Of course, one of the main issues which will be included in the survey is the proposed library project. The board is ex-

pected to go to the public in February for approval of a bond issue for the project. Perception of the need for a new library will show the board how much work it needs to do to sell the idea.

Shine says working through Project Outreach professionals is the most cost-effective way to conduct such a survey.



Grosse Pointe schools join other districts in lawsuit

The Grosse Pointe school board joined other out-of-formula districts in a suit against the state aimed at getting back the money Michigan took from

poorer school systems.

The State School Aid Act, passed by the legislature on July 1, cut back categorical funding to wealthier districts in the state.

Grosse Pointe lost \$1.6 million. Most of that loss was FICA tax payments, which had previously been picked up by the

Dennis Pollard, a partner in the law firm of Clark, Hardy, Lewis, Pollard and Paige, P.C., met with superintendents of outof-formula school districts in mid-August to discuss possible litigation.

Pollard says the State Aid Act provision goes against Section 29 of the Headlee Amendment to the state constitution regarding recapturing funds. Because the act would in effect cut off all categorical funding - funding which the state is constitutionally bound to pay - it is unconstitutional, he said.

"I think the legal issue is real clear," Pollard said, and added that there is substantial precedent on the school districts' side. He said in addition to Grosse Pointe there should be more than 20 districts as plaintiffs in the suit which was to have been filed this week.

What court the suit will be filed in was not immediately

Pollard is seeking an emergency hearing to get a restraining order to stop the state from recapturing the money until a court decides the constitutionality of the act.

Farms OKs rezoning for War Memorial

Before a packed council chamber of some 150 people Monday night, the Grosse Pointe Farms

City Council laid down the law. Actually the council amended it by granting the rezoning of the War Memorial-owned house and property at 40 Lakeshore from residential to community service.

But the rezoning approval is not a blanket thumbs-up for the War Memorial. The 6-1 vote was based on a conditional approval which requires the facility's planners to submit a final site plan and a list of intended uses to the City Council within 60

"Now we can move ahead and formalize our site plan," said Mark Weber, War Memorial president.

"We can get a landscaping exert and begin to work with our

neighbors. We can plan the work on the interior and work out details with the city involving fire protection and lighting.' Weber added that the War

Memorial will submit a formalized list of uses for the house, which include art, educational and cultural classes, exhibits by the Grosse Pointe Artist Association and additional office space.

But gaining rezoning approval was not easy. Several residents presented opposing viewpoints and some said the rezoning would lead to declining property values.

Farms resident David Bogle threatened a lawsuit, adding 'You don't have a leg to stand

After several residents had their say, both in favor and against the rezoning request, resident Lee Wulfmeier presented the council with a petition oppos-

According to Michigan law, if a petition of opposition is presented, approval requires a three-fourths vote by the council. On a seven-member council, that translates to six yes votes, which was reached by the council at the 11th hour of the latenight meeting.

Prior to the roll call vote, the War Memorial board presented a market analysis showing that four homes in the immediate area had increased in value at a higher rate than the majority of homes in the Farms.

Proponents also presented a traffic analysis which concluded no negative traffic impact from the proposed rezoning of the property.

Also, the board presented a letter from Grosse Pointe Schools Superintendent Ed Shine, which read, "... space is not available in the Grosse Pointe Public read. School System . . . "

The letter was presented because in the past, some residents complained that the purchase of the house was not necessary and that the War Memorial should use local schools for additional space.

Also War Memorial-sponsored land-use analysis, presented by community planner Phillip Mc-Kenna, concluded that "the proposed rezoning is consistent with sound planning and zoning principles and practice."

In the land use study, zoning in the area was taken into account, as was the city's current land use plan. Planners inspected aerial photographs and reviewed the traffic study performed by transportation engineers, Reid, Cool and Michalski Inc. of Southfield.

Shores home ransacked, robbed


A Grosse Pointe Shores man, returning home after a week in Las Vegas, found that his home had been ransacked and burglar-



Grosse Pointe Park digs up some interesting history

Some interesting things are being uncovered in Grosse

Another interesting item — or items - was dug up on Jefferson near City Hall. Construction ers sign. What's surprising is workers were tearing up the con-

crete from the middle of the road when they uncovered railroad tracks.

Actually, the iron rails are interurban or streetcar tracks from the days when the electric cars crisscrossed Detroit and ran as far as Pontiac, Mount Clemens and beyond.

According to Park Administrative Assistant Jeff Mueller, the tracks east of City Hall on Jefferson were torn up during World War II for their iron. The tracks going to Detroit are still there and have been covered by decades of repaving jobs. The tracks behind The Tower restau-

rant are still visible where the streetcars used to turn around.

The rails were found sitting on large slabs of granite, which was probably tougher to break up than concrete. Mueller said the city took bore samples before getting quotes on the project but didn't hit granite then.

The tracks were uncovered while a contractor was smashing oval openings in the roadway for medians along the boulevard, which will be reduced to two lanes in each direction as it is in the rest of the Pointes.

Mueller said the project is running 1-1/2 weeks ahead of schedule. The completed boulevard will have six landscaped medians along the Park business district. There will be traffic lights at Maryland, Beaconsfield and Somerset/Westchester.

The \$580,000 project, awarded

to DeAngelis Landscaping of Woodhaven, will be paid for with Tax Incentive Finance Authority funds captured by the Downtown Development Authority. Increased tax dollars realized through rising property values in the TIFA district are kept by the authority for funding im-

provements in the district. The boulevard, which was years in the planning and talked about for more than 17 years, should be completed this fall.

The Esquire Theater was condemned by the city as a nonconforming use for the business district and was purchased by the Park for \$435,000. The city contracted with Metro Wrecking to demolish the old art deco theater building at a cost of \$57,500.

The site will be paved for a parking lot.

'Contain' Iraq seen as new Mideast plan

Tinston Churchill once said that he preferred talk, talk to war, war. And so does most of the world these days as Mideast tensions heighten.

Unfortunately, the United States and Iraq often seem to be talking past each other to world opinion rather than to each other but there is a good chance of a diplomatic settlement if Iraq listens to reason and to the UN demand that it withdraw from Kuwait.

The Bush-Gorbachev talks in Helsinki emphasized that the United States and the Soviet Union are presenting a united front on a major world problem for the first time since World War H. The successful summit raised hopes that some peaceful solution could be achieved.

True, President Bush reiterated his intention to keep all his options open, including the use of force against Saddam Hussein, but he seems to be shifting toward a policy of "containment" of Iraq, rather



than confrontation. And Mikhael Gorbachev clearly prefers any peaceful approach.

As a U.S. policy, "containment" worked for the United States against the Soviet Union but it took more than 40 years to achieve success. And now it appears the United States expects a long Mideast standoff because it may take at least a year for the worldwide embargo to cripple Iraq's economy.

Secretary of State James Baker stressed the long-range view when he told Congress last week that the American people are being asked to "stand firm, be patient and remain united so that together we can show that aggression does not pay."

But his comments also raised questions. One surely is with respect to the amount of support this country will get from its allies, not only in funding the costs of the

U.S. expedition but in providing men on the ground as well as needed ships, planes and other support equipment.

Equally important is the length of time the Bush administration believes it will take the policy of "containment" to bring Saddam Hussein to his knees or to convince him he must withdraw from Kuwait. To date, the military assignment in Saudi Arabia appears to be open-ended.

Another question is whether the administration really is considering offensive military action against Iraq as a last resort if the stalemate continues for many months.

Perhaps an equally important question is whether the administration believes any such action could be contained or would be quickly converted into a widespread war involving most of the Mideast as well as the United States and other major powers.

Meanwhile, Saddam Hussein continues

to spill forth his bile over Iraqi television and in statements circulated to Western news media that "This is the war of right against wrong and is a crisis between Allah's teachings and the devil."

Unfortunately, Hussein's appeal is winning some support among the have-nots of the Arab populaces who are joining his holy war against what he terms "the corrupt rulers" of Saudi Arabia and Egypt as well as against the United States and its "Zionist" supporters.

With several hundred thousand men stationed not far from each other on the borders of Saudi Arabia, it will be miraculous if the "talk, talk" can continue long enough to enable diplomats to work out a solution to the crisis.

The major fear at the moment is that some hothead on one side or the other, or some militant with his own purposes in mind, will toss a lighted match into the Mideast gas tank and engulf all of us in the feared "war, war."

But Secretary Baker is right. The U.S. public must show patience and understanding if the UN blockade is to succeed and force Saddam Hussein into retreat. However, if the American people do not continue their support, then time is likely to be on the side of the Arab dictator, and war then may become the ultimate if dreaded solution.

Durant gets a second chance

lark Durant, the Grosse Pointe lawyer who made a surprisingly good run while losing the GOP nomination for the U.S. Senate, will be on the general election ballot in November after

On the recommendation of state Sen. John Engler, the GOP gubernatorial nominee, Durant was named by the state Republican convention last weekend as one of its two nominees for the state Supreme

While one political observer commented that Durant thus could earn the distinction of losing two statewide races in one year, we think he will do well even against the two incumbents endorsed for re-election by the Democrats.

In his primary race against Rep. William Schuette, Durant easily carried Wayne County as well as the metropolitan area, a showing which would indicate that he ought not to be taken lightly in November.

In fact, he ought to add strength to the GOP ticket, even though his name will appear on the nonpartisan ballot. Engler apparently agrees with that view, telling the GOP convention that he wanted " a quality ticket from top to bottom" and add-"Clark Durant is that and much

He predicted Durant would bring "significant legal scholarship, great integrity, strong ethics" and "a compassion for victims" to the Supreme Court.

We must say again, however, as we have in the past, that the Michigan system under which candidates for the Supreme Court are nominated by political party conventions for the nonpartisan ballot is ridic-

We were pleased to learn that Durant, too, is critical of the present system which, he told the Grosse Pointe News, is "hypocritical." He added that "Justice transcends party" and ought to be "a matter of principle."

Unfortunately, however, the political parties have not been able to agree on any alternative system, even though various leaders of the bar, including several members of the current high court, have proposed variations of the Missouri plan for appointment and then election of justices.

If Durant should make it to the high court, he would once again give the Pointes two members of that bench. Chief Justice Dorothy Comstock Riley, currently a Pointe resident, served during the reign of the late Chief Justice G. Mennen Wil-

At any rate, we agree with Republican Engler's surprising remark, "It's time we had a bow tie back on our state's highest court," that was an obvious reference to the neckwear of the late Justice Williams, a former Democratic governor of Michigan.

Where has everybody gone?

ecent U.S. Census figures show that while the Grosse Pointes have Udropped out of the select circle of Michigan communities in excess of 50,000, more than half of the 1990 list of such cities also lost population in the last decade.

In addition, the preliminary U.S. Census Bureau figures show that the eight-county Detroit metro area lost 3.5 percent of its population since 1980 even though it still should remain as the sixth largest metro

TV blackout?

hen the next televised debate between Sen. Carl Levin and William Schuette, his GOP foe, occurs Oct. 8, we hope notification of the time of the program is handled better than it was for their first debate Sept. 6.

Neither the Detroit Free Press TV book nor either of the the papers' daily TV program listings indicated when the debate would be broadcast locally on Channel 56. As a result, several potential viewers told us they never found the debate on their TV sets.

True, critics agreed the Senate nominees merely repeated old charges and did not break any new ground in their first TV encounter but the people ought to have the opportunity to view such debates and make up their own minds.

The episode reminds us of the first time a U.S. ambassador to the Soviet Union was permitted to address the Russian people on Russian TV some years ago. The Soviet government cooperated fully-except for one small detail. It didn't inform the public in advance of the time of the broadregion in the United States,

But the figures also indicate that outside of the metro area, Michigan actually gained population at a 1.9 percent rate in the last decade. And while almost half of the state's population or 4,587,967 people still live in the region, that total is 167,797 less than it was 10 years ago.

These figures raise the question of where the people who have been fleeing Detroit have gone. The answer apparently is to other areas of Michigan, especially to retirement havens, and to other parts of the United States, especially the South and Southwest, chiefly for the same purpose.

However, with unemployment remaining high in Michigan during the decade, we can't escape the conclusion that some of the population fleeing Detroit also sought job opportunities in other regions of the country.

The biggest population decline in the metro region occurred in Detroit itself, with a 19 percent decline in the preliminary figures, but other cities with doubledigit losses were Flint, 12.9 percent; Saginaw, 10.9 percent; St. Clair Shores, 10.8 percent; Dearborn Heights, 10.4 percent, and Warren, 10.2 percent.

While the five Grosse Pointes are one community, they constitute five different municipalities but their 52,021 population in 1980 and 58,708 in 1970 put the community in the plus-50,000 class. However, their 5.88 percent loss this year has dropped the Pointes to 48,961.

Yet, as we've emphasized before, that's not all bad from the viewpoint of a closeknit community that is proud of its school system, its parks, its public services and its excellent quality of life, none of which is dependent on population growth.

School taxes

a student, parent, spouse, volunteer and consultant. During that period, it has consistently been ranked among the 10 best public school systems in the United States. During that same 50-year

The recent letter from Mr. Cook is an example. I have found that most of those carpers come from one of two backgrounds: A. They recently moved into Grosse Pointe because "of the school system's outstanding reputation," and then are horrified to find that Grosse Pointe pays its teachers like highly trained professionals with multi-degrees and unstinting dedication. "Gosh," they learn, "quality costs money." (Picture a lightbulb going on over their heads.)

Type B may be a newcomer, or a long-time resident. His chief objection is that these "mere teachers make more money than I do," and they and their hausfraus resent it like hell.

Envy is the hobgoblin of the petite bourgeois.

Responsible management of our school funds is the duty of every citizen. Our elected representatives and their appointees have managed well for many years. To the Mr. Cooks of the community I say: "Suck it up, fella, if you want to play in the majors, or move to another second-rate community, probably from whence you came.'


These two young men have a lot in common. They're both 20 years old, they're friends, they're from Grosse Pointe Farms and they're somewhere in the desert in Saudi Arabia.

I spoke to the mother of one of the boys and I knew what she was feeling - fear, dread, apprehension, that he's not old enough to be so far away from home under such dangerous circumstances and, above all, a hope that he'll return safely.

The events that have occurred throughout the world recently have been most incredible, starting with the bloodless revolution last year, that like an overflowing river, washed over Eastern Europe, sweeping away one government after another. The use of the word bloodless is not literal, of course, since much of it was shed beforehand.

The magnitude and the significance of this revolution were hard to comprehend at the time, particularly since it followed so closely the insane slaughter in Tiananmen Square.

I was flabbergasted when a local writer, wrapping up the decade of the '80s, moaned that nothing of importance has happened in recent times. He pointed to his father's era and World War II as significant. I wanted to cut open that writer's



head to see if there was anything inside.

Eastern Europe was short-lived, however, due to the entrance of Saddam Hussein on the world

It's so easy to hate this obvious madman, just as it's so easy for Iraqis to hate us -- the infidels, the Zionist supporters.

That's what is truly frightening — the volume of hate that is The euphoria over events in expanding every day. A poisoned atmosphere is just as deadly as chemical warfare.

But the fear that was so prevalent when the president committed our army to the Middle East has decreased somewhat. Each day that begins and ends without incident gives us hope that perhaps this crisis can be many in the late 50s when resolved without creating a river of blood.

For those who are personally touched by this crisis - the family, spouses and friends - the passing of the days doesn't mean a lessening of anxiety and fear. It's like listening to the ticking of a time bomb, not knowing how long it is before the time's

They both made it all right, but those were dark days. I was reminded of it when I spoke to the mother who wanted us to know that her son was among the tens of thousands of military personnel being sent to the Mid-








"That's just the way it was back then.'

As it turned out, it was the best thing that could have happened to him, Bagnanz said.

Now, three-quarters of a century later, Baganz is affectionately called the "Dean of the Lakes" by his seagoing peers because he is the oldest living licensed sea captain on the Great Lakes and past commodore of the U.S. Steel fleet, the largest on the lakes with more than 50 ships.

For more than 50 years, Baganz captained several iron ore freighters from Duluth, Minn., to Chicago, Detroit, Cleveland and even Quebec, navigating more than three million miles of waterways.

To many Grosse Pointers, the passing of freighters on the lake suggests gentle ships with a slow, smooth journey ahead.

But according to Baganz, only two of his many trips were "without hair-raising experiences.'

The year before he was shanghaied into a life at sea, the "Great Storm of 1913" left more than 235 sailors drowned in its wake. Ten ships were lost that night and 20 more were blown ashore.

A Michigan Historic Site plaque in Sanilac reads: "For sixteen terrible hours, gales of cyclonic fury made man and his machines helpless.

But to Baganz, the "big blow of 1940" was the worst storm he ever encountered.

"It started out as a light southeast wind. We were coming down from the Straits of Mackinac toward Chicago. The radio reported weather trouble to the south. They said it was a whole gale which is almost a hurricane," Baganz said.

"We were in a bad spot, on the east shore and I knew we had to make it to the west side of Lake Michigan before long. You just don't want to have a bout with a hurricane.

"We were about 15 miles off of Sturgeon Bay when the wind started howling. The seas were getting bigger by the minute and it started snowing. The waves were 50 feet high and

1,200 feet apart. When you looked into the valley of the sea, you could see the ground below.

"By now we were going nowhere, just bouncing in the water. About 7 o'clock I jumped to the phone and the wheelsman said he couldn't hold it. 'She's turning around' he said. Just then I called the engineers and said 'give it to her, everything she's got.' It was like we were caught in a whirlpool.

"I tried to get her into Green Bay but it was snowing so hard I couldn't find the door in so there was nothing left to do but to try to make it back to the straits.

"We struck a course but we couldn't keep her straight. The radio said the main light at the lighthouse was out of commission but we had to take a chance and hoped the snow would stop.

"The winds were steady at 100 miles per hour with gusts up to 125. The waves were smashing the pilot house like it was a toy.

'Someone saw a cluster of lights and said it looked like a steamboat. They said 'What's it doing out here?' and I said, 'What the hell are we doing out

"It looked like we were going to hit so just as I was going to haul her around, we realized it was the house lights below the lighthouse tower, which was dark like a ghost.

"We came around and just missed it with the steering pole," Baganz said. "Then we dropped the hook straight down and it almost landed on a tree. Though the water was thick on the deck, we waited out the storm right

"Later we learned that the lightkeeper saw us bouncing in the high water and turned on all the lights in the house, which to us was a miracle because we were about to come down right on top of it.

"It was the worst storm I ever had. I wouldn't have thought it possible we'd ever get back. We all thought we were goners.'

Baganz said that on that November night in 1940, three freighters sank to the bottom, carrying more than three score sailors down with them.
"When the gales blow like

that, you're completely at the mercy of the sea.

"There was a saltwater man on board who kept saying that the Great Lakes were like little puddles, but after that blow, he was the only one who got off in Chicago.

"I hurried to call my wife, Cecille, to say I was all right and she said, 'Oh, was it blowing over there?"

That was 50 years ago. Most of the ships Baganz captained are gone, including the 530-foot George W. Perkins, which was loose at every seam and required more than 178,000 new rivets to keep it together after the storm.





An unusual autumn rail adventure will trace the route Thomas A. Edison served as a news butcher and later a telegrapher between Detroit and Port Huron.

The Bluewater Michigan Chapter of the National Railway Historical Society will conclude its 1990 excursion season on Saturday and Sunday, Oct. 6 and 7, with a three-option set of trips aboard the Edison Express from Pontiac and Birmingham to Port Huron by way of Detroit and Mount Clemens on the Grand Trunk Western Railroad.

Passengers may elect to make the round trip on Saturday or on Sunday. Or, they may travel to Port Huron on Saturday, spend the night at the Thomas Edison Inn and return to Birmingham or Pontiac on Sunday.

The special train will follow the Michigan footsteps of one of America's most prolific and beloved inventors. The trip will originate at Pontiac's Transpo Center on West Wide Track Drive, make a stop at Norman's Eaton St. Station Restaurant, the former Grand Trunk depot on Eton Road south of Maple in Birmingham, and then travel to Milwaukee Junction, east of Detroit's New Center.

From there the train will follow Tom Edison's trail through Mount Clemens, Richmond and New Haven into Port Huron where it will traverse a threemile industrial area to the landscaped lawn of the Thomas Edison Inn on the St. Clair River in the shadow of the Blue Water Bridge.

During a 3-1/2 hour stopover, a special sit-down lunch will be available at the inn, for those who order it in advance. Passengers also will have the option to visit the commercial restaurant at the inn or any of several eating establishments within walking distance or available by special shuttle bus. The stopover also will allow for visits to the recently-restored Fort Gratiot Depot adjacent to the Edison

Drook said DirectoRecycle coincides with the current delivery of the new Detroit and Grosse Pointe Neighborhood white and yellow pages directories in Grosse Pointe.

Drook said the Grosse Pointe DirectoRecycle project is part of a larger effort by Ameritech Publishing to reduce solid waste and protect the environment.

For example, the company recently began using materials in its directories which improve their recyclability.

According to Kim Madeleine, the company now uses animalbased glue in the bindings instead of synthetic glue, and uses soybean-based ink in place of carbon-based ink. Both are moves which make the product more recyclable.

The Troy-based firm is also recycling directories in Wisconsin in partnership with Fort Howard Paper Co., a major paper recycler. And this spring, Ameritech Publishing printed six telephone directories manufactured from 100 percent recycled paper, including the Charlevoix, Mich., directory.

Drook added that although the Grosse Pointe DirectoRecycle project is the first attempt at recycling directories in Michigan, the company is working to find ways to expand the project in the state.

"Once we find companies in Michigan willing to recycle our directories, we plan to introduce the DirectoRecycle project into as many other Michigan cities as we can," Drook said.

Megan is a punky, sullen L.A. teen who is furious with her mother (Karen Black) for moving her from Beverly Hills to Iowa after her father dies.

It doesn't help her situation when she appears in school with Morticia Addams eyliner and a chalklike complexion, wearing all black, looking like the Winona Ryder character in "Beetlejuice." Because of her oddball appearance she is laughed at

and ridiculed by a group of hateful, snobbish girls who make her life miserable.

Her neurotic mother is no help. She is too busy with her own affairs.

Her loneliness makes her a perfect candidate for the evil powers that lurk in the antique mirror left behind by the previous owner. The story is that several gen-

erations earlier, the mirror was a gateway to a dark and evil world from which satanic forces possessed the mind of a young girl who lived there.

Megan, in turn, becomes possessed by the satanic powers that enable her to deal with anyone who causes her pain. At first she uses the powers

cautiously. But when the taunts mount, she becomes more vio-

"Mirror, Mirror" is a teen horror film which sets it apart from

such horror offerings as Freddy Krueger's Elm Street films.

Producer Virginia Perifili says that she didn't want to make films with girls getting slashed by men. Perifili is one of the producers behind Orphan Entertainment. 

"I think it'll be excellent," he said. "I think we'll have a lot of fun there.'







Buying a new car: When is the best time?

introducing its restyled Escort for 1991, Ford Motor Co. announced buyer incentives on the new subcompact. Also included were its '91 Mercury Tracer and the Australian-built Mercury Capri.

The incentive, a \$500 discount, was available only to customers who had never before bought a Ford product.

Anyone who scans the dealer ads in the newspaper has seen the low prices attached to some very inviting vehicles.

The fine print underneath the illustration often explains that the stated retail price is determined by subtracting a rebate and perhaps an allowance for the new college graduate buyer. Or a first-time buyer.

The end of summer brings us to the beginning of a new model year, at least for the domestic automakers

Logic suggests dealers will be anxious to clear their lots of unsold 1990 models to make room for the '91s. Is it a good time to deal, or is the buyer foolhardy for selecting a "year-old" model?

No one said this was going to be easy! Buying a new car is as bewildering and frustrating as it is exciting and invigorating. Psychologists and others who monitor human behavior say buying a car ranks right up there with visits to the dentist on the personal anxiety scale.

Conscientious consumers study the ads, they read automotive buff books and consumer guides, they talk with friends, they visit dealerships. They are still con-

Cottage accredited

Back to the September question: Is this a good time of year to buy?

"More so this year than any other," says Joe Marino, new-car sales manager at Northland Chrysler-Plymouth in Oak Park. "We're almost giving away some models.

Well, not exactly. But rebates abound. There are customer rebates on cars and trucks. There are special low-interest finance programs. There also is factory money available to dealerships to encourage sales of certain

Marino mentions as an example a \$1,500 cash allowance to the customer on a certain Plymouth compact.

"At this point in time inventories are dwindling," Marino cautions. "Certain nameplates in popular colors might not be available. The buyer might have to bend a little.'

Chrysler dealers no longer offer a special Chrysler Credit finance plan for first-time buyers. he says. There was a problem with fraud. There is, however, a Chrysler plan for college graduates. Not too many buyers are taking advantage of it, notes the sales manager.

GMAC's College Graduate Finance Plan is "a great opportunity for buyers right out of school or approaching graduation to save money and to establish a credit rating," says Pete Spano, new-car sales manager at James-Martin Chevrolet in Detroit's New Center area.

Spano says any month is a good time of year to buy. "Check rebates: Look for the high ones,' says the sales veteran.

The James-Martin manager says the current automotive calendar, with year-round, staggered introductions, has made the traditional one-time newmodel introduction just that — a tradition, a thing of the past. Chevrolet, he says, has been rolling out its '91 models in a constant stream that began last January.

If you're interested in making

a deal on a '90 model, don't wait too long, advises Gary Morrison, sales manager at Joe Ricci Jeep-Eagle in Detroit. "We should be all out of stock in a couple of months," he says.

"These are aggressive incentive campaigns," Morrison says. "I'd say 90 percent of our customers know about them through our advertising efforts."

It's complicated, he adds. For instance, there are three Eagle Premier models and each has a different rebate.

Customers who elect to use a rebate as part of the down payment still may not qualify for financing. That, he says, is up to the lending institution.

Factory-to-dealer incentives might be used to increase tradein allowances, he says. Don't look for too many sport utilities like the spunky Jeep Wrangler on used-car lots, Morrison adds. "Owners tend to hold on to them. They have high resale values."

A final note from Joe Ricci's manager: New-model prices are up 3 to 5 percent.

For those intent on buying a

'91, check the automotive buff books. Their lucky-duck editors and writers go to long-lead newmodel previews in glamorous lo-

models, exotics and models that have major technological and styling changes. They probably won't be doing any pieces on everyday, moderately priced cars until later in the model year if at all. Don't look for much about the Chevrolet Cavalier for 1991, for example. Or Plymouth Sundance or Ford Tempo. Not much new in those camps.

Those content with last year's model will find them all reviewed and compared in several publications. One, the Consumer Guide Auto Series, Rating the 1990 Autos, is available to buy cations months before vehicles or borrow. and imported cars and some light trucks. Car and Driver Magazine publishes an annual Buyers Guide.

Incentives seem to be here to stay. They were being offered on some '91s before their public introduction, for goodness sake.

If you're of a mind to snap up a '90, here are a few things to consider:

• Prices almost always go up with a new model year.

• Incentives tend to be more widespread and more generous with current model-year products.

· Warranty is unaffected by the age of the new car - though sometimes warranties are improved, like Cadillac's recent announcement that it has eliminated warranty deductibles for its 1991 models.

• There may even be some new 1989s around, but they'll be hard to find - let us know if you uncover one!

· Selection will be more limited with 1990s; but there is immediate availability - you won't have to wait for it to be

· Dealers are anxious to move the 1990s, so they don't have to pay on them until they're sold.



Parker said he found a crawl space in the basement that was full of leftover items used by the builder — unfired Pewabic tiles, lumber, nail barrels, even a hidden wine cabinet, which was probably used during Prohibition.

Willeke's letter described the house's design as Modern English, strongly influenced by the work of English architect Sir Edwin Lutyens and the American architect Harris T. Lindberg.

Blueberries are perfect for Italian-inspired fruit desserts

lend a large measure of mouthwatering appeal to simple recipes or sophisticated dishes such as summertime desserts, pancakes and muffins.


Blueberries are cultivated in Michigan, Maine, North Carolina, New Jersey and Washington. Michigan ranks first nationally in blueberry production and most blueberry acreage is located in the southwest and west central districts of the state. Popular varieties are Bluecrop, Elliot and Jersey.

Until early in the 20th century, there was just one type of blueberry - the wild blues that were used by the Indians.

During Colonial times, native American Indians sold sun-dried berries to the new settlers, who would then enjoy them through cold New England winters. Today. Americans have a unique fondness for this sweet, plump and luscious fruit.

Nutritionally, blueberries rank first in Vitamin A and second in food energy among all the berries. They also contain healthy amounts of Vitamin C and iron. Health-conscious Americans like them because they are low in calories (only 42 calories in 1/2

The cultivated blues are almost flawless dessert fruits. Not only do they have a fine flavor, but they require little or no preparation other than a cold water rinse. The best blues have a powdery light blue color. They appear to have been dusted with a waxy powder called bloom. The bloom is a clue to freshness. 1-1/2 cups all-purpose flour

Dark black blueberries aren't as 1/2 tsp. baking powder fresh, flavorful or firm as the light-colored blues. When purchasing cultivated blues, the bigger the berry, the better the flavor. Pay the premium price and buy the largest blues available. Blueberries are at their peak during June, July and August.

Here are four Italian-inspired desserts that are easy to make. The ancient Romans didn't have native blueberries to work with, anymore than do creative chefs in Italy today, but if they did, they would have used classic dessert ingredients familiar to Italians for centuries and combined them with something very special - the marvelous fresh blueberries that give such imperial flavor to summertime desserts. The Roman emperors might have given up a small piece of the world for just a taste of the blueberries everybody in America can enjoy today.

Blueberry Sophias 1/2 cup butter or margarine 1 pkg. (8 oz.) cream cheese

4 cups fresh blueberries, rinsed and drained Sugar

1/2 cup confectioners' sugar 1/2 tsp. vanilla 1/4 tsp. mace

2 tsp. grated orange rind 2 cups (1 pt.) heavy cream

Mash butter until soft and fluffy. Add cheese and mix until smooth and well blended. Stir in flour and baking powder. Shape dough into a ball, wrap in foil and chill for 1 hour. Roll out 1/4inch thick on a floured board. Cut into 12 3-1/2 inch rounds using a floured cookie cutter. Place rounds on a cookie sheet and prick well with a fork.

Bake in a preheated hot oven (400 degrees) for 10 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool on a rack. Sprinkle blueberries with sugar.

Combine remaining ingredients and beat until stiff. Arrange 6 pastry rounds on a serving platter, top each with a generous spoon of flavored whipped cream and some of the sugared berries. Top with a second pastry round,

more whipped cream and sugared berries. Can be topped with blueberry syrup.







Saros also kept the handpainted murals and the plaster carving on the ceiling of the living room, a stained glass window at the top of the staircase, and all the stained oak floors.

The living room is unusually large - 30 feet by 50 feet with a walk-in fireplace, and a mantel decorated by a shield design with a windmill on it. There is speculation that the home is located on the same property as the old French windmill from which Windmill Pointe Drive takes its name.

> Architect Hugh Taylor Millar used strong symmetry on the facade to focus attention on the decorative stonework and solid bronze door of the main entrance.

The Rossetti/Rochon residence, designed and built in 1938 by Louis Rossetti, is an international-style house featuring strong interrelated masses which are devoid of excessive detail, according to the AIA tour committee. A few small windows face

A number of ideas considered to be modern in 1938 were incorporated into the design - including a sunken living room, splitlevel space organization, wholehouse power ventilation and built-in lighting and furniture.

The Purdy/Youngblood residence, an English Tudor design constructed in 1929-1930, was also designed by Leonard Wil-

Executed in carved stone, decorative brickwork and a slate roof, the home is designed to give the impression of having an interior courtyard.

The present owners have renovated and restored interior and exterior portions of the house. Pewabic tile in the Florida room and around the living room fireplace has been restored and the kitchen has been renovated.





HAVE A PLEASANT TRY AT PERFECTION **BRIDGE BY WOODY BOYD** THE PASTEBOARD PASTIME

Two of the boldest, but notorious bridge technicians in the game's long history are Pappy Poacher, an aged and old student of swindle and filch, and his compulsive compatriot, Peter Theiver, who has an irresistible impulse to sneak away with anything in play on the table. Some say they have a subterranean chamber full of bridge tricks they'd snitched that are worth several million dollars in duplicate and stake play.

It is the law of the land that if you steal and are found guilty, you're a felon; but not so at the bridge table. When the cards are in play and it's your turn to do so, to snitch a trick here or snatch one there is an acceptable and highly respected practice. In fact I know a venerable judge from Southfield who is proficient in this art of snitching, and to the best of my recollection he's never been before the bar to set at rest any question of his integrity.

Neither does one need to be slight of hand or faster with the finger than the eye can see to succeed in this craftsmanship. All that is required is a sensitive recognition of the limits of your opponents keenness, tempo, timing and a deceptively inexperienced table presence. Of course it adds to the scenario to be able to set the defense up with your bidding by leading them astray with a modicum of trickery, but truly the practices execution and effectiveness is pri-

I have found, though, that it isn't easy to acquire one of their petty theft masterpieces. 

Pappy and Peter have gained fame and maintained their dignity from this technique at the bridge table, but there are only a few who can make that claim.

The alarm clock rings exactly at 4:08 a.m., and out from under the sheets rolls a man on a mis-

Dr. Richard Bell stumbles half asleep to the bathroom. He showers, shaves and scurries back to the bedroom, where he slips on layers of play clothes.

A quick sip of coffee, perhaps a bite or two of a Danish, and Bell is out the door — with work clothes in hand - just one hour after waking.

His mission: to get to the Detroit Boat Club by 5:30 a.m.

From sun up to sun down, Bell

hardly ever home, he's had to convince his wife to join his program, and he spends more time in a coaching boat than most people spend in a car.

Bell has coached the Detroit Boat Club's rowing team since 1971 and he plans to continue his reign.

"I've been lucky in the fact that I've been doing OK here in Detroit," said Bell, who lives in Lathrup Village. "I've had the opportunity to take other jobs and move out of the area, but I haven't done that because my job has really moved along well,

But in 1965, Bell's father died so he was forced to turn most of his attention to family affairs; he did, however, remain active in rowing. Two years later, he got out of rowing, and in 1969-70, was writing his thesis.

"There were a few rough years there, but staying in rowing really kept me enthused," said State's rowing team in his senior year. "I had been so attached to rowing for a long time, and it was difficult to leave for awhile, but it was something I had to do at that time.'

Club's team at the end of his sophomore year in high school. He rowed for three years before entering Wayne.

After his collegiate stint and his rowing hiatus, he started getting the itch to row again. This time, however, it would come in a different capacity.

"In 1971, someone asked me to row and I felt an obligation to Bell, who captained Wayne the rowing so I did," said Bell. "Plus I was ready to get back into it.

And now he's right in the thick of it, coaching through a megaphone on the waters of the Detroit River every day.

"In the fall season we don't practice at 5:30 in the morning because it's too dark on the water," Bell said. "It gives me a chance to sleep in a little, and I don't mind that too much at all." In fact, Bell has the privilege

of using a snooze alarm. "After the initial alarm, I hit the snooze and then it goes off only every 10 minutes," said Bell. "I love that feeling of knowing I can go back to sleep and not worry about getting to the club. I guess I'm getting all

those mornings back now." And his wife doesn't mind that he's home more, either.

'The balance of work and being the rowing coach got to the point that I wasn't doing a lot at home," said Bell, a microbiologist at Difco Laboratories, Inc. in Detroit. "But she (Karen) decided not to fight rowing anymore, so she joined. She's been a very patient and understanding person, and now I'm very pleased that she's involved."

Karen Bell is the treasurer of the Friends of Detroit Rowing, and Dr. Bell is a board member.

The Friends of Detroit Rowing was started in 1972 and is the entire fundraising and support arm of the rowing team. The group's president is Denne Os-

"Rowing's fortunes have really gone down," Bell said of a sport that offers only glory and no fi-nancial rewards. "We've had some successful years, but we've had to go to a self-sufficient program. At one time the club used to pay for everything, but that's not possible any longer so we have to do our part and with the Friends of Detroit Rowing we've been successful.

Bell's hectic life has also settled down with the help of assistants Chris Costello, Craig Larsen and Carol Swanson.

The only thing Bell has to show for it is an Olympic ring.

"We got the whole treatment and prestige while we were training," he said. "But it's not the same. We didn't get the chance to get to that great oracle - the Olympics - but we knew we were supposed to be there. It was a typical feeling of why does this have to happen to

There are no pictures of Jimmy Carter in your house are there?

"No, I can't say we're very fond of him," Bell said. "When we look back on it, the boycott really didn't do anything for America anyway.

But what Bell has is his home and his volunteer work at the Detroit Boat Club.

"Rowing is a very graceful, yet masculine sport that is the true meaning of teamwork, dedication and commitment," Bell said. "I learned a long time ago that this is not something you do just to do it. You're either involved or you're not. A rower has to be a strong individual and then has to become a good team rower. One mistake by one person can really ruin the crew's cadence.

"I do this because I love it and I love to see the kids. It seems that I can never get enough of rowing.





"It looks like we're finally over the hump in our program, Newvine said after his team dismantled Redford St. Agatha, 30-7, Sept. 7 at ULS. "We had never beaten this team before, but now we have. If we didn't win this game it would have set us back and probably created some doubts, but now we just have bigger things to look forward to.

ULS is ranked No. 5 in the Class C polls, and is predicted by many to make the playoffs.

For the second straight week, the ULS defense held its opponent under 100 yards and didn't allow a score. The only Aggie score came against the special teams on the second-half kickoff. when the ball was returned 80

Whelan's point after attempt was blocked, and ULS settled for a 13-0 halftime lead.

"I think the kids got a little too comfortable with the lead they had and that's why we gave up that touchdown to start the second half," Newvine said.

But ULS bounced right back and extended its 13-7 lead to 16-7 on Whelan's 23-yard field goal.

"That was the turning point," Newvine said. "We felt the momentum shifting to St. Agatha, but Mike's kick made sure it stayed with us. His kick took a lot of pressure off our defense, because we started playing like we were afraid to make a mis-

Making no mistake on the Knights' next defensive stand was Mike Fox, who picked up a loose ball and ran seven yards for a score. Whelan's kick gave the Knights a 23-7 cushion. Carroll capped the scoring with a 38-yard run in the fourth quarter. Whelan kicked the

"Our defense played exceptionally well, but it was our offensive line that made it possible for us to do anything we wanted," Newvine said. "I said at the beginning of the season that our tone would be set early on if the offensive line could mature, and it looks like it has.'

Finess Asthma: Life threatening?

Asthma can strike people in all walks of life.

A farmer in rural America, an office worker with a desk job, an Olympic gold medalist, an 80-year-old retiree. It is estimated that 10 million Americans suffer from this chronic inflammatory lung disease, and yes, asthma can kill.

Asthma has been a major contributor to morbidity, mortality and health-care costs in the United States. Asthma costs in the United States exceeded \$4 billion in 1986. Each year asthma accounts for 38 million days spent in bed, 111 million restricted activity days, and nine million days lost at work.

Asthma is the 16th most common diagnosis in doctor's office visits. It is the fourth leading chronic condition in persons under 17 after hayfever, chronic bronchitis and chronic sinusitis. There were more than 4,000 deaths related to asthma in 1986.

Asthma is a chronic physical lung disease. Over the last two decades, much has been discovered about the physiologic events in the lung's airways; however, there is much more to learn. One thing we positively know is that an asthma attack can be a very

frightening experience.

To explain what happens during the actual attack, it is helpful to trace the physiologic events in the airways. Asthma attacks usually do not happen spontaneously. For every attack there is likely to be a specific cause, or trigger.

The number of probable causes or triggers is enormous. Examples of these triggers include, pollens, dusts, molds, foods, exercise, cold air, sleep, infections, emotional stress, air pollutants, cigarette smoke and household products.

When an allergen such as pollen enters the airways of an asthmatic, the immune system responds by producing large amounts of antibodies. The allergen and the antibodies attach to a special type of cell called the mast cell in the bronchial lining of the lung.

This interaction is just the beginning of a chain of explosive events. Within mast cells

are a group of chemical mediators. These mediators are released into the airways and cause the muscles around the airways to tighten. This tightening causes narrowing of the airway passage, swelling of the tissues and increased mucus secretions.

After the initial asthma attack a late-phase attack may occur. In the late phase, other mediators are released that draw white blood cells to the irritated lung airways. These other mediators and white blood cells attack the already weakened walls of the airways. Inflammation sets in, the airways are further damaged and become filled with damaged cells and mucus plugs.

Asthma management starts with an early and thorough diagnosis. This includes a detailed medical history, a physical examination, a chest Xray, and various laboratory and lung function tests. Once an asthma diagnosis is made.

medical treatment can begin.

First-line medical treatment may begin with a physician prescribing the right medication and effective dosage for the asthmatic. Asthmatics are frequently prescribed medications called bronchodilators. Bronchodilators relieve airway constriction and keep the air passages open. The asthmatic may also be prescribed steroids to help fight airway irritation and inflammation. These steroids should not be confused with the type of steroids taken by some athletes.

Unfortunately, asthma can't be eliminated but it can be controlled. The best ways to manage asthma are to avoid triggers and join an asthma management program. The programs consist of physicians, pulmonary rehabilitation therapists, and patients working together on how to prevent and manage the asthma attacks.

Programs may include educational classes such as 1)

avoiding triggers, 2) asthma medications and their side effects, 3) treatments and therapy for asthma, 4) nutritional guidelines for asthmatics, 5) appropriate exercise for the asthmatic, 6) stress management and relaxation, 7) the disease process of asthma, and 8) lung anatomy and physiol-

The asthmatic must always keep in mind that preventing an attack is the key factor in a successful asthma management program.

Gathering the facts

The influx of nutritional information over the last few years has made us perhaps the most informed, most health conscious Americans ever.

But, just how well are we absorbing and using this knowhow? Are we making positive changes in our eating habits? No, suggests a recent survey.

According to a report in the April newsletter "Environmental Nutrition," the International Food Information Council (IFIC) and the American Dietetic Association (ADA) recently authorized a telephone survey of 772 adults. Although 95 percent of those adults believe "balance, variety and moderation" are critical to healthful eating, about 50 percent said they often increase consumption of a single food once it has been touted as a 'cure'' (i.e., oat bran).

However, when it comes to increasing their consumption of fruits and vegetables, only 6 percent responded in the affirmative to fruits, and only 8 percent responded in the affirmative to vegetables. Apparently, many of us still have a long way to go. A clear understanding of some of

some basic nutrition information. Q) What is the difference between dietary cholesterol and blood cholesterol?

A) Cholesterol is manufactured by the liver and is also acquired from the consumption of animal fats.

Our blood cholesterol levels are affected by both sources. Despite individual diet, some people are prone to higher blood cholesterol levels than others. According to current recommendations, blood cholesterol levels should be under 180 milligrams per millimeter of blood for those under the age of 30, and no more than 200 milligrams for those over 30.

Another factor to remember is the ratio of "good" cholesterol (high density lipids, or HDL) vs. the "bad" cholesterol (low density lipids, or LDL). When you have a cholesterol test done, the American Heart Association suggest a dietary cholesterol intake of no more than 300 milligrams

Q) When selecting beef, which cuts are the healthiest?

A) Beef graded "good" is

sive "choice" or "prime" cuts because fewer of its calories come from fat. The fat marbling that you pay extra for in "prime" cuts adds only to flavor and

tenderness, not to good health. Q) Are health food bars better choices than regular candy bars? A) Not necessarily.

Many so-called health food bars may be made with whole grains and fruit, but they still may be high in saturated fats or sugars. When selecting "health" snacks, check the label. Look for products that have grains and fruits listed first. Note the placement of oils and sugars they should be near the bottom of the list. Also note the types of oils

Avoid palm and coconut oils because they're high in saturated fat. If a label says "vegetable oils" stay away from that product also. In all likelihood, healthier than the more expen- the manufacturer is using the

cheaper, highly saturated oils. Q) Does eating extra protein build muscle?

A) Many athletes consume large amounts of protein under the assumption that eating extra protein will increase muscle mass. Unfortunately, no evidence supports that. In fact, only 22 percent of muscle is protein and 70 percent is water. Exercise, not protein, seems to be the key factor in muscle growth.

Q) What percentage of carbohydrates, protein and fat should our diet include?

A) The U.S. Dietary Guidelines recommend that about 55 to 65 precent of our calories come from complex carbohydrates (fruits, vegetables and grains), 10-15 percent come from protein, and 25 to not more than 30 percent come from fat.

You do not need a degree in nutrition or math to work out a balanced diet. If the majority of your food selections come from the carbohydrate foods, (the less unprocessed and the freshest), balanced with small amounts of lean protein choices and still smaller amounts of fat, you will achieve a well-balanced diet.

Q) Is it true that excessive amounts of sugar in the diet can cause diabetes?

A) The primary cause of diabetes is still unknown.

However, your chances of contracting the disease significantly increase if diabetes runs in your family or you are overweight.

In fact, it has been estimated that 80 to 90 percent of Type II diabetes (non-insulin dependent) victims are overweight, a good reason to control not only sugar, but fat intake.

Q) Does a label that reads "made with pure vegetable oil" ensure healthful fat?

A) Although many labels try to sound impressive with their claims of "pure vegetable oil" or "cholesterol free," such labels are often warning signals and give reason to read the label more carefully.

Only animal products contain cholesterol, but even some vegetable oils contain highly saturated fats (palm kernel or coconut oil), which can act like sticky glues in your blood vessels and raise blood cholesterol lev-

Q) Considering their youth, heir robust activity ievel and their general good health, is there a need to monitor children's cholesterol levels?

A) Recent studies indicate that one in four children under 20 already has high blood cholesterol, a significant risk factor for heart

Many physicians advocate intervention to lower cholesterol levels in children, maintaining that acquiring wise eating habits at an early age may prevent early onset of heart disease.

While newborns and babies need a high-fat diet for proper development, the American Acadmey of Pediatrics recommends as reasonable, that no more than 30 to 40 percent of calories should come from fat for children 2 years old and over.

Q) Are Americans better off if they take vitamin supplements? A) The answer is no.

Many studies have proven that all the necessary vitamins and minerals can be supplied simply by eating regular, well-balanced meals. However, there some obvious exceptions. such as some older people, pregnant women and some infants who have been diagnosed as requiring supplementation by their physicians.

These are just some of the answers to the questions you may have regarding nutrition, but credible information abounds, if you seek it. By taking responsibility for your health, by being aware of current nutrition issues, you will move ahead in your quest for good health and a balanced life.

Benefits of being in shape

I know it's tough to think about, but cold weather is on the way again.

You could sit around and pout about it, or you could (with a reasonable amount of effort) prepare for the best season ever with your favorite winter sport.

Those who have tried it know that Alpine skiing is one of the most demanding, yet exciting forms of athletic endeavor. A well conditioned cardivascular system, strength and flexibility are the basic prerequisites. Power, agility, coordination and balance are also necessities to prepare you for the rigorous demands of the slopes.

Skiers who are in shape will counteract shifts in balance smoothly and ultimately prevent injury. Adding sports-specific exercises to your current fitness program, or initiating a program with ski fitness in mind, will net you a safer and more rewarding season.

Skiing involves very fast muscular contractions within a small range of motion. It's because the speed of contraction is so high that your muscles for the most part are working without the presence of oxygen, or in an anaerobic capacity. That "burn" you feel in your legs at the bottom of the first run is a by-product of this kind of muscular activity.

The most effective way to improve anaerobic conditioning is through interval training. Interval training is alternating short bursts of intenst activity with slightly longer periods of active recovery.

For example, the next time you go out for a run, try this during the last 15 minutes: Alternate a one-block sprint (that

should take about 30 seconds) with two minutes of light jogging. The stronger you become, the more tolerable the 30 seconds will become.

The human body is very adaptive to physical stresses placed upon it. Therefore, in order to continue to improve conditioning, it is necessary to force further adaptation by increasing the amount of stress. What that means is when the 30 seconds gets easy, make it 45 seconds, and eventually a full minute.

This kind of program can easily be adapted to fitness walking and cycling with the same re-

Another essential element of ski fitness is a combination of agility, coordination and balance. That's the body's ability to maintain equilibrium during a downhill run. In general, less muscle tension is produced in a position of balance and stability.

So, a balanced downhill posture uses less energy than one which is constantly fighting gravity.

Jumping rope is a great selfhelp method for improving agility and coordination; start with five minutes and work up to a half hour.

See how tricky you can be. Alternate between single and double skips of the rope, step-kick and arm crosses. The better you are with the rope, the faster you will react to conditions on the

Have you tried an aerobic class lately? If they are on your regular program, than you're

one step ahead of the game. If not, give an aerobic class a shot; it's without a doubt the best way to improve coordination and bal-

An aerobics class does wonders for your flexibility, too, and you're going to need it on those moguls. What about strength training to improve your ski technique and reduce the potential for injury?

No problem. I suggest, however, that you ask a certified fitness professional to give you a series of sport-specific exercises concentrating on lower body and abdominal muscles. General overall upper body conditioning is also important.

If all this seems like hard work, you're right. But, Alpine skiing is a skillful blend of body awareness, balance and strength. This season, if you start now, you can add an extra element of safety and pleasure to one of the greatest winter sports.

What is an athletic trainer?

An athletic trainer is a member of the sports medicine profession, acknowledged by virtually every member of the medical profession, and the National Allied Health Commission.

Specifically, the athletic trainer is a health professional who has completed a four-year undergraduate or graduate degree, fulfilled the requirements for certification by the National Athletic Trainer Association (N.A.T.A.), and has passed the N.A.T.A. certification examination. Consequently, there are individuals who are athletic trainers but are not certified. They, however, are unable to assume the same role as a certified ath-

letic trainer. Athletic trainers' studies are concentrated in biology, anatomy and physiology, exercise physiology, biomechanics, preventive medicine, emergency procedures, advanced athletic training principles, rehabilitation skills, and administration and practical experience.

When you look at what the athletic trainer does, there are actually six "domains": prevention of athletic injuries, recognition and evaluation of injuries, management and treatment, disposition of injuries, rehabilitation, and organization and administration, as well as education and counseling of athletes

When you take into account the education of a certified trainer, this person is, by far, the best qualified to handle the emergency care and prevention of athletic injuries in any athletic program and is an excellent resource for information on enhancing an athlete's performance.

Traditionally, the athletic trainer is found in professional sports, colleges and universities, as well as high schools, and more recently in private and hospital-based sports medicine clin-

The modern athletic trainer is regarded as an asset in clinics not only for the athletic population, but for the community at large. With a more active community, it becomes clear why the special skills and training of an athletic trainer are needed.

There is a concern expressed by athletic medicine professionals regarding the lack of qualified health care personnel for high school athletes. It is very clear to me that good care can't be met by using an assistant coach or student who has had only minimal training in first-aid or taping. Looking at the total picture, we find that high school athletics have the least medically trained personnel

available to their athletes. According to a survey by Johnson and Johnson, only 15 percent of high schools employ certified athletic trainers, compared to 98 percent for pros and 78 percent for universities and col-

Parents need to consider the need for a certified athletic trainer in their high schools. Is it a right or a privilege? Unfortunately, for many schools it currently is not only a privilege, but

The next time you see a certified trainer administering aid to an injured athlete or taping an ankle, remember that he or she is more than someone who enjoys hanging around a gym or handing out ice.

To a certified trainer, your child's health and well-being are the major concerns.
