# ocal Mideasterners assess crisis in Persian Gulf

For two weeks the name on the lips of every American - indeed on the lips of peosle the world over — has been Saddam Hussein, the president of Iraq.

When Hussein's troops crossed over the Kuwaiti border to begin, in Hussein's words, "redrawing the boundaries between the haves and have-nots," the world re-sponded with sanctions and military support for other countries in the region which may be the next to fall.

Arab-Americans who were born in the Middle East and still have family there have a different perspective on the situation. A few aired their views, while some refused to talk because of the highly charged emotional reaction the crisis has produced.

Grosse Pointe Shores resident Ed Deeb, president of the Michigan Food and Beverage Association and the Eastern Market Merchant's Association, is active in many local Arab-American organizations.

He is chairman of Wayne County Community College's Administrative Council on Arab-American Affairs, past president of the Midwest Federation of American, Syrian and Lebanese Clubs, and was the co-founder of the Arab-Chaldean Social Services Council and the American Arabic-Jewish organi-

He said that feelings among the Arabs he has spoken with run wide and deep, and not always in the same direction.

"Most of the people of the Arab community are split." Deeb said. "But the vast amount are in support of (President George) Bush. It is right to go in. We have a commitment to Saudi Arabia and the free flow

Many Arabs, though, look up to Hussein, but for the wrong reasons, Deeb said.

'The Arabs have not had a strong leader who can fight for what he wants in a long time," Deeb said.

Indeed, much has been said comparing Hussein to Gamal Abdel Nasser, who was president of Egypt during the '50s.

Deeb, as a parent, is worried about the American servicemen who were sent to the Mideast, but said he doesn't think the tensions will escalate and that the world's response will give Hussein pause to think.


He believes that if America re-evaluates its Middle East policies, and creates a "solid, moral, fair position on the Middle East" some good may come out of the crisis.

That is not an easy task, Deeb admits.

"One of the reasons it's so difficult to have peace in the Middle East is that there are 16 countries or sheikdoms, most of which have three to four religions, and each of those religions have any number of sects that are in conflict with each other," he said.

Dr. Samir Yahia was born in Lebanon, and his entire family is still there. While



# Farms OKs library at Brownell School

After four years of planning, the Grosse Pointe school board received a long-awaited thumbsup Monday night from the Farms City Council, approving a new central library site plan at Brownell field.

Before nearly 200 Farms residents, Mayor Joseph Fromm provided a last-minute surprise by breaking a deadlock of a divided council, thus providing an approval for the plan for the 48,000-square feet facility. He voted against the plan in April.

Fromm said the reason he changed his vote was due to an improved library site plan by the school board.

In April, the proposed plan concerns with a driveway connecting the two main parking areas, which students would have to cross to get to the adjacent playfield.

The new plan calls for the elimination of the driveway as well as moving the proposed 37foot-high structure 48-feet farther back, now placing it 110

feet back from Chalfonte. Before his vote of approval, hich caused an uproa called for the removal of a proposed 20-space parking area along Chalfonte in front of Brow-

Farms Director of Public Safety Robert Ferber said the city will take a wait-and-see attitude, possibly installing the small parking area in the future if the area becomes too congested.

Several residents who live in the immediate area expressed concerns that the plan, which es timates a couple hundred library visitors per day, will cause to much traffic in the area and will become a nuisance.

A few doubted the accuracy of two traffic studies and expressed concern that increased traffic volumes would cause property values near to the school to drop.

The school board's traffic study engineer said projected traffic volumes would not be heavy enough to affect property values.

Superintendent Edward Shine, prior to the vote, said the library planners have made every effort to create a plan that would be acceptable to the Farms council and the community.

"We have made revisions based on concerns expressed," Shine said. "We have conducted a May traffic study as encouraged by the community and we have provided the information in dents opposing the plan, Fromm an honest and forthright manner.

> During the meeting, library opponent Jay Geideman presented the council with a petition containing 640 signatures opposing the library site at Brownell, collected from the city's 8,748 registered voters.

Council members John Danaher and Gail Kaess, along with

the mayor, voted for approval. Councilmen John Crowley and Gregg Berendt voted to deny the site plan; councilmen Emil Berg and Harry Echlin were absent.

Kaess said the revised site plan contained several significant changes and is now in harmony with the city's ordinance. "The location and the design is appropriate and the vehicular conflicts have been eliminated," Kaess said.

She said the school board was serious and sincere about meeting the city's guidelines and had ordered four studies including a

# Frank J. Welcenbach

"Good morning, students and teachers, this is your principal, Mr. Welcenbach.'

For more than two decades, those words echoed through the hallways and classrooms of Grosse Pointe Park's Robert Trombly School, where longtime Park resident Frank J. Welcenbach was a teacher and principal for longer than anyone can remember.

school's top administrator in 1952, Welcenbach was already a long-timer at Trombly, where he came to teach math in 1936.

"Initially, I taught homeroom in the morning and math in the afternoon to fifth and sixth graders," Welcenbach said. "At that time our math was stinko and I removed the stinko.'

Trombly's math curriculum was not the only change Welcenbach is credited with. As the Korean War raged on, a local battle ensued over the traditional selfcontained classroom wherein students spent most of the day with one teacher, who taught several subjects.

A trailblazer of sorts, Welcenbach saw the newer practice of elementary fragmentation (changing classrooms and teachers every hour) as ineffective.

As one who leaned toward the personal approach of self-containment, he abolished fragmentation, also known as the department plan, at Trombly when he was given the top seat.

"That way, the students are able to get to know the teacher better and they can form a closer relationship," he said.

The explosion was powerful enough to rip holes through garages and aluminum garage doors, he said. One of the damaged garages belonged to Councilman James Robson. The blunt cap-end of the pipe bomp went through the tire of Lomax's car.

Lomax said he is pressing

Hiller said an 18-year-old Park man has confessed to the bombing, though no charges have been filed yet. He said federal prosecutors will handle the case.

The suspect could be charged with the felony of placing an explosive with intent to destroy or damage property, which under the state statute calls for a sentence of up to 25 years in prison.

Hiller said the suspect purchased the materials to make the bomb from numerous stores. The bomp, consisting of a galvanized pipe with a cap on each end, was filled with 22-caliber bullets and nails.

Young, easily defeated accountant Tom Barrow. The defeat makes Barrow a three-time loser, including two failed attempts to oust Young.

Barrow, however, received strong support from voters in the Park and City, which are the only two communities in the Pointes that are in the 13th Congressional District. Barrow received 1,654 votes in the two Pointes and 6,736 votes overall.

Collins received 25 votes from the Pointes and 11,987 votes total, making her - according to political pundits - the next U.S. representative because the district is overwhelmingly Democratic and the monopoly is expected to hold in November. A Republican hasn't represented the 13th District since 1948.

GOP challenger Carl Edwards Sr., a K mart merchandising manager, easily won the Republican primary against two challengers. Edwards vowed before the primary to continue the campaign to November so voters would have a choice.

Barrow did well in the Pointes because of his opposition to the proposed expansion of Detroit City Airport, and a new political action group, Citizens Against Airport Expansion, was formed in the Pointes to work on Bar-

Collins favors the airport expansion, and Edwards said he is not opposed to it, though he believes a scaled-down version of the expansion will most likely be implemented.

Durant of Grosse Pointe made a valiant effort to win the right to challenge incumbent U.S. Sen. Carl Levin. Statewide Durant got 182,886 votes to winner U.S. Rep. Bill Schuette's 268,640. In the Pointes, Durant got 4,016 votes to Schuette's 1,856. Durant was also the top vote-getter in all of Wayne County with 30,197 votes to Schuette's 25,712.

In the GOP gubernatorial primary, Grosse Pointe Woods resident John Lauve was trounced by state Sen. John Engler, the state's most powerful Republican. Lauve received 63,966 votes statewide, compared with Engler's 408,073. In the Pointes, Lauve got 1,030 votes.

Grosse Pointe Park resident Philip Tannian will face incumbent state Sen. John Kelly in November. Tannian beat fellow Park resident Art Williams in the Republican contest for the 1st Senate District. Tannian took all the Pointes and received 5,918 votes to Williams' 2,057.

The Pointes soundly rejected WCCC's request for a 1-mill tax: 6,278 Pointes voters said no to

the request, while 1,726 said yes. Throughout the community college district, 93,818 voters said no, while 52,182 said yes.

The 1-mill tax request was necessary because the state has indicated that it will discontinue a special subsidy of \$10.5 million it gives WCCC, which is the only community college that is not supported by a voter-approved tax. Currently the college collects a 1/4-mill tax that was mandated by the state Legislature.

Voters have rejected tax requests to support a community college four times.

Pointes voters did approve of the 1-mill renewal for the county with a 4,477 to 3,607 vote. Countywide the vote was 98,968 for and 52,182 against.

Voter turnout was also higher in the Pointes than the county and state average.

Grosse Pointe City led with a 34.2 percent turnout; the Park followed with 27.7 percent; the Farms, 23.3 percent; the Shores, 21.4 percent; and the Woods, 21.2 percent. The average turnout for all the Pointes was 24.9 percent.

Countywide, the turnout was less than 19 percent; and statewide less than 20 percent of the registered voters turned out. In Detroit, voter participation was about 12 percent.

Lamerato also served as an accounting instructor for the Detroit College of Business.



### Gun found; four arrested

The Grosse Pointe City officer saw several bullets in the back seat of the Bronco and quickly warned the officers present. Also,


a five-shot, .38-caliber, nickleplated Smith and Wesson handgun was found.

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# Park & City back Barrow in losing bid

majority of Grosse Pointers once again voted Republican in the Mich-Again voted republicant though many in the many Park and City residents broke with their party to support Democrats in the 13th District congressional race.

It was opposition to the proposed expansion of the Detroit City Airport that brought the GOP voters in the Park and City into the Democratic column in sufficient numbers to give Tom Barrow 1,654 votes, almost one-fourth of his 6,736 district total.

In contrast, Carl R. Edwards Sr., who captured the 13th District GOP nomination, received only 591 votes in the Pointes and only 1,215 in the district in his threeman race.

Total party votes are not reported separately but a comparison of GOP votes for the U.S. Senate, which attracted the most attention in the Pointes, with the Democratic votes in the 13th District shows the Park with a majority of Democratic votes and the City with a slight margin for the

In the Park, the Republican U.S. Senate vote totalled 927 while Democrat Barrow alone captured 1,263 votes for Congress. In



the City, however, the GOP Senate totalled 780 while the Democratic 13th District congressional vote only came to 709.

Park and City voters strongly indicated their opposition to Barbara-Rose Collins, chiefly because of her support for the controversial airport project, by providing only 25 of the 11,987 votes she won in capturing the nomination that will apparently send her to Washington in January as Michigan's first black congresswoman.

Of the other Democratic candidates, Dr. Charles Vincent, who also made a strong appeal to Grosse Pointe voters, came in second to Barrow in the Park and City with 558 votes while Alberta Tinsley-Williams came in third with 196.

Other results were about as predicted except for the unexpectedly strong race run by Clark Durant of Grosse Pointe for the GOP nomination for the U.S. Senate.

Durant, who had been trailing badly in the polls, obtained about 40 percent of the vote and on election night seemed to have a chance to win on the basis of the exit polling but Rep. William Schuette pulled away in the actual count.

In the Pointes, however, Durant easily distanced Schuette, 4,016 to 1,856. Durant also carried Wayne County, 30,197 to 25,712, as well as Oakland, Macomb, Washtenaw, Lenawee, Hillsdale, Houghton and Keweenaw counties.

The difficulty of doing accurate polling in a primary because of the traditional light turnout helped explain Durant's poor standing in the early polls. Less than 20 percent voted in the state.

In addition, many polls were taken before Durant's own TV and radio commercials had been aired. Furthermore, Durant's own supporters in the field came on strong in support of his family campaigning in the final weeks. Such factors contributed to his last-minute surge.

In his concession speech, Durant said, in part, "Our ideas and our people really made a race that no one thought was possible," and then added a prediction, "You ain't seen the last of Clark Durant," that augurs well for his political future.

In his contest for the GOP gubernatorial nomination, John Lauve of Grosse Pointe Woods did not fare as well as Durant did. He got only about a tenth of the statewide vote that went to Sen. John Engler of Mount Pleasant who won the nomination and carried the Pointes, 4,626 to 1,030.

In a contested primary involving two Grosse Pointe Park residents, Phillip Tannian's defeat of Art Williams for the GOP nomination in the 1st state Senate District assures the GOP of a tough competitor against Democratic Sen. John Kelly of Grosse Pointe Woods in November.

The GOP believes nomination of Tannian, former Detroit police commissioner who also served as a Detroit and Wayne County official, gives it a chance to pick up an additional seat to help hold Senate control. The Democrats will fight equally hard to hold it as they seek to wrest control from the GOP.

Senate control will be especially important because state senators serve four-year terms and those elected in 1990 will assume with House members the task of redistricting both legislative and congressional seats after the 1990 census figures are reported, whether the reapportionment moves occur in 1991 or 1992.

If one party controls both houses, it will be in charge of redistricting. If the division remains, the task is expected to be performed by the courts, as it was in 1982 after Gov. William Milliken vetoed the proposal passed by the two Democratic houses.

It was that reapportionment, only slightly modified by the appeals court, that divided the Pointes into two congressional districts, a move that the News and many Pointers called gerrymandering.

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# Nimbys lose on library site

espite strong opposition from Brownell school area residents, the Grosse Pointe Farms City Council Monday night approved the revised site plan for a new public library building on the school grounds on Chalfonte Avenue in \*the Farms. \*\* Also 1

The 3-2 vote reversed a 5-2 decision in April that rejected the first plan for the Brownell site. The approval apparently paved the way for the Grosse Pointe School District to vote in February on a bond issue now estimated at \$7.6 million to finance the building.

Once again the Nimbys were out in force to express their views about the site under the unannounced Nimby banner, "Not in my backyard," that has become the national rallying cry of opponents of public and commercial projects in their own neighborhoods.

Even though the new plan called for an increased building setback from Chalfonte and other changes asked at the April meeting, the audience of almost 200 people in the South High School auditorium appeared to be strongly against the new site as well.

The foes also provided eight opposition speakers to only four pro-plan witnesses during the public hearing that preceded the council vote and often greeted plan supporters with derisive comments.

When Mayor Joseph Fromm announced his support, after opposing the first site plan, there was a chorus of complaint and at least one cry of "We need a new mayor" was heard in the hall.

The critics apparently failed to recall that at the April hearing Fromm had suggested some of the changes that were incorporated in the revised site plan and had urged the school board to consider a re-

vamped site plan on the Brownell grounds. Gail Kaess and John Danaher, who had voted for the first plan, also supported the second one with Gregg Berendt and John M. Crowley voting against the new plan as

they did on the first plan.

The mayor's shift became crucial because the two absentees, Harry Echlin and Emil Berg, who opposed the first plan, split on the second one in statements left with city officials.

The revised plan, in the minds of three council members and other Farms officials questioned during the hearing, met the criteria required by state law and city ordinances. În general, it also appeared to answer many of the earlier criticisms of the first plan.

But the audience renewed many complaints, ranging from fears the library site would destroy the children's playground to the charge that increased traffic would damage local property values.

Even professional architects living in the Brownell area differed. One complained that the plan deviates from sound architectural practices but another approved the new plan and found the traffic studies "su-

All in all, it was another raucous demonstration of democracy in action that ended with approval of a new library site but also with the threat of possible court action that might halt the proposed bond issue.

In our view, the board of education ought to go ahead with plans for a vote by all school district residents on whether to issue the bonds to finance the project. Then all Pointers, not just the Nimbys in the Brownell School neighborhood, will have the chance to vote for a second time about the need for a new library.

# City upholds voting tradition

Toters in Grosse Pointe City upheld the Pointes' tradition of good turnouts when more than a third of them turned up at the polls in last week's

A total of 1.593 City voters, or 34.2 percent of the registered voters, cast ballots in the primary. The Park was second with 27.7 percent of its registered voters casting ballots but its vote total of 3,031 was the highest of any of the Pointes.

The best explanation for the higher turnouts in the City and the Park than in the three Pointe communities is that both are in the 13th Congressional District in which there was a highly competitive battle for the Democratic nomination as well as a contest for the GOP nomination for Congress.

In the other Pointes, turnouts were disappointing considering that two county millage proposals were on the ballot. Only 23.3 percent voted in the Farms and 21.4 percent in the Shores but the Woods, with the largest population in the Pointes, had the lowest percentage of voters, 21.2.

On the 1-mill county tax renewal, the Pointes went along with the rest of the county in expressing its approval by a, 4,477 to 3,607 margin but the Pointes also joined the county in rejecting Wayne County Community College's request for a new 1-mill county-wide levy.

In fact, the Pointes' margin of rejection, 6,278 to 1,726, was much larger on a proportional basis than the countywide decision, 93,818 to 52,182.

That strong Grosse Pointe opposition stemmed, at least in part, we believe, to the Grosse Pointe News' revelations that WCCC had been collecting an undisclosed levy that already totalled 0.99 of a mill. That total included not only the onequarter mill the Legislature had imposed on county taxpayers but another fraction of a mill required to service the school's bonded indebteness.

It was the fourth time the school had sought an additional county levy and the fourth straight time it had been rejected. The voters' response, especially from the

Pointes, was "No way!"





#### Transplant center receives approval

The Transplant Specialty Center at St. John Hospital and Medical Center has received official approval from the federally mandated organization, United Network for Organ Sharing, to perform kidney and pancreas transplants. The Transplant Specialty Center will focus on patients with endstage kidney disease and insulin dependent diabetes.

Heading the transplant program is Henry K. Oh, M.D., F.A.C.S., who came to St. John from Henry Ford Hospital where he served as director of the Pancreas Transplant Program and acting head, Division of Transplant Surgery.

Oh received his medical degree from Yon Sei University Medical College, Seoul, Korea, and served his residency in gen-

He has been a transplant surgeon for 14 years and is certified by the American Board of Surgery. Oh is the president-elect for the Transplant Society of Michigan and a board member of the Organ Procurement Agency of Michigan.

The medical director of the new transplant program is Robert Provenzano, M.D., a transplant nephrologist who was also trained at Henry Ford Hospital.

Assisting Oh and Provenzano is Nancy A. Turza, R.N., B.S.N., C.C.T.C., who has joined the team as transplant specialist. Turza was formerly the transplant nurse associate at Henry Ford Hospital where she was instrumental in coordinating the Pancreas Transplant Program.

No on matter how fleet of foot events prove to be, and no matter how they tickle us, we need to pursue them with calm and vigor, lest our understanding run away from us too.

Perhaps we can get hold of events in the Soviet Union. As a threat to our security she appears finished. The Soviet economy lies in ruins, unable to make a smooth transition to a market system. Soviet manufacturers are without supplies needed for production. Soviet consumers face shortages and rising prices. And Soviet workers experience the great pains of unemployment.

Recognizing the scale of the crisis, Gorbachev begs a miserly West for easy credit. He says outright that without Western aid, things will grow "more painful" still. And given the present situation, this admits of impending disaster.

But today in the Soviet Union, not only have lesser republics such as the Baltic states of Latvia, Estonia and Lithuania declared their sovereignty, so have the core industrial and agricultural republics of Russia and the Ukraine. The Soviet Union is no House Divided; it is an Abandoned House.

Catching up with events in the rest of Europe proves a bit more difficult. The end of the Soviet threat, and the recent democratic revolutions in Eastern Europe mean the end of NATO and the Warsaw Pact alliance.

United States policy currently is that the alliances are still important for world security even in the absence of the Cold War for which they were formed. However, alliances hold together only so long as they serve a purpose that is in the interests of the parties involved.

Without the Cold War, maintenance of the current system of alliances must be artificial and burdensome to those nations subcribing to its dictates. Hence, the alliances cannot remain for long as more than a vestige of the great ideological conflict now re-

The various nations of Europe, therefore, will be free to arrange their international political affairs in any way they see to their particular advantage. Eastern European nations undoubtedly will continue to struggle for some time with their economic difficulties, as they, like the Soviet Union, discover that years of central economic control cannot give way to capitalist prosperity at the wave of a hand.

Nevertheless, once the Eastern of? We shall see.

European nations resolve their internal problems, they will have their respective expectations and demands for the world to contend with.

Western Europe, for its part, attempts to move toward economic union. Most on the continent are agreed, having seen so much bloodshed in the 20th century, that union is the best way to ensure a peaceful and prosperous Europe.

Yet Britain continues to drag her feet in this regard, clinging to her precious sovereignty and making noises about a German plot to take over Europe through political wile and economic indomitability.

And what about Germany? Scarcely anyone can keep up with her. Chancellor Kohl cleverly moved reunification along too fast for its slack-jawed objectors to intercede. Now, on Dec. 2 of this year, for the first time since the defeat of her armies 45 years ago, Germany will be one

Together, East and West Germany will be more than 80 million strong and very likely more prosperous than ever. We are told that the German-Polish borders will be kept as they are. But we cannot say with confidence that Germany has put her Polish claims entirely out of mind.

There is one thing, however, of which we can rest assured. The united Germany will have her own ambitions and her own policies, and will in all cases act according to her own perceived interests, regardless of the anxieties of the rest of the world.

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# News Park man advises Czechoslovakian officials on air pollution

With the thawing of Eastern Europe, Dr. Peter Warner of Grosse Pointe Park was called upon recently to advise Czechoslovakian leaders on environmental concerns.

He and his colleagues were pleasantly surprised with what they saw.

"We were all just very positively impressed," he said. "A few of their methods could use improvements in spots, but they were pretty much up to date."

Warner, 53, is chief of the technical services section of the Air Pollution Control Division of the Wayne County Health Department. His doctorate is in chemistry.

After more than two decades with the county, Warner is an expert in air pollution monitoring and controls. And because Czechoslovakia wanted advice on environmental matters, Warner was one of several to tour the former communist country for two weeks.

He returned Aug. 1 along with his colleagues, Dr. Ralph Ku-mmler, chief of chemical and metallurgical engineering at Wayne State University; Michael Lyons, director of WSU's English Language Institute; Dr. Jaroslav Vostal, senior medical adviser at the General Motors Technical Center; and WSU political science professor Maurice Waters.

Waters was in Czechoslovakia last December to observe the helping solve environmental

"The people have a long-term interest (in environmental quality)," Warner said. "They are disappointed in what was done under the Soviets. Now they believe they have their chance. They're certainly not dragging their feet."

While the Czechs have made headway in fighting pollution, including the recent passage of a clean air bill similar to the United States' now in Congress, they are yearning for the latest technology.

Warner said Czechoslovakia's indigent fuel source is lignite: a soft, brownish-black, high-carbon coal that is considered very dirty

To counter the lignite pollution in the short term, the Czechs want to use more natura. gas. The long-term solution would be nuclear and hydroelec-

The Czechs asked for advice on their flood water management, but there was little the WSU team could add to what has already been done in Czechoslovakia to hold and control floods. Some of the flood-control systems are elaborate, Warner said.

While the media like to show shots of defoliated forests near industrial cities, Warner said if the cameras panned across the road, they would see the dead forests being bulldozed away and replanted with pollutant-resistant trees to hold the soil while pollutants are being curbed.

Following the Great Lakes experience, the Czechs are fighting nitrate runoff from over-fertilization practices, and phosphate buildup from detergents. And just as the case here, the Czechs are banning the use of phosphate cleaners and are looking for substitutes.

Not only are the Czechs hun-

gry for new pollution-control technology, they are also craving crash courses in English and French so they can deal with the Western world. Today, there are some 1,500 Russian language instructors without jobs in Czechoslovakia, Warner said.

The Soviets haven't left Czechoslovakia yet.

Warner said the Red Army still handles security throughout the country, and the American guests flew in Soviet planes. The Red Army is expected to pull out for good soon, Warner said.

The WSU team's report will be positive, Warner said, reflecting the members' being impressed with the pollution controls in place and the enthusiasm of the new government's willingness to fight pollution head on.

"They're very anxious to be right up front," he said. "They are very intensely interested in improving the environment."



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

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

# Look for pattern, design


Patterns and designs are encountered so often in our daily lives, they can play an important part in our photography. They can make order out of chaos and lend harmony to a seemingly meaningless design.

## Towing two vehicles now legal

highest number of boat registrations in the country, it is now legal to tow both a camping-type trailer and a boat trailer behind a pickup truck, a combination known as recreation double. The camping trailer must be hitched to the pickup truck with a "fifth wheel" (not a ball-hitch) cou-

University of Michigan transportation researchers conducted a study from which the Michigan Legislature formulated the new law, enacted in May. The researchers found the doubles as stable as single trailer combinations if their total length, including the truck, does not exceed 59 feet and they are driven no faster than 55 mph.

"At reasonable speeds and loading weights, the addition of a second, ball-hitched trailer behind the fifth-wheel camper does not appear to affect maneuverability or steering response," said researchers Robert D. Ervin and Charles C. MacAdam of the U-M Transportation Research Insti-

"As with any other vehicle, increasing speed causes a towed trailer to oscillate more rapidly," MacAdam said, noting that the speed and length constraints adopted for recreational doubles in Michigan are selected to keep these tendencies under control.

"In the past, depending on where you were driving in Michigan, you may or may not have been stopped for towing a dou-Ervin said. "One sheriff would ticket, another would look the other way."

Officials in the recreation industry have protested the length limit as too short, pointing out that a limit of 62-65 feet is common in many western states. The 10 most popular recreational trailers range in length from 17 to 33 feet, while an average boat trailer selected for the U-M study was 23 feet long.

It is estimated that 50 percent of Michigan's 8,195 registered

"fifth wheel" campers will meet the length restriction when coupled with an average boat trailer.

Ervin and MacAdam used computer simulation to evaluate common driving maneuvers that might lead to loss of control. Specifically they examined the amount of oscillation or side to side movement of the trailers caused by right or left turns or lane changes.

Ervin noted that the most significant factor affecting safety is the length of the camper. Because the camper is typically built with a long overhang behind its axles, the vehicle combination is less stable with a long camper than with a short one.

The Michigan Office of Highway Safety Planning will conduct a study for the state Legislature over the next two years to determine the impact of the new law on recreational activity and accident rates.

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

Unfortunately, many might not be able to come because there won't be a place for them to stay.

All over the United States, volunteers and staff with student exchange services say they are facing a critical shortage of host family homes for year-long high school exchanges.

If host families aren't found within the next few weeks, some organizations say that many students eager to live an American experience may have to give up their dream.

When both husband and wife have separate careers, they are often reluctant to take on the responsibility of caring for an international high school student. They worry that the student may feel neglected and unhappy in this family situation.

Two-career families and singleparent families should not rule themselves out, according to Bill Gustafson, president of ASSE International Student Exchange Programs.

Some of the exchange agencies seeking local families are:

American Scandinavian Student Exchange: ASSE, founded by the Swedish government, is affiliated with the Swedish and Finnish national Departments of Education, maintains 21 offices in 19 countries and arranges more than 10,000 high school age student exchanges annually. In August, over 2,300 girls and boys, 15 through 18 years of age from Sweden, Denmark, Germany, Mexico, France, England, Australia and 11 other countries, plan on coming to the United States through the ASSE program. 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

# Park provides backdrop for Cadillac video manuals

deos, which have been in Cadillac and Buick glove boxes for several years, are owner's manuals. They cover such things as proper starting procedures, maintenance, changing tires, using the accessories and so on - just like a printed manual.

The taping in Grosse Pointe Park was for 1991 Cadillacs.

Kevin Johnson, GTN location coordinator and assistant producer, said during taping Aug. 6 that several Park addresses were being used for the video locations, as well as Windmill Pointe Park.

# Migraine related to psychiatric disorders

In a study of more than 1,000 young adults, researchers at Henry Ford Hospital found that 60 percent of the study participants who had migraine headaches also suffered from either anxiety, depression or both. Depending on the type of migraine, these individuals were 2-1/2 to 6-1/2 times more likely to suffer from those psychiatric problems than people who didn't have migraine headaches.

"Persons with migrains also were more likely to experience panic attacks, obsessive compulsive behaviors and phobias," said Naomi Breslau, Ph.D., of the Departments of Psychiatry and Biostatistics and Research Epidemiology at Henry Ford Hospital. Breslau is principal investigator for the study.

"Migraine, anxiety and depression may simply be different expressions of the same underlying genetic vulnerability," said Glenn C. David, M.D., chairman of the Department of Psychiatry and co-principal investigator for the study. "Possibly, the neurochemistry that causes these disorders overlaps or is linked in some way we don't yet understand."

Although previous research hinted at a link between psychiatric disorders and migraine, this is one of the first studies to provide detailed data showing an association with depression and specific anxiety disorders. David and Breslau recently reported on the study at the International Association for the Study of Pain's VI World Congress on Pain held in Australia.

The study also addresses the chicken and egg dilemma regarding which comes first: migraine or psychiatric problems. While it may seem logical to assume the pain and stress of migraine trigger anxiety and depression, the facts don't support that premise. In approximately 70 percent of migraine sufferers who had psychiatric disorders, psychiatric symptoms (primarily

anxiety symptoms) preceded the onset of migraine attacks, often by several years.

Other findings from the study of migraine include:

• Of the 1,007 study participants, nearly 13 percent suffered from migraine, with common migraine slightly more prevalent than classic.

• Women are more than 1 1/2 times more likely to suffer from migraine than men.

• In comparison to women, men are younger when they experience their first migraine attack and they have a higher rate of remission

• Migraine is inversely related to education. Individuals with a college education are far less likely to be affected by migraine than those with lower educational achievement.

• There is no difference in the prevalence of migraine between blacks and whites.

Because the man didn't have \$3,400 for bail, he was arrested and turned over to Detroit police at the 5th Precinct.

The resident told police he has been having an ongoing dispute with Detroit over a tax bill but he didn't know a warrant had been issued for his arrest for tax

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
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

# Pointe students won't see Channel One in the schools

Channel One, the controversial news show aimed at middle and high school students, will not hit the airwaves in the Grosse Pointe schools.

The board of education accepted the recommendation from Superintendent Ed Shine to keep the program - and the commercials that come with it - out of the classrooms.

Whittle Communications made headlines across the country when it first offered the program a few years ago. The corporation said it would give school districts nearly \$50,000 of electrical equipment, including a satellite dish, a television for every 23 students, a timer and a receiver

to record the program. The equipment would be wired together throughout the entire district, allowing for computer linkup and other video programming, aside from the regular pro-

gramming. reasons the district decided not the board drop the project. to go forward with the project.

But the main reason the district decided against Channel One is the amount of instructional time taken up by a 12minute-a-day program which contractually had to be seen by 90 percent of the students for 90 percent of the school days.

"Philosophically, we had a problem with delegating the content of the curriculum to another body other than our teachers and administrators," said Dr. Alfreida Frost, director of elementary curriculum. Frost works closely with the Curriculum Coordinating Committee which recommended denial.

Frost said the committee formed by the CCC which studied Channel One recommended getting the system. But the CCC decided - for perhaps the first time in its four-year history - to go against the committee's recommendation.

said, is not worth the loss of instructional time or the message it sends to the community.

"We have to show that the schools have a value system of what is important," Shine said. "If we went ahead, we would be indicating to the community that that is where our values lie. We are not willing to sell the instructional time of our students."

To get the most out of the program, the teachers would have to discuss the contents of the program with the students, taking more time from the school's scheduled curriculum.

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
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#### Statewide telephone system for hearing impaired planned

is personnel and operator service centers will operate a statewide telecommunications relay system that will enable hearing and speech-impaired people to communicate with virtually anyone within the state.

The Michigan Public Service Commission in March ordered Michigan Bell and other state telephone companies to establish the system by late 1991. The companies recently agreed that Michigan Bell will operate the system.

The Michigan Association for Deaf, Hearing and Speech Services estimates that as many as 600,000 Michigan citizens are "communidatively impaired" and could benefit from the system.

To use the system, a hearingor speech-impaired person must have a telephone device with a keyboard, called a telecommunications device for the deaf or TDD. Using the TDD, the customer calls a statewide 800 telephone number that reaches a specially trained Michigan Bell relay operator who then connects the person with whom the caller wishes to communicate.

The caller types a message into the TDD which the operator receives at the center. The operator reads the message to the called party, then relays his or her response back to the caller using a TDD. The system works in reverse for customers wishing

This was about 3 inches below what it was a year ago, and about 1 inch above one month

# School board defines cuts, balances budget

Budget cuts are two words all school boards fear, but the Grosse Pointe board of education breezed through its share of the state budget cuts in the blink of an eye. And without raising taxes or going to the people for a mill increase.

The board - along with school boards throughout the state was forced by a last-minute cut in state aid to reduce its 1990-91 budget by \$1.625 million.

A recommendation for balanc-

ing the budget by Superintend- will come out of the building and ent Ed Shine was approved by the board Monday night.

The recommendation calls for reducing the district's fund equity by \$1 million, leaving a balance of \$2 million; reducing the central budget by \$452,000; reducing school budgets on a weighted per-pupil basis by \$108,000; and reducing the library budget's fund equity by \$35,000 and cutting library spending by \$30,000.

Nearly half of the \$452,000 coming from the central budget

site fund, with another \$146,000 saved by trimming all central

budget line items by 1.5 percent. Other cuts were made in technology, staff development and the Curriculum Coordinating Council. The largest library cuts came

in the areas of new books, supplies and programming.

School principals, some with help from their program advisory committee, determined where cuts would be made in their building's budget.

But this is only the beginning of budget crunches in the district, according to Christian Fenton, assistant superintendent for

business affairs. The state cuts, which came mostly in the area of FICA reimbursements to the districts, will be larger in 1991-92, he said, perhaps as much as \$2 million.

The following year's cuts may be

even larger. The board will revise its general appropriations act before September when it will set the mill rate for the year.

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

the Central Library building on Kercheval at Fisher.

"We looked at a lot of sites but none was as appropriate as the house next door," Weber said.

"We're hoping that the city will grant the rezoning from residential to community service because the house lends itself to small classes, symposiums, conferences and lectures.

"We're not expanding our activities as much as relieving some of the pressure on the Alger House by moving a few of the activities to the house at 40

Some residents said they were concerned not only about additional traffic at the site, but how the house was purchased from former owner John Griffin, who

attended the meeting. Griffin said he sold the house to local developer John C. Uznis for \$1.3 million. Uznis, who originally considered moving into the house, sold it to the War Memorial a few months later for

roughly the same price.

"After purchasing the house, I later became aware of the War Memorial's interest in the property," Uznis said. "Since I was unsure of what to do with the house, I offered it to the War Memorial."

Uznis said he offered the house at a nominal profit because he is a supporter of the War Memorial.

Dealing with another concern, War Memorial board member William D. Monahan said since no additional parking spaces will be created on the new property, classes and lectures will not generate much traffic at the site. He added that an occasional drop-off of a disabled person may cause

minor traffic problems. LeRoy Wulfmeier III, a Lakeshore resident and opponent of the War Memorial's recent bid for a Class C liquor license, asked what the War Memorial would do with the house if the Farms City Council denies the

rezoning request. Kay said there are no formal

plans, but the War Memorial would consider resale or rental if rezoning is denied. A hearing for rezoning is scheduled for Sept. 10 before the Farms City Coun-

Finally, a couple of nearby residents criticized the War Memorial, saying if programs and services provided to the community were reduced, the facility's directors would have no need for the

Kay said the mission of the War Memorial is to serve the community. "To reduce our services would not be fulfilling our mission and we really cannot do that," Kay said. "We are here to serve the community. What they are saying is just don't do as much.'

Commenting on plans for a non-profit, local origination cable studio, Weber said no location has been formally decided upon. Under consideration is the plan approved recently by the Farms City Council to extend the Alger House's art wing addition.

Weber said a cable studio

could also be built in the garage area of the adjacent house, though the plan may require approval by the council.

Today, Welcenbach's time is spent nurturing flowers and vegetables.



they re not in danger, they are concerned about escalating world tensions after nearly a year of an uneasy peace among the world powers. The Shores resident, who said he was speaking from no political viewpoint, said the average Arab on the street is confused by American policies in the Middle

"The Arab layman believes (what Hussein did) is what has happened to the Palestinian people and no one said anything,' Yahia said. "The perception is that if the bad guys are our allies, we can tolerate it, but if the bad guys are our enemies, we don't have any tolerance."

Since Egypt's Nasser died, there has not been a strong Arab leader, Yahia agrees, but he said the way Hussein has achieved his strength - through terror and strongarm tactics - is not very popular.

But at least part of the blame could be laid on the United States government, he

"By observing with indifference the way Hussein ran his country, if he is in this position of popularity, he was helped in part by the United States," Yahia said. "Hussein is ruthless, but he's not a mad-

man," he said. "I'm not a fan of his by any means, but a lot of people are hoping he can be the strong Arab leader who can bring Arab unity. "There is a feeling of Arab nationalism


that cannot be denied, but whether that is politically feasible is the question." Yahia summed up the situation by calling it "a struggle for power through oil and

# 'Knight of Burning Pestle' is rollicking 17th century romp

Neither death, separation of lovers or seeing ghosts are taken seriously in Francis Beaumont's Elizabethan farce, "The Knight of the Burning Pestle," and Stratford's actors take full advantage of it.

They romp through every improbable scene of this burlesque of 17th century London life with a style that keeps the audience 'chuckling from start to finish. While a description of the plot would be really hopeless, the situation bears some explanation.

Beaumont uses two devices to surprise the audience. One is the relatively common play within a play. The other is that he brings this about by the risky trick of having principal actors planted in the audience.

They are a London grocer and his wife who step out of their seats to complain about the play they have come to see. At her behest, he pays the troupe to Rafe, perform along with the company.

Moreover, they insist on inserting fanciful episodes that poke good-natured fun at the pretentions of knight errantry. Hence, Rafe the grocer's appren-



tice, becomes the Knight of the Burning Pestle.

Pat Galloway as the grocer's wife manages to steal the show (though not without a fight from other members of the cast). She repeatedly rises from her seat to interrupt either because she wants Rafe to perform another


And always it is a gentle satire in which even the villains are lovable and forgivable, as well as thoroughly laughable.

# 'Problem Child' has its problems

It's hard to say where to place "Problem Child" in the lexicon of the film industry. It's probably meant to be a comedy in an outrageously silly way.

I can see kids jumping up and down with glee at the diabolical antics of Junior Healy (Michael Edwards). The kid never gives anyone a break. He's a monster who can create havoc out of any situation and then turn around with wide-eyed innocence and a "who me" attitude.

Watching his shenanigans, one wonders where the inspiration for this little demon came from. As the film progresses, it's obvious that this kid is beyond just being a tormenter. He's more like a Stephen King character.

But wait a minute. Maybe we have missed the point of the film. Edwards is not a bad boy and we have a clip from "Boys" Town" with Spencer Tracy to remind us that there is no such thing as a bad boy. That notion is quickly vanquished by Edwards, who says: "What does he know anyway.

Actually, the saga of Edwards and his progression from infancy to the amazing age of 7 - amazing because he made it that far - is one that involves the frazzled nerves of would-be parents and their capitulation to near lunacy

It begins on a Dickensian note when a shrouded figure leaves a basket at the door of what appears to be an affluent household. A maid answers the door and lets out a scream. The lady

Leaving him to continue his rampages, the film switches to suburbia where John Ritter and his ditsy wife are looking out the window at the neighbor's gathering for a child's birthday party and feeling sorry for themselves

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
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
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# Tragic blues singer profiled in Attic's 'Hot Snow'

never really explained. There is only the reference to being remembered as Ericka teaches Valaida a Jewish lullaby. This becomes significant only as we recall from the program notes that Valaida's last concern in life was not to be forgotten.

But even unsatisfied in our desire to get a more complete picture of Valaida's life and personality, we get involved. We suffer with her in her imprisonment and agonize for her in her 14-year struggle to regain her almost star status.

A most touching tie between her successful career and the imprisonment occurs when Valaida sings snatches of the blues song "In My Solitude" while in the concentration camp. Moreover, Braden's performance makes us aware that the real tragedy was Valaida's inability to regain memorable star status comparable to Ethel Waters and Sophie Tucker, with whom she had often shared the limelight.

For at the moment that her comeback became a reality in 1956, Valaida suffered a fatal stroke.

"Hot Snow" is movingly performed and its subject appears to have been colorful and talented enough to warrant a biographical play. It is intriguing to speculate how much more impact the play could have if Holder would take up the script once more and research or invent more depth to this intriguing performer's story.



Who wants to own a vehicle Ford's ultra-popular Taurus. ers say "I do" each year as they cort. climb enthusiastically into their

new vehicles on the market and have been for the past several years. While many earn their keep as work vehicles, the majority are bought for personal uses like commuting to work and running errands.

Owners have become the tail wagging the dog. As more people switch from passenger cars to light trucks, they are letting the manufacturers know what they want in their new vehicles. And hauling capacity isn't often near the top of the list. Instead, it's options like air conditioning, a good sound system, comfortable seats, power windows, ABS brakes, tinted glass - things that make these trucks more like passenger cars.

Fifteen years ago - maybe only 10 - a driver might think twice about showing up at the club, at church or at a dinner party in a pickup truck. Now no one bats an eye. They are widely accepted, to the point of outselling several popular passenger cars. Sales of the Ford Ranger through the first six months of this year were close to those of



Ford says Ranger buyers include young thinking consumers who want something different; families looking for a utilitarian second vehicle; first-time buyers and business owners in need of an economical commercial vehi-

"Ranger owners tend to be more upscale than owners of our full-size F-series pickups," says Woody Haines of Ford Public Af-"However, we're now seeing a trend toward upscale among full-size owners as well."

Haines says Ranger dates back to the 1983 model year. Before that, Ford was bringing in compact Courier pickups through its long-time relationship with Mazda (Toyo Kogyo). The fuel crisis of the 1970s was hard on sales of gas-slurping full-size American pickups. By the end of the decade, Nissan and Toyota

were making inroads in the light truck market with their compact pickups. Until it could build its S-10 here, Chevrolet imported the little LUV truck from Isuzu. Ford had its Courier. Chrysler marketed Mitsubishi products. Volkswagen imported the Rabbit Pickup for a few years.

The test vehicle was a top ofthe-line extended-cab 1990 Ranger XLT with conveniences like power windows and power locks, automatic transmission, a 4.0-liter V-6, air, AM/FM stereo radio with tape deck and plush

Ranger prices run between \$8,000 and \$14,000, depending on equipment levels and body styles. Engine sizes include the 2.3-liter fuel-injected four, a 2.9liter V-6 and the 4.0-liter V-6.

Ever wonder where you put your stuff in a pickup truck you know, things like your briefcase, coat, umbrella and the bakery box full of doughnuts for the office? In the regular cab pickup, these items go on the seat beside

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you, or on the floor or in the rear bed of the truck.

Enter the fabulous extendedcab model. In this more expensive body style, you get several additional cubic feet of storage space behind the front seat. The Ranger is equipped with two side-mounted rear seats that

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
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
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
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# Neat or MESSY: Teens' rooms cause parent-child conflicts

"I keep my room pretty clean," Julee said. Both agreed that keeping her room clean is not a big source of conflict in the Mertz

"There are so many other things it's necessary to communicate about with teenagers. If communication breaks down about the room, the child may clam up. The bedroom is the child's domain.






Day in, day out, Milt Bielfield plays as much duplicate bridge as almost anyone I know in the Detroit area. Like so many who play, Milt just thoroughly enjoys the challenge and competition the game imparts upon its' participants. Recently there seems to be an even stronger will to perform well. This is certainly more apparent to me with each passing week. He seems to sincerely be in search of right from wrong in his bidding and play and this is a very encouraging attribute. This degree to which he pursues accuracy often requires a lengthy and meaningful explanation to satisfy his keen inquisitiveness. I have said to him on occasion that it's unfortunate that one of the great players of forty years ago didn't harness his aptitude and interest for he has the natural talent at cards to be practiced and proficient. Of course in those days he was so vested in local tennis championship medals that he had little of the time that is required to become a bridge star. When six or seven years ago he finally cased his racket for the last time (tennis was truly his first love) he has become a daily devotee

We have only played twice, but have never won. On a good day we would have because our performances were a shade shy of priceless. On the first occasion, we scored 170-1/2 on a twenty-four board average of 144 and finished 2-1/2 match points out of first. Our second sitting was even more perplexing with a 179-1/2 on a 144 average. This time we were only 1/2 a point below the top.

Milt is easy to play with and fulfills the role of partner very agreeably. He uses his time at the table to think with. His play is far above average and he's flexible enough to put suggestions to work for a win. Some feel uncomfortable with four card majors, but Milt has never been encumbered. He handles them with good judgement and treats their use with very little anxiety.

## The Pastor's Corner

#### **Impressions**

By Rev. Walter Schmidt First English Lutheran Church



It was my privilege to host a tour for our congregation to Germany and Israel. We chose Germany because we wanted to see the Oberammergau Passion Play and, being a Lutheran congregation, it was our intent to take in sights connected with the life and work of Martin Luther. We chose Israel for obvious reasons: for the Christian it is the Holy Land — the land where Jesus carried out his ministry.

The Passion Play was very meaningful and moving, especially the end dealing specifically with the death and resurrection of Jesus. It was a long play, about six hours, and fortunately we had excellent seats about 15 rows from the front. The auditorium holds more than 5,000. Because the play was performed in German, it was a little difficult to follow, even with English scripts in front of us. If the play could have been done in English, I am sure that it would have been even more meaningful. In 10 years, when the play will be done again, I would encourage you to go.

Being from a German-Lutheran background, the tour through Germany was fascinating. The quaint Bavarian villages nestled in the hills with their red tile roofs and flower boxes on the windows, are more than just tourism propaganda; they really do exist. As one drives through Germany, especially the West, you cannot help but be impressed by the cleanliness and pride that is shown in the communities. Of course we saw many castles and cathedrals with workmanship that is priceless and beyond description. In the old days, they really knew how to build

The highlight of Germany for me, as a Lutheran pastor, was our group standing in the castle church at Wittenberg, the church where Luther nailed his 95 Theses, where he often preached and where he is buried. As we stood there soaking up the history, we sang together, "A Mighty Fortress," Luther's famous hymn.

Since this was my first trip to Germany, I was not quite sure what to expect at the border between West and East, even though I had heard and read a great deal. Our guide who had taken several tours through the border, was literally dumbfounded that there were no guards in sight. We simply drove through. The high fences topped by barbed wire were still there; no man's land, stripped clear of any buildings or trees, was still there; the patrol stations and heavy gates (now open) were still there; but no guards.

The Holy Land is the Holy Land. This was my second trip to Israel and a visit here makes the Bible come alive like no ordinary Bible study can. While there are many memorable highlights of our time spent in Israel, three stand out in my mind: standing on the Mt. of Beautitudes



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#### Reach out, touch someone? Answering machines often frustrate communication

According to a San Francisco psychiatrist, Americans are becoming a nation of citizens who do not talk to each other. He offers a case in point - the telephone answering machine - an unfriendly, wily device designed to accept or screen out what you have to say.

The answering machine is a convenience for its owner. It he or she doesn't want to talk to you, he just doesn't return your call. If he calls back, he does so at his convenience and too bad if it is an inopportune time for you

What you had to say may not matter anymore. It was a good idea when you made the call. Now you don't care.

Another aspect of this one-way form of communication (actually no communication at all), is its capacity for generating anxiety and/or stress.

You deliver a message, but there's no guarantee that it gets through. You worry. Did you talk loud enough? Is the machine working? Did the tape run

All these doubts and frettings

ten traveled 700 miles a day. On a comparative scale, they were at least as efficient as some mail deliveries.

These were simple, direct forms of communication, without the complications of fallen wires interrupting service, hearings on rate hikes or having service interrupted because of non-payment of bills.

Someone discovered an electric current could be sent through copper wire. Someone else wound copper wire around an iron magnet, making an electromagnet. This is the basis of the telegraph.

Along came Alexander Graham Bell. He believed that the voice as well as dots and dashes could be sent along wires. Out of his theory came the telephone. What a magic moment that must have been! People who had been separated by miles could now have the pleasure of hearing a voice they had longed to

The first telephone was a clumsy device. It had no receiver, only a mouthpiece. It was

while the "Sermon on the Mount" was read; standing in the Jordan River (yes, we brought back some water from the Jordan); and most of all, a communion service at the Garden Tomb. All three of these are outdoor places not covered up by churches; I guess I liked that best.

We never encountered problems, but we were aware of tensions in Israel. For example, when we went to the government-sanctioned gift shop, we went in through the back door because some of the fundamentalist leaders were calling for a strike.

One final observation. While we were in Europe there was much talk of arms reductions because of the thaw in East-West tensions. Some were even suggesting that we did not need to worry about the possibility of war. How quickly things change. I am reminded of the words of Jesus, that there will always be wars and rumors of wars. We, of our own human efforts, no matter how noble or sincere, cannot bring about the perfect kingdom; only God can do that.

Yes, we must strive for peace, but it will only remain a goal, not a reality, this side of heaven.

arise out of frustration because if you hadn't wanted to talk to a real live voice, you wouldn't have called in the first place.

This brings up the problem of need. Suppose you are really down and you've got to talk to a certain person - one who has a way of smoothing things out and making everything better someone you can count on. The trouble is you can't count on his phone. Instead of a warm reassuring voice, you find that in your desperate need, you're blocked by an electronic gadget.

Another annoying feature of this block to human communication is some of the attempts at wit that you'll find if you are patient enough to listen to the recording. Not content with making themselves unavailable. many answering machine owners make up cute little messages that are supposed to let you know how creative they are. Most of them are so bad they only make you madder.

Telephone answering machines are particularly hard on those for whom the phone is not a convenience but an addiction. No day is complete without a fix of a long chat with someone anyone. In between they resort to little pickups. If they have no real business to transact, they call to clarify what has been made perfectly clear to them on the last call.

Most older people have not felt the need for reading tapes instead of talking. Often the phone is their main source of keeping in contact with relatives and friends. It is a joy to catch up on all the important little happenings over the phone. It is the next best thing to a personal visit.

When people talk on the phone they are fulfilling an important function of human need the need to communicate. That means talking and listening. By talking they share their thoughts with another person. By listening they learn others' thoughts. A bond is formed.


Communication has always been important to people. The earliest inhabitants communicated with each other across distance with smoke. Indians built a fire, covered it with a wet animal skin, then quickly uncovered it. So many puffs of smoke would mean certain words.


Later, telegraph drummers were used. A large drum was partly buried in the ground because sound travels better underground. A telegraph tom-tom could be heard in a village 12 miles away. The drummer there would pound out the message for the next village until all parties were contacted.

Messages carried by homing pigeons were another means of keeping in touch. The pigeons ofnecessary to speak into the mouthpiece and then quickly. hold it to your ear to listen to the reply.

cerned about teens' isolation. They get frightened or feel threatened when the child spends lots of time in his room. Fights are often an expression of this.'



# North, South run head on into MAC

For years Grosse Pointe South ruled the Eastern Michigan League.

For years Grosse Pointe North ruled the Bi-County League, and then began ruling the Macomb Area Conference (MAC) when the Bi-County folded.

And for years to come, both will try to rule the MAC.

The MAC started in 1987-88 after the Bi-Country league went belly up. In the meantime, the EML was looking for admission into the league, but had to fulfill its own league obligation for a few more years - until last year.

By the end of the 1989-90 school year, the MAC administrators had welcomed the entire EML, which consisted of seven teams. Now, those seven schools, plus the established 17 MAC schools, will make up the state's largest athletic league.

North, which has been highly successful in the MAC for three seasons, will not only go head-tohead with South, but will have to fight the Blue Devils for league championships in every sport.

Generally, North and South clash in each sport but that used to be in non-league play. But, because of the restructuring of the three divisions, North/South matchups will take on a whole new meaning.

Under its umbrella, the MAC has three divisions; red, white and blue, all based on enrollment. There are eight schools in each division. Schools with 1,300 students or more are in the Red Division, while the White Divisions consists of schools with enrollment between 850 and 1,299. The blue schools range from 500 to 849 students.

'It's simply a numbers game," said North athletic director Tom Gauerke. "The more people in the school, the easier it is to pick a team. You can't expect a school with 500 fewer kids to compete against the larger school.'

But in previous years that was the case.

"Not any longer," Gauerke The best thing this nev league will bring is parity in divisions. It's going to give teams a great challenge each game, and it'll provide greater competition. In each division, teams will be very evenly matched."

The girls' and boys' tennis teams at North and South are the first exceptions to this year's plan. By numbers, both should be in the White Division, but because of their previous success, they asked - and were granted permission to play in the larger Red Division.

- to shuffle a particular program (sport) to compete in a bigger or smaller division based on the success of the sport," Gauerke said. "So far this arrangement has worked very

There is, however, a safeguard to the exception.

"Teams who can see that they lost a lot of players to gradua-tion, but still have the proper numbers, can't just apply to a lower division," Gauerke said. "It's purely based on the success, and not what the team looks like in a year or two.'

The move to increase what some are calling the state's 'mega-league" was in the works for 10 years, but didn't come to pass until last year.

"Schools that were aligned with one another saw a greater difference in enrollment and started calling for some help," Gauerke said. "Larger schools caused a discrepancy in size and that created unfair competition. There was a dire need to separate larger schools and create some enrollment parallels."

But even if the schools were closely matched in enrollment, it didn't necessarily mean all schools would field a team.

"One of the reasons we

about this league is that it al- wanted to expand the league lows schools - every two years was because it would help in scheduling," said Gauerke. "The expansion of sports in the early 70s started the scheduling concern. Not all schools were fielding teams in non-revenue sports, and that made it difficult for teams to compete. In some cases, there would only be four of the eight schools represented in certain sports.

So far, Gauerke hasn't noticed any glitches in the system, but North girls' track and cross country coach Charles Buhagiar, has a different feeling about his team competing in the White Division.


"The league is going to be a war - especially in track," he said. "Almost all of the best girls' track teams are in the middle division and that's going to make it very difficult, but it'll also be very competitive.

"I don't think it was done on purpose, however. I think it just worked out that way.

Since entering the MAC, Buhagiar's cross country and track teams have finished first.

"I think that record will be in jeopardy every meet now," he said. "Instead of running a tough dual meet and then just running through an easier one a few days later, we're going to have to become a great dual-





"After the first day, in which we sailed twice, we felt very comfortable," he said. "Our boat speed was excellent and the crew worked very effectively togeth-




