The college is the only school in the world soley dedicated to preserving the ancient art of clowning and DeMercurio is wholly dedicated to a career in which she can make people laugh.


Toward that goal, DeMercurio is in the midst of an intensive two-month session where students learn the art of comedy, makeup, choreography, stiltwalking, jug-

Woods stumbles over business hour limits

A proposed ordinance limiting business hours in Grosse Pointe Woods was shot down by a divided City Council Monday night.

The ordinance, which would have limited all-night businesses in the Woods, was proposed as a way to prevent crime in the future. In 1989, the Woods had the lowest major crime rate among the larger communities in the Detroit metropolitan area, according to the FBI.

The Park, City and Farms all have existing laws limiting business hours, but a Woods city attorney warned such limits have been found unconstitutional.

One one hand, Woods council members in favor of ordinance said if businesses were closed between midnight and 6 a.m., there would be less opportunity

On the other, council members opposed to the ordinance said that while some measures are needed to control business hours, adoption of the ordinance may leave the city open to litigation.

City attorney George Catlin said the Woods currently has an ordinance prohibiting self-service operations between 1 and 6:30 a.m., but it allows full-service operations for 24 hours.

But because the city does not prohibit full-service hours, serquired by their parent oil companies to remain open aroundthe-clock.

Some who would rather close between midnight and 6 a.m. may lose up to \$2,500 a month in overhead, such as wages, health insurance and utilities, because very little gasoline is

sold during those hours. One gasoline dealer, who was present at Monday's meeting, urged the city to enact the ordinance so he could shut down between midnight and 6 a.m.

"We are inviting a dangerous situation," the dealer told the council. "I want you to enact the ordinance so that I can be prohibited from operating 24 hours.

According to Catlin, who strongly urged the council to deny passage of the proposed ordinance, some gasoline dealers want the city to go to battle for

The problem is, Catlin said, the city would be a likely target for a constitutional challenge under federal statute code No. 42, Sec. 1983.

A challenge under the same statute was recently brought against the city of Novi (in a different type of challenge), and the municipality was fined \$200,000.

Catlin added that Miami was fined some \$90 million under the same statute, and the fine was than loving against the city's taxpayers.

'In my opinion, any ordinance that cannot stand up to constitutional muster can be a hazard to any municipality," Catlin said.
"In our case, if such an ordi-

nance were passed, businesses could prove that we are infringing on their constitutional right to do business. They would not even have to prove a loss of income, and the city could be subject to punitive fines, which have no limit."

Councilman Paul Beaupre, who urged passage of the ordinance, said that while the legality of a council action is certainly a concern, it is not the only variable.

He said that because Grosse Pointe Woods is a unique community and is located close to a major expressway, such an ordinance would limit the opportunity for crime and would offer better protection of residents.

Also, Beaupre said, businesses already operating around-the-

Symposium to address emotional impact of cancer

When 28-year-old Robert Maynard was diagnosed with cancer last February, his chemotherapy treatments left him unable to work for four months. In addition to the frustration of strapped finances, he blamed himself for contracting the dis-

"Initially, everyone who is diagnosed with cancer is in a state of shock," said Patricia Rieker, Ph.D., director of Psychosocial Research, Dana-Farber Cancer Institute, Harvard Medical School. "Patients who are unable to grieve and experience the anger have more difficulty later on with anxiety and stress during treatment and recovery.'

Pit bull decision delayed again Staff Writer

A ruling on the constitutionality of a ban on pit bull terriers in Grosse Pointe Woods has encountered yet another delay, with the decision now expected in early 1991.

Wayne County Circuit Judge Kaye Tertzag announced recently that the case, which involes a challenge to the Woods ordinance prohibiting pit bulls within the city limits, has been delayed because of a rotating court docket.

Woods City Attorney George Catlin said the ordinance, which was adopted by the City Council on Oct. 3, 1988, was challenged by Woods resident and pit bull owner Rosemary Mulleavy.

Board sets mill levy

order, filed just one week later, Mulleavey claimed the ban on a specific breed is unconstitutional and should be struck down by the court.

Mulleavy's attorney, Wayne Woodford, said the ordinance is vague because, under its language, it is impossible to define what a pit bull is. Also, Woodford said, there are equal protection problems since the ordinance singles out certain dogs, and therefore certain owners for

Woodford added that pit bulls are not any more dangerous than any other breed of dogs.

But Catlin said research by canine specialists reveals that pit bulls, which represent roughly 2 percent of the American dog population, are responsible for 70 percent of fatal dog attacks on humans.

Catlin also said that a former resident brought home a pit bull as a family pet and the dog later turned on her toddler son, who required 30 stitches on his face.

Catlin said Woodford has brought forth a handful of witnesses during the hearing process who have testified in favor of overturning the ordinance.

Further testimony will be taken after the first of the year and will include testimony supporting the ordinance.


After all testimony is delivered, Tertzag may rule the ban is valid, in which case the city can order all pit bulls out of the

If Tertzag decides the ordinance is invalid and unenforceable, the council will have to reword it to allow pit bulls within

Until the case is decided by Tertzag, no enforcement action can be taken by the city.

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


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Suburbs spur big growth in metro areas

ver the last 40 years, the nation's suburbs have replaced the country's rural areas as the locale of the largest share of the nation's population.


In 1950 about four in every 10 persons lived in rural areas while today only about two in every 10 still live there. Today more than four in every 10 people live in the suburbs and outnumber even the three in 10 who inhabit the cities of the nation.

This population shift means that on the basis of the latest estimates 77 percent of the nation's population now lives in the suburbs (45.7 percent) and cities (31.3 percent) and only 22.9 percent in the rural

The fact that more than three-quarters of the U.S. population lives in the cities and their suburbs not only emphasizes their importance but the need for better relationships between them.

While the Grosse Pointes, like Detroit, continued their slow population decline in the 1980s, it was the growth of other suburbs that enabled the Detroit metro area to maintain its respectable position as the sixth largest in the nation.

So instead of battling against metropoli-



tan area trends in government, we think both the city of Detroit and its suburbs should emphasize them for the good of all concerned. Unfortunately, Detroit officials too often seek to take over metro government agencies and control them for their own political benefit rather than for the benefit of the entire metropolitan area.

Yet the links between the suburbs and the city remain strong. In the Pointes, for example, many residents retain close ties with the city itself.

Many Pointers work in Detroit, many own businesses and/or property there and many others have family connections in the city. For those who work in Detroit, the Pointes serve as a bedroom community but these people pay taxes in both places, city income taxes in Detroit and property taxes in the Pointes.

Pointers with investments in jobs, property and businesses in Detroit have a direct concern with the future of the big city. Many of these Pointers recognize that fact and are doing their part in planning the regeneration of the city.

But the central city is more than the

business hub of the area. It is also the cultural center and the home of such institutions as the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, the Detroit Institute of Arts, the Detroit Public Library and the various museums that populate the downtown area.

Those are all important assets for a modern big city and most of them are wellsupported by Pointers and other suburbanites through their taxes, their contributions and their work as volunteers. These metro area efforts benefit the cultural institutions and help maintain them for the enjoyment of all southeastern Michigan residents.

In the world of business, competition increasingly is measured on a global basis as the U.S. auto industry has learned in recent years. But in heavily populated regions of this country, domestic competition increasingly is measured in terms of metropolitan areas.

Thus there was good news, along with the bad, when the 1990 preliminary census figures showed Detroit has maintained its position as the sixth largest metropolitan area, despite the population losses in Detroit, the Pointes and other close-in sub-

In seeking new business and industrial capital. Detroit's planners ought to capitalize on this positive fact and try harder to it get more cooperation from suburban officials in improving economic development.

Admittedly, the suburbs would find it easier to work with Detroit officials if the latter would show more consideration for suburban concerns, such as the worries about the increased pollution, traffic and threats to safety resulting from the proposed expansion of the Detroit City Air-

For their part, the suburbs ought to be more receptive to appeals to cooperate with the central city's planners and more cooperative in their own efforts to help improve the area's economic outlook as well as to help preserve Detroit's cultural jewels.

Detroit still may find the additional 29,000 plus people it needs to keep its standing as Michigan's only city of one million population but it won't be the end of the world if it fails. Detroit still can claim to be the center of a metro area of more than 4.5 million people, which means that almost half of the state's population live in the nine-county metro area.

That huge market offers many opportunities for modern businesses and industries interested in expansion of sales and services as well as profits. And the city and its suburbs ought to work together more closely to help promote economic development that would benefit the entire metro

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War Memorial wins a round

he War Memorial board won a conditional victory last week in its effort to rezone its newly acquired property at 40 Lakeshore from residential to community service usage.

The critics of the proposal, some of whom see the recent purchase as evidence of empire-building, did persuade the Farms Council to require the board to accept a number of conditions that must be met before the plan can win final approval.

For example, the War Memorial within 60 days will supply the council with a formal list of the proposed uses for the home; a new site plan indicating the proposed new traffic routings, location of plantings and a fence to screen the property from its neighbors, and installation of new lighting and plumbing facilities to meet the Farms' fire protection requirements.

Since some critics saw the entire project as a threat to the commercialization of the nearby residential area and as a cause for new concern about traffic, the council's imposition of additional requirements was helpful even though not acceptable to all

The War Memorial board also made a number of moves to win official and residential support for its expansion, the most

But the board also took a traffic study to prove the lack of traffic impact, made a market analysis showing that four homes in the immediate area had increased in value more than a majority of homes in the Farms and promised to change the

Whether the required conditions and other changes proposed by the War Memorial board will satisfy the critics is doubtful ficult to measure until the new property is

At the moment, it's clear that a good many Farms residents are still unhappy over the entire venture.

Verbal skills still on decline

Tationally and in Michigan, scores in the verbal section of the Scholastic Aptitude Test dropped again this year while the average mathematics skills showed no improvement.

Nationally, the score in verbal skills slipped three points to 424, equalling the 1981 average, the worst test result in verbal skills in the 23 years the board has compiled the SAT test data.

Michigan students scored higher than the national average on both the verbal skills and mathematics sections for the sixth consecutive year but the SAT scores on the verbal section averaged 454, or four points lower than in 1989.

What is the reason for the decline in verbal skills since the national peak of 466 was reached in both 1967 and 1968?

Robert Cameron, executive director of research and development for the College Board, a New York-based non-profit education services firm, attributes the decline to the de-emphasis on reading in an electronic era.

"We may be seeing the erosion of reading skills in this information age where people are getting their information by means other than reading," he explained.

In Michigan, the SAT scores reflect only the standing of the small 12 percent of the students who took the test which is widely used for college admissions outside the state but is not required by Michigan colleges and universities.

As Robert Maxfield, superintendent of the Berkley School District, told the Detroit Free Press, the kids who take the SAT are generally the best and brightest "who are trying to get into the fancy Eastern colleges.

However, the drop in the SAT scores even by the best and brightest who take the test is further evidence that young people are spending too much time watching TV and playing electronic games and not enough time reading.

That is a criticism of our entire society, of course, but it surely supports the recent decision of the Grosse Pointe schools not to accept the offer of a daily TV news program complete with commercials that would take 12 minutes out of the regular school day.

The high price of U.S. debt

e are grateful to a friend for a copy of the U.S. comptroller general's annual report that stresses the high price of the growing national

"In 1975, interest payments on the public debt amounted to 13 percent of the general fund budget of the United States," the report said. "In 1989, they totalled 27 percent or \$241 billion.

"What this means," the report went on,

"is that a quarter of the budget of the United States now buys nothing. It does not go to fight the war on drugs, or broaden educational opportunities for the young, or enhance the nation's security or expand access to health care.

"It simply pays interest on a \$3 trillion debt" that at the present rate of increase "will soar by another \$1 trillion to \$4 trillion in just the next four years.'

About cancer

To the Editor:

An article about breast cancer which you published on 6 September 1990 made two statements with which I do not agree at all.

Although early detection of breast cancer is of great importance because it gives women the best chance for a lasting cure, it is not the "only hope." There are proven, effective treatments for breast cancer now which enable us to cure a large proportion of already palpable cancers in addition to virtually all those micro-cancers that are too small to feel but that regular mammography alone now enables us to find.

Likewise, I cannot agree that we "still know nothing about cancer." We know a great deal about cancer both scientifically and medically. The last 10 years have shown the critical role in cancer causation of small changes in genes that we can now recognize chemically. These years have also brought us important new ways of using chemotherapy that have substantially added to the duration of

healthy living for many cancer patients.

I am sure that what Dr.

Irma Russo was trying to say about early detection being our "only hope" is that we as yet have no proven ways of reliably preventing breast cancer. Therefore the best available protection from this disease still continues to be its very early detection in patients who have no symptoms or palpable abnormalities in their

Dr. Russo herself knows a great deal about cancer. She is nationally known for her experimental accomplish ments. Her rhetorical remark that "we know nothing about cancer" should be understood as a sign of her intellectual modesty and of her intense desire to rapidly

she pooped under the table or on the rug. We praised her when she pooped outside.


She's pretty smart. She got the picture pronto.

Setting it straight To the Editor:

I think it is time to set the record straight so that the taxpayers of Grosse Pointe understand the difference between the many groups which make up the system we call the Grosse Pointe Public Schools.

There are administrators, building administrators, nonbargaining supervisors, teachers, secretaries, aides, paraprofessionals, parking lot attendants, plant and cafeteria workers. Each of these groups bargain for themselves

The group I represent is the plant and cafeteria personnel. They are the persons who provide the atmosphere and environment in which your children learn. They maintain the school buildings and provide food services for the students.

Probably the very first impression a parent receives of the Grosse Pointe Public School System is when they enter one of our school buildings. The landscape is well groomed, the hallways sparkle, there is cleanliness throughout and all equipment functions properly. This is accomplished by the plant personnel which are comprised of custodians, engineers, outside site and

maintenance department. The average plant employee works 12 months a year at a base salary of approximately 10 percent less than the lowest paid teacher and 48 percent of the plant employees earn 25 to 30 percent less than the lowest paid teacher.

Our cafeterias rank with the best. The ladies who work in our cafeterias create appealing, but nutritional

meals following very restrictive budget and dietary guidelines. The cafeteria is a self-supporting function of the school system and is not subsidized by the district as they are in other school dis-

In the past several years, the cafeterias have encountered difficulties with decreasing revenues due to the off campus and open enrollment policies established by the district. This has resulted in the reduction of necessary staff positions and hours to compensate for the negative cash flow.

The average cafeteria employee works 10 months a year at a base salary approximately 20 percent less than the lowest paid plant employee. Contingent workers comprise almost 50 percent of the cafeteria work staff, working four hours a day or less at slightly above minimum wage and without any benefits.

The benefit package provided to the plant and cafeteria personnel is not the same package offered to the teachers, administrators and other groups throughout the school system.

The group life/accidental death and dismemberment insurance provides only \$25,000 for eligible plant and cafeteria personnel. The hospital and medical coverage is the same or nearly the same as Blue Cross/Blue Shield MVF-2 with master medical coverage (option 2, \$200 deductible). A mandatory second opinion and preadmission review riders are added to the coverage. Any cafeteria employee hired after March 1980 is only provided one person coverage but may purchase the additional coverage at their own

The dental plan provided to the plant and cafeteria personnel is the equivalent to the Delta Dental Insurance Plan E (80-80-80). However, the dental insurance coverage for cafeteria employees hired before the execution of this plan is (60-60-60) and no insurance coverage for cafeteria person-

nel hired after March 1980. The optical plan provides full family coverage in accordance with MESSA, Optical Plan-2 with the exception of cafeteria personnel who are not covered if hired after March 1980.

Being a taxpayer in this community myself, I can understand Mr. Cook's concern regarding the ever-increasing costs of maintaining a home in the Pointes, especially for those with fixed incomes.

Unfortunately, we are an out-of-formula district with a different tax base from other districts so we must be selfsupporting without the benefits of normal state and federal funding to offset the many costs of operating and maintaining a school district such as Grosse Pointe Public

As president of the plant and cafeteria personnel, my concerns are that all of our employees receive a decent living wage with enough benefits to provide for the care of their families as you must for yours.

I believe the Grosse Pointe Public School System is the finest educational system in the State of Michigan and that with the continued cooperation and understanding of the taxpayers, board of education and employees of the Grosse Pointe Public Schools, we will be able to maintain the quality of excellence that all of us have strived to achieve through hard work

and dedication.

After all, the children are what we are all about. Aren't they worth it?

To the Editor:



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Scholar's lectures range from Islam to pop music

Dr. Robert Giammanco maintains an apartment but believes, "Like (Dutch scholar) Erasmus, I am a citizen of the world."

He is in demand as a lecturer but prefers to keep his itinerary flexible so he may go "wherever stimulating problems, stimulating ideas and an interest in the progress of human intelligence exist." Currently, he is scholarin-residence at Macomb Community College.

Giammanco, a Fulbright scholar, is an expert in the methodology of social and historical sciences and the sociology of minorities and religion. He was invited by the college's Center for Teaching and Learning to lead a six-session seminar in interdisciplinary teaching for college faculty and to conduct guest lectures in the classroom.

"I hope to promote continuous and unrelenting debate," said Giammanco. "I want them to question themselves and question ideas." In his lectures, some of which will be open to the public, Giammanco will share his insight into the societal implications of everything from Islamic fundamentalism to Madonna.

"She moves millions and represents a stereotype, a reference point for many young people,' said Giammanco of pop star Madonna. "She is expressing the spirit, the wishes of a large sector of society. Scholars of human psychology must be aware of these things.

Giammanco is best known in his native Italy for the documentaries he has written and directed for Italian State Television. He has also authored several books and journal articles and has been a visiting professor at several colleges and universities in the United States and Europe, including the University of Florence, Columbia University and Wayne State University. His educational degrees include doctorates in philosophy, and social and historical sciences from the University of

One area that particularly interests Giammanco and will be included in his lectures is Islamic fundamentalism, a religious sentiment prevalent in the Middle East. "Current events (such as the conflict in Iraq) should be viewed in terms of their complexity," said Giammanco. "It's more difficult than Doyle at 445.7401.

The following letter was sent to the Grosse Pointe Farms City Council. It is being reprinted here at the request of the writer.

Re: War Memorial

To the Editor:

On behalf of myself and other residents of Grosse Pointe Farms who are opposed to the rezoning, as requested by the War Memorial of 40 Lakeshore Road, the former residence of Mr. and Mrs. John C. Griffin, I hereby respectfully request that the action taken by the council at its meeting held Sept. 10, 1990, to rezone the Griffin residence from residential to a non-residential community service center be reconsidered and that a public hearing be scheduled with respect thereto at which time the opponents to the rezoning may be heard.

The following is submitted in support of this request.

1) In view of the substantial opposition to the rezoning expressed by the residents of Grosse Pointe Farms at the Sept. 10 Council meeting and the many petitions against rezoning which were filed at the council meeting, I decided to further investigate the legal ramifications of the rezoning.

2) Preliminary investigaion has included an examination of several deeds in the chain of title to the Griffin residence which has revealed the following significant facts:

• On April 24, 1990, Mr. and Mrs. Griffin conveyed the Griffin residence to the John C. Uznis Co. by warranty deed reciting that the Griffin residence was subject to building and use restrictions of record. A commitment for a title insurance policy in the amount of \$1.3 million was delivered to a representative of Uznis;

ment in the amount of \$1.3 million expressly set forth that the title to the Griffin residence was subject to certain building and use restrictions and listed the county recording reference where such building and use re-

strictions could be found. • On May 10, 1990, Uznis deeded the Griffin residence to the War Memorial by warranty deed which also stated that transfer was subject to building and use restrictions of record.

3) An examination of the building and use restrictions of record provides, inter alia, that the Griffin residence is restricted to single family residential use only and such restriction is to remain in full force and effect and be binding upon all present and future owners of the Griffin residence and their heirs and assigns.

While our examination has not been finally concluded, it appears that, on the basis of the facts of record, the use of the Griffin residence is restricted to single family residential and that the rezoning of the property to a non-residential use cannot be legal or effec-

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

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
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




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Soviet art comes to Gallerie 454

When Mark Doren went to Russia to meet artists there and bring modern work back to show and sell in his gallery, he had no idea what to ex-

The works he brought back - and which will be on display at Gallerie 454 in Grosse Pointe Park — reflect a wide array of styles, subjects and techniques that both surprised and impressed Doren.

"There was a lot of what you'd expect and a lot of what you wouldn't expect," Doren said of Russia and its contemporary art. "The art seems to be an expression of their struggle, but they don't all express it in the same

For example: Doren shows a photograph of an oil painting of several happy, smiling, singing Russians in a boat on a river. The colors are bright almost primary — the scene is curved in an almost comical way. The style is reminiscent of Grandma Moses. The piece reflects an idyllic, peaceful land.

"Then you find out that the guy who did this (Nikolai Nedbailo) has been in prison for 20 years - that's more than half his life - and you wonder where did this come from?" Doren pointed at the painting.

From his talks with Nedbailo through an interpreter, Doren had the feeling the painting — one of several in this style - was a way of showing people how life could and should be.

"He loves Russia, and this is his way of showing it," Doren said. What is ironic is that while Nedbailo was in prison in Russia, he was not allowed to paint. Now that he's free and able to paint and has some money, he is unable to find materials.

"You hang this in a house in Russia and you see all this color, then you look out your window and see just a gray film over everything. This becomes art in that environment," he

But in Russia, people generally don't have art hanging in their houses. Because workers make such meager wages, and most of what they do earn goes to necessities, there is not a big call for artwork.

In fact, in Doren's travels, he noticed that most of the artists had all of their works stacked in a room, or hanging on the wall. With no one to sell it to, there is nothing to do but store it.

Which leads to another point: Because there is no market, Russian artists paint for the purest reasons. They create for the simple fact that they

"Their painting comes from the heart," he said. "You find yourself asking 'Why are you painting?" But then you answer yourself 'Because I can't do anything else.' I sometimes wonder what those who didn't paint did to stay sane.'

Doren's mission — to introduce Russian art to the American people was more difficult than he thought. Not only did the different languages present a problem, but Doren's two sides were competing with each other.

On the one hand, Doren is an artist, a painter who appreciates art because he knows first-hand the creative process. Then there is Doren the businessman whose gallery is intended, quite frankly, to make money.

In looking at the art, Doren had to balance his feelings for a piece, or an artist, with what he thought would sell here. Some interesting work was left behind because he knew it was not anything an American collector would buy.

He had to explain, through an interpreter, the idea that just because he didn't want a particular artist's work for his gallery the art wasn't necessarily bad. It might sell in Europe, but

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not in America. For some artists, it was a harsh form of rejection. For Doren the artist, it was a difficult comment to make.

"There were some political works I saw, but I chose not to bring those,' Doren said. "That's not our fight. For us to be showing that type of work I think would demean it.

"Then I thought through picking and choosing are we not, in some ways, deciding what Russian art looks like? That's a hard question.'

He thought, at first, that there would be something distinctive about Russian art, an overall style, maybe, or a mood, but he says there isn't. If you weren't told it was done by a Russian, you'd never know, he said. The Russian art show is designed as much to inform people about Russian art as to show it to them.

For decades there were always two types of contemporary artists, those who were sanctioned by the government, and those who were not. The official artists had their work shown and displayed in museums. The unofficial did not.

The subjects, the techniques and the styles do not differ between the two groups; politics perhaps being the only thing separating the two.

With perestroika, the two groups are merging, although government officials are less likely to help the unofficial artists get their work out of the country. Those who agree to help also help themselves to a healthy fee.

Russian art is a new market - basically opening up in 1988 when Sothe-by's held an auction in Moscow and determined the prices — so no one knows what to expect. The artists see that a piece of work by a less respected painter went for hundreds of thousands of dollars, while work by an admired artist went for much less. Quite understandably they are con-

Doren said he gravitated toward the unofficial artists, but the show will contain an equal mixture of work from both groups.

With a lot of the hard work behind him, Doren says the only thing remaining is whether the American public will accept the art.

Doren believes it will. The works of contemporary Soviet

artists will be on display at Gallerie 454 from Sept. 27 through Oct. 17. A preview to benefit the Michigan Cancer Foundation will be held from 5:30 to 9 p.m. Sept. 27. For more information call the gallery at 822-4454.



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




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
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Less brassy, classier 'Guys and Dolls' plays well at Stratford

The oldest established floating crap game in New York is now in Stratford and even though it is no secret who wins, the excitement runs as high as ever. In fact, the revival of "Guys and Dolls" is a double pleasure.

Along with putting on a great show, the festival troupe recalls the inimitable characters and style created by the most quintessential of all New York genre writers, Damon Runyon.

You can't go wrong with creations like Nicely-Nicely Jones who "commits eating," Harry the Horse, Angie the Ox and Big Jule, the terror of Chicago's gangland.

Then, of course, there is Nathan Detroit who runs the crap game. He provides a major sub plot with his search for a safe place to hold the game while trying to evade marriage to his doll, Miss Adelaide.

Even the dialogue and lyrics are in Runyonese which limits every utterance to a simple declarative sentence in the present tense. This was rendered by Abe Burrows, author of the musical's book, with just the right degree of compromise to avoid cuteness.

All of which helps make "Guys and Dolls" one of the best shows from the era of America's greatest musicals. The spirit of Runyon emerges perfectly with the musical form. What, then, is needed for an evening of great

Along with song, of course, there is dance and it is appropri-

ate that Brian MacDonald served as both director and choreographer. Most moves, from the Havana brawl to Nicely's testimony number, are choreographed even though they are not precisely dance numbers. The effect is a flow of action that emphasizes and expedites the progress of the play.

When the action explodes into a real dance number, like the crapshooter's ballet, the musical comedy segues into one of its most wonderful traditions and MacDonald shows he knows his business. His choreographer takes special advantage of the unusual configuration of the Festival stage and brings a heightened sense of fantasy to the

At one point most of the company crouches off the edge of the main stage and beats on it rhythmically, like a giant drum, with tremendous impact. Mac-Donald owes a debt to the innovations of Agnes deMille and Jerome Robbins, but his is a contemporary treatment and bears his original stamp with plenty of delightful new ideas.

Stratford's "Guys and Dolls," in fact, is no imitation of somebody else's historic production. It is a fresh and valid revival of a show that can well claim to be a classic in a great tradition.

In a touching scene we see her without a wig or makeup and watch Streep lovingly help her to look presentable for the press who will be waiting to interview her when she is released. "I don't mind being old," she says. "I just don't want to look old." The absurdities of Hollywood

are pointed up in a scene in which Streep, still shaky from drugs, goes back to work. She is playing a cop in a junk picture that has her terrorized by snakes on the first day of shooting and hanging by her fingernails from skyscrapers the next.

Director Mike Nichols enhances "Postcards" with a solid supporting cast that amounts to cameo appearances. Streep's encounters with Dennis Quaid, a womanizing producer, Richard Dreyfus, a concerned doctor, and Gene Hackman, a solid director, are all played out.

MacLaine is in a role similar to her Oscar-winning performance in "Terms of Endearment" and she is as sharp, witty and loving as she was in that film.

But the final triumph is Streep's. She projects the desperation in one-liners but keeps the delivery light.

"Postcards," by any measure, is an outstanding achievement for both cast and director. It is immensely entertaining and never more so than at the end when Streep belts out a Western style "Heartbreak Hotel." song continues all through the closing credits and no one chooses to leave. It would have been great to call out "encore" and have it run through again.

With "As You Like It" at Stratford this summer, Director Richard Monette and Designer Debra Hanson have brought the festival to a major watershed on two impressive counts.

They have matched the glory of Stratford's golden years (the '50s) when Sir Tyrone Guthrie was artistic director and Tanya Moisevich was designer, with a production that sparkles and enchants from beginning to end. The ebb and flow of performers and scenes are so seamless and the performances so finely tuned, that the audience is totally caught up in the delightful illusions of the play.

In addition, Monette and Hanson have, perhaps for the first time, given the production of Shakespeare a thoroughly Canadian character. They and the festival are to be congratulated on both counts.

This play is easily Shakespeare's most charming and idyllic as it transports lovers and philosophers (all the good guys) from the grim reality of a cruel world to the blissful escape of the Forest of Arden. There they pursue their loves and fancies to our delight and entertainment.

Monette and Hanson were inspired when they chose to set the play in "Quebec City and on L'lle d'Orleans in the fall of

1758." The Forest of Arden suddenly becomes the woodlands and waterways of colonial French Quebec complete with Indians, a birchbark canoe, game and voyageurs - in short, Acadia. Courtiers sport 18th century-style leather britches, a



shepherd wears one of those beautiful Hudson Bay blanket coats and the ladies' gowns especially for the mass wedding that ends the play - are in a flowing country style, set off by stunning, large hats.

But it does not end there. Happy moments in the play are punctuated with French Canadian country dances and the music is an arrangement of a dozen of the most nostalgic and charming French Canadian folk songs.

At the finale, one of Shakespeare's most famous songs, "It Was a Lover and His Lass," undergoes one of its most successful re-renderings, this time as a lively country gigue. It brought smiles to the faces and tapping to the feet of even those unaware of the song's long history and many settings.

Strange as it may sound, it all works marvelously. "As You Like It" finds a home in Acadia and, dazzled by this imaginative production, the audience finds the play all the more enchant-

Yet the setting has to take a back seat to the performance. Lucy Peacock, who attributes her ability to be boyish to growing up with rough and tumble brothers, is a Rosalind as convincing in her male disguise as she is ravishing in her fullskirted white gown and hat. One of the many reminders of Stratford's great early years, in fact. is her excellent diction and the ease with which she projects her voice and the mischievious charm of her role to the farthest corner of the Festival Theatre.

But the success of this production does not depend on Rosalind alone (as it did with Katherine Hepburn's famous performance). Here the entire ensemble weaves a web of romance and escapism with each role a gem of characterization





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Introducing

Rossetti architectural legacy lives on in third generation

When a member of the Rossetti family speaks, people in architectural circles stop and lis-

Headed by noted Detroit architect Gino Rossetti, 56, the Grosse Pointe family is carrying on a family legacy that dates back to turn-of-the-century Europe.

That legacy today has led to an impressive list of design projects including the Palace of Auburn Hills, the downtown Hudson's building renovation, several large office complexes and a few Canadian sports arenas and hotels.

As president of Rossetti Associates in downtown Detroit and Los Angeles, Rossetti as a child lived in a house in Grosse Pointe Park designed by his father, the late Louis Rossetti.

Born in Paris in 1895, Louis spent his youth in Germany and Italy. He later became a commissioned officer in the Italian army during World War I. After the

education in Europe.

While teaching architecture at the University of Rome, Louis won an Albert Kahn scholarship and immigrated to the United States in 1926. Soon after, he became an associate of the nationally known firm of Giffels and Vallett in Detroit.

It was during this time that the firm produced numerous sizable projects including the Cobo Hall Convention Center.

Some 60 years later, Gino, the patriarch, is carrying on the family's architectural legacy.

Rossetti, who went to Pierce Middle School, and his wife, Donna, have four children, all graduates of Grosse Pointe South. Also, most of the Rossettis at one time or another have worked at the architectural firm established by their father.

Dina, a 1976 South grad, studied architecture and drafting in high school and later earned a bachelor's degree in business from the University of Michigan.

Matthew, a '79 graduate of South, is a full-time architect with Rossetti Associates. After studying drafting and architecture in high school, Matthew earned a bachelor's and master's in architectural design, also from U of M.

His younger sister, Andrea, class of 1980, earned a bachelor's degree in business from the Northwood Institute and owns her own business.

And the youngest daughter, Miga, graduated from South in 1982 and earned a fine arts degree from U of M. As a graphic designer, Miga also perfoms work for Rossetti Associates.

If you ask Matthew, the next generation's patriarch, what is on the horizon for the company, he will tell you that the agenda is full.

At the top of the list is the Detroit Metropolitan Airport expansion, which involves a new national and international terminal interconnected by a modern underground rail system.

Matthew is heading up the "reskinning" of the Northfield Plaza complex along I-75 near Crooks Road. Now in the working drawing stage, the complex when complete will feature blue tinted glass fascia with several backings at different spots on the structure.







Traditional sports car fans turned up their noses at Corvette for a long time because through most of its existence, it has been available only with an automatic transmission. Chevrolet offers it with a five-speed manual now, but its automatic will shift gears better than most drivers, so almost 85 percent of Corvettes still are built with an automatic transmission.

Foreign sports cars more commonly came with four- and then five-speed manual transmissions and the thought of a Datsun Zcar with automatic seems odd.

But it isn't, not now anyway. The new Nissan 300ZX Turbo with automatic is a world-class sports car that is far more user friendly than most. It is smooth, it handles like an extension of yourself and it looks so good that people on the street often comment. And when you punch it, it moves out as if it has a 455 V-8 under the rounded, sloped hood.

Under the hood is a high-tech dream, a weekend mechanic's nightmare. The three-liter V-6with its twin intercooled turbochargers, electronic engine control system and port fuel injection literally fills all available space from fender to fender and radiator to windshield cowl. You cannot see the spark plugs, let alone remove them. So if you like to tinker, beware.

But if you enjoy high-performance driving, this engine compartment full of mysterious looking equipment will let you do it. The automatic transmission, which gives this Z car such a friendly feel, is similar to the unit developed for the Infiniti Q45 sedan sold by Nissan's silkstocking division. It is a fourspeed with lockup torque converter.

Use of two intercooled turbochargers has eliminated any discernible turbo lag and in case you were worried that Nissan had overlooked any engine performance technology, the V-6 has dual overhead cams and 24 valves, four per cylinder, in its Autos

aluminum heads (the block is iron). Port fuel injection is electronically controlled, as are all engine functions.

The result is a smooth and extremely responsive flow of power to the rear wheels which drive this remarkable car. Suspension is not harsh, nor is it soft, but just right. A switch on the console allows selection of "sports" or "touring" mode, but touring works fine unless you've got something unusual in mind.

The speedometer goes up to 160 and maybe the car does too, but not wanting to tempt fate or the State Police, I resisted the enormous temptation to "open 'er up." In normal interstate driving (which can get fairly rapid), you will never feel you are going as fast as you are, so be careful. The car can probably go beyond your limits of fear, but the law says be cool.

There might be an element of mysticism in grapevines — at least respect for antiquity. The most ancient Greek and Egyptian sources speak of the cultivation of grapes and they are mentioned in many places in the Old Testament.

Grapes were planted by the Romans on the banks of the Rhine in the second century. Soon after, they were grown in Gaul and the first records of grape growing appeared in India and in the Far East. As new colonization occurred, grapes spread. They are cultivated around the world today.

Cato, Virgil and other Italian writers said a great deal about the grape. Its cultivation suffered a decline after the fall of the Roman Empire until the rise of the Italian city-states when it again became a thriving indus-

bined with the old ones to produce new varieties. Viticulture has progressed during this century so that it is now one of the most important harvests in exist-

In many religions, man's discovery of grapevines is attributed to divine intervention. Grapevines, native to Asia Minor, were one of the Biblical symbols of peace and plenty. In Syria in ancient times, grapevines were trained to grow on fig trees which were also symbols of peace and abundance, hence many references to the vine and fig tree together.

A magnificent reproduction of the vine, sculptured in gold, with grapes made of precious stones, adorned the eastern wall of the temple of Jerusalem. After the war against Judea and the capture of Jerusalem in A.D. 70, the Roman general and emperor Vespasian carried this sculpture to Rome where it was exhibited as a spoil of triumph.

The vine was an early symbol of the redeemer. In St. John 15:5 we read: "I am the Vine; you are the branches." The Vine was used as a sacred symbol in the catacombs and under Constantine the Great, the first Christian emperor of Rome, it became the sole symbol of Christian

In modern times, grapes have found a very important place both medically and nutritionally. They have therapeutic qualities and are nourishing. Grapes contain fructose and glucose, carbohydrates, and are high in many vitamins and minerals. During the 18th and 19th centuries the

fall when people would drive to the vineyards every day and eat great quantities of grapes to benefit their health.

Grapes have been considered a good luck gift, a symbol of the wine of the Eucharist, a token of peace and abundance and a symbol of Canaan, the Promised Land.

The ability to make correct suppositions at the card table is, in this one's opinion, gifted and the most important asset a good player has at his command. Much can be acquired from lessons and execution about bidding and play, but good judgement and card sense are attributes that are basically innate and no amount of study will add much if you don't possess these genetic

There are many fine players in our game whose winning ways didn't come easy and there are also those whose genius became conspicuous almost Today's difficult hand supplies the ingredients for the case I'm endeavoring

to make. Less than ten percent of the experts will miss on this one because they will work out the surest line of play based upon the bidding and probabilities. Better than half of the good club players will too, but among the average finding nine tricks at the table with less than five minutes to define the problem and plan the play isn't easy and a predominant number of them will go down.

North has only nine high card points and might have invited game by bidding two no trump, but middle cards in such circumstances have playing weight which gave him texture and some credibility for his aggressive call. Nevertheless, twenty-five point game contracts are venturesome investments and declarer's errand was precarious.

At some tables East opened a no trump which gave South, who was often the declarer, a maximum advantage for he now could develop his winners knowing the exact whereabouts of each missing high card. Not so with East's third seat one club bid that could range from 10-15 H.C.P. not vulnerable. 





Eat your vegetables By Rev. William C. DeVries

First Christian Reformed Church

Some things are worth waiting for.

Like, "You will not get your dessert until you eat all your broccoli, George."

Then again, some things must be waited for and the dessert is just that it feels so good when it stops.

Will you please bear with me? I would like to share some important thoughts with you. The only dessert I have to offer is my stopping. I hope some thoughts I spark in you may offset the pain of hearing me out. The first of my thoughts is that science, and tests, and surveys are not all they're cracked up to be. I don't mean they don't give us a whole lot of accurate information and data. Oh, they do! I mean that the position to which we have elevated science is far out of proportion to its actual value.

It's sort of like my pocket knife, file, scissors, toothpick and tweezers. It's a helpful tool.

But there are some things it just won't do. Like crack rocks or cut wire.

Science is like that. The method of taking surveys or tests or samples is very useful in answering certain questions. But there are some questions that observations and proofs iust cannot answer.

Let me give you a specific instance. No amount of observation or testing or marvelous mathematical manipulation will ever prove what caused what.

There are several reasons for this. One is that cause is not actually an event to be observed, but a particular way of explaining a relationship between events. Science, of course, can only test what can be observed in some way.

Another is that science, in answering cause questions, is always wary of some event, some data that is missed. We all know of examples we tested and were sure we knew the cause, only to find out later about the real cause.

By the way, these observations are, of course, not new. Philosophers have been trying to warn us about the limitations of our observations for some time. Admittedly, there is some difficulty in reaching a consensus about those questions that science can't answer. But, to act as if something cannot be true if one cannot make scientific tests prove it, is a shaky thinking style at best.

There are some questions in your life to which surveys, samples, tests and calculations offer not a hint of an an-

One response you can have is to ignore these questions. One of the questions is, "Does my life have any meaning." The tactic of ignoring will likely prove vastly unsatisfactory. What we need is some standard by which to gain an evaluation of the truth of competing answers to these unscientific questions.

I propose this standard for a system of answers: Do the answers make me able to make sense of the whole of my experience? Do things really fit together when I answer the question in this particular way?

OK. You've eaten your vegetables, I'll stop now. But there's another course before we get to dessert. If you'll look for it, I promise to move this meal forward here soon.

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Memorial Church to celebrate 125 years

Members of the Grosse Pointe Memorial Church will meet at the corner of Kerby Road and Lakeshore on Sunday, Sept. 23, at 4 p.m., to commemorate the founding of their church at that site in the year 1865.

A stone monument on Kerby Road marks the location where the founding members met on Thursday, Sept. 7, 1865, to establish the Grosse Pointe Protestant Evangelical Association. A small group of 14 people banded together on that date to form a church in a community that until then had been almost exclusively Roman Catholic.

After a brief service at the Kerby Road site on Sunday, church members will fail in behind a Scot piper for a procession down Lakeshore Road to the present church at 16 Lakeshore.


A worship service will be held to commemorate the 125th anniversary. At this service a new banner will be dedicated, a time capsule will be filled and a certificate will be presented from the national Presbyterian Historical Society. A Michigan Historical Society certificate will be presented, and in spring of 1991, a historical marker will be erected on the church grounds.

At the conclusion of the worship celebration, an old time boxpicnic will be held on the church quartet, old songs and hymns, a structure. picnic and a special 125th anniversary cake.

The first church building was completed in 1867 on grounds donated by a founding member, Rufus Kirby, the postmaster of Grosse Pointe at that time.

As the congregation grew, an addition to the original white clapboard building was completed in 1880. By the 1890's, the Grosse Pointe community had greatly expanded with the building of permanent homes along Lakeshore replacing the French strip farms.

The trustees felt that a new

church should be built and should be located closer to Fisher Road, where the new trolley line ended its run from downtown Detroit.

The name of the church was changed to the Grosse Pointe Evangelical Church, still an indigrounds, including a barber shop cation of its inter-denominational

> The new church building, referred to as the ivy-covered church, was dedicated in 1894, and the church got its first fulltime minister, the Rev. Norman W. Carey.

Growth of church membership again brought about the need to expand. In 1912, an addition was built to house the Sunday school and handle its daily activities.

Through its first 50 years, the ivy-covered church served the needs of its congregation, made up of Presbyterians, Episcopalians, Methodists, Baptists and other Protestant denominations.

Often the members retained affiliation with their original churches in Detroit.

In 1920, however, it was decided to join the Presbyterian denomination and 186 members of the ivy-covered church became charter members of the Grosse Pointe Presbyterian Church. The post-World War I years brought an increase in the population of Grosse Pointe. The old ribbon farms that once stretched from the lake to Mack Avenue or beyond were being sub-divided and new streets were being built.

The trustees of Grosse Pointe Presbyterian Church undertook a long-range construction program to build an entirely new church on the existing grounds: a building to house the expanded Sunday school rooms, a gymnasium and auditorium, offices and social rooms was completed by

In 1924, the Newberry brothers, Truman and John, gave money for the construction of the sanctuary in memory of their parents, John and Helen Newberry. The name of the church was again changed, this time to reflect the memorial gift of the Newberrys. In 1927, the sanctuary was dedicated with the name becoming Grosse Pointe Memorial Church.

In 1930, the Rev. Frank Fitt became pastor of Memorial Church. During the 28 years of Fitt's service, Memorial Church was active in the community and helped in the founding of Grosse Pointe Woods Presbyterian Church and Faith Presbyterian Church in St. Clair Shores. Memorial Church grew five-fold during Fitt's years, and by the late '50s, it was again necessary to expand the facilities. A new Sunday School wing was added which included Fellowship Hall, the Fitt Library and Barbour Chapel.

With the departure of Fitt in 1958, a call went out to the Rev. Bertram Atwood to become the senior pastor. During his years at Memorial, Atwood dealt with racial unrest in the inner city of Detroit and provided leadership in the Presbytery of Detroit.

The Rev. Ray Kiely succeeded Atwood in 1970. During his years at memorial, the ecumenical minister program was started. Vietnamese refugees were brought to Grosse Pointe and a number of service projects were undertaken.

The year 1990 marks the second anniversary of the Rev. Bruce Rigdon's ministry at Memorial Church. Coming here in 1988 from the McCormick Theological Seminary, Rigdon has brought years of Christian service in the world to this church and community, including a number of visits to Christians behind the Iron Curtain.

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Norsemen fun

For the first time in about three years I'm having fun watching Grosse Pointe North football.

The Norsemen, guided by 10year head coach Frank Sumbera, have more heart, dedication and fun than the past three teams. Why? Maybe it's their overzealous defense, maybe it's because they don't know any better.

But, whatever the chemistry Sumbera has created, it's work-

In the opener against Lake Shore Aug. 31, defensive back and special teams leader Adam Mlynarek set the tone. He left his feet quicker than Superman, and slammed himself, kamikaze style, into a guy and had to leave the game just 30 seconds in. Why? Because of his free-spirit attitude on the football field, and the cobwebs in his head.

This season, unlike past seasons, North hangs its hat on defense. With nine veterans, headed by Leo Salvaggio, Steve Craparotta, Jim Kutscher and Scott Nesom, it's no wonder they've allowed only 21 points in three games. Over the past few years, North football was successful because of guys like Mike Miller, Craig Como and Charlie Stumb.

This season there are offensive names like Mike Haskell, Paul Straske and Gary Corona. Corona, the quarterback, and Straske, the tailback, are juniors. Haskell, who runs with bullish style, is only a sopho-more, yet like Straske, rushed for more than 100 yards in each of the first three games.

This season there's a certain aura coming from the field. New stands? No. New press box? Can't be. New attitude? That's the answer.

After a 17-0 shutout of South Lake, and a 22-0 win over Roseville, North was on a roll. The pressure of a maturing offensive line was off, and the defense was playing as expected.

Into Romeo, their biggest nemesis in the last two years, for week No. 3 went the Norsemen, riding a two-game winning streak. This was to be the biggest test of the young season. The Bulldogs, who had beaten North the past two meetings, and the Norsemen tied for the Macomb Area Conference White Division title last year, but this year Sumbera and company didn't want a kiss. However, after losing 21-18 to Romeo, a share is all they may get again this season.

What really sold me on this team was its character.

There's a ledge just outside the locker room and on it steps all Norsemen after a win. There, they chant Noorrrsemen in harmony. They're not the choir, but you get the gist of what they're doing - they're bonding and maturing like good, solid teams do.

North doesn't do anything fancy and that's what's nice about its brand of football. The premise of its game is to control the ground attack with Straske and Haskell, let Corona toss the ball when he's forced to, and then play inyour-face defense with Nesom, Kutscher, Marc Adams, Mlynarek and others. It's simple, yet effective and fun.

It seems there's been a rejuvenation of sorts at North, especially after suffering through identical 5-4 seasons in the last two years. There's still plenty of season left and things could take a turn for the worse, but with the pride, excitement and talent, there's still a lot that could go right, too.

At that time nobody really knew. The ULS football program. was struggling, yet trying to regain some respect. Nobody, however, cared much.

ULS, currently ranked No. 5 in the Class C polls, hasn't been anywhere near playoff contention since the program was reinstituted six years ago, but with three straight victories to start the 1990 campaign, some are already reserving seats at the Silverdome.

But hold on, there are still six games to go.

As freshmen, Whitfield, who played defense, and Carroll, who stepped into the offensive backfield immediately, enjoyed only two wins in nine games. The following season the losses (5) continued to outweigh the wins (4), and that began wearing a little

"We knew both those guys could help our program immediately," said Newvine. "We got them into the lineup right away as freshmen and now look, they're our captains and have been four-year starters. We knew they were both special athletes."

Special is the operative word. As a freshman, Carroll, who runs the 40-yard dash in 4.5 seconds, set the school's single-game rushing record with 267 yards on only 10 carries. As a junior, he scored 18 touchdowns and rushed for 1,104 yards.

Whitfield, who doubles as a linebacker and fullback, had 130 tackles last season, and should eclipse that this season. He also rushed for 864 yards and eight touchdowns in 1989.

Last year ULS put together its first winning season since the 60s, winning seven times against two defeats. And the two defeats were to two of the toughest teams on the schedule.

What also kept Carroll and Whitfield interested in the ULS program were Lex Smith, now the quarterback at Case Western Reserve, and Dike Ajiri, a running back with the Miami of Ohio team.

"Both those guys really pushed us," said Whitfield. They were always encouraging us and wouldn't let us slow

Carroll tried to emulate Ajiri. "I thought that if I could pattern myself after Dike, that I could be as good of a runner as he was, or is," Carroll said. 'When I saw him run hard, I'd want to run harder.'

And now Carroll and Whitfield, who will have to carry the bulk of the ULS load for the team to make the playoffs, are complementing one another.


