Pierce student wins state geography contest

United States for the downtown commercial section of a city?

By correctly answering central business district, Christopher Mac-Kechnie, an eighth-grade student from Grosse Pointe Park, won the Michigan competition of the National Geography Bee March 30 at Central Michigan University in Mount Pleasant.

The state bee was the second level of a national competition sponsored by the National Geographic Society.

MacKechnie was one of 100 stu-

dents who were orally tested on geographic knowledge in all categories, including identifying countries

MacKechnie answered more questions than anyone else in the com-

"I was kind of nervous at first, but then I heard how easy the questions were, and I relaxed," he said. "I really learned a lot of the answers by watching the news every day and after school I read the almanac.'

Although some of the questions were easy, i.e., what is the center of

a hurricane called, MacKechnie knew what potential energy sources could be found in the Bay of Fundi in New Brunswick. (Tidal pools)

For winning first place, Mac-Kechnie, who attends Pierce Middle School, won \$100 and an all-expense-paid trip with his teacher chaperone to Washington, D.C., for the national finals May 23-24.

More than 200 Michigan schools participated in preliminary bees in January. Winners of the preliminary round took a written qualifying test, which was scored by the

National Geographic Society in Washington, D.C. The top scorers in Michigan advanced to Friday's state contest.

Also in the state finals was Mike Franzinger, an eighth-grader at St. Clare of Montefalco. He finished ninth in the state last year.

The national champion will receive a \$25,000 college scholarship. The second- and third-place winners will receive \$15,000 and \$10,000 in scholarships.

Farms council rejects library proposed for Brownell field

Most of the people in the audience applauded when the Grosse Pointe Farms City Council overwhelmingly rejected a proposed 43,000 square-foot library Monday night on the Brownell school field.

The action was taken in a 5-2 council vote rejecting the proposed site at a special meeting of the council in the Brownell gym-

John Danaher and Gail Kaess cast the dissenting votes on the council, seeking to have the proposed site plan approved.

Dashing four years of prepara-tion by the school board, the rejection will send planners back to the drawing board to draw up a new site plan, possibly at the same location.

Possible traffic and safety problems at the school and in

the immediate area were cited by the council as the primary reasons for the rejection.

Many residents complained that numerous studies by the school board and the city regarding possible effects on property values, student and pedestrian safety as well as projected traffic volumes are inaccurate.

Others claimed that the traffic study outlined at an earlier meeting does not reflect true traffic conditions during the

summer peak season, since it was conducted in February when traffic is light.

One complaint centered on the actual building design, with a resident saying the proposed building was a "monolithic monster typical of Soviet architecture and does not belong in Grosse Pointe."

Before the vote was taken, resident Bill Frey presented a selfdesigned alternative site plan with the library building set back from Chalfonte, closer to Williams, the rear boundary of the Brownell property.

Frey's plan eliminated the need for a road circumventing the school building, which oppo-nents consider a safety problem. The plan also called for the elim-ination of parking along Chalfonte, another concern.

Frey's plan received strong support from the audience and from Farms Mayor Joseph Fromm, who outlined his reasons for rejecting the site plan before the final vote was taken.

"The location would be a nuisance to the neighborhood," Fromm said. "I want the library set further off Chalfonte to protect the residential community."

The plan called for the library to be set back 40 feet from Chalfonte, which many residents felt was too close and would destroy the aesthetic character of the

Fromm said he was intrigued by Frey's home-spun site plan and said he would give it serious consideration.

Another resident presented the council with a petition signed by 230 residents urging the council to reject the site plan. Fromm said the city had received more than 50 letters of opposition and only 10 letters of

supposition and only to letters of support for the proposed library.

After several minutes of deliberation by council members, the vote was taken and the site plan rejected.

If the site plan would have been approved, the school board could have placed a \$7.1 million bond-issue vote before voters to gain funding for the project.


James Poole

In James Poole's world, geometric shapes rise out of subtle colors to tell a story.

Poole, an artist living in Grosse Pointe Woods, combines atmospheric conditions - like fog or freezing rain - with strong shapes and colored lines which represent himself and the people in his life.

"I have always been in awe of nature, its forces and phenomenon," Poole said. "I adapt forms from nature to my own world of images and color.'

And while many people are plugging away at the daily drudgery of work, appointments and errands, Poole imagines the graceful flight of a bird, the wind sweeping over tall grasses or water in waves and ripples.

Welcome to Poole's world of constructionism, mixed media and stretched canvas.

"I try to achieve a balance of subtle forms and colors to bring a unique, sensual quality to each piece," Poole said. "Through my painting, I am also trying to deal with emotions by using symbols and color to project my perceptions of man's interaction with man."

Still with us?

Actually, the written word is not sufficient to describe his works. But even a quick glance is enough to see into his vision of the world.

For example, his painting, 'Brighter Bands,' curved linear bands representing people and relationships flow from a geometric base into an airy background of subtle colors.

So who wants to look at this

kind of stuff anyway? Just ask the thousands of people who have seen his exhibitions at noted galleries like the Sales Gallery at the Detroit Institute of Arts, the Cade and Detroit Focus galleries, the Scarab Club, the Detroit Artists Market, the Detroit Renaissance Gallery

Crockett to retire; 13th District up for grabs


The announced retirement of U.S. Rep. George W. Crockett Jr., who represents part of Detroit and Grosse Pointe City and Park, will leave a major void to be filled in this year's November election.

On March 28, Crockett, 80, announced to his fellow congressmen that he will not join them when the new 102nd Congress convenes in January 1991. His retirement brings to an end 10 years as a U.S. representative.

While the sprawling 13th Dis-

trict includes the Park and City, the two Pointes are vastly outnumbered by Detroiters. The district is reported to be 67 percent black and 95 percent Democrats.

Crockett told the Grosse Pointe News during the 1988 election campaign that he represents the bulk of his district: black, urban, working people. He also said he did not agree with putting the two Pointes in the 13th District during 1980 reapportionment. He said he would have preferred that all the Pointes be in a district that is



more politically compatible.

Crockett has been criticized for not bringing home federal dollars for his district, which has lost more population than any other congressional district. But in his defense, Crockett points out that federal spending on social programs has been slashed and more dollars are being spent on defense and foreign interven-

Some have criticized Crockett for his preoccupation with foreign affairs, and he does serve on a subcommittee of the House Foreign Affairs Committee. He also serves on the House Judiciary Committee and the Committee on the Aged.


In November 1980, at the age of 71, Crockett began his career as a congressman, which was one of many careers during his lifetime, including 12 years as a Detroit Recorder's judge and, before that, 20 years as a labor

During the McCarthy witchhunt, Crockett refused to back down before the House Un-American Activities Committee. During that period, he successfully defended a 34-year-old Coleman Young against McCarthy's attacks.

In 1952, Crockett spent four months in a federal prison for contempt of court while defending accused Communists.

Crockett has spent a lifetime on unpopular causes; at least they were unpopular at the time. In 1945, he fought racism in Detroit auto plants, and he continued the fight for civil rights in

Detroit, long before being a civil libertarian was in vogue.

"After 68 years of working, championing unpopular causes, Crockett told his congressional colleagues, "I'm hoping to enjoy a little time off ...

There is a time, however, when each man or woman must decide to leave the day-to-day struggle to others.

Crockett's resignation is expected to draw a plethora of candidates to the August Democratic primary. One report said that state Sen. John Kelly, D. Grosse Pointe Woods, was being urged by Grosse Pointe constituents to run for the federal office.

Kelly could not be reached for comment prior to going to press.

By Ronald J. Bernas If you've ever wondered where your milk jugs and detergent containers go after you take them to the recycling center, the answer is Secondary Polymers Ltd., a year-old company located

in Detroit. There the jugs are cleaned, ground into tiny pieces and sold.

People who buy plastics need it in pellet form, however, so Secondary Polymers Ltd., an affiliate of Louis Kay Enterprises, is updating its facility to create a system capable of processing some 12 million pounds of plastics a year.

Secondary Polymers received money from the Quality of Life Bond in the amount of \$668,000, which matched with company funds and totals about \$1 million, said Jan Katz, spokesperson for the company.

The company purchased the old Ghermack Pistachio roasting facility in Detroit and has been granulating plastic since August on a pilot basis.

"We hope to be up and operating in the spring," Katz said.
"By then we will be completely competitive with virgin resins (original plastics)."

Pellets, Katz said, look like a piece of spaghetti approximately one-eighth to one-quarter inch long. Virgin natural (meaning clear) pellets cost 49 cents a pound and natural recycled pellets are approximately 23 cents a

That's what Superintendent Ed Shine told the Grosse Pointe Farms City Council Monday night. But, a majority of the council and the large and vocal audience disagreed with Shine and the proposed library site plan was rejected by a vote of 5-

"I'm really disappointed," Shine said after the vote. "We've done everything that we possibly could to respond to the concerns of the people.'

Board President Jon Gandelot said he couldn't understand the thinking of the Farms council in

Gandelot said the board has worked hard to answer all the questions and address the concerns raised by residents and citizens. He thought all the questions had been answered and was surprised by the outcry in the library project since

The board will have to decide whether it wants to redo the site plan at Brownell or to step back and look at yet another alternative.

John Bruce has been involved nearly the beginning. He was a member of the 54-person committee that proposed the site at Brownell.

"The community needs to real-

Board member Gloria Konsler said the board will not let this defeat end the library project.

"I feel that all the people of Grosse Pointe are the losers," Konsler said.

"This doesn't end the problem, though," she said. "I don't think it's something we can let drop."

Trustee Fred Adams said that although he's disappointed with the vote, he feels the council did what it had to do.

"I still think that a new library is needed," Adams said. "but this is democracy in action.

"As to where we go from here, that's the big question.'

The following is a list of options and alternatives that have been discussed since 1986 which led to the board's final decision to build a library on the Brownell site:

• 1986 — Elworthy Field was dismissed as a site because of the impact on the playfields, and because the poor structure of the soil would have made building difficult.

• 1986-1989 — Barnes Elementary School has been brought up many times, but has been dismissed because it is not centrally located and was under consideration as a possibility for relocation of the board offices. Renovation would be costly and there is a possibility that the school could be reopened as an elementary school to accommodate projected enrollment in-

• 1987 — Osler-Milling architects designed a plan to add on to the rear of the current central Library, the Woods branch at Parcells Middle School and the Park Library at Pierce Middle School. The plan was rejected by voters in November for many reasons, including the impact that expansion of Central Library would have on playing fields, insufficient parking and the cost. In addition, the vote came a few weeks after the stock being cautious.

• 1987 - After the defeat of the above, the board discussed building an extension of Central Library at nearby Richard Elementary School. The cost of building a free standing building with a parking deck in the school's parking lot (not to mention negotiations for required parking spaces) and the fact that library services would have been divided into two buildings eliminated this option.

• 1986, 1989 - 389 St. Clair, currently administration headquarters, was considered if the

nearly as expensive as it would be to tear it down and start over. Additional concerns were the limited parking, its accessibility and the fact that the building

was not suitable for a library. • 1988 - Selling Central Library and using the proceeds for construction of a new library was discussed, but the sale could not be completed until the new building was completed and occupied. Because the building was donated to the district for use as a library, the board felt it would not be proper to sell it.

• 1988 - The board discussed purchasing an abandoned car dealership on Jefferson Avenue in Grosse Pointe Park. Board offices were to fill half the building and the other half would

library. The site was then on the block for approximately \$600,000, which was above school or library budgets.

• 1986-89 - Adding a floor on top of Central Library was discussed, but the option did not solve the other issues of parking availability and traffic on the already-busy Hill area. Other considerations included Grosse Pointe Farms zoning restrictions, the impact on local landscape that an additional story would have, and the high cost of executing and constructing it.

• 1986-1989 — An underground expansion was discussed even though it was costly. This solved the parking issue and a new problem would have presented itself - water tables.

Liggett School announced it was

planning on consolidating its operations, the board discussed purchasing the Briarcliff Campus. Central Library and school administration would, along with computer operations, have been moved there. The main stumbling block was the need for available dollars to buy the building, although extensive renovation and asbestos removal were also considerations. Farms bows to Nimbys on Brownell site

ot for the first time, the Nimbys have halted action on a Grosse Pointe project. This time it is the proposed library building on the Brownell school site that has prompted the Nimby rejection: "Not in my backyard."

After a second open hearing, the Grosse Pointe Farms Council Monday night bowed to the Nimby demand for rejection of the site on the grounds traffic would be increased, children's lives would be endangered, proposed parking changes would violate the Farms ordinance, property values might be damaged and the library doesn't belong in a residential area anyway.

The 5 to 2 vote found only councilmembers Gail Kaess and John Danaher supporting the board's request for approval of the site plan, with the other five voting to reject it. Mayor Joseph Fromm led the opposition by making a speech against the plan before the council voted, but did suggest study of an alternative offered by a critic.

As a result of the council action, however, the school system's heavy investment of time and money in its second attempt to win approval of a library expansion plan



has gone down the drain. The first proposal, for an addition to the present Central Library building, was defeated at the polls in 1987 after complaints about the use of a small portion of the South High athletic field and the \$8.4 million cost of that project.

The people who didn't want the new library in their backyard dominated the hearing. They applauded testimony against the plan and even shouted derisively at proponents once or twice. One critic said the school system was trying to "brainwash" him. Another charged the plan was being "crammed down our throats." Several termed the proposed building "a monstrosity." One even said it "looked like Soviet architecture."

A minority of nearby residents supported the plan. Several said they would be happy to have the library in their own backyards on the Brownell site and others said the property values would be enhanced with its construction.

But the Nimbys prevailed. One critic even confronted Danaher after the hearing to ask how he had voted and when told Danaher had supported it, retorted: "You won't be re-elected."

Unfortunately, the school board's options now are limited. The Pointes constitute a built-up community with few acceptable sites for library expansion or any other kind of public or even private project of any size. But the school board and library supporters now will have to consider what if anything to do next.

Nor can the possibility of future Nimby objections to any new site be dismissed. Many governmental agencies and even corporate developers are hearing the same message: "Not in my backyard."

That happens when people do not regard the benefits of development, in this case improved library service, as sufficient to offset the possible damage they see to the quality of life in their own neighborhoods.

Yet a new library, or, for that matter, a new business, cannot always be built in someone else's backyard. Most studies show Americans really want growth and development but they don't want it near them. But if carried to its extreme, this

view could paralyze government and halt needed improvements such as a new library.

Yet the need for more space for the library is apparent from the crowded reading rooms at Central Library, the lack of shelving which requires the storing of hundreds of books in the attic at Richard School and the general lack of space to provide the service to which the Pointes have become accustomed.

Unfortunately, the current minitax revolt has contributed to the library's difficulties. The new building would require an additional millage to finance expanded services and in these days taxes, and especially property taxes, are being violently criticized in the Pointes and elsewhere.

All in all, Monday was a bad night for library supporters, even for Dexter Ferry, member of the family that contributed the Central Library building to the school district. He had been promised time to make a presentation on behalf of the new building but Fromm, presiding, forgot to call on him, although the mayor publicly apologized for the oversight as the meeting ended.

Brandon Rogers, the local planner, was credited with an appropriate quote when the schools made their presentation: "An excellence-oriented community does not attempt to block its future." We believe the rejection of the site plan will not block the library expansion but its supporters, who, we are sure constitute a majority in the school district, now will have to rescue it from the Nimbys.

Honoring the man we liked

t was appropriate that a joint session of Congress last week began the year-long celebration of the birth 100 years ago of Dwight David Eisenhower, a Kansas-born farm boy who became a World War II hero and the 34th president of the United States.

The timing was appropriate because, as several speakers pointed out, Ike's wartime role in liberating Western Europe from Nazism could be likened to the recent crumbling of communism in Eastern Europe and, in fact, his efforts could be credited with making possible that collapse of communism.

One of Ike's strongly held views that is highly relevant today emerged from his address to the American people just three days before his term ended on Jan. 20, 1961, when the best-loved U.S. military leader of the 20th century warned of the threat of the "military-industrial complex" in peacetime.

That threat is recalled today as the same "military-industrial complex" (which, we should remember, includes the local communities profiting from defense jobs and profits) resists the government's efforts to trim defense spending in the wake of the breakup of the Soviet empire.

After he retired from the presidency, Ike wrote in "Waging Peace" that he had decided after the Korean War that the United States, to discourage aggression, was required to make immense peacetime

defense expenditures.

He added that while some effects of these expenditures would be beneficial, "their eventual influence on our national life, unless watched by an alert citizenry, could become almost overpowering."

Ike pointed out that among the interested parties that find value to themselves in constantly increased defense spending are the military services, the makers of expensive munitions and the lobbies that spring up in Washington and in every community to argue for ever larger defense expenditures because of the profits and jobs involved.

Those are among the reasons Ike issued his famous warning:

"In the councils of government, we must guard against the acquisition of unwarranted influence, whether sought or unsought, by the military-industrial complex. The potential for the disastrous rise of misplaced power exists and will persist.

"We must never let the weight of this combination endanger our liberties or democratic processes. We should take nothing for granted. Only an alert and knowledgeable citizenry can compel the proper meshing of the huge industrial and military machinery of defense with our peacetime methods and goals, so that security and liberty may prosper together."

Surely, one of the reasons the people of his time liked Ike was that as a military hero, he still could retain a civilian's viewpoint.

Detroit not 'stealing' Pointers

residents who thought Detroit was trying to "steal" the population of their communities have been told by census officials that their fears are baseless.

The fears were prompted by the fact that residents of many suburbs, including the Pointes, received census forms with mailing labels which accurately identified their street addresses and zip codes but listed the city of residence as Detroit.

Some Pointers, including several who called the Grosse Pointe News, suspected that Detroit was seeking to have the suburban population counted in Detroit to make sure the city retains at least a mil-

lion population, which appears to be Mayor Coleman Young's chief census objective.

Not so, said census district manager Janie Boblitt. She said the head counters know which city each address is in but that the important facts on the census form are the street address and the zip code. Detroit's name was used on the mailing label presumably as a convenience to the post office.

We'll accept the census manager's explanation but we can understand suburban fears in view of Mayor Young's worry about an undercount that might cost Detroit its "millionaire" status — and in view of his practice of using the suburbs for political gain.

A 10-strike for the Freep

hen the Free Press management picked Park resident Neal Shine as its new publisher, the Knight-Ridder paper made a 10-strike.

Shine had retired late last year from his duties as senior managing editor but had continued to write a column. Now he returns to become the news and editorial head of the paper.

The choice was a 10-strike because Shine knows Detroit like the palm of his hand from a lifetime as a working journalist in

the city. As a highly respected newsman, he also ought to be able to reinvigorate the news arm of the Freep which has been in the doldrums since the paper sought a Joint Operating Agreement with The Detroit News.

Subscibers, too, should benefit. Unlike many daily publishers, Shine came up through the news department, still retains his love of the writing craft and his ability to tell a good story, and no doubt will insist that his staff show the same respect for those hallmarks of a good newspaper.

(The following letter, sent to the Federal Reserve Board, is being reprinted at the request of the writer.)

In reference to the lawsuit challenging the rule to allow lenders to freeze home equity lines when their interest rate caps are reached, filed by Consumer Union as a part of the Home Equity Loan Consumer Protection Act of 1988, this citizen is requesting that the Federal Reserve Board eliminate the provision that allows banks/ lenders to stop lending when

the ceiling level is reached.
In addition, it is recommended that banks/lenders be required to maintain lending rates at no more than 2 percentage points above the Federal Funds rate. This would allow the feds to control interest rates.

This citizen also challenges the practice of banks charging points in addition to closing costs for mortgages. The costs of buying a home for today's first-time home buyer or any home buyer are prohibitive. Closing costs which include lending points, fees, insurance, taxes, and down payment are becoming unaffordable for more and more families. The cost of housing has jumped leaps and bounds

Baby love

We visited our first grandchild in California recently and it was a magical, enchanting experi-

Grandparents reading this will nod knowingly when I say this is a special child. There is a unique bond, unlike any other, between grandparent and grandchild. This I know, not from my newly acquired status, but from having wonderful grandparents who left me a legacy of beautiful memories.

It hasn't been easy for our David Paul so far. There were complications at birth, and right after he was born, he was taken to Loma Linda University Medical Center where he underwent his first operation.

He was put on a respirator and this less-than-5-pound human being had tubes connected everywhere - head, arm, chest.

There was a protective chimney placed atop his stomach to keep the organs that formed outside his body sterile until they could be put inside.

When my daughter-in-law was told he might be in the hospital for two months, she wondered how she would bear up for that long. She and my son made the trip five or six times a week - it was more than two hours each way. Sometimes she stayed overnight.

He was born in August and they hoped he would be home for Christmas. Instead they spent the day with him in the hospital.

It seemed that every bit of progress he made was marked with a setback. But he continued to gain weight and thrive. By the time he reached his 6-month mark, he had undergone seven operations

We arrived two days after he turned 6 months old. It was one of those gloriously warm, golden, Say Pat Paholsky

sunny mornings when we got on the San Bernardino freeway to the hospital to see our grandbaby for the first time.

When we got there, we learned that his long-awaited release - postponed for weeks was finally a reality.

The kid was busting loose. Talk about timing. We had planned to spend most of our time in the hospital.

Even though his parents had been sending photos of him, we were not prepared for what we saw in the hospital bed: an 18pound hunk with huge dark eyes, long lashes and a crooked smile that could melt ice. It was love at first sight.

When his other grandmother learned he was being released, she got a video camera and rushed down to record him getting dressed for the first time in civilian clothes, saying goodbye to his caregivers, getting on the elevator, getting off the elevator, walking out of the hospital (in the arms of his mother, of course) and being secured in his car seat.

She spent the next couple of days recording significant events getting his diaper changed, spitting up, staring at the camera - and the end result is a two-hour videotape that will be treasured by a small, but select, number of families.

I took 87 photos. About 80 were of the baby. I think it's pretty funny that my husband took every single one of them to work. I'm sure his co-workers could now pick that baby out of a crowd with no problem.

He is still being fed intravenously, but he is home with his parents, obviously enjoying the outside world. The doctors aren't sure how long it will be before he can take food by mouth - it could be a year or two or even

In the meantime, this baby isn't worrying about it. He's too busy taking in new sights and

And teaching the adults around him the virtues of patience. My son, who is eager to move to China with his family to do missionary work as soon as the baby is well, related this story to me last week: David was sitting in his walker, playing with the toys on the tray in front of him. Just as he was getting very interested in one particular toy, it slipped out of his grasp and fell to the floor. He looked at it and grunted. Then he decided to turn his attention to another toy in front of him.

Mark said the message from this little scene is that we should direct our energies toward that which is in front of us and not fret about that which is unattainable, temporarily or other-

What a kid. Both of them.

All I know is that when David begins to eat for the first time on his own, I'm going to buy him the biggest chocolate bunny I can find, even if it's Christmas.

ahead of inflation and salary increases. Because the values are so high, the taxes alone can cripple the family financially.

Why are the banks allowed to charge points? Why aren't these regulated? The Federal Funds rates are currently at the same level they were in October-November 1989 when the banks' mortgage lending rates were at a year's low of 9.0 to 9.75 percent. Even though the Fed. eral Funds rates are at the same level now, the mortgage lending rates are higher. In fact the prime rate is lower now than it was at that time. If the American family has to finance higher interest rates in purchasing a home, higher closing costs, higher taxes, how can the American family be expected to increase the savings rate?

Perhaps the Federal Reserve Board should consider controlling some of the finance fees that banks charge to prevent the monopolistic control over interest rates and closing costs that banks

It is a greedy and a leverage buy-out mentality that is affecting all our businesses and discourages the industrious ethic that made this country great. Help us increase our savings rate give us some relief from these assessments.

To the Editor:

Wayne County citizens may soon be able to vote on

a ballot question to amend and improve — their County Home Rule Charter for the third time since its adoption in 1981. This new ballot question would ask whether or not a special election should be held if there is ever a vacancy during a county executive's regular four-year term, as a result of resignation, recall, permanent incapacity or death.

The Wayne County commission is now considering a resolution to place this question on the ballot. But before making a decision, the commission held two public hearings and if appropriate will make changes to the ballot question based on citizens' testimony.

I do not really expect there to be a mid-term vacancy in the office of county executive in the foreseeable future. But it is possible at some point in the years ahead, so a responsible transition process should be in place.

At present, the charter does not allow the voters to elect a successor in a timely manner if this office is vacated. Instead an appointee, the deputy county executive, would automatically assume the office and hold it for up to two years until the next regularly scheduled county election.

I believe that the office of county executive is too important to fill it by just shuffling an appointee upstairs. Furthermore, letting a county executive handpick an automatic successor

would present a serious conflict if the voters ever recalled whomever had been elected to that office.

Therefore, citizens ought to be able to consider all the candidates, and directly choose the one they consider best for Wayne County. The goal of the proposed ballot question is, very simply, to let the voters themselves decide whether or not they want this opportunity.

In 1981, when the County Home Rule Charter was drafted, a process was included to make it a living document by allowing the people to vote on proposed changes. This has already happened twice when citizens adopted charter amendments to eliminate the separate Drain Commission and the Road Commission.

Both amendments made government more accountable — and both were resisted by special interests who felt their independent power threatened.

Similarly, there is opposition to the current ballot question.

Unfortunately, its opponents have tried to mislead the public about its consequences and divert attention from its goal - to let the voters elect a new county executive, if necessary. Much of their criticism has focused on a minor provision of the ballot question, which states that the commission would appoint a temporary county executive to keep ongoing projects on course for no more than 90 days - until a new county executive is elected by the people.

If indicated by testimony from the public hearings, we may modify - or even eliminate - the provision regarding the 90-day transition period to ensure that attention is not diverted from our fundamental goal: a special elec-

Ironically, the procedure initially proposed for transition was quite similar to current state law, which provides that the commission makes a temporary appointment to fill a vacancy which occurs in the first year of a commissioner's two-year term. This appointee can only serve until voters choose a successor at a special election. Opponents of the ballot

question have also complained that a special election is too costly. However, Michigan voters have traditionally favored direct participation in important decisions - even if it does mean paying for a special election. School and municipal millages, as well as candidates for school and city offices, are often voted on at times other than the regular Au-

gust and November elections. Moreover, special elections are required by state law if a mid-term vacancy occurs in certain state of-

The manufactured objections to the proposed ballot question, along with efforts to misconstrue its intent, lead me to suspect that those who hope to benefit by the status quo are very uncomfortable about an open, competitive election.

Nevertheless, I strongly believe that the electoral process strengthens government - and keeps public officials responsive to the citizens they have an obligation to serve.

Therefore, I urge Wayne County residents to insist on the opportunity to vote on whether to require a special election if there is ever a mid-term vacancy in the county executive's office in the years to come.



Other kids on this block are Jen, a learning disabled child, Ellen Jane, who is retarded, Mark, who was born with cerebral palsy, and Renaldo, who is blind. These puppets are joined by Melody and Brenda, who aren't disabled, but talk with the other puppets about their disabil-

The disabled puppets look at their disabilities as challenges, and, like Mandy being able to talk with her mouth full, find the best in their situations.

Ellen Jane, who works at a veterinary clinic, for instance, tells Brenda that retardation means you are "just a little slower to learn." But there are some things she knows - how to soothe a frightened animal - for instance.

Mark, confined to a wheelchair, says, "Whenever I go to the show, I always have a seat."

When Melody asks Mark how he goes to the bathroom, the audience chuckles, but listens in rapt silence as he answers.

But the audience also asks questions, from "How do you know when the telephone rings?" directed to Mandy, to 'How come Mark calls his wheelchair a cruiser?" The students were surprised to learn that a light on the telephone flashes when the phone rings and that Mark just thinks it's more fun to call his wheelchair his cruiser.

"Each of the puppets takes on a personality," Scheiwe says. 'Children feel safe asking the puppets personal questions they

would never ask a person.'

The program, Scheiwe says, does not point out the differences between disabled puppets and able-bodied students, but discusses the similarities instead.



Society for blind to form statewide resource center

The Greater Detroit Society for the Blind is forming a Michigan Eye Health Resource Center. It is a clearing house that will serve educators, community agencies and organizations, as well as medical personnel by providing up-to-date resource material on eye health topics for individuals of all ages.

The resource center is made possible by a \$7,000 grant from the Metro Health Foundation. The money will be used to purchase and disseminate films, videos and publications on eye health and blindness prevention throughout the state of Michi-

The Michigan Eye Health Resource Center will have materials organized around five basic areas. They are:

• General Vision Information

Low Vision and Blind

Rehabilitation

In addition, eye models, posters, charts and eye protective devices will be available for demonstration.

The Greater Detroit Society for the Blind is accredited under the National Accreditation Council for Agencies Serving the Blind and Visually Handicapped. Its general mandate: to bring all appropriate resources to bear to prevent blindness and to reduce the effects of blindness.

And although the able puppets are more open-minded and accepting than most children are, their insights help the students to be more understanding.

"We usually do this program for fourth and fifth-graders," Scheiwe said, "because that's when the teasing usually be-

All the puppets mentioned that they are teased because of their disabilities, and they don't

"Have you ever been teased?" Ellen Jane asks the students. "Yes," they yell back. "Do you like it?" "No," the students respond. "Well I don't either," she

Bonnie Rozycki, a mother of a


learning disabled child, attended the presentation and was moved to tears.

"If you can catch the kids early," she said, "maybe they will understand the students with disabilities."

The puppets were dug out of teachers' attics, basements and offices after being put away five years ago because the time constraints of the two women who did the show. Scheiwe, who did Kids on the Block presentations while living in Kentucky, felt the project was worth reviving.





"You can be who you are," he said. "If someone wants to be an artist, they shouldn't be discouraged by the stereotype. Now my parents are proud of what I've accomplished."

Poole put himself through college by refinishing furniture and woodwork and wallpapering. The experience paid off when Poole decided to completely refurbish his own home, from the bottom

"I'm not afraid of a challenge," Poole said. "In fact, I can't resist them."

Poole began his art education at Niagara Community College and the State University of New York. He earned his bachelor of fine arts degree from the School of the Dayton Art Institute in Ohio.

He worked a printmaking internship at Rosary Hill College in Buffalo, N.Y.

In 1974, Poole earned a master of fine arts degree from the Cranbrook Academy of Art in Bloomfield Hills.

And in 1981, he attended the Santa Reparata Graphic Art Center in Florence, Italy.

Poole currently serves as a professor of fine arts in the printmaking section of Detroit's Center for Creative Studies-College of Art and Design. He also lectures occasionally for the Grosse Pointe Artists Association.

Among other subjects, Poole lectures about his approach to his work.

"I work from thumbnail sketches," he said.

processes I'll need to complete the work," Poole said. "If I ruin it, I can't erase that part. I have to throw it out and start over." Fortunately, he doesn't make many mistakes.

Once the concept is determined, he transfers the idea onto a full-size mock-up to work out any problems with perspective and color scemes.

"I use soft, enticing colors to suggest a tranquil setting," he

Then Poole adds the elements such as lines, curves, waves and geometric shapes that suggest both the constants and variables in peoples' lives.

When Poole was beginning his career in art and printmaking, he used a "photo realism approach," recording the world around him with pinpoint accuracy. But he wanted to make a change, to do something uniquely his own.

Like the tale of the artist who locked himself in a room to find his niche, Poole enclosed himself in a room, covered the walls with paper and began flinging paint in all directions.

One discovery led to another and Poole now uses his training in defined realism to record abstract ideas.

"I've been working in this direction for about 15 years, probing and searching for different elements," he said.

As an artist, Poole shies away from the hot trends that are here today, gone tomorrow.

"It has been a gradual development as an artist, but it's important to be who you are and not just jump when a new trend

Geo Storm is a good-looking, good-performing sportster

It's a bit early to tell, but it appears that the new-for-1990 Geo Storm is living up to to raves it attracted when it was previewed at the North American Auto Show here a year ago.

The sharply styled little sportster rounds out the Chevrolet Geo very nicely, giving Chevy's import franchise a hot-looking and reasonably priced performance car to go with the Prizm, a solid four-door sedan built at the General Motors-Toyota plant in California on the same line as the Toyota Corolla (because it's the same car); the Metro, an entry-level mini-car,



sports-utility vehicle.

The Geo lineup is a multinational peek into what seems likely to come in the automotive and the Tracker, a perky little future: the Prizm is a Toyota

Corolla built in America by a joint venture of GM and Toyota; the Metro is built by Suzuki, which markets the same car as the Swift; the Geo Tracker is a version of the Suzuki Samurai which was built to Chevy's orders and is marketed by Suzuki as the Sidekick; and the Storm is based on the Isuzu Impulse. The Geo is an imaginative ap-

proach to the market in which Chevrolet in effect is saying "there are some buyers who will only consider buying an import and we want a share of that market.'

But the Storm GSi is a lot more than that. It is also a very competitively priced entry; in the mini-sportster market, which includes Chrysler Corp.'s Plymouth Laser and Eagle Talon and Mitsubishi's Eclipse, which are built in Illinois by Diamond Star, a joint venture of Chrysler and Mitsubishi; the Ford Probe, which is built by Mazda at its plant in Flat Rock and which uses MX-6 mechanicals; and Pontiac's LeMans GSE, designed by GM's Opel operation in West Germany and built in South Korea in a joint venture by GM and Daewoo.

Far from waging a trade war with the Orient, it appears that Detroit is merging with it.

Among the beneficiaries of this policy are those buyers who want a small, well-built, goodperforming and good-looking little sportster, because that is what the Geo Storm is. With its quality construction and its yuppie good looks, the Storm should prove attractive to many buyers with its base price of \$10,390 or \$11,650 for the GSi. The wellequipped GSi test car (options included air conditioning and upscale sound system) bore a sticker price of \$12,825.

The standard Storm is powered by a 1.6-liter 12-valve single-overhead-cam four-cylinder



Five-speed manual transmission is standard. Fifth is an overdrive. Two optional automatic transmissions are available, a three-speed for the standard Storm and a four-speed for the GSi. Both have a brake interlock mechanism to prevent unexpected movement when shifting out of park.

The Storm has an aggressive look, partly because it is quite wide in relation to its length. It is 66 inches wide and only 164 inches from bumper to bumper. As a result, there is not a lot of room inside, although two adults can ride very comfortably. The back seat of the 2 plus 2 hatchback coupe is suitable only for kids and pets.

The body is very sleek and aerodynamic. Four halogen headlamps lurk beneath motorized shutters, door handles are hidden behind the door's exterior skin and the spoiler-type rear end lends a racy look.

And a visit to a Geo showroom proves that bright colors are in again. A color called "flash yellow" is available only on the GSi and if you order that you'll never have trouble finding your car in the parking lot.



Lake St. Clair at the end of 'February was at elevation 573.85 feet above the mean water level at Father Point, Quebec, or 26 inches above chart datum. This was about 11 inches above what it was a year ago, and 6 inches above one month

The February monthly mean level of 573.57 feet was about 12 inches above the long-term average for February. The lake, however, remained about 31 inches below the all-time high February monthly mean level, which was recorded in 1986.

The forecast shows that at the end of March, the level of Lake St. Clair will be about the same as what it was at the end of February. The lake is expected to continue its seasonal rise into June. The water level in August 1990 is expected to be about the same as the long-term average for that month, or about 5 inches below what it was at the same time in 1989.







Neil Simon's 'Rumors' is free-wheeling farce

"Rumors" is Neil Simon's 23rd play and his first no-holdsbarred farce of his prolific career. A genuinely funny play, which one television reviewer said has 6,000 laughs, "Rumors" keeps the audience in stitches with its frenzied action, comic situations and jokes that fly back and forth like zingers on a tennis court.

Before the action ever begins, we know we are in for classic farce. There are nine doors in set designer Tony Staiges' beautiful suburban New York living room, making it a sort of a large-scale revolving door set up as characters poke their heads out of one and others dodge in and out of others trying to avoid each other. Even the bathroom door becomes a comic focal point and the basement door is crucial to the resolvement.

The loosely constructed story, which provides a launching pad for fast-flying one-liners, involves a couple who invite their friends to celebrate their 10th wedding

anniversary at a black tie din-

When the guests arrive, they find the dinner uncooked, the



help gone, the host in his bedroom with a bullet through his ear lobe and the hostess nowhere in sight. We never do meet them, although many times during the play we are led to believe they will appear. We know they exist because the host keeps calling downstairs from his bedroom and before the play is over, we also hear from the errant hostess.

The first guests to arrive are Ken Gorman (Gibby Brand) and his wife, Chris (Kathleen Marsh), a couple so high-strung that you wonder how gravity operate at a high-decibel delivholds them down.

They become almost hysterical when they discover what has happened to their host who is deputy mayor. Brand, who is his lawyer, deems it necessary to keep the accident (or attempted suicide?) under wraps. He rushes upstairs to minister to his client, leaving Chris to cover up when the rest of the group arrives. While he is gone, she calls a doctor. Before she can explain the circumstances, Ken pokes his head out of the upstairs door. When he hears what is going on, he rushes down and while the doctor is still listening on the phone, the two enage in a hilarious exchange of how much he should be told.

This incident sets the pattern for more of the same as each guest arrives. Wild, unbelievable excuses for the absent host are modified and contradicted. What makes this nonsense so plausibly funny are the hyperkinetic characters and a wonderful cast who play their parts so well. They all

ery, making it possible to catch every word.

Peter Marshall as the pompous Lenny Ganz and his wife Claire (Patty McCormack) add to the confusion and hilarity with their own problem. Enroute to the party, his new Mercedes is rammed by a Porsche that leaves the scene of the accident.

Eventually he gets around to inquiring about the missing host so that when the next couple arrives, Ernie Cusack (Reno Roop) and his wife Cookie (Heather MaCrae), they hear a new rewrite of the story. Cookie adds to the hilarity of the situation with her wild screams. She has back spasms and when one hits, she lets out a primordal scream that pierces the ear. She does have a range; an air-raid-alarm scream when she loses her earrings and a fire-alarm scream when she finds them clasped in her hand.

Lenny is a psychiatrist, who, when clued into the situation of-

fers a new version, which for a professional is every bit as ditsy as the others.

However, Ernie adds immeasurably to the proceedings with a simple off-beat charm. Cookie. who gives cooking lessons on television is drafted into the kitchen to cook. When Ernie tries to help, he burns his fingers. It's a riot to watch him walking around with his fingers wrapped like sausages waiting on people and trying to open

'Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles' campy, childish, entertaining

Warning: The following paragraphs contain material that may be offensive to anyone over the age of 18. Parents and other adults are advised to read this only under the supervision of a child or a child-at-heart.

Well, OK. Perhaps nothing in "Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles" is actually offensive. It's campy and downright childish, maybe, but it's not going to make anybody mad.

The title alone is a pretty good indicator of what we're dealing with here. This is a movie about adolescent humanoid turtles who use their knowledge of the martial arts to right all wrongs in one big city. It's make-believe fantasy taken to an extreme, to be sure.

It's also good, clean fun.

The film brings to life the colorful cartoon characters who have become popular with more

than a few youngsters. It's easy

to see why. These guys are

funny. They love pizza more

Sylvester Stallone impressions. And boy, can they ever fight.

Their origin, for the record, is fascinating. It seems an orphaned rat wandering around the sewer is stuff bled across four turtles bathing in a strange, glowing liquid. The liquid, whatever it was, caused the four turtles and the rat to grow in size and intelligence. Meanwhile, the rat - who is sort of like Obi Wan Kenobi with a tail teaches the young turtles all

about right and wrong. And what they should do when they encounter wrong.

Now granted, this isn't the kind of stuff that will thrill most adults. Save for the lessons about right and wrong and life and death the film teaches in its own delicate way. Still, since most of the adults who check out this picture will be doing so with their children, perhaps that alone is somewhat comforting.

For what it's worth, the material in "Turtles" is mildly entertaining in an offbeat, subtle sort of way. Too, the technical side of the production is good enough to hold viewers raised on "Star Wars" and other special effects bombshells.

So all right. Maybe this isn't an Academy Award winner, but it is a picture that scores of adults who end up taking their kids to see will be able to han-

Underwater exhibit opens April 6

Mysteries that lie beneath the inland seas will be uncovered for the public in an exhibit on underwater archaeology scheduled to open at the Michigan Historical Museum Friday, April 6.

"Beneath The Inland Seas," created jointly by the Department of State's Bureau of History and the Lake Michigan Maritime Museum of South Haven, showcases artifacts documenting Great Lakes history that have been recovered from Great Lakes shipwrecks and the Great Lakes bottomlands.

"An estimated 6,000 ships have sunk while navigating the Great Lakes and for the first time we will be exhibiting artifacts recovered by archaeologists and sport divers from those shipwrecks," Secretary of State Richard Austin said. "Visitors will discover how well fresh water preserves those shipwrecks and how important our Great Lakes bottomlands are to our rich heri-

"In addition to providing valuable information about the Great Lakes, we hope the exhibit will promote sport diving in Michigan as well as a respect for what lies beneath the inland seas."

"Beneath The Inland Seas" explains how and why underwater sites are being preserved, traces the development of Great Lakes shipping, and describes what happens to a ship after it sinks in fresh water.

Among the showpieces are artifacts recovered from the Rockaway, which sank off South Haven in 1891; the Pewabic, sunk near Alpena in 1865; and the Regina, sunk off Port Sanilac in 1913. Other significant artifacts include prehistoric pots recovered from the waters around Isle Royale in Lake Superior, an early dugout canoe, and a War of 1812 cannon recovered from the Detroit River.

The museum is located in the east wing of the Michigan Library and Historical Center.



Importance of revocable living trusts

Financial Affairs Month is an annual public service event sponsored by the four professions of law, banking, insurance and certified public accounting.

The purpose of Financial Affairs Month is to encourage people to establish a plan for retirement and family financial security. All four professions stress the need for people to learn about income tax strategies, savings plans, early retirement, writing a will and where to seek

sound financial advice. The average married couple in Michigan with assets totaling \$1,200,000 have a choice; they can pay \$192,800 in tax on their deaths or they can pay nothing. Most people would ask, "So, what's the choice?"

Although it seems banal, many couples are, in effect, opting to pay the tax by neglecting to utilize the tax planning tools available to them. This tax savings is accomplished by creating an estate of at least \$600,000 in each spouse.

The tax law allows unlimited gifts between spouses without incurring gift tax and gives each spouse the opportunity to direct the disposition of their estate, while controlling the assets during their lifetime.

One vehicle by which this can be accomplished is known as a Revocable Living Trust. An RLT, when properly prepared and funded, allows an estate to use its \$600,000 credit against tax through what is called a credit trust. The surviving spouse may be the income bene-

Alternatively, the grantor of the trust may make specific bequests for children or other beneficiaries since the first \$600,000 of an individual's estate is not subject to federal estate tax. Any amounts over and above the first \$600,000 pass to the qualified terminable interest trust.

The surviving spouse is named the income beneficiary with a party acting as the trustee.

The trust could also provide for invasion of the principal for medical or financial emergency befalling the surviving spouse.

Any amount passing to the surviving spouse, either outright or in a trust, is free of federal estate tax on the first spouse's death.

Upon the death of the surviving spouse, the first \$600,000 would again not be taxable, and only the amount over and above the first \$600,000 would be subject to federal estate tax unless it passes to the spouse of a second marriage.

Further, at the death of the second spouse, there may be, based upon present Michigan law, state inheritance tax. However, a bill considered by the state legislature would bring Michigan into line with the majority of other states and reduce inheritance tax substantially.

The Internal Revenue Service will be happy to receive it; however, taxpayers have the ability to distribute to children, heirs or other beneficiaries free of tax.



Grosse Pointe Memorial Church, 16 Lakeshore, above, was built in 1927 with a bell tower containing eight bells which rang the Westminster chimes every quarter hour. In 1952, a 47-bell carillon was installed, with bells ranging in weight from 4,700 pounds to 15 pounds. The carillon is played before and after each Sunday service, at weddings and funerals, and for summer carillon concerts.





Community Spring wildflowers are often featured in mythology, legend

With the beginning of April, spring really seems at last to be a reality. There is warmth in the sunshine and birds are beginning their nest-building activities. Green shoots are appearing in our gardens and new buds are appearing on trees and shrubs. In the woods and fields there will soon be spring wildflowers to delight us: hepatica, spring beauty, trailing arbutus and bloodroot are a few.

Violets are perhaps the only spring wildflower to ever become a political symbol. In 1814 during Napoleon's exile on the Island of Elba, the French Bonapartists chose the violet as their emblem. Napoleon was nicknamed Caporal Violet, the little flower that returns with spring, and France was soon flooded with postcards picturing bunches of violets. This seemed innocent enough at first glance, but close inspection would reveal that the flowers pictured concealed the faces of Napoleon, Maria Louise and their three-year-old son Charles, the King of Rome. On and off, for many years, the French government fought by decree any reproduction of the violet, the symbol of the Bonapartists. This violet campaign finally died down about 1880.

There are many varieties of violets in many shades of blue, lavender, purple and white and they come in many sizes, some scented, some not. In the Edwardian period, bunches of Parma violets were very fashionable and everyone wore them pinned to lapels, muffs or collars. Violet perfume was also in great demand and it was during this period that the perfume house of Coty introduced its most famous scent, Violet Sec, which is still a popular perfume.

Most people don't realize that. pansies are really violets and the product of many years of hybridization, but a spring garden would hardly be complete without them. Their almost-human little faces have earned them many rather endearing names such as hartsease, little grandmothers, johnny-jump-up and lady's delight.

Lily-of-the-valley is another of

One of the first signs of spring in the supermarket is asparagus, always eagerly welcomed. Its hard to believe that onions, asparagus, yuccas, and many spring wildflowers, including wake robins, bellwort and dogtooth violets are all really lilies, and calla lilies and skunk cabbage are cousins.

The many-colored many-sized blooms of the iris family are numbered among the plants we think of as symbols of spring. Iris was the goddess of the rainbow and in Greek mythology she was a messenger from the Gods - a link between Olympus and mortals, in that she touched both sky and earth.

The iris goes back for thousands of years. Its roots were among the botanical booty Pharaoh Thutmosis I brought back to Egypt in 1950 B.C. as part of a

Iris is not only the flower of gradually driven further and fur- France, but is claimed as the flower of Florence and Tuscany, in Italy and vies with the peony and the chrysanthemum as the representative flower of Japan.

Ever since the days of Thutmosis I, iris has been used in medicine and in earlier ages was used as a cure all for ague, shivering, epilepsy, headaches, loose teeth or snakebite.

In poetry, the iris is often used to symbolize or describe the sky. The many colors of iris are all colors that appear in the sky at sunrise, sunset, evening or dawn, or the colors of the rain-

It is recorded that when Cadillac first came to Detroit in 1701 he brought with him from Quebec, a gardener whose duty it was to lay out orchids and gardens. But in early spring in woods and fields and along the shore of the lake, thousands of wildflowers provided a natural garden which must have been very beautiful. Violets and columbine, dogwood and shadbush and many other plants were here. The Indians gathered the fern shoots called fiddleheads which they cooked and ate, not only as a spring tonic, but because they thought that they would then smell like ferns and would be able to surprise and capture small game more easily.

The Pastor's Corner A Sympathetic Hum

When I was a child (my wife might debate the past tense here), I took piano lessons.

This was a rite of passage in my family. That is, if you were a child and took no piano lessons, you had no right to pass mother without receiving showers of guilt-producing verbiage.

I was miserable practicing the piano. But I was more miserable when I did not. One factor which made practicing interesting was to find which notes on the old upright had a sympathetic frequency to which objects on the piano's top. If you repeatedly stuck contain level of the piano's top.

If you repeatedly stuck certain keys, the sounding note would produce a slight buzz or hum in some of the figurines or in the lamp shade on the piano.

This phenomenon is not to be confused with the noise emanating from my father if certain notes were repeatedly struck. My father's was, in fact, a highly unsympathetic noise.

The sympathetic hum was produced by something about the object itself. Deep inside, it was tuned to react to that particular note, to agree to sound along with the note itself.

When Jesus entered Jerusalem at the start of what we know as Holy Week, he orchestrated the events in very particular ways. He made sure that he was riding on a certain animal and in a certain context. He made sure a certain "note" of history was being sounded very clearly.

Matthew tells us it was a note first tuned by the prophets of the Old Testament's Jewish Tradition. That note or tone is a promise that a great king would come to set up a new rule of freedom, hope and right. It is the tone of being the true king in which Jesus wraps himself.

There were also some strong hints of the strange type of king this was to be. This king was to emphasize humility, love and service — a unique note for any royalty.

As Jesus came into the city, there was a sympathetic hum in the hearts of people. It was turned into shouts by the crowd. Something deep within them resonated to this tone. Here is the new king, the right ruler, the source of hope and freedom. The note was struck by Jesus and rang through the hearts of the people.

Some of the poeple's hearts rang. Others couldn't see it, or hear it, or feel it. Their reaction was a hearty request to cut out all the racket. There is no king here, no music to their ears — just a troublesome (though sometimes nice) carpenter's son coming to the city.

And ever since, this has been the rub. Some people just keep vibrating to the note that this Jesus is a king worthy See PASTOR, page 6B

G.P. teenagers help homeless

A few dozen young people from Gresse Pointe United Methodist Church and five other churches in the Detroit area recently spent a week working with homeless people.

During the week of March 11, Zion United Methodist Church in Detroit hosted 65 homeless people, and the other churches provided food and supplies, according to the Rev. Jack Mannschreck, associate pastor of Grosse Pointe United Methodist Church.

The project is a part of a Wayne County program called Interfaith Hospitality, one of several programs of the Homeless Union, a national organization based in Cass United Methodist Church in Detroit.

The 65 homeless people slept on foam matresses on the floor of Zion church and the other churches, including G.P. United Methodist, provided workers to help with supper, evening snacks, security, breakfast and a sack lunch. Each morning, participants in the program were transported to their jobs or job placement center and the children were taken to school.

In addition to Grosse Pointe United Methodist Church, other churches which participated were Christ United Methodist Church in Detroit, Redeemer United Methodist Church in Harper Woods, Mt. Hope and Jefferson Avenue United Methodist in Detroit.

On Friday evening, 27 youthful helpers gathered to serve the evening meal to the homeless, then returned to Grosse Pointe United Methodist for a lock-in focused on the issue of hunger. On Saturday morning, the youths returned to Zion at 6:30 a.m. to prepare breakfast and pass out lunches.

Mannschreck said that the consensus of the young people

was that they were fortunate to have their essential needs met in nice homes with plenty of food.

"During the evening, they brainstormed about other ways they could help alleviate the pain of the homeless and the hungry," he said.

The program was led by Joy Stuckey, a Grosse Pointe South High School junior and was under the direction of Mannschreck.





For some fifty years Eddie Wunsch has been one of our better barristers, the husband of one of the loveliest women in the world, a sea captain and a bridge burn who's skills have improved with age and sageness. I believe it was four years ago he decided to become a life master, a feat many have struggled to achieve in a decade or two of play. Last year he reached that distinguished rank and while I'm a little late, today's column is intended to commend him for this emblem.

Sailing ships are safe in the harbor, but a sturdy old sea captain will remind you that isn't what we built sailing ships for in the first place.

Bridge players too face unsafe situations, treacherous card combinations, bad breaks and amazing plays. A good performer who has built his game on sound basics will remind you that a good player often overcomes such misfortunes and that is one of the challenging reasons we play this game in the first place.


Today's bad break on board twenty-four was the result of a trump stack, but the year old life master overcame adversity with careful play to share a top with only one other declarer.

When declarer inspected the dummy he counted five spades, three hearts, a diamond and a club for ten winners. Could anything go wrong? It didn't seem so, so he proceeded with the diamond king at trick one which west won with the ace. The club jack next from west was won by north's ace. The spade king at trick three and east's failure to follow confronted Wunsch with a possibly unsolvable problem. Could be still win the same tricks he had originally counted? It was possible if west had at least three hearts and three diamonds to go with his five spades. At trick four a small heart to durnmy's king and a spade back to the ten. Then the queen of spades, diamond queen, heart ace and queen and at trick ten this was the four card ending.




Many declarers went wrong at this point trying to ruff the heart nine, out this was vastly inferior to ruffing the third diamond which Wunsch did successfully. The spade ace was his tenth trick. East then won the club king, but West's last trump was hopelessly wasted on east's high club at trick thirteen.

Social Security critics point to intergenerational inequities A cartoon appeared recently in that there will be an insufficient

a newspaper showing a family looking at a painting. It was Whistler's "Arrangement in Black and Gray," more often referred to as "Whistler's Mother." The caption read: "His mother did OK without Social Security."

It was a silly, rather pointless comment. It is not known whether Whistler's mother was rich, poor, dependent or sufficient unto herself.

However, the cartoon did alert older citizens that there exists a low rumbling among some - a rumbling that could erupt into a groundswell, unless means are taken to correct the misconception that federal money is being unfairly distributed to support Social Security, Medicare and Medicaid. Dissidents contend that the young are being shortchanged.

The concept of intergenerational inequity is threatening to divide advocates, policy makers and families. The thesis purports

number of working people to support seniors because the number of elderly persons is increasing more rapidly than the number of working-age people.

When facts are presented, thinking young people support programs for the elderly. In a report, "The Common Stake: The Interdependence of Generations," published by the Gerontological Society of America, one of its authors, Barbara Hirshorn, points out that citizens of all ages prefer cuts in defense alize that because some seniors spending over cuts in Medicare.

There has been some grumbling also about the economic status of seniors. It is true that the poverty level among seniors has decreased over the past 25 years — as it has for all Americans, regardless of age. Some people incorrectly generare better off financially, all seniors are financially independent. "This is not true," Hirshorn writes, "but the proponents of intergenerational inequity would like to make it the new stereotype of elderly people."

and education of their children and through assisting their friends and relatives, all their lives.

Mark Jungwirth, who last year went 2-4 and had a 2.90 ERA, is back as the potential ace, and left-hander Marty Gulewicz (0-1) returns for what should be an outstanding senior season. After Jungwirth and Gulewicz, Coach Dan Griesbaum is going to have to groom five jayvee players from last year's team.

"Our pitching is by far our biggest key," he said. "We've got more depth on the mound, but we lack a lot of game experience at the varsity level. We're very deep in pitching, but we've got to get the younger guys ready.

Tim Gramling, Chris Wood and Colm Moore are all vying to fit the shortstop spot, and Bill Leins should start at second base. Kevin Nugent (.304) will play third base, and Weissert will play first and see limited action as a designated hitter. Downs may also play first.




