
"By the time I started kindergarten, I was already a fixture on the school grounds," DuPont said.

Grosse Pointe City has lost more than twice as many trees to Dutch elm disease this year than last year, despite continuing efforts to save them.

The city plans to cut down about 140 trees on public property this year, according to Administrative Assistant Chris Bremer. She said 128 trees have already been cut down this year.

Private tree losses this year are expected to total an additional 40 to 45 trees, she said. Though the city monitors all trees, public and private, it is more difficult to keep track of private trees being cut down.

"This is an absolute recordbreaking year to date," she said. "We're doing all we can. It (elm the country.

ers have a specified time period in which to have their diseased trees removed.

The trees that have to come down are injected with cacodylic acid, causing the leaves to turn bronze and attracting the disease-carrying bark beetles to the ailing tree and away from other trees.

To prevent transmission of the disease to other trees through the roots, infected trees are sometimes girdled — a process in which a 4- to 5-inch strip around the trees is cut with a chain saw and the bark peeled away. Girdled trees are placed on the removal list.

The City also sells a fungicide, Lignasan, to residents. The fungicide is injected into a healthy elm to protect it from beetles. Residents can inject the fungicide themselves by borrowing

equipment furnished by the City. Grosse Pointe City spends \$88,000 a year for its tree program, which includes planting replacement trees.

In the Park, Tarabula knows all the elm trees intimately. He walks the entire city inspecting the elms on public and private property. He recommends whe-

ther they should be trimmed or condemned. For trees on private property, he sends the resident a letter recommending what should be done.

The Park also injects cacodylic acid to prevent the fungus from being spread to other trees. To stop root transmission, the Park also uses a trencher to cut the roots between elms.

But despite the efforts to prevent the spread of the disease, there seems to be no way to stop

# School board, teachers reach tentative agreement By Ronald J. Bernas

The bargaining teams for the school board and the Grosse Pointe Education Association entered the bargaining room on Tuesday morning, Aug. 28, and emerged nearly 24 hours later with a tentative contract, concluding months of bargaining.

The new three-year contract, which has yet to be ratified, was presented to union members on Aug. 30. Union bylaws state members cannot vote on it until at least 10 days after that date.

Terms of the settlement were announced by Superintendent Ed Shine who also said he was pleased to be able to settle the contract before the scheduled start of school Sept. 5.

Included in the contract is a wage increase of 7 percent for year of the contract. each year of the contract.

In a money-saving move for the board, newly hired teachers tute a seven-period day in the will not be covered by the traditional Blue Cross/Blue Shield

plan. Instead, they will be provided with Preferred-Provider and Health Maintenance organizations (PPOs and HMOs).

After two years of service in the district, teachers may switch to the traditional Blue Cross coverage. This process will begin with the 1991-92 school year.

New librarians hired after this contract goes into effect will be paid on a separate salary schedule from teachers. Details of that pay scale were not made public.

Additionally, in a move which will change the way the district's middle schools operate, the contract approves an adviseradvisee program and will institute a seven-period day for middle school students in the second

A study committee late last year suggested the board instimiddle school as part of a major restructuring.

Other points of the contract allow for direct deposit of paychecks for teachers and increasing elementary school planning time by 15 minutes a week.

The school calendar remains at 181 days of instruction a year for students and 184 teacher duty days, and maintains the traditional vacation schedule.

Ronald Tonks, director of personnel and head of the board's bargaining team said the new contract, including salary increases, was competitive with settlements made by other school

The tentative contract must be submitted to Local 1 of the Michigan Education Association and to the membership of the Grosse Pointe Education Association for ratification.

"When we were walking through the halls I saw my first grade teacher making plans for this year," Neeme said. "And now my son knows the school and the janitor so I don't think he's so scared."

The Neemes feel the district has given them a lot of opportunities and memories in addition to the quality education. and they believe Benjamin will also be a recipient of the school's tradition of excellence.





# Pointe couple works together to fight scourge of breast cancer

A husband-wife research team at the Michigan Cancer Foundation has made a startling discovery which may one day lead to a vaccine for breast cancer.

Drs. Irma H. and Jose Russo of Grosse Pointe Park, who have conducted research on breast cancer together for 25 years and have been married for 22 were able to reduce the incidence of breast cancer in laboratory rats by treating them with a human hormone produced naturally by the placenta during pregnancy.

The findings were published in the Aug. 1 issue of the Journal of the National Cancer Institute and have received a lot of attention in the medical world, the pair said.

The hormone, chorionic gonadotropin (hCG), is produced naturally in the placenta during pregnancy and injected into virgin rats to simulate the effects of pregnancy. After the hormone treatment, the rats were then injected with a carcinogen known to produce breast cancer in other rats, but the treated animals did not develop cancer.

The cancer incidence was reduced in direct proportion to the amount of hCG injected.

"It's been known for a long time that if a woman had a fullterm pregnancy before the age of 24 she is virtually protected from breast cancer for life," said Jose Russo. "But nobody knew why."

They found that women's breasts change permanently after pregnancy, and that change seems to form a protection.

Inside the breast, the mammary glands look like trees, Jose Russo said. After pregnancy the ends of the "branches," called terminal end buds, look like trees in summer, he said. Before pregnancy, the buds are not fully developed, like trees in winter.

Irma Russo says that if women could be treated with the hormone at an early age, they might be protected against breast cancer.

can't get pregnant by 24 years of age," she said.

The two are working to find a pharmaceutical company which would set up clinical testing of the treatment with women. What bothers Irma Russo is that it may take 30 years to determine whether it works on hu-

Other questions which need to be answered are what is the best ge to administer treatment. and what dosage would be adequate.

To date, there are no side effects, because the treatment is natural, not chemical.

"We are very happy," Irma Russo said. "Right now there is nothing to do for breast cancer but hope for early detection. This is a hope for women."

Irma Russo sees herself as an advocate for women with breast cancer, because they are, quite often, a silent group which doesn't lobby for research funds.







# Dan French dies at 49; friends remember him

Dan French was one of those people in life who seemed to attract good friends wherever he went. So said Libby Follis, a family friend for more than a decade.

"He had a quiet wit that everyone loved and he was considered a best friend by many, many people," Follis said. "He was a real gentleman, very humble and very vulnerable."

Follis said she will never forget his memorial service, which was held Aug. 28 at Christ Church in Grosse Pointe Farms. She said there were some 700 people packed in the standingroom-only ceremony which left scores of friends crying in the aisles.



# Hell hath no fury like a lady scorned


**T**ell hath no fury like a woman scorned, or so the early playwright -William Congreve said. Now Gov. James Blanchard knows what that phrase really means.

But isn't it a pity that The Detroit News and the Free Press couldn't have waited to get Lt. Gov. Martha Griffiths' side of the story before editorially endorsing Blanchard's unilateral decision to oust her from the Democratic ticket for November?

If they had waited, the dailies' editorial pages wouldn't have looked quite as silly as they do now for having approved an action that Blanchard has handled with all the delicacy of a sledgehammer and thereby prompted new questions about his administrative skills and his relations with

True, the Free Press editorial conceded that Ms. Griffiths had been helpful in winning support for the Blanchard-Griffiths ticket from women and older voters who "helped Gov. Blanchard win his narrow initial victory" in 1982.

But in a second editorial, reiterating its



support for Blanchard, the Freep told the lieutenant governor bluntly "to pack it in" and concluded she "does not deserve support in her attempts to dictate to a governor who has made a very tough decision involving some personal pain and some political risk and who has every right to decide as he did.'

The News chimed in with rare support for a Blanchard decision, this time on the grounds that "if in his judgment there are doubts that the lieutenant governor is capable of being an effective governor, he did the only proper thing.'

In other, words, the papers' editorials seem to say, "Thanks a lot, Martha, for your previous service, but what have you done for the governor and the state late-

In her interview with the Free Press last Wednesday, Martha Griffiths made it clear that she felt the governor had treated her badly all the way. She indicated Blanchard

had made up his mind to get rid of her even before he asked to see her health records and reveal her income tax statement.

She declined both requests on the solid grounds of invasion of privacy but she had offered, she explained, to submit to a physical examination by a physician of the governor's choice. On the tax issue, her husband said he had asked his wife to decline on grounds it would be an invasion of his privacy since they file joint tax returns.

In answering critics, Ms. Griffiths said, "He wouldn't even be governor if I hadn't helped him." It's true he was an obscure congressman when he asked her to run with him in 1982. Blanchard's apparent response is: "So what? This is 1990.

The lieutenant governor and her husband, Hicks, a former state Democratic chairman, told the Free Press they think Blanchard believes he'll be re-elected but wants to be able to leave the governor's

chair if and when he chooses - perhaps to run for Don Riegle's seat should the senator be ousted as a result of the savings and

According to this scenario, Blanchard could resign as governor and his lieutenant governor would become governor and promptly appoint Blanchard as senator to fill the vacancy left by Riegle's political demise.

This explanation has the ring of truth because Blanchard is a political animal who has looked out for his own political interests first, last and always and now wants to keep open as many political options as possible.

The lieutenant governor announced on Tuesday she will not contest the governor's decision, but a good many people still hope that she will at least make clear to her fellow Democrats that Blanchard's action was no way to treat a lady who had served him and the state well.

But who will be Blanchard's choice if he insists on picking a new candidate for lieutenant governor? It had better be a good one because many people, especially women and senior citizens, feel almost as aggrieved as Martha Griffiths does at her treatment.

It's worth noting, too, that on the GOP side, Sen. John Engler has come up with a solid, respectable senior citizen and state senator, Connie Binsfeld, as his running

# WCCC doth protest too much

representative of Wayne County Community College took the Grosse Pointe News to task last week in a letter to the editor that charged an editorial misrepresented the college's actions and intentions in at least two ways.

In one way, the letter said, the editorial "inappropriately implied" the college had timed its announcement of its new evening program in Grosse Pointe to influence voters to approve the Aug. 7 millage request.

In the other, the letter said that the editorial "misled readers" in contending that WCCC had not told "the full story when it went to the public to ask that the current 0.25-mill levy for operating expenses be replaced by a full 1-mill levy.

In its denial that WCCC had sought to influence voters by announcing its program at South, the letter said the program had been conceived more than a year earlier and had been approved by the Grosse Pointe Board of Education in May before the WCCC trustees had voted to seek the millage.

Such arrangements obviously are not made overnight. We have no doubt the program had been under study for some time. But we thought the announcement just before the Aug. 7 election of the start of the educational program in a community that has never strongly supported the WCCC was "more than a strange coincidence." Perhaps it was only a strange coincidence.

The second charge of misrepresentation is more serious, however. It was only after the Grosse Pointe News investigated the reason that property owners already were paying 0.99-mill to support WCCC that we learned, and most property owners realized, that 0.74 of that millage was going to pay off the college debt.

For WCCC now to claim that we misled the readers is curious since it never told the voters in advance that any of their tax dollars were committed to debt service even though since 1982 Grosse Pointe and other Wayne County property owners have paid more for debt service than for operating expenses of the college.

And for a college spokesperson to airily dismiss its failure to mention the 0.74-mill debt service levy on the grounds that it "is not used for operating expenses nor subject to voter approval" shows a callous indifference to taxpayers who are paying the bill for operating expenses as well as debt ser-

In our view, the latest allegations that the college has been overpaying some of its faculty and the dismissal of the acting president who "blew the whistle" on that practice support this newspaper's contention that the college ought to get its house in better order before it again attempts to seek greater public funding.

In short, we think the college doth protest too much.

# Adding insult to city's injury

f it weren't disappointment enough to learn that Detroit apparently will lose Lits prized possession of a population of one million, now three more cities from the rapidly growing Southwest have swept past Detroit in the 1990 census sweepstakes.

True, Detroit still may come up with the 30,000 more residents it needs to retain its one million status and thus might even surpass Dallas and Phoenix, which are larger than Detroit in the preliminary count but still less than one million.

But if Detroit can find more uncounted persons, the same may be true of those cities as well. So it seems likely that Detroit will become the ninth largest city in the nation in the 1990 census and thus drop down three notches from its 1980 standing.

While Detroit has been in a downward spiral since 1950, it was still the fifth largest city as recently as 1970. But in 1980 it was surpassed by Houston and now San Diego, Dallas and Phoenix have passed it,

Even San Antonio is close on Detroit's heels and still growing at a 17.9 percent rate while Detroit's loss in the 1990 preliminary report was at a 19.3 percent rate.

Michigan, too, lost ground in the 1990 preliminary figures but still retained its position as the eighth largest state. Three other states immediately ahead of it in the population totals - Ohio, Illinois and Pennsylvania - also lost population but at a slower rate than Michigan's 0.9 percent.

The dipping populations for Detroit and other cities and for the state itself have some dire consequences. The state is expected to lose two congressmen as well as a vast amount of federal aid that depends on population.

Equally important, the Midwest is continuing to lose congressional clout to the rapidly growing populations of California, Florida, Arizona, Nevada and Texas. And with a rapidly aging U.S. population that tends to seek the warmer climes, the outlook for the Midwest and Northeast does not indicate any early change of population direction.

It's true that most of Michigan and the rest of the Midwest states have been spared the traffic, developmental problems and other troubles of rapidly expanding state economies.

But the prospect of a rather stable population for at least the near future ought to flash a new warning signal to state government and the people of the state.

It is that the state will have to develop more innovative ideas, more workable long-range plans and better teamwork among business, labor and the government in tackling school reform, tax problems, restoration of the state's infrastructure and the other major problems Michigan faces.

If Michigan doesn't meet this challenge, it is likely to drop even farther back in the population race and become a less attractive and profitable place in which to do business in the future.

# **War Memorial**

To the Editor:

In response to recent letters to the editor regarding the War Memorial's acquisition of 40 Lakeshore Drive, we would like to clarify the following points:

1. The War Memorial is not asking to rezone the property to commercial use as one letter stated. The War Memorial is asking for the property to be rezoned to Community Service.

2. The War Memorial is not commercial; it is a nonprofit organization that facilitates the educational, cultural, civic and patriotic needs of the Grosse Pointe community. It has done so for well over 40 years. Program calendars are mailed only to contributors and the 22,000 homes within the Grosse Pointe Public School System.

3. In an effort to maintain the current tax revenue of the city of Grosse Pointe Farms, the War Memorial has offered to pay a fee for city services.

4. To move War Memorial functions to other facilities is not feasible. The Central Library is already operating at capacity and does not have

facilities adequate for our purposes; and rooms at the local schools are not available for our use and are not functional for art exhibits, meetings and lectures. Also, part of the uniqueness of the programs at the center is the War Memorial's site.

5. The board of directors are all volunteers and residents of our community, and never has any board member incurred personal or financial gain for efforts on behalf of the community. The War Memorial is making an investment for the community, and the board's wish is to preserve and enhance the quality of life for residents of all ages.

The War memorial board of directors' decision and the Grosse Pointe Farms City Council's approval to rezone the Alger House residence to Community Service in the 1940s proved to be a monumental decision. Further additions of the Fries Auditorium and Ballroom, the Art Wing, and the Junior League Carriage House offices also proved to be beneficial to all Grosse Pointers. We are confident that 40 Lakeshore will also prove to be a wonderful investment

for our community while helping to preserve the Alger House as a registered historic site.

# Just a day off work?

Here I go again, trying to attach meaning to just another day off work. The last time was Memorial Day and I went on about the flag and our country's brave soldiers.

Well, we've just completed another one of those weekdays spent at home or at the park and I couldn't resist looking back in history to find out how Labor Day came into existence.

Many people in the community, especially those under 30, do not seem to know why we celebrate Labor Day.

According to the American Book of Days by Jane M. Hatch recognition of America's work-


force, which for more than two centuries has contributed to our nation's prosperity.

Hatch says that the national holiday is most prized by members of America's labor unions, who unlike most Americans, appreciate labor's many contributions, victories and sacrifices since the dawn of the Industrial Revolution.

At the beginning of the industrial movement, most workers toiled long hours for low pay under difficult conditions. Labor as a force lacked any clout with employers or lawmakers and was without representation to improve its bargaining position.

The intolerable conditions were later portrayed in books like Upton Sinclair's "The Jungle" and several other books by muckraking authors who sought to expose those conditions to the American public.

Efforts to organize America's vast workforce began in earnest (3rd Edition, 1978) we do so in in the decades following the Civil War.



According to a long-accepted version, labor organizer Peter J. McGuire first proposed in 1882 the idea to set aside a day to honor the nation's workers.

McGuire, the son of Irish immigants, had himself known extreme poverty and was forced to leave school at the age of 11 to hold an assortment of jobs.

In his own words, McGuire was everthing but a swordswallower. And sometimes I was so hungry that a sword - with mustard, of course - would have tasted fine.'

McGuire suggested that Labor

# School taxes

Mr. Cook's letter last week regarding school and library taxes raised a number of points that need to be clarified.

1. Statistics from the Michigan Department of Education show that in 1988 Grosse Pointe teachers' salaries ranked 9th in the state (not 5th) and our per pupil cost was 13th statewide (not 4th). The salary statistic is misleading without noting that the average Grosse Pointe teacher has worked 25 years in our school system and has 10 hours of postgraduate training beyond a master's degree.

2. In June 1989 voters approved a 2.2 mill increase, not 3.3 mills.

in the 1990-1 school budget was not solely for teachers' salaries. Part of that increase was to fund a number of improvements, both in programs and buildings, that we had hoped to make this school year. Now part of that increase will offset the recent and unexpected loss of \$1.6 million in state categorical aid. To our knowledge, we are the only out-of-formula school district absorbing this loss without going to the taxpayers for additional

4. All Grosse Pointe public schools do operate 181 days a year.

5. "Extra pay for extra duty" is money paid to athletic coaches and advisers to various school clubs, newspapers, etc. This extra duty requires a substantial time commitment on the part of a limited number of teachers, who work evenings, weekends, and holidays with students involved in extracurricular activities.

6. The Blue Cross-Blue Shield plan we offer to our employees is competitive with that offered by other school districts in the state. Like Mr. Cook, we are concerned with health care costs, and we are looking at ways to contain those costs while at the same time being fair and equitable to our employees. We will continue to address this issue in all negotiations.

7. The retirement plan for the Grosse Pointe Public School System is mandated by the state, as is our 5 percent contribution. All school systems in Michigan are required to offer the same retirement benefits.

8. All contracts with employees other than teachers are negotiated separately. While there are some similarities, there are also many differences.

In Grosse Pointe, much of the cost of running the school system falls directly on the individual taxpayer. That is because we have no

industrial tax base and only a small business community to help dissipate the tax burden. The nature and character of our community is something we chose and presumably want to continue. Unfortunately, that means individual taxpayers pay a larger percentage of school taxes than residents in other communities with substantial industrial and/or business holdings.

The board of education has always been acutely conscious of the tax burden on our residents. Consequently the board has tried to keep costs down without affecting the quality of education offered to our students. Over the past five years (1985-1990), the average Grosse Pointe school tax increase has been 5.7 percent. Compare that to Bloomfield's 6.2 percent, Birmingham's 7.5, or Troy's 9.4!

Mr. Cook has spent an enormous amount of time studying the school budget, and we appreciate his interest. It is because of knowledgable and committed residents like him that Grosse Pointe has both a school system and community of which we can all be proud.

# Gun control

To the Editor:

While I was serving as press secretary to President Reagan, a man named John Hinckley shot me during his failed attempt to assassinate the president. Hinckley easily purchased his concealable Saturday Night Special at a Dallas pawnshop. In Texas, as in more than half of the states in America, there is no "cooling-off" period to give police the chance to run a background check on the buyer. Each day I live with the consequences of that easy gun sale.

The U.S. House of Representatives is set for a showdown on several important gun control bills this fall.

The one I'm watching with the most interest is supported by 91 percent of the American people, every major police organization in the nation, and is vital if America hopes to reduce its everescalating level of handgun violence.

This legislation is known as the Brady Bill (H.R. 467) and would require a national, seven-day "coolingoff" period before the purchase of a handgun. During those seven days, local law enforcement officials would have the opportunity to run criminal records checks of handgun purchasers. This cooling-off period would prevent the John Hinckleys of the world from easily buying handguns over-the-counter.

Last year, 9,536 Americans were murdered with handguns. And according to a Justice Department study, 639,000 violent crimes a year are committed by criminals armed with handguns. No American is safe from the threat of handgun violence.

We fell a few votes short of passing the Brady Bill last time, but each member of Congress will have the chance to vote on this key bill within the next several weeks. My wife, Sarah, and I are asking all Americans to help pass this public safety bill by writing their representatives urging a vote for the Brady Bill. Because seven days can save a life.





# Leeches become attached to surgery therapy

Most people squirm when they think about leeches. But doctors at Henry Ford Hospital are using these tiny blood-sucking worms for a fascinating type of therapy that is helping certain patients recover from surgery.

The leech therapy is effectively being used on patients who have lost fingers or toes in accidents and had them reattached through surgery. Sometimes these patients have poor blood circulation after surgery, because the original blood in the affected areas blocks the passageway for fresh blood to enter. By applying leeches to the site, the "old blood" is removed creating room for fresh blood to circulate.

"The leeches not only help to

the affected tissue," said Peter Janevski, M.D., a hand surgeon at Henry Ford. "This helps improve blood circulation in a manner that cannot be achieved through medications."

Only one leech is applied to each finger or toe, and it may suck blood for up to a half hour. When the leech has had its fill of blood, it will automatically let go. By this time the leech may have grown as much as three

The area will continue to bleed for the next 12-24 hours. The therapy is painless because most of the patients do not yet have any feeling in the affected areas.

Doctors can determine if there

Doctors had few alternatives for treating these patients before the leech therapy. Sometimes fingernails or toenails were removed or incisions were made in the affected areas to facilitate bleeding.

Anticoagulants, drugs prescribed for blood clotting, also were used to help improve circulation. But Janevski says the leech therapy has proved to be the most effective type of treatment.

"The leeches are very effective through their own components by relieving congestion where it could not be done with other means," Janevski said.







mentary, then to Parcells Middle School.

He graduated from Grosse Pointe High School just one year before it was renamed Grosse Pointe South.

Like many, Fenton had anxieties about his first day of school.

"I was very nervous about going off to school and was always scared to go back," Fenton said. "The same feeling still applies today. Now that I'm in charge of many noninstructional projects for the district, I'm still nervous about the first day of school."

One of the things Fenton is nervous about is the renovation of the swimming pool at North High School, "which won't be done on the first day," he said, "but will be done soon afterward.

Lillian Kachadourian, a teacher at Trombly Elementary School for the past 25 years, said she can also appreciate a student's anxiety on the first day.

As a teacher of young children, she sees a

similarity between students who came into her classroom 25 years ago and the students who come in today.

According to Kachadourian, their concerns have not changed at all.

"They want to know what the teacher will be like and they're afraid of making mistakes," Kachadourian said. "The kids are also worried about getting lost or forgetting a school rule and many are worried that the work will be too difficult.

"My feeling is that the teacher needs to

establish a feeling of trust and understanding the minute the students walk in."

Kachadourian said she remembers feeling concerned over leaving the house and going off to a school building that was overwhelming and very far away.

"I was ready but I felt very anxious and cautious about what was to come," she said. "These are the things that young students experience. The most important thing for the teachers is to establish trust right away. That's the first step in education."



home is being, and has been, enjoyed by the public through tours, exhibits and other events.

His role in preserving the past - something in which he is firmly committed - is linked to his childhood when he lived in a large apartment with his family above the Verheyden Funeral Home.

His father, Clayton Alandt, helped run the funeral home and, in fact, convinced Charles Verheyden to move to Grosse Pointe when it was still "the sticks," Alandt said.

Alandt worked at the funeral home while studying for his mortuary license. It was expected that he would become a mortician like his father.

But Alandt, who hated chemistry, said, "I switched to business and found life to be more sensible." He graduated from the Detroit Institute of Technology with a bachelor's degree in business administration.

Before graduation, he met his future wife, Lynn Ford, at a cocktail party. They were married in June 1975, "the hottest day on record," he recalls.

The following year, his wife's grandmother, Eleanor Clay Ford, died. Her 60-room Cotswold house, while not inhabited, continued to be maintained by employees. Before Alandt's fatherin-law, Benson Ford, died in 1978, he asked his son-in-law if he would be interested in running the house according to Mrs. Ford's wishes.

Alandt started his new job Aug. 1, 1978. It was a tremendous challenge, he said, because there were no handbooks on what to do and how to go about

it. There were long discussions with family members.

Mrs. Ford wanted the house left intact and she left a sum of money for its maintenance.

His first office, Alandt said. was a desk in the library. They began hosting events for nonprofit groups and before long were scheduling 30 functions a month.

Furniture was being moved around on a daily basis, Alandt said, and there were many problems with adapting a house used for family living to a center for various activities.

First, the house was on a septic system, Alandt said, and the plumbing had to be updated. We had no parking lots, we didn't have coat racks, we didn't have tables and chairs and we had to do everything from scratch," he said.

"We had to put in a decent telephone system and we had to have stationery. We had to decide where to put the men's room and the women's room."

People were in awe of the house, he said, and he had a stack of thick folders from groups requesting tours. There were discussions on what to name the house which had been simply know before as granny's

An expert was hired to research the furnishings and paintings, which had not been cataloged.

The Edsel & Eleanor Ford House Foundation was set up as a non-profit organization, beginning a long tax dispute case. "It took us about eight years to get tax-exempt status," Alandt said.

During this time, the house was the site of many functions. "Food had to be carried from one

# City of Grosse Hointe Honds Michigan

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the City Council will be considering the following proposed ordinance for first reading at its meeting scheduled for September 10, 1990, at 7:30 p.m. in the Council Room of the Municipal Building:

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND TITLE VI OF THE CITY CODE OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE WOODS OF 1975 BY ADDING THERETO A CHAPTER 21 ENTITLED BUSINESS HOURS OF OPERATION.

THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE WOODS ORDAINS:

Section 1 That Title VI of the City Code of the City of Grosse Pointe Woods of 1975 be amended by adding thereto a Chapter 21 entitled Business Hours of Operation, containing the following sec-

6-21-1 DEFINITIONS: As used in this ordinance, all business, commercial, professional and service establishments as defined in Section 4-15-2 of the Code of the City of Grosse Pointe Woods shall be deemed to be included in the providisons of this ordinance.

6-21-2 HOURS OF OPERATION: As a crime, vandalism and/or disturbance of the peace prevention measure and in order to protect the life, health, safety and general welfare of the public and/or business employees as well as to preserve the peace and tranquility within the community, it shall be unlawful for any person, partnership, corporation or entity to operate any business within the corporate limits of the City of Grosse Pointe Woods between the hours of 12:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m.

### 6-21-3 EXCEPTIONS:

(A) Restaurant, Bar Entertainment Facility or other similar business establishment.

No restaurant, bar, entertainment facility or other similar business establishment serving alcoholic beverages on the premises within the corporate limits of the City of Grosse Pointe Woods shall be open to the public between the hours of 2:30 a.m. and


(B) Any restaurant, not serving alcoholic beverages on the premises operating twenty four (24) hours daily at the time of the adoption of this ordinance may continue such operation as a non conforming business operation; provided however that in the event such non conforming restaurant operation is discontinued for a period of thirty (30) days it shall then be governed by the provisions of section 6-21-2 of this ordinance.

6.21-4 APPEAL TO CITY COUNCIL: Any party requesting a variance from the provisions of this Chapter may file an appeal to the City Council. Such appeal shall be accompanied by an appeal fee of seventy-five dollars (\$75.00), payable to the General Fund of the City. Upon receipt of an appeal, the City Council shall establish a date for an appeal hearing and give due notice thereof to the persons owning or occupying real property within three hundred feet (300') of the premises requesting such variance. At such hearing, the City Council may grant such appeal and approve a variance to the provisions of this Chapter upon finding that such variance would be in the best interest of the public health and welfare of the

6-21-5 EFFECTIVE DATE: This ordinance shall be deemed to become effective 21 days after approval by the City Council.

I was shifting through the gears toward a reasonable highway speed on a beautiful stretch of Ohio Route 2 through the Sandusky Bay area toward Cleveland when I realized that I really liked this car. It was one of the best sports sedans I had ever driven and a bunch of halfformed thoughts began bubbling up to the more or less conscious part of my mind.

What prompted the bubbling was the thought that said: "The only thing I can find that I don't like about this car is that it was built in Japan." And then: That's dumb.

This past summer I had driven the new Toyota MR2, Land Cruiser and Previa. And now this 1990 Nissan Maxima SE. I was having my attitude readjusted by the excellence and value of these new Japanese cars. I admit to a prejudice in favor of American cars, but it is getting difficult to tell what an American car is.

A Ford Crown Victoria? This most American looking and feeling of automobiles has enough foreign content that it is rerarded by Washington as an import. Ford did that to get it out of consideration for determination of its domestic CAFE rating. The Ford Probe and the new Escort are built in the United States, but they are basically Mazda designs, at least mechanically. Are they American or Jap-

What about the Hondas that are built in Ohio or the Mazdas built in Flat Rock? Are Japanese cars built in America American? What about Toyota Corollas built in California and sold as both Toyota Corollas and Chevrolet Prizms?

And how about the Plymouth Laser, Eagle Talon and Mitsubishi Eclipse built in Illinois by a joint venture of Chrysler Corp. and Mitsubishi? Are thay foreign or American or what? The Cadillac Allante has an American drivetrain and a body designed and built in Italy. The Eagle Premier features Italian styling, French and American engineering and assembly in Canada. ---

What are the captive im ports, the Chevrolet Geo line, the Dodge and Plymouth Colt, the Ford Festiva, the Mercury Tracer and the Pontiac LeMans? hey are all built abroad but marketed with American nameplates. And the 1991 Dodge Shadow convertible is built in

The Maxima SE is powered by a single-overhead-cam 3.0-liter V-6 with iron block and aluminum heads rated at 160 hp. The five-speed manual transmission is extremely smooth and precise. The power train is more than ample to cruise at interstate speeds without working the engine hard at all.

The suspension, with struts and coil springs all around and anti-roll bars at each end, provides the driver with complete control and with the optional SE Sport package you get anti-lock brakes and even greater control.

The old Maxima had excellent mechanicals, but this new one has more than that, it also has verve and style. Its sleek aerodynamic look turns heads and it is fun to drive and pleasant to look at.

Japanese engineers have been paying a lot of attention in recent years to what Americans like in a car and it is obvious that they found it's more than just fit and finish. Sound, for example. Much was made over how the Mazda Miata's exhaust sound was tuned to jog memories of post-war sports cars and the Maxima's sound is pleasant and powerful, rather like a Pontiac.

Base price of the Maxima SE is \$19,224 and the SE Sport package kicks it up to a little more than \$20,000. But for what you get, this sports sedan which can run with the best from the U.S. or Europe is a real bargain. Standard equipment includes air conditioning, a premium Nissan/ Bose sound system, power windows, power door locks, power outside mirrors, power sunroof, cruise control, rear defroster and tilt steering wheel. The EPA rates the Maxima at 20 miles

# Entertainment One Tiger to a Hill' is one powerful prison drama when Gillie is counting

By Alex Suczek Special Writer

The tension of a hostage-taking in a Canadian maximum security prison chills the audience at the Stratford's final opening this season. Sharon Pollock's "One Tiger to a Hill," based on an incident in the mid '70s, recounts with vivid reality events that began with the suicide of an inmate in solitary confinement and ended with a shooting by guards of a prisoner and his female rehabilitation counselor.

For Stratford, it represents an important trend to present more contemporary plays and the work of Canadian authors. If the work of Sharon Pollock is indicative, the trend is highly justified.

Pollock lived near the Canadian prison where the tragedy occurred and became obsessed with uncovering every fact and detail. Her play, presented in a one and a half hour single act, recounts the 10 hours of tension involved and the points of view of all the participants.

James Blendick as George and Ron Hastings as Richard represent prison authority. They keep order and control at any cost while dealing with pressure for coldly calculating security guard,

reform from all sides - prisoners, counselors, politicians and the public - but without adequate funding.

Anne Wright as Dede Walker is the rehabilitation officer. She is confident that her unorthodox professional style can succeed with her hardened yet highly intelligent client, prisoner Tommy Paul, who takes her hostage. She trusts him even though he is declared incorrigible by the



security staff.


Corporate lawyer Ev Chalmers, played by William Dunlop, becomes the negotiator only by chance. Caught in the irreconcilable conflict between prison security and the inmates, he discovers he is dealing with a dark and brutal world previously unknown to him.

Carl Hanzuk. On duty, he is an inhuman professional, but he offers a brief contrasting glimpse of his other life as a family man. The questions that linger at the end of the play are whether it was he who fired the fatal shots, whether he really intended to kill Dede as well as Tommy Paul, and if so, why.

And Joe Norman-Shaw as Tommy Paul is the pivotal figure. He inspires wrenching ambivalence as he portrays what may be on the one hand a psychopathic criminal as the prison managers see him, and on the other, a talented, redeemable human being, which is Dede's view. Triggered by his prison buddy's suicide and encouraged by Dede's sympathetic guidance, he seeks to win his freedom and prison reform by the desperate act of taking his counselor hostage and threatening her life.

Each one has conviction for his or her point of view and there lies the tragic conflict and sheer terror of this play. All are right and all are wrong. There is no resolution except the tragic deaths of the key players. The guards shoot Tommy as he is about to board the negotiated


Another supporting role that stands out as a superb characterization is Gillie McCermott, fellow inmate and accomplice to Tommie. Played by Roger Honeywell, this low IQ, amoral murderer wins audience sympathy and laughter for his inept efforts to gain dignity and freedom and his display of concern for his hostage, even as he threatens

The interplay between Gillie and Tommy places clear leadership on the latter as the one on

whom Gillie is counting for his liberation. Their relationship in the play is both touching and terrifying.

The web of the plot, in fact, based entirely on details dug up by Pollock over months of research, could hardly be more complex or more engrossing. It verifies again that truth is stranger than fiction. There is even a hint of love interest between Tommy and Dede which becomes warmly suggestive when Gillie persuades them to dance to the radio while they wait for response to the prisoners' demands. The contrast of moods is excruciating.

Director John Wood skillfully sets the atmosphere of the play from the first moment with a total blackout, lasting what seems like an eternity while the audience hears steel door after steel door clang shut on every side. The lights then come up on a stark set of multi-level bars and wire cages by John Ferguson. This and the highly focused lighting by John Munro, greatly enhance the impact. The result is a powerful piece of theater, loaded with tension and sus-



pense that is also an informative social statement of an issue that society still addresses inadequately.



# The Witches' casts a spell on young, old

"The Witches," a magical modern fairy tale, opens on a storybook setting as the camera glides over the snowy mountain peaks of Norway, roams the redroofed tops of colleges that line the cobblestone streets and settles in a picture book parlor where Grandmother Hega (Mai Zetterling) is telling scary stories in a lyrical voice about witches to her wide-eyed, entranced grandson, Jason Fisher.

The boy, Luke, sits in awe as she relates the story of a little girl who was seized by a witch and lived forever after in a painting, growing with the years but never moving until she was very old and then disappeared.

Armed with this information, guke drops off to sleep, fully con-Adent that now he knows what to look for to be safe.

So begins Nicolas Roeg's horror adventure movie for kids.

Luke and his grandmother travel to a seacoast hotel in England where witches have gath-

She is fascinating to watch in her changes of mood. She purrs seductively when she offers candy to Luke, rages and screams when she is displeased.

Posing as "The Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children," the group plots to rid England of its children by changing them into mice with a powrful magic potion. Luke becomes their first vic

tim when he is an unwilling wit- seen in scary tales.

ness at the witches' convention in the hotel auditorium.

His non-violent transformation from boy into mouse can be funny or scary, according to the reaction of young viewers, but any apprehension is soon dispelled. Luke is a cute, savvy little gold-colored mouse who still has Luke's voice in a believablelooking mouse's body constructed by Jim Hensen's Creature Shop. What's more, Luke has fun. As he tells his astonished grandmother, "I like being a mouse."

Like all good fairy tales, this magical mixture of fun, mischief and enchantment has a happy

As Luke, Jason Fisher is a natural both as a boy and a mouse. Huston is the wicked witch of all time behind a glamorous mask. Mai Zetterling, an accomplished Swedish actress, is outstanding as the caring grandmother whose concern for Luke and willingness to believe in fantastic events gives the film a gentle touch that offsets the meaness of the witches.

Roeg, who directed the terrifying "Don't Look Now," is the right man for this macabre and funny tale. He tempers his usual weirdness by avoiding the dark

Instead "The Witches" is visually sunny, making it more suited for what is essentially a children's story.

The mice crafted in Hensen's workshop are lifelike and capable of facial expression and movements and the ability to speak. Wonderfully expressive and realistic, they are a delight to watch as they zip around the nooks and crannies of the old ho-

Never condescending to children, the film, because of its wit and puns, holds interest for adults also.



# From perfume to plays to technology, his territory is the world

Editor It was while David L. Kelson was working in army intelligence in Vietnam that he developed an interest in international relations.

After his return, he spent a summer in Europe and South Africa while he was a student at Wayne State University. His goal, he said, was to get a job with an organization like the United Nations.

His client base today, however, is the world. As president of KMG International, Kelson, a Grosse Pointe Park resident, consults consultants in the import and export business.

In 10 years of dealing with foreign businesses and governments, Kelson has traveled throughout the Pacific basin -India, Indonesia, Taiwan, Japan, Thailand, Hong Kong, South Korea - and Kuwait, China, Germany, Italy and the United

One of the cooperatives, however, came up with a better way to produce, among other things, table tops. The Soviets and Americans use the same production techniques which involves a machine that has as one of its parts a belt, he said. The belts, however, wear out periodically, and the Soviets were unable to replace them.

So they devised a cylinder to run the machine that is not only permanent, but can make the table top thinner and can be used on polymers. KMG is transferring the technology to the United States, he said.

Kelson, who is contantly broadening his knowledge, began his professional career in telecommunications. A 1964 graduate of Grosse Pointe High, he earned a bachelor's degree in political science from Wayne State University, a master's in public administration from Wayne and ness management from the American Graduate School of International Management in Phoenix.

His first job was with the International Trade Administration in Washington, D.C., a department within the Department of Commerce. As major projects manager for overseas, Kelson worked with large corporations, like ITT abnd ATT.


#### HAVE A PLEASANT TRY AT PERFECTION **BRIDGE BY WOODY BOYD** THE PASTEBOARD PASTIME

A mirage in the desert is something illusory. At the card table, an illusion is a false conception of something you see that is actually present. This experience is quite common in bridge, especially when declarer views the dummy for the first time and commences the important count of winners and losers. The defense can sometimes suffer the same delusion. Best when this happens, look away for a moment before looking back. Such a pause often gives you a better perception of the problem at hand. Take today's ticklish stickler that can be an anguishing exercise. The illusion is that declarer sees four losers; a spade, unless the finesse is successful, a heart, a diamond and a club. This is a false conception that can be corrected and Carolyn Russell did just that in a game I kibitzed in Grosse Pointe over the fire cracker Fourth.

West's no trump opening was a little limp, but not vulnerable; there was a thin vindication. East's six card club suit was a savior for North's pass of partner's double acknowledged a willingness to penalize West's bid to the tune of at least 500 points. I like North's three spade call after Carolyn introduced the suit and game was certainly a reasonable endeavor.

Carolyn concluded that if West was left to his way, he could inflict some mayhem and a possible minus upon her for he obviously had all the missing high tickets . . . But could he? Did he have time? After a careful survey she realized she was a trick ahead of the defense and had no intention of relinquishing that lead. Could she set up the heart ten for a diamond discard before her protection was gone? Yes she could with a carload of careful play, so she initiated her plan to counter West's execution.

She won the club ace; not to do so would have been mortal. Then she laid down the space ace and another. After West won both black kings, he switched to the diamond queen which Carolyn won with her ace and played a heart to dummy's ace and back to her king. Now she relieved West of his last trump and played a heart toward dummy's king won and the ten of hearts was a haven for Carolyn's minor red loser.



The discussion that followed was puzzling. East erroneously contended that if West had led the diamond queen at trick one and persisted, the defense would have gathered in four winners. Not so! If West originally plays diamonds and continues each time he's in, the defense will only win a spade, a diamond and a heart. Open clubs as west did and you know the outcome. The defense can't win a club and a diamond too against good declarer play. Four losers is an illu-

partment of maddening packaging are the caps designed to keep children and people with headaches from getting at the contents of the bottles.

Relief from this ordeal is in the offing.

Hugh Lockhart, professor at

Michigan State University, after considerable research in cooperation with Western Michigan University, has come up with a bottle design which has a selfseeking tab inside a double cap. The tab slips down into a slot, allowing the top to be turned.

For some consumers, the inconvenience of wrestling with the tops of products is secondary to the chore of shopping for them. Shopping is a tedious task that takes up valuable time better spent in more pleasurable ways. The true "I-hate-to-shop individual" would rather do almost anything else - even household chores. They dislike pushing their way down aisles that are often impassable because two friends who haven't seen each other since yesterday are exchanging gossip; or because boxes waiting to be unpacked defy passage; or because some conscientious shopper blocks three shelves with herself and a cart while she makes a choice.

Then there are the anklebumpers. Some are more treacherous than others. The real menaces are the speeders who go whirling through the store, zipping around corners, crashing into all obstacles, including shin-

All good things come to an end, including the frustrating ones. The groceries are checked out and packed in the cart. Breathing a sigh of relief, you push the wobbly pile to the car. Leg muscles bulge, shoulders strain with effort, but you make it. It was an ordeal but thankfully you won't have to face it for another week. A sense of accomplishment and peace settles over you that is quickly dispelled when you spot your car.

You've overstayed your time. You have a ticket. So ends the

saga of a disconsolate shopper. There are those who love the challenge of shopping. They never seem to encounter the travails of the reluctant supermarket visitor. It could be because of their positive attitude toward the chore. Their adrenaline begins to flow the moment the door swings open. They come armed with lists of specials and neatly clipped coupons.

For them it is exciting to beat

the system and come out with \$6 worth of merchandise for every \$5 spent. They go from store to store in a euphoric state, making pennies do the work of dollars and loving every minute of it.

This separation of kind is not limited to supermarkets. That area of shopping is just a prelude to the big-time pursuit of taking on the shopping malls. Here the perils are more marked.

To begin with, it is important to remember where the car is parked. Unless the lane number is noted, hours could be lost searching for the car you drove there that suddenly looks like any one of the 50 cars parked in the location where you are sure

The next problem is figuring out where the shop is that advertised all merchandise at 50 percent off. Usually it is at the opposite end of the building where you parked.

Then there are those uncanny shoppers who enter a mall, point themselves in the direction of the best buys and come home with coordinates that they can mix and match to make them look like an ad for tomorrow's fashions.

There is no doubt that successful shopping is a skill. There are those who are born with it, some who acquire it and others who have it thrust upon them.

# Rock gardens, natural landscapes, are eternally popular

Rock gardens are popular right now. A lot of people think of them as the latest thing, but rock gardens and ornamental grottos have been around with varying degrees of popularity since a general revolt against formality in landscaping took place beginning about 1710. The Earl of Shaftsbury in England was one of the first to say that he was tired of the clipped, edged, and otherwise manicured gardens of the time.

He was a collector of the paintings of Salvador Rosa who delighted in rugged scenes of craggy mountains, grottos and caves, great boulders strewn artistically about and otherwise

landscaping were influenced by these paintings. In 1711, he published an essay in which he stated, "Even the rude rocks, the caverns, the grottos, the broken falls of water, with all the grace of the wilderness itself representing nature, appears with a magnificence beyond the mockery of princely gardens."

Joseph Addison was also writing about the natural landscape and advocating a return to rocks and grottos. And in 1712, Alexander Pope joined this chorus with a denunciation of topiary and its artificiality.

The idea grew in popularity and William Kent, landscape designer and artist, began to plant rough terrain. The earl's ideas of natural gardens for his clients. He even planted dead trees in strategic spots.

Along with Kent came Batty Langley, who advocated rock and grotto areas in gardens in his book "New Principles of Gardening" published in 1728. He began the vogue of building ruins in gardens with broken pillars and heaps of rubble, among which were planted trailing

Charles Hamilton, in his went so far as to build ruins and a grotto which were to be inhabited by a hermit. The hermit was to be supplied with a Bible, a mat and pillow, an hourglass to tell time and food from the house. He was to wear a robe

and sandals, never shave or go grounds at Pain's Hill in Surrey, out of the grounds, and never speak to anyone. If he held the job for seven years he was to be paid 700 guineas. There was only one applicant for the job. He lasted three weeks.

But rock gardens were a coming thing, England's first rockery garden was built at Chelsea in 1772 when Sir Joseph Banks brought slabs of lava from Iceland. At this time repairs were being made on the Tower of London and a lot of stones were dumped on the grounds. These items with some broken bricks, the lava, and other rocky debris were heaped together and planted with Alpine plants. By the end of the 19th century, rock gardening was an established

In our own time both naturalistic and formal rock gardens vie for popularity. In France and Germany, many of them are built in terraces and many owners pride themselves on their collections of rare Alpine and rock plants. Perhaps this is really a full circle back to the ancient gardens of Babylon with their rock terraces and pebbled

Many of our gardens today have pebbled paths like the paths in the geometric herb gardens of medieval monasteries which were filled with patterns of colored river pebbles. And of course, in another part of the

#### Get a real league

The Bi-County League, once the premier sports organization, is gone, and now so is the Eastern Michigan League, a place South called home for 17

But over at University Liggett School, a different twict is occurring.

ULS can't seem to get out of a league that houses nothing but decent-at-best teams. For the most part, the Michigan Independent Athletic Conference (MIAC) is a mediocre and embarrassing conference.

Last year the football team won the conference championship, and Coach Bob Newvine and his staff were not pleased with their new reign. While most coaches would celebrate and order new T-shirts for the players, Newvine and his brain trust just shrugged their shoulders in bewilderment.

Winning the league was not a big deal. With only three teams in the league, it's no wonder ULS won it. All it had to do was split those two conference games and it would have shared a piece of the pie. But, because they thrashed Lutheran Northwest and Westland Lutheran by a combined score of 108-0, there was no sharing the title.

The league is now in its second season, but why is ULS in it? They would do much better to jump out of the league, just as the basketball team should do this coming winter, and get some stronger opponents. Hence, a larger crowd would be on hand to watch the Kevin Whitfields and Chris Carrolls, but not this year.

Chuck Wright's basketball team waltzed through the MIAC schedule to win the crown last winter, and even with the projected lack of competition they're staying in the

ULS has got to get out of that league. It's doing nothing for them and it's giving them less competition than their newly instituted junior varsity football team would.

This season Newvine got St. Agatha, Country Day and Birch Run on the schedule, and discarded Cardinal Mooney, a team ULS beat 43-0. But, because of his school's obligation to the MIAC, the hapless teams from Lutheran Northwest and Westland Lutheran have to be played.

It makes no sense to put a rising program into a rinkydink league.

For years, ULS ran an independent schedule. While struggling to regain its football heritage, the Knights were on the losing end of many games. Winning was unheard of, and nobody wanted to attend the games because they knew the

Newvine resumed the program six years ago and after playing one year of a jayvee schedule, decided to go challenge the other local varsity

Making the jump five years ago was a big decision, but it was necessary. And, now, so is the move to a different league or even jumping back to independent status.

The football team would be better off playing some stronger schools and finishing 6-3, than getting beaten by two strong opponents and drilling seven terrible teams - as it did last year on its way to a 7-2 record.

In the seven wins, Newvine's team outscored its opponent 295-44. Sure the wins looked great, boosted confidence and gave the school a winning record, but the games were boring to watch.

The words "Champions 1989" are on the ULS football pocket schedule, but it should read "Champions 1989, of a league with no competition.'

# Rob Rahaim's life is a drag Sports Editor For Change P.

For Grosse Pointe Woods resident Bob Rahaim, life in the fast lane is truly a drag.

Rahaim, co-owner of Oxford Beverage, isn't one to race down Mack Avenue, nor would he test the Farms cops on Kercheval. But, he does put the pedal to the metal on dragstrips around the country.

On Aug. 26, Rahaim won the Quick Rod Division of the International Hot Rod Association World National Drag Racing Championships in Norwalk,

'When I started racing, I figured it would be best to do so on a track and not in the street," said Rahaim, 30. "I knew racing on the street wouldn't be the way to go. Besides, there would be too many tickets to pay for if I did race on the streets. The track was the place to be."

But if it weren't for hockey, Rahaim feels he wouldn't have tried to develop this "hobby."

"I've got a very high competitive spirit about me and I got it edge about me, and I just thought it would carry over into drag racing and it has.'

Each race stretches a quarter mile and all cars have the capability to cross the line in 8.90 seconds.

"Everything just really comes at you pretty fast when you're running 150 miles an hour," Rahaim said. "But it's an exhilarating feeling."

In seven years of racing, Rahaim has been to the quarterfinals before, but he's never stood in the winner's circle.

"This is a life-long dream come true for me and my family," he said. "I think the only thing that can compare with this is when my Pee Wee team went to the state finals in 1972. Unfortunately we lost in overtime.

"I never thought this would happen so soon, but when things go right, they really go right." And fortunately, these races

don't need an extra session.

Rahaim, who started racing in a 1968 Camaro at Milan and

Detroit Speedways in 1982, had to drag five races to win the championship by .006 of a second.

"In the final run, I got off the light fast and took off," he recalled. "I remember just glancing back and seeing the other car laying back a bit, so I knew I was in pretty good shape.'

But he didn't know he had

"I got into the safety zone to shut the car down and I saw all the guys jumping up and down," he said. "Then, my friend, Greg Tillison came back with his three-wheeler we use to pull the car back, and he was going nuts. We were jumping up and down hugging one another. It's really a feeling I can't compare anything to.'

And it's not too bad a job, considering Rahaim's raced in only three of the scheduled 10 races, and plans to compete in only one more.

"I'm not even in the point standings and suddenly I'm a winner," he said. "If I can score at the next race I go to, then I

may finish in the top 10 of the season.'

What if you don't? "That really wouldn't bother me because I've got something

that not everyone gets.' When Rahaim began fantasizing about his experiment with drag racing, he wasn't sure what to expect. He found a Camaro for sale in California and later purchased it and had it delivered to Michigan.

"At that time I was not in a great position financially to go out and buy a newer car," Rahaim said. "I did what I could just to get started in the sport. Now, I've been bitten by the bug and I can't get away from the

That's evident by his purchase of a 1989 Oldsmobile Cutlass Supreme, with an engine that measures 509 cubic feet and sports 900 horsepower. The body is made of carbon-fiber panels; it's lightweight, yet has great strength and durability.

"As I continued to race, I knew this wasn't just a phase," Rahaim said. "I knew I was going to continue to do this, and I've been able to, so I figured I'd buy the right stuff this time and get it over with. The car is great."

When the race was completed, Rahaim looked for his wife Kelly, and children Bobby, Sarah, Kristin and Jennifer. He also had Marc Matthews and Jim Lewis in his crew, along with his father Robert. Longtime friend Eric Rasmussen was also on hand.

"I owe them all a great deal for helping me and supporting me," Rahaim said. "But I owe a special thanks to my dad. He's really helped me a great deal and without his help I don't think this would have happened to me. I'm really fortunate to have a family that supports this type of hobby, because there are a lot of families and wives that wouldn't allow such a thing."

But there's proof positive that Rahaim belongs in drag racing.

"I hope to be around for a few more years," he said.

# ULS tackles Harper Woods

After trailing 29-18 at the half, South outscored Grosse Ile 15-10 to cut the lead to 39-33 at the end of the third quarter.


"We began shutting their offense down, plus we had the first-half jitters out of our system," VanEckoute said.

# Norsemen beat South Lake

Playing like seasoned veterans, the Grosse Pointe North football team used a methodical ground attack to beat South Lake, 17-0, in the season opener Aug. 31.

North, which threw the ball only three times the entire game, controlled the line of scrimmage, enabling a young but now experienced offensive backfield to rush for 339 yards.

"We used our counter plays, reverses and mis-direction plays as our passing plays," said Norsemen coach Frank Sumbera, whose team tied for the White Division championship last season. "Instead of throwing in an obvious throwing situation, we came up with some big running plays.'

Six to be exact, including 35yard runs by Bob Tiderington and Eric Merte.

Merte and Tiderington ran well, but the rushing game was highlighted by the bullish running of sophomore Mike Haskell and junior Paul Straske, who played while nursing the flu.

After a scoreless first quarter, in which a North drive was stopped when Corona's first pass was intercepted, the Norsemen got on the board early in the second quarter.

On the first play of the second quarter, Scott Nesom, who finished with seven tackles and a quarterback sack, picked up a loose ball and ran it to the Cavaliers' 5-yard line. Three plays later the Norsemen had to settle for a 25-yard Corona field goal to take a 3-0 lead.

"That was big," Sumbera said about Corona's field goal. "We had established the ground game and set the tone with some great defense, but we almost came out of that empty. Instead, Gary kicked the field goal and we were on our way."

Senior linebacker Steve Craparotta, who jarred the ball loose on a tenacious hit, led North with eight tackles.

With Jim Kutscher and Leo Salvaggio, who combined for 10 tackles, manning the defense, it was Straske and Haskell who went back to work offensively. After his 82-yard punt return for a touchdown was nullified by a penalty, Straske came right back and rambled 45 yards to the Cavalier 5, where Haskell tucked it in one play later. Corona's one-point conversion gave North a 10-0 halftime lead.




our 40." And several plays later Clintondale's quarterback Tim Kubiak lofted a touchdown pass to put the game out of reach.

The Fall 1990 series features world class artists from the "motor cities" area of southeast Michigan performing song gems by Jerome Kern, Duke Ellington, the Gershwins, Cole Porter, Billy Strayhorn, Rodgers and Hart, among others.

#### September 19

"Dean" of Detroit pianists Earl Van Riper presents the group which he recently took to Djakarta, Indonesia, and Singapore. Trumpeter Marcus Belgrave, alumni of the Ray Charles and Duke Ellington bands, will be featured instrumentalist. Songtress Helen Gilbert, long a favorite at the Rhinoceros jazz club in Detroit's Warehouse District, will highlight the music of Cole Porter. Rounding out the group are bassist Ken Kellet and drummer Joe Harris.

## October 3

Saxophonist George Benson and pianist Claude Black will reprise their recent smash hit performance in the Graystone Jazz series at the Club Penta. Perhaps best known for their teamwork on several Parkwood Records releases, the Benson/Black sextet will feature singer Judy Cochill of the Austin-Moro band, Stan Kenton alumni Jerry McKenzie on drums, Stu Saunders on trombone, and Don Mayberry on acoustic bass.

#### October 17
