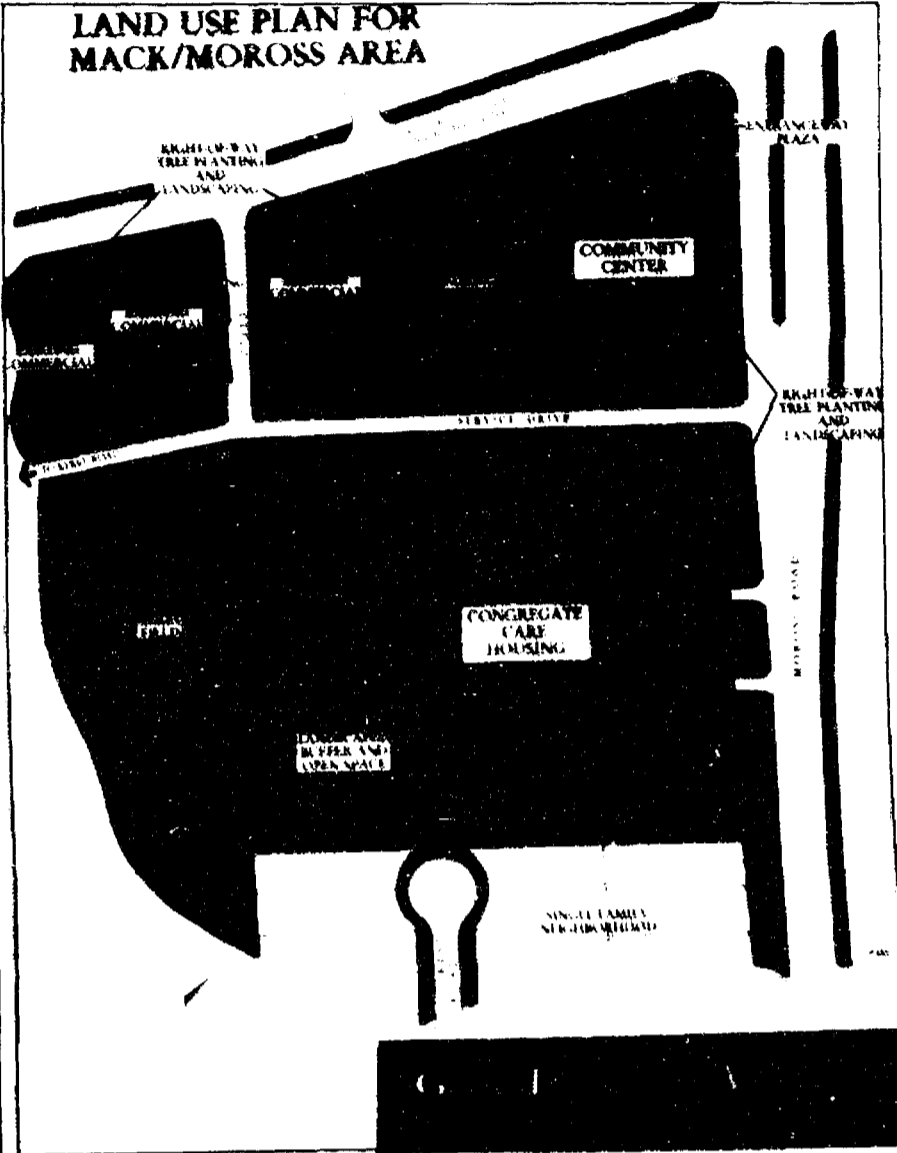

Community center, senior housing eyed for Mack/Moross

The pleas to build a senior housing complex in the Pointes have been heard by those in a position to accommodate such a request.

The City of Grosse Pointe Farms announced this week the acceptance of the recommendations of its economic development task force to construct senior housing and a community center on the Mack/Moross site the Farms purchased for \$3.1 million in late 1994.

"For several years, the goal of the Farms city council has been the improvement of this corner of Grosse Pointe Farms," said Mayor Gregg Berendt. "Among the values that the council holds high is to improve this important gateway to the Pointes while best serving the needs of our community. At Mack/Moross, we have the unique opportunity to achieve both goals."

Since December 1994, a sub-committee of the task force has worked with planning consultant Gerald Luedtke and Associates to look at potential uses for the property. The study, now concluded, proposes a housing complex for senior citizens and a community center.

The Farms also plans to acquire the first nine houses from the Sears building east as part of the project.

"It will square off the property and make this a viable project," Berendt said.

In December 1994, the Farms purchased the 5.1-acre parcel, which included Sears, A.I. Price and Jo Ann Fabrics and the parking lot behind these buildings.

The purchase was financed with a 1-mil increase over 10 years which went into effect last year.

It has not been determined how the nine houses would be paid for, but the Farms' share from the Grosse Pointe Cable sale last year is one possibility.

Sears and A.I. Price have vacated their buildings and Jo Ann Fabrics is scheduled to move down the street to the former Scott-Shuptrine location. Kroger, which has a lease until at least May 1998, is presently not part of the deal; however, the Farms has an option to purchase the Kroger property at a later date.

In late June or early July, the Sears, A.I. Price and Jo

Ann Fabrics buildings will be leveled and replaced with temporary landscaping.

City manager Richard Solak said a formal request for the proposal is being prepared in conjunction with further marketing and feasibility studies for at least the senior housing project.

"There is a good deal of additional work that needs to be done on the feasibility of senior housing at this location," Solak said. "The council felt it important to fully explore this recommendation, which has been a central theme of the Futuring Report and long discussed among senior groups in the community."

Logistics questions — how many housing units, rental or for sale, and prices — still must be answered.

Berendt stressed that this is strictly a Grosse Pointe Farms project now, but added that other area communities or partners may be participating in the future.

"This is a project where state and federal money is not being contemplated at all," Berendt said.

The project will not affect the Kerby baseball field this summer, but it could be reconfigured in the future to improve utilization.

Berendt said that the council is asking the public for input on the proposed project. The next council meeting is at 7:30 p.m. Monday, May 15.

"In removing this blight, we achieved one of our goals," Berendt said. "The second goal is to develop the property and to serve the community as it grows."

State offers 84 school districts \$45 million — rejection likely

Although the state has offered a settlement of \$45 million to 84 school districts — including Grosse Pointe — involved in a Headlee Amendment lawsuit, administrators aren't holding their breath.

The offer comes years after some 30 lawsuits were filed against the state and litigated all the way to the Michigan Court of Appeals.

The appeals court recently consolidated the cases and appointed retired Circuit Judge James Meis to work as a special master on the case.

The cases charge that the state did not make the appropriate categorical aid payments (whether full or partial) to government mandated programs at the levels paid in fiscal year 1978-79, as required under the Headlee Amendment of the state Constitution.

The special master will at-

tempt to make sense of all the cases and make a recommendation to the appeals court.

"In this context the plaintiff (school districts) have inquired as to whether we were willing to make an offer," said assistant state attorney general Paul Zimmer. "We looked at it and put on the table what we thought was a reasonable offer under the circumstances."

Zimmer said the state has not received a formal response from the 84 school districts listed as plaintiffs, but said he has heard unofficially that the offer will be rejected.

The \$45 million offer would be split between the plaintiff school districts as they see fit, Zimmer said, noting that there wasn't a formula to determine which school district was entitled to what amount of the settlement offer.

"We have been informed of the state's offer but it has not been considered by the school

board," said superintendent Ed Shine. "We don't anticipate it being presented to the board until June. It will be a lengthy process from this point on."

The case began in 1990 when the Warren Fitzgerald School District filed a lawsuit against the state because it wasn't funding categorical programs at 1978 levels.

Categoricals are government-mandated programs like special education, gifted and talented programs, bilingual education programs and driver education, Shine said.

One section of the Headlee Amendment, approved by voters in 1978, says that the state has to continue to fund programs it mandates at the same level the programs were funded in 1978.

In 1985, the state supreme court agreed with the Fitzgerald district and remanded the

Police arrive and party ends

Grosse Pointe Woods police broke up a large party of underage drinkers gathered at a house in the 800 block of S. Brys on May 6.

The department received several complaints from residents concerning underage drinking and when officers showed up at the house, they could see a number of teens socializing on the front lawn and a number of empty beer cans strewn on the grass. The teens fled when they spotted the scout car.

When officers went to the back yard, they saw about 150 partygoers, none of whom officers said looked old enough to be drinking. Officers said many of the teens were holding 16-ounce cups containing beer, which they dropped on the lawn when they saw the police.

As officers began rounding up the teens, many fled the yard. A 19-year-old man identified himself as the resident, telling police his parents were out of town and his party had apparently gotten out of hand. Police confiscated four kegs of beer and are conducting a follow-up investigation.

Is 'Bob' the new Elliot J?

A Grosse Pointe Woods woman said that on May 1 she received a telephone call from a man named Bob Stevens from MCI, who said he needed her long-distance calling card identification number.

The woman complied and was given a bogus 1-800 number to call for further information. She then called MCI and learned the call had been a fraud. She immediately cancelled her calling card and reported the incident to police.

A number of residents in the Grosse Pointes were called in March and April by a man named Elliot Johnson, who claimed to be working with the FBI and various long-distance phone companies. Mr. Johnson, under the guise of conducting a sting operation, asked callers to verify their calling card numbers and personal access codes so that he could catch the perpetrators of phone fraud.

Very few Grosse Pointe residents called by Johnson gave out any information and instead reported his activities to local police, the FBI and the phone companies.

Neighbors see suspicious man

Two Grosse Pointe Woods residents who live in the area of Morningside and Blairmoor reported on May 3 that they saw a man in a blue van driving and then walking around their neighborhood in a suspicious manner.

The mother of a 6-year-old girl said she saw the man driving past her house at a slow rate of speed, staring at her daughter as she played in the back yard.

Another resident told police she saw the man park his blue van and walk around the neighborhood. He is described as 5-feet, 6-inches tall, with brown curly hair and a slender build. He was driving a medium-blue van with no side windows.

Police follow trail of evidence

Grosse Pointe Farms police officers on duty early May 7 heard a loud crash outside the station on Kerby and when they went to see what happened, they found that a hit-and-run driver had struck two parked cars.

Officers followed a trail of freshly spilled oil and engine fluid on the street south on Kerby, west on Grosse Pointe Boulevard and then onto Fair Acres, where they found a 23-year-old man sitting behind the wheel of a 1993 Jeep with fresh

front-end damage.

When officers approached the driver, they could smell a strong odor of alcohol. The driver was arrested and cited for operating a vehicle under the influence of liquor, unlawful blood alcohol level and failing to stop at the scene of an accident. He was released on bond and is scheduled to appear in Farms municipal court on May 17.

Woman robbed at bus stop

A 49-year-old woman was robbed of her purse at 3:30 p.m. May 5 while waiting for a bus at the corner of Kercheval and Maryland in Grosse Pointe Park.

The woman, a Grosse Pointe Park resident, said she was approached and pushed down by a young man wearing a baseball cap. He grabbed her purse, containing her identification but no cash or credit cards, and fled down an alley. Police are investigating.

Caught in the act

Undercover Grosse Pointe Park police detectives on May 2 arrested two Detroit men in connection with a bicycle theft from a garage in the 1300 block of Lakepointe.

The detectives were on patrol when they saw the two men ride into the Park on one bike. One of the men got off the bike, went into an open garage and took a bicycle and attempted to flee. Police stopped both men and placed them under arrest.

Reginald Brown, 35, and Dion Brown, 17, who are uncle and nephew, were charged in Grosse Pointe Park Municipal Court with entry without breaking and intent to commit larceny. Both are being held in Wayne County Jail.

Woods readies to approve budget for 1995

Efforts by the Grosse Pointe Woods City Council to keep the city budget's under control appear to be successful.

The council tentatively approved a general fund budget of \$6,955 million, which will require no increase in the city's millage rate. Last year the

city's general fund budget was \$6,781 million.

"The millage rate for 1995 will remain the same as the millage rate for 1994," said city comptroller Cliff Mazon. "Our millage for '95 will be 11.79 mills as compared with 11.82 mills in '94. The city, under the Headlee amendment, can charge up to 18.15 mills. This

budget reflects the council's hard work and efforts to keep the millage rate down. The council did not want to raise millage rates, and thanks to their efforts, they won't."

The total city millage rate consists of several millages, said Mazon. The general operating millage remains 7.82, and the solid waste-recycling disposal millage also stays the same at 2.61 mills.

The park redevelopment bonds dropped slightly from 5586 mills to 5496 mills. The emergency medical services millage stays the same, 4996 mills. The biggest change is the swimming pool bond millage. In '94 it was 2820, and for '95 it will be 2965.

Councilmember Peter Gilezan, chairman of the council's budget committee, said that the council, as a way to further reduce costs, is looking at self-insuring the city's worker's compensation fund.

Right now, Gilezan explained, the city purchases worker's compensation insurance through the Michigan Municipal League. In order to self-insure, city officials would

set up a special worker's compensation account, and make annual contributions to it. Any worker's compensation claims against the city would be paid out of this special account.

The downside, said Gilezan, would be if the city had to pay a large number of claims before the account became fully funded. Then the city would have to pay claims using general fund money.

"We would still have insurance for claims above a certain amount," Gilezan said. "So if a huge claim were filed against us, we would be covered."

Right now Woods officials are compiling information of what it would cost the city to self-insure, said Gilezan. The council hasn't seen those figures yet, and will not act until it has time to study them to see if self-insurance is the best option.

"We don't know how much we could save," Gilezan said. "But we are hoping it's enough to offset rising costs in other areas of the budget."

The council will vote on granting final approval of the budget at the May 15 meeting.

Program provides grants to tackle regional issues

to capitalize on new leadership and positive momentum in our community," said Joseph L. Hudson Jr., chairman of the Community Foundation.

Funding partners include The Anderson Fund; Community Foundation for Southeastern Michigan; Mr. and Mrs. Stanley R. Day; Grayling Fund; Hudson-Webber Foundation; The John S. and James L. Knight Foundation; The Kresge Foundation; The Elizabeth Allan and Warren Sheldon Fund; Mrs. Richard C. Van Dusen; and David C. Whitney Fund.

New Directions is guided by a committee made up of donors and civic leaders who will determine program priorities and oversee the grant selection process. The Initiative will also showcase the projects funded and issues addressed to increase national visibility for southeast Michigan.

Lance Aldrich's comic strip, "Real Life Adventures," is based on his own life. Aldrich and his wife Donna live in Grosse Pointe Farms.

"We just lead lives. We go to work. Come home. Feed the cats. Have kids," Aldrich said.

"Real Life Adventures" appears on the feature page of The Detroit Free Press five days a week. Aldrich and his partner, Gary Wise of Fenton, create six panels and one colored multi-panel strip each week for Universal Press Syndicate. It turns up in 250 American and Canadian newspapers as well as papers in South Africa and Japan — even Sri Lanka.

"It's observational humor," Aldrich said. "We don't have continuing characters or a continuing story line like 'Cathy' or 'For Better or for Worse.'"

"Real Life Adventures" is gentle, quiet. Rather like Aldrich himself, a Mel Torme look-alike who offers soft-spoken observations, fresh perspectives and wry comments about some

of life's most mundane activities.

For instance, last Thursday's "Real Life" panel: An ordinary couple — Everyman and Everywoman, perhaps — are staring at a computer.

"Ewww...," they say. The caption: "Gawkers at a horrible crash on the information superhighway."

A 1993 "Real Life" shows a golfer wading waist-deep in water. The caption: "Golf tip: When you throw your clubs in the lake, make sure your car keys and wallet aren't in the bag."

"We touch a common nerve about shared mundane experiences," Aldrich said. "Then we try to put a little twist on it."

Aldrich and his wife Donna grew up in Leslie, where they were high school sweethearts. Leslie, he said, is "a teensy little town in the middle of Michigan that provided a pretty nice Huck Finn sort of boyhood."

Aldrich graduated from Michigan State University with a bachelor of arts degree in communication arts and advertising, "after stumbling around,

in, and through several different majors, including veterinary medicine, social work and clinical psychology," he said.

He's been working as a writer in the advertising business ever since graduation. Currently, he's a senior vice president, associate creative director with BBDO advertising agency in Southfield. He creates TV, radio and print copy for Dodge automobile ads.

"I'm happier than I've ever been, in business," he said. "I like being left alone to write."

Nights and weekends he and Wise, an art director with BBDO, do "Real Life Adventures."

Because there are no continuing characters or stories, every day is a new day, Aldrich said. And it's not easy. "We have to be funny on a clean sheet of paper every day."

Aldrich uses a portable tape recorder to hang onto ideas. "I'll be driving," he said. "I'll see a U of M sticker. I'll say,

college stickers on car windows. Sometimes it's just a word. Sometimes it's just a situation. I record it and figure out what it all means later."

Aldrich comes up with the jokes, situations and captions for the comics. Wise does the drawings. Sometimes they switch. Aldrich comes up with the visuals and Wise has the words.

"The best people in advertising are Renaissance people," he said. "They think in conceptual terms. Ideas. Not just copy. I'm a fair-to-middling art director and designer and my partner is a fair-to-middling writer."

The pair works about a month ahead on the daily panels and about two months ahead on the Sunday strips. "I do four or five pages of ideas for two weeks of dailies," Aldrich said. "I hand Gary my pages of word processing and leave the room as quickly as I can. I can't stand to watch him go over the material. It's like watching your paper being graded."

"He draws little thumbnail sketches next to the ones he likes and we refine them."

Aldrich and Wise began their collaboration six years ago on a slow day at work. They created a dozen panels and packed them off to 10 syndicates.

"Amazingly, two syndicates, King Features and Universal Press, were interested," Aldrich said. "Universal wanted to see 24 more. The editor there said he was attracted to our work because it was not another 'Far Side' spinoff."

"Real Life Adventures" was launched in March 1991 and they haven't missed a day since.

"We do seven days a week. Come rain, shine, flu or Christmas," Aldrich said.

Aldrich said they get four or five letters a week. Usually, people have nice things to say. Or they request autographs.

They get some complaints too. Aldrich feels bad about offending people.

"We try to treat our readers as intelligent people. We offer reflections on middle class life. Still, we have managed to offend people," he said.

"We don't pick on anyone, really, except middle class white guys."

Aldrich would eventually like to work on the comic strip full time, at home, and do some freelance writing on the side. It would have to be in wider syndication before he could afford to do so, he said.

"My partner Gary once said, tongue-in-cheek, that our goal should be to become so rich and so aloof that we no longer have anything relevant to say to the common man."

"I don't see that happening in the next 75 to 100 years," he said, with a smile.

Aldrich and Wise have published two books of their cartoons: "It's a Dog Eat Garbage World" and "Waiter, There's a Tie in My Soup." The books are available by calling (800) 255-6734.

Aldrich and his wife have been married nearly 30 years. She works in the personnel office of the Grosse Pointe schools. They live with two cats, Sparky and Sophie.

They have two grown sons. Eric, 27, is in the advertising business; Matt, 25, is a pastry chef.

"It amazes me that I am where I am," Aldrich said. "We're just two little kids from Leslie, Michigan."

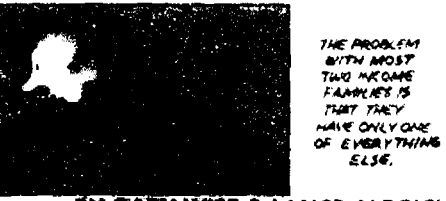

Say yes to schools

To the Editor:

I am writing to urge the citizens of the Grosse Pointe to vote in favor of the school millage renewals next month.

One of the main reasons my husband and I decided to buy a home in Grosse Pointe 12 years ago was the excellent reputation of its school system. Although we did not have children at the time, we believed that good schools and good city services were critical to maintenance of property values. Now that we have children in school, of course we benefit from our tax contributions more directly.

When my oldest child entered kindergarten in 1992 and I attended my first few PTO meetings at Ferry school, I was very surprised at the lack of luxuries in the school.

Class sizes were bigger than I anticipated (usually 25 students); there are few teachers' aides; there are only a few rather primitive computers in the classrooms; and there are no foreign language classes. The PTO was raising money to buy encyclopedias, refurbish the library, and improve the playground area.

While I have been very positively impressed by the quality of the classroom instruction and school administration, there was certainly no evidence of the kind of "extravagance" I would have expected from the news reports of our "wealthy" school district.

It is obvious that unless the millage renewal passes, serious and damaging cuts will be made in the educational program. Of course, some of us may have the option of sending our children to private school if class sizes are too large and the facilities too primitive, but that won't compensate us for the inevitable reduction in property values if the Grosse Pointe are no longer known as a community with a high level of commitment to its public schools. Support for the millage renewal is critical both for the children who attend the schools now and for the future of the community.

School millage deserve to pass

To the Editor:

On Monday, April 10, the board of education

passed the millage proposal that will appear on the June 12 ballot.

The proposal allows for approximately 6.8 mills over five years for the operating budget, which would maintain current services. This fills the gap left by Proposal A passed in Lansing last year. If the millage passes, the average Grosse Pointe resident will still enjoy a 48 percent decrease in overall school taxes from those paid in 1993.

Also, the board passed 6.1 an approximate 1.3 mill proposal for technology. This would commit about \$2.4 million yearly for five years for the purchase, installation, and staff training of the new computer systems. The technology will link our schools and bring the best this school system has to offer to all our students.

There are two important points that must be understood about the April 10 school board meeting.

First, the 6.8 gap millage must pass. Without those mills for operating expenses, class size will increase, high school schedules may be reduced from seven hours to six hours, teachers aides and assistants will be lost, and co-curricular programs such as the North planetarium, music, art, theater, and athletics will be cut or eliminated. With the proposed 6.8 mills for operating expenses, these services will be maintained and your property taxes will essentially be unchanged from 1994-95.

Second, the 1.3 mills for technology will get the school system "on line" with what is really happening in the world today.

As lifelong citizens of Grosse Pointe, we urge you to vote June 12 and encourage you to vote yes for both the gap and technology millage proposals.

As the Grosse Pointe schools start to release proposed budgets for the coming year, we are starting to see the results of the cuts that had to be made due to the defeat of the millage.

The sub-roster committee at Ferry Elementary did an excellent job of keeping the cuts as far from the students and classrooms as possible; however, every cut will affect our children in some way and some will have a very direct impact.

Larger class sizes with fewer assistants and cuts

in the teaching staff have been proposed. Instrumental music will be cut entirely. We think this will be a tremendous loss for our school.

As the students prepare for their spring concert, it's sad to think that this could be the last one. Of course, instrumental music isn't as important as math, science and reading, but it is important and it's one of the things that has made our schools special.

We hope others agree that we do not want these losses in our schools and vote to renew the millage on June 12.

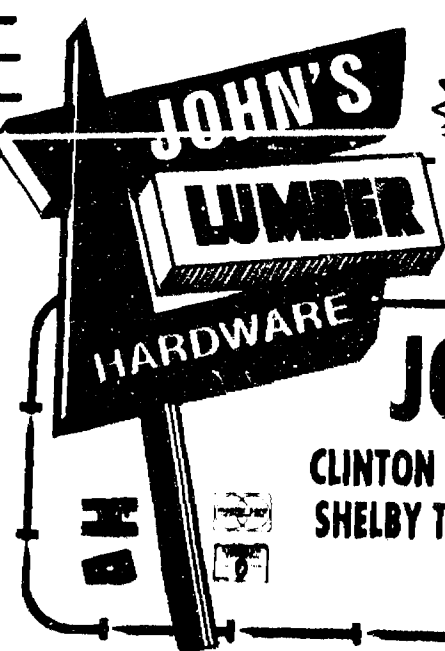

What the millage proposals mean

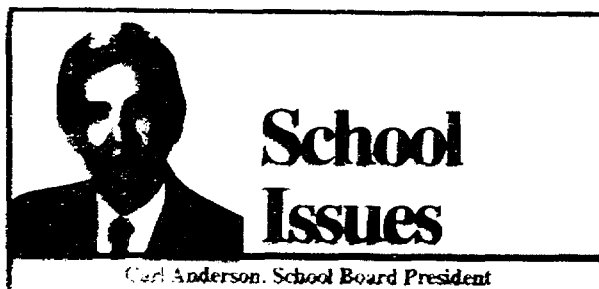
With the school board election on June 12 only a month away, a number of residents have contacted me to ask questions about the two millage proposals that will be on the ballot that day.

Proposal 1, or the "gap" millage, is for 6.8303 mills for five years to continue student programs and services and maintain building facilities at 1994 funding levels. Proposal 2, the technology millage, is for 1.2 mills for five years earmarked to fund the district's technology plan.

Some of the questions asked of me might be helpful to Grosse Pointe News readers. Here are a few I heard most frequently.

Q. Bottom line: How much will this cost me if these proposals pass?

A. If both proposals pass, you will pay approximately the same school taxes you paid in 1994. The new district library millage goes into effect on July 1, however, and that millage (approximately 1.3 mills) will appear on your 1995 winter tax bills. For the owner of a \$200,000 home (taxable value of \$100,000), the increase in combined school and library

taxes would be \$190.

Q. Why do we need a gap millage?

A. The gap millage makes up the difference between what the state pays the Grosse Pointe Public School System and what we actually spend on our students. That difference amounts to \$12.6 million, which is 17 percent of this year's school budget.

Q. Why can't technology be funded out of the school system's general operating fund?

A. Some technology has always been funded out of the general operating fund, but there has never been enough money to pay for a comprehensive district-wide plan. We need to modify our buildings (wiring, etc.) to support new hardware,

and we need to increase both the level and amount of hardware and software available to our students so they will be competitive both in college and in the workplace. We cannot do that within the severe financial constraints now imposed by the state.

Q. Why not fund technology through a bond?

A. We could ask voters to approve a bond, but that would cost taxpayers an additional \$1.8 million in interest over five years. In addition, earmarking the funds safeguards them for the purpose they were intended, because auditors consider earmarked funds as separate designated accounts.

Q. How is the board accountable during the five-year term

of the proposed millage?

A. Financially, the board is accountable every year during the site-based budgeting process, at the public hearing on the budget, and at the annual audit. For more important than that, however, is the board's accountability for serving our students well.

In Grosse Pointe, 90 percent of our graduates go on to colleges and universities across the country. Ninety-nine percent of this year's graduating class have earned all three diploma endorsements (reading, math and science) from the state. Seventy-three percent of the advanced placement tests taken by seniors in 1994 earned scores high enough to earn college credit. Student success is by far the true measure of accountability.

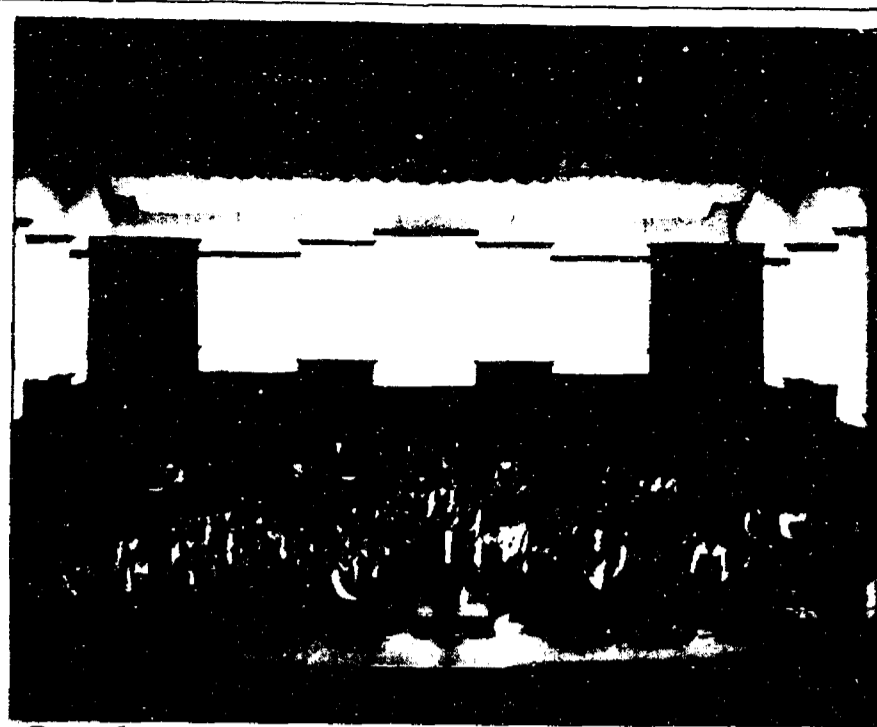

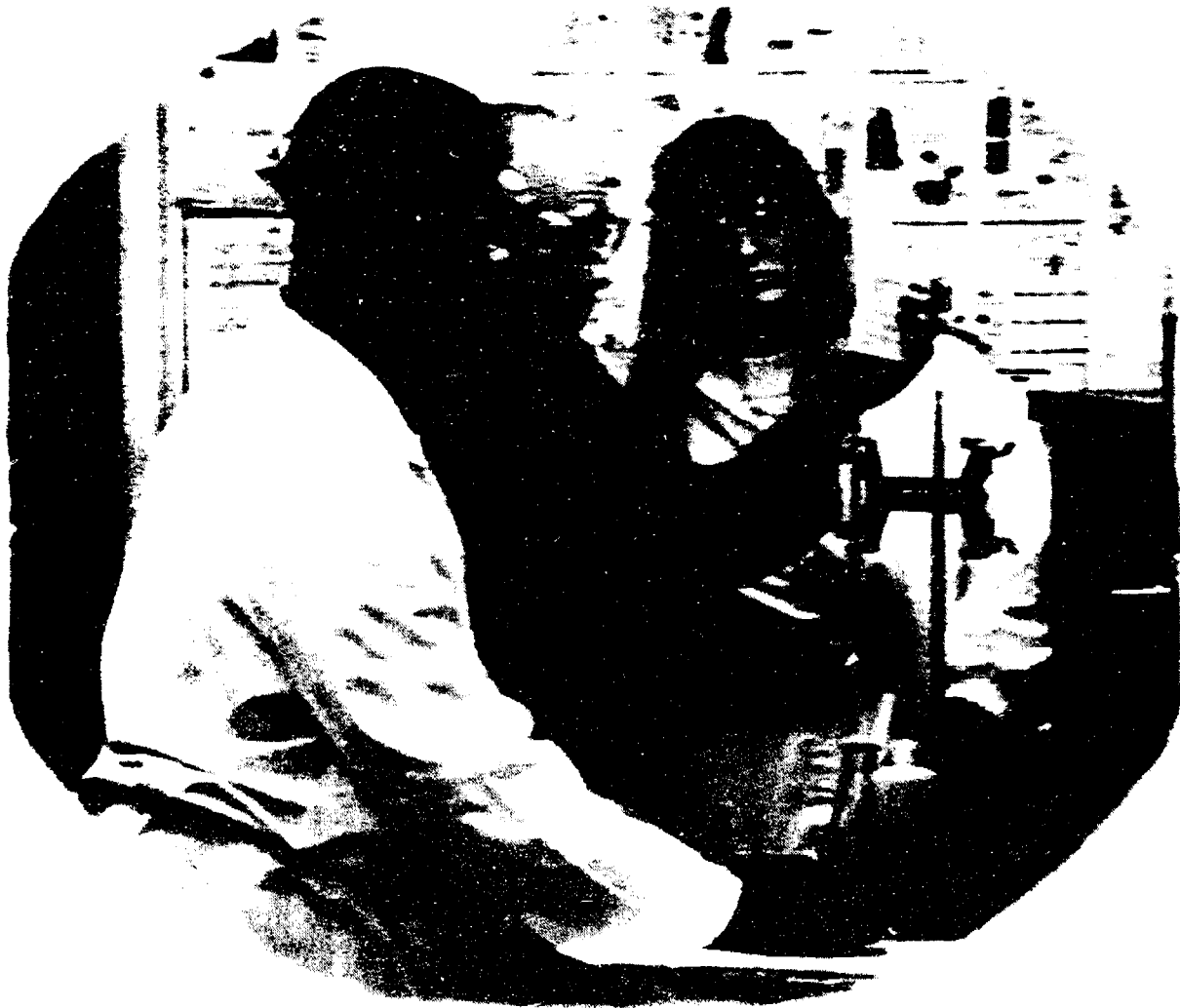

St. John, neighbors mend fence over parking lot improvements

In sharp contrast to previous construction proposals, St. John Hospital officials and area residents were able to quickly settle their differences.

As a result the hospital received permission from the Grosse Pointe Woods City Council to proceed with a new lighting plan for the hospital parking lot.

St. John officials told the Woods council at its May 1 meeting that the hospital had agreed to build a 6-foot brick and mortar fence along the border of the parking lot and the homes off Raymond and Bour-nemouth, removing a major neighborhood objection to the project.

St. John's original plan called for the replacement of an old wooden fence along the parking lot border with a new wooden fence. The old wooden fence was built before the city's current zoning laws for the area were passed, and received grandfather clause protection.

The hospital's original proposal called for a new 6-foot wooden fence to replace the old one. A new fence would not have grandfather clause protection and would have required a variance from the city council.

The hospital plan also called for the installation of several new street light poles. The height of the new poles is greater than allowed by city ordinance and also required a variance.

Hospital officials also asked that they get a variance from having to put a green belt of grass between the fence and the parking lot. Spokesman Greg Jakub told the council that a greenbelt would take away too many parking spaces.

But the variance requests stirred up considerable opposition at the April 3 council meeting.

"I want the hospital to build a 6-foot brick wall," said neighbor Carol Vanden Bussche. "Too much light spills between the slats with a wooden fence. There's only 3 feet of space between the wooden fence and the parking lot curb. A brick fence would increase property values."

Hospital director of engineer-

ing and maintenance James Wild said a brick fence would cost \$500,000 vs. \$25,000 for a wooden fence.

Several hospital neighbors expressed fears that higher light poles would mean more light spill into their back yards. Wild said that modern lighting technology can better focus light down and neighbors would have less light spillage.

Mayor Robert Novitke told the hospital representatives that a councilmember was absent and said that a delay in a vote until the full council was present was probably a good idea. Novitke also suggested that St. John officials use the time to meet with neighbors to see if they could work out some sort of compromise.

Jakub and Mike Moore, president of the Country Club Woods Progressive Association, were at the May 1 meeting and told the council that they had reached an agreement.

St. John agreed to build a 6-foot wall to replace the current wooden fence. The wall will be built in two phases. The first phase will be completed by October and cost about \$100,000.

The second phase will start in July 1996 and should be finished by October of '96. The second phase is estimated to cost \$200,000.

"After meeting with neighbors, I think we realized that we had many of the same concerns they did," said Jakub. "We want to enhance the

beauty of the neighborhood, but had different ways of getting there. I think this wall, despite its greater cost, is a sound investment in the community, and is the best way we can demonstrate our concern."

Moore said that the meeting with hospital officials was very productive and that the neighborhood group he represents was pleased with the outcome. Moore believes that the hospital's actions signal a new era of cooperation with its neighbors.

The council, after learning that the hospital and its neighbors had come to an agreement over the fence and the height of the light poles, unanimously approved the hospital's request for a variance on pole height and the need for a greenbelt around the parking lot.

Park condominium project stalled

After reaching an impasse, Grosse Pointe Park officials believe that they have come up with a solution that will get the proposed condominium project at Jefferson and Lakepointe moving again.

The Grosse Pointe Park City Council, at the request of restaurant owner and developer Diamond Phillips, approved the rezoning of several lots in the area of Jefferson, between Beaconsfield and Lakepointe.

Phillips owns several lots in the area and has proposed building condominiums along Jefferson. To complete the project he needed the rezoning. But to complete the project Phillips must also purchase the site where Lakepointe Olds used to

be. The city currently owns the property, after purchasing it for \$400,000 two years ago.

"Mr. Phillips has made an offer for the Lakepointe Olds property," said mayor Palmer Heenan. "The offer is considerably less than what the city paid for the property, and we will not sell it for a loss. We are still negotiating the price."

To end the impasse, Heenan has offered to sell the city's property to Phillips at an agreed on price per square foot, or purchase Phillips' property at the same price per square foot. If Phillips chooses to sell to the city, the city can then work out a deal with Tri-Mount, the Novi-based development company that will build the condominium units.

"Things like this happen all

the time in development deals," Heenan said. "This kind of offer is not unusual, that's why the council has chosen to make it."

While the city is negotiating, Tri-Mount is seeking final approval of its site plan from the Park planning commission before the commission issues a special land use approval, said city manager Dale Krajniak.

"Even if the property were sold today, construction can't begin until the planning commission approves the site plan," Krajniak said. "The commission should, if all goes well, grant permission in the next few weeks. Construction should begin within 120 days."

Brian Streck, Tri-Mount's representative on the condominium project, was unavailable for comment. John Vitale, who designed the condo project for Phillips, said that he believed that Phillips and the city would be able to reach some sort of agreement soon.

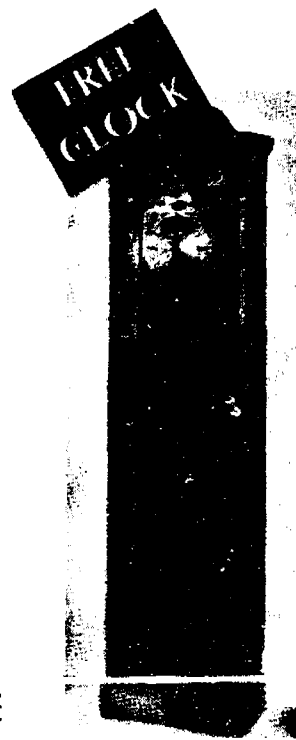

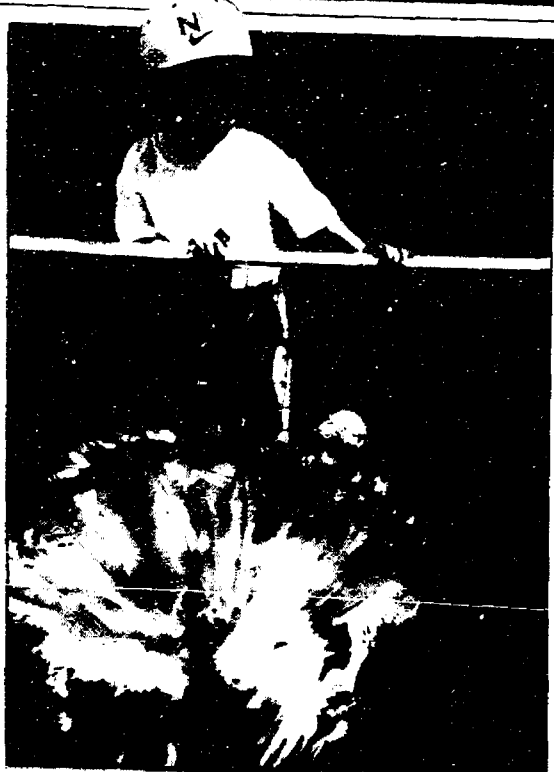

case to the appeals court. In 1990, several school districts filed another lawsuit against the state claiming that reductions in the state-financed portion of certain required services, like the funding of Social Security taxes, was in violation of the Headlee Amendment.

In the 1990 case, the state argued that Social Security is a federal program and the state is not obligated to pay the local school district's share.

Zimmer said in his opinion one of the biggest issues in the consolidated cases is the funding of special education pro-

grams.

"The school districts think that we owe them a lot more than we offered," Zimmer said, referring to the \$400 million the schools sought. "Most of the money in this case is involved in special education. We believe that special education is a federal mandate and we don't think we are liable."

Even if the plaintiff school districts were to get their settlement in this case, Grosse Pointe schools aren't expecting a windfall of millions of dollars, said Chris Fenton, assistant superintendent for business.

Every day is Mother's Day for Pregnancy Aid Sewing Group

On the first Thursday of the month, shortly after 9 a.m., about a dozen women get together at St. Paul Parish House to sew baby clothes.

They cut and stitch and sew and knit and quilt and crochet for three hours, sharing conversation and materials. Sometimes they bring sandwiches and share lunch.

About a dozen more women work at home making crib sheets and kimonos and knitting tiny sweaters and booties and bonnets for newborns.

All baby clothing is donated to Pregnancy Aid Inc., an ecumenical volunteer organization that provides counseling and assistance for pregnant women.

"We've helped 12,000 women over the last 21 years," said Madeleine Scranton of the City of Grosse Pointe, past president of Pregnancy Aid. "We give out 500 layettes a year. We're the envy of all the other Pregnancy Aid centers in the tri-county area, because of these women."

Betty Nienstedt of Harrison Township, formerly of Grosse Pointe Farms, started the group in February 1979, when she was president of the St. Paul Altar Society.

"A client of Pregnancy Aid came to me in 1978," Nienstedt said, "because she needed a snowsuit. I realized the need extended beyond one snowsuit, so I got a few friends together. We started meeting in February 1979, once a month in the parish house. The Altar Society bought some of our materials at first."

"Most of our clients are needy," Scranton said. "I remember a young girl who had just had a baby. Our layettes are in big plas-

tic bags, tied with pink or blue ribbons, depending on which sex the baby is. I showed her a hand-crocheted blanket from one of the bags of baby clothes.

"She said it was so beautiful," Scranton said. "She wept. She said nobody had ever given her anything so beautiful in her whole life."

Nienstedt said the Pregnancy Aid Sewing Group draws its members from more than St. Paul parish. "We put ads in other church newsletters," she said, "and now we have women who come from Our Lady Queen of Peace, St. Gertrude's, St. Joan of Arc, St. Matthew's and Our Lady Star of the Sea."

Nienstedt is chairman of the group. She's assisted by Rosemary D'Hooghe of the City of Grosse Pointe and Corrine Auty of Harper Woods.

Last year, Nienstedt said, the group contributed 85 crib sheets, 529 kimonos, 321 wrapping blankets, 274 quilts, 704 bibs, 158 sweaters, 80 afghans, 63 pairs of booties, 94 bonnets, assorted scarves, mittens and used baby clothes, even a few car seats.

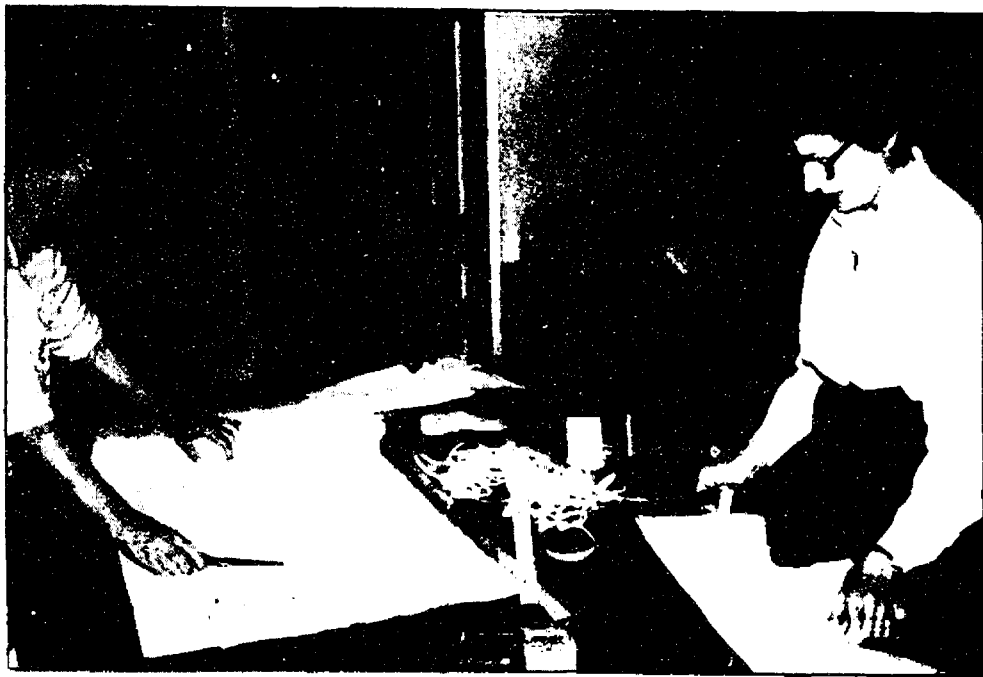
The sewing group has about two dozen active members, mostly mothers. Many are unable to attend meetings, so they work at home, knitting or sewing.

"It's really satisfying," she said. "We're all against abortion. This is a practical way to use our talents to work against abortion."

"Over the years the group has increased because of need. We started with five or six ladies and only a handful of things to donate."

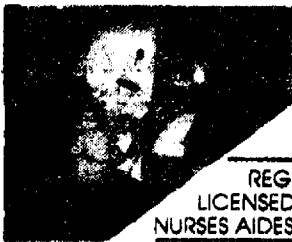

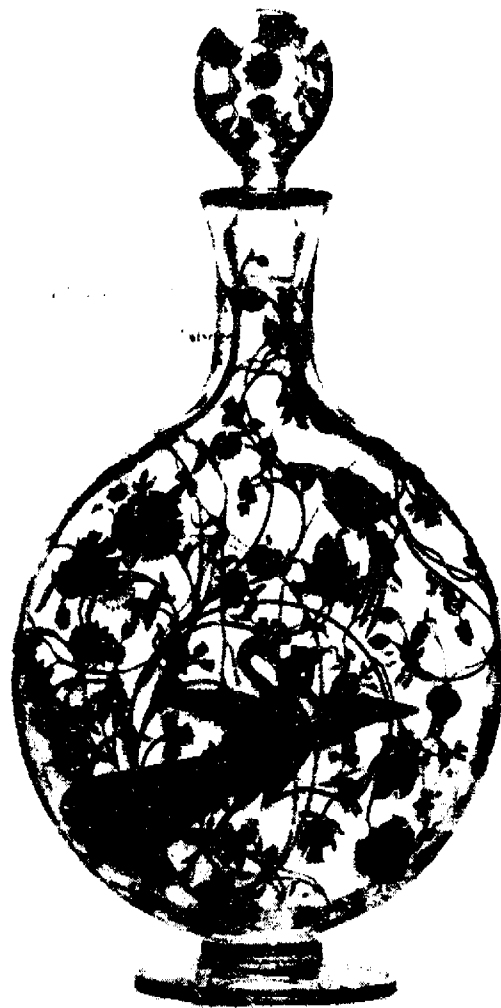

Autologous Donor Serum

In recent years, it has been increasingly common for those who are about to undergo elective surgery to donate and store their own blood before their surgeries. Autologous blood donation, as it is known, eliminates exposure to any perceived patient's own blood if it is needed. Now, a study by researchers at the University of California at Los Angeles reports that autologous blood donation provides very little in the way of added safety, largely because stringent testing of ordinary donated blood has reduced the risk of contracting the AIDS virus to about one in 225,000. In addition, autologous blood donation adds to the cost of surgery. Patients should weigh these new facts when assessing their own comfort levels.

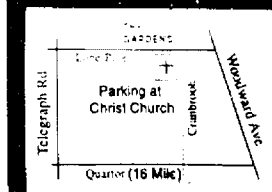

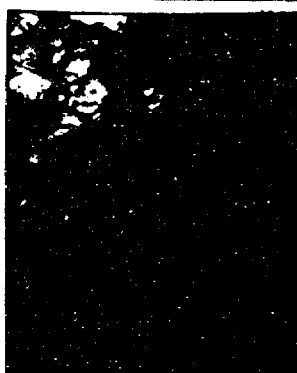

New draw at Rushmore is Crazy Horse

This is the first of two reports from South Dakota.

South Dakota's claim to tourism fame has always been Mt. Rushmore. The mountain on which are sculpted the faces of four United States presidents. We all have seen pictures of this fascinating monument since we were small and most of us figure that we will see it someday.

Chances are, if you have been to Mt. Rushmore, you did it the typical way: Your family drove there by automobile. After all, western South Dakota really isn't close to anywhere else so it is the perfect destination for a driving vacation from the Midwest: once you get there you can turn around and head back. You can make the trip in about 10 days if you include the appropriate amount of sightseeing.

These days, however, with two parents working and all of the pressures of children's summer activities — everything from swimming to soccer — it seems that fewer families are making those old-fashioned driving trips. Even I must admit that I flew in and out of Rapid City.

But the fact is, whichever way you choose to do it — drive all the way, or fly and rent a vehicle — South Dakota is still a great place for a family vacation. And your children might even have some extra appreciation for it when you explain that this is where "Dances with Wolves" was filmed.

"There isn't much out there," a good friend of mine from Texas observed, "but it has a very special feel. Those plains... well, they are just really different than anything around here."

Olivia Felder, who lives in Rapid City and is part Sioux Indian, declares that the skies are bluer there. "It has been documented by scientists," she explains. "We don't have the pollution and other stuff in the air and so it is actually clearer."

She also told us much about her Native American heritage, which is a very important component of any visit to this state which is home to the seven bands of the Great Sioux Nation. One of those facts is that these Indians do not like to be called "Sioux," which is a French term given to them by their enemies, the Chippewa. A loose translation is "little snakes."

Instead, these Native Americans call themselves Lakota, Dakota or Nakota — depending on which Sioux dialect they speak. Those who live on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation near Rapid City (second only to the Navajo reservation in size)

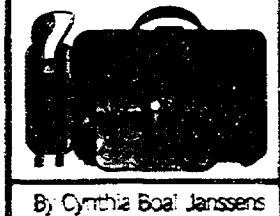

call themselves Lakota. It is a proud word for a proud people.

One of our side trips from Rapid City was a visit to this reservation, but I digress. Back to Mt. Rushmore. This famous mountain is located a mere half hour out of Rapid City, which is the only city of any size in this half of the state. However, it does not appear to be big because there are not any tall buildings — in fact, the 10-story historic Hotel Alex Johnson where I stayed positively towers over downtown.

Of course, I had looked forward to seeing this famous site so I was not pleased when the day was dark and dreary. And the fog was the final insult.

When we arrived, it was to see the entire mountain bathed in white. No faces. However, we listened to a national park ranger talk about how sculptor Gutzon Borglum came to undertake this tremendous task, which actually was never quite finished. When he died unexpectedly in 1939, work ceased and so it has remained.

Right now the park buildings at its base are all under renovation so it promises to be an even more inviting place to visit in future years. As we were leaving, the fog finally lifted — a bit — and we were able to glimpse the carvings, even if it did appear that tears were running down those famous faces. (Fortunately, we had the opportunity to return a few evenings later to see the mountain lit at night and it was quite impressive.)

However, another highlight awaited us. Just down the road apiece and several mountains away, another sculpting feat is under way. Most of you have probably heard or read about it by now: Crazy Horse. This is where not just a mountain face, but an entire mountain, is being sculpted by a private family to honor a famous Indian.

The story is rather lengthy but I'll condense: Korczak Ziolkowski was a sculptor who had already gained great fame at

the 1939 New York World's Fair when he was asked by some aged Indian chiefs who had survived the Battle of the Little Big Horn (where chief Crazy Horse defeated Gen. George Custer) to come to South Dakota and sculpt a monument for them. As that first letter from Sioux chief Henry Standing Bear to Ziolkowski stated, "My fellow chiefs and I would like the white man to know the red man has great heroes, too."

Ziolkowski came to South Dakota, heard them out, thought about it for seven years (during which he served in World War II), became entranced with the idea, went forth and bought a mountain and began sculpting. He arrived in the Black Hills in 1947 at age 38, pitched a tent and began. Eventually, he was to bring his new wife Ruth and their 10 children into the project.

Ziolkowski died in 1982 and his work goes on. Ruth remains chairman of the Crazy Horse Foundation which owns the site and carries on with the sculpting. Eight of the children are still involved in running a museum, gift shop and restaurant at the base of the mountain. No

public funds are involved. Chances are that Ruth will greet you when you visit as she rarely leaves. There is no estimated completion date, but the head should be finished by the year 2000.

The project is massive and impressive and should not be missed. That is not to say it is without controversy. The Indians don't all rave over Mt. Rushmore and there are those who disparage Crazy Horse. But one senses that attitude is waning.

"There are many who thought that Korczak was taking advantage of the Indians," explains Rob Lee, local historian. "But I've known Korczak since he arrived here — in fact, I was the first newspaperman to interview him, and I have never seen anyone work that hard — physically, I mean. It was brutal work and I always thought he would die on that mountain. Anyone who works that hard believes in what they are doing."

So it is today that most folks head out to Mt. Rushmore and then on to Crazy Horse and in one day will see two of the most amazing sights in America.

Of course, with those comes a lot of other stuff... trash and trivia, it might seem. Which is to say that the outskirts of Rapid City are full of kitsch. Places selling Black Hills gold jewelry (distinctive for its grapevine patterns and green and pink hues) are nestled next to ranches offering chuckwagon dinners and campgrounds with few trees but lots of spaces. There is Bear Country USA and a marine show. There are water slides and caves to explore. Obviously, your kids won't be bored.

The best of these is the Reptile Gardens. Ignore the name. The place, which dates back to the 1930s and remains in the same family, is extremely well done and will be enjoyed by all. As you would expect, the Gardens has an extraordinary collection of reptiles — look for a fascinating little fellow called a Jackson's chameleon (a three-horned lizard with paws that open and a reticulated tail) — but there are many other animals as well, including an amazing collection of giant tor-

toises. The Reptile Gardens offers five live shows during the summer: reptiles, raptors, alligators, domestic animals and birds. Expect to spend several hours there. Don't miss the beautiful flowers and the collection of artifacts, minerals and gems which decorate the various cages. They are as interesting as the animals.

Oh yes, and there is a chicken which hits home runs. And a duck that counts. And some other fanciful stuff that's been held over from the 1940s and '50s. You'll love it.

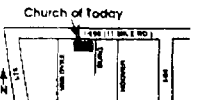

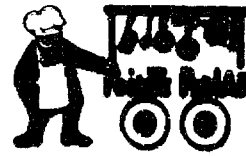

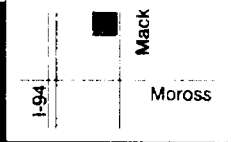

Herbs enjoy uses from medicine to cooking to perfume

With a new respect accorded to herbs by the medical profession, the herbalist physicians of the Middle Ages are being viewed in a new light, and new research into the many healing properties of herbs is opening up fresh approaches to the chemist and pharmacist as well.

Culinary herbs have again acquired the importance they had during the Middle Ages when the ladies of every manor house, farm or castle had their stillrooms (short for distill) where they compounded herb vinegars, mixtures of dried herbs for seasoning, and confections and preserves based on herbs they had grown in their gardens.

The perfume industry is one of the largest users of herbs, which are used as aromatics, accents and blenders in nearly all of the popular perfumes of today.

Some of the most popular herbs in use today have romantic pasts. Sweet basil, so good in tomato dishes, is sacred in India to krishna and vishnu, and to die with a sprig of basil on one's breast is to wear a passport to paradise.

The Moldavians consider basil to be a herb of such importance that a man who accepts a sprig of it from a woman will, they believe, be so enchanted with her that he will love her forever. And in Italy it is said that basil engenders sympathy between those who may wear it.



There are probably more legends and myths connected with thyme than almost any other herb. Among them is the idea that if you brush your eyelids with wild thyme you will be able to see elves, gnomes, fairies and sprites invisible to everyone else.

Chervil, on the other hand, one of the ingredients in the so-called "fines herbes" mix, was one of the most basic herbs in the gardens and kitchens of ancient Rome. In the 15th century it was a kitchen staple and was also used as a strewing herb scattered on floors to give a sweet scent to the rooms in the house.

Oregano, a basic herb in spaghetti sauce recipes, was very popular in the early 19th century as a sachet ingredient to be carried in a small packet to sniff in case of faintness instead of smelling salts. A rinse made of cooled oregano tea was poured through the hair to condition it and prevent hair loss.

Also very popular in the 19th century was a hair rinse made of chamomile flowers and leaves. It would keep blonde hair from darkening. It is a foolproof garden asset as well because it is easy to grow and is very ornamental. Its nickname is "plant's physician" since it seems to promote the health and vigor of plants grown near it. Chamomile flowers make an aromatic tea, are wonderful in potpourris, are an insect repellent, and have definite antiseptic properties. Chamomile tea is the oldest herb tea on record, having been popular for literally thousands of years.

Sage is nearly as venerable. The Chinese have long treated it with great respect and, in past generations, held it in such high regard that they would barter four units of tea for one unit of the precious herb. Sage derives its name from the Latin verb meaning "to heal" and in ancient Rome it was thought that if one were anointed with this herb one would become very wise and possibly never grow old.

For centuries rosemary has been symbolic of reminiscence and remembrance. As such it has been tucked into countless bridal bouquets, worn at funerals, mailed in Christmas cards, and given to departing guests. A native of the many coastal hills of the Mediterranean area, its name means "dew of the sea" and if the wind

is offshore may be smelled miles out to sea. Wonderful as a seasoning with lamb, it also is a moth repellent when made into a sachet with lavender, cloves and dried lemon peel.

Herb gardens are enjoying a great revival of interest everywhere. More and more people are adding herbs to create ornamental plots in their gardens, fragrant borders, or windowboxes or kitchen windowsills. One notable herb fancier who is often a visitor here is world traveler Gregg Peterson, of Chicago, nephew of Boyce and Lois Tope of Grosse Pointe Woods. He is impressed with the many herb gardens in Grosse Pointe, particularly the beautiful one maintained by the Grosse Pointe Herb Society on the grounds of the Grosse Pointe Academy.

It is hard to think of dandelions as herbs, but so they are, and in fact are considered to be one of the "bitter herbs" mentioned in the "Old Testament." (Of course, most gardeners striving for a perfect lawn consider it a pretty bitter herb even now.)

Lettuce, a basic component of salads, was used in many medicines of ancient Egypt whose doctors were considered to be the best in the world.

Perhaps the largest herb listed in medieval herbal books is the hawthorne which we think of as a tree, but which then was sacred, as Christ's crown of thorns was supposedly made from twigs of the hawthorne.

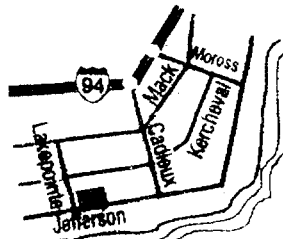

Falling mortgage rates boost home sales in March

Sales of previously owned homes rallied between February and March, as declining mortgage rates pulled consumers back into the market, according to the National Association of Realtors.

The association recorded a seasonally adjusted annual sales rate of 3.62 million existing single-family homes last month, up 5.8 percent from February, when the resale rate was 3.42 million units. Sales rose between February and March in all of the regions.

NAR president Edmund G. Woods, Jr. said the rise in housing activity reflects some pent-up demand from prospective buyers who had been waiting for mortgage rates to drop.

"The spring home buying season is off to a promising start," Woods said. "Buyers who left the market appear to be coming back."

However, he noted that he remains "cautiously optimistic" about the outlook for home sales.

"The availability of jobs has a heavy influence on housing activity. In areas where employment is stable, home sales are picking up and will continue to pick up," Woods said.

NAR chief economist John A. Tuccillo pointed out that a decline in interest rates is the basic factor boosting markets that already have the elements for a healthy housing industry.

"Rates alone don't make or break a market," Tuccillo said. "The areas that will thrive this year are those

with strong local economies, low unemployment and an ample supply of affordable housing."

The Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corp. reported that the national average commitment rate for 30-year, conventional, fixed-rate mortgages has continued to slide during the first quarter of 1995. The rate was 8.45 percent in March, down from 8.77 percent in February and 9.15 percent in January. However, at 8.45 percent, the average mortgage rate for March remained significantly higher compared to one year earlier, when it was 7.68 percent.

The sales rate for existing single-family homes in March was 11.9 percent below that for March 1994, when the rate was 4.11 million units.

Last month's national median existing single-family home price was \$107,900, which was unchanged from one year earlier. The median is the midpoint in the price range — half the homes sold cost more, half cost less.

On a regional basis, the Midwest recorded the largest increase in existing-home sales between February and March. In that region, the resale rate was 960,000 units in March, up 14.3 percent from February. However, the rate was down 7.7 percent from one year earlier. The median existing-home price in the Midwest was \$88,000, up 2.9 percent from March 1994.

The Northeast's resale pace for March was 550,000 units, up 1.9

percent from February, but down 8.3 percent from March 1994. The median price for existing single-family homes in the Northeast was \$136,700 last month, down 2.6 percent from one year earlier.

The South posted a resale rate of 1.35 million units in March, up 3.1 percent from the February pace, but down 12.3 percent from March 1994. The region's median price was \$92,600 last month, down 2.1 percent from one year earlier.

The resale rate for the West was 760,000 units in March, up 2.7 percent from the rate for February, but 17.4 percent below that for March 1994. The median price in the West was

\$141,900 last month, down 2.8 percent from March 1994.

There were 1.82 million homes available for sale in March, representing a six month supply at the March resale pace.

Currently, NAR is predicting a total of 3.713 million existing-home sales for 1995, down 5.9 percent from 1994. The national median existing-home price for 1995 is expected to be \$111,400, rising 1.5 percent from 1994.

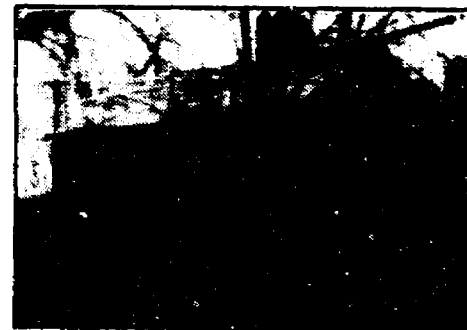

Long-term value in home remodeling not such a long shot

Homeowners who remodeled in 1993 spent an average of \$1,330 each improving their houses, according to the U.S. Department of Commerce. Those remodeling dollars covered everything from roof replacements to new windows and room additions. Only a few of those projects delivered the long-term value homeowners were hoping for.

"Selecting a quality home remodeling project within budget constraints can be difficult, particularly for homeowners who lack

a remodeling background," said Patrick Bushey of Pella Window & Door company, the local distributor of Pella windows and doors. "When it comes to selecting new windows, many area homeowners are unsure how to make the best use of their money."

In fact, *Better Homes and Gardens Special Interest Publications* found nearly 40 percent of survey respondents were undecided about the type of window they want to purchase. That's nearly equal to those who plan to purchase wood windows, while only 11 percent were opting for vinyl.

Bushey recommends window selection be based on a number of factors. First, consider the home decor. Many people prefer wood windows because they can be painted or stained to coordinate with the wood trim in the home. Aluminum and vinyl windows, on the other hand, usually are available in one or two standard colors and that color will be on both the interior and exterior. A popular option is aluminum-clad wood windows, providing the warmth and beauty of wood on the interior, and aluminum's low-maintenance benefits and color choices on the exterior.

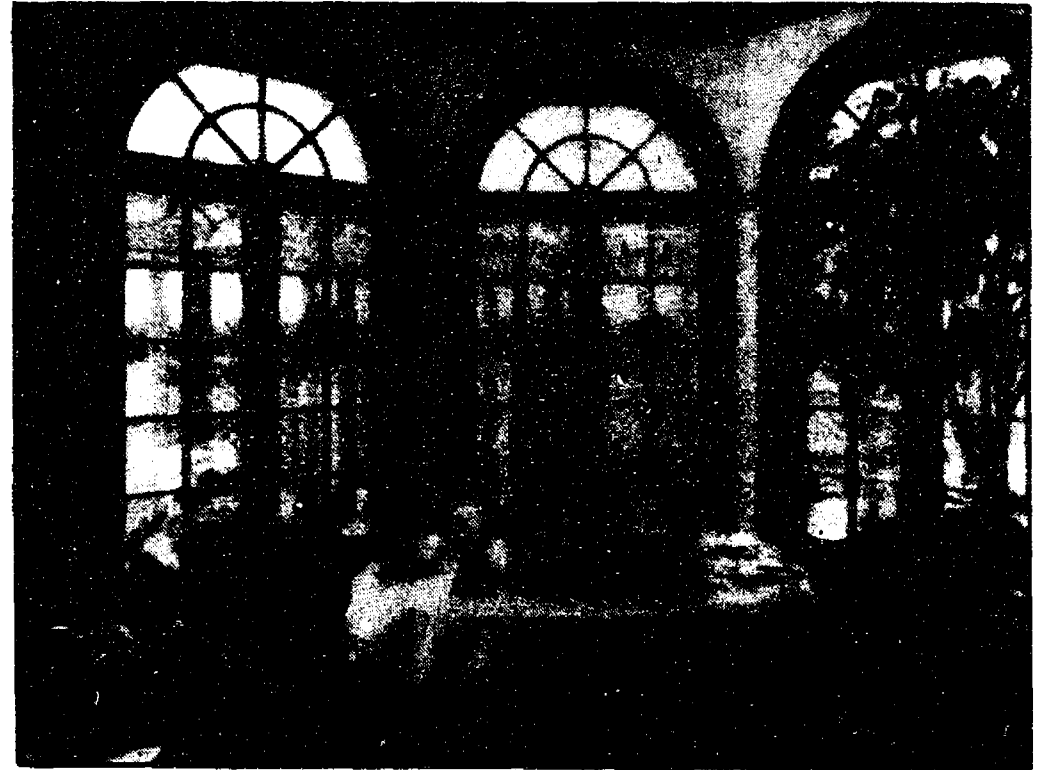
"The next big question is the window's long-term durability," Bushey said. Vinyl windows can crack, shrink

and expand when exposed to the elements. This is probably one reason wood windows tend to deliver a better return on the investment than vinyl."

According to *Metropolitan Home* magazine, installing wood windows usually delivers a higher payback — between 77 and 97 percent — over aluminum and vinyl windows.

Finally, Bushey suggested

homeowners evaluate a window's energy efficiency. Homeowners should request a window's total-unit U-value, a measure of the amount of heat lost through both the glass and window frame. The lower the U-value, the better. A good, energy-efficient window will rate about .40. For free literature on making window decisions, call 1-800-847-3552.

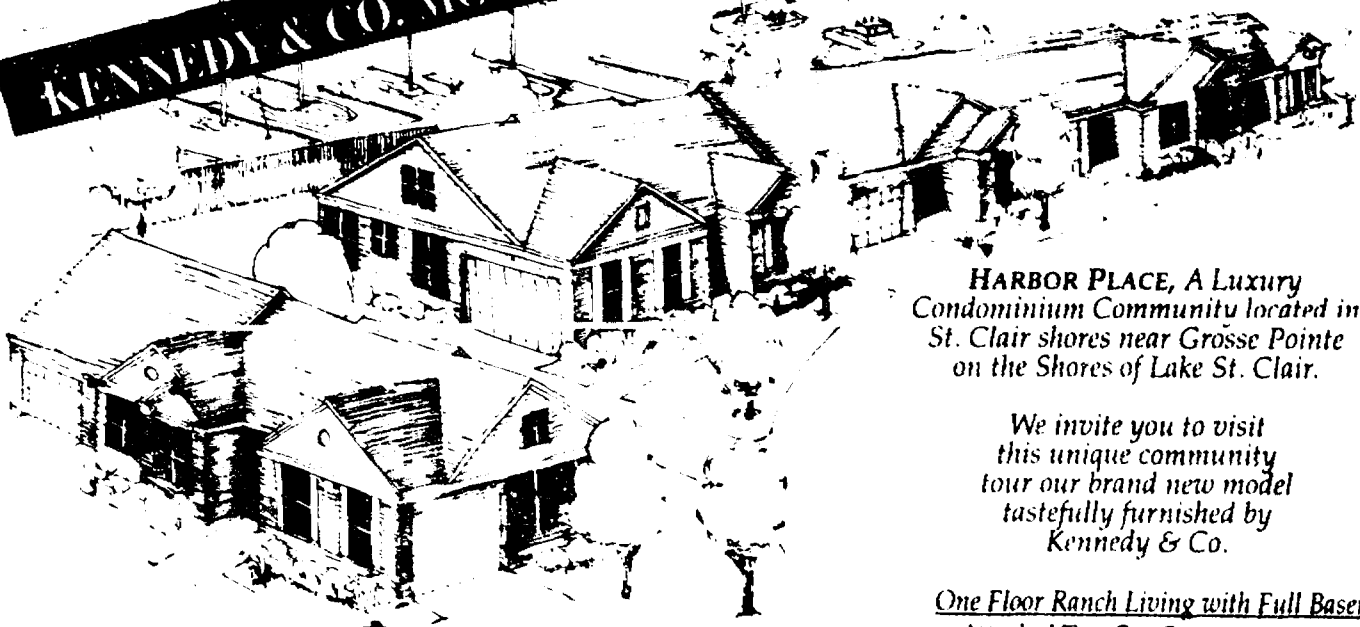

Use your yard clippings to build healthy soil

Every day, the average American discards 3.5 pounds of refuse. From leaves to grass clippings and Christmas trees, more than 20 percent of the refuse is yard waste which can be composted or used as a mulch in the garden or on the lawn.

Yard waste can be converted to "yard riches" to build a healthy home landscape. The vision of the "New American Yard" is a landscape of small habitats of plants, beauty, and peace. The solutions to some global environmental problems may be found in our own back yard.

To reduce the refuse at landfills, try composting and mulching yard wastes such as grass clippings, leaves, prunings, and old flowers. Even the most casual gardener can reuse many of the yard clippings generated during the spring, summer, and fall.

Since the landscape character of each yard is different, there is no single "yard waste reduction formula" for use in every yard. You are encouraged to develop your own plan, combining nature's recycling system with common sense.

Year after year, leaves, grass and foliage mature, grow, die, and eventually fall to the ground. Soil organisms begin the process of decomposition, helping to transform yard debris and clippings into rich

layers of humus that give soil its dark color and its good "rich earth" smell.

Mulching grass clippings is one common-sense method. Mulching adds nitrogen, reduces evaporation from the soil surface, and provides ideal conditions for earthworms and other organisms necessary for healthy soil.

Before purchasing shrubs or garden plants, read the tag and ask questions. Make sure that the plant is suited to the sunlight and terrain of your yard. Select varieties that minimize the need for water and pest control. Consider slow-growth species that "naturally" minimize yard waste.

What is composting?

Composting is a semi-controlled decomposition process in which microscopic organisms break organic waste materials into a dark, rich and crumbly substance called humus. Compost comes from the Latin root compostus, "to put together." Successful composting can take place, given enough time, by simply layering grass clippings and leaves together. Moisture, soil, and air are also essential elements in the composting process. There is no need to add artificial chemicals, fertilizers, or manures.

Every compost mixture should include either old compost or soil. The

old compost or soil provides essential micro-organisms which decompose the raw materials.

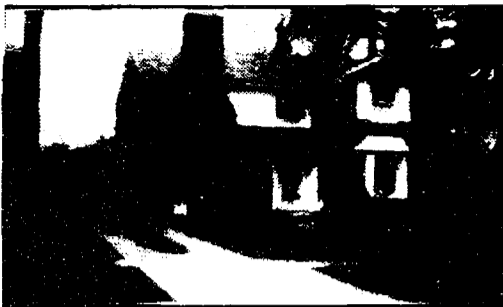
DRAYTON'S DOLLY DINGLE DOORSTOP
One of the more popular illustrators of the early 20th century was Grace Drayton. Born as Grace Gebbie in 1876, her first drawings were published in the 1890s. She later gained fame as the creator of the Campbell's Soup kids in 1904 and a poplar paper doll named Dolly Dingle in 1913.
She was married twice, to Theodore Widerseim and W. Heyward Drayton II. Her illustrations were marked with any one of her three surnames but she is best known as Grace Drayton.
Drayton illustrated many children's books, advertisements, magazine poems, stories and wrote a comic series called "The Pussycat Princes..." Her round-eyed, full-faccd characters were copied in many forms, including dolls, bookends and even iron doorstops.
Q. I have eight small plates with a pink and white design. On the back of

the plate is the following: "Kent, Made in England by Swinnertons Ltd. Genuine hand engraving, acid and detergent resistant colours." I know the word detergent has been in use since 1832 but to me it has only been in popular use since the advent of the dishwasher. Can you help?
A. The words "detergent proof" or "detergent resistant colors" were first used about 1944. You probably have a rather recent version of an antique pink transfer design plate. Swinnertons Ltd. has been making dinnerware in England since 1906.
Q. My old 7 1/2-inch milk pitcher is in the form of a deer or moose head. It is marked on the bottom, "Royal Bayreuth, Bavaria." What is it worth?
A. Your pitcher was made by a famous factory that started in Tettau, Bavaria, in 1794. The pottery company is still operating, and its mark has changed with the times and local polit-

ics. The word Bavaria was used from about 1870 to 1919. You probably own a piece known as the Elk pitcher. The spot is the animal's head; the antlers curve back to form the top rim and part of the handle. A mint-condition pitcher sells for \$495.
Q. Is there any quick way to check for a crack in a porcelain or glass bowl?
A. Support the foot of the bowl on one hand and "ping" the rim. The bowl will ring if it is perfect; it will "donk" if it isn't.
TIP: For a pollution-free rug cleaner, use cornstarch. Sprinkle on rugs or carpet, then vacuum.
Q. I have a strange "vase" with Orphan Annie and Sandy modeled on the front. It's strange because it's small and the vase part has two small square holes. It's signed "Famous Artists Syndicate."
A. You probably have a toothbrush holder. Holders made with comic fig-

ures were very popular gifts for children in the 1930s. The holder was kept on the bathroom sink to remind children to brush each day. Mickey Mouse, Pluto, Donald Duck, the Three Little Pigs and other Disney characters were made in Japan and imported by the George Borgfeldt Co. from 1931 to 1941.
Orphan Annie and Sandy, Uncle Walt and Skeezix (characters from the "Gasoline Alley" comic strips) and Moon Mullins were other comic figures used for toothbrush holders in the 1930s. Prices are determined by their popularity. Disney figures bring the highest prices. Yours sells for about \$75.
