When the Rogers and Hamels heard the story, they knew Peepers had been out visiting.


The feathered friend also tried to play with children at the nearby Trombly School playground. Apparently, Peepers was swooping down at the children



Grosse Pointe Park will begin curbside pickup of grass clippings Monday, resulting in potential cost savings for the city and, ultimately, taxpayers.

'It's pleasing to see curbside recycling from a cost-effective standpoint," Councilman Dan Clark said at Monday night's meeting after the grass pickup plan was approved. Clark has been a leading proponent of getting curbside recycling started in the Park.

In addition, the city will phase in curbside pickup of newsprint and clear glass in the near future if such pickups are economically feasible.

In the meantime, the Park will continue to operate its recycling drop-off center at the old Unocal station on Jefferson for newsprint, plastic, tin and aluminum and glass. Also, Park officials said they will continue to work with the Grosse Pointes-Clinton Disposal Authority in developing a multi-community

approach to curbside recycling. City Manager Dale Krajniak described the Park's curbside collection plan as a phased pilot program.

Currently, yard wastes, which

Park to begin curbside grass pickup Monday comprise 65 percent of the Park's total recyclable or compostable materials being sent to the incinerator, are collected by the city's private waste hauler and taken to the incinerator in Clinton Township.

> According to the incinerator authority's April study on wastes from its member communities, the Park generates 2,551 tons of yard wastes annually that is burned at the incinerator. The five Grosse Pointes, Harper Woods, Clinton Township and Mount Clemens currently pay a tipping fee of \$55 a ton to deliver wastes to the incinerator.

Park officials estimate that out of the city's total yard wastes annually, some 1,875 tons are made up of grass. At the current tipping fees, the Park pays \$103,125 annually just to dispose of grass.

On Monday, the Park's contracted waste hauler, Painter/ Ruthenberg, will begin picking up grass clippings that have been set by the curb in clear plastic bags. The bags can be purchased at City Hall at cost for \$8.50 a carton or residents can buy them elsewhere, as long

as they are clear bags.

The waste hauler will then take the grass clippings to one of two private composting sites, though the city has yet to pick a site. The private composters charge a tipping fee of \$12 to \$15 a ton.

Initially, residents are being asked to voluntarily participate in the grass pickup program. All residents are required to do is put the clippings in clear plastic bags and set them out first thing on Monday mornings. At first, residents may want to call City Hall to let officials know they will be setting out bags. The waste hauler, though, will be going down all the Park streets looking for the bags.

The city estimates that even at only 40 percent participation, the Park would save \$20,922 during the 24-week summer period by composting the grass instead of delivering it to the in-

The 40 percent participation would result in an estimated 750 tons of grass being collected and composted. The composting would cost \$9,000 at \$12 per ton, and the private waste hauler, which would pick up the grass at

\$59 an hour, would cost \$11,328 for one eight-hour day a week for 24 weeks. The total cost to collect and compost the grass would be \$20,328.

Had the 750 tons of grass been delivered to the incinerator at \$55 a ton, then the total tipping fees would have come to \$41,250 - far more than the cost to collect and compost the grass.

Newsprint, which comprises 22.3 percent of the Park's recyclable or compostable wastes, would be the next item targeted for curbside pickup. But a market has to be found for the newsprint. Currently, there is a glut of newsprint making its disposal difficult and sometimes costly.

Glass makes up 6 percent of the Park's recyclable wastes, and of the glass collected, about 78 percent is clear. Krajniak said that if glass is targeted for pickup, then clear-glass collection would be most effective.

Annually, the Park delivers 8,330 tons of municipal waste to the incinerator, based in the disposal authority's study. Of the total waste stream, 47 percent is comprised of grass, newsprint, tin and aluminum, plastics and yard waste.

Road to U of M solar victory leads to the land down under

A year and a half of all-nighters finally paid off for Bill Ka-

Kaliardos, a Farms resident and design team leader for the University of Michigan's solar car, the Sunrunner, was involved in the project from the wheels

And when the Sunrunner rolled into the General Motors Tech Center last Thursday, hundreds of U of M students were on hand to cheer the victory.

But 18 long months ago, Kaliardos and a handful of students were the only ones with the Sunrunner in the eyes, following a letter from GM inviting the school to participate in the first large scale solar car race in the United States.

By spring break 1989, when most students headed for home, Kaliardos sat nearly alone writing proposals, testing materials and establishing a solar car design concept.

After several "what ifs" and "I wonder hows" Kaliardos began to feel that his home-spun, high-tech design could really do the job.


Aside from design, the proposal to GM outlined team organization and how the team planned to raise the necessary funding to build the car.

But early in the game, the challenge to build a high-tech car which runs on energy from the sun was just one of many projects Kaliardos and fellow members of the Society of Automotive Engineers were involved

After focusing his energies, Kaliardos spent last summer eating, sleeping and dreaming solar energy. The car, then a quarter scale model, began to take shape.

By autumn, when most of the students returned, 180 of them caught the solar fever and they pitched in doing whatever they

"By then the involvement was huge," Kaliardos said. "We de-

vised the teams which would perform the various tasks."

Teams were created to delve into several aspects of mobile solar energy, such as solar voltaic cells, power electronics, exterior structure, body structure, drive mechanisms, interior structure and race strategy.

As one of the Sunrunner's overall technical consultants, Kaliardos' background in solar energy didn't hurt. Kaliardos

"Everyone had their work cut out for them," he said. "We spent nearly 20 months working

nearly 20 hours a day and now we feel that it all paid off.

Kaliardos, who just graduated with two bachelor's degrees, one in mechanical engineering and the other in aerospace engineering, said the project is the most exciting one he's ever worked on.

"It's been one of the most exciting experiences of my life, especially since we won the race," he said.

"Our team deserved the win said it was teamwork, far and amore than any other team in the above, that led to the U of M vic- race. We worked very hard." Kaliardos named four other Grosse Pointers who were instrumental in the race winning team effort:

• John Hensler, of the U of M

business team, credited with gaining the funding to make the race possible.

• The Park's Cyril White, for his winning strategies and quick hands on the strategy team's computers.

· Carl Allen, of the U of M business school, for help with funding.

· George Bournias, who is producing a video on the race from beginning to end.

But with the sweet victory comes a tough decision.

Both Kaliardos and White, who've been accepted to other schools, must now decide whether to go with the Sunrunner to Australia to compete in the next World Solar Challenge along with the world champion General Motors.

Both must now decide between hitting the books or delaying their formal educations and heading to the land down under.

Either way, Kaliardos plans to put the Sunrunner through a weight reduction program in order to compete with the world's best solar cars.

"We're also trying to improve the efficiency of the power electronics and establish a strategy as well as logistics."

Those close to the racers say you can bet your billabong they will be in the great southern land come November.

Besides being the top winner in the recent race from Orlando, Fla. to Warren, the U of M team took top honors for teamwork. race strategy and also won the 1990 Popular Science Magazine design award, netting about \$2,000 for each award.

Just how far can a solar car go on \$6,000? "Not very far," said Kaliardos. "Somehow we'll meet the challenge. We're all feeling very great right now."

The U of M's 27-person team is in Washington, D.C., this week visiting the U.S. Department of Energy, where many of the solar cars will be on display. Taking center stage will be the Australian-bound Sunrunner.





Sentencing hearings began last week on whether the juveniles who murdered a Farms man in February should be sentenced as adults, and it appears that one or more of the youths will not go to prison.

More than 30 friends, family and wife of the murder victim, Benjamin L. Gravel, packed Detroit Recorder's Judge Dalton A. Roberson's courtroom July 19 when the sentencing hearings for the four juveniles who murdered Gravel began.

According to a Detroit police

judge has received more than 700 letters urging that the juveniles receive adult murder sentences.

Sue Gravel has stated publicly that the youths are criminals, have showed no remorse and should receive life in prison without parole. All the youths have prior criminal records.

Four juveniles and two adults (17 and over) were charged in the Feb. 8 shooting death of Gravel, 53, as he was driving home shortly after 10 p.m. from Bayview Yacht Club. The four

to trial for first-degree murder Nov. 19 before Judge Roberson.

While all six suspects were charged with first-degree murder, two juveniles Willie Hobbs and Gregory Brown, both 16 - pleaded guilty to seconddegree murder. The lower plea was accepted by the prosecutor's office when the two juveniles agreed to testify against the two adults when they go to trial.

Cortez Miller, 15, and Kermit Haynes, 16, pleaded guilty to first-degree murder.





Even though the four juveniles were charged as adults, they may not be sentenced as adults, which is contrary to the prosecution's purpose for trying youths as adults

According to the 1988 state law that allows youths to be charged as adults, the judge has the final say as to whether the youths are sentenced as adults. The judge bases his decisions on internal social workers' reports, arguments presented by the prosecution and defense during presentencing hearings and the youths' criminal records, if they have them.

If the youths are sentenced as The boulevard will have six adults for first-degree murder, parole. While the second-degree minimum sentence for adults, life in prison is possible.

If sentenced as juveniles, the offenders are turned over to the Department of Social Services. As wards of the DSS, the youths can be let free any time from the date of their sentencing to their 21st birthday, when they must be let go.

Miller be sentenced as a juvenile, according intimations made a Miller's sentencing hearing that began July 19.

During Miller's sentencing hearing before Roberson, the clinical psychologist said Miller is the product of a broken home and lives with his alcoholic grandmother. She said Miller did not know how to behave in soci-

Testimony revealed that it was Miller's gun that killed Gravel, but Haynes was the one who pulled the trigger. Earlier, Miller had shot at a car, but did not wound anyone. Miller had told his friends that he was going to kill someone to get a car, according to statements made to police investigators.

The four youths and two adults wanted a car to go to a party, so they used Miller's gun to try to steal one. They threw a tree limb across Clairpointe to stop cars. When Gravel stopped at the obstruction, the youths ran toward the car and Gravel sped away, during which time Haynes fired shots at the car.

Gravel was struck by a bullet in the chest. He continued to drive north to Conner and Jefferson, where he passed out and collided with a car and bus. He died from the bullet wound at

doctorate in psychology) has rec 11:21 p.m. at St. John Hospital After the shooting, the youths went to a friend's house and a nearby store to buy more bullets. At one store, they were able to get 50 bullets for \$12.

During Miller's sentencing hearing, Roberson took issue with Assistant Prosecutor Marc Hart's procedure. The judge couldn't understand why the prosecutor insisted on having Detroit homicide detectives read the statements of defendants and witnesses, all of which are already part of the record.


When Hart attempted to belittle the clinical psychologist's credentials - and, therefore, her recommendation of leniency for Miller - Judge Roberson said it was a waste of time because he accepts the clinical psychologist as an expert.

After two hours, Miller's hearing was barely getting started, but Roberson adjourned it to July 24 because he and the court's staff had already put in a six-hour day. Similar hearings must be held for each of the juveniles before they are sentenced.

Before the sentencing hearing began, Roberson said it is the prosecution's job to convince him that the juveniles should be sentenced as adults - even though they were charged as adults and pleaded guilty to the charges.



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
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

Lucille Whitford called down to room service and asked for a diet Coke. It was quickly delivered - ice cold and refreshing. Cost: free and no gratuity accepted.

No, Whitford wasn't staying at a Hilton with complimentary beverages and tip-less bellboys. Rather, she was a patient recently at Bon Secours Hospital in Grosse Pointe City.

On July 9, the hospital kicked off its room service program, which is free of charge and provided by some 30 volunteers.

Chuck Kohlruss, Bon Secours vice president of human resources, said the hospital has a longstanding reputation for high quality service, and the room service program enhances the personalized attention to patients.


"Through the introduction of this program, I think we've made it a little better," he said.

The program was developed and instituted by Gail King, director of volunteer services. The idea itself originated at Griffin Hospital in Derby, Conn.

Besides offering more personalized service for patients, a major benefit of the room service program is to give nurses more

time for medical-related duties. "This is our opportunity to





When patients are admitted to Bon Secours, they are greeted by volunteers who explain how the room service program works. Also, laminated cards explaining the program are placed_at bedsides and on food trays during lunch.

When patients want something, they call the room service office by dialing 2223 on their room phone. The room service requests are varied and include:

• Purchases from the gift shop, such as toiletries, books, magazines and newspapers.

 Food and beverages from the cafeteria, as long as they don't contradict the hospital's prescribed diet for the patient.


- Recreation, including a partner or partners for checkers, card games or just conversation.
- Interpreting, letter writing, reading and assistance filling out insurance forms.
- Videocassette recorders and
- Numerous support services, inlcuding pastoral care.

"I'm really excited about this new program which I think will become key for hospitals in the future as far as patient comfort and satisfaction are concerned."

Based on its initial response, it appears the program will be a success. Within its first 2 1/2 days, 52 requests for room service were made.

A testimony from patient Whitford:






Durant offers new approach for the GOP

lark Durant, the Grosse Pointer who is seeking the GOP nomination for the U.S. Senate in the Aug. 7 primary, says he would bring a fresh approach to politics and government. And we believe him.

Durant sees the primary as a contest between a Washington establishment candidate, Bill Schuette, and a man, Durant himself, "who will go to Washington to fight against special interest, pork barrel politics."

As head of the federal Legal Services Corp., Durant challenged Congress to reduce his budget and send the money back to the taxpayers. As a trustee of the Ann Arbor Railroad, he rescued the bankrupt road and saved jobs. Those actions show he



can challenge the status quo and shake things up.

As a candidate, he has supported a series of reforms that would change the way things are done in Washington and, more specifically, would end what he terms "the cozy game of special interests and congressional perks."

He says Schuette, the incumbent 10th District congressman, not only benefits from congressional perks but voted for a supplemental appropriations bill containing billions of dollars in pork barrel projects for districts of legislators who handled the bill.

He contends Schuette supported the savings and loan bailout, a \$350 billion bailout of people like Charles Keating that will burden Michigan and other U.S. taxpayers for years to come.

Those are a couple of the reasons Durant has challenged Schuette to debate the issues but, Durant says, the congressman has ignored the challenge because "he doesn't want to face the issues I will bring up.'

Overall, Durant's campaign emphasizes empowering people to have more control over their own lives, expanding their choices and giving them more opportunities. He has tried to offer a clear vision of freedom and opportunity, even when his views separate him from the president on such matters as China, Lithuania, the

Moynihan payroll tax cut, the savings and loan bailout and even Bush's call for a tax

Durant's clear enunciation of his goals not only for his campaign but for the American people explain why it is that the Grosse Pointe News, which does not normally take positions in U.S. Senate and other statewide races, is supporting Durant in the primary. Our knowledge of Durant and his background convinces us he would be admirable GOP nominee for the Senate and, indeed, a worthy challenger against Sen. Carl Levin in the fall.

We don't always agree with Durant's positions but we think he would do as he has said: Stir things up and even rock the boat a bit in Washington. The savings and loan disaster, the shocking record of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and the continuing and costly rise in the federal deficit all offer evidence that Washington would benefit from someone willing to "rock the boat" and force a change of direction.

We think Durant could be that kind of man in the Senate.

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Higher U.S. taxes on seniors?

s Congress and the president wrestle with the budget problem, they Once more are reported to be considering an increase in the income tax levied on the Social Security income of the nation's more affluent senior citizens.

In a story quoting Horace Deets, executive director of the American Association of Retired Persons, the Christian Science Monitor said "it is increasingly likely" that Congress and the White House will reduce the current limitations on Social Security income subject to federal income taxes.

Such a move in effect would be an increase in taxes on people with incomes above the new limitations. Single retirees with an adjusted gross income of more than \$25,000 now pay federal income taxes on half their Social Security benefits as do married retirees who file jointly and have an income of more than \$32,000.

If the tax increase on seniors finally is approved, it will add another chapter to the long history of legislation providing new benefits to Social Security recipients - and then often cutting back on them, freezing cost-of-living adjustments or making other revisions.

Last year Congress repealed the Medicare Catastrophic Coverage Act, passed in 1988, after senior citizens protested that they were being forced to bear alone a costly burden for benefits they said they didn't need.

They objected specifically to the fact that Congress, in approving the financing of the

expanded program, had adopted a new principle. It was that the cost of the program would be borne only by the senior citizens who were eligible for the program and could afford to pay for it.

That meant that, depending on their income, eligible seniors in 1989 were required to pay additional income taxes of up to \$800 a year for individuals and \$1,600 for couples to help finance the program for those who couldn't afford to pay for it themselves. Those sums were in addition to another \$4 a month premium for all eligible Social Security recipients.

Under the now-repealed law, the maximum payments would have reached \$1,050 per person by 1993 for couples with a com-bined ancome of \$65,000 to \$70,000 a year, plus a monthly Medicare fee that would have risen to \$10.30 apiece. In fact, the Treasury Department estimated eligible couples would have paid close to \$8,000 a year by 2005.

All other Social Security programs, however, are financed by taxes on all segments of the population. The same principle is followed in other federal programs.

All in all, it was no wonder that the senior citizens rebelled and filed so many complaints that Congress beat a hasty retreat. Yet some reporters still blame the repeal on those who would have been eligible for benefits and call them "greedy geezers" because they didn't want to pay for programs they neither needed nor wanted.

They're obviously not greedy, just misun-

derstood.

A blow to DIA

It is a sad blow to the entire Detroit metropolitan area that the Detroit Institute of Arts will have to cut back to a five-day, Wednesday through Sunday week starting Aug. 8.

The cutback will save about \$350,000 in operating costs but it may not be sufficient to spare the museum from also shortening public hours in view of the estimated \$1.8 million deficit.

The DIA's total budget has been in the range of \$30 million a year with the state contributing \$16 million for the eighth straight year and the city of Detroit providing \$500,000 annually since 1985-86. Foundations, corporations, individuals and endowments and earned income fill out the

budget. Even though the city of Detroit is in a bad way financially, we are disappointed that it permits another setback in the cultural activities that serve not only the city but the metro area and, in fact, the entire state.

I met Val at a radio station in Los Angeles where we both worked. She was tall and willowy with long red hair and a tiny voice. I liked her instantly.

My husband and I were newly wedded, rock-solid Midwesterners in a strange land. Val and her husband embraced us with their friendship and thus began a relationship that has spanned the decades - most of it long distance.

Bill — his real name is Billy

was born in Oklahoma and even as he has moved in the fast lanes of the ever-changing entertainment industry most of his life, he has retained his soft

Val is a former model who speaks her ancestoral Hungarian as well as she speaks English. An unlikely couple, but totally devoted to each other. They are dreamers without parallel.

When we first met, they took us to a house they had given up in the hills above Los Angeles, a fantastic castle rising out of the side of a hill that was magnificent in its solitude.

They struck a deal with the owners to turn it into a Hungarian restaurant in which Val's mother would cook.

I couldn't begin to relate the flavor of the story he tells about the time he was getting Jayne Mansfield ready for a show. Some of us will remember that she was extremely well-endowed. She decided that as long as she

wasn't doing anything, she could nurse her newborn while Bill did her face. He says it never took him so long to make up a person

 he was distracted no end.
 Neither religious nor political, it was ironic that Bill and Val, who is also a make up artist, were hired by a religious and political group known as Moral Re-Armament. Essentially a peace movement that grew out of the Oxford Group, the organization was based for awhile on Mackinac Island.

It was in the '50s and the group was making films to promote their cause. Bill and Val were flown in from California to work on a film. They were greeted at the airport by a committee, there was a large bowl of fresh fruit in their room every day and they were always escorted to and from the set.

It all sounded so unreal to me, a native of Michigan, who had never heard of such a group on Mackinac. It was even stranger, therefore, when years later I was in a hospital after giving birth to my third child. I couldn't sleep and I walked over to the nurses station about 3 in the morning to get a sleeping pill. It was very quiet, the lights were low and I could hear one nurse telling another about her experiences as a member of the MR-A.

The unique thing about these two people is they have never

been afraid to dream, often on a grand scale, and to work hard to make those dreams come true. Some have and some haven't.

They once bought a house in which the entire back was gone, destroyed by a mud slide. They worked to rebuild and restore that house and they probably made a profit on it. They bought a cluster of run-down buildings they lovingly restored to look like old-time country stores with the idea of attracting all sorts of artisans and even a Thai restaurant. It partially materialized and then it didn't.

A few years ago, we were devastated when we learned Val was diagnosed with a degenerative disease. It's taking its toll on her. Then a few weeks ago she wrote that Bill had undergone an operation for cancer. The prognosis is hopeful; only time will tell.

It's easy to wonder why bad things happen to good people and to ask unanswerable questions. But that's not what these people are about.

They celebrate life every day and they pass on their passion to the people they touch. They have the wonderful ability to make others feel special. They are a tribute to a race that so often has no business being called a higher intelligence.

They are good friends, one of life's most precious commodities.

To the Editor:

Congratulations on a magnificent 50th anniversary issue of the Grosse Pointe News. I have shared it with several other former Grosse Pointe residents who live here in California, and we all agree that it brought back many fond memories of our years in the Pointes. As

we get older, and I'm now 74, nostalgia plays an increasingly important part of our lives.

The emotions became so intense as I read of so many events in which I had played a role, to say nothing of the fine article Nancy Parmenter did in tracing the history of my tours, that I have decided to return to Grosse Pointe next spring.

Though I must admit I have enjoyed the climate of Los Angeles, the city itself is becoming a less attractive place in which to live.

What I am looking forward to doing is re-establishing contact with some of the thousands of teens with whom I worked during my 25 years in Grosse Pointe. I chuckle, though, when I realize that the oldest of them are now in their mid-sixties. Still, when I recall all of them, I somehow still think of them as they were then. As a matter of fact, whenever we do get together, we all revert to that "age" as we reminisce about our great projects together, especially the tours.

However, the memory of those years includes more than the tours, the teaching, and the years serving on the board of education. I thoroughly enjoyed the 10 years when I produced the variety shows for the Grosse Pointe

Memorial Church's youth group, the Tuxis Club. Each year as many as 600 teens from the entire community had their first taste of the "stage." One of them, Edward Herrmann, is now a distinguished actor. Bill Carruthers became one of Hollywood's leading TV producers, with shows like "The Dating Game" and "The New-lyweds."

I also enjoyed serving as the MC for the first 10 years of the Celebrity Series of lectures sponsored by the Bon Secours Assistance League. I have been pleased that I also arranged sponsorship (by the Rotary Club) for the first of the American Field Service students. Also to have arranged for the 50th anniversary Michigan Older Boys Conference of HI-Y Clubs, in Grosse Pointe, with GP teens handling all of the details.

Since Grosse Pointe was my first home after leaving the University of Michigan. it has always held a special place in my life. It was there that I worked, not only with the young people of the community, but with their parents. The parents seemed to adopt me, as, after all I was only a relative "kid" myself

when I arrived. For my first year in Grosse Pointe, I had only a bicycle for transportation, as the salary offered teaching interns, a program unique to Grosse Pointe, was only \$70 per month.

Perhaps I experienced something like the old-time rural teachers did, as in one of those early years, when I kept a record, I had 250 dinner invitations in one school year. Food has always been a great interest, and Grosse Pointe mothers loved to have such an enthusiastic dinner guest. When I did tutoring, I refused to take payment, but, instead, stayed for dinner.

Even as I write this, I am getting excited about returning to the place I shall always consider HOME.

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
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Park blues band on the verge

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


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Hamlin's closes after 38 years

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War Memorial seeks rezoning for adjacent house, grounds

War Memorial representatives submitted a rezoning request to the Farms City Council July 16.

The property under consideration is a residential home next door to the north of the facility which was recently purchased by the War Memorial for use as a possible meeting facility, nonprofit cable studio and shortterm guest residence.

The council will make a decision Sept. 10.

In a July 11 letter to the Farms City Council, Jane Kay, chairwoman of the War Memorial Association board of directors, requested that the house at 40 Lakeshore, currently residential, be rezoned to community

service. "For many years, lack of space has been a top priority and an integral part of the association's long-range strategic plan adopted by the board of directors," Kay

said. "In seeking additional space, none were as appropriate as the property next door. The land is contiguous and the existing house is readily adaptable to the needs of our community and the association."

The 15-room house and estimated 50,000 square feet of property was purchased in mid-May by the War Memorial Association from the John C. Uznis Co. for just over \$1 million. Previously owned by former Farms resident John Griffin, the house was built in 1959.

The transaction is the first real estate purchase by the War - 14 PARKING SPACES 21

Memorial and its third acquisition since the Russell Alger house was donated to the War Memorial in 1949 as a gift from the Alger family.

The Fries Auditorium and ballroom, dedicated in 1962, were made possible through a gift from William H. Fries. Furnishings were donated by Walter

B. Ford II. The Center for Arts and Crafts, an addition to the Alger house, was opened in 1977

through gifts from several Grosse Pointers.

The recent purchase was funded in part through money raised during the last capital fund drive. The acquisition enlarges the War Memorial property by about 30 percent.

Kay and War Memorial President Mark Weber said in May that a logical first step would be to further screen the house from adjacent properties through land-

scape barriers.

Weber added that the house will serve as a buffer to the nearby residential area. Use of the house, if the rezoning request is granted, would eliminate some of the wear and tear from the Alger House and help to preserve the structure as a national historic site.

"The War Memorial will readily comply to zoning requirements for community service and will satisfy any fence and landscaping requirement along the property lines," Kay said.

"We would anticipate that all access to the property will be from the existing War Memorial property and the Lakeshore entrance will be fenced and landscaped appropriately," Kay said.

Weber, who said the Alger house at one time was a residence, said the rezoning of that structure 40 years ago has proved to be beneficial to the entire community.

"The War Memorial is one of many organizations that makes the Pointes unique," Weber said. "It has enhanced the quality of master plan. life here for four decades.

"We're not looking so much to pressure on the Alger House, values in the area," Weber said.

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

uncertain. There is good news, though, on the cocaine front, Coonce said. The quantity of drugs reaching U.S. markets has declined, prices are rising and the quality of the drug is reduced, though Coonce isn't sure if the corner on the battle against America's No. 1 drug of choice has been turned or if the downturn is temporary.

make the hiring of new agents

But with the decline in the availability of cocaine, there is an ongoing increase in heroin shipments. Because heroin is a drug that is used intravenously, Coonce is concerned that if heroin becomes popular, then AIDS cases will skyrocket.

He said the drug problem in Detroit isn't any worse or better than in other major cities in the country. One difference in Detroit, Coonce said, is the extreme lack of economic opportunities —

Another problem area involv-

ing drugs is the false economy the drug trade produces. Coonce said that in Miami he saw firsthand how money from drugs feeds the economy in retail and real estate sales.

"It's a very, very false economy," he said of the wealth produced by drugs.

One thing he and the DEA are trying to do, Coonce said, is to convince businesses, bankers and lawyers to report any suspicious transactions. Already, the Internal Revenue Service requires that any transactions of more than \$10,000 cash be reported.

Coonce said many business people think a sale is a sale and it's none of their business where the money comes from. He said he's not telling businesses not to make a sale, but he is asking them to report suspicious activ-

'We really can't do the job with people's help," he said.

The DEA, as well as other law enforcement agencies, is tapping some of the drug dealers' wealth through seizure of cash and assets. Last year the DEA seized \$1 billion in cash and property. and the Detroit office seized \$20 million, mostly in cash. Coonce expects his office to exceed last year's record.

"We're paying for ourselves," he said.

While the DEA uses its resources best by going after the drug kingpins and the cartels, the casual user is being overlooked, Coonce said.

"The casual users are not being held accountable," he said. "They're driving up the supply, the market.'

He said local communities can

effectively tackle the casual user by adopting tough anti-drug poli-

Although he has a niece with the Los Angelos Police Department, Coonce's own children have chosen other careers. His oldest daughter, Leighanne, 21, lives and works in Boston. And his younger daughter, who is a 1989 South graduate, is beginning her sophomore year at her father's alma mater: the University of Arizona.

The oldest of 12 children, Coonce still considers Arizona

"I love it on the east side," he said, "but my heart is in Tuc-

The next model year came a bit early this summer to Ford Motor Co., which has already introduced its 1991 escort.

In fact, it came none too soon because Ford is locked in one of its classic see-saw sales battles with Chevrolet and the Escort is a key factor, since it has been Ford's top seller for several

Ford is still ahead this year in combined new car and truck sales, but it has fallen behind Chevrolet in car sales alone, whereas for the last couple of years it has led in both. Sales of the 1991 Escort have been disappointing enough that Ford is offering incentives on the new car, along with its sister Mercury

Ford has had some trouble best bet yet to invade Japan's building the new Escort and small-car dominion, but there is production lower than had been largely a Mazda design. planned, so inventories have not been climbing and were at 62 days July 1.

But the slow production startup might be the reason that the greatly improved 1991 Escort is not selling as well as its prede-

cessor did a year ago.
In the mid-'70s, Henry Ford II made a prediction which missed the mark by quite a bit, namely that "we will push the imports back to the sea," referring of course to Japanese imports since some Europeans were already thinking of heading for home. This new Escort looks like the

In fact, it is basically a Mazda 323 Protege'. In its three-door GT version, the new Escort looks lot like last year's, but the four-door sedan looks very Mazda-ish, while the station wagon resembles a small Taurus. None of these styling ideas are bad at all.

But if you buy a new Escort, it. will not be for its looks, but for its performance, handling and design. The four-door sedan is a little bigger than last year's Escort, but it has a roominess that belies its subcompact size. Seats are very comfortable, instruments are easy to read.

The base engine is a singleoverhead-cam 1.9-liter eightvalve four-cylinder Ford unit rated at 88 horsepower. The enAutos

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Stallings promises independence in 13th

This is sixth in a series of profiles of candidates squaring off in the Aug. 7 Democratic primary for the 13th Congressional District, which includes Grosse Pointe Park and City.

In his bid for the 13th congressional seat, businessman Henry E. Stallings II said he is looking for independent-minded voters who are looking for a likeminded U.S. representative.

Stallings, 39, is proud of the fact that he is not being backed by unions, entrenched political machines or political action committees. In fact, he said he has refused money from PACs and other groups so that he can maintain his independence.

He bills himself as a candidate who is "unbossed, unbiased and unbought."

Stallings is owner of the One Stop Payment Centers with two locations in Detroit and three more planned. The One Stop Payment Centers take payments for bills, such as utilities and credit cards, make cash advances, operate a Western Union branch, provide cash advances and make money orders. The centers also prepare income tax forms.

He has also worked as an executive with the Xerox Corp. and was a contracted food stamp distributor and a banker.

He has a bachelor's degree in business from Western Michigan University and is a master's degree candidate at D'Etre University. He also attended the Detroit College of Law in 1982 and 1983.

In the public sector, he served in Washington, D.C., as a Congressional Fellow and in Lansing for the Commerce Department as director of all the minority and women-owned businesses in the state.

Stallings said it is time to "usher in a new era of politics," or else politics as usual will continue in this country. He said politicians must be held to a higher standard of integrity, and he supports limits on campaign spending and terms in office,

which will help to prevent abuse of political power, he said.

"We should have learned our lesson with the S and L scandal and the Coleman Young admin-

istration," Stallings said.

He is opposed to the proposed expansion of Detroit City Airport for a number of reasons. He said the benefits of the expansion in jobs and business opportunities have not been determined, and he fears the city will be bogged down in cost overruns and costly lawsuits.

The proposed expansion would also bring in larger planes that would be louder, he said, and the resulting noise nuisance would drive down property values in affected areas. He also objects to the displacement of homes and businesses, adding that the owners would not be able to afford to buy elsewhere.

Stallings' list of key issues facing Detroit and the 13th District in particular include long-term national health care for senior citizens and others on fixed income; childcare benefits for working parents; "restoring, rebuilding and revitalizing" neighborhoods and retail strips; property tax and school aid reform; revision of the federal tax laws; and 'creating minitiatives that

would provide job training, business opportunities, mass transit, housing and crime and drug prevention.

"I will fight to see that the people of my district get their fair share of federal money," he said in a written statement.

Concerning crime, Stallings said if elected to Congress he would introduce a bill that would appropriate more federal money for crime prevention in Detroit.

He is also proposing a "Federal Security Credit/Crime Prevention Bill" that would provide tax credits for home and business owners who install security devices, such as alarms, motion detectors, bulletproof glass and cameras. He said the security devices would not only reduce crime but would lower insurance rates

Stallings' national health care plan for those on fixed incomes would include prescription drugs and hospice and nursing home care.

Unemployment among Detroit's youth is a serious problem, he said, and he supports public programs that would "train people for jobs with substance." He also suggests that college tuition credits be given to high school students who have above-average grades.

Stallings is the first 13th District congressional candidate interviewed by the Grosse Pointe News this year who is calling for a mass transit system for metropolitan Detroit.

"The auto industry has some of the highest paid executives in the world," he said. "Mass transit won't affect the auto industry. People will still drive cars."

He pointed out that most of the jobs today are in the suburbs, and mass transportation is needed to get the unemployed in Detroit out to where the jobs are.

Stallings is a strong supporter of expanding human rights and affirmative action programs across the country. He said human rights and affirmative action are facing more serious problems than ever before.

"We must ensure that minorities do not lose the gains made in the last 20 years in the struggle for civil rights," he said. "Until America deals with the inequities to the homeless, disadvantaged and minorities, we'll continue to have a very serious problem."

Also unique to his candidacy, Stallings is proposing that a major shopping center be built downtown. He pointed out that the shopping malls have replaced the traditional downtown district, but a mall downtown would attract the shopping that once was a tradition in Detroit.

He said every major urban center in the country has a major shopping center downtown—except Detroit. And the same thing goes for mass transportation, he said.

Stallings said he is a candidate with "integrity, respect and reliability." He said he would represent all the people and work with Republicans and Democrats alike.

"Even though it's a partisan race," he said, "you have to represent all the people in a nonpartisan way."

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
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
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Vernier School alumni plan all-class reunion

Obeid said, "We all have such a warm feeling about that school. It was so small we knew everyone.


She recalled when the school had a birthday party for her brother and her father treated everyone in the school with ice cream.

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

Because automobiles emit damaging gasses, blamed in part for the depletion of the Earth's ozone layer, gasoline manufacturers across the United States are being urged by the federal government to clean up their

One such company, Marathon, has developed a cleaner burning fuel. Amaraclean, designed also to reduce engine wear in the pro-

But how does Amaraclean differ from the typical gasolines available at most service stations?

marketing for the Marathon Petroleum Co. headquartered in Findlay, Ohio, said that Marathon has reformulated its gasofewer hydrocarbons and 14 percent less carbon monoxide without reduction in vehicle performance.

The formula has added oxygenates - compounds which include oxygen molecules in their chemical compostions.

Oxygenates, when added to gasoline, tend to make the airfuel mixture leaner, resulting in more complete combustion - especially in older vehicles with less sophisticated emission con-Dick White, vice president of trol systems, White said.



Not so, White said. Though line so that it emits 20 percent oxygenates are added, there is no reduction in the octane number or anti-knock properties of the fuel.

Marathon's effort toward cleaner gas, tailored to the Midwest geographical area, is not the only effort of this kind in the country, however. Other oil refiners have introduced their own cleaner gasolines.

One company developed a gasoline to replace leaded regular gasolines exclusively for southern California. Two other companies have developed reformulated unleaded gasolines for high altitude use only in the Denver

Marathon's pilot program is limited to this area. According to White, Detroit was selected because auto emissions here exceed federal standards and because the Melvindale plant was relatively close to Marathon's headquarters and was easily converted to produce the new gasoline.

If the program is successful in this area, the company may expand to other areas, depending on governmental action and Marathon's presence in other

Currently, White said, 161 Marathon stations in southeast Michigan feature Ameraclean, including Phil Zoufal's Village Service at Cadieux and Kercheval and other Marathon stations in the Grosse Pointe area.

According to Zoufal, reaction to the new product has been fa-

"I couldn't believe the reaction to it." Zoufal said. "I've been here 21 years and I've never seen anything like it. There are a lot of new faces coming in.'


Zoufal added that many of his customers read about the product in local media sources and come in to try it.

"Marathon didn't patent Amaraclean because they want other companies to copy the formula," Zoufal said. "Hopefully all the other companies will begin making the gas which burns more completely and without gimmicky additives like alcohol that cause wear on an engine.'

White said that gasoline formulas have been changed over the years to respond to changes in automobile and refining technology.

"For example, lead has been removed, detergents added, and recently the EPA has lowered gasoline volatility during the summer months," White said.

The ozone problems have proved to be far more challenging than most people anticipated. Clearly, additional measures will be needed, he said.

family is afraid she'll starve to death if they refuse to feed her.

According to a wildlife specialist with the Michigan Humane Society, the problem with Peepers is that she's never been taught to be afraid of people. Peepers looks to humans as her source of food, and until she's taught otherwise, she will depend on people instead of fending for herself.

The specialist said the society never touches the birds it is trying to rehabilitate, and the birds are never fed from human

She suggested the Park family build a flight cage at the rear of back yard. The cage must be big enough so Peepers can fly around. She should be then given worms and bugs only, because robins are meat eaters. The food must be left and not associated with humans. Eventually, Peepers will learn to search for worms and bugs on her own.

If the human adoptive family continues to feed Peepers, she will not return to the wild on her own. She will always depend on people. If the adoptive family refuses to feed her, she will bother other people. If the family simply locks the bird outside, she will fly into the glass windows until she hurts herself.

So now the adoptive family has to begin the rehabilitation process. The humane society specialist said that how long the process takes depends on how attached the bird is to people and, more importantly, how rigidly the human parents stick to the rehabilitation process.

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


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Donating food: It's not as easy as pie

When you leave a restaurant, do you ever wonder what happened to the freshly-baked dinner rolls that nobody ate? Do you wonder what supermarkets do with milk that languishes on the shelf beyond its expiration date? Or who gets the dozen apples that were rejected by customers because they're smashed or soft? Or what a private club does with the leftovers from its Sunday brunch?

The plight of the homeless and hungry — much in the news these days - has raised some sticky problems about food donations. Although people may have admirable motivations ("Let's donate this wonderful food to people who are hungry") the actual donation process is strewn with legal and practical stumbling blocks.

Father Lloyd Thiel of the Capuchin Community Center Soup Kitchen, one of the largest organizations of its type on the east side, said the donation process is complicated by health

"It's more difficult than we'd like it to be. We actually have to throw away some donated food," Thiel said.

The Soup Kitchen is extremely careful about spoiled food, he said. "We have a restaurant license and the health department comes on a regular basis.'

Thiel said that donations of prepared food are infrequent. Most of it is bread. "We pick up

dinner rolls from the Westin regularly. We often get food from the Roostertail's parties and banquets, like, for instance, when they prepare food for 500 and only 200 show up. We also pick up food regularly from Eastern Market, Danny's Fruit Market in St. Clair Shores, Buddy's Pizza and Pace."

Darrell Finken, co-owner of Sparky Herbert's, said the restaurant rarely has leftover prepared food. "We plan carefully and order carefully," he said. Some items, such as leftover bread, can be ground into bread crumbs. Sometimes leftover items that were not served at brunch are given away during happy hours.

"On occasions, after off-premises catered parties, when the client declines to keep the food, we have donated it to the Capuchin Soup Kitchen," Finken

Chris Hessler, executive chef at Lochmoor Club, said that surplus food is given to employees. "For each five-hour shift, employees get a meal. If we have a large banquet, like a game dinner, and we end up with a lot of leftover food, we may give it to a soup kitchen.'

Hessler estimated that 10 to 15 percent of Lochmoor's diners take home leftovers in doggie

Van Karibian, manager of the Village Food Market, said that many of the store's perishable

items are dated. "When it gets close to that date," he said, "we pull them off the shelves, call the supplier, and we get credit. We have a tight inventory. A few customers come in for trim. mings, like wilted lettuce leaves for their guinea pigs. We give this away. If necessary, we throw food away."

Vivian Day, public relations director for ONE23, said that all their dishes are made fresh after the customer orders. "Our sauces, for instance, are prepared from scratch at the time they're ordered.

"We buy very carefully. We get deliveries of fresh produce daily and fish five times a week. The purveyors phone the chef every morning for his order.

"Some evenings we might run out of a certain fish at 10 p.m. If anything, we buy a tad under what we need. We don't often have anything left over, but occasionally we'll have two pieces of cake, or a muffin, or some pastries. Some bread can be used for croutons, or we put it in the emplovee area. Our employees get a family-style meal as part of their benefits during each shift."

Day guessed that about 10 percent of ONE23's guests take doggie bags home.

A state bill and a federal bill are pending concerning donations of food to charitable organizations.

Phil Kirkwood, deputy chief of the division of environmental health, Michigan Department of

Health, said that the existing state law, passed in 1982, provides immunity to those who donate food to charities. In other words, restaurateurs, grocers, wholesalers, even private citizens are somewhat protected from legal action if someone claims an illness was caused by donated food.

An amendment to a new state law which will not go into effect until July 1, 1993, will further refine the law to say donors must by licensed, law-abiding organizations and that the food must be donated in good faith and that reasonable standards of health and sanitation must be exercised.

The Good Samaritan Food Donation Act is currently tied up in four committees, according to a spokesman in Sen. Carl Levin's office. A rider on this bill has already been approved by the Senate, providing not only immunity to organizations who donate surplus food, but also allowing the organization to claim a tax credit for the value of the donations.

"People in the food industry are anxious to be Good Samaritans," said Grosse Pointer Ed Deeb, president of the Michigan Food and Beverage Association and chairman of the Eastern Market Merchants Association, "but stumbling blocks and red tape and fear of lawsuits often prevent them from donating use-

items are dated, but may have a shelf-life beyond the date. "Under good conditions of refrigeration, milk, for instance, may be good for two weeks beyond the date on the carton." Retailers may not want to sell milk beyond the stamped date, but they may wish to donate it to a char-


Lettuce, while it may not have the high visual quality that people want, may be still useable, Deeb said. Slightly wilted or yellow lettuce can be used in sal-


"Many restaurateurs are not fully aware of the laws that assist them," said Deeb. "I suspect that many restaurants donate food privately and anonymous-

Thiel said that families often shop together specifically for canned food to donate to the Capuchin Soup Kitchen.

The Soup Kitchen is able to purchase items in large quanities, often at a discount, he said, "but it's often valuable for a family to shop for the donations together. The donations become more personal and it provides us with a connection to the donors.'

In a sense, he said, the Soup Kitchen can use cash donations more efficiently. But he emphasized that the value of the personal touch is not to be taken lightly.

HAVE A PLEASANT TRY AT PERFECTION **BRIDGE BY WOODY BOYD** THE PASTEBOARD PASTIME

In 1959, the DeSoto Division of The Chrysler Corporation, sponsors of the ever popular Groucho Marx's Show, "You Bet Your Life," engineered a second TV coup. They underwrote the first TV coverage of a duplicate bridge tournament. It was the final sixteen boards of the ninth Bermuda Bowl played in Manhattan and transmitted by cable from New York to Detroit and Chicago. The famous Italian Blue Team, defending their third consecutive world title was pitted against a formidable United States team captained by the fun loving and legendary Harry Fishbein. That team was comprised of some great players of that period; Sam Fry, Jr., Leonard Harmon, Lee Hazen, Sidney Lazard, Ivar Stakgold and non playing captain, Charles Solomon.

Putting together a three city network for such a special event in those days had its ludicrous instances, but the exercise became an interesting endeavor. It required a couple of Manhattan escapades to make the arrangements. I can remember the Gen. Mgr. of WOR-TV, the originating station when I approached him with DeSoto's clever notion. "Bridge! What's that? Will anybody watch?" Of course we were unable to get the cable until 11 p.m. on Sunday night so you can see it wasn't a prime time spectacular. Of course the Italians beat us badly, but the participants were enthusiastic and it was a memorable event.

My first meeting with the famous Mr. Fishbein I shall always remember. I arrived at his popular Mayfair Bridge Club at 6 p.m. one evening and never left him until 3 a.m. the next morning after his before bedtime breakfast. That was Fishy's way. I wanted to talk about DeSoto and TV and he wanted to talk bridge and his club which was one of the great card playing spots in North America. If it weren't for Eddie Pinner, Harry's partner and a superb player in his own right I doubt whether anything would have been accomplished on that


Harry Fishbein, author of his own popular convention was an outstanding player who wore a beret, even on TV as his distinctive trademark. Few of the great players of this country were better liked. He had an imaginary and very amusing personality that mixed well with everyone. Bridge and his club were Harry's life and he made a host of lifelong friends from it. He was one of the few great duplicate players who succeeded at stake play, but in that game you take your chance on the partner you draw and Fishy got a few of that dubious type too.

Today's hand comes from Leonard Harmon's file on Harry and shows what an expert can expect when he draws a performer whose overbids are usually mortal in spite of his partner's perfect play. The hand is also unusual as we rarely see an opponent bidding openers suit three times with the intent of describing his cards correctly.

South first cue bid was marginal at best, but Harry accepted it as game force. His second Que bid conveyed slam intentions and was a wee bit unhandy because of the shady spade suit. Harry knew his future may be in danger as his partner was known to be extravagant, but the five card trump suit and extra king convinced him to buckle his seat belt and fly. Six hearts by south was supposed to show two aces and a usable void. East's double because of the expected trump tenace was intended to inflict mortal damage. When Fishy saw the



dummy he was expressionless, but it was worse than he had expected. Obviously there was a trump stack, but prosperity was possible if the diamonds and clubs behaved favorably. Here's how he did it! Trick #1 Ruffed heart king in dummy. 2; He let dummys spade six run when west played the five. 3; West played the ace on trump continuation. 4; West exited with a heart which dummy ruffed. 5,6,7; Dummy's ace king of clubs and a club ruff. West's best play is to pitch a diamond. 8,9; Declarer plays king, ace of diamonds ending in dummy. 10; Declarer plays a club from dummy and west suffers a coup de grace.



Of course this was all in a pleasant day's play for the legendary Mr. Fishbein who the bridge world will always fondly remember.

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Detroit Science Center will take fundraising 'To the Max'

The Detroit Science Center is embarking on a \$200,000 renovation of its 12-year-old Omnimax Theater.

"After serving 2.5 million visitors, many of them children, it's obvious the Omnimax Theater needs a facelift," said Jerry Porter, executive director of the Detroit Science Center. "Twelve years of constant, heavy use have been hard on the theater in general and on the seats in particular.'

The project includes replacing 240 specially constructed highback chairs, cleaning the giant domed screen and recarpeting the floor.

Funding for the renovation will come from a variety of sources. Science Center officials hope that half of the budget will come from an Omnimax Chair Sponsorship Campaign, of which Grosse Pointers Cynthia and Edsel Ford II are serving as honorary chairmen.

The Pastor's Corner Conspiracy theories

You can further your education in the strangest places. Recently, I furthered mine while leafing through a book display in a souvenir shop. I expected to find vacation guides, mystery stories and romantic novels.

But the entire rack of books dealt with the allegedly nefarious activities of the Trilateral Commission, and in particular, a complicated criminal conspiracy involving Henry Kissinger, the Rockefellers and world Communism.

It seems that the super-rich and the Reds have joined forces, and the books I paged through expounded the evidence for this evil conspiracy and revealed its Plans To Take Over The World.

Each book ended in about the same way, with a chapter warning the reader to wake up before it's too late. Also, there was an order blank for obtaining more books about this great conspiracy.

I had never realized before that the super-rich and the Communists were in it together. I left the souvenir shop a wiser man. (What a fool I had been, wasting my time looking for a vacation guide when the world was teetering on the edge of ... something terrible!)

This sobering experience got me to thinking about conspiracy. Remember the general dissatisfaction with the Warren Commission report and all of the theories on the assassination of President Kennedy?

Some of these theories were hard to follow, involving as they did, such diverse elements as the Mafia, Fidel Castro and the CIA. But they were interesting - much more interesting than the conclusion of the Warren Commission that Lee Harvey Oswald had acted alone.

I suppose that part of the attraction of conspiracy theories lies in their very complexity. If the theory can weave together diverse and even seemingly opposite elements, it will be all the more interesting.


This process could be an amusing game. Select no fewer than three world powers and/or personalities, and invent an explanation of how they are working secretly to achieve some common goal.

For example, could it be true that Gorbachev, the CIA and the Swiss government are conspiring to gain control over world chocolate prices?

Conspiracy theories have a darker side. When taken seriously, they can produce a feeling of powerlessness and fear. If powerful forces much bigger than ourselves are uniting against us, where can we turn?

Fear keeps us off balance and makes us desperate. Here is what the Word of God says: "You are not to say,

A newspaper response to an etiquette question regarding the proper manner for addressing an older hospital patient has highlighted an attitude that has become irksome to senior citizens. It has to do with the condescending manner in which older patients are addressed by young staff members.

The question was whether it is proper for physicians and nurses to call an older person by his or her first name.

The writer was incensed because every morning the resident physician would come by and say, "How are you today, Mary?

"Is there no respect left in the world for one's elders?" she wrote.

She said the doctor was young enough to be her grandson and that she resented him calling her by her first name. She pointed out that she wouldn't dream of calling him "Jim." He was Dr. Smith to her. (Both names are fictitious)

The writer said that when she was growing up, one didn't call someone by his or her first name until invited to do so or until a friendship developed.

An expert agreed that her view was not old-fashioned and that she merited being called Mrs. as a badge of respect.

Not long ago a feisty older citizen complained about the same condescending manner. She objected to being treated like a

young child. She wrote in no uncertain terms that she was perfectly capable of directing her own life and communicating with adults as an adult. She particularly objected to being talked down to and cited an instance where clerks and hospital personnel had used baby talk to

"Old ladies are not old babies," she declared.

There is another issue, however. There are older people who are long-term patients in hosptials and nursing homes who complain of being neglected and would welcome any kind of attention whether it be out of context with the expected plane of adult communication or not. In other words, they wouldn't care whether they were called by their first name or sweet-talked in nursery terms just as long as someone recognized their existence by giving them personal attention.

Good medical care, nourishing ues and attitudes held by nurses

food and a clean bed are necessities, they agree, but they also feel that a bit of conversation, a smile and a hug are the extras that make the difference between being a bed number and feeling worthwhile.

Experts concur. They also feel these extras make a sick person want to get well, a troublesome patient less demanding and those patients who see no reason to keep up personal appearances recognize the therapeutic value of looking as good as possible.

Attitudes toward older patients are of increasing importance to those in the field of gerontology.

The findings in a recent article of nurses' attitudes toward older patients highlighted some concerns. The question raised was whether their attitudes are influenced by the age of the nurse, education and percentage of time spent with elderly clients. It was felt that the val-

ledge and humanistic care that is delivered to older patients.

The type of facility where they worked was also a major factor in attitude. For instance, the study showed that the differences in the degree of favorable attitudes toward the aged among registered nurses varied. Hospitals, nursing homes and health agencies were considered.

Nurses employed in nursing homes have a less favorable attitude toward older patients than those who worked in other settings and nurses employed by visiting nurse associations had more favorable attitudes than nurses employed in private home health agencies. It was conjectured that a nurse in a private home health agency chose to work in that setting because of monetary benefits rather than because of motivation to work with elderly clients.

Regarding nurses who worked in nursing homes, it was concluded that they often work under what is termed "burden of care," such as inadequate staff, low salary and poor fringe benefits. They are confronted daily by challenges of caring for a number of elderly clients who have multiple physical and emotional problems.

Subsequently, they come to view their patients as more dependent and may actually foster dependence rather than rehabilitation. This is essentially what

Garden clubs and flower shows are not new; first club was founded in 1785

Did you know that Grosse Pointe has more garden clubs than any other community in the country except Stamford, Conn.? Or that garden clubs in general are not a new idea?

As a matter of fact, the first organization of that kind to be formed in the United States was the Philadelphia Society for Promoting Agriculture. It was founded in 1785, the same year that the South Carolina Society for Promoting and Improving Agriculture and Other Rural Concerns was begun. One wonders if it was called SCSPIARC for short, or what the present members of this venerable society call it now. In 1792, New York founded its Society for the Promotion of Agriculture, Arts and Manufacturers. By 1818 the New York Horticulture Society was a going concern; in 1827 the Pennsylvania Horticultural Society joined the fold; and 1829 marked the founding of the Massachusetts Horticultural Society, which still flourishes. In 1828 the Domestic Horticultural Society was a popular group in Geneva, N.Y., and soon other groups in New York state followed.

These early organizations were largely devoted to farming, rather than domestic gardening, since gardening was regarded as "the elegant branch of husbandry." It was not until the early years of the 19th century that ladies' garden clubs in their present form became an established thing. Later, garden clubs were established for men whose hobbies included rose growing or collecting exotic plants.

A natural outgrowth of the proliferating garden clubs of the early 19th century was the flower show. It was customary for members of these early garden clubs to bring examples of their horticultural skill to the monthly meetings. Competition naturally developed. The first American public exhibition was held in June 1829 in Philadelphia at Masonic Hall. By 1832, it had become an annual affair. Boston's exhibitions began as private showings for members only, but soon expanded and became public events.

The Garden Club of America was founded in 1913 in Philadelphia and was really the culmination of a tremendous vogue for organizing garden clubs that had sprung up all across the country at the end of the 19th century. Interest in gardening leaped social barriers and became an almost universal feminine diver-

At about this time, too, the Federated Garden Clubs came into being. Being a member of a garden club is by now almost an automatic part of the essential social equipment of many women. And garden clubs have made a tremendous difference in civic beautification and in horticultural education over the years all across the country.

The Grosse Pointe Garden Center, located in the Grosse Pointe War Memorial, is the headquarters for a large number of local garden clubs and is dedicated to the furthering of garden-oriented education in the area. It supports scholarships on a laternate years in the graduate school at the University of Michigan and Michigan State University in horticulture and landscape architecture. It also conducts workshops, supports a Bonsai group, presents annual lectures and programs, and has an extensive library of garden reference books which are available to the community

The Council of Grosse Pointe Garden Clubs is also a large and important group of local clubs whose purpose is primarily civic beautification and whose efforts have made a tremendous difference in the planting of trees and shrubs and flowers which add so much to the appearance of Grosse Pointe streets and public buildings.

The Grosse Pointe Shade Tree Council is another dedicated group that has done much to create and maintain our tree-embellished streets and parks to foster the leaf-shaded beauty of our many neighborhoods.

The Detroit Garden Center, located in the historic Moross House on Jefferson Avenue near downtown, has recreated the original garden of this charming house. It also has an impressive reference library, and sponsors classes, lectures and programs on garden subjects for all ages.

And garden clubs everywhere, during this busiest season of the gardening year, already are planning informative programs and field trips for the year ahead. The garden-dormant days of winter are times for classes, meetings, and informative programs of all kinds to further the horticultural education of garden club members. What a long way we have all come since 1785.

Committee members at the Grosse Pointe Garden Center are deep in arrangements during these hot summer days for the 36th annual Tour of Homes which will be a feature in mid-October. This tour, which has become a Grosse Pointe classic over the years, is the source of funds to support scholarships, bring lecturers and teachers from far places, and maintain the beautiful Trial Gardens on the lake side of the Grosse Pointe War Memorial.

For the third straight year, the Bayview Yacht Club's Mackinac race — its 66th — has been delayed by the absence of winds.

Two hundred and fifty-six boats entered the race, and as of Monday at 3 p.m., only 50 of those boats had docked.

The Coast Guard was predicting that most of the fleet would not be in until noon Tuesday, July 24, because winds were hovering around only 4 knots. As of 8 a.m. Tuesday, 114 boats had yet to finish.

Under normal conditions, the largest boats should have reached Mackinac Island early Monday. In last year's race most boats didn't finish until Tuesday and some straggled in Wednesday afternoon while the annual bash took place on the grounds outside Mission Pointe Resort.

Stripes, skippered by Bill Martin of Ann Arbor and a Bayview




in its division with a corrected time of 48:17:07, after crossing third. Pied Piper was the first boat to finish last year's race and eventually took the overall honors.

Pied Piper, Stripes and Sassy compete under the International Offshore Rule (IOR). Stripes and Pied Piper are light-weight maxi boats, and Sassy, which set the course record of 32 hours, 13 minutes and 43 seconds in 1984, is a maxisloop.

Fujimo, skippered by Bayview's Jerry Schostake, and Nitissima, skippered by Bayview's George Uznis finished third and fourth in IOR A in corrected times of 47:37:24 and 48:03:35, respectively.

"There's great satisfaction in finishing first because we've sailed six races (Mackinac, including Chicago) with Pied Piper up to this time and she's beaten us every time," said Stripes skip. per Martin. "Now it's our turn.

"We just got lucky, but she (Pied Piper) got lucky last year. Sassy was up an hour on us at one point, but hit some dead air and sat. We dueled with Piper and we tacked to the high side and Piper tacked the other way. At that point we weren't concerning ourselves with Sassy because if she gets her breeze she's gone. If we get light, flukey air and Mackinac. we'll beat her. It all depended on who got the right air conditions

in the race."

On Saturday, July 21, the boats started the race with winds at their noses, but early Monday morning most of them were turned into aluminum bobbers because of the 1-3 knot winds.

As of 11 a.m. Monday, 207 boats had rounded Cove Island, the halfway mark in the 259nautical mile race and were still anywhere from 80 to 119 miles out of Mackinac. To add to the dismal conditions, Mackinac Island reported some rain Monday morning, but the island became sun-soaked in the early after-

In the International Measurement System's (IMS) Division A, the newest boats, J-44's, highlighted the race. Ken Meade's Renegade and T.K. Lowrey's Tomahawk, dueled at the start, but both jumped the gun and had to start over, losing about 10 minutes in the race.

Renegade, which most couldn't find on Lake Huron during the day Sunday, rounded Cove Island about 10:15 Sunday night. Bill Alcott's Equation, Clune Walsh's Lunatic and Fred Somes' New Zealand built 63footer were the other IMS A boats spotted early Monday morning between Cove Island

All boats have since finished. Renegade and Tomahawk have unofficially finished in times of 61:07:28 and 58:37:39.

Llwyd Ecclestone's Kodiak is the apparent overall winner in the IMS category with a corrected time of 51:54:50. Ecclestone, out of North Palm Beach, Fla., is a member of Bayview. Ed Grant's (GPYC) American Eagle and Eugene Mondry's (BYC) Leading Edge were the other IOR A boats to cross.


Leading Edge finished sixth overall (48:15:40), and American Eagle was eighth overall in a corrected time of 48:34:41.

Regardless, sailing in the PHRF K division and skippered by Bayview's Daniel Padilla, and TNT (PHRF D) were two boats that dropped from the race.



The finger of blame should also be pointed at the partiers. You people who discard your bottles and urine in the river or on the ground are scarring this race. You're laying a black eye


on the largest fresh water boat race in the land by your ignorant acts and careless ways.


