She lives at the top of a hill so the first part of the trip is easy, but she doesn't have enough energy to get back up the hill to

"I used to tell my kids 'meet me at the bottom of the hill in 15 minutes," Attie said. "And they'd come and push me up the

hill, or my neighbors would help." But now she has help from an unlikely source: the family dog, Mickie.

For a while Mickie would go along with Attie on the rides as a sightseer, but Attie thought perhaps the German shepherd mix could be put to use getting her back up the

Grosse Pointe dog trainer Carolyn House was brought in to train Mickie to pull the

For a year House has been working with the dog, using food placed on the road to motivate Mickie to pull.

"She enjoys the food and eventually she'll enjoy the pulling, too," House said.

"We've not had all successes," Attie said. "We've had some failures, but Mickie's very loving and very dedicated. And she always

It's become a family affair, too. "When my husband or my son stands at the top of the hill Mickie just — as my son would say — hauls," Attie said. "We get going pretty fast sometimes."

Mickie was a stray a year ago when the Atties got her from the Grosse Pointe Animal Clinic.

"She was ugly, scrawny, she had fleas and worms," Attie remembers. "My husband, Tony, absolutely did not want this

Inside Expansion foes see positive signs

By Ronald J. Bernas Staff Writer

Foes of the expansion of Detroit City Airport are encouraged by recent votes of the Detroit City Council and the Planning Commission which they feel reveal growing dissension over the project among city officials.

The Detroit Planning Commission recently recommended that the City Council not move forward with the project. The council however, not bound by the commission's recommendation, voted 6-3 to continue expansion plans.

But those in the Pointes who oppose the expansion are gaining onfidence that they will eventu

ally win the war.

Jack King is the head of the Grosse Pointes-Harper Woods Airport Study Committee for Detroit City Airport - the group that encouraged the cities to pool their funds and hire an attorney to study the project and find the weak spots.

The committee hired former Transportation Secretary James Burnley IV. His investigation found that not only did Detroit fail to file the documents properly, it hadn't completed all the necessary studies. Additionally,

the report showed that there was no feasible way the city could pay for the proposed \$501 million project.

The cities agreed to keep Burnley on and fund more work by his firm and others to fight the airport expansion. That fight will continue, King said, despite the City Council's decision to move forward.

"I was delighted that the Planning Commission voted to reject the proposed expansion plan," King said. "I was appalled that the City Council voted to approve the plan in that it did not have before it all the information.

King said the council should have waited until it had environ-mental impact, noise pollution and economic impact studies.

"The vote means nothing to the work we're doing in opposi-tion," King said. "The cities voted to continue with the fight until the FAA says they (Detroit) can't build.'

Burnley and his group will continue the fight at the state and local levels until that time, King said.

Grosse Pointe Shores Village President Ed Brady was named chairman of the steering group of Pointe mayors at its Nov. 21 meeting in all matters dealing with the City Airport fight.

He says a number of encouraging things have happened that will help the Pointes and other suburbs opposing the expansion.

One was the Nov. 6 passage of the bond issue for a major expansion at Detroit Metro Airport. The second was the election the same day of John Engler to the governor's seat.


And now at the ripe old age of 37. Andrus owns his own company along with his brother. whom he calls his best friend.

Woods Arbor outlet can sell beer and wine, but not liquor

The Michigan Liquor Control Commission (LCC) has granted a license for the sale of beer and "Engler is on record as being wine at the Arbor Drugs outlet on Mack in Grosse Pointe Woods, but has denied the firm's

Also denied was a request for a special Sunday permit for the sale of liquor from the store.

The LCC found that the new

close to existing liquor outlets along Mack.

John Stora, deputy director of licensing for the LCC, said after an application for a liquor license is received, the commission sends an investigator to the area.

The investigator found that the Arbor store was within 500 feet of Christ the King Lutheran Church, and thus violated section 17A of the Michigan Liquor Control Act, stating that an applicant must not be within 500 feet of a church or school.

The investigator's report further revealed that the store is within 2,640 feet of three existing liquor outlets, again voiding the application. According to the report, the store is within that distance of Rokin Pharmacy, Oxford Beverage and Rosemary Hage.

Stora said if an applicant wishes to appeal a denial, the applicant must request a hearing before the Liquor Control Commission within 20 days.

The Arbor spokesman said the store and its owner, Arbor Drugs Inc. of Troy, will not appeal the LCC's denial.

The spokesman said the 11,000 square-foot store, which opened Nov. 5, has created 28 jobs in the community.

The Woods store is the company's 106th outlet in the state. Arbor says it plans to open another 44 stores in Michigan by

A 32-year-old, three-time convict faces life in prison in the Nov. 7 assault and armed robbery of an elderly Park couple.

Samuel Roberson, of Detroit, stood mute at his arraignment before Park Municipal Judge Kirsten Frank Nov. 20. Frank denied bail, and Roberson was sent to the Wayne County Jail to await his preliminary exam in Municipal Court.

Roberson is charged with first degree criminal sexual conduct and two counts of armed robbery, all felonies carrying a maximum sentence of life in prison. In a separate incident, he is charged with one count of larceny from a person.

The two were assaulted in the apartment building they manage on Maryland at Jefferson. The 86 year-old woman was assaulted and robbed in the basement of the apartment building. Rober and a knife as weapons.

As Roberson was forcing the woman upstairs, he was surprised by a delivery man, according to police. Roberson then encountered the woman's 85-yearold husband, who was also allegedly assaulted and robbed.

Police quickly identified Roberson as a prime suspect, and detectives obtained arrest warrants. On Nov. 10, when a woman's purse was snatched at St. Clare Catholic Church, police learned more regarding Rober son's whereabouts and were able to recover rings that were taken from the elderly woman and the purse that was grabbed at the church.

Park Public Safety Deputy Director William Furtaw said that while detectives were work ing on the case involving the elderly couple, they were also look ing into the purse snatching and son allegedly had a screwdriver - learned that the suspect in both cases was the same man - Rob-

"You can't afford to let anything slide," Furtaw said. "As a result of their tireless efforts over the past two-week period, a very dangerous individual has been taken into custody.

Detective Lt. David Hiller said the witnesses at the church deserve credit for coming forward with key information.

Furtaw said Roberson is also suspected of assaults and robberies in Detroit's 5th Precinct.

Roberson turned himself in at about 7 p.m. Nov. 19 to Detroit police on the west side. Furtaw said Roberson told police that he surrendered because he was tired, knew he was wanted and had no place to go.

According to police, Roberson has served three prison terms for robbery, burglary and assault. "He has spent 12 years of his Into in prison," Furtaw said.

Pointes to get bids for curbside recycling

The communities that make

up the Grosse Pointes-Clinton Refuse Disposal Authority may soon be getting curbside recy-

The authority's board recently put General Manager Ed Whedon in charge of coordinating bids for curbside pickup of recyclables in Grosse Pointe City, Shores, Park and Farms and Harper Woods. Grosse Pointe Woods already has curbside pickup.

Whedon said each city will be bid separately. Bids will be opened Dec. 12.

Whedon said 25 percent of the waste stream is made up of re-20 percent is made up of leaves and grass which will not be allowed in landfills by 1994 according to state law.

But recycling may mean higher costs for incineration of the refuse.

"The whole recycling push is going to take a bit out of the incineration," Whedon said, "which will have to be made up either by charging more per ton for incineration or by taking in

outside tonnage. Whedon said the amount of trash burned is down 1,000 tons from the same time a year ago, but Whedon says recycling may not have anything to do with that decline.

"Last year at this time we were burning leaves which we now compost," he said. "It could also be the economy.'

He said when the economy is sluggish, people don't buy new things and therefore don't throw out old things.

The incinerator has operated continuously since April when it was reopened after being closed for more than a year when it failed routine testing. There have been no problems since it reopened, Whedon said.

Seventeen years after beginning his career as a firefighter with Grosse Pointe City, Al "Skip" Fincham is receiving a top honor - as a police officer.

Fincham, now a lieutenant with the Public Safety Department, has been invited to attend the FBI National Academy in Quantico, Va.

He will be one of eight veteran law enforcement officers from Michigan and a couple hundred from around the nation and world who will attend the 10week advanced-training program, which runs from Jan. 6 through March 22.

"It will be an opportunity to attend the best available program ever offered." Fincham said. "It's like being selected to go to West Point. It's an elite, highly recommended program, and I feel honored to be chosen."

Last year, Park Deputy Public Safety Director William Furtaw attended the program and Fincham's bosses - Director Bruce Kennedy and Deputy Director Richard Clarke - have both attended the course.

One of the most memorable parts of the FBI training is the physical fitness program, which culminates in the "Yellow Brick Road" - a three-mile obstacle course designed to test the mettle of Marine Corps officer candidates. Furtaw, 50, completed the

"Deputy Director Furtaw has explained it to me," Fincham said of the Yellow Brick Road, "and if he can do it, I can do it. ... Now I have to do it, if you print that.'

Fincham was hired as a firefighter on July 1, 1973. He was promoted to lieutenant in 1986. In the interim, something happened that drastically changed his working life: Grosse Pointe City combined its fire and police departments into a single public safety department in 1979.

"It was a complete career change," he said of suddenly having to become a police officer and carry a gun. And at first he was resistant to the change.

"It's natural for the firefighter to feel threatened by change, Fincham said. "Nobody likes to change after doing something for a number of years. I, of course, was no exception.

But he went along with the new arrangement and completed the police academy at Macomb Community College. He also became a certified Breathalyzer operator and attended a Detroit Metropolitan Police Academy seminar on homicide prevention.

Fincham had previously graduated from Macomb's fire training academy, and he teaches at the college as a state certified instructor. He is a level II fire officer, only a couple of steps away from the highest level.

He spent a week in 1978 with the Deroit arson squad and a week in the evidence technician bureau.

During his years of service with the city, he has been awarded a medal of honor, two citations and six commendations.

Over the years, Fincham has come to realize that the public safety concept works well in communities like Grosse Pointe, and he's glad he became crosstrained.

"Now that we've been into this a number of years," he said,





Pointes vow to continue to battle airport

ven though the Detroit City Council approved the Detroit City Airport master plan last week, the Grosse Pointes have vowed to continue their opposition to the huge expansion of the city facility.

Despite opposition by the City Planning Commission and criticism by both Detroit daily newspapers, the Detroit council voted by a 6 to 3 margin in favor of going ahead even though several members had sought a delay in order to get an environmental impact study, a noise abatement study and a finance plan.

The Planning Commission cast a 4-to-1 nonbinding vote against the expansion. Chairman John Slater said that "losing 2,000 jobs and spending \$501 million without any guarantee of replacing those jobs was a major problem.'

Opinion

A Detroit News editorial flatly urged the council to "kill the gold-plated airport" on the grounds the \$501 million cost would make it the largest land acquisition scheme ever undertaken by the city.

In its editorial, the Free Press urged the council to get answers to its questions about the effects of increased noise and air pollution on residents in the city, the suburbs and nearby Canadian areas as well as the consequences of the expansion for safety, ground traffic and property values.

While the council action does not authorize the city to begin work, it apparently does enable planning for the project to continue. The expansion would quadruple the

size of the airport and increase the number of flights tenfold.

Pointe foes of the expansion, representing both official and civilian committees, still can find additional support for their opposition. Gov.-elect John Engler said during his campaign that residents in the path of the expansion should be heard and indicated his own personal opposition to state expenditures for the project.

If he maintains an opposition stance, Engler as a Republican governor and a Michigan chairman for President Bush in the 1988 campaign also would be in a position to delay or halt Detroit's attempt to get the federal government to pay \$343.1 million to help finance the project.

The Pointes base their opposition on their concern about further noise and environmental pollution, the increased hazards to flight safety, the possible loss of property values and, in general, the potential damage to the high quality of life in the Pointes.

Support for the expansion is reportedly highest among some Detroit homeowners in the path of the project but many other residents of the area are highly critical of the plan.

Overall, it involves destroying 3,600 occupied and 600 vacant homes, removing more than 50 industries that employ several thousand people and wiping out other commercial establishments even though many property owners do not want to

Mayor Coleman Young of Detroit and his staff seldom have listened to complaints about their pet development projects either from city or suburban residents, but with the governor-elect's help it is surely possible that the Pointes and their supporters still will be able to halt or delay the airport expansion plan.

Detroit 'looks like a million'

etroit finally "looks like a million," as the Detroit Free Press headline told us last week even though the city still faces many major problems.

The reference was, of course, to the fact that the city of Detroit had been successful in its frantic search for additional residents in order to keep the city's population above that magic million number.

The figure is important because nearly two dozen state laws apply only to cities of one million people or more which is the state Legislature's way of writing laws that pertain only to the city of Detroit.

But the finding, when confirmed, will also mean that the city will lose less revenue than feared even though its total population will drop to just barely 1 million for 1990 as contrasted with 1,203,368 in

After a several weeks' campaign, Mayor Coleman Young had submitted more than 92,000 "Were You Counted?" forms to the U.S. Census Bureau and predicted an increase of about 121,000 people in the city's census rolls.

However, federal officials said last week that Detroit's population had passed 1 million in the course of the normal bureau follow-up and the gain had nothing to do with the city's campaign for registration of people previously missed.

Detroit apparently sustained the largest percentage of loss of any large American city in the last decade but many other large cities in the country also took lower census counts than they expected. And most of them are complaining as loudly as Detroit has done.

Part of the urban trouble is that while central city populations have declined in Detroit and other cities, the cost of services continues to rise. Those costs go up because many older citizens, members of minorities and underprivileged people who remain require costly public services.

In addition, the older cores of these cities also need more fire protection, increased police protection and more maintenance costs for streets and public buildings because of aging buildings, increased crime and lack of finances for proper upkeep.

The physical, educational and financial problems of inner city schools contribute to the overall sense of crisis. And it is difficult to see where hope for improvement lies without a massive regeneration program financed by federal and state sources and including private development money.

However, with both the state and federal governments now pleading poverty, it is unlikely that any massive injections of aid can be expected in the short term. In fact, some of the blame for the continuing decline of cities such as Detroit must be directed at the federal government's elimination of urban support programs and financing in recent years.

It is easy for non-residents of metro areas to say that the decline in population and economic status of America's cities is not their responsibility. Yet the needs of the big cities are so great that only a policy of broader burden-sharing will enable them to survive as something better than

Is a 'new world order' next?

Tints from the Bush administration about the need for a "new world order" have aroused a wide range of critical responses in political and journalistic circles in this country.

Even the conservative viewpoints of the U.S. and British governments which would presumably be leaders in any "new world order" have begun to change in recent

Election results aroused hopes among GOP progressives that their star might be in the ascendancy once again as a result of the victory of several Republican governors who were not wedded to the right. And the president himself seems to have become a less conservative partisan than Ronald Reagan was.

In Britain, the United States lost its strongest ally with the retirement of British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher. Her successor, unknown at this writing, is expected to be more sympathetic to the European community but will lack the close ties Thatcher had to Washington.

True, the signing of the 34-nation Charter of Paris for a New Europe does signify the end of the cold war but since the treaty has no enforcement mechanism, it may become simply a forum for "permanent political discussion," as Thatcher once termed it.

Meanwhile, Eastern Europe faces ethnic divisions and the Soviet Union the possibility of disintegration. Even worse, the prospects of a bleak winter in the USSR led President Mikhail S. Gorbachev to hand

Western officials an urgent grocery list that included pork, beef, flour, butter, powdered milk and peanut oil.

The newspaper columnists, too, are worried about the wave of the future and any possible "new world order."

George Will, for example, thinks the United States "needs a more deGaullist foreign policy, more stabilizing contact with concreteness: U.S. national sovereignty, U.S. national interests and U.S. national decisions." In short, we need to recognize, as de Gaulle did, "the political primacy of nations.'

But Tom Wicker of the New York Times even questions the need for a single superpower, arguing that the United States can't manage its own affairs very well. With the nation heading into a depression, he feels the most pressing problems lie at home and that playing the superpower role abroad is increasingly hard to defend.

The cacophony about whether to go to war to oust Saddam Hussein is rising now that the Iraqi dictator apparently has been given a Jan. 1 deadline to get out of Saudi Arabia. Daily the American people are being warned that such a war would be fought chiefly by U.S. servicemen and women, even if under United Nations aus-

Sorry, George. Development of any "new world order," if there is to be one, apparently will have to wait. The American people are not yet agreed about the need for the United States to act as a world policeman in support of the old order in the Middle East.

Traffic

As longtime residents of McMillan, we have also been concerned about the increasing traffic in the area. One thing not mentioned in Kerry's letter is the increasing development on the Hill.

The number and size of buildings has been increasing for many years. Now the Punch and Judy Theater has become an office and retail building; the last of the residences between Kercheval and Ridge on Muir have been replaced by an office and retail building; the Grosse Pointe News itself has moved to a newer, much bigger building across the street; and Cottage Hospital is about to expand its emergency facilities.

All this growth is bound to generate more traffic, and the existing streets were laid out for residential traffic. Plans to "... improve and expedite the flow of traffic to and from the Hill area ... are bound to fail with the existing roads. There simply isn't the capacity to handle more traffic.

This is not a question of which street is going to take

up the heavier traffic. The question facing residents of the Farms from Fisher to Moran and beyond is whether we want to live in a residential neighborhood or a business district.

City Council seems to have decided that there will be a business district here. We would prefer a residentail neighborhood. We think many of our neighbors would agree.



Weeks after ABC television insulted Detroit, angry reaction resonates. Columnists analyze, groups protest, letters to the editor pour out the hurt, threats are



Even the study showing Detroit is a better place to live than Calcutta hasn't cheered us

Touchy, aren't we? Our baleful reaction completely ignores the fact that community groups have been making the same charges for years. Television exaggerates, but it didn't invent out of whole cloth. What we actually have here is the sad truth — and it hurts.

The crime and the racism and the wreck and decay are all part of the greater truth that is Detroit. The man from Warren was right: Suburbanites, especially those who live at a little distance from the center city, are afraid to go downtown. Heck, Detroiters are afraid. Whatever we insist about the good truths that are Detroit, the bad truth is still there, and denying it won't

make it go away. The truth is that for 20 years, the metro area has been turning into a doughnut, with many of the residents who can afford to do so moving out to the edges and leaving the unlucky in the middle. Plenty of studies have

documented our divisions. In the flurry of defensive anger comes an echo down the years: "I told you so." Malcolm X.

Does this paraphrase sound familiar? If America doesn't change the socioeconomic context, ghetto people will become criminals. A system based on oppression creates the problems of crime, drugs, and dropouts.

Put another way, if blacks don't gain an appreciation of their cultural heritage and whites don't let them participate in the system, we'll end up with fear, class division, and injustice. And violence.

We heard it in the 1960s and we didn't want to hear it. None of us wants to hear it now.

The prophetic voice of Malcolm X. Yes, "Detroit Red," pimp, jailbird, philosopher, civil rights leader. One of Michigan's own, who rose to renown on the national stage.

And scared the hell out of a

lot of people while he did it. "He was never abstract, always down-to-earth. He was always understood by both blacks and whites. That's why whites were so afraid of him. They didn't want certain things to be discussed."

That's Dr. Roberto Giammanco talking. An Italian professor of intellectual history, analyst of Malcolm X's thought, currently a visiting professor at Macomb Community College. A man who believes we haven't

heard the last of his old friend. "His stature will grow with time," he told Macomb's Interfaith Center for Racial Justice recently.

It's already happening. Directors in Hollywood are jos-

tling for position to do the Malcolm X film. A Detroit school aimed at teaching pride and good self-image to young black males will be named for Malcolm. The "X" that made whites so nervous in its rejection of the dominant culture, has practically

been dropped, as blacks call him

by that he's-our-guy first name,

just as they did Jesse. Malcolm is already a hero in Europe, Giammanco said. He is quoted in school textbooks more frequently than other U.S. civil rights leaders, and in Italy, "young people knew him so well in those years that he was the

hero of the student movement.' In 1980, Giammanco traveled to Iran to study Islamic fundamentalism. In a small country village, he visited the home of the mayor. To his surprise, on the wall hung a portrait of Mal-

colm X. 'Do you know who that is?" Giammanco asked his host. "Do you know who that is?"

countered the mayor. "This man gave a sense of dignity to the oppressed of all the world."

According to Giammanco, the established media all over the world presented Malcolm X as a rabid racist and dangerous subversive — and frightened whites swallowed it. And the scarv end of the chapter is that by refusing to listen to his message, whites have helped bring about the kind of conditions that plague Detroit - and the world - to-

His call to the have-nots to find pride through anger is understandably terrifying to the

Maybe it's time to swallow the pill, lest Malcolm's vision of apocalypse comes true.



Following the September rezoning of the 40 Lakeshore property owned by the Grosse Pointe fire. War Memorial, the Farms City Council Monday night approved the site plan for the property.

The War Memorial can now begin landscaping and fencing and making minor changes to the interior of the home.

But the site plan approval was anything but smooth.

Attorney John Lizza, speaking on behalf of nearby residents, said a 1941 deed placed several restrictions on the property including one that limited the property to residential use only.

Lizza said the deed restriction issue cannot be decided by the city and would most likely be resolved in a court of law. "The zoning decision cannot override the deed restrictions if the restrictions are valid and enforceable," Lizza said.

War Memorial Chairwoman M. Jane Kay said the center has met all of the city's requirements for the site plan and that the deed restrictions were not discovered until after the Sept. 10 rezoning approval.

"The War Memorial was not aware of the restrictions at the time of the sale or at the time of the rezoning," Kay said.

She said that the War Memorial is willing to work with neighbors to ensure privacy and is willing to construct a masonry wall between the center's auxiliary property and the residential property to the north.

Included in the site plan is the removal of an existing driveway which extends from Lakeshore to the house.

The property line along Lakeshore will be fenced and access to the house will be from the existing parking area near the War Memorial's carriage house.

The perimeter of the small lagoon area near the lake will be fenced, as will the area on the north side of the property, adjacent to the residential area.

Additional parking will be installed on the north side of the

A water line will be installed in a loop around the center's Alger House to bring added water pressure to the area in case of

War Memorial President Mark Weber said the house will be used for meetings, classes, seminars, art exhibits and offices.

The current garage, which will be used as an art studio, will have a permanent wall instead of garage doors.





capped. The War Memorial's main parking lot may be altered to maximize parking. An engineering plan for the new water line will be offered to the city for approval, Weber said.

City of Grosse Pointe Michigan **ORDINANCE NO. 260**

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 2.113 OF CHAP-TER 24 OF TITLE II OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE.

THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE ORDAINS:

1. That Section 2.113 of Chapter 24 of Title II of the Code of the City of Grosse Pointe is hereby amended to read as follows:

2.113. Water and Sewer Rates. Charges for water service to each premises within the City connected with the water supply system, and charges for sewage disposal service to each premises within the City having any sewer connection with the public sewers, for each quarterly (3 months) period, shall be as follows for bills issued covering the period beginning October 1, 1990 and thereafter:


For water and sewer used, a rate of \$20.00 per thousand cubic feet for all customers.

A minimum combined water-sewage service charge of 1,500 cubic feet of water consumed per quarter shall be made per dwelling unit or non-residential unit.

For water and sewer used for non-residential customers, a quarterly surcharge equivalent to three months charges from City of Detroit for Industrial Waste Control meter charges as established from time to time by the City of Detroit, Michigan Water and Sewerage Department.

2. The effective date of the within Ordinance No. 260 shall be ten (10) days after date of publication thereof.







The storms of November Shipwrecks, sinkings and terror on the Great Lakes

In Grosse Pointe's autumn, a "storm on the lakes" manifests itself mostly in winds howling down from Lake Huron - a lastgasp offering of a really big

These are the winds that bring wild thrashings on the surface of Lake St. Clair, creating powerful waves that smash violently against Lakeshore's rocky seawall and send towering walls of water crashing across the drive.

But along the river towns of Port Huron, St. Clair, Marine City, Algonac - and all the downriver communities - autumn brings a lot of anxiety to a lot of people. The concern mounts in October and peaks as the dread month of November creeps or roars its way across the calendar.

A lot of fathers, sons, brothers, other relatives and friends are aboard the ships of the Great Lakes and, historically, the end of the shipping season has taken its fatal toll among sailors of all ranks from deckhand to captain.

Brave men, they literally fought for their lives as their ships encountered storms, battled them fiercely — desperately and then often broke up, foundered and sank with all hands lost.

Recollections of the Edmund Fitzgerald, or the great storm of Nov. 11, 1913, come to mind. They certainly are uppermost every November in the minds of wives and children of the men who sail the Great Lakes.

The storm of 1913 is the yardstick by which all other historic storms are measured.

As a kid raised in the Port Huron of the '20s, I remember tales of the "storm of November 1913," as well as stories of other great storms in Great Lakes his-

Port Huron is at the mouth of Lake Huron - half the town is on the lake's shore, half on the St. Clair River. The town sent many of its men to sailing careers, and every winter welcomed them back for their threemonth, off-season stay.

During this hiatus, the older men - skippers, mates, engineers - would gather afternoons at the Lake Carriers' Hall, the Knights of Columbus, the Elks Club and other places for poker, conversation and reminiscence.

hands and other crewmen would meet around the pool, billiard and snooker tables and bowling alleys of Fenner's, Bill's Recreation and Peloso's. For the benefit, or envy, of their landlocked peers, they would spin tales of the wild life in such ports as Duluth, Cleveland, Buffalo, Milwaukee and Chicago.

If there had been a "big blow" that year, the sailors would tell of it - with magnifications, enhancements and exaggerations, of course - particularly concerning their parts in the storm.

Sailors generally agree that the worst storms come in November, and that four were of giant proportions. Author William Ratigan calls these four storms "Epics of violence and destruction, leaving in their wake incredible legends that are too wild for fiction and therefore must be confined to the naked bones of stark truth." They

(1) The Lake Huron storm of 1913; (2) The Lake Superior storm of 1905; (3) Lake Erie's Black Friday of October 1916 and (4) Lake Michigan's Armistice Day storm of November 1940.

Port Huron's wintering sailors, like sailors everywhere, boast of the ferocity of the storms they battled. It's a matter of pride. Sort of a "my-storm-was-worsethan-your-storm" sort of thing.

Veteran sailors were willing to argue the terror of stormagainst-storm, but they would allow no one to speak in the same breath of any storm in comparison with any one of the "Big Four." And among the Big Four, November 1913's was by all odds rated the worst.

In his book "Great Lakes Shipwrecks and Survivals," Ratigan writes: "It is generally agreed that Lake Huron's (November) 1913 was the greatest ever to strike the Lakes. Beyond all argument it must be called the worst in loss of life and in loss of shipping. No other lake storm in modern history even begins to compare with its toll of 235 lives and 40 shipwrecks. No less than eight giant lake freighters went to the bottom of Lake Huron, disappearing with all hands. Not one survivor reached shore to tell what finally happened to any of the long, stout carriers."

Clair, while not counted among the "great" lakes, still has its own small part in two of the four worst storms, connecting — as it does - the waters of Lake Huron and Lake Erie. Huron, to the north, was site of the worst storm, the fabled November 1913 disaster, and Erie, to the south, was the locale of the infamous "Black Friday" storm of October 1916. This, incidentally, was the only storm of the "four worst" to occur outside the month of November.

Most notable of recent storms were those that claimed the limestone carrier Carl D. Bradley, and the Edmund Fitzgerald. The Bradley met her doom on a wild and raging Lake Michigan in the last trip of the season on Tuesday, Nov. 18, 1958. She foundered and was lost. Of her crew of 35, a few were saved by clinging to inflatable life rafts thrown overboard.

The Fitzgerald, whose dramatic demise is memorialized in a popular Gordon Lightfoot ballad of 1976, "The Wreck of the Edmund Fitzgerald," was "christened" in 1958, the year the Bradley was lost. Seventeen years later, in a Lake Huron storm that blew up - the experts observed - "on a day like the Bradley went down," the Fitzgerald broke up and was lost "with all hands" - its full complement of 29 seamen.

The Fitz had been battling 30foot waves in a 70 mph gale. She was being followed by the Anderson. Radio contact was lost. The Fitz literally disappeared from the lake's surface.

The fact that ships like the Bradley and Fitzgerald foundered and were lost despite being equipped with the latest navigational and safety gear attests to the almost demonic nature of the storms of November on the Great Lakes.

Grosse Pointe sailors are found mostly in summer sailboat regattas. But they know well the unpredictable furies of Lakes Huron and Michigan through sailing in the annual Port Huron-to-Mackinac and Chicago-to-Mackinac races.

There have been summers when furious storms ruined one or more races. The storms have splintered masts, torn hulls, beached boats. Just a few sumHarbor Beach in a raging storm that tore its hull apart.

Lowery and his crew of seven abandoned ship and climbed aboard an inflated raft tossed from the doomed boat. They were picked up by veteran skipper Charley Bear, and his famous "Old Bear" from Bayview, in response to the Tomahawk's May Day radio distress call. All hands were safe, if shaken, by the experience.

My personal knowledge of the great storm of November 1913 came from conversations with my wife Alice's family. Her father was Capt. John C. Heaney, of Port Huron, who retired as master of the King, flagship of the Minnesota and Atlantic Transit fleet.

In 1913 he commanded an earlier ship based in Chicago. He was scheduled for a trip to Milwaukee, 85 miles north. The storm raged in both cities. In Chicago, a park project that took eight years to complete was destroyed in eight hours. And in Milwaukee a new breakwater was pounded for hours by sledgehammer waves and finally reduced to rubble.

Captain Heaney was known as "O.T." - for "on time" - Heaney. It was fully consistent that he should make his trip to Milwaukee, storm or no storm. He put out into Lake Michigan and set a due-north course in the teeth of a howling gale from the north. He took his position and entered the time in his log. He ordered the engineer to set her "full speed ahead."

For four hours he battled the gale, his ship rolling in towering waves. He took his position again. After four hours at full speed ahead into the gale, he hadn't moved forward an inch.

For one of the few times in his life he lost out to the Lakes. He ordered his ship back to port. He was totally unaware of the scope of the storm that was sending ships to the bottom on Lake Hu-

Next day he learned of the disaster's Lake Huron toll: 13 ships lost, shorelines and harbor cities battered and smashed, hundreds of thousands of dollars damage, surviving ships damaged, wrecked, beached, docks and piers destroyed up and down the lake.

In the wake of the Nov. 13

storm, the Lake Carriers Association filed a report: "No lake master can recall in all his experience a storm of such unprecedented violence with such rapid changes in the direction of the wind and its gusts of such fearful speed. Storms ordinarily of that velocity do not last over four or five hours, but this storm raged for 16 hours continuously at an average velocity of 60 miles per hour, with frequent spurts of 70 or over."

In 1957 a historical marker was erected at Port Sanilac. along the highway overlooking Lake Huron. This plaque is inscribed: "The Great Storm of 1913," and reads: "Sudden tragedy struck the Great Lakes on Nov. 9, 1913, when a storm whose equal veteran sailors could not recall, left in its wake death and destruction. The grim

toll was 235 seamen drowned, 10 ships sunk, and more than 20 others driven ashore. Here on Lake Huron all 178 crewmen on the eight ships claimed by its waters were lost. For 16 terrible hours gales of cyclonic fury made man and machines helpless.

Michigan has 2,389 miles of shoreline, more than half of the total Great Lakes shoreline in the United States. And Michigan shores are washed by all but one of the Great Lakes.

One thing is certain in cities, towns and villages all along those 2,389 miles of shoreline: Throughout November, fervent prayers will be offered many a time in many a home for the safety of loved ones as weather reports are scanned. And in river towns, the phrase will be heard: "God help the poor sailors on a night like this.



After a lecture on "The Importance of Experiencing New Things," however, I gave in and agreed to hike the dry river bed known as the Wadi Kelt.

After the long and bumpy ride from Jerusalem, we climbed down the steps of the old bus and looked around. The old Arab driver had told us that this was the starting point of our sevenmile trek, but there was no river bed to be seen. However, a brief search uncovered a narrow dirt pathway that led down a steep slope and into a narrow canyon with rough stone walls.

For part of the year, the river

carried water downstream to the ling merrily off the surrounding town of Jericho. When we visited, however, there was only rock. Without a word, we began to march down the deep trench.

After a few miles, we noticed a side canyon wiggling its way inward. What made the canyon interesting was the aqueduct that emerged from it, and headed downstream. We decided to explore the area.

We were not prepared for the explosion of color that met us. The narrow pass opened into an emerald pool that was being fed by a long, creamy white waterfall. Rich green foliage squatted around the pool, like animals at a watering hole. Small, colorful birds played in the branches, their high-pitched songs bounce

If shortly became apparent why they were there Carrest into and out of the stone were several mixiest buildings. We had stumbled upon a monastery

The small courtyard was contained by a black wrought iron fence, and was empty except for a small potted plant and a catwashing its paws. An old monk came rushing around the corner, muttering to himself in some foreign tongue. His bulky black robes contrasted wildly with a nest of long white hair. Upon noticing us, his face (almost as craggy as the rock of the canyon) gave birth to a wide and mostly toothless smile.

He talked very rapidly in a tongue that one of us recognized as Greek. After he completed his monologue, he whirled around and beckoned us to follow him.

The monk took out a ring of keys and opened a set of large wooden doors. The sight inside was straight out of a horror movie. In large glass cases, in stacked wooden boxes and on the shelves of this little room were... human bones and skulls.

One particular case held a full

to it. The old monk smiled widely and motioned us into the room so that he could close the door.

It slammed shut and echoed a little bit too loudly. We took a closer look at the macabre collection, and noticed small cards with names and dates on them in Greek, Hebrew and English. We realized, with much relief, that this room was the resting place of monks from ages gone by. The skeleton with the sword was one of the founding monks, and according to the dates was several hundred years old.

A narrow passage led us into the small sanctuary where the monks (we assumed there was more than just one) worshipped. The chamber was very dark, except for the dun light issuing from scores of oil lamps of all shapes and sizes that were sussended from the ceiling of the

The walls were painted with a east of biblical characters that stared at us silently. The air held the last lingerings of incense. The old man said something and motioned to a door in the rear of the chapel. His tour was not yet over.

We climbed a set of stairs that led us to the upper level of the monastery. The monk led us into a small kitchen, picked up a bucket filled with food, and led us back outside to the upper ter-

Bucket in hand, he walked to the edge where there was a pulley and a hook. He attached his bucket to the pulley system, and sent it upward. At the top, perhaps 20 feet up, was a small window. As soon as the bucket was outside the window, a pair of arms silently unhooked the bucket and pulled it inside.

Back in Jerusalem we learned that this particular monastery had "apartments" for individuals who wanted to spend the rest of their lives in religious contemplation. They remained there until they died.

We were led back to the entrance of the complex where the monk pulled a tin cup from somewhere under his robes and spoke his only English word: "Donation?"

Here's some sound sleep tips for senior citizens

Changes in sleep patterns are ten during the night and earlier a natural part of aging, according to Kevin Grady, M.D., medical director of the Sleep Disorders Center at St. John Hospital and Medical Center.

After age 60, sleep becomes fragmented. People in that age group tend to wake up more ofin the morning.

In a survey of 21,000 people over the age of 65, the National Institute on Aging found that more than half reported sleeping badly and feeling poorly rested the next day.

"The older you get, your sleep pattern becomes different. You

sleep a shorter period of time and the times that you sleep are a little bit different physiologically. We spend less time in

REM sleep," says Grady. If you're having difficulty getting a good night's sleep, Grady offers some suggestions.

"Number one, you should go to bed when you feel pleasantly tired. Going to bed when you're terribly worn out many times makes it difficult to go to sleep. Avoidance of alcohol, caffeine and other stimulants is very important to good sleep hygiene. We suggest that the sleeping environment be comfortable for people. It is difficult to fall asleep when it is very warm or when it's very cold, or in a noisy

environment," he said. Simple exercise, like a short walk in the evening, might help you relax and feel tired. Also, bedtime routines like a warm bath and a good book could help vou fall asleep. Grady suggests that if chronic insomnia occurs, you should consult your doctor or a sleep disorders clinic.



Brady is encouraged by the Planning Commission's vote against the expansion and the fact that the council was split.

Warren and Center Line have joined the Pointes and Harper Woods, and Brady said the group has been talking with Macomb County about entering the fight.

Theresa Klaasen, one of the founders of the City Airport Opposition Association, a grassroots organization which opposes the expansion, is not just optimistic about the chances of successfully opposing the project; she's positive the expansion will fail.

"I was surprised but delighted by the Planning Commission's decision," she said. "But the City Council's approval was illadvised. The plan simply is incomplete.'

Klaasen said the council should have waited for more reports, but thinks the timing of the vote — before expansion supporter Barbara-Rose Collins goes off to Washington to serve in Congress - shows eroding support for the plan.

"Even the council believes the chances are very slim," she said. "The council knows it doesn't have the money.'

Klaasen said the council should put its time and energy into rejuvenating the area around City Airport, instead of throwing money at the plan which she is sure will be re-

"The Burnley report revealed major flaws," she said. "We're not just grasping at reeds here, we have substantial basis for our opposition. Our local governments have responded beautifully."



Blithe Spirit introduces emerging designers to Grosse Pointe

Business partners Audrey Platt and Sarah Hill can be called patrons of the arts, manufacturers' representatives, clothing retailers or traveling saleswomen. They are all of these and more.

The two Southern gentlewomen -- one from Georgia and one from Tennessee — have combined their backgrounds in art to develop a unique business, Blithe Spirit, that is literally operated out of suitcases - or trunks, to be precise.

Platt and Hill seek out artistdesigners who, in some cases, hand-dve and weave their own fabric, for a one-of-a-kind or limited collection which they then take on the road.

The two Grosse Pointe residents are at home this week and next with their most recent collection being shown at 76 Kercheval on the Hill. The collection includes dresses and suits, accessories and jewelry and even some pigs and rabbits which testify to the sense of fun they bring to their generally sophisticated line.

"It's a full store," Platt said, "with 15 to 20 designers of dresses, jewelry, fur and felt hats, jackets, funky coats and suits.

And pigs and rabbits. The women picked up the stuffed animals earlier this year as props, to serve as a counterpoint for the fashions. The animals are handmade out of feed sacks by a farm woman in Indiana, "real American craftwork," Hill said.







Biking is great exercise for MS patients, Attie said, and Mickie's help allows her to continue getting her exercise. In fact, Attie's purchased a winter wardrobe so she can continue her workouts.

The jaunts have gotten longer and Mickie has pulled Attie on trips of nearly a mile.

"When you have MS you necessarily have to spend a lot of time alone. I don't have enough energy to socialize a lot and I can't talk for a long period of time because I lose my voice, so she's a great companion. I don't have to talk to her. She just wants to be with me," Attie said.

Mickie is so loyal to Attie it's at times a disadvantage.

Recently, Attie fell while making a turn on her bike. Although several people stopped to help her, Mickie wouldn't let them near her master. Eventually, Attie calmed Mickie down enough to get some help.

"I don't consider myself handicapped, but for people who are, especially people with MS, a dog can be a great help," Attie said. "Mickie has enabled me to get out of the house and allowed me to continue my exercise, which is very important to me. I'm sure dogs can even be trained to pull wheelchairs.'







Grosse Pointers recall favorite gifts given, received

We're staring down the barrel of the gift-giving and gift-getting season again.

Retail merchants are rolling out the heavy artillery. For the next four weeks we'll be shell-shocked from all the advertising and marketing promises/pitches/lures/ claims/sales/deals/bargains/ploys/ discounts/promotions.

We'll search for the perfect gift for each person on our Christmas list. Sometimes the perfect gift is an obvious choice. Sometimes it's a lucky strike. Sometimes it misses by a mile.



We asked a half dozen or so Grosse Pointers to tell us about the most memorable Christmas gift they ever received — and the most memorable Christmas gift they ever gave.

Lawrence Scripps Wilkinson, treasurer of the Detroit Historical Society and a Detroit historical commissioner, probably has more toys than anybody. Wilkinson is a collector of antique toys. He recently donated a portion of his collection to the Detroit Antique Toy Museum gallery in Wrigley Hall, a new addition to the Detroit Historical Museum.

"I was fascinated with electric trains when I was a kid," Wilkinson said. "Electricity had a magic about it when I was a boy. It was mysterious. We were always wondering if it was dangerous.

"When I was about age 6 or so, Mother gave me a Lionel catalog with colorful illustrations of trains. She said that she expected to be in touch with Santa and that he would probably ask her what I wanted for Christmas.

"I liked a particular train because it had lights in front, lights in back, lights in the middle. It wasn't particularly expensive.

"The train of my dreams appeared under the Christmas tree," Wilkinson said.

Wilkinson said he no longer owns that particular electric train, but he found one just like it and purchased it for his collection.

Wilkinson said that giving a gift is most satisfying when he finds something that the person wouldn't be reckless enough to buy for himself or herself — a work of art or a decorative object, for instance. "By knowing the person, you know their taste and you have the courage to buy the present. This gives me great satisfaction," he said.

Roger McCaig, director of research and development for the Grosse Pointe schools, also remembers an electric train.

"In the middle of the Depression, I got an electric train that went around in a circle," he said. "I don't know how my parents managed it.

"But it just went around in a circle. It took me about five minutes to get bored. Every time I wandered away, my mother wanted to know why I wasn't playing with my train."

Last year, McCaig created a memorable gift for his 4- and 10-year-old grandchildren. With the

music of Saint Saens' "Carnival of the Animals," Ravel's "Mother Goose Suite" and Debussy's "Children's Corner Suite," he taped his own version of the three stories that accompany the musical works.

"I told the stories — sort of a voice-over technique — by matching up the words with the musical clues. I listened to the music and guessed what part of the story was happening — like the 'Peter and the Wolf' music and story."

George Eddington, director of community education for the Grosse Pointe schools, also remembers an electric train. "I got it when I was about 7 years old, from my grandparents. It was a Lionel freight train," he said.

Virginia Thibodeau, Grosse Pointe artist and teacher, said that the best gift she ever got was about seven years ago, when she and her children went to the hospital on Christmas Day and brought her husband home.

"He had cancer and he had been ill for quite a while," Thibodeau said. "We brought him home and he lived until August."

A memorable gift, of sorts, she said, was the creche she made for St. Paul Catholic Church about 10 years ago. "It was a monumental task — four pieces, cast stone sculpture."

Two of the pieces — the lamb and the Christ child — were subsequently stolen. Thibodeau replaced the Christ child. The creche will be placed in front of the church again this year.

Catharine McMullen, past president of the School of Government Inc., also has a birthday on Dec. 25.

"I remember a gold nugget ring given to me on my fifth birthday by a stranger," she said. "It was two gold nuggets on a band, right from the mines of Colorado. The man who gave it to me was living in the hotel where we lived, in Denver.

"He said it was because I was so well-behaved. I used to hold the chair for his mother."

McMullen said the most memorable gift she ever gave was a photo album containing all the family photographs that she put together for her mother and father when she was about 15 years old.

Barbara Willett, director of The Children's Center Capital Campaign, past president of the Junior League of Detroit and current vice president of the Grosse Pointe Shores Improvement Foundation, said that her most memorable Christmas gifts — those given and those received — were not material things.

"My husband, Howard, and I decided long ago that we would buy each other memories," she said.

The whole family has embraced the idea.

"Howard and I were married for six years before our daughter Wendy was born," she said. "The Christmas of 1969 was the most memorable, because I received the gift of parenthood."

She also remembers giving an exercise slant board to her father-in-law, Papa Willett "— for the sit-ups he did not want to do."

Some memory-gifts that stand out in Willett's mind: a trip to Stratford and a weekend on a working farm; a family reunion; daughter Wendy's 21st birthday party at 21 Club in New York City; a 25th anniversary party that she and her husband

gave for all their friends; and a recent birthday party that she gave for her husband.

Sister Verenice McQuade, an administrator at St. John Hospital and Medical Center who is active in the hospital's Fontbonne Auxiliary and in community affairs, said her most memorable gift was a trip to the Holy Land she received in 1974.




"I felt that this trip provided insight into biblical theology which has affected my life and deepened my faith," she said. "I've shared this insight with my patients and their families and I'm convinced many have benefited from my most memorable Christmas gift."



"Katey opened the lid on the box and there was such a glow on her precious little face . . . "





Although an aggressiveness to the music seems to be a common demoninator, Srock says that Final Cut's current sound is progressing toward the more melodic. On their new album, being currently produced and tentatively titled "Consumed," Srock contends that there is a conscious attempt to display more musical qualities and straightahead vocals. He even goes so far as to invite comparisons to English supergroups such as Depeche Mode and New Order.

England itself, as well as other markets such as New York and Los Angeles, have been lukewarm to the Industrial movement since its inception in the early 80's. The markets where Industrial records sell best are Chicago and the rest of the Midwest, much of Canada, Germany, Belgium and the Netherlands, as well as Detroit.

It is because these cities are. in fact, more inclined to show scars of the decline of the Industrial Age than are the trendier cities on the coasts of England? Are these cities soulmates of sorts that can relate more to the grinding of the Industrial sound?

"I think England wants to be this huge trend-setting country,' says Srock. "And anything that another city thinks is cool, England will totally go against just to spite everyone. A good example is the major label dilemma in England right now. The majors are having a real problem in England because all of the hip bands that they are signing ... start to sell not very well back in England once they are signed

dustrial Dance music notwithstanding, Final Cut sees a positive future for the genre. Srock

warehouse club in New York which plays a heavy list of Industrial records as an example. Final Cut also realizes that Industrial, which has its roots in rock 'n' roll, will proliferate as a live concert medium.

The live concert, and the marketing of a band's image, are what Final Cut believes will add to the longevity of Industrial Dance music. This is one advantage they believe Industrial has over the main competitor for nightclub dancefloors - house music.

House, much more akin to disco of the past, is a totally digitized and beat-oriented music. House artists struggle with anonymity, especially in the United States, and seldom have a hardcore fan following essential for a long and prosperous career in pop music.

Music

"We get to develop a fan following," says Srock. "The kids can identify with who Final Cut. You would think Srock, La-Fata and Oldham would have their hands full with Final Cut but actually most of their time is spent cultivating their own, independent record label - Full Effect Records.

"The label came about after we became disgusted by how other people handled the business-end of our music. Our first record was on Atlantic Records and Polydor in the U.K.," says Srock. "It was a hard time. It came to the point where we just wanted to do our own thing."

"It comes to a point where

destiny," says LaFata, a Grosse Pointe South High School graduate.

"We like it better this way be cause we get to do what we want. We get to put the music that we like on the label. Nobody tells us what to do anymore and that's the brilliant part of it," says Srock.

"We've had over seventy tapes from different acts sent to us since we started."

"And the best of that is what you will hear on the compilation album, Full Effect 1991," says Oldham, referring to the label's sampler album to be released early next year.

Srock lists a partial roster as including Final Cut and Substation, both from Detroit, Praying Mania from Vancouver, The Subjects from St. Louis, Flight EKĞ from New Hampshire, and Static from London.


"It helps that we've made a lot of contacts in the business over the last few years," says Srock. "For instance I know a guy from Warner Brothers who sent me The Subjects' tape because Warner wasn't into it.

Full Effect expects good things from the compilation album but retains Final Cut as the project that will get them to the national and international danceoriented rock charts. In the meantime, the guys will work on building their label identity in Detroit and other markets.

"There's a lot of good local music that people ignore because their record doesn't have a Wax Trax or Netwerk label (the two major Industrial record labels) on it," says Srock. Full Effect hopes to change that.

"This label is the best way for us to get our music out there and heard," says LaFata.

The entrepreneurial spirit, unlike the factories, lives on in De-

impossible dream. But now Pastoria, the drummer in the band DC Drive, can

look back and laugh, for the dream has come true. In 1979, the band Adrenaline was born; the band re-grouped in

1987 and changed its name to DC Drive and became a new band with new ideas. In February, the band will re-

lease its first album on Capitol Records.

They've come a long way since band members Pastoria, his brother, Mark, and Michael and Jimmy Romeo grew up together and went to grade school at St. Veronica's in East Detroit.

"Our parents were all into the music thing and we were in choirs and bands," Pastoria said.

He said that as kids, they would get together, fool around and see if they could get through

Moving to Grosse Pointe Woods was a pivotal point in his

"I really got into rock 'n' roll when I was at Grosse Pointe North," Pastoria said. He went through high school when everyone was into J. Geils, Kiss and Aerosmith.

Travel Trends

By Phyllis Hollenbeck

Lower fares ease pain

What a helpless feeling when there is a death or serious illness of a family member living far away. When it is impossible to get back home for a funeral or to help the other family members, because you simply cannot afford to. Historically, fares for last minute travel have been astronomical. Today, however, almost all major airlines waive their restrictions on lower fares when a sudden illness or death is involved. For obvious reasons, bereavement fares are not advertised, but they are available.

The following is an overview of emergency trip policies of several major airlines. In all instances, it will be necessary to contact your travel agent or the airline to verify the policy and to check their definition of "immediate family."

 America West: Immediate family only. Death only. Supply name and phone number of the funeral home at time of booking. Work directly with the airline and they will handle each case on an individual basis, depending on your destination and the space available.

Continental Airlines: Immediate family only. Death only. The bereavement fare is usually equivalent to the excursion fare but with the rules and regulations waived. Arrangements must be made directly with the airline and you must furnish them with the name and phone number of the funeral home at the time of booking.

· Delta Airlines: Immediate family only. Critical illness or death. Travel must originate within seven days following a death. Reservations are booked at the full coach fare and may be booked and ticketed by a travel agent. After the trip has been completed, take the ticket and a copy of the death certificate or a letter from the doctor to a Delta ticket office (or the airport ticket counter) and they will refund 45 percent of the value of the ticket purchased.

• Eastern Airlines: Immediate family only. Critical illness or death. Reservations to be booked directly with the airline. They will book the three-day advance fare and waive the rules and regulations for that fare. You must be prepared to give the reservations agent the name and address of either the hopsital and doctor or the funeral home and its director.

 Northwest Airlines: Immediate family only. Death only. Travel must begin within two days of the death. Book reservations directly with Northwest Airlines. Be prepared to supply the name and phone number of the funeral home and its director. The ticket will be issued at 50 percent of the lowest regular coach fare.

• Trans World Airlines: Immediate family only. Death only. Book directly with TWA. Be prepared to give name and phone number of the funeral home as well as the name of the director. The discount will be 30 percent of the lowest regular coach fare.

• US Air: Immediate family only. Death only. Travel must begin within five days after death. You may book with a travel agent, but you must have the name and phone number of the funeral home and its director available for their reservations agent. The charge will be the seven-day advance excursion fare with the rules waived.

• United Airlines: Immediate family only. Critical illness or death. United Airlines allows you to work with a travel agent. They require the name and phone number of the hospital and doctor or of the funeral home and the director. The charge is the seven-day advance excursion fare with the rules waived.

Since so much depends on the airline you are using, I cannot tell you the "best" way to arrange your emergency travel. Probably, if it is during the workweek, you should begin with your regular travel agent. If your agent can't help you, check with the airlines directory.

Because cases are handled individually, check all airlines that fly to your destination. If you don't get a sympathetic airline agent with your first call, try again.







On Dec. 1, Grosse Pointe's A.J. Dennis will realize a lifelong dream.

Dennis, a 1985 North graduate, will sit behind the wheel of a Formula Ford and make his racing debut at Sebring International Speedway.

Dennis, who graduated with honors from the Skip Barber Racing School in late September, will also race in the Skip Barber Formula Ford Florida Series which runs through March.

"I'm extremely excited," said Dennis, who has stayed in shape by playing hockey two to three nights a week. "It's funny, but I've really planned this whole thing. I told myself that I'd be in racing school by Oct. 1, 1990, and I was done with it by then. It's kind of surprising."

But it's not surprising that this perfectionist found his niche after years of waiting, reading and wondering what racing would be like.

"I've read a lot, have talked to a lot of people in the business and done my homework," said Dennis, "and I'm confident this is the right path for me."

That path began when Dennis was 14. He was a hydroplane race-rat who monkeyed around with engines and eventually landed a job on a crew. And ever since, he's been infatuated.

"I had been pit-crewing with limited and unlimited hydroplanes and loved it," he said. "I can remember all the kids would be down at the park or the beach during the summer, and I'd be down by the river with the crews.'

It also helped that his grandmother lived in Indian Village,

so Dennis had an excuse to visit. "Every year we got involved in some fan clubs down there and there were some owners and drivers also in the clubs," he said. "I guess they could all see the stars in my eyes when it came to talking about hydroplanes, and one day I was picked up by a team.

But hydroplanes were not his only love.

Dennis tinkered with computers and now, after owning his own business for a few years, is an account manager for Data-Ease International.

"Through high school I always loved computers and I got very good at it," Dennis said. "I mostly did a lot of consulting and got paid for it on the side while I was holding down a job at a retail store.'

Consulting became a burden for Dennis, so he changed directions. He attended Macomb Community College while working for a software company, and that combination gave him the chance to train himself further. He landed another job in Southfield and transferred to Lawrence Tech.

That move to Southfield took him out of hydroplane racing.

"I was at a crossroad and knew that I had better concentrate on school," he said. "I felt that someday I'd get into racing cars and if I didn't have the majority of my schooling out of the way, I could run into a conflict so I had to give up hydroplane racing. I looked at it like an investment in the future."

The 23-year-old Dennis, a selfproclaimed entrepreneur, was dabbling in many things as he worked on an engineering degree, but all the while he focused on a career in racing cars.

"It seems that I've been off in all these different directions," he said, "but I've never lost sight of my goals. I'm very goal-oriented and I'm constantly - no matter what I do - working toward racing.'

And on Dec. 1 it's time to put up or shut up.



The first of these small, just-for-fun convertibles was the Su-zuki Samurni. While it is a small sports-utility vehicle, it was perhaps the closest in con-cept to the European sports car of the post-World War II era. It is bare-bones utilitarian, you have to keep it revving high all

the time, it delivers a firm

the time, it delivers a firm (make that bouncy) ride, it has little rown inside and it is a burrel of fun to drive, which no doubt accounts for its popularity among the younger set.

Suzuki advertises the Samurai as the lowest-priced convertible in America, which may also help explain its popularity among the young. Powered by a 1-3-liter four-cylinder engine driving a five-speed transmission, the Samurai has a base price of around \$9,000 and you can actually buy one for less than \$10,000.

If you like its looks but want something more civilized and comfortable, there is the Geo Tracker, based on the Samurai but bigger and built to General Motors spees and more attuned to American tastes and riding habits.

The Tracker bears a strong family resemblance to the Samural, but it is a workhouse of a different color, much smoother, more refined, more user-friendly. Even someone who is not a fan of Jeep-type vehicles can quickly

We will report more on all these cars in upcoming weeks, but what prompted this biref survey of fun "toy" cars was a sunny Saturday in November spent in a Geo Metro with the top down and the collar up.

The Metro convertible is as much fun as its looks suggest, and that's a lot. With the top down, the test vehicle looked a bit like the kind of car Donald Duck would drive and from certain angles it bore an uncanny resemblance to a Datch wooden shoe painted be right blue.

The top, which drops below an ingenious three-piece plastic cover, can be put up or down in seconds. The centerpiece un latches and the two side pieces swing away, then back to cover the top in the well. One can't help but wish that the folks who designed the Cadillac Allante top had taken a look at the Metro first.

Making your home safe for the holiday season

The Grosse Pointe Board of Realtors and its members offer home safety tips to ensure a happy and safe holiday season for you and your family.

Start by carefully checking all electrical decorations, particularly those that have been sitting in a damp basement for the past 12 months. The National Fire Protection Association reports that during the 1980s there were 560 structural fires annually involving Christmas trees. A dry tree and poorly wired lights can lead to disaster.

Make sure that all electrical cords, lights and ornaments are approved by a testing agency, such as UL (Underwriters Laboratories), and are in good condition. Check for frayed ends or loose connections. Make sure that all extension cords are placed out of the normal traffic path and that no furniture or other objects are resting on the cords.

Keep your Christmas tree moist by checking the water level daily and select decorative lights that do not generate large amounts of heat. Place the tree away from direct sources of warmth such as radiators, televisions and hot air ducts. Tree lights should be on only when an adult is present. Never leave tree lights on overnight. If you have an artificial tree, make sure it's fire retardant. Fire retardant spray is available for both artificial and live trees.

Scented holiday candles can make a home warm and festive, but never leave a candle lit when an adult is not present to monitor its burning. Make sure the base or candleholder is sufficient to contain dripping wax, and take care that there is nothing near the flame that could ignite. Extinguish the flame when leaving the room, and keep all matches and lighters out of the reach of small children.

The kitchen is often one of the busiest rooms in the house during the holidays. Make sure that stove top burners have not inadvertently been left turned on. If you have small children in the house, keep them away from the kitchen during busy meal preparations.

If there are no cigarette or pipe smokers in your household, but you anticipate entertaining guests who smoke,

New-home construction

Pointes experience 5-year boomlet

Assistant Editor Even though the five Grosse Pointes have been built up for decades, 181 new housing units were constructed over the past five years.

The new-housing figures are based on permits issued and were compiled and published by the Southeastern Michigan Council of Governments (SEM-

Though not a building boom when compared to northern Oakland County, the average of 36 new units a year provided Grosse Pointe builders with steady work.

Grosse Pointe Farms led the way with 83 new detached single-family homes in the five-year period from 1985 through 1989. Grosse Pointe City was second with 48; the Park had 21; the Shores had 16; and 13 new units were added in the Woods.

Christopher Blake, president of The Blake Co. in Grosse Pointe, one of the most active builders in the Pointes, said he thought SEMCOG's numbers sounded high.

His company has built 18 houses at Dodge Place on the former Horace B. Dodge estate in the City and 16 homes in the still-growing Scherbrook subdivision in the Farms. His firm has also built many houses and condominiums on odd lots throughout the Pointes.

Blake said he does not expect the next five years to be as vigorous as the past five years in terms of new construction. There are fewer and fewer lots left, he

Blake expects major home ren-ovations and additions to in-crease in popularity.

For example, a City resident got approval last week to tear

the roof off his 1 1/2-story house on Rivard and add an entire second floor, as well an attached two-car garage.

The Blake Co. has been in the in St. Clair Shores. Grosse Pointe area since Blake's in 1940. Initially engaged in residential and commercial income properties, the company, under Chris Blake's management since 1985, has branched into major developments.

Webber estates in the Farms); and seven at Windward, one block north of Moran off Lakeshore. He has also built many homes on single lots throughout the Pointes.

Russell said his family has been in the Pointes since the '30s, and he has been a builder here since 1978. He said he is the biggest builder in the Pointes.

Besides continued construction of large additions and major renovations, Russell thinks rebuilding may become more frequent.

"I can see that happening, especially in the older areas," he

Some older homes are not kept up, Russell said, and it becomes more costly to "rehab" them than they're worth. For around \$15,000, a house can be torn down, he said, and then the property owner can build the house he wants.

Grosse Pointe builder Jim Mast, who continued the Walter H. Mast Co. founded by his father in 1928, is building his fourth house on Cameron in the City. He also built some homes on Sycamore Lane in the City.

Grosse Pointe builder John C. Uznis said most of the vacant lots in the Pointes have disappeared over the past five years.


He echoed the sentiment of other builders that as land gets more scarce and more expensive, more people are opting for major home renovation projects. His company has undertaken many extensive remodeling jobs in the Pointes in the \$200,000 to \$300,000 range.

Uznis said high land values make the major renovations eco-

nomically feasible.



From Thanksgiving to Christmas The holiday season calls for corny decorations

This is the time of year when the seasonal decorations for holidays overlap. With Christmas trimmings appearing in all directions, there are still the decorations for Thanksgiving to be seen. It is amazing how many lampposts, front doors and fences around Grosse Pointe have been festooned since early October with shaggy bunches of cornstalks and how many front doors are adorned with clusters of variegated ears of corn.

In a beautiful book called "The Fruits of the Earth," pub-"lished in Italy in 1976, corn is 'defined as "a sturdy, annual plant of North American origin."

A thousand years before Co-.lumbus, the Indians had learned to hybridize corn and to fertilize the soil where it grew. It is gen-Serally believed that maize, or corn, originated with the pre-In-Can cultures of Peru and very cearly pictures of maize with its stalks, ears and tassels have

been discovered in ancient graves thousands of years old.

From the terraced gardens of Peru, corn gradually spread northward to Mexico, where it helped to build both the Mayan and Aztec empires, and still further north along the Mississippi Valley and into the American Southwest.

Some scientists now believe that corn, even that known to early Indians, was actually a hybrid of two wild grasses. The Jemez Indians of New Mexico today will show you a canelike tasseled grass that grows in the canyons and tell you that "from this plant we got corn.

There are many legends among the Indian tribes to explain the beginnings of corn. The nomadic Navajos maintain that one day a mammoth turkey hen flew across the sky and dropped an ear of blue corn from beneath her wing, while the Iroquois tribes in New York state tell of

a spirit woman who walked across the fields, corn sprouting from her footprints.

Whatever the legend, Indians everywhere hold corn sacred, a gift from the gods to be surrounded with ceremony. The Zunis of New Mexico believed it to be so sacred that a medicine man sprinkled a trail of corn across gates to prevent the conquistadores from entering.

Characteristic of rituals was the ceremony the Creeks held each summer when the corn was ready for harvest, and at this time a new year began with feasting and thanksgiving. (The Pueblo Indians know more than 40 ways to cook corn.)

To the Hopi people, corn is the symbol of life, and at the naming ceremony of a new baby, an ear of corn is set aside, dried and saved as a sacred memento for the child.

There are now hundreds of varieties of corn that come in colors ranging from white through all the shades of yellow and red to gray and blue and purple to black. In early times it was used

to make colored dyes as well as for food and decoration. Popcorn, too, is an Indian discovery.

Today, corn is a staple food for more than 200 million people around the world. Dr. Richard Ford, eminent ethno-botanist and anthropologist at the University of Michigan, has made an extensive study of the evolution of corn. He discovered some of the earliest archaeological corn in the southwestern United States, collected the wild ancestor corn in Mexico, excavated dry rock areas in New Mexico where corncobs more than 3,000 years old were found, and farmed with the Zuni Indians, in his lifelong quest for information on the history of corn.

Perhaps a way to bridge the holiday use of corn from Thanksgiving to Christmas would be to remember our feathered friends who have not flown south for the winter. Dried corn kernals are used to fill bird feeders or are stuck in suet balls to hang from trees - sort of a pomander for

Ever since man began to till the soil, people have looked for favorable signs in the stars, moon, native plants, colors of sunsets, bird behavior patterns, and other aspects of nature to guide them in proper planting.

There are many rules in folklore about planting corn. One is that corn should be planted when apple tree leaves are as big as mouse ears. Most Indian tribes believe that corn planted by a pregnant woman will be most productive.

One of the most popular decorations for Christmas trees in Victorian times was popcorn. It was strung in long ropes and looped around the tree with strings of red cranberries, and popcorn balls were hung from the branches with loops of satin ribbon. A popular pre-Christmas festivity was making popcorn decorations, with some of it being consumed in the process.

have an adequate number of ashtrays available, or request that guests not smoke in your home.

Following the opening of gifts, bag all excess wrapping paper and ribbons, and remove to a metal garbage can or dump site. In a household fire, excess paper will increase the speed at which the fire will spread.

If your home or apartment does not have smoke detectors, now is the time to have them installed. If you do have smoke detectors, check the batteries. If you're not sure how old the batteries are, replace them.

A small fire extinguisher is an important household item. Purchase one that will extinguish all types of fires, including electrical and grease fires. Keep it in a handy place in your home. Review its proper usage with all members of your household. You may even want to practice outside on an imaginary fire. Make sure, however, that the extinguisher is fully recharged. Discuss escape routes with all household members and overnight guests in the event of a fire. Check with your local fire department for information on escaping safely from a burning home. Is the fire department's number posted in plain site near each phone? If you have small children, help them memorize the number and instruct them on how to call the fire department in an : emergency.

Woodchopping: Don't try to cut corners

Woodchoppers who believe that the single bit axe, an axe with a cutting edge on one end and a striking face on the opposite end, is the all-purpose woodchopping tool, are risking serious

The single bit axe should be used only to fell or trim trees or ments. This also means keeping split and cut wood. It can also be used for notching and chopping logs and timber. It's important to remember the striking face How to keep your axe is to drive wood stakes, and tree fresh Inever to be struck against metal, stone or concrete. This means emphatically that it should never be used to strike steel wood-splitting wedges; serious injury could result.

The double bit axe, a cousin of the single bit axe, is limited to the splitting, cutting, trimming and shaping functions described above; it does not have a flat striking face.

Hatchets, the smaller but more versatile cousins of axes, are used for cutting and trimming. The striking face of hatchlets is properly hardened for driving common nails, but should 'never be used to strike chisels, punches or other hardened metal

If your woodchopping chores linclude using a steel wood-splitting wedge, then be certain to 'use the woodchopper's maul when striking the steel wedge. A woodchopper's maul has a round bevel edge striking face with a sharp, opposite edge. In addition to splitting wood with the sharp edge, the maul is used in conjunction with a steel wedge by first making a notch in the wood to be split with the sharp edge, placing the steel wedge in the notch, followed by driving the wedge with the maul's bevel striking face. Never use an axe or hatchet as a wedge as serious injury could result.

makes for a more difficult job, it often can be dangerous. Discard any maul, axe, hatchet or wedge if it shows dents, chips, cracks, mushrooming or excessive wear. Handles can and should be replaced when damaged.

Safety goggles must be worn when chopping to prevent eye injury from flying chips and fragonlookers away from the work area when chopping wood.

The National Christmas Tree Association offers a few simple tests for checking and maintaining a tree's freshness.

First, gently grasp a branch between your thumb and forefinger and pull it gently toward you. Few needles should come off in your hand if the tree is fresh. Second, take a look around the tree. You shouldn't see an excessive amount of green needles on the ground. Some loss of brown needles is normal.

Keep your tree in a sheltered, unheated area, such as a porch or garage, until you are ready to decorate it.

Before you set up your tree, make a fresh, straight cut across the base of the trunk (about a quarter of an inch up from the original cut) and place the tree in a water-bearing stand. A tree will absorb as much as a gallon of water in the first 24 hours and one or more quarts a day thereafter. Water will prevent the needles from drying and the boughs from drooping.

Keep your tree away from heat and draft sources like a fireplace, radiator, or television set. Test your light cords and connections before hanging them on the tree to make sure they're in good working order. And be sure to unplug them before you go to bed or leave the house.
