Report outlines many options for costly Milk River clean up

Staff Writer It will not be done soon and it will not come cheap.

That's the word from engineers studying several options of the Milk River drainage ba-

A report released recently by the engineering firm of Mac-Namee, Porter and Seeley, Inc., the firm contracted by the Milk River Inter-County Drainage Board to study the problem, maps out short- and long-range solutions for the polluted basin at the northern end of the Grosse Pointes.

The 55-page report presents several solutions, including the total separation of sewers and storm water drains in the area served by the Milk River system at a price tag topping \$90 mil-

The Milk River system serves Grosse Pointe Woods, Harper Woods and a small portion of St.

start at about \$7 million and in- raw sewage, the basin emits foul clude disinfection of the drainage basin and the rerouting of the Harper Woods sanitary sewer system from the Milk River sysfor the state-mandated clean up tem to Detroit water treatment facilities.

The alternatives are designed to not only clean up the Milk River drain, but to alleviate raw sewage entering Lake St. Clair when the system becomes over-

During heavy rain, combined sewage and storm water overloads the Milk River pump station on Marter Road in Grosse Pointe Woods and exceeds the station's volume limit being pumped into the Detroit treatment facilities.

The sewage and storm water mixture is stored in a four million gallon retention tank adjacent to the pump station. But water volumes often exceed the tank's capacity and overflow into the Milk River channel and eventually into Lake St. Clair.

Since the overflow contains

odors which have led to numerous complaints over the years by residents living near the Milk Once sewage enters Lake St.

Clair, bacteria can cause infections if water comes in contact with eyes, ears or cuts in the skin. The bacteria can be especially dangerous if swallowed.

Vyto Kaunelis, an engineer who helped design the engineering report, last week told members of the drainage board that each of the five possible alternatives include six or more steps that can be undertaken one at a

All of the alternatives have similar components including disinfection, rerouting Harper Woods sewage to Detroit and disconnecting downspouts to direct rainwater from storm sewers onto residents' lawns to decrease the amount of storm water entering the system.

Four of the five alternatives include cleaning the channel and installing a river circulation system to keep solids in the water from settling.

Two of the alternatives include building one or more 15million-gallon retention basins on or near the Grosse Pointe Woods DPW yard.

Board closer to decision on new library building

The school board took two steps Monday night toward a new library building at Brownell Middle School.

The first step was the unanimous acceptance of a committee report detailing uses for the Central Library building at the corner of Kercheval and Fisher.

The report, presented to the board Dec. 4 and adopted Monday, calls for the school administration offices currently at 389 St. Clair to be moved to the Central Library building.

The land and building at 389 St. Clair will be sold and the money will be used for the move, making cost to the taxpayers minimal

The committee, chaired by board member Vince LoCicero, discussed possibilities from selling the land to converting the building into a community cen-

The committee was unanimous in its decision not to sell the land, and also unanimous in its recommendation to move the district's offices there.

The decision is predicated on the fact that a new building will be built at Brownell and that both the Park and the Woods branches be kept open and oper-

In making the decision, the committee had to take into consideration the land was given specifically for construction of a library, and that the building symbolizes the library in the minds of many residents.

"The main thing the commit-tee wants is a new library," Lo-Cicero said.

Board President Jon Gandelot said the move was "one more step in eventually seeing a new library built." He praised Lo-Cicero and the committee for their work.

The second step was more tentative, and cannot be taken until sometime in January when the board receives yet another re-

The board was to have re-Associates, Inc., a private fundraising company that has been spending time in the community trying to determine how much money can be raised privately for a new library facility.

The report is now expected to be presented to the board in Jan-

The Campaign Finance Act states that a person who pays for a political advertisement or mailer must state his name and address. If it can be proven that the sponsor did not follow the rules laid out in Section 47 of the act, the person may be fined up to \$1,000 and serve up to 90 days in jail.

"Most of these types of complaints are handled in conciliation, where the violator would sign a conciliation agreement with the state to undo the wrong," Buell said. "A corporation would be put on notice of the wrongdoing to avoid similar actions in the future.'

Wulfmeier said he didn't know why the War Memorial filed the complaint, "especially in light of the election result."

"I have filed an affidavit with the state indicating that neither Wulfmeier said. He added that he does not know who paid for





If the first plan is adopted, the board will have spent approximately \$283,000 - for Ketchum's services (at \$15,000 a month), secretaries and supplies for Ketchum, architects' fees and public relations efforts - by June 1991 when the taxpayers go to vote. If the bond issue is defeated, that money cannot be

If the second plan is adopted, the board will still have spent close to \$75,000.

Along with a vote on a bond issue, the district would also be asking the voters to approve a .5 mill increase — from 1.7 mills to 2.2 mills - for the increased staff for the new facility

Trustee Carl D. Anderson expressed frustration that the board couldn't go ahead and launch a campaign to have a bond and millage issue vote in June 1990 to save the school some money.

"I'm 100 percent for a new li-

brary, but I'm concerned we don't commit the taxpayers to \$100,000 or \$250,000 and then have the thing defeated," trustee Fred Adams said.

He also was concerned that the board has to get approval from the Grosse Pointe Farms council before the whole plan can be implemented.


"The board will have a difficult decision to make next month," LoCicero said.

If the Ketchum report estimates the community can raise into the millions of dollars, the board must decide if Ketchum's \$15,000 a month services will be worth the cost.


Whritner said the board must move cautiously with the project and make sure the school can drum up support for it.


"One thing this library project cannot afford is another defeat,' he said.

The movement of school offices from 389 St. Clair and the sale of that property will only be started after a favorable vote on the library bond issue. Occupancy will be approximately 13 months after the library vacates the building.



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Group collects more than recyclables at last recycling day

The monthly drop-off days sponsored by the Grosse Pointe Citizens for Recycling have come to an end, but the group's work is far from over.

In addition to collecting plastics, metal, newspaper and glass at its last recycling day Dec. 2, volunteers for the group collected 1,202 signatures to petition cities to "establish an interim fixed dropoff site and institute citywide curbside recycling by January 1991."

"And that wasn't everybody who dropped off recyclables," said Donna Di Sante, a group member who coordinated the petition drive. "Those were just the cars we caught.

"We had people waiting so we sign," she added.

No one refused to sign.

The councils for all five Pointes passed a resolution urging the Grosse Pointes-Clinton Refuse Authority to begin a recycling program and provide appropriate staffing for the program.

None of the cities acted on a separate request that they establish an interim drop-off site for recyclables until curbside recycling could be instituted.

The 1,202 signatures contained the names of 299 Park residents, 279 Farms residents, 249 Woods residents, 144 City residents, 53 Shores residents, 101 Harper Woods residents, 53 Detroit residents and a smattering of names from other cities, including one from London, Oncould give them a petition to tario, and another from Califor-

"The petitions will give the city council members and the city managers a realistic idea of how many people are concerned about recycling," said Fran Schonenberg, president of the recycling group. "Having the names and addresses of the constituents

who want recycling, perhaps the councils will move to respond to the needs of the communities.'

Schonenberg said the group's goal is to get one city to establish a Pointe-wide drop off until curbside recycling can be insti-

"We believe recycling will be mandated soon, either by the state or at the federal level," she said. "The only question is when, and will our cities be able

to look ahead and plan and get an organized program, or have to put something together at the last minute.'

Schonenberg said she was floored with the community's response to the drop-off days and to the recycling group.

Grosse Pointe Citizens for Recycling was created in September 1988 with the goals of establishing curbside recycling and raising consciousness about recycling. From only a handful of members at the start, the group now numbers more than 300.

"We started it because we believed in it," Schonenberg said. 'We didn't start this for the feeling of fellowship we developed."

Di Sante agreed: "There was a great spirit of camaraderie that developed among the group and those who came to the drop-off days."

"It was a lot of work," Schonenberg said. "But it's amazing how people pulled together. It's just amazing what this community is doing. No one could have expected it.

At the December collection

day, 1,170 cars dropped off 36,320 pounds of newspaper, 19,080 pounds of glass, 3,850 pounds of plastics and 5,580 pounds of metal.

During the eight drop off days the group sponsored, 7,577 cars unloaded 289,760 pounds of newspapers, 134,260 pounds of glass, 27,518 pounds of plastic and 33,500 pounds of metal. The cost to the cities of putting the nearly 242.52 tons of recyclables collected into a landfill would have been approximately \$9,700 according to an employee at the incinerator.

"We had great success with our drop-off days, and in a way we're sorry it's over," Schonen-berg said. "But it shouldn't be all volunteer anymore. The city's must do their part now.'



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
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

tion capabilities will enable the pump station to retain water longer while pumping water to Detroit. The result would be less sewage pumped into the lake.

Currently, sewage and storm water are pumped into the lake an average of 44 times per year during heavy rain. Additional retention would cut that number drastically, he said.

Kaunelis said his engineering firm is not recommending any particular alternative for the cleanup.

"We are striving for the most benefit per dollars spent," he said. "Our long-term goal is to eliminate combined sewer overflows and to increase water quality. There is a possiblity that solutions chosen could take up to 70 years. We've got to concentrate on the next 20 years or so.'


Now that several alternatives have been presented to the drainage board, the next step is a series of public hearings where people served by the system will be notified. Kaunelis said the public hearings are expected to begin in January 1990.

During the public hearings, people will have a chance to voice concerns regarding which alternative(s) to use, the cost involved and the completion schedule. If there is a consensus of opinion, the information will be compiled and presented to the drainage board.

"The input of the public is very important," Kaunelis said. "The public has a strong voice in the matter.'

He said the choice of alternative will be decided by the drainage board but will have to be approved by the DNR. Once one or more solutions are chosen, the drainage board will then apply to the DNR for funding.

When voters in Michigan last year approved nearly \$600 million in environmental cleanup bonds, a state revolving finance fund was created. The fund allows municipalities to borrow

cleanup projects at 2 percent interest over a 20-year period.

The cost of the clean up will be shared by people living in the area served by the Milk River system, Kaunelis said. The proportion to be paid by each city will depend on which alternative is chosen since each involves various construction projects in different communities. For example, if more work is to be done in Grosse Pointe Woods, then Woods residents may have to bear higher costs.

At the low end of the scale, a solution to improve water qual-

money for environmental ity in the basin and to alleviate raw sewage from entering the lake will cost residents in the area less than \$10 per month about \$115 per year.

At the upper end of the scale, total separation of sewers and storm drains at more than \$90 million, customers can expect to pay \$46.50 per month - about \$558 per year.

"The solution chosen will be based on affordability," Kaunelis said. "Whatever solution is chosen, it will be a long-term, stepby-step procedure that will take time and will not be without ex-

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
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

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

Revolt called a Yule gift to the world

Tith the sudden collapse of the Soviet empire in Eastern Europe, it appears that the world is getting an early Christmas present: new hope for peace on earth, good will toward men.

True, reorganizing and restructuring Europe will not be easy and even the United States will have its troubles in adapting to a post-cold war world. Michigan, not a major defense supplier in recent years, will pay a price for peace in the form of the sharp shrinkage of defense contracts in Warren, Detroit and elsewhere.

It is a price, however, that most Michiganians and most Americans will gladly pay.

But what was it that set off the bloodless revolt against the Communist leadership in Eastern Europe?

If we read the signs correctly, it was the system's economic failure that started the rout of communism. The trigger was the sudden realization behind the Iron Curtain that Mikhail Gorbachev meant it when he called for more openness in government and a restructuring of society.

Once he permitted reformers to take control in Poland and Hungary, the door to economic freedom was opened and through it rushed the people of the Baltic states,



East Germany and Czechoslovakia, with even Bulgaria showing signs of wanting reform and political and economic freedom.

These impressions of what has been happening are derived from the comments of several Eastern Europeans who have recently visited the Detroit area as well as from television, radio and print media reports by U.S. correspondents covering the political and economic battlegrounds in Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union.

Despite the more than 40 years of Communist control of public education and the media, the people themselves knew that the system wasn't working. Despite what they had read or heard from the media and what they had been taught in the classroom, they knew that there were shortages of food, clothing, housing and consumer goods in general. Standing in line just to buy the necessities of life was a daily reminder of communism's economic

failures. The eastern Europeans knew as well that they were really occupied countries with the Soviet divisions ready to pounce on any sign of opposition to or protest

against Moscow's orders. They knew, too, that their local rulers were really puppets manipulated from Moscow, although it wasn't until recent weeks they learned the extent of their leaders' personal corruption.

Despite the tight control of information, they also knew from western European television, radio (including the Voice of America) and the print media that made it over and through the Iron Curtain that economic conditions were far better in the Western world.

And so, when the opportunity presented itself, the people went into the streets and the government leaders, having been warned by Gorbachev against any use of armed force and no doubt hoping against hope that the protesters would wear themselves out, let them have their say and their way.

The rest, we could say, is history. By now the flood of humanity streaming toward freedom and economic opportunity has become so strong and supportive of democratic and capitalistic reforms that not even the mustering of the Soviet occupation army is likely to be able to stem the

tide against communism.

Not that the millenium has arrived. Replacing the Communist command system with a market economy will be difficult, just as difficult as it will be to replace the Communist political organization with a more democratic system.

In addition, Europe's nationalistic quarrels over boundaries, displaced ethnic peoples, access to water transportation and other traditional issues are likely to be revived as Eastern Europe seeks to play a new role in the new order that will follow the collapse of the Soviet empire.

In fact, some of the quarrels are already apparent. Ethnic Germans in Poland warmly welcomed West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl when he visited an area taken from Germany and awarded to Poland after World War II. Some Western Europeans as well as some Americans are warning that the moves toward German reunification must be slowed down to maintain European stability during the dangerous transition period.

Obviously, peace is not yet guaranteed. And even though Gorbachev says the Cold War is over, there still are disagreements between the United States and the Soviet Union, just as there are different views in Western and Eastern Europe over the future policies to be followed.

Yet can anyone think of a better Christmas present for the world than the rapid march toward political and economic freedom that has occurred in Eastern Europe in recent days? Let's hope it truly means the eventual achievement of the goal of peace on earth, good will toward men.

A housing deal for Whritner

rosse Pointe's school superintendent, Dr. John Whritner, accepted a new post in the Greenwich, Conn., schools only after a creative financing deal made it possible for him to make an offer on "a modest home" for just under half a million dollars on a visit to that city last weekend.

Whritner received \$94,000 a year in salary in Grosse Pointe, plus a \$3,000-a-year bonus for staying three years, rent-free use of the residence owned by the school district and a \$400-a-month car allowance.

In Greenwich he will be paid \$105,400 a year, plus a housing allowance of \$11,400, a tax-deferred annuity of \$15,000 and \$3,600 for car expenses.

But the special financing plan was required to enable him to buy a home in Greenwich because housing costs there are far in excess of those in Grosse Pointe. Last year, average sales were about \$170,000 to \$200,000 here. The superintendent's residence in which Whritner lived rent-free here was valued at from \$250,000 to \$300,000.

In contrast, the Greenwich Time reported that the average price for a singlefamily home in Greenwich for the first six months this year was more than \$822,000 and 23 percent of all houses sold at more than \$1 million apiece.

Under the special plan, Whritner will finance his new home in Greenwich, where his contract requires him to live, with the aid of a private housing subsidy valued at about \$200,000. It will require him to take two separate mortgages on his home in order to pay both the bank and the investor

The superintendent will pay 5 percent

interest on the loan from the private investors who also would be reimbursed if the house were sold and, in addition, would receive their proportionate share of any profit realized in the sale.

Until the private financing deal was worked out, Whritner's negotiations with the Greenwich school board had stalled, according to the Greenwich newspaper. Then after the plan was worked out, Whritner informed the Greenwich board of education he would accept the post.

Whritner had told the Grosse Pointe News earlier he had accepted the Greenwich post to be near his family. He has three grown children on the East Coast and other relatives as well. Being nearer his family remains his major reason for accepting the new post, he said again last week.

A native of Long Island, Whritner had been superintendent in East Lyme, Conn., for 13 years before coming to Grosse Pointe four and a half years ago. Before that he had worked as a teacher and administrator in White Plains, N.Y.

From the reports heard by this newspaper, and our own coverage of his activities, we believe Whritner has had an excellent reputation not only with school officials and the school board but also with community leaders.

To tell the truth, however, many are disappointed that the Pointes once again will have to go through a search for a new superintendent. Thus many local people, while respecting Whritner's wish to return to the East Coast to be closer to his family, are sorry he could not have been persuaded to remain.

JOA stumbles in early going

Torror stories abound in the Pointes and elsewhere in Michigan about L Lthe lapses and failures of The Detroit News and Free Press joint publishing arrangement now heading into its third weekend.

One family in the Pointes that subscribes to both papers reported it received two copies of the first Saturday jointly published newspaper, three copies of the first Sunday and then no copy of the Monday Detroit News. Delivery was better for this family on the second weekend, but a good many other subscribers reported they failed to get all of the special sections.

As expected, the newspapers raised their rates last week for advertising and circulation. The circulation hikes seemed to be generally accepted but some advertisers, angered by steep boosts in ad rates, threatened to use other media to get their messages to the public.

To their credit, both newspapers covered their own failings in the news columns, but at the same time quoted executives as promising better and more efficient service in the future.

Meanwhile, down in the trenches at both papers resentments were reported even after members of the Newspaper Guild, which represents chiefly news and editorial department employees, approved their con-

Among those who were unhappy was Pointer Pete Waldmeir, columnist for the News. He complained the JOA is a "joke" because of its poor delivery service, because the first edition of the News now looks like the old first edition of the Freep, and vice versa, and because of assorted other gripes.

Many of the staff complaints are normal, of course, because it is the nature of newspeople to criticize everyone and everything. So those now involved, for better or worse, in the JOA are just following their waspish tradition.

There is enough merit to the public criticism, however, to warn the joint publishing agency it ought to get its act together as quickly as possible to avoid further complaints and losses in circulation and advertising that might jeopardize the future of the JOA or one of the two papers.

On a larger level, let's hope that recent changes in Eastern Europe will continue to support the efforts of citizens crying out for a voice, a vote that may guide us to a brighter future.



Dealers want to resurrect auto rows of old with a new twist

Krajenke's vision is an ambitions one. While the strip was home to dealerships of virtually all American makes in the '40's, it has shrunk to a handful. But the dealerships have plenty of history. Krajenke Buick advertises that "only General Motors has sold more Buicks." Woody Pontiac recently celebrated its 50th anniversary at the same Joseph Campau location, and dealer Woodrow Woody figures his store has sold more than 100,000 new Pontiacs. Also still inhabiting the strip are Kozak Chevrolet, Central Oldsmobile and Garrity Dodge.

But none has been on Joseph Campau as long as Krajenke. "My grandfather, Stanley Krajenke, started a garage farther south on Joseph Campau in 1913," said Clarence Krajenke, chairman of the dealership and cousin of Robert and Stanley, who is the dealer and president.

"That one-story garage, called Hamtramck Garage, had four stalls and it was near where Garrity Dodge is now," Clarence

"In 1915, he got a Hupmobile franchise and moved into a bigger facility, still in Hamtramck. In 1925, he added Buick and Pontiac franchises.

In 1940, Krajenke Buick, then run by Robert's father, Clarence (better known as "Babe"), sold the Pontiac franchise to a buyer who then sold it to Woodrow Woody.

"Sales were climbing and we

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"The fact that Joseph Campau needed more space," said Clarence, "so we moved into the present location (in Detroit, a couple blocks north of Hamtramck) in figures, celebrities of all kinds 1950." Later in the '50s, Al Long Ford moved out to Eight Mile Road and Krajenke bought the Long facility for a body shop. A building Krajenke had been using for new-car prep and delivery until a few weeks ago had housed a Kaiser-Frazer dealer-

> Krajenke sells about 600 new cars a year now. How good were the golden years? "We sold about 3,000 new cars a year in the '50s, '60s and early '70s,' said Clarence, who also runs the service department.

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"We were the No. 1 Buick dealership in those days," he said. "Hollywood stars, sports came to our showroom to buy Buicks. We got orders from overseas. One oil sheik ordered 25 Park Avenues at a crack.'

Babe Krajenke died last year. Clarence explained his uncle got his nickname because he had been a pretty good baseball player. Clarence's own father, Leonard, was nicknamed Barney, after Barney Oldfield (who drove Henry; Ford's Old 999) because he loved to drive fast cars.



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

Suspected crack dealer arrested in the Woods

A Detroit man arrested in the Woods for not having a driver's license was found to have all the makings of a crack dealer.

The 31-year-old man was trav eling south on Mack at 6:17 a.m. Nov. 28 when a Grosse Pointe Woods officer stopped him for not having his headlights on. He was arrested for operating the vehicle without a license.

The officer removed a pager that was clipped to the arrested man's belt.

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Woods officer ducks bullets

While making a traffic stop Dec. 4, Grosse Pointe Woods Public Safety Officer Steven Petrik found himself ducking as bullets slammed into his scout

Petrik monitored a broadcast out of St. Clair Shores shortly before 10 p.m. of an armed robbery at the Dairy Mart near Jefferson and Marter. In order to be able to watch traffic in case the suspects came through the Woods, Petrik pulled into the Peters Funeral Home parking lot at Vernier and Mack.

About two minutes after the broadcast, Petrik spotted a white BMW with smoked windows traveling westbound on Vernier. The officer pulled out behind the BMW and activated his overhead emergency lights.

The BMW pulled over to the curb and drove slowly for about 100 yards before coming to a stop west of Canton in Harper Woods. Petrik was unable to see who was in the car because of the smoked windows. As the BMW came to a stop, the passenger door flew open and a man jumped out and "assumed a crouched position," Petrik wrote in his report. The suspect began raising his arms and had a shiny object in his hands.

Petrik then dove across the front seat of the scout car, and just as his head was disappearing below the dashboard, he saw



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pect's hands.

Petrik said he heard about five or six shots. Two of the shots hit the police car's hood and two went through the windshield.

When Petrik peeked over the top of the dashboard, he saw the BMW pulling away, and the suspect who had fired the gun was running down Vernier toward Harper. Petrik began running after the suspect when he realized his portable radio had fallen out of its holster. 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
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Woods' colonial storefront requirement challenged

Evans Telegadas will not wait any longer.

As the owner of Telly's Place on Mack Avenue in Grosse Pointe Woods, Telegadas has been trying to install new awnings on his building.

Telegadas has been before the planning commission at least three times to get his awning designs approved. Each time he was denied.

The problem is that the awnings are not colonial in design. They are simple barrel awnings, half-round from the front, and not unlike others earlier ap-

On Dec. 4 he approached the board of appeals (the same members as the city council) in hopes that the board would finally approve his awning designs.

When board members seemed divided on approving the concept, Telegadas said he didn't care what they decided. He said he intends to put up the awnings anyway.

This was not the first time he was confronted with divided opinions from the city. On Oct 24, the planning commission in a 4-2 vote denied the barrel shaped awnings.

But commissioner Robert Fraley, an architect who voted in the minority to approve the barrel design, said Telly's Place will not look colonial regardless of what type of awnings are installed. In his appeal, Telegadas said

the city's master plan allows for awnings and building facades to set one type of business apart from another. The master plan also states that facades must have colonial designs.

For clarification, city attorney George Catlin said Telegadas indeed followed the guidelines for the approval process. Catlin also said the planning commission had the right to reject the designs if they felt the awning designs were not colonial or early American.

The division of opinions widened when board of appeals members Paul Beaupre and William Wilson fought to get Telegadas' awnings approved.

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
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

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
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Alumni Day at South is Dec. 21

Heroin addict steals

A 40-year-old heroin addict from Detroit was arrested Dec. 8 following the theft of steaks from the Farmer Jack store on Mack in the Woods.

six packages of Farmer Jack steaks from under the man's clothing.


The two men were arrested

Look for miniature landscapes

Too often photographers try to shoot the broad panoramic view while ignoring landscape details. Within every large landscape are hundreds of smaller ones just waiting to be captured by your camera.

Lily pads shimmering on the surface of a pond, a cluster of fallen leaves, or a wave gently lapping the shore — each of these and many more can be just as exciting and picturesque as the more expansive view.

Any environment contains an inexhaustible supply of fascinating miniature landscape detail.

Other than a keen eye, no elaborate equipment is needed. At times, a set of close-up filters or a macro lens will help to move in close and a tripod should be used to maximize the process and death of field.

sharpness and depth-of-field.
Seeing "simply" is a good way
to begin to photograph miniature
landscapes. That is, start to look
through the viewfinder and withdraw simple elements from the
whole that, in themselves, make

exciting, dramatic photographs. In other words, begin to see pictures within the picture.

Photography

The view of a majestic mountain across the lake will make a beautiful, overall landscape shot, but don't overlook the miniature landscape produced by the velvety row of moss-draped rocks at the water's edge.

Rather than portray the whole plowed field in your country photograph, zoom in on a small section of freshly cut furrows.

The Bodnant Gardens in northern Wales provided me with many sweeping landscape opportunities. Yet isolating only the simple elements of a single water lily, as shown in the accompanying photograph, produced a picture that "says it all" about these vast, impressive gardens.

Miniature landscapes will give a unique perspective to your picture and will emphasize textures and tones you often won't get by shooting the whole.

Remember, you're making photographs, not taking snapshots. Let your miniature landscape be a complete picture in itself while at the same time conveying the flavor and essence of the whole.

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Public school students score high on state assessment test

Local public school students have made Roger McCaig, director of research and development for Grosse Pointe schools, very happy.

District scores from the Michi gan Education Assessment Program (MEAP) were better than the state predictions that two out of three students would fail the test.

Reading and math tests were given at the start of the school year to fourth, seventh and 10th graders in all of Michigan's public schools. The fifth, eighth and 11th graders took a science test.

The most talked about test this year is the reading test which is completely new and has a totally different focus.

A pamphlet by the Michigan State Board of Education said the old test was revised to keep pace with rapidly changing needs of American businesses and the need for students to have a higher level of reading skills.

The new test focuses on understanding a longer reading as opposed to the shorter readings in previous tests. The new test consists of two sections - a story and an informational piece much like that found in a textbook.

In the fourth grade, 63.6 percent passed both sections of the reading test, in the seventh grade, 64.2 passed both and in the 10th grade, 53.6 passed both.

Because the new test is vastly different from previous tests, a section with similar questions was devised for comparison.

On that section, 98.8 percent of Grosse Pointe's fourth graders passed, 98.1 of all seventh graders passed and 95.7 percent of the 10th graders passed. All figures are slightly higher than last year's figures.

The math test, which McCaig

calls "ridiculously easy" and is being revised for next year, gave in giving the MEAP tests, the Grosse Pointe's students no problems, either.

reading program. The MEAP test is the state's way of measuring each district's

programming. In some cases the state gives compensatory money to lowscoring districts. Additionally, it is a way for the district to respond to public pressure to improve its programming if the scores are low.

The real value of this test is that we documented for the staff, and hopefully now for the community, what high achievers we have here," McCaig said. "And we're working hard to improve them still."



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


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

Airport committee is ready for next move

With the city of Detroit's announcement for an expanded runway at City Airport, the ad hoc Airport Committee in the Pointes readied itself for action.

But when it takes the next step, it will do so without its cochair and co-founder, Art Wil-

Williams, who lost a bid for the Grosse Pointe Park council in November, said he didn't feel he had the support of the current council and mayor. He resigned last week.

The committee, he said, is prepared to go forward with its plan to keep the Pointes safe from air traffic and free of noise.

Detroit officials have proposed a new runway parallel to the current runway which would be 7,400 feet in length.

Its construction of the runway would mean the city would have to acquire some 985 acres, relocating nearly 3,600 families, 52 industries and 130 other small businesses and destroying approximately 600 vacant homes.

The new runway will allow larger jets carrying full loads to take off, Williams said.

"This is the second worst-case scenario we could have had in the Pointes," Williams said. "But our position is on record with the FAA and we are standing on good ground.'

The Grosse Pointe Airport Committee was formed to protect the Pointes from problems associated with expansion at City Airport, and is working to get concessions from the city regarding traffic flow, size of airplanes and other safety and noise con-

The group has gotten assurances from carriers relating to size of airplanes, but because more carriers will soon be operating from the airport, Williams said assurances in the form of regulations must come from the

FAA. "We're in a pretty good position because three cities (Grosse Pointe Park, City and Farms) predate the airport, and there is legal precedent (from other airport expansions in other states),' Williams said.

But now the committee is going to need money for what is sure to be a long, possibly legal, road, to obtain the concessions they want from the airport.

The group is looking to combine efforts, and perhaps funds, with other similar groups in Wayne and Macomb counties to assure safety.

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
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

Roseanne Barr gives 'She-Devil' life

It's kind of odd, in a way.

Consider: In "She Devil." Meryl Streep, easily the most acclaimed actress in the movies today, works alongside Roseanne Barr, easily the most ... uh, mundane actress you'll find anywhere.

Streep, with films like "Kramer vs. Kramer," "Sophie's Choice," and "The French Lieutenant's Woman" to her credit, teamed with Barr, who has a nightclub act and a television show to her credit.

Streep - dramatic, a master of the art, the quintessence of drama. Barr - sophomoric, a quintessence of blue-collar Americana. An unlikely pairing, to say the least.

What's strange is that it's Barr - not Streep - who gives "She Devil" the life it needs to go the distance. It's Barr, with her easily understandable and approachable personality, who puts this picture in a class above the routine comedies.

Not that Streep isn't respectable. On the contrary, she's quite solid in her reading of a prissy romance novelist who steals Barr's husband. She brings to the role of harlot all the vigor and energy she brings to every-

in here. Barr, as the woman scorned, grabs our attention and our sympathy immediately. And from there, we only become more enamoured with her.

Douglas, Turner excel in 'War of the Roses'

There are no shots fired in "War of the Roses," but it is a war that is fought with frightening force between two people who go at each other with whole scale hostility in a black comedy that is uproariously funny in its excesses.

It begins when Oliver Rose (Michael Douglas) meets Barbara (Kathleen Turner) at an estate sale. She catches his eye when she keeps outbidding him on a small piece of sculpture. It is here when we see that this persistent young gymnast never gives up until she gets what she

Douglas, who is also used to getting what he wants, is fascinated. He follows her out. With no preliminaries they end up at his house. Soon after they are married. By all odds, it should be a successful marriage.

Douglas becomes a partner in an influential law firm. Turner converts her catering service into a successful business. They have two trouble-free children who are doing well at a prestigious col-

In the process of acquiring success, however, they miss the signs that lead to disenchantment with each other. He becomes insufferably domineering and patronizing. At first she is hurt by his self-satisfied manner, then she rebels in furious anger.

When Douglas is seized by what is thought to be a heart attack while lunching with clients, he asks them to call his wife. She never arrives at the hospi-

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When he is released, he confronts her and demands to know why she didn't come. The answer is devastating.

She tells him that she started out, but pulled her car over because she was scared. He melts at what he thinks is concern. But she tells him she was frightened at the thought that she was relieved at the prospect of his demise. Then she tells him she wants a divorce.

As viewers are led down a dark and dangerous path with the Roses charted by director Danny De Vito, it becomes increasingly apparent where the journey will end. The battle rages as each of them contends for the house. They both want it.

DeVito, who is Douglas' lawver and also his friend, arranges for joint occupancy of the house. It is a devastating mistake.

Both Douglas and Turner are enchanting in their evil doings. DeVito holds our attention both as narrator and amusing friend who becomes frustrated when he cannot reason with his client.

If you like humor that disturbs and shocks even as it fascinates and entertains, you don't want to miss this film.

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mantle each of those assets. Along the way, she destroys a house, builds her own business, turns Streep's life upside down, and gets her hubby into more legal trouble than he's ever known. She's a devil, yes. But she's a justified devil.

The film at times comes off as a commercial for the women's liberation movement, and in that respect it seems as if it's just a little bit behind the times. The comeuppance Barr delivers may give pause to more than a few viewers: It certainly begs the question why she ever married such a louse in the first place.

At its best, "She-Devil" is a contemporary morality play; an essay on the relativity of happiness and the shallowness of beauty. That interpretation is a bit liberal, however. More likely, this picture will be remembered as Streep's first big attempt at comedy, Barr's first big movie, and generally funny - but occasionally limp - holiday comedy.



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

Whoever said water and oil don't mix didn't have the business mind of Ramzi Simon of Grosse Pointe Shores.

Simon, an Armenian who arrived in this country in 1973, bought his first gas station in 1974. A few years later he mixed water into the oil business by selling packaged ice.

While the Simons operate a number of gas stations under the Atlas name, others are affiliated with the major oil companies such as Amoco, Shell and Sun-

Simon & Sons is always looking for new ventures. This past year, the company bought a couple of gas docks with adjoining stores along the Detroit River. Some \$100,000 was invested in one gas dock, which will include a deli, store and lounge.

Simon & Son's most ambitious project, however, was the opening of a \$2.2 million, 3,500square-foot Sunrise Food Mart & Deli, which could be considered the Meijer's of convenience sta-

Not only will the convenience mart sell gasoline, diesel fuel and propane, but inside there will be a food store, deli, pizzeria, bakery, hand-dipped Stroh's ice cream and three dining booths with a pay telephone at each. There is also a large selection of video rental tapes and there's a fax machine.

The entire store, from the gas pumps to the automatic car wash to the video rentals to the deli, is open 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

Simon & Sons opened its first Sunrise Food Mart Nov. 30 in White Lake Township across from the Alpine Valley ski resort. Next year the company plans to open three more Sunrise



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
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Paws With a Cause: Hearing ear dog works 168-hour week

The doorbell rings.

Inside, Randi, a light-gold 2-yearold 60-pound golden retriever, jerks her head up, awake, alert. Her ears twitch and rotate. She responds with a deep bark and an energetic prance to the front door. She runs to her owner, Bill Kerr. She returns again to the door. Back to Kerr.

Rhonda Kerr grasps Randi's collar in one hand and opens the front door with the other.

Without Randi, Rhonda and Bill Kerr of Grosse Pointe Woods might not have known that their doorbell rang. Both are hearing impaired. Bill is severely deaf. Rhonda's hearing is moderately impaired. She wears hearing aids in both ears.

Randi is a hearing ear dog.
"She hears when I don't hear,"
Rhonda said. "She makes our life a
lot easier."

Lynn Hoekstra is director of Paws With a Cause, a non-profit organization that helps people with hearing impairments and other disabilities use the unique working qualities of well-trained dogs.

"Dogs' sense of hearing is so acute," Hoekstra said. "They hear so much more than we do. They respond to stuff they're not even trained for."

Paws With a Cause has been in existence for 10 years, she said. Formerly known as Ears for the Deaf Inc., the organization has expanded and now trains dogs not only for people with hearing impairments, but also for people with other disabilities.

"By the end of this year we will have trained 337 dogs," she said. "Three-fourths of these are hearing dogs; the other one-fourth are service dogs."

Hearing ear dogs like Randi are trained to alert their owners at the sound of a telephone, a smoke alarm, an alarm clock, a door knocker or door bell, a baby's cry—and the sound of an intruder.

When she hears the sound, Randi barks, makes eye contact with one of her owners, and takes her owner

to the source of the sound. If the smoke alarm rings, Hoekstra said, Randi is trained to take her owners outside.

Rhonda Kerr learned about Paws with a Cause by chance.

"I had taken Randi to obedience training. The staff trainer knew about the program and told me about it," she said.

Hoekstra said that Randi had to pass a temperament test before she was accepted into the program. "We use dogs that are outgoing, friendly, intelligent, alert. They must be sound-sensative and have stable temperaments.

Randi attended school in a suburb of Grand Rapids for four weeks of sound training. Dogs who have not already been to obedience school, as Randi had, must attend an eight- to 10-week session which includes obedience training as well.

Then the dogs receive four weeks of in-home training for specific sounds and situations within their own families.

If the dogs pass their final examinations, they're certified as hearing dogs. They're issued an ID card and an orange leash with Hearing Dog printed on it. In 48 of the 50 states,

hearing dogs, like leader dogs, are granted access to restaurants, public buildings, public transportation, hotels and shopping centers where other dogs may not be allowed.

Hearing dogs are not mechanical robots, Hoekstra emphasized. They're happy, well-adjusted pets who are also trained as working companions. They stop playing when it's time to work, and they're on call 24 hours a day, 168 hours a week.

Paws with a Cause is a United Way of Michigan agency. Hoekstra said the organization receives 60 percent of its funding from United Way and the other 40 percent from service clubs such as Lions and Moose and AmVets. Donations are tax-deductible.

"Southeastern Michigan has between 60 and 100 trained dogs," she said. "In addition to dogs that are trained to help people with hearing impairments, service dogs are trained to help people in wheelchairs by holding doors open, turning on light switches, picking up dropped items, and pulling the chairs."

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

Divided no more

The Rev. Robert A. Rimbo St. James Lutheran Church

A few years ago my wife, Lois, and I stood near the Brandenburg Gate in West Berlin and stared into the gray bleakness of the Soviet Bloc. I felt a strange emotion then, never felt in quite the same way before or since - until

Then and now the words of theologian hymn writer Martin Franzmann come to mind:

We walled us in this house of doom, Where death had royal scope and room, Until your servant, Prince of Peace. Broke down its walls for our release

As the Berlin Wall comes down — figuratively if not literally - I am reminded of the mercy of God which has removed every barrier so we might live in union with all creation and with its Creator.

This is one of the wonders of the Holy Season we enter, that time of anticipation and celebrating Christ's coming to break down the walls for our release. At the manger we all can start over again, no longer barred from God, but free, forgiven, unafraid and unashamed. At the manger, we know that we are loved with the love of the Child.

It is this love we know and celebrate - a love which leaves nothing outside - a love for which nothing is too poor or weak or full of sin. It may break the Child's heart to carry our burden, as it really did in the terror of the crucifixion.

But that is why he came.

Berlin reminds us of other cities: San Salvador, Johannesburg, Havana and, yes, Detroit. Thus reminded, we hear the summons from the manger to seek the welfare of the cities, to break down the walls that divide us from others, to heal the breach of all our sad divisions as we are gathered into the arms of a Baby.

The gray bleakness of all the world will, then, witness to the rising Sun of Righteousness, Jesus the Christ, who comes with healing, with wholeness, with love.





Brand Marwell is one of Franklin Hills finest fairway medalists, an encyclopedian of rare manuscripts and a good friend. He also enjoys dabbling at duplicate when time from his business permits. This was the instance a few weeks ago for our partnership at Patty and Bob Newman's Tuesday game in West Bloomfield.


As we sat to play Brand remarked, "Take it easy on me, I haven't played in a month and I'm a little rusty." Then he proceeded to show me that even rusty he was no duffer. In the course of twenty-four boards he was instrumental in finding three successful slams, two of which weren't bid at the other tables. Three games that we were alone in, one of which he had to coup east in an end position to capture nine tricks. For an encore on board Twenty-four he doubled east for a penalty price of plus 300 while the field was laboring in a major partial.

In summation the evidence soundly supported his judgment, his bidding and playing acumen. But what impressed me sincerely was the confidence he displayed in himself and our partnership. If that is lacking the outcome is usually underdone or overbungled.

Heaven forbid if this man ever takes duplicate seriously. Such natural talent with professional direction and an experienced partnership could become a life master in a month of

To best show you what I mean by his partnership confidence let's do a delayed replay on one of the dramatic hands from that pleasant event. It was a bidding problem that Brand handled with bravery and resolution and this I believe was spurred by his respect for our partnership.

You say . . . boy, were they lucky! Yes, there's a lot of luck in every competitive card game. It was lucky that west didn't lead a singleton spade or north/south would have been a trick short. It was luck for east/west that we didn't play six diamonds as nothing will topple that. It was also luck that east took a third bid or we would have languished in one spade. So luck did favor us, but let's talk a little bit about judgement and skill. When north could show two good



suits vulnerable it was time for me to cooperate. After three rounds of bidding I had constructively contributed nothing. Holding two key queens and a lonesome club my hand had to be working for north ... so three spades accelerated my partner's last call and that could have won for him "The distinguished bidding cross" posthumously, but I like this kind of valor. It comes with the character of every winner.

As that wonderful gentleman Teddy Roosevelt once said, "Far better it is to dare mighty things, to win glorious triumphs, even though checkered by failure, than to take rank with those poor spirits who neither enjoy much nor suffer much, because they live in the gray twilight that knows not victory nor defeat." not victory nor defeat.

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




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

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Pineapples, pomegranates: Symbols of hospitality

Hospitality is a wonderful aspect of the holiday season. It's a tradition that goes far back in American history. In fact, the first settlers in Virginia recorded the Christmas celebrations which marked the very first years of the colony in their diaries and letters.

It is hard to imagine Christmas without Santa Claus or Christmas trees, but neither of these Christmas symbols was part of the colonial tradition. Christmas trees appeared in Williamsburg in 1842. Santa Claus came along even later.

But hospitality in colonial times was lavish and presents were given on New Year's Day. Families and friends gathered in festive groups in each other's homes to celebrate the season. It was a time for weddings, for family reunions for the renewal of friendships. Wines, punch of various kinds and cider were in lavish supply.

There is a lot of confusion about cider. It is, basically, the juice from apples that have been ground to a pulp and pressed. Cider may be sweet (unfer-

Sometimes it is difficult to decide where apple juice ends and cider begins, since the words are often used interchangeably. There is a difference in the taste of cider, depending on what varieties of apples are used in making it.

Fermented cider is the drink to which Europeans refer when they speak of cider. Its alcoholic content varies. One form is applejack, a potent spirit distilled from hard cider.

Sweet cider is the native New England American form, while hard cider has always been more popular in Europe. It is the traditional beverage of England and northern France where it is called *cidre*. Sparkling cider is also very prevalent in Europe.

are traditional symbols of hospitality. Pomegranates are native to western Asia and southern Europe and were named by Pliny who was fond of the appleshaped fruit of this decorative plant. The leaves are willow-like and the fruit is orange and gold and flushed with red, as are the large fragrant flowers.

Pineapples were grown in greenhouses as a curiosity in the 18th century. They make good house plants, but may be grown outdoors in the southern part of this country. They're a big industry in Hawaii.



and as a motif in woven fabrics for draperies and carpets. They were often used in wreaths and on mantels or windowsills along with apples and evergreen branches in holiday arrangements.

In 1790, George Washington's cook, Hercules, made beautiful centerpieces for the table out of fruit and holly, always centered with an exotic pineapple. Hercules was apparently an excellent cook and went to Philadelphia with the family and back to Mt. Vernon when they returned. Dinner was always served at 3 p.m. and when there were guests of importance or at Christmas or other festive occasions, the feast often lasted until 6 p.m. or later.

Christmas puddings and fruit cakes all around the world are replete with nuts and currents, citron and pineapple, cherries and spices from many origins.

So deck the halls with apples and holly, pineapples and evergreens, mistletoe and pomegranates, rosemary and ivy, and prepare for that most festive of holidays which brightens the darkest days of winter with tra-




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Semiors Catastrophic Coverage Act: What can we learn from it?

The Catastrophic Coverage Act was repealed Nov. 22, but there are no winners in this decision: In varying amounts, everybody will lose something.

What is there to be learned from the recent series of events surrounding catastrophic's passage and repeal?

It was absolute nonsense in the first place to adopt the Catastrophic Coverage Act without extensive input from seniors who were going to carry the cost. Forty percent of the seniors who were slated to pay for most of the cost of the benefits were never asked to testify in congressional hearings.

Some say the whole mess is now history, but history has a strange way of threading its way into the present and future. Seniors must keep informed and vo-

Taxes, premiums and health benefits seldom make exciting news in the media. I have been told by some seniors that this sort of information is either hard to follow or boring. Maybe we need to ask ourselves if this kind of response is in our best interests. Whether we are seniors or baby boomers, we have a responsibility to become informed about the health coverage we are receiving or are going to receive someday.

The need for an informed public throughout the development of the Catastrophic Coverage Act became evident by the ground swell of opposition by seniors following its passage. Without belaboring the details of this opposition, which resulted in organized responses to Congress, we should focus on two conditions.

For seniors to understand and evaluate the various plans proposed, it requires an understanding of Medicare benefits. A recent survey by the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) revealed that most Americans over 45 years do not feel well informed about how the

Rep. Sander Levin said the response of seniors reflected a failure on the part of television and newspapers to keep the public progressively informed during months of congressional hearings and debate.

It is my firm conviction that as citizens we cannot confront health-care issues if we do not have a knowledge of basic health-care facts.

The content of future news and information must, by necessity, prepare the public with an understanding of population changes affecting health costs and coverage, health care inflation rates, use of health care resources and private and public coverages. On the local level, community agencies and centers have an educational obligation to clarify health care issues with members, possibly through meetings and newsletters.

The act was signed by the president in July 1988 and was the most significant expansion of Medicare since its beginning in 1965. It represented a culmination of several legislative proposals, the original being submitted by Dr. Otis Bowen. The main population involved. thrust of the law aimed to protect Medicare members (actually a small percent) from the cost of lengthy hospital stays and large doctor bills.

It should be mentioned that several plans for financing catastrophic benefits were considered in view of the current national budget deficit. Many seniors were unaware that AARP exerted strong opposition to the original congressional proposal to count the value of Medicare benefits as taxable income, which would have imposed a heavier premium for Medicare members of moderate income than the two-premium plan.

Another proposal highly disapproved and discarded would have financed the new benefits through a flat premium paid by all Medicare beneficiaries. This would have resulted in premiums which the majority of Medicare members could not afford.

The two-premium plan that became the law did not contain a means test. It was a payment plan, not welfare. Income was used as a means of determining how much a beneficiary would pay, but not whether he would be entitled to benefits.

Actually, the income-related 'tax" was not new to the Medicare program. FICA taxes, which go into the Medicare Trust Fund, are proportioned according to income earned. In spite of how much each worker pays into the Fund, all workers receive the same Medicare benefits when they become eligible.

The catastrophic supplemental "tax," however, differed from FICA in that the FICA is paid by all employees and employers, while the catastrophic supplemental "tax" was to be paid only by those receiving the benefits namely seniors.

To avoid future public uproar, any expansion of Medicare benefits should carefully address the payment plan as to how premiums are apportioned across the

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

Roast goose, plum pudding are on traditional holiday menus

Domestic geese date from a remote time in history, as documented by their appearance on the monuments of ancient Egypt. Biblical writing, early Roman manuscripts, and Chinese records show geese as part of agricultural enterprise as far back as 3,000 years. Throughout the ages, geese have been reared and prized as a source of nutritious and palatable meat.

The new American-bred goose has become popular for the holiday season because of increased availability, the marketing of larger sizes, lower prices and leaner quality. Our modern American geese are different from their ancestors because they are grown in a controlled environment and fed natural grains which result in the highest yield of meat to bone and the least amount of fat.


This year, a larger goose is available to the consumer. Birds weighing more than the popular 12 to 14 pounds are coming to market as lean and tender as their smaller counterparts. There are sizes up to 17 pounds which will feed eight to nine people generously. An early order from your favorite butcher or supermarket is the best way to insure getting the size you want.

Fresh chilled goose can be held two or three days in the coldest part of the refrigerator. Make sure the wrapping is loose enough to provide some air circulation. Giblets should be removed from the bird, cooked promptly and refrigerated until ready to use.

Fresh frozen goose must be completely thawed before cooking. The National Goose Council recommends that you select a goose with the USDA Grade A shield to be sure the bird you serve is the finest available. The shield signifies that the goose is a federally inspected, healthy bird that has met the most stringent quality standards. Imported birds are graded in their country of origin. Standards in these countries are not equivalent to those imposed by the USDA.

Roasting the goose

- 1. If goose is frozen, it must be thawed thoroughly.
- 2. Preheat oven to 400 de-
- 3. Remove neck and giblets from body cavity. Cook them promptly or refrigerate until ready to use.
- 4. Remove excess fat from body cavity and neck skin. Reserve fat and render for use in other cooking. Rinse bird and drain.
- 5. Wings may be removed at second joint or tied flat against body with cord around each wing and across back. If two end pieces of wings are removed, cook them with neck and giblets. If unstuffed, sprinkle body cavity lightly with salt.
- 6. To stuff, fill neck and body cavity loosely. Fasten neck skin to back with a skewer. Tie legs together, or tuck in band of skin at tail if present. (No need to truss.)
- 7. Place goose, breast side up, on rack in shallow roasting pan. Insert meat thermometer deep into inside thigh muscle.
- 8. Roast uncovered for 45 minutes to 1 hour (depending on size of bird) in preheated 400 degree oven. No need to baste.
- 9. During roasting, spoon or siphon off accumulated fat and



reserve for use as a shortening in other cooking. This should be done at half-hour intervals so that the fat doesn't brown excessively.

10. After roasting for 45 minutes to 1 hour, reduce oven temperature to 325 degrees and con-

11. Roast until thermometer in thigh registers 180 to 185 degrees. Stuffing temperature should also be checked and it should register 165 degrees.

12. If a thermometer is not used, press meaty part of leg between protected fingers. It should feel very soft. Also prick thigh with a fork. The juices running out of thigh should be beige in color, not pink. The skin should be golden brown and

Scatter the carrot, celery, on-

ion and chopped giblets on the bottom of the pan, and roast the goose. During the last half hour of roasting, soak the dried mushrooms in 1 cup of broth, heated. Strain the mushroom liquid through a fine sieve. Rinse the mushrooms, drain them well and chop fine.

Remove the goose from the pan to a heated platter. Skim off the fat in the pan, remove the vegetables and giblets from roasting pan with a slotted spoon and discard. Reserve the pan juices. Add wine and Port to the pan, deglaze the pan over moderately high heat, scraping up the brown bits clinging to the bottom and sides, and boil the mixture until it is reduced by half.

In a saucepan, combine 1/4 cup of reserved fat drippings and flour and cook the roux over moderately low temperatures, whisking for 3 minutes. Add the remaining 2 cups of broth, the wine mixture and the reserved porcini liquid in a stream, whisking, bringing the mixture to a boil, whisking, and simmering the gravy, whisking occasionally for 3 minutes, or until it is thickened. Stir the porcini into the gravy with salt and pepper to taste. Simmer the gravy for 2 minutes and transfer it to a heated saucepan.



Pour the mixture into a one gallon pudding basin or steam mold. Cover the top with plastic wrap and foil, tying them in place. Steam for 6 hours. If the pudding cooks too fast, it will become a hard inedible mess.

Before serving, ignite brandy in a separate pan and pour on pudding when the flame goes



Roast Christmas goose is part of the American holiday tradition. American-bred geese are becoming more popular because they're leaner, larger and lower priced.

Plum pudding may be made gradually to the butter until weeks in advance, but must be stored in an airtight container in the refrigerator or in a cool place. Reheat by steaming process before serving. Top with holly for garnish.

A struggling club

It may be too early to tell, but the Grosse Pointe North hockey team doesn't yet look like the state contender I thought it would be.

Watching the Norsemen play Brother Rice Dec. 7 at the St. Clair Shores Civic Arena, I wasn't very impressed. North is touted as a team to give defending Class A champ Southgate Anderson its toughest task, but if the team continues to play as individuals, Anderson will again skate circles around the Norsemen.

North will host Anderson Dec. 19, and that will be its toughest test. North needs to escape its syndrome of not playing as a team and get on with things now, otherwise this season could fizzle.

North has difficulty getting the puck out of its zone.

Rice, which won the game 7-6, dumped the puck in and North struggled all evening to dump it back out. Many of the players were standing around waiting for something to happen instead of taking command and forcing the tempo.

I was surprised to see North playing as a team separated by individuality. The players have yet to mold their styles and personalities, and they didn't play a very disciplined game.

With 10 guys back from a year ago, North is supposed to be skating with precision and confidence, and no glitches even though it's early in the season. These guys have been playing together for three years now but the consistency is missing.

Perhaps you could blame the slow 3-3 start on the fact that No. 1 goaltender Matt Krieg was lost to the team. Perhaps you could blame it on the coaching, or maybe the lack of defense. Maybe, but North's biggest problem is weak goaltending.

Defense was to be a strong trademark for the Norsemen. Six defensemen are in the lineup, but the steadiest one right now is Tim Ryan. Ryan plays a very physical game, but he's the only one. Good defensive teams don't give up seven goals. If North can't clear its zone, the goaltender may as well paint a target on his jersey. And with the current lack of goaltending North may give up more than seven goals a

Coach Mike Manzella anticipated his senior-laden team would open the season with some fire. But, the fire has been doused by poor execution and the missing link of leadership. Manzella also mentioned his team looks good on paper, but it must find the right chemistry. Well, someone better get into the lab and mix some things together, otherwise North won't have much fun this season.

At 3-3, it's not time to panic. but there is no quick fix. The guys on the ice and off the bench must come together and play as a team. It's difficult to blend 16 different personalities, but it's not impossible.

Instead of seeing guys standing around banging their sticks on the ice calling for the puck, I'd rather see five guys forechecking, backchecking and creating opportunities. Not a few working hard and the lazy guys getting the reward.

North has the potential to win the state title, and thank goodness there is still enough time to correct the mistakes. There's a great deal of individual talent, but someone's got to step forward and take charge.


Can a smiling Stumb meet the challenge?

"Coach Olman (basketball) and Coach Sumbera (football) tell me all the time that I'm only playing on my abilities," said Stumb, who has been heavily recruited since his junior season. "Personally, it's not that I haven't given my best, but I know I can be a better player. I'm just a happy-go-lucky person.

question remains: Can Stumb I work hard, but I know I could work even harder."

> "He's not a good basketball player yet," said head basketball coach George Olman. "He's playing on ability. I expect so much more out of him because I know there's so much more ability in him. He knows it, too.'

His peers expect much more from him too, because he is a franchise player. Stumb is popular, friendly and the president of the Varsity Club. Not all the people you talk to at North may know him, but they know of the kid with the perpetual smile.

"That's because Charlie is liked by everyone," said Sumbera. "He's one of the most pleasant kids I've ever coached. Everyday at practice, he'd have a smile on his face. He's just a good-natured kid who makes you feel good even when you're not

"Coach Sumbera, Ritter and Olman are a few of my best friends," Stumb said. "They've always wanted what's best for me and pushed me to be the best. I have a lot to thank them

Stumb, who plays point guard and can post up for the hoop team, shattered several school records on the football field including the most career catches (60), most receiving touchdowns (10), most career yards (1,097), and the longest touchdown catch for a tight end (73 yards).

Besides being the only receiver at North to ever exceed 1,000 yards in the air, Stumb twice set single-game marks with eight catches.

Offensively, he's powerful, strong and a threat. But, when the opposition takes over on of-

fense, it doesn't get Stumb off the field. In his senior season, he recorded 90 tackles from his linebacker spot, had four interceptions, including one for a touchdown, had 15 behind-the-line tackles, three fumble recoveries and four quarterback sacks. He also handled the punting and kickoff chores.

'Charlie never left the field," said head football coach Frank Sumbera. "He has great coordination. In my 20 years of coaching, I've never seen an athlete with hands as soft as Charlie's. He just flat out catches the ball, and on defense, he's got such a keen sense and gets to the ball very quickly.'

In his two varsity seasons for the Norsemen, Stumb has been twice named to the All-White Division first team. This season he shared the team's MVP award with fullback Bryan Ford, and also made The Detroit News All-Dream Team.

"I never thought for a minute that I could be selected as one of the state's top 23 players," Stumb said in reference to the News' selection. "It's a great honor for me, but I wouldn't have been able to do it without a lot of help from my teammates."

This season. Stumb was also placed on the All-Suburban, All-Metro East and All-Metro teams listed by the Free Press and the News.

Destined for DeLaSalle Collegiate High School after eighth grade, Stumb had no hopes of attending North until he found the freshman football team practicing in August of 1986.

'I knew Scott Bernhardt

(North's quarterback) pretty well and one day I saw him throwing the ball on the field," Stumb recalled. "I ran a few patterns and caught a few passes, and the next thing I knew Coach Sumbera had me going home with a Norsemen football helmet."

And his life would never be the same.

In subsequent years Stumb threatened to quit, but Sumbera kept motivating him. So did his best friend Matt Brady, a 1989 North graduate.

"After my sophomore year, I knew I had to play as a junior," said Stumb. "Matt was a senior and playing, and I knew I couldn't sit in the stands on Saturday afternoons and watch him play. I had to be a part of it."

And a big part he was. As a junior Stumb set the single-season record for catches (36) and scored five touchdowns.

Unlike the previous seasons, Stumb didn't have any ill feelings toward football after his junior season. In fact, he was anxious to put the pads back on.

"It took me a while to realize how much I really love football," he said. "After my junior year, I personally thought I was not an all-around good football player, but a lot of college coaches were interested in seeing my game films and that's when I began to realize I should take football more seriously."

He still, however, takes his basketball very seriously.

As a child, he gave up his ice hockey skates to work on basketball. Sleeping with his ball and always dribbling it through his house, Stumb began to show

signs of being a quality basketball player.

"I used to dream of being a great hockey player," Stumb said. "But I gave it up for basketball, and now I'm going to play college football and that's it. I haven't ruled out college basketball, but it would be very difficult to play two sports in college. After the basketball season, I'll work in the weight room and get ready for football. Basketball, however, will always have a special place in my heart.'

If he peaks this basketball season, though, perhaps he could be recruited for hoops, too.

"My first love used to be basketball, and in some ways it still is," said Stumb. "I've got to think of the basketball team right now and when that's over I'll focus back on football. When I was a kid, everyone had the biggest dreams for me to become a great basketball player because they knew that was my sport."

And now?

"It's kind of scary to think at one time I wanted to be the best basketball player ever," Stumb said. "And now I'm being recruited for football. It's kind of strange, but it's fun, too."

The fun of being recruited began at the conclusion of his junior football season, but now the pressure mounts as the signing date nears and the colleges look to acquire Stumb.

"I'd like to commit and sign as soon as possible," said Stumb, who can't officially sign until Feb. 15, 1990. "By doing that, I can stop all the phone calls and mail from recruiters. It'll be nice Photo by Dick Cooper

to know I'm going somewhere and can concentrate on things that are going on right now."

Stumb is currently looking to play at Michigan, Michigan State, Penn State, Indiana or Louisville.

"I know I've got to be stronger, faster and mentally ready to play football at a Division I school," said Stumb. "I'm very happy with all that's happened to me and I'd like to thank all the people who have helped me along the way. I can't do anything from here on just on my athletic ability. I've got to be ready to compete.'

And he will be.

Mike Uznis of Grosse Pointe Farms will be bound for Ecuador next April.

Uznis has just returned from the Mid-Winter Championships of Optimist Dinghys in New Orleans, where he finished third overall in the six-race series.

By finishing third overall, Uznis earned a spot on the United States team that will compete next spring. The top five skippers qualify for the national

Uznis sails in the Bayview Yacht Club Junior Sailing Program. Tom Shumaker of Grosse Pointe finished 38th overall.




