front Park marina, Hallman said.

The old swimming pool bathhouse was recently converted into a recreation building which is also used for a warm-up area for ice skaters during the winter months. Also, a sledding hill was recently installed at the park.

Hallman added that the city is

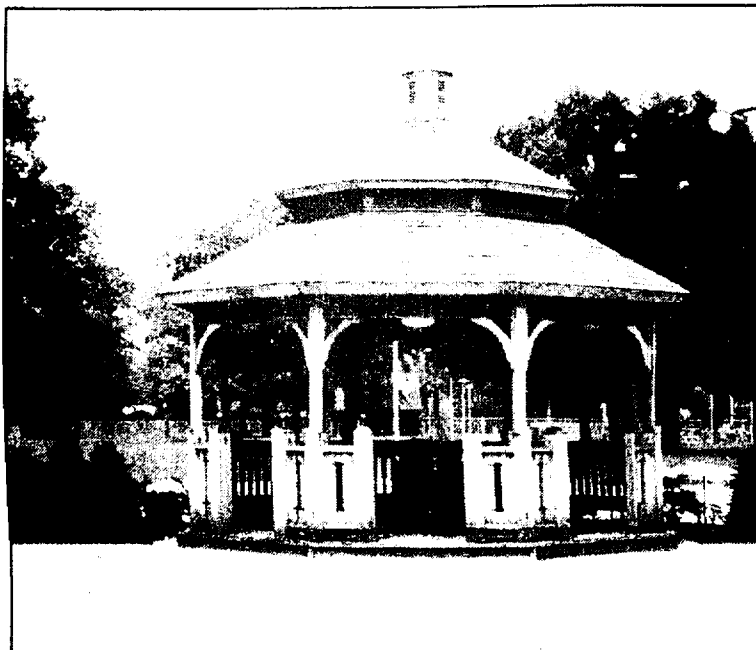

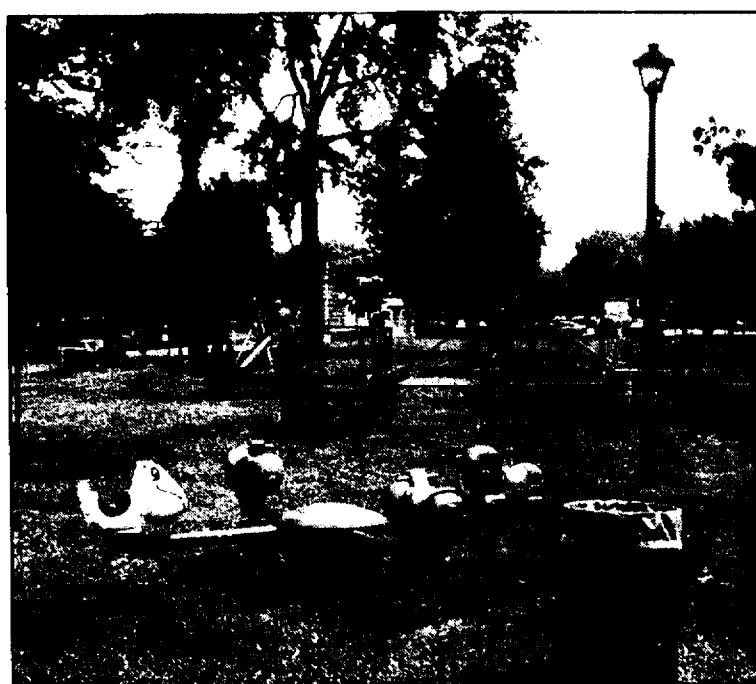

seeking permits from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and surrounding communities to install a 200-foot fishing pier from the Lake Front Park property.

Sweeney Park is a three-acre neighborhood play area near Mack Avenue between Fairholme and Torrey roads. The small park is designed primarily for children under 12 years of age and is accessible through Baltree, Ford, Clairview and Fair courts.

At the time the park was developed, the plot was owned by two Woods families, the Ballantynes and Torreys. The land was later acquired by John S. Sweeney, who developed the park to benefit families in the area.

Hallman said a new ice rink was recently installed in the park. He added that the Parks and Recreation Department will soon present the City Council with a proposal for new playground equipment at the park.

Chene-Trombly Park, located at Ridgemont and Mack Avenue, was the result of a grass-roots neighborhood meeting on April 26, 1938 in the home of Mrs. Edgar Hallead. The purpose of the meeting was to find ways of obtaining recreational facilities for the community and its children.

The group, named the Grosse Pointe Woods Community Club, received a generous donation of land by Hattie Chene. As a memorial to her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Columbus Trombly, Mrs. Chene named the park in their honor. Later, she deeded the land to the village of Grosse Pointe Woods.

The club's president, Crystal Gregory, appointed a building committee for the purpose of seeking funds for the construction of a community center.

With financial contributions and help from volunteers in the community, the Community Club Building was erected in 1941 on the site of the current Chene-Trombly Park. For several years, the club offered a nursery school, dance classes, recreational activities, group work, informal education classes.

The Woods Historical Commission also reports that in later years recreational activities were considered a municipal function and became the territory of a city recreation commission.

The Community Club moved from the site and the building was later demolished. The Chene-Trombly playground is

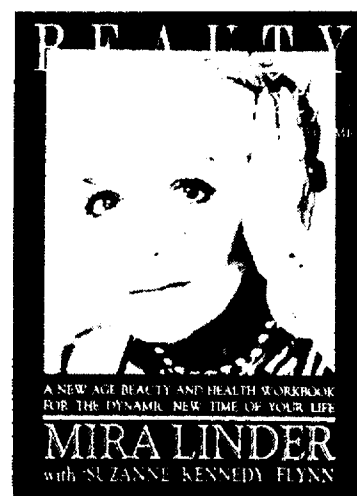
still used today.

Hallman said the city has approved funding for the city's new community center, which will be located adjacent to the city offices. The center will be used for

community groups and recreational activities.

Hallman added that the center will be completed in the spring of 1990, depending on the weather.

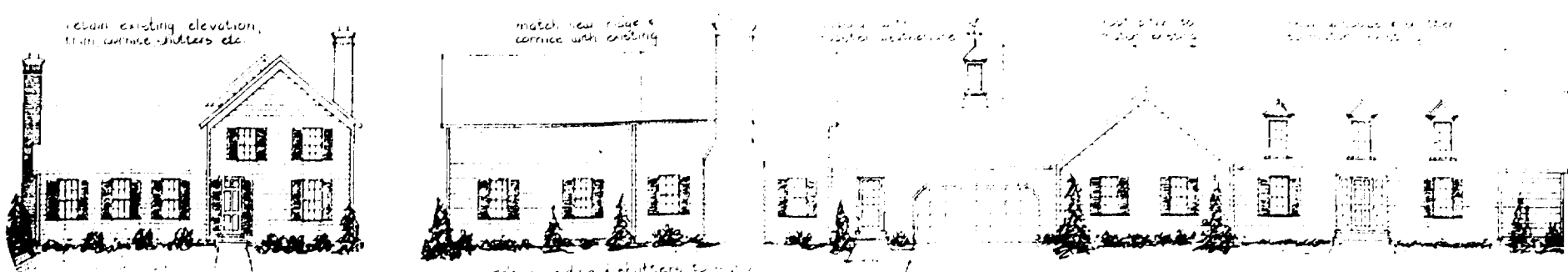

and only Blake was willing to work with the society to preserve the Cadieux farmhouse.

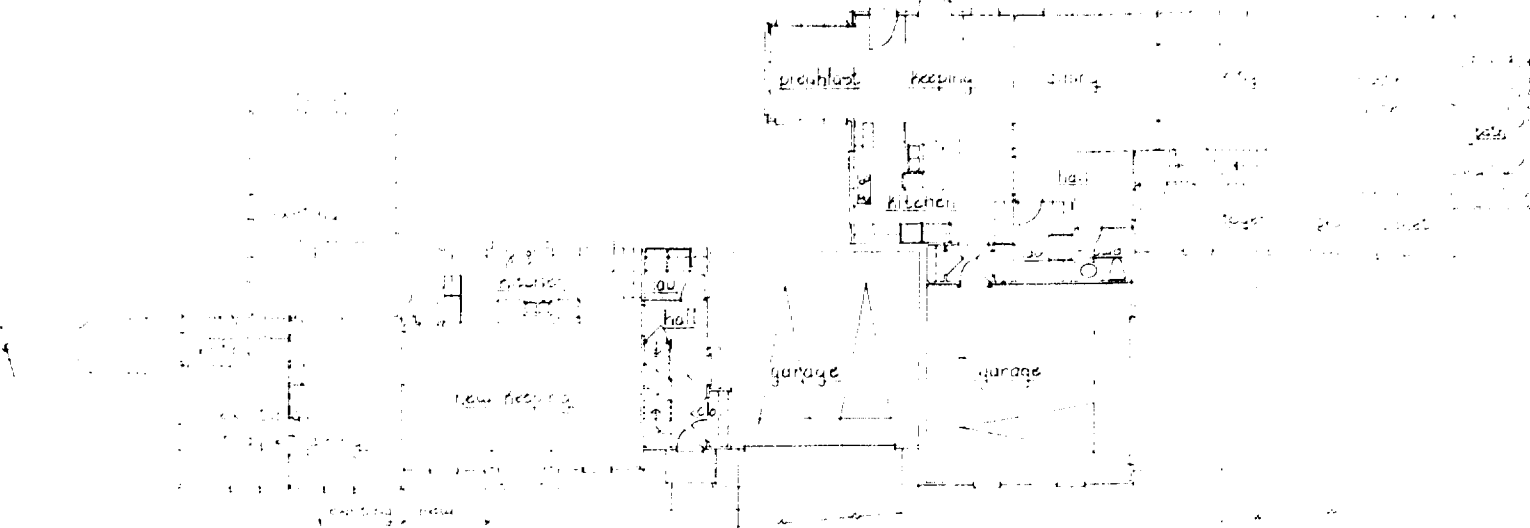
Blake said the wooden siding and architecture would be maintained throughout the project, and at the urging of Gandelot, Blake agreed to keep the white picket fence along Jefferson and Notre Dame.

Councilman Carl Rashid Jr., who lives across the street from the Cadieux farmhouse, said he

liked Blake's plan and is in favor of it. A straw poll conducted by Mayor Browning indicated that all the council members either favored the plan or at least felt the concept deserved a hearing.

The Planning Commission directed the city to schedule a public hearing concerning the rezoning. Though no date was set for the hearing, Kressbach said it will probably be scheduled for Jan. 15.

If the the council agrees to the variances, future builders could point to the Neff decision as justification for their projects on substandard lots. Also, if the council fails to justify a denial of the Neff proposal, then the Circuit Court could overturn the city's decision. The court decision may then be an even stronger precedent.

Rogers compared the problem of building on substandard lots to trying to jam an "elephant in a size 4 dress."

The neighbors on both sides of 547 Neff offered to buy the prop-

erty so that they could tear down the house and have larger side yards, but their offer was less than what Haberkorn paid for the property, he said.

Also, Haberkorn's attorney took issue with the neighbors' opposition to his client's proposal.

"There is a house there now," Gilbride said. "It was there when the neighbors bought (their homes)."

"The lot is not going to get any bigger, and therefore the problem is not going to go away."

Haberkorn and his attorney indicated that Haberkorn bought the Neff property as an invest-

ment. Haberkorn does not plan to live in the new house if he is allowed to build it.

Last week was the third time the council has discussed the Neff property. In March, a public hearing was held at the request of Century 21 East in the Village on behalf of the owner. That hearing was adjourned pending the submission of a site plan. In August, Haberkorn came before the council requesting variances, and the council denied the request.

Last week's hearing before the Board of Zoning Appeals was granted because Haberkorn had changed the building plans in an attempt to address previous con-

cerns.

In order to have more time to consider the legal aspects of the decision, the Haberkorn matter was adjourned to the Dec. 18 meeting.

Describing "Hansel and Gretel," the Michigan Opera Theatre's second offering of the season, in one word is easy: charming.

This simple children's fairy tale of good triumphing over evil moves along gracefully, albeit a bit too slowly in the first act.

The featured roles, played by Kathleen Hegierski as Hansel, and Janet Williams as Gretel, were sung beautifully. It helped, however, to have surtitles projected above the stage.

The roles are alternated with Diane Kesling as Hansel and Mary Callaghan Lynch as Gretel. The mother and father are played by Ealynn Voss and Andreas Poulimenos, who are superb in their roles.

The story of the brother and sister who are sent into the woods by their mother to pick strawberries takes an ominous turn when the children realize they are lost and night falls.

The visit by the Sandman and later, when the children are asleep, by the angels who stand guard over them lends the right note of false security.

The first act, about one hour



long, ends.

After a 30-minute intermission, the second act, loud, brassy and lively, is the opposite of the first.

TV personality and makeup artist Jeffrey Bruce is the wicked witch who eats children. But Bruce plays her with high camp, and he plays the role with obvious relish in a ridiculous green skirt billowing with crinolines, enormous mutton sleeves and a red wig straight from Bozo the Clown.

Engelbert Humperdinck's opera premiered in December 1893 in Germany under the musical direction of composer and conductor Richard Strauss. On Christmas Day 1931, "Hansel and Gretel" became the Metropolitan Opera's first performance to be broadcast on network radio.

This is family fare — bring the kids, but leave the littles ones at home.

There are three performances left of the five holiday performance production: Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Dec. 1-3. The opera is at the Masonic Temple Auditorium. There will be one American Sign Language inter-

preted performance on Sunday, Dec. 3, at 2 p.m. For details, call TDD Voice at 874-7878.

Tickets range from \$10 to \$55; students and senior citizens may buy tickets at half price one hour before curtain. For ticket information, call 874-SING.

## 'Steel Magnolias' showcases six women

Written by one man, Robert Harling, and directed by another, Herbert Ross, "Steel Magnolias" owes its tremendous impact to an ensemble of six actresses, each of whom gives a fabulous performance.

Even the male characters serve only as sounding boards for the brilliant group, each of whom moves into her part as though she was born to it.

They are Sally Fields, Shirley MacLaine, Dolly Parton, Olympia Dukakis, Daryl Hannah and Julia Roberts. The pleasure of their company cannot be overstated. They are glowing, vibrant individuals that make you glad you came, eager to share their joys and sorrows and reluctant to leave them.

Not only is the cast outstanding, the story unfolds like a

chapter of life as it is lived. Actually it was lived by author Harling. He was a small town actor trying to make it as an actor in New York when his sister died of diabetes.

In 10 days he sat down and wrote his first play making his mother and sister the center of a play about six steel magnolias who formed a circle of friendship as they met each Saturday morning at the local beauty shop.

Although they are of different ages, temperament and social standing, all differences are equalized under the dryer.

Dukakis is a wealthy widow who loves football and has enough money to buy a radio station so she can be a sports commentator.

MacLaine has run through three husbands. She is rich, eccentric, and mean enough to dis-



inherit her family in favor of a dog who is as perverse as she is.

Parton and Hannah represent the working class. Parton is warm and friendly, much like herself. She takes pleasure in improving on what nature has accorded her clients, but she does much more than that. She listens, advises, consoles. She holds the group together.

Hannah is Parton's protegee. She arrives seemingly out of nowhere, a drooping, scared kid seeking a job as a beautician. Under Parton's tender care, she blossoms into an attractive, self-confident girl.

Fields and Roberts, the mother-daughter combination, are not rich but comfortably well off. Their behavior is more subdued than the other, but their story and relationship set the emotional tone and impact of the story.

We first meet them during the hectic preparations for a family wedding in a small southern town. The mother of the bride, Fields, is running in all directions fretting over last-minute

details. The beautiful, spirited bride, Roberts, is getting ready to go to the beauty parlor to be made more beautiful. (Parton credits her success to her slogan: "There is no such thing as natural beauty.")

Tom Skerrit, the father of the bride, is occupying himself shooting birds out of the magnolia trees to spare the guests from bird droppings.

His task is interrupted by MacLaine who arrives with a nondescript, overwrought dog who keeps tripping her as she hangs on to her hat with one hand and his leash with another. At the same time she is screaming at Tom for terrorizing her dog with his gun blasts.

In the play, there was none of this by-play. The beauty parlor was the setting for the entire drama. The film by virtue of camera mobility fleshes out the story to show scenes that could only be imagined by playgoers. Nevertheless, the beauty parlor is still the focus of the film.

Just as the shop sets the scene for drama and tragedy, so it does also for comedy and smart, highly quotable one-liners. Each of the characters has a turn up front, more than enough for viewers to enjoy and appreciate their performances.

"Steel Magnolias" is one of those films where you can sit back and enjoy a good laugh and a good cry.

## 'Cinderella' opens at Bonstelle

"Cinderella," Rodgers and Hammerstein's musical fantasy, opens Friday, Dec. 8, for a two-weekend run at the Bonstelle Theatre. Performances are 8 p.m. Fridays and Saturdays and 2 p.m. Sundays through Dec. 17, with a special 2 p.m. matinee on Saturday, Dec. 9.

Rodgers and Hammerstein originally wrote "Cinderella" for television. Julie Andrews' agent wanted the famous musical duo to adapt the fairy tale for his client, who was enjoying the success of a Cinderella take-off, "My Fair Lady." Rodgers and Hammerstein liked the idea and soon CBS announced a coast-to-coast, 90-minute special presentation of "Cinderella."

"Cinderella" played on national television for one evening only, March 31, 1957. Surveys estimated that between 75 million and 100 million people watched it. This is more than twice as many as had viewed all of Rodgers and Hammerstein's previous Broadway productions.

Ben Gross of the New York Daily News proclaimed it "the best original musical in television history" and Jack Gould of the New York Times called it "a love story of enormous charm."

Cinderella is played by Tracy Linn Washburn, who was last seen at the Bonstelle as Lea in "My Sister in This House." Prince Christopher is portrayed by Curtis Colder, who played the title role in this year's "Mister Roberts" at the Bonstelle.

## 'Back to the Future II' clearly a winner, as was the first one

They say you can't go back.

But "they" never met Marty McFly, a youngster who has gone back and forth and back and forth numerous times.

McFly (Michael J. Fox) is the principal character in "Back to the Future II," sequel to the extremely successful earlier film of the same name. In the first film, viewers may recall, McFly went 20 years into the past with his scientist friend (Christopher Lloyd), and ended up getting romantically involved with the girl who would one day be his mother.

This time, he goes 30 years into the future to prevent trouble in the life of the boy who will one day be his son. But while he's there, he gets himself into trouble, and ends up having to scurry through history to save the world from a terrible fate.

Despite being a second treatment for much of the material, the film works extremely well, mostly because of Fox's freshness and his ability to work with even the weakest dialogue and make it effective.

Many of the film's early moments lack direction and focus,



and we wonder for some time just where Director Robert Zemeckis wants to take us. In these scenes, sight gags are the main attraction; Michael Jackson and Ronald Reagan read off a menu on a Max Headroom style video screen, "Jaws 19" plays at the local movie house, and billboards urge tourists to "Ski Vietnam."

While this material is funny for a few moments, it is hardly enough to occupy viewers for two hours.

Soon enough, the plot unfolds, and becomes more than mildly entertaining. It also becomes more than mildly complicated. Many scenes from the first film become intertwined with the plot this time around — a gimmick that not only refreshes viewers' memories, but also ensures an equal dose of wit and intelligence.

On the negative side, those who did not see the first picture may be a bit lost during parts of this film. Quite often, characters make verbal references to things that happened before, or the film itself takes for granted that viewers will understand the implicit irony or humor in a given situation. It's a small complaint, however, since there are likely to be very few people who did not see the first film.

The end of the picture teases the next sequel, even going so far as to show scenes from that film and promise a summer 1990 release. The third film is already in production, if not already completed.

But if this chapter does half as well as the first, it will still do twice as well as most other films. And that, of course, is good enough to justify another sequel.

"Chapter III," we hope, will be the final chapter, since it becomes clear just by watching those previews that there isn't a whole lot that's new and exciting to do with the formula.

But that, it seems, is a few months down the road. In the meantime, "Back to the Future II" is a winner.

# Clinic prepares international travelers with medicine plus

So you want to go to Kenya. You know what to bring with you, but do you know what immunizations you need and what foods to avoid. Do you know the political climate?

International Travelers Clinic, a service run out of Cottage Hospital's emergency room, helps travelers get the most out of their trips by preparing them — not only with the proper immunizations and other medications — but with information they might need once they get there.

The service was started about two years ago for people who were going abroad and didn't have all the information they needed. It is run by Deb Hotra, Lori Crow and Ruth Sircy, all emergency room nurses.

"We have people going everywhere," Sircy said. "We've had people going to Egypt, Africa, South America, Europe — everywhere. They've even gone to places we've never heard of. We're learning a lot here, too."

"We tell people what's required in the way of immunizations and what's recommended for them to get. We also get information on the countries from a computer which is updated weekly so we know what the countries are currently requiring."

The computer — which contains updates from the Centers for Disease Control and the World Health Organization — also tells them if there is an epidemic or if the possibility of contracting a disease is high and what could be done to reduce it, and common medical remedies — such as anti-diarrheals — which travelers are advised to pack.

"We recommend people come in as soon as possible after they make their plans, so we can start working with them immediately," Crow said.

Because a series of shots is sometimes needed, the sooner one starts the immunization, the longer the shots can be spread out. Some injections can cause

reactions, and it is recommended that they be given early, so travelers are in good health by the time the trip begins.

A nurse works with a traveler to determine which of the recommended immunizations he or she wants. In many cases, an oral polio booster is recommended, too.

The time element is also important because certain immunizations require seven to 10 days to take effect. If a traveler arrives in a country before the time limit, he or she would be quarantined.

Phone numbers and addresses to embassies are also given to travelers.

Political strife in a country can be dangerous to tourists, so current political climate is also discussed. One couple who had plans to go to Bogota, Colombia, changed their minds after being told of the dangers of the current drug war.

A country profile is given to each traveler, including such information as when the rainy season is, temperatures, altitude and various other geographical information.

Specific hazards are listed, too. In Kenya, for example, it is recommended that people not wade or swim in freshwater lakes or streams, not drink the water outside of Nairobi, and eat fruits and vegetables, meat and milk only under the most strict conditions.

Travel advisories tell tourists where not to go after dark, where it is safest to travel in groups and where to leave valuables.

If they are on prescribed medicine, travelers are given a form, signed by their doctor, describing what the medication is and what it is for, to ease their way through customs.

The service is also valuable in case a traveler contracts something abroad that manifests itself here. Because the nurses know where the person has been, what vaccines they have had, and what diseases are rampant, they are able to diagnose the symptoms earlier and with better accuracy.

"We've had nothing but favorable comments," Crow said. "They find all the information we give them helpful."

The service costs \$35 for the original consultation, and appointments are required. Each immunization is an additional charge and costs range from \$5 to \$20. When possible, immunizations are scheduled for many people at once to keep costs down.

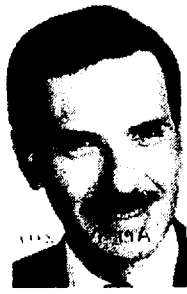

## Lumina is proof that not all mini-vans look alike

It's registered as a truck, as are other mini-vans on the market, but the new Chevrolet Lumina APV (All-Purpose Vehicle) acts more like a car. And it's probably not just coincidence that there is no station wagon in the Lumina line (the Celebrity wagon is still available) because vehicles like the APV are doing away with that type of car.

The APV handles like a passenger car. It sounds like a passenger car. It rides like a passenger car. It has all the luxuries and conveniences of a passenger car. And it costs like a passenger car. It just doesn't look like a passenger car.

In fact, its styling is the first thing everyone notices about the Lumina APV. Styling is very futuristic and seemingly not in keeping with the Lumina sedans, which are certainly attractive enough but not unusual in any way.

With its long, swooping nose and huge expanse of windshield flowing back into a rather low (for a van) and aerodynamic silhouette (oops, that's Oldsmobile's version, the Silhouette; Pontiac markets the same vehicle as the Trans Sport), the APV is a real attention-getter.

The three new vans from GM represent by far the biggest use of plastic in automotive history and Chevrolet figures it will get

the biggest share of sales. Each of these vehicles will use about 325 pounds of sheet-molded compound plastic in their bodies, compared with about 265 pounds in each Corvette and only 66 pounds in each Fiero. More importantly, General Motors plans to build about 225,000 of the vans each year, compared with around 35,000 Corvettes.

The Lumina APV is quite a change from Chevy's more traditional Astro van. It has front-wheel drive, plastic body panels affixed to a space frame, and "modular" seating behind the driver and passenger seats which can be folded down or removed for hauling cargo.

Making it feel like a passenger car are independent MacPherson strut front suspension, twist-axle rear suspension, power

rack-and-pinion steering and power front-disk rear-drum brakes. Power train is a 3.1-liter V-6 engine and three-speed automatic transmission.

Standard equipment includes tinted glass, halogen headlamps, rear window washer-wiper, AM/FM stereo radio with digital clock, tachometer and 20-gallon fuel tank.

The test vehicle had a base price of \$13,995 and enough extras — air conditioning, power windows, power locks, cruise control, tilt steering wheel, etc. — all the usual goodies one expects on a luxury passenger car — to add up to a sticker price of \$17,320.

The Lumina APV is the newest kid in a tough neighborhood

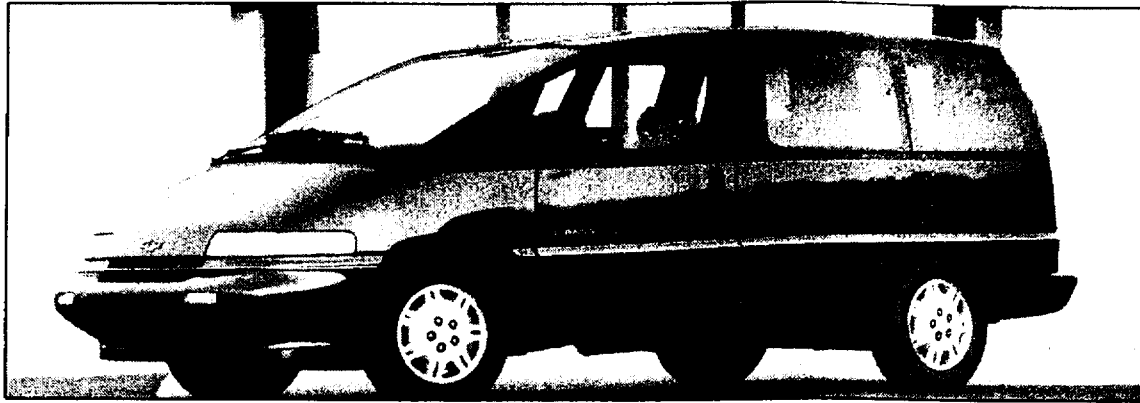
still dominated by Chrysler Corp.'s Plymouth Voyager and Dodge Caravan, which were not threatened much by mini-vans from Toyota, Nissan and Volkswagen, Ford's Aerostar, Chevy's Astro or even the impressive Mazda MVP, a very car-like unit. The Lumina is interesting enough to make the folks in Highland Park a little nervous, but it remains to be seen how well the unusual styling will be accepted.

A rule of thumb in Detroit is that the radical styling does not sell, even if it is later judged to be good. This is why most cars tend to look pretty much the same. Experience with such radical designs as the Chrysler Air-

flow, various Studebakers, Hudsons, Nashes, the Edsel, the Packard, Hawk, the AMC Pacer and other cars, many of which are now sought after by collectors, have reinforced this notion.

But there is also always the hope that something truly different will capture the public's imagination. Here, however, the list is shorter — the Volkswagen Beetle, certain big-finned models of Cadillac and Chrysler Corp. in the late '50s, the post-World War II "coming-or-going" Studebaker and the Cord 810.

The Chevy Lumina APV assures that all mini-vans will not look alike. The parking valet won't have any trouble finding this one in the lot.

## Non-surgical gallstone treatment begins at St. John Hospital

The state of Michigan's first U.S. Food and Drug Administration approved study to investigate the safety and effectiveness of a new non-surgical gallstone treatment device began at St. John Hospital and Medical Center Nov. 28.

St. John Hospital and Medical Center, Oakwood Hospital in Dearborn, and Sparrow Hospital in Lansing, partner facilities in Michigan Mobile Lithotripsy, Inc., have been selected by the Siemens Co. to be one of 10 sites in the United States to use the company's Lithostar Plus Extracorporeal Shockwave Lithotripsy System. Michigan Mobile Lithotripsy, Inc., which operates a mobile laboratory, is one of only two mobile sites in the nation.

The Lithostar Plus uses sound waves, focused by ultrasound imaging techniques, to non-surgically pulverize gallstones in a mobile medical laboratory. This new technology makes it possible for patients to need lit-

tle or no anesthesia, and eliminates the need for waterbaths found on older lithotripters.

Other anticipated benefits over previous forms of gallstone therapy include necessity of only an outpatient or short hospital stay, less discomfort and recovery time, less time away from work and lower cost.

The only previous form of treatment available to these patients has been surgical removal

of the gallbladder and its stones. It is estimated that 15 to 20 percent of patients with painful gallstones will be eligible under the FDA approved guidelines for biliary (gallstone) lithotripsy.

Upon referral by the patient's doctor, a specially trained nurse coordinator will do an initial screening of the patient by phone. If the patient is a potential candidate for the procedure, a personal screening appoint-

ment will be scheduled.

A physician on the investigation team will keep the referring doctor informed of the patient's progress. Team members represent gastroenterology, nursing, radiology and surgery.

Through its first mobile laboratory, opened earlier this year, Michigan Mobile Lithotripsy, Inc., has provided almost 400 patients non-surgical treatment of kidney stones.

# Fontbonne Auxiliary's White Christmas Ball is Dec. 9

"The Magic of Christmas" is the theme for this year's White Christmas Ball, one of the longest-running social events of the holiday season, and the major fundraiser for the Fontbonne Auxiliary of St. John Hospital and Medical Center.



This year's White Christmas Ball — the 36th annual — will be on Saturday, Dec. 9, at the Country Club of Detroit. Cocktails will begin at 6:30 p.m. Dinner is at 8 p.m. and Lester Lanin and his orchestra will provide music for dancing.

Decorations for this year's event are — well — kind of... a surprise.

Publicity chairman Marilee Rinke said the color scheme is silver and white, and lots of tiny

silver stars figure prominently in the decorations. Tables will be covered with silver Mylar and fresh white flower arrangements.

A photograph of each couple will be framed in silver, waiting to be claimed at the end of the evening.

Proceeds from the White Christmas Ball will be used to purchase a heart-lung machine, a state-of-the-art piece of equipment that takes over the function of a patient's heart and lungs while heart surgery is being performed.

According to hospital spokesman Mike Kairis, St. John Hospital is among the leaders in the state in performing cardiac surgery. During the crucial and delicate part of this operation, he said, blood is diverted from the heart and lungs into a heart-

lung bypass machine for oxygenation and perfusion.

The state-of-the-art computerized heart-lung machine which will be purchased with proceeds from the White Christmas Ball will greatly benefit the hospital's program, said Ali Kafi, M.D., chief of cardiovascular surgery at St. John Hospital.



The Fontbonne Auxiliary was begun in 1947. In its 42-year existence, membership has grown to 1,300, and, as of November 1988, the group has raised a whopping \$3.8 million for St. John Hospital.

"We hope to be able to raise the funds for the heart-lung machine, which costs about \$120,000," said Marlene Boll, general chairman of the ball, which usually draws about 400 people. "Patrons have been generous. We hope it will be a success."

Venice McQuade, S.S.J., is director of the auxiliary. Patricia Young is president. Patricia and Thomas H. Jeffs II are honorary chairmen of the White Christmas Ball.

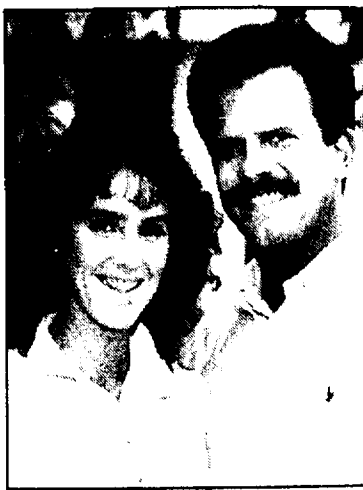

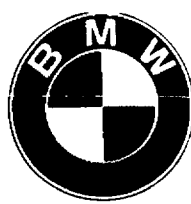

# Arts & Scraps fundraiser: pre-cut gingerbread houses



As he was dying, Abba Benjamin taught his sons: "Do this, and you'll be saved: Rejoice always, pray constantly, and in all circumstances give thanks."

— Yushi Nomura, "Desert Wisdom: Sayings from the Desert Fathers"

If the father's saying sounds familiar, you will find Paul saying the same in 1 Thessalonians 5:16-18. These three spiritual practices: "be joyful always — pray continually — give thanks in all circumstances," constitute the tripod of saving faith.

Are each of these three legs of the spiritual tripod really possible to experience in everyday life? How do they work in us? How do they save us, which in the Bible's understanding means, to make whole, or well?

Remember that any spiritual practice serves to make the implicit presence of the Divine explicit. Constant rejoicing, praying, and thanksgiving makes God's presence explicit in a way that makes us whole, or well.

A handy conceptual tool to understand how this works in the human being comes from the field of Gestalt psychology. We humans are created with marvelously complex mental-emotional-physical-spiritual processes that help us to order, to pattern, and to make sense of our outer and inner world.

Our brain operates much like a camera in that it focuses our awareness on what is in the foreground while at the same time de-focuses our awareness on what is in the background.

Gestalt psychology calls this ordering and pattern making process figure-ground relationship. Our minds focus on a figure by bringing it to the front of our consciousness while at the same time putting the rest of the elements into the background of our consciousness.

A current example of this figure-ground mental process is the Batman logo. If you visualize the golden oval shape as your figure in the front of your mind, you see a mouth with teeth. The dark-colored shape is in the background of your perception.

On the other hand, if you visualize the dark shape as the figure in the front of your mind, you see a bat.

A religious example of the same is a rather popular plaque which, in its light colored pattern, presents the figure of weird geometric shapes, but in its dark colored pattern, presents the figure of the word, Jesus.

This plaque can serve as a metaphor for what happens to us when we do the spiritual practices of continued rejoicing, praying, and thanksgiving.

As we continually make sense of our experience by figuring patterns in the front of our consciousness, we can, in a fluid in-and-out sort of fashion, also make faith-sense of our experience by figuring patterns of God's presence, the Christ, also into the front of our consciousness.

Being joyful in spiritual practice is not the same as being psychologically happy. (Yes, faith can incorporate the aspects of psychic pleasure).

Rejoicing continually, means to see, by means of one's faith-vision, God's caring and supportive presence as the figure that was always there in the background of one's life.

Even during grief for the loss of someone beloved, we can see the eternal life-giving care of God and image the promise that God's faithful will meet again in history's time of fulfillment. In the front of one's sadness there is still the background of joy in knowing God's presence.

Praying involves not simply a bunch of religious words. Rather, praying is a way of being and doing in God. Praying involves listening, seeing, feeling and sensing the presence of God as the constant background behind all the front figures of our patterned life.

These three spiritual practices: the tripod of rejoicing, praying, and thanksgiving, make one whole or well because they bring to the foreground the background of God's saving presence, which is the constant ground of human life.

# Author urges senior citizens to keep in touch with teenagers

In his latest book, "The Life Cycle Completed," Erik Erikson revises some of his earlier concepts.

In earlier writings, he saw old age as a period of serenity and wisdom. Now he sees it as another opportunity for growth and personal fulfillment.

This change in philosophy has come about not only because he has reached that stage (he is 81) but also because of his work and study in the eight stages of human development.

Erikson is joined in this conviction by his wife and collaborator, Joan. She says, "One of the surprises of old age is that learning is possible. It has been proven that even the muscles of the aging adult can learn new skills, if not approached with a negative attitude."

"Graceful aging requires all the strength one can muster. Growing old is not for sissies," Erikson substantiates this view. "Old age has ordained conflicts. By living through them, old people can develop new strengths," he said.

He also emphasizes the discontinuity of the traditional family unit, where three generations often lived in one household.

He contends that when grandparents live alone and children

live far away, there is a minimum of vital involvement necessary for staying really alive. In other words, older persons feel unneeded and betrayed. Children, which they hoped would provide companionship and make a place for them in their lives, have failed them.

There is a way to combat the situation. Erikson advises older people to develop and grow and become such interesting people, that grandchildren will seek them out.

With this in mind, Joan Erikson is working on a project that combines her skill at teaching arts and crafts with her knowledge of human needs at various life stages.

"I want to establish a program for grandparents, particularly for children who live far from home," she explains. She wants to establish a studio workshop where older people can brush up on their skills and share them demonstrating that grandparenting can stimulate the older generation as well as benefiting the young.

"Where I live, most children don't get grandparenting," she adds, "but when you talk to older people they don't know what to do with children. When children come to their homes,

most grandparents have the feeling that the children want to be fed and taken somewhere — but the rest is amorphous."

The vital intimacy, the nurturing of ties between generations, must be nurtured for survival of both young and old, Joan Erikson maintains. "It may be necessary to demonstrate how the task of grandparenting can stimulate the older generation. It is especially needed for deprived children from impaired families."

As she searched for new ways to help her contemporaries become intimately involved with the younger generation, she said, "There is a need for older people to take on more responsibilities. Whistler's mother, sitting there with her hands folded, is no model for today."

A question arises: Do grandparents in this enlightened age feel abandoned and at loose ends?

Many of them have accepted the difficult truth that the extended family is gone. They realize that now, even if families live close by, they are so busy with their day-to-day goings on that the only time allotted for grandparents is holidays, celebrations and vacations.

Having accepted these facts, the older generation has gone outside the family for companionship and purpose for being. They join clubs; they volunteer; they play bridge; they travel. They fill up time but their hearts are empty. They long for a close, meaningful relationship with that family that was once the center of their lives. They know they are loved and that in times of stress and need, their sons and daughters will be there to help.

What they really want is to be an integral part of the family.

How to achieve that without being demanding is what Joan Erikson hopes to demonstrate. Although she has achieved that goal through her arts and crafts, there are other areas to approach the same end. The best way is to find out what interests the younger people most and find out all that is possible about it.

Young people today have far different problems and interests than even their parents experienced. It takes a little probing to find out what they are, but a good place to begin is newspapers, magazines, radio and television.

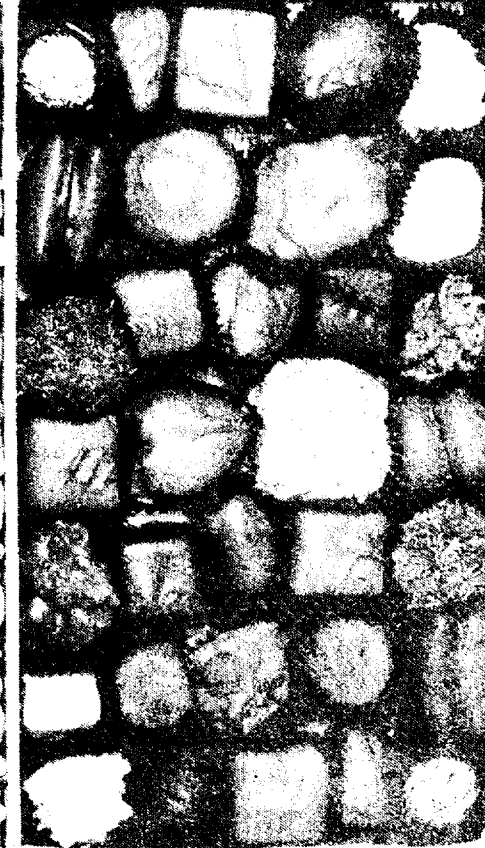

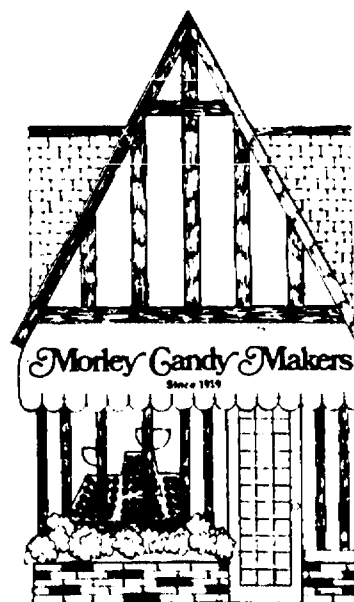

# Christmas plants lend tradition, color, fragrance to season

Thanksgiving was fun. Its traditions, family gatherings, predictable menu and festive atmosphere are very precious and are a fitting introduction to several weeks of joyful celebration.

Everywhere we look, Christmas decorations are going up and Christmas plants and flowers are making their appearance in stores and churches, in public buildings and in our homes. Tradition plays a large role here, too.

Poinsettias, without which it would seem that no holiday decor would be complete, are perhaps the most obvious, certainly the most prolific holiday plant. The brilliant red bracts of this plant are seen everywhere and convey a warmth and cheer which adds much to Christmas. The white, pink and pale green varieties add beauty and freshness to the holiday scene.

Poinsettias are only one of some 600 kinds of euphorbia, a plant of the spurge family, which grows wild in various countries. Some of them are small and uninteresting, others are beautiful flowering shrubs or small trees, others resemble cacti in appearance. The sap from the stems of all the euphorbias is very acid and can cause blisters on sensitive skins.

The name of this species of plant comes from euphorbia,

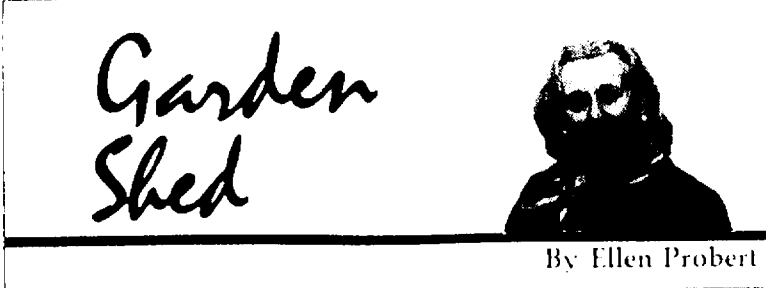
the court physician to Juba, King of Mauritania many centuries ago.

The Poinsettia, as we know it, is a native of Mexico. There, as well as in our southernmost states, it is often grown in hedges which ornament gardens with great bursts of dramatic bloom. In our colder climate, these flowers are reserved for holiday display as houseplants only.

Less common, but no less beautiful, are other blooms typical of the holiday season. Christmas cactus, whose real name is *zygocactus truncatus*, can be a delight for several weeks, with its graceful drooping rosy flowers brightening a sunny windowsill. A native of southern Brazil, this plant may be easily grown and, with care, will last for years, producing its lovely flowers annually from November to January.

The Christmas rose is a hardy evergreen perennial from Southern Europe and Asia and is a member of the buttercup family. One of the loveliest of winter flowers, the Christmas rose produces its large pure white flowers from November to March on stems about 15 inches tall.

Its relative, the Lenten rose, a native of Greece, comes into its own from February to April with

large flowers in shades of purple and pink.

One wonderful plant which has passed into the realm of legend is the sylphium. It became extinct about the time of Christ. It was a North African plant discovered in the mountains of Cyrene in the sixth century, B.C., during the reign of King Arcesilus. It produced a resin which became one of the principal sources of frankincense, used very extensively in ancient Egypt and Asia as a medical cure-all, an ingredient in perfume, and for embalming and fumigation.

The kingdom of Cyrene in time became the prosperous Greek colony Cyrenaica with frankincense its chief export item. Many years of exploitation caused the extinction of sylphium and now only stylized pictures of the plant can be found, usually on ancient coins

from this long-ago kingdom. Frankincense is still made, but other plants with similar resins supply the ingredients.

Ivy is often used for Christmas and holiday decorations, along with holly to make wreaths and roping for stairways, mantels, windows and doorways.

In ancient Greece, ivy was called Cissos. It was used in festivals and feasts much the same way it is used today and in time became a symbol of festivity. Dedicated to the wine-god, Dionysus, it is hung even today over the doors of taverns and wine shops, and is a symbol of love and friendship because it so happily twines about and embraces everything near it.

There are many varieties of holly, members of the clan of ilex, all evergreen trees and shrubs. Most of them are decorative. With its shiny leaves and bright red berry clusters, it's widely used for winter and holi-

day decorations in wreaths and swags and roping.

Some hollies have prickly spiny leaves. Even in the most spiny kinds there is a great difference between the leaves of the lower branches of the tree or bush and those of the higher branches. The higher branches have fewer spines than those on the lower part and often the top-most leaves will be almost spineless.

Rosemary, for centuries popular as the symbol of nostalgia and remembrance, is newly popular as a Christmas plant. These fragrant evergreens are popular as gift houseplants. They bring a piney scent to centerpieces and

decorations, and they are edible as well.

Christmas trees are also Christmas plants. The largest of our traditional decorative plants, even the artificial ones provide a touch of forest beauty and charm to our homes in the darkest season of the year.

A comparatively new custom, dating from Victorian times, the Christmas tree is now a worldwide tradition. Victorian trees were decorated with strings of popcorn and cranberries, spun glass ornaments and tiny candles. Modern ones are a blaze of electric lights and glittering ornaments, but the idea is the same.

THE PASTEBOARD PASTIME

Our acute master sleuth Irwin Klar reported a hand from Oakland's Cavendish Club North that may be the best played pastebord performance of the year.

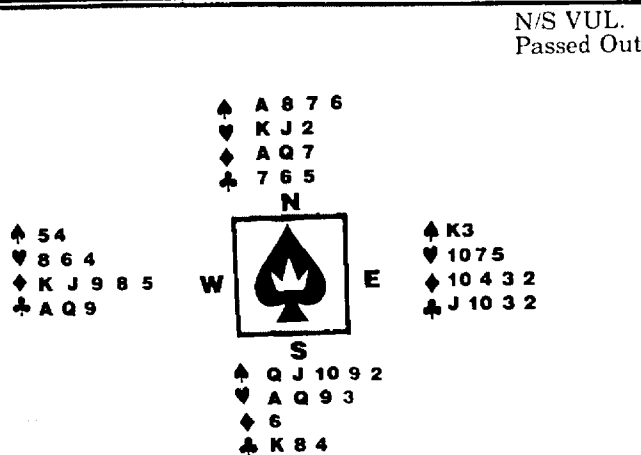
It is a tribute to a declarer who can perceive adversity when viewing dummy for the first time. Such intuitiveness isn't universally gifted and is the mark of an experienced practitioner. To then know how to play your cards in a tactical manner that neutralizes or circumvents the predicament you have fathomed is an exacting bit of craftsmanship.

Such were the conditions relating to today's hand played by one of our longstanding Detroit experts. When Al Silber saw the dummy, he immediately visualized crippling difficulties if a couple of key cards were imperily placed.

West on lead (spade 5) had a reputation for being a daring first card player. Could he be leading from the missing trump king or had he found one of those miraculous plays that places declarer in a perilous position at trick one. If Al concluded that east had the spade king and west the club ace and maybe even the lady then he could be set in the first series of four plays. Such an unfortunate early result was extremely displeasing, so Silber set about to see what he could do to overcome such a dilemma. As one can see, Silber's tribulation had validity, but note that twelve tricks are available by reversing these two key cards.

After some headwork and a heavenly request that hearts divide evenly (a 36% probability) Al came up with a reasonable counter. For sure the trump king probability was less than a 50% proposition because even daring leaders would seldom underlead a king so consequential.

Follow Silber's series of skillful maneuvers. Trick one dummy wins the trump ace followed by the diamond ace and a small diamond ruff in the chance instance the king might

be doubleton. At trick four a heart to the king and the diamond queen ruffed high in the closed hand. At trick six a heart to the jack and back to declarer's ace. As the cards are when Silber led his last heart (the queen) the defense had to surrender. If west ruffed with the spade four dummies small club was jettisoned and either he now had to give declarer a sluff and a ruff or lead clubs. If West doesn't ruff Silber pitches one of dummy's clubs and east has to ruff with the trump king. Either way declarer overcame a nasty card adversity with an extraordinary line of play.

Al Silber, you have won this column's commendation.

## Tough to repeat

Grosse Pointe South's basketball team is in trouble.

What? Trouble? The season has yet to tip off. Correct, but when Mike Chambers and Brian Letscher, two integral pieces to the puzzle, are out with injuries, it's difficult for the Blue Devils to get untracked in camp.

Letscher, the outstanding quarterback who directed the football team into the state playoffs, was hurt on the final play of the loss to Detroit King. With his arm in a sling, it's tough to work on drills.

Letscher, who doesn't like to be sidelined because he's a true competitor, has his right arm (shooting arm) taped to his side every practice. Dribbling left-handed, he's still perhaps tougher than most athletes.

Chambers, a wide receiver for the football team, sat out three quarters of the 41-0 play-off loss to King. With his elbow banged up, Chambers entered basketball camp as one of Coach George Petrouleas' big men. Now, however, Chambers is struggling to regain his physical health — especially after suffering a severe groin sprain in the first week.

South still has the horses to repeat last year's 21-3 season, though.

Chambers and Letscher can kill you with a jump shot, but they'll also put the body on you under the boards — provided they have any body left.

The Blue Devils will be the preseason pick to win the Eastern Michigan League, but both Port Huron and Port Huron Northern will challenge the defending E.M.L. champs. East Detroit has seven of its top eight players coming back, so that will provide some formidable opposition as well.

Joe Caldwell, South's only returning starter from a year ago, is seasoned and strong at his point guard slot. If South is to make it back to the regional championship game, Caldwell is going to have to can 18 points a game and dish out 10 assists.

On the boards, South is in trouble. Trouble? What? Yes, with an average height of 6 feet 4 inches, the Blue Devils are going to have to box out and each player will need to hit the glass. It sounds simple, but with guys stretching to 6-8 and 6-10, South doesn't have anybody to match up.

However, if the Blue Devils can create points off their traditionally strong defense, then the height factor won't matter. With the speed and agility South possesses, teams will need running shoes to keep up. South is quick, strong, yet injured at this time.

Petrouleas sees the potential for his team to regain its 1988-89 status. But, Tim Gramling, a junior, is going to have to step in at the off guard spot and be consistent. Gramling was the court general for the jayvee team last year. He is solid, yet vulnerable only because he's in his first varsity season.

Durmon Coates and Rob Khoenle, both football players too, will line up at the forward spots. Both have leaping ability and both love to bang in the paint. Both are going to have to, until they can be relieved by Letscher and Chambers.

Trouble? You bet, because after its first six games, South could be an average 3-3 team. Notre Dame, Highland Park, Fordson, Bishop Gallagher, North and DeLaSalle fill the docket for the first three weeks.

As soon as trainer Marti VanEenanam can get Letscher and Chambers out of the ward, South should make a bid to be a top-10 team, with its mouth still watering from last season's loss to Southwestern in the regional finals.

## Champine, Reiter finish Norsemen careers

It's not incorrect or impolite to describe the 1989 North girls' basketball team as two-faced.

The success of this year's team centered around the loud and quiet leadership from point guard Melissa Champine and center Kim Reiter.

Champine and Reiter, the only seniors on this year's 18-4 Macomb Area Conference White Division championship team, were largely responsible for the family atmosphere and camaraderie the Lady Norsemen developed.

After a combined seven years with the varsity program at North, Champine and Reiter finished their prep careers with a combined record of 121-37. Reiter has played varsity ball for four years and Champine for three.

After junior years in which Champine and Reiter averaged seven and 12 points, respec-

tively, they were called on to make greater contributions as co-captains this past season.

Graciously accepting the responsibility, Champine and Reiter carried the Lady Norsemen on the court. Champine dished out an average of four assists a game, and Reiter was hitting better than 14 points. Both, however, are multi-talented. Champine can pass the ball, but also hit for eight points a game, had 59 steals, 57 rebounds and hit 66 percent of her free throws.

Reiter, who was double-teamed most of the season, pulled down 223 rebounds, averaged seven steals a game, and also had 30 assists.

"What makes Melissa and Kim so strong is their confidence," said Norsemen coach Gary Bennett. "Neither of them interferes with the other one's game. If anything, they both complement one another very well on the court."

That's because they've been

playing together for eight seasons, including summers at AAU, school seasons at Parcels and before that at St. Joan's.

"Melissa is a fundamentally sound and strong point guard," said coach Ray Ritter. "She's the most confident player I think we've had here in quite some time. It's tough for a point guard like Melissa, who also has the great potential to not only run the show, but score points as well, to balance the two, but she did."

"It's extremely difficult to look for other players first and not yourself, but Melissa was a very unselfish player."

Reiter, whose personality is geared to a more humble and blue-collar style, was a finesse player despite her 5-foot 11-inch frame.

"Kim led us very quietly," said Bennett. "She's a great person, but she's just quiet. The kind of person she is off the court, she is on the court. Kim was the type of player who leads by example. She was never flashy, just simple and got the job done."

Champine also led by example, but she was more boisterous.

"Melissa has a great desire to be in control," said Bennett. "She wants to run the show on the floor and she has. That's just her personality. What makes her so strong as the point guard is that she communicates well. A lot of times we (Ray and I) would be discussing something, and Melissa would plant a seed in our minds about trying something different; generally, we ended up trying it."

Champine's court sense and ability to use all her resources proves why she is one of the best players to come out of North's system.

"She's not afraid to make a mistake," Bennett said. "Conse-

quently, what happens is she makes a lot of good decisions. Whether or not her decision is right or wrong, something is going to get done."

Reiter followed her own humble routine all season. Quietly she would get 18 points, pull down 12 boards, and get six steals.

"Kim has always led very quietly," said Bennett. "She's not interested in tooting her own horn. She did what we asked and was not selfish about anything even though she set all those records."

Reiter now has eight school records, including most points in a season (316), most career points (736), most field goals made in a season (121), most free throws made (74), most free throw attempts in a season (115), highest point average in a season (14.4), most rebounds in a game (21) and most career rebounds (596).

"Kim's best quality is her humbleness," said Bennett. "You'd get down to it and look at the impressive numbers she put up, but you wouldn't know about it otherwise. She is a true team player."

Champine and Reiter pumped their stats in their final season, but it just added to the established success they've had through the years. Reiter, who was voted the White Division's Most Valuable Player, finished her four-year stint with 736 points, 160 steals, 74 assists, 596 rebounds and a shooting percentage of 44. Champine, an All-Academic and first team All-League selection, rounded out her career with 342 points, 122 steals, 179 assists, hit 36 percent of her field goals, and managed to yank down 116 boards from her guard position.

Since 1987, both girls have helped North win two division championships.

Although Champine and Rei-

ter play so well together, they also know when to be individuals.

"They don't get their roles on the court screwed up," said Ritter. "Kim doesn't try and help Melissa run the show, and Melissa doesn't try and take shots away from Kim by shooting herself, that's why they are both successful in their own way."

Champine and Reiter plan to be successful outside of North, with both pursuing careers in teaching. Champine will study elementary education and Reiter will study kindergarten.

"I want to be a teacher because I love kids," said Champine. "Plus I want to coach."

"From when I was growing up until I came here (to North)," said Reiter, "I wanted to do something in medicine. All that's changed, though. I really love little kids."

Both will also chase collegiate basketball careers.

"It's hard to accept that my

North basketball career is over," said Champine. "I will miss North, but I'm looking forward to college. However, I know I'll never find the same kind of teammates in college as I had here."

Ritter shares similar feelings.

"In my four years on the varsity, this was the closest team," she said. "We would do everything together. We are, like all the girls will tell you, one big family. I'm going to miss basketball, but what I'll miss most are the friendships I've had here."

Whether it was an exuberant command from Champine, or a simple nudge from Reiter, North's two leaders will be remembered for their personality, sportsmanship and diligent work ethic.

"Both girls accepted the fact that they were going to be our leaders," said Ritter. "And they went out and did it. They are largely responsible for our success this season."

"I respect, very much, what Melissa and Kim did for me and this team," said Bennett. "They are two quality people that I'm going to really miss as basketball players, but also as friends."

## Grand Prix Iberian style

Have you dreamt of attending the Monaco Grand Prix? Of mingling with celebrities and royalty? Of visiting beautiful palaces and picturesque hill top towns gleaming in the sun along the European coast?

Well, forget Monte Carlo.

As an alternative to the crowded, over-priced French Riviera, consider the late September Formula One races in Portugal and Spain. Only a week apart, you can get two for the price of one — one trip to Monaco, that is.

The first race takes place near Estoril, Portugal's famous playground for deposed dukes and duchesses. Many of the "titled" from throughout Europe have lived here "in exile" for decades. There is a huge casino at Estoril, plus a number of beaches, great seafood restaurants and varied shopping, especially in lively Cascais.

The race track follows natural, rugged terrain, and grandstands are placed on steep slopes to offer superb viewing. From some of the hills, it is possible to see several different segments of the course.

And what action there is to see. In its few short years of existence, the track has managed to set quite a bit of history: 1988 world champion Ayrton Senna of Brazil had his first win here in the rain in 1985; Alain Prost of France first broke the record for the most wins in 1987; and last year's race was noted for Senna's apparent attempt to force McLaren teammate Prost into the pit wall.

This year's race will also be long remembered: Ferrari driver Nigel Mansell of Britain, black-flagged for backing up in the pits after he over shot his stop, failed to heed the warning and then collided with Senna. The result gave the win to Ferrari teammate Berger, with Prost finishing second. It may have cost Senna the championship. A \$50,000 fine and banishment from the next week's race for Mansell added to the controversy, along with the fact that Berger and Prost are switching teams next year.

Between the races, one can get more fun and sun along the Algarve coast in southern Portugal, or go directly to Spain by train, plane or rental car. Golf courses are plentiful in the re-

sort area, and that's where you'll find most Formula One drivers when they're not testing or racing.

The "Tio Pepe" Spanish Grand Prix is held at the new "Circuito" near Jerez, the town that brought sherry to the world.

The track is similar to its Portuguese counterpart, but more earth was bulldozed to create a flatter, less-interesting layout.

While views were excellent from the grandstand seats, many spectators opted to stand on the hilltops.

Away from the track, the area has much to offer. From visits to the bodegas of the sherry firms, to the ancient walled city of Cadiz (it claims to be the oldest city in the western world), or to the amazing "pueblas blancas," the "white towns" such as Arcos de la Frontera, Ronda and Vejer. Arcos, just up the road from the circuito, was celebrating its San Miguel Festival, and locals in native costumes added to the allure.

Arcos' famed paradox, set in an old palace, would be an ideal place to stay. However, many tourists prefer the beach-front hotels scattered up and down the coast, less than an hour's drive from the track.

About 60 miles to the north, connected by a toll freeway, is the quintessentially-Spanish city of Seville. There is frequent train service between Seville, Jerez and Cadiz. Jerez itself is very close to the track.

Back at the track, the 1989 Grand Prix provided quite a show. Mansell, barred from driving for the weekend, took precious time away from his golfing to appear and amuse the press with threats of retiring. The following days, spectators were treated to record-setting performances. Race-winner Senna, attained the 40th pole of his career (another record) by breaking the track record; Alain Prost finished third and pushed his record of career points closer to the 600 mark (592), and newly crowned Formula 3000 champion Jean Alesi of France, excited fans when he took his Tyrrell-Ford to a fourth-place finish.

Detroit connections were in strong evidence at the Spanish race. The Ford-sponsored and powered Benetton team announced top-rated designer John Barnard will be coming to Be-

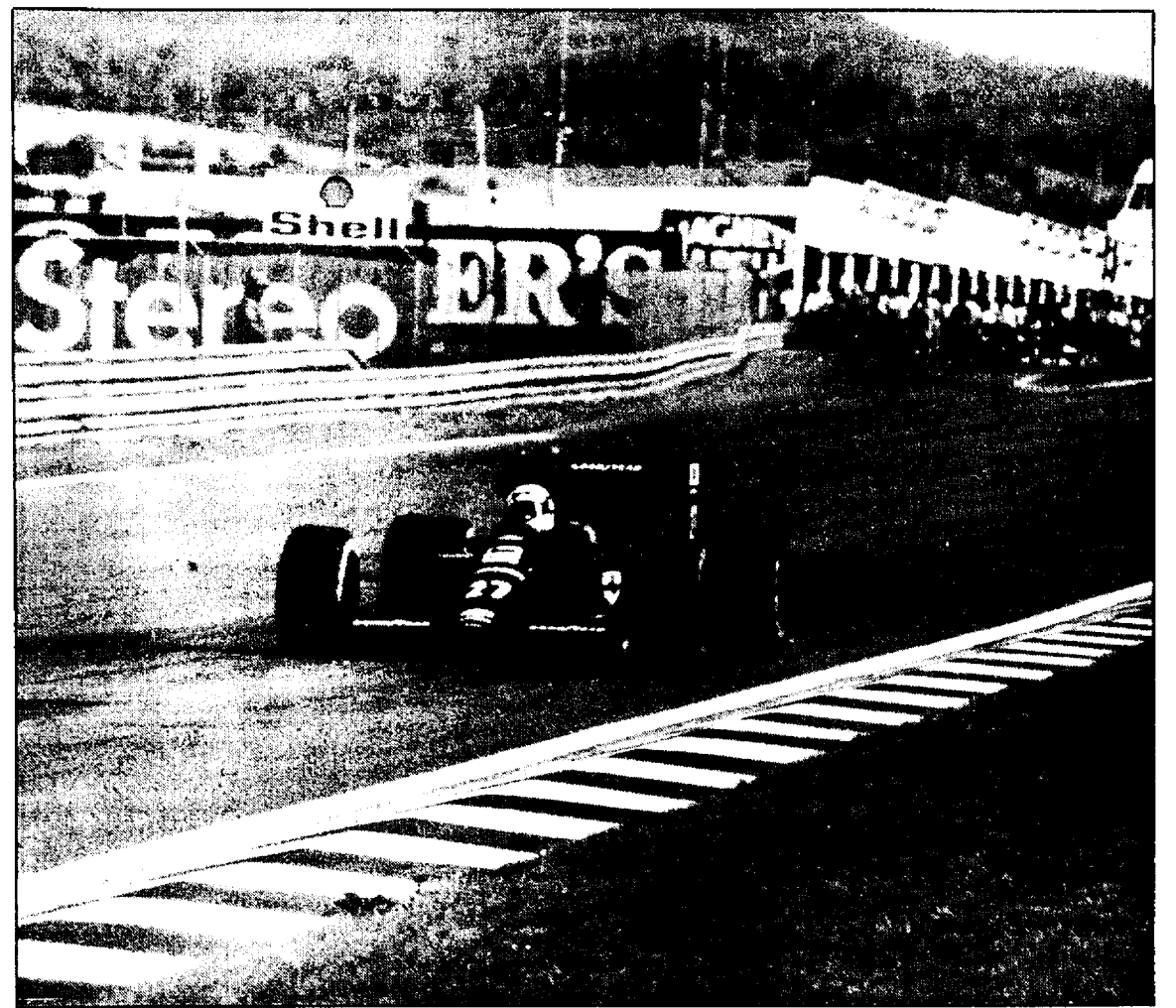

netton. An expensive new research and development facility is to be built for him in England, but supposedly not financed by the Dearborn-based conglomerate, despite providing R & D services for Ford in the future.

The Chrysler-backed Lorraine team had its first success with the V-12 Lamborghini engine when Philippe Alliot captured one point for a sixth-place finish.

Even General Motors was represented by a GM Lotus Euroseries support race, a most entertaining event.

The Spanish race had to be postponed until after the F1 race when a brief thunderstorm hit just as the drivers were taking the grid.

Despite the shower, weather was quite delightful at both Estoril and Jerez. The areas are sunny, warm and relatively dry with autumn the perfect time to visit. Not only is the weather ideal, but these back-to-back Iberian races provide the best possible

transportation, including taxi service is cheap and plentiful. Tickets are readily available at average or lower-than-average prices, and the Portuguese track workers are courteous and efficient.

Language is generally not a problem at hotels and restaur-

ants, particularly in Portugal, which gets plenty of British tourists.

Although slower than many of the other permanent circuits, Jerez and Estoril offer the advantage of hilly terrain and great corners, which makes for extremely exciting racing.
