Computerized matching makes carpooling easy

If you could conserve fuel, cut pollution, reduce daily stress and, at the same time, save money, would you do it?

Probably. And RideShare just might be your ticket for accomplishing all this.

One of the best things about living in the Grosse Pointes is that it's just a short ride to downtown. But while the little drive may save time and gas, it's expensive to park

downtown and each driver is adding to the congestion, pollution and consumption of

With so many Pointers traveling to and from the same areas each day, you would think the free RideShare carpooling program operated by the Southeastern Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG) would be popular.

RideShare Manager Anita Ste. Marie said that as of February, however, only 15 Grosse Pointers were using RideShare, which has been around for a decade.

The benefits are there. For the average commuter, RideShare means an annual savings of \$1,000 in gas and repairs, and that doesn't include the cost of parking and the environmental cost of so many commuters going it alone.

"The need to carpool or vanpool will be greater than ever as the inevitable increases in traffic congestion, environmental

pollution, road deterioration and parking demand take their toll," Ste. Marie said.

"Pooling offers a cost-saving, environmentally beneficial and relaxing alternative to the hassles of driving alone. And studies have shown that commuters who share the ride arrive at work with better attitudes and that absenteeism and tardiness are re-





Angry Woods taxpayers pack council meeting

The quiet Woods council chamber was packed with a couple hundred angry residents at Monday night's meeting of the City

And like a game of follow the leader, residents, one-by-one, residents that he quit his job. took turns expressing their ire toward unusually high and uneven assessment increases throughout the city.

Some even claimed, with the backing of state Rep. William Bryant, that the increases are illegal as described by Michigan

When the residents were done, the meeting. the mayor and council were ready to consider starting the process from scratch by reassessing the entire city.

On the front line was Gerald McNamara, acting city assessor, who weathered demands from

Many of the residents demanded that the council do something to remedy the situation, but were told that only McNamara or the city's Board of Review could reduce the amount of their assessment increases.

That wasn't good enough for Ann Omen, who led the battle at

city that the assessment on her Ida Lane property had been increased by 87 percent since last

"Why should people go through a year-long process with the Board of Review and Michigan Tax Tribunal when it is obviously a horrendous error?" Omen asked

Last week, Omen contacted Rep. Bryant for a clarification. Bryant's reply stated that Omen's 87 percent increase is illegal, as described by state law. Also illegal is assessing just one part of a city, as Omen claimed McNamara did during the assessment process.

"Although some cities do it," Bryant wrote in a letter to Omen, "the basic legal requirement is uniformity, which is difficult to maintain if the city is reassessing only part of the

Bryant also referred to assessment appeal procedures which state that assessed valuation increases "shall not be increased or decreased more than \$20,000.

When Omen asked McNamara why her increase far exceeded the legal limit, the assessor said he was not aware of any limit on assessment increases

McNamara said many larger homes in the Woods are assessed less than smaller homes. "One of the projects we've done is to reappraise all the homes in the city," McNamara said. "I think we have done that. A lot of the homes have been underassessed and now have been increased. A lot of homes were overassessed and have been reduced.'

Omen said many of the residents are frustrated because the Board of Review is not responsive to the residents.

"If someone can show that

be no change," Omen charged. Another resident complained that his assessment rolls contained numerous errors and the assessment on his vacant property had been increased by more than 700 percent.

As Councilwoman Jean Rice tried to put the problem in perspective, she was met with loud complaining.

"The problem is going on all over the state," Rice said. When she recommended people write to their congressman to complain,

One problem repeatedly referred to by residents was that the computer software package used by the assessor is in error. Residents said John Pierce, chairman for the Board of Review, told them that the software package is faulty and places too much emphasis on the land area rather than the home on a given lot. The problem seemed to be compounded in areas with odd-shaped lots.

The whole appraisal process is wrong and needs to be scrapped," one resident said. His

statement was met with a vigor-

audience.

While he would not be specific, Robert Novitke, mayor pro-tem, hinted at action by the council that would solve the problem in the future.

Before moving on to other business, the council set a third date on which residents can appear before the Board of Review to appeal their increases. The two remaining dates for Board of Review sessions are Tuesday, March 27, and Tuesday, April 3. For more information, call City Hall at 343-2440.

The shooting of the Grosse Pointe Park family's dog March 4 was still being considered by a special police board Tuesday.

Police Capt. William Furtaw said a major incident review board has been convened to look into the incident. The review board will decide if the shooting was justified and make a recommendation to top police officials.

The shooting occurred while a Park public safety officer was walking to work to begin the 7 p.m. to 7 a.m. shift. The officer reportedly said the dog, a 2-yearold Labrador mix, lunged at

Police looking for witnesses in hit and run of Farms man

Grosse Pointe Farms police are seeking witnesses to a hitand-run accident that left a Farms man lying in the eastbound lanes of Mack Feb. 14.

Robert Charles Jenks, 60, was in stable condition at St. John Hospital Monday. He was initially in critical condition after being run over at 12:28 a.m. near Mack and Manor. He suffered broken ribs, bruised lungs, a broken pelvis and a ruptured bladder.

Just prior to the accident, Jenks told a bartender at the Pointe Cafe that he was going to walk home, according to police reports. Jenks was having drinks at the bar with his 35-year-old ex-wife from a second marriage.

An investigation following the accident indicated that Jenks' own 1989 Cadillac may have been the vehicle that struck him and dragged him 135 feet. A piece of Jenks' checkered pants was found hanging from the undercarriage of the Cadillac, which was found parked nearby on Canyon.

Farms Chief of Detectives George VanTiem said his department would like anyone who saw the accident or who may know something about the individuals involved to come for-

No charges have been brought concerning the accident, which remains under investigation. VanTiem said he hoped to be able to question Jenks this week.

Jenks has three daughters from his first marriage. His oldest daughter, Terry Gurzell, 41, of Grosse Pointe Woods, said her father is a lifelong Grosse Pointe resident. He has two other daughters, ages 31 and 29.

According to Gurzell, Jenks graduated from Grosse Pointe High School, where he was All-American, and Wayne State University. He is owner of CDA Engineering Inc.

Gurzell said her father is an

avid sailor and a member of Bayview Yacht Club and the Crescent Sail Club, where he keeps his boat.

Police ask anyone with information concerning the accident to call the detective bureau at 885-2100.





Relief may be in store for Woods residents who are irate over unusually high residential property assessments.

But for now, many residents are angry enough to go forward with a government recall petition and a possible lawsuit calling for a new assessor.

Many residents protested when they received word from the city that their assessments had doubled. In some cases, residential property assessments increased 212 percent. At least one vacant lot's assessment was increased 705 percent.

After approximately 300 residents demanded reviews of their assessments on March 13, a spokesman for the city's Board of Review said the Woods, due to a computer error, had assessed residential property incorrectly.

John Pierce, chairman of the Board of Review, said the high assessments were caused by an honest mistake. He said most of the errors occurred in the Vernier Road area and the assessments are soon expected to be reduced to the correct level.

Gerald McNamara, acting assessor, said the average assessment in the Woods was raised by 12 percent, though many individual assessment increases were higher.

By state law, property is assessed at half the market value of the home. In some cases, the assessment of nearly identical homes situated side-by-side on

the same block varied by as much as 40 percent.

Pierce said property owners in the Woods whose assessments were raised by more than 15 to 20 percent should contact City Hall or appear before the next Board of Review session on Tues-

day, March 27. Meanwhile, residents are not waiting for the city to correct the problem. At least one petition is being circulated calling for a recall of the entire Woods council, according to Dwight Mochiewski, Woods resident.

Mochiewski said the high assessment increases, if not corrected by the city, will cause many seniors to move elsewhere.

He added that a group of residents plan to go to Lansing to present recall petitions to lawmakers.

Perry Lewis, an attorney and property owner in the Woods, is weighing possible legal action calling for a new assessor.

"I'm looking into possible legal action in Wayne County Circuit Court to have a master or receiver replace the Woods' assessor, Gerald McNamara,' Lewis said.

"My assessment increase was 95 percent. There is no rhyme or reason to it.'

Lewis said he went to City Hall to review the records pertaining to his property and found that there were no new notations on his assessment roll since

In 1988, Lewis said two college students representing the Woods' assessor came to his house asking questions about additions or renovations. "Even then, there were no notations on my assessment roll," Lewis said.

"They (the city administration) are claiming that there was a computer error, but that's not correct at all. They're just trying to cover up their mistakes."

Lewis said the heart of the problem is that McNamara is not doing his job. "We have a total abuse of government power by just one man and people are up in arms," Lewis said.

'We can't find anything in the procedures by the Woods assessor that relate to the rule of

"It appears to be quite arbitrary. As taxpayers, we are being denied our due process of

Lewis said before a suit goes to court, the city must be given a chance to correct the wrong; in this case, to reduce the incorrect assessments and replace the assessor, he said.

Lewis said even if the assessments are reduced to the satisfaction of residents, a legal challenge will be brought to the court asking for a new assessor.

"No one is doing the job," Lewis said. "People there are not returning my calls. But the real problem is the arbitrary nature of the increases. Our country has a long history of opposing something like this.'

Lewis said if a suit is filed, it would most likely be a class-action suit involving several resi-





Drain board begins long process of cleaning polluted Milk River

The long process of cleaning the sewage-laden Milk River Drain is slowly beginning to roll.

A public hearing is scheduled for Tuesday, March 27, at 7:30 p.m. in the Woods City Hall to discuss construction of a disinfection building on the grounds of the Woods Department of Public Works at Marter and Parkway.

Chester Petersen, Woods city administrator, said the public hearing is the first step in a long process designed to clean up the

At the hearing, the Milk River Inter-County Drain Board, comprised of city officials from Grosse Pointe Woods, Harper Woods and St. Clair Shores and representatives from Wayne County and the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR), will present a list of clean-up options and recommendations.

The first option chosen by the Drain Board is the construction of a disinfection building which will contain chlorination equip-

ment to reduce the odor coming from the drain. The building is expected to cost the municipalities and the county about \$300,000. Most of the cost will be borne by Grosse Pointe Woods and Harper Woods.

Petersen said the next step in the clean-up process is expected to be the dredging of the basin to remove solids from the river

According to a report issued by McNamee, Porter and Seely, the engineering firm contracted to map out clean-up solutions, the process chosen by the Drain Board will include several steps costing more than \$14 million.

The process, which must be approved by the DNR, includes: • Improvements at the pump station to handle increased vol-

ume. Cost: \$400,000. • Rerouting the Harper Woods sanitary flow from the Milk River Drain to the Detroit sewer

interceptor. Cost: \$1 million. · Disconnecting downspouts in the area served by the Milk River system. Cost: \$400,000.

• Increasing volume of water circulation so that the drain is flushed weekly into Lake St. Clair to prevent settling of solids. Cost: \$1.9 million.

• Initial channel dredging to remove solids. Cost: \$600,000. (Must be done periodically.)

• Construction of a 15-million gallon stormwater retention basin to combine with current 4million gallon basin to reduce overflows into Lake St. Clair. Cost: \$8.8 million.

The entire project is expected to take years, possibly decades, to complete, according to engi-

After the initial public hearing on the disinfection building, another public hearing will be scheduled for April where additional options are expected to be discussed.

Petersen said the April meeting will be held in the Assumption Greek Orthodox Church on Marter Road in St. Clair Shores. The date will be announced later. All interested parties are invited to attend the meetings.

The city ordinance parking formula would require the library to come up with 430 parking spaces; the library site plan offers 195 spaces. A consultant will make recommendations to the city as to whether a variance is appropriate.





Pointes rebel at valuations, join tax revolt


o nobody's great surprise, property tax assessments in the Pointes are continuing their steady increase this year but they also seem to be prompting a tax revolt in this usually docile commun-

What has aroused many property owners are the double-digit increases in property assessments in all of the Pointe municipalities with the hikes ranging from about 12 percent on average in most communities to 16.25 percent in the City.

In the Woods, a number of huge assessment increases prompted talk of trying to recall the council and seeking legal action to replace the assessor.

One Woods resident's 212 percent increase on his old farmhouse on Vernier Road apparently topped residential assessment boosts. But even the admission by Woods officials that some of the big hikes were honest errors obviously didn't soothe all the residents' pain.

Despite the size of the assessment boosts, however, state tax limitation laws will limit the average increases in total taxes



collected to about 4.8 percent, the increase in the inflation rate for the past year. But individual assessments as well as taxes will vary both upward and downward from the averages.

Pointe residents have been jamming their boards of review seeking assessment and tax relief, but the tax revolt seems to be picking up steam statewide, too. Petitions supporting new property tax relief proposals seem to be getting more support with new ways to cut property taxes surfacing every day.

The new enthusiasm for tax relief stems not only from the boosts in assessments but also from the Legislature's failure to come up with an acceptable tax reduction program after talking about the issue for several years. The people themselves in November 1988 rejected two legislative proposals to revise state school funding that also included tax relief or a tax shift.

But last week Senate Republicans tried again to find a solution, although Gov. James Blanchard and his fellow Democrats

in the House insisted the Senate had proposed only a gimmick.

When the Senate took up a \$765 million school aid budget, the Democrats sought an amendment to enact Blanchard's proposed \$40 million school property tax cut plan. With seven of the 20 GOP members joining the 18 Democrats, the Senate passed the measure.

But then both parties played politics by sponsoring additional amendments, with the result that the bill as passed and sent to the House called for \$739.5 million in tax relief and doubled state aid for K-12 education to \$1.5 billion. But the problem of financing the other needs of government was ignored.

So the major issue still seems to be what it has been for several years: to find sufficient sources of revenue to meet the needs of the public schools and, at the same time, discover ways to meet the public demand for property tax relief.

To date, Sen. John Engler, the GOP's leading candidate, has proposed perhaps

the most specific solution but it has, however, won little support. It is to cut the budgets of the other services of government, perhaps as much as 6 per cent across the board, to assure sufficient funds for the schools and to make property tax cuts possible.

In economics as well as in life, there is no free lunch. Under the Michigan Constitution, the state is supposed to balance its budget each year and cannot simply go on running deficits as the federal government has grown accustomed to doing.

Yet with a tax revolt brewing again this spring, it is difficult to see any acceptable solution to the state's problem except for a wholesale revision of the state's tax program. That is unlikely in an election year. which leaves as possible alternatives only Engler's plan and the growing number of petitions for ballot proposals that trim property taxes but avoid ways to meet the reduction in funding.

There's another saying that seems to apply here: "You can't have your cake and eat it, too." At a time when the federal and state governments are in fiscal straits, and cutting their aid to local governments, all units of government seem to be caught between a rock and a hard place.

So we shouldn't be surprised that if we insist on tax rollbacks, we'll simply get fewer services at all levels of government. But is that what we really want? We doubt it.

Honest count up to all of us

n the Pointes as well as in the rest of the country, it is important that every-Lone be counted in the 1990 Decennial Census.

As Mayor Coleman Young of Detroit told a census information session last week, "What's at stake is representation and money — the lifeblood of politics."

Young has more cause for concern about an undercount in his city than do the five Pointe mayors, but it is true that an honest count that finds everyone benefits the Pointes just as it does the city of Detroit.

That's because the distribution of both federal and state aid depends to an important extent on census figures. An undercount, a failure of all the people to be counted, means a loss of important state and federal revenue - whether to benefit highways or to fund social programs which local governments are entitled to

Even so, some people have a built-in distrust of government that affects the work of the census enumerators. However, the Census Bureau has promised not to share its information with any other governmental agency or individuals outside of the Census Bureau.

That distrust is less likely to be expressed in the Pointes than in the inner city of metropolitan centers such as Detroit where families or individuals fear they may be violating tenancy, welfare or other laws or regulations. Yet if that distrust results in an undercount, it costs local taxpayers money, whether the municipality is one of the Pointes or Detroit.

One of the questions the census will answer is how the Pointes have fared in population in the past decade. In 1980, the Pointes reported 52,099 people, a decline of about 11 percent from the 58,708 counted in 1970. But the Grosse Pointe public schools recently estimated the Pointes' population at 51,675, which, if accurate, would represent a further drop of 424.

But the 1990 count will also tell us the median age in the Pointes, which was 38 in 1980, with 15 percent of the people above 65 and 25 percent under 18. It also will report the occupation, education, home state, length of time lived in the current dwelling, the number of motor vehicles in the household and other pertinent pieces of demographic information that will be of use to many private enterprises as well as government.

Eventually, too, the census will be responsible for required changes in congressional, legislative and county commissioner districts. Because Michigan's population has not kept pace with that of other states, it is expected to lose two congressional seats to Southern or Southwestern states, which continue to grow.

If Grosse Pointe continues its population decline, it is likely to constitute a smaller proportion of its congressional, legislative and county commissioner districts and to have less clout with its elected representation in all three districts.

So in the Pointes as in Detroit, both money and representation, the "lifeblood of politics," are at stake in the census count. So we can all serve our Pointe communities, as well as ourselves, by filling out the census questionnaires and mailing them to the Census Bureau by April 1 to make sure we are counted.

Speed still kills on highways

e probably are entitled to say, "We told you so," about a new report that finds more people dying on Michigan highways since the state raised its speed limit to 65 miles an hour two years ago.

We could do so because we were among those who predicted a rise in highway deaths with the increase in speeds on rural highways from 55 mph to 65 mph that took effect in November 1987. Most other states did the same after Congress permitted such action.

The report also finds that the number of deaths on urban freeways, where the speed limit stayed at 55, has jumped more dramatically than on rural highways where the higher limit is in effect. Yet experts attribute this increase to the motorists who drive 65 mph or more in the 55-mph zones and cause accidents, again as we predicted.

Yet not all the evidence supports our contention that the increased speed would kill more motorists, as it seems to have done. For one thing, the death rate, figured on an individual's chances of being killed and based on the number of miles

driven, is reported at 2.2 deaths per 100 million miles, which is the same rate Michigan has posted since 1987.

Yet the study, made for the state Office of Highway Planning by the University of Michigan Transportation Research Institute, estimated that 27 fewer people would have been killed on the rural highways if the limit had remained at 55 mph.

And perhaps the death toll would have been even higher than the 168 reported from Dec. 1, 1987, when the speed limit was raised, until Dec. 31, 1988, when the study ended, if the seat belt law had not been in effect and if the new cars were not safer than the earlier models.

Whatever the differences about the study results, there was no question in the minds of the Michigan Association of Professional Insurance Agents. The group, which opposed the increased speed two years ago, called for legislative action to trim the speed limit back to 60 mph and described the 65-mph limit as "suicidal."

We think the evidence tends to support the use of that term. A trial of a 60-mph limit appears to be in order.

Well, as things stand now, I'm not going to vote for either of the candidates - at least not because of their anti-tax stands. I'm not sure I want my taxes



Recent articles in your paper have made it clear that the board of education primarily wants a new central library building in order to obtain new school administration offices. Why should the community allow this to happen? The board states that the

present library building is too crowded and cannot hold enough books. This is true for the current first floor operation. But why are the second floor rooms not used for book lending functions? The large room in the basement could also shelve a great many books. Without doubt, a multi-floor library would require more library staff, but the additional operating funds needed would be far less than the annual debt service for a new library building. And, given the dated reference books in the present library, it would seem that Grosse Pointe needs new books and not a new library building.

The board also states that parking at the current site is inadequate. True, parking is a problem, especially on school days, but this would not greatly improve with the proposed location on Chalfonte. The parking problem could be improved, however, by moving the many nonbook lending activities, currently held at the library, to another site (like Barnes

Often, when the parking

lot is full, it is because of these activities and not because too many people are inside borrowing books. In the evening, of course, when the majority of the people have time to use the library, parking along Fisher Road and all along Kercheval is available. And, given the school board's interest in this problem, we are sure that South High School could give up a few feet of their athletic field for expanded parking.

The community should not support plans for a new library building. The present beautiful building, given to the community as a library, can adapted for expanded book lending purposes. Office space for the school administration should be provided from school funds and not disguised as a library improvement scheme.

The community should instead support updating the current school administration offices which are valued historic buildings and not an embarrassment. Certainly, school administrators should have a pleasant environment in which to work and the renovation of the current adminstration buildings is the very best alternative to provide such an environment. Obviously, nobody wants to pay additional property taxes due to increased assessments. As I believe and have read, it is a doubleedged sword. It's great that our real estate is appreciating, but along with the appreciation comes greater taxes.

Something that I have also read in this and other publications tries to soothe the homeowner by placing supposed limits on the actual tax increase by the Headlee Amendment. Stated on the front page of the 3/15/90 Grosse Pointe News "... if a community's total State Equalized Value went up 16 percent but inflation was only 4.8 percent, then the tax rate - number of mills has to be rolled back so that the increase in taxes is only 4.8 percent."

Unfortunately, I have been told that there is an additional crucial variable which has been left out. That variable is the maximum number of mills allowed to be charged.

The Headlee Amendment only goes into effect if the maximum number of mills allowed is being charged and then if the assessments increase more than the rate of inflation. In Grosse Pointe Park, for example, the county tax is at its maximum, so the Headlee Amendment should limit the increase in actual taxes being levied by the county, but the city and school are below the maximum allowed and could increase equal to the new assessment.

Grosse Pointe Park charged 15 mills out of a maximum 20 mills in 1989, but with the increase in assessments is considering rolling back the mills to 14 in 1990. So if your 1989 SEV was \$50,000, you paid \$750 (50 x 15) in city taxes. With the average increase of 15.75 percent this year, the same homeowner would pay \$810.25 (50 x 1.1575) (14) assuming the mills are rolled back. This works out to be an 8 percent net city tax increase, not a 4.8 percent which the Grosse Pointe News is showing.

Current school and library mills total 31.31 mills. Again, using the same Grosse Pointe Park example, school and library taxes would increase from \$1,565.50 (50 x 31.31) to \$1,812.07 (50 x 1.1575) (31.31) or a net 15.8 percent increase. Combined city, school and library would increase 13.3 percent whereas

the county would be limited to the rate of inflation.

I think it is important to understand the Headlee Amendment in its entirety and hope the Grosse Pointe News will run a new story showing the actual impact of our rising taxes. The Headlee Amendment helps, but not as much as people believe in our area. The questions that should be addressed are: (1) Are either of your city or school/library mills going to be rolled back to compensate for your increased assessment? and (2) What do they plan on doing with the additional reve-

In the afternoon an old friend phoned and said, "Are you going to the library meeting at Brownell at three?" I declined. I said that I thought the library was O.K. He said, "No! No! The bookshelves are warped, or something, and they need a new one for 7.2 million." I said, "Will that raise my taxes?" He said, "Yes." I went.

Dr. Shine opened the meeting. He introduced the board of education, architect. (I can't recall their names) Dr. Boss of the library and Dr. Shine's assistant who operated the overhead projector and handled the transparencies (she did a good job). Dr. Shine turned the meeting over to the archi-

The architect stated that the board individually tacitly approved his plan. The architect explained his site plan. There will be a service road completely around Brownell with a series of parking areas off of the service road - the library will be on the other side of the service road along Chalfonte. The flat roof building would be about as high as the peak of the Lutheran Church on Chalfonte, and have windows on the north and west sides. The architect asked if there were any questions. There were.

The first question from the audience was, "Are you going to build a bridge or tunnel over or under the service road to get the kids from Brownell to the playground?" I don't think he

was a doctor. The architect said that he plans for a 5foot high wall along the service road to funnel the kids to a crossing where the road would be marked with two yellow lines to designate the crossing area, and two bumps in the road to slow down the cars. Why a fivefoot wall? So the kids don't leap over it. I knew that made sense; I raised two boys.

The next question. "How can the cars see the kids through the wall?" The architect said that maybe a chain link fence would do, or something - My boys could go over that without missing a step. At that point a board member stated that we have a school with the playground across the street and no one has been hurt. Someone in the audience said, "They close off the street." I don't think that the board member knew that.

It occurred to me that with the school at one end of the property, the library at the other end, and the playground in between the two, the kids would be safe, and a wall would not be needed. I wondered, too, why windows were designed in the north wall where most heat loss occurs, and not in the south wall where least loss occurs.

Someone in the audience stated that they heard that the board was soliciting funds to promote the library. A board member proceeded to explain in detail that the state law forbids school boards from soliciting funds, and none of the board members had done that. However, she continued, it is O.K. for members to set up a private committee to solicit funds, and she co-chairs such a committee - I pondered my preacher's sermon on honesty.

There was more.

I left with tears in my eves, but it wasn't like Friday. I went home and showered; I felt violated.

Lupus rash to be discussed

"Just What Is a Lupus Rash?" will be the topic when David Fivenson, M.D., addresses lupus patients, families, friends and others at Cottage Hospital, Board Rooms A and B, on Wednesday, March 28, at 7 p.m.

Sponsored by the Metro East Area Chapter of the Michigan Lupus Foundation, the meeting is free and open to the public. Cottage Hospital is located at 159 Kercheval Ave. at Muir Road, Grosse Pointe Farms.

Fivenson, a dermatologist at Henry Ford Hospital, will discuss other aspects of lupus as well. A question-and-answer session will follow his presentation.

Lupus, once thought of as a rare disease, is now known to affect one out of 400 females between the ages of 13 and 40. Many cases go undiagnosed due to lack of awareness. Lupus is a chronic, inflammatory, autoimmune disease which, in layperson's terms, means that the body's defense system malfunctions and produces antibodies directed at itself. The cause and cure of the disease are currently not known.

Common symptoms of lupus are joint pain, low-grade fever, chest pain, unusual swelling, and sometimes a sun-sensitive rash. These symptoms are chronic and come and go over a long period of time without the physician's being able to determine their cause. The majority of patients have symptoms from three to 10 years prior to diagnosis, and many of them have been labeled chronic complainers.

The prognosis today is much better than it was 10 years ago. Increased awareness of lupus and improvement in diagnostic tests make early diagnosis ble, thus enabling the initiation of treatment before damage is done to a vital organ.



New ornamental tree offered to Park residents

The Grosse Pointe Park Beautification Commission is again offering residents a choice of two trees in its annual spring sale, one a shade or specimen tree and the other an ornamental.

J.K. Abbs, spokesperson for the program, said the group tries to introduce new or somewhat uncommon species with special attributes. The trees are bought "bare root" directly from grow-

The ornamental tree for 1990 is the Narragansett flowering crab apple, recently released by the U.S. National Arboretum. It matures as a small tree with wide crotch angles and leathery dark green leaves. Carmine buds are bunched on terminals and lateral branches, and the tree often remains showy for weeks before its buds open to an abundance of snow white blossoms. ... Pointe Park.

The bright-eyed fruit clustered on the tiered branches remains brilliant until December or a hard freeze. Softened fruit is eaten by the birds. A picturesque, good landscape tree.

The Aristocrat pear bears masses of white blooms in the spring. A "three season" tree, it has attractive, long, waxy leaves that turn deep red to purple in the fall. Inconspicuous pea-size fruit is edible only by birds. Somewhat pyramidal in shape with open spreading branches, it is disease-resistant and fairly rapidly grows to 50 feet.

Start tax/assessment appeal at local level

I am very disturbed by the widespread, large, and in some cases alarming, increases in assessments on homes in our area. Many of you have shared your particular situation with me. Nobody should be put out of their home because of property

My Republican colleagues and I are working hard for an immediate, statutory form of property tax relief and have passed a major property tax relief bill to the Senate. But, still, your best chance to avoid large and immediate increases in your property taxes due to assessment increases is to act at the local level.

First, appeal your assessment to your city Board of Review, based on it being an excessive or unfairly arrived at assessment. An example of an unfairly arrived at assessment would be if only part of the city was reassessed and, thereby, different properties are treated differently, violating the legal requirement of uniformity. If the result of that appeal is not satisfactory, then appeal to the State Tax Tribunal, Small Claims Division. We can provide information on how to do that. The Tribunal is thought by many to be more responsive than local boards of review.

Second, demand that both city and school authorized tax rates be rolled back under the Headlee Amendment and, more importantly, that actual millage rates be reduced under the Truth in Taxation Act. Under the latter act, a taxing unit must reduce the tax rate so that no tax increase occurs by virtue of inflationary assessment increases. Property taxes will not increase unless the local council or board or taxing unit votes to increase taxes, after a Truth in Taxation Act public hearing, by voting to keep millage rates up, causing a tax increase, voting not to reduce those rates in order to keep your tax (higher assessment multiplied by lower rate) the same as last year.

In your appeal ask the Board of Review to reduce your assessment or exempt your property, based not just on the theory of the assessment being illegally high or unfiarly arrived at but, also, based on your inability to

Under Michigan Compiled Laws Section 211.7u, and by virtue of the 1981 opinion of the Attorney General, Opinion Number 6007, the Board of Review has the right to reduce an assessment because of inability to pay the taxes. On page 461 of Report of the Attorney General for 1981-82, the opinion says, "The board of review may ... grant a reduction of assessment or an exemption because of poverty" and goes on to say that "a board may reduce individual as-

Poverty is not defined, but clearly the intent is to encompass anyone whose income is not sufficient to pay the property tax in full and still have enough income left to meet basic needs without selling the home the person lives in. And don't be shy about asking. It beats having to sell your home.



All the world's a dance stage as Pointers plan Soviet visit

As sweeping changes continue in Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union, cultural and educational exchanges abound between the "sleeping bear" and the "land of the free."

This summer a dance school troupe known as Dance Ltd., featuring Grosse Pointers both in the dance line and in the teaching position, will visit the Soviet Union as part of cultural exchange.

Grosse Pointe Park resident Patrice Salerno, dance instructor and founder of Dance Ltd., will take about 50 people including dancers and support staff to Moscow, Leningrad, Gorky and Minsk, Detroit's sister city. Dance Ltd. will perform in all four cities as part of the Soviet Summer Festival.

Salerno's dance school was one of 10 American entertainment groups chosen by the New Olympians, a western Michigan Dance troupe and talent scout agency based in Grand Rapids. New Olympians was signed to a contract by Intourist, a Soviet company which coordinates cultural exchanges between the Soviet Union and nearly all the nations of the world.

Because the trip will cost each person more than \$2,000, all of the students have been working to raise money. Some of the fundraising activities already completed include Halloween and Christmas parties, a 1950s party and a dinner dance at the Italian-American Cultural Center in

Warren. Other efforts include bottle collecting and a car wash.

The adult members have been working the concessions at the Palace of Auburn Hills during Detroit Pistons' games and various music concerts. They have been selling flowers and writing to several companies asking for donations.

One major contributor, the Shorehaven Manor Retirement Community in Sterling Heights, has consistently sponsored trips by Dance Ltd.

The visit will be highlighted by a visit to the Soviet Olympic Training Center near Minsk, where the young Americans will receive coaching by Soviet Olympic trainers including former Olympic gymnast Olga Korbut The students will also get an introduction into the world of Russian ballet by taking ballet classes in various cities during the trip.

"It's a great opportunity for the students to meet others from the Soviet Union," Salerno said.

Dance Ltd. will be performing in outdoor shows at summer camps known as "pioneer" camps. Children from seven to 17 years old live in the camps all summer, learning various skills. In return, the Soviet students will perform for the Americans at the camps.

Salerno got into dancing at the urging of her father when she was 3 years old. She studied dancing at the Monte Carlo School of Dance in Detroit. In the years before high school, she studied with several professional instructors around the United

During high school, she performed in several variety groups for USO dinner dances. She founded her first dance studio in

East Detroit 17 years ago. In 1985, she moved Dance Ltd. to Utica.

This June. Salerno will direct a recital at the Macomb Center for the Performing Arts. The show will feature tap, jazz, acrobatic and clog dancing.

Next year Salerno plans to enter Dance Ltd. in state and national competitions.

"For now, the Soviet trip is on our minds," she said. "It is an educational opportunity and a cultural exchange.

"Besides the performances, the visit is a social opportunity for the dancers. They will be able to interact with Soviet children. It will provide fun and travel, a great experience for all of us."

RideShare applicants receive a matchlist computer printout of commuters whose addresses, working hours and other criteria fit the needs of the applicant. The list contains commuters' names, city, phone numbers, work hours, willingness to drive, work locations and whether carpoolers are smokers. The applicant then calls those on the list to see if mutually acceptable arrangements can be made.

There is no cost for using RideShare's matching services.

Another option available is vanpooling, through which a van is provided to the vanpool organizer. The organizer - usually the

driver - then collects fares from a minimum of nine riders to cover costs.

RideShare is encouraging corporation officials to get involved in urging employees to use RideShare. Corporate involvement could be as simple as passing out RideShare applications to workers. The corporation could also look into vanpooling.

Those interested in RideShare can get applications at their local libraries or they can call the highly visible hot line number:





'Blue Steel' pits female supercop against psychopath

Blue Steel" is a riveting police thriller with new angles that set it off from the usual "cop-vs.bad-guy" formula.

For starters, the cop who hunts down the killer is a woman and a gun is more than a weapon. It is a symbol of achievement, for one, but for another it is a means of arousing the instincts of a mad killer. It clearly defines that there is more involved than bringing a psychopath to justice.

It also shows that the chase is a battle of wills between two desperate people intent on destroying one another.

Jamie Lee Curtis is Megan Turner, the cop. We first meet her as she is putting on her uniform for the first time, before attending her induction into the New York Police Department. We see how much this achievement means to her. The camera takes time to note how carefully she dresses for the occasion, making sure that each item of clothing is just right.

A full-fledged cop, Curtis goes patroling in a cruiser with another rookie. He leaves her alone to run in for coffee. While he is gone she spots a thug holding up a supermarket clerk. She has a decision to make. Should she



confront the gargantuan-sized thug or wait for her partner?

She decides to go in alone through the back door. As we see her cat-walking down the aisle, we note the fear in her face. When she orders him to drop his gun, he laughs at her. He has seen that fear also.

He swings his gun around and aims it at her. She shoots and blows him away in a barrage of bullets. As he falls backward, the gun in his hand flies across the floor and a customer, played by Ron Silver, picks it up.

He is a successful commodities trader, but beneath his suave surface lurks a deranged psychotic killer. The purloined gun provides him with the means to go into action.

The incident is a disaster for Curtis. Far from being commended for her action, she is suspended and stripped of her badge and uniform. With the holdup man's gun gone, there is no proof that he ever had one. The bystanders at the scene say they are not sure either. Her line of marble-like high-rises.

Later a man is found shot to death in the street for no apparent reason. The bullet found in his body matches ones that only can be used in the type of gun that Curtis insisted the thug in the supermarket held in his hand. Curtis is brought in for questioning and released.

As she is making her way home in the rain, a taxi pulls up and an attractive stranger invites her to share the ride. At first she refuses, but he persists and she gets in. He invites her to dinner. Taken in by his charm, Curtis accepts. Other dates follow and she finds herself falling in love with him.

What she doesn't know, as we do, is that he is the man who picked up the gun in the holdup and is now using it in a series of violent murders. What we don't know is why he is wooing Cur-

The hard-nosed action scenes in "Blue Steel" are balanced by dream-like scenes of characters that seem to float through Manhattan streets. One memorable sequence showing Curtis and Silver gliding over the city at night in a helicopter creates a city of lights and twinkles and a sky-

The director, Kathryn Bigelow, a former artist, is adept at creating atmosphere. She has a fine eye for detail and the effect of light and shadow. When the camera zooms in for close-ups, the audience can almost read the

Staffordshire figurines at art institute

"Fragile Memories: Staffordshire Figurines from the Jerome Irving Smith Collection" opened at the Detroit Institute of Arts on March 11 and continues through Sunday, April 29. The exhibition will then begin a year-long tour under the Statewide Services Program of the

Thanks to the bequest of Jerome Smith in 1977, the DIA has one of the largest collections of Staffordshire figurines in the United States. The design, manufacture and distribution of these ornaments between 1760 and 1900 provides a glimpse of the British Empire at its zenith.

One wit called Staffordshire figurines "the tribal art of England" and the procession of personalities, from royalty to rogues, is a visual chronicle of the people and events which captivated popular interest in Georgian and Victorian Britain.

Although they are unsophisticated in comparison to the fine porcelains they copied, the molded and painted earthenware ceramics have a jaunty, homely appeal their aristocratic porcelain cousins could never claim.

The figurine buyers tended to be fervently patriotic, sentimental, nonconformist in religion and great lovers of animals. Perched on the mantelpiece, an affordable figurine of Queen Victoria or Atlas propping up the sky showed that one had aspirations and a sense of decor.

Staffordshire potteries in the clay and coal-rich Midlands of England had produced tableware, tiles and bricks for generations. Now the potteries seized the moment. For patriotic interests they offered figurines of the Queen and her son, the Prince of Wales. Indeed, the most frequent subject was the British royal family: Queen Victoria, Prince Albert and their four sons and five daughters.

Even though the government unceasingly attacked him, another favorite figure was Napoleon Bonaparte, whom the common people admired as a dashing hero and brilliant military tactician.

Other popular categories of figurines included characters from everyday life, entertainers and pealed chiefly to the large work- representing Prudence. Stafford- through Sunday; closed Mondays

creatures inhabiting a rustic setting, but figurines of brutal sports - cock-fighting, bear-bait-

ing - also were made. Subjects could come from classical sculpture, theatrical prints, monuments, medals, engravings or any other source. One example, traceable to a medal and an engraving, is 'Turkey England France (c. 1854)" which commemorates the three nations' alliance in the Crimean War. It depicts Queen Victoria in court robes, standing between Abd-el Mejid, Sultan of Turkey, and Emperor Napoleon III, both in uniform.

Thousands of animals, royalty, authors, scientists, musicians, biblical characters, entertainers, mythological figures and other subjects emerged brightly glazed from the Staffordshire potteries to be peddled door-to-door, sold at seaside stalls and outside theatres, in country and city shops. "House Party" jumps into a teenager's world with wit, humor and exuberance. Reminiscent of Hughes "Sixteen Can-"Fast Times at Ridgemont High" and "Animal House," it has the wild appeal of those films — only turned up a decibel. Another difference. Usually Kid knows better than to try to out-fox his father, but this party is worth taking chances on the consequences. He waits until his father is asleep and goes out the window. That is only part of the chance he takes.

Without a car, he has to walk. Along the way he runs into the terrible three, the school bullies from school, all physical replicas of Mr. T. Christopher Reid as Kid is outstanding. He has a self confidence that invites admiration. He knows who he is and he knows his limits. He is a refreshingly normal young man who deals with the problems that plague young people with common sense while still allowing room for fun.

Director-writer Reginald Hudlin presents a fresh and effervescent highly entertaining view of a black culture not usually featured on the screen. There are elements that might offend, however, such as the language and the hip to hip dancing.

Shrewd, sassy and perceptive, "House Party" operates on a hyperkinetic wave-length at a dizzying pace that is highly entertaining.

Detroit library forgives fines for one week

The Detroit Public Library has announced a one-week moratorium on the collection of overdue fines on all library materials. During the period of March 26-31, all library materials, no matter how long overdue, may be returned to any Detroit Library location or drop-box with no questions asked and no overdue fines charged.

This "forgiveness" week is being initiated by the library as part of its 125th anniversary observances. The library wants to be remembered by the public, not with cards or flowers, but with the return of all overdue library materials.

Noting that this is only the fourth time in its 125-year history that such an amnesty has been granted, Library Director Jean T. Curtis expressed the hope that citizens would make it a matter of personal responsibility to check their homes, work places, and school settings for unreturned materials belonging to the Detroit Public Library.

People from all over the state use the Detroit system. Any Michigan resident with valid identification can check books out from the Main Library.

Paul T. Scupholm, executive director of the Friends of the Library, suggested that persons without overdue books could join in the anniversary celebration by donating used books to be sold by the Friends in their used

Materials returned via the drop-box at library locations during the two Sundays which bracket the moratorium period will be granted amnesty also. Overdue fines are normally 10 cents a day for adults and 5 cents a day for children.

Shine: Schools are good, but we can do better

Grosse Pointe schools will ensure continued success by keeping its goal of education within its means and never losing track of its foundation.

So said new Superintendent Edward J. Shine, who addressed the school board and the community at his first official meeting as school chief.

"I think it is a widely known fact that Grosse Pointe students do very well right now, but in

our hearts we know we can all do better," Shine told the board. "The traditional way Grosse Pointe and other school districts have attempted to improve, has simply been to



add more money, more staff, more equipment, more courses and more requirements.

"However, research is showing us, and slowly we are coming to realize, that if adding more is no longer the best way, or even a possible way, we need to begin looking at the real issue of realigning our schools with our resources and with the foundation values that have served us well in over 80 years of sustained excellence.'

The state's school finance system is in a time of renewal and educational rhetoric at the national level is reaching an alltime high, Shine said. The district needs to be able to listen to the new thoughts, he added, but keep in mind the values which have kept the Pointe's schools

"We know...that the true measure of an organization is not what it knows, but what it does with what it knows," he

But we must not be afraid of change, he said, but noted that too much change is as bad as no change at all.

Change must come slowly and take into account the history and continuity of the district. It must be gradual and followed through, he said.

But as important as change is, he said, it cannot be done without first taking into account the school's mission - educating children.

"For our children's sake, we must confront the reality that, while our schools' quality is undeniably outstanding, it is not yet as good as it could or should be," he said. "Our mission is a reliable rudder that will guide us toward continuously higher results.

"It is probably painfully obvious that there are no easy answers. Together we must steer a reasonable course, one that does not go too far in any one direction lest events require a rethinking. We must skillfully juggle our ever-scarce resources of time, talent and dollars for maximum good effects, and we must strategically ready ourselves to be scholarly masters of a new and vibrant future that we cannot clearly see.

"I am both grateful and inspired to be facing the future with all of you," Shine con-



Should a gentleman offer a much sense and the vans and lady a ride in a Blazer?

I mulled that question on the way to pick up the mother of a friend who was playing in a concert to take said mother to said concert. The lady has a touch of arthritis and I knew she would be elegantly dressed, no doubt in a skirt not designed for climbing into trucks. Nonetheless, I asked and she said yes, seemingly intrigued by the brutishly handsome machine with the big tires and high platform.

The Chevrolet Blazer is definitely a truck. But it does have a rugged appeal and with the 5.7-liter V-8 engine it has plenty of muscle. It has many of the nice touches of a passenger car stereo radio, power windows, automatic transmission, etc. but it is like Attilla the Hun in a tux or Dick the Bruiser in docksiders; it is a truck.

More so than many of its competitors in its very trendy sports utility market segment, the Chevrolet Blazer is a truck with only a veneer of civilization, just enough to make it a reasonable alternative to the station wagon.

The full-size sports-utility vehicle and the minivan are now in the process of replacing the conventional station wagon. Small station wagons never did make

> "Since then," Cross said, "we've logged 150 agencies into the computer. We have 1,100 different types of jobs. Some of these jobs require as few as two or as many as 50 people, so we have the potential to place 10,000 volunteers.

"We've matched about 500 already. Each volunteer gets three jobs to select from, so it's really ,500 matches."

"It's satisfying, knowing some good is coming from the time I'm spending," said Skewes. "There's a lot of agencies out there that should be registered. There's a lot of people — especially in Grosse Pointe — who should be registered. I'm sure a lot of Grosse Pointers would volunteer their time and skills if the word was out that we could put them in the right job, the right location.'

So far, Volunteer Connect has a committee of 15 people. Three are hands-on participants: Skewes, Kathleen Simmons of Grosse Pointe and LaWanda McClellon of Inkster.

Cross said she's looking for more people to work in the office on the computers. "We will reimburse them for parking," she

Cross is enthusiastic about the future of Volunteer Connect. "Volunteerism is such a key part of our community now. People are beginning to realize the number, the range and the enormous needs out there. I know that within a short time, Volunteer Connect will be another shining star for Detroit and we'll be known as the volunteer city with the people with hearts. This is not just a wish. I know we can do it.'

Skewes said he feels good about his volunteer commitment. As a bonus, he learned some computer skills. "I've been fortunate to have good health, a good job, a great wife who backs me up. I want to return something to the community," he said.

"The wave of the future is to use technology to improve human services," Cross said.

The Pastor's Corner Bonnets, eggs and Easter

Spring brings its own symbols: the robin, the crocus poking its pretty head out of the warming soil, the lilac scenting the air. And of course there's always the IRS to remind us that we're already into the middle of April.

Spring brings Lent and Easter, Jewish Passover and the Seder, the meal Jesus shared with his apostles as the Last

Lent and Easter celebrate the newness of life — the resurgence of life in flock and field, but for the person of faith, an even more vital awareness: Jesus, through his death, emerged in his resurrection to a newness of life that he invites us to share by baptism and a steady loyalty to

Down the ages people of every culture have celebrated Lent and Easter with symbols of a rich variety.

The word Lent comes from the Old English meaning, literally the lengthening of the days. It can be a symbol of the lengthening, the broadening of our spiritual vision. Pretzels can be seen as symbolic of the hands in prayer. They were perhaps first baked in monasteries in medieval times with unleavened dough. The sugar and yeast were reserved for Easter.

Abstention from meat on Fridays of Lent, particularly Good Friday, and other ways of self-denial, are signals that we should say no to our earthly appetites in order to appreciate spiritual values that often get overlaid by our self-in-

Many of the commercial elements of Easter have their roots in the ancient ways of celebrating the ressurection of the Lord.

New clothes, especially the Easter bonnet, go back to the ancient rite of dressing the newly baptized in a white garment that symbolized the new, innocent life of Jesus into which they were reborn with the flowing of the water.

The Easter egg neatly symbolizes Jesus breaking forth from the tomb. The Easter egg hunt suggests our own human efforts to find Jesus that we may greet him like Mary Magdalene and ask to share in his resurrection and eternal

The use of lamb for the Easter meal is quite obvious. Jesus is hailed by John the Baptizer as the Lamb of God, to replace by his own death on the cross the sheep and other



What makes an Irish poet Nobel Prize winner and whom many citics consider to be the greatest poet of his time.

Neal Shine, Detroit Free Press columnist and Oakland University professor of journalism, will bring to life the creative character and works of William Butler Yeats (1865-1939) in Oakland University's final Enigma of Genius lecture for the season on March 29.

Born in Dublin, Ireland, Yeats led the Irish Literary Revival, a movement of the later 1800s and early 1900s that stimulated new appreciation of traditional Irish literature. In 1898, Yeats helped to establish the Irish Literary Theatre, which in 1904 became the renowned Abbey Theatre.

In 1923, Yeats was awarded the Nobel Prize for literature. His most important works were published in "Collected Plays" (1952) and "The Poems: A New Edition" (1984).

animals sacrificed in the Temple.

The blessing of food, usually on Holy Saturday, echoes the past when a far more rigorous fast and abstinence prevailed. In Eastern Europe, especially Poland, no meat or dairy products were eaten during Lent. The blessing was meant to thank God for the food and to thank Him that a more normal menu was back in use.

Flowers, especially the lily, are a fairly recent example of Easter. Their beauty and aroma express the joy we feel in the triumph of Jesus over death, the vindication of his message and ministry, the joy we feel in the hope of our own resurrection into eternal life.

Finally, the very word Easter. We use it to celebrate the Lord's resurrection. Ironically, it stems from an ancient Germanic pagan festival to salute the rising sun in the east. That's all right. Many a pagan rite has been "Christened." The sun rising in the east symbolizes for us the rising of Jesus from the darkness of death and the tomb.

Let's use and enjoy all the symbols that mark Easter. But what irony if we forget or ignore their meaning. Our Lord had something to say about people who had eyes but did not see, ears but did not hear.





Wearing, carrying flowers is old custom now out of vogue

What is in fashion governs us more than we realize. There are fashions in everything: clothes, foods, decorative arts, jewelry, hairstyles, home decor, music, dance and drama, manners and morals, and, surprisingly, flow-

Currently, wearing flowers is at a rather low point, but in the 30's and 40's, flowers were worn as lapel corsages or hair ornaments with almost any outfit. This was the heyday of the gardenia.

Alexander Garden, a physician in Charleston, S.C., who was instrumental in developing these lovely flowers to their present familiar form. They were introduced as a corsage flower by the English flower firm, Jas. Vietch and Son, in the 20's and were an instant success primarily because of their marvelous, heavy scent. Even though they are difficult to handle, gardenias were very popular. What debutante of the 30's or 40's would have felt a dance was successful without a Gardenias were named for Dr. gardenia corsage on the shoulder

Flower-wearing has been a custom through history. Corsages of the present day are worn only on special occasions, but a few years ago, they were worn on a day-to-day basis. These are direct descendants of the Grecian garland, the classic Oriental hair ornament, the leis of Hawaii and the 18th century flower decorations for powdered

There was a time early in this century when hats made of wired fresh flowers were fre-It's still a marvelous idea for modern bridesmaids. Wrist bouquets or little muffs covered with forms will have a fashion renaisblossoms used to be charming costume accessories.

In the late 19th century, the flamboyant Oscar Wilde made headlines for his gifted writing, his unconventional lifestyle and his spectacular flair for fashion. At one memorable party, he followed the prevailing vogue for men of wearing a boutonniere bouquet, but he exaggerated the fashion by placing a huge sun-flower on his lapel. And somewhat earlier, Madame Pompadour used potato blossoms and carrot tops to decorate the hairdo that bears her name to this day.

In some tropical countries the wearing of large flowers tucked behind one ear is usual for both

sexes and the placement of these flowers has special meaning: right or left ear, above or below the ear, in front or behind the ear. This custom is also favored by the Flower Children of the

Victorian brides carried small tight tussie-mussie bouquets surrounded with a lace frill, while late Edwardian brides favored huge cascade bouquets adorned with ribbon loops and streamers, or carried fans or prayer books adorned with flowers.

With Easter approaching, hats quently seen at garden parties. adorned with large silk flowers are appearing in the shops. Perhaps flower-wearing in various sance before long.

Early spring flowering bulbs will soon be giving us their gifts of blossom. Among the daffodils and narcissus and crocus may be the beautiful Crown Imperial with its circle of orange-colored bells hanging down under its green crowns and with a drop of honey resting at the base of each petal.

Legend has it that once this plant held its blossoms proudly aloft. On the day when Christ passed to his crucifixion it would not bow in sorrow as did all the other flowers. For this it was cursed and shunned until, for shame, it hung its head and forever after has shed honey tears

shapes of tulips: single, double, ruffled and smooth, that it is not hard to understand how, in the 17th century, there was a craze for tulips all across Europe that led tulip fanciers to fling whole fortunes into the acquisition of rare varieties and new hybridiza-

tions. Dumas' novel, "The Black Tulip," is based on this tulipmania which lasted for several decades.

Other spring bulbs which come to mind are lily-of-the-valley, violets (purple or white, scented or unscented), hyacinths and scilla, or squills, with their blossoms as the symbol for lake-blue flowers, and fragrant March.

HAVE A PLEASANT TRY AT PERFECTION **BRIDGE BY WOODY BOYD** THE PASTEBOARD PASTIME


Woody Ott is one of the card playing cardinals of our suburban community. He is also an excellent director, master of his own Sunday evening duplicate game and a congenial and experienced performer.

I wanted to get that statement into print before anyone suggested that this town isn't big enough for two bridge playing Woodys. There is, and today's space in this column will make that premise evident for everyone to see.

It was just over a full moon ago that we joined forces to do battle with an impressive field of competitors at Joyce Krouts Thursday afternoon Southfield game. Some said egos would fly where no player dared to tread and Joyce reminded us not to shoot 'til we saw the whites of the enemy s'eyes, but otherwise our demeanor was a cut above pleasurable perfection. Actually I've never enjoyed a partner more and it was exciting if not a totally successful adventure. Our defense was just above the lower edge of exceptional and our declarer play was a fraction shy of that. If we'd never known about slam bidding we'd have won in a walk. Unfortunately as we closed on the last five boards we both sensed victory and that was what caused our dismantlement. On boards twenty thru twenty-three we bid our first four slams of the afternoon and were lucky to capture three and a half match points out of a possible twenty-four. Knights reminisce about championship

On Jan. 13, the University Liggett School hockey team turned the corner. Almost two months later, it completed the journey at Flint's IMA arena with the Class B-C-D state hockey title.

But just three days later, the Knights lost only their second game of the season to Grosse Pointe North, 4-3. Of ULS' three losses, two of them came against the Norsemen.

"I think those losses to North really sparked us," said Fowler,

whose team finished 24-3. "The kids were pretty down after those games, but the next day in practice they still knew they had to work hard. Our work ethic was clearly in place all season long and that's what enabled us to win the state title.'

So did its offense and defense. As a team, ULS scored 6.1 goals a game and yielded only 2.6.

Just three weeks into the season, ULS earned the state's No. 1 ranking in Class B-C-D after it rattled off nine straight wins before losing (for the first time) to North in the ULS Christmas tournament.

At 9-1, ULS entered the holiday break. Four wins to start the second half of the season enabled ULS to retain its ranking. After its second loss to North, ULS ran off two quick wins before losing to University School of Milwaukee.

Cruising with a 15-3 record after wins at Lake Forest and Flint Powers, one of three Class A semifinalists ULS would beat during the regular season, the Knights beat Richard, Stevenson, Lumen Christi and Ann Arbor Huron before the regionals, where they won three straight.

While Mike Coello and Jesse Kasom manned the defense, Doug Wood, Andrew Van-Deweghe and Jonathon Davis took charge on offense. Wood, who became the state's all-time leading scorer, finished the season with a team high 60 goals and 65 assists. Davis had 36 goals and 45 assists and Van-Deweghe had 34 and 54, respectively. With totals like that from the first line, it's no wonder the Knights won the title.

Even though they are two of the finest defensemen in the state, Coello and Kasom are also offensive threats, as evidenced in their combined totals of 22 goals and 66 assists. Coello, who shared the team's Most Valuable Player honors with Wood, had 16 goals.

'We had a lot of Indians out in full force," Fowler said. "There were a few chiefs who took charge, but it was a true team effort.'

If the defense slipped - which was seldom — goalie Tripp Tracy would be the next step, and a huge barrier it was for opponents. Tracy's save percentage hovered at 92 all season, and he gave up only 2.4 goals a game. He also had four assists.

"I'm very pleased for the boys because they proved that hard work pays great rewards," said Fowler. "I have a lot of respect for the boys because they didn't stumble because of discipline and the fact that they hung onto their No. 1 ranking all season long."

However, even with a host of juniors and seniors, Wright still couldn't find a way to win a district basketball game.

The Knights, who finished 18-3 overall, were knocked from postseason play for the fourth straight year. ULS has been snake-bitten when it comes tournament time, but during the regular season it is a tough team to

It's believed that the last time ULS won a district basketball game was back in 1982, before Wright took over.

"Even though we haven't won a district game we've come a long way," Wright said. "We

were tested only a few times with wins over Cranbrook and during the regular season, but Notre Dame. The only loss was game. We were a little flat." we were more than tested by Royal Oak Shrine."

Shrine eliminated ULS March 6, 63-59.

"I'll take the blame for that game," said Wright. "I've always believed that if you lose a game by less than five it's the coach's fault. I could have done some things differently.'

But early in the season Wright wouldn't have changed a thing. His team, even in the opening game, looked like it was in mid-season form.

"We were so ready to play," Wright said. "We had such high hopes for this season because of the talent and experience we had coming back, that we just iumped into the season with both feet.'

ULS scooted to a 2-1 record

to Detroit Country Day.

'We were feeling pretty good about ourselves right around Christmas time," Wright said. "We were ranked (3rd in Class C) for the first time and we were playing well."

The No. 3 ranking didn't last long, however, because ULS lost its first game after the break to Lutheran East. The Knights dropped to sixth after that and were eventually dropped from the rankings despite never losing another regular season game.

"The loss to Lutheran East was an eye-opener," said Wright, whose team won the Michigan Independent Athletic Conference with a 9-0 record. "I think what hurt us was the layoff we had. We didn't have one game from just before the Christmas break Dec. 12 to Jan. 3 and that's just

But three days later, ULS got pumped up and began to inflate its record. A win over Oakland Christian Jan. 5 was the start of 16 straight wins.

"Our practices were our best competition," Wright said, as he referred to the MIAC schedule. 'We practice hard and the kids weren't always emotionally together, but we worked hard and that's what paid off for us. It was also tough that our starters weren't being tested for four quarters because we were blowing some teams away.'

The starters were led by guard Tarik Lester's 15.6 points per game. Kandia Milton, a co-captain, averaged 14.5 points and Kevin Crociata, also a co-captain had 8.2 points per game. Lester also led the way with 4.3 assists a game, and Milton was the leading rebounder with 9.1 a

Off the bench, Brent Mc-Mahon averaged 10 points a game and had 4.1 rebounds. Kevin Whitfield and DeDan Milton averaged approximately 7.5 points a game.

"During the streak, it was a struggle for us," Wright said. "We struggled to stay up each game and not come down to the level of our competition. It was a credit to the kids to stay mentally in the game and not lose their focus."

On Feb. 27, ULS faced Redford Catholic Central and looked for a challenging game. However, the Knights didn't get one as they blew Central away by more than 20 points after leading by 31 in the first half.

"Our schedule is a lot tougher next year," Wright said. "Our league will be stronger and we've gotten rid of some weaker non-league games."

Perhaps that will groom ULS for a district win.



Petrouleas: 13-8 season caused by inconsistent offense
