Second-story cat burglar kidnaps hamster —twice

Garth, a brown and somewhat disheveled dwarf hamster, will soon be gray if this keeps

He was abducted twice from his glass aquarium two weeks ago by a neighborhood cat that broke into his Grosse Pointe Woods home.

David Holman, 17, of Lochmoor in the Woods, was talking on the phone in his living room on Friday, June 12, when he heard a loud noise in the kitchen.

It was late at night, the

lights were out, and Holman said he thought it might be a burglar.

Upon investigating, Holman saw his next-door neighbor's black and gray cat, Maggie, reaching into his brother's hamsters' aquarium, which was on a desk in the kitchen.

When Maggie saw Holman, she ran upstairs. He followed and saw her leave the house through a torn screen in an upstairs window.

Saturday morning, Holman's brother, Wesley, discovered that one of his hamsters was missing. He has two, Wayne

and Garth, named after the stars of "Wayne's World."

The missing hamster was Garth, the bigger of the two. 'Wesley was a little shook up, because he thought the cat had eaten Garth," said Wes-

ley's mom, Regina Holman.

'And I thought, what a horrible way to go.' Saturday evening, Regina and Wesley went next-door to Margaret Nathan's house to tell her they thought her cat

had killed the hamster. "We had seen the cat before," Regina Holman said, "and we knew who it belonged to. In fact, the cat had been in our house before. He would come in at night last summer whenever we had the upstairs window open, but we thought he was past that this year.'

Maggie broke into Holman's house by climbing a tree in her front yard, hopping onto an awning and then squeezing herself through a slit in a window screen above the awning.

"When they (the Holmans) came over to my house, I said, 'wait a minute, I have something to show you," Nathan

She got a box from her

kitchen. Inside the box was Garth, alive and well and without a scratch on him.

Nathan said she had found her cat playing with the hamster in the bushes by her garage Saturday morning.

'I didn't know who it belonged to, so I took it inside and kept it in a box," she said. "My best guess is that Maggie thought it was a kitten, and wanted to take care of it."

Although Garth was not hurt, "He looked like a wild







There's more to being a midwife than birthing babies There's more to being a midwife than birthing babies

Think of the term "midwife," and what image comes to

A grandmotherly-type with no formal medical training who, summoned in the middle of the night to a "hippie" pad or tenament flat, coaches a woman in the midst of labor and tells the father to boil water and get clean blankets?

Well, think again.

Today, midwives are registered nurses who have graduated from a college midwifery program, and few of them make house calls.

Most work in hospital birthing centers through which their malpractice insurance is paid and where doctors are readily available to take over a delivery in case a problem arises, said Thersa Bedell O'-Rourke of Grosse Pointe Farms, who is a certified nurse-midwife (C.N.M.).

Also, midwives do a lot more than birthing babies.

They're involved in, and teach patients about, all aspects of women's health care, from breast self-examinations to birth control to pre- and postnatal care, through post-menopausal care.

"I think the philosophy that all midwives share is that we're empowering women to take better care of and make more informed decisions about

their bodies and their lives," O'Rourke said.

She is one of seven certified nurse-midwives on staff at the Henry Ford Medical Center's Grosse Pointe Farms. The C.N.M.s deliver babies across the street (Muir Road) in the Family Childbirth Center at Cottage Hospital.

Cottage began its certified nurse-midwifery program last November, and it's the only hospital in the Grosse Pointes, and one of just a few in Michigan, which have certified nurse-midwives.

How does a certified nursemidwife differ from an obstetrician?

The key word is "normal." Certified nurse-midwives can Pierson Clinic on Kercheval in only handle normal deliveries where the woman and fetus both appear to be healthy - on their own.

If the pregnancy or delivery becomes complicated (for example, if a vacuum or forcep extraction or caesarean section is necessary), or if the pregnancy is difficult from the outset (for example, if the mother is diabetic), then the case must be handled by an obstetrician.

However, a C.N.M. can assist the obstetrician in a complicated delivery, and help provide pre- and post-natal counseling and care for the mother and

Doctors and C.N.M.s also differ in that C.N.M.s work more closely with their patients and get to know them better, O'-Rourke said.

"Doctor's treat everything from the standpoint of pathology," she said. "By that I mean, they treat childbirth as they would any condition. They basically tell the patient, 'Lie back honey and I'll take care of you.' Certified nurse-midwives, however, empower women to go through this natural process. The woman is the star of the show, the significant other is the coach, and we're there to prevent harm."

While high malpractice insurance premiums and the fear of lawsuits are driving some doctors out of the business of delivering babies, more and more people are getting into the C.N.M. field.

Nationally, about 250 nursemidwives are certified each year, and C.N.M.s now deliver almost 3 percent of all newborns in the United States, according to the University of Michigan.

Just a few years ago, nurses in Michigan who wanted to become certified nurse- midwives had to travel out of state to re-

Now, interested students can enroll in the nurse-midwifery education program offered through the University of Michigan's School of Nursing, or the Community-based Nurse-midwife Education Program (CNEP), a home study program that's affiliated with Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland.

Each of the two programs just graduated its first class of certified nurse- midwives.

Grosse Pointe City resident Elizabeth Roeske, 28, a C.N.M. at Hutzel Hospital in Detroit (which was the first hospital in the state to have certified nurse- midwives on staff) could have been part of U-M's first graduating class.

"At the time I was looking for a certified nurse program to enroll in, U-M was just forming its program," Roeske said. "I

decided to go to the University of Illinois instead, because it had a shorter program. My program only lasted 18 months, because we worked right through the summer. U-M has a two-year program.'

Roeske received her master's in nursing, with a speciality in certified nurse-midwifery, from the University of Illinois in November 1991, and was a nurse at Hutzel for about four years before that.

In Case Western Reserves' CNEP program, midwifery students study at home, gain practical experience by watching local C.N.M.s (who serve as mentors) work in hospital settings, and travel to the university a few times each semester to take tests.

O'Rourke and the other C.N.M.'s at the Pierson Clinic serve as mentors in the Case Western Reserves program, and considered enrolling in it, but I also work with interns from U-

Roeske agrees that midwives have an image problem.

"I think a lot of people have this image that midwives only serve poor people, or that we're a bunch of grannies, or that we can't administer pain medication, or handle minor complications and infections, but we can," she said.

"And then some people don't even realize that we exist, or that we treat women of all ages, and not just pregnant women. Some women have no idea that we can perform their regular gynecological exams, or insert norplants or cervical caps. We take care of the whole range of women's health care, from their very first pelvic exam through menopause.

Engler backs DiNello's juvenile crime package

If state Sen. Gil DiNello, D-Clinton Township, had his way, the confessed killers of Farms businessman Benjamin Gravel two years ago would be serving hard time instead of being freed in a couple of years.

DiNello has introduced, and Gov. John Engler has thrown his support behind, juvenile crime bills that would make youths subject to adult time for scharges for anyone 14 or older adult crime. Who commits serious crimes.

DiNello, whose district in cludes St. Clair Shores, East Detroit and Mount Clemens, has introduced a four-bill package that would allow minors who commit serious crimes to be tried and sentenced as adults.

Engler described DiNello's bills as a centerpiece of his (Engler's) "Criminal Justice Agenda for the '90s.

'Speedy passage of these bills is an absolute necessity if we are serious about getting tough on crime in this state. Engler said last week.

The bills have been referred to the Senate Judiciary Com-

DiNello said the number of juveniles committing felonies is growing to epidemic proportions and that his bills, if approved by the Legislature, would remove legal road blocks that prohibit prosecutors from having minors tried and sentenced as adults.

"It boils down to one issue for kids who commit felonies," DiNello said. "If you do the adult crime, then you should do adult time.

"We need to send a message to these young hoodlums who are turning our state into zones of fear that their behavior will not be tolerated and that they will receive the maximum (sentence) that the law allows.

The time has come to make a frontal assault on these murderers, dope dealers and other criminals who are running around in a juvenile's body."

DiNello said that while prosecutors can seek to have juveniles charged and tried as adults for certain serious crimes, such as murder, judges still have the discretion to sentence the young offenders as

juveniles. Such was the case with four of the six youths that ambushed and killed Gravel in February 1990 as he was on his way home from the Bayview Yacht Club. All four were charged and pleaded guilty as adults to murder, but were sentenced to juvenile probation and became wards of the Department of Social Services until they turn 19.

"I was sick about that one," DiNello said.


DiNello's indignation over crime extended to the Michigan Supreme Court's recent striking down mandatory life sentences for those caught possessing more than 640 grams of cocaine. The court ruled that life sentences were unconstitu-

cruel or unusual punishment. The court's decision made those previously convicted of such crimes eligible for parole after serving 10 years in prison.







Pointes laud new delay in redistricting

or the second time this year, the Grosse Pointes have reason to be thankful for judicial decisions on reapportionment.

This time the decision by a three-judge federal court panel is to delay any action on legislative reapportionment and keep all the five Pointes in District 13 through the Aug. 4 primary and probably until

The move was taken to avoid postponement of the state's primary which the judges feared might have been necessary if they had sought to collect additional testimony in the case before reaching a decision.

The delay means that the 13th District represented by Rep. William R. Bryant Jr., the veteran Grosse Pointe member of the House, will remain as ordered by the state Supreme Court until the federal court panel completes its work and makes its report.

Legislative reapportionment has already been run through several series of state and federal courts as a result of the inability of the Republican Senate and the Democratic House to come to any agreement on the redistricting required

by the 1990 census.

After the state Supreme Court had agreed to the reapportionment plan completed by a panel of state judges, the NAACP and the American Civil Liberties Union sued in federal court on the grounds that the original order had violated the Voting Rights Act by not creating a sufficient number of black districts.

It was at that point that the Supreme Court responded with a 47-page memorandum defending and explaining its original reapportionment plan.

As part of their plan to create three minority seats in this area, the appellants reportedly had sought to split the Pointes into two districts and increase the minority as well as the Detroit and Democratic strength in both of them.

In our view, the Pointes have no quarrel with the appellants except that most local people believe the Grosse Pointes deserve consideration as a single community, not as five individual municipalities, insofar as legislative representation is concerned.

In voting to delay their decision, the federal judges, however, apparently felt

that they needed more time to collect testimony about the issue than they had originally estimated when they had said they would act by last Tuesday, June 23.

That date was set to meet the deadlines for public notification of new district lines and provide the other information needed by local officials, candidates and voters to prepare for the Aug. 4 primary.

The delay now enables District 13 as well as the other legislative districts to go ahead with their preparations for the primary. It also assures the three District 13 candidates, Democrats Elaine Hartman and Deanna M. Scallen, both of Grosse Pointe Farms, as well as Republican Bryant, that the state Supreme Court's reapportionment now will remain in effect through the primary and probably

Rep. Bryant obviously was pleased with the outcome even though he would have preferred that the reapportionment made under direction of the state Supreme Court had been made permanent.

Under the reapportionment now in effect, District 13 covers all five Pointes and Harper Woods, plus the addition of a

few more Detroit voters, but, as Bryant noted, it it still is primarily a strong GOP district.

Two earlier state Supreme Court decisions that were welcomed in the Pointes because of their handling of the Wayne County reapportionment issue achieved two important results:

One voided a redistricting plan for Wayne County commissioner districts that had put the Park into a Detroit district and the other approved a revised plan restoring the Park to the 1st Commissioner District which includes the other four Pointes.

While legislative District 13 presumably will remain intact for the November election, nobody knows what will happen to it until the federal judicial panel completes its hearings and its reapportionment.

The delay, while welcomed in the Pointes, offers further evidence that the courts, both state and federal, are playing legislative roles in the reapportionment of congressional, legislative and county commissioner districts.

Nobody really approves the present system but, unfortunately, nobody has come up with a better plan. The problem is how to require the Legislature or the Wayne County Apportionment Commission to agree on redistricting plans that meet the legal requirements and are fair to the voters, the political parties, the incumbents and everyone else.

To date, nobody has figured out a substitute plan that would better serve the public interest.

An adoption plan that works

t is good news for Grosse Pointe Farms residents and other Pointers who use Lakeshore that construction work on the Adopt-an-Island project got under way this week.

The work on the medians and the areas between the curb and Lake St. Clair along Lakeshore means that by shortly after Labor Day the Farms will match the improvements completed earlier along Lakeshore in the Shores.

Court ruling

To the Editor:

I am troubled and angry by the Michigan Supreme Court's 4-3 ruling that the state's mandatory life without parole penalty for possession of one and a half or more pounds of heroin or cocaine is unconstitutional.

Justices Cavanagh, Griffin, Brickley and Levin possess a rather myopic concept of what is really cruel and unusual, and their argument that those convicted in the case before them "have been punished more severely than they could have been for seconddegree murder, rape, mutilation, armed robbery or other exceptionally grave and violent crimes" is specious.

Did it ever occur to the justices that many second degree murders, armed robberies and mutilations can be directly attributed to the drug trade? And if there is a punishment imbalance pertaining to convicted rapists, the better remedy is to

lock them up forever also.

Have the justices ever observed the painful contortions of a cocaine-addicted newborn? Have they seen what heroin addiction can do to the human body? Are these wise men aware that narcotics addiction is a major causitive factor in the AIDS epidemic?

Michigan's lifer law was a powerful weapon against drug dealers. With a stroke of a pen, four justices have taken that weapon away.

For example, he never let me go on camping trips with my Brownie troop (even though the outings were in the troop leader's back yard) because he said a stranger could snatch me out


He wouldn't let me go on a bus to Greenfield Village in the winter with my fourth-grade class, because the road could

But what a challenge In addition to its very real problems, Detroit has a powerful psychological barrier to hurdle before it can even think of itself as an attractive place to live. Other cities build canals and think of themselves as Venice; Detroiters put down their east side canals as a nuisance at best and a sewer at

worst. With Detroit, it's always good news/bad news: the east side riverfront is graced with a series of parks — but they're unkempt and crime-ridden; the east side has some pleasant neighborhoods, but people only

see the scarv ones. One block from Grosse Pointe Park, you can rent a boat and buy some bait, chug out into the river and catch some walleye. I have it on good authority that the east side is actually home to the same kind of yuppie who inhabits the Pointes.

But who sees it? Who looks past the bad that garners so much attention?

Victoria Park, the site of this

year's Homearama, is a gated community, as they call the new breed of security-minded subdivisions surrounded by high fences and guarded by uniformed officers. The gates keep out the curious and the criminal alike.

And I got there before opening hours.

So I had a friendly chat with the security officer (and, later, another with the guard at nearby Grayhaven, where they wouldn't let me in without an appointment, either).

The security guards were just about the only signs of life. In fact, it's safe to say that, even on a sunny summer morning, they don't unroll the sidewalks on Dickerson before noon. If it hadn't been for a graduation or awards ceremony at Remus Robinson Middle School across the street, I'd have said everyone had moved out.

But never mind. The main point was to see the area, and you can do that without going inside. Dickerson is all gussied up for guests, so it's a fine place for a morning stroll.

Dickerson had a few things going for it before anyone ever thought of Homearama. There's a neat-looking development of low-rise townhouses, the attractive brick Robinson School, the Fisher Mansion, rescued from oblivion some years back, and, of course, the Grayhaven townhouses, right next door. With the canal frontage and Grayhaven's marina (private, though) and the riverfront park at the end of the street, Dickerson might be envied, even with-

And these houses are just the beginning. Phase I is mostly spoken for and Phase II land is already purchased, with plans to knock down the shabby few

out the new subdivision.

remaining houses to clear the way for a whole new batch. Lured by new construction reasonable (city-subsidized) prices, and the security of the guarded gates, customers are practically standing in line.

And it's a mere 11 blocks from Grosse Pointe Park.

Most of us are creatures of habit, ritualistically traveling the same routes every day. If you're used to driving down Jefferson and haven't taken a side road in a long time, change your route for a day and dream about it: a beautiful Detroit right next door.

Harbor Island, Victoria Park, Harbortown, Indian Village, a chain of desirable neighborhoods, all the way down Jeffer-

Sounds pretty utopian.

But block after block already has the same comfortable brick houses people pay big money for in the Pointes. Block after block is lined with trees, flowering bushes in the front yards, little kids playing on the side-

We drove down Korte toward the Park, and as we bounced over the Fox Creek bridge, my companion eyed the street barricade and said, "Iron Curtain, huh?"

Oooff!

Whether to control traffic or crime, the symbolism of the barricade is inescapable. The Park has gotten itself in public relations hot water several times with talk of berms and walls and street closings.

But it isn't as simple as that. The Park has legitimate concerns about the spread of urban blight. And futuristic dreams aside, it would take a blind man not to notice the current differences between the two cities as you cross the boundary

All the more reason to ap-

plaud and encourage the tiny beginnings of change in Detroit. Because if the whole east side looked as good as Dickerson, it would be a welcome neighbor.

But let's hope the change (if there really is one) doesn't come entirely in the form of new, heavily guarded subdivisions. Somehow the gates, the aura of closing oneself in, the private "this-is-mine-you-stayout" attitude seems destructive of community. It's no different from the street barricade on Korte.

And for now, at least, Detroit's new oases of upscale living are strictly islands along the river. Jefferson itself still could use a facelift - and across Jefferson, the situation is, well, an optimist should never use the word "hopeless," but it isn't good.

Mack-Alter Square, the shopping development on Mack just outside the Park border, has yet to live up to its promise. Two stores have been painted and rehabbed, but stand alone in a gritty block of vacant lots and closed-down buildings.

It's not hard to guess that funding must have dried up, a common problem everywhere these days, and especially in a city that is more willing to subsidize "glamor" developments like Victoria Park than a mere

working-class shopping center. In short, the east side has a long way to go. A neighborhood is more than pretty houses. It needs services, shops, restaurants. It needs places to buy a screwdriver or repair a lawnmower or get a picture framed, pick up hamburger and bread and milk, gas up the family car. It needs decent neighborhoods that are closer together than Grosse Pointe Park and Victoria Park and Indian Vil-






4th, 5th graders create operetta



Road on a perfect Sunday afternoon, we're suddenly overtaken by a red-and-cream '55 Chevrolet two-door sedan with wheels so shiny they are almost obscene.







Law firm moves into historic Detroit landmark


They say a man's home is his castle.

When industrialist Col. Frank Hecker had his 20,988-square-foot house built in 1891, at a cost of \$147,000, he made the castle on Woodward Avenue his home.

Now, 101 years later, the extravagently designed Hecker-Smiley mansion, which boasts gold- and silver-leaf walls, full-length stained-glass windows and intricately designed ivory-carved ceilings among its lavish appointments, will be the new home of the Detroit law firm Charfoos & Christensen.

Sharon Lutz, of Grosse Pointe Woods, vice president and managing attorney with the law firm, is one of nine people who make up the Motor City Ventures Inc. investment group, which paid just under the \$620,000 asking price for the 49-room house last month.

"We had been looking for a new location in the city," said Lutz. "We feel committed to the city. It's where we make our money and it's where we wanted to stay. We didn't want to move out to suburbs like Southfield or Oakland County."



Lutz said the law firm, longterm tenants of penthouse offices on the 40th floor of the Penobscot Building, wanted to the an owner rather than a ren-

"I think this will contribute to rejuvenating the area," said Lutz, referring to the outskirts of the Wayne State University campus near the Detroit Institute of Arts.

"Anytime you have a group of any major significance at all relocating into the area, it's always a positive thing and reflects a positive image for the city.

"It leads to kind of a domino effect; look at what happened after the Fox Theater opened up. We obviously believe that or we wouldn't have invested."

Lutz said the law firm hopes to move into its new offices in late October or early November, after all renovations are complete.


The three-story, limestone mansion was home to Col. Hecker, his wife and their children from 1891 until the mid-1930s. After operating as a boarding house for 10 years, the home was purchased by Paul Smiley, of Smiley Brothers Music Co., who restored it and used it for his organ and piano business. From 1947 until August 1990, the home was known to most Detroiters as a place to buy pianos or attend

music rehearsals and recitals.
Heirs of Smiley, who died in
1990, worked with Preservation
Wayne on the sale of the grand
home, which, along with the
5,721-square-foot carriage house
behind it, is listed as one of the
top five historical homes in
Michigan.

Preservation Wayne is working on a plan that would include additional housing, shops and restaurants for the area.

The facade of the mansion looks like a uniting of France's Versailles Palace and an ancient British monarch's castle, with a French chateau-styled center flanked on either side by Gothic turrets.

What is perhaps most amazing about the home is that all of the original dazzling, ornate



architectural details are intact and nearly untouched. And in a city that has seen most of its once-grand homes destroyed by decay and crime, it has never been seriously vandalized.

"This home is very sound and in very good shape," said Lutz. "We believe that's due to the fact there's only been two owners in its history, so it's never been remodeled by various owners."

Lutz said the members of the law firm have "absolutely zero concern" about safety in the neighborhood.

"We have plenty of parking and this area is patrolled by the Wayne State police as well as the 13th precinct police," she said.

The investment group hired the Gator Construction Co. and the Washington D.C./New York-based architectural firm Quinn Evans, which is also doing the renovations on the west wing of the White House, to complete the \$1.2 million in renovations needed to refurbish the mansion and make it office-friendly.

The electrical, plumbing and heating systems will be updated, including restoring the original 13 gas fireplaces that are scattered throughout the house, from the former bedrooms and children's nurseries to the billiard room and downstairs kitchen.

Working under the direction of the Detroit Historical Commission and Preservation Wayne, workers will clean, repair and polish the extensive brasswork, marble and onyx fireplaces, Victorian light fixtures, ivory carvings, ornate plasterwork, detailed woodwork and silver and copper walls and ceilings.

The home also boasts a twostory story stained-glass window that illuminates the main entranceway with gold and yellow light and another one that opens on hinges from the attic, which lights the center staircase below it and provides a cool breeze for the home in the summer.

Under the direction of the art restoration department at the DIA, the mansion's walls will be painted in either their original or similar colors.


Lutz' new office will be in the ornately designed, richly paneled dining room, where Hecker, who built railroad cars, would entertain friends like the Whitneys and Buhls.


"When Col. Hecker built this home in 1891, there were 150,000 people living in Detroit," said Lutz. "Ten years later, there were 1.5 million."


The third floor had a billiard room, which, Lutz said, will be converted into the legal library, and a sauna. Topping off the grandeur of the mansion, come November, some lucky lawyer will find his legal digs in "the Presidential Suite," a bedroom where former presidents William McKinley and Rutherford Hayes slept.

Motor City Ventures Inc., headed by law firm partner David Christensen, is the new owner of the Hecker-Smiley mansion, and the Charfoos & Christensen law firm will be the main tenant. Lawrence Charfoos, the law firm's other principal, is not a shareholder in the investment group.

Construction and renovations are under way on the limestone-exterior facade of the Hecker-Smiley mansion (right) located at E. Ferry and Woodward Avenue near the Detroit Institute of Arts. The French chateau-style front is flanked by turrets (below) on both sides.









Col. Hecker's children had silver-domed ceilings in their playrooms, which were adjacent to their bedrooms on the third level of each turret (left).

Mengden's not only excited bout his new venture because 's a change in careers - he's so fascinated with the elecronics involved.

The station is almost completely electronic, able to run for extended periods of time without a human being preent. Of course, Mengden will have a staff of on-air reporters to cover the local news, and advertising salespeople, but the fact that the station can be oprated by computers is exciting nough for him.

He spends at least one day a veek at the station, which is located in Saginaw, getting things up and running. He expects immediate success even though, he says, people younger than 35 don't know there's an AM dial on the radio.

"This is exclusive to the area," Mengden said. "Local news, weather and traffic will be broadcast from our electronic newsroom twice each hour and we will focus on community happenings and events."

And Mengden, who says he's "been on every blacktop in Michigan" in his work in public finance knows the Saginaw Bay area. He even knows that the average commute to work for professionals in the area is 12 minutes, which is why headline news will be welcomed by drivers, he said. It's short, it's on constantly and it's up to

In addition to the "CNN Headline News" and local news he is planning on adding the Chicago Tribune farm report to attract the large number of farmers the station reaches, and the Coast Guard reports for the large number of boaters on Saginaw Bay. The station also exclusively carry the Michigan State University football and basketball games and selected hockey games.

"No one knew the station existed," he said. "The station wasn't even rated in Arbitron."

Arbitron is the organization which keeps tabs on radio audiences, much like Neilson does for television audiences. He expects the station to be listed in Arbitron's next guide.

He's even got a deal going with the local cable television's "CNN Headline News" channel to promote each other. "Leaving the house?" the television advertisement asks. "Take CNN Headline News' with you on 1440 AM." The radio ad urges people arriving home to turn on cable when they get in-

There was one other station in Michigan which aired CNN news but it closed recently, so Mengden has a monopoly in the state and plans on expanding his listening public through ransmitters outside the Bay

Woods fears legal lumps, puts kibosh on speed bumps

The Grosse Pointe Woods citizens recreation commission and the city council are at odds over the issue of placing speed bumps at Lake Front Park.

The recreation commission wants them and the majority of the council doesn't.

Last year, the council considered slowing motorists at Lake Front Park with speed bumps, but decided against it after reading the recommendations of the city's public safety department, insurance carrier and city attorney.

The issue resurfaced last month, when the city received a letter from a resident asking that speed bumps be installed at the park to slow motorists and protect "little children darting in and out" of the roadway and parking lot, said councilman Peter Gilezan, council representative on the recreation commission.

Acting city administrator Philip H. Belcher asked the recreation commission to study the issue once again, and the commission recommended to the council that speed bumps be installed at the park.

Last week, the council voted 6-1 against installing speed bumps. Gilezan voted in favor of the project.

Mayor Robert E. Novitke. waving three documents in his hand, said he voted against the speed bumps because, "I wouldn't want this city to be a defendant in Wayne County Circuit Court and have these three recommendations come to light either through discovery or the Freedom of Information

He was referring to the recommendations made last October by the city's insurance carrier, attorney and public safety department.


The first document, a letter written to then-city administrator-clerk Chester E. Petersen by Kenneth McLoud, loss control manager of the city's insur-ance carrier, Willis Corroon Corp. of Michigan, says:

"1. The use of speed bumps would increase the exposure to trip-and-fall injuries to patrons in the park.

2. There is the possibility that a driver would try and miss the bumps, lose control and/or run off the road hitting a park patron or another vehi-

3. An 'increase' of vehicle damage is possible from drivers striking the speed bumps at an excessive speed, causing damage to their vehicle.'

The second document, a memo to the council written by



Some people say that speed bumps are needed to slow motorists to 10 miles an hour at Lake Front Park in Grosse Pointe Woods. Others say that better enforcement of the park permit revocation rule - posted at the park entrance - will do the trick.

city attorney George B. Catlin,

says:
"I have been unable to find any statutory prohibition against the installation of speed bumps. The Michigan Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices makes no mention of such devices as authorized methods of traffic control.

However, a search of Michigan court cases reveals 54 appeal cases wherein speed bumps were involved in the litigation. Since these are appellate court decisions, cases at the trial court level would exceed this number.

Since it is apparent that speed bumps generate litigation, it is my recommendation that they not be installed at the Lake Front Park."

to Petersen from Jack L. Patterson, director of public safety,

"Per your request, I have studied the placement of speed bumps along roadways inside the park.

I went to the scene along the dockage roadway and concluded that spacing of every 100 feet would be the best manner to place the speed bumps.

In every application of which I am aware, the bumps are used on private property. The application seems to do the job but is very controversial. Motorists involved in accidents cite the fact that the bump has caused them to lose control of their vehicle.

I do not recommend them as an answer to the vehicle speed.

A better solutions would be for drivers to be cited for violation. of park speed rules by being warned, or having their park passes confiscated for a period of time.'

Gilezan said the recreation commission considered those documents when it made its recommendation, but felt that the city was also at risk of being liable if a person was injured by a speeder at the park.

The speed limit at Lake Front Park is 10 miles an hour. A sign posted near the entrance this season says that anyone who is ticketed for speeding will lose his or her park pass.

Although Grosse Pointe Woods owns Lake Front Park, the property is located in St.



Clair Shores, and park personnel must call in St. Clair Shores police to issue speeding tickets.

'The weekend of June 13-14 we had St. Clair Shores officers issue two reckless driving tickets, and park personnel have been confiscating the park passes of people caught speeding,' Belcher said.

"But it's only in 'extreme' situations that we call in St. Clair Shores," Gilezan said. "People going 5, 10 or 15 miles over the speed limit are a potential threat to little children darting in and out. From a practical, cost-effective point of view, this is where they (the recreation commission members) come down. If someon has a better idea (for control ling speeders), I'd like to hear

Councilwoman Jean Rice pro posed stepping up law enforce ment by having a commission member deputized by St. Clair Shores police with the power to issue speeding tickets inside

Lake Front Park. Belcher said he would ask St. Clair Shores officials if they would agree to that, and if so, how much it would cost the Woods to have a recreation commission member trained by St. Clair Shores police.

He said he would share his findings with the recreation commission.







The Farms was able to save me \$25,000 on the cost of the oject by accepting fill dirt om area construction projects ince last fall.

Park man convicted of electronic fraud

A 64-year-old Grosse Pointe Park man, who stole \$2,702 from Grosse Pointe banks by taking advantage of a delay in the verification of automatic teller machine (ATM) deposits, has been convicted on several counts of electronic fraud.

Milton Charles Banta pleaded guilty to the charges and was sentenced by Recorder's Court Judge John Patrick O'Brien on June 11.

Banta pulled his scam at banks in Grosse Pointe Woods, Grosse Pointe City and Grosse Pointe Park, and it worked like this, detectives in those cities said:

Banta had an account with First Nationwide Bank in Grosse Pointe Woods, and would make deposits to that account at ATMs of banks other than First Nationwide, using phony checks.

Then he would go to another bank (again, other than First Nationwide), and withdraw money from his First Nationwide account, which had grown with the deposit of the phony checks.

"It took the bank a couple of weeks to realize that he didn't actually have that money in his account to withdraw from,' said Detective Sgt. Walter Paton of Grosse Pointe Park.

Last September, Banta got \$900 from the Michigan National Bank on Jefferson at Barrington in Grosse Pointe Park, \$852 from Standard Federal and Franklin Savings in Grosse Pointe Woods, and \$950 from First Federal of Michigan in Grosse Pointe City, after writing checks against his First Nationwide account.

When First Nationwide learned of the fraud, it contacted the Grosse Pointe Woods public safety department, which notified officers in Grosse Pointe Park and Grosse Pointe City about its investiga-

Detectives from the three cities and the head of security for First Nationwide Bank jointly went to the Wayne County prosecutor on March 27 and obtained warrants for Banta's arrest, Paton said.

"I'd like to stress that the three cities cooperated on this case," he said. "If each of us had gone alone, we may not have gotten as much from the prosecutor as we did, but by going together, we were able to impress upon the prosecutor what this guy was up to."

Grosse Pointe City Detective Dennis VanDale and Detective Steve Backlund of Grosse Pointe Woods agreed.

'We just enjoy working with the other cities, and I think it's a big reason why we have such a low crime rate," VanDale

Backlund said, "It worked out very well. We were able to get the maximum we could out

of this case because we cooperated."

After the warrants were obtained, Grosse Pointe Park detectives staked out Banta's home and arrested him on March 28.

His preliminary hearing was held before Grosse Pointe Park Municipal Court Judge Kirsten Frank on April 2, and he was bound over to Recorder's Court. In the meantime, he was free after posting 10 percent of his \$10,000 bond.


O'Brien sentenced Banta to five years probation, six months on an electronic tether, 100 hours of community service, full restitution of the money he stole and payment of full court costs.

My favorite duplicate regional tournament is held the first week of April each year in Gatlinburg, Tennessee. This honky tonk tourist town nestled in the foot hills of The Great Smoky Mountains at the eastern border next to North Carolina is one of our scenic beauties of the east. I'd bet there aren't three thousand year round residents, but from early April'til November, Gatlinburg attracts hundreds of thousands of vacationers and most come by car as the driv-

Three years ago the town leaders completed a new convention center which is now home for The Mid Atlantic Regional, one of the A.C.B.L.'s most popular playing attractions drawing from all over America. Imagine in a six day period they drew 4620 tables of bridge and that's for a lot of reasons beginning with hospitality, accommodation and management. You aren't there two days and you want to come back. Many Detroiters are always present and partnership arrangements are handled in a masterful fashion. I arrange for many of my games thru this subscription and I have been extremely lucky. For it is refreshing and fun to play with good partners from the four corners of our country. This year my best match up was with a young San Franciscan named David Hankins. We enjoyed our first day warm up so much that we played for two more. Our best result was Friday's stratified open pairs, winning our section afternoon and evening and finishing eighth over all amongst 364 competing pairs. It wasn't equal to my two third place finishes the preceding year, but against the size of that kind of competition you've got to be brilliant and lucky

There were many exceptional hands thanks to the computer, but this one played by David was a performance.

As you can see, David needed God's good grace to succeed, but his skill was the determining factor as West made an amazing defensive play.

Declarer won the spade king and tricks 2-4 played trumps ending in his hand. On the third heart, West contrived a clever discard... the diamond deuce! Now this put David to a very daring guess as he could take the diamond hook either way and his opponents play suggested he had nothing to protect in that suit. At trick 5 he drew East's last trump and he played his low spade toward the ten which West captured with his queen. In under a moment West returned the club jack which was speculatable and suspectful, but David had no place to put his second club and won the finesse with dummy's queen. Many a defender with West's cards would have led a third spade which did Dave no favor as it would leave him to play clubs and diamonds himself. There is an unexplainable contention among many that sometimes the lead of a critical suit by defender sends vibes that are subtle and foretelling. In this instance, that wasn't the case as declarer had no alternative play. Of course all of this was a prelude to how he perceived the out diamonds. I would have guessed wrong respecting honest and dependable West's earlier discard. Dave saw it much differently. West was, in his opinion, concocting a ploy. Why else at trick 4 would he have parted with a diamond when a low spade seemed more reasonable. So at trick 8 he played a low diamond to his ace and back toward the dummy's king, ten and the riddle ended when West followed with his queen. You say, Oh! No! what a fool was West to unproctect his queen. Not so, it was brilliant as many fine declarers would have played dummy's king and let the ten ride.

Of course, these young San Franciscans are building their reputations on plays like this and I'm sure he knew I would tell you about it as I'd mentioned my column to him.





New kid on the block

Having moved to Grosse Pointe from Ann Arbor in April with my family, and before that commuting to my new position as senior pastor of St. Paul Lutheran Church since the second week in January, I feel like a new kid on the block.

My very first day on the job consisted of attending the Grosse Pointe Ministerial Association meeting. My new colleagues in this area were very cordial to me as a newcomer. I sensed that Grosse Pointe churches have a refreshing and encouraging ecumenical spirit.

The subsequent months which have followed that initial meeting have not betrayed that original assessment. One of the programs which crosses over denominational lines is the Lay Theological Academy. The classes for laity and clergy alike vary from biblical themes and historical perspectives to spirituality and interpersonal skills. The courses are offered for a nominal fee and the location of the sessions is shared by the participating congregations.

Watch the Grosse Pointe News for upcoming course offerings. You may also contact the pastor of your parish for more information on this worthwhile ministry.

Another area ministry which involves churches working together is the Racial Justice Center of Grosse Pointe. In conversations I have had with Bill Weld-Wallis, executive director of the center, I have been impressed with the scope and depth of this important ministry.

Justice issues need to be on our agendas continually, as we seek to be a healing, mediating force in a society which experiences much division and brokenness. Cross-racial and cross-cultural learning experiences are being planned by the center, especially for elementaryage students in our community. You may want to contact the Racial Justice Center about this program, as well as other opportunities available.

Other significant cooperation among the churches includes local and world hunger concerns. The CROP Walk in May brought walkers and sponsors together in a united effort to help alleviate world hunger. With homelessness on the increase and a severe drought in portions of Africa, the need to continue to explore and to implement ways to address these problems is para-

By no means have I exhausted the list of cooperative ministries; there is much more being done and which needs to be done. I am glad to be here with you in an attempt to work on solutions to problems together, as well as grow in cooperation and understanding of our commonalities in a true spirit of ecumenism.





Darker and stranger, 'Batman Returns'

You know you're watching a bad movie when the power at the theater goes out in the middle of the film and it's the most exciting thing that happened all evening.

Two thoughts go through a reviewer's head: "Will they honor my ticket so I can come back and see the rest?" and



"Will I have to wade through this entire, murky mess again, or can I come 90 minutes late?" That's what happened at a

special sneak preview of Tim Burton's "Batman Returns" last Wednesday during that storm that brought tornadoes and sheets of rain throughout the metro area.

(Yes, they did honor the ticket, and yes, I sat through the whole thing again.)

It's the most anticipated movie of the summer and once again, it doesn't live up to the hype. The first "Batman" was too long, too dark in tone and worse yet, just plain boring.

"Batman Returns," unfortunately, is more of the same.

The second film in Burton's planned trilogy about the Caped Crusader is unfocused, disjointed and rather grotesque. Its theme is too dark for children yet it misses the mark if it's aimed at adults.

There is more humor in this

one, which isn't saying much, but because there's so little to relieve the gloomy tedium, a smile or two is welcomed with open arms like a cat welcomes a dish of cream.

The film begins in the Cobblepot mansion in which a baby is being born. The reactions from the doctors show that something is terribly wrong with the baby. The parents throw the child into a stream one Christmas. It survives to become The Penguin (Danny DeVito).

Some 33 years later, Gotham City reels when The Penguin rescues the mayor's child from a kidnapping (arranged by The Penguin) and the bird-man announces that he's Oswald Cobblepot, misunderstood monster, looking for his identity and a little respect.

He gets it from the city with the help of evil (are there any other kind anymore?) businessman Max Shreck (Christopher Walken), who recruits The Penguin to run for mayor of Gotham City. Shreck has a wicked past which The Penguin uses to intimidate him. But Shreck has

which he is using The Penguin to help him obtain. Shreck also has a secretary, Selina Kyle (Michelle Pfeiffer) whom he kills, but who is licked back to life by a bunch of stray cats and becomes Catwoman.

an even more wicked future

Oh, almost forgot, there's this guy named Bruce Wayne (Michael Keaton), a multi-millionaire who becomes Batman. He has a bit part as a superhero who fights crime. His role is so small it's a wonder that he got top billing. Last time he was billed second, behind Jack Nicholson's Joker.

The plot, if that's what you want to call it, has The Penguin and Catwoman teaming up to defeat Batman, while Bruce Wayne teams up with Kyle for a little heavy petting.

It's too long, has too many disjointed parts and really goes nowhere. It doesn't build, it's only bland.

There are some notable ex-

First of all is DeVito's Penguin. He is funny (when the script allows him to be) and truly an interesting character. It's almost touching watching him decide what he wants to be human or monster — and it's hilarious when he echoes John Merrick's famous "I am not an animal, I am a human being" line from "The Elephant Man," but backward.

Walken looks like he stepped out of a Dickens novel with his white hair sprayed into a Beethoven esque 'do. He not only looks good, he lights up the screen with an intense performance.

Pfeiffer's Catwoman is too harsh and too cruel and Keaton's Batman is listless.

The sets, from Gotham City's town square to the catacombs under the city to the top of Shreck's office building, are remarkable and far more interesting than the story. The cinematography captures all the angles and curves and beauty in Oscar-winning style.

But when we get right down to it, the problem is this: "Batman Returns" is a story about a man who becomes a bat to fight criminals who are part penguin and part cat - why isn't it fun to watch?

Burton has shown his flair for zany comedy in "Beetlejuice" and for romantic comedy in "Edward Scissorhands." He could have used some of that here.

"Batman Returns" is as cold as a penguin's heart. There's no spark, no warmth, no feeling. When it

And it could have been so much more.

Their manager is Jimmy Dugan (Tom Hanks), a one-time great ballplayer who drank his ral ballplayer who looks at the career to oblivion. Of course, he is none too happy. "Girls," he says, "are for sleeping with after the game, not for coaching during the game." But he was chosen for a reason: Fans might turn out to see him wave his hat and smile on the side-

> The team owners don't take the league seriously. Newsreels show that the players not only look good in their little skirted uniforms, but that they knit in the dugout and touch up their makeup between plays.

A theme emerges - these are a group of women who want only to gain respect, but are thwarted at every turn. And, the movie seems to ask, is it right to take playing a game so seriously when a war is raging around the globe?

Fuller breathes life into the murder mystery genre

A Death in Paris

By Dean Fuller

Little, Brown. 339 pages. \$19.95

An erstwhile composer and arranger in musical theater, Dean Fuller now writes full-time from his home in East

The musical world's loss is a marvelous gain for all of us nystery fans. This is luminously evident in "A Death in 'aris," an Alex Grismolet mystery which is sure to impress ficionados of the genre. Serious readers will welcome a ook of this type which deals realistically with character and plot, and offers much action along with suspenseful twists and turns leading to an electrifying climax.

Grismolet, the young Surete chef-inspector of Paris, is a most likable man blessed with Gaelic charm. He is usually teamed with his wily assistant, Alphonas Varnas, a resourceful Lithuanian who has at his fingertips reliable connections with the police informants who inhabit the dark underworld of Paris. Alex and Varnas are assigned the baffling case of the murder of a prominent American statesman, Andrew Wilson, who has received both the Distinguished Service Cross and the Croix de Guerre for his World War I service. Wilson's body is discovered in a park near the Musee Cernuschi, a small private museum specializing in the collection of rare antique Chinese porcelain.

Millicent Wilson, the dead man's oddly composed wife; the glamorous Brazilian Anna Gutierrez who directs the Musee; David Stevenson, Jan Bollekens, and other of Wilson's friends, all have important roles in Andrew Wilson's life. Even though they try to discourage the police from digging too vigorously into Wilson's past, Alex and Varnas grow more determined to pursue the strange matter to the end regardless of where the trail leads them. The strange attitude on the part of the widow and the friends only piques Alex, whose Gaelic personality reminds one, a bit, of Hercule Poirot, Agatha Christie's Belgian detective. Fortunately, though, Alex does not possess the irritating mannerisms of Poirot.

Alex lives on a houseboat, shades of Travis McGee, and he is the generous guardian of a beautiful 18-year-old ballerina, Philippa, who was unceremoniously dumped on his

lap some twelve years earlier by an erratic Englishwoman who then disappeared from their lives. It has become a touchy situation as Philippa begins to realize that Alex is more than just a father-figure, and Alex struggles to maintain the status quo. This is one entertaining thread, among many others, which continually seize our attention. There is never a dull moment in this very civilized and literate

As Alex and Varnas persist in digging into the backgrounds of Wilson's survivors, it finally emerges that the elderly man had never recovered from the death of his only brother, an air ace who was shot down during WWI. From

that time on, Andrew Wilson vowed to avenge his brother's death at the hands of a German pilot, no matter how long it took. This plot thread leads to a very different scene altogether - airplanes and the men who flew them during war.

Fuller very obviously knows the French well, along with their culture and history. He has a warm understanding for their national characteristics, and he always presents them with his urbane manner, ever cultured and sophisticated. This is a robust novel peopled with sympathetic characters who win our interest. The plot rolls faster and faster as we near the end of this remarkable chase, spanning the European continent and a half century, before we find the unsuspected killer. The author succeeds fabulously in producing a real twist, a resolution that stuns us by its audacity. We will not forget this wonderful combo, Alex Grismolet and his loyal Varnas, nor the archaic weapon responsible for Wilson's death.



This 'Housesitter' is welcome

In "Housesitter," a fresh and zany romp, two comedic masters (Steve Martin and Goldie Hawn) join forces as liars. Experts at fabrication, they spin tall tales with ease when neces-



sary to work themselves out of tight situations.

The stage is set when Newton Davis (Martin), a Boston architect, takes his girlfriend Becky (Dana Delaney) to see the house he has designed and built for her as an engagement present.

Preppy, practical Becky is amused, but not impressed. She makes it plain that he is too impulsive and impractical to be good marriage material.

Crushed by her rejection, Davis goes into town to a bar where he meets Gwen (Goldie Hawn) who is a waitress there. She also is a con artist and a compulsive liar, who shuffles false identities with considera-

They spend the night together and she learns about his new house. When Gwen wakes up the next morning he is gone. Without a second thought she packs up her belongings in a duffel bag, takes off to the house and moves in. Then it's off to the grocery store where she passes herself off as Davis' wife and opens a charge account. Ditto the furniture store, drapery and china shop.

Settled in, she makes friends with the townspeople, shopkeepers, Davis' friends, his parents and finally Becky, for each of whom she has a different tale to tell about how she met and married Davis. So well does she elaborate on her story that Becky decides Davis is a suitable marriage prospect after all and regrets her decision to dump him.

Gwen does well with her storybook life until Davis arrives with a "For Sale" sign. He has decided to sell the house and repay his frugal father who loaned him the money to build it, hoping to patch up the hard feelings that resulted because of his father's disapproval of the venture. What he doesn't know is that Gwen has already patched up the quarrel during her frequent

visits to his father (Donald Mof fett) and his mother (Julie Har-

A compromise is reached when Davis gets the idea that if Gwen stays, Becky may realize that he is good husband material and change her mind about marrying him. Their hoax of a marriage becomes a series of fights with some tender moments. It also becomes a one-upsmanship lying contest.

Director Frank Oz, the same man responsible for Martin's "Dirty Rotten Scoundrels," and first-time screenwriter Mark Stein, deliver a lively film enhanced by a wonderful cast. Martin, whose forte is physical comedy, also has the ability to accentuate comic situations with funny mannerisms and facial expressions. He is given ample opportunity to display his talents.

Hawn has a way of delivering zany anecdotes, dramatizing them as she goes along by batting her eyes and ending with a big, wide smile that is irresistible. The supporting cast is also excellent.

Built around the theme that lying and love both are rooted in imagination, "Housesitter" has an aura of romance that adds to its appeal.



H.M.S. Pinafore' sets sail 'nto new, hilarious waters

Her Majesty's Ship Pinafore sailed across the Avon Theatre stage last week to conquer its audience with some of the most creative staging and dance routines ever lavished on a Gilbert and Sullivan revival. Anyone who saw Stratford's musicals in



recent years, especially the spectacular "Mikado," will recognize the magic touch of director-choreographer Brian Mac-Donald, who directed those, too.

Much to his credit, and the viewer's pleasure, every treatment has been uniquely suited to each show, and this is especially true of "Pinafore." Mac-Donald puts aside all the hackneved traditions of performing G&S to render it as a contemporary musical with spectacular effect. Most notable is the treatment of Pinafore's crew as a male chorus line as precise as the Rockettes while performing routines infinitely more clever, entertaining and difficult.

The opening scene, discovering the crew asleep in their hammocks, sets a level of originality that never flags. As they are wakened and rolled out (literally) by the bosun, it's hard to imagine that any opportunity for stage business, based on the swinging hammocks and the crew pulling on uniforms over their caricatured Victorian long johns, could have been missed.

Even the action of the story is performed in a mahnered, melodramatic style redolent of ballet pantomime carrying the dance treatment throughout the show. This peaks in a fullblown dance number in the second half using a giant silken Union Jack as a prop to play with and to simulate ocean waves. The culmination is a ballet-like storm scene that rocks the ship. Strobe lights heighten the suspense which breaks into hilarity as a mechanical rat rolls across the


stage, ostensibly to leave the sinking vessel. Or perhaps it was merely escaping the clever cat puppet that appeared from time to time in one of the crew's arms making characteristic feline gestures with its

MacDonald has interpolated these big dance numbers into the show to the accompaniment of special arrangements of "Pinafore" themes brilliantly scored by music director Berthold Carriere. The effect is wonderful and adds immeasurably to the vitality of the performance. Less spectacular but totally enchanting is a moment when the cast of sailors and the "sisters, cousins and aunts" of the First Lord of the Admiralty waltz to Buttercup's theme.

G&S' delightful music and script are all the better for it, with the genius and charm of the original shining through. That, of course, requires a cast that can sing, dance and tum-ble with perfect timing, as well as act to perfection. This troupe certainly does. Joanne Hounsell is the perfect comic Victorian damsel whose fluttering hand on her breast reveals the agitated state of her heart as she admires and flirts with Seaman Ralph Rackstraw. And Michael Brian as Ralph plays the troubled but persistent suitor handsomely while leading the singing of innumerable famous G&S solos and choruses in his ringing Irish tenor voice.

In his best role yet at Stratford, Douglas Chamberlain prances, camps and postures deliciously as the Rt. Hon. Sir Joseph Porter, K.C.B., First Lord of the Admiralty. He is in fact everything that G&S imply in title and text designed to spoof the pomp and circumstance of Victorian British Cabinet Officials. By the use of updated verses to his famous patter song about polishing up the handle on the big front door, he manages to tweak contemporary senators and prime ministers as well. But his interaction with a stuffed, divebombing seagull in a suspended flight over the apron of the stage is alone worth the price of admission.

Marsha Bagwell's Bumboat Lady, "Little" Buttercup and

David Dunbar's Captain Corcoran are equally right in their characterizations, helping us both to believe in the improbable satire on class consciousness and to laugh heartily at the preposterousness of it all.

At a time when everyone is aware of tight budget limitations, it is inspiring to see how creative sets, props and costumes can be without the extravagance that mainstream musicals have resorted to, perhaps to make up for a lack of creativity. Susan Benson's set treats the stage as alternately the deck, a cabin, the sea and the forecastle with easy conviction. Wheeling major props on and off stage and lowering things like hammocks from the flies allows the action to zip along at a dizzying pace and the props themselves are creations to wonder at.

There's a captain's bridge on wheels from which the Captain and Sir Joseph address the crew. It is prevented from becoming static by continuously

having its position changed by the crew, while the Captain or Sir Joseph imperceptibly change their position to keep facing the audience. It's devilishly clever and fun to watch. The skiffs that bring Sir Joseph and all his sisters, cousins and aunts to the good ship, are truly fanciful creations that received well-earned applause as they made their grand entrance.

It all adds up to a "Pinafore" that is as fresh today as when it was first performed thanks to an incredible assemblage of talent and skill that has turned it into an up-to-date musical with no sacrifice of the creative genius of the original. It's another show not to miss at the Stratford Festival this summer.

"We're just delighted to have the opportunity to host a worldclass event like this and to have the top sailors in the world competing," he said.

Although registrations aren't complete, there have been indications that Bud Melges, Mark Reynolds, Ed Adams, Paul Cayard and possibly Dennis Conner will be among the competi-

The Grosse Pointe Yacht Club was chosen to host the North American Championships because of the job it did last summer when it held the Star Class district champion-

ships.
"The sailors who competed last summer had nothing but good things to say about the way the event was run," Palm said. "They had sailed in regattas in Chicago, Cleveland and Toronto, among others, and said what a wonderful facility we had here."

That glowing endorsement of the course and facility prompted the GPYC to ask the Star Class governing body about hosting one of the major events on the circuit.

'We told them that we'd be interested in hosting one of their events and they replied that they would be very interested in having it here," Palm said. "That set things in motion. This will be the first major world-class sailing event on Lake St. Clair in some 20 years."

Palm thinks it's a shame there haven't been more events like this on Lake St. Clair.

There are between 200 and 300 boats on the water each weekend," Palm said. "We want the world to know that the Pointes and Lake St. Clair are a great place to race.

"We have great fresh water, which sailors like much better than salt water, beautiful



breezes, especially in September, and what we call the 'Sweetwater Chop,' which makes the lake challenging for the boater.'

Star Class is the oldest and most-competitive one-design class in yacht racing. Frances Sweiguth's original design in 1911 has remained virtually unchanged except for some modern technical and material improvements. And they've been made only within the highly disciplined and closely governed specification and rules program.

"We feel that yachting is the most thoroughly disciplined sport there is," Palm said. "It takes every human discipline to be a successful sailor. You need brawn, you need patience, you have to have an understanding of the rules and of the water. A successful sailor has to be something of a meteorologist in order to take advantage of the winds."

Palm hopes that the North American Championships become more than just a regatta. "We want it to become Grosse Pointe Race Week," he said. "We want all the communities and the merchants to get involved. We want this to be a showcase for the Pointes.

"We hope the sailors who are competing bring their families along and make this a vacation where they can enjoy the ambiance of the area. Mid-September is a beautiful time of the year here."

There's an added attraction for sailing enthusiasts, because Crescent Sail Club will be hosting the Snipe Class North American Championships the week before the Star Class regatta.

Palm and his committee have put together an outstanding group of race officials. The race jury is headed by Commodore Lynn Stedman, a past president of the United States Sailing Association.

Race management will be under the direction of Commodore Tom Adams of Chicago, one of the top race officers in the business and a former Star Class world champion. He'll be assisted by Commodore Ted Everingham, who worked at the America's Cup Challenger Series in San Diego.

"When we tell the sailors who's on the jury and who's on the race committee, they're even more eager to come here," Palm said. "They know the race will be officiated by the best in the business."

Palm said there have been many corporate sponsors interested in lending their names and support to the event.

"The interest has been tremendous," Palm said. "We hope to keep it a first-class event and have it year after



SCS leads YourHome communities in new construction

By John Minnis

St. Clair Shores led the pack in new-housing construction last year among the seven suburban-east communities comprising the YourHome circulation area.

The five Grosse Pointes, Harper Woods and St. Clair Shores posted a net gain of 28 new housing units in 1991, according to the annual new construction report published recently by the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments (SEM-COG).

The report is based on new construction and demolition permits issued by SEMCOG's member communities.

Sixty-eight new-housing permits were issued last year among the seven YourHome communities. St. Clair Shores led the way with 46 permits, of which 30 were for single-family homes.

Eighteen units were demolished in St. Clair Shores, for a net gain of 28 housing units.

Two condominium developments by local builders contributed a large part of the new construction in St. Clair Shores.

Piku Management Co. is building a "planned cluster project," called North Shore Villas, in St. Clair Shores on Masonic near Jefferson and Memorial Park.

Piku's development calls for 40 new condominium units — four units in each of the 10 ranch-style buildings planned. The two-bedroom units with full basements and attached garages go for less than \$100,000.

Twenty of the units have already been built and all but four have been sold. Piku recently broke ground for building the last 20 units.

"We're responsible for 16 of the units," said Frank Piku, commenting on the new-construction permits issued in the Shores last year.
"People are walking in here and are impressed."


Harbor Place, on the water near Nine Mile and Jefferson, is a multimillion-dollar development consisting of terrace homes and townhouses being built by The Blake Co., based in Grosse Pointe. Blake began construction in 1989 with the first phase consisting of 15 units in the \$300,000 to \$500,000



The next phase, started last October, includes a series of cluster homes in the \$259,000 to \$289,000 range.

"They're filling up very nicely," president Christopher Blake said of Harbor Place. He said home sales have picked up considerably, and his workers have broken ground on four new homes at Harbor Place.

The five Grosse Pointes experienced no net gain in housing units as the 19 new-unit permits issued were offset by the same number of demolitions.

Nine units were demolished in Grosse Pointe City, while permits for two new single-family homes and four duplex units were issued. resulting in a net loss of three housing units.

Seven of the demolished singlefamily homes were on Cadieux Road and were owned by Bon Secours Hospital, which razed the structures to build a parking lot.

"It was a banner, banner year for demolishing homes here," said

Chris Bremer, assistant city manager, adding that the razing of homes is unusual.

Grosse Pointe Farms experienced a net gain of two units with seven single-family construction permits being partially offset by five demolition permits.

Six of the new single-family homes in the Farms were built by Blake, five of which were in the Scherbrook subdivision. The sixth was on a vacant lot at Lothrop and Grosse Pointe Boulevard.

No new construction or demolition permits were issued in Grosse Pointe Park in 1991.

Three new single-family permits were granted in Grosse Pointe Shores last year. No demolitions were slated.

Three new single-family homes got the go-ahead in Grosse Pointe Woods last year. There were five demolitions, for a net loss of two housing units.

The three new single-family permits issued in Harper Woods last year were offset by an equal number of demolitions.

A 30-year mortgage will enable you to make the lowest monthly payments. However, the longer the life of the loan, the more you will pay in interest charges, and the longer it will take you to build equity in your home.

Both 20-year and 15-year mortgages are being promoted more

widely these days. When compared to a 30-year loan, these mortgages offer home buyers an opportunity to save thousands of dollars in interest.

Biweekly mortgages are similar to other standard fixed-rate mortgages, except that the lender requires a payment every two weeks. When you pay your mortgage biweekly, you make the equivalent of an extra month's payment each year, thereby reducing the life of your mortgage.


Adjustable rate mortgages

If you are buying a home with the thought of moving within five years, you may want to consider an adjustable-rate mortgage (ARM). ARMs offer interest rates and monthly payments that are initially lower than fixed-rate mortgages. However, these rates and payments fluctuate according to changes in a predetermined index, commonly the interest rate on U.S. Treasury securities.

Each lender carries different provisions for adjustable-rate mortgages. such as caps on interest rates. Also, look for an ARM that allows you to pay a fee to convert it to a fixed-rate loan.

Q. Our back yard is a disaster, especially in the spring. When the snow melts and it rains, it floods a lot. Our yard is lower than those of the surrounding houses, and I've tried a few truckloads of dirt, but it doesn't help; we don't want to flood our neighbors' yards. We've also checked with an irrigation company, but it's quite expensive. We would like to sell the house, but this problem would indeed turn off potential buyers unless we list the house as lakefront property. Do you have any ideas?

A. Take heart. You won't have to list your home as lakefront property. There is a relatively simple and inexpensive solution to your problem.

Since you didn't provide specifics, I'm going to assume you don't have a downspout or leader that discharges rain water into your backyard. Taking into consideration the amount of water that remains in your yard, I would strongly suggest building a couple of drywells. Drywells are a good way to dispose of excess water from the roof, gutters, downspouts, and natural rainfall.

To construct a drywell, dig a hole in the yard where the obvious low point exists. This will require some

tunneling, and the hole should be deep enough to accommodate a 55gallon steel drum. The top of the drum should be approximately 12 inches beneath the surface of the yard. Before you dig, take precautions and check for any underground utilities.

You can now begin by drilling lots of holes in the drum with a power drill. Also, punch large holes through the bottom of the drum for drainage. Place the metal drum in the hole and fill with old broken bricks, masonry debris and top off with smaller gravel. The circumference of the drum should also have gravel and/or other stones filled in around it. There will be no cover or lid placed on the drum.

Finally, replace the dirt by shoveling loosely and pack it on top of your drywell. You will probably have to replace some lost soil at times due to settlement. If needed, you may wish to position additional drywell at another low point in your back yard.

Q. My grandmother's silver pat-

tern was "Repousse" by Kirk and Son. I just saw some old pieces in an antiques mall and they were marked "Rose" by Kirk Stieff. When did the companies merge?

A. "Repousse" is a Kirk pattern that was first made in 1828. "Stieff Rose" is a different pattern that was first made in 1892. Both have handles that are completely covered by raised flowers. It is easy to confuse the two patterns. Samuel Kirk started marking silver in Baltimore in 1821. The company changed names through the years and became Samuel Kirk & Son, Inc. from 1924 to 1979. It became The Kirk Stieff Company in 1979. "Repousse" is still being made.

Q. I have a wooden Fisher-Price pull toy shaped like a chicken. It has gears attached to the wheels that make it clunk when pulled. It says "Katy Kackler" and "Red Hen" on it, but it is not dated. When did Fisher-Price first make toys? How old is mine? I bought it in a thrift store for \$1.

A. You made a good buy. The

Antiques by Ralph & Terry Kovel original Katy Kackler was made in 1954. The large wooden chicken was made in several versions over the next 14 years. If it is the original and in mint condition, the toy is worth over \$200. It is worth much less if it is worn. Fisher-Price has been making toys since 1931. The earlier toys with no plastic parts are constantly going up in value.
