Park police catch cat burglar suspected in 35 break-ins

Park police caught and charged a career cat burglar last week who is thought to have committed some 35 break-ins during the last few months in the Pointes.

Floyd Harris Jr., 39, of Highland Park was arraigned July 26 on charges of burglary and car theft following his arrest at about 4:40 a.m. the same day. Park Municipal Judge Kirsten Frank set bond at \$100,000 cash, and Harris is sitting in Wayne County Jail.

Harris, who is well known to the Park and other local police departments and has been arrested several times here, is believed to be responsible for a rash of burglaries in all the Pointes except the Shores since April

Police suspect Harris in the many burglaries because they closely match Harris' method of operating — or $\dot{M}O$.

Park detective Lt. David Hiller said Harris always wore gloves; committed the burglaries at night; looked for open doors or windows; entered occupied homes; stole un-

usual items, such as stained glass, antiques and furniture; and if the keys to the burglary victim's car were available, he would load the stolen goods in the vehicle and

Hiller said that Park officers began suspecting Harris when the MOs were similar to Harris' past burglaries.

Harris has been in and out of prison many times, and he has been out on parole for less than six months. He was serving time for theft-related charges.


Hiller said Deputy Director William Fur-

taw recalled Harris' MO from earlier investigations of Harris in 1978 and 1984. When the stolen cars from the burglaries were found abandoned in the Highland Park area near where Harris lives with his girlfriend, Park police's suspicions that Harris was their man strengthened.

To catch Harris, they needed to wait for another burglary and be ready.

Patrol officers volunteered to set up watches in the areas that were expected to



WCCC seeks 1 mill tax; will hold classes at South

ginning of classes in the Pointes comes at a time when the beleaguered two-year college is seeking 1 mill (\$1 per \$1,000 state equalized value) to make up for a special state subsidy that the Legislature is no longer willing Since 1966, school officials

have been trying to get county voters to approve a tax for the community college, but all requests have been rejected. WCCC is the only community college in the state not supported by a voter-approved tax.

"I certainly know it's going to be a hard thing for people to approve this," said Jacobs, who is a professor of economics at Macomb Community College and is currently on loan to the Industrial Technology Institute in Ann Arbor. "We are certainly aware the image of WCCC isn't what it should be in this community, and we want to rectify

To improve the college's reputation, Jacobs said the school is seeking to provide courses that are in demand, letting the market decide the curriculum. The college is also working closely with business and industry to provide the courses and training they want.

But before the school can progress and improve quality, it needs funding.

Currently, county taxpayers in the WCCC district pay a .25 mill tax to support the school's operating expenses. Plus, county residents pay an additional fraction of a mill to pay for bond debt that the county incurred in 1978.

Last year, the debt service cost property owners .74 mills for a total WCCC tax of .99 mills. In 1990, the debt will cost .55 mills, according to the county Department of equalization. If the 1mill operating mill is approved by voters, then the total tax rate for the college in 1990 including

debt service will be 1.55 mills. The one-quarter operating mill was enacted by the Legislature in 1971 after voters rejected a community college tax three

times. In 1966 voters approved a community college district but rejected a 1.25 mill property tax to support the district, which was then not organized. In 1967, the Legislature created the WCCC district without voter approval. In 1968, voters rejected a 2.5 mill tax request, and again in 1970 voters turned down a 1mill request.

Also, because the one-quarter mill falls short of supporting the school, the state provides extra funding to WCCC in addition to the state aid it grants all community colleges under a complex formula based on the assumption that the community colleges are supported by a minimum 1-mill tax locally.

Because WCCC is supported by only a .25-mill tax, the state kicks in another \$10 million, which is roughly the equivalent to the amount of money a .75 mill additional tax would create.

Through the community college formula, the state granted \$12.3 million to WCCC in 1989. 90 school aid. In addition, WCCC received the \$10 million

to make up for the tax dollars the college would have received locally had a full 1-mill tax been approved for the college.

The state Legislature, however, has adopted a 1990-91 appropriations bill that is intended to phase out the special \$10 million subsidy for WCCC. Thus, WCCC officials are going to voters to get a 1-mill tax approved to make up for the future elimination of the subsidy.

A 1-mill community college property tax would raise nearly \$16 million. Currently, the .25 mill tax raises about \$4 million. If the 1-mill tax is approved, the \$10 million subsidy will be immediately discontinued. The .25 mill state-mandated tax would also be eliminated.

The loss of the special state subsidy and the .25 mill mandated tax would cost the college \$14 million. The 1-mill tax, if approved by voters, would give the college about \$2 million more in local funding. WCCC would continue to get its school aid according to formula, as would all other state community

WCCC's total budget under an approved 1-mill local property tax would be \$38.8 million.

The 1-mill tax would cost voters three times what they now pay in community college operating taxes. Based on an average home selling price of \$188,466 in the Pointes in 1989, the averaged assessed value is \$94,233. A 1-mill tax then would cost the average homeowner \$94.23, up from \$23.56 now paid under the mandated 25-mill tax.

But added to the 1-mill tax would be a .55-mill debt service tax for the collge, bringing the total WCCC tax bill in 1990 by the average Pointes homeowner to \$146.06.







Farms preservation committee completes three-year study

Staff Writer One after another, stately old Grosse Pointe mansions have met with the wrecking ball to make way for multiple home developments.

Now, if members of the Grosse Pointe Farms Historical Preservation Study Committee get their way, the practice may be slowed or even halted in an effort to save several historically significant structures.

The committee, formed in July 1987 and charged with studying the viability of a protective ordinance, has just released a final report outlining the committee's recommendations.

The bottom line: The committee believes that a historical preservation ordinance would be premature at this time.

The recommendation follows an exhaustive architectural survev of more than 1,100 structures in the Farms which were cataloged and photographed for both historic and architectural significance.

Tish Colett, a member of the preservation committee and the Grosse Pointe Historical Society, said although the committee's

report does not recommend legislation on the local level, all of the seven members agreed that Farms residents would be well served by a public education ef-

The effort would be aimed at increasing awareness of the sensitivity of irreplaceable historical architectural resources within the Farms.

Receiving a thumbs-up from the Farms City Council at its July 16 meeting, the committee recommended the following:

· Coordinating with the local school board to commit a specific portion of the library to materials dealing with the history of the Grosse Pointes.

• Placing copies of the recently completed architectural survey of Grosse Pointe Farms in the library for circulation to all interested persons.

• Requesting that the Grosse Pointe board of education establish a budget for the development and acquisition of materials dealing with local history.

 Informing the owners of historically and architecturally significant structures of the importance of their homes or buildings. This could be done

through a form letter sent to the appropriate people.


 Requesting that the Grosse Pointe Historical Society and other civic groups work with the school board to develop a program for inclusion into the school district's teaching curricu-

Colett said the committee's report recommends the placement of several structures onto the National Historic Register.


On the list is the Farms Waterworks Pumping Station on Moross near Lakeshore, the adjacent Highland Park Pumping Station and the Department of Public Works sewer and filtration plant at Kerby and Chalfonte.

Colett said placement onto the National Historic Register does not hinder the owner of a municipal building, institution or home from making changes as in the case of a Michigan Historic Site.





tion arguing that a structure should be saved from the wreck-

ing ball. 'Nomination onto the National Historic Register is a great honor and it may help us to protect a home later on," Colett said.

"If the Farms ever gets a preservation ordinance, then a home or building could be deemed historically significant," Colett said.

"Many homes in this area have been destroyed and the property subdivided to make way for several smaller homes. Rose Terrace was a real heartbreaker.'

The Historic Preservation Committee also recommended in its report that the Farms council urge the school district to nominate Richard Elementary School and South High School for inclu-

sion onto the National Historic Register.

The report urges that several churches be nominated as well. They are St. Paul Catholic Church and St. Paul School, Christ Church Grosse Pointe and Grosse Pointe Memorial Church.

Colett said there are several neighborhoods in the Farms which are historically and architecturally significant.

Since the owners of the structures must nominate them for inclusion onto the National Historic Register, the report urges

the council to contact homeowners and set the program in mo-


The council accepted all of the recommendations outlined in the report and the Preservation Committee plans to meet in September to discuss the specifics of the plan.

"Historically and architecturally, we can't afford to lose any more of these important community gems," Colett said. "But until the tide turns, we will be doing what we can.'



2 Park residents vie for GOP spot

Two Grosse Pointe Park residents face each other in the Republican primary for a chance to challenge state Sen. John Kelly in the November general election.

In the Aug. 7 Republican primary, voters will choose between Phillip G. Tannian and Art Williams for the 1st State Senate District. Incumbent Kelly is unopposed in the Democratic primary.

Phillip G. Tannian

Though Tannian, 55, has spent much of his life working for Democratic administrations in Detroit, he said he has been involved in GOP politics for some 15 years.

In the Navy he reached the rank of lieutenant junior grade. He graduated from the University of Notre Dame with a degree in accounting and earned a law degree from the Detroit College of Law.

After college, he worked for more than five years as a special agent for the FBI. He then served a couple of years as a Wayne County assistant prosecutor. Under former Detroit Mayor Roman Gribbs, with whom he became friends, Tannian served as deputy controller and chief of the mayor's staff. He was named police commissioner and served in that capacity some four years into the Young administration.

Tannian now has his own law firm.

As a state senator, he wants to see less money given to the city of Detroit, especially for regional concerns such as transportation, water and sewage and cultural institutions.

He said it's wasteful for the city of Detroit to operate its own mass transportation system and the suburbs to have their own system. Likewise, the water and sewer department serves half the population of Michigan — from near the Ohio border to Port Huron — and yet Detroit controls it. Tannian doesn't think Detroit should have all the power over regional concerns.

When he was a city employee, Tannian helped set up the now controversial utility tax that was recently restored by the Legislature.

Now, however, Tannian is an outspoken opponent of the tax. He criticizes Kelly for failing to eliminate the "regressive utilty tax," and he believes Mayor Coleman Young blackmailed lawmakers by threatening to lay off police officers if the tax was not reinstated.



He said the state Constitution subjects taxes to the vote of the people, but the utility tax was never put on a ballot.

Though Detroit City Airport is not in the 1st Senate District, Tannian said he is opposed to the proposed expansion of the airport, partly because of the large number of businesses and homes it would displace. "That makes no economic sense," he said.

Concerning reapportionment — the redrawing of congressional boundaries following the expected loss of up to two Michigan representatives following the 1990 census — Tannian said he would like all the Pointes to be in one district. Currently, the Park and City are in the 13th District and the other Pointes are in the 14th District.


Tannian feels he can get Republican support from the black community that makes up most of the Senate district. He said he has been meeting with groups in Detroit and has been urging that they have the same opportunities and advantages as those outside the city.

He said the one word he wants voters to remember concerning his candidacy is "change."

One change he would like to be part of is recapturing a Republican majority in the Senate.

Another change he would like to see is reduced taxes for businesses and individuals and Michigan laws made more practical. Detroit and Michigan are hard on business, he said, causing many jobs to go to other states.

Williams, 64, is known in the Park and the Pointes for his ongoing efforts to block the proposed expansion of city airport.

During his unsuccessful run for Park City Council last November, Williams said he began opposing the airport expansion before anyone knew enough to be concerned about it. He was co-chairman of the ad-hoc Grosse Pointe-Harper Woods Airport Study Committee, and though he is no longer on that committee he is still very much involved in the opposition to the proposed expansion, he said.

Williams has been retired since 1985. He is a master plumber, engineer and former president of two corporations. His heating and cooling company served mainly the Pointes. He has lived in the Park for 23 years and in the Pointes more than 40 years.

After his defeat in his bid for City Council, Williams is now running a non-campaign for the Senate.

"I am not campaigning," he said. "If people are happy with the way things are, then they can have things the way they are. If they're not, they can have Art Williams."

He is not putting out campaign signs or leaflets, and he is especially opposed to endorsements by special interests, political action committees and political parties.

Since he filed for office, he has received more than a score of solicitations from special interests and PACs seeking his support.

Some of those who've contacted him are the National Rifle Association, Farm Bureau, both sides of the abortion issue and the beer and wine industry.

He said he is not supporting any of the interests. "I'm not responding to this stuff at all," he

Even though he was asked to run by the state Republican Party, Williams said he is not beholden to the party and is running as an independent — philosophically if not according to the ballot.

He is running on a philosophy that taxes are too high and political abuse is rampant, if not allpervasive.

"There's so much money available they don't know what to do with it," he said about tax dollars. "Property tax is the most unfair tax there is."

Unlike his opponent, Williams favors the utility tax for Detroit. He said the best taxes are user fees assessed on those using a commodity or service. Utility users paying a tax is better than statewide tax dollars going toward subsidizing Detroit, he said. When pressed, however, he said he would not favor a utility tax for other communities besides Detroit.

To prevent office-holder abuse, Williams is recommending that state politicians run for re-election every year instead of every other year for the House and every four years for the Senate. He is also proposing that the Legislature become a part-time body meeting only half a year. He said all the work will still get done at less than half the cost.

He would like to see welfare abuse targeted — not just abuses by the recipients but by the politicians who dole it out as well.

Williams also wants to see legislation that would effectively control the use and disposal of hazardous material, including the excessive use of paper and plastics, he said. He believes disposable products should not be allowed where recyclable alternatives are available.

"I'm trying to get in touch with the people," he said. "I want to represent the people, I don't want to represent special interest groups.

"I'm an independent candidate and not beholden to anyone, including the Republican Party."



Airport called crucial issue in the Pointes

hen residents of Grosse Pointe Park and Grosse Pointe City go to the polls in the Aug. 7 primary, they will be faced with the task of picking a 13th District congressional candidate from among 11 candidates, eight of them Democrats and three Republicans.

Since the district is overwhelmingly Democratic, traditionally Republican voters in the two Pointe communities are being urged to desert their party to vote in the Democratic primary because of the crucial importance of picking a nominee opposed to the proposed Detroit City Airport expansion.

Nobody can predict how many Park and City Republicans will respond to that appeal being made by some people active in the campaign against the airport.

Unfortunately, however, Pointe Republicans who desert to the Democratic primary



will be unable to vote in three important GOP primary contests in which Grosse Pointers are involved as candidates for the U.S. Senate, governor and the 1st District state Senate seat.

So which candidate should Park and City voters support for Congress if they vote Democratic in the primary?

In our view, probably the best and most electable Democratic candidate opposed to the airport expansion is Tom Barrow. He is a certified public accountant with his own business who is a twice-defeated candidate for mayor of Detroit, but who probably has the best name recognition of the 11 candidates.

In running for Congress, Barrow is taking on the Democratic machine headed by Mayor Coleman Young of Detroit for the

third time. The issue is clearly defined. The mayor has endorsed Barbara-Rose Collins, a Detroit councilwoman, who has so often supported the mayor's proposals that Barrow says she would be "a clone, not an independent," if she were elected to Congress.

Barrow strongly opposes the airport expansion proposal and sees it as a part of a Detroit plan to win approval of casino gambling, which Barrow also dislikes. Barrow seeks improved health care as well as more affordable housing for the people of the district and increased economic development to cut down the district's high unemployment.

But Dr. Charles Vincent, a practicing physician who is also an assistant dean for admissions at Wayne State University's Medical School, strongly impressed Grosse

Pointe News interviewers by his concern for health and education problems in the district. So he would be our second choice.

In his interview, he stressed the fact that the 13th District has the highest rate of AIDS infection, the highest infant mortality rate, the highest teenage pregnancy rate and the highest substance abuse rate of any Michigan congressional district.

While those problems are not as serious in the Pointes as elsewhere in the district. Vincent emphasizes that everyone needs good health care and good educational facilities and that many 13th District residents working in low-paid service industry jobs are not even covered by health insur-

Other candidates worthy of consideration are Alberta Tinsley-Williams, a Wayne County commissioner who has been endorsed by County Executive Edward Mc-Namara, and Rep. Juanita Watkins, a veteran House member who gave up her reelection chances to run for Congress.

Some things are clear: Rep. George Crockett is retiring, a new Democratic representative will be named in the 13th District and voters in the Park and City can play an important role in the outcome next

Lauve gives GOP a choice

Tohn Lauve of Grosse Pointe Woods is facing one of the toughest uphill races in the state's Aug. 7 primary in his quest for the GOP nomination for gover-

Lauve, in his fifth try for public office, is taking on state Senate Majority Leader John Engler for the privilege of facing Democratic Gov. James Blanchard next November.

But Lauve is undeterred by the odds against his success. He feels that the people of Michigan, and especially Republicans, deserve a choice in the primary and he is giving it to them.

Basically, Lauve doesn't like the way things have been going in the Blanchard years and he holds Engler partly responsible. He contends that Engler and the governor have failed to meet the challenges of education or to make needed reforms in welfare, taxes and other areas of govern-

More specifically, he charges that Engler went along with the governor on a "Robin Hood" school funding bill which in effect takes state funds from the wealthier districts, including Grosse Pointe, and distributes them to poorer districts unable to fi nance their own schools.

As another example, Lauve cites the renewal and expansion of the Detroit utility tax that was approved by the Legislature

with what he regards as Engler's connivance, even though in his view the legislation violates the state constitution because of its retroactive effect and also because the Headlee requirement for voter approval of such a tax increase has not been imposed.

Lauve, 49, is a quality control engineer for General Motors whose greatest claim to fame arises from his unsuccessful attempt to recall Blanchard on the same tax issue later used by friends in the successful recall of two Democratic senators for their votes on the governor's proposed 38 percent income tax increase that became law.

Lauve's attempt to recall the governor failed when the courts held he had failed to meet the law's requirement to obtain 750,000 signatures on petitions within a 90-day period. But Lauve won a partial victory when the recalled Democrats were replaced by Republicans who gave the GOP Senate control.

Lauve is not cut from the same cloth as the average politician but in this era of public disillusionment with politicians, he brings an unusual intensity and sense of integrity to his primary task. We doubt he'll be nominated but he has served the people well by forcing the Senate majority leader to discuss the issues and defend his own policies.

A critical state Senate year

n this critical election year for Michigan's state Senate, the Aug. 7 primary will be of major importance in nominating candidates who will enable the Republicans at least to maintain their two-vote Senate margin or the Democrats to regain control.

This will be a critical year for the Senate because the election will determine which party will control the body for the next four years during which it will join with the House in reapportioning the legislative and congressional districts.

Two Grosse Pointe residents, Phillip G. Tannian and Art Williams, will wage one of the major primary battles in the 1st state Senate District where they will seek the GOP nomination to challenge state Sen. John Kelly in November. Republicans believe a strong primary showing will enhance their prospects in the nominally Democratic district.

The contest between Tannian and Williams pits two men of contrasting styles and backgrounds. Tannian, now an attorney in private practice, has spent much of his career in appointive public positions and in the middle 1970s served as Detroit's youngest police commissioner.

He comes on strong in recommending changes to enable the state to compete more effectively in world markets and in proposing regional arrangements to help Detroit and southeastern Michigan solve their problems.

Williams has devoted himself to public service since he sold his plumbing, heating and oil conditioning business five years ago. He first sought elective office as a Grosse Pointe Park councilman last fall.

Usually a quiet, reserved man, he has become more assertive since starting the opposition to the Detroit City Airport expansion. Now he aggressively attacks

"Democrat politicians" for operating the state government "more for the benefit of the politicians" than "the interests of the people."

The two men sharply disagree on some issues, notably the Detroit city utility users tax. Tannian was the attorney who in effect caused Detroit's recent crisis by persuading the courts that the law authorizing the tax had expired. Now that the Legislature has renewed and enlarged the tax, he finds grounds to attack it again.


Williams calls it a users' tax that substitutes for other taxes that no longer raise much money from Detroit's depleted tax base. He says if the tax were not in effect, the rest of the state's taxpayers would have to provide even greater subsidies to

Both candidates oppose the airport expansion plan, Williams because of its threat to the Pointes' quality of life and Tannian because it doesn't make economic sense to him.

Williams proposes that elected officeholders be required to run annually, supports a part-time Legislature and recommends better accountability and more realistic control to stop overbudgeting and overspending.

As a former Detroit police commissioner, Tannian claims expertise on the problems of crime and other inner city issues and points to reforms he instituted in the police department to help control the drug traffic and prevent needless killing of on-duty po-

In our view, Tannian's experience in government and politics has prepared him better than Williams' background to challenge Kelly and to serve the Pointes if elected. Whoever is nominated will be in for a fall battle, however.



Vote 'No' on WCCC millage

he Grosse Pointe News is so disturbed by several facts it has uncovered about Wayne County Community College's debt service levy on county taxpayers that we are recommending that the Pointes vote against the proposed increase in property tax support for WCCC in the Aug. 7 primary.

The major reason we question the proposal is that the college did not tell the full story when it went to the public to ask that the current 0.25-mill levy for operating expenses be replaced by a full 1-mill levy.

It didn't explain that county voters, including those in Grosse Pointe, already paid a total of 0.99 mills (or almost a full 1 mill) earlier this year to support the college when the college debt service levy of 0.74 is counted.

On one 1989 Grosse Pointe Farms tax statement, for example, the community college levy cost the taxpayer \$107.78, the same sum charged against him to meet the 1-mill levy for the new county jail voters approved several years ago. That home was assessed at \$108,870, not far above the average in the Pointes.

The facts also show that the college, which has had more than its share of troubles in its brief history, is still having

It is searching for another new president, the seventh according to our count, the enrollment is still anemic, it has been the target of a critical state auditor's report about its use of bond money in recent days and now after three defeats of proposed millages in past years it is seeking a 1-mill property tax levy without telling the public the full story.

If the 1-mill levy is approved Aug. 7, it would bring the total millage for the college for 1990 to 1.55 mills because the debt service millage will decline to 0.55 mills. If the request for the 1-mill levy is rejected, the 0.25-mill operating levy will remain in place and the 0.55 debt service levy will bring the direct property tax support from

Wayne County to 0.80 mills.

In checking the WCCC levy imposed on county voters, the Grosse Pointe News found that the total has been close to 1 mill as far back as 1982 when it was 0.85. The highest since then was the 1.05 mills imposed in 1985 but the decline in bond debt payments since then has brought the total to 0.99 in 1989.

The current 0.25-mill levy was imposed on Wayne County by the Legislature in 1971 without voter approval after voters had refused to adopt earlier millage proposals to operate the college.

To us it also seems more than coincidence that the college has announced just before the millage vote that it will begin offering classes at Grosse Pointe South again this fall, as it did in the not-so-distant past. The estimate is that 150 to 200 students will enroll in the evening liberal arts courses.

That apparently would mean that Grosse Pointe residents would be getting something back from their tax dollars in support of the college but we have no way of knowing whether that estimate of enrollment is on target. The college reports that only 22 Grosse Pointers are listed in early enrollment figures for the 1990 fall term.

However, if Pointers feel that the new WCCC courses to be offered here really open up educational opportunities for additional residents, they may desire to vote to support the 1-mill levy to assure the college's existence. But if few Pointers see this planned service in Grosse Pointe as providing new opportunities, then we think the Pointes should vote against the millage proposal.

It was only a few weeks ago that the state Legislature cut the Grosse Pointe school district's state aid by about \$1.3 million in order to help poorer districts. That loss hardly makes this an appropriate time to ask the Pointes to join other Wayne County residents in contributing additional dollars to an institution whose value is still in doubt.

When I came home from work, despite my best efforts, I was tired so I just kicked my shoes off as I walked in. I emptied my pockets on the coffee table. I threw my mail on the dining room table. And when I needed a pen to write down a phone number, I couldn't find one because they were all put away, so I found a few and strewed them about the room.

I sat down and sighed - I was home again.

Grass clippings

To the Editor:

The residents of Grosse Pointe Park have a right to be appalled upon learning that their city has been spending over \$100,000 per year of tax revenues "just to dispose of grass.'

Now the city proposes to reduce the amount by changing the system. It is not necessary for the city to spend any taxpayer money "to dispose of grass.'

The city has made a commitment to salvage rather than discard usable items. The city can extend that commitment and save its taxpayers the entire \$100,000 plus by discontinuing the pick-up of grass clippings and instructing the

residents to leave the very usable clippings on the lawn.

When left on the lawn, the clippings will decompose naturally to provide nutrients for the grass and, while decomposing, become a blanket to retard the evaporation of moisture from roots of the grass and surrounding soil. My father taught me that 60 years ago.

When clippings are bagged, the homeowner must go to the local hay, grain and feed store to purchase fertilizer. Sprinklers are turned on, oftimes spraying as much water on driveways, walkways and the street as on the lawn.

Starting in 1991 all the Grosse Pointe communities should discontinue pick-up of grass clippings at public expense. The resident who wants to discard clippings can make private arrangements with a waste hauler.

We must remember that the sole function of grass is to prevent erosion of soil.

The most economic and constructive method of composting grass clippings is to leave them on the lawn as they fall from the mower.

Amending the Constitution to prevent burning the American flag as a protest of dissent makes as much sense as calling in an atom smasher to kill a gnat.



How to preserve photographs

How many times have you tried searching for a box of slides or set of prints from that special occasion years ago only to be stymied as to where you last put

Do you have boxes of loose slides and drawers full of loose prints that are totally disorganized?

You're not alone. A great many photographers regard the filing and storage of negatives, slides and prints as an onerous task to be avoided.

Imagine how convenient it would be to have an organized filing system, to have your prints and negatives orderly, neat and available at a finger's touch. It's easier than you might

Cardboard boxes, throughout the years, will emit gases and peroxides that will tarnish the silver in films and prints causing fading and loss of picture detail."

The same is true for brown paper envelopes often used to hold prints and negatives. Glue in the seams of many envelopes can cause discoloration if it gets too close to the emulsion of a picture.

Even rubber bands wrapped around a roll of negatives or stack of prints contain compounds that can cause damage.

Here is some advice on how to void these dangers and assure

most valuable possessions . . . his or her pictures.

Negatives: Care in preserving your prints must naturally begin with your negatives. This is easily done by storing them in transparent polyethylene holders which in turn can be stored in vinyl binders. Larger negatives can be placed in polyethylene sleeves and housed in small steel cabinets.

Polyethylene will resist mois ture and will not decay or grow misty with age. Furthermore, contact sheets can be made of the negatives without having to remove them from the holders.

Prints: Sunlight fades and bleaches some color prints. To avoid this, spend a few extra dollars and have a Cibachrome or Fuji "Super Gloss" print made from your favorite slides or negatives. They will last for many without any fading and the safety of a photographer's will produce prints of superior

quality.

When mounting your prints, be sure to use acid-free rag board. Acids in regular mounting boards will eventually cause discoloration, not to just the board but to your print, too.

When buying a photo album, make sure the pages are made of an acid-free material.

Finally, never hang photographs (or any artwork) where direct sunlight will-strike them. Slides: The biggest enemy of color slides is moisture. In an atmosphere of more than 60 percent humidity, fungus can form on your slides and damage them. Storage methods for slides should therefore provide for circulating air. Most slide trays and metal slide storage boxes are specifically manufactured to permit air circulation and thus reduce moisture.

Preserving your photographic nemories is easy. A measures will ensure that they'll be around to enjoy for a long time to come.

signs or symbols. Both the Senate and House turned back the proposed amendment. But it'll be back. Bet on it. You mentioned an obscure Michigan candidate for Congress who is at it already, peddling flags complete with his political slogan of choice. It's just too good an appeal to pass up. Can't you just see the boys in the saloon where the issue gets hot, pounding the table and screaming: "Of course I'm for amending the Constitution to stop these here flag burners - you bet-

I believe it can be argued that making selfish use of the American flag's symbolic value as a personal campaign tool, or device, or gesture is as degrading in its way as burning it for one's own selfish, personal inter-

Also, please remember, the American flag is the symbol of choice of the Ku Klux Klan. I have seen photos of lynchings, conducted against a backdrop of white hooded and robed klansmen, with the American flag prominent in the picture. Nobody sought an amendment.

And Richard Nixon, on TV the night he told the nation "I'm not a crook," wore in his lapel his ever-present American flag pin. Some people thought him a great American.

There is a related First Amendment issue in the news. And that is the National Endowment for the Arts, and taxpayer support not only for good, quality, classic art — but for filth, depravity, obscenity and sacrilege.

A segment of conventional wisdom says you can't put shackles on creativity. You can't stifle the free expression of feelings, ideas, impressions. The First Amendment protects it under an extension of the freedom of speech clause.

OK. Agreed. But the Constitution does not say the taxpayers have to pay for it. If we can't fund good art, without funding what, by accepted standards, is filth then withdraw the subsidy from all art. Let the ACLU subsidize the filth. Ask private sources who appreciate classic art to help support the classic artists.

My wife and I have had the good fortune to visit the world's great art museums

- the Louvre, Hermitage, El Prado, British Museum, the Vatican museum, Sistine Chapel, Huntington, Norton Simon, many others. But nowhere have I seen the national flag on the floor, homosexuality glorified, pedophilia expressed, depravity masquerading as "art."

In El Prado, Goya, who suffered a period of great depression in which he painted demons, horrible visions, deepest anguish, never in any instance resorted to obscenity or filth to mirror his suffering. These works are on display, along with the works of his periods of normalcy and ecstasy.

Don't vote the ban-flagburning-through-a-constituitional-amendment ticket. And remember, on the garbage-art thing, you can get "mad as hell," and tell 'em "I'm not gonna take it any



Her Grosse Pointe apartment, like the outfit she is wearing, is timelessly tasteful, rather than high-fashion trendy. But Elizabeth C. Grant has been a player in the high-fashion world and talking about it still excites her.

Her eyes glitter as she recalls the excitement of leaving the Detroit area for New York and a successful and creative career in the world of fashion. But one of her greatest successes occurred here in Detroit, when a proposal she made to Chrysler Corp. in 1953 made a permanent impact on automotive colors and upholstery materials.

By 1953, the new-car boom market that followed the end of World War II had subsided and the industry was looking for something to spark buyer interest. Enter Liz Grant, who had just returned from New York to her hometown on family busi-

"Cars were dull and colorless and the sales picture in 1953 was poor," Grant said. "With the use of new colors and new uses of colors in cars, as in the field of fashion, a public excitement was generated that resulted in an upturn of new-car sales."

The result most car buffs are aware of was the 1955 Dodge Royal Lancer with black, white and shocking pink finish. Other three-color combinations spread through the Chrysler Corp. car lines and those of Packard, for whom Grant also did considerable work. Before the '50s were out, bright colors became one of the hallmarks of that enormously successful era, along with soaring tailfins and highcompression V-8 powerplants.

"A friend of my sister, who knew of my fashion background in New York, owned an executive placement service and without my knowledge set up an appointment for me at Chrysler Corp. headquarters in the fall of 1953 when I was visiting my family in Detroit," Grant re-

then in charge of fabrics (later a vice president in charge of safety and environmental matters). His reception was tepid at first, until I started talking about fabrics and colors. He then proposed that I prepare a portfolio of 'trim proposals, coordinating fabrics and Chrysler's own colors.'

Grant said Chrysler's fabric inventory was "a calamity dirty browns, mold greens, smoky grays." And, she said, weaves were unimaginative in their patterns.

There was nothing to work with," ishe said; and began a

search for fabrics to enliven her trim proposals. She said she submitted 16 combinations, of which 12 were accepted. Her central theme was a fashion concept known as "accent color." The concept was accepted by Chrysler President Lester (Tex) Colbert and his top aides, Harry Chessbrough and Fred Zeder.

"It is a third color which creates the illusion of bringing together and enriching other functional colors, one light, one dark," she said. In the case of the '55 Dodge Lancer, the bottom was shocking pink, the top

white and the accent color was Fashion Academy in Manhattan. oxford gray.

"People called these cars three-tone, but they are not," Grant stressed. "They were twotone with an accent color."

This approach quickly spread through the auto industry. Grant worked for Chrysler and the accent color combinations were approved for all its car lines. She also came up with coordinated interior upholstery of various textures, including brocades.

"I tried to convince Chrysler to use blue denim upholstery in a station wagon (Grant had already made denim a hot fashion item for women's clothing), but they wouldn't listen. Twenty-five vears later, American Motors did just that with its Levi interiors."

She also showed a burlap textile with bold printed design, but it cost \$1 a yard more than current fabrics. "Everyone loved it, but it was too expensive," she said.

She then went to Packard Motor Car Co., where she spread her accent color gospel and showed President James Nance the burlap with the bold print, which she called "Stained Glass," because that is what it resembled with its black-bordered geometric shapes.

"He laughed heartily for five minutes and said he had been rejuvenated," said Grant. Despite his delight, Packard never used the fabric. But Packard convertibles and sedans of that era bore Grant's unmistakable "accent color" exteriors.

After her automotive interlude, Grant returned to her first love, the New York fashion world, where she made her mark with designs for Jantzen Mills, College Town Sportswear, Bernhard Altmann Corp. and Greylaine Manufacturing Corp., among other accounts.

Grant says she was the first to establish denim as a factor in women's fashions, with the design in 1942 of a denim "Victory Dress" in a contest sponsored by the Chicago Tribune. She had just moved to New York that year and was a student at the

Her effort won her some snide comments from classmates, but an honorable mention from the Tribune, the only award to go to the academy.

Elizabeth du Lac Czizek Grant was born in Mount Clemens and has traced her family back beyond 1701, when the du Lacs landed with Cadillac to found a trading post at Detroit. She presented a book to the Detroit Historical Museum in 1979, which traced the du Lac family back to France in 1600.

Since the founding of Detroit in 1701, there have always been du Lac family members in this

"When land was parceled out along the Detroit River to the first settlers in alphabetical order, the du Lacs had claim No. 15. Later, the family had a choice of buying Gaukler Point (now site of the Edsel Ford mansion) or going on to Belvidere. They chose Belvidere. The du Lac mills and shipyards were at Mount Clemens and the du Lac house, the Chateau, was the city's showplace," she said.

With her family heritage and her brief but influential fling with the auto industry, it is no wonder that Grant feels she has

returned home.

be burglarized. Hiller said a grid system was set up to catch the suspect if he was seen and immediately reported. Officers from the City, Farms and Woods were also prepared to respond, and did when the time

The opportunity came July 26 at 1:20 a.m. when a Park resident in the 1200 block of Buckingham saw a stranger in his garage and scared him off. Then at 2:26 a.m., a resident in the 1000 block of Yorkshire saw a burglar trying to crawl through a window. Again the suspect was scared off, but police were beginning to close in.

At 2:56 a.m., a resident in the 1100 block of Cadieux heard a noise and went to investigate. He discovered a burglar, who fled when confronted. The resident found a television, radio and briefcase had been loaded into his van, which the thief was apparently going to steal as well.

Hiller said Harris, who is physically fit and can "run like a deer," always went from house to house through rear yards. Thus, a rash of burglaries would be reported within a couple blocks several streets in a

Hiller said Harris is quick, smart and knew what he was doing. "He's no kid," Hiller said.

Because Harris works his way to the east. police suspected he fled across Cadieux into Grosse Pointe City. Park police obtained the services of the Detroit Police Department's canine unit and began searching for Harris. While police were looking for him, Harris burglarized two houses in the City and stole a car from one of the houses.

One of the houses burglarized was in the 400 block of Lakeland, but the resident did not hear anything and did not report the burglary until 8:05 a.m.

The break that finally led to Harris' arrest came at 3:45 a.m. when a City man reported that someone was driving off with his 1985 Buick Skyhawk. Park, City, Farms and Woods police converged on the area, with some of the units taking up stations at I-94 waiting for the suspect to pass through on his way out of the Pointes.

Hiller said a Park officer was driving west on I-94 heading toward Highland Park when he drove up alongside the suspect in

the stolen car and was able to identify that the suspect was in fact Harris. Upon spot-

ting the officer and a Woods unit that also arrived, Harris began to flee, passing cars on the shoulder and making a quick exit at Conner, where officers lost sight of the suspect's car.

Park officers, however, proceeded to Harris' girlfriend's apartment in the 200 block of Glendale Avenue in Highland Park and waited. At 4:43 a.m., the waiting Park officers saw Harris walking toward his girlfriend's apartment and made the arrest.

At the time of his arrest, Harris had in his possession jewelry taken from the earlier Park burglary on Cadieux, according to police.

Detectives obtained warrants from the Wayne County Prosecutor's office charging Harris with two counts of breaking and entering, two counts of receiving and concealing property valued over \$100 and one count of car theft. The charges involve the burglary on Cadieux in the Park and the one on St. Clair where the man saw his car being taken.

City Public Safety Director Bruce Kennedy praised the Park's officers for outstanding police work. He said the arrest of Harris was made possible by good cooperation between several police departments and

residents. He commended the St. Clair resident who was alert and quickly called police. In turn, the resident sent a letter to Kennedy praising the department's quick response and professionalism.

Kennedy said 12 burglaries in the City match Harris' MO.

The average tax rate levied among the state's 29 community colleges in fiscal year 1988-89 was 1.83 mills. Within the metropolitan Detroit area, the community colleges' tax rates in 1988-89 were Wayne, .25; Oakland, 1.0; Macomb, .97; Schoolcraft, 2.11; Henry Ford, 2.14; and Highland Park, 1.6.

Jacobs said the college's response if the millage request is rejected would depend on the size of the defeat. If it's overwhelmingly defeated, then the college would have to seriously look at its role, and major, drastic changes would have to be made. If the millage is narrowly defeated, then the college can make another request of the vot-



The preparations for the filming began at about 5:30 p.m., and Miller said the shooting would probably go right up to closing time.

The outside of Jimmy Mack's was illuminated with lights, which attracted curiousity. Some of the bar's regular pool players, however, had to settle for watching Mickey Axle take the shots.

Jimmy Mack's was opened in December 1989 after owner John Carlisle, a Grosse Pointe Farms attorney, made extensive renovations to the building, which formerly housed the Hollywood Nights bar under a different owner.

Woods renews home repair program for seniors in need

The Grosse Pointe Woods City Council has reached an agreement with Wayne County renewing the city's 12-year-old Minor Home Repair Program.

Approved unanimously at the July 16 meeting, the council set in motion a program to aid senior citizens who need house re-

The funding agreement states that \$27,500 will be paid by Wayne County to the city of Grosse Pointe Woods, with the program administered by Services for Older Citizens Inc. (SOC), an organization representing seniors in all five Grosse Pointes and Harper Woods.

Diane Kelly, administrator of the Minor Home Repair Program, a department of SOC, said the program is designed to help older citizens with minor repairs such as small electrical problems, small plumbing problems, gutter repairs, snow removal and landscaping such as shrub trimming and lawn cutting.

"We can't do things such as window washing, roofing, driveways and painting," Kelly said.

The program is funded by the Department of Housing and Urban Development in Washington, D.C., with money funneled through state, county and city governments.

Last year, the Minor Home Repair Program provided

"We have very few married couples and most of the people we help are widows. More and more people are joining," Kelly

"Unfortunately, we are not able to help all the people who need it. Last year our money ran out in June. I would like to see the amount increased — that way we would be able to help more people.'

Kelly said lack of funding is not the only problem limiting the program.

"It also depends on the number of workmen available to do the work," she said. "The cost to do the work keeps going up as does the number of people being

Kelly said more funding is the only answer since the population in this area is growing older, especially in Harper Woods, the program's largest recipient of

Even with funding problems and an older population, Kelly said the program has been very beneficial to many senior citizens over the last decade.

"It is a wonderful program, as is the entire SOC program,'



The five-year, \$3 million fundraising effort was initiated in March 1990 to support endowment and the construction of the new auditorium/gymnasium fieldhouse.





level, hit the car, throwing it 100 feet. When the car landed, it hit the cement embankment and before it came to a complete stop, it was broadsided by another car.

The next thing she remembers is feeling the vibration of someone knocking. She realized she was lying face down across the length of the front seat, after her seatbelt was snapped by the impact of the cement truck.

The person knocking was someone who had seen the accident, and was checking to see if she was alive.

"When I heard the knocking, I just sat up, and started crying, she said. "I had no idea what to

An hour after the accident an ambulance arrived. That's when she had her second brush with

It began when she lost her vi-

"I realized that I had lost so much blood that my blood pressure was real low and that's why I lost my eyesight," said Childs, who at one time was a trained

"Then I said 'I'm going now,' and I closed my eyes and felt myself falling and falling and falling. Then I realized what was happening and I jerked myself back and yelled 'No I'm not."

They told her later that her yelling got her adrenalin flowing, and brought her blood pressure back up long enough for her to get to the hospital.

Her ankles and heels were shattered and the tendons and ligaments around them were mangled. Both legs were in casts for a month.

"When you have two casts on, you can't do anything and you keep falling backwards," she said. "It's kind of funny."

The accident, obviously, put everything on hold, which frustrates Childs because she was gearing up to embark on "the trip of a lifetime.'

Childs was about to go to San Diego with the Sea Cadet unit she recently formed to train with the Navy Seals. The six Sea Cadets and their mentors will have to go without her.

"There's always next year, but I really wanted to go this year," she said.

She first learned about the Sea Cadet program a year ago when she wrote about it in The Purple Post, the newsletter for Selfridge Air National Guard Base, where she was editor.

"It's such a wonderful program," she said. "It's a wonder there's not more around the country."

The program, sponsored by the Navy League of the United States, is designed to help young Americans become more patriotic and responsible citizens while teaching them the role of the maritime services in national defense.

It turns boys and girls into leaders. Indeed, one of her cadets is Child's man Friday, living with her and her son while she recuperates.

In addition to their work with the Navy and the U.S. Coast Guard, Child's cadets will work toward becoming lake conservation specialists. They will work with the Army Corps of Engineers to restore the ecological balance to dying inland lakes.

The six cadets, both boys and girls, and four of their commanders will undergo a two-week boot camp much like those who enlist in the army receive.

"The objective of the boot camp is to give them this feeling of how to stand, and how to walk and how to wear their uniform," Childs said. "It teaches them to be proud of being Sea Cadets even though they already are."

The entire program is free, paid for by the Navy. Uniforms have been donated to the unit by

former members of the Navy, and many have never been used.

Childs sees the Sea Cadets as a great way to use her farreaching and varied training to benefit kids and the community.

After graduating from Holy Redeemer High School, Childs entered the convent. Cloistered for two years, only able to speak for 45 minutes on Sunday, Childs and the other sisters worked hard maintaining the convent, serving meals and attending classes.

"If we weren't doing screens and windows, we were doing the marble floors," she said. "We learned about everything from cooking to farming.'

She was required to leave the convent when she became ill with what she thought was rheumatic fever but was later diagnosed as lupus. Among the many things she had to adjust to was the fact that the country had sent soldiers to fight in Korea. World events were not part of a cloistered existence.

"I was so unhappy when I had to leave the convent," she said. "I was so lonely. I wrote the convent asking to come back, but the mother general told me that it must have been God's will that I got sick. I wasn't allowed to return."

She married a few years later and had five sons. She and her husband were divorced in 1965. She was married again for a short time, but has been single for almost 20 years.

But she hasn't been lonely, she said. Five sons have given her five grandchildren. Her varied jobs have also kept her busy. She's been a high school teacher, a coach, a waterfront director, a manufacturer's rep, a project director for many organizations and businesses, a writer and a woodshop manager. She is currently the financial aid and work-study manager at Wayne State University and she teaches microeconomics at Henry Ford Community College.

And when she's not working, or spending time with family or friends, she's busy fixing up her pride and joy - her house.

It's not just any house, though. It is one of farmer John Kerby's houses given to his children. It was moved several times before its final resting place on Kerby Road.

When she bought it on Christmas Eve 1965, it was condemned, filled with bugs and even a trapped squirrel was gnawing holes everywhere trying to get out.

Childs and her five boys, aged 3 to 11 at the time, redid the house from its upper floor to its basement which at the time of purchase was filled with poisonous gas.

"But it had everything you want in a house," she said. "It had wonderful potential. It had a new roof and a new furnace. I had a vision and I worked toward that vision.'

That vision included building her own furniture, creating light fixtures, laying the floor and moving marble stairs into her new home from a bank being demolished.

"I put a lot into this home, but like İ said, I worked toward my vision," she said. "Whenever I wanted to do something, and I got stuck, I thought to myself How would farmer Kerby have decorated?' He was land rich, but not monetarily rich so you wouldn't put brass all over the house."

She will apply later this year for a Michigan Historical Marker for the home.

"I thought (the author of the article) was crazy, but look at me

now," she said. She is planning on adding a porch, partially winterized, which will wrap around the house bringing it closer to its original state. She had marble slabs cut into smaller pieces for a stairway landing because "that would have been more authen-

And she's adding cabinets. And she's redoing the front room. And the list goes on.

"I've always wanted my life to be a little - well - less exciting," she said. "I've always had something major going on. But I think the secret to going on and achieving is to never feel sorry for yourself. That's something I learned in the convent; the buck always stops with you. If it doesn't get done, you only have yourself to blame.

The next thing Childs wants 'done" is her autobiography.

A synopsis of each of the above Ordinances is as follows:

Ordinance No. 175 SUPPLEMENTAL ZONING DEFINITIONS. This ordinance contains Supplemental Zoning Definitions. It amends Article I of Ordinance 80 of the Village of Grosse Pointe Shores, said Ordinance 80 being entitled ZONING ORDINANCE, by adding 25 definitions thereto.

Ordinance No. 176 SINGLE-FAMILY DETACHED RESIDENTIAL CONDOMINIUM LAND DIVISIONS.

This ordinance amends Ordinance 80 of the Village of Grosse Pointe Shores entitled, ZONING ORDINANCE; it provides substantive provisions and a comprehensive procedure governing the utilization of land for single-family detached residential condominium land divisions, including submission requirements, a review procedure, district requirements, design standards, provisions for utility easements, provisions for final acceptance; and it repeals all other Ordinances or parts of Ordinances inconsistent therewith.

Ordinance No. 177 SUBDIVISION OF LAND ORDINANCE.

This Ordinance amends Ordinances 133 and 145 of the Village of Grosse Pointe Shores; it provides substantive provisions and a comprehensive procedure governing the subdivision of land, including a definitional section; it adopts the Subdivision Control Act of 1967; it contains procedures for plat approval and the imposition of fees; it sets forth plat processing procedures and final preliminary plat submission requirements, review and approval criteria, lot requirements, block requirements, installation specifications for improvements, and approval requirements needed before sale; it provides for penalties for violation; and it repeals all Ordinances or parts of Ordinances inconsistent with the provisions thereof.

Ordinance No. 178 DEVELOPMENT DESIGN STANDARDS OR-DINANCE.

This ordinance establishes detailed specifications for the design and construction of subdivisions and other projects and improvements in the Village; it establishes grading, soil erosion and sediment control standards; it established fees, insurance and bond requirements; it establishes procedures for variation from the standards; and it repeals all other Ordinances or parts of Ordinances inconsistent ther-

Ordinance No. 179 LAND DIVISION ORDINANCE. This ordinance controls and regulates the further division of platted land and the division of unplatted land which does not result in a

subdivision as defined by Section 102 of Act 288, Michigan Public Acts of 1967, as amended; it provides a procedure for obtaining approval of said divisions and an appeal process from a denial thereof; it prescribes penalties for violation; and it repeals all other Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict therewith.





Barbara-Rose Collins has Young's support for 13th

This is the last in a series of profiles of candidates squaring off in the Aug. 7 Democratic primary for the 13th Congressional District, which includes Grosse Pointe Park and City.

Detroit City Councilwoman Barbara-Rose Collins has all the big endorsements.

For her bid for the 13th Congressional District vacated by George Crockett who is retiring, Collins, 51, is being endorsed by Detroit Mayor Coleman Young, the Michigan Education Association, the United Auto Workers, the Detroit Federation of Teachers, the Polish-American Cultural Citizens Committee, the Metropolitan Detroit AFL-CIO and the 1st and 13th congressional districts' Democratic organizations.

She believes Young's endorsement is a plus. She said Young has strong support in the 13th District where he lives and grew up and which made up part of his state Senate district.

Saying she would probably spend \$250,000 in her campaign for Congress through November if she makes it through the primary, Collins said politics has changed a lot since she spent \$40 in her successful campaign for the Detroit school board in

After a three-year stint with the schools, she was elected to the state House of Representatives in 1975, where she served for six years. While a state lawmaker, she was chairwoman of the House Committee on Urban affairs, was chair and founding member of the Michigan Legislative Black Caucus and vice-chair of the Democratic Caucus in the

As a state lawmaker, she said she worked to get bills enacted covering food dating, sex education, sexual harassment, pensions and enterprise zones.

Collins said her bills were "bread and butter" legislation that people expected were covered by law but that were in fact not covered. A good law, she said, is one which people say should have been in place al-

In 1981 she was elected to the City Council, where she said she was instrumental in getting ordinances adopted covering South African divestiture and toxic waste. Her leadership on the council includes chair of the Task Force on Teenage Violence and Juvenile Crime, the Task Force on the Homeless and the Task Force on Litter and Clean-

Collins was featured in a Red-

book article on successful Michigan women and is in the "Who's Who in Black America." She received the Feminist of the Year Award in 1977 from the Na-

tional Organization for Women. Concerning the issues in the campaign for the 13th District, Collins favors the proposed expansion of Detroit City Airport. She believes the expansion is critical to the development of Detroit. The area around the airport is completely run down, she said, and she hopes growth such as that around Metropolitan Airport will follow the proposed City Airport expansion.

Many Grosse Pointers, including a local grassroots organization, are opposed to the airport because of noise and safety concerns, which will drive down property values, airport expansion opponents say.

"I hope that once it's completed," Collins said, "the Pointes will find it's not the horrendous project they think it will

Her key issue in the congressional campaign is simple: jobs. Collins believes that if jobs are

to help themselves instead of dressing the needs of the cities, turning to crime and drugs.

"If we could develop a good job atmosphere," she said, "most of the problems of Detroit would be taken care of."







News Profile: Lewis Dahle Von Schlanbusch

The vibrant sound of his voice is solid and deep. His diction crisp and clear. The lyrics flow with ease. Baritone Lewis Dahle Von Schlanbusch finished one of his many practice sessions in his Mount Clemens home for the Aug. 4 concert at Chene Park in Detroit.

He has been proclaimed as one of the musical theater's brightest young stars and has received international acclaim for his dynamic baritone voice and superb theatrical ability. If success is emulated by demand, then indeed, this low-profile celebrity has achieved it.

In reviewing his itinerary over the next few weeks, you get a feel of his popularity. He will appear in Toronto July 31, Aug. 1 and 2. On Aug. 4, he returns to downtown Detroit at Chene Park, then on to the Ravinia Festival in Chicago on Aug. 5.

After one day off, he then heads south to St. Louis for three shows on Aug. 7, 8 and 9. Just recently, he completed a performance at Meadowbrook.

"It's a demanding schedule and it takes a lot out of me to do it," he says. There is comfort for him in that it is only for a few weeks. He will have some time to relax, before his next block of performances. The singer admits that he could have a much more assiduous schedule, but he prefers it like it is.

"I enjoy my life," the 35-yearold says. "I could be busier like some of my friends who work all the time, but I enjoy my time off between performances. I love my work, but it is not my style to keep it at a hectic pace.

He is quite satisfied with his career's progress and enjoys taking time out to go fishing, sailing, or up to the cottage in Boyne with his wife, Mary Puls.

Born in Pontiac and raised in Birmingham, Schlanbusch started singing at an early age in his father's church. Since his father was an Episcopalian minister, he had ample opportunities to sing in the church choir. He went to Birmingham's Seaholm High School where he did the "usual high school stuff" - plus choir and drama class.

"At the time, I never thought of doing this as a career — I just enjoyed doing it," he reflects. "I was raised with the typical values that you go to high school, on to college, then get a nice desk job," he says. The desk job did not sound too appealing to him. Nevertheless, he went to college at the urging of his par-

He attended Olivet College and earned a bachelor of arts in theater, and then went on to earn a master of music degree at Indiana University while studying opera. While there, he taught voice for a couple of years, but that was the extent of what you could call his "desk job.

bb. He says, "A desk job just doesn't fit my personality . . . it just never will. I also enjoy being my own boss, and my singing career affords me that opportunity.'

For a while, he did some opera, but later changed to the pop repertoire because it fit his lifestyle better. "You are not away from home for as great a length of time with a the concert, as you would be in the case with an opera production," he explains.

When his "big break" came, he went for it. "You always have to be prepared for that break,' he says. "It can come at any time and anywhere.'

Being prepared was a major factor in getting his first big break for a career in the pops arena. "At anytime and anywhere," he repeats while nodding his head. "Mine was in a

small bar. My friend, who is also a baritone, was singing at a pop concert in Cincinnati, and after the concert, the two of us went to a local bar.

"Upon leaving, a man started harassing my friend about his performance that evening. I immediately came to his defense and started arguing with the stranger, but before things got too out of hand, my friend introduced me to the gentleman.

"The man turned out to be Erich Kunzel, the conductor of that evening's concert, and he was just having some fun with my friend. He told Erich that I also sang baritone, so then Erich asked how good I was. I accepted his 'challenge' and sang a few measures right there in the

Kunzel was impressed enough with Schlanbusch's talent to offer him a job as soloist in one of his next concerts. That was the start of his career in pop music and, since then, he has done almost half of his performances with Kunzel.

Schlanbusch has been closely identified with the music of Rodgers and Hammerstein, Lerner and Lowe, Rodgers and Hart, and Cole Porter. He has made symphonic and operatic appearances in Los Angeles, Honolulu, Toronto, Winnipeg, Detroit, Chicago, Pittsburgh, St. Louis, Houston, and others.

His solid vibrant voice has also given him many operatic roles, including Figaro in "The Barber of Seville," and Dr. Malatesta in "Don Pasquale." He has recorded and performed with the Cincinnati Pops and the Rochester Pops.

One of Schlanbusch's most interesting and rare works in his repertoire is Richard Rodger's "All Points West," which he has recorded with the Rochester Philharmonic under the direction of Kunzel. This rare piece has been performed in occasional appearances, and only by Schlanbusch and Kunzel. It was done two years ago at Detroit's Ford Auditorium.

Schlanbusch has had many excellent reviews of his performances. The Ottawa Citizen said, "(His) voice is ideal for Broadway music and his diction makes all of his contributions a special delight." With reference to Schlanbusch's version of "Ol' Man River," The Buffalo News said, "His languid rich baritone caressed the slowly flowing lyr-

To achieve his popularity, Schlanbusch has had to learn all of the symphonic repertoires of the pop musicals. Over the past

eight years, he has performed some of these shows 40 times.

However, if you were to see his show today, the one next year or the year after that will be different, even though they may have some of the same selections. So, what has he done to make the performances different so the audience comes back?

'That's where the work comes in," he says. "You find new ways. Each time I perform, I try to make it as if it were the first time for this audience to see me, although many of the people may have seen me in prior concerts.'

A wall in his home has seven different hats hanging on it. He uses them in various concerts to help establish a certain "atmosphere" for the song.

Sometimes he uses a complete costume, or he may just don a hat and vest. Last October at Ford Auditorium he ran on stage with coconuts and a grass skirt

for "Honey Bun" from "South Pacific.'

He explains that the average concert patron who goes to most pop concerts gets accustomed to a certain decor or protocol. "I try to use some of my acting ability to liven up the performance," he says. "For 'All Points West,' I dress as an old train station master, and when I do a 'Western Night,' I have a western outfit complete with six-shooters that I shoot."

He points out though, that symphonies are in trouble be-

cause they have not cultivated a new audience. "Pop evenings are becoming more popular because many of the average concert goers who listened to Bach and Beethoven over the past 30-40 years are growing older," he says. "John Williams has helped, because the sound tracks that he has written for movies such as 'Star Wars' and 'Raiders of the Lost Ark' are so symphonic.

"However, many people are not familiar with the 'standards' of Broadway's Golden Era, from the '40s through the '60s. Many of them only know it as 'elevator music.' They know the tune, but don't know anything about the story, or how the song fits in.'

Broadway is a part of our American heritage, he explains. It is unique to this country – Europe has its operas and America has its Broadway. The difference he sees is that many of the Europeans are more knowledgeable of their operas and have a higher appreciation for them, which is not the case with most Americans and their Broadway

"So, if you can explain the story, it gives the audience something to identify with the song. It means something more to the listener," he says.

He feels this gives the pop artist a fantastic opportunity to make this kind of music come alive for the audience. Schlanbusch researches many of the songs, the story lines of the shows, or the songwriters, then uses this material in his performances to add a special touch or create a different style.


"To hear little anecdotes surrounding the production, or an' explanation of the plot, or even a brief historical note on the songwriter, heightens the concert patron's knowledge and appreciation level. Based on my experiences, the audiences enjoy having a little narration. It adds to the show."

He wants the audience not only to appreciate the song for its own beauty, but also to understand how it fits into the story and what makes it, special. He adds that people can learn something different, which is not usually a part of their everyday

"I enjoy what I do," the Michigan native says, "and I do the very best job I can. If people really do enjoy it, then I know I've been successful." He gets a great sense of satisfaction when people come back to hear him at other engagements. Most of all, he thoroughly enjoys what he does and he puts everything he has into his performances.

creations of master designer Gordon Buehrig will be unveiled in the Auburn-Cord-Duesenberg Museum's south showroom in Auburn, Ind., on Friday, Aug. 3, at 7 p.m. The exhibit will remain until Nov. 3.

Buehrig, a Grosse Pointe resident, died Jan. 22, ending a career that spanned more than 60 years. He worked for, among others, Duesenberg, Auburn Automobile Co., Studebaker and Ford Motor Co. Buehrig de-signed the 1951 Ford Victoria Coupe, the 1952 Ford all-metal station wagon and the Continental Mark II.

It was his work at Duesenberg and Auburn Automobile Co., however, that earned him a spot in history and made him an automotive legend. His Duesenberg designs are considered "rolling sculpture" and consistently sell well in excess of \$1 million.

But his 1936 Model 810 Cord

A tribute to the automotive is perhaps what he is most noted personal Armchair Beverly Cord. for. The Cord's unusual design features front-wheel drive, disappearing headlamps, a wraparound radiator grille and eliminates the running boards. It stole the show at the 1936 New York Salon and 15 years later was displayed in the Museum of Modern Art.

News Camilo Pardo: Designs cars, furniture, teaches, paints

tary and middle school who were always drawing cars? Futuristic dream cars on otherwise untouched pages in the arithmetic sections of their looseleaf binders? Cars that bore the initials of whichever classmate they had a crush on at the time?

Camilo Pardo was probably one of those kids: He doesn't say. But he has made the leap from fantasy to reality.

The 27-year-old Grosse Pointe Park resident, still a dreamer by his own admission, is making a name for himself as a member of the design staff at Ford Motor Co. He also teaches at the Center for Creative Studies in Detroit. And for fun in the evenings and on weekends, he paints pictures of cars and designs avant garde furniture.

"I had some of my paintings at the recent Eyes on the Classics show in Grosse Pointe Shores," Pardo says. "I plan to have a few more at the Concours d'Elegance at Meadow Brook the first weekend in August.'

Pardo's current responsibility at Ford is in truck design. He has worked on passenger car interiors and exteriors. During his stint in Germany, he got some "glamour" assignments that in-cluded doing illustrations using dream-car ideas. He confesses a personal preference for the German approach to design, in transportation and other disciplines like architecture and fur-

The sleek functional lines associated with European post-war design don't have to be cold and forbidding, he says, "You can warm them up with color and softer materials."

Europeans take a different approach to cars, he says, being more driving oriented. They take performance seriously. "Mercedes and BMW are the standard-setters," Pardo says. These are powerful cars built for the autobahn.'

Pardo describes French cars as ergonomic, with a lot of attention paid to human comfort. Germans, he says, are prone to buying German-built vehicles, while University, the Cleveland Art

one finds a bit of everything in Italy. The Japanese are designing their imports for European tastes, trying to keep their prices very competitive.

Although he was born in New York, Pardo is a product of the Midwest. He grew up in Rochester, Mich. After high school, he enrolled at the Center for Creative Studies where he earned a degree in transportation design.

Graduation from CCS can be a ticket to the big time in the auto design field. It is one of the top schools in transportation design, and has the distinct advantage of being near General Motors, Ford and Chrysler headquarters. There are also highly regarded programs at Pratt Institute in New York City, Brigham Young Institute, Massachusetts Institute of Technology and at Cal Tech and the Art Center in Pasadena, Calif. CCS and Pasadena's Art Cen-

ter are considered the best today. This wasn't always the case. Fifteen years ago, the Art Cen-

ter was alone at the top. But thanks to a number of factors, CCS now turns out an elite of designers sought by major auto makers, studios and suppliers around the world.

Homer LaGassey is credited with building up transportation design at CCS. LaGassey played the strongest suit available to him — the proximity and interest of the Detroit-based automakers. He brought them in to teach and share knowledge and equipment with the Cultural Center-

"I had no shame," he once said. "I begged from all the automotive styling departments for whatever we needed."

LaGassey retired in 1987 and was succeeded by veteran auto designer Carl Olsen, who returned to the United States after nearly three decades with various design operations in Europe to take over this unusual challenge.

The annual spring student show is a highlight of the school year. Students are allotted space in which to display their work. Transportation design displays are reviewed by movers and shakers from domestic and import auto makers. Undergraduates frequently are offered internships with those companies based on their work. Graduating seniors are considered for staff positions.

Pardo continues his relationship with CCS as a part-time instructor. Teaching, painting and designing for Ford aren't enough to satisfy his creative energy. Pardo also is involved with Propeller, a fledging design studio located in Detroit, near CCS.

"We're a small group of artists from different backgrounds who got together a couple of years

some of our furniture on display in August in a gallery in Holland, Mich."

These are mostly one-of-a-kind pieces, he says — "sculptural and semi-functional." A few could be copied on a limited basis, he says. Propeller had a similar display last winter in a Birmingham gallery.

These outside activities help temper the demands of corporate life. Pardo says learning how to thrive in the bureaucracy of a large automaker is critical to a designer's career.

"The corporate thing is just incredible," he said. "You have to get along within the system, to accommodate. Most important, I think, is to make bridges within the corporation. Certainly, you never want to burn

Pencil, paper, imagination and discipline still form the foundation of design training, but elec-



dimension, Pardo said. Computer-aided design (CAD) and computer-aided manufacturing (CAM) take a lot of guesswork out of the complex process of bringing a vehicle from paper into metal, glass or plastic.


"CAD is like a million-dollar pencil," says Pardo. "It has so many possibilities and it just sits there waiting for you to put its capabilities to use.'

The computer's memory allows the designer to work on six pages at once, mixing features, even animating them, he says. CCS transportation design students are required to take a course in computer-aided design.

Young future designers may argue that Nintendo will give them some of the necessary computer skills. But there will still be futuristic drawings in math notebooks by the would-be automotive artists.

Brando fans will love 'The Freshman'

Just say the name out loud: Marlon Brando.

Brando.

It's a name that represents some of the best and some of the worst of what Hollywood is all about.

Brando is a living legend. Almost every role he's done is in the cinematic hall of fame - the off-center husband in "A Street-car Named Desire." The confused longshoreman in "On the Waterfront," the towering title character in "The Godfather."

But think some more and you think of his off-screen life. His declining the Best Actor Oscar for "The Godfather." His reclusive lifestyle. His dramatic weight gain. The recent events involving a murder in his house.

Take all that into consideration as you sit down to watch

"The Freshman." It's the scope Brando, he believes, is a mobspersona that makes the film work so well.

Brando plays, in essence, himself. Or at least a parody of himself. It's hard to tell. He's a powerful international importer who bears a striking resemblance to Don Corleone. He knows it, and so does every other member of the cast. Very few are willing to make the verbal connection, however.

Then along comes Matthew Broderick, who plays a New York University Film School freshman who needs work. He hooks up with Brando, who promises him \$500 for a single job to be nothing more than a

Broderick, desperate for money, takes the job. He quickly finds he's gotten himself into more than he bargained for.

of Brando's on and off-screen ter, and the huge lizard he's been asked to smuggle fits into some sort of international crime.



At least that's what Broderick

Then there 's Brando's daughter, who falls in love with Broderick at first sight and announces immediately that she's going to marry him.

Then there's the high speed car chases. And the gun permit he's supposed to get. And the creepy double-entendres from

All of this is more than any college freshman should have to deal with. But Broderick is in so far over his head - and so fast - that he's not sure how to correct things.

Neither is the audience, since we're trying to figure out the connection between all the diverse elements. It's an absolutely delightful, if somewhat dark task. The film is a comedy, no doubt about that. But it's a black comedy that borrows from Brando's previous work to make its points and deliver its punch

Those who aren't fans of Brando can just forget it. Those who are will be thoroughly pleased with his excellent work as a comic with just the right blend of self-respect and self-deprecation.

'The Freshman" is a winner.

'Navy SEALs' has adventure, action

'Navy SEALs" is what might be called a double A film - adventure and action all the way. Weak on story and character development, it nevertheless holds the viewer's attention with incredible, dare-devil, death-defying feats performed by an almost unheard group of Navy personnel called the SEALs.


SEALs is an acronym that designates the enormous scope of the activities of an elite, superbly trained command unit of the U.S. Navy. It operates on sea, air or land and goes anywhere, any time within 50 miles of water. They have been basically kept a secret since President Kennedy delegated them in 1962 to defend the country against terrorist attacks.

According to the producer, this is the first motion picture to reveal the clandestine operations of this American fighting force.

Billed as the best of the best, Navy SEALs defends America against the world's deadliest forces. A combat unit of indomitable strength, they are a rescue team of unparalleled skill and courage.

Knowing that there is such a

tirely fictitious adds interest to Beihn decides the most importhe film. What we see is fairly authentic because one of the cowriters is a retired Navy SEAL



commander who says that his challenge was to create a script that would reflect the true spirit of the unit without compromising national security.

Participation in actual news events is not disclosed but the film portrays what could happen and very possibly would happen in a given situation.

The opening sequence is not too far from headline news. It involves the death-defying rescue of a Navy helicopter crew held by the Arabs. In the process, officers Michael Biehn and Charlie Sheen locate a cache of American-made Stinger missiles headed for terrorists. New video 'humanizes' Detroit as a convention site

Last year 869 conventions brought some \$317 million and countless people to the Detroit metropolitan area.

Those conventions ranged in size from the Society of Automotive Engineers, whose 40,000 members pumped \$30 million into the community, to family reunions of only a few dozen peo-

Next to the automotive industry, convention business is the biggest money maker in the city.

A new video, "Detroit: It's An American Classic," is making the rounds of convention planners and other people in charge of arranging large get-togethers.

Visitors Bureau, the tape shows what Detroit and its surrounding areas have to offer conventioneers and their guests.

It isn't an easy task to market a city known across the country as "The Murder Capital" and the place where fans riot when their teams win championships.

"It's something we face every day at the bureau," Usitalo said. "What we are attempting to do is to break through that impression. We feel if we get people in to see the city - and by the city we mean the Detroit metro area in addition to downtown — they will see through that image."

The 11-minute video is narrated by comedian Thom Sharpe, who grew up in the Detroit area and is now enjoying some national name recognition.

It also stars a 1959 pink Cadillac as the tie-in to the Motor City. The car, driven by Sharpe, takes the viewer from Cobo Convention Center to Greektown to Belle Isle to Cranbrook, and everywhere in between.

Only time will tell whether the new approach will work. Magazine advertising in travel and trade publications is also a part of the campaign, which is bringing some response through an 800 number.


The tape recently won a national award, proving, Usitalo said, that there is a lot of good talent in Detroit.

Grosse Pointe Woods resident and a member of the Department of Immunology and Microbiology, recently became one of three Wayne State University faculty members to receive a Board of Governors Distinguished Faculty Fellowship.

Each winner will receive \$6,000, to be used for support of his or her scholarly endeavors. Each of the fellowships has a two-year term. The \$6,000 award will be renewed in the second year if funds continue to be available.

The fellowships were created to recognize and provide support for faculty whose attainments and activities in scholarship, research or the fine and performing arts are nationally distinguished.

to light the mechanisms for regulation of autoimmune responses, using autoimmune thyroiditis as the model system. Among her most significant contributions in this area are the demonstration of the contributory roles of histocompatibility genes and thryglobulin to severity of the disease, as well as the role of suppressor cells of both the T4 and T8 subsets in regulation of the autoimmune process.

Kong's findings are recognized by her peers both nationally and internationally. That recognition is evidenced by her record of support from the National Institutes of Health, her appointment as an American Society of Microbiology foundation lecturer from 1986 to 1987 and by her numerous invitations to speak at or chair sessions at national and international meetings.

She has presented 20 seminars in Europe and China and 10 American universities. Kong has published 57 papers in peer-reviewed journals, and has continued her productivity with five papers in 1989 and one paper and three chapters currently in press.

Kong has taken two sabbaticals to further her research. One of those, to the Pasteur Institute in 1980-81, was supported by the National Cancer Institute-IN-SERM Cancer Program Award and a National Science Foundation-CNRS Cooperative Program

The other sabbatical, at Cambridge in 1988, was funded by the Fogarty International Fellowship.

While maintaining her research projects, Kong has also worked on the NIH and Veterans Administration review sections, on the editorial boards of journals, on several national committees and as a reviewer for four journals.

Additionally, Kong has coordinated several graduate courses. directed 10 theses and dissertations and nine post-doctoral fellows. Five of those fellows were from foreign institutions, further emphasizing the international recognition she has received.

Local doctor heads study on diet, kidney disease The control group diet consists participants because he the results as pure as poss

This year there are more than 110,000 people in this country on kidney dialysis, a treatment that helps those whose kidneys have stopped working stay alive.

It is unknown how many more suffer from chronic progressive kidney disease who are not yet on dialysis, but the number of people on dialysis grows annually at about 9 percent.

By the time dialysis is necessary for a patient, there is virtually no kidney function. The dialysis machine, several times a week, does the work of the kidneys by filtering the wastes out of the blood.

Harper Hospital is conducting a study under the direction of Grosse Pointe Park Dr. Franklin D. McDonald to see if there is a way to slow the progression of kidney disease, thereby delaying dialysis and the lifestyle changes which naturally accompany it. eliminate, or postpone, the need

for a kidney transplant.

The study is also being conducted in other medical centers Slowing the progression could in the United States and Can-

with Harper Hospital for two years, and at the Medical Center for 18 years. Most recently he was chief of medicine at Hutzel Hospital.

He has served on the federal task force on transplantation which presented a report to the government several years ago, and is on the boards of the National Kidney Foundation and the Renal Physicians of the United States.

He is a past president of the American Council on Transplantation and is currently a professor of medicine and chief of nephrology at the Wayne State School of Medicine.

"It's been shown, and the data has been around for years, that animals with mild to moderate progressive kidney failure have had the progression of the disease slowed with a low protein diet," McDonald said. "What we are attempting to see is whether

Because it is thought that much of the wastes the kidneys filter are protein by products, it may follow that the less protein eaten, the less waste the kidneys have to filter. That would result in a decreased strain on the kid-

Participants in the study are carefully screened, and fall under the category of progressive, but mild to moderate chronic kidney disease, which McDonald defines as having only 15 percent to 50 percent of normal kidney function.

Working closely with a dietitian, the participants are given a diet suited to their likes and lifestyle. The control group is given a low protein diet, and the study group is given a very low protein

The average person eats one gram of protein per kilo of weight. That would mean a 150pound man would eat 70 grams of protein per day.

of 70 percent, and the experimental group diet consists of 40 percent of the normal protein intake. The control group diet is lower in protein than the average diet because, McDonald said, the medical community believes the normal diet is slightly higher in protein than is neces-

Protein, McDonald said, is composed of amino acids strung together. Amino acids are ketoacids with nitrogen bonded to them. Removing the nitrogen is what scientists believe will slow the progression of the disease.

To date, more than 50 people have gone through the evaluation, and 30 were chosen to participate. Of those 30, only 15 have complied with the terms of the study, which include clinic visits and staying on the diet, and staying out of the hospital.

McDonald says he is keeping an extremely close eye on the

The control group diet consists participants because he wants the results as pure as possible.

> If results show the low-protein diet helps, there are ramifications which go beyond the scope of the individual patient's lifestyle changes. Because nearly 90 percent of all dialysis is paid for by the federal government, Mc-Donald says keeping people off dialysis can save the government millions of dollars.

High blood pressure is the major cause of kidney failure, with diabetes and heredity playing major roles.

"We can't promise anything, but that they'd be participating in a good research project, with very little possibility of hurting anybody," McDonald said.

Participants also receive free medical care and free counseling on nutrition and blood pressure.







Eastwood Clinics:

Non-profit agency offers professional counseling for families, children, teens, substance abusers

Problem: A 17-year-old high school student — let's call him Scotty — has been arrested by the Grosse Pointe police for possession of alcohol and marijuana, shoplifting and breaking and entering. He has recently withdrawn from all family activities; has changed friends; has lost interest in school and sports. His grades have plummeted.

Scotty started sneaking a few beers on weekends when he was in middle school. Once in high school, because of the availability of other substances, he progressed to marijuana and hallucinogenics such as LSD, crack cocaine and heroin.

His parents aren't aware of his drug use, but are frantic with concern about his behavior.

Another problem: A 12-year-old middle school girl — let's call her Kelly — is staggering under a stack of adolescent worries — peer pressures to try alcohol and sex; a parent's serious illness; low grades; a new school; concerns about her identity and self-esteem. She threatens suicide.

Her friends are worried.

The Family Life Education Council, a Grosse Pointe-Harper Woods based nonprofit organization dedicated to helping teenagers with their problems, used to offer a crisis line, a medical clinic and counseling services for teens in such situations.

FLEC closed in mid-July because it ran out of money.

Where can these youngsters get help?
Grosse Pointe and Harper Woods youngsters (and adults) who want help for mental health and substance abuse problems could call Eastwood Clinics, a non-profit corporation operating within the network of St.
John Health Corporation.

Eastwood Clinics consists of 16 clinics in the six-county metropolitan Detroit area. Each clinic is responsive to the community in which it is located.

Three are near Grosse Pointe: in the Eastland Professional Building, 17800 E. Eight Mile Road, Suite 602, Harper Woods; at Eastwood Plaza, 20811 Kelly Road, Suite 1, East Detroit; and at 15085 E. Seven Mile Road, Detroit. The corporate offices are also located in the Eastwood Plaza building.

The two typical clients were described by Alan Warbelow, psychologist and clinical director of the Harper Woods office.

Andy Konwiak, group vice president of Eastwood Clinics, added that typical clients have not necessarily hit rock bottom.

"We see kids who are just plain unhappy. For instance, difficulties with boy- and girl-friends are important for 15- and 16-year-olds. Sometimes these problems can be a symptom of deeper-rooted problems," he said.

"Or a kid may be dabbling in alcohol—even though he's in the so-called right crowd. He may feel he's being pulled too much into the culture."

The first clinic, founded in 1970 by three priests from St. Raymond's parish, was called Project Headline. It was formed to provide counseling services for Vietnam veterans with drug problems and youngsters who were experimenting with drugs.

Today, the 16-clinic system is a separate corporation, but within the St. John Health Corporation. It employs about 225 professional staff members (psychiatrists, psychologists and social workers) and a support staff of about 50 (secretaries, receptionists and bookkeepers).

In 1989, 10,000 people made 120,000 outpatient visits to the 16 locations.

"One of the reasons Eastwood Clinics hooked up with the network of the St. John Health Care Corporation is that it needed to be attached to a larger organization — or it was in danger of disappearing," said John Andrews, president and chief operating officer of Eastwood Clinics. He added that he hopes the organization will some day have an office in the new Mack Plaza location, next to St. John Hospital.

Bill Sumner, a former priest and one of the founders of Project Headline, serves as chairman and CEO.

Eastwood Clinics and Northeast Guidance Center offer some overlapping services, Andrews said, but they differ in their sources of funding. He said that Northeast Guidance Center is part of the community mental health system.

"It's funded by the state and its target is people who are low income, or indigent, or who have no insurance. Northeast Guidance Center also has a specific catchment area," he said.

"At Eastwood, people either have the ability to pay or they have insurance. Our public funding is limited to some state funding for substance abuse cases."

Konwiak said that the lowest fees charged are \$50 an hour for counseling services. However, if drugs or alcohol are involved, fees are usually covered by state funds. The drug and alcohol involvement doesn't necessarily have to be that of the client. It may be that of someone in his family or his friends.

Andrews offered a definition for Eastwood Clinics: "We're a professional counseling service for family and mental health problems, including substance abuse problems."

He estimated that 60 percent of Eastwood's cases concern family or mental

He said that approximately 15 percent of Eastwood's funds are public health dollars from the state, funneled through local entities such as Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties and the city of Detroit, and earmarked for the treatment of substance abusers. The other 85 percent of Eastwood's funds comes from fees, collections and insurance payments from clients.

"We're family-oriented," Andrews said, "because most problems originate within the family or have created dysfunctional families."

Referrals come from schools — social workers, guidance counselors and substance abuse counselors; from the police departments; from FLEC; and from priests and ministers. About 50 percent of Eastwood's clients are self-referrals.

Andrews would like Grosse Pointers and Harper Woods residents to become more aware of the availability of the clinics. "We're quiet, low-key," he said. "Most of our advertising is by word-of-mouth.

"If somebody needs the kind of services we provide, we can usually see him or her within two or three days. In a crisis situation, we often can see them the same day. If we don't provide the service they need, we can refer clients to the proper place. We also connect people with a variety of self-help groups, like Alcoholics Anonymous, Narcotics Anonymous, Overeaters Anonymous."

Andrews said that the clinics do not operate a walk-in medical facility as FLEC did. Nor do they have a crisis or suicide hotline.

"But we have a 24-hour manned phone here, and if someone calls, he or she can be in touch with a counselor within a few minutes," he said. Eastwood refers clients to other agencies when the clinic can't handle them.

Eastwood Clinics are known by professionals, Andrews said, but they are probably not a household word. "We're not known to the general public. If you don't have a problem today, you probably don't know about our services," he said.

HAVE A PLEASANT TRY AT PERFECTION **BRIDGE BY WOODY BOYD** THE PASTEBOARD PASTIME

One of my superfine times at duplicate was five weeks ago at the MBA sectional in Oak Park. That Saturday I arrived in search of a pick of the litter partner, something that never just happens by uttering the incantatious proclamation, "Oh mighty Bridge God, serve upon this humble servant one so proficient!" I even considered paying the caddies to peddle my questionable press. Fortunately for this lucky duffer that wasn't necessary as the brave and talented Edith Jones suggested we play and that made my day. You see I had been schooled in Edith's skill and was familiar with her ability. In the three hours that followed the delightful Mrs. Jones played the game superbly. What separated our fourth place finish from a win was partnership confidence and style and both of these difficulties can be overcome with compatibility and practice.

Success at duplicate certainly requires an artful and exacting partnership, but also much more. No pair wins with averages, but neither can they succeed with undisciplined aggression. Edith's judgment in this regard is exceptionally well tutored and her play was impressive. As declarer she handled the twentysix cards at her command with masterful knack always pressing the defense to miscue or submit. When they did she was quick to snatch the advantage.

At first sight today's hand seems quite mundane, but looks can be deceiving especially at bridge. The ordinary sometimes requires an extraordinary effort because of the way the cards lay or overconfidence caused by a lack of careful research can effect technique and narrow declarer's vision, ability and judgment. Board ten was such a test of Edith's best and you will enjoy her thoughtful toil.


S W 3NT Passed Out The hand was bid identically by all N/S pairs in our section, but the play for nine tricks was poles apart and only Edith and one other declarer prospered.

East led Heart J

With defensive definess nine tricks are hard to find because the diamond honors are situated adversely. Of course a hold up play in hearts is required to sever E/W communications and the spade ace must be found. You might say this hand was a nasty little savage that beats mediocre play.

Note how the able Edith Jones proceeded! Declarer won East's heart jack with her queen and played the diamond deuce and South's jack to West's king. The heart king was ducked and the heart continuation won. At trick 5-8 Edith played four rounds of clubs ending with dummy's king. On the fourth club West pitched the spade eight. Now a small spade to her king and the conspicuous Mrs. Jones had found the ace. West was now known to have had at least 2 spades, 3 hearts, 1 diamond and 3 clubs. That left West with the ace of spades and three unknown pasteboards. This therefore was the four card ending.



At trick ten declarer played the diamond three, hesitated on East's seven, then called for the ace and diamond eight. West won the diamond queen and spade ace, but had to play a spade to south's queen at trick thirteen. In all Edith's magnificent card reading and subsequent end play earned for her 2 spades, 2 hearts, 1 diamond, 4 clubs and my enthusiastic congratulations. It was a tie for a top!










The Pastor's Corner

Surprise is God's other name





The Bible portrays God as One who fulfills promises. Every time I have tried to help or hurry God along in the fulfillment of some promises to me, I've succeeded only in getting in the way and delaying, or even preventing, the fulfillment of some of those promises.

I give lip service to belief and trust in God, but I fail to allow those promises to be fulfilled in God's own way and in God's own timing.

But, in spite of us, God is a promise-keeper and will act sometimes in surprising ways. The truth of the matter is: God's ways are not as our ways, nor are God's thoughts as

The Bible contains a record of how God made specific promises but then went about fulfilling them in totally unexpected ways. God could always be depended upon but never anticipated precisely.

As with us, learning to obey and trust this kind of God was a high challenge for the people of the Bible. It involved unwavering trust in the content of the promises, but also wide latitude as to the forms the fulfillment would take: being certain that God's word would be kept but uncertain as to how and when and by what means things would come

Our tendency is to set limits on God rather than making room for wonder and surprise. Reducing God down to our images of what is possible or impossible is something we have no right to do wherever the God of the Bible is con-

The challenge is to learn to trust and to obey, confident that God will be faithful, but flexible as to when and how and in what form God will come to us and say, "Surprise!" God is full of surprises, but not always in a way that we expect, or that is immediately pleasurable.

These anonymous lines should challenge you. They do

We ask for strength, and God gives us difficulties which make us strong.

We pray for wisdom, and God sends us problems, the solution of which develops wisdom.

We plead for prosperity, and God gives us brain and brawn to work.

We plead for courage, and God gives us dangers to over-

We ask for favors, and God gives us some wonderful surprises!

Michigan is very cherry state; leads nation in fruit production The National Charge Football T

The National Cherry Festival, July 7-14, honored the cherry industry in Traverse City. The festival features 125 activities and events, 85 percent of them free and open to the public.

Cherry trees or shrubs are grown for ornament or for their edible fruits and are of the species Prunnus, part of the rose family, and consist of a small round stone fruit with a skin varying from pale yellow to dark red and a pulp that can be sweet or sour.

Cherry trees originated in Asia and were widely dispersed in Europe and North America in prehistoric times. Colonists from Europe found wild cherries in America. They cultivated them and crossbred them with European varieties. Today, the United States is the leading producer of cherries with 85 percent of the country's crop grown in Michigan, California, Oregon

and Washington.

Michigan is the leading state in annual production of tart cherries. The main variety is the Montmorency cherry and leading producing counties are Leelanau, Oceana, and Grand Traverse, with approximately 23,500 acres, 2,500,000 trees and an annual harvest of 100 million to 140 million pounds.

Cherries are nutritious and

taste great. Bright, flavorful, wholesome cherries can be used in a variety of dishes. Because cherries are loaded with nutrients, they bring out the best of those who enjoy cherry prod-

Cherries are high in vitamin C and potassium and very low in calories. Raw red tart cherries, without pits, have 90 calories per 1 cup serving. Sweet cher-

ries, raw, without pits, are 82 calories per 1 cup serving.

Most of the tart cherry crop is converted into pie stock, jellies, dessert filling, frozen cherry pies and other convenience foods.

Traditional Cherry Pie 2 cans (16 ounces each) pitted

tart cherries 2 Tblsp. quick-cooking tapioca

1/4 tsp. almond extract pastry for 2-crust, 9-inch pie Tblsp. butter or margarine

Drain the juice from cherries, reserving 3/4 cup juice. In a large mixing bowl, combine cherries, reserved juice, sugar, tapioca and almond extract; let stand 20 minutes.

Line 9-inch pie plate with pastry; fill with cherry mixture. Dot with butter. Adjust top crust, cutting slits for steam to escape. Bake in a preheated 400 degree oven for 50 to 55 minutes. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

Sweet Cherry and Hot Pepper Glaze

can (16 ounces) dark sweet cherries in heavy syrup 2 whole pickled banana peppers (large, hot yellow peppers)

seeded and finely chopped 1/4 cup granulated sugar 2 Tblsp. cornstarch

Drain cherries, reserving syrup. Chop cherries into small pieces, combine with sugar and cornstarch; mix well. Add enough water to reserved cherry syrup to make 1 cup; gradually stir cherry syrup into sugar mixture. Cook, stirring over medium heat until thickened and bubbly. Add cherry-pepper mixture; reduce heat and simmer 10 to 15 minutes to blend flavors.

Use as a glaze on grilled, broiled chicken roast duck or baked ham.

Makes about 2 cups of sauce. Note: Leftover sauce may be frozen or stored in the refrigerator for 7 to 10 days.

Cherry Cheese Pizza 1 8-oz. package cream cheese 1/2 cup sugar 2 eggs

1/3 cup walnuts, chopped 1 tsp. vanilla

2 21-oz. cans tart cherry pie filling

Use pastry for a 2 crust, 9-inch

pie. Roll and put in pizza pan. Bake 15 minutes at 350 degrees. Blend cream cheese, sugar eggs, walnuts and vanilla. Pour in crust and bake 10 more minutes. Cool and spread with cherry pie filling. May be topped with whipped topping.

Yield: 1 pizza.

1-1/4 cups graham cracker crumbs

1/2 cup granulated sugar, divided

1/3 cup butter or margarine. melted

package (3 ounces) cream cheese, softened

Bless you, sailors

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Amen. The 256 boats, loaded with crew, deserve a blessing for sustaining one of the slowest Port Huron to Mackinac sailboat

For the third straight year, boats began the race with hopes of a spinnaker start, but a breathless Mother Nature forced all of them to sit, bob, and spin in circles trying to eatch a puff of air.

To no avail. Those sailors, who year after year subject themselves to windless conditions, redefine perseverance. For more than 60 hours some of those boats, and Old Goats, sat lifeless in Lake Huron. Nothing to do but fight insanity. Nothing to do but tell jokes. Nothing to do but think of land and fight off the urge to fantasize and see land.

A slow sailboat race, however, is still better than a slow week of work. I'd rather have nothing to do on the water, than nothing to do behind the desk. Life on the water has got to be a different world, but it's probably entirely different when food runs out, jokes become stale and boredom sets in

A light-to-no-wind race on the water makes for impatient land-lovers who await the docking of their ship. As wives, sisters, brothers and fans invade Mackinac Island, most of them have had to ride more bikes, take more tours and spend more cash than in previous years because their sailors are stuck in the lake.

Last year the race was reportedly the third slowest in history. I was on the island and that was one reason I didn't go back this year. To kill two extra days is as much fun as sitting in a waiting room. Nothing to do, but eat fudge, have lunch at the Pink Pony, and avoid the bats.

The island has much to offer. but spending a few extra days with no action on the water is worse than watching paint dry.

What do the sailors do when their boats only float and don't shove on? What can keep sanity? What keeps morale? Who's the first person to complain? Who's the first person to get scared of the dark?

I would venture to guess that there's only one thing worse than being stranded on Lake Huron during the day, and that's being stranded at night. I'm sure the stars are a very pretty sight, but that's it. What else is there?

When boats began earnestly heading for the island Saturday, July 21, none of them had an inkling the wind would die a third-straight slow death. They were committed to sus-

tain the test of nature - again. To sit, anxiously, on the water is a sailor's nightmare, but it's also a part of life aboard a vessel. You take whatever nature delivers and deal with it. No questions asked. The good thing about the race was the absence of high winds, rain and treacherous conditions.

A few years ago Tomahawk, owned by T.K. Lowrey, sank to the bottom of the lake. Nobody was hurt and that's the key. In fact. in 66 runnings of the Bayview sponsored race, not one sailor has died. A perfect record reflecting the sailing skills of the competitors in the race.

The number of entries was down this year and many thought it was because of the light winds in the previous two years. Others felt it was because the Chicago to Mackinac race was the following weekend. Either way, some 250 boats finished a race marred by low winds, but highlighted by competitive sailors with a desire to keep this fresh-water spectacle an enjoyable event.

Shamrock, Disruption lead Fulton Pointers in Mackinac race

Grosse Pointe's Tom Youngblood, one of three partners who own Shamrock, had never hoisted a flag that designated him a Mackinac winner.

Until now. Youngblood, whose partners include Grosse Pointe's Howard Keys and Birmingham's Barry Woodrow, skippered the C & C 35 to a first-place finish in the Performance Handicap Racing Formula (PHRF) G division in the 66th running of the Port Huron to Mackinac sailboat race July 21.

Youngblood and his crew covered the 259-nautical-mile race in a corrected time of 59 hours, 51 minutes and 18 seconds.

And that's not a bad time considering the light winds, which highlighted the race for the third consecutive year.

"It was a race of patience," said Younglbood, "but it was also a race we won. This feels just great."

Stripes, owned by Ann Arbor's Bill Martin, won the overall flag in the International Offshore Rule (45:32:26), Collaboration, out of Grand Rapids, won the International Measurement System (43:45;18), and the overall PHRF flag went to Windancer of Muskegon (54:35:04).

It was Youngblood's 13th race, his 12th in Shamrock, and it was one he'll savor for at least a vear until he tries to defend his

flag.
"I've done this race for a number of years and there's been times we've docked and thought we were in the money (one of the top finishers)," he said. "But then we found out there were a couple of boats that scooted in before us and we were moved

down in the finish.

"This time we played it smart and didn't take anything for granted. After we crossed the line, we went through the docks making sure nobody else was ahead of us. After that, we just waited until the final results and then celebrated."

Another skipper who celebrated a first-place victory was Bayview Commodore Larry Oswald.

Oswald skippered Disruption, a North American 40, to a win in the PHRF C division. His corrected time was 54:54:33.

"Our goal all along was to set a little history," Oswald said. 'And we're proud of the fact that we did.'

Oswald became the first sailor in history to win while serving as commodore.

"We just never let down in this race," Oswald said. "When we passed the mark (Cove Island) we were aware Merlin was ahead of us, but we closed the gap and eventually passed her Monday morning. We knew we

were in pretty good shape the rest of the way because of the company we were keeping (we were sailing with the bigger boats).

Merlin, skippered by Bayview's Doug Scheibner, finished third in a corrected time of 55:12:10. Velero took second in 55:10:45.

It was Oswald's sixth win in 21 Mackinac races.

Fast Tango, skippered by Bayview's Tim Prophit, was the winner in PHRF H, but he was unavailable for comment. His time was 57:17:35. Shamrock, whose best finish

in previous years was a fourth, was locked in a tacking duel with Roy Hawkinson's Cygnus, which finished second (61:19:43), for three quarters of the race. Around Cove Island, the halfway point, Frank Tenkel's Bravo, of the Shores, was also challenging Shamrock.

'When we rounded Cove Island Bravo was about 10 miles back, but we were always in sight of Cygnus," Youngblood recalled. "We lost Cygnus in the dark Monday night, and at that time we were only a mile apart. Tuesday morning, we stuck with

our game plan and hugged the American shore and opened the lead to more than an hour at the finish.

Tenkel's boat took third in 62:08:34.



taken strolls for pleasure and to get a little exercise in their lives. Today, we know that walking used as an aerobic exercise can do far more - it provides physical and psychological benefits.

"I couldn't believe it," Osborn said. "We were a couple hundred

yards from the finish line but stopped dead. We became a little impatient. The A's received strong pitching from Matt Hicks and Mark Rossman, who also had two hits. Ben Scrace laced a double for the A's.


