

## 4 Pointes sign up for futuring study project

There seems to be a lot of talk about the future among local city councils these days.

That's because the five Pointes and Harper Woods are being asked to participate in a project to plan now for their combined future.

The project was initiated by Grosse Pointe Farms Mayor Gregg Berendt, who appointed a committee of three councilmembers - John Danaher, Gail Kaess and Terry Griffin two residents - Pat Jeffs and Bill Burgess - and city manager Rich Solak to come up with a way for the Pointes to work together toward a common goal.

They brought in Edward D. Barlow Jr., a nationally recognized futurist, to see if there was enough interest among the communities to pursue the matter further. After a meeting in early May Barlow was commissioned to draft a project proposal to present to the cities.

To date Grosse Pointe Farms and Shores have approved participating in the project. Grosse Pointe City has approved it provided a "substantial number" of the other cities participate. The Park said it would join as long as four others signed up.

The Grosse Pointe Woods council is expected to discuss the project at its Aug. 17 meeting. James Leidlein, Harper

Woods' city manager, said the idea is still under discussion. Both cities have until Aug. 21 to make a decision.

If all six cities participate, the project will cost \$60,000 with each city kicking in \$10,000 - \$5,000 of which will be in cash. The other half will come in the form of in-kind services such as secretarial work and use of city supplies.

The contribution will change if any of the cities fail to participate, but what the difference will be has not been determined.

Barlow's proposal said the project should take approximately 12 months - possibly starting in September if all the cities fall in line soon - to come up with goals and suggestions on how to reach them.

based on comments at two meetings of city officials interested in the project. Those task forces are: public facilities and services, financial and economic vitality, beautification and preservation, human services, leisure and cultural, and public safety. A steering committee would be appointed to oversee the work of the task forces and Barlow would work directly with that committee.

Danaher, who helped bring Barlow to the Pointes, said the project is important to the survival of the area.

"We in the Pointes cannot continue to go on as we have in this economic climate," he said. "We're going to find it increasingly more difficult to fund our current programs with cutbacks in funding from Lansing. And we can't just keep taxing our residents. There are certain economies of scale that can be realized in all aspects of government.

In agreeing to participate in the project, Park Mayor Palmer T. Heenan told his council, "There may be some reason why we should do this. There may be some cost efficiencies (if. the Pointes and Harper Woods combined some services) that should be looked into." Grosse Pointe Shores presi-

A woman who lived in the house asked him to help put her sick Collie in her car, so she could take it to the veterinarian.



## Parking variance granted by Woods

A small company that provides consulting services to financial institutions across the country can move into an office building in the 1800 block of Lancaster, now that it has received a parking variance from the Grosse Pointe Woods City Council.

Under the city's zoning ordinance, Automated Management Systems Inc. needed one offstreet parking space on the property it recently purchased on Lancaster.

Because there is no room for off-street parking on the property, the company needed a variance for one space, even though the firm's president, Thomas A. McPharlin, said he had made arrangements with nearby Jiffy Lube to use two of its parking spaces.

Parking variances are hard to come by in Grosse Pointe Woods, because the council does not want to increase traffic and

The council agreed to grant the variance in this case because Automated Management Systems Inc. has no retail busi-

McPharlin said the firm only has two employees (himself and an assistant), and its clients are out-of-state and will not be visiting the office, which mainly will be used to store files.

"So any increase in traffic will not be because of my business," he said.

Voting for the variance were Mayor Pro Tem Thomas J. Fahrner and councilmen James Alogdelis, Ted L. Bidigare, Peter R. Gilezan and William W.

Wilson. Mayor Robert E. Novitke and councilwoman Jean Rice were absent.

McPharlin also is planning to add a 192-square-foot, secondfloor addition to the building.

Currently, the first floor has 650 square feet of useable space. McPharlin said he will lose some room on the first floor when he remodels it to comply with federal barrier-free access rules (which benefit handicapped people). He said the second floor will only be used for storage.

His project was approved by the Grosse Pointe Woods planning commission in July.



## Volunteers rough it to preserve America's wilderness

Staff Writer And how did we spend our symmer vacations?

If you ask Ann Gillard of Grosse Pointe Woods, she'll tell you she spent hers in the Appalachian mountains, waking up in a tent around six every morning, hiking at least a few miles to work every day and spending eight hours trimming tree limbs and clearing mountain trails.

She had the time of her life. Gillard was one of 426 high school students chosen from more than 2,000 applicants to be a member of a volunteer crew with the Student Conservation Association (SCA).

The association, a nonprofit educational organization, that provides expense-paid volunteer field experiences for high school and college students and adults in national parks, forests and other wilderness areas.

High school student volunteers, ages 16-18, typically spend four weeks working on environmental or ecologial restoration projects, such as trail construction and rehabilitation, and a final week hiking, camping and having fun. The students can be placed anywhere from Yellowstone National Park to Richmond (Va.) National Battlefield Park to Denali National Park in Alaska.

Gillard, 18, who heard of the program from a friend who had joined three years earlier, requested placement in the Mount Rodgers National Recreation Area in southwest Vir-

"I really liked the area. It has the most beautiful, fantas-

tic scenery I have ever seen," said Gillard. "And I especially liked the forest service people and the rangers. They were all really nice. I hope to be working, eventually, for some of the people I met.

Gillard, who plans to start college next month and will receive college credit for participating in the program, said students don't have to declare that they're going into natural resources or environmental fields to be accepted into the pro-

"I've always been interested in helping out the environment any way I can, but I just love being outdoors. My crew members felt the same way," she said. "They're just looking for people who really want to learn about everything in general about the outdoors. I've learned more about trees than I ever would have believed."

The high school crews, com-

prising six to 10 people and an experienced SCA leader, work on maintaining, repairing or even draining old trails and, sometimes, practically building new ones.

'We get up around 6:30 that wasn't too much fun, but our leader liked to get up early eat breakfast, pack a lunch and walk to our trails, about 45 minutes away," said Gillard.

The students cleaned up the trails, removing rocks or anything else that might be cluttering them, set up new drainage paths with logs or rocks to redirect the flow of rainwater, and cleared branches from the sides and overhead.

"Surprisingly for an environmental group, we cut down a lot of trees. The trail had to be 4 feet wide by 10 feet high to accommodate people and horses," said Gillard, who said that that was one of her duties for the month.

"It teaches them all the work that goes into all of these trails in our parks and forests and, at the same time, a love for nature," said Debi Monroe, a national coordinator of the program, who just happened to meet Gillard this summer while visiting the Mount Rodg-

"That was a great bunch of kids up there. She (Gillard) just worked, worked - but she seemed really happy."

Monroe said SCA has sent mailings to over 17,000 high schools but they find most of the teenagers who are accepted learn about the program through word of mouth.

"The only thing it costs them is getting to and from here and

we offer a lot of financial assistance," Monroe said. "We get kids from all income levels and backgrounds - black, white, Asian, Hispanic, Native American, urban and rural. A lot are just interested in the outdoors and want to do something in

Gillard said the theme for SCA and most wildlife groups is "No Trace," which means

leaving the natural wildlife area looking untouched by humans.

'We had an occasional campfire, but they aren't good for the environment because they destroy the ground, leave ashes and char the surrounding rocks. That impacts the ecosystem because then animals change their habits. We basically didn't do anything the animals would notice," she said. Gillard said she'd like to re-

turn to the program next summer as a resource assistant, a program which sends approximately 1,000 college students anywhere from Hawaii to Puerto Rico to assist with wildlife research, provide visitor information and educational programs and do archaeological surveys and other tasks. Research assistants are also volunteers, but airfare, food and lodging are paid for by the

Was Gillard happy to return to the real world?

"In some ways, yes. I mean, it's nice to have running water again and a bed to sleep in. But as I was flying in over Detroit, all I could notice was just how flat everything was. It was just so beautiful in Virginia," she said.

SCA is supported by foundations, corporations and more than 12,000 SCA members.

It would be like the awardwinning PBS series "The Civil War," only shorter, and more localized.

That's how members of the Grosse Pointe Historical Society envision the documentary they want to make about the history of Grosse Pointe.

"What I would like to do is open with how Lake St. Clair got its name," and then cover the highlights of Grosse Pointe's history up to the present, said Mike Skinner, cochair of the society's videographics committee.

Like the Civil War documentary, the video would consist mainly of still photographs.

"We'd pan across the photos, of focus on a person in the photo, and then pull back to show a historic building the person is standing in front of. In those ways, we'd give movement to the still photographs,'

Ideally, each photo would be shown for about five seconds, which poses a big problem, Skinner said.

"We'd need about 360 photos or drawings, and we don't have nearly that many," he said.

The society has advertised for historic photos, but so far, the response from the public 'has not been good," said Olivia Mandel, president of the society.

"It's hard for people to get excited enough to go through their attics and look through their drawers for old photos, when they don't know anything about the project," she said. "We know there are old photos out there. We just hope people

The videographing would be done in-house by Skinner and the husband of another society member who owns a video production company.

Skinner, who grew up in Grosse Pointe City but moved to Dearborn a few years ago, is the human resources and payroll manager for Technicolor in Livonia, a video company that specializes in duplicating videos for Disney.





## Yes, folks, we can have our beef and eat it too

It's not where's the beef, but what's the beef?

That's a question that might well be asked of Jeremy Rifkin, a Washington, D.C., philosopher-activist who alleges that there is an international conspiracy by the industrial nations to subjugate the world's poor and plunder the Earth of its soil, grain and water by keeping beef a mainstay in the diets of affluent countries.

In his book, "Beyond Beef: The Rise and Fall of the Cattle Culture" (Dutton), he lays out a campaign to convince Americans to stop eating or at least drastically reduce their consumption of beef.

A steer for Rifkin is not so much meat as it is a metaphor for everything wrong with the late 20th century.

A report in the Tufts University Diet and Nutrition Newsletter says the picture he paints is one-sided and the solution he proposes so simplistic that he distorts what are legitimate

According to Rifkin, Americans are fat and dying by the millions of cardiovascular disease, colon and breast cancer and diabetes specifically because of beef consumption. But he never points out that Americans were overweight long before beef became the most popular meat in the United States in the early 1950s, or that they are still overweight now that consumption of beef has been overtaken by poultry in the American diet.

He also blames beef-eating for cancer and heart disease. Eating too much fat has been linked with certain cancers and consuming too much saturated fat and cholesterol is one of the risk factors of heart disease. But together, pork, poultry, dairy products and eggs provide far more of the fat, saturated fat and cholesterol Americans consume than contributes beef.

Rifkin also has another beef about beef:

He claims that beef production is "one of the most destructive environmental threats of the modern era" and provides a disturbing description of the ecological ruin that clearing rain forests for grazing land has caused in Central and

South America.

Pushing the guilt complex further, he says that the production of a single quarterpound hamburger from a steer raised in Central or South America involves the eradication of 165 pounds of living matter that comes from different plant, insect, mammal and reptile species.

What Rifkin neglects to add is that less than 1 percent of the beef Americans eat is imported from Central and South America, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture and even that small amount is steadily declining.

As for the impact of cattle production on global warming, steers do exhale methane gas, which rises to the atmosphere where it traps heat escaping the Earth and thus helps to

create the "greenhouse effect." Again he forgets to add that cattle are not the only culprit.

Coal mining, oil and gas drilling, the incomplete combustion of fossil fuel, the burning of vegetation and our wetlands all produce large amounts of methane. Rice paddies and termites alone produce almost as much methane as

Another problem with beef, Rifkin asserts, is that because some people eat it, a billion humans are starving. He maintains that more than half of the grain harvested in the United States is fed to livestock and if we were to reduce our cattle production, we could use our agricultural resources to grow more food for starving humans instead.

He ignores the dilemma that

the production of grain in one capabilities. area of the world does not guarantee that it will be used to end hunger elsewhere, as evidenced by the fact that the U.S. grain surplus has reached 200 million tons.

In fact, in the United States alone, 60 million acres of cropland have been withdrawn from grain production to prevent agricultural surpluses from depressing prices.

The unfortunate reality is that in many areas of the world, hunger is as much a product of politics, civil wars, entrenched wealth, inefficient distribution networks and corruption as it is of inadequate food supplies and production

So while we realize that beef should not be the mainstay of our diet, we should not feel that we are digging our graves with our teeth, polluting the air or depriving the hungry if we enjoy a steak, a luscious piece of roast-beef or a hamburger. Beef is not America's favorite meat for nothing. Look at it as one of life's little rewards.

If you still feel uneasy, try cooking a 10-ounce steak for one person by cutting the beef into cubes and placing it on skewers along with peppers and other vegetables. That way you can have your steak and still be socially conscious.



## What did we find out from our primary?

Tow that the primary is over, the question is not just who were nominated but what did the rest of us learn from it?

By this time, you readers know the answer to the first part of that question, although the writer, facing an early Tuesday deadline, doesn't know the outcome.

During the campaign, however, we learned that it is possible to challenge the cumbersome reapportionment machinery and win.

That is what officials of Grosse Pointe Park and Wayne County did after the county apportionment commission played blatant politics in shifting the Park into a district in which the voters of Detroit predominate.

Pursuing their appeal to the state Supreme Court, the Pointes won a notable victory by forcing the apportionment commission to restore the Park to the 1st commissioner district, thereby giving Republicans a chance of victory in November.

## Opinion

That successful appeal also helped attract a primary field of five Grosse Pointe candidates, three Republicans and two Democrats. That means the Pointes ought to be assured of a new commissioner who values their interests, regardless of which nominee wins the November face-off.

We also learned from the primary campaign that challengers who filed in the 14th and 15th congressional districts campaigned hard to displace both incumbents, Reps. John Conyers and Barbara-Rose Collins.

Both are fairly liberal Democrats who were favored to be renominated but neither one has done much for the people back home. And so both were challenged by both black and white candidates who found plenty of reasons to criticize them

Both Conyers and Collins are vulnerable, and not just on their lack of performance. Convers had issued 273 "bad"

checks in posting one of the worst records in the House banking scandal. Ms. Collins had overspent a higher percentage of her appropriation for her franking (free mailing) privilege than any other member of Congress.

In both districts, reapportionment provided challengers with an additional incentive because redistricting added territories that neither incumbent had represented in past years.

This is the first time that Convers has represented the Woods, the Shores and Harper Woods and even though he had opened an office in Harper Woods, he still isn't very well known in those additions to his district.

In fact, his district, which looks like a pistol on the map because it runs from Dearborn Heights across the entire western half of the city of Detroit to Grosse Pointe Shores, encompasses some of the state's poorest people in Detroit and some

of the richest in the Shores.

The 15th District, which added Grosse Pointe Farms through reapportionment, had included the Park and the City in Rep. Collins' first term, but she, too, lacks much knowledge of the Pointes, which makes us wonder why she says she wants to represent us.

From even her own comments, she obviously doesn't hear much from the Pointes by mail except for routine questions for information about applications for the military academies and queries about problems with federal Social Security and Medicare services.

If she survived the primary, she may face a tough contest in November. Dr. Charles Vincent, who ran as a Democrat in 1990, conducted a vigorous campaign under the GOP banner this year and was t expected to capture the party's nomination.

Even if the incumbents win in November, the primary campaigns have raised hopes that both will do more to bridge the gap in interests and understanding that now divides Detroit from its suburbs.

Perhaps they will even try to satisfy not only the voters who supported them but those who criticized their failure to do very much to represent the home folks, including those in the Republican Pointes.

view from the sidelines hen President Dwight Eisenhower nominated Harry Blackmun to the federal court of appeals in 1959, Blackmun was described as a "nominal Republican" and a politi-

cal moderate. Now, however, Blackmun is often refered to as a liberal because of his 1973 Roe vs. Wade Supreme Court decision that established abortion as a fundamental right and his continuing support for it, including his recent reaffirmation of that right.

In the first place, I doubt that he would accept either of those descriptions, political moderate or liberal, because he is, after all, a man of the law, not of politics.

When he was nominated in 1959 to the federal bench, he was rated highly by both the American Bar Association and the Minnesota Bar. The ABA committee on the federal judiciary gave him its highest recommendation, "exceptionally well qualified.'

At the time he was the resident counsel for the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn. A summa cum laude graduate of Harvard and a Harvard law school product, he had taught at the University of Minnesota Law School and had been in private practice with a prestigious Minneapolis law

In view of that record, it was no surprise when a delegation from the Rochester area, including Democrats as well as Republicans, asked the Minneapolis Star and Tribune to help dislodge the nomination from a Senate committee.

The paper quickly agreed. As the paper's editorial page editor, I wrote an editorial calling on Minnesota's Democratic senators, Hubert Humphrey and Eugene by Wilbur Elston

McCarthy, to back Blackmun, whose nomination had been caught up in senatorial politics.

Lyndon Johnson, then the Democratic majority leader, had held up a batch of judicial nominations because it included a Texan Johnson did not endorse.

The editorial was timely because the logiam had just broken. The Texan to whom Johnson objected had withdrawn and the president had nominated a successor acceptable to Johnson. The committee had cleared 10 other nominations but not Blackmun's.

Five days later, however, I was able to write another editorial complimenting the Senate as well as the Minnesota senators for responding to the demands for action by confirming the appointment.

Years later, long after writing a 1970 editorial for The Detroit News to applaud Blackmun's appointment to the Supreme Court, I sent him a note reminding him of the 1959 and 1970 editorials.

In his reply, he recalled especially the endorsement of his appellate court nomination, added that the editorial had "dislodged" it from the committee and concluded, "I know the editorial was instrumental in breaking the impasse."

If he was right, I suppose critics of Roe vs. Wade could blame me for starting Blackmun on an illustrious judicial career capped by his Supreme Court opinion for the first time establishing abortion as a fundamental right.

If so, I'll take the blame - and the credit from the other side - even though nobody knows how much longer Blackmun, now 83, will remain on the court and how much longer Roe vs. Wade will stand as the law of the land.

#### **Banking logic** To the Editor:

There is something that confuses me about the recent banking scandal our nation experienced.

The Federal Reserve System (FRS) is what is called a "bankers bank." It is stock owned. It has never been audited. No one knows, not even the Treasury Department, how much it costs to operate it. It pays no taxes. It also has its own insurance company (FDIC). Should some bank mismanage its funds, the depositors' funds are insured.

Now while the banks were insuring for larger and larger amounts (\$10,000 to \$100,000), they were paying less and less into the insurance fund.

A really win-win situation for the bankers.

Among the nastiest commercials were the radio ads that were used in the Wayne County sheriff's race, with charges and countercharges about lies and misrepresentations coming from the incumbent, Robert Ficano, as well as from his chief challenger, Wayne County Commissioner Kevin Kelley.

In congressional races, too, negative appeals also were widely used in interviews with the news media as well as in campaign advertising. Some of the most negative showed up in the 14th and 15th congressional districts which include the Pointes, with some of the worst namecalling coming in the 15th District.

Incumbent Rep. Barbara-Rose Collins saw Democratic challenger Tom Barrow's use of different messages to the black and white portions of the district as proof that he was playing the racist card.

Denying that charge, he claimed, in a Detroit Free Press interview, that she had questioned his "blackness" and commented that she "does very little for black people except sponge off them."

In the 14th District, there were some nasty long-distance innuendoes cast at each other by Rep. John Conyers and one of his challengers, state Sen. John Kelly, but their word match paled into insignificance with the reports of what happened in the 11th Congressional District.

There three Republicans running for the GOP nomination to succeed retiring Rep. William Bloomfield went to the airways to seek votes with negative ads on radio and television that blasted their opponents.

From the commercials, the issues appeared to emphasize abortion rights, the public's trust in candidates, the candidates' political ambitions and the influence of PAC funds.

Those matters are not very illuminating, if voters really want to know what the issues are in Washington as well as the kind of people who are seeking to go there from the 11th District.

But we'll know more about the effectiveness of negative appeals, no matter how obnoxious, when all the results are available for study. And if the winners used negative appeals, don't look for any change in November.

#### Air bags and children

This reminder from the Michigan Department of State

If you have a passenger-side air bag in your vehicle, do not use a rear-facing child restraint in the front seat. An air bag could strike and seriously injure a child from the sheer force of its deployment.

A forward-facing child restraint is OK - if the child's age and weight meet the manufacturer's requirements and the seat of the vehicle is moved all the way back to its farthest position.

Safety belts used in conjunction with air bags - this is the best way to protect yourself according to the state police memo. Even with air bags, it's still important to buckle up.

## Principles are fine — until they're tested

Percy didn't have much good to say about the levees along the river. Never mind that they were touted as saviors of the agricultural way of life. The ultimate in flood insurance. Oh,

For one thing, with levees along the banks, you can't gaze at the river. For another, once the floods do breach the walls, the water doesn't flow out again for weeks. Let's hope the Park doesn't experience that in the next 500-year flood.

Still, principles are easier to

maintain in the abstract than in actual concrete flesh and blood. Inveighing against berms is one thing, but when your own house is threatened, the gut reaction is to do whatever it takes to save it.

I've had some of my own dearly held theories tested in real life and found them emotionally darn hard to hang on to. Examples:

The gypsy moth population explosion should be allowed to run its course without interference from people, which will only make matters worse.

I believe that. But omigod, once I went up North and saw the horrifying globs of worms on the oaks, the occasional road closed because the caterpillars had made the surface too slippery, experienced the frass (that's caterpillar doo-doo) dropping on my head — well, the principle got a lot harder to stand on.

Out in California, they're arguing about legalizing euthanasia. I believe in the principle that the individual should have the right to decide his or her own fate. But trying to imagine myself when it comes to actually carrying it out, I have only to remember my feelings on holding my pet cat while the vet gave her a lethal injection. Thinking of her body going limp and lifeless, I realize how humanly difficult it would be to

make the decision. Here's another: Medical cures should be done by the least invasive method possible. Skip the heroic measures. I believe that, too.

But when a member of your family has a cancerous tumor, it's hard to remember. All you think about is that Thing growing away inside somewhere. Get it out. Fast. Forever. Whatever it takes

Even when personal considerations make it difficult to stick to theoretical rules, you still have to give it your best shot. George Bush has been finding this out about Saddam Hus-

Saddam seems to outwit Bush at every turn. The catand-mouse games he plays have even earned neat little rhyming names at the White House. Saddam's belief that the U.S. will bluster emptily whenever he violates the rules is called "threat-and-forget." And his brinksmanship is "cheatand-retreat."

That's pretty cute. But it doesn't make Bush's position

any easier. A new appreciation of the president's predicament has enveloped me lately, as I watch Bob play out the same roles with his time-honored adversary. The difference is that Bob has been utterly honest and forthright about his goals and single-minded in their pursuit. No false or misleading signals

It's the squirrel. He just won't stay off the birdfeeder, gobbling sunflower seeds until his little cheeks bulge.

Like Bush, Bob believed an understated warning was best to start with. So he knocked on the window and waved his fist threateningly.

The squirrel just watched. Postured, even.

Bob escalated, by charging out the door with a stick. Next, he tried a starter's pistol. Brandishing it abouve his head, he fired into the air.

Saddam-like, the squirrel was unimpressed. He recognizes threat-and-forget when he sees it. Like Bush, Bob began to realize that the only route to

was an unpalatable one: total annihilation. And the public wasn't going to put up with

Right now, they've achieved a temporary standoff with a squirt gun as enforcer. But Bob's foreign policy is taking a beating.

Emergency patients should enter the emergency area as


always. The west parking deck, across from the emergency cen-

#### Immigration to replace old cards

Beginning in August, the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) will require permanent resident aliens in the United States who carry a green card issued before 1978 to obtain new cards by July 31,

The old cards, known officially as the I-151, Alien Registration Receipt Card, will expire on that date because the INS is replacing them with newer, more sophisticated cards (I-551s) that may be read by machine, contain more identifying information, and are more resistant to counterfeiting.

The new card will contain the photograph, fingerprint, and signature of the person to whom it is issued. The cards are proof of permanent resident

immigration status.

An application form for the new card may be obtained by calling 1-800-755-0777. When the form is completed and two photographs are obtained, they must be brought to the closest INS office.

The application fee is \$70. Resident aliens who have been traveling abroad may also file a completed application at a U.S. port of entry upon their return.



#### Should students be held back?

Children who are held back and made to repeat a year in school often suffer emotionally and academically from the experience, according to Dr. William Irving, a psychologist who specializes in pediatrics and is on the medical staff of St. John Hospital and Medical Center, with an office in St. Clair Shores. "Children are retained more in the earlier grades because of the assumption that it's less harmful," he said. "However, when you interview even kindergarten and first graders, they are very aware that they were retained.

"If you take 100 children who are recommended for retention and 50 happen to go on because the parents decide against the retention recommendation, and you compare them about five or six years down the road, what you find is that kids who went on against the retention recommendation actually do better than kids who repeated a year."

Often a child's problems in school are oversimplified and described as "immaturity," Irving said, when in fact, a more comprehensive evaluation may reveal that the child has attention deficit problems or a hyperactivity disorder.

"Kids with short attention span, kids who have a hard time sitting still, whose work is characterized as being disorganized and sloppy, these kids look on the surface to be immature," he said. "But these kids in a one-to-one, many times, present as very mature.

"The biggest hazard, in my opinion, is the fact that the wrong question is even being asked. Instead of asking the question, 'ready or not?' we should be asking the question, 'if a child doesn't seem to be ready, what are all the possible reasons that might bring that child to our attention in the first place?'

He contends that children who are held back tend to gravitate toward the norm of their younger-aged peers, while their

underlying problems are never dealt with. There are four questions that parents should ask when their child's teacher recommends retention, Irving said.


"It's incumbent upon those recommending retention to explicitly state what their criteria is that they're using for retention. Are they just retaining a child because he seems immature?

"Secondly, we want that person making that recommendation to be able to, with confidence and reference to documented research, demonstrate what's going to happen when the child is retained. What are going to be the benefits that accrue?

"Thirdly, we also want the to consider the possible hazard that could accrue to the chile that is, emotionally and per haps even academically, as we know those children do not seem to make as many gains as kids that do go on.

"Lastly, we want them to also ask what are alternatives that could be tried? Are they simply going to recycle the child through the same material again? Is some sort of remedial assistance indicated, whether it be in or outside of special education?"

## Pointer's at sea, but not in her studies

Grosse Pointe Park resident Amy Verlinden wants to design boats when she graduates from college. That's why she chose the Maine Maritime Academy in Castine, Maine.

The school is one of five maritime academies in the country and in five years Verlinden will éarn a degree in marine systems engineering and receive her license to go to sea.

Most likely, she will also have a job, because placement of graduates from the academy is nearly 100 percent.

As part of the school's curriculum Verlinden must participate in three, two-month "cruises." That may sound That may sound nice, but there's no resemblance to "The Love Boat." The 533-foot training vessel on

which Verlinden spent part of May, all of June and part of July was a floating school complete with classrooms, drills and a regimented lifestyle worthy of a military academy.

The vessel at one time was a passenger ship that was used by the government to take troops to the Far East during the Korean War. It is still owned by the government but is on loan to the school so it can be used to give students first-hand seagoing experience.

"In order to get your license you have to have lived a military lifestyle," Verlinden said. "We'd have drills — lifeboat drills every week — and we had watch duties and had to work in the engine room. And that was in addition to classes we took every day."

The 300 students on board -

of which only 11 were women - also got a look at the world during their two months at sea. The ship, the T/V State of Maine, visited ports in England, Russia, Poland and Spain before returning home in early

In England Verlinden visited Stonehenge. In St. Petersburg, hosted by a Russian maritime academy, students saw the circus, ballet, symphony, the Hermitage, the czar's Summer Palace and spent an evening sailing in the Baltic Sea. In Poland, cathedral tours were the main attraction and in pain the World's Fair and the Rock of Gibraltar topped the agenda.

"We saw a lot more than I expected we would," Verlinden said. "But we also did a lot of

Verlinden spent a lot of time

in the engine room. "It can get up to 100 degrees in there, but it's good experience," she said. "And all freshmen get hazed by the upper classmen. They ask us to go get a bucket of steam or some propeller wash. There is no such

thing as propeller wash.' The engine room experience will come in handy later when Verlinden starts designing boats.


"I could have just gotten a degree in engineering anywhere, but because I want to design ships it seemed practical to get experience on ships," she said. Next year her classes which are strictly regulated and leave little room for electives - include engine thermodynamics, applied hydraulics and diesel power I.

But it shouldn't be too difficult for Verlinden, who was an honors student at South and did well during her first year at the academy - even during the firefighting training that was part of the curriculum. She also found time to earn a letter on the school's varsity sailing team.

"That was kind of interesting because I'd never really sailed before," she said, explaining that she was raised on powerboats.

Next year Verlinden will spend two months on another ship, one not affiliated with the academy, and the following year she will spend two months on another academy-run cruise.

Then, if things go as planned, she'll be designing boats for others to travel on when they see the world.



## Auto experts explain their lingo in audiotape interviews

Arthur Flax, formerly on the staff of Automotive News, recently introduced the first of what he hopes will be a series of audiotapes for auto enthusiasts and consumers who'd like to know more about the prod-

"Mechanical Masters, Modern Machinery" includes discussions between auto writer Flax and a half-dozen auto designers, customizers, racers and involved enthusiasts.

On the 45-minute tape, Flax interviews these experts on the lingo of auto technology and terms like overhead cam, torque, all-wheel drive and anti-lock braking systems.

"Originally I was going to explain these things myself, but then I decided to try what I call a 'magazine format,' one that includes conversations with people like Corvette Sting Ray designer Larry Shinoda and race car builder Bill Stroppe," Flax said in a telephone interview.

These "mechanical masters" express their opinions and describe their roles in derring-do adventures like hot-rodding on dry lake beds in California and driving in the "treacherous" Mexican road races of the early 1950s.

"While cars are gaining in speed, safety and efficiency, they are losing their souls,' Flax said. "In the past when a driver set off in something like a Pontiac GTO, he might not have been as certain as we are today that he would make his destination without incident, but he did know if something went wrong he could fix it.

"When we pop the hoods of our modern cars, we haven't a clue," Flax said. "We're more irritated than intrigued.

Music with a beat, plus a hint of roaring engines, accompany Flax's musings and his informative interviews. Although the host's interest clearly is racing, performance and the development of technology (his voice can't conceal his enthusiasm), he eases into modern applications of lessons learned on tracks and dry lakes decades ago for everyday driv-

For example, he asks suspension expert Dick Guldstrand what development in the last 20 years has had the greatest effect on handling improvements. "Tires," is the reply. "Wide, low-profile tires allow drivers to do more on the track and on public roads.'

Flax interjects himself into the endless debate over allwheel, front-wheel and rearwheel drive. Which is best? Racers tend to prefer rear drive. "If the front wheels start slipping on wet pavement, you lose control, whereas you can throttle-steer with rear drive," one says. Another owned an Audi with four-wheel drive and thought it an excellent car.

Chrysler LH sedans bow

One of the automotive designers interviewed on the Auto Lingo tape mentions the handsome, practical design of Chrysler's new LH sedans, now being assembled in Canada and soon to arrive at dealerships.



These all-new passenger cars will be sold as the Chrysler Concorde, Dodge Intrepid and Eagle Vision, and all will feature one of this year's important automotive buzzwords: cab-forward design. Chrysler says cab-forward first showed up on the Lamborghini Portofino 1988 concept vehicle, and Chrysler used the idea on a couple of its show cars the next two years.

Cab-forward moves the entire passenger cabin to the front. extending it over the front wheels. The rear wheels are pushed to the back of the vehicle platform. An "aggressively raked" windshield also extends farther forward (don't lose your sunglasses, or anything else, on the top of the extended instrument panel), its base resting somewhere over the front axle (on the other hand, here's an opportunity for someone to design a special fetch-it tool for lost sunglasses and sandwiches and market it through a place like Sharper Image).

Air bag update

MGA Research Corp., headquartered in Akron, N.Y., recently sent along a newsletter detailing some of its activities in the area of air bag testing.

That's a good business to be in these days, because federal legislation requires all new cars to have driver-side air bags by Sept. 30, 1994, and bags on both sides up front by Sept. 1, 1996. Ford Motor Co. said it sold 2.2 million cars with bags by the end of 1991, and last year alone General Motors delivered one million vehicles with supplemental restraint systems.

MGA runs a Crash and Sled Test Center in Burlington, Wis., where the makers of air bag systems components come for product evaluation. Test data obtained in a number of hair-raising head-on, side and angle crashes helps set standards for bag actuation, shaping anid positioning. The air bag market could reach \$4 billion in North America alone by 1997, according to a spokesman from Allied Signal's Bendix Safety Restraints Group.

Honda offers service centers American Honda Motor Co. is establishing "satellite service centers" across the United States, the company says. The dealer-owned centers are separate from the dealership facilities and are devoted exclusively to the service of Honda automobiles. The first satellite center opened in December 1991 in Madison, Wis., with a second



## How it worked in one city

By Ronald J. Bernas Staff Writer

In 1988, Farmington Hills of ficials looked at their city, saw it was 85 percent developed and decided that a plan should be instituted to make sure that the city didn't get over-devel-

They contacted Ed Barlow, a consultant whose work with several companies and municipalities on planning now for tomorrow's needs has earned him a national reputation.

"We looked around and saw that we were at the end of one century and the beginning of a new century and we wanted to know what we could do now to keep our city strong in the year 2000," said Richard Lampi, community development coordinator for Farmington Hills. "We wanted to fine-tune what we have so we could continue in the right direction.'

To generate enthusiasm Barlow hosted a kick-off community meeting outlining the proposed project and asking for volunteers. They needed 90 volunteers; 150 joined the effort.

While Farmington Hills planned the project for its own use, representatives from the bordering city of Farmington also participated.

"What we do affects them and vice versa," Lampi said.

The volunteers were divided into six task forces, each of which was to focus on a particular issue. The task forces targeted on beautification and environmental preservation, financial and economic vitality, human services, leisure and culture, public facilities and services, and public safety. Many of the task forces branched off into subcommit-

Each task force came up with a vision of the future and several goals and objectives to implement now to ensure the vision becomes a reality in 2000.

"They came up with fortysome goals, more than 100

objectives and hundreds of strategies on how to achieve those goals," Lampi said. "One of the difficulties was that we told them not to consider money; just to put down all ideas.'

Some of the ideas were simple and inexpensive to implement. One committee suggested adopting a city butterfly. Another suggested creating a warmer city image with use of "Welcome to Farmington Hills" signs at all city borders.

If some of the goals were too expensive - for example one task force suggested the city create a human services department - a cheaper way to achieve the same result was discussed.

And, as happens in all task force projects, the goals of one task force sometimes conflicted with the goals of another. The leisure task force wanted parks; the economic vitality task force wanted development.

The project - including printing of a \$30,000 brochure cost the city \$100,000.

Was it worth it?

"We think it was," Lampi said. "What we got out of it, because of the makeup of the volunteers, was a real crosssection document. It addressed the concerns of the seniors and families and businesspeople."

A steering committee, which oversaw the study stage and still meets to discuss progress made on the plan, was appointed. It has input on capital improvement projects and makes recommendations to the Farmington Hills City Council as to whether a proposed development meets the goals of the futuring report.

Lampi said the city is working toward achieving the 530 items the committees recommended.

"We won't implement the whole plan by the year 2000, but if we keep plugging away at it, we'll be in the right direction," he said.

"We Pointes have to cooperate among ourselves in something like this," he said.

Shores councilman John Monahan said the communities will realize a benefit even if nothing else but better intercity communication results.

"I'm very positive," Farms Mayor Berendt. "To have four cities say yes, that's terrific. This is a community project and the community will benefit from sharing ideas. And, this is a golden opportunity for residents to get involved in city government.'

"This project will work," Danaher said, "because it is citizen-driven.'

## Future Bryant, DiNello join retreat is 100 percent behind the project. in face of outraged boaters

Under pressure from the Michigan United Conservation Clubs and Michigan boaters, the state Senate recently abandoned the idea of using \$9.6 million from the Harbor Devel opment Fund to help balance this year's state budget.

Originally, the Legislature passed a bill that would have authorized borrowing the money for several years, but the Senate approved a companion bill by a one-vote margin to return the money by the first of next month.

"The outcry by MUCC and the boaters and others in the state has derailed the effort to use the boaters' fees," said Richard Jameson, assistant executive director of MUCC. "The boaters have prevailed and the boater fund is left intact."

Gov. John Engler first attempted to use the money to balance the budget when he issued an executive order in May transferring the funds. But when MUCC challenged the legality of the move, the order was rescinded.

Consequently, the fund was buried, at the urging of the Engler administration, in the Department of Treasury budget within the \$449 million general government appropriations bill HB 5520. The bill involved various programs, including summer jobs for kids.

Both houses of the Legislature passed the bill, thereby snatching the Harbor Development Fund from boaters. State Rep. William Bryant, R-Grosse Pointe Farms, and Sen. Gil DiNello, D.Clinton Township, voted for the measure.

"I only voted for it when it became clear that the passage of our government bill was a way of curing the problem of

balancing the budget," said Bryant, whose district includes Harper Woods.

"I certainly oppose such borrowing," he said. "It shouldn't be done and the money should be paid back as fast as possi-

Caving in to angry pressure by boaters, the state Senate recently passed a companion bill that will return the money to the fund by Aug. 1, effectively reversing its decision to use the boaters' fees to balance the





After the war, Dr. Posch opened his first practice in Detroit and joined the faculty of Wayne State University Medical School, where he established a fellowship for advanced training in surgery of the hand. He personally trained over 400 surgeons in this procedure through the fellowship.

In the 1960s, a group of hand surgeons from the program founded the Joseph L. Posch, M.D., Alumni Association, later known as the American Association for Surgery of the Hand, an international professional association.

World renowned as a hand surgeon at the forefront in diagnostic and surgical innovations, Dr. Posch taught all over the world, including Europe and Asia.

He was an adjunct professor on the teaching staff at WSU Medical School and was on staff at Bon Secours Hospital, St. John Hospital and the Detroit Medical Center.

Spending time with his family and relatives in Michigan and Minnesota was Dr. Posch's favorite pastime and, along with his faith, played the most important role in his life.







conservationist. He attended the seminary at Wittenburg University in Ohio and earned a master's degree in social work and theology from Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland.

Although he's an ordained Lutheran minister, he's one of the few who have never had a parish. But he feels both his work and his spare-time activities are a form of ministering.

Lutheran Social Services of Michigan is one of the largest social agencies in the state with a budget of \$40 million and a staff of some 1,500 people who run the nearly 50 nursing homes, retirement centers, group homes, foster homes and community centers in Michi-

He has worked as a group leader and social worker directly with the people for the same agency in Wisconsin and Michigan. As a vice president who deals with human resources he says he's a servant to the people who serve the people.

"And really, I see that as ministry," he said.

That's what he says about his work with the Boy Scouts. He was scoutmaster of Troop which meets at Grosse Pointe Memorial Church, for 15

"Scouting meant a lot to me as a kid and I said early on that I want to stay with it," he said. "It taught me self-sufficiency and promotes physical and emotional well-roundedness. The kids learn to do all this stuff outdoors and then they can easily transfer the skills indoors.'

Those skills are taught at monthly camp-outs where the boys must not only learn how to get along with each other, but learn other skills necessary to living a full life.

One of the more important skills the kids learn on the outings is not only how to cook outdoors, but also how to create a menu and shop for the food

on a budget.

The troop sometimes bestows the Silver Spoon Award on a patrol whose weekend menu was especially well-planned and prepared.

Steele, for his part, loves cooking outdoors and generally makes what he doesn't get on a day-to-day basis. Things like stews with dumplings and pot pies and - a special favorite cobblers. He's even cooked a turkey in an "oven" fashioned out of tin foil and four fires.

His two sons - one a music teacher like his mother and the other a law student - also

went through scouts and, like their father, earned the designation of Eagle, the highest rank a scout can achieve.

Because of his ministering background he has served as a chaplain for the last three national scouting jamborees. He describes his function at the outings as that of a low-key minister.

Borrowing another's phrase, he calls it one-legged counseling — the belief that counseling is no good if lasts longer than you can stand on one leg.

His proudest moments, he says, come when he sees former scouts head troops of their own.

"They're passing on something that's important," he said. "That means more to me than anything else."

His duties at work recently started taking up too much of his time and he stepped down as scoutmaster and has become assistant scoutmaster. But that doesn't mean he'll have trouble finding things to do.

His woodworking hobby has evolved into carving duck decoys. He's working hard now so when he retires his skill will be at a level where he can show and sell them. Although he's a long way from retirement, he's living up to the Boy Scout motto: "Be prepared."

"I enjoy everything I do because I keep everything in balance," he said.



## Cold, wet summer weather is no picnic for Pointers

The summer of '92 has not een good for outdoor concerts, r lifeguards, or people who eny using Grosse Pointe parks.

Of the seven concerts that ave already been performed in ne Grosse Pointe War Memoril's two outdoor summer conert series, six had to be moved iside because of rain.

The bad weather "has virnally cut our business in half," aid Suzanne Berschback, pubc relations director for the 'ar Memorial.

On Thursdays, concert-goers ere supposed to be able sit on ankets behind the War Memial and eat picnic dinners ey had brought while listeng to bands perform rock'n' ll oldies in the "Songs of ımmer" series.

Instead, the concerts were oved inside to the ballroom, nere music lovers ate their icnic dinner while sitting on ankets or at cabaret-style ta-

For the "Summer Music Fesval" series on Monday nights, eople could bring their own nic dinner or purchase diner at the War Memorial. hen the concerts were moved side, people had to eat their eals in the ballroom, and en go downstairs to the audirium for the concert.

"It still works out nice, beuse we have the facilities to old the concerts indoors, but 's just a beautiful setting then we can have them outde, by the lake," Berschback

There is one concert left in ach of the music series.

Tonight, Aug. 6, "Sun ound" performs its brand of goldies at 8 p.m. The War Memorial grounds open at 6:30 p.m., and tickets are \$6.50. Picnic dinners are not sold with this series, so you have to bring your own, and furnish your own blanket or lawn chair.

On Monday, Aug. 10, the Grosse Pointe Symphony performs at 8 p.m., followed by fireworks. The rain date is Tuesday, and the grounds open at 6:30 p.m. Tickets are \$7.50, \$12 for reserved seats.

Picnic dinners are normally sold with this series for an additional \$7.50 and with advanced notice, but the dinners are already sold out, Berschback said. However, she stressed that concert tickets are still available, and may be purchased at the door or in advance at the War Memorial.

For more information about the concerts, call the War Memorial at 881-7511.

The rain has also kept people away from Grosse Pointe parks this summer.

Four lifeguards watched as a lone swimmer did laps last Friday in the pool at Grosse Pointe Shores' Osius Park.

The temperature was a snappy 63 degrees under the cloudy, noon sky. Better to stay in the pool where the water temperature was a relatively balmy 76.

"We try to keep it at 79, but the heater can't keep up, because it gets so cold at night," said park director Mick Serafin-

"On days like this, we only get the die-hard swimmers," he

The brave swimmer was one of only a few residents visiting the park, and the only one who used the pool the entire day, Serafinski said.

"If it were sunny and 80 degrees out, this place would be packed," Serafinski said. "The end of July is usually the hottest time of the year in Michigan, but not this year.'

He acknowledged that park attendance was "down drastically" compared to last summer, but said exact figures had not been compiled yet.

Only 22,480 people used Windmill Pointe Park in Grosse Pointe Park in June, compared to 60,000 the previous June. Attendance picked up last month — 68,385 people visited the park, compared with 59,400 last July - "but that's because we've had a lot more swimming meets here,"

"A lot of these kids (lifeguards) are saving for college, and this wet weather isn't helping," he said.

But every cloud has a silver lining, right?

The reduction in employee hours is saving the cities a little bit of money, officials con-

Flowers and lawns all over Grosse Pointe have benefitted from the regular doses of rainwater.

"Our (the War Memorial's) gardens are certainly lush,' Berschback said.

Serafinski added, "We put a sprinkler system in the park last year, and I think we've only had to use it once this year."

And Zedan said, "We think the rain kept the fish fly population down this year, but we'd rather have the fish flies.



Mick Serafinski, Grosse Pointe Shores park director, said maintenance crews still have work to do, even if park attendance is down. For instance, rough lake water keeps washing seaweed onto the boat docks, which have to be cleaned, he said.



"A lot of people have been staying away because of the weather," she said.

Grosse Pointe Farms does not count park users, but "an educated guess is that attendance is down 25 percent," said Marge Galiff, Pier Park super-

In Grosse Pointe City, 20,922 used Neff Park in June, compared to 22,174 in June 1991, said Diane Zedan, park director. Last month, 20,385 people used the park, compared to 25,452 in July 1991, she said.

"This summer has been a big

bust," she said. In Grosse Pointe Woods, 49,789 people used Lakefront Park in June, compared to 53,034 people the previous June, said Kathy Brown, an assistant to the parks and recreation director. Last month, 63,989 people used the park, compared to 64,373 people the

previous July. Because of low attendance, lifeguards and other employees at Grosse Pointe parks have been sent home early on most days, or told not to come in.

In Grosse Pointe Shores, for example, lifeguards have had their workweeks cut by 10 hours, Serafinski said.



## Ad firm's 'White Papers' even educate rivals

Why are "baby boomers" div-

Why do "baby busters" feel so hopeless?

so hopeless?
And how does all this affect the marketplace?

J. Walter Thompson, one of the oldest and largest advertising companies in the world, offers answers to those questions in a series of leaflets it calls "White Papers."

Actually, the White Papers are printed on pastel-colored paper.

paper.
"That's just a name we use,"
said Blaise C. Newman, JWT's
vice president of special projects

"Generally, the term 'white papers' is applied to a strategic statement someone issues."

J. Walter Thompson's White Papers are available, free of charge, to anyone who asks, including schools, clients, and even competitors.

"We've been around for so long, I guess the temptation to see what we have on the various subjects is too great for our competitors, which gives us a chuckle sometimes," Newman said.

The 129-year-old company, which has 134 offices in 60 countries and 6,000 employees worldwide, offers generalized statements about the future based on its marketing research, but competitors have to figure out on their own how to apply those generalizations to specific clients.

"Traditionally, J. Walter Thompson has been known as the university of advertising," Newman said. "That's why we decided to publish this series, to help educate people."

The company published its first White Paper two years ago, and since then, they have been coming out about once every four months.

The first one, titled "People Buy Brands, Not Products," is a collection of excerpts from an address on brand image that was given by Peter A.
Schweitzer of Grosse Pointe Farms to a firm that markets

Ford vehicles in Australia.
Schweitzer, vice chairman of agency operations for JWT
Worldwide, has been with the company since 1975 and is responsible for directing the growth and profitability of all JWT offices throughout the world. He is also in charge of publishing the White Papers.

"We had so many requests for copies of his speech in Australia that we decided to publish it. The idea for the White Papers sprang from there," Newman said.

In the first White Paper, Schweitzer talks about the difference between a product (something that can be made in a factory and easily duplicated by competitors) and a brand (a company's personality and reputation, which make its products unique).

"All too often when companies talk about success, they talk only about products; brands are hardly mentioned at all," he writes.

That isn't good, he said, because people tend to buy brands, not just products.

Baby busters, defined as people born after 1964, may want to cry after reading "The Paradox Papers: Youth in the 90s."

In that White Paper, JWT says that baby busters were born at the wrong time — right after the baby boomers (those born between World War II and 1964), who greatly outnumber them.

"Being part of a numerically small generation should not be a bad thing. Historically, this should mean a shortage of be-

ginning workers, less competition for jobs, higher pay, in other words, a sellers' job market. But for the busters, history isn't working," the White Paper says.

That's because many baby boomers are stuck in entry level jobs for which they are overqualified, clogging the ranks of industry, according to JWT.

Twentysomething people think the way to get ahead is through higher education, but many can't afford it, and 66 percent of people who graduated from college in 1991 left campus without a full-time job, the paper says.

When baby busters do get a job, they have to start saving for the "three-way stretch" — their parent's retirement, their children's education, and their own retirement.

And save for retirement they should, because when baby busters retire in 2030, there will be only 1.9 people working for each person drawing Social Security, compared to 3.4 working persons in 1990.

"Finally, you (the baby buster) are looking forward to this so-called future with a dead-end job, scant hope for advancement until all the boomers die, and at best a 1 percent increase in income per year."

Because of this, and because

the majority of baby busters grew up in one-parent homes, or homes where both parents were working, they are looking for security in the products they buy.

They'll stick to established brands like glue, but they'll switch to new brands if the products are better than and different from the older brands, and if they can claim the new products as belonging to their generation, according to JWT.

Many companies think of baby boomers as being one target group, but they should really think of them as being two groups, JWT says in another White Paper, "The Paradox Papers: Marketing in Modern Times."

Older boomers are just about done raising their children, fairly well-off financially, approaching retirement, and loyal to the brands they have chosen.

Younger boomers are just starting their families, struggling to make ends meet, and feel like they've been cheated out of the prosperity older boomers have enjoyed. They are apt to try new brands if the brands "make a compelling argument."

Other titles in the White Papers series are "Creative Research in the 1990s" and "Buying... It's Not an Event. It's a System."







## Camp Wingford is not arf bad, guests agree

eature Editor Dogs and cats are referred to as

Fido's and Fluffy's vacations at Vingford Kennel in Avoca, near Port Huron, may have more in common with a child's trip to summer camp or a two-week visit to a farm than with a boarding facility for pets.

Guests usually arrive with duffle bags packed with well-loved blankets, beds or rugs, toys, leashes, favorite snacks, special food and medication.

Guests choose from indoor, outdoor or combination indoor-outdoor facilities. They get food just like home and lots of personalized affection and attention. They may choose twice-daily exercise times or an educational refresher course, and there's even the option of doorto door transportation in a specially equipped van. We try to make the dogs feel

like part of a family. This is very important, said Judith Biggs of Grosse Pointe Shores, who owns the kennel with her husband, Raychildren at camp. Some people re- adjacent field. fer to this as Camp Wingford."

Although most boarders are dogs, incoming campers may find cats, some pet birds, a duck or a few rabbits on the guest register.

Wingford Kennel is a boarding and training facility for family pets that promises most of the comforts of home - even emergency medical treatment if necessary. A local vet makes kennel calls.

For some guests, camp Wingford offers more amenities than they get at home: a romp through the apple orchard twice a day, for instance. Or a swim in the pond. A real person to play ball or Frisbee with. Some quiet time to sniff out

mond. "The dogs are treated like a few wild rabbits and birds in the And all guests get a complimen-

tary shampoo, blow dry and manicure before they go home.

Wingford Kennel has been boarding and training dogs since 1932. The facility was built by Emory Ford of the Wyandotte Fords. Raymond and Judith Biggs bought the kennel and the surrounding property four years ago. They're celebrating its 60th year this year.

"It always had a w**ond**erful reputation as a boarding facility," Judith Biggs said. "That's one of the reasons we bought it. And we've made even more improvements."

Manager Julie Nicholson lives on

the grounds and often takes campers home with her for the evening. "We think one-on-one time spent with animals helps relieve their stress." She owns a black Labrador retriever named Goose and she is waiting for her turn as a volunteer to raise a puppy for Leader Dogs for the Blind.

Nicholson said Wingford boarded about 10,000 dogs last year. It has space for nearly 100 pets and Biggs said they plan to add about 50 more indoor-outdoor kennels next spring.

Besides boarding, the facility offers two obedience training programs: one for older dogs and a program for puppies that begins when they're about 12 weeks old.

'We teach the puppy to heel and sit. He spends two weeks here," Nicholson said. "Then he goes home and his owner practices with him for six weeks.

"He comes back for another weeks here and learns to stay and for six weeks.

"Then he's back here for two

weeks to learn to heel, sit, stay and come when commanded when he's off the leash. Then he goes home for good."

Wingford has two full-time dog trainers. "We also teach dogs not to bark incessantly and we teach them to get in and out of a car or kennel on command," Nicholson said. "We have private consultations for specific problems and we have a housebreaking program for

"We don't teach attack," She said, explaining that the philosophy at Wingford is that pets are companions, not weapons.

Amy Krause, assistant manager. is also a groomer. Some campers get haircuts while they're visiting. Krause said the kennel has some local grooming clients as well.

Guests must have proof of up-todate inoculations against rabies and distemper as well as a vaccination for a highly contagious, though not usually fatal disease called canine cough.

Each pet's kennel has a prominently placed identification card with the guest's name, owner's name and vet's name; dates of arrival and departure; and special instructions for diet, medication and exercise. Next to many of the ID cards, postcards are stuck by tween the mesh of the cage. They're addressed to individual pets. Staff members read them to the campers. Some owners even call long distance, Biggs said.

"While I was on a Scandinavian cruise, I called my dog from on board the ship," she said.





Within the seven levels allowed a partnership to describe high card content and shape exemplary technique and judgment are mandatory if maximum bidding effectiveness is to be achieved. The consequences if you're not precise are most often consequential. Many of "the old school" of standard American devotees argue that complex systems used by the modern stalwarts have smothered the use of judgment. Not so, but recognize that abuses can destroy bidding systems and ultimately the partnership.

If you have total confidence in your partner's ability, a series of well founded bids tells much. Here are two examples of what I mean.

Sitting south you hold: The bidding K 10 9 8 N 1D Q 8 10 2H

After North's third call, you know this about partners hand. (1). At least 17+ H.C.P.; (2). Shape is 3451 or 3460; (3). None of your points are wasted. Slam should be investigated by asking for aces.


Sitting south you hold: The bidding 9 2H 3NT J 10 9 5 After North's third call, you know this about partners hand. (1). He transferred

you to hearts and bid diamonds twice. He must be at least 5-5 in the red suites with strong interest in slam as he passed up a no trump game; (2). Your three aces should guarantee twelve tricks. If you bid six diamonds, you may be missing a grandy. 4NT in this sequence would be ace asking.

Barbara Frank of Southfield is a very trusting partner whose wonderful personality is supplemented by many fine attributes. She's a lady in every way who is well trained and disciplined with an exceptional forty-some years of

playing experience. Add to all of that she's a grand mama of a pretty famous Michigan bridge family. Both her husband and celebrated daughter Judy Rankin of New York became life masters in '69, just a few months behind Barbara. Today she holds the enviable total of some seventeen hundred master points which places her high on the Michigan list. Of course, daughter Judy has gone beyond her mother's fondest dreams nudging the ten thousand mark. In fact, Judy is classed as a world master and certainly is one of North America's foremost women players.

Here's a hand from one of our games that epitomizes the garlands I have laid at Barbara's feet.



Four no trump by North on his third turn to bid was unusual for the minors as it was obvious from the bidding that there was a strong possibility of such a fit. Barbara's six club call was aggressive, but motivated by confidence that North had something. Unfortunately not much. True she was lucky to find the diamond honor on side, but West might have bid again with that card in her arsenal. With clubs behaving declarer had no trouble getting to dummy twice which won for her two hearts, a heart ruff, five diamonds and five

Much can be said for the defense cashing their spade ace against a slam. but West had visions of defeating the contract and abstained from the play.







## 'Kid' is a grand family romp

Ask any parent - surviving the Terrible Twos is an ordeal that tries the patience and frays the nerves, no matter how cute, lovable and precocious the child is.

The little cherub who was once a helpless, winsome, adorable infant becomes a menace to the household who spends the days breaking things and getting into places he or she



"Honey, I Blew Up the Kid," is the sequel to "Honey, I Shrunk the Kids," a 1989 summer hit in which Wayne Szalinski (Rick Moranis), an eccentric inventor, shrunk his kids. In this one, Adam, the youngest child of Wayne and Diane (Marcia Strassman) is typical of the Terrible Twos. (Adam is alternately portrayed by identical twins Daniel and Joshua Shali-

While the film begins with typical 2-year-old behavior and tantrums, viewers who remember the first film know that it

is a prelude to what is to come. In "Honey, I Shrunk the Kids," Wayne, inventor of contraptions equipped with laser beams that rearrange matter, accidentally shrunk his son and daughter and two neighbor friends to a quarter of an inch. With the help of the family dog, Quirk, who reappears in this sequel, they make their way back to the house across a lawn that to them was a perilous jungle.

Since then, several years have passed. The Szalinskis have moved to a Las Vegas suburb where Wayne Szalinski works for a laboratory which bought his idea of an electromagnetic ray that can enlarge objects.

When Wayne is left in charge of Adam and his older brother Nick while their mother drives their sister Amy (Amy O'Neill) to college, he takes them to the laboratory while he tries to work out some bugs in his invention.

Of course, Adam gets zapped and starts to grow.

By the time his mother arrives he is 7 feet tall, heading for 14 feet and trashing the house and terrorizing the neighbors. Finally a tent-like rope playpen is rigged up and for the time being he is restrained.

Leaving Nick in charge, his parents take off for the labora-

tory to retrieve the machine which will shrink the kid back to his original size. In the meantime, Adam gets loose and heads for the outdoors. In his travels he comes in contact with electromagnetic fields. He keeps growing until he reaches a height of 112 feet and the fun begins, all of it derived from distortions of perspective.

By this time Adam is a media item and is being pursued by his parents and police across the desert as he heads for the neon-lit streets of Las

A sub plot involving Wayne's obnoxious boss, played by John O'Shea, who figured in "Honey, I Shrunk the Kids," is back again in this sequel, sabotaging Wayne at every turn.

The twins are adorable with their curly mop of hair, twinkling eyes and mischievous

Strassman plays a devoted mother and patient wife who keeps hoping her husband will run out of ideas that affect the family. Lloyd Bridges, with perfect timing and finesse, makes the most of a minor role. Moranis, with his head in the clouds, is sweet and immeasurably likable.

All in all, "Honey, I Blew Up the Kid" is a thoroughly entertaining family romp and, with the exception of "Pinocchio," the only one around.

## 'Buffy' isn't as bad as you think

The worst thing about "Buffy the Vampire Slayer" is not the mediocre acting or the slowmoving plot, but the fact that sitting through it means you spent 90 minutes in a theater with a group of loud, rude teeny-boppers who showed up just to watch teen dream Luke



That's not to say "Buffy" is by any stretch of the imagination - a good movie. It's hilarious in fits, but peters out just when the momentum gets

It's what, in an earlier era, might be called the perfect drive-in movie: It's silly, the plot is ridiculously simple and

it's uneven, so if it were playing at a drive-in you could talk when it's dull and pay attention when it's funny, which is often enough to make you not too sorry you spent the money. But see it at a matinee.

Buffy (Kristy Swanson) is the queen of Valley Girls - a character straight out of Fox TV's "Beverly Hills 90210" only more vacuous and shallow, if that's possible.

She's a busy modern girl. She has a relationship with the school's dreamiest basketball player, is a cheerleader and is on the school's dance committee charged with the task of coming up with a socially conscious dance theme that isn't depress-

That's why she really doesn't have time for Merrick (Donald Sutherland), a strange man who appears in the oddest places and tells her she is the latest in a long line of women chosen to be a vampire slayer.

The idea of a one-dimensional Valley Girl on a mission to save the world from a centuries-old vampire God (played by Rutger Hauer) is ripe with comedic potential.

The script finds most of it, but the direction by Fran Rubel Kuzui and the acting by Swanson and the aforementioned Perry (as Buffy's love interest) leave a lot to be desired.

Like, oh say, timing. While no Carol Lombard (heck, she's not even Madonna), Swanson gets most of the humor out of her lines. Perry, on the other hand, is, well, not a comedian.

The best humor comes from Buffy's triumvirate of Valley friends whose shallowness is hilarious - and goes over the head of most of their contemporaries in the audience.

Paul Rubens, formerly Pee Wee Herman, turns in a spooky, funny cameo as a vampire who's having a bad hair reincarnation.

It's really an intermittently entertaining movie that will probably play better on videotape at home where you have quick access to a fast-forward button. But you really can't complain. Those who see a movie called "Buffy the Vampire Slayer" should know exactly what they're getting.

#### DSO's new CD is a work of art By Alex Suczek

As each new Chandos CD is released by music director Neeme Jarvi and the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, the remarkable artistic stature of our orchestra is further enhanced. The latest, just out, features all French music by Albert Roussel, Darius Milhaud and Claude Debussy and the quality of this disc, both technically and artistically, is at least equal and possibly superior to any other available recordings of these works.

From a technical standpoint, the richness of the sound achieved by recording in Orchestra Hall is simply magnificent. Careful comparison with recordings made in other halls reveals the remarkable balance of clarity and resonance that our acoustical jewel affords. And Chandos engineers have captured it faithfully. This alone makes Jarvi's latest release a treasure to acquire and But one must add to this the

fact that the performance is unexcelled. One could hardly ask for more understanding, consistent and inspired interpretations of the four works.

Roussel's Symphony No. 4 has crisp and often surprising turns of melodic and harmonic phrase. It and his "Sinfonietta" Opus 52 are not considered major works. Nor are they programmed very often. Yet they have a high interest level as a result of Roussel's intriguing synthesis of 18th century form and 20th century polytonality. Happily, the DSO's performance makes them highly accessible to the interested listener.

Milhaud's "Suite Provencale," Op. 152b on the other hand, is a readily appealing, lighter work. It provides a refreshing interlude between Roussel's challenging creations.

Concluding the disc with Debussy's three symphonic sketches, titled "La Mer," might seem unnecessary. "La Mer" has been recorded by just about every major and minor orchestra. Yet it provides a satisfying balance to this program of music from the Impressionist era and like the rest, it is a su-



perb performance with elegant orchestral sound and resonance.

The fact that the disc as a whole is also a tastefully balanced concert program is a bonus making this CD an exceptional prize in the mixed choices of the fast-growing CD catalog. Moreover, it could well become a collector's treasure. It certainly is a listener's treat today emphasizing once again the exceptional stature of our orchestra in this wonderful era of Jarvi's leadership.

## Kiwifruit — it's brown, it's furry and its taste is dreamy

added to your repertoire, kiwifruit is likely to become your favorite summer fruit.

Is it the color that refreshes, or the flavor? This fuzzy brown fruit from New Zealand has an emerald green interior with jet black seeds and a flavor reminiscent of strawberries, bananas, pineapple and melon. You'll know it's ripe when it is soft to the touch like a peach or an avocado. In the 1960s the kiwifruit was introduced to southern California and has thrived there and become an important crop, now available year-round.

Peel and quarter kiwifruit. Place in food processor with metal blade in place; pulse on and off until fruit is pureed but seeds are not crushed. Melt marmalade in small saucepan over low heat. Stir into kiwifruit puree. Chill sauce until thick. Makes 6 servings

Kiwi Crisp

Crisp: 1/2 cup flour 1/2 cup firmly baked brown 1/2 cup butter or margarine Work together flour, brown sugar and batter to form a crumbly topping; chill. Preheat

oven to 450 degrees. Kiwi Filling: 10 kiwifruits

1/2 cup granulated sugar Pinch salt 1/4 cup tapioca beads 1 teaspoon grated lime or

lemon rind. Peel and slice kiwifruit. (About 4 cups.) Mix together sugar, salt, tapioca and rind and toss gently with kiwi slices. Pour into a 9-inch ovenproof dish and cover with

chilled topping.

The Bard
takes root at Lakeside

Shakespeare's writings are full of references to flowers, plants, herbs and gardens and gardening in general, and it is evident that he had a great love for them.

He was not alone; gardening was popular almost to the point of obsession among many of his countrymen and women.

MARIGOLD

The purple violets and marigolds Shall, as a carpet, hand upon thy grave While summer-days do last.

Pericles, IV, 1.

This was the period when mazes, topiary gardens and knot gardens were status symbols among the well-to-do, and the cultivation of herb gardens was the delight of many women.

From time to time, renewed interest in Shakespearean gardens surfaces, and we are experiencing such a revival now. Perhaps the annual Shakespeare festival at Stratford, Ontario, has something to do with it.

At Lakeside Mall in Sterling Heights, wonderful things have been happening for the last three months in the creation of several authentic Shakespearean gardens as part of a Shakespearean Festival which will continue until mid-August and includes audience-participation theater, Elizabethan costume workshops, puppet shows and concerts featuring medieval and

Renaissance instruments.

To provide a suitable background for the festival, Lakeside is planting two Shakespearean knot gardens with herbs and flowers arranged in intricate patterns. Also, other smaller, single-flower gardens of daisy, rose, marigold, lily and carnation, or, as the Elizabethans called them, gillyflowers, are planted throughout the center.

In all of the gardens, only flowers and plants mentioned in Shake-speare's writings are used. Incredibly, there are more than 500 of them, and each one is labeled with a quotation from a play or sonnet.

Lakeside's resident horticulturist, Tom Petito, recalls being very bored with classroom-required reading assignments of Shakespearean works years ago, but new admits to a growing fascination with the Bard.

"I find myself quoting Shakespeare's sonnets to people," he says. "It's fascinating to find out about all the flowers Shakespeare

mentioned, how he used them and what they stood for. I think of Shakespeare in a completely different way now."

Also instrumental in creating the beautiful gardens was Karen MacDonald, marketing director for ROSE

Lakeside, who traveled to the Folger Shakespeare Library in Washington, D.C., and to the Stratford festival in Ontario to study their gardens.

The result is the only indoor authentic Shakespearean garden in the world.

Much of the planting in these fascinating gardens is symbolic, with meanings and allusions found in the plays and sonnets. Among these is the flower that fills Shake-speare's world more than any other, the rose — a symbol of love — and in particular the white ones standing for unity, symbol of the Tudor dynasty.

Other symbols growing in the gardens include mint (for virtue), white daisy (innocence), juniper (protection) and marigold (matchless beauty).

Lakeside Mall is located on Hall Road (M-59) and Schoenherr in Sterling Heights.

During the mid-1920s, there was a tremendous interest in Shake-spearean gardens in the United States and many large estates had meticulously authentic examples. Often excerpts from the plays were performed in the gardens, or Elizabethan garden parties were held.


At one such event, it was planned to present a performance of "Romeo and Juliet" on an evening in mid-summer. A stage was built against a background of tall junipers and pines, and minimal lighting was installed. Footlights were hidden in the rock garden at the edge of the stage and reflected in the artificial brook.

Much consulting of the Farmer's Almanac and other such sources, and research conducted by an interested astronomer, and meticulous rehearsing and timing then ensued.

The triumphant moment came during the performance when Romeo declaimed the line, "Lady, by yonder moon I swear . . ." and with a sweeping gesture pointed upward just at the moment when the full moon rose into view behind the junipers and pines. It was a sensational effect which was talked about for years.

Many gardeners in Shakespeare's time were experts in topiary and in the planning of mazes and knot gardens. The designs of

knots were usually very intricate and in some instances copied the patterns of the more geometric forms of lace, which were fashionable at the time. Sometimes they were patterned after the rosettes of "knottes," which were a fashion accessory, and were planned to be green in winter and bright with annuals in summer.



# Add color — or seating — with modular

Mix, match or stack these easy-to-build containers to provide a multi-level display of plants for your deck or patio. Or, invent them to create sturdy padded benches for extra seating.

Exterior dimensions of all the planters are identical — 15 inches square. Heights will vary, depending on the size of the lumber you select. By stacking two or more together, the variety of arrangements you can achieve is almost limitless.

The containers shown in the diagram use 2x4s for the smallest version, 2x8s for the midsize planter and 2x12s for the largest. You could also use 2x6s and 2x10s. The bases are made of 1x4 boards. All these sizes are readily available at any lumber retailer.


For economy, durability and good looks it is recommended you use either a naturally decay resistant species, such as cedar, or pressure-treated western softwood lumber. (Note: Always wash hands after handling treated wood and never burn scraps of treated wood in fireplaces or wood stoves.)

Even if you've never tackled a woodworking project, you should have no trouble completing these simple wood planters. Besides the lumber, all you need is a hammer, a saw, a power drill, a small tube of exterior use glue and about 30 stainless steel or hot-dipped galvanized 3-inch nails.

For each planter, you will need five lineal feet of two-inch dimension western softwood lumber (of any width) for the sides. You will also need a five-foot length of 1x4 for the base.

To make the sides, cut two lengths 15 inches long and two lengths 12 inches long. Place the boards on edge and arrange to form a 15-inch square, then fasten them at the corners with glue and nails, spaced two to three inches apart. To avoid the risk of splitting the wood, you may want to predrill the nail holes for the corner joints. Use a drill bit that is slightly smaller than the diameter of the nail.

For the base, cut the 1x4 into four, 14-inch lengths. Nail them side by side to the bottom of the square so they are inset a half inch from the outer edges on all four sides. Using a half-inch bit, drill six to eight holes in the base for drainage. To help protect the surface under your planters, cut two-inch squares from scrap pieces of



lumber and attach them as feet to the bottom corners.

To make a variety of sizes, select several widths of two-inch lumber, from 2x4s and 2x6s, all the way up to 2x12s. If you need extra outdoor seating, simply turn one or more of the deeper containers upside down and add a colorful cushion.

Pressure treated western softwoods may be primed and painted or stained to match your deck or patio, or simply use a clear water repellent and leave the unfinished wood to weather naturally.

# Home sales strong during first half of 1992

Sales of previously owned homes were notably higher in the first half of 1992 than during the same period for 1991, according to the National Association of Realtors.

The association recorded that existing-home sales totalled 1,703,000 units between January and June, which was 6.2 percent higher than the total of 1,604,000 units for the first six months of last year. The steady activity contradicts persistently gloomy economic news, and indicates that consumers are taking advantage of low mortgage interest rates, said NAR President Dorcas T. Helfant.

"The market is in good shape. Low rates have kept sales consistent," she said. "More and more buyers are deciding that now is the time to make a move."

The Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corp. reported that the national average commitment rate for 30-year, conventional, fixed-rate mortgages was 8.51 percent in June. During the first half of this year, rates started off at an average of 8.43 percent in January, then inched upward to peak at 8.94 percent in March, then steadily declined. Mortgage rates have generally remained at least one percentage point lower than during the same time last year.

"Anyone thinking of buying should get out and take a look at

what's available. In markets across the nation, there is a wide selection of homes in a broad price range. People who want to buy, but think they can't, could be surprised at how much they can afford," Helfant said.

The seasonally adjusted annual sales rate for existing single-family homes was 3.36 million units in June, down 3.4 percent from June 1991, when the resale rate was 3.48 million units. Helfant said the year-to-year drop primarily was due to extremely heavy activity in June 1991, as consumers flooded the market in a surge of buying following the victory in the Persian Gulf war. Although the rate fell below that of a year ago, last month's resale rate is "healthy and sustainable," Helfant said.

NAR Chief Economist John A. Tuccillo said the June resale rate reflects a temporary lag in a market that is more robust than it was one year ago.

"We've been experiencing a stall within a rise," he said.

He noted that the June slowdown in sales occurred as new doubts surfaced about the nation's economy. The Federal Reserve Board's action to lower interest rates early this month should boost home sales activity in the months ahead, he said.

"We expect mortgage rates to keep sliding," Tuccillo said.

The national median existing single-family home price for June was \$105,100, rising 2.9 percent from one year earlier, when the price was \$102,100.

In each of the regions, the January-through-June sales total was higher than that for the same period in 1991.

During the first half of this year, resales totaled 482,000 in the Midwest, up 8.6 percent from the total

for the first half of 1991. The resale rate in the Midwest was 860,000 units in June, unchanged from one year ago. The median existing-home price in the Midwest was \$82,300, up 4.4 percent from June 1991.

Currently, NAR is predicting existing-home sales to total 3.48 million units this year, rising 8.1 percent from 1991, and reaching the highest level since 1988.

The annual event is co-sponsored by the MIM and AIA Michigan to honor distinguished accomplishment in architecture by members of the AIA Michigan. Cast bronze "M Award" plaques will be presented to AIA Michigan architects, owners and MIM member mason contractors of each winning project.

Any building or project completed since May 1, 1989, is eligible for entry. Projects will be judged by three prominent architects from a major city not located in Michigan. The deadline for receipt of submission materials for judging is Nov. 30.

Winning projects will be announced in March 1993 at the 18th annual Masonry Awards Banquet for Excellence in Masonry Design.

## Antiques by Ralph & Terry Kovel

One of a kind? "It must be valuable. I've never seen another like it." This is a favorite saying of collectors. When you look at commercially manufactured advertising signs, toys or dishes, remember no manufacturer ever made just one of a salable

An ultra-expensive New York antique-toy shop went bankrupt late last year, and some of its rare toys were auctioned in England for thousands of dollars each. A tin carousel toy made about 1920 by Marklin was expected to sell well. It was in fine condition with bright paint and original transfers, and it was probably the first ever to be offered at a public sale. Most of the auction-goers had "never seen another like it." The carousel sold for \$85,100.

After the sale, a woman from London went over to the buyer with pictures of her toy. It was a similar carousel in better condition. We heard that he immediately went to her house and purchased the second rare Marklin carousel. The English woman sold her toy at a good price because she waited until she knew exactly what it was worth. There is always an underbidder at an auction, so she knew that at least two people were willing to pay \$85,000.

Q. How old is my grandfather's clock? It is marked "Brass clocks made and sold by Seth Thomas, Plymouth Hollow, Conn." It has two lead weights. One is for the time and the other for the chimes.

A. Seth Thomas originally used wooden movements in his clocks. Brass movements were first introduced in 1838. The company started using springs instead of weights in 1850. The clock was probably made in the years before those two dates.

Q. How can I tell if my figurine with the crossed blue lines on the bottom is really Meissen china?

A. You can't tell from the mark. More than 25 different factories listed in recent ceramic-mark books used the "crossed swords" mark. The blue crossed lines were well known, easy to draw and added a touch of glamour to the works of minor factories. The laws about trademarks were not as strict as they are today. The quality of the porcelain is the best indication of the maker.

Sports Editor A quick start and an alert crew was a winning combination for Grosse Pointers Paul Van Tol and Bruce Vande Vusse in the recent Port Huron to Mackinac race.

Van Tol and Vande Vusse's Eliminator was one of five boats owned by Grosse Pointers to win their classes in the recent race, sponsored by Bayview Yacht Club.

They took first place in the Performance Handicap Rating Factor (PHRF) G class, finishing in 50:30.54 with a corrected time of 35:37.21.

"We did well during the first part of the race, and hitting the Cove Island buoy well ahead of everyone else gave us a big advantage," said Van Tol, a member of the Grosse Pointe Sail Club. "We beat all but two boats to the buoy.'

It wasn't quite as easy as it sounds, however, because blowing fog hampered visibility. Eliminator was relying on its computer instruments to guide it through the fog, but sometimes the human eye still holds the upper hand over technol-

"The buoy is sunk in deep water so there can be a 200-foot swing where it might be." Van Tol said. "If we had relied on the computer we would have missed it, but one of our crew saw the buoy and we had about 30 seconds to navigate further right. One other boat missed it and spent about an hour coming back."

Van Tol said the weather reports his crew received were , also helpful.

"They were extremely accurate and we put our faith in the reports," he said. "They predicted a northwest shift in the wind on Monday morning so we just stayed along the north shore (of Lake Huron) and didn't have any problems.'

This was the seventh Port Huron to Mackinac race for

Van Tol and Vande Vusse and their first championship. They finished third in their class two years ago.

"It's always an interesting race," Van Tol said. "You learn something new every year and you realize just how much of a team sport it is. Every member of the crew plays an important part in your success."

Among the other class champions from Grosse Pointe was Warren Jones' The Great Whisper out of Bayview. Jones had an elapsed time of 49:05.30, corrected to 36:08.30 to earn the first-place trophy in PHRF

Windy, William Bresser's boat sailing under the colors of the Detroit Yacht Club, won PHRF F with an elapsed time of 51:18.39, corrected to 37:16.54.

Veteran skipper Charles Bayer, sailing in his 47th straight Mackinac race, took first place in PHRF K. His Old Bear had an elapsed time of 47:54.41 which was corrected to 46:53.29. The 64-year-old Bayer elected to sail the new shoreline course instead of the Cove Island course - the only one used since the 1971 race. Earlier Mackinac races were run along the shorter shoreline

Bayview's Sensation, owned by Grosse Pointers Thomas, Thomas and Chapman, won IMS A with a corrected time of 39:08.51 after finishing in 43:28.43.






